New Design Presented To County Council For Spring Roundabout

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan, has welcomed the fact that the proposed redesign of the Spring Roundabout on the N25 is to be presented to the Roads Section of Waterford County Council this week.

The redesign, which has been carried out by Roadplan Consulting, based in Co. Kilkenny, was undertaken by Waterford County Council in conjunction

with Dungarvan Town Council and was co-financed by both local authorities.

"This is the first step in having the layout of this particularly dangerous roundabout altered and improved from a safety viewpoint, as approval and funding must now be sought from the National Roads Authority (NRA), in order to have the proposed works carried out," Cllr. Geoghegan said.

Cllr. Geoghegan, who lives nearby at Silversprings, has raised the issue on several occasions at both Town Council and County Council level and has welcomed the acknowledgement by Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer, that this particular roundabout is operating at full capacity and needs to be improved.

Controversial Plans For Housing Development On Tierney's Land

Controversial plans to construct a new housing development on Abbey Farm in Abbeyside have been lodged with Dungarvan Town Council.

The development, planned by John A. Tierney, has been the subject of contention due to its location close to two protected structures - Abbeyside Church

and the thatched cottage on the quay.

However, the developers say these concerns, along with the concerns raised by An Bord Pleanala over the size, scale and layout of the development have been addressed.

The plans also consist of a reduction in the number of houses.

In the first application, twenty-eight houses were planned whereas twenty-one houses were included in the new application.

But opposition is again expected to mount against plans to develop what is regarded as the last green site in Abbeyside.

Speaking at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, Labour councillor, Billy Kyne urged that the concerns of the residents, which were upheld by An Bord Pleanala, would be addressed.

He said that the impact of the proposed house types and the location of the proposed residences at the top of Home Rule Street should be limited and that the council planning de-

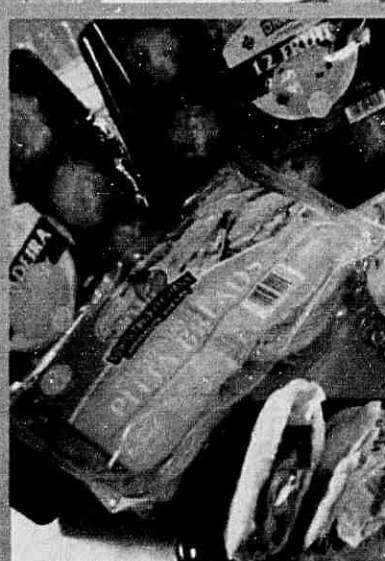

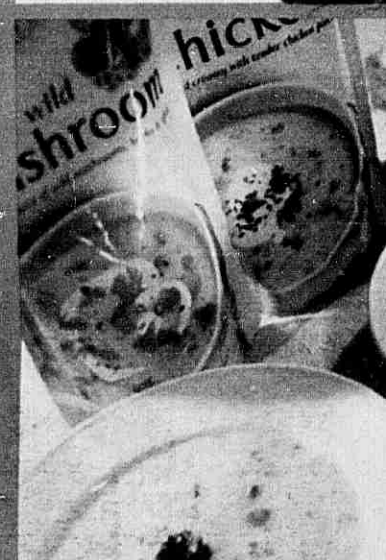

Geoghegan Slams Mansfield Over "Personal" Attack On FG Deputy

"SINN FEIN ATTACK BACKFIRES BADLY" - GEOGHEGAN

Dungarvan-based Fine Gael county councillor, Damien Geoghegan, has slammed Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield, over the personal nature of his attack on party colleague Deputy, John Deasy TD, and has called on Cllr. Mansfield to publicly spell out his party's position immediately.

Cllr. Mansfield launched a stinging attack on Deputy Deasy in last weeks national and local media, labelling Deputy Deasy's recent visit to the United States with a cross-party delegation of the Public Accounts Committee as a "waste of taxpayers money".

A CHEAP STUNT

Describing the attack by Cllr. Mansfield as a "character-assassination on John Deasy" and a "cheap stunt which backfired badly on Sinn Fein," Cllr. Geoghegan added: "Cllr. Mansfield should now clarify his own personal position in light of the revelations that his own party colleague, Dublin Sinn Fein Deputy, Sean Crowe, was also on an Oireachtas visit to the United States during the same week.

"Cllr. Mansfield, I believe, has made a laughing stock of himself over this issue, and to make matters worse, was too cowardly to go on local radio and explain himself."

EMBARRASSMENT

Cllr. Geoghegan said: "It must be deeply embarrassing to Cllr. Mansfield and Sinn Fein, since it has been revealed that

Deputy Crowe stayed in a hunting lodge in Syracuse, New York, after flying first-class to the US, all courtesy of the Irish Taxpayer!"

He went on to say that, "this type of personal attack by Cllr. Mansfield, is typical of the 'headline-grabbing tactics' of Sinn Fein, but they were caught out on this occasion.

"I certainly believe that Cllr. Mansfield now owes an explanation to the electorate as to how he can hold up Sinn Fein as 'paragons of virtue' and so called defenders of the working class, whilst engaging in this double-speak and hypocrisy.

"It would seem to be the case with Cllr. Mansfield and Sinn Fein of 'do as I say, but not as I do.'"

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE

Deputy Deasy, who is a member of the high-profile Public Accounts Committee since 2004, attended numerous meetings in California and Washington DC, where various models on controlling public spending and ensuring value for money on large government projects were examined.

Deputy Deasy, who spent seven years working as both a lobbyist and a Congressional Staffer in the US, also met a number of US Senators, both publicly and privately on Capitol Hill to discuss the current position of illegal Irish immigrants in the US and privately discussed a number of cases regarding his constituents locally,

who were imprisoned in the US over the past year for relatively minor travel visa violations.

