WRH Gets Go-Ahead To Become Satellite Cancer Centre

Health Minister, Mary Harney's announcement that a satellite radiation oncology treatment centre will be put in place in Waterford Regional Hospital was hailed as a "victory for people power" by campaigners.

Cancer Care Alliance campaigners said they were "ecstatic" at an announcement which they described as "fantastic news" for cancer patients and their families in the South East region.

Minister Harney, making the announcement on Monday, said Waterford Regional Hospital will be one of two integrated satellite centres in the new 400 million euro plan for a National Network For Radiation Oncology Services.

"The government recognises that as well as facing the trauma of cancer treatment, many patients have to face arduous, long journeys for radiation treatment. This is not what anyone wants for cancer services in our country or in any re-

gion of it," the Minister said.

"With the inclusion of Waterford and Limerick in this network, and the arrangements being made in the North West, we will be keeping patients' travel times as low as possible while delivering top quality care for patients throughout the country.

"It is important for maintaining the quality of care standards that the satellite locations are fully integrated with the main centres.

QUALITY OF CARE

"This way the same quality of care will be delivered in each location. It also means that clinical staff will keep up the

same levels of expertise by working in both the main centre and the satellite," the Health Minister said.

"It is part of the government's policy for health that as many services as possible are delivered in each region. This will require networks and team-

working by consultants. This is the model into which new cancer consultants will be recruited."

WELCOMED

All the main groups that led the campaign for radiotherapy welcomed the announcement.

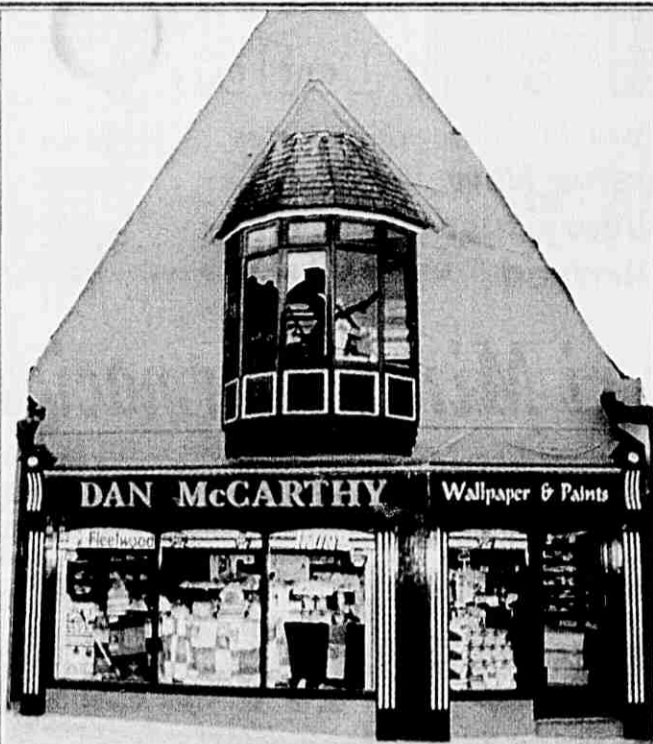

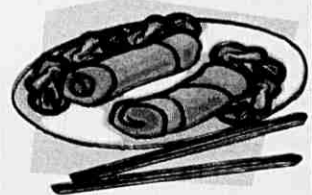

**Housing for Whites
Orchard and
Powers Brewery**

Dungarvan Town Council plans to construct housing for the elderly on Whites Orchard at O'Connell Street and at the former Power's Brewery site, at Fairlane.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty confirmed that the council has agreed to purchase a 0.6 acre site known as Whites Orchard.

The site includes a house fronting onto O'Connell Street, which will be demolished to give access to the remainder of the site. Seven bungalows for the elderly are planned.

He also confirmed that the council is in negotiations with Andrew Hally, the owner of the Brewery site, about plans to construct 7 more bungalows for the elderly on the site. "This will complement the nineteen houses already there," he said.

Both developments are now to go to the Part 8 stage for public submission.

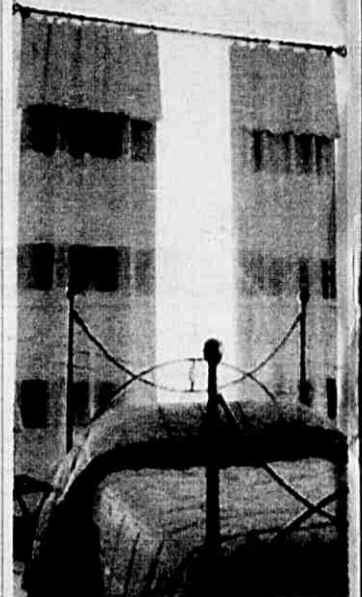

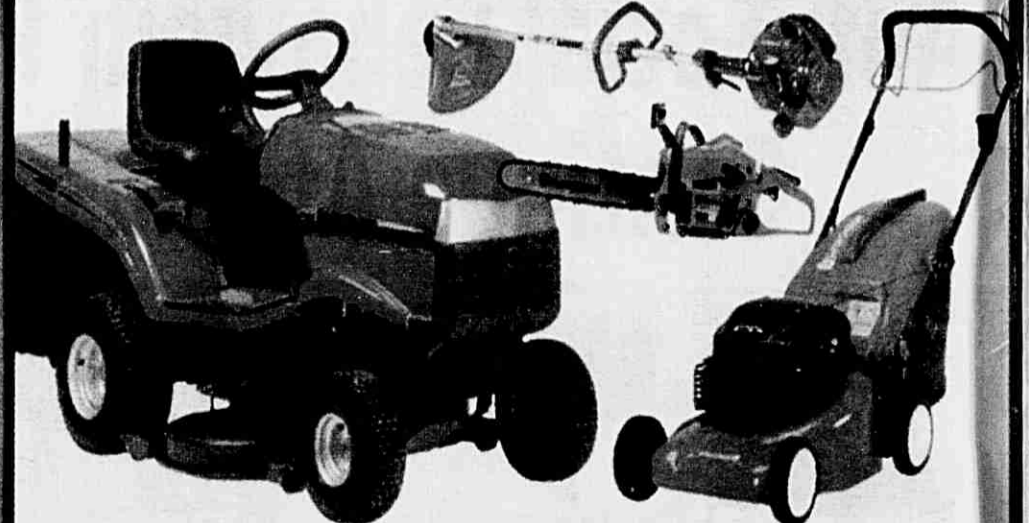

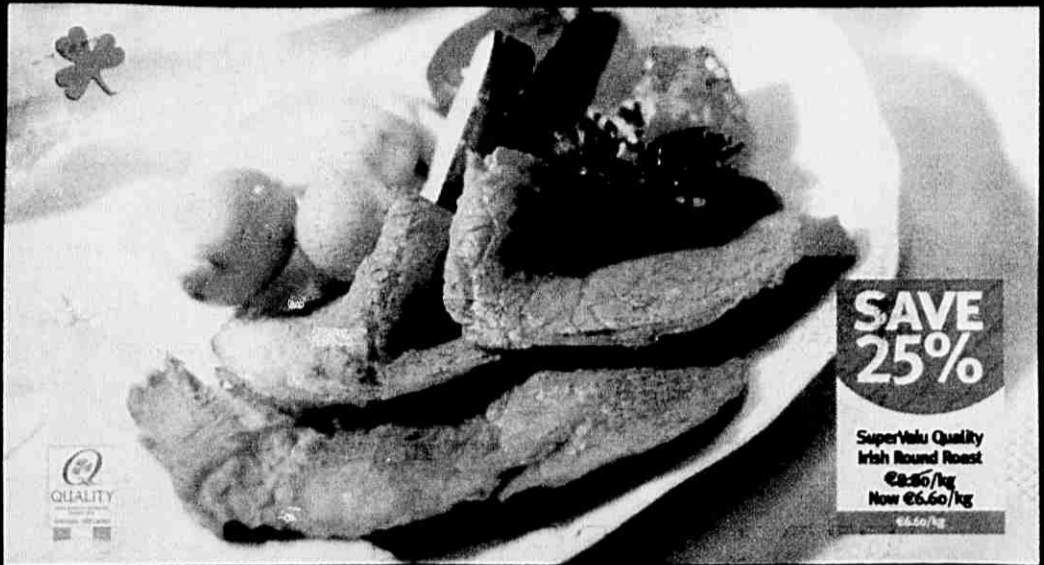

Vocational Education Committee Launch Brochure

Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee launched its Adult and Continuing Education Brochure, at the July meeting of the committee held in the Adult Education Centre, Priests Road, Tramore on 17th July.

The Adult Education Officer, Mary Walsh presented the brochure to the committee outlining the programmes available to those in employment and those who are currently unemployed and who wish to re-train for further employment.

The 2005/2006 brochure outlines the various schemes which are available to adults from Tallow to Tramore and many venues in between. It details the acceptance criteria and application procedures and introduces many new courses for the 2005 session, including the Diploma in Disability Studies and Introduction to Public Relations, both of which will take place in Colaiste Chathail Naofa, Dungarvan alongside hobby courses such as small animal management and introduction to stock broking. St Declan's Kilmacthomas will host the Childminding Practice module at FETAC level 2 which is being promoted by both Waterford City and Coun-

ty Childcare committees to childminders in the county. There is a significant subvention from both committees to childminders willing to gain formal qualifications by taking part in this course. Meanscoil San Nioclís, An Rinn will again host the Dioplóma sa Gaeilge certified by NUI Galway. Two groups have successfully completed this two year Dioplóma in 2005 and the next intake will commence in September. This school will also host a FETAC level 2 module on Irish for Preschool children.

Full time courses available through the Vocational Training Opportunity Scheme, include Business Studies,

Information Processing, Tourism, Retail Studies, and Art Craft and Design, enabling social welfare recipients retain their social welfare payments while training for a new career, generally over a two year period.

The Start Your Own Business course in the Business Training Centre, Kilmacthomas, (VTOS) aims to develop the skills in the budding entrepreneur which will allow them nurture a fledgling business. Students work on their business for three days per

week, attending the course on two days to learn business management, accounting, taxation, planning, marketing etc.

The Back to Education Initiative allows adults take part time courses in General Skills for adults with less than Leaving Certificate, in both Tramore and Dungarvan and at FETAC level 2 1 in Business Studies and Childcare in both Tramore and Tallow. A new addition to this suite of programmes for 2005/2006 are the introduction of a Garden Maintenance and a Start Your Own Business for adults in the Business Training Centre, Kilmacthomas. BTEI has the advantage of being open to all adults regardless of social welfare status. This is a very flexible system which gives adults and early school leavers the opportunity to access part-time courses while seeking work or continuing with family responsibilities. The Garden Maintenance course, at 9 hours attendance per week, will be of particular interest to farm families wishing to use existing plant and equipment to generate additional off farm income. People wishing to start their own business may do so through this programme with out the qualifying social welfare eligibility for VTOS, aiming to develop the skills in the budding entrepreneur which will allow them nurture a fledgling business. Students work on their business for three days per week, attending the course on two days to learn business management, accounting, taxation, planning, marketing, etc.

Other courses added to the suite for this year for the first time, include a short course for young offenders to enhance their education levels and improve their social skills. This year also for the first time the VEC will host a dedicated programme for adults who suffered a brain injury or illness in adulthood, working with them to meet their individual needs in reading, writing, etc.

Co. Waterford VEC provides community based and basic education tuition, in numerous locations throughout the county

with a varied and flexible programme, details of which are outlined in this years brochure.

The event will provide an opportunity for all to complement and draw strengths from each other in the drive towards promoting Waterford as a rural holiday destination of choice.

Pennsylvanian Twin Proposal To Be Discussed

A proposal to twin Dungarvan with the Pennsylvanian city of Erie will be discussed alongside proposals for towns in Europe at the council's next protocol meeting.

Dungarvan Town Council has been looking for a suitable twin for several years without success. A number of options were previously extensively explored, primarily through the visits of delegations to a resort town in France and Mt. Kisco near New York in the US.

Fine Gael councillor, Fred Forsey put forward the proposal to twin with Erie, Pennsylvania in the US.

A city of almost 110,000 citizens, the third largest in Pennsylvania, it is a manufacturing centre, located two hours from the Canadian border and Niagara Falls. Plastic is the towns biggest output. "About ten miles from Erie, is a town called Waterford, so there might a connection," Cllr. Forsey suggested.

A proposal to twin with the Belgian town of Leuven – the headquarters of Stella Artois and home of the internationally renowned Catholic University – is also up for discussion.

