Frank and Maurice Drummy hailed the decision as a vindication of their five year battle with the planning authority and the electricity giants.

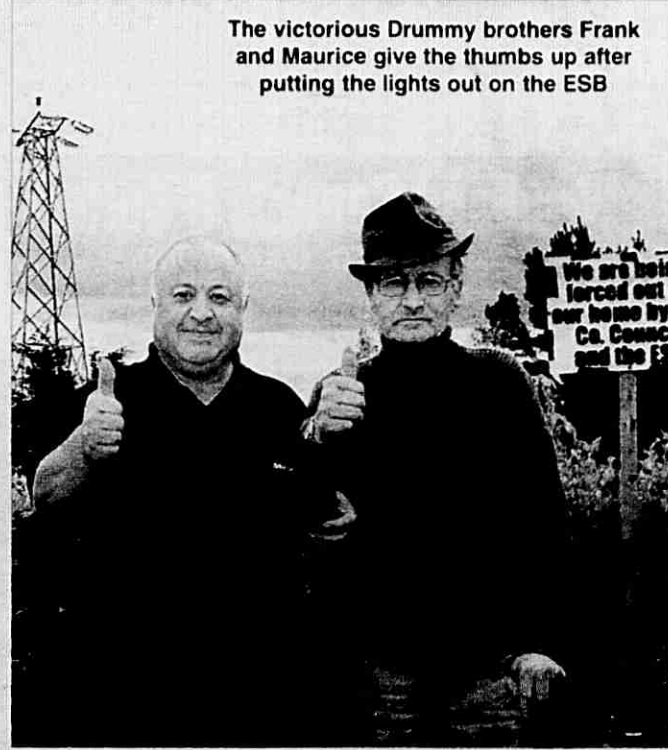

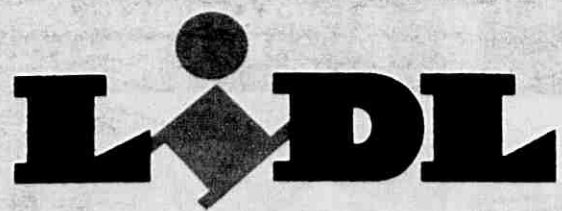

Midsummer's Night Delight With New Art Exhibitions

The Old Market House Arts Centre, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford was filled to overflowing for the launch of three new exhibitions on Mid Summers evening. Pauline Coogan, who is originally from Dungarvan but now splits her time between Ireland and Italy where her husband is the Irish Ambassador officially launched the works with a thought provoking speech which relayed the sentiment and vision behind each exhibition.

'Exhibit A' is a series of work by Dublin-based artist Julian Hills. Julian has family links with Co. Waterford. He is also involved in theatre, film and TV - producing several series of 'A Scare at Bedtime' with the characters Podge & Rodge. His portrait 'Kevin' takes over the frontage of the Art Centre and is causing a lot of local comment. Having worked as an artist on private commissions and on a commercial basis for some time, this is Julian's first exhibition since university. There is a cross-section of work on display, in various media, produced over the last fifteen years. The landscapes are the most recent development - borne mainly from time spent walking in Wicklow and the Comeraghs.

John Murphy from Tramore is exhibiting his recent work in oils. John attended the Art Col-

lege in Waterford where he studied graphic design, and for the past fifteen years has worked as in house artist with Design and Display Waterford. He also runs art classes in Tramore Library. Portraits in pastel and oil have been his main interest up to three years ago when he started painting from the landscape and seascape. This is his first exhibition of oil paintings from his immediate environment.

On display in the upstairs gallery Seomra de Paor is 'Wildlife of Ireland' photographs by Kevin Power. Kevin is a native of Coolnasmear, Dungarvan. Living in a beautiful place and being surrounded by wildlife and wild landscapes, have been the main inspirations for his photographs. His affinity to the world of animals is evident in his studies of native mammals, birds and salmon.

Michael O'Riordan in his last official function as Mayor, spoke of the dedication of the Arts Centre staff and how much he enjoyed visiting the Arts Centre on opening nights. He extended a special welcome to the many visitors who had travelled especially for the evening.

The Arts Centre is open Tuesday to Saturday from 10am - 5pm. These exhibitions continue until Saturday 23rd July 2005. Admission is free agus tá fáilte roimh gach aoinne.

O Ceilleachair Elected New Mayor Of Dungarvan

Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair was elected as the new Mayor of Dungarvan at the Town Council's Annual General Meeting, on Monday night.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair was elected with the support of Labour, Fine Gael and the Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair said he was humbled to become Mayor of a town where the tradition of organised Labour has been "such a strong and positive force."

Outlining the challenges facing the council over his term, he said: "Critical among them is for public monies, raised fairly, to be distributed fairly to the point where Dungarvan Town Council is resourced and enabled to carry out its functions without adding to increasing pressures on local households to make up shortfalls."

DECENTRALISATION

"In an era where the trend is to direct power away from communities and their local councils, I'd suggest that 'decentralisation' must be more than an individual deed and become in fact a movement throughout public services to the benefit of Dungarvan Town Council and the community it serves."

"Most critical of all, perhaps, is all that flows from the current threat to deprive Dungarvan of an industrial plant where some of its most skilled and best paid jobs are."

How we can move on the town in the face of possible setbacks like that presents a major challenge for us all."

lenge for us all."

EXPAND ROLE

Cllr. O Ceilleachair also put forward a number of ideas for the year ahead including the possibility of a monthly mayor's report; initiating a "Community Achievement Award" where those active in voluntary and other sectors would be honoured on a monthly basis by the Town Council; an Annual Seminar; a schools based initiative where schoolchildren could submit their views; an annual forum with the four TD's of the Waterford constituency and finally the possibility of an annual Mayor's Ball should be explored.

OUTGOING MAYOR

The outgoing Mayor, Michael O'Riordan was praised for his role over the past year. He was one of the busiest Mayors in the council's history having attended 120 functions on behalf of the local authority.

"I can look back with satisfaction at what has been an extremely busy term of office for me and I think a very successful year for the council," he said.

"I regret that my term of office comes to an end this evening. I am privileged to have served the people of the town and my fellow councillors to the best of my ability. I have often said in this chamber that there is no better service than that on behalf of the community and I say in all sincerity that we as a council have achieved a great deal from just a year ago."

HONOUR

He said he was privileged to be in a position to

have honoured and thanked the Carriglea Sisters, Dungarvan Brass Band, former Supt. Michael Blake, Self Help Africa, the Madden family and Abbeyside School for their respective achievements and service to the town.

He said while there has been progress, particularly the opening of Dungarvan Shopping Centre, the town also faces challenges.

"With the possible closure of Dungarvan Crystal looming on the horizon and talk of redundancies elsewhere it will be a difficult time for the Mayor and the members of the council and I can only urge the Town Manager, the Town Clerk in conjunction with the County Manager to do all in their power to ensure the future of the plant."

Concluding, he went on to wish the new Mayor, a fruitful and successful year, "one which he can look back on with the same satisfaction as I have."

DEPUTY MAYOR

Meanwhile, Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan was proposed for the post of Deputy Mayor by Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab), seconded by Cllr. Forsey of Fine Gael, and deemed elected.

Minister Martin Should Meet Council Over Crystal Closure

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne called on the Enterprise Minister, Micheal Martin to meet a deputation from the Town Council about the closure of the Crystal plant.

He told the June meeting of the local authority, they must impress upon the Minister the urgent need for a replacement industry in the town.

Cllr. Kyne, who is also a trade union activist, said there is a tendency at a time of an announcement for an immediate reaction, but for a vacuum to then be allowed form. "We should write to

Minister Martin and invite him to come down here for a meeting with the local TD's and Town Councillors where we can impress upon him the need to fast-track the process towards securing a replacement business."

PROBLEMS

Problems have already surfaced with one business intending to relocate to Dungarvan. The German paint manufacturing firm, Bio Pin, were said to be setting up in the new Business Park last year. However, according to Cllr. Kyne those plans appear to be "in abeyance". With only around 10

industries with more than 100 employees in the town, he said there's a "good case for a new large industry".

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan said the Regional Director of IDA should be invited to the Town Council. He said: "We need to ask what exactly they are doing to attract an industry if and when Waterford Crystal goes," he said.

FORUM

Town Manager, Denis McCarthy said an inter-agency forum is in place involving the IDA, Enterprise Ireland, the Leader Project, WIT, Waterford

Crystal and the Trade Unions, MABS, the VEC and the Health Board.

Co. Manager, Ray O'Dwyer has also met with Minister Martin, although "nothing solid" has come back from the meeting as yet, Mr. McCarthy said.

"I can assure the members, there is a good deal of work going on in the background."

Cllr. Teresa Wright expressed concern that workers at Dungarvan Crystal, who are still in negotiations, would see the council looking for a replacement industry and think they are being forgotten.

