Cllr. Wilkinson Tells F.G. Hands Off Waterford County Council's Cash!

Fine Gael Strenuously Denies Claims

Claims by Fianna Fail county councillor Kevin Wilkinson that Fine Gael is using local authority cash to fund a party political conference have been strenuously denied by Fine Gael party whip, Paudie Coffey.

In a war of words, which erupted early this week, Cllr. Wilkinson accused Fine Gael of a "scam" by using local authority cash to fund, what he claimed, is a media training conference for its county councillors in Athlone at the end of this week.

However, Cllr. Coffey hit back, claiming Fianna Fail are attempting to put a slant on the conference, which he said deals with important national issues, and is open to councillors from all parties.

In a statement issued on Mon-

day, Cllr. Wilkinson said it was "entirely inappropriate" for Fine Gael to expect the local authority budget to cover the cost of their councillors attending a party political meeting, and urged County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer, not to sanction the use of council money to cover the cost.

"SCAM"

"It would be like me asking Mr. O'Dwyer for local authority funding to cover my expenses at the Fianna Fail Ard Fheis in Killarney next month," Cllr. Wilkinson claimed.

"Fine Gael's scam really defies logic and reason. I am call-

ing on the County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer, to put a stop to this nonsense."

He said literature circulated by Fine Gael makes it clear the

party is to receive 200 euro for every one of its councillors attending the party conference.

That money can be recouped

Gardai Lacking Manpower To Tackle Anti-Social Behaviour

Gardai in Dungarvan are not being given the manpower or resources to effectively tackle anti-social behaviour, according to Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair.

The Labour Mayor, who was speaking at Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, highlighted the number of incidents which have occurred in the town recently.

These included a serious disturbance two weeks ago in an estate in the town when a Garda was forced to wait between half an hour and an hour before back-up was available.

The lengthy delay occurred because Gardai were policing Tallow Horse Fair the same day.

Mayor O Ceilleachair said the Gardai in Dungarvan are not getting the resources promised by the Government before the last election.

He said the Government recently spent 30 million euro buying farmland in Co. Meath which was only worth 6 million euro, for a new prison. But they haven't provided the extra manpower needed for a town of Dungarvan's size.

Anti-social behaviour has become a growing problem in the town over the past number of years.

Ongoing incidents have been reported in Walton's Park, the Town Park and the old graveyard while serious vandalism has been caused to the Causeway Tennis Club and Cunnigar

Pitch & Putt Club.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said "yobbos" who gather in the Town Park at night are likely to have been behind the recent damage there, including damage to a car in the area.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield, meanwhile, criticised recent comments by Fine Gael Deputy John Deasy.

He said he "did not appreciate" comments from the Deputy that the local authority is not doing enough to tackle anti-social behaviour.

Cllr. Mansfield added: "There is no easy solution to this problem. We are doing our best. It's very easy to put out surveys on crime. It's not easy to solve it."

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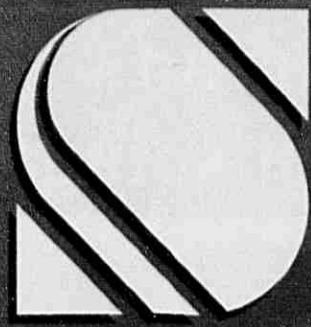

Signs Of Frustration For Local Groups Over Council Policy

Community fingerpost signs are being refused permission while a "plethora of massive signs featuring a long list of the County Engineer's qualifications" are going up all around the county, one county councillor complained at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council.

Fine Gael councillor, Tom Higgins said he has spent six months lobbying for a fingerpost sign for Kilgobnet GAA hall without any success.

Cllr. Higgins was commenting on the Draft Roadside Signage Policy, which was before the council for approval.

RESTRICTIONS

The council rejected the initial draft policy, fearing that it would tighten restrictions for local community groups who wish to advertise upcoming events. The main aim of the policy is to regulate auctioneers signs.

The plan was proposed by Fianna Fail councillor, Pat Daly, who said the council's Strategic Policy Committee, had spent a lot of time altering it.

However, Cllr. James Tobin (FF) said: "they can't have spent too much time. We were only given five lines of a report before the meeting started."

He said he couldn't support the plan without seeing the assurances he'd sought on community signage.

Cllr. Higgins also warned against "rushing into" a decision without all the information.

A further discussion on the draft policy was deferred until the next meeting of the council.

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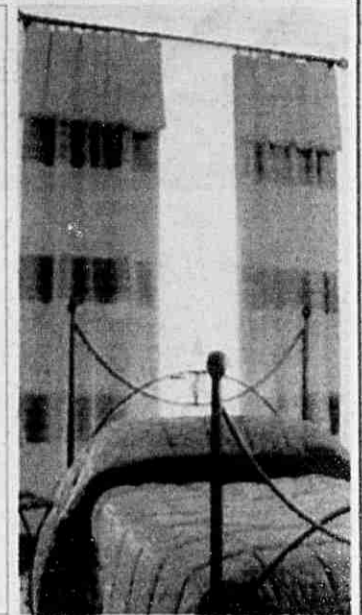

Dungarvan Woman Runner-Up In Beacons Of Hope Competition To Mark World Lymphoma Awareness Day

Alice Strain from Dungarvan, was announced as a runner up in the Beacons of Hope photography competition at a ceremony on Thursday 15th September in the Irish Cancer Society Offices. Alice received her prize for her photograph entitled "Hope is believing everything is possible".

The Beacons of Hope competition was developed by Lymphoma Support Ireland and the Irish Cancer Society in partnership with Roche Products Irl. Ltd. to celebrate World Lymphoma Awareness Day by encouraging the public, especially those who have been touched

by cancer, to represent hope and survivorship through the medium of photography. World Lymphoma Awareness Day aims to increase awareness of lymphoma and highlight that improved symptom recognition will lead to accurate diagnosis, improving the lives of those affected by the condition and ultimately improving treatment outcome and survival rates.

Alice's picture is of her nephew Kevin aged 7 and he is her Beacon of Hope. "The photo captures him hoping to fly skyward with his birthday balloons. Looking at the world through Kevin's eyes always

fills me with hope and makes me believe, as I did when a child, that everything is possible" she said.

The judging panel, which included internationally renowned photographer Perry Ogden, received over 250 entries and commented that the standard of entry was remarkably high, making the judging process very challenging. Many of the entrants were cancer survivors or had personal experiences of cancer through family members or friends. In addition to the winner, 11 runners up were highly commended and also awarded prizes at

the ceremony.

Lymphoma (cancer of the lymphatic system) is the fastest growing cancer after lung cancer and is most prevalent in the 20 - 40 year old age group. Approximately 800 people are diagnosed with lymphoma each year in Ireland and Northern Ireland, yet research demonstrates that little is known of the condition. In fact, results of a recent global study conducted shows that less than 50% of people surveyed have any knowledge or understanding of lymphoma and nearly three quarters of people (73%) are shocked and surprised by how little they know and want to know more.

Cllr. Flynn said other businesses had "no interest" in coming to Cappoquin because of the parking shortage. "I've even been asked by the Gardas what can we do about it," she added. She said the problem needs to be solved, and asked that it be put on the agenda of the area meeting.

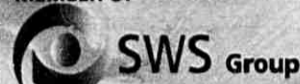

Step by Step – County Waterford Walking Strategy launched

“Go on, get out there, and Walk Waterford!” That is the message being relayed by a new strategy launched this week by Waterford County Council. Speaking at the launch, Councillor Nora Flynn, Chair of the Economic Development and Community Services SPC, emphasised that County Waterford had a wonderful array of landscapes for the walking enthusiast – mountains, valleys, woodlands and coasts. This strategy would form the platform for the development of this walking product for both the tourist and for our own communities.

Well known author Michael Fewer, who attended the launch on behalf of the Irish Sports Council, spoke of his delight at the unveiling of this work. Firstly, he welcomed it because of how perfectly it fitted within the context of current national initiatives, such as the National Trails Strategy, Comhairle na Tuaithe, the development approach of Fáilte Ireland and the work of the Obesity Task Force. He also welcomed it because this was the first local work of its kind in Ireland and he was delighted that it was his own County which had taken the lead. Many others will follow. He heartily congratulated Waterford County Council on its leadership.

Some of the key themes of the strategy are Access, Trail Development, Tourism/Economic Gain and Promotion/Marketing. With regard to Access, the County is blessed in that there are a vast array of non-contended points of access to the most important walking routes and the most scenic spots in the County. Overall, a genuine respect has built up between landowners and the walking fraternity, to their mutual benefit and to the

benefit of local communities.

Waterford Leader Partnership will be one of the main partners in the implementation of this strategy along with the County Council and both will be concentrating their efforts in the areas of trail development and management. The initial work will concentrate on the development and management, in partnership with local communities and other bodies such as Coillte, of some 10-15 key

strategic routes in the County. Thereafter, work will continue with interested communities to develop and manage local routes, while the work of promoting and marketing will be undertaken, especially by such as the Regional Tourism Authority and Waterford Sports Partnership.

Some of the key findings outlined in the Strategy are: €112.7 million was spent by overseas visitors engaged in

Walking in Ireland in 2003

There are 235,000 estimated domestic walkers who contribute to overnight stays

Over 79.9% of women participate in recreational walking – for men, it is less than 70%

There are only three affiliated walking groups based in the County – Dungarvan, Ballyduff and Kilmacthomas

In his introduction to the strategy, County Mayor, Councillor Ger Barron has this to say:

“I acknowledge the contribution of all the Working Group to this work and especially the community representatives. I also congratulate Brian White, and his staff in the Community and Enterprise Section, especially Richie Walsh, who facilitated the process. Now, however, the real work begins. The strategy contains a range of actions which will need to be undertaken in order to make County Waterford the “Walking Capital of Ireland”. They will need resources and commitment. They will need partnership and collaboration. I ask everyone to contribute to the “Walk Waterford” idea. Not necessarily in one fell swoop, but little by little – STEP BY STEP”.

Let the vision unveiled in the Strategy though have the final word:

A Waterford where all people of all ages and all abilities – local and visitor alike – walk conveniently, safely and often.

Better Roads On Way For Lismore Motorists With €3.6m Grant – Wilkinson

Waterford Fianna Fáil Councillor Kevin Wilkinson has said motorists in the Lismore electoral area will shortly drive on better roads after €3.6 million was allocated to upgrade national primary and secondary routes.

“The money has been allocated to Waterford County Council to spend between now and 2008. That means the local authority will have €1.2 million to spend each year on improving our national primary and secondary routes in the Lismore area.

“I have made several representations to the local authority on behalf of people living in the Lismore electoral area. We need to improve our roads.

We need to make them safer and smoother to save lives and reduce wear and tear on motorists’ cars. I will keep pressing for more funding to improve our roads and I would urge Waterford County Council to identify priority routes as a matter of urgency,” said Cllr. Wilkinson.

Meanwhile, Cllr. Wilkinson pointed out that the Minister for Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs, Éamon Ó Cuív TD, has made available €75,000 for enhancements to local housing estates in Cappoquin, Lismore and Ballyduff.

He said these amounts are important to local areas where enormous differences can be made when money is allocated sensibly for small-scale projects that make a real difference to people’s lives.

Stradbally Tourism & Enterprise

An update on the status of the new Sewage Scheme in Stradbally, after discussions with Waterford County Council as of 19th September 2005.

As part of the Grouped Towns & Villages Sewage Scheme, the Part 8 Planning for the proposed Treatment Plant and Collection System for Stradbally has been approved by the elected members of the council.

Currently, Waterford County Council are carrying out Ground Investigation works in advance of the contract documents for the scheme being finalised.

Landowners have been contacted with regard to Land Acquisition and Wayleaves for the scheme and negotiations are ongoing. It is expected that the collection System will be going to tender in July 2006, pending approval by the Dept of Environment, Heritage and Local Government. The Treatment Plant is expected to go for tender in June 2006, again pending approval by the DEHLG.

Construction of the Collection System is expected to go for tender in June 2007, while the Treatment Plant is expected to begin construction in early 2008. Both elements of the sewerage scheme are expected to be operational by late 2009.

