It follows Minister Noel Dempsey's decision to grantaid Ardmore Technologies for the roll-out of the broadband network, and is the culmination of months of behind the scenes

The blackout occurred at 3.40pm forcing businesses to close as a security precaution.

While the exact cause of the blackout was not known yesterday, it's thought a digger working in the Shandon area, may have struck a cable during construction work.

A spokesperson for the ESB said a switch in its 38kV station was tripped resulting in the outtage.

Residents in the Shandon area, however, reported hearing a loud bang close to where

construction workers were digging at the time.

The ESB apologised to all their customers who were affected for the inconvenience caused.





Faster Internet Access On Way For Tallow Area

Waterford Fianna Fáil TD Ollie Wilkinson has said rural communities in Tallow and surrounding areas are soon to get instant internet access as part of the Government's push to connect low-population areas to the digital age. The Dungarvan-based Fianna Fáil TD said the broadband service provider, Ardmore Technologies, has been offered grant aid to part-fund the roll-out of a broadband network in the Tallow area.

The Tallow Enterprise Group had made a strong case to the Department of Communications, Marine and Natural Resources touting the region as a prime lo-cation for investment in broadband access.

I am delighted the Government heeded that case and I pay tribute to the Tallow Enterprise Group's hard work. Both households and small industries will soon have instant access to the internet for an affordable flat-rate monthly fee,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

He explained that the County and Group Broadband Scheme brings broadband access to a wide range of communities and ensures that even the most remote areas can compete equally with our major towns and cities.

The new access should spur more companies to invest in Waterford and ordinary householders will get fast and affordable internet access without taking up the regular telephone line,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

Waterford's broadband projects is among 43 announced by the Department of Communications, Marine and Natural Resources. Grant aid of over €2.9 million has so bar been approved for projects under the scheme.



Register Figures In

There was a slight fall in the numbers signing on in Dungarvan over the past year, figures compiled by the Central Statistics Office show. However, in the last month, eighty-six more people were recorded on the Live Register than there were in June.

In a year on year analysis, which includes part-time and seasonal workers, there was a decline of forty-six people signing on in Dungarvan, the figures show.

In July 2004, 1030 were on the Live Register; this fell to 896 in July of this year or an annual fall of 46.

More males than females were also on the register.

These included 88 males under the age of twenty-five, and 427 who are twenty-five years of age and older. This contrasted with 72 females under twenty-five and 395 twenty-five years and older.

On a month by month basis, a sharp increase was recorded. The July figure of 982 was 86 more than signed on in June.







Can you Reduce Meal Costs this Winter

With our new found 'freedom to farm' comes the challenge of being able to survive in a more market driven industry. Like it or not things will change and we will need to evolve our systems to keep pace. As we move closer to another winter our aim should be to firstly keep this expensive feeding period as short as possible and to see how to we can reduce meal costs. There is huge variation across the country in what individuals are paying and will pay for rations. For some the norm will be 180-200+/tonne while others will hope to aim around the 130-140/tonne mark. Compounders seem to be suggesting at this stage that ration costs may be up by 5-10/t this year on last years prices. If you can buy and handle straights these generally offer the greatest potential savings on meal costs. Where barley or wheat can be bought off the combine you are getting an excellent feedstuff at good value. Indications at present suggest that barley may trade at 95-100/t off the combine, treating and rolling will add another

25-30/t to overall cost. By balancing cereals for protein and adding minerals on the silage you can keep your ration costs nearer the 150/t.

The Weanling Dilemma

The tumbling beef price that we have seen in recent weeks has filtered back to lower prices in the marts for stores and weanlings. Admittedly, weanling numbers at marts have been small, so far, but for those that have been sold 200-300 with the weight have held most bull weanlings. Given this sort of price a 300kg bull weanling would be worth between 1.67 -2.00/kg liveweight.

This drop in price has provoked many thoughts amongst weanling producers. Some have suggested that they may not creep feed weanlings this back end. Others are contemplating holding them on to next spring.

Either way there are implications. Those of you considering selling weanlings even at current prices to cut out creep feeding is false economy. Never in the animal's lifetime is it so efficient at converting meal into liveweight. Typically Grange has shown that in this type of animal 4-5kg of meal will convert to 1kg of liveweight. Even with quite expensive ration there is still a return, not to mention the extra bloom the feeding will put onto these calves as grass supply and feed value diminishes into the autumn. The other payback is the obvious reduction in weaning stress experienced by calves already eating creep. Remember have your weanlings gain in excess of 1-1.2kg /day while they are on the farm. Have them forward creep graze and feed them 1.5-2kg of ration per day in the six weeks prior to sale. If you want to save on meals try using trough feeding that way you can control intakes.