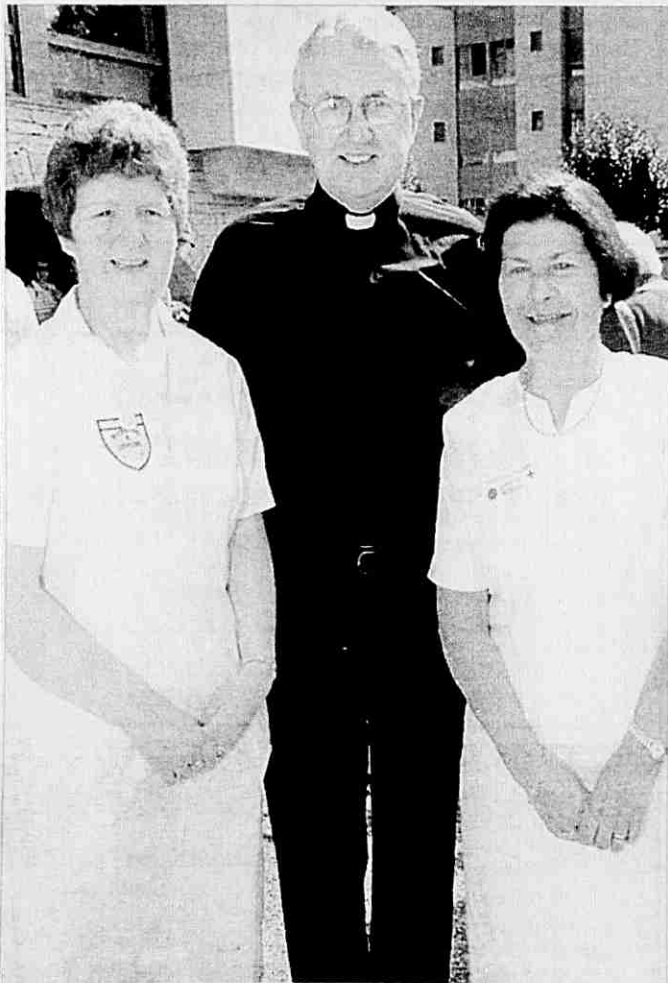

Residents May Sue If Water Supply Not Overhauled

Residents in Ring may sue Waterford County Council unless it delivers on the long promised overhaul of the public water supply.

That's according to Labour councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair who is calling for a swift resolution to the ongoing problems.

Residents say there are overnight cut offs, and weak water supply on return over the summer months. Many say they do not have enough water in the morning for a shower, to bathe a baby with or even enough to boil a kettle.

They also claim the quality of the supply is very poor, with the result that buying bottled water

has become the norm.

PLANS

While plans are in place and some preparatory work has been done to overhaul a system said to be more suited to the 1960's, Cllr. O Ceilleachair believes: "there is a strong view locally that the local authority is failing to provide an acceptable basic public service in Ring."

"This has been a millstone around Ring's neck for too long," the Labour councillor said. "The local county council crew, despite their best efforts in trying circumstances, cannot fully correct the problems that regularly arise from an old and poorly supplied system."

"Various patch up jobs and tem-

porary measures have led to no significant improvement," he went on to say.

Senior Engineer with Waterford County Council, Pat McCarthy acknowledged problems with quantity and quality of water in the area are a problem.

A preliminary report was prepared in 2003 outlining proposals to upgrade the scheme.

Trial testing was also carried out on boreholes in late Summer/early August of last year. But these tests show a suitable groundwater supply was not available in the immediate vicinity.

DUNGARVAN RULED OUT

"Furthermore, the possibility of

bringing water from the Dungarvan area was eliminated pending the determination of the existing sources in the Dungarvan area," he stated in a letter to Cllr. O Ceilleachair recently.

He added: "It may be possible to cater for the demand in the Ring/Helick area from the Ardmore area. The Ardmore Water Supply Scheme is at a similar stage and trial drilling which was also carried out in 2004 was somewhat more successful. This option is now being seriously considered and when evaluation on technical grounds is completed, we will be in a position to define the future direction of the water supply scheme for Ring/Helick."

ESSENTIAL FAT

The health benefits of eating a low fat diet have been known for years. A diet which is too high in fat can lead to obesity, heart disease and a variety of other problems. However, not all fats are bad, and some are actually an essential part of a healthy diet.

Essential fatty acids (EFAs) cannot be made by the body and must therefore be present in the diet. They are vital for a whole range of physiological functions, such as repairing or replacing damaged cells, producing hormones, and controlling inflammatory responses in the body. This has a very beneficial effect on the heart and circulation, the brain and nervous system, and the skin, hair and nails in particular.

A diet which is rich in essential fatty acids can help to prevent and treat cardiovascular problems such as raised blood pressure, heart disease and stroke, neurological problems such as poor concentration, depression and dementia, and skin problems such as dryness, eczema and acne.

Essential fatty acids fall into a number of different groups, and those which have received most attention in recent times are the omega-3 and omega -6 fatty acids. These two groups have different functions in the body and it is very important to maintain a healthy balance of both types.

Omega-3 EFAs are present in fish oils and linseed or flax oil. Omega-3 EFAs tend to reduce the body's inflammatory response which is very useful for preventing and treating conditions such as inflammatory bowel disease, psoriasis and arthritis. In countries such as Greenland where people eat large amounts of fish, there is a very low incidence of arthritis. Unfortunately the consumption of oily fish in this part of the world is now very low, and this has contributed to the large increase in people suffering from chronic inflammatory diseases.

Omega-6 EFAs are found in most other vegetable oils, particularly sunflower oil, and they tend to increase inflammation. This may

seem like a negative effect, but it is actually an essential part of healthy physiological function. A healthy and appropriate inflammatory response to infection or injury helps to kill any invading organisms and prevent any further damage to the tissues of the body.

Nowadays however, sunflower oil is one of the most widely used oils in cooking and it is also found in most packaged foods. Many people have also stopped using butter in favour of sunflower spreads, causing an excess of omega-6 fats in the diet. Together with the decreased intake of fish, this has contributed to the huge incidence of inflammatory diseases.

In order to redress the balance it is important to eat at least three portions of oily fish per week, such as mackerel, salmon, tuna, sardines, and trout. If this is too difficult, a fish oil supplement may provide an easier way of increasing your levels of omega-3 EFAs. However, avoid taking cod liver oil if you are pregnant, diabetic, or taking blood thinning medication such as warfarin, unless it is on the advice of a qualified health professional.

For vegetarians, linseeds are an equally good source of these essential fats. Udo's oil is an essential fatty acid supplement which is made entirely from seed oils and tastes a lot better than fish oil! It can be poured over vegetables or used to make salad dressings. Try to avoid using too much sunflower oil and opt for a neutral variety such as olive oil which also has its own health benefits.

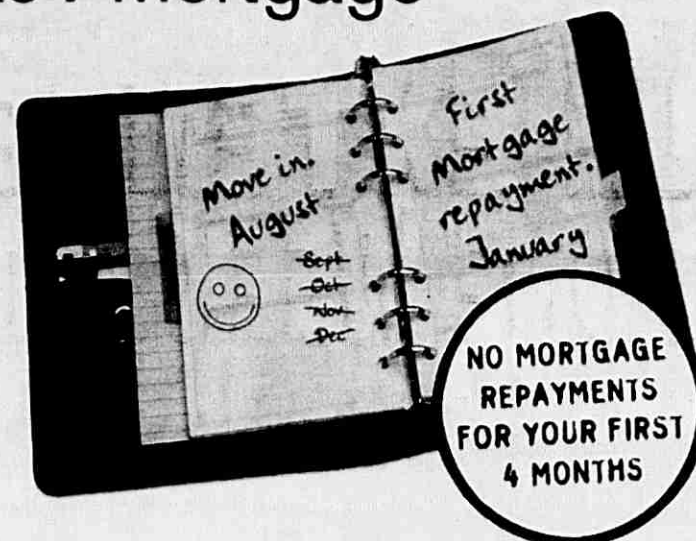

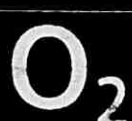
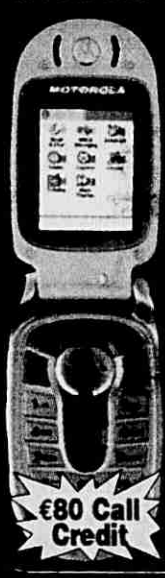

GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

The War On Docks Is Never Won!

Docks are the most serious weed of intensively managed grassland and as most farmers know are almost impossible to eliminate in continuous silage ground. We have to be satisfied with containment and aim to keep docks at a level where they are not seriously affecting silage yield, digestibility and palatability. It is estimated that when docks reach 5 - 10% of sward dry matter there is a substantial effect on productivity and therefore efforts should be made to contain dock infestation to below this level. Experimental work has shown that frequent defoliation can keep docks under control. In rotational grazing, where there is some defoliation by grazing livestock followed by topping, there is usually acceptable control of docks.

Docks In Silage

As can be seen by looking into almost any silage field in May, docks really thrive in the conditions that also give high silage yields. The reasons are thought to be: (i) the longer growing period in silage (compared to grazing) allows docks adequate time to develop into large plants and build up good root reserves; (ii) silage swards are more open, favouring dock seedling establishment, (iii) slurry application following silage cutting produces a temporary setback to grass recovery and a competitive advantage to the docks, (v) high soil potassium encourages dock growth. Cattle slurry is high in potassium and heavy applications combined with chemical potash can give higher soil potassium levels than is needed.