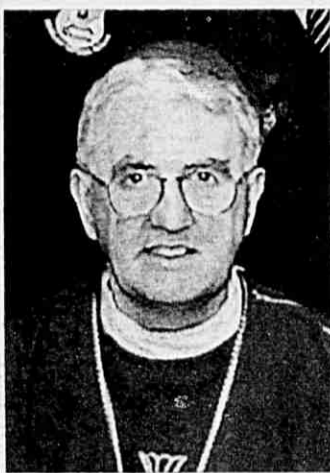

A LETTER FROM BISHOP LEE

Parish Groupings and the Rationalisation of Masses



When I speak of the Grouping of Parishes I am referring to parishes that are bordering on each other, neighbouring parishes. Grouping of such parishes does not mean their suppression or amalgamation nor does it mean changing parish boundaries or closing churches. The focus of a Grouping of Parishes is on drawing strength from co-operation. Some co-operation between parishes is already taking place and this is a welcome development. It brings many benefits to each parish and will be helpful and a great support to neighbouring priests.

I am sure you are very much aware of the steep decline in the number of priests currently ministering in our diocese. The lack of vocations will be a big issue for the foreseeable future. As well, there is the rapidly changing age profile of our priests. All of this will mean that parishes will have fewer priests and some parishes, may have no resident priest.

We should not be faithless about the fall in vocations. The encouragement of vocations has to be a priority for every member of the Church. Jesus still calls. We have the responsibility of ensuring that his voice can be heard.

At the same time, however hard we work and pray for vocations, we cannot ignore the fact that even if there should be a dramatic upturn in the near future, it would take many years for the effect to be seen.

I sincerely hope that people will increasingly take more ownership of their parish, its achievements, its goals and its problems. Ownership and involvement go together. They are an attitude of mind on the part of each individual person and they can find their expression in Parish Pastoral Councils, Liturgy Teams, administration and other forms of ministry. Quite an amount of this is already taking place. Last year's Listening Process gave further importance to this development. And I am very pleased to see progress of this kind in several of our parishes.

There are two very practical issues that I would like to address in this letter to you.

Grouping of Parishes

The first issue concerns the Grouping of Parishes so that parishes can cooperate and help each other in different ways.

In Europe as a whole, one third of parishes now have no resident priest. In response to changing needs and the demands of parish life, parishes have had to come together and this coming together of parishes has had very concrete effects. Firstly, it gathered together energy, resources and gifts that could be shared by neighbouring parishes. Secondly, it provided a system of support for the declining number of priests. This meant that priests were not isolated and they could have cover for a day off, for holidays and in times of illness.

Parish Groupings are an important part of the way forward in our diocese. They will provide us with a structure that will enable us to face the challenge of the new situation in all our parishes. I ask our priests to discuss, in the near future, the details of such Groupings and the implications arising from them with you the people, particularly with Parish Pastoral Councils and other Parish Leadership Teams.

Number and Times of Masses

Secondly, we need to face a very practical issue regarding the number and times of Masses in our different parishes. Given the number of Masses in each Church at present and the small congregations, we need to look urgently at this matter. What makes this so urgent is the fact that the number of priests in our diocese is in sharp decline and their average age is increasing.

We must also give due consideration to the fact that good liturgy requires careful planning and preparation and that the Sunday Eucharist is intended to be a community celebration, requiring the full,

conscious and active participation of all. It is difficult to achieve these ideals when congregations are small and the priest has to preside at a number of Masses.

We should therefore discuss the number of Masses, firstly in each parish and then in each Grouping of Parishes, bearing in mind the following:

- Each parish should so arrange its Masses that it has some possibility of being able to offer help to a neighbouring parish whose priest may be ill or on holidays or has to be away for any reason.

- Normally a priest should not celebrate more than two Masses on a Sunday and should only celebrate one vigil Mass.

- Except in special circumstances, no priest ought to be saying two week day Masses as his normal commitment.

- In parishes with more than one priest, the schedule of Masses should be planned so that it is possible for one priest to be absent without having to seek a supply.

- Parishes with only one priest are a particular challenge at holiday time or in emergency situations.

As we endeavour to address these and other issues in our diocese today, it is important for us not to be too pessimistic. We have many advantages compared to the generations that went before us. The most distant parts of the diocese can be reached more quickly today than a neighbouring parish might have been a century ago. We have new means of communication if we use them well. There are new ways of involving people with new kinds of expertise available.

We are conscious too that the future is in God's hands. "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain" (Ps. 127:1). The house we are asked to build is God's house. It is God who is building it for us and with us. We can therefore approach even the most daunting challenges with quiet confidence. The Lord asks for our whole hearted commitment, offering our divinely given gifts in the service of the Gospel. God's love will undoubtedly bear the fruit. May He continue to bless and look after us in all our endeavours.

saying it was vindication for a campaign which saw people march in their thousands for full radiotherapy services at protests in Waterford City, Dublin and Dungarvan over the past three and a half years.

And it was greeted with relief within the local Fianna Fail party which suffered devastating losses in the last local elections over the failure to provide radiotherapy unit in WRH.

FANTASTIC NEWS

Chairman of the South East Cancer Campaign Committee, Dick Roche said the announcement was "absolutely fantastic news."

"We're all ecstatic here - all of us on the committee and the campaign - we were celebrating the announcement last night. It's been a long campaign going back three and a half years.

"They must ensure now that it

is delivered in the timescale that they are talking about - that it isn't put on the back-burner."

"We were told we were banging our head off a brick wall, or flogging a dead horse, well we refused to give up and this announcement is a victory for those people who joined in the protests for a radiotherapy unit."

SHOWS UP POLICY FAILURE

Sean Kelly, Regional Organiser of the ATGWU (which organised the march in Dungarvan) said the announcement showed up the failure of the policy adopted by the Government three and a half years ago.

"I think what we have seen is the result of people power.

Three years ago we were told that radiotherapy was not needed in the South East. We are told now that three different units, uses three different approaches are needed to meet capacity."

"It is of critical importance that what is involved is a full and public radiotherapy unit in Waterford Regional Hospital - not radiotherapy provided on a selective basis."

BEST INTERESTS

Jane Bailey of the Cancer Care Alliance said the announcement is "great news."

"This is what everyone campaigning for full cancer services in the South East wanted - multi-disciplinary cancer care at Waterford Regional Hospital.

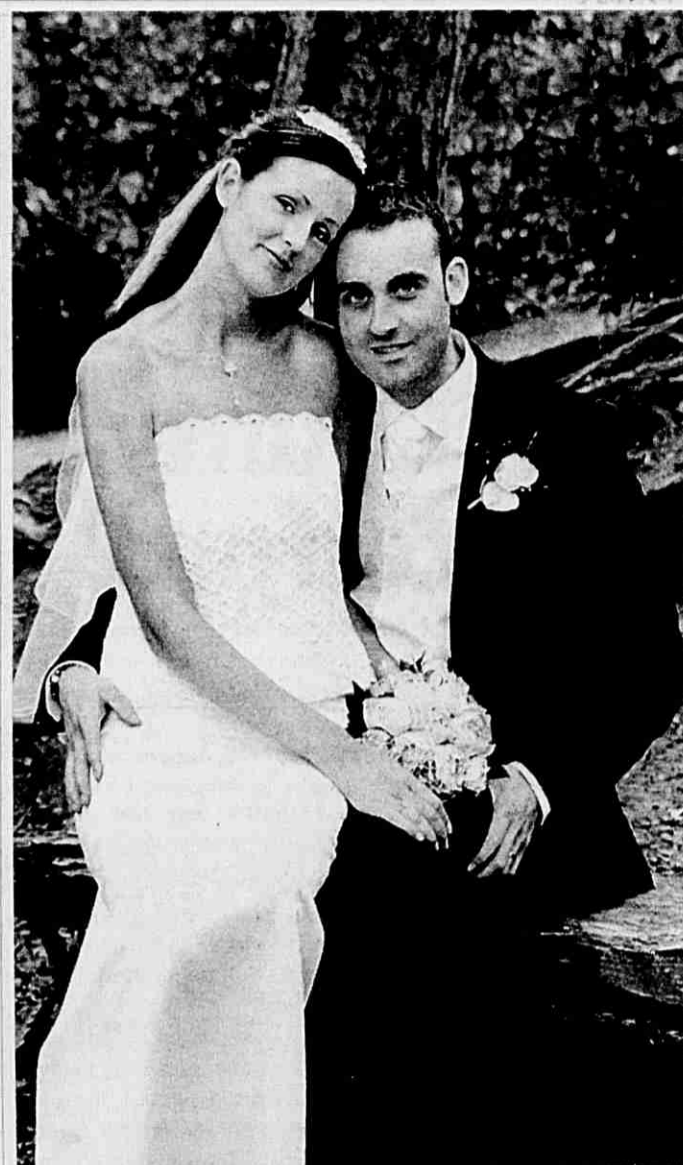
"That focus was never lost because multi-disciplinary cancer

care was what was in the best interests of the people of the South East."

Fianna Fail Senator Brendan Kenneally said the announcement was made due to the huge work and lobbying by people on the ground.

"Waterford Regional Hospital will become a satellite centre in the treatment of cancer, in the conjunction with Cork Regional Hospital. Under the plan two high tech linear accelerators will be installed in the hospital, making it the biggest such centre in the South-East region.

"Today's announcement is due to the huge work and intensive lobbying work carried out by a large number of people on the ground, and it is a credit to them that we have come so far with this significant boost."

Anti-Social Behaviour Problems Continue At Causeway

But, a committee member of the Causeway Tennis Club said discarded beer cans, plastic bags, broken glass and other debris are constantly being left strewn on the club's ground.

RUBBISH

On Monday morning last, groundskeepers removed three sack full loads of beer cans and broken glass which were discarded on the grounds - just as the club put final preparations in place to host a major tournament for junior players.

It's a problem which has plagued the club on an ongoing basis for the past number of months. Although caretakers clean up the area two or three times a week, and bin collections are picked up for free by the Town Council, rats have been attracted into the grounds by the rubbish, and workers have been forced to remove condoms and broken glass in the past.

It comes a week after serious concerns were expressed about problems with anti-social behaviour in Walton's Park. Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan said people are now afraid to go into the park after 5 o'clock due to the groups gathering to drink there.

UNBELIEVEABLE

"In the past we've had stones thrown at us while we are playing," a member of the tennis clubs committee said. "They bang on the doors of the clubhouse during meetings.

"But this," he said indicating the litter strewn across the grounds, "is as bad as I've seen it. It's unbelievable, the amount of rubbish we pick up



here every week.

"Friday night is a regular night for this," he added. "We might pick up two or three sack loads of rubbish on Monday, but its back again the following morning."

He said the groups "even stash some of the cans in the hedges, so they can say they weren't drinking if the Gardai come around."

MEETING

Cllr. O'Riordan said he will be raising the issue when Dungarvan Town Council meet with the new Garda Superintendent, John Harnett to discuss anti-social behaviour problems on Thursday.

"This is something that needs to be stamped out," he said.

"Both the Tennis Club and Walton's Park nearby are being effected by anti-social problems and public drinking. It's seems to be an ongoing problem and a solution needs to be found."

Sergeant Paul Heffernan of the Dungarvan Gardai said both areas are receiving particular attention in relation to breaches of bye-laws on consuming alcohol in public places and other public order offences.

"We're giving it as much attention as we can," Sgt. Heffernan said. "Obviously if it's an ongoing problem then we will have to look at concentrating more resources there. But already there have been a number of arrests there and down as far as Abbesside church."

HERITAGE WEEKLY Lismore Heritage Centre

The old Courthouse at Lismore, now the Lismore Heritage Centre has attracted attention lately because of the restoration work that was carried out there last year by contractors acting for Waterford County Council.

What people notice is that the lines of pointing between the building stones (visible at the base of the building in the picture) are now whitish rather than cement

grey. This is because the restoration team found that the repointing that had been done decades ago had been done using cement-based mortar. Cement mortars often do not let moisture out of old walls that were built, frequently without damp-proof courses, from brick and stone. Lime based mortars do.

Cement-based renders on buildings are more brittle than those based on lime. This means that

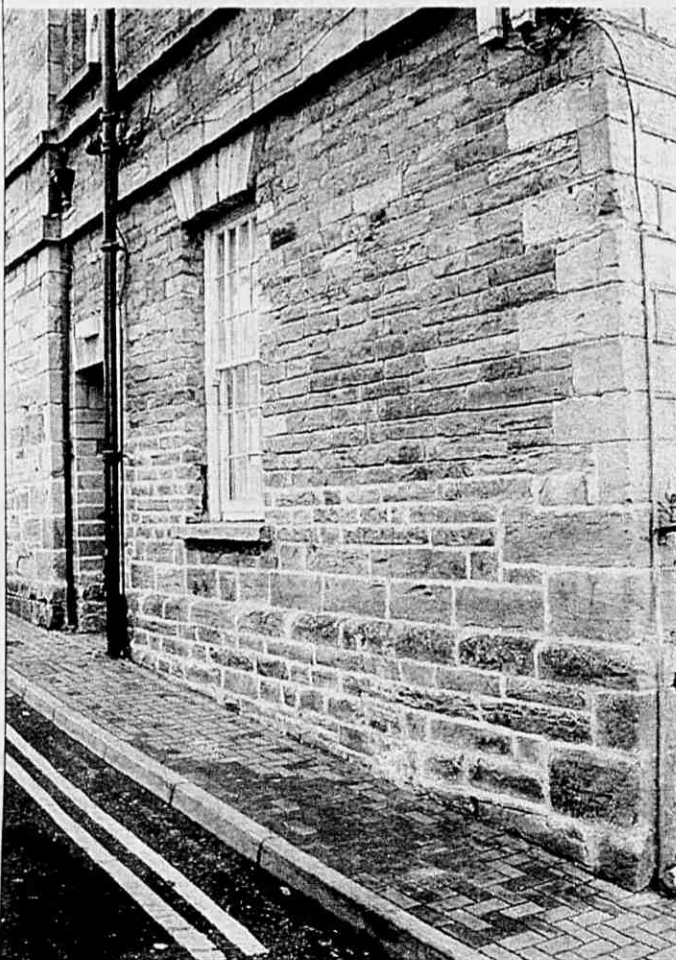
cracks often form in cement-based render; these let in rain that cannot then get out. In the worst cases the cement is stronger than the brick or stone and does not "give" when there is vibration. Cracks can then form right across whole areas of stone. This problem has sometimes been blamed for cracking of some harbour walls.

