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€25,000 Stolen In Ring Pub Raid

Gardai are following a number of lines of enquiry into the break-in of a public house and the robbery of thousands of euros in cash over the August Bank Holiday weekend.

A substantial amount of cash, estimated to be up to 25,000 euros, was stolen when raiders gained entry to Tig an Cheoil in Ring through a rear window. The robbery occurred in the late hours of Monday August 1st or the early hours of Tuesday August 2nd.

It was one of a number of incidents, which occurred in the area leading up to and during

the Bank Holiday.

The Oyster Festival was held over the weekend, and it's believed the raiders may have been aware takings at Tig an Cheoil, which hosts a number of the events during the Festival, would be unusually high as a result.

Gardai said a number of people have provided information and they are following a number of lines of enquiry.

Meanwhile, Gardai have also urged the public to be vigilant after several other incidents occurred in the area in the run up to Bank Holiday weekend.

A number of cars, which were

parked close to the Cunnigar and at Helvick Pier were forcibly entered and valuables and items of a sentimental value were taken.

"We would urge the public to take due care of their property, and ensure that if they are to leave any valuables in their ve-

hicles that they are kept secure and out of sight," a spokesperson from the Gardai said.

Anyone with information about the break-in at Tig an Cheoil or the incidents at the Cunnigar and Helvick Pier are urged to contact the Gardai in Dungarvan at 058 - 42370.

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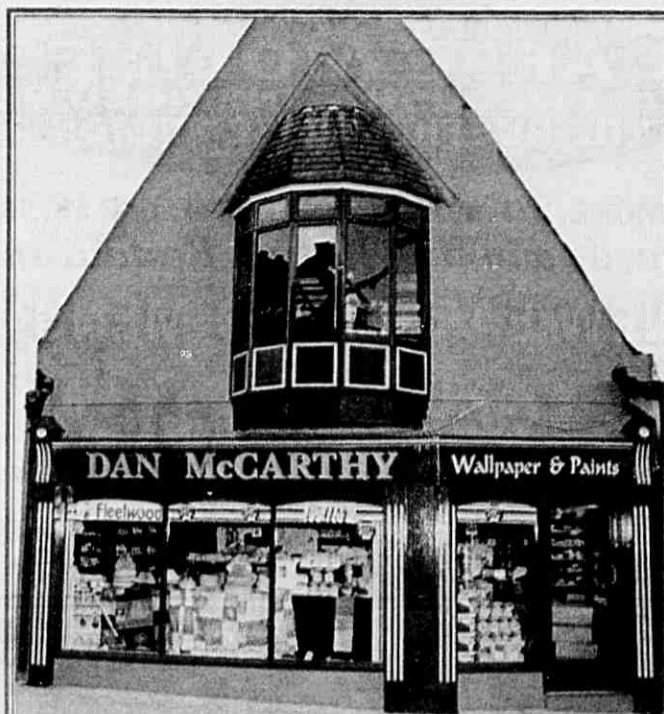

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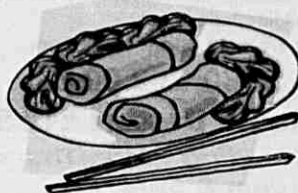
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Dungarvan Man's Jewel Of An Idea Proves Sparkling Success

THE SUGAR LOAF ROCK, CO. WATERFORD

The above picture appeared in a published explanation to the mid 19th century Ordnance Survey six inch maps. It shows a rocky outcrop in Knockeen townland, north of Tramore, that is now not as visible as it once was, due to the growth of trees that were planted in the 1960s. Knockeen Dolmen, a Portal Tomb of New Stone Age (Neolithic) date is just one kilometre away to the east-south-east. Given the proven relationships of some Neolithic monuments to features on horizons, it is tempting to ask just how forested Ireland was in ancient times. How much did Stone Age cattle grazing keep trees down?

The artist was George Victor du Noyer, a Huguenot (descendent of French Protestant refugees) Irishman who lived from 1817 to 1869. From 1834 to around his rather early death, he was a draughtsman with the Geological Survey of Ireland. He did hundreds of landscape drawings to illustrate geological structures and he often exaggerated the rocks a bit; sometimes so much so that he could be called a geological caricaturist. He might even have left out any bushes and trees that he felt were in

the way. The Romantic Movement in art and literature was very much alive then; Romantics liked crags to be craggy and this drawing of the Sugar Loaf is certainly that.

There are hundreds of steeply conical hills in countries that use the English language—all named after the then familiar shape of sugar loaves. An example on the internet is to be seen at <http://www.mawer.clara.net/loaf.html>.

It would be interesting if anyone had pre-1960s photos that show the Sugar Loaf from the East before the trees were planted. They might show how much the artist exaggerated the cragginess.

Du Noyer also produced paintings and drawings of other Waterford views: Mount Misery; Ballyvoyle Head; Coum Mahon; Waterford Harbour; Coumshingaun from half a parish away; and he did a nice sketch of Cloughlowrish; the Speaking Stone in Durrow at the bridge over the River Deehil.

Help Create A Beach Mosaic On The Copper Coast

Join us on Sunday 14 or Sunday 28 August to create a pebble mosaic on Annestown beach on the Copper Coast, Co. Waterford. During the course of the afternoon you will discover the story of the origins of the pebbles and use their subtle colours to create a temporary mosaic.

The oldest found pebble mosaic dates to 7th or 8th century BC and was discovered in Anatolia in Turkey. These pebble pavements used different coloured stones to create simple patterns. It was the Greeks however, in 4th century BC, who raised the pebble techniques to an art form, using precise patterns and scenes of people and animals. Each Sunday participants will be using these ancient techniques to create a temporary work with materials that are up to 400 million years old. However if we find other interesting objects on the beach - drift wood, sea weed, shells we will incorporate them into our work too.

Any one interested, just meet at the car park at Annestown beach (on the R 675), west of Tramore, Co. Waterford at 2.30pm. Children from the age of 8 upwards are welcome accompanied by a responsible adult (up to 5 children per adult). Bring a snack and drink, wear suitable clothing and a pair of gloves. Participants will be working with geologist Martina Keating and other staff from the Copper Coast Geopark Office. The fee is 4 per child, accompanied adults are free. The session will last approximately three and half hours. The Beach Mosaic Sessions are supported by Waterford County Council Art Office. A third session will take place in September in associa-



tion with Knockmahon National School.

The Copper Coast Wednesday Summer walks are still going on. Meeting point on 10th is The Rock Garden Bunmahon at 7.30 pm, 17th Kilmarrasay Strand at 7pm, 24th Annestown Strand 7 pm and finally on 31st Benvoy Strand at 7 pm.

The Copper Coast European Geopark is supported under

the EU Interreg 3B programme and its other European partners are Vulkaneifel Geopark and Bergstrasse-Odenwald Geopark in Germany as well as Marble Arch Geopark in Co. Fermanagh.

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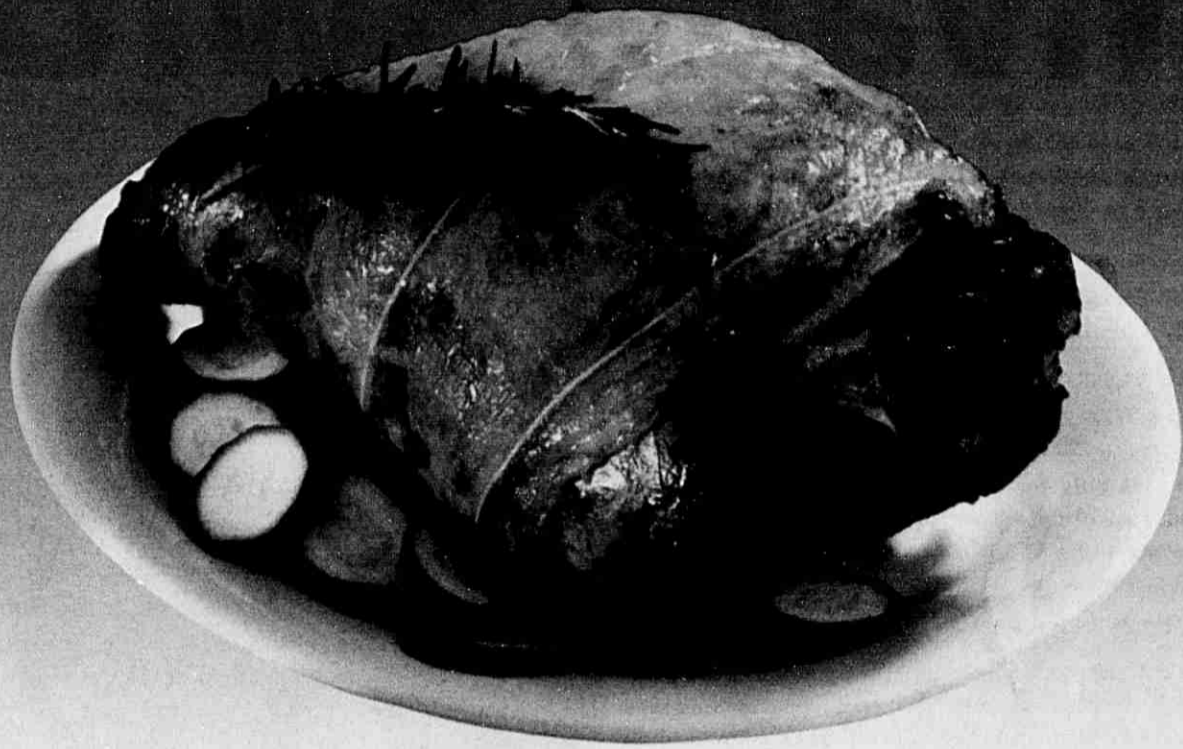


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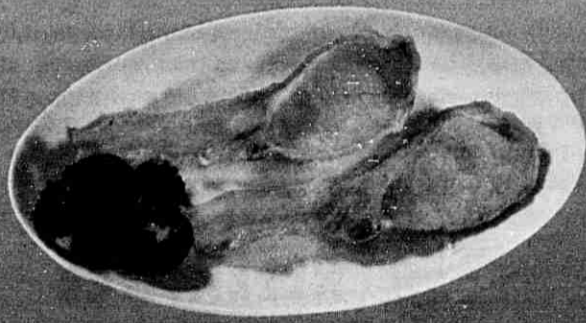

Seventeen members of South Eastern Mountain Rescue supported their colleagues in Mayo Mountain Rescue to provide assistance to the thousands of people who climbed Croagh Patrick on the annual "Reek Sunday" pilgrimage during the Bank Holiday weekend.