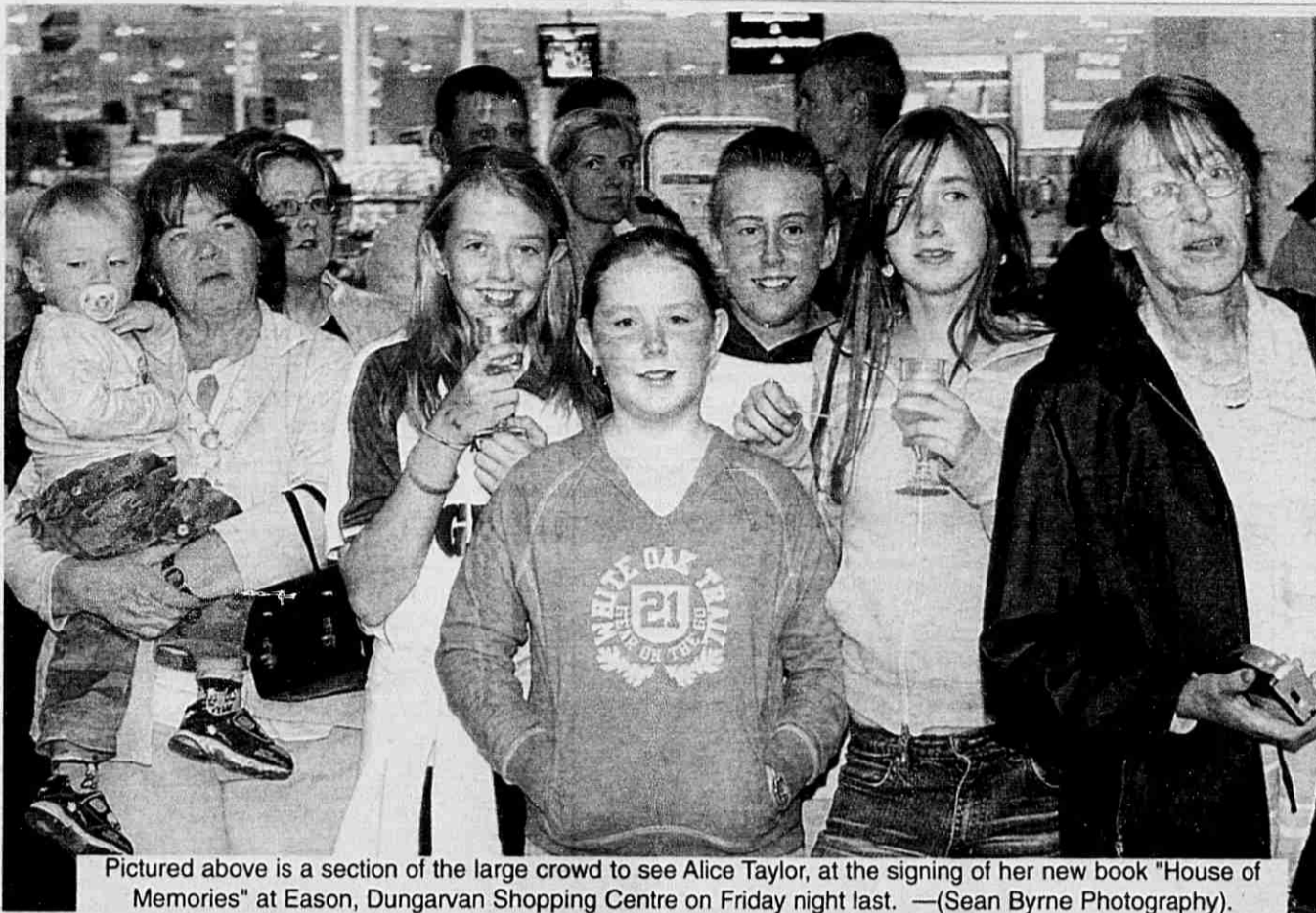

Council Urged To Avoid "Sterilising" Land

Extreme planning enforcement measures should only be used when all other efforts fail, the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Section 47 Orders – the sterilisation of land – are included in the new County Development Plan, which will be in force until 2011. However, a number of councillors cautioned against the use of measures, which Fine Gael councillor Mary Green described as "very extreme."

MEETING

The council was legally obliged to adopt Government guidelines on rural housing as part of the CDP. While Section 47 Orders were part of those guidelines, the county council

agreed to hold a meeting to decide what circumstances they can be used in.

Cllr. Nora Flynn, Fine Gael, said she was aware Section 47's are being used a lot.

"It's not good enough," she said. "Each case should be dealt with on its individual merits."

LAST RESORT

Suir electoral area Cllr. Paudie Coffey (FG) said sterilisation should be "a last resort," adding that the County Development Plan should not be putting further barriers to people who wish to build on their own land.

Pat Daly of Waterford County Council said members had all agreed how one-off housing should be dealt with. Section

47's were needed to "keep control" of areas "under pressure" and which were in danger of "snowballing" out of control.

LEGALITY

An amendment to restrict the use of the Section 47 Orders, was put forward. But its legality was questioned by County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer.

The policy set out in the County Development Plan was to deal with high pressure areas, he said.

"If they are being used in Low Pressure Areas, then we will have to look at that."

Cllr. Flynn said that sections of the County Development Plan on rural housing are unconstitutional, and the "day is coming" when someone challenges their legality in the High Court.

CHANGES

Fianna Fail Cllr. Tom Cronin, who previously called for

changes to the Plan, pointed out that Limerick County Council changed their County Development Plan, and the council in the Minister's own constituency turned it down.

In comments directed towards the council's majority Fine Gael party benches, Cllr. Cronin's party colleague, Cllr. Kevin Wilkinson, said Limerick County Council "rightly used their powers" to change the CDP.

PRECEDENT

Labour councillor, Teresa Wright warned that a precedent would be set if councillors decided to "rehash" the CDP every few months, while fellow Labour councillor, Billy Kyne said Fine Gael and Fianna Fail members were "cherry-picking" sections of the plan.

A meeting will be held next month to decide when Section 47 Orders can be used.

"Blitz" Of Infrastructure Works Needed In Ballinroad

A "blitz" of infrastructure works must be carried out in Ballinroad before any more housing developments are granted planning permission, according to Labour councillor, Billy Kyne.

Cllr. Kyne told a recent meeting of the county council that traffic signs, lights, road markings and a series of other short-term safety measures must be put in place, and an action plan drawn up for the long term development of the area.

Cllr. Kyne recently compiled a list of works which need to be addressed in an area which he said is as big as the town of Cappoquin but suffering from a chronic shortage of infrastructure.

In a letter to Cllr. Kyne from Director of Services, John O'Flynn, Mr. O'Flynn responded to his points.

WORKS PLANNED

These included: Kilminion Graveyard, which has been put forward for inclusion in the Environment Department's Low Cost Remedial Measures Scheme for next year, and is the priority project in the Dungarvan Electoral Area.

In relation to the Junction serving the Hally Development, Mr. O'Flynn said there is a proposal for access to Ballinroad from the R675 Coast Road through lands opposite Kilminion Close to a proposed new roundabout. A planning application has recently been received for these lands and it is hoped to put the required road infrastructure in place in conjunction with this development.

Regarding public lighting, his re-

port said Ballinroad is not in the current 2004-06 Public Lighting Programme, but it will be considered for any future programme and ducting will be included in any new footpaths.

ROUNDBABOUT

A new roundabout is proposed to alleviate problems at the dangerous junction at St. Laurence's Hall as part of the Clonea Strand Access Road realignment.

A 14,000 euro per year footpath programme is also planned over a five year period. Footpaths will be

constructed between the church and the hall; Kilminion Junction; between Lord Maguires and Knocknagranagh estate; Ballinroad Cross to Kilminion junction; and from Kilminion Graveyard to St. Augustines College.

Road safety works are also planned on the Ballinroad to Garribane road, which has been included in Year 1 of the 2006 - 08 Road Restoration Programme.

Road markings will be painted in the greater Ballinroad area as soon as possible, Mr. O'Flynn said.

Council Claims Refuse Charges Too Low

By Kevin Kirrane
County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer, claimed householders are not being charged enough for the county's refuse service.

Speaking at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council, Mr. O'Dwyer said the "bottom line" in the council's 700,000 euro budget shortfall, is the council is not taking in enough income from each household. He said that while the council's current waste management "model" may be great in terms of giving an incentive to recycle, it is not so great at generating enough income to cover costs.

CUTBACKS

This is despite a series of cutbacks in services. The number of collections was reduced, the environmental awards scheme

scrapped, and no new staff are being hired by the Environment section.

Paul Daly of Waterford County Council's environment section said the annual cost per householder of the current service is very low at 125 euro a year. And he warned the local authority is "heading into a storm." He said the waste crisis is set to escalate following the closure of Tramore landfill, the cost of remediating Tramore and Dungarvan landfills, the loss of income from their closure, and the cost of shipping waste to Carlow.

He said the calculations were based on the number of householders, divided by the number of refuse tags sold in the first half of the year.

Earlier in the year, Mr. Daly

said the figure was 147 euro per year. However, the figure was revised downwards after "seasonal factors" were taken into account.

DATABASES

Fifteen-and-a-half thousand householders are believed to be using the service in the county. Satellite imagery from tags placed in the new brown bins has enabled the county council to establish where these bins are located.

And new databases to establish the status of each householder, including their socio-economic status are being compiled.

Mr. Daly said adverts will be placed in newspapers shortly, asking the 1,000 or so householders who did not return the survey which was with the

brown bins, to fill them out and drop them into shops.

Households which fail to return the surveys by 10th of October, will have their collections stopped, he said.

FIGURES WRONG

However, Fianna Fail Cllr. Pat Daly questioned the figures. He said householders were paying considerably more than 125 euros a year. "We've brought in a three-weekly collection. Adding up the average amount of refuse and recycling people put out, it will work out somewhere around 433.50 euro."

"I believe that the figures we're being given are distorted."

"Even if you put out one grey bin a month and even six brown bins a year - that's one every two months - your figures will work out at 261 euro," he said.

Dungarvan-based Century Homes say Government Failure to Spend EU millions Shows Disregard for Energy Efficiency in Homes

Gerry McCaughey, Chief Executive of Century Homes - Europe's largest timber frame home manufacturer - today strongly criticised the Government's proposal to reallocate 5 million of EU funding away from sustainable energy.

He said: "The Government has already cut the budget for renewable energy by 15 million in 2004 because it failed to invest the European Union funding allocated to the area. It is a disgrace that they are now proposing that another 5 million should be subtracted from the 2005 and 2006 budgets."

"It is remarkable that at precisely the time of rising oil prices, the Government continues its record of dismal failure to invest in sustainable energy," he added.

"This latest insult comes after the Department of the Environment knowingly allowed over 250,000 homes to be built here over five years to be built to energy standards 35% below what they should have been, because any improvements would have had a negative effect on the concrete industry," he said.

"Right now these home owners are paying up to an average of 600-1200 per annum more on heating bills than an energy efficient home, or 15,000-30,000 over the life time of a 25-year mortgage. The inexorable rise in the price of oil will ensure that many home heating bills will skyrocket this winter," he added.

"We will pay a heavy price for the lack of any political vision on the need for a strong sustainable energy sector. Not one penny of Government funding was given to sustainable energy research throughout the 1990s and in the National Development Plan 2000-2006 the area was given the very least priority."

"This winter the people most affected by this political failure will be those families on the lower end of the income scale, many of whom could be forced into the fuel poverty trap for the first time ever," he added.

Century Homes was established in 1990. It is the biggest timber-frame manufacturing company in Europe. The company currently employs 560 in total in plants in Dungarvan, Monaghan, Longford, Cardiff, Newcastle and a sales and engineering office in London.

EROSION

Erosion will be an important topic in the secondary schools of the county over the coming year as it forms part of the subject of a project in the Geography Syllabus.

It is a natural process that happens wherever air or water move, as wind, waves or as currents in rivers or the sea. Problems can arise where soils are loosened by human activity, be it walking or farming.

On Co. Waterford's mountain tops, particularly on the Comeraghs, the blanket bog turf (sometimes called peat) is being washed away in large patches. High blanket bog erosion has been going on many Irish mountains and it is not really known if it is the result of climate change, vegetation burning in too large patches or to overgrazing.

There is erosion on almost every river bend, at the outer edge. It can be speeded up by the unwise removal of riverside trees and shrubs; the drainage of wetlands nearby that makes the river more prone to floods and by the wakes of speedboats and jet skis.

Soil erosion and loss can be a problem in fields that are ploughed up too often. Sticky fine mud in hollows or at the lower ends of slopes is often the first sign.

Rivers get cloudy with silt downstream of erosion; the silt can settle and clog up salmon spawning beds and other habitats.

Some of the most spectacular erosion happens at cliffs that are exposed to the full force of the sea. Many cliffs in Waterford, especially near Bunmahon, show patches that have been stripped bare of vegetation by landslides. These happen where waves undercut the rock and the roar of falling rock can be heard from miles away.

At Tramore and Bunmahon there is erosion of the delicate sand dunes by wind and waves. In both places this is being made worse by trampling that kills the delicate grasses that bind the sand. At Tramore the problem has been going on for at least fifty years and might threaten to cut the dunes into an island. Waterford County Council, Fáilte Ireland and University College Cork are studying this problem at the moment.

