





Dungarvan Loses Litter-Free Status

Dungarvan has lost its "litterfree" status and slipped twentythree places in the latest Irish Business Against Litter league table.

The results from the IBAL summer survey, which was conducted independently by An Taisce, show that Dungarvan has dropped from 7th to 33rd place in a list of fifty-seven towns inspected.

The spectacular collapse in standards apparently took place in the space of just three months when Round One of the 2005 Litter League named ter free towns in Ireland.

Reacting to the announcement, Independent councillor Michael O'Riordan said the results are very disappointing.



Everybody feels down from time to time, but for hundreds of depression, but unlike most modern anthousands of people in this country, depression is a day to day reality which is much more debilitating than the occasional low mood.

FEELING DOWN

Of course low mood is often the most prominent feature of depression, but there are numerous other common and distressing symptoms. Many people who suffer from depression have low self esteem and negative or irrational thoughts, and in more severe cases, individuals may experience delusions or even contemplate suicide. Sufferers often have very low energy levels, poor memory and concentration, and experience much less enjoyment of activities they used to love. Sleep disturbance is also a very common feature.

Physical symptoms are often present with depression. These may include muscle pains, constipation, reduced libido, poor appetite and weight loss (or in some cases weight gain due to comfort eating). Some people find their perception becomes less intense and they develop very slow speech and movement, while others can feel anxious or full of rage.

The medical approach to the treatment of depression usually in-

volves the use of drugs known as SSRIs (selective seratonin re-uptake inhibitors) such as Seroxat. These drugs work by increasing the availability of seratonin (an important chemical messenger in the brain) which in turn increases nerve impulse transmission. This is an effective form of treatment for some, however many people experience very unpleasant side effects such as headaches, anxiety, insomnia, excessive sweating, palpitations, and sexual dysfunction.

If used for long periods, antidepressant drugs can lead to exhaustion as the nerves are forced to keep firing beyond their usual capacity. Many people also experience problems when trying to reduce the dose, and some find that the depression returns when they stop taking the tablets. Perhaps of most concern are the findings of a re-cent study which reported an increased risk of suicide among people taking SSRIs. Therefore, many people are now seeking a safer, more natural approach to the treatment of depression.

The most useful herb for this condition is St. John's wort, which is

available on prescription from Medical Herbalists and GPs. St. John's wort has been found to be equally as effective as modern anti-depressant drugs in the treatment of mild, moderate and even severe

tidepressants is not habit-forming and has a very low incidence of side effects. As well as being an effective antidepressant, St. John's wort is also a nerve tonic which helps to prevent symptoms returning after treatment is discontin-

Medical Herbalists use extracts of St. John's wort which are of high quality and considerably more potent than those which were previously available over the counter. Additional herbs are chosen depending on the particular symptoms being experienced, and a

unique blend of ingredients is prepared to suit the unique needs of the individual. For example, agnus castus is useful for depression which is due to hormonal imbalance, while rose can help with depression due to bereavement

For those who experience lack of energy and poor concentration, ginkgo biloba is an extremely effective part of the treatment. Valerian and passionflower are useful for people who experience anxiety and sleeplessness, while skullcap is good for negative thoughts. Herbs are also available which can help to relieve the physical symptoms of depression. Useful supplements include vitamin B complex and essential fatty acids, both of which are necessary for a healthy nervous system.

If you think you may be suffering from depression, herbal medicine can be a very effective form of treatment, but it is essential to seek the advice of a qualified practitioner. If you are already taking antidepressant medicines, it is important that you do not make any changes to your medication without the assistance of your doctor. Ideally, herbal treatment should begin before you start to reduce the dose of antidepressants.







CENTRAL AMERICAN CIVILIZATION

he three great civilisations of South American were the Incas, the Aztecs and the Mayas. The Mayas were a major tribe of South Americans who established an amazing civilisation in Central America from the 3rd to 9th centuries A.D. 



Check the ram

Purchase replacement rams at least 8 weeks before mating to allow them adapt to their new environment and diet. Rams already on the farm should be examined at least 8 weeks before mating so problems can be treated or a replacement sought well in advance of mating. A proper examination will also reduce the number of infertile or subfertile

Head: Eyes should be clear. Conditions like pink eye effect the ram's sight and can quickly spread to the rest of the flock. Check for crusty growths on top of the ram's head which maybe due to orf, mange or fighting. Good teeth are important since eating problems can affect body condition. Check for any swelling around the molar teeth on either side of the jaw.

