Government Meeting Needed On Looming Jobs Crises

An urgent meeting with the Government to discuss the looming employment crises when Waterford Crystal closes its Dungarvan plant next month and radical political action to address the fears of the workforce was urged by a leading Trade Unionist.

Mick O'Rielly, the national Regional Secretary of the ATGWU, said more focus needs to be brought to bare on the problems Dungarvan now faces.

The union leader said the closure of Waterford Crystal's Dungarvan plant next month will have major implications for the town.

And he called for radical political action to find replacement jobs for the 390 staff being made redundant.

"We believe that the situation needs to be focused at the Government level," he said.

"It is a huge crises and it needs us to bring the fears and

the aspirations of our members to bare on the Taoiseach and the Tanaiste and on those involved in Government to get the necessary focus on Dungarvan," he said.

"We need them to listen to the despair that's there, and give it some kind of focus in terms of work for people."

RENEWED CRITICISM

His appeal came amid renewed criticism of the management of Waterford Crystal and the Government. Labour councillor and fellow Trade Union-

ist, Billy Kyne accused Waterford Crystal's management of "shafting" its workforce, and said "cynical" wordplay is being used to describe the lay-off of 390 staff as voluntary redundancy.

And he criticised the Government for its "criminal" lack of support for Dungarvan and West Waterford.

While he said every call for urgent state intervention is welcome and gets his support he claimed "the lack of any mean

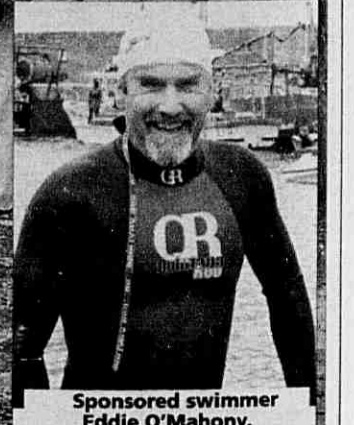

Hill Walker Rescued From Comeragh Mountains

The helicopter then searched the Bools & eventually found the party containing the injured walker in Coumshingaun. The walker was airlifted to hospital in Waterford. The mountain rescue personnel then escorted the remaining members of the walkers party to the roadside.

Safe in the Sun

Years ago, having a suntan was considered to be extremely undesirable. In those days, the only people with golden-brown skin were poor farm labourers and servants who had to work outside in all weathers. The aristocrats, on the other hand, could be identified not only by their fine clothes, but also by their very pale skin which resulted from an altogether easier lifestyle.

So the suntan became associated with poverty and hardship, while pale skin denoted wealth and beauty. Ladies in particular would avoid sun exposure and hot fireplaces at all costs, and would even use white powder to accentuate their porcelain complexion.

What a change there has been since those times! Today, people flock to hot countries or to their local beauty salon in search of a suntan. In fact the Irish Cancer Society recently recommended a complete ban on the use of sun beds following research which revealed that 7 per cent of Irish people use sun beds.

It's a strange fashion really, considering that tanned skin is in fact damaged skin. When the skin is exposed to ultra violet radiation, the damage caused triggers specialised cells to produce a brown pigment called melanin which gives a tanned appearance. Repeated exposure to sunlight can lead to malfunction of these cells which results in the appearance of brown spots, patchy pigmentation and an increased risk of skin cancer. The most aggressive type of skin cancer is malignant melanoma which quickly spreads to other organs in the body and is often fatal.

Exposure to UV radiation can also damage the skin in other ways. In the short term there is the risk of sunburn which can be quite severe in some cases. In the longer term, damage to the skin's structure causes a thickened and wrinkled appearance. In some cases, excessive sun exposure can cause a particularly nasty form of eczema called chronic ac-

tinic dermatitis in which the skin becomes permanently thickened and inflamed with numerous scabs. So the long term effects of the sun are really not so attractive after all!

Perhaps fashion will change, but in the meantime I would urge anyone who is concerned about their health (and the appearance of their skin in later life) to protect their skin from the sun's harmful rays and to avoid sun beds at all costs.

Wear a good quality high factor sun block whenever possible and remember that there can be high levels of UV radiation even on cloudy days. If you do overexpose your skin to the sun there are some natural ways of helping to repair the damage.

Make sure your diet includes plenty of nuts, seeds and wheatgerm which are high in essential fatty acids, zinc and vitamin E which promote healing of the skin. Calendula cream, aloe vera gel or a few drops of lavender essential oil diluted in olive or almond oil are all excellent for restoring the skin after exposure to the sun. Alternatively you can cut open a vitamin E or evening primrose oil capsule and rub the contents into your skin. For best results, all the above ingredients can be mixed together for a very nourishing and effective aftersun treatment.

54 Weeks Waiting Time For Driving Test For Dungarvan

Efforts to slash waiting times for the drivers test in Dungarvan remain stalled in first gear, new figures show.

Although Dungarvan has lost the dubious honour of having the longest waiting times in Ireland, the current waiting time is still too long, according to a Fine Gael Town Councillor.

Councillor Fred Forsey, who works as a driving instructor, said Dungarvan still has one of the longest waiting times in Ireland despite promises from Transport Minister Martin Cullen to tackle the issue.

The town had the longest waiting time last year at 64 weeks, but has now been replaced at the top of the league by Raheny in Dublin and Nenagh in Tipperary which has a waiting time of 61 weeks.

The waiting time currently stands at 54 weeks in Dungarvan.

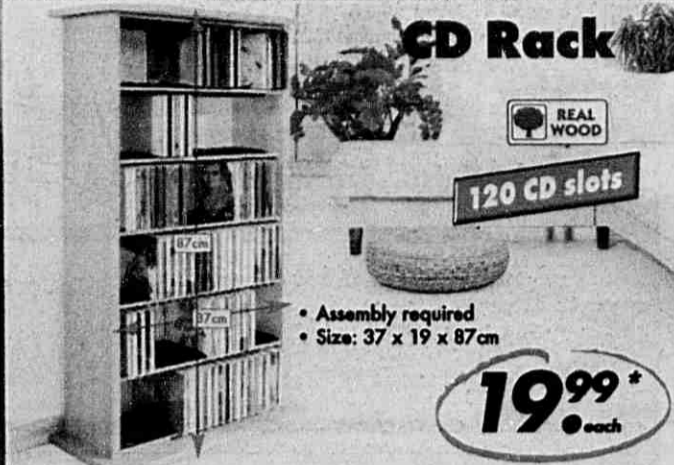

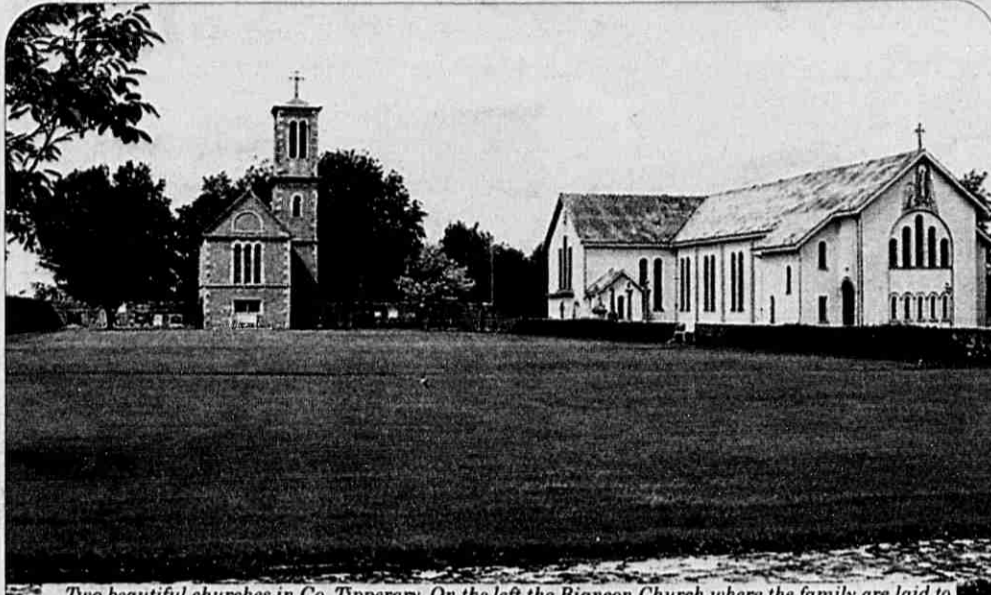

14 Year Old Knocked Down In Hit And Run

Maura's son, Liam, put it succinctly when he said that Davis Road was the hub of the Hackett family. Number 15 was the old homestead, being the rendezvous for them all down through the years. The house resounding with animated chat, laughter and song when they gathered there.

Daughter of Paddy and Delia Hackett of Davis Road, Maura was the youngest of nine children, six boys and three girls. During her school years he was a keen camogie player and having completed her education, she worked for years in Munster Shoes, where she met her husband, the late Sean O'Shea who hailed from St. Oliver Plunkett Terrace, Clonmel. Moving into the family home in Davis Road, they reared two sons, Liam and Jack, who have fond recollections of growing up in such a carefree and safe environment under the watchful eye of their loving parents.

Liam reminisced too about the great caravan holidays which they used to have in Tramore and how at the Halloween, Maura would dress up as a witch and frighten the lives out of them. His mother enjoyed dressing up he said and possessing a fine voice would invariably burst into song, her party piece being 'The Spinning Wheel'. Sunday mornings, he remarked, wouldn't have been the same without a visit from Maura's brother who could call to Davis Road after 10:30am Mass at S.S. Peter and Paul's Church, a ritual that went on for years.