From Samuel Lewis's Topographical Dictionary 1837 ARDMORE (Continued)

The living is a vicarage with that of Ballymacart united, in the diocese of Lismore, and in the patronage of the Bishop; the rectory constitutes the corps of the precentorship in the cathedral of Lismore. The tithes amount to £650 of which £433.68 is payable to the precentor, and £216.13.4 to the vicar; and the gross tithes of the benefice amount to £258. The church and glebe-house are annexed to the vicarage: the glebe belonging to the precentor consists of the lands of Ardochart, in this parish, comprising 68a. 5p., and 48 a. in the parish of Lismore; and the vicarial glebe comprises 20a. 1r. 9p. In the R.C. divisions this parish is the head of the union or district, comprising the parishes of Ardmore, Ballmacart, and Lisgi-

nan, in each of which is a chapel; the chapel of Ardmore is situated in the village, and is commodious edifice of recent erection. There are a Sunday school and five day schools, in the latter of which are about 240 children. Some remains exist of the ancient church, consisting chiefly of the chancel, part of which, till the recent erection of the present edifice, was used as a parish church; it was a fine building, richly decorated with sculpture, and still displays traces of its former magnificence. To the south-east of the church is a small, low, and plain building, called the Dormitory of St. Declan, and held in great veneration by the inhabitants of the neighbourhood; it was repaired and roofed about a century since Bishop Willis. In the church yard is one of the ancient round towers, a fine specimen of those monuments of remote antiquity. On Ardmore Head are some slight remains of an ancient church, but in a state of such dilapidation that few traces either of its original architecture or embellishment can be distinguished. Near it is St. Declan's well, which is held in veneration by people of the neighbourhood; and on the beach is St. Declan's stone, resting on the ledge of rock, by which it is raised a little from the ground, and at which, on July 24th, the festival of the saint, numbers of people assemble for devotional purposes. Several circular intrenchments may be traced in various parts of the parish. Near Ardmore Head is a large and curious cavern, called the "Parlour;" and on the coast, which is precipitously rocky, are several other caverns. (To be continued).

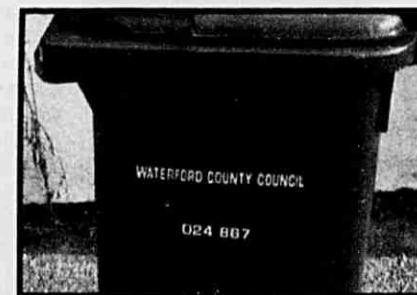

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DAIRYING: Crowds Flock to Cappagh for Open Day

"The best farm walk I have ever been on". This was a statement echoed by many of the 1,600 dairy farmers who came from all over Ireland last week to see the farm of Pat and Pauline Ryan, Cappagh, winners of the 2005 EBI 100 Competition. Visitors were amazed at how streamlined the management of this 200 cow herd is, at the superb quality of the grassland and above all at the exceptional quality of the stock.

When questioned about the breeding strategy at the discussion forum Pat explained that each year he selects 5 - 6 AI bulls for use during the breeding season. He is satisfied with his cows producing 1,200 gallons per year and does not look for any milk lift. The most important trait he requires is a lift of 0.5% in milk protein. Each cow in the herd is then matched to a specific bull to improve on her weaknesses in the next generation. The bulls used in 2005 were UYC, CWJ, GMI, SSI, SLW and RSM.

This well thought out breeding strategy is the base for achieving a common profit of 1,000 per cow i.e. the cost of land, quota lease, labour and interest are excluded.

Teagasc advice to dairy farmers is to plan to increase the average EBI of the herd by 5 per annum. In the Ryan herd the top 40 cows have an EBI of 100. The bottom 40 cows have an average EBI of 34. When the profitability of both groups is compared the improved fat, protein and calving interval of the top group has resulted in a high profit per cow of 176 or 7,040 for a 40 cow herd. It is worth noting that the bottom 40 cows in the Ryan's herd had an average of 34, close to the top 10% of cows nationally.

The Ryan's deserve great credit for all they have achieved to date and especially for the manner in which they opened their farm so that fellow dairy farmers might benefit from their experience.

Assess your Position:

Assess your winter feed requirements versus what you have.

- If short you have more options available to you now.

- It may be possible to buy silage on the shank at good value (less than 50 per acre plus harvesting costs).

- Maize is an option, but don't pay more than 100 per ton dry matter. (barley at 140)

- Buy green barley off combine and store for feeding during winter, but be careful to adjust the price for moisture content.

- Buy straw and feed with ration during winter. At 8 per bale it represents good value and combined with meal the daily cost of feeding a dry cow could be 0.96. (4.5kgs DM straw + 6.4kgs meal/cow/day).

Assess the quality of your silage

- Analysis will give you dry matter, preservation, protein, feeding value and performance date.

- Some farmers think they are short of feed but the dry matter is good, so less of it is required. A cow will eat 10-11 KGs DM of silage per day, so a small dry pit may feed more than a big wet pit.

- At a cost of 30 it is great value for money.

Assess your soil fertility by soil sampling.

- This could save you a lot of money

- Lime, phosphorous and potash are essential to maximise grass yield on your farm.

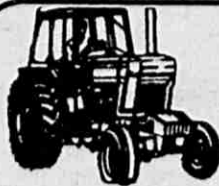
Similar to the Beef Calving Reports issued earlier in the year they will enable farmers to compare the cattle they slaughtered in 2004 with other farmers' cattle slaughtered throughout the country. Grade, carcass weight and lifetime performance are among the statistics given for each herd. The reports are broken down into steers, heifers and bulls. Preparing Weanlings for Sale

At this stage the big Autumn weaning sales are well under way. Over the past few years we have been highlighting the importance of reducing stress on weanlings at sale. In the typical mart sale situation, weaning, transport, sale processing, deprivation of food and water for several hours, change of diet and change of environment are all compressed into a period of 12 to 24 hours resulting in a huge increase in stress and a consequent reduction in disease resistance. At the same time, exposure to disease organisms, especially respiratory pathogens, is greatly increased where large numbers of animals from many different farms are brought together in one enclosure. Most of the follow-on health problems have to be dealt with by the buyers but weaning producers also have to do their bit to minimise the disease risks. In any case, a producer who offers for sale well presented clean fresh animals will get a premium price.

Reduce Risks

Lets consider what the producers can do to minimise the risk factors outlined above. These can be divided into two categories: medium term and short term. Ideally weanlings should be properly dehorned, weaned, eating meal and vaccinated against the respiratory diseases before going for sale. These mostly fall into the medium term category. For example, if weanlings are going for sale next week they should not still have to be dehorned and it is too late to start weaning, meal feeding or vaccination for some of the viruses.

On the other hand, there is time to do these practices with weanlings that will not be sold until after mid October. It normally takes a few days to a week to get weanlings on to meal in troughs and somewhat longer to get a full group eating meal from a creep feeder. Any progress in getting them trained to eat meal is a benefit to the calves at the sale and when they get to the new farm. Stomach worms cause scouring and poor thrive while hooose can increase the risk of pneumonia. Treat calves to control these parasites before sale. Try to disturb calves as little as possible before the sale and when being sold. Do not make any changes to their feeding or management in the days before sale. Do not house them overnight at home or at a mart. They should continue to be well fed and have access to water before movement. Divide animals into suitable sale groups i.e. those of similar breed, weight and conformation. If buyers can get a number of animals from the same group there is less stress as they settle better when companion animals remain together.

BEET HAULIERS SEEKING OUTRAGEOUS INCREASES FOR TRANSPORT

The Chairman of IFA's Sugar Beet Section Jim O'Regan today said that negotiations on haulage rates between the Beet Hauliers' Association and the IFA Sugar Beet Section for the 2005 beet campaign were proving very difficult to reach any agreement on.

"Beet growers are not in a position to concede to the demands of hauliers, who are seeking increases of 30% over the 2004 rates."

Mr O'Regan said "while recognising increased costs primarily as a result of rising fuel prices, beet growers particularly in the Carlow area are reeling from their factory closure and cannot sustain the transport costs being imposed by hauliers."

"IFA has rejected demands by the BHA to split the growers into three groups. "This is unprecedented," said Mr. O'Regan, explaining that the hauliers are seeking one level of increase in the old Mallow factory area and another for beet going to the Wellington Bridge depot, while attempting to hammer the Carlow area growers with outrageous increases.

Irish Sugar has confirmed to IFA that it will facilitate payment from growers to non-BHA members who have agreed haulage rates. This facility will only operate where the rate is no more than the agreed rate between the IFA / BHA for 2005. In the absence of an agreement, Irish Sugar will only operate the 2004 agreement for all hauliers wishing to use this facility.

IFA Welcomes New Baby Potato Launch by Tesco - IRISH GROWERS TO TARGET €30 MILLION MARKET

Waterford IFA Potato Committee Chairman Declan Hurley is hailing a joint initiative by Irish

Potato Growers and Tesco Ireland to grow baby potatoes in Ireland as a welcome development that could result in reduced imports and provide a new market opportunity for Irish growers.

Mr. Hurley said "salad, or baby, potatoes have been steadily growing in popularity in Ireland in recent years and now account for up to 15% of retail potato sales. Many of the country's hotels and restaurants also serve these potatoes in favour of the more traditional varieties. Now Irish growers have linked up with Tesco Ireland to produce Irish potatoes and take market share from imports."

"It is a market that up to now, Irish growers have been unable to supply because of the difficulty in growing the salad potato varieties here. These potatoes generally require free draining soils and higher levels of sunshine than the more traditional varieties. However, with the aid of Tesco's agronomists, this season's new venture in baby potatoes is proving to be very successful and hopefully this will lead to increased production and a reduction in imports in the coming years."

The Waterford IFA Potato Chairman added "the Irish potato sector has seen grower numbers

decline dramatically in recent years. Therefore, innovative developments like this one that have the potential to provide new opportunities for growers are always welcome."

"The first of the Irish baby potatoes have just been launched in Ireland this week by Tesco Ireland and the quality of the product is excellent. Hopefully, the Irish industry can now begin to fill this important market and displace imports."

TIME TO CALL A HALT —Shanahan

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman Bill Shanahan has said that it is time that grain farmers in Ireland and across the EU called a halt and stopped producing / selling grain at prices that are below the cost of production.

Mr. Shanahan said "the majority of Irish growers will fail to cover their production costs this harvest, even at prices of 100 - 106 / tonne green or 124 / dried. It is clear that a number of key players had set a target price of 95 and 97 / tonne for barley and wheat a number of weeks ago."

"The trade is being disingenuous to growers as 100 - 105 / tonne is being freely paid with 1 - 2 / tonne over for wheat. Growers are being taken advantage of by the bigger buyers as they have little or no bargaining power when they have their grain delivered in. They are at the mercy of the buyer.

"Farmers should think twice about taking out seed for the 2006 crop without first obtaining a minimum price commitment / contract from the buyer."

"Before you take out the plough, get a pen and do your sums. If it does not add up, don't sow cereals but consider alternatives crops, where minimum price contracts are being offered. As long as farmers keep throwing grain at the trade without a minimum price that is capable of covering production costs and returning a margin, they will not get a fair price for it", he concluded.

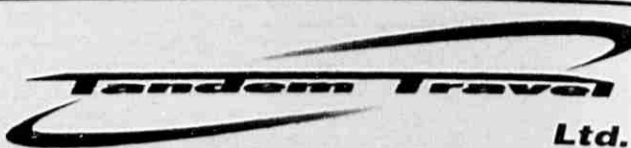

Gaeltacht Road To Be Upgraded After Funding Boost - Kenneally

Waterford Fianna Fáil Senator Brendan Kenneally has said the R674 road, which is the regional route to Rinn from Cuanach, is to be targeted with an extra 200,000 for improvements such as better markings and surface dressing.
'The funding, announced by the Minister for Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs, Éamon Ó Cuív TD, will be used to redo road markings, double surface dressing and improve footpaths and public lighting on the R674 route. The money will also be used for land purchase.