Survival of Docks Seeds

Estimates indicate that one mature dock plant can produce up to 60,000 viable dock seeds per year. Seeds are capable of germination in the year of production so that from late July up to 80% of mature seeds will germinate given the right conditions. Scottish research indicates that dock seeds can remain viable for 50 - 70 years if buried in soil and will germinate if conditions of light, temperature and moisture are suitable. Therefore if you can totally kill all existing docks there are generations of seed reserves in the soil ready to germinate if soil is disturbed. The seedling dock has a better chance of developing into a mature plant in silage ground than in a dense grazed pasture. It is not thought possible for dock seeds to survive the low pH of direct cut silage but they will obviously survive in hay.

Chemical Control

Where silage and grazing can be rotated annually there will be a measure of control. However, silage areas are often fixed and in these cases control by herbicides is the only practical method. Where there is a heavy crop of docks in first cut silage, using a product containing CMPP is inexpensive (about €8/acre) and will give good control for that silage harvest but will kill clover. Spray when the docks are growing vigorously and before flowering. Dicamba based herbicides combined with other products such as triclopyr, CMPP and 24D give longer term control. Products such as Bandock, Condox, Kildock, Docklene and Foundation, if applied from now when dock plants in silage aftermath are growing vigorously and leaves are about 15cm (6"), should give good control of docks in next years silage crop. These products also eliminate clover. Doxstar which is a mixture of triclopyr and fluroxpyr also gives longer term control. It could be applied four week pre-harvesting at 1.5 litres/ha and repeat in the aftermath to clear out remaining plants. The total cost of the two treatments is about €80/ha (€33/acre). Other products in this general category are Garlon 2, Grazon 90 and Fettle. All harm clover. Where clover is desired Asulox and Prospect can be used as these do not affect clover. If grass is under stress, as in dry weather, the old pasture grasses can be retarded. Apply nitrogen 1 - 2 weeks after spraying to stimulate grass recovery. It is important to follow manufacturers recommendations and to choose good vigorous growth conditions for best results

land or our neighbours land.

"It was an illegal attempt by the council and the ESB to move the powerline when there was no need to do so."

"Our lives have been destroyed for the past five years. This has gone to An Bord Pleanala three times, and they say the ESB was wrong to do what they did. Answers must be given as to why what happened was allowed to happen," he said.

SAGA

The saga began when a developer constructed his house too close to the ESB's powerline, which started a sequence of events.

The ESB altered the line, and erected two massive steel pylons metres from the Drummy's home.

It sparked a legal and planning battle which seriously affected the health of Maurice, a chronic asthmatic, and has virtually taken over Frank's life for the past five years.

It was after the intervention of the ombudsman that the issue was appealed to An Bord Pleanala.

The appeals board found that the massive structures were not exempted from planning and subsequently, Waterford County

Council and the Bord both refused the electricity giant permission for retention.

In the most recent application the ESB sought permission to alter the 38kv line, which is vital to the Tramore and Kilmacthomas supply.

Although the Bord granted the ESB permission to do so, a condition rules out any crossing of the Drummy's property.

SUFFERED

Ian Lumley of An Taisce welcomed the ruling, saying the Drummy's suffered unfairly as a result of an adjoining developers failure to comply with planning permission.

"It would seem that today's decision has gone a long way towards addressing that," he said.

"We don't believe this matter is just a matter of planning. It goes way beyond planning. It

was so unfair what happened.

"It's a natural justice issue because somebody failed to apply the planning conditions and the Drummy's ended up becoming caught up with that.

"That's the key issue in this whole case," Mr. Lumley said.

An Taisce has already lodged a complaint with the Dungarvan Gardai on the matter, and contrary to speculation it has not been dropped.

"It's in the Gardai's hands, and it's up to them to pursue it or not. It would be prejudicial to comment on the matter any further than that."

Huge Crowds Attend Radiotherapy Rally

employees of the main factories in the town, elected members, council staff and members of the public from across West Waterford, took part.

It started at 3pm from the Garda station on the Youghal Road, before making its way down Mitchell's Street, turning into Mary's Street and gathering in Grattan Square for a short rally.

Due to its size, the crowd took several minutes to filter into the square.

CRITICISM

There was stinging criticism of the Government and local Fianna Fail TD Ollie Wilkinson.

"I remember a day when I met Ollie Wilkinson," Dick Roache, Chairman of the Cancer Care Alliance (CCA) told the crowd. "And I remember when Ollie Wilkinson told me, radiotherapy just wasn't an issue in West Waterford."

"Well today you have proved him wrong. Radiotherapy is an issue in West Waterford, just as it is an issue in Waterford City and everywhere else in the South East."

Mr. Roache also warned Health Minister, Mary Harney,

the public won't be "caught out on a promise again."

He was referring to news that the Minister was expected to announce the development of a radiotherapy wing at Waterford Regional Hospital on a public-private partnership basis.

Two companies are believed to have expressed an interest in developing the facility and the Minister is expected to make an announcement about her plans in the next week.

INEQUALITY

Secretary of the CCA, Christina Phelan said it is time for the inequality of access to cancer treatment, to come to an end.

"The voices of the South East have been raised to a deafening roar," she said. "If the Government turns a deaf ear, then it will be to their detriment and their shame."

She said in a time of prosperity the imbalance of treatment is "cruel and unnecessary."

Regional Organiser of ATGWU Sean Kelly challenged "the local political opportunists" who have been attacking the radiotherapy campaign.

"Firstly they told us that we didn't need a Radiotherapy

Unit in the South East. Then they told us that Waterford Regional Hospital would not be suitable, then we were made a promise that was later denied. They said they never made such a promise. Then they produced a report to say it couldn't be done.

"But when cancer patients and their families took to the streets in protest, did the political decision makers sit up and listen, especially after the last local elections?"

"Some still waffled on and told us that we weren't living in the real world and they criticised us for their own personal public gain, while making a political football out of human suffering."

"Following a visit by the Minister for Health to Waterford City," Mr. Kelly said, "...we are now told that there is a national capacity problem particularly at Cork and Dublin treatment centres and we may need two, if not three, Radiotherapy units at Waterford."

"To the local political opportunists who have been attacking our campaigns and trying to undermine our efforts, I challenge them today. Criticise us now, you'll know them by their silence."

From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1745 CLONEA (Continued)

That part of the Parish of Clonea, which is bounded by the sea, forms a shallow bay of a considerable length being a smooth, and pleasant strand, composed of a fine sand, which is hard and firm, although it is only the covering of a turf-bog, which the sea has overflowed for many ages. In some places the turf rises above the sand, and is of a closer texture than most other kinds, having little of the mossy parts remaining, when dry it is hard and black, and burns with a crackling noise like coal but with a disagreeable smell. However little of this kind is made use of as it is troublesome to fish produces some corn, but is mostly pasture. In cutting trenches for draining of a bog, some Cannon Ball were discovered, which probably lay there since Cromwell's time, who might have made use of them against an old castle in the neighbourhood; which together with the ruins of the church, are the only remarkable building in the parish. 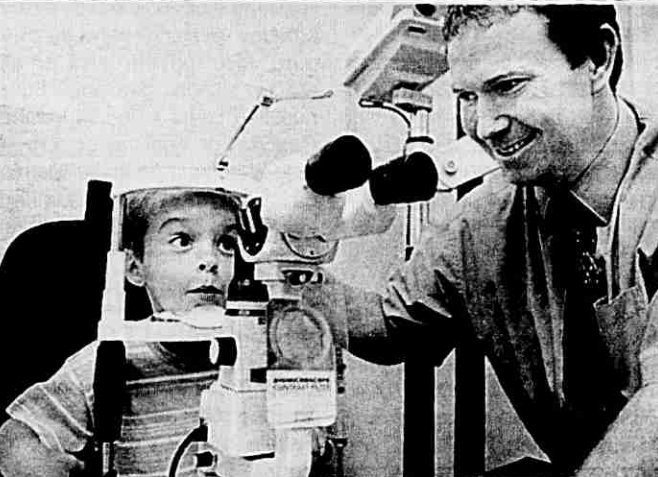

International best practise states that there is a higher success rate in treatment of Cancer when the three modalities are located in the one centre.

He stated that recently, the Sinn Fein party had asked a question in the Dail of the Minister of Health as to what would be the situation regarding the treatment of public patients in private facilities. He stated that the response received was most unsatisfactory in Sinn Fein view.

Cllr. Mansfield he will be continuing to lobby in the Council Chamber, for the Tanaiste to immediately meet with a cross party delegation from both Waterford County Council and Waterford City Council, in order to show that everyone City and County are demanding proper treatment.