Maura, in earlier years, with her husband loved to go on foreign holidays with her brother Martin and his wife Buntie. They had some marvellous times together in the Canaries, Spain, Majorca, the Isle of Man and Jersey. The four of them also enjoyed going to socials together at the G.A.A. centre and Maura loved the day trips in the car with the flask and the sandwiches, stopping enroute for their lunch in idyllic little spot which appealed to them.

Sadly in 1996 Sean passed away and Maura was never quiet the same again, as they had been such a united couple who attended daily Mass together at S.S. Peter and Paul's Church and were familiar figures as they strolled arm in arm along the riverbanks. A deeply religious person, Maura had a great devotion to the Blessed Mary and her strong faith giving her much solace.

Deteriorating health over the past six years or so didn't diminish her spirit, she loved getting her hair done and she was an elegant lady, a great character who has left them with such memories.

Needing constant attention, Maura received excellent care in St. Anthony's, Western Road where she passed away. Her remains were blessed and received at S.S. Peter and Paul's Church by Very Rev. Canon Nicholas Power P.P. On the following morning, requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of her gentle soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. Brian Power assisted by Rev. Fr. Partholan O'Leary P.P., St. Oliver's.

After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where she was laid to rest.

ABBEYSIDE SCOUT NOTES

Annual Camp Switzerland - Conclusion

Once again the weather in Switzerland at this time of year was just perfect as Wednesday morning dawned crisp and clear. Once the sun started to rise high in the sky heat soon followed. This day everyone boarded the bus for a visit to the Trummelbach waterfalls, the international scout centre in Kandersteg and some serious shopping in the town of Interlaken! The bus journey took approximately two hours and along the route the scenery was spectacular and the number of road tunnels we travelled through left everyone marveling at the ability of the Swiss when it comes to civil engineering projects. Having arrived at the waterfalls and gaining admission an elevator took everyone up inside the mountain to the starting point of the visit. Once out of the elevator the sight of millions of litres of water cascading down through the mountain was truly spectacular to see. Cameras and photographs could and did not do justice to the scenes everyone marvelled at. If anyone visits Switzerland again in the future this waterfall is way up on a list of sights which must be seen. Having marvelled at the scene for a couple of hours it was now time to visit the scout centre in Kandersteg, which was only a short bus ride from the waterfall. On arrival in Kandersteg lunch was eaten and then a little time was allocated to see the scout centre as well as buy some souvenirs and

swop a neckerchief or two with some Italian scouts we met. Lots of scout troops from all parts of Europe were camping here and the scene of so many tents brought back memories to many of the older scouts/adults of Mount Melleray and Jam-borora 1977 which was the golden jubilee of scouting in Ireland. Having seen as much as possible in the time allowed it was next stop Interlaken for the spending of lots and lots of Swiss Francs. Souvenirs brought home from here included the following, a cuckoo clock by Muller, pink Swiss army knives by many scouts as presents for their sisters, tee shirts, hats and badges by Cearbhall, Swiss flags, Swiss manufactured walking sticks for use by Marco's dad and of course Swiss made giant bars of toblerone. Late in the evening the bus headed home and once again the swimming pool in Adelboden was visited.

Thursday morning was once again glorious as far as the weather was concerned and this was very welcome as today was the day which was probably looked forward to more than any other - "this was white water rafting day"! The journey did not begin until twelve mid-day and so this morning was the first and only time everyone got the chance to sleep in for a bit. Instead of getting out of bed at seven thirty as usual all were allowed to sleep in until nine o'clock. A good general clean up of the chalet and sur-

rounding area was undertaken by all before lunch was readied and packed. In the early afternoon the launch site for the rafting was reached and once everyone had been kitted out it was down to the river. On the river bank the instructors from Gennany, Australia and Switzerland went through the safety procedures. The heat of the day at this point nearly melted everyone as the safety talk went on. Finally and thankfully it was time to take to the water. The large rafts were launched one at a time with their crews of eight paddlers and one guide! Those who had no experience of rafting, canoeing or any similar water sports were at this point questioning the sanity of their decision! However the adults Ray, David, Geoff and Gearoid gritted their teeth, wrote their last will and testament, kissed all the girls goodbye and with a glance back over their shoulders faced up to their destiny! Two minutes later one raft had to pull in to the river bank! Geoff was over heating! The problem was quickly solved and soon the paddlers from Abbeyside faced once again the raging torrent. At one set of rapids David, Adrian and Joe were unceremoniously ejected into the torrent and the life saving skills of the guides were called into play. Once again the difficulties posed by the power of the river and rapids were overcome by the team work of the various crews in the rafts. At the finish-

ing point down river some two hours later, epic stories were recounted of how each raft narrowly avoided disaster. This day of rafting everyone agreed, was the most exciting day experienced in a long - long time!

Friday the last full day on camp was spent mainly tidying up the accommodation and personal gear in the early morning. Adelboden was visited for a swim and then it was back to the chalet for lunch. In the afternoon it was back again for a swim or some last minute shopping for gifts back home. At six thirty everyone gathered outside an hotel in the town and then went in to have a meal of delicious pizza's, steaks and chips exactly the kind of traditional fare one would expect to find in Switzerland, not! This meal was organised by the group leader. The scouts appreciated the meal itself especially the wonderful desserts while the adults appreciated the meal as well as the fact that for one night they themselves did not have to cook but instead were waited on! At the end of the meal patrol leader Marco Hanrahan presented the group leader Muller with a specially inscribed Swiss army knife as well as a haversack in appreciation of all the effort he put in to making this the 75th annual camp of Abbeyside scouts the huge success it was. Muller thanked everyone for the gifts and also thanked those present on the way they all had pulled

together to make camp such a fantastic success. At about eight o'clock it was time to start moving towards the bus for home. The town of Adelboden was transformed this night with open air stalls as well as music, games and fire works on the main street. It was all part of celebrations to mark Switzerland's national day. To everyone from Abbeyside it was exactly the same as "pattern days" in Abbeyside, and so everyone joined in the fun! On arrival back at the campsite a final campfire was to be held but this was the one and only time the weather was against us on camp. Instead of the planned campfire "plan B" was put into action. This consisted of two Abbeyside scouts campfire songs being sung with pride in Switzerland and the letting off of a couple of fire works (which we got permission to do) to formally end annual camp Switzerland 2005. Speaking of fire works, the writer of these notes had intended letting everyone know the identity of the scout who became known as the "Burgery bomber" during camp, because of a particular incident! However legal advice received in the past week as well as a gagging order from the international scout commissioner means his identity must remain a secret, known only to those present at the time of the incident. However the following can be said - he has blonde hair as do his mother and father, there is a tradition of scouting in his family and he became known as the Burgery bomber because he lives out "the Burgery road"!

Saturday morning was grey and drizzly at six o'clock in the

morning when everyone was up and out of bed making final preparations for the trip home which was to start later on at seven. The only hitch to our departure was the strict guidelines of tidiness laid down by Hari! Hari had left very strict instructions for us as to how the chalet should look on our departure and everyone was determined to show we could adhere to them. By seven thirty the chalet was spotless but guess what, no Hari showed up to inspect the work! By seven forty an executive decision was taken to board the bus and head for Frankfurt in Germany to catch our flight. On the way down the mountain towards Adelboden a road block was encountered by the troop which halted the bus. Manning this road block was the local fire officer, spokes person on recycling in Adelboden, part time washing machine technician and chalet owner - Hari, looking none the pleased to see us fleeing in our bus! Muller approached the road block with caution and as back up along went Paddy. Within twenty minutes the situation was normalised, friendly relations were once again established and a small charge of 20 swiss francs to cover the loss of a pillow case was paid. The bus driver Guy pointed the bus in the direction of Frankfurt, Germany where our flight was to depart from and by about four in the evening we had arrived. Taking off later that evening for Dublin, everyone said goodbye to mainland Europe and at ten minutes past ten the flight bringing Abbeyside scouts home to Ireland touched down at Dublin airport.



Dramatic Change In Fortunes For New Theatre

1.25 million revamp of the Town Hall, which will also see the upgrade of the building itself.

Around 750,000 euro will be spent on refurbishing the badly deteriorated building while the remaining 500,000 euro will go towards the development of the theatre on the first floor.

Dungarvan Museum is to remain on the ground floor of the building under the plans drawn up almost two years ago for the Town Council by David Kelly Partnership.

It's a dramatic change in fortunes for a project, which looked set to be shelved earlier this summer when it was announced that funding was not forthcoming.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Deputy Deasy said the prospects for the theatre now look to have greatly improved since the start of the year.

"From the standpoint of where we were at the start of the year when the picture looked bleak, the prospects of work starting on the theatre have improved considerably.

"The people involved in the Dungarvan Dramatic Committee, when they contacted me a few months ago, did not have much confidence that anything would be done considering the announcement that was made at the Town Council. But it appears that the whole thing has improved greatly since then."

While the work had been contingent on securing funding for the work, the Town Council is now seeking a loan of 1.25 million euros to cover the cost.

Due to the size of the loan, departmental approval is needed. However, that has now been granted.

It's also believed that the Town Council is also seeking grant-aid from the Department of the Arts, Sports and Tourism, which if approved would reduce the size of the loan being sought.

Councillor Damien Geoghegan welcomed the news, saying a theatre is an important piece of infrastructure for Dungarvan.

"We have a fantastic Arts Centre yet we are lacking a theatre. We have a fantastic tradition in drama and the arts in Dungarvan and we need a theatre to continue on that tradition," he said.

"If you travel to any town in Ireland of a comparable size to Dungarvan you will notice that they

have a theatre. It's important that this development now goes ahead, but it has dragged on long enough already."

The plans would see a 150-seat theatre with stage, dressing rooms and toilet facilities on the first floor, and offices on the second floor along with work on the ground floor of the Town Hall.