The use of lime mortar started centuries ago in Ireland and was only really completely replaced by cement mortars in the 20th century. Traditionally limestone was burned using wood or coal in the many limekilns that still to be seen in many places. The result was a dangerous material called quicklime which had to be slaked in a trough of water where it formed a putty that was mixed with coarse sand, clay gravel etc. in proportions dictated by the needs of the work and the experience of the builder.

Lime putties and powders are available in builders' providers centres but many people need training in its use so as to know what "hydraulic" limes are and where they should be used and where it is appropriate to use a "fat" lime. Selection of mixed particle size aggregates is also important as soft builder's sand is often not the right material.

Some people find that it takes a while to get used to the fresh white pointing on well-restored old buildings but this may well be the original appearance of the building and the benefits of dryness are also there. Lime also takes less energy to prepare in the factory than cement and this is something to remember in times when we should be using less fossil fuel.

Pedestrian Crossing Plans Go On Public Display

Plans for a pedestrian crossing at the Causeway junction in Abbeyside are to go on public display with work expected to be completed by October if all goes to plan.

If approved it would see six sets of pedestrian lights including between Remedies Health Store and Abbeyside Post Office on Sexton Street, from Eurospar to the traffic island enabling pedestrians to cross to either the opposite side of the Causeway or onto the Village Inn side. A sixth set of pedestrian lights will be located at the top of Strandside South.

New kerbing, footways, guardrails, signs and lines will also be put in place.

Fianna Fail councillor, Nuala Ryan, speaking at the July meeting of the Town Council, said the local supermarket is concerned about the loss of car parking.

She said the extension of the

double yellow lines would cut the number of parking spaces by five. The retailers are concerned that some cars are already parking all day in the car park behind the supermarket, and "a lot of customers" can't

get a space.

Under the plans, she said, "Five more spaces will be lost in front of Eurospar."

Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan replied that the car park belongs to the Town Council, and the only option to prevent day long car parking was pay and display parking - an option firmly rejected by the members.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp) welcomed the proposed pedestrian lights saying the junction was "an accident waiting to happen."

Cllr. Billy Kyne of Labour said the spaces wouldn't be lost, as car parking shouldn't have been allowed so near the junction in any case.

The plans are to go to Part 8 for submissions and will be back before the council at the September meeting. Work should be completed by October.

Undeveloped Site Should Be Left As Green Area

An area planned for a shop in Cruachan should be left as a green area, a Fine Gael councillor told the July meeting of Dungarvan Town Council.

Cllr. Fred Forsey, who previously expressed concerns about unfinished roads and shores at Cruachan, said plans for a shop had fallen through, and the residents hope the space will be left as a green area.

Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said the estate has been taken in charge by the council.

Cinema Not A Protected Building Insists Town Engineer

The Ormonde Cinema on O'Connell Street is not a protected structure under the Dungarvan Town Development Plan, according to Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan.

His comments came after

Labour councillor Billy Kyne and Independent councillor Michael O'Riordan both maintained that the cinema and the Technical School were protected under the plan.

A Clonmel retailer is seeking to demolish the cinema, and

build a furniture store, retail units and apartments in its place. But, Cllr. Kyne said he had understood that the cinema was listed as being of local interest due to its 'art-deco' style façade.

Cllr. O'Riordan said he "would swear on my life" that

the building was listed in the Town Development Plan.

Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said the building is not listed anywhere in the Development Plan.

Although he did acknowledge that it is listed in the Dungarvan Architectural Inventory as a protected structure, he said the Development Plan "is the one that counts."

Fianna Fail councillor, Nuala Ryan said one resident of Stephen's Street is concerned about the positioning of the proposed building. If the building was constructed closer to the road than the cinema is currently, it would block the light coming into the nearby residents home, she said.

Cllr. O'Riordan expressed concern that the development would bring extra traffic onto O'Connell Street.

The public has three weeks in which to make a submission.

Traffic Calming Planned For Clonea Road

The Clonea road, from the junction with Sarsfield Street and the turnoff with TJ Murphy Place, will be narrowed in an effort to slow traffic.

In plans which are on public display, the footpath will be built out at St. Monica's Terrace and at the junction with the Grove and at either side of the

Centra supermarket.

Raising the issue at the July meeting of the Town Council, Cllr. Billy Kyne said residents car spaces would be lost at numbers 1 and 2 St. Monica's Terrace.

"They should be made aware that if they make a submission their concerns will be listened to," he said.

Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said there is adequate parking spaces at 3,4,5 Monica's Terrace.

"The aim is to improve the junction and the road. Unfortunately spaces will be lost because for traffic calming to work we have to use hard features from the start of the road," he said.

GREEN FINGERS

Those which are safe and easy to use for a variety of common health problems include yarrow, marigold, chamomile, lemon balm and the mediterranean plants such as lavender, rosemary and thyme. Medicinal trees include elder, birch and hawthorn.

To learn more about growing and preparing your own herbal medicines, why not come along to the Blackwater Garden Centre on Saturday 30th July. I will be giving a talk on herbal medicine at 3pm followed by a tour of the herb section. There will

be lots of information on how to grow and use herbs at home for the treatment of a variety of common health problems. There will also be plenty of opportunities to ask questions about any aspect of health and natural medicine.

The talk is part of a whole weekend of activities organised by Blackwater Garden Centre in aid of the Hospice. In addition to the herbal medicine walk and talk there will be workshops and demonstrations on a variety of other topics including Indian head massage, reiki, aromatherapy, yoga, karate and meditation. There will also be a plant sale, activities for children, entertainment and a vegetarian barbecue. All in all it should be a very interesting and enjoyable way to spend the August bank holiday weekend.

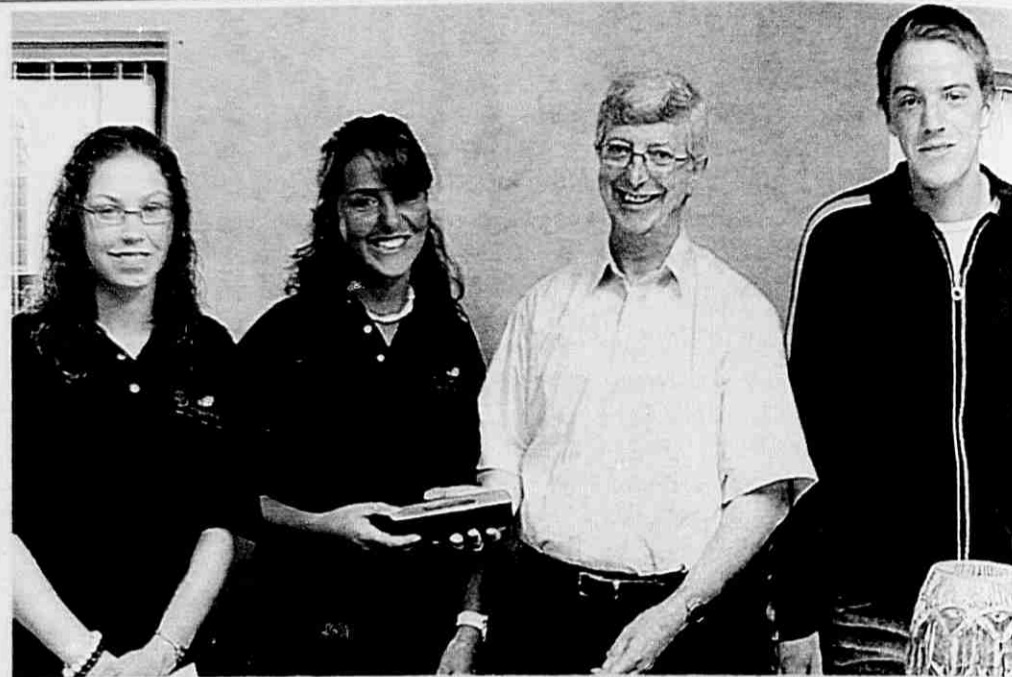

Funding Boost For Local Sports Clubs

€130,000 Grant For Tallow GAA Club

Tallow GAA club's ambitious development plans received a timely boost with the announcement of a 130,000 euro grant from the Department of Arts, Tourism and Sport last Thursday.

It was one of a number of local clubs included in a 1,425 million

euro funding package for sports in Waterford City and County. Clubs in Cappoquin, Dungarvan, Stradbally and Kilmacthomas all received funding.

Tallow GAA club has already completed the first phase of its development programme. The second phase will include the development of four new dress-

ing rooms, ball alleys and an all purpose room and medical room. The new building will replace the inadequate facilities for the 250 players who use the ground.

Other grants go to Ballyduff Lower GAA Club (40,000 euro); Cappoquin AFC (80,000); Dungarvan Boxing Club (6,000); Kilmacthomas AFC (40,000); Kilmacthomas Development Group (2,000); Sliabh gCua/St. Mary's GAA Club (40,000) Stradbally AFC (60,000); Stradbally GAA club (50,000).

DELIGHTED

Fianna Fail Deputy Ollie Wilkinson said he was delighted vital funding had been secured.

He said: "Waterford has a proud sports legacy. Our young people have driven that legacy with their commitment, talent and enthusiasm. It is crucial that we provide them

with the best facilities to sustain our tradition and provide social alternatives to pastimes that can destroy lives rather than enhance them.

"I have worked hard to secure funding for all 21 clubs included in this tranche. I would like to pay tribute to each club for their grant applications and hard work. I intend to ensure that any sports clubs or organisations that were unlucky to miss out on funding this time will be included the next time around," said Deputy Wilkinson.

IMMENSE BENEFITS

Minister Martin Cullen said the provision of over 1,425m

in funding across the City and County is great news.

"The benefits from such grants are immense for the City and County. So many people in so many communities will benefit," he said.

"The types of projects being funded under the allocations are varied. These include multi-purpose sports centres, GAA clubs, boxing clubs, soccer clubs and community schemes.

"Local clubs, run by volunteers are the backbone of all communities and the provision of the necessary facilities are important. It reflects the Government's commitment to the development of sport", he added.

PROFESSIONALISM

Minister Cullen said he was delighted for all those involved in clubs and groups in the City and County who give of their time to promote and develop sport in Waterford.

He said: "The professionalism and commitment of the applicants is a credit to all concerned. There are a series of requirements to be fulfilled by each organisation to enable the grant to be drawn down. These include planning permission, public tendering process and tax clearance. The allocation of this money would not have been possible without their efforts."

Minister Cullen concluded by re-emphasising his commitment to continuing to work with all clubs and groups to ensure that "Waterford continues to get the benefit of this invaluable funding."

Mansfield Calls For High Street To Be Re-named

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said he will propose that the new street, leading into Dungarvan Shopping Centre and which has "mysteriously" been named High Street, be re-named by Dungarvan Town Council.

Cllr. Mansfield said he will put forward the name "Creamery Way" or a name associated with the hero of the 1917 Dublin Lockouts, Jim Larkin at the next meeting of the council's Protocol Committee at the end of the month.

Cllr. Mansfield suggested at the July meeting of Dungarvan Town Council that the street should be named in a fashion that would be an everlasting memory of the Creamery which once stood on the site and the many workers who gave a life time service to the town.

Cllr. Mansfield suggested a name of Creamery Way. "I will be bringing this suggestion and another one before the Protocol Meeting," he said. "The other suggestion I have is that the street be named after James Larkin, who was a legendary Union Leader and a tireless worker for the working people...and I think it would be fitting legacy to the work of Big Jim Larkin if we named the street in his honour.

"Either way I think anything is better than High Street," the Sinn Fein councillor said.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair called for the position on naming streets to be clarified and for a letter expressing the local authority's concern to be sent to the developer.