It is important that we target resources where they are needed most. 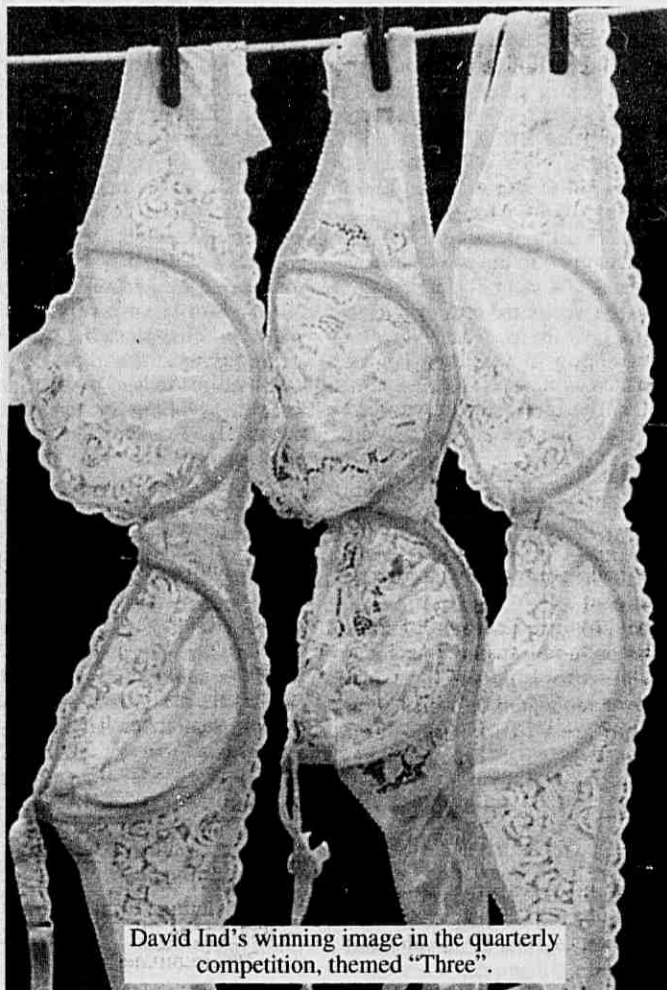

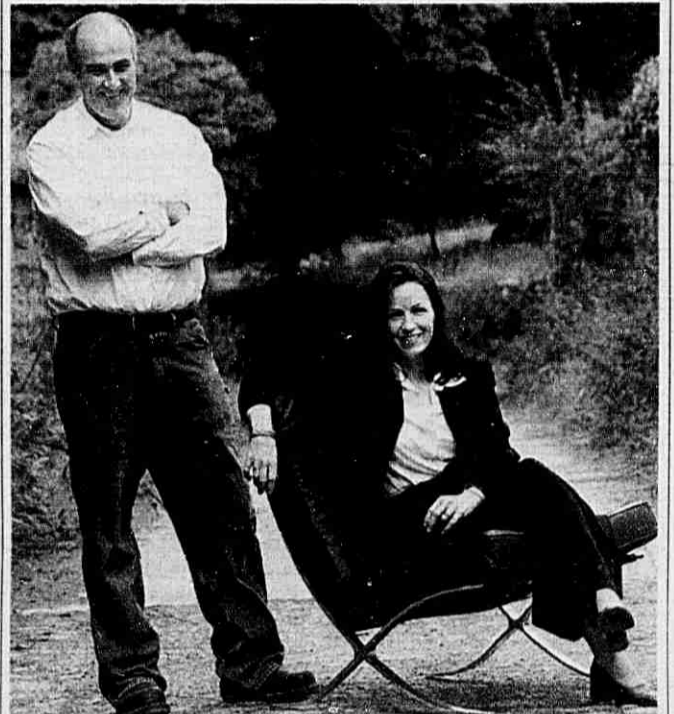

posed to peoples health who live in the vicinity of such developments. Among the large attendance were Councillor Mattie McGrath and Councillor Liam Ahearn who on hearing submissions of both speakers and the general public gave an undertaking to propose a change to the County Development Plan whereby it would pass into planning strategy that no development plan of the nature discussed would be allowed within 2k of residential areas, school, creche or health facilities in order to protect people's health. Feelings ran high on the night as the public are very annoyed with our officials in not informing them of the possible dangers associated with the masts and did wonder if the expertise and the knowledge were available to them. Also invited to speak on the night were the E.S.B. who declined by saying they would not attend a public meeting but would be available for one on one consultation. O2 were asked if they would like to attend but declined by saying they had a previous engagement. One can only wonder why these companies appear to ignore the very people they expect to use their products.

Cllr. Michael Anglin (FF) and Cllr. Seanie Loneragan (Lab) were unable to attend due to prior engagements but went on to say that the people of Ardfinnan had their full support and co-operation in any decisions or actions that were felt necessary to achieve a solution to any problems that may arise with the development of telecommunication masts in the village of Ardfinnan

Carrie Acheson, Hon. Secretary in her report outlined the extensive role of the committee maintaining monuments to those who lost their lives in the cause of Irish Freedom and marking the graves of the volunteers who lie in unmarked graves. The annual Churchgate collections to fund this commendable work will take place in several parishes throughout South Tipperary on the weekend 17th/18th September. The committee will hold the annual Sean Tracey commemoration on Sunday, 16th October at Kilfeakle. The ceremonies will commence with Mass in Kilfeakle parish church at 2:15pm. This is traditionally one of the major commemoration ceremonies and the oldest of that period in County Tipperary. The first Sean Tracey commemoration was held in October 1921 on the first anniversary of his death, businesses including banks closed and fairs were not held. The committee has stood the test of time and has reached out to all despite political and Civil War obstacles who played their role in the cause of freedom from foreign rule. When the demonstration of all who recalled or remembered the people who died for Ireland by the State and sections of the National media over the last twenty years was rife, this committee never failed to fulfil their duties and obligations and refused to be intimidated by the presence of observers. The committee deeply appreciate the generous response they get from all, for their annual collections, and hope that the people's generosity and support will continue to enable the good work of remembering fittingly the people and places that are an important part of South Tipperary's Irish history.

LATE MR. DICK WALSH

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mr. Dick Walsh, Baron Park, Clonmel which sad event occurred recently at South Tipperary Hospital, Clonmel after an illness of some duration. Dick was described by all of those who knew him as one of life's true gentlemen. Son of the late John and Catherine Walsh, Dick was born on the day the Anglo-Irish Treaty was signed on December 6th 1921. He came from a well known and popular Clonmel family and was the last member to pass away. He was President of Clonmel Theatre Guild and an honorary life member of St. Mary's Choral Society, of which his two sisters Jocie and Molly were founder members. Dick had a wonderful love for both theatre and music and was also box office manager for both groups for the last 25 years. Both societies were very dear to Dick's heart and he always greeted patrons and succeeded in accommodating those who came on the night without tickets.

The Vice Chairman of the Choral Society, James Butler, who gave a beautiful graveside oration, spoke of the warmth and high esteem in which Dick was held, and that he hoped he would "accept the position of box office manager of the pearly gate of heaven, where nobody would be refused". Dick was very proud when this year, the choral society won the AIMS award for Front of House, he described it as like winning an Oscar or a Tony. He also sang for many years with the choral society and it was here that he met his late wife Terry. They married in September 1956 and they took up residence in Baron Park. When his wife Terry died in 1976 at a young age, leaving a young family, it came as a devastating blow to him, but with the help of his sister Molly, he raised his young family.

Dick worked for over forty years in Bulmers, where he saw many changes in what was a growing company. Although the work was hard, he looked back over this time in Bulmers with great joy and was grateful for the friends that he made. He had particular happy memories of his time working in the Old Rope Walk. Dick humbly described himself as just an ordinary worker, who was proud to have helped to build Bulmers into the thriving company that it is today. Indeed, he always looked forward to meeting his old friends, at the Bulmers Christmas Party every year. For many years he also served as an active member of the I.T.G.W.U. and served as a shop steward in Bulmers. Last December he received his 50 year Gold Pin in recognition of his services to the Union.

Dick has a passionate interest in sport. He was a lover of all sports but in particular hurling, football, soccer, rugby and tennis. He was a huge follower of Tipperary hurling and football teams. His big regret was that Tipperary had not won a Munster Senior Football title since 1935. He often spoke with joy of the first time his father brought him to see Limerick play Waterford in the Munster Hurling Championship, the game took place in Clonmel in 1930 and it was there that his love affair with what he called the greatest game on earth started. Like so many people of his generation, he cycled to many of the games, often accompanied by his brother Jack. Dick thought that the Tipperary team of the sixties was the greatest team ever to pick up a 'caman'.

He followed the fortunes of both St. Mary's and Clonmel Commercials, of which he was a life member. He was also a big fan of Clonmel Town F.C., indeed the last match he attended was when Clonmel Town beat St. Michael's 2-0 in May to capture the league title once more. One of his happiest days was when Town finally reached their holy grail and won the F.A.I. Junior Cup back in 1994.

Dick was a very religious person and tried to attend Mass every day. He was very involved in the parish of S.S. Peter and Paul's and would be seen collecting every Sunday at 12:30pm Mass. For years he was a member of the Church choir. He had a particular devotion to Our Lady. One of the highlights of this year was his annual pilgrimage to Lourdes, he first went there in 1974.

Dick suffered with ill health over the last thirty years but he never allowed sickness to get in the way of living a full and active life. He had an unquenchable thirst for living, he loved nothing more than the company of his friends, young or old, as he was comfortable talking with any generation. He also loved to read and was in the middle of reading Bill Clinton's autobiography "My Life" when he died.

He was a fan of every type of music, he also loved to listen to the music of Clonmel's Frank Patterson, he once shared a stage with him on many occasions and he was proud to call him a friend. Dick was in South Tipperary General Hospital for two weeks before he died, he had many stays in the hospital over the last ten years.

His remains were removed to S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. who also celebrated the requiem Mass on the following morning. After Mass, his funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where he was laid to rest. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. officiated at the graveside in the presence of a huge concourse of mourners paying their final respects to a Christian friend whose memory they will long treasure.

Overall Developmental Approach

Thank you for all the information sent with the entry form which was most helpful on adjudication day. It is gratifying to read that you continue to have the support of your local School, local sponsorship and the County Council, the evidence of which is to be seen in Ballymacarbry. While your plans for the future have been noted do try, as mentioned in last year's report, to prepare a simple development plan based on what you might realistically do over the next 2 or 3 years in co-operation with your partners and within your physical and financial resources. Ballymacarbry is progressing well in the competition but, in a small centre, planning and attention to detail is what is required if further success is to be achieved.

The Built Environment

Commercial properties in the village looked very good again this year and the Garda Barracks and Post Office are being well maintained. While your hopes for a new hall are to be encouraged, St Patrick's Hall nevertheless is a major building in the village and will continue to require maintenance for some time to come.

Landscaping

As one has come to expect in Ballymacarbry, landscaping throughout the village has been very nicely presented again this year and is being well maintained. Some lovely displays were to be seen in the vicinities of Doocey's Pub, Melody's Pub and in the housing estates for which great credit is due to all concerned. The planting on the large bank at the new footpath is coming along nicely and will be a lovely feature in a year or two. The picnic area is again nicely presented and individual efforts throughout the village by way of tubs of flowers, hanging baskets, window boxes and containerised plants were much admired. Where possible, and as part of your future planning, do continue to plant trees and shrubs at suitable sites which will give you some colour on an all year around basis and, in the event, are easily maintained.

Wildlife and Natural Amenities

This is a heading under which, with careful planning, a number of additional marks can be obtained and it is indeed encouraging to see that you have a Hill Walkers representative on your committee. A small project such as the provision of nesting boxes and feeding tables in the village would be a lovely addition as

would a Wildlife Board showing what species can be seen locally by hill walkers, visitors, and residents alike.

Litter Control

Ballymacarbry was litter free on adjudication day. Congratulations to all concerned. Your amusing anti-litter signs were admired.

Tidiness

On adjudication day, the village looked very nice and is being well maintained and reflects great credit on your residents and their interest in their preservation of their living environment.

Residential Areas

Individual houses throughout the village looked very nice and are being well maintained. Housing estates and their open spaces were much admired and, overall, great credit is due to all concerned on another fine presentation. Lovely gardens were in full bloom on adjudication day which added greatly to the general atmosphere of the village.

Roads, Streets and Back Areas

Great credit is due to your Local Authority for all the work which has been carried out in Ballymacarbry. Road surfaces are excellent and the pathways both old and new are being well maintained. The verges of approach road had been trimmed and strimmed and Melodies car park looked very nice again this year. All involved in this very fine overall presentation are to be congratulated.

General Impression

While the emphasis in Ballymacarbry is on maintenance it is, nevertheless, gratifying to note that you are planning for the future and that very good work is being done by your Local Authority on your behalf. The continued support of your residents also makes a significant contribution to the overall effort and you are to be congratulated for it. Keep up the good work.

Second Round Adjudication

As Ballymacarbry is a long village this characteristic should be exploited and the roadsides consistently maintained from one village name sign to the other. The standard throughout the village is mixed, varying from seeming neglected to excellent. A landscaped bank was quite weedy. The Garda Station and other buildings which have been well painted created a good impression. St. Patrick's Hall on the other hand looked a little shabby. Several open yards could have been better. The new residential area was exceptionally neat and tidy. We look forward to returning to Ballymacarbry next year.