Waste Collections Reduced As Council Cuts Costs

Waterford County Council is set to reduce the number of bin collections each month in a bid to cut costs.

The council will reduce the number of bin collections from the start of next month, which management estimate will save the cash strapped local authority around 60,000 euros.

The new collection cycle was advertised last week, and information leaflets were sent to householders across the county to inform them of the changes.

Its introduction on September 5th is part of the council's ongoing effort to cut back on costs ahead of the estimated 10 million euro bill for capping the Tramore and Dungarvan landfills and the costs likely to be incurred in the exportation of waste out of the county while the search for a new countywide landfill goes on.

It will begin with the collection of the ordinary bin followed by the recycling bin the second week and the organic bin the third. Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy announced.

"We want to introduce new efficiencies and streamline the service as much as possible. So far this year, our income from waste collection has not matched the anticipated amount," he said.

"We are making these changes and hope to save 60,000 euros to 80,000 euros in the process.

"From our experience, we have found that a three-week cycle would be enough to cover people's needs," he said, adding that the organic bin will be particularly utilised this month as householders dispose of their grass cuttings.

However, he urged people who will have difficulties with the new system to contact the council now.

Previously, ordinary or residual waste was collected one week in the month, and recycling bags twice a month.

Cutting back on the number of collections was one of a package of measures discussed at the July meeting of Waterford County Council. However, drastic rises in waste charges and the introduction of an annual flat fee were shelved amid opposition from local councillors.

ingful intervention by Government TD's and the Department of Environment to date" does not give cause for encouragement.

"I am continually amazed and angered to see statements on national and regional newspapers and broadcasters referring to the loss of 400 jobs in Dungarvan as being part of a voluntary redundancy exercise.

"This cynical playing with words tries to ignore the fact that a workforce that introduced innovative practices and flexibility saw their plant closed without any dialogue or discussion.

SHAFTED

"The management of Waterford Crystal shafted these workers and how national and regional journalists can put voluntary redundancies in the same context as the Dungarvan plant is amazing and indeed an insult to the workers involved," he said.

He said finding a replacement industry is "more critical than ever" and is overdue for Dungarvan since the closure of Waterford Foods. And while there is a longstanding invitation to the Enterprise Minister, Micheal Martin from the Town

Council for a meeting to date there hasn't been a positive response.

"The lack of support for Dungarvan and West Waterford from the Government and the state agencies is criminal," the Town and County Councillor said. "I believe Michael O'Reilly's call is one of many for intervention on a local level, and should see a renewed response from Deputies Ollie Wilkinson and Martin Cullen to what is the most serious job losses Dungarvan and West Waterford has ever experienced."

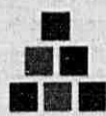
Changes to Waste Collection Schedule

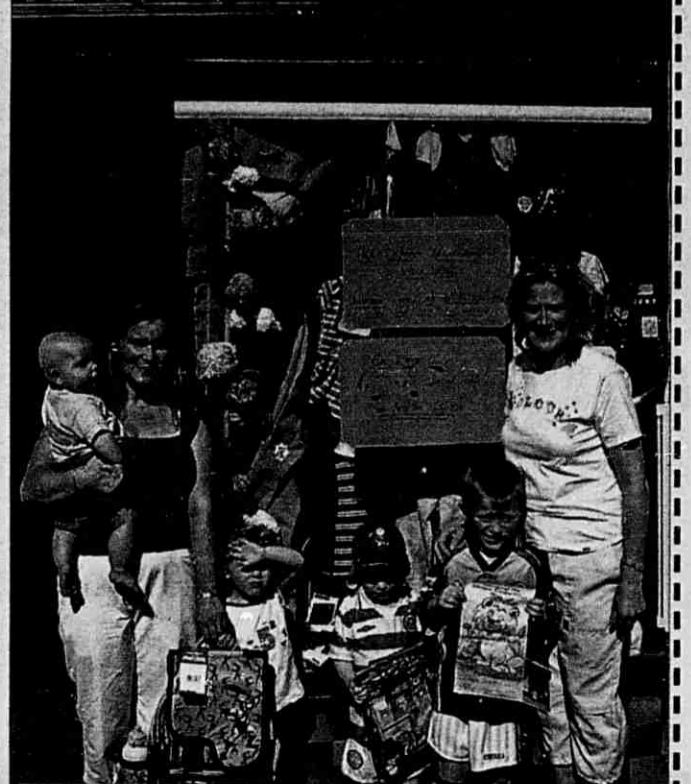
The Valkyries, Odin's handmaidens, were the ones who decided which warriors were to die in battle. They would then take them to Valhalla.

Local Schools Delighted With Leaving Cert Results

Cappoquin Student Celebrates Six A1's

Local schools reported exceptionally good results in this years Leaving Certificate with many students achieving high grades in Maths and the Sciences despite dire warnings nationally about high failure rates.

Denis Ring, principal of Blackwater Community College in Lismore said he was absolutely delighted with the results after students obtained a "very high proportions of A's" particularly in Maths, English and Irish.

"It's an exciting time for us," Mr. Ring said. "We opened the year before last but this is the first group sitting the Leaving that have been two years at the school."

"We're conscious of the fact that it's a new school and new building and initially the facilities would sell the school. But, at the end of the day, it's all about results. And from that point of view we've been very committed and everyone put in a lot of work."

He said thirty-eight per cent of students at Blackwater Community College got over 400 points, and 71% of students got over 300 points.

Owen Landers from Cappoquin scored the highest results in the school, getting 600 points with six A1's and one B. He now plans to do Accountancy in University College Cork.

PROUD

Deputy Principal of the Ard Scoil na nDeise, Dorothy Hughes, meanwhile said many of the Dungarvan school's Leaving Cert students will go on to the third level course of their choice.

"We are very proud of the leaving certificate results of our students," Mrs. Hughes said. "Many pupils have received offers for courses requiring high points and those who found the Leaving Certificate most challenging have delighted us with their results."

"We wish each girl the very best of luck with her choice of career in the future," she said.

VERY PLEASED

Principal of Colaiste Chathail Naofa, Pat Buckley was also very pleased with the results in both the Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme and the Leaving Certificate Applied Programme.

He went on to compliment the parents, the students, and the teachers who worked well together throughout the year.

"Most of the students will access college places, apprenticeships or return to the college to attend one of our eight Post Leaving Certificate courses that lead to full-time employment or further education," he said.

Mr. Buckley concluded by saying that the Post Leaving Certificate exam results this year were amongst the highest in the country with over 92% of students obtaining distinctions or merits in their examinations.

At St. Augustines College in Abbeyside, the atmosphere was electric on results day as many of the students declared their results to each other in anticipation of where September will take them as they begin the next phase of their education or career path.

Around 30% of students at the Friary scored in excess of 400 points with many others well over the 500 mark. 25% of the female students attained in excess of 445 points. The school said an especially powerful performance was produced by a small number who were repeating with one student improving by as much as 140 points while another improved by 70 points on an already impressive points total last year.

CONCERNS

Meanwhile, John Farrell, Regional Director, IBEC South East expressed serious concerns about the high failure rates in maths.

"Nearly 4,500 students did not achieve a pass in ordinary level maths this year and about 5,000 students sat the foundation-level exam," he said. "The bottom line is that about 10,000 students this year have left school with a real difficulty in maths and are ineligible for many third level courses."

Nationally, twelve percent of students sitting ordinary-level maths failed, while 4.2% of those sitting the higher level paper failed.

Green fingers looking good

GARDENING gives you the ideal opportunity to enjoy the great outdoors - right on your doorstep. You don't need to travel, you don't need to plan, you don't even need to be kitted out with special equipment. You simply step outside the backdoor and you're ready to begin... But like all outdoor activities, there are a host of accessories that can make enjoying your hobby more convenient, more comfortable - and less vulnera-

ble to our very changeable weather. When you're gardening the chances are you'll be in the privacy of your own backyard and nobody will take much notice of your choice of clothing. You don't need to make a fashion statement - and unlike walking or cycling, designer gear has made little impact on the world of gardening. But you do need to be comfortable, warm and dry, so a little investment in appropriate gear is well worthwhile. Footwear comes first. Whatever the weather, you'll be exposed to mud and dirt - and you don't want to ruin your best shoes.

The traditional footwear favourite is the good old wellington boot because it keeps out the wet, is suitable for all weather and can be purchased at a reasonable price. While a cheap pair may be fine for the occasional gardener, if your hobby is serious or you are

likely to walk miles down muddy tracks, it is worth investing more for the extra comfort. Since the welly was invented, footwear has become more sophisticated and most garden centres now offer an extensive choice. Waterproof PVC ankle boots are very popular as they offer greater flexibility, but the current favourite is the garden clog. Based on the Dutch clog design but made from the same material as wellington boots, they are easy to slip on - and if you get a good pair the linings can be taken out for cleaning. Next on the shopping list should be a good pair of gloves, with a strong, leather or woven fabric palm and heavy-duty back to protect your hands from prickly thorns or other sharp objects. Not only will they make gardening cleaner and more comfortable, they will also protect you from cuts, which can be unpleasant and even dangerous.

If you're serious about your hobby and want to garden in all weathers, a good, thorn- and water-proof jacket is also essential. Waxed jackets have long been a favourite since they are hard-wearing, tear-resistant and easy to clean. Modern fibres are excellent at keeping out the weather - but make sure they are not prone to damage from sharp objects. Your garden centre will be packed with ideas and items that

can make life easier, from specially-designed hats, shirts and trousers to kneeling mats for weeding and aprons that will hold your garden tools. Like every hobby, gardening has an infinite selection of equipment and accessories available. The important thing to remember is that the essential basics needn't cost a fortune - but if your hobby becomes serious and you have a big budget, there are plenty of things to choose from.