Something "Radically Wrong" With Sexton Street Sewers

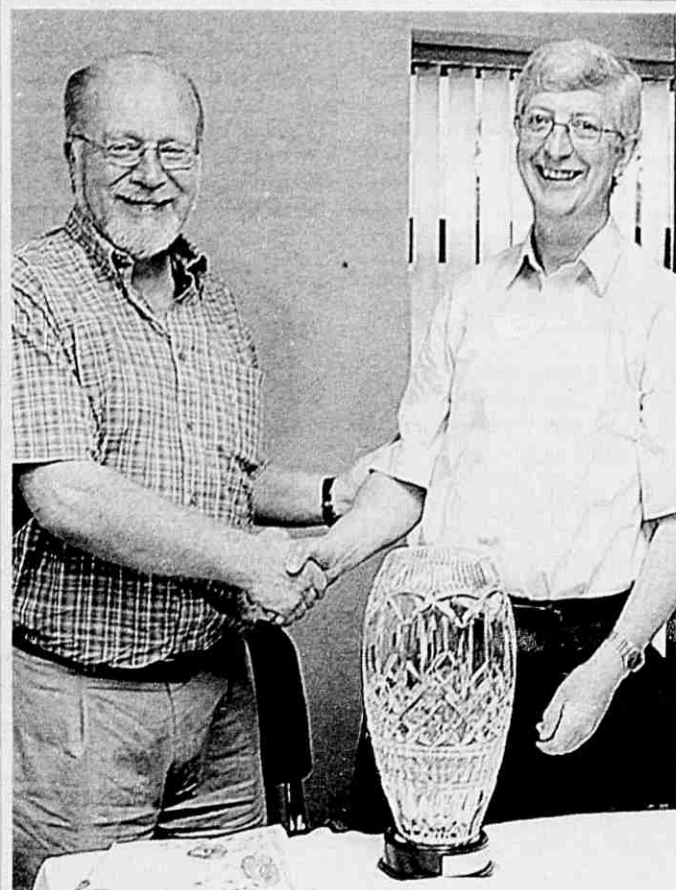

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty agreed that the council would look into the problem.

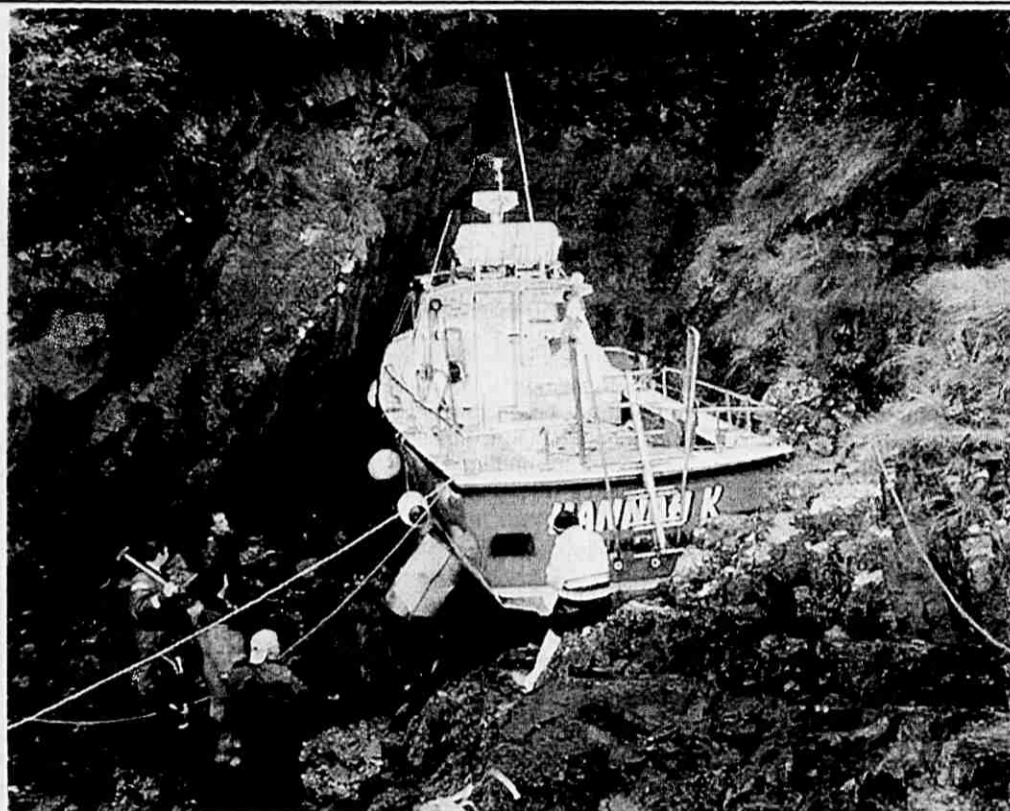

At 8pm on the full tide she was successfully refloated with the help of numerous ropes and 2 Ribs and taken to the pier despite her having only reverse gear and no steering. The ribs were used to ram her in order to steer her into the pier where she was eventually tied. This was an excellent result of team work for all those involved.

THE FUREYS & DAVEY ARTHUR TOUR

The Fureys celebrated their 25th anniversary in 2003 with a series of concerts throughout Europe, the UK, Australia, New Zealand, the USA and Canada. They were reunited on these concerts with their lifetime friend and former member Davey Arthur.

Due to the huge success of their anniversary tour, Davey has stayed on with the Fureys on a permanent basis and will be with the lads on this tour.

The oldest of the brothers, Eddie left home in 1966 and travelled to Scotland at the time of the great folk revival where he met and shared accommodation in Edinburgh with then unknown folk singers Billy Connolly, Gerry Rafferty and Alex Campbell, now all famous in their own right. In 1969 with his brother Finbar, he supported the Clancys and Tommy Makem throughout the USA and Canada. In 1971 he moved to mainland Europe where he toured for seven years with Finbar, building up a huge following particularly in Germany.

At this time George, Paul and Davey were also playing around Europe with their own band called the Buskers and in 1978 while playing in Denmark they heard that their two brothers had been involved in a road accident and immediately travelled to Germany to be with them. They then decided that they should all be playing together and this was the start of the Fureys and Davey Arthur.

The band became an instant success and had a string of hits including When you were Sweet Sixteen, The Green Fields of France, Red Rose Café, The Old Man, Steal Away, Her Father did'nt like me anyway, Clare to Here and Leaving Nancy.

They are responsible for some of the most stirring music ever to capture the public imagination. Their folk based

music has received standing ovations in some of the biggest concert halls of the world and they credit their musical ability to their parents, Ted and Nora, who were well known musicians themselves. They encouraged their sons to play music from a very early age and there was live traditional music in their house almost nightly. DAIRYING:

Grass Cover Targets

- This very much depends on stocking rate (SR), as defined by cows per hectare, and rotation length.
- The average farm cover per cow (livestock unit) in August is 420 Kgs DM, varying from 400 to 450.
- You multiply this figure by S.R. (cows per hectare) to get your average farm cover.
- For example, a farmer stocked at only 2 cows per hectare needs a cover of 840 Kgs DM per hectare over the whole farm, whereas, a farmer stocked at 3 cows per hectare needs 1,260 Kgs DM per hectare (difficult to achieve).
- Growth rates, with reasonable nitrogen, will average 60-35 Kgs DM per day going from the beginning of August to the end of August.
- This tells you that your rotation length must increase drastically during August.
- If growth rate is only 35 Kgs DM per day and rotation length is 30 days, then you will only have 1,050 Kgs DM per hectare cover on the next paddock which will only sustain low stocking rates (2 cows per hectare or less).
- To get the 'ideal' grass cover on the next paddock, calculate as follows:-
- Establish your stocking rate (cows per hectare).
- Work out daily demand by multiplying S.R. by 20 (each livestock unit eats this per day).
- Multiply daily demand by your rotation length to give you cover per hectare on next paddock.
- Example: A farmer's S.R. is 2.3 livestock units per hectare.
- Therefore, his daily demand is 46 Kgs DM per hectare (2.3 x 20).
- Ask yourself how this compares with daily growth rates. If it is higher then grass cover will decrease over the whole farm.
- If the recommended rotation length in August is 30 days, then the ideal cover on the next paddock is 1,380 Kgs DM per hectare.

Grass Build-up

- It starts now.
- As you see from above growth rates daily, demand may outstrip growth rates on many farms from mid August on.
- So it may seem impossible to build up grass.
- The solution is:
- To reduce stocking rates by selling or moving stock.
- Feed supplements, meals or silage, to reduce daily grass demand.
- Close up ground for a '3rd cut/graze'.
- Do this by grazing stock on 0.85 acres per livestock unit (2.90 L.U. per hectare), staying on a minimum of 25 day rotation. This will result in average farm covers and cover on next paddock being 725 and 1,375 Kgs DM per hectare respectively.
- This means that if you are stocked at 1.1 acres per L.U. over the whole farm, you have 0.25 acres per L.U. left for a '3rd cut-graze'.
- This 3rd Cut-Graze should get the following management:
- It should be a clean cut silage field or a severely topped grazing field.
- Apply 60 units per acre of nitrogen at closing with 2,000 gallons of slurry.
- Leave for 42 days before grazing.
- If you are running short of grass on the grazing area, then you can come in and graze some of this before 42 days, so you lose nothing by this plan.
- In fact you grow more grass - enough to feed 10-12 cows for one day for each acre devoted to this - because you have used 30 units per acre more Nitrogen.

BEEF

Labour Issues

Teagasc Grange Beef Research Centre carried out an important study on labour efficiency on cattle farms. Over 100 farms participated in the study. Participating farms recorded in detail the time spent on various farming activities. All producers need to be conscious of labour requirement for their own farm. The Grange study indicates enormous variation in the time spent on individual farms. Labour input is compared on the hours worked per livestock unit on the farm. This standardises the findings across farms and removes farm size as a factor. Some farms require as little as 20 working hours per livestock unit per year. On other farms the labour input is five times higher at 100 hours. Obviously the system of production is important. But there is scope to reduce labour input on many farms.

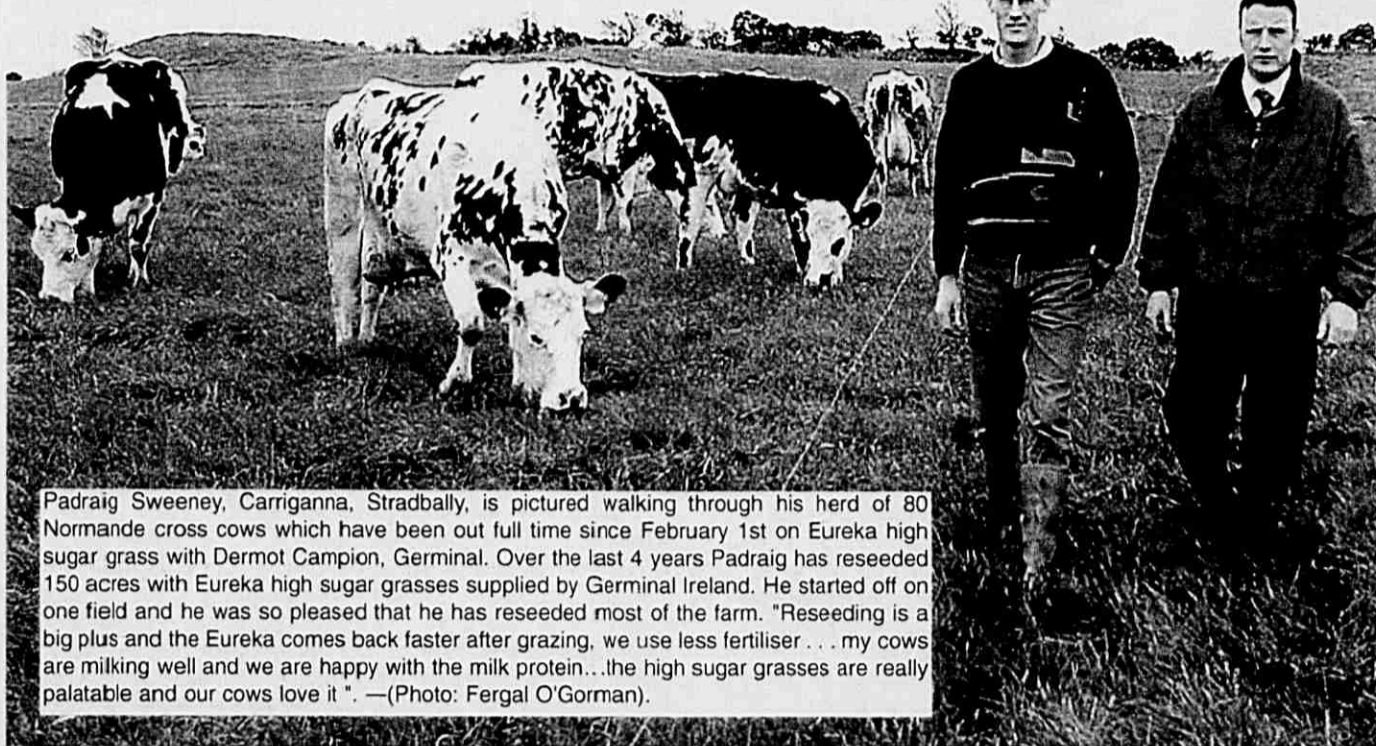
Key Areas

In business labour efficiency and organisation is usually tackled under three broad headings

- Knowledge and skills
 - Elimination or streamlining of inefficient work-practices.
 - Provision of labour efficient resources (structures and equipment)
- Knowledge and skills are always important whatever the subject. We are becoming more aware of the importance of efficient farm labour organisation. But we have much further to go. Teagasc labour organisation studies will hopefully provide greater insights. Every farmer should look at work practices on the farm. You will be surprised at how certain practices can eat up time. Unfortunately a lot of the problem may be totally related to how you set out to do the job. Any of us are prone to clutter and a lack of organisation. You should ask yourself if the way you carry out each task is efficient. If it is inefficient there are three important follow on questions.
- Why is the task being carried out inefficiently?
 - What can you do to improve the situation? This is a fundamental question. Sometimes you should ask if you should be carrying out the task at all.
 - How important is the task to overall farm profit? Get the knife out for any job that eats time but gives a poor profit return.