West Waterford Notes

In Appreciation of Helene Eva Marie De Speville-Thompson 1917-2005

When Harvey and Helene Thompson first made Ireland their home in the early 1970's, unlike many foreigners at that time, they integrated in to the Clashmore community like a hand in to a glove.

Their arrival here coincided with times of great change in our community and country, slowly recovering from years of oppression and mistrust, our membership of the E.U. was bringing an introduction to new cultures, languages and a totally different way of life. Right from the beginning the Thompson's made life long friends among their neighbours and in the community. In the latter years of their lives, Harvey and Helene returned to England to spend the final years of their lives among their family but they continued to return here on a regular basis and the friendships they made during their time here continued right to the end of both their lives.

Helene Thompson's life was a Tour de Force. She was an extraordinary, energetic lady, who endeared herself to everyone who came into contact with her. Her life was summed up wonderfully by her son Philip in the following appreciation given by him at her funeral Mass on July 7th at St. Alphege's Catholic Church, Oldfield Park, Bath, England.

"MAMON"

"Mum had an extraordinary life, it could be nothing else with such a strong character, passionate, determined, opinionated and totally committed to anything she did, there was no compromise. This passion extended into every aspect of her life.

Her style, her panache, the high heels, the dresses, those nails beautifully manicured, all the attention to detail.

Her routine was not to be interfered with, Mum had a time for everything and stuck to it rigidly throughout her life. Her walk was an exercise, determined, head down - walking double time leaving her children and husband trailing in her wake. When Mum was in Bath, she would swim every day in the local pool and she would increase her lengths until she was doing 100 a day. This took nearly two hours and she actually started to lose her hair from the chlorine. Vanity won through in the end though.

Mum's abiding love of the sea from her childhood in the Seychelles carried on all her life and was instilled in her children. However, swimming in the Indian ocean was quite a contrast to swimming in the Atlantic off the West Coast in March, it was head numbingly cold but Mum would have no argument, Dad got away with holding the towels while she swam.

Mum's eye for bargaining was legendary, gaspiage- nothing was wasted. Food was kept until it was almost rotten. She even prided herself on the fact that it would taste better that way.

Mum hounded the grocers in the search for bargains who in despair would almost give her the food. She would question us about the price of items we had bought at the Supermarket and she would tell us proudly how she had found it at half price elsewhere. Clothes were mended, sewn, crocheted, passed down, recycled. If all else failed they would be used as dusters. Plastic bags, buttons, nothing went to waste.

Mum had a strong opinion about everything, her convection was extraordinary. There was no argument, obesity, diet, education, lack of discipline, everything was in the firing line. To counter this, she could be very affectionate and open and had, as we all know, a wicked sense of humour. Mum had the capacity to immediately endear herself to everyone she met. What defined Mum more than all this was a 59 year love affair with Dad. Together they endured deep heartache, financial hardship and sheer hard work of bringing up 12 children, the fact they still remained in love was incredible.

Wherever Mum and Dad lived, people would always remark on their romance. The way they held hands and the way they talked to each other, their intimacy was an inspiration to everyone they met. We had two tragedies in our family, the death of Claire, our sister and of Francis, our brother and with Dad's death, there was more sadness for Mum.

Now Mum has died, the pain that she experienced and the pain that we saw in her is over, it is complete. We can celebrate a life and not mourn a death. She is back with her beloved Harvey. Let their love endure forever".

The celebration of Helene's life concluded the following old Gaelic blessing was read by Fr. Michael:-

May the road rise to meet you,
May the wind be always at your back,
May the sun shine warm upon your face,
May the rain fall soft upon your fields, until we meet again,
May God hold you in the hollow of his hand

This too is a prayer for our dear friend Helene, and may the wonderful memories of you bring comfort to all of those left behind to mourn you.

To all of you, her beloved family, we extend our deepest sympathy and heartfelt sympathy on the loss of this very special lady.

Great Explorers

People have always wanted to explore new places, sometimes to achieve fame and fortune, sometimes to acquire new lands, and often just for the joy of discovering something new. The period from 1400-1800 is often known as the Age of Discovery. European explorers sailed to the Americas, around Africa and as far as Australia, and several European countries established colonies overseas.



James Cook Made Three Expeditions To The Pacific

James Cook's abilities as a good scientific observer and excellent map-maker, charting the coasts of Newfoundland and Nova Scotia in Canada, earned him the leadership of an expedition to the Pacific in 1768. During that expedition he surveyed New Zealand and charted the coast of Australia. From 1772 and 1775 he discovered and charted new islands in the South Pacific. On his last voyage, which began in 1776, he discovered the Sandwich Islands (now Hawaii), where he was killed by local people in February 1779.

Burton failed To Find The Source Of The Nile

From 1852 to 1856, Sir Richard Burton explored much of West Africa. He searched for the source of the River Nile, but this was eventually found by John Hanning Speke at Lake Victoria. Much of the centre of Africa, which up until then had been completely unknown to the outside world, was explored by David Livingstone, who discovered Victoria Falls. Other great explorers, such as Mungo Park, James Bruce and René Caille, did much to make the continent of Africa known to the rest of the world.

- ★ In the 1st century B.C., the Ancient Chinese discovered that a substance called magnetite could be used to work out direction.
- ★ The first magnetic compasses were used by explorers in the 12th century

Lessons to be Learned

The scoreline on Sunday would suggest it was easy and in many ways it was easier than any of us had reason to expect but if we don't learn lessons from how we came to be in this position we will end up fighting for senior survival again next year. The relief induced by Sunday's win should not hide the fact that some of the players on our panel this year had a lot more to give.

It is a problem common to many clubs. How do you motivate these guys. Nothing from the "kick ass" to the "lick ass" approach seems to work. Maybe they are a product of the affluent times in which we live but increasingly, some players are not prepared to suffer the pain for the gain and are all too willing to embrace the merest hint of an injury, be it real or imaginary, in order to shirk training and renege on their duty to their fellow team players. Diagnostic medicine is not an infallible science and you depend on a players honesty and sincerity.

In many cases they are players of tremendous potential which may never be fully realised because they are not being honest with themselves or team mates. Senior hurling is a tough task. It takes dedication and there are sacrifices to be made. There are other sports if you want the easy option. Most of us never had the ability to play at that level which it makes it all the more frustrating when you see lads with ability not making the most of it. There is no greater honour at parish level than playing for your senior hurling team.

Historic First County Title For Naomh Columcille:

After twenty years in existence, surviving against all the odds, the East Tyrone club Naomh Columcille captured their first county title (at any level) last Sunday when they defeated Carrickmore in the Tyrone under 16 hurling county final. That might not mean a lot to you but I can tell you when the cavalcade of

thirty or so cars rolled into Coalisland on Sunday night these lads had reached the pinnacle of their hurling world. This was far more important to them than Tyrone winning Sunday. COOKERY CORNER

Barbecued spareribs

THERE is nothing nicer to chew on than a succulent sparerib coated with in delicious sticky sauce. You only get one or two mouthfuls per rib, so buy plenty. It's worth asking for them specially if the the butcher does not have any on display, but don't confuse them with sparerib chops, which are thicker and meatier. The sweet sauce has a slight tang that perfectly complements the crisply roasted ribs.

Ingredients:
(serves 4)
2kg Chinese-style pork spare ribs, cut into individual chops
100g clear honey
60ml dark soft brown sugar
60ml tomato ketchup
30ml Worcestershire sauce
30ml prepared English mustard
30ml red wine vinegar
Salt and pepper

Method:
PLACE the ribs in a single layer in two roasting tins and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Roast at 190°C, 375°F, Gas Mark 5 for 30 minutes. Meanwhile, put the remaining



ingredients in a jug and stir well until mixed together. Pour the sauce into the tins and turn the ribs until well coated. Return to the oven and roast for a further 60-75 minutes, until the meat is tender and the

sauce syrupy. Turn the ribs in the sauce several times during cooking and swap over the shelf positions of the roasting tins, if necessary, to ensure all the ribs cook through evenly.

Serve hot, with any remaining sauce poured over the ribs. Accompany with plain boiled rice and a dish of mixed stir-fried vegetables such as thinly sliced carrots, shredded leeks and baby sweetcorn.

Tasty tomato tart

FRESH sun-ripened tomatoes put this delicate tart into a class of its own.

Ingredients:
(serves 4-6)
750g ripe, firm tomatoes, peeled
180g puff pastry, made-up weight
90g Gruyère or mild Cheddar cheese, grated
30g softened butter
4 tbsp double cream
2 eggs, lightly beaten
Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method:
Preheat the oven to 230°C, 450°F, Gas Mark 8. Put a heavy baking sheet in the oven to heat. Cut each tomato into quarters gently over a colander to rid them of excess moisture. Chop the tomatoes and leave them to drain. Roll the pastry out thinly and

line a 23cm fluted tart tin with a removable base. Sprinkle the pastry evenly with 30g of the grated cheese. Work the remaining cheese into a fluffy paste with the butter and the cream. Beat in the eggs and season lightly with salt and pepper. Season the chopped tomatoes and spread them evenly over the base of the pastry-lined tin. Spoon the egg and cheese mixture over the tomatoes. Put the tart on the hot baking sheet in the oven. After the first 5 minutes, reduce the heat to 180°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6. After another 5 minutes turn it down again to 180°C, 350°F, Gas Mark 4. Continue to bake the tart for 30 minutes longer, or until the filling is puffed and richly coloured and the pastry crisp and cooked through. Should the pastry brown too much around the sides before the tart is done, cover with a

AUTUMN PUDDING

THIS tasty treat is exactly the same as summer pudding, but this time the bread-lined basin is filled with a juicy mixture of the finest autumn fruits. Keep any left-over juice to 'top up' any dry patches of bread

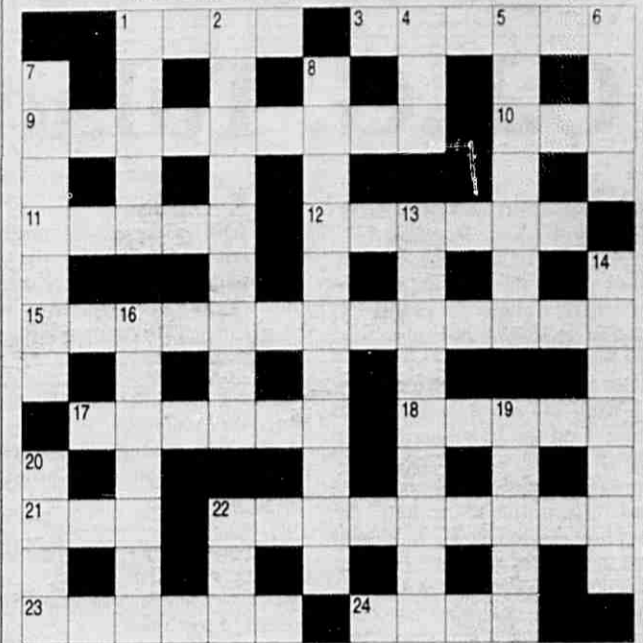
Ingredients
(serves 4 to 6)
700g mixed autumn fruit, such as apples, blackberries, plums, prepared
8-10 thick slices of day-old bread, crusts removed
Fresh fruit and mint sprigs, to decorate

Method:
STEW the fruit gently with 60-90ml of water and sugar until soft but still retaining their shape. The exact amounts of water and sugar depends on the ripeness and sweetness of the fruit. Meanwhile, cut around from one slice of bread to neatly fit the bottom of a 1.1 litre pudding basin and cut 6-8 slices of the

bread into fingers about 5cm wide. Put the round at the bottom of the basin and arrange the fingers around the sides, overlapping them so there are no spaces. When the fruit is cooked and still hot, pour it gently into the basin being careful not to disturb the bread framework. Reserve about 45ml of the juice. When the basin is full, cut the remaining bread and use to cover the fruit so a lid is formed. Cover with foil, then a plate or saucer which fits just inside the bowl and put a weight on top. Leave the pudding until cold, then put into the refrigerator and chill overnight. To serve, run a knife carefully round the edge to loosen, then invert the pudding on to a serving dish. Pour the reserved juice over the top. Decorate with fruit and mint sprigs and serve cold with cream.

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Dungarvan Leader - GARDENING FEATURE

Healing sage is all the rage

A POPULAR bedding plant often found in the the borders of formal parks and stately homes, the salvia, or sage, offers many different varieties. The best known of all is the common sage. Used in kitchens for centuries, it is hard to imagine roast chicken dinner without sage and onion stuffing. Sage also has a long history of medicinal use. It has been credited with curing anything from colds to snakebites. In fact the name salvia comes from the Latin 'salvare', meaning 'to heal'. The soft greyish-green leaves are a common sight in kitchens, but it is usually the purple-leaved and variegated varieties - still suitable for cooking - that are used as decorative border plants. The purple varieties can grow to a considerable size, bushing out and taking over large parts of the border if they are allowed to grow unhindered. But it looks spectacular when it is covered in its spikes of lavender flowers - which can reach waist height.