Feet, legs and joints: Examine the feet to ensure they are free of footrot and scald and pare and foot bath if required. Watch the way the ram walks and feel each leg and joint for swelling or soreness. Lameness may reduce feed intake, sperm production and ram mobility during mating. Foot abscess can raise body temperature and reduce fertility.

Scrotum and testicles: There should be no signs of injury or diseases like mange lesions on the scrotum. Restrictions on testicle movement within the scrotum may indicate injury or infection. Testicles should be free of lumps and bumps. They should feel firm like a clenched biceps. The sperm store at the base of each testicle should not contain hard lumps. Check the sheath and penis for small growths or pustules. If orf is diagnosed then such a ram should not be used as they may rapidly infect ewes and rams.

Body condition: The ram should be in good body condition (score 3.5-4) at the start of mating. If he is thin now you need to find out why. Check the brisket for soreness or skin damage as these can put the ram off his work particularly if harnessed. Treat with ointment/spray. It is also important to consider the lean meat index and resistance to scrapie as outlined in the July newsletter.

Buying stock not trouble

When buying replacement stock make sure you do not buy trouble. The risk of introducing new diseases onto to your farm can be reduced by buying from a reliable source, thoroughly inspecting stock before purchase, by vaccinating and treating where appropriate and by operating a quarantine period. Ideally purchased stock should be kept separate from the rest of the flock for 4 weeks. During this time they should be closely watched for signs of disease. While many diseases have a longer incubation period than this it does help reduce the risk. Problems that arise should be managed during this time to avoid infecting the main flock. The main concerns are likely to be sheep scab, resistant worms, footrot, chlamydial (enzootic) abortion, toxoplasma abortion, orf and caseous lymphadenitis.

What is caseous lymphadenitis (CLA)?

This disease is caused by a bacteria spread by direct contact through skin wounds like shearing cuts or contaminated dip. CLA is an emerging problem in Irish sheep flocks. Reports from the UK indicate that CLA maybe most prevalent within terminal sire breeds. Thick walled abscess develop mainly in the lymph glands of the head and neck. Various lesions can occur including swellings up to 5cm in diameter under or behind the jaw. These lesions can rupture discharging infective pus. Controlling CLA is difficult because antibiotic treatment is ineffective and vaccines are not licensed for use here. Control is also made more difficult because CLA has a long incubation period, of 2-4 months before symptoms maybe seen and even then infected sheep may not always show overt clinical signs. Thus prevention is best. Breeding stock should only be purchased from flocks that do not have CLA. Carefully examine all sheep before purchase for abscesses and swellings. Suspect animals should be rejected along with others from the same flock. Ideally new stock should be isolated for 4 months and checked regularly for abscess or swellings before introduction to the main flock.

'Individual Fields,' curated by Aileen Corkery, is a group exhibition which brings together the work of seven internationally renowned artists -Matthew Barney, Richard Billingham, Gerard Byrne, Michael Craig-Martin, Dorothy Cross, Barry Flanagan and Richard Long - and features work in a variety of media in-cluding film, photography, sculpture, painting and textbased work.

The inaugural exhibition is a culmination of an ambition conceived by the Devonshire family in 2003 to transform the long-derelict West Wing of the castle into a state-of-the-art contemporary gallery.

Most of the works, which will be on display, have never been exhibited in Ireland before, and yet it is Ireland and its landscape that unites the exhibition, with each of the artists sharing a physical and/or emotional connection to this country.

This is most evident in Matthew Barney's triptych of photographs from CREMAS-TER 3 shot on location on the Giants Causeway; Richard Billingham's photographs of Wicklow and the Irish Coast; Richard Long's interventions in the Burren and County Mayo; Michael Craig-Martin's singular filmic work in the west of Ireland; and Gerard Byrne's Framed Photographs in Phoenix Park, Dublin.

Elsewhere more subtle associations and connections can be made between the artists and Ireland even if the work was not necessarily made there.

gan's abstract collages on paper from 1968; Billingham's new film Sweep shot in south of England and Long's recent mud works utilising local material from his hometown of Bristol.

The new contemporary gallery is a series of light-filled rooms of varying sizes, designed to accommodate artworks in all media.

Visual distraction is minimal, yet the design cleverly incorporates some of the castle's original features, allowing the visitor glimpses into its 1,000 year history.

The curator has carefully considered the unique personality of the new space in the overall concept of the show.

William Burlington, son of the present Duke of Devonshire, is the driving force behind the project.

He says, "Aileen has worked incredibly hard to bring this extraordinary group of artists together under one roof particularly as there was barely even a roof in place seven months ago.