HYPOCRISY

Cllr. Geoghegan said that only two weeks ago, Cllr. Mansfield sat in silence at a meeting of Waterford County Council when it was revealed by the Local Government Auditor that 53,000 euro in Part V contributions were undercharged "in error" to building developers.

"He asked no questions on that occasion on behalf of the constituents that he claims to represent. In fact he let the issue pass without as much as a whimper. It would seem that personal attacks on individual politicians, rather than dealing with the concerns of the public is the modus operandi of Cllr. Mansfield," he claimed.

Cllr. Geoghegan went on to say that: "Cllr. Mansfield, in his crude and failed attempts to sneer Deputy Deasy and score political points, shows up Sinn Fein for what they really are.

"This is the politics of the worst kind. The reality is, Sinn Fein is a party of hypocrites who engage in double standards, pretence and duplicity. Never was this more apparent than on this occasion."

STANDING OVER COMMENTS

However, Cllr. Mansfield said he is standing over comments describing Deputy Deasy's trip as a "waste of taxpayers money."

Cllr. Mansfield also described

the remarks made by Deputy Deasy on Deise AM in which, Deputy Deasy called on Cllr. Mansfield to have an on-air debate as "very cynical". Cllr. Mansfield claimed that Deputy Deasy was well-informed and knew only too well that he would be indisposed having worked a night-shift.

Cllr. Mansfield also questioned the last time that Deputy Deasy had to work an 8 to 12 hour shift.

"The simple fact is that he probably never has, because he is not a working person. He is one of the social elite who earns upwards of 80,000 euro a year.

"It's easily known that there is a General Election on the way and it's good to see that the Fine Gael TD has finally woken from his slumber," he added.

"A number of years ago, before the General Election, following comments made by Deputy Deasy in which he stated that my party, Sinn Fein, and anybody that supported us were the lowest common denominator in society.

"I offered to debate the issues with Deputy Deasy - an offer which he didn't take me up on. We in Sinn Fein and our supporters are still waiting for an apology for those comments. It sums up the kind of person Deputy Deasy is that he has not apologised."

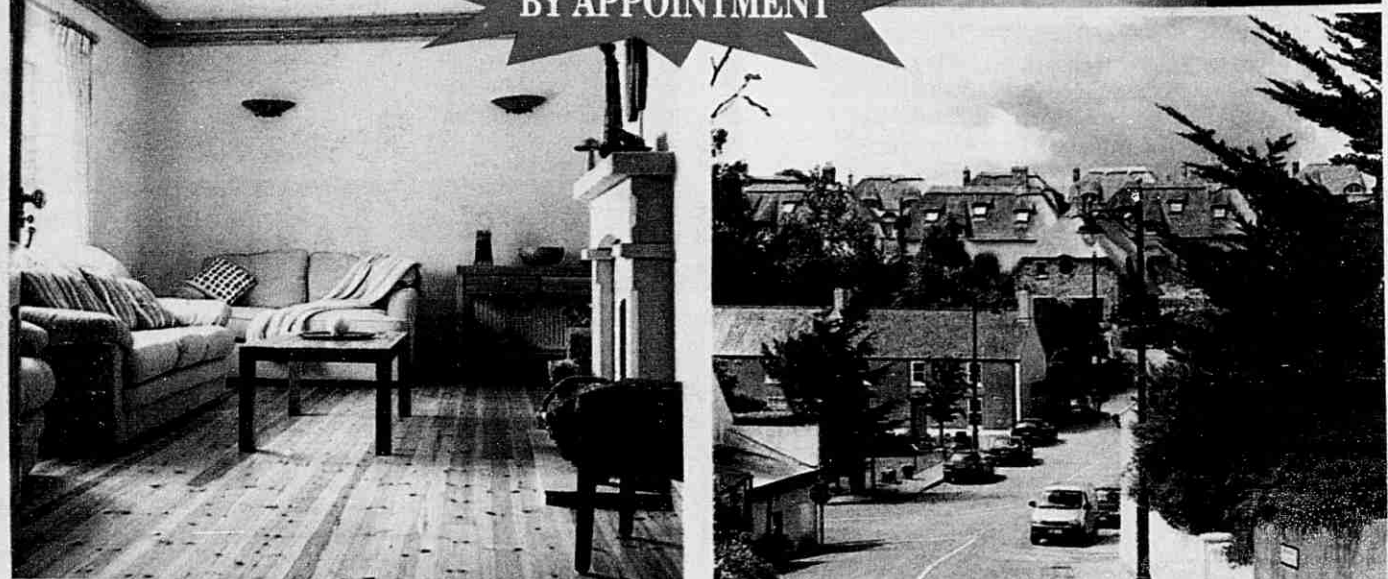
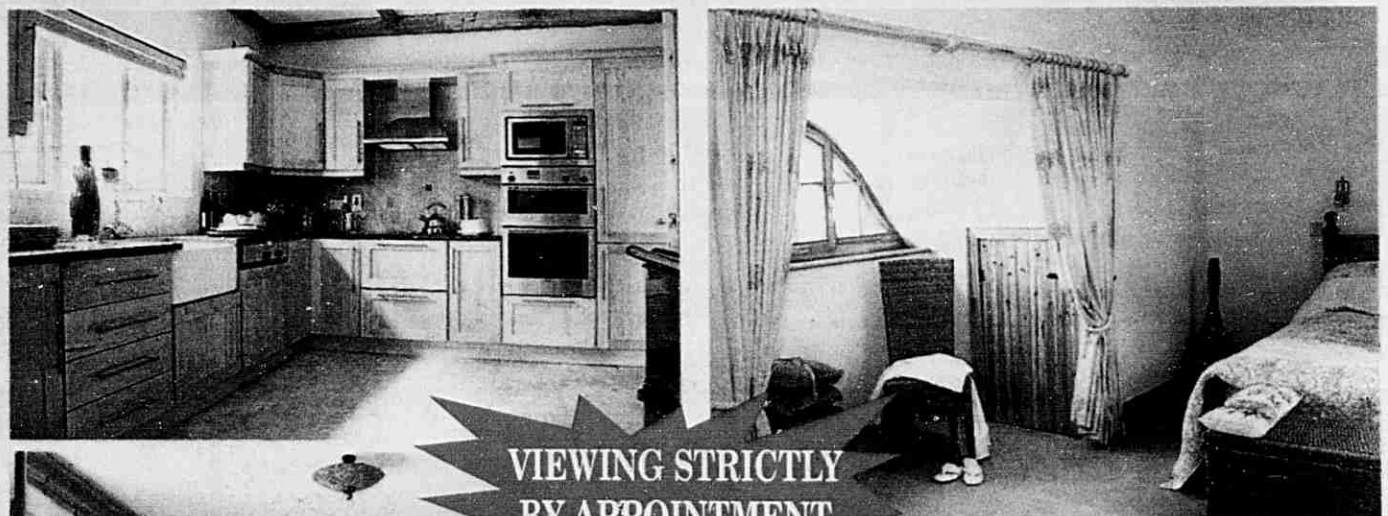