Salvia should be given a light trim after flowering to stop older plants showing their woody bases. It prefers a sunny position with a light sandy soil, where it will remain perfectly hardy and will produce kitchen-worthy produce every year. For a sage that flowers all the way through till autumn, choose *Salvia uliginosa*. Its purple-blue flowers are at their best during autumn. The flowers will be presented on long stems at eye level and can be kept tidy with a few strategically placed support sticks. It likes a moist soil, but not too cold a position in winter. A border of mixed sages can look stunning, although it is important to choose varieties that will work together. To soften the effect of some of the brighter sages, use *salvia argentia*. It flowers only once every two years and has large leaves covered in thousands of fine silvery hairs when the flowers are absent. It multiplies best in gravelly areas, but you can cultivate the seeds yourself in pots of gritty

compost. Ideally they should be planted under cover in late January in a heated seed propagator. The plant should be quite big by May and should be planted out in the garden by then. If you delay planting until late February expect the plants to be a lot smaller. The advantage of planting later is that the smaller plants will be better for taking cuttings in June. Plant using a trowel, giving plenty of room for the roots and firm-in the soil quite hard around them. Water well if the soil is dry. Some varieties such as *S. patens* originate from hot climates and will not survive outdoors during the winter. They should be dug up as soon as their foliage is blackened by frost, usually in early October. The dead growth should be removed just above the tubers, which can then be stored in trays or boxes packed with dry moss peat to protect them until being planted out again the following spring.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Start to plant evergreen shrubs
From now until mid-October is the ideal time for planting hardy evergreen shrubs lifted from open ground. You cannot do this if the weather is very hot or the ground is dry, but neither condition is likely to continue for long at this time of the year. Plant firmly and stake all big specimens. Later on, if winds are very cold and drying, erect temporary shelters of hurdles, evergreen boughs or sacking between stakes to protect the shrubs, particularly on the north and east sides.

Plant violets in frames
Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass. Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

Plant rooted carnation layers
Carnation layers pegged down at the end of July should be well rooted by this time. Scrape away a little of the soil and see how things are. If there are plenty of fibrous roots around the cut area, sever the layers from the parent plants and a few days later lift them - each with a good ball of soil. Transfer these to their flowering quarters or pot them in 10-13cm pots, place them in a frame, and plant them out next March.

Pick all tomatoes
Outdoor tomatoes are not likely to ripen any more on the plants now, so it is as well to pick all the fruits that are showing some trace of colour and stand them in a sunny window to ripen. Absolutely green fruits can be made into chutney. The summer tomatoes under glass will be coming to an end and as every inch of greenhouse space is likely to be needed in the next few weeks, it is a good idea to clear these, treating them in the same way as outdoor fruits.

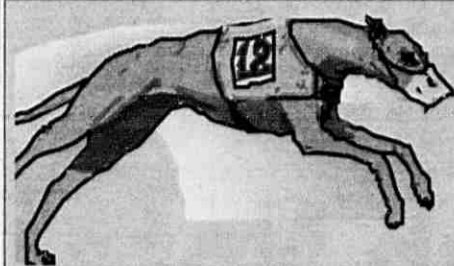

We've seen a number of top class greyhounds around the standard trip in Kilcohan Park over a long number of years but the Seamus Shealy owned Abbesside Blonde surpassed all those efforts producing a track record effort running away with heat three of the 2005 Cork Airport Munster Oaks last Saturday in a brilliant time of 28.17. Back to defend her 2004 crown Abbesside Blonde (Always Good-Mammys Nightmare) the red-hot 2/5 favourite was soon in the clear of the chasing pack. The further this qualifier went on the further Abbesside Blonde increased her lead and it came as no surprise to see her cross the winning line with eight and a half lengths to spare over Rookery Revive.

In heat one Faraway Girl set a scorching pace from the outset to lead from the 1/1 favourite Deerview Vieri and Greenfield View but coming with a great rattle from the rear of the field the Michael Moriarty owned and Denis Shanahan trained Golf Crazy (Droopys Kewell-Golfing Choice) 4/1 finished full of running to come through for a three quarters of a length win over a gallant Faraway Girl in 28.90.

The Ronnie Crevan owned Lolos Choice, late Paper Talk, returned to her old patch with a vengeance capturing heat two in fine style. Trained by Paddy McCormack Lolos Choice (Honcho Classic-James Cue) the 5/4 favourite drove up the inside of Laid Back Tippy to lead around the opening two turns. It was plain sailing from that point on for Lolos Choice and despite Newline Honcho making fine late headway to fill the runner up spot Lolos Choice went on to triumph by one and a quarter lengths in a smart 28.50.

GEORGE WASHINGTON

As expected George Washington justified long odds on taking the National Stakes at the Curragh last Sunday. I would be slow to place any single price anti post bets on this fellow for next years Classics as it remains to be seen if he trains on as a three year old. A very talented individual I sometimes I think that George Washington could well develop his own ideas about racing in 2006. If he trains on the Irish and English Guineas will surely be next year's targets.

HORSE RACING PREVIEW

AZAMOUR BACK ON TRACK

Following his rather disappointing fifth to Oratorio in the Baileys Irish Champion Stakes at Leopardstown recently, the John Oxx trained Azamour was found to have tweaked a muscle in his back after the race but his trainer now reports that his stable star is back in work and is more than hopeful that he will be ready for a tilt at the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe at Longchamp on Sunday week. Oxx won this race in the year 2000 with Sinnidar and provided the ground does not turn up soft, Azamour would have to be given a great chance on his overall form.

KINANE TO RETURN SOON

Jockey Michael Kinane, out of action since breaking a wrist in a fall at the Curragh on August 20th, could be back in the saddle in the next week or so if the injury continues to heal. A guest of RTE's racing panel at the Curragh on Sunday, Kinane was hopeful that he would be fit enough to renew his successful association with Azamour on whom he won the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes and the Prince Of Wales's Stakes earlier this summer while the John Oxx stable has a host of two year olds set to run which would benefit enormously from his skill in the saddle.

HUGHES OUTLINES PLAN FOR HARDY EUSTACE

With the National Hunt season almost upon us trainer Dessie Hughes reported that his stable star, Hardy Eustace, is unlikely to be seen on the racetrack until Christmas at the earliest. As expected, his whole season will be geared around a third consecutive attempt at the Smurfit Champion Hurdle, a race he has won for the last two years, and as he appears to be more a Spring horse, his trainer has decided to bring him along slowly and it could well be the AIG Europe Champion Hurdle at Leopardstown in late January before racegoers see him in action.

Television presenter, Hector O'hEochagáin, will host the Horse Racing Ireland (HRI) 'Go Racing' marquee at the National Ploughing Championships in Mogilly, Midleton, Co Cork for the first two days on Tuesday and Wednesday, 27th and Shane O'Donoghue from RTE TV Sport will host the Marquee on Thursday 28th September. Hector will give his unique and entertaining view of the world of Irish racing while interviewing a number of its leading personalities (jockeys, trainers and racecourse managers) and patrons will be able to get information on all 27 Irish racecourses. Many of the tracks hosting major National Hunt races in the winter season will be on hand to provide advice and incentives to racegoers and HRI will be giving out free copies of the 'Beginners Guide To Racing' while patrons can sign up for a free weekly email racing preview which they will receive every Friday afternoon.

WELCOME CHANGE OF LUCK FOR LYNAM

Trainer Edward Lynam enjoyed a welcome return to the winners' enclosure when scoring with Love City (7/1) in the twelve furlong maiden at Roscommon on Monday. Lynam has saddled over twenty second placings this season and was relieved when the Judge announced that his charge had just defeated the 6/4 favourite, De Laurentis, by a head in the hands of Niall McCullagh.

CHENCHIKOVA IMPRESSES ON DEBUT

Aidan O'Brien's Chenchikova, a full sister to the brilliant High Chaparral, made quite an impressive debut at Tipperary on Thursday when comfortably landing the two year old fillies maiden by two lengths in the style of a smart sort. Ridden by Kieren Fallon, this daughter of Sadlers Wells started the 5/4 favourite and it was no surprise to see her being quoted at a general 20/1 for next year's English Oaks after this display.

BREFFNI FLYER STRIKES FOR AUSSIES

Australian rider Brett Scott had a day to remember at Downpatrick on Friday when winning The Fosters Lager Carryduff Handicap Hurdle on the Pat Martin trained Breffni Flyer (4/1). Although this win was not enough in preventing the home team winning the Challenge Series, Scott, who won the Nakayama Grand Jump Steeplechase at Tokyo last April, stated that he was thrilled to ride a winner in Ireland and voiced his support for this annual challenge which provokes plenty of interest in his home country.

COLLIER HILL LANDS IRISH LEGER FOR SWINBANK

The Dermot Weld trained Vinnie Roe (9/4 joint favourite) failed in his bid to win the Irish Field St Leger for the fifth consecutive year at the Curragh on Saturday when going down by half a length and the same to two English raiders, Collier Hill and The Whistling Teal in an exciting finish. A first ever Classic winner for Alan Swinbank, trainer of Collier Hill, the 10/1 shot was also a first Classic success for jockey Dean McKeown and is now likely to clash with Vinnie Roe again in the Melbourne Cup in Australia on November 1st. Despite his defeat Dermot Weld's charge ran a cracking race with connections inclined to blame the fact that he had to miss a couple of bits of work in the build up to the race due to an injury and it would be foolish to write off his chances in the Melbourne Cup on the evidence of this display.

GEORGE WASHINGTON IN COMMAND

The Aidan O'Brien trained George Washington started a prohibitive 2/11 favourite for the Laing O'Rourke National Stakes (Group One) at the Curragh on Sunday and while he was not as spectacular as when winning here five weeks earlier, he produced a solid display to defeat Golden Arrow by two lengths. O'Brien's charge stumbled slightly upon leaving the stalls and had to come from a long way back as his stable companion, Amigoni, built up a huge lead but once jockey Kieren Fallon asked him for his effort, the response was immediate. Quickening up well to hit the front a furlong out, he began to idle soon afterwards and had to be pushed out to score. On a great day for Fallon who rode a four-timer, he was seen to good effect on the Sir Michael Stoute trained Red Bloom (15/8 favourite) who gained due reward for a number of consistent performances at the top level earlier this season with a convincing victory in the Irish National Stud Blandford Stakes (Group 2) while the O'Brien trained Art Museum (8/11 favourite) looks a very smart sort on the evidence of his winning effort in the Laing O'Rourke Blenheim Stakes and is now likely to go for the Middle Park Stakes (Group One) at Newmarket next month.

MCNAMARA IN DOUBLE FORM

Jockey Andrew McNamara has been in fine form of late and he was again seen to good effect on the opening day of the Listowel Festival on Sunday when recording a fine double courtesy of Merry Star (11/2) in the Kerry Maid Maiden Hurdle and Look Between Us (5/1) in the featured Dawn Milk Handicap Chase.