IFA Press for Removal of Exclusion Limits for Farm Investment Schemes

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Rosemary Kennedy has said that she was optimistic that the exclusion limits that currently apply to Farm Investment Aid Schemes will be significantly altered so that more farmers will be eligible for a substantially revised farm grant scheme.

Speaking following a meeting of IFA with senior Department of Agriculture officials recently, Mrs. Kennedy said a new improved Farm Investment Scheme will be implemented to coincide with the implementation of the Nitrates Directive.

The new revised scheme will be called the Farm Nutrient Management Scheme.

She said that "it was important that all farmers under the Nitrates Action Programme were eligible for this scheme as the requirement for investment aid will apply to all categories of farmers".

Currently, a lower income unit limit of 20 and an upper limit of 450 applies to qualify for grant aid. IFA now believes that adjustments will be made to the limits in the new scheme following the discussions with the Department.

Continuing, Mrs. Kennedy said that IFA called for an early submission to the EU Commission as there must be no delay in getting the scheme agreed. Farmers need a maximum level of grant aid which IFA has sought of up to 90% in counties with 22 weeks storage and 75% in the remainder of the country. An adequate phasing in period for compliance with the meas-

ures included in the Nitrates Action Programme is also critical.

Mrs. Kennedy said that IFA has raised the issues of the inclusion of pig and poultry enterprises for grant aid, annual updating of standard costings, increasing the number of eligible items for grant and an increase in the investment limits to 150,000.

SEARCH IS ON FOR PLOUGHING ACCOMMODATION

The annual scramble in now coming into full spate for accommodation for the National Ploughing Championships, which take place at Mogeely, Middleton, Co. Cork from September 27-29. The organisers have mapped out an area within a radius of about 25 miles from the site and embracing such towns as Youghal, Middleton, Fermoy, Coby and stretching as far as Cork City and Dungarvan.

That provides for a very wide selection of hotels, registered guesthouses, farm guesthouses and other types of accommodation being co-ordinated by Cork Kerry Tourism.

There is still a strong demand for more family homes that are equipped to take guests for a short-term stay as demand for accommodation will come from right across the country as well as many international visitors according to NPA Managing Director Anna May McHugh. She also says that "Traditionally the local community are very hospitable, opening their homes to guests for "Ploughing Week" and we look forward to that kind of welcome again this year in East Cork".

Our Unregistered Accommodation Officer Mary Murphy would like to hear from people who can offer a room or ideally a couple of rooms. Basic requirements include rooms being clean and warm, offer plenty of hot water, comfortable beds (no overcrowding) and provide a good breakfast. If hosts are interested in providing an evening meal that is also a bonus.

There will also be a demand for houses or apartments to let for a week or more to groups who are working at the Championships and need accommodation for a week or more.

IFA WELCOME €17.5 MILLION BEEF PREMIUM PACKAGE

IFA President John Dillon has welcomed the announcement from the Minister for Agriculture & Food Mary Coughlan to allocate additional funding of 17.5m towards the severe cuts in the 2004 special beef premium payments.

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman John Bryan said both EU Commissioner Fischer Boel and Minister Coughlan had recognised the severe financial hardship which the beef premium quota overrun had caused and their response to the IFA case would help alleviate the financial losses for 25,000 livestock farmers.

John Bryan said the 17.5m

package was exclusive to Ireland and for that reason the EU Commission did not include bulls or 1st stage special beef premium.

The IFA livestock leader said the 17.5m additional payments include 8.9m of national funding. He said these payments would reduce the 23% beef premium cut at the 21-month stage by almost half.

John Bryan said IFA had undertaken a major campaign on the beef premium overshoot including a major rally by over 1,300 livestock farmers in Portlaoise in early June and a visit to Ireland by Commissioner Fischer Boel on June 23rd.

RECENT DEATHS

Late J.D. Hally



Thursday, July 7th brought the sad news of the passing of J.D. Hally, The Burgery, Abbeyside, at Waterford Regional Hospital. Jim who hadn't enjoyed the best of health for some time was very well known and respected and held in high esteem by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was a man who would have met thousands and thousands of people through his work and interests and would have left an indelible impression on everyone.

Life began for Jim in Clonmel on the 6th June 1918. On completion of his Leaving Certificate he entered the Engineering Faculty as a student at U.C.D. He graduated with his B.E. B.S.C. and took up his first posting in Donegal. It was at this time he met Mary Peter who was to become his wife and best friend. Sligo was also to benefit at this time from Jim's expertise. 1959 saw Jim apply for the position of County Engineer here in Waterford.

Successful, he was to the forefront in many if not all of the engineering projects in this County until his retirement in 1983.

Much admired by staff, he was a man of first rate ability, exemplary character, his work was his true vocation in life. His meticulous attention to detail, his organisational skills with his outstanding leadership qualities saw Jim give of his best at all times.

J.D. Hally was for many years one of the cornerstones in the scouting movement in Ireland. He masterminded the first big Jamboree for International Scouts in Lismore in 1967. Ten years later at nearby Mount Melleray Jim was the driving force behind Jamborora '77. No task was too big, how the scout movement was so fortunate to have a person of his calibre in its leadership. He negotiated with the Lord Abbot of Mount Melleray for the leasing of buildings and lands which is now being used as a Scout Activity Centre. In more recent times he established a Scout Museum in the Centre which he always enthusiastically encouraged people to visit. Having done so myself, how the memories came rolling back of happy days with fellow scouts as we attended Annual Camp which in that era was a huge operation. J.D. was Chief Scout for some years, a position he greatly enhanced. One of the proudest moments of his long and distinguished life was at the Papal Mass in Dublin's Phoenix Park. He received Holy Communion from Pope John Paul II, our late and much loved Pontiff. For many years

he was also Chairman of the Board of Management of St. John's School in Dungarvan where he also took an interest in the pupils and their personal educational development. He also served as a member of the Board of Management of Abbeyside National school over the years.

Jim travelled to Lourdes with the Diocesan pilgrimage being the local organiser. For forty years he had attended as a helper at the Marian Shrine. He was also called upon by the Church in advising on the churches around the Diocese. Highly intelligent he was an avid reader of diverse forms of literature from The History of the Wars to Agatha Christie. He always had wonderful time for his family, supporting and encouraging them whenever needs be. He will be missed and indeed his passing has taken from our midst a man we admired from our childhood to adolescence. He lived his deep religious faith with sincerity and honesty.

As the Scout motto relates 'Bí Ullamh' or 'Be Prepared'. Jim was prepared on that Thursday just weeks ago when the Lord called Going Home.

Reposing at his residence on the Burgery, V. Rev. Fr. R. Doherty P.P. recited prayers and rosary before the funeral cortege left for St. Augustine's Church, Abbeyside. Flanked by a guard of honour of Scouting leaders many of whom had travelled long distances, Jim's coffin was draped with the flag of the Scout movement. We passed in prayerful silence at the Den, the home of the 4th Waterford. Funeral Mass was celebrated on arrival by Fr. Doherty P.P. assisted by Dr. Michael Russell, Fr. Conor Kelly C.C. V. Rev. Fr. Michael Farrell P.P., Canon Nicholas O'Mahoney P.P. His Lordship Dr. William Lee presided. A huge concourse was present to bade farewell and to thank God for the life of Jim, a life that mirrored everything the Gospel preaches and encouraged. The lessons were read by Mary Hally, daughter-in-law, and son Jimmy. His beloved grandchildren Simon, Laura, Rachel and Kevin shared the Prayers of the Faithful. A prayer was recited by Sean while the Offertory gifts were brought by Peter, Ted, Catherine and Aoife. A eulogy was shared by son Brendan while music was provided by the Lourdes Diocesan Choir. The Scouting movement provided an impressive Guard of Honour at the graveside.

Following prayers and final blessing by Fr. Doherty P.P. at St. Laurence's Cemetery, Ballinroad, Jim Hally or J.D. as he was known to so many, was laid to rest as the Salve Regime filled the air in tribute.

The curtain of life was drawn as Jim was gone home. Our heartfelt sympathies to sons Brendan and Jimmy, daughter Marianne, sister Mary Murphy, Clonmel, son-in-law Robbie, daughters-in-law Mary and Mary, grandchildren Simon, Peter, Mary Claire, Laura, Aoife, Rachel, Kevin and Sean, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, nephews, nieces and many friends.

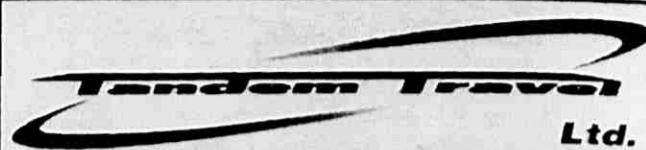

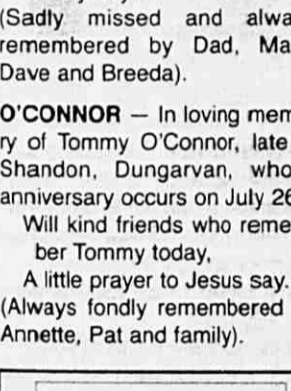

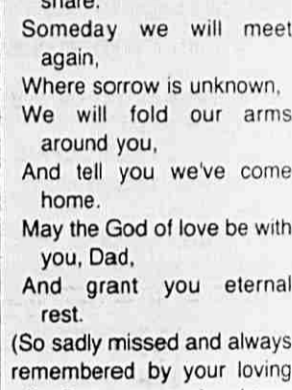

Whither now for Waterford

Justin McCarthy was ambiguous about his future plans when he was interviewed after the game yesterday. Whoever is in charge next year a decision should be made sooner rather than later. The club championship will resume within a couple of weeks and will be galloped through with indecent haste. Whatever the management team they need to get out there and start looking at club hurling - intermediate, senior and especially under 21 hurling. They haven't done it, or not enough and the farcical way we gallop through our club championship after months of delay doesn't help.

For some reason that old nursery rhyme about "Old Mother Hubbard" came to mind Sunday. You know the one. "Old mother Hubbard went to the cupboard etc" "When she got there the cupboard was bare...." You see aul mother Hubbard didn't do her shopping, that's why there was nothing in the cupboard.

When it came to the crunch and we lost a few through injury, suspension etc. our attack options on the bench were limited. Limited because the bench was never cultivated. Management have concentrated solely on the first fifteen or sixteen. Flynn, Browne and these guys have carried us long enough. They can't be expected to go on forever. We haven't seriously cultivated any youth policy, although Peter Queally has made a start with the minors.. What is the point in reintroducing players past their sell by date. Those young players who were brought on to the panel were kept under wraps. I watched Waterford games this year which were either of little consequence or we had sown up. Common sense would suggest you rest the seasoned players who are tried and tested and blood the youngsters..

It may not be time for recriminations but there are questions to be answered, answers the thousands of despondent loyal supporters packed into the trains leaving Connolly station on Sunday are entitled to. I don't go along with the line that "we didn't do too bad. We won two Munster titles.." I'm not a fan of any man who turns his back on his country but Roy Keane would call it settling for second best. Since '97/'98 we had enough quality players in the county to win an All-Ireland and any amount of Justin's platitudes wont change that. This team has underachieved!!

Team selection and positioning has at times been bizarre. Its hard to gauge also what input the selectors have into decisions. Team selection is a subjective matter but there have been glaring blunders like firing untried and untested youngsters into the heat of championship battle like Paul O'Brien in a Munster final a few years ago, Ian O'Regan and Shane O'Sullivan in last years All Ireland semi final, these young lads and more should be introduced but at the right time, in one of the many challenge, tournament, league or qualifier games. Clinton Hennesy was landed in it too and I was delighted for the Ardmore man that he played so well.

This isn't a hatchet job on the management in the wake of a defeat. I'm only repeating the views held by many Waterford supporters ever before Sunday. As a new chairman Pat Flynn is ideally placed to introduce reforms to the outdated system we operate. We have to look at how our club championship is run. We need to look also at the whole structure of the county minor, u21, Intermediate and Senior squads and get new people familiar with under age hurling with fresh ideas about team preparation involved. All these squads appear to operate in isolation. Does Justin McCarthy meet with minor, U-21 and Intermediate selectors before drawing up his panel to seek their input? Would he listen? The intermediate set up as it's constituted is serving no purpose. As they say it's time for some joined up thinking on all of it.