partment must protect the privacy of the residences on the street.

He drew particular attention to the fact that in the Tourmore development at the Burgery some years ago the council and the developer agreed that the houses being built close to existing long established family residences would be redesigned to bungalow and would be so placed to protect to the maximum extent the privacy of these residents.

He impressed on Mr. McCarthy that the same principal must be applied in relation to this development.

He also expressed personal disappointment that the design and height of these houses and original proposal to situate their backs facing onto Abbeyside Church was put forward as any part of the planning proposal in what is a very sensitive area.

"This is one of the most sensitive remaining green areas in Abbeyside, and I believe the planning department should re-examine this site to minimise the impact of any proposed development which may must be factored into the present proposal, bearing in mind that a

new Development Plan for Dungarvan is presently being considered," Cllr. Kyne said.

Town Manager, Denis McCarthy, said he had pre-planning discussions with the

developers on the issue.

He said he hasn't seen the application as yet but he would take Cllr. Kyne's comments into account when it comes before him.

VEC Chairman Praises Handling Of School Transport Crises

Chairman of County Waterford VEC, Cllr. Declan Doocey would like to take this opportunity to praise and thank the clerical staff of the VEC for their handling of the school transport crises.

"With limited resources, they resolved a serious situation which arose as a result of the fatal bus crash in Navan last May," Cllr. Doocey said.

"Subsequent announcement of the provision of seatbelts on school buses and students outside catchment areas who were told their places were not guaranteed for the new school year, created a serious seat shortage.

"Thankfully, from a situation where approximately 110 pupils had no transport, due to the hard work of the VEC staff, this figure has now been reduced to three," the Lismore area Fine Gael councillor said.

Meanwhile, Cllr. Doocey welcomed the planned development of a car park and playground for Lismore.

"It is a great addition to the future success of the area," Cllr. Doocey said.

Cllr. Doocey looks forward to a speedy completion of both facilities and the usual high standard of workmanship from the outdoor staff.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader this week, Cllr. Geoghegan said, "it has become quite obvious over the past number of years that this roundabout has become quite dangerous and as someone who uses this particular roundabout on a daily basis I believe these improvements need to be carried out sooner rather than later. Hardly a week goes by without some sort of minor traffic accident taking place at the roundabout, and it's particularly dangerous for traffic using the Clashmore Road to access Spring Meadows, Lackenfune and Coolnagour."

"The redesign of the roundabout is just the first step but both Dungarvan Town Council and Waterford County Council must now keep the pressure on the National Roads Authority and ensure that the necessary funding is provided as a matter of priority," Cllr. Geoghegan said.

Three New Exhibitions At Old Market House Arts Centre



The Old Market House Arts Centre, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford launched three new exhibitions recently.

'Travelling Mind' is a series of paintings by the well-known Dublin artist Paul D'Arcy. Paul was born in Dublin but spent his childhood in South Africa and Namibia. He has travelled extensively throughout Europe and also around India. He has been painting since childhood and is primarily a self-taught artist. Paul has exhibited in solo and group shows and has been commissioned for private and public collections. This exhibition 'Travelling Mind' reflects scenes and inspiration from his recent travels to Australia and New Zealand.

"Divergence" is a series of mixed media work by the Waterford city based Divergence Artists Group. The group was founded by the participants in 2004 to create new opportunities and a collaborative work environment. This exhibition features the work of five artists from varied international backgrounds- Irish multi-media artist Bernie Laherty, painters Robert Jackson and George Roe, both from Ireland, Swiss-Irish photographer Denise Schwarz and sculptor Cordula Hansen, originally from Germany.

On display in the upstairs gallery is 'In a Place like Auschwitz' an exhibition of work by Thomas Delohery.

Thomas, who is based in County Clare, has a Masters in Fine Art from University of Ulster where he became interested in the human figure in extreme situations of war and violence. In 1997 he visited Poland and while there he visited the concentration camps- Auschwitz, Birkenau and Stutthof. Thomas' work from then until the present day has been solely about the holocaust.