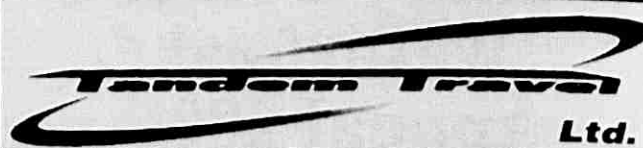

RECENT DEATHS

Late Mr. Brendan Dunne

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the sudden death of Mr. Brendan Dunne, Ard Caoin, Clonmel which sad event occurred in Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel with his wife Sheila and his family by his side. His passing was received in the locality with a sense of loss and disbelief, his unexpected passing coming as a devastating blow to his heartbroken wife Sheila and family around whom his life revolved.

A family man of great faith, Brendan enjoyed the simple things in life, his good humour and optimistic outlook endearing him to everyone with whom he came in contact. His numerous friends, many former customers who frequented his popular public house in Davis Road, during the 70's, 80's and 90's nostalgically recall what a lovely affable man he was, with such a boyish enthusiasm for the Tipperary hurling team and of course Arsenal, both of which he loyally supported for decades.

Son of Patrick and Annie Dunne from Ahenny, he was the youngest of five children, two boys and three girls. Brendan was only three years of age when his father, a well known baker, died in the Fever Hospital, now the Nationalist newspaper premises. Following that sad occurrence, the family moved to Laois, where Brendan was reared in Emo, by relatives and subsequently did a four year apprenticeship in Ballybrittas at Tynan's Bar and Grocery. Emigrating to England he worked in the Bar trade and it was over there he met Sheila O'Brien from Pallasgreen, Co. Limerick, whom he married in London in the mid 60's. His one ambition was to be his own boss and be the landlord of his own pub, a dream which was to be fulfilled when a premises became vacant. He and Sheila moved in over the pub. They had three children, two of whom were born in England and one was born in Clonmel. Returning to Ireland Brendan bought a pub in Davis Road, formerly owned by Jim Gleeson, and in no time he built up a thriving business.

Having lived near Highbury, Arsenal's football ground, it was inevitable that he would have an interest in that team, an interest which seemed to deepen when he arrived back in Clonmel. It was a big occasion in the pub when Arsenal won the cup in 1979 and again in 1989, when they won the league by beating Liverpool. Brendan recalling a late goal by Michael Thomas. And like Arsenal, the Tipperary Hurling team, after all the barren year, won the All Ireland final in 1989 to Brendan's delight, who at such times was animated. Arsenal winning the double in 1998 must have been one of the most exciting times in the pub which was packed, the supporters club then being in full swing. Brendan, such an amiable person, loved all the banter and the craic, according to his wife Sheila who said that the 80's and 90's in particular were a great period in the pub. She said her husband's favourite party piece was "The Old Bog Road" which he would sing with gusto on occasions. Five years ago he climbed Slievenamon which was a proud boast of his and some one had given him the present of a walking stick for the climb, on which he had the date engraved.

Though Brendan retired from business in 1998, he did part time work in Jerry Moynihans, which he loved and according to his son it was also a good sporting pub. The fact that Brendan had been watching Arsenal playing Manchester United whom they beat in the F.A. cup final and Tipperary beating Limerick in the Munster championship when he died added poignancy to his passing.

His remains were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Parthalon O'Leary P.P. at St. Oliver's Church. He also celebrated the requiem Mass on the following morning, his coffin draped in the Tipperary blue and gold colours. His funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where he was laid to rest. Fr. O'Leary P.P. officiated at the graveside.

Ann O'Dwyer's family had always been staunch supporters of Fianna Fail and on coming to Carrick-on-Suir, Denis joined the party and served as Cumann Treasurer for a number of years. He took a great interest in the sporting life of the town especially soccer but he never lost touch with Chelsea his home club in London and this was acknowledged by a note in the Chelsea programme following his death. His wife Ann also received a letter of sympathy from An Taoiseach Bertie Ahearn T.D. There was a large and representative attendance at the removal of his remains from O'Dwyer's Funeral Parlour, Carrick-on-Suir to St. Nicholas Parish Church, Carrick-on-Suir. On the following morning requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his eternal soul. After Mass the funeral took place to St. Mary's Cemetery, Carrickbeg where he was laid to rest. IMAGES OF IRELAND: LISMORE, LAUNCHED AT IMMRAMA FESTIVAL

A great crowd of native and ex-Lismoreians turned out at Lismore Hotel at 6:30pm on June 17th for the launch of Eugene Dennis' new book: Images of Ireland: Lismore, published by Nonsuch Press at €16.99. The book is a collection of old Lismore photos in the main, over 220 in all, going back to 1853 and up to about the 1970's. Though the pace was a bit hectic due to Brian Keenan's presentation at 8pm, the occasion was a delight and the hospitality superbly orchestrated by Betty Feeney of Lismore Hotel.

The book was given an ideal launch by ex-Canadian Mary Lawton whose people originally came from Lismore. She praised the sheer diversity of images in the eight chapters, plus their fetch and timelessness.

Eugene Dennis, the author, spoke of the labour of love it was to collect the photos refuting the publisher's that the images were 'archival', rather 'the people's photos' from out the attics and from under the beds and crumbling envelopes and albums. In brief, a rescue mission of a fragile heritage. A rescued touched up photo on page 77 illustrated this. Every photo, noted Eugene, involved a battle for collection (a war in a few cases!), establishing its provenance (date, sitting, names, etc), quality and selection. Quite time consuming and an odd time in the face of indiffer-

ence, even dismissal - the latter in the case of one town 'developer' so called. Allied to this was that some photos collected for the project weren't made available. Eugene apologises for this though in many cases he retrieved the situation himself.

In general, most people were extremely co-operative and generous. Overall, Dennis said the exercise was worthwhile and satisfying, as one buyer of the book said "Now there are two Books of Lismore, sláinte!"

Yes, the new Lismore photo book is now a splendid artifact of local heritage. The great thing about photos is that they remember while people forget. A book of them meeting togeth-

er is a veritable chat room where no technology is needed, only your fingers to flick the pages.

Finally, the book is distributed in the main to bookshops only, however, interested shops may hold copies as Nonsuch, the Dublin based publishers, who are new, acquaint themselves with the needs and sensitivities of the rural scene. Incidentally, Dennis wasn't afraid to tick off his 'new Dublin publisher' over some uncorrected errors and some avoidable omissions even if the final result was excellent. Quite so! Also Eugene tells me he is starting to return photos to donors so be patient.

COOKERY CORNER

Cajun coated steaks

A HOT cajun coating is ideal for kebabs or spread over tasty steaks and chops.

Ingredients:

- Serves 2-4
- 2-4 beef, lamb or pork steaks/chops
- 1 x 15ml sp oil
- 2 x 5ml sp black peppercorns, crushed
- 2 x 5ml sp paprika
- 1 x 5ml sp dried thyme
- 1 x 5ml sp dried oregano
- 1 x 2 1/2ml sp cayenne pepper
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- Salt

Method:

IN a bowl, mix together all the ingredients, except the meat. Spread the mixture on to both sides of the meat. Grill or barbecue according to the chart below. This recipe is also ideal for kebabs. Serve with jacket potatoes and salad.

Note: This mixture is hot. For a milder result spread on to four chops or steaks rather than two.

TASTY MUSHROOM AND PEA KORMA

A VEGETARIAN feast – mushroom and pea korma.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4
- 3 x 15ml sp vegetable oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2cm square of ginger, chopped
- 3 plump cloves garlic
- 1/2 x 5ml sp turmeric
- 1/2 x 5ml sp chilli powder
- 2 x 15ml sp ground almonds
- 115ml sour cream
- 115ml water
- 350g assorted mushrooms
- 120g green peas
- 1/2 x 5ml sp salt
- 1 x 15ml sp garam masala
- 1 x chopped coriander
- 1/2 x 15ml sp chopped mint

Method:

HEAT the oil in a heavy-bottomed 20-23cm pan and sauté the onion very gently over a low to medium heat for about 15 minutes, stirring to prevent sticking, and adding a

15ml sp water every five minutes until onions are soft and golden. Meanwhile blend the ginger and the garlic in a food processor for 30 to 60 seconds until puréed. Add the purée to the onions, stir in and sauté for five minutes. Add the turmeric and stir for a minute. Add chilli powder and sauté for another minute, continuously stirring. Add almonds, sour cream and water and bring to the boil. Turn down the heat and simmer for 2-3 minutes until the mixture thickens. Add the mushrooms and cook for five minutes before adding the peas, and then continue to simmer until they are cooked. Bring to the boil, sprinkle on the garam masala, coriander and mint, cover, turn heat down to low for a couple of minutes, then turn off the heat and keep the pan covered until ready to serve.

Mouth-watering savoury scones

HASSLE-free gourmet savoury scones – they melt in the mouth!