Been to the Top - Don't wanna go back

There was something eerily quiet about the county as we drove eastward in the belting rain early on Sunday morning to link up with the match train in the city. The Deise did not have the appearance of a county girding its loins for battle. It was in stark contrast to the normal buzz and bustle you would

experience prior to a championship game in Thurles. Despite the decree from Headquarters summoning us to the capital many Deise supporters decided against making the arduous and expensive trek to Croke Park and who could blame them.

The GAA are in danger of overplaying the Croke Park card. Cork and Waterford on their own would have drawn as many to Thurles as there was in Croke Park for the double header. The atmosphere too would have been better and supporters would not be so much out of pocket.. Returning there for the Ulster final replay was also a mistake. Peoples budgets are finite as is their tolerance and loyalty.

I think the new qualifier system has been, on balance, a success. It was designed to give counties more games and this has happened but as a natural consequence it has increased the financial burden on supporters, particularly families and further marginalised club hurling. The choice of venues for the qualifiers was not properly thought out. Home advantage should not apply. The criteria for venue selection should be ground capacity as well as geographical location - equidistant, within reason, from the competing counties.

From where I sat in row Y in the upper Hogan I could scarcely read the numbers on the miniature players a couple of miles below me on the green sward.. An artic wind whipped in over the top of Hill 16 perishing all of us in its path as we clung to the rafters. No comfort could be drawn from pitch level either.. Cork supporters to my right and left had switched to full crowing mode. The fat lady was singing. I joined the scramble to get off the Hogan, rushed to Connolly to join another scramble for the first train to Waterford.

ANCIENT GREECE



Birth Of The Olympics

The Greeks were great athletes and there were over 200 different sports festivals in Greece and the lands around the Mediterranean Sea. Most famous of these was the Olympic Games, named after Mount Olympus, the home of the Greek gods. They first took place in 776 BC. At first, running was the only sport, but later other sports and even music, poetry and drama competitions were added. The games were held every four years until AD393, when they were abolished by the emperor of Rome.

The Greeks AT War

The ancient Greeks were often at war. In 490 and 497 BC they defeated Persian invaders. From 431 BC to 362 BC the Greek states were constantly at war with one another. These civil wars weakened the country and gave Philip II of Macedon (an area north of Greece) the chance to conquer it in 338 BC. Greece remained under Macedonian rule until it became part of the Roman Empire in the 2nd century BC.

Lismore Notes

LISMORE TIDY TOWNS

Judgement day finally arrived for the citizens of Lismore, Ireland's town entry in this year's Entente Florale. For the past several months a major community effort has gone into transforming this already picturesque town by the Blackwater into a flower filled haven of colour.

Last Friday, judges from eight of the other eleven participating countries visited the town to decide if Lismore should receive the coveted Entente Florale gold medal. On arrival at the Civic Offices they were shown a recently made audio-visual presentation that highlighted the efforts made by the local authority, businesses, and the general community.

We then brought our visitors to the Towers by bus where they enjoyed the scenic walk. A guided tour of the Castle Gardens was next on the agenda before returning to the Civic Offices for lunch. This was an opportunity for all the Council

men and Tidy Town's volunteers, who have done so much recently, to meet the foreign judges.

At this point the Irish judge indicated his concern that some of his colleagues were showing signs of fatigue. A hectic week of early morning flights combined with the stress of the judging was taking its toll. On his advice, we hastily rearranged the plans for the afternoon which meant running very much ahead of schedule.

If the judges were feeling weary, then Park's Road proved to be the tonic required. They were stunned by the quality of the front gardens and the green areas. Garden after garden was admired and photographed as Billy O' Keffe led the way. In high spirits we eventually brought the party to Bunscoil Bothar na Naomh for a short visit.

The South Mall, North Mall and the Cathedral were next to be shown. However at this

point the judge from the Netherlands became ill and could no longer continue. Concerned for the welfare of the remaining guests we moved quickly along the Main Street and into the Millennium Park. As well as the usual attractions we had a performance of the Brush Dance which the judges found both entertaining and appropriate. Rose O' Dowd announced that Cahill's had won the shop front competition before departing for New Street, Lower and Upper. A visit to the Heritage Centre was followed by a choral performance in the Chapel.

Back in the Civic Offices the judges deliberated in private for over 45 minutes before meeting with a local delegation. The feedback was very positive but it must be remembered that they don't give the gold away lightly.

The day finished with dinner in Ballyrafter. This was attended by the Mayor of County Wa-

terford, Mayor of Lismore, Entente Florale judges, County Engineer, County Councillors, Town Councillors, Council Officials and the nine members of the Lismore Tidy Town's Committee. We finally waved goodbye to our visitors at half past ten as they set off for Cork to catch early morning flights on Saturday.

Whatever the outcome of last week's assessment the town is already a winner as Lismore has never before looked so well. Last Friday the place was awash with hanging baskets, window boxes, shrubs, flowers and newly painted premises. The members of the Dramatic Society also brought their own colour to the event as they dressed in the traditional costumes of all the countries taking part in Entente Florale 2005.

The results of the Competition will be announced in Hungary on September 9th.

165,388 EURO ALLOCATED IN LOCAL EMPLOYMENT SCHEME

A sum of 165,388 euro has been provided in the county council's road works programme for this year's Local Improvement Scheme.

The council received sixty-two applications; seventeen of which were approved for funding, senior council engineer, Vincent O'Connor said.

The majority of the roads were in the West Waterford area, where additional CLAR funding can be drawn down.

In the Dungarvan area, three roads were approved for funding - Mweeling, Kilnafrehan East and Toor North. In the Lismore area, Dromana, Moanfune, Curraghanav and Mocollop were approved. An application in Grenan in Kilmacthomas areas was also approved. Additional CLAR funding will be granted towards roadworks in Curradarra in Dungarvan and Corraskeha and Salterbridge in the Lismore area.

Ten percent of the funding will come from local contributions, Mr. O'Connor said.

Meanwhile, a sum of 110,000 euro has been provided for the Community Involvement Schemes.

Graigue in Aghlish will see funding of just over 25,500 euros for the upgrade of the road.

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan, however, blasted some of the spending on road projects on rarely used roads.

He highlighted an instance where the council surfaced one road recently, although "there was nothing on it but sheep."

While saying the road was under the control of the council and not in the LIS or CIS schemes, Cllr. Geoghegan said money was being spent on rarely used roads "at a time when we don't have the money to give out."

20,000 EURO FOR LISMORE FOOTPATHS

Lismore is to receive 20,000 euro for the provision and improvement of footpaths under a new grant scheme, which was announced by Environment Minister, Dick Roche on Thursday last.

The grants go to Town Council areas which were formerly Town Commissioner areas, Minister Roche said at a meeting with Association of Municipal Authority representatives.

He said: "I am introducing this scheme in view of my concerns about the condition of footpaths in a number of smaller towns and the fact that poor maintenance or indeed the absence of footpaths, impacts on residents and visitors, on the urban fabric, and on local authorities themselves in terms of the costs of accidents."

COOKERY CORNER

Tasty vegetarian paella

SOMETIMES it is very difficult to know what to prepare for a vegetarian if they are invited to a summer barbecue. Many will blanch at the thought of a veggie burger cooked on the same grill as various cuts of meat, so this is a perfect dish to try. It will also appeal to meat eaters as an accompaniment to any cooked meat.

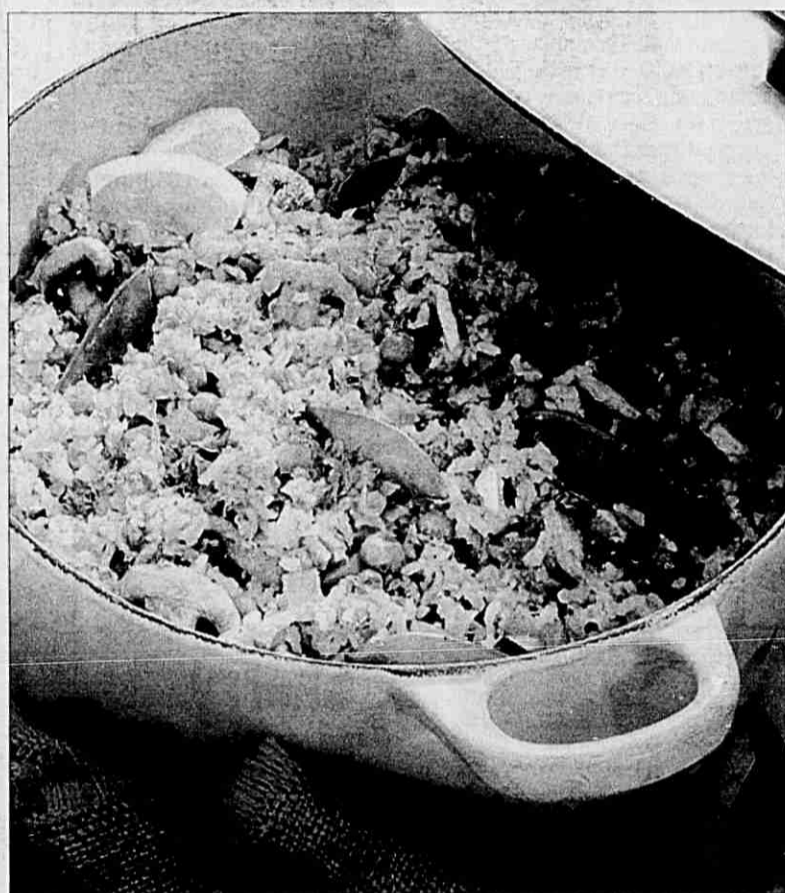
Ingredients:

- (serves 4-6)
- 4 tbs olive oil
- 1 large onion chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1/2 tsp paprika
- 350g long grain brown rice
- 1150ml vegetable stock
- 175ml dry white wine
- 1 x 400g tin chopped tomatoes
- 1 tbs tomato puree
- 1/2 tsp tarragon
- 1 tsp basil
- 1 tsp oregano
- 1 red pepper, roughly chopped

- 1 green pepper, roughly chopped
- 3 sticks celery, finely chopped
- 225g mushrooms, washed and sliced
- 50g mange tout, topped and tailed and cut in halves
- 100g frozen peas
- 50g cashew nut pieces
- salt and pepper
- Parsley and lemon wedged to garnish

Method:

HEAT the oil and fry the onion and garlic until soft. Add the paprika and rice and continue to cook for 4-5 minutes until the rice is transparent. Stir occasionally. Add the stock, wine, tomatoes, tomato puree and herbs and simmer for 10-15 minutes. Add the pepper, celery, mushrooms and mange tout and continue to cook for another 30 minutes until



the rice is cooked. Add the peas, cashew nuts and season to taste. Heat through and place in a large heated serving dish. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and garnish with lemon wedges and olives.

Tuna salad with a summer twist

IF you are looking for an unusual summer starter, try this unusual twist on tuna salad.

Ingredients:

- (serves 4)
- 4 button onions
- 1 small can tuna
- juice of 1 lemon
- 1 red pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1 green pepper, seeded and chopped
- 2 oranges
- 1 tbs orange liqueur
- 6 tbs mayonnaise
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1 tsp salt
- pinch of paprika
- pepper
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 4 lemons

Method:

Peel and chop the onions. Drain and flake the tuna and sprinkle with the lemon juice. Mix with the peppers and onion. Peel the oranges, remov-



ing a thick layer of skin, and chop the flesh. Mix together with the orange liqueur. Mix the mayonnaise, seasoning and Worcestershire sauce. Half the lemons and scoop out the centre. Mix the pepper and orange mixtures and spoon into the scooped out lemons. Top with a spoonful of mayonnaise mixture and serve with the remainder separately. Garnish with onion rings.

STRAWBERRY JELLIES

JELLY does not have to be confined to a children's birthday party - it can help make a perfect summer dessert that can be enjoyed by all the family.

Ingredients

- (serves 4)
- 225g strawberries
- 1 packet strawberry jelly
- 1 packet blackcurrant jelly
- 150ml double cream
- 1 tbs castor sugar
- 1 tbs finely chopped pistachio nuts

Method:

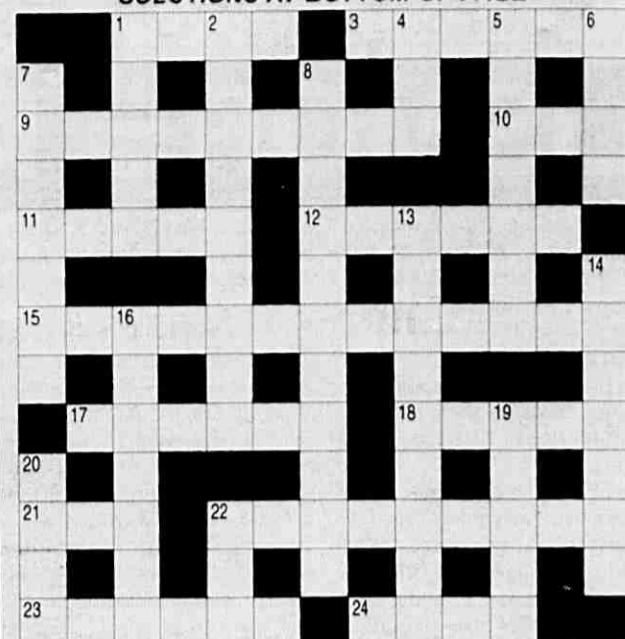
WASH the strawberries carefully and hull. Pat dry with absorbent kitchen paper and cut in half. Prepare the jellies separately, according to the directions on the packets. Cool slightly, then pour a quarter of the strawberry jelly into each of four individual glass dishes. Chill in the refrigerator until set, then top with the strawberries.