The day started early as the teams were on the pilgrimage route from 4 am.

This year the weather was relatively good and there were no serious injuries. An elderly woman fell at the top of the mountain. She had broken her wrist and was also suffering from shock. She was evacuated by stretcher to the hospital tent from where she was airlifted by Air Corps helicopter to Castlebar hospital.

Supermarkets Putting Rural Petrol Stations Out Of Business

Low cost supermarkets are forcing rural petrol stations out of business by undercutting prices, Paddy Joe Ryan of Comeragh Oil has warned. Mr. Ryan said petrol stations in Dungarvan and across West Waterford are surviving on tiny profit margins, and the situation is becoming increasingly serious.

Already, a number of stations in West Waterford have closed in recent years.

Once 5 petrol stations operated in Cappoquin, only 2 have survived; Lismore had 3, now

only 1 remains. In Tallow, all three petrol stations have shut down. Petrol stations have also closed in Stradbally and Kilmeaden.

On the main road between Master McGrath cross and

Clonmel there were four petrol stations - only two remain in operation. Both petrol stations on the main road between Master McGrath's and Lismore have closed.

"I think it's a serious situa-

tion," Mr. Ryan said. "If a school or a garda station closed or a creamery even, there would be uproar. But I haven't heard anything from the politicians on this."

He said supermarkets who sell petrol at below cost on their forecourts are to blame.

"The recommended retail price by a major oil company is 121.9 a litre. It's being sold as low as 101.9 a litre. People are working on margins of 1c, 2c or 3c a litre. Then they have to pay costs. In my own case, I am paying wages of 2,100 euros a week. Then there's other costs such as insurance etc."

Mr. Ryan gave the example of undercutting by one major petrol company in Cork City, which sold 50 euros worth of petrol for 50 cent.

"If the Government can't do anything about the undercutting of prices by major retailers, then there won't be any stations in rural Ireland.

"When all this ends and all the small retailers are driven out of business, what will happen is the same as has happened in England. The prices will go way way up, because there won't be any competition left."

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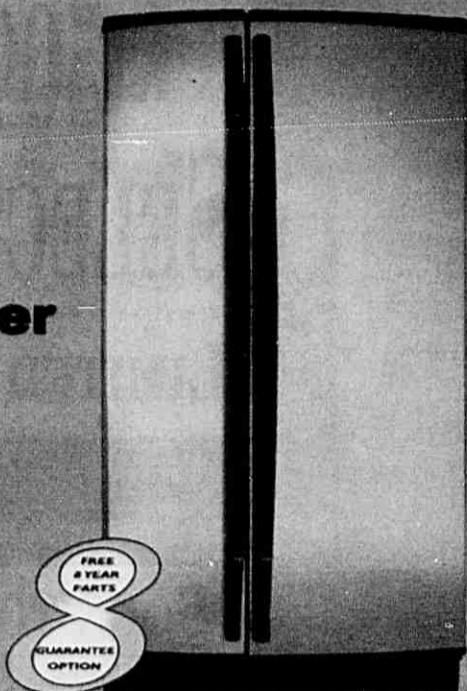
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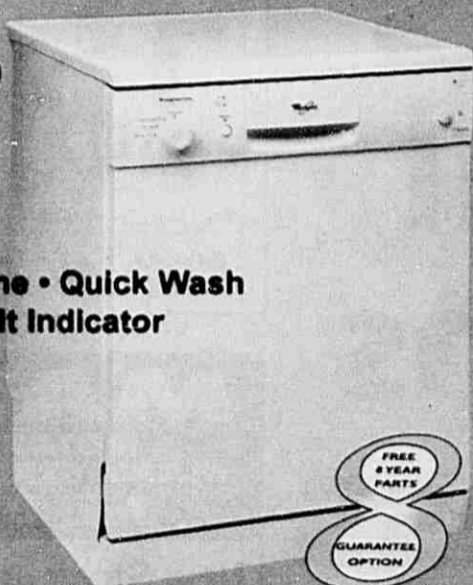
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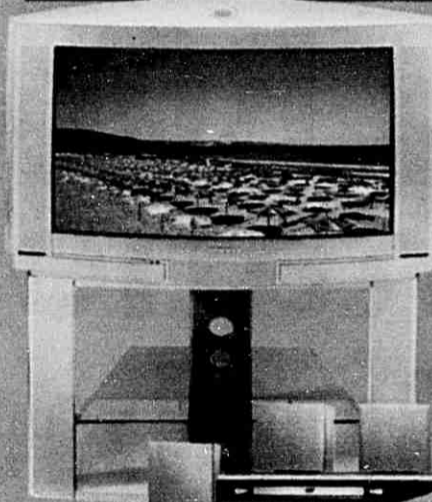

PLANT MEDICINE

Herbal medicine is often described as 'alternative' or 'complementary' medicine. However, what most people don't realise is that many of the modern pharmaceutical drugs used today were originally found in plants. Even now, the plant world is often the first place the scientific community turns to when seeking new drugs to treat medical conditions.

Pharmaceutical companies try to identify a single chemical within a plant which is responsible for its medicinal action. This single component is then chemically extracted and usually synthesised artificially to create the drug.

This generally results in a product which has an extremely powerful effect on the body, and which can be very useful in the treatment of many serious conditions. However, it can also lead to imbalances of the body's normal functions and an increased risk of side effects.

Herbal medicine is different because it makes use of the plant in its natural form. Extracts of flowers, leaves, roots, bark or seeds are usually prepared by soaking the plant material in water, alcohol or glycerine. This extracts a much wider range of the plant's complex profile of chemical constituents.

The so-called 'active' constituents which are used by the pharmaceutical companies are still present. However other components are also present which support the action of the active constituent or help to reduce its side effects. The result is a powerful, yet gentler, more balanced action on the body.

Aspirin is a very well known and widely used pharmaceutical drug. It is composed of a chemical called salicylic acid which was originally discovered in the plant known as meadowsweet. The frothy cream-coloured flowers of this plant can be seen lining many roadsides at this time of year. The word aspirin was

derived from Spiraea, the original Latin name for meadowsweet.

Aspirin has the unfortunate side effect of causing damage to the lining of the stomach. However, the active constituent of meadowsweet is present in a much gentler form and is only converted to salicylic acid after absorption into the bloodstream. Therefore, it does not have a damaging effect on the digestive system. In addition, meadowsweet contains tannins and mucilage which actively protect the stomach lining.

Another example is orthodox antibiotics which can lead to imbalances in microbial flora and the development of antibiotic resistant bacteria. Herbal antimicrobials such as thyme and calendula are very effective in the treatment of a wide range of infective illnesses but do not upset the normal microbial balance of the body. In addition, the complex range of constituents they contain makes it very difficult for bacteria to develop resistance to them. Many people do not tolerate orthodox medicines very well and many others are concerned about potential side effects or other negative impacts on the body. For these people, herbal medicine can offer a very effective alternative or adjunct to orthodox medical treatment.

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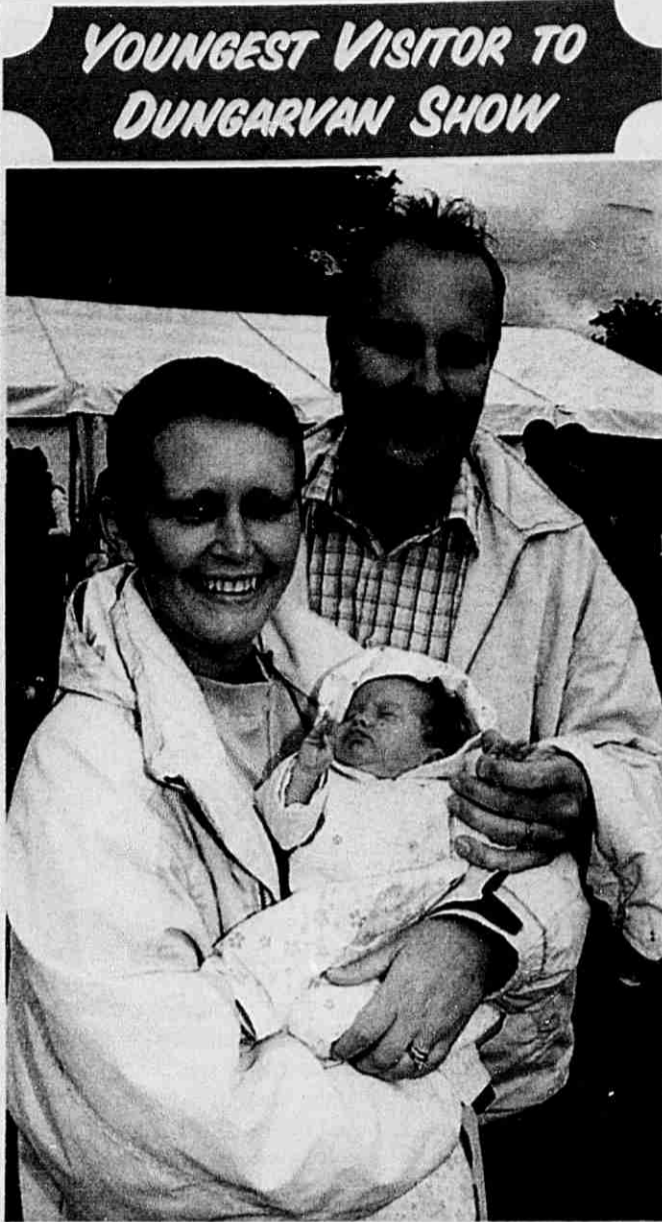

County Mayor Top Paid Representative

Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Ger Barron was named as the highest earner among the twenty-three members of Waterford County Council.

The Labour councillor was guaranteed a minimum of 30,000 euros once he was elected for his one term as Mayor.

However, the Kilmacthomas-based representative, elected as Mayor at the council's AGM two months ago, could earn up to 45,330 euros when expenses and other allowances are taken into account.

According to figures compiled by the Irish Independent last week, Mayor Barron is entitled to claim the eighteen highest level of allowances and expenses of all the local authorities in the country.

Cork City Mayor, Deirdre Clune will be the highest paid, receiving 97,396 euros with an allowance of 82,066 euros. Cavan Mayor, Eddie Feeney is the lowest, with 33,330 euros and an allowance of 18,000 euros.