Ingredients :

- Serves 8
- 450g self-raising flour
- 1 x 5ml sp baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 x 5ml sp mustard powder
- 2 x 15ml sp fresh chopped dill
- 180g butter
- 2 medium eggs, beaten
- 120ml milk

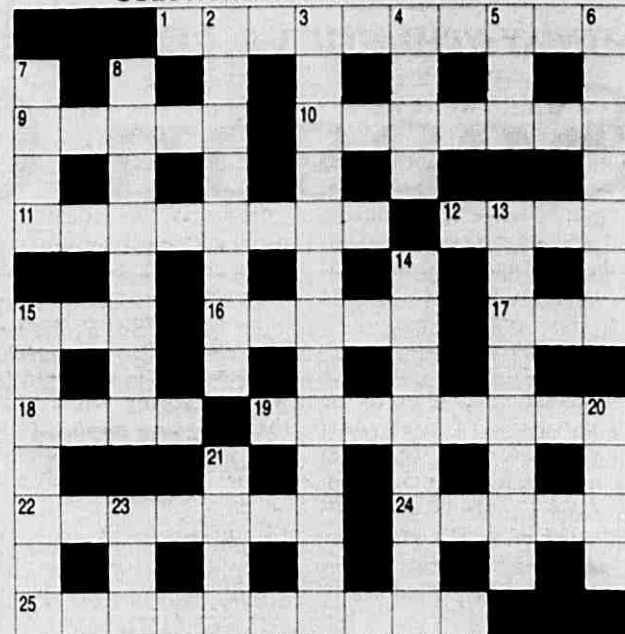
Method:

PREHEAT the oven to 230°C/450°F/gas mark 8. Sift the flour baking powder, salt and mustard powder, then stir in dill. Rub in the butter. Add the eggs and enough milk to form a soft dough. Knead lightly on a floured surface and roll to 2cm thickness. Using a 7.5cm plain cutter, cut out eight rounds (roll trimmings again as necessary). Arrange on a baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until the scones are golden and risen. Leave to cool on a wire rack before splitting. The scones can be served as sandwich type bites (with a top and base) or open, with the fillings on display. Try filling the scones with mayonnaise, a little salad and smoked trout, peppered mackerel or finely shredded smoked chicken breasts.

Dungarvan Leader - GARDEN FEATURE

French beans - a firm favourite

ONE of the joys of summer is picking fresh crisp beans for the table, but they do not grow themselves. The French bean, also known as the kidney or stick bean, make short bushy plants producing heavy crops of delicious, firm fleshy beans. Many believe that this humble bean is named after French Huguenot refugees who fled France in Elizabethan times.

It was the French who called the dried seeds of the beans haricots, because they put them in ragouts or haricots of mutton. The young pods, eaten whole, were called haricot verts and the shelled beans, eaten extravagantly young, became known as flageolet beans, because the French imagined the bean resembled a flute known as the flageolet. French beans detest the cold, so first sowing should be made under glass in modules, in mid-spring. These early plants can be planted out under cloches in late spring, in rows 30cm apart

with 20cm between plants. When planting out, it is an opportunity to sow the first seeds in open ground at the same distances, followed by further sowings at three weekly intervals until mid-summer. At the end of the row, sow a few extra beans to fill any gaps in the rows where the beans fail to germinate.

Sowings in June should provide a fine crop in September and October, although some cloche protection may be required. During the growing season hoe to keep weeds down and water in dry weather. Place a mulch of black plastic down between rows in June to help smother weeds, keep the ground moist and protect the beans from getting soiled.

Dwarf French beans can be beaten down by heavy rain, so support them with sticks or lines of string.

Climbing French beans should be supported the same way as runner beans with a sturdy wigwam of canes or inverted 'V' frame along the row, a cane to each plant, reinforced with canes tied together near the apex.

Spraying the plants with water on dry days, when the flowers begin to appear, will help them set. This can be a tedious task, but it will certainly pay dividends in the

resulting crop. Harvest from July onwards, picking the beans when the pods are young and tender, about 8cm long. They taste much better then and the plants will be encouraged to go on producing more beans. When they are picked, French beans snap off the plant, which is why they are sometimes called snap beans.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Feed, remove side shoots and pollinate tomatoes

Tomatoes will be in various stages of growth by now. The earliest will have set some fruits, while later batches are just coming into flower and others from your March sowings will be ready for potting into 13cm pots.

With all stages you must remove side shoots regularly. It is advisable to pollinate flowers by hand, tapping the plants or scattering pollen from flower to flower with a paintbrush. The most effective time is about midday when the sun is shining.

Mulch fruit trees

Spread a fairly thick layer of well rotten manure around fruit trees and bushes of all types. This is known as a mulch and is very valuable for 3 reasons:

1. It provides the trees with much needed nourishment while in growth
2. It helps to retain moisture in the soil
3. It keeps down weed growth

Vine treatment

Outdoor vines will be growing freely by now and you need to regulate their growth. Reduce the number of laterals to one per spur, retaining those that are showing flower trusses. Stop them beyond the truss but before they have grown so far as to interfere with neighbouring vines or laterals from other rods.

Plant Dahlia tubers outdoors

Cover the tubers with 8cm of soil and they will be quite secure against any late frost.

It will be some weeks before you see shoots appear above the ground.

Sow Cinerarias

Sow a few seeds if you want plants in flower by December. The seeds will want a little warmth to encourage germination so early, ordinary greenhouse temperature will be ample.

Sow thinly using John Innes or a soil-less seed compost. Cover lightly with fine soil and sand and put in the shade until germination.

I have always maintained that club pro's like myself serve only as an instrument to express the views of the GAA people at grassroots club level.

I was approached after the game in Colligan by a clearly irate Fourmilewater clubman. (It wasn't Paddy Joe) Oh! I thought, what have I written to upset this man.

Thankfully the object of his annoyance was not myself but Justin McCarthy and his management team.

I was at the game against Of-faly in Carlow. Waterford coasted through the first half with our forward line clearly having the better of their individual markers. As usual we lost our shape completely in the second half with the forwards, apparently with the blessing of Justin and selectors, roaming aimlessly and at will. The whole thing went pear shaped but given the opposition on the day we got away with it. Paul O'Brien was the only sub introduced and only briefly as a blood sub for John Mullane. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I will be claiming a full Contributory Old Age Pension from the Department of Social and Family Affairs shortly. My wife has no income in her own right but has capital of €60,000. Will I be able to claim for her on my pension?

ANSWER

Although the Contributory Old Age Pension is not a means tested pension, you will only receive a payment for your wife, called a Qualified Adult payment, if her weekly means are assessed as not exceeding €220.00 per week. How much you receive will depend on how much her weekly means are assessed by the Department to be. Means include income and any capital or savings.

The formula used for the assessment of capital/savings for all means tested social welfare payments, including Qualified Adult payments, changed from June 2005. Under the new formula, capital/savings are assessed as follows:

First €20,000 is disregarded

Next €10,000 assessed at €1 weekly means for each €1,000

Next €10,000 assessed at €2 weekly means for each €1,000

Balance assessed at €4 weekly means for each €1,000

Note: This formula does not apply to Supplementary Welfare Allowance.

Under this formula your wife, who has capital of €60,000 and no other income, will be assessed as having a weekly means of €110.00. Under the previous formula she would have been assessed as having €124.43 weekly means.

To receive a full Qualified Adult payment the maximum capital your wife can have is just under €55,000. As your wife has capital of €60,000, you should get a reduced Qualified Adult payment of €97.90 if your spouse has not yet reached her 66th birthday or €113.70 if she is 66 or over. Prior to the change you would have received €87.10 or €101.30 respectively. Anyone already receiving a social welfare payment on the basis of the assessment of capital should qualify for an increased payment following this change in the formula for assessing capital/savings.

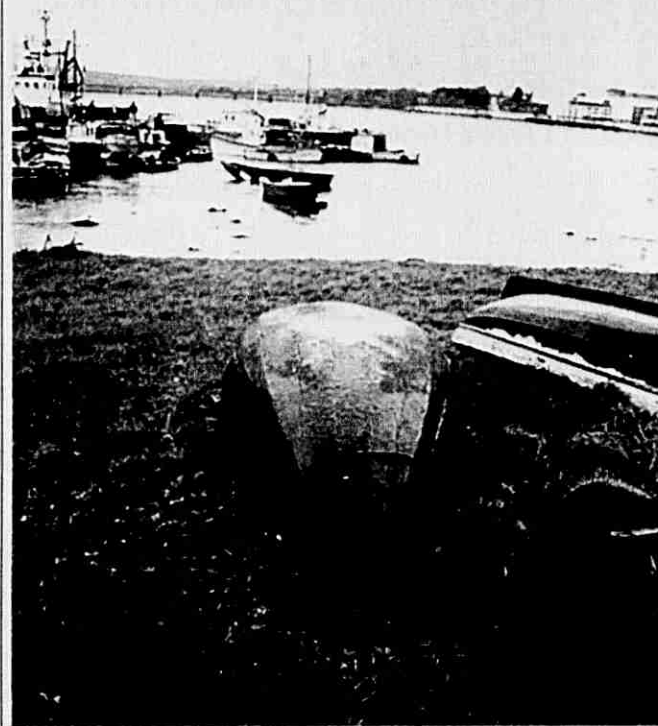

Small Ship of the Suir, Nore and Barrow



Every river in the world is different and the people who use them for fishing and transport have evolved boats that are adapted to local conditions.

One such is the prong a small boat used traditionally by eel fishermen and others on the Suir, Nore and Barrow rivers. Nobody seems to know where the name came from and the most similar boats elsewhere in Europe are used on the Loire River in France.