"It means a great deal to me and my family to see such energy and life returning to this castle, which has been dormant for at least fifty years."

"Individual Fields" will be open to the public from 3 September and continue until 30th of October, daily 11am-to-6pm. Lismore Castle's private collection of contemporary sculpture will remain on show in the gar-

Major Upgrade Of Regional Sports Centre Paves Way For Soccer Excellence

Facilities at Waterford City Council's Regional Sports Centre home to Waterford United - are to be greatly enhanced following agreement with the FAI and the Department of Arts, Sport and Tourism, to invest €500,000 in a major upgrade.

An agreement was signed today under which Waterford City Council will spend up to €600,000 in bringing the grounds up to UEFA standards. This will involve increasing seating capacity at the WRSC by approximately 500; improving disabled access and facilities; increasing the number of turnstiles from two to six; lengthening the pitch and carrying out work to protect the

Waterford City Council has also received a grant of 100,000 investment planned at the Cork Road side of the WRSC to

At a meeting at WRSC attended by the Mayor of Waterford, Councillor Hilary Quinlan, City Manager, Conn Murray, the FAI's John Delaney and John Byrne with UEFA's Bob Breen, details of project were finalised.

"This is a very significant development for soccer and sport in general in Waterford," said Mayor Quinlan. "The development of the WRSC is part of a partnership process with the FAI which in time will see Waterford City become a centre of excellence for soccer development.

"At present 1,732 youths participate in school-boy soccer and that is an indication of the huge interest and potential which exists for the development of the sport. Waterford City Council is determined that the necessary infrastructure to facilitate the achievement of that potential will be provided here," added the

Negotiations are also at an advanced stage between Waterford City Council and a private developer which will result in a 12 million development on the Tramore Road side of the sports centre. The investment will provide a swimming pool, gymnasium, fitness and health facilities as well as all-weather tennis courts and playing pitches.

























































STRADBALLY SOCCER NOTES





Stuffed baked cucumbers

IF you are looking for a tasty low calorie summer supper dish, why not try this delicious recipe which can be made with large courgettes or cucumbers.

Ingredients:

(serves 4, 385 calories per serving)

4 eggs

3 tbs single cream

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp white pepper pinch grated nutmeg

1 tbs chopped parsley

1 tbs chopped dill

4 ridge cucumbers or large courgettes

350g ham

2 small onions 11/2 tbs vegetable oil

150 ml hot chicken stock

Garnish 2 tomatoes

few dill sprigs Method:



The final whistle sounded just thirty seconds into injury time as scenes of jubilation not often witnessed were seen as Ardmore / Grange had defied the odds to

be crowned All Ireland u12 Soccer Champions. For the children the realisation will take time to sink in but for the parents it was a proud moment to see their son win an All Ireland Medal. Ardmore commiserated with Boyle Celtic and again these words were recorded by RTE and played on Monday night. Once the excitement had died down the players were calling friends and family as messages of congratulations began to flow in. After the lads had changed, they were again taken for a meal this time at the Julianstown Hotel where they certainly enjoyed themselves. The parents continued in good form as the lads were now looking forward to receiving their Gold Medals.

PRESENTATION

The presentation ceremony was set for 8-30 pm with Monaghan who had beaten Kells after extra time taking the bronze medals. Boyle got Silver but the moment we were waiting for finally arrived as the Gold Medals were presented to each of the squad. The moment was captured on film and in photo as what started out as a hopeful journey had finished with the boys being crowned All Ireland Champions. Many had decided to stay another night while some had to head for home at that late hour. Thankfully all arrived safely as then plans were put in place for a welcome home party on Tuesday evening with a parade from the Church to the Round Tower Hotel

HOMECOMING PARADE

The team along with team manager Declan Barron was paraded through the village on Tuesday evening last to a welcome home reception at the Round Tower Hotel. Despite being a number of days in season the Hopeful Four Syndicate owned and Michael Delahunty trained Killaspy Molly a full sister to earlier winner Chain Gang produced a pleasing front running performance to capture the seventh event in 29.19. Stretching into an early lead over Rather Cool and Bill Is Waiting Killaspy Molly the 6/4 favourite made the best of her way home for a well deserved five and a half lengths success over a running on Richie Rapid.

Wilcox Tiger made a brave effort to make every post a winning one in the tenth contest but with the winning post in sight he was collared close home by Luke Fitzgerald's Lukes Roano (Roanokee-Lukes Honey) this 3/1 chance finishing strongly for a neck win in 29.60.