The guest speaker on the evening was Peadar Drinan, cartoonist with the Irish Examiner. Peadar spoke of Paul D'Arcy's work at first appearing surrealist and how the colour and beauty of his travels to Australia and New Zealand are brought to life on canvas. He praised the work by 'Divergence', the collaborative efforts of the artists involved. He felt the variety of themes and mediums used by the individual artists somehow worked together to make for a very interesting group exhibition. He spoke of how all the participating artists from Divergence Artists Group are in some way concerned with physical and psychological space. Peadar made a heart-rending speech about Thomas Delohery's work. The fact that Thomas "discovers the magic beyond the mire, the glory amongst the

grime, the beauty amidst the cruelty" made the exhibition a memorable one for Peadar.

He wished every success to the exhibiting artists and encouraged those in attendance to take the time to closely view and absorb the artwork on display.

These exhibitions continue until Saturday 22nd October 2005.

Answers Still Needed On Ballinroad Infrastructure

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne is to raise concerns over the lack of vital infrastructure in Ballinroad with the Minister for Transport, Martin Cullen.

Cllr. Kyne is to call on the Transport Minister to release funding in order to tackle the serious infrastructure deficit in Ballinroad. "The people of Ballinroad deserve better," said Cllr. Kyne, who also called on the county council management to implement an action plan for Ballinroad clearly explaining the finance from development charges and Central Government.

Speaking in response to a 23-point reply from John O'Flynn, Director of Services, with the county council, Cllr. Kyne said answers to his concerns are still needed.

ANSWERS NEEDED

He said two vital infrastructural works at Kilminnion graveyard junction remain unfunded, unplanned, and with no schedule for completion. While the council is to seek funding from the Department, Cllr. Kyne said this "catch up" approach illustrates the serious problems facing the residents of Ballinroad today.

"How housing can be delivered without matching services brings us all into disrepute," he said.

ROADS

Road markings and well-designed signage are also urgently needed, while the absence of public lighting leading from Lord McGuire's was he said, another example of a housing estate being completed without the enforcement provision of adequate public lighting.

The Knocknagranagh Park Exit

has also shown up the lack of enforcement, the Labour councillor added while a lack of funding for footpaths was highlighted.

The lack of funding for footpaths, Cllr. Kyne said, "again raises my original question of what amount of development charges were levied for Ballinroad. "Were these collected, and more importantly, were these fees spent on the infrastructure these were levied for?"

"This question has been referred to the planning department, and it is an answer still awaited with interest by the public," he said.

WATER SHORTAGES

Residents have also faced water shortages during the summer months. According to the county council, the public water supply is being looked at in the context of the Deelish/ Ballinacourty

scheme and Dungarvan.

"This summer residents experienced significant water shortages especially with showers. This is another critical question the council must give a clear answer to.

"To the residents, especially this summer, the system has failed. How can you balance further housing development against a deficit in water supply? The answer is, you can't."

"Pedestrians young and old are hostage to the ever increasing traffic generated without any control through this location, similar in size to Cappoquin and Lisimore. Cllr. Kyne said he is again refocusing on the ongoing need for further urgent action.

"I will be bringing this also to the attention of the Minister of the Environment to try to get the financing for some of the requested works.

Avoiding antibiotics

The days are getting shorter, the children are back at school, and the weather has turned chilly and damp. Autumn has arrived and it has brought the first of this year's winter coughs, colds and tummy bugs with it.

At this time of year it always puzzles me when people call to say "I can't make my appointment today, I'm ill". It seems that many people now understand the benefits of herbal medicine for chronic and complex conditions such as depression and anxiety, migraines, digestive disturbances, hormonal imbalances and joint problems. However, acute infections such as sore throats, colds, flu and tummy bugs still bring people to their doctor in search of antibiotics.

Antibiotics are drugs which kill the bacteria that cause various types of infection in the body. Some antibiotics are very specific and act on only a small number of bacterial species, while others (known as broad spectrum antibiotics) kill many different species. Antibiotics are completely ineffective against the viruses which are responsible for the majority of winter bugs, and they do nothing to support the immune system or to help with the symptoms of the condition. Of course antibiotics are absolutely essential in the treatment of serious or life threatening conditions, but they are powerful drugs which can have some serious side effects.

Firstly, antibiotics interfere with the normal balance of microflora in the body. Microflora is the term used to describe the various species of bacteria and yeasts which are present on the skin and mucous membranes of all normal, healthy people. Many of these species (often referred to as 'friendly bacteria') are important for biological functions such as absorption of various nutrients and protection against harmful micro-organisms.

Antibiotics destroy large numbers of these friendly bacteria. This can allow harmful micro-organisms such as *Candida albicans* to become dominant. This causes irritation and inflammation of the local tissues and a variety of other problems which affect the rest of the body. These include thrush, sweet cravings, allergies, sinus problems, reduced alcohol tolerance, digestive disturbances, skin problems, severe pre-menstrual symptoms, thyroid problems, headaches, tiredness and poor concentration. This type of imbalance can be very difficult to correct and in some cases the problem can continue for months or even years.

Antibiotics can also have far-reaching effects on the immune system. Infections which resolve after antibiotic treatment often recur because the immune system has been damaged by the antibiotics. The most no-

table examples are cystitis and ear infections which may return time and time again and take years to fully resolve.

Studies have shown that children who are given antibiotics before they are 6 months old are twice as likely to develop asthma than other children, and those who are given broad spectrum antibiotics are almost nine times more likely to develop the condition. The use of antibiotics in children also increases the likelihood of a range of other allergies.

Perhaps the most serious consequence of the overuse of antibiotics is the development of strains of bacteria which have become completely resistant to treatment. One example is MRSA (Methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus*), which can cause incurable and sometimes fatal infections.