This Week In The Garden

SOW SCHIZANTHUS FOR SPRING FLOWERING
Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory.

Sow seeds thinly in well-drained seed boxes using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.

SOW WINTER SPINACH AND SPINACH BEET
Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart.

You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves, used as a spinach substitute.

START TO GATHER MUSHROOMS FROM OUTDOOR BEDS
If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should examine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the buttons (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well into the autumn.

COOKERY CORNER

Verona style risotto

IN the region around Venice, risotto is a basic dish flavoured with whatever happens to be available, such as pieces of cooked chicken, game, fish cooked ham or chicken livers.

Unlike most rice dishes, this has a moist creamy texture. This is a result of using Arborio or Vialone rather than long grain rice..

Ingredients:

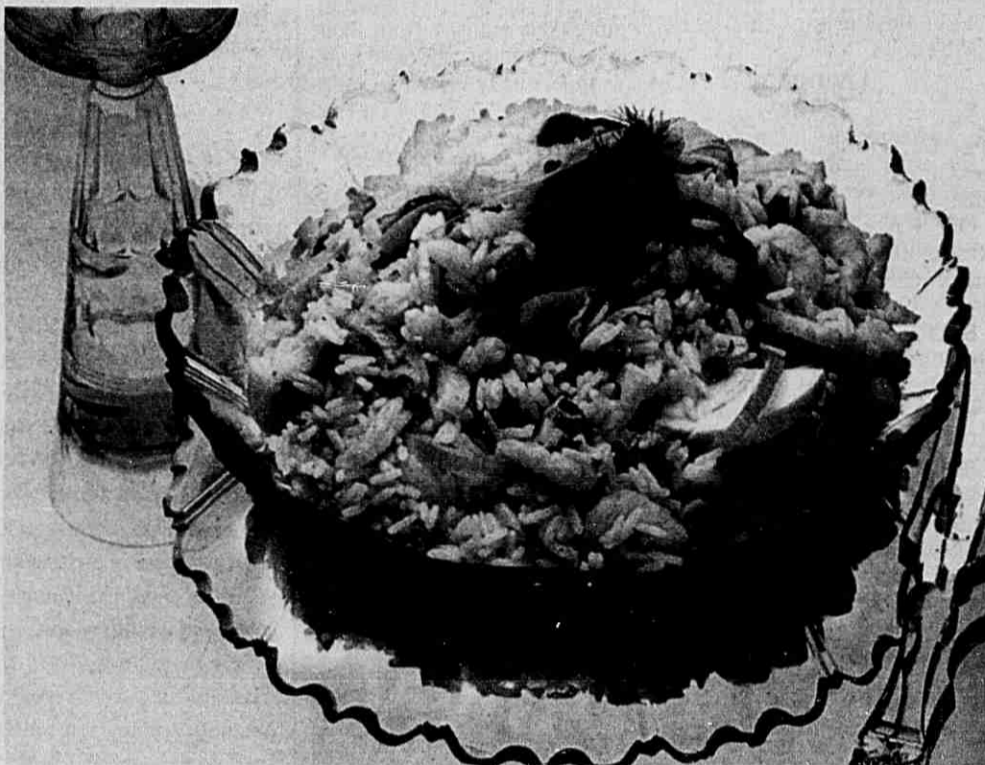
(Serves 4)

- 75g butter
- 100g onion, finely chopped
- 350g risotto rice
- 4 tbsp white wine
- 1.2 litres hot chicken stock
- 4 chicken livers
- 50g cooked ham, finely diced
- 5g grated Parmesan cheese

Method:

MELT 25g of the butter in a heavy based saucepan and fry the onion gently for about 7seven minutes until soft and golden.

Add the rice and stir until translucent, then add the wine and cook until almost completely absorbed.



Begin stirring in the hot stock, a little at a time, adding more as soon as the previous addition is almost absorbed. Stir frequently and cook uncovered over moderate heat..

Towards the end of cooking stir in a further 25g of butter, 25g of the Parmesan cheese and salt

and pepper to taste. While the risotto finishes cooking, - the rice should be tender but firm and the consistency creamy - wash the chicken livers, cutting away any tissues or coloured areas, then cut into small pieces.

Melt the remaining butter in a

frying pan and fry off the chopped livers very gently for two to three minutes until lightly cooked, then add the ham. Stir into the risotto with the remaining Parmesan chese. Serve with quartered boiled eggs and mushrooms fried off in a little oil and garlic

Courgette Soup

THIS is a nourishing yet delicately flavoured country soup that is perfect for using up any excess courgettes from the garden.

Although prettily flecked with flakes of egg, it can be reheated the following day provided it does not boil.

Ingredients
(Serves 6 to 8)

- 750g courgettes
 - 50g butter
 - 1 medium onion, sliced
 - 1.75 litres water
 - 2 chicken stock cubes
 - 2 eggs
 - 3 tbs grated Parmesan cheese
 - 2 tbs fresh basil or parsley salt
 - freshly ground black pepper
- To serve
grated Parmesan cheese

Method:

TOP and tail the courgettes and cut into 5mm slices. Melt the butter in a large

saucepan and fry the onion very gently for five minutes. Add the courgettes and fry, stirring frequently, for five to 10 minutes. until lightly golden.

Add the water, crumble in the stock cubes, bringing to the boil, cover and simmer gently for a further 20 minutes. Pass the mixture through a coarse sieve, or purée in an electric blender, then return to the saucepan. Just before serving bring the soup to the boil.

Put the eggs cheese and herbs in the bottom of a large warmed soup tureen and, using a wire whisk, beat together thoroughly. Still whisking, pour the boiling soup slowly on top the beaten eggs.

Check the seasoning and serve immediately which warmed crusty bread. Pass a bowl of grated Parmesan cheese separately.

Super strawberry yogurt cake

THIS is a super way of making sure none of those super summer strawberries go to waste.

Ingredients:
(Serves 6 to 8)

- 200g plain flour
- 50g margarine
- 175g sugar
- 1 egg
- 25g gelatine
- 3 tbs water
- 50g strawberries
- 900ml natural yogurt
- 150ml double cream
- 1 small apricot

Method:

Sieve the flour on to a working surface. Make a well in the centre and put in the margarine, cut into small pieces, 100g of the sugar and the egg. Mix quickly together to form a dough.

Press firmly into the base of a greased 23-cm loose-bottomed cake tin.

Prick all over with a fork and bake blind in a moderately hot oven (220°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6) for 25 minutes or until cooked. Leave to cool.

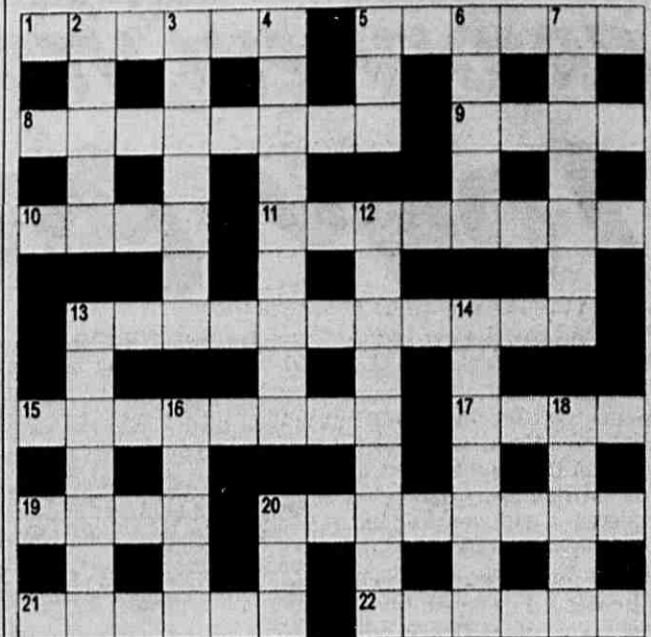
Sprinkle the gelatine over the water and leave to soften. Hull the stawberries, then sieve or liquidise three-quarters of them. Mix with the yogurt and the remaining sugar. Dissolve the gelatine in a bowl over hot water, then strain into the yogurt mixture. Put aside a few strawberries for decoration and half the rest.

Arrange the halves, cut side down, on the pastry base. Spoon over the yogurt mixture and chill until set. Remove from the tin.

Whip the cream and pipe on top of the cake. Decorate with pieces of strawberry and pieces of apricot.

WEEKLY RACING REVIEW (15th August - 21st August)

GRASSICK CONTINUES GOOD FORM

Trainer Michael Grassick has his horses in good form of late and he was on the mark again with Nakiska (7/2) in the Lynam Merit Maiden over ten furlongs at Roscommon on Monday. This lightly raced filly made every yard of the running and kept on well when challenged inside the final quarter mile to defeat the hot favourite, Bawaader (8/13), by two lengths.

KINANE STRIKES IN INTERNATIONAL

Irish jockey Michael Kinane was seen at his strongest in getting home the Italian trained Electrocutonist in front in the Juddmonte International Stakes at York on Tuesday. A second victory in this event having won on Giant's Causeway in the year 2000, Kinane's mount came from well off the pace to touch off Japanese raider Zeno Rob Roy in a real thriller with the first four horses home separated by just a length. Aidan O'Brien's Ace (9/4 favourite), tried to make all the running but was just run out of it in the closing stages and had to settle for fourth spot.

DETTORI MISSES OUT AGAIN

Having missed out on Group One glory aboard Dubawi in France just three days earlier, jockey Frankie Dettori had to watch from the sidelines once again as Saeed bin Suroor's Punctilious (13/2) came back to her best form to win the Yorkshire Oaks (Group One) at York on Wednesday. Dettori broke a collar bone in early July and has been on the sidelines since then but is expected back soon while substitute Kerrin McEvoy has certainly been making the most of his opportunities in the Italian's absence.