Fill the dishes with the still-liquid blackcurrant jelly and chill until set. Whip the cream with the castor sugar until stiff. Pipe on to the jellies and sprinkle with the chopped pistachio nuts. You can use other fruit with this recipe - cherries, raspberries, peaches, pears - with complementing jelly flavours.

Dungarvan Leader - GARDEN FEATURE

Geraniums are easy to grow

The ever popular geranium is one of the most versatile flowers grown by gardeners. It can be used as a border plant, a pot plant or be grown in hanging baskets.

The commonest and most popular geranium is in fact the scarlet pelargonium, but other geraniums come in all colours and sizes.

But the fact remains that when people speak about geraniums, what they are really talking about is the pelargonium.

Pelargoniums are tender plants of South African origin. When introduced over here they were given the common name geranium because of their botanical similarity to the hardy herbaceous species of the genus Geranium, which was commonly cultivated in Europe at that time. This common name still remains in widespread use today although almost all plants usually referred to as geraniums belong to the genus Pelargonium.

Pelargoniums are divided into five groups - zonal, dwarf and miniature zonal, regal, ivy-leaved and scented-leaved. They grow well in the open garden and are ideal for summer bedding as they flower continuously from early summer to late autumn. They also thrive in window boxes, hanging bas-

kets and containers.

The zonal variety happily adapt to the growing conditions in a greenhouse or conservatory.

The commonest and most popular "geranium" is the scarlet Dolly Varden pelargonium which is of the zonal variety. Dwarf and miniature zonals are tall bushy and free flowering.

Miniature zonal pelargoniums have smaller leaves and flowers than the dwarf zonals.

Regal pelargoniums are small shrubby plants with rounded, deeply scented leaves and wide trumpet-shaped flowers which come in several exotic colours.

Ivy-leaved pelargoniums have rounded, lobed, ivy-like leaves and flowers similar to those of zonals. They are also available in a rich assortment of colours. These are the variety most popular in hanging baskets because their flowers on long trailing stems can be displayed to their best advantage.

Scented-leaved pelargoniums have small delicate flowers with five petals. They also have fragrant foliage for which they are mainly grown. They make excellent house and greenhouse plants.

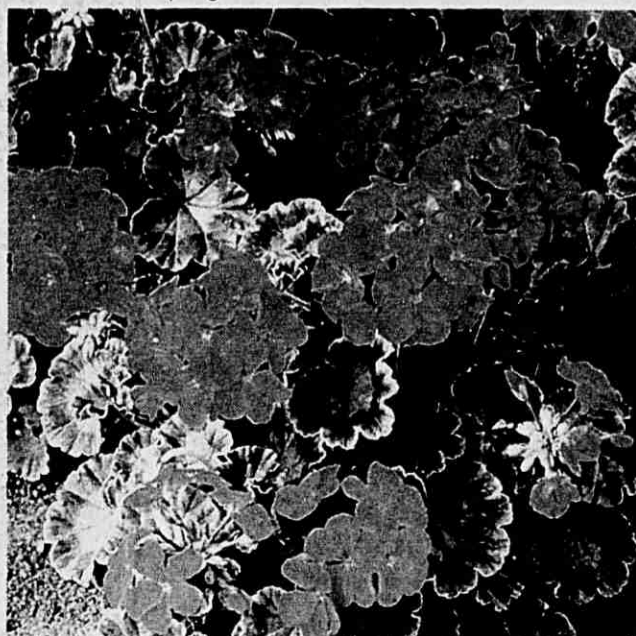
All pelargoniums need weekly feeding throughout the summer with a high potash liquid feed such as tomato fertilizer. They also need regular dead-heading when the blooms have faded. Together, this helps the plant continue to

produce a mass of high-quality blooms.

Pelargoniums must be kept frost-free and plants should be lifted before the first frosts are expected. They should be stored in a strong wooden box half-filled with cutting compost.

This will keep the plants alive but will contain sufficient food for them to grow vigorously during storage. Store the box where it will receive plenty of light and remain frost free.

By mid-winter, new shoots will begin to appear on the stools. These may be used as cuttings in the spring.

Geraniums: How to take cuttings

Pelargoniums are very easy to propagated from cuttings and the method used is the same for all types. Cuttings should be placed in a pot filled with standard seed or cutting compost.

The pot should be kept in a warm, light place but not in direct sunlight.

After a week the cuttings should be lightly watered. When they are rooted they can be transplanted into three inch pots.

This week in the garden

Prick out perennials and biennials

Perennials and biennials sown in June will be in need of pricking out into a nursery bed. This should be in an open position except for violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthus, which grow more quickly in partial shade.

The ground must be well forked and reasonably rich but not recently manured with dung. Get the seedlings up as carefully as possible (if the ground is dry it is best to give it a thorough watering the day before you intend to move the seedlings).

Peg down strawberry runners

The runners of strawberries are most conveniently propagated by pegging them down into pots of compost sunk into the ground. When rooted they are easily transplanted.

Protect vines from mildew

Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew dust the foliage and fruits with flowers with sulphur.

Plant winter greens

Plant out all manner of winter green crops as you clear the ground of early crops such as dwarf peas, early potatoes and the first sowings of turnips and salad vegetables.

So far as possible, choose showery weather for this work. If July is persistently dry, push on with the planting and then water freely for a few days.

Cut off faded flowers

From time to time during the month of July you should examine all the flowering plants in the garden and remove any blooms or flower spikes that are so faded as to be no longer decorative. This will allow the plant to generate more.

Trim hedges

Trim evergreen hedges and topiary specimens as necessary to keep them neat and tidy in July.

MONEYMATTERS

Holidays And Credit Cards

Credit Cards have become a part of everyday life in Ireland, from paying for petrol, groceries, to entertainment. Paying for goods or services with your credit card may be cost effective, convenient and secure. It has become increasingly popular for Irish people to use their card when abroad. If you wish to use your credit card while on holiday, please bear the following in mind:

Obtain a PIN number for your card from your bank, which then can be used for the purpose of withdrawing cash. If your account is in credit withdrawing local currency may be cheaper than exchanging cash or buying travellers cheques.

Be especially careful of using ATM's or giving your Credit Card number over the phone in Airports. Criminals have been known to note your personal numbers even from a distance. Ask about the availability of cash dispensing machines in the area you are visiting. Note that while many will be open 24 hours a day, some may be open business hours only.

Observe your surroundings before using an ATM. If the machine is in an out of the way place or is poorly lit, go to another one.

Shield the screen and keyboards so that anyone waiting behind you to use the ATM will not see the transaction.

Once you have made your withdrawal put your cash, card and receipt away immediately. You can count it at a later stage. If you are using your credit card to buy goods in a shop or in a restaurant do not allow it out of your sight. Go with the person to the credit card machine.

Before you go on holiday check with your credit institution to determine the daily limit of funds that can be withdrawn.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I believe I can get help with the cost of my child's clothes for school. Can you please give the details?

ANSWER

You are probably referring to the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance which is a special payment for parents to assist with the costs of children's school uniforms and footwear at the beginning of the school year. You may also claim for a child aged 18-22 in full time education for whom a payment is included in your social welfare payment.

Families claiming a social welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement) or a Health Service Executive payment are eligible for this scheme if their income is below certain thresholds as follows:

	Lone Parent	Couple
1 Child	€250.90	€368.10
2 Children	€272.50	€387.40
3 Children	€294.10	€406.70
4 Children	€315.70	€426.00

Each additional child €21.60 €19.30

Those taking part in a Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or getting a Back to Education Allowance are also eligible. The allowance is also available to people on employment schemes such as Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance, and Revenue Job Assist who retain their secondary benefits (i.e. gross weekly household income is less than 317.43). If they do not meet this condition they can apply under the normal income limits.

The allowance is €80 for each child aged 2-11 and €150 for each child aged 12-22.

The Scheme runs from 1st June to 30th September and is administered by the Health Service Executive as part of the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme. Families should apply to the Community Welfare Officer at their local Health Centre.

From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1745

(Continued).
Fews/Rossmeer/
Kilmacthomas/
Newcastle

The parish of Fews, being mostly mountain, has little remarkable, except that it affords, from its lofty situation, an extensive and agreeable prospect of the ocean, and inland parts of the country. Rossmeer parish is also exceeding coarse, though some what better than the former. The chief culture in this and the adjacent parishes, besides Oats, is Rye. About an hundred years ago, one Greatrakes formed a design of

building a town, at a place in this parish, which yet retains the name of Newtown; the streets were marked out and paved, and several houses built, which are since gone to ruin. At Kilmacthomas is an ancient castle, built formerly by the Powers of this county; where is also a small barrack for 20 Men. The castle of this place was in 1643, taken by Sir Charles Vavasor, who at that time reduced other castles in the East parts of this country. Having arrived at the eastern extremity of Decies, I shall still proceed eastward and describe the Barony of Middlethird. The first parish we meet within this Barony, is that of Newcastle, the soil whereof is very poor, being for the most part rock or bog, and has little remarkable in it. The high road leading to the city of Waterford from Dungarvan, runs through this parish, which to a traveller seems very uncomfortable, being exceedingly rugged in most places; nor is the face of the country here most agreeable, little being to be seen but naked rocks, heath and furze.

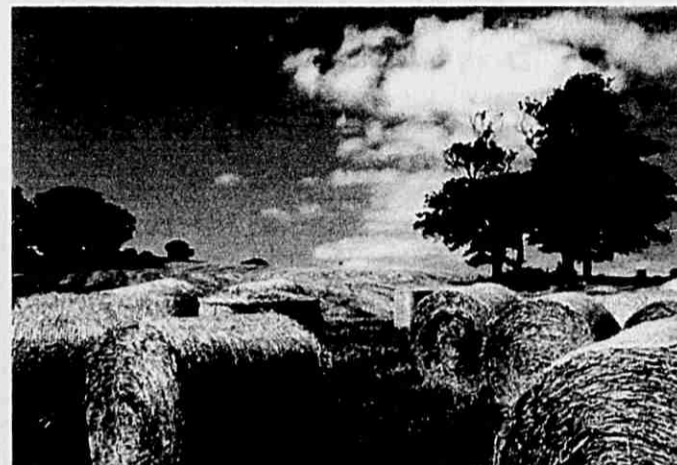

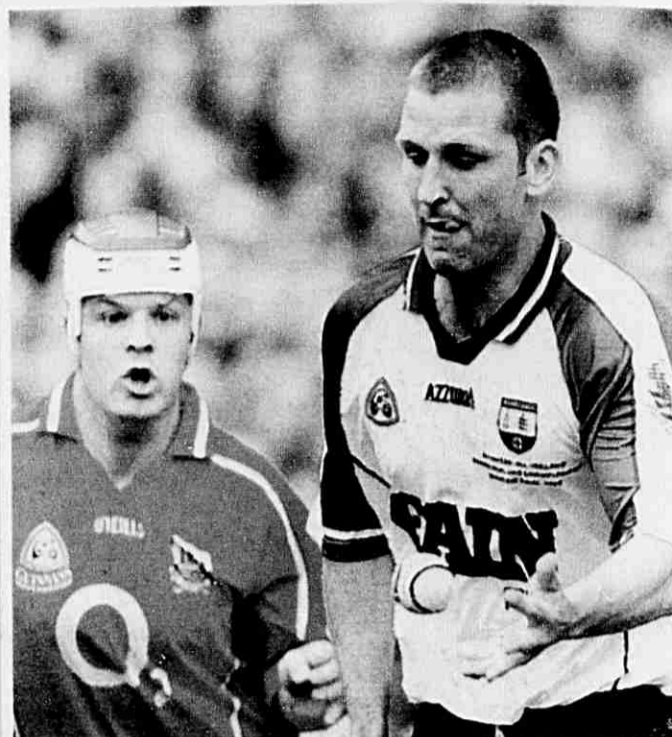

Thousands who came down to the drawn match did not get back home until around midnight. Among the causes of this delay was the huge number of cars that were 'clamped' and the hours (and 80 euro fines) that were spent in organising the release of the vehicles. This was described by GAA officials in Ulster as an absolute disgrace.