The Prong has no keel; no ridge of wood running along the length of the boat's underside to help keep a steady course. For the inexperienced this can make it very hard to row straight. The advantage is that the boats can skid about on the firm mud flats that line the tidal reaches on the rivers. In many places these mud shores are steep and, at low tide the boatmen can launch the boat by tobogganing down to splash into the channel.

Another distinctive feature of the prong is the pram-front. This is a half moon-shaped piece of wood, to which the planks are nailed at the front. The boats are carvel-built which means that the planks are not overlapped along the underside. They are usually covered in tar and the smooth black hull of an upturned prong can look for a moment like a currach, one of the west of Ireland's tarred skin-covered boats.

There has been a revival recently of interest in traditional river boats and this may secure the future of these unique craft. It comes just in time as one of the traditional uses, eel-fishing, is in decline with the current mysterious reduction in the numbers of young eels coming back from the breeding places in the Sargasso Sea, between the West Indies and the Azores.

I am grateful to Darina Tully, historian of Ireland's traditional boats, for this week's photo of a prong and for information.

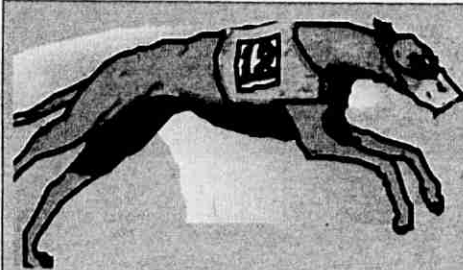

Valentia Action was sent off the 5/4 favourite but she was badly baulked at the first bend along with Grennan Walk who took a crashing fall. This incident left Glenberrie Sweep in control of matters as he quickly dashed clear to register a cosy three and a half lengths success over Kilkenny Sport.

In the only novice race down for decision the What About It Syndicate owned and Jim Scully trained Bought In Hope (Come On Lleyton-Mays Ballyrio) 2/1 produced a nice dash of early pace to lead around the first bend from the evens favourite Burt The Squirt and seeing of that challenge Bought In Hope went on to defeat a running on Riggs Sonny by two lengths in 29.58.

In the second contest the Julie Power owned Distant Smurf (Top Savings-Reactabond Seski) 3/1 came from last to first to open her account in 29.74. Gripwell Who scampered into an early lead over Duffry Starlight but picking off her opponents one by one Distant Smurf finished best of all up the fence to short head Gripwell Who.

Kilmeaden based trainer Damien O'Regan enjoyed his second success of the night in the third contest as the Mrs S Hamilton owned Belmont Carduus (Hotshow Ben-Glenburn Marea) 5/2 ran riot over the opposition in a career best time of 29.48. Grabbing a second bend lead from Blanco who appeared to check when in the lead Belmont Carduus went well clear down the back and it came as no surprise to see him cross the winning line with fourteen lengths to spare over Mango.

The Michael Murphy owned and Brendan Murphy trained Waxies Dargle (Top Honcho-Penn Clare) 5/2 a previous winner at Shelbourne Park made it two wins from as many outings making all the running in the fourth contest to win out in 29.51. Forging into an early lead over Belmont Thistle Waxies Dargle had to be at her best in the closing stages to repel Minglers Echo by a length the runner up having made eye catching late headway after running into first and second bend traffic problems.

The Richard Walsh owned Point Two (Mustang Yank-Silver Micra) the evens favourite recorded the same time as the previous winner when opening his account in race five. Waterford City owner Michael Clooney was on the mark in race ten courtesy of his Got The Nack (Westpark Prince-Gift Lass) this 5/2 chance showing good early pace en route to a 29.52 success. Dashing into an early lead over Catsrock Sound Got The Nack was in total command throughout dishing out a two and a half lengths beating to a staying on Lakefield Yank.

Lismore Lawn owner Pat Walsh was present to see his Fantasy Tiger (Jamela Tiger-Monmahogue Rose) 2/1 do the business in the eleventh contest as this January 04 whelp made no mistake carving out a polished front running performance in 29.11.

Driving into the first turn Fantasy Tiger emerged with a length lead at the entrance to the backstretch from Ballybrazil Inca. The latter took a crashing fall at that point as Fantasy Tiger made the long break for home. Varra Homer kept on well to claim the runner up spot but there was no catching Fantasy Tiger who went on to score by a length and a half. 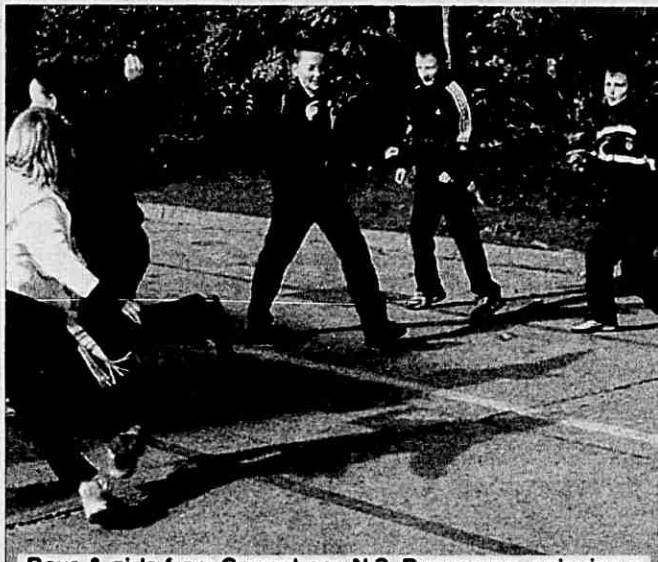

BETTING TAX UNDER EXAMINATION

The Minister For Finance Mr Brian Cowen T.D. has asked the Dept of Finance, in conjunction with the Revenue Commissioners and the Department of Arts, Sport and Tourism to review the current system of betting duty in light of modern day circumstances. The current system dates from 1928.

The examination will consider in particular if there are grounds for adapting a different basis for the calculation of betting tax such as a gross profits tax — defined as a tax on the difference between stakes received and winnings paid out. Such a tax system was introduced recently in the UK.

Hopefully whatever comes about after this investigation it will not impact on the ordinary punter having his few bob each way on a Saturday afternoon.

HORSE RACING IN CHINA

Betting is banned in China but that fact hasn't stopped Irishman Kevin Connolly in setting up the country's first horse racing track. The Beijing Tong Zhou Jockey Club is a Euro 48 Million racing and bloodstock centre and it's the first of its kind in China.

The project is funded by a local tycoon who is hoping that the Chinese Government will rescind the ban on betting. As China continues to allow betting in Hong Kong and Macau should it open up the whole country to gambling Kevin Connolly and his team could be queuing up to collect some sizeable winnings.

J.P.S PAD

Did you know that J.P. McManus will shortly open up his new 50,000 square foot mansion at his Martinstown Stud in County Limerick? The house is fifty times

the size of a normal house and will contain a cinema, hot tubs, gym, bar, snooker room, computer playroom, wine cellar and huge living accommodation.

Before even fitting out his mansion JP will fork out Euro 20 Million. A coincidence is that JP's first job was working on a JCB digger on the site, which he now owns.

PHOENIX PARK RACECOURSE

Remember the old Phoenix Park racecourse on the north side of Dublin? Over 300 apartments were built on the site of the old racecourse last year valued at Euro 110 Million and these were sold within a couple of days of going on the market. Phase two of the project is just around the corner which includes the building of a further 2,000 houses and apartments.

Co Limerick trainer Eric McNamara captured the a Grade 1 hurdle event worth over Euro 100,000 with Strangely Brown ridden by Ruby Walsh while the Willie Mullins trained Rules Supreme was unsuited by the slow pace in the Champion Hurdle he still managed to hold on to second place.

CURRAGH ABSENTEE

Mick Kinane missed the three-day Budweiser Irish Derby meeting due to the sudden death of his mother Frances. The late Mrs Kinane is survived by husband Tommy of Monksfield fame while her three sons Mick, Thomas Jnr, Jayo and Paul all rode winners under rules of racing. while she is also survived by three daughters.

BOBS RETURN DIES

Kilbarry Lodge Stud in County Waterford lost a valuable sire recently with the sudden death of former English Ledger winners Bobs Return a fifteen-year-old son of Bob Back.

Polish Precedent the dam of Rakti also perished last week while the Godolphin team lost the valuable three-year-old Blues And Royals to a bout of colic. Blues And Royals won the United Arab Emirates Derby.

PAUL RETURNS

Jockey Paul Flynn who was attached to the Phillip Hobbs yard in the UK has returned home to ride in his native Ireland and is intent on staying in this country for the foreseeable future.

FOOTSTEPSINTHESAND RETIRED

2000 Guineas winner Footstepsintthesand has been retired to stud after picking up an injury. He heads off to stand in Australia but will return to Coolmore in time for next years breeding season.