GOOD NIGHT FOR PUNTERS

Bellewstown on Wednesday was certainly the place to be for favourite backers as no less than seven of the eight favourites obliged. While Ruby Walsh rode his now customary double on Chemin D'Or and Sorry Al, the most impressive winner of the night was the Sir Mark Prescott trained Red Damson in the concluding Ray White Auctioneers Q.R. Race. This 9/10 favourite stretched right away in the straight to win easily by 14 lengths and is a possible runner at the upcoming Tralee Festival.

WET CONDITIONS CAN'T DETER MCCULLAGH

Despite the wet and gruelling conditions at Sligo on Wednesday evening, jockey Niall McCullagh was in good form when riding a fine double. McCullagh landed both divisions of the Sligo Race Supporters Club Handicap over twelve furlongs on the Dessie Hughes trained Iron Hague (7/2 favourite) and the Annette McMahon trained Crafty Eyed (6/1) who just got the better of the favourite, Goose Island, after a dour battle inside the final quarter of a mile.

OXX STRIKES AT YORK

The John Oxx trained Kastoria landed a massive punt (returned 6/4 favourite from 9/2 that morning) when becoming the only Irish trained winner of the three day York Meeting when proving successful in the Galtres Stakes under Michael Kinane on Thursday. On the same day the Barry Hills trained La Cucaracha continued her fine run of success when coming out best in the Group One Nunthorpe Stakes having earlier won the Ballyogan Stakes at Leopardstown in June.

CORRIG WINS BIG POT AT BELLEWSTOWN

The €30,000 Murphy Environmental Mullacurry Cup Handicap Hurdle was the richest race ever run at Bellewstown and in an exciting race, it was Joe Crowley's Blue Corrig who landed the spoils under a fine ride from Ruby Walsh. It was a rather poignant victory as his owner, Dick Forristal, died in tragic circumstances just a couple of weeks ago.

BERRY ON THE DOUBLE

Jockey Fran Berry is riding on the crest of a wave at present and he was in double form at Tipperary on Thursday evening for trainer John Oxx. He had little difficulty in bringing home the heavily backed Noelani (2/5 favourite from 4/6) in the opening five furlong maiden before having to work a lot harder aboard Fairy Of The Night to take the listed Fairy Bridge Stakes over seven and a half furlongs.

HUGHES MAINTAINS FINE STRIKE RATE

Trainer Dessie Hughes is rapidly becoming the trainer to follow at Kilbeggan and he saddled another fine double at the popular Westmeath track on Friday night courtesy of Zululand and Hows Trix. Zululand (3/1 fav) made all the running to win the Martinstown Opportunity Handicap Hurdle Series in the hands of the promising Nicky O'Shea while Hows Trix (8/1) made a winning debut in the Tullamore INH Flat Race under Roger Loughran.

BIG PRIZE GOES FOR EXPORT AGAIN

For the tenth consecutive year the €300,000 Tattersalls Sale Stakes at the Curragh on Saturday was won by an English raider as Chris Wall's Wake Up Maggie (9/2) landed this six furlong event in good style under Alan Munro. On the same card the Aidan O'Brien trained Horatio Nelson won the Group 2 Galileo E.B.F. Futurity Stakes in comfortable fashion and this unbeaten colt is now a general 12/1 chance for next year's Epsom Derby.

GERAGHTY DOUBLE

On a day of doubles at Cork on Sunday, jockey Barry Geraghty bagged a brace when riding the Ed-

ward O'Grady trained Oh So Lively to victory in the David O'Meara & Sons Handicap Steeplechase before guiding Jessica Harrington's Bunmahon to success in the Fleming Construction Maiden Hurdle. The €25,000 Kevin McManus Bookmaker Novice Steeplechase was presented to the Dessie Hughes trained Khairambar when clear leader Monjoyau came down at the third last fence.

LUAS LINE LANDS FEATURE

The David Wachman trained Luas Line confirmed herself as a smart filly when winning the €75,000 Denny Cordell Lavarack Memorial E.B.F. Stakes in decisive fashion at Gowran Park on Sunday. Ridden by Wayne Lordan, Luas Line (7/4 fav) defeated Sanserif and Pictavia by a length and a half and connections have a race in America next month in mind for this daughter of Danehill.

RACING UPDATE

With Johnny Murtagh ruling out an appeal against his 21 day riding ban for striking fellow jockey Pat Smullen at Leopardstown last Sunday week, the race is on as to who will replace him on Motivator in the Baileys Irish Champion Stakes at Leopardstown on September 10th. With Murtagh on board since the start of the season, Michael Bell's stable star has won both the Dante Stakes at York and of course, the English Derby at Epsom, before meeting with defeat by Oratorio in the Eclipse Stakes at Sandown in early July. Connections have stated that Frankie Dettori is their number one choice to replace Murtagh as he has won the race on several occasions in the last few years and knows the Leopardstown course very well but his availability would have to be open to question as this Group One contest is often targeted by Saeed Bin Suroor and even if they don't have a runner this year, it is possible that they will need Frankie for the English St Leger at Doncaster on the same day.

Trainer John Oxx has confirmed that Christophe Soumillon will ride Azamour in the same Leopardstown race as regular partner Michael Kinane broke his right wrist in a nasty tumble at the Curragh last Saturday and will be out of action for six weeks. Unfortunately for the Oxx stable, Fran Berry sustained a chest fracture in the same incident and will also be out for a few weeks and with third jockey, Catherine Gannon, already on the sidelines after a recent fall at Tramore, it would appear that the trainer will have to use outside jockeys for his charges for the foreseeable future.

Tralee Races is certainly the place to be this week with five days of quality racing to enjoy while there are also plenty of counter attractions for the racegoers. Tuesday is Ladies Day with €1,500 in prizes for the Best Dressed Lady Competition while on Wednesday the newly crowned Rose Of Tralee will be paraded Ascot style up the track after the running of the first race before mixing with the crowds in the enclosures. There is a chance to win a Mercedes Benz Sports Coupe on Thursday while Friday is Family Day with a barbeque during racing plus free admission for children aged under fourteen, with slides and bouncing castles in operation. There are free racecard competitions on a daily basis with holidays to be won while the big screen will be in operation on the first four days. For the more serious punters, the Jackpot Pool has been guaranteed for €5,000 on the Wednesday and the Thursday so all in all there is something for everyone at Tralee this week.

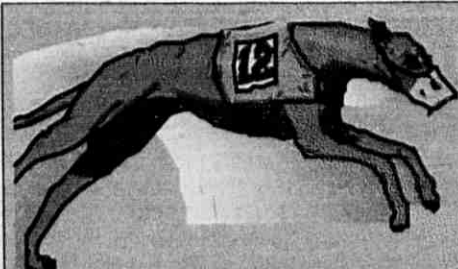

Forging his way into the lead Khayeltisha stayed on well in the final quarter of this event to register a length win over Tinahue Spring.

The Andrew Delahunty owned Bigwood Wally (Sineads Rocket-Monmahogue Dash) got favourite backers off on the right foot this February 2004 whelp posting a very easy success in 29.14 in the first semi final of the Traps Bar Unraced event. Trapping smartly from trap one the early paced Bigwood Wally soon had his rivals on the stretch leading throughout from Alex Tiger before registering a facile six lengths win.

The good run of the favourites continued in the second semi final with victory going to the evens favourite Judicial Mate (Spiral Nikita-Dons Beauty) representing the well-known partnership of owner Pat Daly and trainer Michael J O'Donovan. Securing a nice run up the inside as Cotton Lark moved out on the run up Judicial Mate was soon on his way to victory. After a slow start and first bend crowding Wayword Hill caught the eye with a slick finish but Judicial Mate was home and hosed beating Wayword Hill by three lengths. Time 29.10.

Mooncoin based trainer Leo Dunphy sent out the Friday Club Four Syndicate owned Kingofthemetz (Droopys Kewell-Yom Boki) the 4/5 favourite to a trap to line 29.46 success in race three. Breaking in front Kingofthemetz was full value for his pillar to post length win over the always well-placed Bolt Home.

Taghmon Sally broke in front in a graded sprint but after thirty yards the Dick Cullinane owned Gortnahoe Sally (Fortune Mike-Dainty Dash) 2/1 was soon in control of matters and while Banco challenged briefly between the first and second bends Gortnahoe Sally kicked on again for a three lengths success over Hurry Buk in a useful 16.61.

Races five and six were semi finals of the Bet With The Tote 29.60 Hurdle event. In the first semi final Tommys Hero led to halfway where Pier Flyer (Sineads Slaney-Gers Memory) 3/1 jumped his way to the front. Once in front the Larry O'Sullivan owned and John Corbett trained Pier Flyer was never going to lose out coming home three and a half lengths clear of Tommys Hero in a very slick 29.15.

Track newcomer Linkvue Hon (Top Honcho-Star Cash) 2/1 did the business for Cork owner Oliver Kenny and trainer Eddie Lingane taking the second qualifier in 29.66. Leading out of the first turn from Highlight Miller Linkvue Hon was not extended in proving two lengths to smart for the rails seeking Free Air.

In the seventh contest about five lengths covered the entire field on the back stretch but cutting through the opposition the Breda McCabe and John Murphy owned Castleboro Rose (Rapid Journey-Castleboro Katie) 3/1 finished best of all to beat the always prominent Monmahogue Mindy by two lengths in a career best time of 29.25.