Meanwhile, it's emerged that the cash-strapped council will pay out a total of 348,500 euros in representational payments to its 23 elected members, or 15,152 euros a year for each councillor.

The cost of representational payments have soared in the two years since the national pay rise for councillors. In 2003 this figure was just 264,923 euros, or 12,133 euros for each councillor.

A monthly allowance, expenses for conferences and expenses for the chairman of each of the council's five Strategic Policy Committee will also be footed by the local authority.

As will a separate allowance

of 2,000 euros for the Deputy Mayor and expenses for members of various committees, such as the County Waterford Vocational Committee.

This is set to leave the final bill for a single year somewhere in excess of half a million euros.

It comes as the executive look for cost cutting measures and boost revenue, to offset the massive losses set hit to the council due to the waste management crises.

Ó Céilleachair, who is also the Udarás na Gaeltachta elected representative for the Ring and Old Parish areas, presents Ruán as the first grandchild for his parents Ann Mulqueen and Tomás Ó Céilleachair of An Rinn, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford. Ruán is the sixth grandchild for Siobhán's parents Rosemarie and Dominic Smyth of Blackrock, Dundalk, Co. Louth.

Tallow Snubbed By South East Tourism

A County Waterford Development Board funded tourism body, which planned to capitalise on the massive visitor draw of the Tall Ships Race in Waterford City, deleted one of the county's most scenic tourist trails from its guide books.

South East Tourism planned to spread tourism across the county and city during the three day international festival and in the long term raise awareness among visitors about the natural beauty and historically significant areas in County Waterford.

But residents of Tallow were angered

when they learned that the guide, called "One County Three Holiday's," excluded areas west of Lismore from the map.

Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin called the decision "an insult to the people of Tallow."

"People are very upset that coming at the time of the Tall Ships Race Tallow and the scenic route up and around the River Blackwater to Youghal was excluded. It was a magnificently produced guide, but I think that by not including Tallow and the areas around it, it completely undermines our tourism potential."

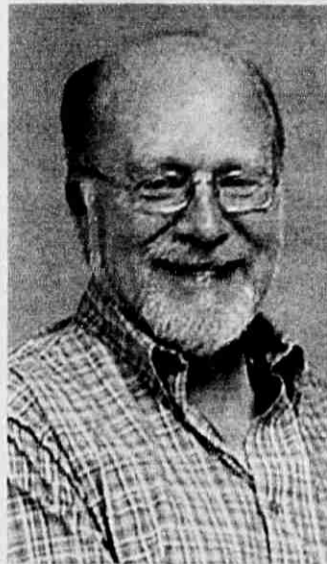

Milking Machines and SCC problems.
Change milk liners by August to get 4-6% more milk. This also reduces cell counts. After 2000-2500 milkings liners become weak and worn with distorted lips resulting in more liner slip, which in turn allows air in. This can cause air blasts and spread of infection from one teat to the next.

All herds must attempt to reduce cell counts. Milk volume supplied X cell count = total SCC loading into a Co-ops supply. Continue teat dipping after each cow is milked as it reduces the spread of mastitis by 50%. Dry off persistently high cows now & do a voltage check on the parlour.

Still Breeding in August?

August bulling is mid May - mid June calving. Calving could be later if a long gestation beef bull is used. However, it may be necessary to bull in August if a herd had bad fertility earlier in the year or there is little or no replacements coming in next year. The price you will receive for cull cows will also affect this decision. A calved cow maybe worth more than a cull cow. You need to consider your options before a decision is made on a definite end to the breeding season.

Holiday Time

Hard working, self-employed people like yourself should make time to take holidays away from the farm. Have extra peace of mind when away by being well organized in advance, ensure the relief milker is fully familiar with your systems, have essential and emergency phone numbers to hand in the dairy.

TILLAGE

High Moisture Grains

Crimping (Grain Acidification and Rolling)

Grain for crimping should be harvested at 35% - 45% moisture content with a normal combine harvester. The combine is usually set with the sieves fully open. The grain is then passed through a crimper (a roller with dimpled or fluted rollers), which is usually at the final storage site. Crimpers can process from 12 - 40 tonnes per hour, depending on machine. In most cases an additive is then added to the grain within the crimping machine before ensiling. Crimped grain should be maintained in strictly air-free conditions throughout storage.

Urea Treated Grain

This grain is normally stored under sealed, air-free conditions (e.g. sealed beneath conventional silage plastic sheeting) to prevent the rapid loss of the ammonia produced from the urea. The ammonia prevents mould growth and when it binds with moisture in the seed coat of the grain the resultant hydroxide effect should replace the need for mechanically rolling the grain. This treatment also increases the concentration of crude protein in the grain - however, the extra N is non-protein N and may be of limited value to the animal.

Caustic Treatment

Caustic soda treatment of grain disrupts the seed coat of grains, so that they can be fed to cattle without further processing. Grain harvested at the conventional stage (16-20% moisture).

Treatment

Add 3-4 tonne of grain added to the diet feeder. Add caustic soda to the feeder (Barley at 50 kg of caustic soda per tonne of grain, Wheat at 30 kg of caustic soda per tonne of grain). Thoroughly mix caustic with the grain. Once mixed, add water to the mixture. The level of water will depend on the moisture content of the grain and the length of the storage period. If the grain is to be fed fairly quickly, then enough water needs to be added to bring the moisture content up to 30%. If the grain is to be stored for more than 3 months then the moisture content should be brought up to 22%.

Storage

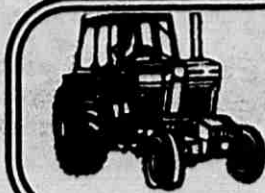
It is important to allow the caustic treated grain to cool adequately before heaping it. Clean conditions during treatment and storage (seal tightly with a polythene sheet) are essential and conditions conducive to mould growth or mites should be avoided.

FARMING LEADER

Action Programme Must Support Farmers to Maximise Production From Grass

Commenting on the final Nitrates Action Programme, IFA National Treasurer Pdraig Walshe has said that the Programme must not prevent farmers from maximizing their grass production.

He said "livestock farmers are facing serious income losses from falling cattle prices, and the ongoing impacts of WTO on international beef markets. Cash is not available on farms for expensive building work. Livestock farmers must be supported in maximizing their production from grass with grazing systems that allow them to graze late into the autumn and early winter, and early in the spring, thereby reducing the amount of manure storage they need. The Nitrates Action Programme must allow these grazing systems which both save farmers money and are environmentally friendly."

Mr. Walshe said the revised farm grants package announced by Minister Coughlan should include a significant increase in investment ceilings.

"Farmers must scale up to remain viable. The revised grant package must provide grant support to farmers for every euro they spend on new and additional storage capacity."

Noting the requirement included in the Action Programme that county council bye-laws must be made consistent with the Programme, Mr. Walshe said that the storage required by county councils should be reduced to the amount provided for in the Action Programme. Mr. Walshe said that this will mean a two week reduction in the minimum storage required in Westmeath and Cavan.

Dillon Welcomes New Grant Supports For The Environment

Commenting on today's announcement of a new farm investment support package for environmental protection, IFA President, John Dillon, said:

"Increased grant supports of 60%, and 70% in four border counties, will go a long way to helping farmers meet the high costs of compliance with the Nitrates Action Programme, particularly for additional manure storage capacity. The top-up support for young farmers, of 10% in the disadvantaged areas, and 5% elsewhere, gives a strong positive signal to young farmers wishing to make their career in commercial agriculture."

Mr. Dillon welcomed an expected significant increase in the investment limit, the removal of the income unit exclusion clauses, and the extension

of grant support to pig and poultry farmers for the first time in many years.

He said these improved grant supports are critical to practical and sensible implementation of the Nitrates Action Programme.

He said: "The notification of the Programme to the EU Commission removes the uncertainty hanging over farmers for the last number of years about new and higher standards of environmental protection farmers are being asked to meet."

He said: "We now need sensible implementation of Action Programme, which takes account of practical farming conditions in an increasingly open, and economically deregulated, European and world food market."

Mr. Dillon said that early agreement with the Commis-

sion on a derogation from the organic nitrogen restrictions included in the Nitrates Directive is crucial, and must be pursued immediately, to secure the competitiveness and economic viability of our best farmers.

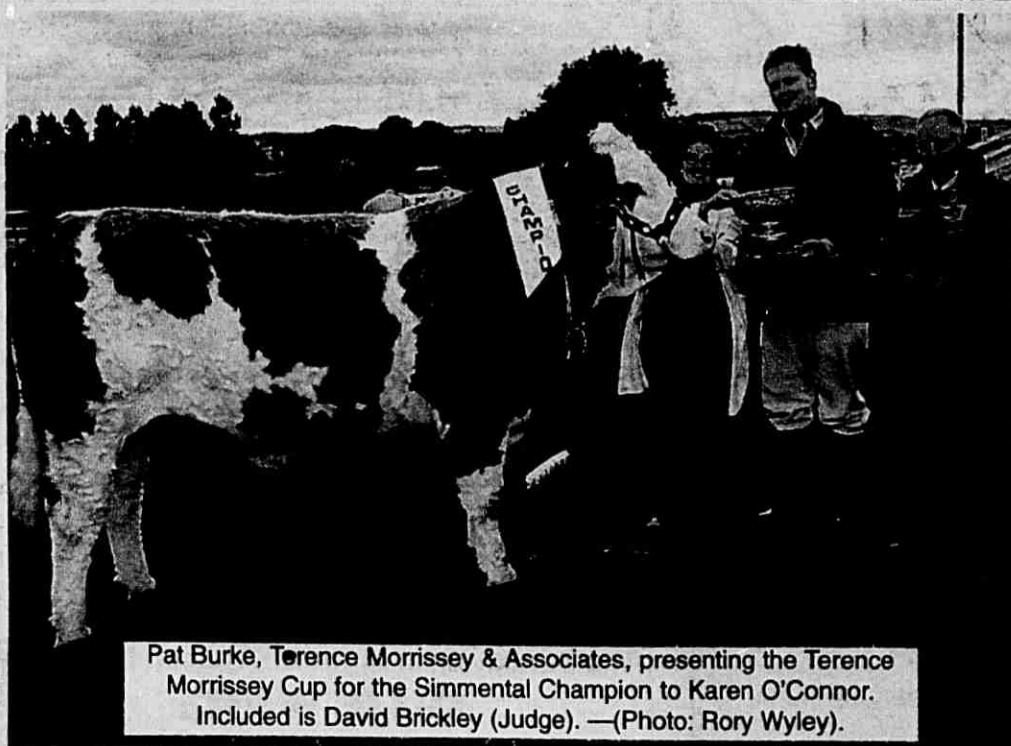
Bord Bia Lamb Promotion Launched in Belgium

From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1745 (Continued). KILMEADEN

The parish of Kilmeaden which place gives title of Baron to Mohun St. Leger, Lord Viscount Donerayle, whose grandfather was so created the 28th of January 1703. The Parish church is kept in repair; in the church-yard is a handsome tomb of John Ottrington Esq. Grandfather to the Right Honourable Elizabeth Viscountess of Donerayle (by whose care it was erected). Here is also interred Mrs. Mary Maitland his wife, descended (as the inscription says) from the ancient family of the Maitlands in Scotland. Kilmeaden-house is built upon the foundation of an ancient castle which was boldly erected on the banks of the river Suir. In the gardens are several pleasant canals stored with fish. Round the seat are good plantations of timber-trees. The Suir is here of a considerable breadth, and deep enough for vessels of a large burden.