IRISH DERBY FESTIVAL ROUND UP

The three days of the Budweiser Derby festival of racing produced some quality fare. Its not to often that Dungarvan trainer John Kiely gives the leg up to Kieren Fallon but that's what happened on Friday night as the combination produced the desired result with victory for Visit Wexford. Visit Wexford is owned by well-known Dungarvan GAA personality Greg Fives. Greg and his late father Michael were more associated with greyhounds down through the years but Greg appears to be concentrating more on horses of late enjoying plenty of success with the likes of Visit Wexford and Grattan Square.

That good mare Alexander Goldrun displayed her class on Saturday in the featured Audi Pretty Polly Stakes. Ridden

with supreme confidence by Kevin Manning Alexander Goldrun the 9/4 favourite came from near last to first to beat Red Bloom by one and a half lengths. The German entry Elopa who ran a creditable race to finish third was found to have sustained a hock injury during this Group 1 event and may never race again.

A crowd of over 31,000 people flocked to the Curragh on Sunday to witness Kieren Fallon ride his first ever Irish Derby winner aboard the French trained Hurricane Run. In workmanlike fashion Hurricane Run had to be rousted along in the home stretch before getting the better of outsider Scorpion.

On the same card the Paul Nolan trained Cloone River showed that he had lost none of his sparkle taking a flat handicap and he is now well on course for Galway where he is a likely starter in the big hurdle event. Cloone River is also a fine jumper of fences but the plan at Galway is to keep him over timber.

CARELESS FRAN

Title chasing flat rider Fran Berry picked up a nine day suspension for careless riding last week and this suspension could well have major implications in his quest for his first ever jockeys championship. Fran did well however last Sunday at The Curragh when booting home two nice priced winners.

BRETT IS BACK

Brett Doyle is back riding in the UK after a stint in Hong Kong. He is attached to the Clive Britain yard and rode his first winner since coming home when successful aboard Lonely Ahead at Doncaster last Saturday night.

ALKASED SCORES

A number of weeks back we highlighted the ill judged ride Alkased received in the Coronation Cup at Epsom well with a different rider, Frankie Dettori, in the saddle the Luca Cumani trained horse captured the Group 1 Prix De Saint Cloud at odds of 6/1 in France last Sunday. Arc winner Bago could only finish third in the same contest.

GYPSY KING NO MORE

Aidan O'Brien and Coolmore suffered a major loss at the Curragh on Sunday when Chester winner and Epsom Derby fifth Gypsy King was put to sleep after breaking a shoulder in the Irish Derby.

KIEREN TOPS

Kieren Fallon was the top jockey at the three day Budweiser Irish Derby festival riding eight winners.

SEVEN FOR AIDAN

When George Washington captured the Railway Stakes at headquarters on Sunday it was the seventh time that a horse trained by Aidan O'Brien had won the race. George Washington is a funny old character however as he refused to leave the parade ring after the race and it was some time before he consented to following a lead horse brought in to coax the thoroughbred back to the stable area.

SCOPED BADLY

Epsom Derby runner up Walk In The Park ran a disappointing Irish Derby but he scoped badly after the Curragh showcase event and this certainly contributed to his below par performance.

MONTJEU

Up and coming Coolmore sire Montjeu has the distinction of siring the first two home in both the 2005 Epsom and Curragh Derby's. He is a son of Sadlers Wells and a number of experts say he is poised to take over from his illustrious dad as a sire of classic winning stock.

THE HURRICANE TO REST

Sunday's Budweiser Derby winner Hurricane Run is to take a rest and his next intended outing is the French Arc in September.

League Honoured by Being Selected by FAI for Pilot Scheme

As can be seen by advertisement elsewhere in this paper, The Football Association Of Ireland are advertising the post of Regional Development Officer for The West Waterford East Cork League.

The FAI and The W W E C will work in partnership to fund the appointment of a development officer to operate within the West Waterford East Cork Area. The primary reason for seeking the appointment is in order to develop and co-ordinate the implementation of various FAI programmes leading to the development football in the region.

The FAI currently implements 15 national programmes designed to increase participation in football, develop emerging talent and to educate coaches and volunteers in relation to best practise.

Senior Championships

At the recent meeting of the County Board complaints were made concerning the awful delay in resuming the senior hurling and football championships and several clubs, east and west expressed their anger at having to wait for nearly four months to play the second rounds.

As the situation is now, all 14 hurling and 12 football clubs will still be involved in the championships when they resume in August.

The whole policy of having the club championships put on hold to facilitate the intercounty programme is not good enough. Players who want to plan their holidays, some with their families are left in a quandary and club selectors are finding it impossible to programme their training for the resumption of the championships.

The increase in intercounty activity is only one reason why we have this situation. Another reason is that county team managers are insisting on having players free from club activity for too long a time before they are playing intercounty games (league and championship). With all senior panels having 30 players and only five of the 15 substitutes going to be used, is another matter that needs to be cleared up.

On the weekend on which we played Offaly in Carlow, a record total of 24 intercounty championship matches, including 'Qualifier,' Christy Ring and Nicky Rackard competitions, were played. That was the greatest number of official intercounty games played on any weekend since the foundation of the GAA in 1884. This gives a fair idea of the huge increase in activity and it is no wonder why clubs are getting more and more concerned.

The programme of intercounty activity for 2006 is currently being drafted (even though the draws are not yet made) and it will shortly be announced that all the activity which we saw this year, will have to happen at least one week earlier next year because the Ryder Cup is being played at the K-Club in Kildare and as a result the All-Ireland final (hurling) must take place one week earlier than usual. All this may mean clubs having to take a stand and insisting that players be available for club championship on a more regular basis.

U-21 Hurling Championship

The under 21 hurling championship is scheduled to commence on Sunday July 10th.

The programme opens with a double fixture in Fraher field commencing at 6.15 p.m. with Comeragh Rangers meeting Ballyduff and followed with Fourmilewater versus Brickey Rangers tie at 7.30 p.m.

Lismore will play Tallow in Ballyduff and this has a 7 p.m. start.

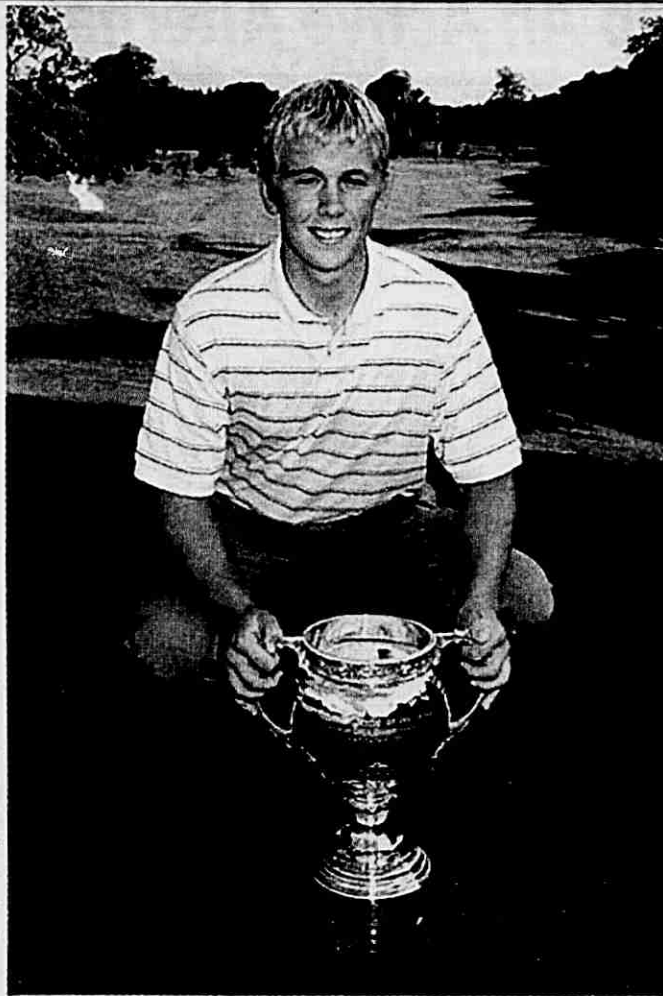

ITFAS

A recent press release was sent to papers around the country to promote the upcoming ITFAS Championship I felt it was a good idea to include this in our notes as it gives a good flavour of what we are about: To whom it concerns. The ninth annual ITFAS (Irish Traditional Field Archery Society) championships will take place in Milltown (near Newbridge), Co Kildare on July 30th and 31st.

ITFAS is a society of clubs and individuals from all over Ireland and abroad with an interest in shooting traditional or back to basics bows and arrows. These are "old fashioned" bow's and arrows made of wood and includes the English Longbow, American (Indian) Flat bow, the European re-curved bow and the Mongolian / horse bow. Clubs are located in Longford, Dungarvan in Co Waterford and Newbridge Co Kildare and we have individual members from Mayo, Leitrim, Cork, Westmeath, Dublin, Cavan, Tipperary, Meath, Sligo and even a few in Holland, Canada and the UK. ITFAS has also founded The European Traditional Archery Society. A society of traditional archery clubs and archers with members in The UK, Holland, Germany and Wales.