Cork Defeat Waterford In Thriller At Croke Park

LATE CORK SCORES PROVE COSTLY FOR WATERFORD

CORK 1-18 WATERFORD 1-13

While the final result was very disappointing for Waterford, very little fault can be found with their splendid performance throughout the 70 minutes of tremendously exciting play which was enjoyed by the 55,500 attendance at headquarters on Sunday last. For periods of the game, Waterford had the upper hand and it seemed as if we might revenge the defeat in the Munster semi-final.

Seven minutes from the end of normal time the teams were level (1-12 to 0-15) after a magnificent Seamus Prendergast point but then came Brian Corcoran's goal after a very long delivery out of the Cork defence. While our world did not fall apart after this, it was the killer blow and the score which made the difference between victory and defeat. It was, as a colleague in the press box said, the score that put an end to the Deise interest in the All-Ireland championships of 2005.

Cork are the Munster and reigning All-Ireland champions and were odds on favourites to win, but for a very long time in the match the betting odds belied the measure of the Waterford

challenge. Cork may have been deserving winners, but this was Waterford's best performance of the year. The game, played with fierce intensity and at a cracking pace, had some really brilliant scores on both sides may yet be labeled the 'match of the year'.

Clinton Hennessey making his championship debut proved to be the right choice and was outstanding in his first championship appearance and his first game in Croke Park. In fact the Ardmore man's display will now surely give rise to speculation about what might have been, if he had been played throughout the year in goal?

Also the sparkling display by his Ardmore club colleague Seamus Prendergast embellished his profile, deservedly earned him the man-of-the-match award and is likely to win him an All-Star nomination.

The placing of Ken McGrath at centre half back did have a steadying effect on the whole defence whose all-round performance was more solid than it had been in earlier rounds. Brian Corcoran's goal in the final ten min-

utes was a great score and our defence could have done little to prevent it.

The absence of Eoin McGrath because of suspension and Paul Flynn's immobility due to a thigh injury received in the Ennis match, were factors in making scoring that bit more difficult and meant that Diarmuid O'Sullivan and goalkeeper Cusack were under that bit less pressure.

PLAY

Waterford played with the strong breeze in the first half but Cork were the first to score when Joe Deane pointed in the 3rd and 5th minutes. In the 9th minute, Seamus Prendergast had a great score and one which was the first of his four from play.

Two super points, one from in-form Tony Browne and the next from David Bennett saw the teams level at 0-3 apiece by the 15th minute.

Cork under enormous pressure were defending magnificently but conceded a 20 meter free and Paul Flynn in an adventurous mood shot low for a goal but the ball was saved and Dan Shanahan was on hand to meet the rebound and shot home for the first goal of the game and our only major. John Gardiner and Paul Flynn exchanged points. Ben O'Connor pointed for Cork and a tremendous roar greeted the Seamus Prendergast point which was scored following a solo of some 60 yards.

Paul Flynn pointed Waterford into a four points lead from a 29th minute free.

Tom Kenny and Joe Deane had Cork points and Paul Flynn had our final score of the first half to leave the tally at 1-7 to 0-9 in our favour at the break.

SECOND HALF

Ben O'Connor leveled the game for Cork in the 4th minute before Paul Flynn restored our lead in the 6th minute. O hAilpin

had his splendid long range point to level matters again but another great score by Seamus Prendergast had us back in front again in the 10th minute. An 11th minute point from a Joe Deane free as followed with John Mullane's great score in the 13th minute. This tit for tat pattern continued, up until the 28th minute when Corcoran's goal shot the hot favourites into a lead which they never surrendered.

In the immediate aftermath of the match, Cork officials were first to agree that a five points winning margin was an unfair reflection of Waterford great display over the 70 minutes.

As well as Browne and McGrath, Tom Feeney, Fergal Hartley, Eoin Murphy, James Murray all played very well in defence and certainly justified their selection following some unfair criticism after the Ennis match.

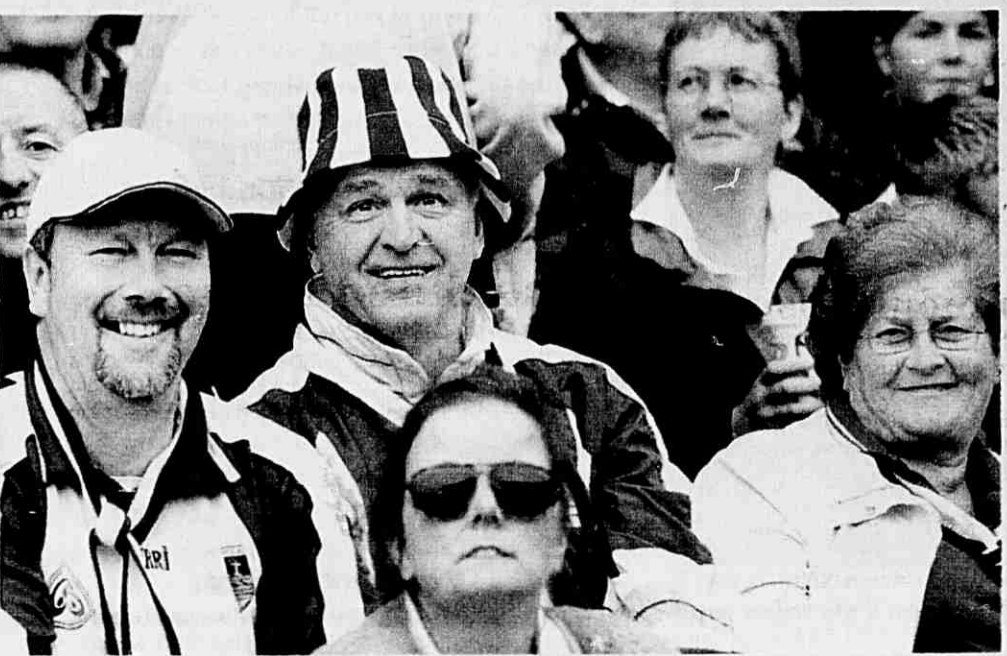

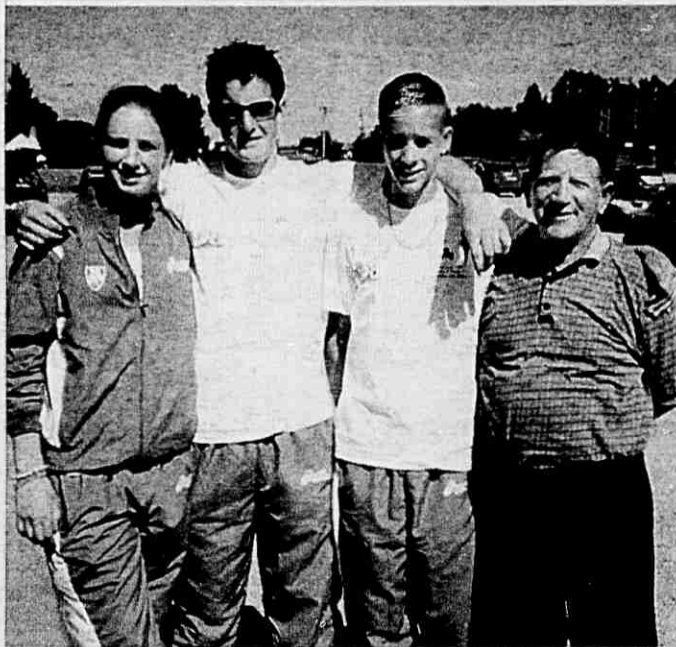

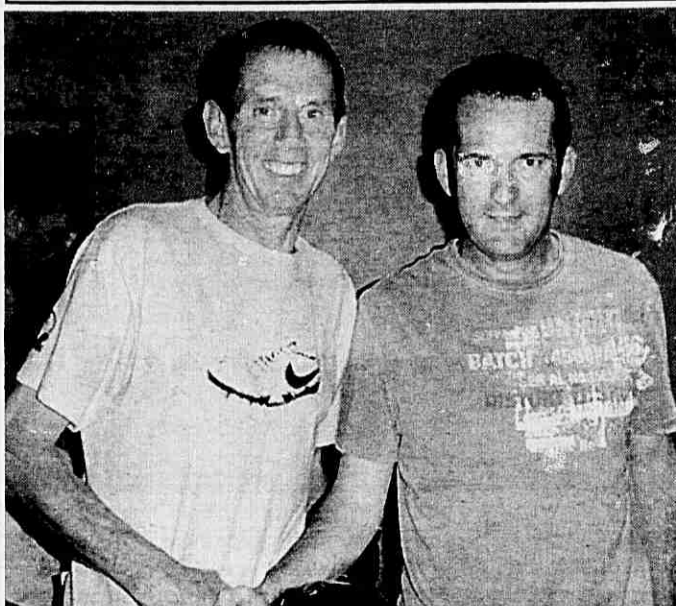
Regretted Death Of Former Local Athlete And Juvenile Coach John Dower

On his retirement from farming, John always seen in the company of his dear wife Joan, was known as the man who read the E.S.B. metres in countless homes over a wide area, here his cheerful and pleasant disposition endeared him to many, including the elderly who enjoyed his visits greatly.

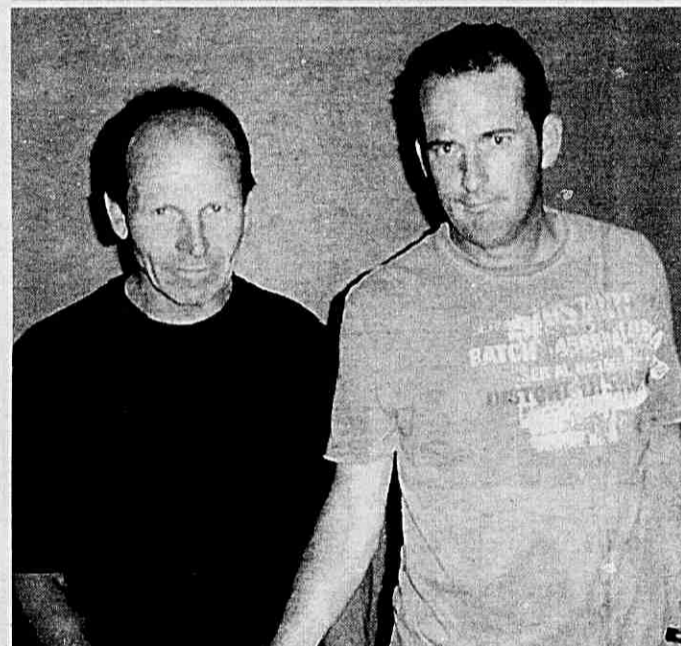

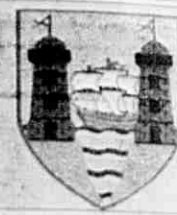

Dairy Breeding Awards Announced

Pat and Pauline Ryan of Lauragh, Cappagh, Waterford were today announced as the overall winners of the EBI 100 competition at a reception held at Teagasc Moorepark. As overall winners the Ryans won a prize of 5,000 for the outstanding breeding and financial management of their 200-cow herd which has an average EBI of 63. More than 40 stock in the herd have an EBI of over 100.

This national competition attracted almost 50 entrants for a total prize fund of over 10,000. The purpose of the competition was to focus attention on improving profits in dairying through better breeding.

Three regional winners were also announced. They were Kieran Heame, Ballinacurra, Carrick-on-Suir in the Munster region, Eamon Fagan, Lough Ree House, Glasson, Athlone, Co. Westmeath in the Leinster region and Richard Starrett, Killendarragh, Lifford, Co. Donegal in the Connacht/Ulster Region. Each regional winner won a prize of 1,500.

Speaking at the announcement of the winners - Matt Ryan, Teagasc Dairy Programme Manager said that the competition has clearly demonstrated the association between better breeding and higher profit.

"The twenty five contestants short listed for a farm visit were all high EBI herds with a common profit 1.8 c/litre higher than the average Teagasc client. This is worth an extra 5,400 in common profit on a 300,000 litre dairy farm" said Mr. Ryan.

Representing ACC Bank, the main sponsors of the competition, Paddy Horgan, National Agri-Business Manager said, "We were impressed by the performance of

the farmers who entered the competition. Overall the competition has been an enormous success with a large number of exceptional entrants attracted to it".

Brian Wickham, Chief Executive, Irish Cattle Breeding Federation, said, "It is clear that commercial, profit-focused farmers are identifying the association between EBI and profit. The fact that the competitions finalists have herd EBIs that are twice or three times as high as the national average and have a higher profit than the average dairy farmer is

not coincidental".

Six runners up also attended the event. They included three Cork farmers Tom Kearney, Ballybrown, Rathcormac, Robert Shannon, Droumgarraffe, Clonakilty and Michael Downing, Farranastig, Whitechurch.

The other runners up were Mark Cassidy, Cookstown, Kells, Co Meath, Jim Delahunty, Ballykineash, Carrig, via Birr Co Offaly and Wexford farmer David French from Raheenvarren, Newbawn. Each received a prize of 250.
