The Town Council will raise concerns about public drinking and anti-social behaviour in a number of areas around the town

Raising the issue, Cllr. Micheal O'Riordan said people are now afraid to go into Walton's Park because groups are congregating and drinking from 5 o'clock every day.

'It used to be the case that they started drinking after 7 or 8 o'clock," Independent councillor Michael O'Riordan said. 'But it's the case now where groups are in there from 5 o'clock in the evening.

"People of my own age and

older, are now afraid to go inside there

Councillor Mansfield said a solution to public drinking and anti-social behaviour must be found by working with the Gardai, publicans and off-license vendors.

He said groups were drinking in the park throughout the day, and others were drinking behind the Moresby buoy.

"A number of cars in Sexton Street were also vandalised,' he said, "including my own. A car owned by a local publican got a right doing. All the windows were put in.

He called on off-licenses to stop employing "children" to serve drinks.

"I know I'm going to be criti-

cised for saying this, but they can't say it's not going on because I know of a number of places where it's happening.

"There's no point having children serving in an off license. They are intimidated when someone of their own age comes in.

Calling for a meeting with the vintners, he said, "we have to solve this by working together."

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
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Work On Cappoquin Warning Lights Must Begin

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

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

ACTION NEEDED ON BALLINROAD REPORT

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The Humble Potato

The potato was first planted in this country in the 16th century by Sir Walter Raleigh, and quickly became the nation's staple food. But there is more to the humble potato than many people realise.

When cooked in its skin, particularly baked or steamed, the potato is very nutritious, easily digested, and provides a good source of energy. It is rich in important minerals and contains numerous vitamins, particularly vitamin B complex and vitamin C.

Contrary to popular belief, potatoes are an excellent choice of food for anyone trying to lose weight. They are very low in fat and contain complex carbohydrates which release their energy slowly into the bloodstream. Unlike refined sugars, carbohydrates which are released slowly are less likely to be converted to fat. They assist in keeping blood sugar levels stable, which maintains energy levels and helps to prevent sugar cravings.

Of course this does not apply to potatoes which are fried or smothered in butter! For maximum health benefits, potatoes should be steamed in their skins and lightly drizzled with olive oil, or baked and filled with tuna or natural yoghurt and chives.

The potato has been used as a folk medicine for generations. The juice of raw potato contains anti-inflammatory and antioxidant properties which are useful for all sort of health problems.

When taken internally, raw potato juice helps to soothe and heal the mucous membranes of the digestive system. This is useful for conditions such as excess acidity, gastritis and peptic ulcers. For external problems such as wounds, burns, ulcers, dermatitis and infections of the skin, a grated raw potato can be used as a poultice. Slices of raw potato can also provide soothing relief from headaches and migraines when applied to the temples.

Though the potato is a very safe and nutritious food, the green parts of the plant are poisonous a

parts of the plant are poisonous and should not be eaten. The same toxic substances are found in the potato itself when it has turned green.

Ardmore Sewerage Plant Receives Go-Ahead

Site investigation works and an architectural impact study will be carried out in Ardmore for a new wastewater collection system, which is planned for the town.

Ardmore is one of seven towns and villages which will see the development of waste water treatment plants as part of a multi-million euro grouped scheme.

All seven schemes have now proceeded through the Part 8 process, Waterford County Council's July meeting heard.

Extensive architectural investigations will be carried out in Ardmore's case to determine the impact of the works on a number of recorded monuments and areas of archaeological potential, including the Crannog site, the Holy Stone, the Church, St. Declan's Way and other ecclesiastical remains.

The Department of Environment also ordered a full underwater archaelogical impact assessment, including a search for shipwrecks in the area.

Replying to a question from Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, Director of Services, John O'Flynn said the council will also attempt to make the pumping station at Curragh as unobtrusive as possible.

"The exact location of the pump station will depend on the Site Investigation works but the best location from site visits, indicate the current proposed location is the most suitable," he said.

"The design of the building will be such that it will not have any major negative visual impact for surrounding properties. The location of the vent stack can be moved to the opposite side of the building."

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Mr. O'Donovan, a Chartered Physiotherapist, graduated with B.Physio Honours Degree from University College Dublin in 1999. 