Fortunately there is a safer approach to treating the wide range of infections which are common throughout the winter months. Herbal preparations such as garlic, thyme and tea tree oils have been found to be more effective against a range of bacteria than pharmaceutical anti-septics, and because they are much more complex than orthodox medicines they are less likely to lead to the development of resistant bacteria. There are also a number of antiviral herbs which are more appropriate for treating viral infections than antibiotics.

In order to treat the symptoms of the infection, herbs are used which help to manage fever, to reduce the production of mucus, to soothe sore throats and coughs, or to ease diarrhoea. Which herbs are chosen depends completely on which symptoms are being experienced.

In addition, herbal medicine focuses on supporting the body's own immune response in order to fight the infection and to help prevent future attacks. By visiting a herbalist for the treatment of winter infections you can be assured of treatment which is safe and effective for both adults and children. At the same time you can avoid the side effects of antibiotic treatment and help to ensure that they will be effective if they do become really necessary.

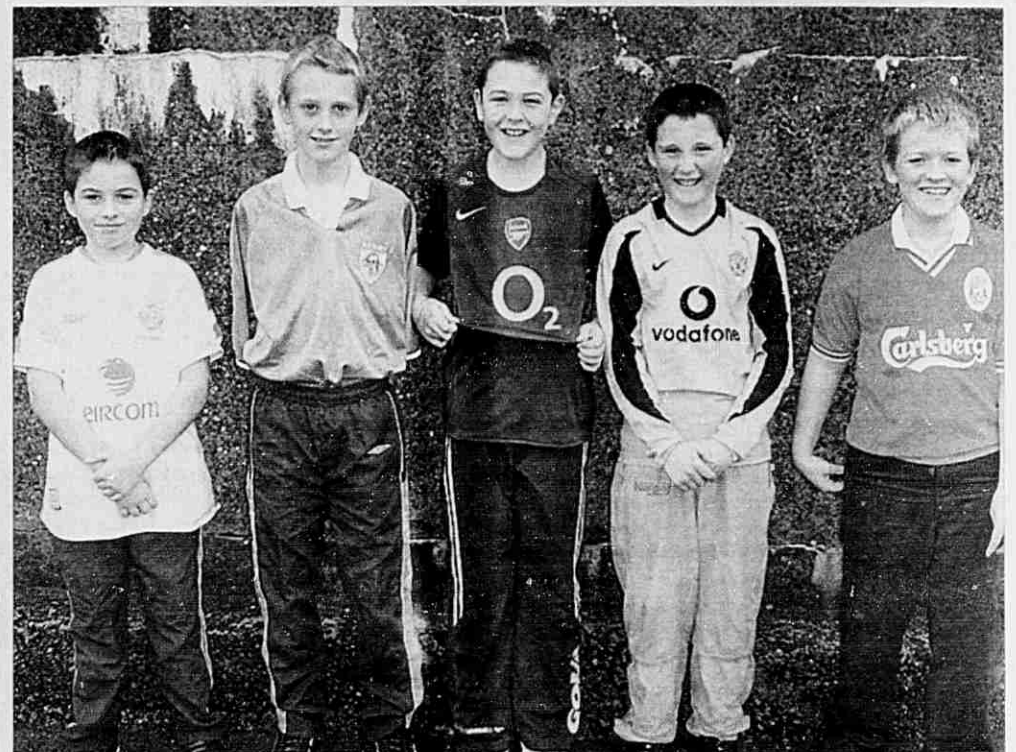

**BEEF: Suckler Cows**

Teagasc beef specialists have produced a summary of the financial analysis done for suckler farmers who completed eProfit Monitor in 2004. In general farmers using the eProfit Monitor are the better producers so that even the bottom are probably better than the national average of all suckler farmers.

The table below examines the performance of 145 suckling farms. These farms may be selling weanlings, stores or bringing all of the progeny to beef. The farms are ranked on the basis of gross margin excluding premia into top third, average of all 145 farms and bottom third.

Suckling Farms

Although overall farm size is similar across all the groups the same trend emerges again in 2004 with the top one third of farms carrying more stock per hectare (1.96LU/ha) than the bottom third of farms who were stocked at 1.63LU/ha. The top farms are producing an extra 257kgs of liveweight per hectare compared to the bottom farms. Even though they received 54/ha less premia than the bottom third their overall gross output per hectare was 388 higher at an impressive 1718/ha.

Despite the lower physical output (bottom third only have 63% the output of the top third), the bottom farms had higher variable costs than the top farms 478 versus 467/ha. This indicates a level of inefficiency on the bottom farms that needs to be improved. The top farms did however have higher fixed costs reflecting higher machinery and depreciation costs.

By generating a gross margin (excl. premia) of 572/ha the top farms were able to cover all their fixed costs and add to their premia towards an overall profit of 721/ha. The average profitability of all the farms was 566/ha while the bottom group achieved a figure of 437/ha, leaving a difference of 284/ha in profit between the top and bottom group or a difference of 15,336 in overall farm profit.

With the bottom group only holding on to 59% of premia as profit this indicates quite a high level of subsidisation of production and over the longer term this cannot be justified.