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mrs. Kathleen McEvoy (nee Hyland), Fr. Matthew Terrace, Clonmel which sad event took place at St. Patrick's Nursing Home, Cashel. She was the last surviving member of her family, her sister and brothers having predeceased her.

Noted for her neighbourliness, Kathleen's warm and friendly smile, a characteristic hallmark of hers, endeared her to everyone in Fr. Matthew's Terrace, Clonmel where she resided for half a century.

A native of County Cork, she was daughter of Denis and Ellen Hyland from Mitchelstown. She was of a family of four, two boys and two girls. Her father was a well known and popular Harness makers, whom she loved to accompany regularly on the bus to Cork, where he sued to buy the leather for his trade. In 1964 Paddy got involved with the I.S.P.C.C. and was ably supported by his wife Kathleen in that very laudable work which the society was doing and to which they gave so much of their free time and found so fulfilling. Her husband late taking up a permanent position with the organisation.

Over the years they used to make frequent visits back to Co. Cork.

Sadly Paddy died some thirty years ago, his untimely passing being a devastating blow to his young wife Kathleen and family. She kept going with the loyal support of her family, and she had a deep devotion to St. Anthony, all of which helped her through a traumatic period. With deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mrs. Eily Weston (nee Lafford), Fr. Matthew Terrace, Clonmel which sad event took place at South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel after a brief illness.

She was a jolly, friendly lady noted for her perpetual smile and infectious laughter. Young at heart her youthful outlook on life belied her eighty eight years of age and she was invariably the life and soul of a party. All those who knew her will miss her good humoured and loving nature, not least her family who are devastated by her passing.

Daughter of John and Mary Ellen Lafford of Springmount, Clonmel she was one of a family of nine children, six boys and three girls. Eily, who worked as a cook at Bests of Anerville in her earlier years, often spoke about the tragic death of her father, a groomsman, accidentally killed by a horse at Clonmel Horse Show in the 30's which was a severe blow to her mother and family.

In 1938 Eily married Tommy Weston from Carrick-on-Suir where they lived initially before taking up residence on the Quay in Clonmel. They reared six children. Eily's husband, it will be recalled was a member of Mick Delahunty's first band in the 30's and, of course, he founded the Tommy Weston band, as well as sitting up a basket making business in Bridge Street where he had his workshop to which he used to bring the reeds up the river in a cot from Sally Island. In the mid 40's the family moved to Fr. Matthew Terrace where they had wonderful neighbours and where they all were so happy, Eily making some lasting friends there. They all loved it and wistfully remember the mouth watering roasts with all the trimmings, which their mother, a great cook, used to make for them there and, of course, the fun they used to have together over the years in Bonmahon, one of their favourite sea side spots in the Summer.

Opening a jewellery shop in Upper Gladstone Street, where previously Patsy Sullivan had a garage and where the Emerald Garden is now. Eily ran that business whilst Tommy continued with his basket making into the mid 60's when he passed to his eternal reward. She continued to run the jewellery shop up to the late 70's.

A daily mass-goer at the Friary, she had a devotion to the Blessed Virgin and St. Anthony. She used to attend St. Joachims Mothers sodality every week. Bingo too, which she attended a couple of times every week was a great source of pleasure to her, as she used to meet up with old friends there and have a good laugh with them.

A great supporter of Tipperary football and hurling, she would some times give her own funny commentary on a match. A big shock to her was the death some two years ago, of her brother Frank, with whom she had become very close having virtually reared him when their father died. And, at the time, her own health began to deteriorate but, as her family said, she was a fighter and wouldn't give up or feel sorry for herself. A great source of pride to her was the presentation of the occasion of her ruby jubilee of Profession in the Secular Third Order which took place in her home by Fr. John of the Friary in September 2003.

In fact Eily had been at Mass the morning before she died and at bingo the same evening. Sadly she became ill after the Bingo and was removed to South Tipperary General Hospital where she passed away.

Her remains were removed to S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church where they were removed by Rev. Fr. John O.F.M. and Rev. Fr. THE ROMAN EMPIRE

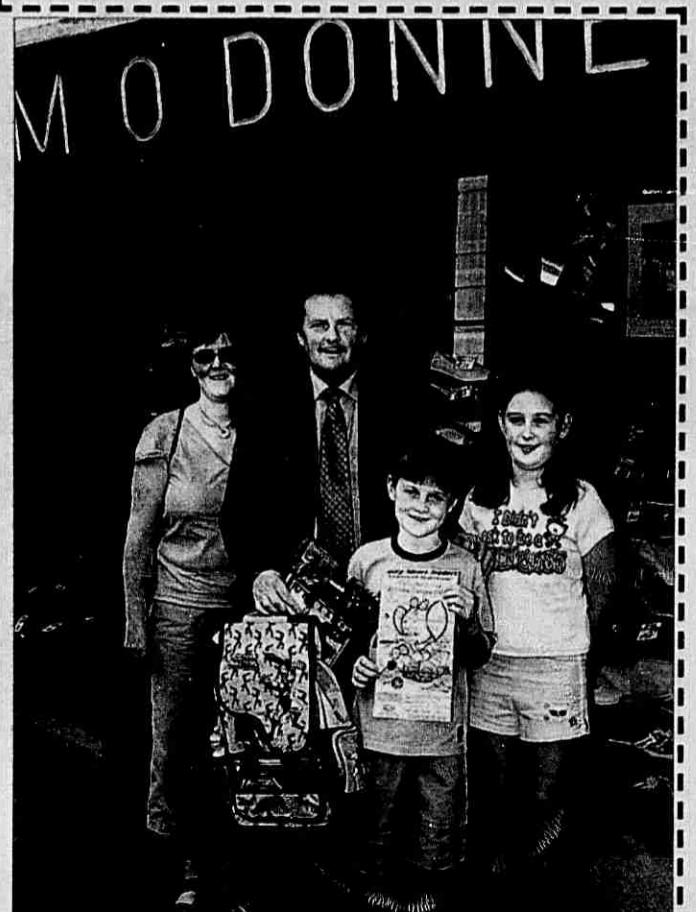
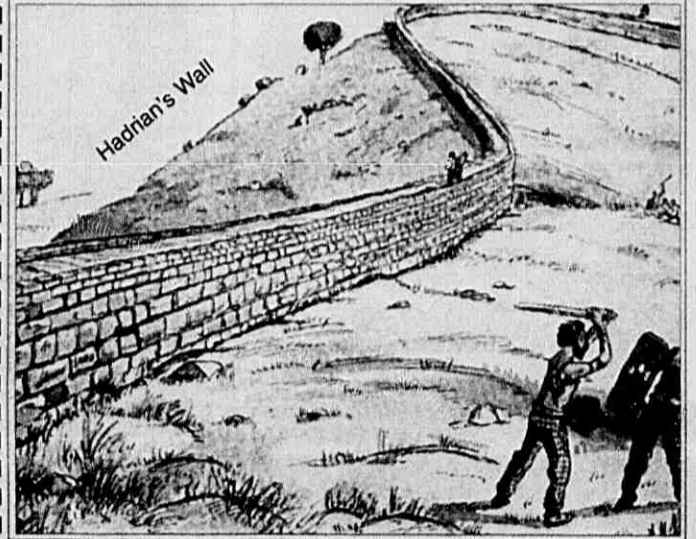
The Roman Empire began when the Romans set out to conquer the rest of Italy, which they achieved by 272 BC. They then went on to conquer parts of north-west Africa and other lands around the Mediterranean Sea. Between 58 BC and 51 BC they invaded Gaul (the Roman name for the Celtic areas of northern Italy, France and Belgium) and Britain, but had to withdraw from Britain because of unrest in Gaul. Britain was not added to the Empire until AD 43. By AD 117 the mighty Romans ruled much of the ancient world.

Founders Reared By A Wolf

According to legend, Rome was founded in 753 BC by two brothers, Romulus and Remus. They had been brought up by a she-wolf who found them unharmed after they had been thrown in the River Tiber by their uncle. The wolf fed them on her milk and a woodpecker brought them food. They were then brought up by a shepherd and later founded the city of Rome at the place where they had been taken from the river. The city was built on seven hills, the Capitoline, the Aventine, the Esquiline, the Caelian, the Palantine, the Viminal and the Quirinal.

Hadrian's Wall

Emperor Hadrian ordered the building of the wall in the north of Britain as a symbol of Roman authority. It was also an attempt to stop tribes from the north raiding the Roman lands. Built by Roman soldiers, it probably took 16 years to complete. At every mile there was a fort staffed by at least eight soldiers. Between the forts were two turrets so the soldiers could keep a constant watch along the whole 120km (75 miles) of the wall.

Impress Your Friends and Family with a Frittata

Eggs are one of the healthiest and most versatile foods around, packed with protein, vitamins and other nutrients they can be cooked in a large variety of ways for breakfast, lunch or dinner. Impress your friends and family with this stylish Italian dish. It is delicious served with a tossed salad.

Italian Frittata with Spinach and Goats Cheese

This is another great continental way with Quality Assured Eggs

Serves 4

- 1-2 tablesp. oil
- 50g (2 oz) Quality Assured Bacon, diced
- 1 red pepper, de-seeded and chopped
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1-2 cloves garlic
- 2 handfuls spinach, finely chopped
- 8 Quality Assured Eggs
- 2 tablesp. basil, chopped



Salt and black pepper
75g-100g (3-4 oz) Goats Cheese, broken into pieces
To Cook

Mouth-watering Minestrone

THE homemade version of this tasty, famous and extremely healthy Italian soup is a delicious revelation.