The early paced Kilbunny Vieri (Droopys Vieri-Adraville Honey) came back to form for Portlaw owner John O'Mahoney capturing the eight contest in 29.20. Dashing into an early lead Kilbunny Vieri was stalked throughout by the well-backed Winnies Appeal but sticking to the task in hand Kilbunny Vieri battled on well to triumph by two lengths.

Stradbally owner Geraldine McGrath is certainly getting a sweet tune out of her Durrow Tracker and this June 03 daughter of El Hombre and Popular Lass made maximum use of her early pace to lead all the way in the first semi final of the Maurice Jackson sponsored Waterford Plumbing And Heating A5 event. In front throughout Durrow Tracker 3/1 maintained a steady gallop up front to see off the challenge of a running on Bobs Fancy by two lengths in a career best 29.16.

The well-drawn Sooty Lark (Larkhill Jo-Cooladine Sooty) the 6/4 jolly credited Kevin Fogarty from Portlaw and trainer Tony Ryan with a richly deserved 29.01 success in the second qualifier. The early paced Sooty Lark dashed into a clear four lengths back stretch lead and while Thompson Girl finished full of running Sooty Lark held out by a length.

In the final race of the session Droopys Perlina 7/2 ran her best ever race for owners Frank Hasset and Paul O'Gorman carving out a smashing 28.87 winning return from trap six. Powering up to lead out of the first bend from Rackethall Lark Droopys Perlina in-

creased her lead throughout eventually winning out by ten lengths from Rackethall Lark. The winner a November 02 whelp is lightly raced and this daughter of Droopys Kewell and Droopys Lillian should make a smashing brood bitch in time.

From that point it was a case of how far would Killaspy Jack win by and it came as no surprise to see the strong running fawn oblige by seven lengths from Paving Stone.

The winner barely out of novice class was having only having his seventh ever race and was recording his fifth success in all.

Racing opened with a win for the favourite Daring Affair (Droopys Vieri-Seskin Daisy) this 6/4 chance producing a battling display for owner Stephanie Maguire and trainer Frances O'Donnell to win out in 28.79. Tested to the limit early on by both Hows The Lack and Copperfield Hill Daring Affair stayed on well up the fence to beat a running on Coolside Joe by one and three quarter lengths.

County Wexford owner Richie Walsh who stands at both Enniscorthy and Kilcohan Park saw two of his runners taste success during the session. A fast starting Canadian Pacific (Pacific Mile-Mile Superb) exited trap six at a fair rate of knots in race three and never in any danger of losing out Canadian Pacific cruised to a nine lengths win over Raytown Lady. Avondale Woods who chased the winner down the back stretch unfortunately broke down and is no longer with us.

Victory number two for Richie Walsh arrived via 3/1 chance Point Two (Mustang Yank-Solver Micra) who captured race nine in a best ever 28.99. Behind early on as Fitzzy Diamond and How Ya Boss dominated the early exchanges Point Two stayed on well in the latter half of this contest and when Oh See was denied a clear run Point Two came through to beat How Ya Boss by two and a half lengths.

Digidyhotdog set the early pace in the third contest but he was quickly taken on and passed by Talking Terms on the back stretch. Once in front the Carmel Kearns owned Talking Terms was never going to forfeit this contest cruising to a six lengths defeat of Elle

Kewell in 28.91.

Races four and five were semi finals of the Gain/O'Dwyer Unraced event. In the first qualifier Droopys Mourinho (Judicial Pride-Droopys Nellie) was despatched as the 4/9 hot pot and while he broke smartly the jolly was headed around the first bend by Ballyhoe Legend and Cuainin Na Muine. These "Droopys" prefixed dogs are made of stern stuff however and coming back a second time the Michael Dunphy owned and Pat Buckley trained Droopys Mourinho drove up the inside of Ballyhoe Legend over the final two bends before racing on to a two and a half lengths win over Ballyhoe Legend in a smart 28.57.

In the second qualifier Wilcox Brunel was sent off the red hot 4/6 favourite but it was the Andrea McCann owned Ballinclare Hue (Honcho Classic-Ballinclare Lark) 5/2 who displayed all the early pace to register an impressive 28.60 win. Wilcox Brunel gave chase throughout but the long striding Ballinclare Hue was not slowing down up front eventually obliging by four and a half lengths.

In the sixth contest Tocky looked all over the winner when sprinting past the front running Movement Ahead at the penultimate bend but the Pauline Kavanagh owned and John Kavanagh trained Aqueduct Ted (Cool Performance-Aqueduct Hesta) 2/1 came out of the clouds to snatch a last gasp three quarters of a length win in 29.19.

Having missed his break in his first round heat of the Gallows Kennels Marathon Stake the Noel Germaine and Sean McCann owned and Brian McCann trained Haliska Blueboy (Smooth Rumble-Haliska Margaret) 2/1 wasn't taking any chances in his semi final as he flew out of trap one to deliver a stunning front running performance in a very fast 40.30. Avalon Supreme never gave up the chase in second spot but Haliska Blueboy was not easing down in the lead eventually scoring by four and a half lengths.

In the second semi final a fast starting Screen Goddess made a brave attempt to make all over the six bends but the leader was stalked throughout by Finchogue Suzie and unleashing her challenge off the home turn the Alan Moorehouse owned Finchogue Suzie (No Tail Told-Femme Fatale) finished with a rattle to credit trainer Sean Jennings with a length win over a brave Screen Goddess with a staying on Sorrento Jack just behind in third spot. In the eleventh contest Moher Mover set out to make all the running but taking over in the lead between the final two bends the Gerard Leahy owned and Nick Turner trained More Rubbish (Carhumore Cross-Widows Walk) 5/2 dashed into a narrow lead on the fence before beating a running on Saltee Tee Jay by a head in 29.09.

The James Begley owned and Harry Seery trained Local Pleasure (Come On Tiger-Local Beauty) sent the punters home happy as this 7/4 favourite came from behind to take the honours in 28.76. Getting the better of the pacesetter Vaughan Prince on the back stretch Local Please a recent 550-yard winner at Enniscorthy stayed on stoutly for a well-deserved two and a half lengths defeat of Vaughan Brindle.