FARMYARDS: Maintenance work pays

- Even in a cost conscious environment this is very important.
- First of all, we all know that a stitch in time saves nine, and similarly small problems if not dealt with in time can create larger problems later on.
- Examine all aspects of your farm buildings now, list them out in order of priority the items that must be repaired during October.
- Clean water mixing with slurry or flowing over soiled yards causes massive slurry storage problems:
- Every 100 sq. yds. of roof or yard area will collect 450 gallons of water with 1" of rain. Unfortunately, many farmers do not collect soiled water which flows away to pollute our wells and streams.
- Much of this clean water can be kept away from the soiled water by fixing shoots and down pipes and piping this clean roof water away to the nearest stream or collect some of it in storage tanks for housed animals. You know how expensive public water charges are.
- Reduce the area of yard available to animals for walking/exercise so that less soiled water has to be collected.
- Soiled water has to be collected:
- It is hard to justify big tanks or total covering of all animal concrete areas, so what can one do?
- An automatic pump - sprinkler system will cost 15-18,000 for two settling tanks and fully set up to operate. Dry land in the vicinity of the farmyard is necessary for disposals of the soiled water.
- Reed beds costing similar money but using up 2-3 acres of land are working satisfactorily in some farms.
- Either of these two options, while not perfect, will keep many farmers out of trouble.
- Broken cubicles, while unsightly, also cause injuries to animals.
- Cubicle beds, mats must now be cleaned before housing.
- Broken doors, gates, look terrible but so many animals and humans get injured by them.
- Damaged concrete is the greatest cause of problems to the housed animal.
- A lame animal will not put on weight.
- So, repair or replace damaged slats.
- Repair damaged concrete now as there will be no chance later.

**FARMING LEADER**

Attending the Food Month at Farmleigh in association with Bord Bia were Paul Flynn, Tannery Restaurant, Waterford; Aidan Cotter, Chief Executive, Bord Bia and Brendan Smith, TD, Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture and Food. The Farmleigh Food Market features over 40 traders selling speciality and premium produce. This year, the market has been extended to include Sundays until Christmas. Produce includes farmhouse cheese, smoked fish, charcuterie, vegetables, confectionery, freshly pressed juices, home baking, crepes, meat, etc. The food market at Farmleigh is an integral part of Farmleigh public access programme attracting on average 6,000 visitors each Sunday.

The Last of the Kilmeaden Fillet of Cheddar

To highlight the impending closure of the Kilmeaden Cheese Factory approximately 100 local farmers protested outside the Glanbia stand at the opening day of the Ploughing Championships at Mogeely, Middleton, Co. Cork.

For the 40 years of its existence skilled artisans at the Kilmeaden Cheese Factory consistently produced award winning cheddar. The fillet of cheddar owes its unique taste to

the quality summer milk sourced locally. This year Kilmeaden cheese has been awarded Gold and Bronze Medals at the World Cheese Awards.

This premium cheese cannot be re produced to the same standard in any other location. The decision to close the factory by Glanbia will destroy

Ireland's premier cheese and will cost an additional €1.6 million in transport costs (management figures)

IFA Says E.U. Commitment on Early Retirement Scheme Must Be Matched by Government

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Rosemary Kennedy has said the EU commitment to have an Early Farm Retirement Scheme (ERS) as part of the Rural Development policy from 2007 must be matched by strong Government support for the scheme.

Mrs. Kennedy was speaking following a meeting of the EU Structures Advisory Committee where the Commission strongly indicated that farm restructuring is still necessary across the EU following the 2003 CAP Reform and the introduction of decoupling.

"The Commission see the Early Retirement Scheme as being an integral part of the need for competitiveness in the agricultural sector. Furthermore, the EU is proposing to fund a scheme in Ireland to the tune of 50% under the next Rural Development Programme."

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Leader said while the current ERS has not had the

level of uptake as the earlier scheme, much of this is related to the failure of the Government to make the necessary adjustments to make the scheme attractive. The main factors that have reduced uptake are the loss in pension value due to inflation, reduction in the age limit of transferees and the transferee off-farm income clause.

Mrs. Kennedy said the new regulation allows a pension of up to €18,000 as well as greater flexibility on some of the rules of the scheme.

"The ERS must form part of a new restructuring and consolidation package for farming. This package must include measures such as Young Farmers Installation Aid, stamp duty exemption, land leasing incentives, and land consolidation support. These issues will form part of further talks between IFA and the Government in the forthcoming partnership negotiations and the next Rural Development Plan."

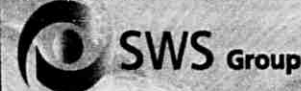

Once again hard work has paid off and the Village of Clashmore has gained an extra nine points over last years final score in the competition. We always need more help, if you have time or skills or ideas which you can share with us, Clashmore Tidy Towns would love to hear from you.

Here's what the judges said about Clashmore in this report.

Overall Development Approach

It is indeed gratifying to read that you continue to have your support of your County Council and you local community for your Tidy Town efforts, evidence of which was to be seen in the village on adjudication day. What a lovely place Clashmore is and the way the Village is being maintained reflects great credit on your residents and their interest in the preservation of their environment. Thank you indeed for all the information sent with the entry form and for the map, which was most useful. As mentioned in last years report, do try to plan ahead on a year to year basis what other projects you might carry out under the various headings of the competition, which in turn will gain your additional marks. Success in the competition does not come over night but with careful planning and attention to detail, Clashmore could be running for County and Regional level awards within a few years.

The Built Environment

Again this year your Church, School, Heritage Centre and Distillery, reflect great credit on those who are responsible for them. The Grotto is a lovely feature and the newly painted village pumps were much admired existing and newly built walls throughout the village add greatly to its overall appearance all of which is in turn being greatly supported by your commercial interests and residents through the very nice presentation of their premises.

Landscaping

Wonderful work has been done throughout the village in terms of the provision of trees, shrubs, flowers, window boxes, tubs and in the maintenance of open spaces and the areas along the river walk. The cemeteries and the school grounds continue to have a high level of maintenance also landscaping which has taken place in the housing estates and particularly on the road to the G.A.A. grounds, was much admired. The areas around the grotto is very beautiful indeed and reflects great credit on its caretakers. Do continue to plant trees and shrubs particularly those which will give you some colour on an all year around basis and most importantly, continue to maintain at a very high level that which you have already achieved and which is the backbone of your efforts under this heading.