THE TALL SHIPS' RAT GUARDS AND WATERFORD'S EXTINCT BLACK RATS

During the visit of the Tall Ships to Waterford City I noticed that only two ships had devices to stop rats from coming aboard. These are metal discs about 60cm or more in diameter, threaded onto the mooring ropes that attach the ship to the quay. The ships were the Kruzenshtern and the Mir; two gigantic sailing ships from Russia. A crew member of the Kruzenshtern told me that the discs are called nakrysniki (from Krysa, which means rat) in Russian and he hastened to add that the crew did not mean to insult Waterford with any implication that the quays are rat-ridden; He pointed to some of their ropes without nakysniki as evidence of this. They were there for tradition and ornament and the discs were decorated with cartoon cats; presumably to frighten the rats off as well as stop them climbing onto the ship. One of these is shown in this week's picture

Neither of two rat species is native to Ireland; they came on boats. The Russians probably did not know that the oldest rat remains in Ireland were found during an archaeological dig on Peter Street in the City, among twelfth century remains. Orla Scully, archaeologist, tells me that these bones were from so-

called Black Rats Rattus rattus whose colour can vary from usually glossy black to pale brown and have longer thinner tails than the so-called Brown Rats Rattus norveigicus which are now common everywhere in Ireland and—very confusingly—can also be coloured the usual brown or glossy black. Black Rats seem to have died out on the mainland of Ireland; being found only on Lambay, off the coast of Co. Dublin. Few will regret the passing of these pests which carry bubonic plague and often live in attics rather than in holes in the ground.

Michael O'Meara, who runs the Waterford Wildlife website, tells me that, when rats were plentiful in some now demolished warehouses on the city Quays, the black-coloured ones would escape danger by climbing up the walls into the ceilings and that brown-coloured ones would scamper into burrows on the ground. This suggests that one of the last mainland Irish colonies of Black Rats may have died out a few decades ago, just a short swim from where the Kruzenshtern and the Mir were tied up during the Tall Ships Festival

Dancing At The Crossroads An Sean Phobal they flourished and fewer sets were danced in rural Ireland. Some private country house dances were held. Those were

for the first time in rural Ireland in the middle of the eighteenth century. He taught all classes. He was usually itinerant and was sometimes accompanied by a blind fiddler or piper. He travelled an area of about ten square miles. He usually stayed about six weeks in an area, lodged in a farmhouse and taught the farmer's children free of charge to pay for his keep. Locals were very co-operative with him and would put a room or an outhouse at his disposal. In parts of the country, the Dancing Master would run his class in conjunction with Hedge Schools and the different classes would take place at opposite ends of the same room. In the book "A Tour of Ireland" by Arthur Young, there is reference to the dancing Master being paid 6d per pupil - 3d for himself and 3d for the musician. The dances he taught were mostly jigs and reels. The rising step and the first step of the jig and the sidestep of the reel. A major problem for some of his pupils

was that they could not distinguish between their right and left foot. To overcome this problem, the dancing master would tie a hay rope on one foot and a straw rope on the other. He would then tell them to lift "hayfoot" or "strawfoot" as required.

To ensure that the weaker pupils were not disheartened he would organise round or group dances in which all pupils could take part and use the basic jig and reel steps that he had taught them. The standard of these dances was quite high, as all pupils had had proper tuition. He also taught solo dancing. Dancing Masters survived into the early twentieth century particularly in Kerry and Clare. Gradually they were replaced by the dancing schools. The dancing master also taught Sets and Half Sets in the nineteenth century.

While the céilí dancing existed, the sets flourished until the advent of Conradh na Gaeilge in 1893. This organisation had as its objective the recreating of a separate cultural Irish nation. This meant refusing to imitate the English in their language, literature, music, dance, dress and ideas. Their primary aim was to keep the Irish language alive and they later turned their minds to other aspects of Irish culture. They believed that in order to achieve their objectives, they had to get rid of all English influences and so the sets and all their variant forms were banished from the social activities of revivalists in favour of céilí dances. Their first céilí was held in May 1897 and the first official organized céilí was held in London in Bloomsbury Hall on Octo-

The Church authorities in Ireland seemed to be opposed to dancing. Throughout the 1800s and the early 1900s, they viewed it as immoral and unbecoming to its flock".. One of the reasons given was the association, which existed at wakes, festivals, patterns and Sunday afternoon gatherings between music, dancing and drink. This resulted in improper behaviour. The fear and general discomfort generated by the attitude of the Clergy contributed largely to the gradual disappearance of house and crossroads dances in rural Ire-

The dancing of the time was mainly sets, so when Conradh na Gaeilge started to introduce céilí dancing it seemed to be more acceptable to the Clergy. In the 1920s, dancing classes were set up under the auspices of An Conradh to teach young children. An Coimisiún le Rinncí Gaelacha was set up in 1929. Its members were chosen from the dancing section of An Conradh. The clergy were agitating to have Country House and Crossroads Dances controlled.