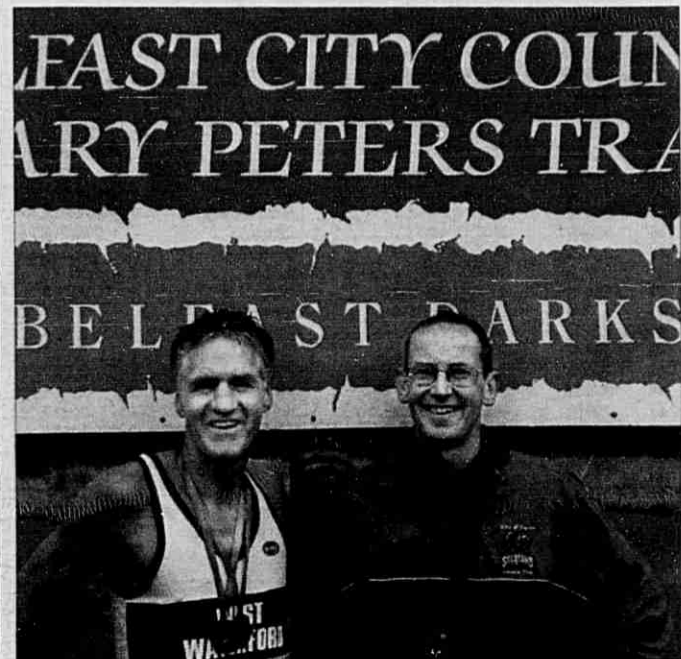

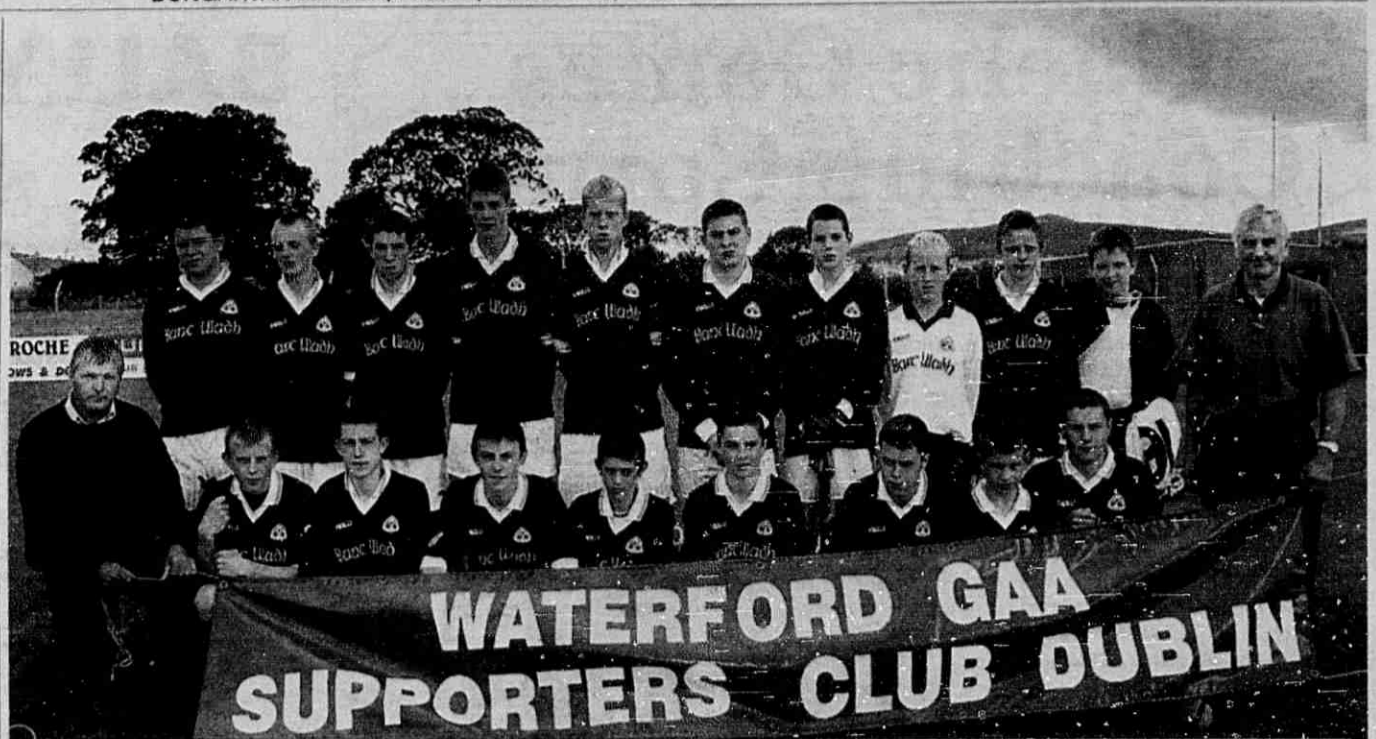

Michael Kiely was a man of vision, proud of our culture and traditions but who always, to use the modern phrase, thought "outside the box". His leadership qualities gained him wide respect in many walks of life, not least in the farming community, where he served as Co. chairman of the farming association on more than one occasion. Michael was honoured to represent the area in the farmers march to Dublin in 1966 and was also on the board of Waterford Co-Op.

When it became apparent that our old Church was in very bad repair in the mid-sixties, Michael was hugely influential

in the campaign which culminated in the opening of our beautiful new Church in 1971, offering his many talents to Fr. Kennedy and latterly to Fr. Enright.

Michael was a GAA man all his life, supporting the "Shocks" through thick and thin. He served on the committee on many occasions and with a sense of fun and mischief told the story of a year he spent as treasurer when he ran the club on seventeen shillings and sixpence. Despite what he regarded as an outstanding performance in the finance portfolio, he recalled being ousted from his seat at the next AGM, such was the standard demanded and the quality of the candidates!!

Michael loved to hear a yarn and to tell a yarn. This interest no doubt led to his support for Scor where he became a legend in Question Time, winning numerous county titles with his team mates, Francis Nugent and Maurice Wade. He was particularly proud of his successes with an "all Kiely" team made up of son Peter and daughter Patricia. He had earlier encouraged elder daughter

Sioban into Scor where she won many awards in Recitation. He took great pride in representing and supporting An Sean Phobal. I recall his delight on an April night in Monahan in 1997 when he and Peggy were in the audience to cheer on an All-Ireland victory for An Sean Phobal and his conversation afterwards as Gaeilge with GAA president Joe McDonagh, when he explained to the then uachtaran what a personal thrill it was for him to hear An Sean Phobal called out at the "top of the heap" on a national stage.

When courage and conviction was required in the purchase and development of Pairc Colmain, the then chairman, John Murphy was lucky to have Michael Kiely among his small band of dedicated workers. When one looks at Michael Kiely's contribution to our parish down through the years, it was so fitting that Sean Phobal GAA last year decided to honour him with life membership of our club as an acknowledgement of a lifetime of service. In accepting the award, Michael was deeply moved and spoke not of what he had done for the club but rather of all the

Abbeyside Shock Mount Sion In Thriller At Fraher Field

What is seldom is wonderful and this one could hardly be described as 'seldom' since Abbeyside in their long history had never before defeated Mount Sion who are the current county champions and the odds-on favourites to win here.

It was exciting stuff all the way with every puck of the ball being contested with vigour and passion and the challengers matching the favourites in commitment and skill.

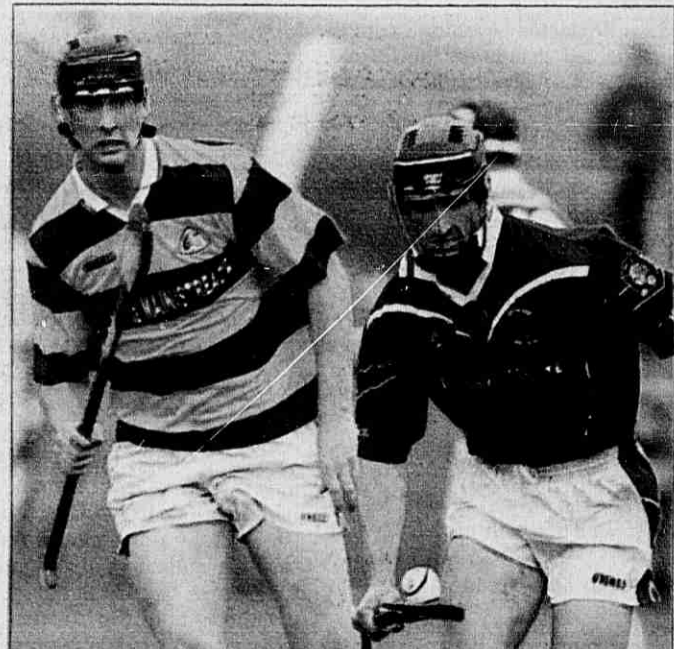

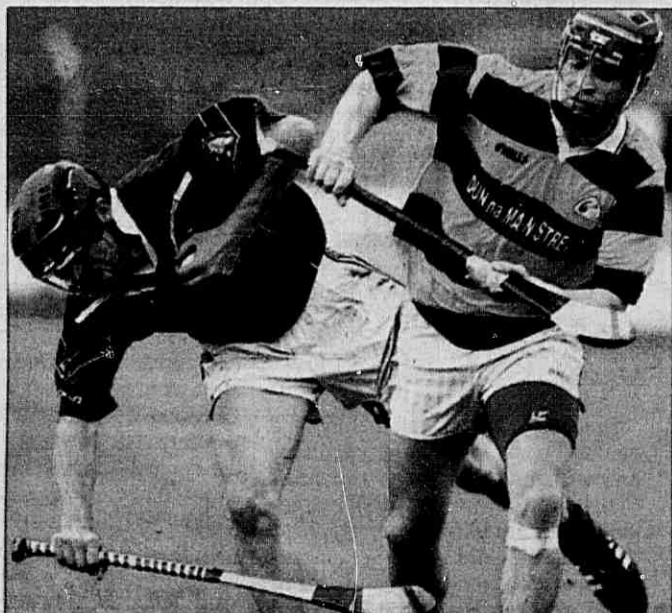

The item on the agenda dealing with the appointment of the managers is the one which will attract most attention and club delegates will be expected to be open and frank in their contributions.

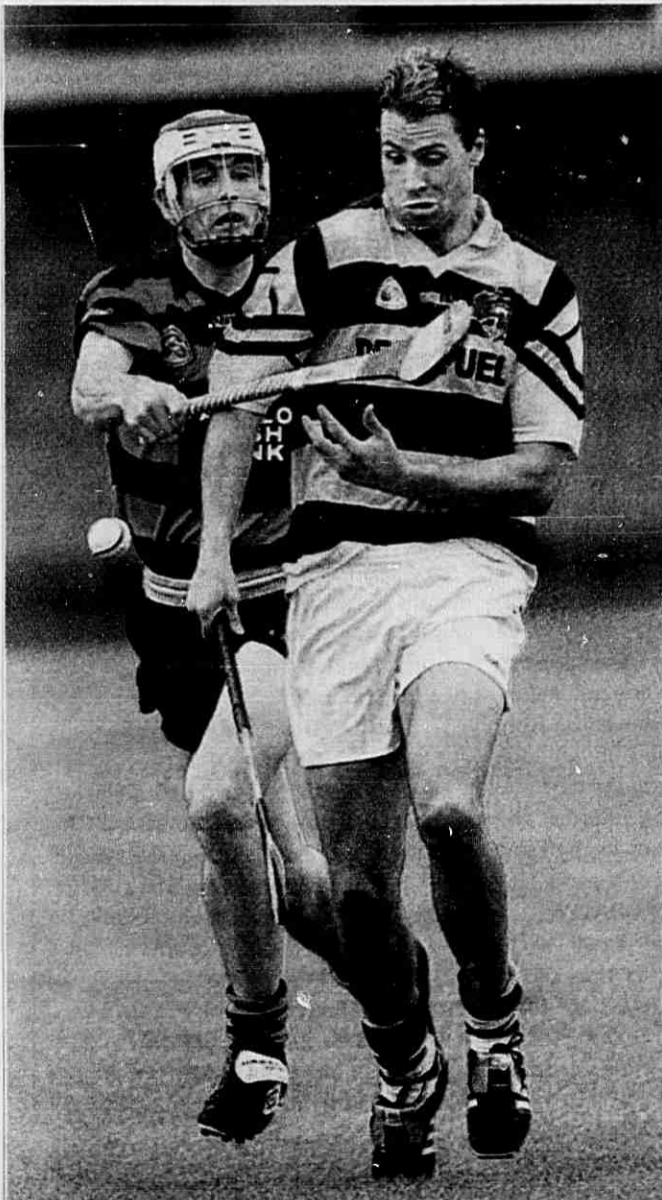

Other matters down for discussion include the payment of the club levy which is due to commence on October 1st.