Trainer Jimmy Frisby had a welcome change of luck as he sent out the To Dye For Syndicate owned Good Hare Day (Fortune Mike-Frightful Laura) 2/1 to a well deserved 29.17 success in the eleventh contest. Showing good early speed up the rails Good Hare Day was always travelling well in the lead and despite the best efforts of Brandy Rebel and Fahee Droopys Good Hare Day held firm to triumph by one and three guarter lengths.

The final race of the night produced the fastest return of the session with the George Roche owned Vaughan Brindle (Bionic Prospect-Betfivemillion) 5/2 coming out best after a keen buckle with the always prominent Valentia Action. The new course is close to the airport, a bit closer to Waterford and has a nice historical feel to it. 
GOOD SPREAD OF CLUBS TAKE DIVISIONAL **HONOURS**







WORLD MASTERS TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Through To Final Of 800m

The World Maters Track and Field Championships are being held in San Sebastian, Spain, presently. Four West Waterford athletes are taking part in the championships. Some have already competed and some are still to compete. Diane Behan was first into action last Thursday in the heats of the ladies over 35 5,000 metres. Diane finished 11th from 16 starters in a time of 18.45.70. Richie Power competed on Friday in heat 1 of 6 for the over 45 800 metres, finishing in 8th place. He recorded a personal best time of 2.18.04 which was well inside his old standard of 2.20.17. Joe Gough competed on Thursday in heat 1 of 4 in the over 50 800 metres. Joe did enough to progress finishing third in 2.09.17, he then com-

peted in the semi finals on Sunday afternoon, and as we go to press a text from Spain tells us that Joe has indeed qualified for press a text from Spain tells us that Joe has indeed qualified for the final due to be held Monday evening at 6.30 p.m. Joe was drawn in semi final one of two and this proved to be a very fast race Rivera Jorge Ortiz, Porto Rico, was first in a super time of 2.02.38 from Dave Clingan, U.S.A. 2.02.47, third was Gonzalo Fraguas Mendez, Spain, 2.03.45, fourth was Wolfgang Kreemke, Germany 2.04.07 and Joe was fifth in 2.05.45. This was a seasonal best for Joe, indeed, it was his fastest time over 800 metres for the last seven years. Both Kreemke and Joe qualified as fastest losers as the second semi final was slower. This semi was dominated by two English athletes David Wilcox 2.04.99 and Alistair Dunlop 2.05.51 with Russian Alexander Kuzovnikov 2.06.92.

> As we can see from the above times Joe has a difficult task facing him in the final, but we know that he will have given it his best shot. Another West Waterford athlete is yet to compete at these championships when Danny McGrath will be in action on this Friday evening in the long jump and triple jump we also wish him well.

G.A.A. NOTES By "Commentator"

County Board Meeting

When the senior board meets in Dungarvan on Monday night next, delegates will be expected to "say their piece" on the subject of a team manager for hurling.

It is an important item on the agenda and will likely be debated for some time before authority is given to the executive

All through the year complaints have been made in public and in the media about the policy of pushing club championships into the background and giving a total free hand to the manager to forbid players to assist their clubs. Clubs have been kept without a championship match for 12/13 weeks be-

cause players were being 'protected' for the county.

Here is the opportunity and now is he time to lay down the ground rules about policy in this regard if the same thing is not going to happen in 2006.

TEAM CAPTAIN?

Who should appoint the county team captains, is a subject which has been aired quite a lot this year. For as long as I can remember it has been the policy of the county board to allow the reigning champions in both codes and in all grades to name the player who will lead the teams on the intercounty scene.

Down through the years there have been players with fine leadership qualities in charge and these do not have to be named to readers who have followed the fortunes (and misfortunes) of our county teams over the seasons.

There also have been team captains who failed to show any leadership qualities but have nevertheless been honoured just for popularity reasons within the champions club. It was recently pointed out to me that there is no Rule, no Bye Law or no Regulation which extends to the champions club the privilege of naming the captain.

The role of a captain should be to lead, to inspire confidence in his fellow team mates and to enjoy the respect of everyone associated with the campaign. And who is to say that a player who is not from the champions club does not possess such

Should the 30 man panel be given the choice of selecting a captain or should the team manager be invested with the authority to name the one whom he would like to see leading the

It would be interesting to hear other views on the subject before the time for naming the captain comes round again.

But there still are a lot of people moving about on the sidelines and many of these would appear to have no business being on the grounds and it would further help in this matter if clubs adhered to the regulations.



BARBECUE AND SKINS