Wildlife And Natural Amenities

The Riverside walk and the area of St. Mochua's Well are a wonderful Wildlife area and the addition of bird boxes greatly enhances this facility. Perhaps you might consider

producing a piece of literature on the same subject, which could be distributed at your Heritage Centre, at your Post Office and in the local shops. In the vent do take the best advice possible and, in this connection, your Tidy Towns Handbook will be useful to you.

Litter Control

Your litter teams are obviously doing excellent work. Clashmore was litter free on adjudication day. This is a remarkable achievement and you are indeed to be congratulated on it.

Tidiness

The village looked lovely on adjudication day. It was very neat and tidy and on this occasion, the river was free of debris which took away from it somewhat last year. Well done to all concerned.

Residential Areas

Housing estates improved tremendously in the last 12 months and open spaces are being very well maintained. This is an important aspect of the competition and needs constant monitoring particularly during a wet Summer. Individuals houses are being very well maintained also and partially all had lovely gardens in full bloom which were very much admired. This type of collective and individual effort is very important under the heading particularly in a small community. All concerned to be congratulated. As a result of their efforts a lovely overall appearance has been established in Ardmore.

Roads, Street And Back Areas

Again this year, approach roads were nicely presented with trimmed verges and landscaping. Your local authority is obviously doing excellent work as road surfaces and pathways are in very good condition.

General Impression

Wonderful work has been carried out again this year in Clashmore which reflects great credit on your residents and their interest in the preservation of their environment. Continue to maintain and indeed improve everything you have at the moment and in addition judiciously plan for the future by identifying with your partners what you realistically achieve on a year to year basis within your physical and financial resources. The adjudicator looks forward very much to returning to Clashmore again next year to see further progress made.

Second Round Adjudication

The Youghal Approach roadsides looked rather raw. They had clearly been recently severely cut back. The well painted pumps were favourably noted. The well mown grass of amenity areas and in particular at the beautiful riverside was admired. The colourful buildings contribute much to the village atmosphere. A few shabby buildings and drab boundary walls need attention, similarly some road signs, litter commendably was not a problem. The Heritage Centre and the Old Graveyard were exemplary. There is scope for further maintenance of stone walls. In short you need to achieve a consistent high standard in order to gain a substantial increase of marks.

ST. OLIVER'S CHURCH PAID FOR TWO YEARS AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

In the last 20 years, St. Oliver's Parish Church, Clonmel has come a long way. Scenic Lake Closed to Walkers in Planning Row

A very scenic walk for hill walking enthusiasts in the South East has been closed to the public "for good" as of a planning row between the owner of the land and Waterford County Council. Crotty's Lake near Rathgormack in County Waterford, has been a popular spot for walkers and visitors to the Comeragh mountains for many years, but they can no longer access the beauty spot because the owner of the land Bernard Cullinane has now sealed off his land and has promised to sue trespassers. This decision to close Crotty's Lake was taken by Bernard Cullinane in the last two weeks when he became angered by the planning process in County Waterford, which he claims left him with no hope of developing facilities on his own land. Members of the Clonmel based peaks mountaineering club has reacted to the news with dismay but say they will respect the land owners decision to stay away from Crotty's Lake. This beauty spot is included in walking guides of Ireland and is well known to all hill walkers. Mr. Cullinane said he had hoped to build a "base camp" for explorers of the Comeragh foothills and Crotty's Lake, with 40 Log Cabins, parking facilities and a place for visitors to shower and buy refreshments. When he formed his plan six years ago, Mr. Cullinane even had famed TV architect Duncan Stewart involved. It was intended that the development would be environmentally friendly and educational.

The mountains wouldn't be ruined, Mr. Cullinane said. The 30 euro million investment would have had economic spin-offs for the area, he said. Now, following "negative" meetings with planning officials in Waterford County Council, which left him with the impression that his plan would not get permission, he is calling into question the decision of the department. Mr. Cullinane said his enthusiasm for the project seemed to be mirrored in his initial contacts with Waterford County Council, but he "ran into problems" when he had two "negative" meetings with the forward planning department and the planning board. According to Mr. Cullinane he submitted his plans at these meetings but felt the reaction was negative and that the planners wanted a "stronger theme" which he says he does not understand. Mr. Cullinane said he also made a submission at the draft stage of the Waterford County plan but it was "not given a proper airing". He questioned the "merits" of the forward planning department within Waterford County Council. A spokesperson for Waterford County Council said that planning policies are set out in the county development plan 2005 to 2011 which was adopted by the elected Councillors. The area around Crotty's Lake is unzoned, or "white" land which is used for agricultural and forestry purposes. It is considered to be of high amenity value by the County Council, and it is their policy to protect these areas. Waterford County Council welcomes development and will meet with those who have ideas in pre-planning discussions. Crotty's Lake is located on part of the Cullinane family's 200 acre holding. It is "no longer open to any one" and trespassers will be sued and prosecuted, Mr. Cullinane said. Explaining his actions, Mr. Cullinane says that in the past few years people may not have understood that Crotty's Lake was on private land and they were only ever allowed to go on to the land if they asked permission. Chairman of Peaks Mountaineering Club, Gerry Treacy said that while the