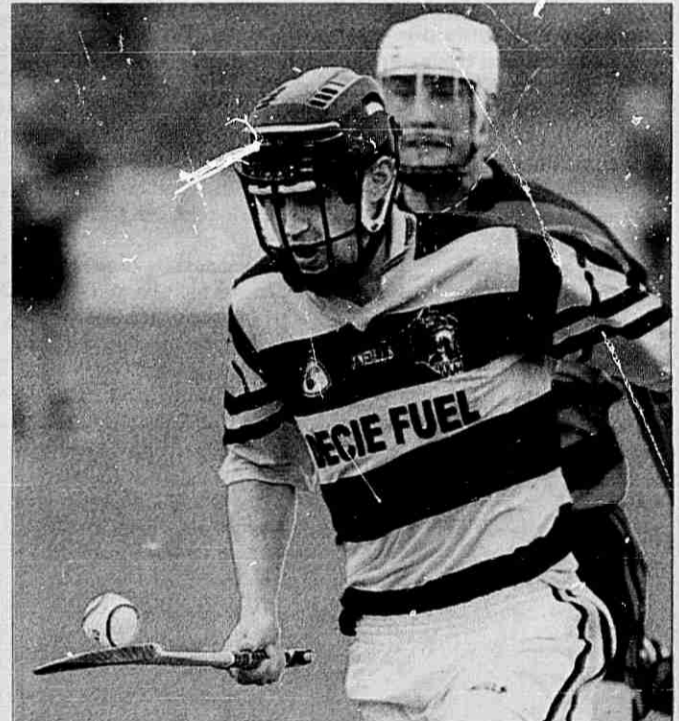
ALL IRELAND FINAL TICKETS

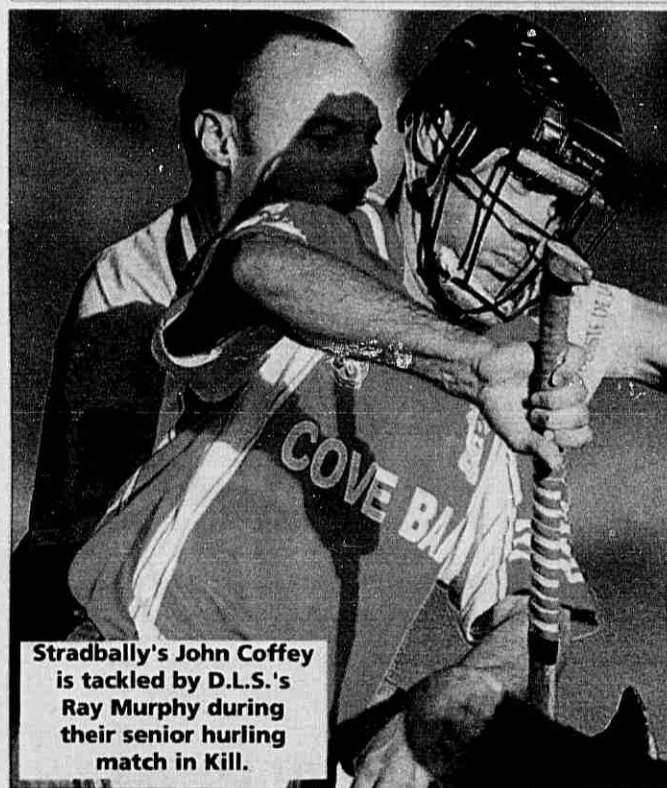

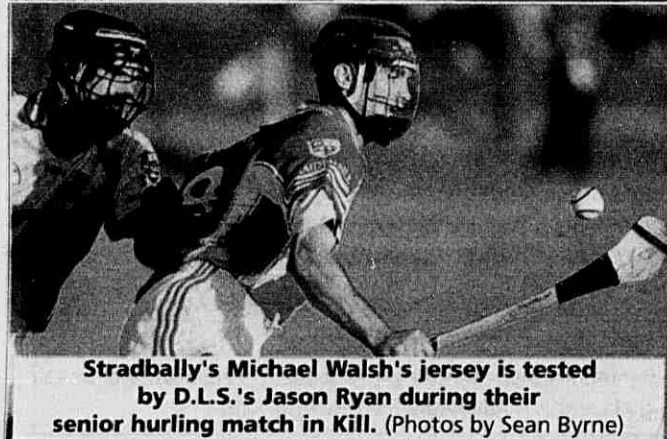

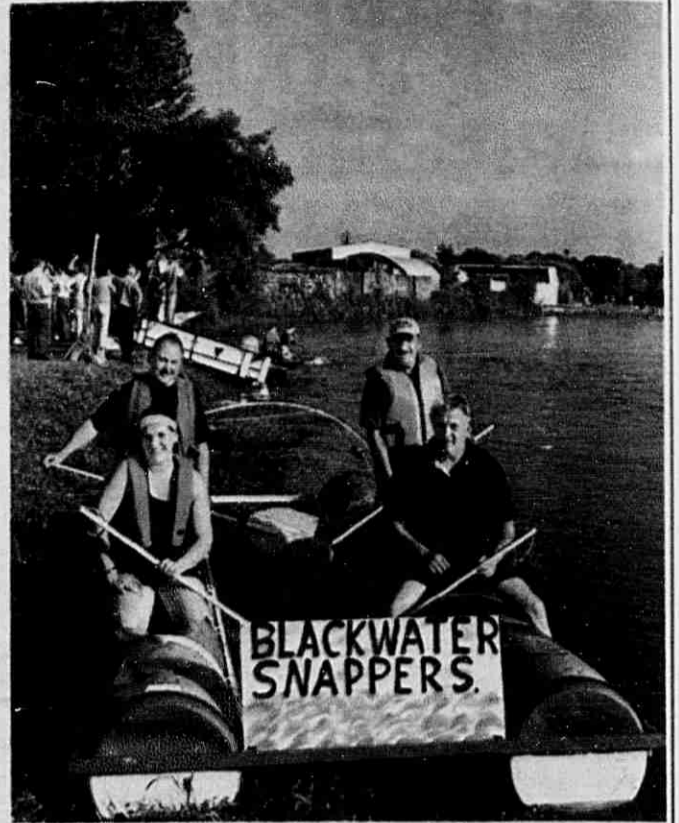

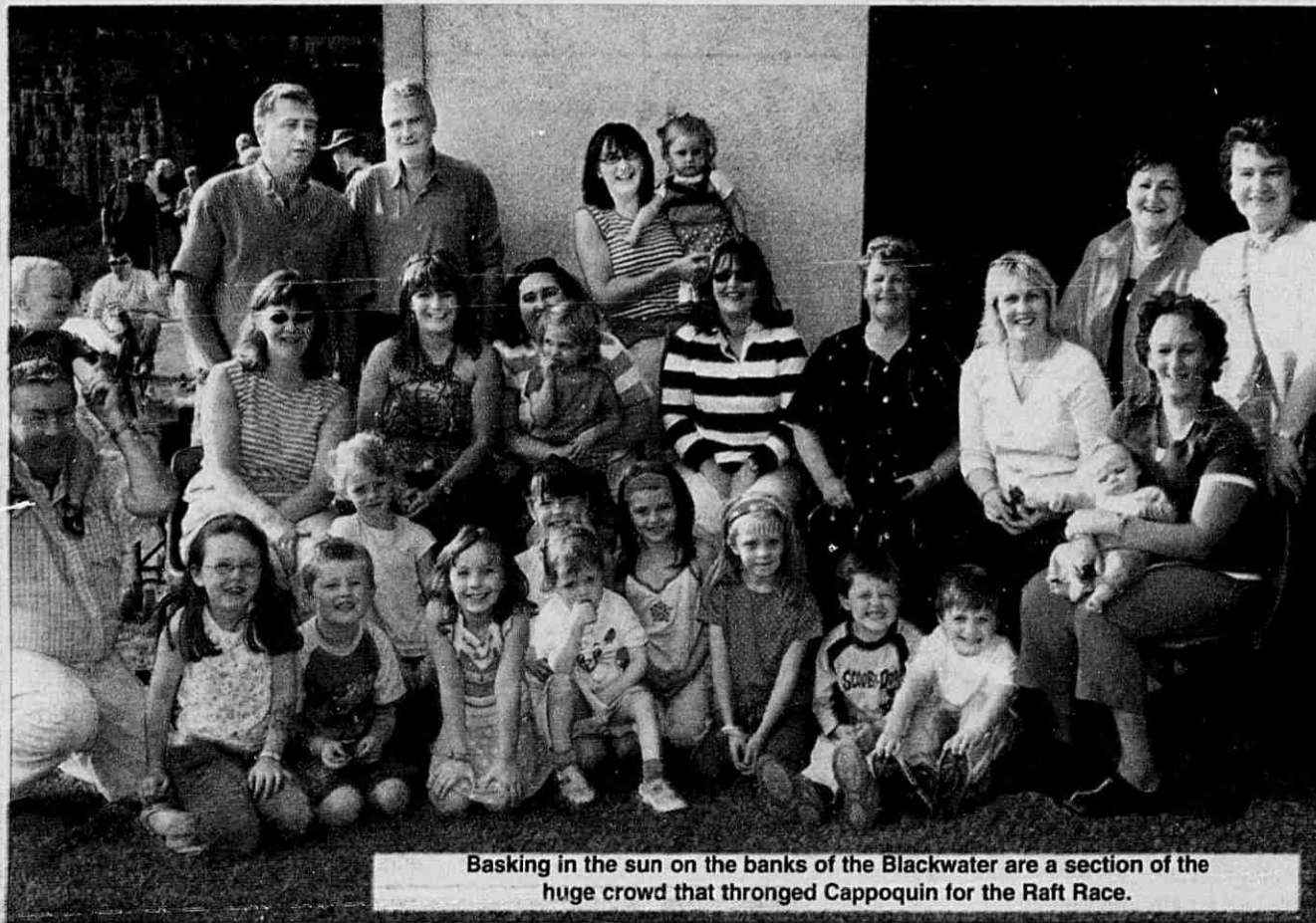
