

parents to keep a close eye on their children's eyesight in the run up to International Literacy Day [Thursday 8 September].

This annual event celebrates and promotes the importance of reading and writing as a key part of children's lifelong learning





Herbs for Head Lice

Now that the kids are back at school, parents are again faced with the challenge of dealing with all the ailments that children

The oil of the East Indian Neem tree (Azadirachta indica) has insect pick up from each other. One of the most common of these is repellant properties which help to head lice which are often picked up at school and spread quickly to the rest of the family.

The main symptom is constant itching of the scalp, particularly behind the ears. The adult lice themselves may be seen on examination or when combing the hair, and the white eggs (often referred to as nits) may be seen clinging to the hair.

Unfortunately, many parents are finding that the products available for treating head lice infestations are becoming increasingly ineffective: as is always the case in nature, the lice are becoming more and more resistant to the chemicals used to keep them under control. In addition, parents are often concerned about putting products which may contain organophosphates and other chemicals on their children's hair, particularly those with sensitive skin or allergies.

Fortunately there are now a number of herbal products available for this problem which are both safe to use and very effective. Because plants contain a complex mix of many constituents, it is much more difficult for organisms such as head lice to become resistant to their effects. Furthermore, these constituents vary depending on the origin and growing condi-

prevent head lice infestation and increase the effectiveness of other treatments. Neem oil shampoo may be used regularly by both adults and children, though it is usually a good idea to have a periodic break from using the same product, perhaps during the school holidays. Lavender, tea tree and citronella essential oils also have insect repellant properties and may be added to a gentle un-

To treat any infestations which do occur, the best herb is quassia (picrasma excelsa). This herb is available in a herbal spray called 'Antelice'. For the first treatment the solution should be massaged well into the scalp, covering all of the hair and the nape of the neck. The eggs have a 7 - 14 day incubation period so it is a good idea to continue to spray the hair lightly and comb through daily to deal with any newly hatching lice.

Cliff Stabilisation Works To **Commence Soon**

A rolling strategy of attending to erosion in Helvick needs to be developed, and funding provided after the area endured a summer where the popular Cove was "out of bounds" to the

Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair said plans announced by Waterford County Council to carry out cliff stabilisation works, from the recently completed works westward, in the vicinity of Murrays Pub, are not enough.

The work, as well as other work undertaken in recent years, is being funded by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government. It will complete the works identified as urgent by the council's consultant to protect the R674 Regional Road.

In a letter to Cllr. O Ceilleachair, Deputy County Manager, John O'Flynn, said there have been a number of slippages of a relatively minor nature at the Cove over the past few winters.


"It's likely that further loose material will dislodge. It is proposed to provide fencing to keep people away from the foot of the cliff. No other works are proposed," Mr. O'Flynn said.

However, Cllr. O Ceilleachair said that while the county council are engaged in "some level of response" to his continuously raised concerns about coastal erosion in the general Helvick area, the situation remains "most unsatisfactory.

"Most regrettably, the popular Cove at Heilbhic has been 'out of bounds' to the public throughout the summer. Various bureaucratic and funding difficulties have been cited by the local authority but the absence of substantial safety works there to address the situation is most unsatisfactory.

"Local pressure will continue to be applied to the various authorities in order that the full enjoyment of the Cove area in Heilbhic become possible once more.

"As regards cliff erosion near the main road in the vicinity of Murrays Pub, there is also now local concern about destabilisation east of that point. Clearly, a rolling strategy of attending to erosion in this general area needs to be in mind and funding to match in order to guarantee peace of mind for local residents and safe usage into the future for road users.'

One Door Closes As Another Door Opens For Prominent Dungarvan Firm

A significant event in the modern history of Dungarvan took place this week with the closure for the last time of Curran's giftware shop in Grattan Square.

The firm which was founded by Michael and Sheila Curran in the early 1930's has now completed the move to its warehouse premises beside the roundabout in Kilrush following the closure of the first of its two Grattan Square shops ten years ago. Jack Curran and his brother Conor, along with their wives Mary and Maura, have run the hardware and furniture company since the 1960s. Jack acknowledges that moving from the square was not a decision taken lightly. "We were brought up over the shop in the square so it was an emotional tug to move but the nature of our business has changed and we had to react to the demands of our customers. The positive reaction we've had to our outlet on the ring road made it easier to move all the business there, but it's an emotional time nonetheless".

Curran's commitment to its customers is set to grow even further with the announcement of plans to double the size of its premises on the ring road. Conor Curran says customer service is the key driving factor. "We have to be able to provide ever higher levels of service and choice to our customers. We will provide the same product range and pricing as the faceless superstores but we'll do it with customer service at the top of our agenda. The type of thing that sets us apart from our competition, like courtesy and expert advice available on demand will remain central to our way of doing business. We pride ourwhere it is now."

opened the doors of his hardware premis-

es in 1932. Dungarvan was a much different place. The firm which now employs over thirty people then only needed two people to fulfil the hardware needs of its customers. According to Conor the biggest items in demand then were ironware and leather goods. "When our father opened the first shop, the premises suited his business. The majority of his stock was small in size - nails, saddles, small iron goods like horseshoes and the like. As the demand increased we expanded, opening the shop on the corner of the Square in the late sixties to sell furniture and fine goods and we had various yards around the town too for the bigger stock as the building and decorating side of the business grew.".