The Public Dance Halls Act was finally passed in 1935. It required all public dance halls to be licensed and this effectively put an end to House and Crossroad Dances and with their demise, the sets went into decline. Functions could now be controlled. Parochial Halls were built in most towns and villages and as Fíor Chéilí seemed to be more acceptable to both Church and State as ten per cent of the door takings went to the state,

they flourished and fewer sets were danced in rural Ireland. Some private country house dances were held. Those were called "Sprees" (from the Irish word spraoi) or Joins but no money was collected and they were more like a house party. Sets were still danced at such

In the surrounding area of An Sean Phobal there were three venues for crossroad dancing. one in Grange near Fleming's pub which only lasted a couple of years. Another one at Robert's Cross-at the turning off from an Rinn to an Sean Phobal. One Sunday evening in the early 1930s the men and women had the dancing in full swing when the parish priest from an Sean Phobal came down, he stopped the dancing and said to the women " go home ye slips". When all the women were gone he turned to the bosca ceoil player and said continue with the dancing, that saw the end to that

The most famous stage was 'Kenneally stage" between the Seanachie and the Marine bar this lasted till the 1950s. The dancing here was held every Thursday and Sunday evenings. the box players took it in turn to play the bosca ceoil, men like Jack Leary, John Daly, Paddy Mc Kenna and in later years Sean Leahy. The bosca ceoil was kept by Paddy McKenna. On average the bosca ceoil would have to be replaced every two years, during the war years a serious problem a ceoil were not being made and a new bosca ceoil was needed. After some considerable time word came that a bosca ceoil was available in county Kildare, so someone had to go and purchase it there.the bosca ceoil was played from six in the evening till it got dark and people came from the adjoining parishes to dance the sets and half sets.



Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG), however, questioned how much it costs to clean up areas littered by these groups.

"I would think it costs a lot more," he said. Fianna Fail councillor, Kevin Wilkinson gave his "wholehearted support" to the notice of motion.

"Ridiculous" **Rule Should Be Changed**

A "ridiculous rule" which bans hedgecutting on roads during the summer months is endangering motorists lives, according to one Fine Gael councillor.

Cllr. Nora Flynn blasted the rule preventing hedgecutting from taking place while birds are nesting.

DAIRYING: Milk Liners

Milk Liners - The Facts. The expected life of a set of liners is 2500 milkings. Look at the following example to indicate the date liners need to be changed.

Example: Farm of 60 cows and 6 milking units:

At each milking, there will be 10 rows, so, each set of liners has 20 milkings each day. Now if one divides the figure of 2,500 by 20, one gets the number of days the set of liners will last. In our example, the liners will last 125 days or just over 4 months.

So assuming you start milking the cows in February, the liners should have been changed by now.

It is estimated that the loss in milk yield due to using worn liners is 5%. At a cost of 24 for one set of liners, the return on the investment is immediate.

Milk Solids for July

July: - The worst month of the year for milk protein. July is also one of the main milk months. It is critical to get good volumes of milk with high kgs of fat and protein. Its impact on the overall milk receipts for the year should not be underestimated. Look at the following table to assess the kgs of milk protein produced in a given volume of milk and it's impact on the creamery cheque.

e.g. 50 cows yielding 5 gallons (23.40 kgs) at a fat % of 3.70 and varying protein %

Total milk produced for July is 7750gls or 36,270 kgs.

Creameries vary in what they pay for milk protein, but let's say, they pay 4.90/kg of protein. Now look at the difference between having a July milk protein of 3.22% and a July figure of 3.52%

Grass quality and grass allowance is the key to protein yield. Grass quality will be maintained by topping to 6 cms if required. A 20-22 day rotation should be the norm and grass allowance is ensured by a 24 to 48 hour allocation.

Nitrogen Use for July & August

July is usually the month when there is too much grass on dairy farms. The chief culprit is too much Nitrogen and not matching nitrogen use to stocking rate. For dairy farmers with 30% of the dairy ground closed for 2nd cut silage, 1 bag of CAN will be necessary. However, for dairy farmers who are taking none or a small second cut, the situation is very different. The entire farm maybe now available for grazing. Nitrogen should be applied as per the

TILLAGE: Whole Crop Cereals & local markets

Cereals harvested as whole crop silage contain both grain and straw. Winter wheat and winter triticale are the most cost effective as they will produce more tonnes of dry matter per hectare.

Local markets to dairy or cattle farmers should be explored. Perhaps direct sales at harvest or on-farm crimping and sales during the winter period to livestock farmers should also be considered. This year the majority of grass silage was harvested late and the quantity and quality of silage is lower than other years. Many livestock farmers are looking to make more silage (second cut) or looking for alternative feeds this year. On a cost basis, grain directly from tillage farms is more competitive than any other source. The cost per ton of dry matter(DM) of a good crop of whole crop triticale (80/ton) or v well to maize (76/ton or 88/ton grown under plastic). First cut grass silage costs are approx 80/ton/DM or second cut at 100/ton/DM.

Harvest of cereal whole crop usually starts 3-4 weeks before the crop is harvested for grain. Fermented whole crop is harvested any time after the grain reaches the "soft cheese" stage and can continue until the grain reaches the "hard cheddar" stage. Dry matter of the whole crop is between 35-55% at those stages. Fermented whole crop does not need an additive for preservation but when the dry matters are high, an additive can be beneficial to reduce heating and subsequent feed loss at feed out.