CROSS COUNTRY SEASON READY TO KICK-OFF

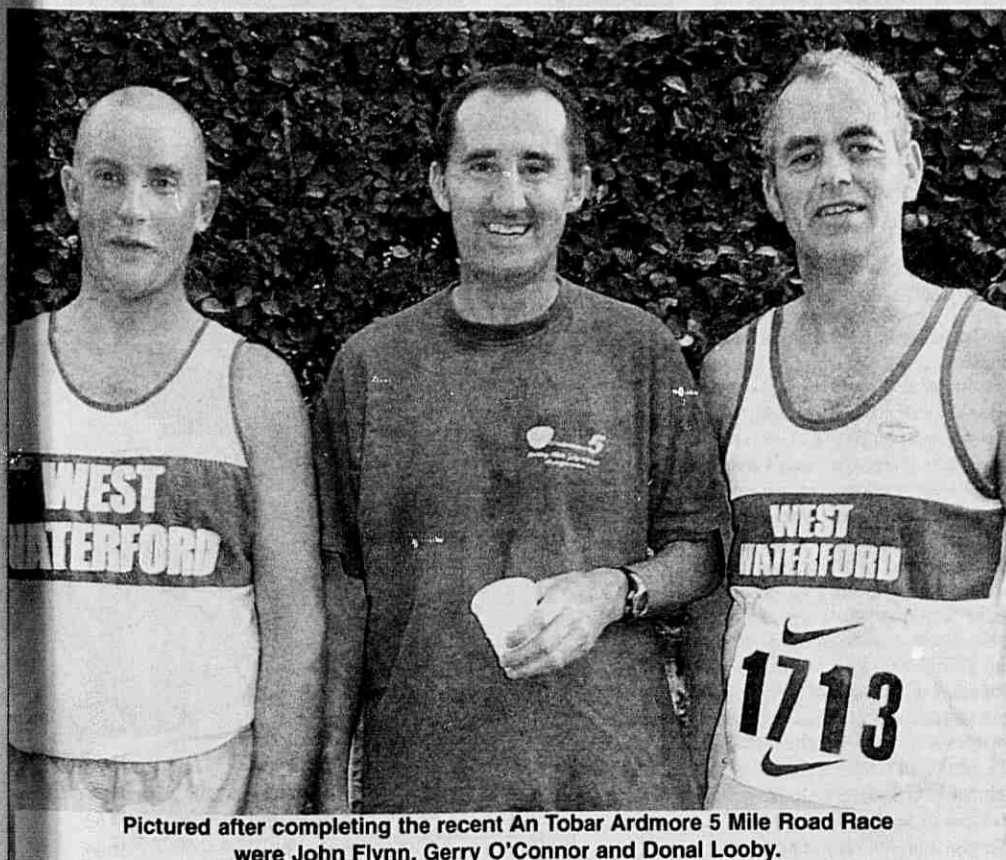

Important Training Tips

Training for a marathon is not something to take lightly. Even the most well conditioned athletes can sustain injuries while training for a marathon. As with all exercise programs, it is recommended that you are in good physical condition and have been cleared by your physician to participate in a vigorous exercise programme. We hope that this section on training can provide you with the information you need to complete your 26.2-mile journey. While it is possible to complete a marathon after having just started running, the marathon distance is very challenging and is recommended that you establish a base of running miles before attempting the marathon distance. The chances of injury are very high for those who are rising up off the couch to running a marathon a few months later. If you are following the programme set out by the club make sure to take the rest days and don't try cramming in a run that you might have missed. You need to give your body a chance to recover and to adapt to the added stresses that you are placing on your system. As your long runs get longer it becomes more important that you are taking care of yourself.

Ways to Prevent Injury

1. Gradually increase your weekly mileage and the distance of your long run, which you are doing if on the club schedule.
2. Listen to your body. If you have a nagging pain that does not go away, take some time off and consult a Sports Physio they are trained to handle many issues related specifically to running.
 - Get the additional sleep and nutrients your body needs.
 - Take the rest days off each week to let your body recover from the rigors of running.
 - A stretching programme focusing on hamstrings, quadriceps calves, lower back, and iliotibial band will aid in recovery and reduce the chance of injury. Try to

stretch at least twice per day, preferably before and after you run.

Nutrition

One of the biggest mistakes that runners make regarding nutrition is not eating enough for breakfast before training and races. As with most of the advice you will hear, try it in your training before you try it on race day. Your training is your practice for the race and you do not want to try eating breakfast the morning of the marathon if you normally don't eat breakfast.

If you normally do not eat breakfast before training or racing try to start with a very small meal such as a half glass (4 oz) of orange juice or sports drink an hour or more before you run. If you can tolerate the juice or sports drink, add an 8 oz glass of juice and a piece of toast and maybe a banana. You can even substitute a Power Bar or other sports bar for the toast. The focus of this small meal is that you get the majority of your calories from carbohydrates and limit the fat and protein, which are harder to digest.

During your training runs and the actual race it is important to remember that your body has a limited supply of glycogen, which is stored in your liver and muscles. Your primary source of energy for these long runs is fat which even the leanest athletes have almost unlimited supplies of. The key to nutrition on the long runs is giving your body periodic carbohydrates in the form of sports gel or sports drink just plain water isn't enough here. What you are going to eat, the timing of when you take gels and what you are going to wear should be determined in your training runs and not during the race. You want to make sure that your body can tolerate the gels you are using as well as the frequency. I recommend that you start with 1 sports gel per hour and if your stomach can tolerate it, go to 1 every 45 minutes. Even if it's in the last few miles of you're run it's okay to take an extra gel because you will need the additional calories and nutrients after the run.

Hydration

Staying hydrated each and every day during your training is one of the best things you can do to help your running and improve your health. You would be surprised at the number of runners that show up at the start line already suffering from mild dehydration. The tips below should help you stay hydrated even beyond the finish line. When the alarm clock goes off in the morning before training runs or races, the first thing to do is drink a full 22 oz bottle of water or sports drink. After the initial 22 oz bottle try to continue to sip on your water bottle up until the few minutes before you start running.

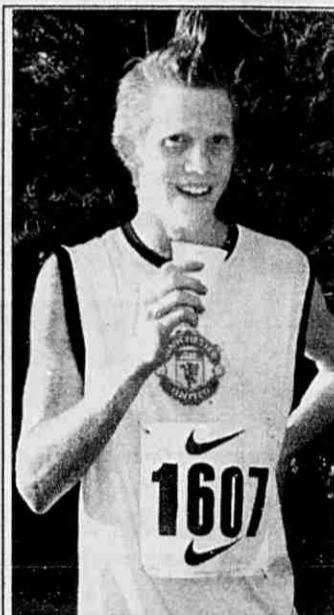
As you run, try alternating between water and sports drink. This will help you maintain your electrolyte levels and should not make your stomach feel to heavy or sloshy. If you can slow down at each aid station and consume a cup of water and sports drink you can stay fairly well hydrated throughout the race. If you are using sports gels you will want to consume the gel about a quarter mile before the aid station so that you can use water to wash it down. Walking through the aid stations is a great way to make sure you get enough fluid and to give your legs a break from running. I highly advise this strategy for novice runners.

After you finish the race you should start drinking water as soon as possible. Find the bottled water that is for finishers and drink a full bottle within the first few minutes of finishing. Continue to drink water and sports drink at a rate of

about 22 oz per hour. Remember that caffeine is a diuretic and will hinder you from rehydrating.

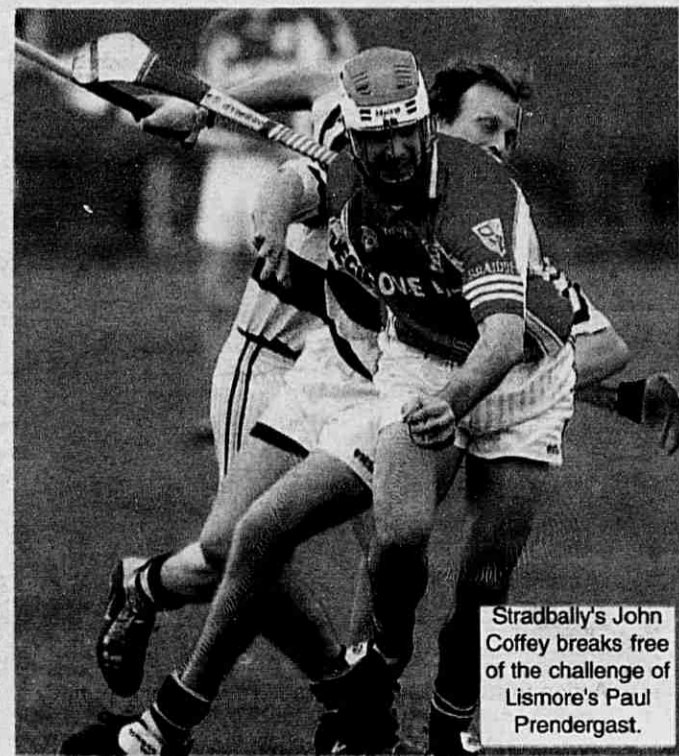
REPLAY

The GAC would likely prefer a Lismore victory since such a result would release Stradbally for the football semi-final.

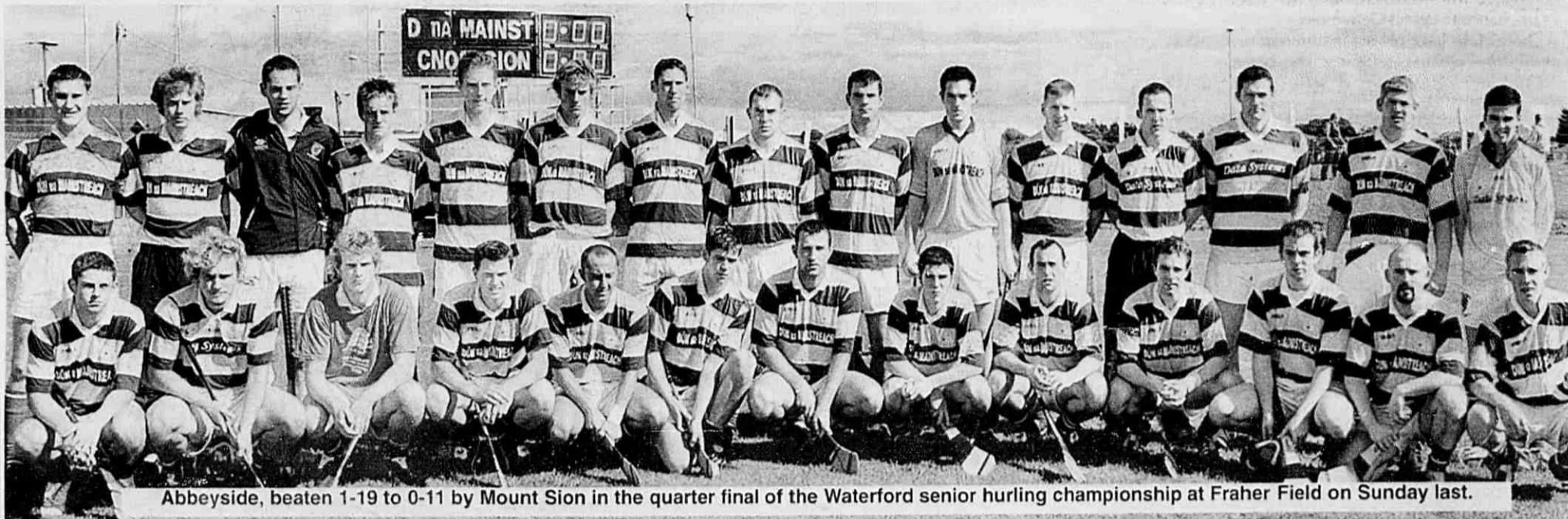


Stradbally's John Coffey breaks free of the challenge of Lismore's Paul Prendergast.

All Mount Sion's craft and experience was brought into play in their mighty second half display and if the county champions can maintain this form it is difficult to see them being defeated at all this year.

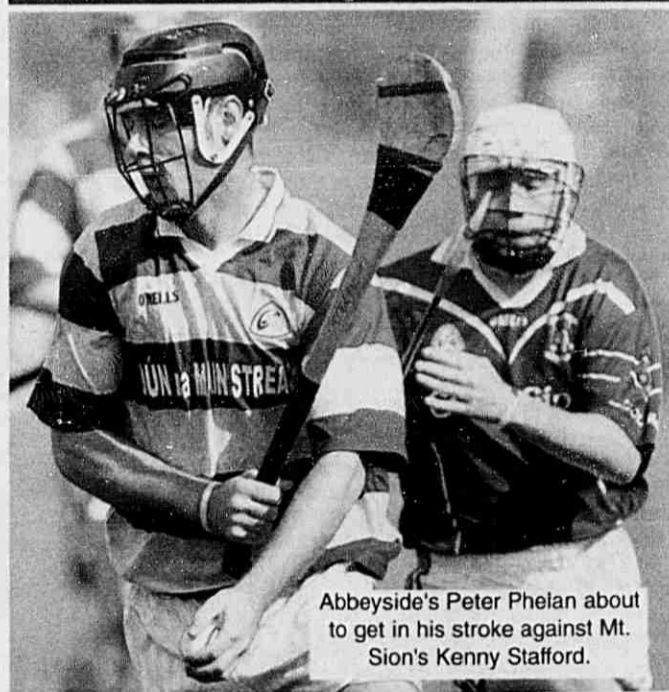

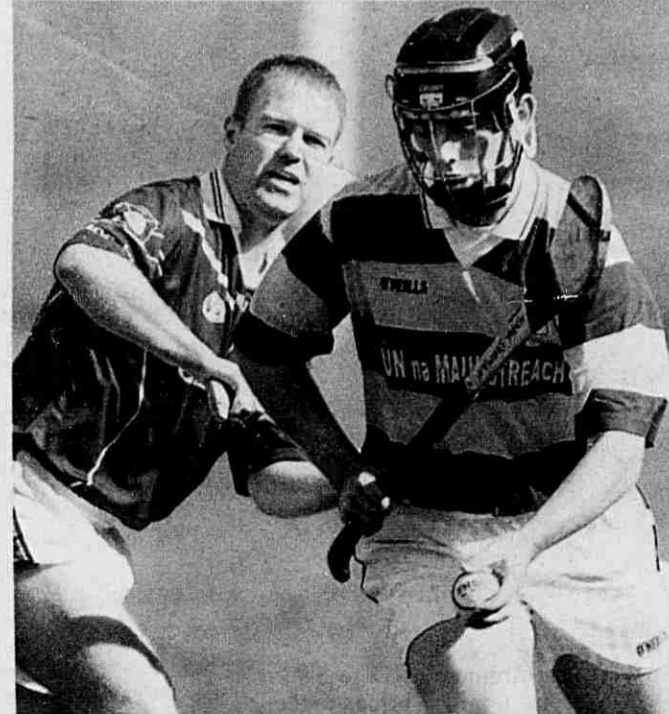

The C.E.O. of The F.A.I., Mr. John Delaney, and the Technical Director F.A.I. Mr Packie Bonner will be present on this very important occasion in the history of The W.W.E.C. As we have written already in our notes, this is a pilot scheme, and the W.W.E.C. was selected by the F.A.I. to improve the standard and to develop and coordinate the implementation of various FAI programmes leading to the development of football in the region and for both to work in partnership funding the appointment of the R.D.O. who will operate within the West Waterford East Cork area. This is a fantastic achievement for the league, a league which is regarded as one of the smaller leagues in Ireland and the presence of both John Delaney and Packie Bonner on the night is testament to the high standing the league has within the F.A.I.