Ingredients:
Serves 4

- 1 large leek, thinly sliced
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 1 zucchini, thinly sliced
- 100g whole green beans, halved
- 2 celery sticks, thinly sliced
- 3 x 15ml sp olive oil
- 1.75 litres of vegetable stock or water
- 500g chopped tomatoes
- 1 x 15ml sp chopped fresh thyme or 1/2 x 5ml sp dried thyme
- 400g can cannellini beans
- 250g small pasta shapes
- Salt
- Ground black pepper
- Chopped fresh parsley
- Finely grated parmesan

cheese
Method:
In a large saucepan, place the olive oil, leek, carrots, zucchini, green beans and celery. Heat until sizzling. Cover, lower heat and cook for 15 minutes, shaking the pan occasionally.
Add the stock or water, tomatoes, herbs and seasoning. Bring to the boil, replace the lid and simmer gently for 30 minutes.
Add the beans and their liquid together with the pasta and simmer for a further 10 minutes.
Check the seasoning and serve hot, sprinkled with fresh parsley and parmesan cheese, if desired.
TIP: Try to make the Minestrone a day early and refrigerate, as this improves the flavours.

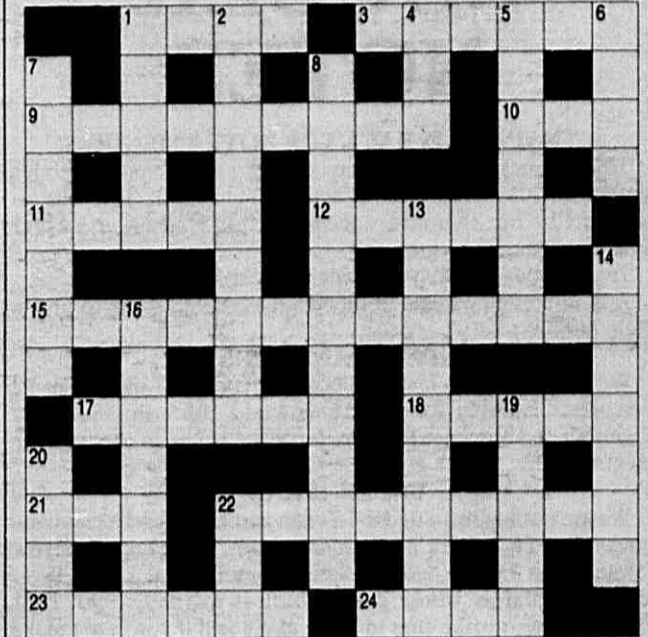
Rich Scottish Chocolate Cake

A RICH Scottish recipe for a chocolate sandwich cake with a difference.
Ingredients:
Makes 20cm cake
Butter for greasing
Flour for dusting
FOR SPONGE:
175g plain flour
50g cocoa powder
2 x 15ml sp black treacle
2 medium eggs
1 x 5ml sp baking powder
1 x 5ml sp bicarbonate of soda
75g caster sugar
150ml milk
150ml vegetable oil
FOR FILLING:
75g plain chocolate, crumbled
25g butter, cubed
150ml double cream, lightly whipped
Icing sugar for dusting

Method:
Preheat the oven to 170°C/325°F/ Gas Mark 3.
Butter and flour two 20cm cake tins.
Whisk the sponge ingredients together and divide between the two tins.
Bake for 30-35 minutes.
Let the cake stand for 10 minutes then turn out on to wire racks until quite cool.
For the filling, melt the chocolate in a bowl over a saucepan of hot water.
Stir in the cubes of butter until melted.
Leave to cool then spread on top of one cake layer.
Top with double cream then second sponge.
Dust with icing sugar.
Serve cool with fresh strawberries on the side for a rich and succulent treat.

Health Tips from "Remedies"

CHELIDONIUM

USES: Common warts, Verrucae.

This herb has been used traditionally for the treatment of warts. The juice of the plant is simply applied to the affected area of the skin.
HOW IT WORKS: Warts are caused by an infection of the skin by the human papilloma virus. This infection causes cells in the skin to multiply, giving rise to the characteristic lump seen. Verrucae are simply common warts found on the feet.
Chelidonium contains alkaloids with anti-viral activity. One of these, Benzophenanthridine, has been shown to possess the ability to damage and kill wart viruses. Another, known as Chelidonine, slows down the proliferation of infected skin cells. Available at . . .

Hobby that can pay for itself!

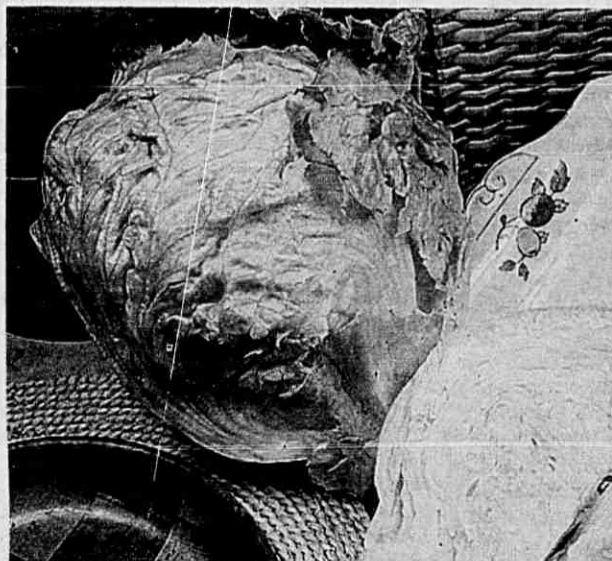
GARDENING is one of the fastest-growing leisure activities. It's relaxing, healthy, enjoyable and offers a great opportunity to be creative. And unlike most other leisure activities it doesn't have to cost the earth. In fact, it can actually save you money! People have been growing their own food for thousands of years. The ornamental garden as we know it today - full of flowers, shrubs and water features - is a relatively new invention. Up until earlier this century most "gardens" were productive plots, a source of vegetables, fruit and herbs to feed the family in the days before 24/7 supermarkets. And today, as consumers become more and more conscious of issues such as genetic engineering and chemical pesticides, "growing your own" is going through a huge revival. You don't need a big plot to generate a healthy supply of vegetables. Even a window box can be a source of summer salad crops such as radish, spring onions or even lettuce. And modern hybrids mean the tiniest of gardens can now house apple, plum and pear trees offering generous crops of tasty, fresh fruit. Even if growing vegetables doesn't appeal to you, it is possible to add interest to your garden and flavour to your food by growing fresh herbs in a window box, just like Jamie Oliver! Sage, tarragon, parsley, mint and thyme all look good, taste good - and take virtually no effort to tend. Here are some useful tips:

VEGETABLES
Growing vegetables may seem time-consuming compared to conventional modern gardening - but many varieties require very little attention once the soil is prepared and the seeds are sown. Among the easiest to grow are early potatoes, peas, beans, tomatoes and celery. One way to save time and effort is to plant them in situ rather than starting them under cover. This may mean you miss out on early crops - but it will still give you a good supply of fresh vegetables throughout the summer and into the autumn and winter. Early potatoes are harvested young and so are less prone to disease and require less tending. Dwarf varieties of peas and beans grow to no more than 60cm and do not need staking or training. Bush varieties of tomato also save time and effort because they do not need to be tied and supported. Self-blanching celery is an "easy care" vegetable if it is planted in blocks, with no more than 20cm between each plant.

FRUIT
Many modern gardens are quite small and the key to successful fruit growing is to make a small space highly productive. By choosing the right varieties and planting carefully you can grow as much as 25kg of fruit in less than the space it would take for a row of runner beans. Modern varieties can be planted as little as 45cm apart. Column-grown trees such as the popular Ballerina varieties form small towers

decked with gorgeous fruit, occupying only a tiny area of your garden. A good garden centre will be able to offer expert advice on what is best for your particular circumstances.

HERBS
Herbs have added taste to food since Roman times. Nine out of 10 originate from the Mediterranean and therefore thrive in sunny spots - although most are fairly hardy and will survive in any soil. They make an ideal addition to a garden because almost all herbs add colour, interest and a pleasant scent, regardless of whether you plan to use them in your cooking.

This week in the garden

Ripen off onions
Onions from January and March sowings will now be approaching ripeness, and you can hasten this by bending over the leaves just above the neck of each bulb.

Pot winter-flowering begonias
If you were able to root cuttings of winter-flowering begonias in late winter, the plants should now be about ready for potting on into their flowering pots. Cut back violas and pansies for propagation. It is an excellent idea to cut back a few plants of any good violas and pansies you may have with a view to encouraging basal growth which will provide cuttings next month. Scissor off the present-flowering shoots to within 2.5cm of the roots. Then scatter a little fine soil mixed with sand and sifted leaf mould over the plants.

Sow cyclamen
It's possible to raise cyclamen from seed sown very early in the year and the plants will flower the following winter, but the best results are obtained by sowing about the middle of August. Keep the seedlings growing steadily through the autumn, winter, spring and summer so they make fine big combs for flowering the following autumn and winter.

Take pelargonium cuttings
You can take cuttings of both zonal and ivy-leaved bedding pelargoniums (geraniums) at any time during August. Choose shoots 10 to 13cm long that are not carrying flowers. Cut them cleanly just below a joint and insert the cuttings around the edge of well-drained pots filled with sandy compost. The cuttings will root quickly if you give them a little shade in and sheltered corner, indoors or out.

Continue to remove faded flowers and runners
Throughout August continue to remove faded flowers from roses and bedding and herbaceous plants.

DISABILITY AWARENESS

ADDISON DISEASE

What is Addison Disease?

Addison Disease is a hormonal (endocrine) disability, involving the destruction of the adrenal glands (small glands close to the kidneys). For people that have been diagnosed with Addison disease, the diseased glands can no longer produce sufficient adrenal hormones (specifically cortisol) necessary for the normal daily body functions body. Addison disease affects both men and women and all age groups.

How does Addison disease occur?