Crimping grain at 30-40% moisture content is very successful. Additional costs of approx 7-8/ton for crimping and 5/ton for additive will result in a well preserved pit of material that does not heat at feed out. This can be sold directly to neighbouring farmers through the winter. Costs for drying grain will increase this year with the increased cost of oil. Selling wet grain (crimped) will cut out this cost for the grain grower and the livestock producer. Grain (20%MC) sold at 95/ton at harvest is worth 78/ton at 34% moisture content (conversion calculated on a dry matter basis) or 118 per ton of dry matter. Crimping and additive costs are not included in these costs.

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Residents greeted the move with relief after enduring what they claimed were continuous problems with anti-social behaviour and intimidation.

And now the Town Council is to make a "determined effort" to prevent illegal encampments from setting up in the area in the future.

Speaking at the July meeting of the local authority, Labour councillor Billy Kyne said measures must now be put in place to make sure it becomes a 'no-go' area for illegal encampments.

"While I'm slow to call for boulders to be put into any area this has now to be done," Cllr. Kyne said.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield also believed boulders should be used to prevent problems from happening again.

"They may not be ideal but the council has to do something," he said. "A lot of young mothers live there and I can understand why they're sceptical about what has gone on after the encampment was moved for the Environment Minister's visit but then returned shortly afterwards.

"On the other side, from the traveller's side, there are a number of lorries going in and out of the advance factory – it's a health and safety concern, and no one wants to see an accident there."

The failure to implement the Traveller Accommodation Plan is also a factor, according

to Independent councillor Michael O'Riordan.

He said when an illegal encampment sets up in the urban area, there is often "no where to move them to."

A transient site is planned for the west of the county, but nothing is in place as yet. While Dungarvan Town Council was one of the first local authorities to set up a halting site, Cllr. O'Riordan believed they are now being penalised, while the county council fails to act.

Following a meeting with GAA chiefs, Mr. O'Flathery said the GAA land is likely to remain undeveloped for the next 10 to 15 years, but in the short-term boulders will be set down in the next few days.

"The GAA is just as anxious as we are area to stop this happening again in the future," the Town clerk said.

Meanwhile, Labour councillor, Teresa Wright said an article in the Dungarvan Leader last week regarding the illegal encampment, incorrectly stated that the County Waterford Traveller Initiative made a submission opposing amendments to the Traveller Accommodation Plan proposed by Cllr. Damien Geoghegan. Cllr. Wright pointed out that the County Waterford Traveller Initiative is a development and education body, funded by the Waterford County Council. An inter-agency group on the council's committee expressed concerns at the process used to pass the amendments.

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mr. Paud Horan, Ard-na-Greine, Clonmel which sad event took place at St. Anthony's Nursing Unit, Glencomer where he was looked after for the past five years. His death evokes fond memories of him as the first professional window cleaner in the town of Clonmel, a service sadly lacking in the town in those days.

Supported initially by many people in the neighbourhood, who gladly gave him a turn, he used to clean their windows for a few bob, before being contracted by shops and offices. Paud was a familiar and popular figure in the town for many years, with his ladder and cleaning equipment, as he greeted the passers by with a cheery hello, or a few friendly words

Noted for his love of all things Irish, the language, literature, music, he was one of the prime motivators some years ago behind Feile Chluain Meala, which initiated cultural activities, especially for school children.

Son of Patrick and Sarah Horan of Sligo, he was one of a family of six, three boys and three girls. Having gone to school in his native Sligo, he duly arrived in Clonmel with his brother Seamus in the early forties, they both secured employment in the Clonmel Pram factory, where Paud met Peggy Dempsey, fell in love with her and a few years later they married. Peggy's mother, it will be recalled, was a milliner with a very fashionable shop in Mitchell Street, 'before the time' some would say in retrospect. Paud and Peggy took up residence in Davitt Avenue where they remained for a few years before moving to the old Dempsey home stead in Ard-na-Greine, rearing their three children. Like most of the peoole of that era, before the advent of the foreign holidays and Celtic Tiger, Tramore was one of the favourite resorts around where the family had some lovely caravan holidays. Visiting his folks in Sligo was always such a treat, especially for Paud meetng with his nephews and nieces and other relatives.

Paud was a very knowledgeable and well informed person, he loved books and was a voracious reader, historical and political subects being of most interest to him. Nothing gave him more pleasure than a few drinks in good company, with lively interesting conversation being the order of the day. Though a Sligo man always, he nonetheless loved his adopted town for which in earlier years, with his brother Seamus he tried to promote the best in Irish culture. And he became an ardent admirer and follower of Banna Cluain Meala. Retiring from the window cleaning business, he enjoyed a daily walk around Powerstown until sadly a deterioration in his health some seven years ago, curtailed his activities, and he more or less confined to the house. Subsequently, St. Anthony's Nursing Unit in Glencomer became his home where he was well looked after.