For those of you thinking of holding on to weanlings to next spring to try and catch a price rise ask yourself the following few questions. Have I enough accommodation to carry the extra stock? Is there adequate winter fodder available on the farm or will I need to buy in? How will this affect my cashflow and will it have any tax implications?

In order to carry this weanling through the winter you will require around 3.5t of silage and between 250-300kg of meal per head. Throw in the cost of a winter worm dose and you are looking at total of between 100-130/hd for feed and vet costs alone. Our experience has shown that weanling performance over their first vinter on many farms is at best only modest with many of the better farr's only achieving 0.6kg/day and the average farm only achieving 0.3kg/day. So think any decision through carefully.

The beef heifers will now be put on 3 - 3_ kgs of meal per head plus good grass and will be finished in 8 weeks. This will then leave a larger area of grazing ground for the replacement heifers and extend total days at grass.

Average August growth rates are around 55Kgs Dm/Ha/day (Range 35 - 70). This average growth rate exceeds demand by about 15% at 1 cow per acre (2.5 cows/Ha)



Continuing, Bill Shanahan said "this fall in production will have serious implications on the future of the Irish cereal industry and a consequent knock-on effect on the intensive livestock sectors. We will see an increased reliance on imports, greater price volatility and reduced security of supply. The reduced availability of arable spread land for pig, poultry and cattle manures will also have negative cost implications particularly for the pig and poultry sectors under the current proposed Nitrates Directive. The current cost of disposal of chicken litter is around 2.6c / bird, and this will increase substantially if the availability of spread land is reduced".

Concluding, the Waterford Grain Committee Chairman said "all non-agricultural sectors are capable of recouping increased costs from the market but farmers are being denied this opportunity. The globalisation of food production and the concentration of power in the hands of a few key traders is neither benefiting the consumer nor the primary producer. This fundamental issue needs to be addressed, but in the immediate term, farmers must be able to recoup the cost of production plus a margin to stay in business".

CONCERN ON PROGRESS ON HOSPITAL SERVICE

The delay in the transfer of surgical services to Clonmel means that the well documented Risk Management issues for both South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel and Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel continue to exist, claims, Breda Kavanagh, South Tipperary General Hospital Manager. In a statement issued recently Mrs. Kavanagh has said that while buildings on the Cashel site may have been completed, the transfer of surgical services to Clonmel has been hampered by lack of revenue funding for the Cashel services. The plan for these services emanates from the 1995 Cashel High Court Agreement which details the services to be developed on the site. The agreement also determines the number of posts to be provided on the site. But in her statement Mrs. Kavanagh has told us that although the buildings for Phase 1 have been completed Phase 2 of the Cashel project requires full possession of the current Our Lady's Hospital building to develop the services planned for Phase 2. All staff working in Our Lady's Hospital at the time of the agreement hold letters of comfort stating that there will be no loss of jobs in Our Lady's and no compulsory transfer of staff to Clonmel. However, said Mrs. Kavanagh it has been difficult to reach agreement on the transfer with the staff unions due to the lack of funding for the Cashel services. Negotiations are continuing on compensation claims submitted by staff unions. In the meantime South Tipperary General Hospital is being prepared for the amalgamation of services with the refurbishment of hospital departments that were outside the scope of the major building project including the enlargement of the hospital car park, the refurbishment of the Laboratory, Pharmacy, Paediatrics and the hospital restau-

Deneing flowers with gedfeitev baa seisegs opd varieties

They're big, they're bold, they're beautiful and their eye catching flowers will dance the summer away in your garden. Take a fresh look at the species and varieties of Hydrangea and you'll see lots of exciting possibilities for this plant. Hydrangeas are one of those plants which will work in lots of different situations and locations around the garden. As specimen plants, in a shrub border planted singly en masse. Perfect for pots and spot on if you want to brighten up a distant corner of the garden. If you have an uninspiring north facing wall which you need a knock-out plant to bring the space alive - there are Hydrangea species and varieties to help with the answer. Whether you are looking for a classic or more contemporary look the

in this country, and it's easy to see why. Hardy and requiring little maintenance, it delivers year after year, over a long flowering period from midsummer to late autumn. Hydrangea macrophylla is in fact divided into two categories. The most frequently encountered are the 'mopheads' or 'Hortensias'. These are the ones producing confident, dome-shaped blooms. 'Blue Bonnet' or 'Goliath' are examples. 'Lacecap' hydrangeas are a gorgeous alternative and their flowers truly dance. Clusters of lacy flowers 'float' across the plant shimmering in the summer breeze. The flowers are made up of two parts - an outer ring of showy florets and a central arrangement of small fertile flowers. Hydrangea 'Mariesii Perfecta' is a wonderful lacecap to look out for. Also known as 'Blue wave' it produces rich blue to mauve coloured flowers set against green leaves. For exquisite, creamy white flowers try