By the mid nineties the two premises in the centre of the town were becoming less suitable for the way the business was developing. Conor's son Shane who manages the hardware business says there was a change in the way customers' needs had to be met. "The growth in the construction business meant we had to adapt. In Kilrush our customers have easy access and plenty of free parking to call in get what they need.

Michael Curran who manages the Interiors side of the business agrees that how business is done has changed dramatically. "Nowadays customers quite rightly are no longer happy to just pick from a brochure. 

- (a) a compulsory purchase order in respect of the land if an objection is made in respect of the acquisition by an owner, lessee or occupier of the land, and not withdrawn,
- (b) an order which authorises the extinguishment of a public right of way if there is an objection to the extinguishment, which is not withdrawn,

How Mexico City Was Founded

In 1168 the Aztecs received a vision of Quetzalcoatl, the great feathered god, who commanded them to look for the permanent home he had selected for them. He said they would find an island on a lake where he would reappear as a golden eagle carrying a snake in its talons. The eagle would settle on a cactus and there they should build a capital city. Over 150 years later the prophecy came true and the Aztecs built the city of Tenochtitlán, which means 'cactus rock', on islands in Kate Texcoco. It had a population of about 300,000 people.

Tenichtitlán is known today as Mexico City and the Mexican flag shows the eagle perched on a cactus with a snake in its beak.







one! The right trees can transform a garden into something very special. Their shape and size influence the tone of the garden formal, graceful, naturalistic. There are any number of small trees to consider for the garden. We've picked a selection to look out for next time you are visiting your local garden centre. Robinia pseudoacacias are a super option with attractive oval leaflets growing along a stem to make up the leaves (up to 30cm long). Certainly a long name to remember - ask for the small Robinia with the rounded crown, your local garden centre should be able to help. In midsummer these trees produce delicate white flowers

grant. 'Umbraculifera' is the perfect little tree for a small garden space, it reaches a height of around 6 metres. It has a straight columnar trunk and is a neat specimen. The ornamental cherry family have a wide range of small trees to choose from. Many have features to enjoy such as spring blossom or attractive bark. Prunus serrulata 'Kiku-shidare' has arching branches which curve downwards giving the tree a dramatic look. Shown to its best in spring when clusters of pink blossom cascade along its branches. Its glossy green leaves are oval and slightly serrated. Prunus serrulata 'Kiku-shidare'

which curve downwards giving the tree a dramatic look. Shown to its best in spring with gorgeous blossom, it grows to a height of approximately 4 metres and a spread of about 3 metres.

Also look out for choices from the Catalpa and Crataegus families. Foliage and blossom or flowers are all part of the attraction with these trees. Crataegus laevigata 'Paul's Scarlet' is a popular choice because it has lots to offer with its clusters of dark pink flowers in spring and summer followed by small red (inedible) fruits in autumn. This is a tough tree ideal for an urban garden or an exposed or coastal location. Ornamental trees are

remarkably adaptable in their uses in the garden. They provide focal points in lawns or borders, frame gateways and entrances into other areas. They are also useful as wind or sound breaks and as part of a scheme for screening or hedging. Try using a tree as a main feature. A full sun position is an advantage. Grow in any moist, but well drained, moderately fertile soil. Winter and early spring are ideal times for planting. It is important to avoid frosty periods. Ideally plant Robinias in a spot sheltered from strong winds. Each of the trees mentioned are frost hardy and require little maintenance. Why not treat yourself and your garden and plant a tree this weekend?

Mass at Knockboy **Ancient Church**

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass will be celebrated on Thursday evening, 8th September at 7.30 pm, the feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin, at the Ancient Church of Saint Sechnenus at Knockboy. This historic and ancient church of Seskinane situated at Knockboy now a skeletal ruin was built by Saint Sechnenus in the fifth century. Cut into stone in one of the door ways at this church are the figures 471. The church was demolished around the end of the 16th century as was every edifice of Catholic worship in Ireland in those dread and evil days. This church replaced a very ancient church and pagan cemetery which at an early period was converted to Christian use probably by Saint Declan or Saint Patrick. The Church and cemetery here occupies part of four fields which were owned by four separate farming families, each donating a quarter of the space required to make up the whole, and each quarter

FARMERS MARKET SUFFERS A SET BACK

Moves to establish a farmers market outside the Main Guard in Clonmel have been put on hold and the search for another location has begun. Because of restrictions imposed by the O.P.W. concerning use of the Main Guard for a farmers market, which also led to protests from business people in the area, supporters of the project are looking elsewhere. Although they have not given up on setting up in the Main Guard at some point the promoters of the farmers market are actively involved in looking for an alternative site in the town. The Main Guard location moved over a year ago. Looks a non-runner in the short term given the O.P.W. restrictions concerning non availability of power, no toilets, limited trading times, restrictions on sale of food and the strong protest by a number of traders in the area. The Chairman of the Farmers Market project, Bernie Lennon claims he was very disappointed at the setbacks encountered with the Main Guard location. The O.P.W. were restrictive to the extent that you could not go with it, he said. It is a pity because on market day it would have brought back to the centre of the town a footfall of shoppers that are being attracted out of the town centre to outlying retail outlets on the by-pass said Bernie Lennon. He emphasised that the committee have not yet given up on the main guard but were looking at other options. The committee are actively pursuing other locations, among them are, Market Place, the GAA Car Park on the Western Road, Thomas St., Joyces Lane and the Poppyfield.



This tradition looks set to continue, with a trainee on the books this year and two more candidates from the Club expected to start their training next year. 