His remains were removed to S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C, S.S. Peter and Paul's, Clonmel. On the following morning, requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his eternal soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien, C.C. After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery where he was laid to rest. Fr. If you want to see the tallest tree in Ireland you will have to travel to Wicklow to see.

Pseudotsuga Menziesii (Douglas Fir), Powerscourt Gardens, Enniskerry - 5 x 56 m - tallest tree in Ireland. If you want to see the second tallest tree you can stay in Co. Waterford and see Picea Sitchensis (Sitka Spruce), Curraghmore, Portlaw - 6.7 x 55 m - Irish Height Champion; 2nd tallest tree in Ireland.

To date 238 trees have been measured in Co. Waterford. What about Abbeyside you may ask! Well, as usual Dungarvan has stolen our thunder with Aesculus Hipposcastanum (Horse Chestnut), Glendine House, Dungarvan - 6.13 x 22.5 m.

If you were ever at St. Gehan's Well Mass and stood under the big Chestnut tree at Glendine, you knew you were in Abbeyside and not Dungarvan - enough said!!

ANCIENT GREECE

Ancient Greek civilisation was founded about 2000 BC. Because the area is so mountainous, communication between cities was difficult. So they developed city states which were ruled separately, but shared a common culture. The Greeks produced superb sculpture, great literature and monumental buildings. They also invented democracy (fair government).



Coins Of Gold And Silver

The first coins were minted in Lydia (part of the present Turkey) around 650 BC. The Greeks copied the idea and made coins of their own from gold and silver. They bore images of the gods and heroes, or emblems of the cities where they were made. The coins for Athens, for example, showed the owl of Athene who was the patron goddess of the city.

Homes Of The Gods

The ancient Greeks worshipped many gods and goddesses. Among them were Zeus (god of the sky), Poseidon (goddess of the sea), Hebe (god of youth) and Aphrodite (goddess of love). Numerous temples were built in honour of these deities and sacrifices were made to them. One of the finest temples was the Parthenon (built 447 - 438 BC) in Athens. It was dedicated to Athene, goddess of wisdom, arts and crafts.

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Dungarvan Leader - GARDEN FEATURE

rid of unwanted bugs

Whatever kind of garden you have, you need to deal with unwanted guests the central aim being to get rid of them.

But you don't need to work on the principle of killing everything that moves in the garden. You certainly do not want to get rid of all the friendly predators in the garden that are, nature's own method of dealing with pests.

This type of bug control is part of the overall return to more natural methods of cultivation which has been growing in recent years. Organic gardening, whether it's food or flowers you are growing, is aimed at getting back to a balance in nature without using chemicals... Plants are more robust when they are grown in soil kept well fed with organic manure.

The use of quick-acting fertilisers induces soft growth which easily becomes the target of many

Instead of using chemicals which can kill off all insects, selective use of predators helps as does using the right plants.

There are many friendly creatures about - the most useful in the garden being bees whose activities encourage pollination. And if you thought wasps were the most annoying creatures invented - think again - they eat lots of greenfly. Although sometimes regarded as something of a pest in some gardens, birds in fact do more good than harm. They eat lots of grubs, caterpillars, slugs and aphids and can be encouraged into the garden by incorporating food tables, bird baths and nest boxes.

Toads, frogs and hedgehogs also eat large number of harmful creatures like slugs and snails. Larvae of the ground beetle are beneficial too.

They look like caterpillars, are a dull brown colour and have three pairs of legs.

They move very quickly - as do most helpful insects that hunt bugs -but should not be confused with the harmful wire worm which is lighter in colour and very much less active.

Black garden beetles feed on eel worms, cutworms, leather jackets as well as insect eggs. Like many predators, they like to hunt at night and hides out of sight under leaves during the

The centipede is another friend which likes groundcover, with a rather flat light brown body. Again, it moves very quickly and should not be

confused with harmful millipedes which are either a slate grey or darkish brown colour and are very sluggish.

Of the flying insects, the ladybird is one of the gardener's best friends. Both the familiar spotted adult beetles and the tiny, rather alligator-like, larvae destroy countless numbers of greenfly.

Some species of hoverfly look rather like elegant wasps. They and their larvae eat huge numbers of aphids too.

The common lacewing has a thin, pale green body and is very active destroying all kinds of small insects.

In the greenhouse, a small wasp called Encarsia formosa will keep whitefly at bay if introduced before the problem gets too big.

Another problem, the damaging red spider mite, can be helped by a bug called phytoseiulus persimilis which eats five adults or 20 young mites in a day. These two have to be introduced to the greenhouse annually and can usually bought by mail order - your local garden centre should be able to help you.

Some plants can help too - nasturtiums help repel whitefly while garlic and tagetes, French and African marigolds, discourage greenfly. And where possible when you buy any kind of plants or seeds, make sure they are healthy and purchase the ones that are bred to be resistant to

This week in the garden

Plant Madonna lilies

This is the ideal time to plant Lilium condidum, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts.

Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover with 5cm of soil. They will probably work themselves out until they show; but make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and good, but not freshly manured ground.

Lift daffodils and bulbous irises

Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another

They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.

Cut back helianthemums

Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own device, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears.

Feed chrysanthemums

It is a mistake to begin to feed chrysanthemums of any type too early, but you can start now with

Give a top dressing of chicken manure and very small doses of liquid feed made for chrysanthemums or other flowering plants every five days as directed by the manufacturer.

Sow for winter

Now is the time to sow turnips and beet for storing. as well as Hungry Gap kale, spinach beet and cabbages for the spring.

chopped Method:

SCRUB and scrape the mussels and wash thoroughly, throwing away any that do not close tightly when sharply tapped Put into a large pan with the water and heat briskly, shaking the pan occasionally. for 5 or 6 minutes or until the shells open. Remove from the heat and drain off the water. Set aside a few mussels in their shells to garnish. Remove the mussels



You will be surprised and delighted at how quickly it will accumulate.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

What is the cost of a passport and how do you apply?

The cost of a passport depends on the type of passport and the rates are as follows:

Standard ten year passport for people aged 18-64 €75 Standard passport for people aged 65 will now be free. Large ten year passport for very frequent travellers €100 Three year passport for children under age 3 €15 Five year passport for children aged 3-17 €25

There are additional fees for urgent and for out-of-hours emergency applications.

The application form (APS 1) for people living within the State is available from your local Garda Station and from Post Offices. With your application and fee you must pro-

Two recently taken passport photographs - the back of each photograph and the witness section of the form must be signed by a Garda Siochana.

Proof of citizenship - if it is a renewal application your most recent passport is sufficient.

If you are born in Ireland and it is your first application or you are under 18 years of age, the long form of your Irish Birth Certificate is required as proof of citizenship. Children born in Ireland since the start of this year and people born outside Ireland will require additional or alternative forms of proof. Information of what is required depending on your circumstances is supplied with the application form.

You can apply in person to the passport office for a passport or by post. You can also apply via the 'Passport Express' service, available through the post office, which guarantees receipt of a passport within ten working days where applications are completed correctly with proper documentation. The additional fee for this service is €7 per application or €10 for up to four applications sent together for a family.

Waterford County Council's Planning Approach in Ring Criticised by Gaeltacht Representative

Waterford County Council is deficient in its planning in the Ring Gaeltacht because development hasn't been matched by provision of a modern, clean and

dependable water supply.
So says the area's Udarás na Gaeltachța representative, Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair. He also says growth is being "funnelled" into particular parts of Ring, whilst restrictions have been applied to the rest of it.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says angry residents and businesses in Ring have contacted the Council in recent weeks with complaints about quality and quantity relating to the water - in his view, the same grievances they had all of ten years ago. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says the Councils' Senior Engineers are on record supporting the case for an overhaul of what is a dated and limited public water supply. However, he says significant monies raised through levies applied to recent developments in Ring do not seem to be progressing the case.

Outlining his point, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

"In Plans approved by members in 1999, 2001 and again this year, the Council has departed from operating an 'open' zoning for the whole parish - where each application, whether for a single dwelling or a collection, could be judged on its' merits. What we're left with in Ring, featuring the same inadequate water supply, cannot be regarded as good plan-

"The Council has presided over a 'property boom' in the locality, once the application of the 1999 County Development and 2001 Local Area Plans saw 3 defined 'priority settlement areas' established in Ring. With so-called

'genuine housing need' criteria deciding approvals in townlands excluded from these zones, a two-tier system of considering planning applications has come about in Ring. Effectively, in much of the locality, sites are only available to relatives of the seller, a 'local' with an adjudged 'housing need' or the small number of people coming to the parish to be employed within it. At the same time, however, applications to develop schemes of between 10 and 30 houses are being encouraged if the land involved happens to be in one of the three zones favoured by the local authority.

"Since 2000, some 65 houses are either built or under way in variously sized estate schemes by developers in zoned parts of Ring. Similar applications for two more schemes totalling 47 nouses have been approved by the Council - in addition to a venture featuring 16 holiday homes. More zoned lands remain, some of which is owned by developers and has been the subject of previously unsuccessful estate applications and could soon be the subject of new proposals. Independent of estate type development and excluding the completion of the Council's own housing scheme in Baile na nGall, that same 5 year period has also seen over 60 single dwellings being built in various parts of Ring.