Hydrangea paniculata 'Floribunda' this plant flowers from late summer through to early autumn. For earlier flowers try 'Praecox'. For that North facing wall look out for Hydrangea petiolaris also with creamy white flowers.

Hydrangeas tend to do best in a sunny or partially shaded location. They like moist but well, drained soil. For plants with pink flowers an alkaline soil is needed, plants with blue flowers need an acid soil. Use a soil tester which you can get from your garden centre to ensure that you get the best results from your plant. Of course you can always plant your hydrangea in a container and create exactly the right soil conditions for it to thrive. Striking colours and dancing flowers are what it is all about in summer. For flexibility and choice check out the range of hydrangeas next time you are visiting your local garden centre.







MARATHON GLORY FOR RADCLIFFE

Paula Radcliffe claimed Great Britain's first gold medal of the 2005 World Championships after a comprehensive victory in the marathon in Helsinki. The world record holder crossed the finishing line in a new championship record time of two hours, 20 minutes and 57 seconds after injecting a stunning mid-race burst of speed. Radcliffe broke clear after around 17 miles to effectively wreck the hopes of rivals Catherine Ndereba and Constantina Tomescu-Dita, who were left to fight their own battle. Defending champion Ndereba, of Kenya, never posed a threat during the race but came through to get second. Tomescu-Dita, after bravely challenging Radcliffe, was broken by her burst and was overtaken by Ndereba. As world record holder, Radcliffe was pre-race favourite.

However, after her disaster in last summer's Olympic Games, she has realised that winning big city marathons like London and Boston is a different challenge from going for gold in a major championship. Ndereba, the defending champion and Olympic silver-medallist, was expected to pose a major threat along with Derartu Tulu. Radcliffe made her intentions clear by immediately hitting the front as the race got underway under way in dull and cool conditions and she quickly opened a 20-metre lead from a chasing pack over the first mile with only Japan's Yumiko Hara and Ethiopia's Ashi Gigi on her tail.

The pack was led by Tomescu-Dita, Ndereba and Tulu.Radcliffe was running well within herself and, with light rain beginning to fall, she continued to set a brisk pace with Hara and Gigi happy to continue their tracking. The trio passed the 10km mark in 33 mins. 23 secs. and an increase in speed saw Hellen Kimutai and Rita Jeptoo fall away. Tomescu-Dita's appearance in the leading pack and the subsequent increase in tempo as she ran alongside Radcliffe, saw Hara drift off the pace too. Then Gigi became another victim as the two top finishers in this year's London race, powered on into what was developing into a two-horse race. The Romanian, who set a national record and world over-35 best on that occasion, has been known to step on the gas too early in other championship races. Four years ago, after holding a two-minute lead at 20km, and two years ago in Paris, after holding a 10-second advantage at 12km, she fell back to 35th. Indeed, at 20km, athletes of all time.

Radcliffe had pulled a second clear in one hour, six minutes and 16 seconds with Kimutai back in the race and Ndereba only two seconds down, Radcliffe began to put her foot on the gas as she sped through the half distance in 1hr 9mins 49secs. A natural front runner, she started to gradually pull away around 17 miles in with a determined burst which really hurt the Romanian. The Briton passed 30km in 1hr 39mins 22secs with an 11 seconds lead over Tomescu-Dita after her break with Ndereba 16 seconds adrift. Radcliffe, well clear of the field, was flowing along the final few miles of the course. After driving up one final steep incline and going through 40km in 2:13:22, she held a lead of 47 seconds from Ndereba, and was in the closing stage of finally achieving a lifetime ambition.

This performance now hopefully will silence the many she was caught 15km further down the road in Edmonton critics of Radcliffe and she will now rightfully go down in the annals of Athletics history, as one of the finest Female

Local Angler May Have Reeled In A **National Record!**

A local angler may have landed a national record when he reeled in a 1.420 kg Gilthead Sea Bream in Dungarvan Bay.