Addison disease occurs when the adrenal glands do not produce enough of the hormone cortisol and in some cases, the hormone aldosterone. The hormone cortisol is normally produced by the adrenal glands. The adrenal glands are located just above the kidneys. Cortisol belongs to a class of hormones called glucocorticoids, which affect the normal function of almost every organ and tissue in the body. Cortisol's most important job is to help the body respond to stress. Among its other vital tasks, cortisol also helps to maintain blood pressure and heart function, helps slow the immune systems inflammation response, helps balance the effects of insulin in breaking down sugar for energy, and finally helps regulate the metabolism of proteins, carbohydrates and fats.

What are the signs and symptoms of Addison disease?

The signs and symptoms of Addison disease usually develop very slowly, often over several months, and may include the following:

- Muscle weakness and fatigue
- Weight loss and decreased appetite
- Low blood pressure and fainting
- Abdominal pains accompanied by indigestion, vomiting or bowel problems
- Joint and muscle aches
- Persistent fever
- Low blood sugar

Sometimes the symptoms of Addison disease appear suddenly, and in acute adrenal failure, the signs and symptoms may include, pain in the lower back, abdomen or legs, severe vomiting leading to dehydration, low blood pressure.

Treatment and Diagnosis

A diagnosis is usually made by taking the persons medical history any signs and symptoms, if the medical professional believes that the person may have Addison disease, then some of the following tests may be carried out.

- Blood test (This will measure the blood levels of sodium, potassium, cortisol and ACTH).
- ACTH stimulation test (this test involves measuring the level of cortisol in the blood before and after an injection of synthetic ACTH. ACTH signals the adrenal glands to produce cortisol).
- Insulin-induced hypoglycemia test
- Imaging test

An early diagnosis of Addison disease will include treatment such as Corticosteroids (because the body is not producing sufficient steroid hormones, a doctor may prescribe one or more hormones to replace the deficiency. Another treatment is Supplemental Sodium, which is a low-sodium diet or diuretics. The outlook for this disability is that once a person has been diagnosed, they should always carry identification stating their condition in case of an emergency. Bee Notes



We all know from listening to Billie Holiday "What a little moonlight can do". Well now we know what a little sunshine can do to for our apiaries and their honey production. A few good weeks of warm sunshine and high temperatures towards the end of July has turned what at one time looked like a paltry harvest into a respectable one. And as I write just now the sun shines yet again so our bees should be getting to the remainder of the blackberry. Our thoughts will be turning to harvest and extraction so good luck to you all. For our new members and others interested the Association is now in possession of a radial 9 frame extractor, so to book your turn ring 058 53508.

To continue on our observations of seasonal changes in the flowering of various of our honey plants it cannot have escaped anybody's attention that the heather is flowering unseasonably early this year. I decided to avail myself of a kind offer from a fellow beekeeper to move some bees to his source of heather in the vicinity of Mount Mellary. Now I have mixed experience of moving bees and the operation never seems to pass without incident. I have had hives overturn inside a VW Van (in which case one puts on one's veil and continues driving to one's destination) but often have only had to listen to the agitated sound from inside the hives. On this occasion I got an upcoming beekeeper to give me a lift with the hives in question which were firmly strapped for transport and off we went along the twisty roads. When we reached

our spot the hives had separated and a certain amount of minupulation was required to carry the two hives to the required spot. And of course it is always difficult to find level ground when one is looking for it. The job done my companion voiced a certain disappointment that he had not been stung under the operation....being part of the initiation rites, so to speak. I just left with the feeling that the weather had better be good for the next few weeks so as not to made the operation a futile one. The signs are that the heather is outstanding this year. Let us hope.

I should like to hear from colleagues about their experience of wasps this year. The little b..... have already raided one of my nuc boxes and decimated the bees inside. I know that queen breeders suffer great losses each year when wasps overrun their breeding boxes (which are small and defenseless) but taking on a nuc is a different story. We shall all have our extraction premises put to the test soon to find out how bee and wasp tight they are.

The next big event on the beekeeping calender is Apmondia 2005 the International Apicultural Congress to be held in The R.D.S. in Dublin 21 st - 26th this month. I hope as many of you as possible have made plans to visit as this is a unique opportunity. Normally these events (which, like the Olympics, happen every fourth year) are held in far distant places and require air travel and all that entails.

Economise at Home

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION: Could you please tell me who is eligible for the Back to Education Allowance?

ANSWER: The Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) is paid by the Department of Social, and Family Affairs (DSFA) to unemployed people, lone parents and people with disabilities who wish to do approved second or third level courses of education. To be eligible for the allowance you must be:

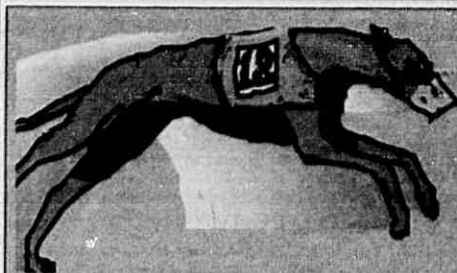
- Aged 21 or over (24 or over for a postgraduate course) and for the previous 6 months* have been receiving a social welfare payment such as Unemployment Assistance/Benefit or One-Parent Family Payment.
- Aged 18 or over and for the previous 6 months* have been receiving a disability payment such as Disability Allowance or Invalidity Pension.
- In receipt of Disability Benefit for at least 3 years. * Aged 18 to 20, out of formal education for 2 years, and for the previous 6 months* have been receiving One-Parent Family Payment or Unemployment Assistance/Benefit.
- It is 12 months for a third level course from September 2005. Periods spent on employment schemes, training courses and in prison may count towards the qualifying period. If you are eligible, your spouse/partner may qualify providing you are getting a Qualified Adult Allowance for them with your payment.

Courses you can attend include full-time second level courses certified by the Department of Education and Science, or approved by the Further Education and Training Awards Council (FETAC) or the Business and Technology Education Council (BTEC), such as the Leaving Certificate or a Post Leaving Certificate course. Also eligible are full-time third level courses approved by the Department for its maintenance grant schemes or which have Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) recognition.

When you have been accepted for a course you should apply to DSFA for the allowance on Form BTE 1. You will be paid the allowance instead of your social welfare payment at a rate equivalent to the maximum of your current social welfare payment. If you were previously getting an unemployment payment, the BTEA will not be paid during the summer period between academic years. Those who had been receiving other payments will continue to receive the BTEA during the summer. You are entitled to a Cost of Education Allowance (€400 in September 2005) at the start of each academic year.

Lisnakill Benjie gave chase down the back stretch but Sparta Tina stayed on stoutly for a cosy four lengths success in 29.18.

Sparta Ace a full brother to Sparta Tina was all the rage in the sixth contest and this 4/5 favourite did not disappoint whizzing around in a blistering fastest of night 28.68. Dashing into an early lead from trap four the much improved Sparta Ace was never in any subsequent danger romping to a five and a half lengths success over Distant Smurf.

In the opening novice event the Gail Turner owned Ina Cooper Tara (Larkhill Jo-Almost Deadly) 3/1 made a swift exit from trap three to lead all the way in 29.35. Fairbrook Sarah kept on well to fill the runner up spot but this was Ima Cooper Tara's night as she dug deep close home to win out by a length.

Blanco the 6/4 favourite made a smart exit from trap five in race two but it was Baby Buk who turned the opening two bends in front. In third spot early on the Peter Hattemore owned Chaotic Trooper (Mossbawn Whisper-Kilkenny Lass) 3/1 displayed plenty of back stretch pace and easing his way to the front on the rails at the third bend Chaotic Trooper went on to run out a four lengths winner over Blanco in 29.46.

Race three produced a 3/1 winner as Kevin Fogarty's Sooty Lark (Larkhill Jo-Cooladine Sooty) 3/1 improved considerably on his 30.90 trial on July 12th to open his account in 29.40. When Fairbrook Jane and Baby Buk appeared to hamper one another rounding the first turn Sooty Lark dashed into the lead on the inside and while Fairbrook Jane ran on again at the finish Sooty Lark held out by a length and a half.

Gorey trainer John Dunne was on the mark in the seventh race as the PM Dwyer and David Kennedy owned Smooth Davy (Mustang Yank-Ashwood Trudy) 3/1 made every post a winning one in a best ever 29.02. A flying exit from trap two saw Smooth Davy kick clear of Ruths Hero and Lisahane Nikita and with this order of running remaining unchanged Smooth Davy came home one and a half lengths clear of Ruths Hero.

In a novice 730-yard contest the James Phelan owned Jays Sky (Droopys Vieri-Jays Lassa) took to the six bend trip like a duck to water taking this event at her leisure in a smart 41.13. Having shaken off the early challenge of Laughing Cider it was plain sailing thereafter for July 03 whelp Jays Sky as this well supported evens favourite coasted to a four lengths winning margin over Bin Weevil.

The concluding four races were heats of the Fieldmaster 29.50 event where trainer Declan Byrne sent out the first two heat winners in the shape of Ballingara Star (Droopys Woods-Starrie Plough) 2/1 and Khayeltisha (Honcho Classic-Dream On Jo) 2/1. Ballingara Star drove up the inside of the long time leader Point Three at the third bend before galloping on to an easy two lengths win over Point Three in 29.44. The winner is owned by Jimmy Skehan and well known horse trainer Pat Flynn.

The strapping Khayeltisha running for Carlow owner Sean Ralph ran a similar race to his kennel mate to capture heat two in 29.00. Led down to the penultimate bend by Good Hare Day Khayeltisha barged his way to the front on the fence before coming out on top by a length.

Larkhill Island set the early gallop in heat three bit the complexion of this qualifier altered in the latter half of this race as a wide running Dairyland Rumble (Smooth Rumble-Nikitas Song) 3/1 swooped into the lead on the wide outside before drawing clear up the home stretch for owner Peter Cronin to beat the always prominent Cassies Pride by five lengths in a smart 28.79.

Hear four produced a close finish with the Danny Kane owned Clais Alainn (Spiral Nikita-Stepaside Rose) 5/2 taking over at the head of affairs on the back stretch from the fast starting Nestorenko before holding at bay the late surge of Vigilant Amy who tasted defeat by half a length in 29.00.

In a graded 550 yard contest Umeras Joy 6/4 and Geneva Girl 3/1 engaged in a battle royal up front with victory in the end going to the Richard Walsh owned Umeras Joy (Glideaway Flash-Rough Beauty) in 30.34. Geneva Girl came away running from a middle draw but was joined and passed on the rails by Umeras Joy on the back stretch. Geneva Girl came back for more however over the final two bends and in a driving finish Umeras Joy held out to triumph by the narrowest of margins.