All the clubs in the league are expected to be present on the night with a minimum of two representatives from each club. The league will be showing it's appreciation to the many sponsors who sponsor the various competitions at adult, youth, underage and ladies football by having all the sponsors as guests of the league. Indeed it is acknowledged by the league that without the generous sponsorship, football within the area would be very difficult to operate.

For those who have been involved in the league since it was founded in 1972, Friday 30th September will be an auspicious occasion. It will be the culmination of over 30 years work of building a league from a very humble beginning of just 4 teams to the present where there are almost 1500 playing football within the league each weekend. This is a big step forward by the league and the benefits will be seen in a few years time.

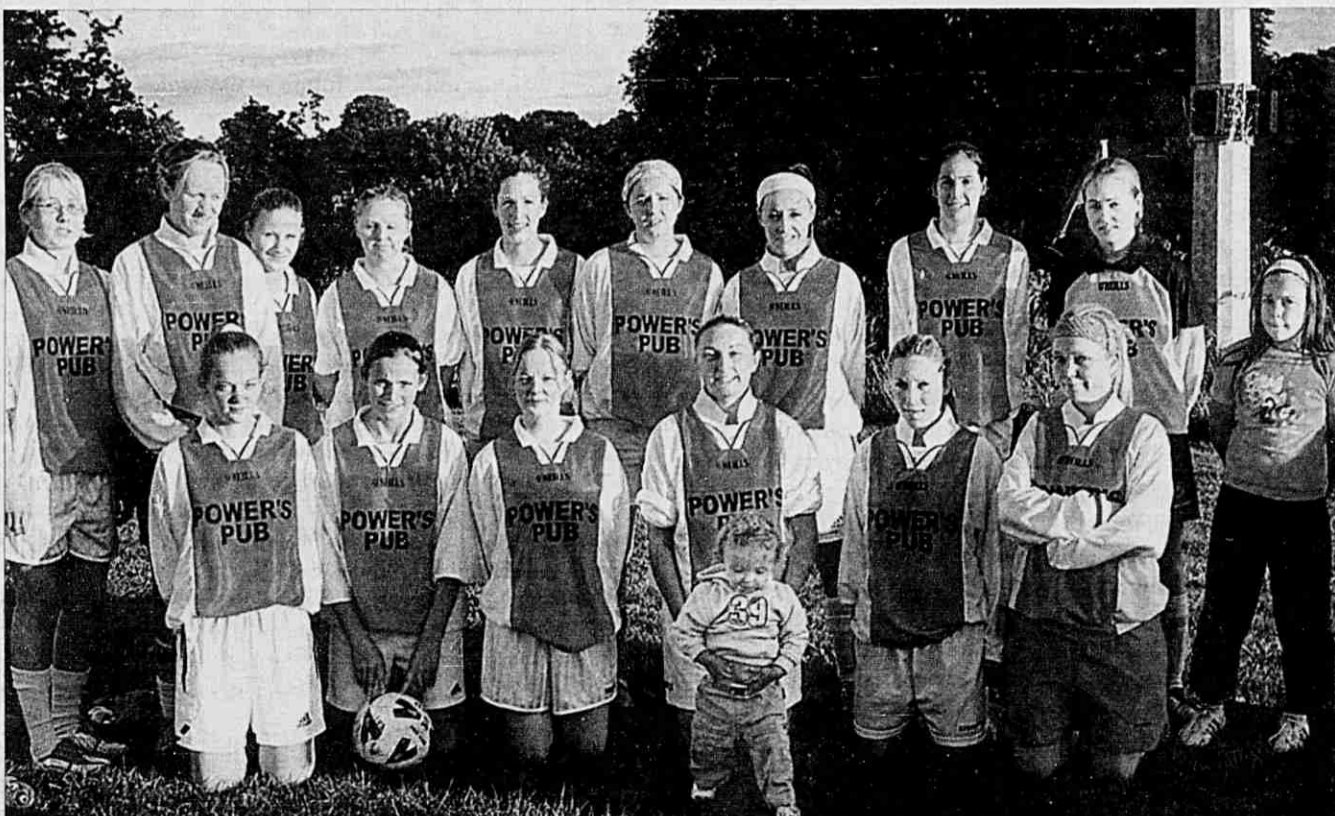

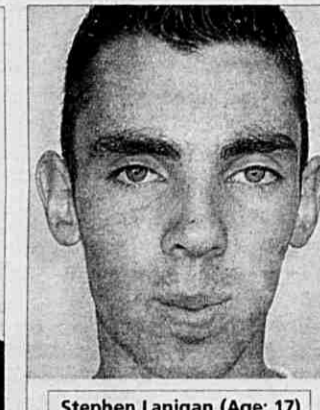

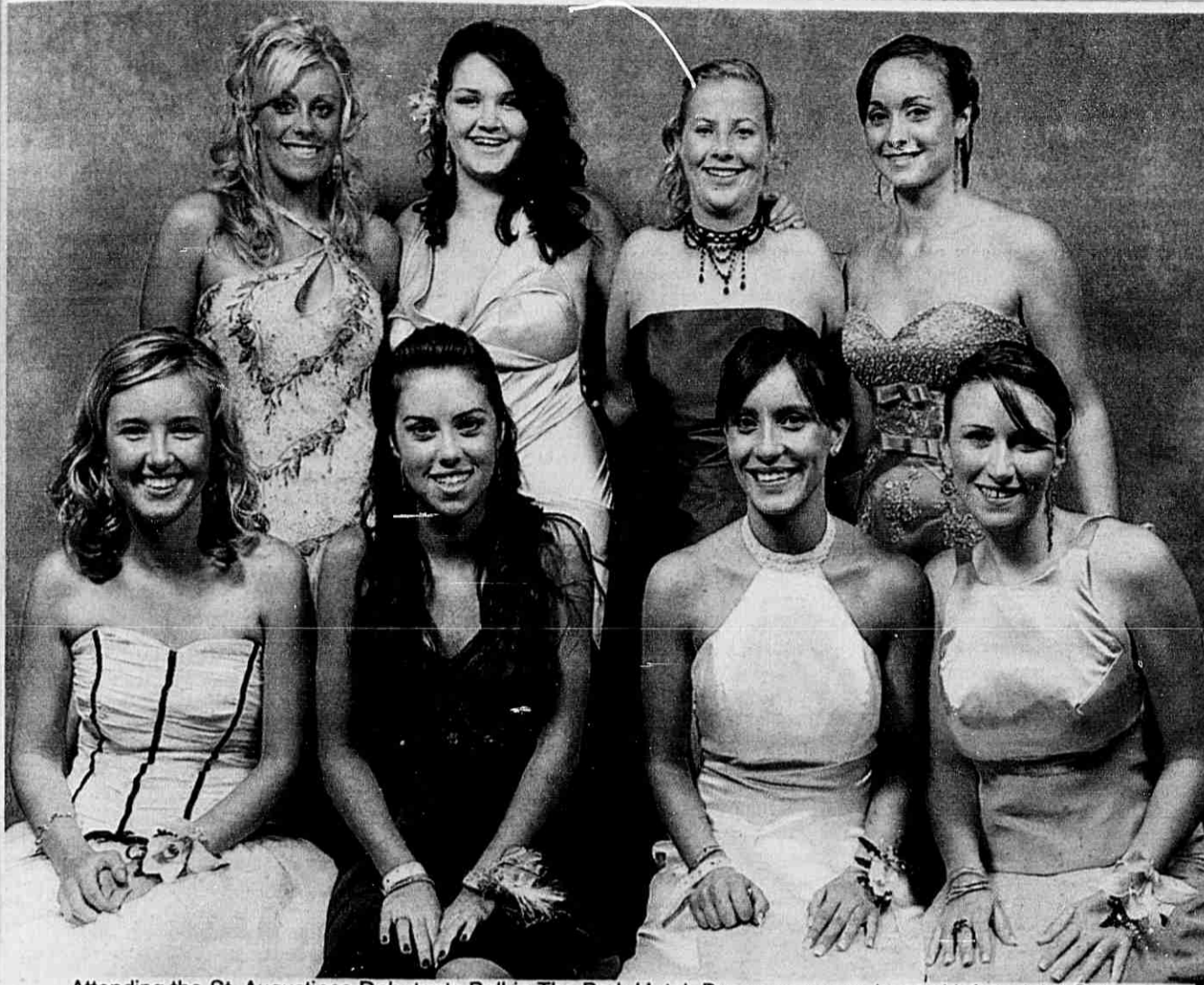

Cllr. Wilkinson Tells FG: Hands Off Waterford County Council's Cash!

from the local authority.

"These arrangements are contrary to long-established protocols in many council's," Cllr. Wilkinson added.

"Meath's County Manager issued a directive preventing local authority funding being used to cover the costs of this conference. I am calling on our County Manager to do likewise before a dangerous and costly precedent is set.

"PARTY COFFERS

"There are more than 400 Fine Gael councillors in the country. Taking into account the fee of 200 euro per councillor - which would have to be paid into the Fine Gael party coffers - the normal daily subsistence rates available to councillors and average travelling and subsistence payments, the bill to the taxpayer for this Fine Gael conference could be anywhere between 200,000 and 250,000 euro.

"If this scam is the fruits of Fine Gael's 'alternative' thinking at local authority level, I shudder to consider the impact of their actions would have on the country if ever elected to central government," he said.

STRENUOUSLY DENIED

However, Fine Gael whip on Waterford County Council, Cllr. Paudie Coffey, strenuously denied Cllr. Wilkinson claims.

He said the conference is open to representatives from all parties, and said the money will not be going into the party's

coffers but to cover the cost of holding the conference.

"It's open to all councillors from all party's. It's not a party political conference. It's a conference organised to look at serious issues which the Government are not addressing at the moment.

"It's at the total discretion of local authorities and individual councillors whether they want to attend or not. These types of conferences are organised week in week out. The fact that Fine Gael are organising it is the reason why Fianna Fail now have a problem with it.

"The conference is looking at issues such as waste management, spatial planning, environment and transport," he added.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE

"We will have international academics in attendance. Speakers who have no political affiliation whatsoever. We're looking at issues which the Government are not doing anything about - serious issues which affect everybody.

"It's a national conference. It'll be organised on national issues not on party political issues. The idea is to help councillors to plan for future around Ireland.

He said Fianna Fail are putting "a slant" on it to ease pressures put on it by result poll results.

"They're just looking at ways of attacking Fine Gael," he claimed.

NEW COURSES ON OFFER AT BLACKWATER COMMUNITY SCHOOL

An 8 week introduction to Insight meditation and mindfulness to encourage the mind to slow down and to develop an awareness of the body so that we can see more clearly what is going on in the mind and how it effects the body. We live much of the time in "automatic pilot" and this allows the mind to be more in the past and in the future rather than in the present moment, and consequently we tend to operate mechanically and miss out on present moment experiences. With increased awareness we can see why we are stressed, anxious, rushed, forgetful etc and can make moves to manage life in a more skillful way.

Both theory and practice will be presented each night. No previous experience needed- just motivation!

Following the huge interest stoked up by Eddie Hobbs' "Rip off Ireland," Margaret Tobin Barry will deliver a course on "Your rights and responsibilities as a Consumer."

Adult Education Co-ordinator at Blackwater Community School Brendan Dunlea says the courses on offer have been carefully chosen to cater to a diverse range of tastes and preferences.