David Power of Kilrush Park, Dungarvan caught the extremely rare fish on Sunday 7th of August, and now faces an anxious three to four month wait to see if his prize catch has also netted hima place in the record books.

"Two or three Gilthead Sea Bream were caught in Dungarvan in 2004 and a couple more this year. But nothing of this size," David said.


Indeed, the fish, which prior to 2003 was only caught twice in Irish waters (once in 1972 in Ard-

more), is not even listed in the Irish Book of Species.

Prior to 2003, the Gilthead Sea Bream was considered an extremely rare fish in Irish waters.

The Gilthead Sea Bream is primarily a sub-tropical species, common southwards from Biscay to the Cape Verde and Canary Islands, including the Mediterranean Sea where it is an important aquaculture species.

It is a shallow water species, inhabiting sea grass beds as well as sandy and muddy areas down to 30 metres. Its food is biased in favour of molluscs, especially mussels, oysters and crustaceans and it can be a pest to shellfish culture.



The concentration of 'clamping' of northern vehicles on that occasion certainly left a very bad taste.

What left a bad taste at last Sunday's game was the unsporting conduct of a portion of the Dublin supporters who continued booing Tyrone. First when the visitors ran out on the ground for the start of the game and also when frees were being taken by Tyrune. A lot of neutrals transferred their support on this account.

Another feature of the programme that did not go down well with the paying public was the decision to delay the start of the game for 15 minutes in order to accommodate late comers to the game. Thousands of Dublin supporters arrived at the gates only minutes before the scheduled starting time of 3.30 p.m.

It was a super day for racing and this was another reason why such a fine crowd turned up at the Tramore Race Course for the annual benefit night to raise money for their holiday. Most of the county players were present and mingled with the crowd

While it is not race course policy to announce financial returns in such cases, it is thought that a fair amount was raised (but not as much as last year) and that the holiday fund will benefit considerably.

While there has been no official announcement from the County Board on the matter, it is expected that the county hurling panel may again travel away on a holiday this year. There may be news of this at the September meeting of the senior board.

Outrage As Two-Hundred Children Set To Lose School Bus Service The Government has reached

a new low by deciding to throw hundreds of schoolchildren off bus routes in County Waterford instead of buying additional buses, according to a Fine Gael county councillor.

Up to two hundred school-children in County Waterford will be denied school transport because the Government is to phase out the three-for-two seating arrangements on school buses without backing the plan with proper investment.

Councillor Mary Green strongly criticised the lack of investment, saying parents are outraged at the situation.

"I am being flooded with calls from angry and concerned parents across County Waterford," she said.

The policy, which will be phased in after September, was introduced in an attempt to address safety matters in the wake of the horrific Meath school bus crash.

Under the plan, 'concessionary' pupils (those who live just within the three-mile limit from a school) will no longer be entitled to school transport.

These controversial measures will also affect primary school children.

In fact," councillor Green added, "I was contacted by a very upset mother in my area who was informed by Bus Eireann today that they will not be able to notify her until September 2nd whether or not they can continue to take her

"Initially the parents decided to send their son to this school because it had a bus pick up point near their home and although the school is in his parish, the catchment area school is in the adjoining

"This boy is due to start thirdclass and he is very happy and settled in his school. The family do not have a second car, and are dependent on the Government's school transport

GALLING

The Suir electoral area councillor, said the "galling aspect" of this whole situation is that although Bus Eireann could accept the concessionery fee, they cannot say whether or not this child will be transported to his school.

"I personally had the view that the Minister involved Mary Hanafin TD would intervene when she returned from holidays. Unfortunately, today I heard her reiterate on national radio that there would be no such intervention.

"Parents have always had a certain amount of choice about where they send their children to school. The government is now telling them they can no longer choose. But the most arrogant feature is that the Government claims to be addressing safety issues while forcing thousands of school pupils onto dark country roads in all weathers. This decision is truly despicable."

However a spokesperson for the Department of Education said concessionary passengers have never been guaranteed

"The only thing that is changing is the basis on which seating capacity is calculated (one child per seat rather than 3 children per 2 seats) and this is positive development."

"Concessionary passengers will continue to be offered seats on the school bus where spare seats are available for them on a one-child-per-seat basis rather than on a 3 children per 2 seats basis as hereto-

fore," the spokesperson said. "A significant number of extra buses are needed already, and are being brought into the fleet as quickly as possible, to ensure that students who are eligible to a seat are given one on a 'one child per seat basis' by

the end of next year. The purchase of buses, the Department said, is part of a 25 million euro package which was announced two weeks.