"Whatever about the future and how the community develops, there is an urgent requirement to complement recent development with essential infrastructure like a water supply that is not susceptible to discolouration, foul odour, weak pressure or unannounced

Ring Gaeltacht's Fearghus Ó Conchúir, First Irish Clore **Leadership Fellow for** Ireland

The Arts Council has announced that Waterford native, dancer and choreographer Fearghus Ó Conchúir has been chosen as the first Clore Leadership Fellow for Ireland. The Clore leadership programme, now in its second year in the UK, has, through support from the Arts Council/ An Chomhairle Ealaíon, been extended to include a participant from Ireland for the first time. The total value of the Fellowship is in the region of 62,000 (i.e. 40,000 from the Arts Council and Stg£15,000 from Clore).

This programme, established by the Clore Duffield Foundation is an initiative which aims to develop the knowledge, skills, networks and experience of potential leaders across a wide range of cultural activity. This includes the visual and performing arts, heritage, museums, libraries and archives, and cultural policy and administration.
Thirty-six-year old Fearghus Ó Conchúir, one of 27 Fellows se-

lected, will undertake a year-long programme of work, research, training and secondment designed to develop leadership skills and experience.

Speaking about the Fellowship, Fearghus Ó Conchúir says: "The Arts Council's support of this Clore Fellowship represents an acknowledgment of the necessity for artists to develop expertise which puts them in a position to protect the needs and promote the value of their art. It is also an endorsement of the ability of artists to meet that challenge. I am very grateful to be the recipient of the Fellowship and I look forward to this invaluable opportunity to learn skills which I hope will enable me to serve my particular art form, dance, and the wider arts community".

Dame Vivien Duffield, Clore Founder and Patron says: "By investing in leadership, we hope to raise the game for the whole cultural sector. We are especially pleased that the new group of Fellows is drawn from such a widely diverse range of backgrounds.'

Brought up in the Ring Gaeltacht, Fearghus Ó Conchúir attended Scoil Náisiúnta na Rinne, Scoil na Leanaí and later boarded at the Cistercian College in Roscrea. He is the son of the late John P. and Nora O Conchúir. Fearghus completed degrees in English and European Literature at Magdalen College Oxford, before going to London Contemporary Dance School. Since graduation, he has danced for companies including Adventures in Motion Pictures, Claire Russ Ensemble, David Massingham Dance, English National Opera, Royal Opera House and ARC Dance Company.

In 2001 he set up Corp Feasa Dance Company to perform his chore-ography which has included Vespers (2001) Tearmann (2003) Sulán (2003) and An dá thrá (2004). His work has also been performed internationally by 4D, and in productions at LCDS, London Studio Centre and Conservatoire for Acting and Musical Theatre, Guildford.

In 1998 Fearghus produced a piece named Gach Mac Máthar. It was commissioned by Waterford County Arts Office and the Arts Council. It premiered in Halla Pobal na Rinne and toured in Waterford at that time. He has undertaken schools' workshops in Scoil Náisiúnta na Rinne, Scoil San Nioclás, An Rinn, and Scoil Mhic Áirt, Sean Phobal with funding from Ealaín na Gaeltachta and will be involved in a creative project with Scoil San Nioclás in 2006.

In 2003 he became Artist-in-Residence in the Muskerry Gaeltacht. He recently represented Ireland in the Eurofuturoscope cultural exchange programme touring work across Belgium. He is a Board Member of the Association of Professional Dancers of Ireland.

Fearghus' latest production Cosán Dearg, at Project in Dublin's Temple Bar. Cosán Dearg was collaboration with director and designer Jason Byrne, composer Julie Feeney and is performed by Bernadette Iglich and Fearghus Ó Conchúir.



Waterford Renew Rivalry With Cork

Quarter Final Double-Header to Attract Huge Crowd to Croke Park

taken among our supporters in the immediate aftermath of the quarter final draw on television on Sunday evening, July 10th it would have shown a large majority happy with the outcome as far as we are concerned.

Personally I did not look at it in this light at first but having analyzed the matter and listened to the opinion of others, I became convinced that drawing Munster champions, Cork, was the best thing that could have happened to us.

Having a crack at the Munster and All-Ireland champions is a challenge that will certainly bring out the very best in Waterford and what a better way than this to get the Clare defeat out of their systems.

There is no point in denying that the defeat at Ennis was a shattering blow to the players as well as to our supporters. After all we did score 21 points - a total that should be enough to win a game in normal circumstances. Leaving that one behind us takes time to get over. A win against Cork would certainly banish it from our thoughts as we prepare for a semi-final challenge back in Croker a couple of weeks later.

The widespread rumours about dissention in the camp after the Ennis game were completely unfounded and it was good to see a denial being published. I understand that the entire panel with the full management team were back in . training on Tuesday evening following the Clare match.

It will be the first time in history that we meet Cork in Croke Park and many people have, quite understandably been ask- sibility for the very costly

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If a 'straw poll' had been ing why not Thurles for this errors at Ennis. game. Thurles would also be a natural venue also for the other component of this attractive double header - Clare and Wexford. But here again, reality must be faced as Thurles would not hold the crowd, expected to be in the region of 55-60,000.