Race thirteen was a lucky number for the Aidan Roche owned Kingsmill Nikita (Spiral Nikita-Its Awesome) as this 3/1 chance after

numerous placed efforts finally got off the mark. Kingsmill Nikita certainly did it in style on this occasion as she glided past Sara Dara and Clonbonny Cross at the entrance to the back stretch before going clear for a facile six lengths defeat of Clonbonny Cross in a speedy winning time of 28.67.

An unlucky loser on his previous outing at this track the Noel Germaine and Sean McCann owned and Brian McCann trained Haliska Blueboy (Smooth Rumble-Haliska Margaret) 3/1 made amends in no uncertain fashion literally destroying the opposition in this 550 yard contest in a red hot time of 29.76. Haliska Blueboy tracked cleverly out of the second bend as he ducked back inside a wide running Dudley Diouf. It has been an unforgettable year for the Ballinamult youngster now regarded as one of Ireland's bright athletic hopes of the future. Coming off a most successful cross country season having won Munster and All Ireland schools titles and also having much International success all looked promising for the track season. Once again here David didn't disappoint. David competed in February in Nenagh in the Senior Mens Indoors Championships and here the youngster showed a clean pair of heels to his more senior competitors taking gold in the 1,500 metres.

Having kicked his outdoors track season off to a superb start at the Munster Junior Track and Field Championships by taking the title in fantastic fashion with his trade mark front running he set a new Munster standard of 1.53.4 over 800 metres. Two weeks later he took up an invitation, to participate in the British Milers Club meet in Watford and here he won his graded race over the 800 metres distance again. It was back to schools competition on the track in June for the All-Ireland's and David competing for his College St. Augustine's, Abbeyside, recorded an unique double when winning the 400 metres and 800 metres.

Next stop was an International meet in Germany when David was chosen on the Irish team to compete over 800 metres he finishes a very creditable 2nd in a top class field and set himself a new personal best over the distance of 1.51.22. In July the month which he won the Park Hotel Award, saw him again picked on the Irish team for the European Youth Olympics in Italy, here David was to show what a class athlete he really is having come through the heats easily. All the top young athletes in Europe were all through to the final. The race turned out to be a real battle between David and a German athlete with nothing separating the two at the line. The gold medal was decided on the photo with the German just shading it by the narrowest of margins. A silver for David, without doubt his biggest achievement to date, just home one day from Italy, it was pack the bags again and off to Marrakech where David was picked again for his country to compete in the World Youth Games over 800 metres, drawn in a very slow heat on the day David missed out on the final by 100th of a second but nevertheless gained much experience at this level and have no doubt will be back on this stage in the future.

The above are just some of the highlights of his season to date, all at the club are proud of his achievements and we congratulate him on his second Park Hotel award.

The race starts from the 1798 Monument in the town and is preceded by a non competitive walk over 5k with spot prizes galore for all.

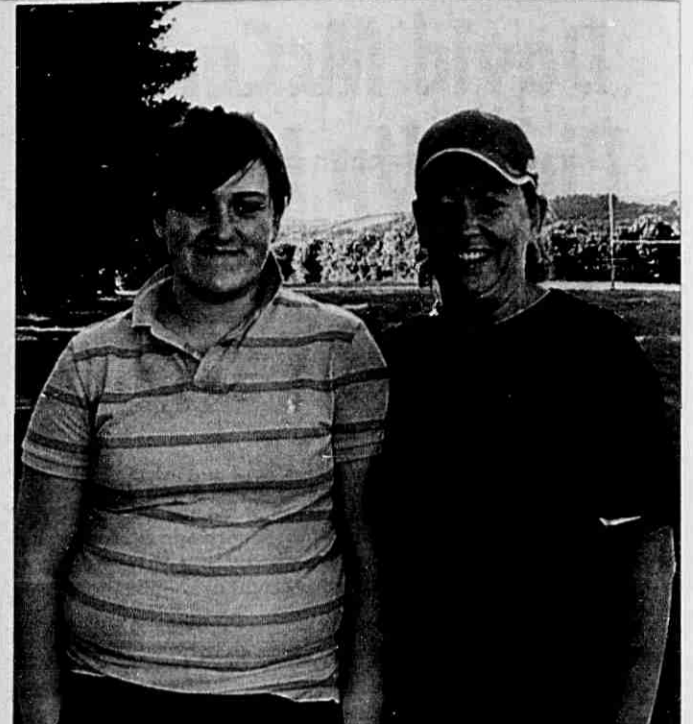

Niamh Coffey returned home from the recent European Racquetball Championships in Hamburg with an impressive haul of 3 gold medals. This was an outstanding achievement for the 19 year old and it means that she is now the proud owner of 4 European and 10 National gold medals.

Along with Geraldine Byrne (Arklow), Elma Gibney (Moyleagh) and Susan Neary (Arklow), Niamh was part of the Irish team that finished as European team champions for the second consecutive time. It meant that they retained the title that they won in Zoetermeer, Holland, 2 years ago. In the semi-final, they defeated the home team, Germany which included the highly rated Yvonne Kortés. A 3-0 victory for the Irish secured a final spot against the French team that were highly fancied to take the title at the start of the tournament.

An 11-10 victory for Susan Neary in the tie-breaker against Marie-Josée Collet set the ball rolling for the Irish. Elma Gibney then secure a straight games win over Nathalie Raphanel before Niamh teamed up with Geraldine Byrne to take the third match and the overall title.

Niamh's second gold came in the 18+under grade which was played on a round robin system. The game between herself and her compatriot, Ailish Gibney decided the destiny of the title and in the end it was one way traffic as Niamh stepped up the pressure and finished very strongly.

The third gold came in the Open Doubles grade where Niamh teamed up with Elma Gibney as she did earlier in the year to win the National Open Doubles title. They got a tough draw but came through to win in an amazing finish. In the quarter final, they played the French duo, Collet and Raphanel. It was score for score right to the death. 11-8 was the score in the deciding tie-breaker and next up was a semi-final appearance against the German's, Yvonne Kortés and Renate Hartmann.

The German's played the tactic of playing Kortés in the front of the court which suited the Irish duo and especially Niamh as she was able to send direct passing shots down the left. The German's were slow to react to this and when they did change, it was too late as Niamh and Elma were well on their way to the final encounter.

The final was an all Irish affair with Susan Neary (Arklow) and Bernie Comerford (O'Loughlins) providing the opposition. The Touraneena/Moyleagh duo drew first blood securing the opening game. The opposition however didn't throw in the towel and levelled up the match at a game each and another tie-breaker to 11 beckoned to see who became European Champions. 2 years ago it was Elma and Susan that teamed up to win the title but this time they were in opposition. Niamh and Elma had a nightmare start and quickly found themselves 7-1 down with time running out. Niamh then started to hit some brilliant passes down the right which were stuck to the wall and virtually impossible to return. Slowly but surely, they clawed their way back in the game but again the opposition regained the initiative and were serving for the Championship at 10-7.

It was then that Elma produced the shot of the tournament under the maximum of pressure. She pinched in the right hand corner from three-quarter court to regain the serve. If she missed the match was over but a super shot meant it rolled out. 2 more winning shots

each from Elma and Niamh meant that they were the new European Champions and they couldn't have done it in more exciting fashion. It crowned off a super tournament and super season for Niamh.

She also participated in the Open singles where the possibility of a fourth gold was always there. In the opening round, she defeated Renate Hartmann in straight games and then drew Bernie Comerford in the quarter final. Niamh had beaten Bernie on 3 occasions on the National circuit but this time it wasn't to be. The match lasted an hour and forty minutes. It was a match that things just simply would not work for Niamh, passing shots were too high and kill shots were skipping. She will however be happy with her overall haul and hopefully in 2 years time, she will be back to take that singles title in Paris.

Julie Skehan won her first European medal when she took the bronze in the 18+under grade. Considering, Julie was unable to dedicate much time to her game over the second half of the season due to her study commitments, she will be happy with this. She also played in the Open singles and Open Doubles grades. In the Doubles, she teamed up with Templederry's Helen Shanahan and gave a great display against the German's Kortés and Hartmann. Although victory eluded them, scoring 11 in both games against such opposition will give them great confidence for the future.

In the singles, Julie was drawn against her compatriot, Elma Gibney. Elma is currently ranked number 2 in Ireland so Julie was really up against it. Julie however produced one of her best ever performances and made her opponent work for every score. Victory went to the Meath woman but 13 in both games shows how close it was to be an upset. Julie can feel well pleased with her performances and we all look forward to seeing her back on the National circuit again next season.

Triston Hickey was part of the Men's team that were hoping to win 3 team titles in a row. Noel O'Callaghan (O'Loughlins), Joe Farrell (Arklow) and Liam Hughes (Fermoy) were his team mates. This time, it wasn't to be for the Irish as they went on to finish in fourth place. Injuries to Noel and Joe didn't help their cause but the quality of the opposition was extremely high also.

A very good German team are the new Champions while Austria finished in second place. England went on to finish in third place with the Irish finishing just outside the medals.

In the singles event, Triston was drawn in the toughest quarter of the draw but was still well capable of coming through it. In the opening round, he overcame the Polish number one, Peter Rakowski after a tough encounter. This set up a match with the highly fancied Ralf Lysakowski from Austria. The speed of the game was unnatural, played in 30 degrees of dead heat. The Austrian took the opener but in typical fashion, Triston fought back to force a tie-breaker. Again the Austrian forced the pace in the decider and despite Triston's best efforts; it wasn't to be as Lysakowski ran out an 11-6 victor.

In the doubles, Triston teamed up with Liam Hughes only to meet the Austrian Lysakowski brothers, Jan and Ralf again. The Irish duo just couldn't get the rub of the green but still fought to the bitter end.

Overall, it was a very successful Championship for the Irish particularly at Junior and overage levels as well as the women's grades. In total, 8 titles and the Women's team title came back to Ireland. The final of the men's singles saw Germany's Joachim Loof win his 7th European singles title. It's worth noting that Triston beat him in the quarter finals of the German Open earlier in the season so he is not too far off the pace.

Fielding without four of their regulars, Ardmore had to give best to favourites, Rathgormack in what might be described as a bruising encounter at Fraher field on Sunday afternoon. In a rather unusual situation, the eastern team succeeded in winning despite the fact that they failed to raise a single white flag throughout the second half. Apart from being understrength, Ardmore will bemoan their inaccurate shooting for points and the cost of having a total of ten misses as against seven for the winners. Also Ardmore had far too many miss-directed passes that proved costly in a number of cases.