Traditional field archery is very different to the Olympic archery, which most people know of. This style of archery takes place on natural terrain (mostly woodland), distances to be shot are unmarked and constantly vary and the targets are realistic animal replicas. Our bows have no sights, stabilisers or other gadgetry and so shooting and "aiming" is instinctive. Essentially what we do is simulated hunting with groups of archers moving from target to target over a marked course. A little like golf. Over the two days at the end of July archers will descend on a remote Coillte woodland in the wilds of Kildare with all sorts of bow's, many hand made by the owner and will shoot for glory over 80 targets or at least have a laugh trying. The 26th Annual Dublin City Marathon promises to be one of the biggest to date with a huge amount of renewed interest in Marathon running gripping the country again, just like we had in the mid 80's. West Waterford athletic club have played a big part in the revival of marathon running in Ireland and indeed running in general. The Dublin Marathon is of course the Irish National Marathon championship race for 2005 as well and we hope to have teams entered in every grade here. Our entry in this year's marathon will be big again as a large contingent from the club are expected to travel to the capital for the October bank holiday weekend where once again we will play a big part in the success of this great event, with the usual suspects plus the many first time marathon runners from the club hoping to be at the start line come October 31st next. Already many have been getting the groundwork in over the last couple of months, but now the real work starts as we approach the 16-week to go mark. Traditionally most marathon schedules are over a 16 week period and with this in mind so is the West Waterford devised schedules, these 16 week schedules will start on Monday next July 10th and will continue and bring you right up to race day.

Its great to see so many runners having made the start on the long ones from the Crystal every Sunday morning. And Albert's group who have been meeting three evenings a week Monday Wednesdays and Fridays and now with the schedules coming into full swing we expect this number to get even larger as the next few weeks pass.

The long run is one of the most important runs of the week where Marathon running is concerned and its great to have other athletes to run the long one with, so if you are on any of these schedules do come along to the Crystal Centre any Sunday morning at 9.30 a.m.. And join us for the weekly long run. The schedules below are designed for those who may have a running base behind them and would like to follow a schedule; here is some advice for all on the road to Dublin.

1 - stick to your schedule as best you can but remember under no circumstances try to make up mileage if you miss a day, forget about it and continue on with your schedule.

2 - listen to your body if you feel tired on a particular day take a day off maybe go for a short cycle, a swim or a walk

3 - one of the most important things you can do to prevent injury is proper warm up and stretching we never give enough time to our pre run stretching it is most important to stretch and not to be running on tired, cold muscles and expect them to perform for us day after day if we don't treat them to a nice stretch before calling them into action, remember stretch those muscles ten minutes before and after running and they will not leave you down.

4 - remember the most important runs at this stage are your longer runs, keep up the good work the big day will not be long coming and as I said before and I say it again you will not experience anything like the feeling of accomplishment when you come up the finishing straight and cross that finishing line in Dublin come October.

5 - a visit to your physio every few weeks will prevent injury too and revitalise those sore muscles, don't wait till you have an injury, prevention is the best policy and a regular rub down will help no end.

The following three Marathon Schedules are all 16-Week Schedules and will begin on the week starting Monday July 10th. (Come on just do it.)

Schedule 1

This marathon schedule is a basic 'get-you around schedule' for first time marathon runners with the longest runs being two 18 mile and one 20 mile run. It is most important to get these long runs in. There are two rest days in this schedule each week and it is also very important to take these days off in order to prevent injury. If you want, on the Tuesday rest day, you could go for a cycle or maybe an hour in the gym, but do not run on the treadmill, maybe some lightweights or 15 minutes on the rowing machine.

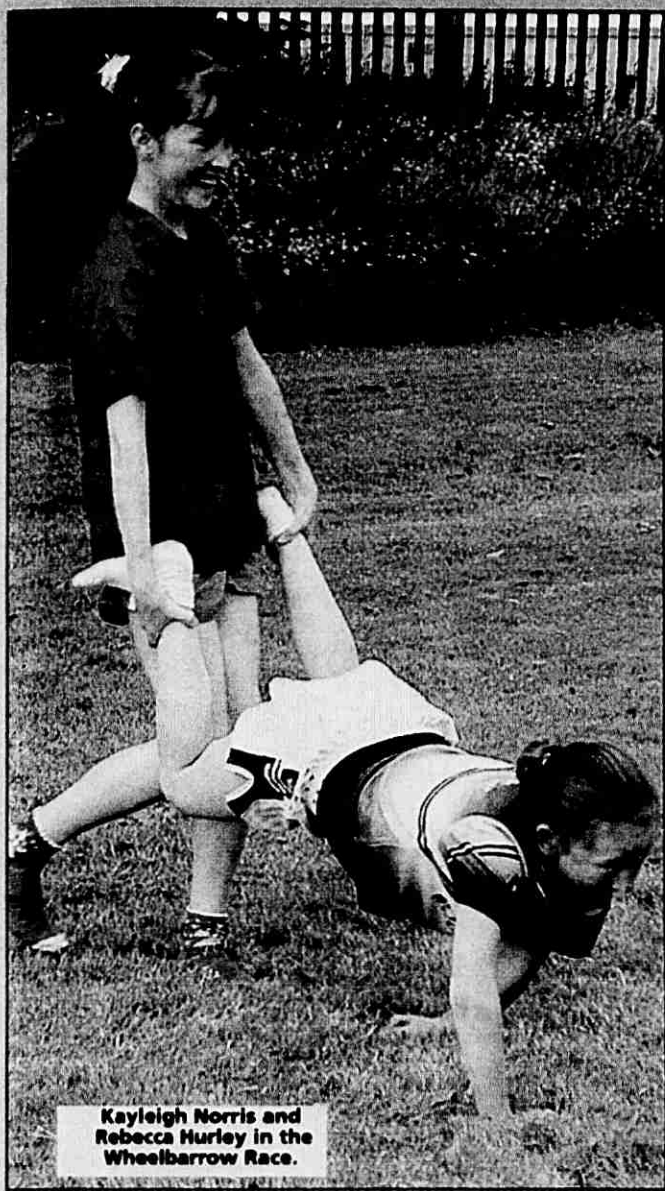

Concert to Aid Sudan and Sri Lanka



A major concert to be held in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Sunday, 17th July next is set to help two very worthy causes in regions where need is very great. Tsunami hit Sri Lanka and poverty stricken Sudan are two locations which do not figure in the world headlines, but where there is great suffering for different reasons.

Now, the members of Dungarvan Gospel Choir have devoted one of their bi-monthly performances to helping people in these two regions and will join forces with other local artists for what will surely be a major night's entertainment. Having some very memorable appearances behind them and mindful of their purpose in the ministry of the Gospel, the Choir hope to raise a significant amount of money to help these two worthy causes.

It is now six months since the disastrous Tsunami hit the Indian Ocean region, causing the deaths of a quarter of a million people, rendering millions of others homeless and devastating the lifestyle of the whole Indian Ocean Rim.

The causes and technicalities of the disaster have been well chronicled, but after the first few weeks the scenes of suffering and misery among the affected populations seemed to dwindle from our pages. For us, the Tsunami has faded into the distance and we will refer to it in the same impersonal tones as the Titanic or the Twin Towers disasters, but for others it is still very real and many are still hurting physically and emotionally as a result.

An old Chinese proverb suggests it is better to light one candle than curse the darkness and one person helping to keep that flame alive in the affected region of Sri Lanka is Dungarvan's Jenny Beresford who is working with the people there, helping them to cope with their grief and loss and trying to assist them in getting their physical lives together again.

"There is still great need here," said Jenny, in an e-mail home recently, "and there is still huge restoration to be done in the aftermath of the disaster. They need just about everything, from working implements to water, food and clothes, to some little toys for the children."

The few skipping ropes, chalk and balloons she brought out on her last trip lifted the spirits of the children enormously and diverted their attention from their terrible plight for some short time at least. Now, with the help of Dungarvan and West Waterford, Jenny hopes to be able to bring practical relief to the people of Sri Lanka and help some of them to become self-sufficient once more.

Br. Declan Power, the Christian Brother from Dungarvan is presently engaged in setting up a Pan-African Province of the Order to cater for the needs of the people to whom they minister in some of the poorest regions on the African continent.

Traditionally, Christian Brothers from Ireland, England and Australia worked under their own Provincial systems, but now, with so many African Brothers available in their own countries, it is time to establish an African Province in its own right which will serve the needs of the population there.

Br. Declan, whose family are still in Dungarvan and district, has been working in The Sudan for the past fifteen years or so, developing health and educational systems and also offering pastoral care to a population which had been devastated by decades of civil war.

Br. Declan is visiting Ireland and England seeking donors for the Brothers' projects and will welcome every assistance he gets. The part proceeds of this concert will help towards providing education, which the Sudanese are eager to get in much the same way as the people of post-famine Ireland and also health care which is so necessary for even the most basic illnesses.

This concert is a practical response to a genuine need in two very poor areas. With the Gospel Choir will be a host of local artists including recording star, Lorna Jane Murray, Seanachaf James Lenane, the Dungarvan Harvest Set, Malla Ragget, The Clancys from Stradbally, Austin and Margaret Anne Hallahan, Pianist and Comedy Act respectively and others not yet committed. At a modest 10 it will be both an enjoyable night out and a rewarding experience. Bigi ann.