It is reported that Waterford county officers are unhappy with the allocation of tickets received from headquarters and are complaining about the quality and quantity.

Having won only one senior championship tie in Croke Park in well over half a century does not speak well for our record at headquarters, but in practically all our defeats since then we felt that the games which we lost were there for the winning.

Without a doubt, one of the most agonising of these was the semi-finl defeat by Clare on August 11th in 2002 when after looking 'home and dry ' after only 20 minutes we eventually lost on a 1-16 to 1-13 score. The worst aspect of this particular game was that we had a total of 17 wides over the 70 minutes.

And who will forget that awful defeat by Kilkenny in the semi-final last year.

OUR DEFENCE PROBLEM

It is acknowledged by all and sundry that we have a problem in defence and this starts with the goalkeeper Stephen Brennar who let four goals pass him against Clare. No one can say that he was responsible for all four because the Banner forwards were able to get inside their markers. So it is only fair to say that backs and goalkeeper must take collective respon-

In that match we did miss some scores through inaccuracy, but at the same time little fault could be found with midfield and our forward division and as I have written above, 21 points is a very respectable tally.

It is possible now that in keeping with policy, there are going to be no replacements, apart from substituting the suspended Eoin McGrath and trying out a new goalkeeper for next Sunday. The selectors will probably feel that it is too late now to do a restructuring job on the defence and will stick with the players, and hope for a better all round performance in this sector.

It is interesting to note that if Stephen Brennar is in goal on Sunday, then he will be the third Waterford keeper to play in that position in our last three appearances in Croke Park.

Of course after last weekend, there may be substance in the rumour that the De La Salle man may not be our goalkeeper on Sunday next.

A full squad of 31 spent the weekend in Dublin and played a mixed match in Parnell Park. The goalkeepers used were Ian O'Regan (who was the 'keeper when we were defeated by Kilkenny in the semi-final last year) and Clinton Hennessey, who for some reason, best known to the selectors, was dropped after a number of fair good performances in the national league.

If one of the substitute goalkeepers is used on Sunday, it

may be just one of two changes from the team which lost at Ennis. Eoin McGrath suspended for one month and having to miss a match has been showing good form and has figured in the scoring in the last three or four games. His absence here will call for a reshuffle in the forward division and will very likely mean that Dave Bennett will be reintroduced, probably at midfield. There is widespread support, also for the placing of Ken McGrath at centre half back which is his natural position.

The team will not be named until tomorrow, Thursday night and will be announced following their final training session. Apart from knowing who will be named as goalkeeper and who will replace Eoin Mc-Grath, there is practically no great interest in the announcement of the line out, since this will change when the team lines out on Sunday.

Cork, according to a report may be without one or two of the players who lined out against Waterford in the Munster semi-final.

The Munster and All-Ireland champions must start warm favourites and this will suit Waterford who invariably perform best when in the role

of outsiders.

When we played the Rebels on May 22nd Ken McGrath, back after a long lay off due to his shoulder injury and Paul Flynn, recovering from a knee injury were not fully mobile

The Result I feel that we can defeat Cork if the players are fully 'tuned,' fully focused and if they believe in themselves. Remember we did beat them in the 2002 and 2004 Munster championship - each time by a singe point. So realistically, we have no good reason for thinking that we cannot do the same again, if things go right for us

Those who expressed views agreed that all players should be well looked after but that if payment was made, then it would spell the demise of the GAA. Personally I can never see the ordinary GAA members, the people who keep the wheels of the association turning - the good people who look after our grounds, the hurley carriers, the jersey laundry people, the club players and all the others who have laboured in a voluntary capacity to make the GAA what it is, agreeing to the introduction of professionalism for an elite group.

But I have no doubt but that the campaign to have intercounty players paid will continue. It is no secret that at the present time very many of the county team managers throughout the country, are highly paid as are many of the club trainers.

the same umbrella within a couple of years, then what the Coaching and Games Development are doing will be very helpful to the integration process. I'm sure that the special Integration Committee at national level will take note of this.

There will be no meeting of the county board in August which is regarded as a holiday period. week

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
TRAVELLER PROBLEMS


CHAMPIONSHIPS

Ballymac Community Centre A Catalyst For New Development

A new community centre in Ballymacarbry must act as the catalyst for other developments in the village, according to one Suir area councillor.

Speaking at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, Fine Gael Cllr. Paudie Coffey said the zoning for a community centre in the Coun-

ucey

ty Development should be capitalised on.

"Full consideration should be given following the development of a community centre to future developments in Ballymacarbry," he went on to say.

Strict new guidelines on oneoff housing, which form a central part of the County Development Plan, are likely to "push more people" into designated settlement areas, the Fine Gael councillor believed.

And the county council should encourage more community development and provide the infrastructure to cater for an increase in populations.

"Nationally," he warned, "the government is putting the cart before the horse. They're putting people into areas when the infrastructure isn't in place."

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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