PLAY

A Joe Murray goal in the opening minute gave Rathgormack the ideal start and after

the same player added a point from play, Ardmore, per James O'Donnell opened their account with a minor.

Then followed a burst of scoring that effectively sealed the issue for Rathgormack when full forward Edmond Hogan scored a goal and 2 points without reply to leave them 8 points clear (2-3 to 0-1) after 17 minutes. Hogan increased the lead further with a well taken point in the 20th minute before James O'Donnell had Ardmore's first point from play in the 23rd. minute. The next stage of the game saw Ardmore goalkeeper Damien Lenane bring off a magnificent save from a close in shot by Edmond Hogan.

Michael Crotty and James O'Donnell exchanged points.

Richie Power (28th minute) and Edmond Hogan in the 29th minute had Rathgormack's final scores of the first half and in fact, their final scores of the entire game.

The half ended with James O'Donnell scoring a goal and a point (he kicked all the Ardmore scores of 1-4) to leave the halfway tally at 2-7 to 1-4.

SECOND HALF

A point by Johnnie Hennessey in the opening minute and followed with two James O'Donnell points, gave renewed hope to Ardmore supporters and with just a goal between the sides and Ardmore playing better football, having reorganized their team, it looked as if the western challengers would win or a draw would result, but amazingly the game went for a further 15 minutes without a score from either team and left Ardmore facing a relegation situation.

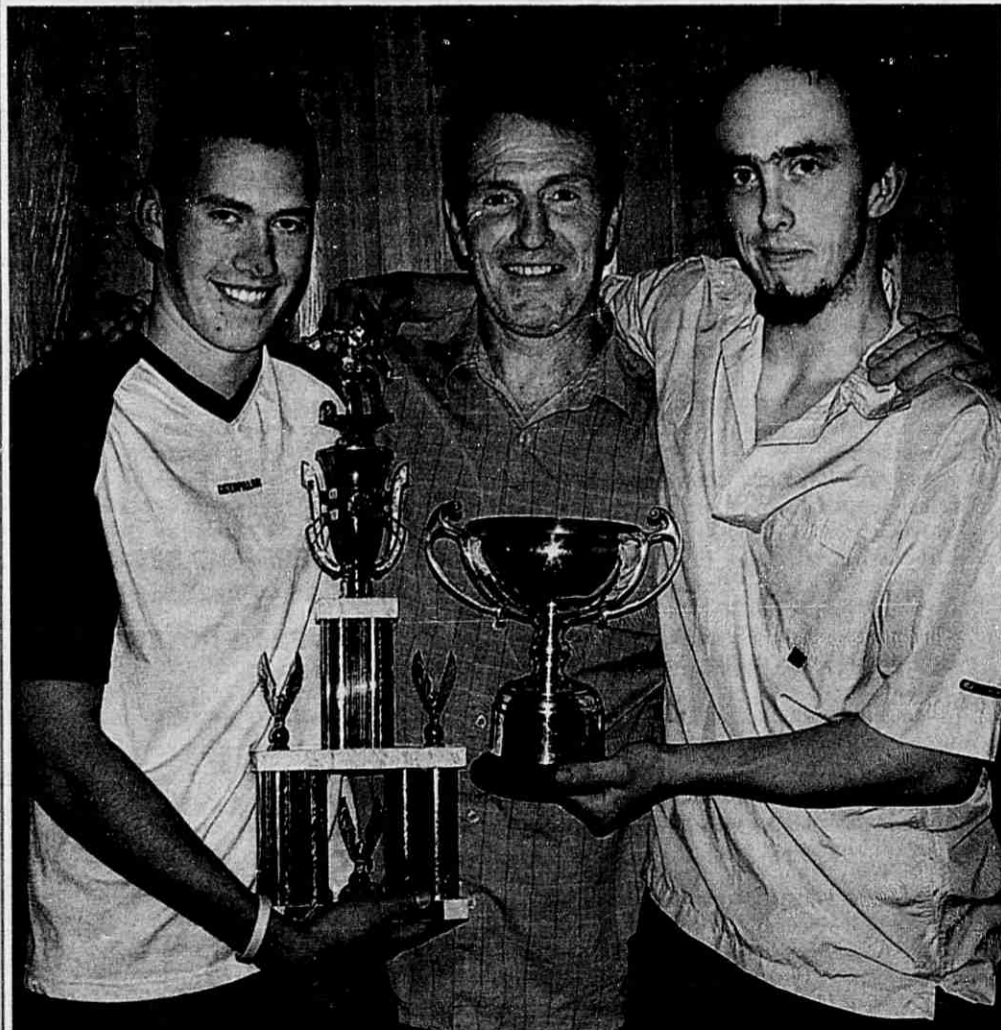

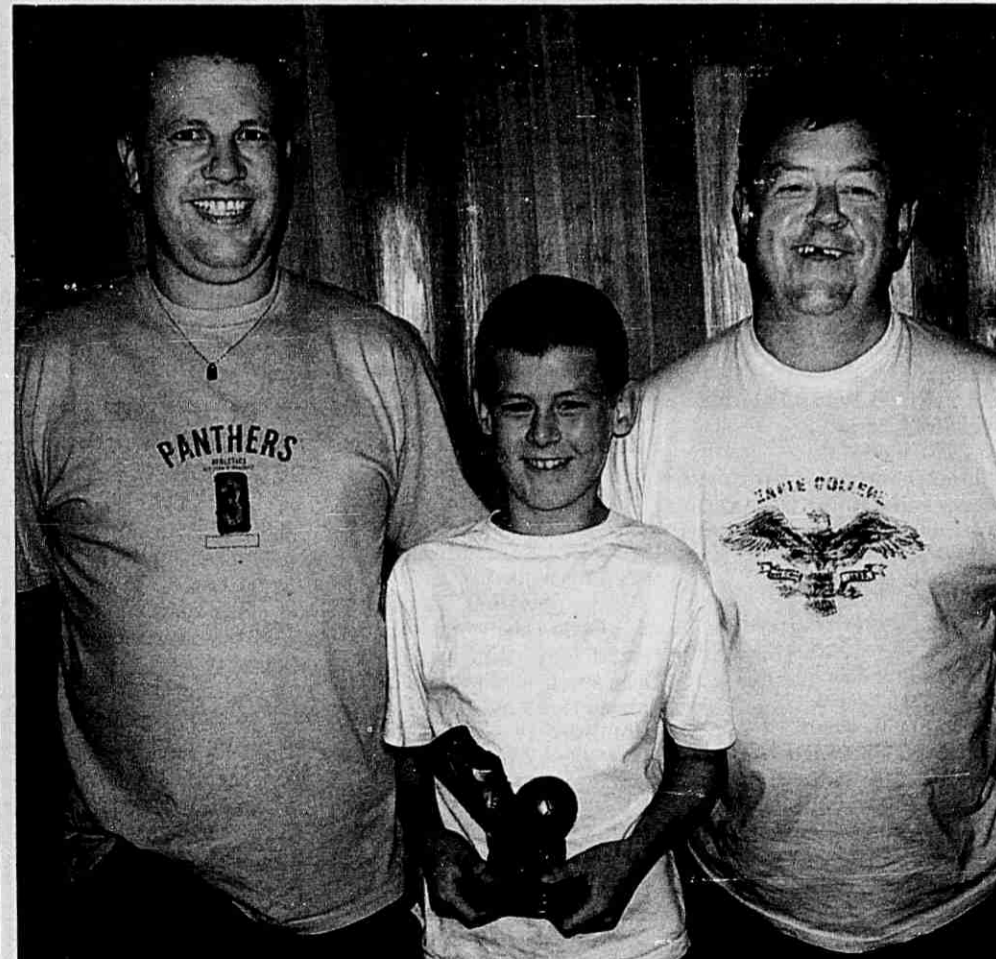

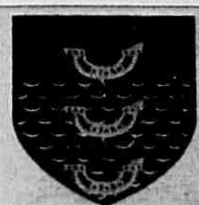

SECTION 75 ROADS ACT 1993

Roads to be Closed:

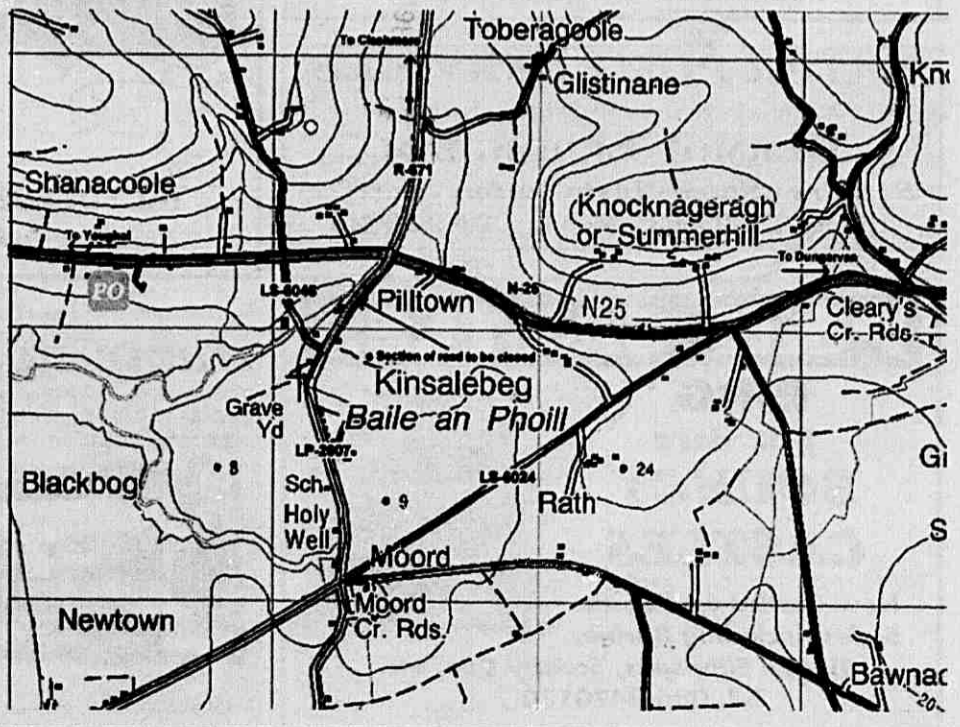

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
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