club members are disappointed with this decision, they will respect it and "we won't be using the area for as long as it's out of bounds". However, he is worried the area will remain closed indefinitely and hopes the situation does not escalate to include other landowners, especially those on the Nire Valley side. He (Mr. Treacy) said that he would have thought Mr. Cullinane would get more support by getting people on side, but he recognises that he took his action as a "last resort". "We are", he said, "disappointed about it but have to respect the man's decision". We can see his point of view but it was probably not the best way to go. The hill walkers of peaks club have a good relationship with land owners in the Comeraghs, they regard the area as a great tourism amenity, not just for the Clonmel hinterland but for the people who come from far and wide to walk there. Mr. Treacy said that the onus is now on Waterford County Council to "make a move" to ensure that the area remains open for people to use it. I would call on the people in Waterford County Council that can have influence on this area to try to come to some agreement. "I had a project in mind for the Comeragh Mountain region, a managed and structured project in the foothills", Mr. Cullinane said. "This was to be constructed on flat land in a wooded area and would have environmental and educational benefits", he said. Accepting that his actions to now totally close off the area will provoke a strong reaction, Mr. Cullinane said that a lot of walkers won't take kindly to this. Justifying his planned development, Mr. Cullinane said that it is obvious to hill walkers and straight thinking people that the Comeraghs are devoid of services on this side, Carrick-On-Suir and Dungarvan. This would cater to the needs of hill walkers and tourists. I'm closing (Crotty's Lake) down as a result of the negativity and lack of forward planning to enable the project to go ahead. We have been unpaid ambassadors here. Crotty's Lake is the crown jewel of the South East area. I'm closing it down because the County Council, in their wisdom, have decided not to give this planning permission. Forward planning (department) in Waterford are blinkered in their approach. I am making a stand. I am refusing to submit the plans until the Council comes back and indicates to me that they will in some way facilitate this planning. Crotty's Lake, he said is closed down for good. There is no right to roam here, no right of way. There will be signs erected to notify walkers that the area is private. "They will be under no illusion that they can walk on this land", Mr. Cullinane said and this will be enforced with security. "Confrontation is the last thing I want". Mr. Cullinane predicted that people are going to go crazy over this.

Unfortunately in modern Ireland, with all its wealth, at the end of the day it is the ordinary punter that gets caught out, but we have been held to ransom. We are taking a stand. We should have taken a long time ago. It's a sad day for South East Tourism, he added. Mr. Cullinane said, he had huge bills for repair to fencing damaged by some walkers over the years, since he has made his decision public, he has received positive feedback, but also some negative reaction. He went on to say that Crotty's Lake provided the town of Carrick-On-Suir with 300,000 litres of water each day supplying 2,000 houses with drinking water. He is not paid for this, as it is regulated by a government ruling.

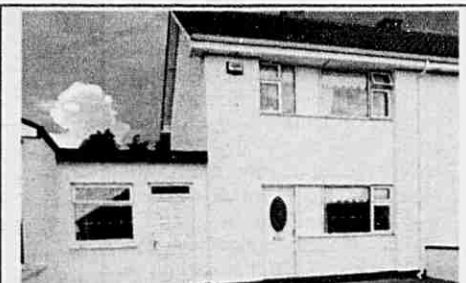

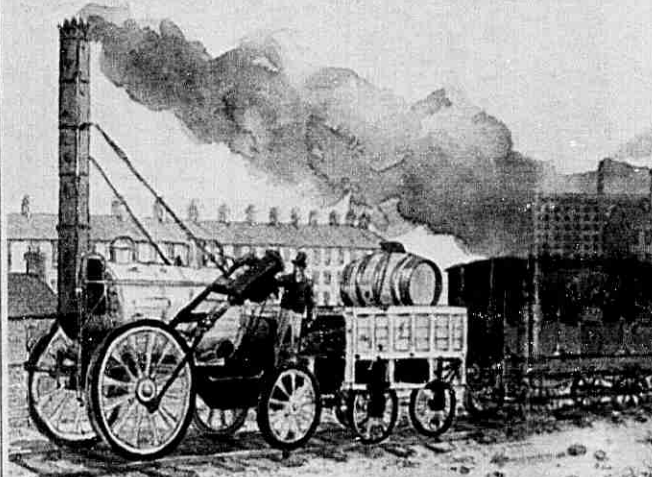

The Industrial Revolution

The Industrial Revolution, which began in Britain in the 18th century, marked a change from making goods on a small scale in people's homes to manufacturing goods in factories. It was helped by the invention of steam power and improvements in iron smelting. The digging of canals, the coming of the railways and improvements in road building all made it easier to transport goods.

THE FIRST RAILWAY CARRIAGES WERE DRAWN BY HORSES

The first iron railway in the world was built at Coalbrookdale, Shropshire in 1760. The carriages were horse drawn and used mainly for carrying coal from a mine. It was not until 1804 that a steam engine was first used on a railway. On September 27, 1825 the Stockton to Darlington Railway was opened for transporting freight, but people were so enthusiastic about this new mode of travel that the directors were forced to make it available to the public. In 1829, George Stephenson's Rocket steam locomotive reached 56 kph (35 mph).



THE INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION WAS A TIME OF INVENTION

During the Industrial Revolution in Britain, many new inventions were developed. James Watt improved the steam engine in 1782, which meant it could be used to drive factory equipment. People such as Jethro Tull developed new machinery for agriculture. Great changes were made in the textile industry with the invention of the flying shuttle in 1733 and the power loom in 1785, which greatly increased the output of cotton. There were also significant changes in the home with improvements to lighting, and to sanitary systems, including the introduction of the flushing toilet.

DID YOU KNOW?

- ★ Before the Industrial Revolution, 90 percent of people in Europe lived in the countryside.
- ★ When weaver James Hargreaves invented the Spinning Jenny in 1764, his fellow weavers broke into his house and destroyed the machine!
- ★ Sir Richard Arkwright, who invented the water frame for spinning in 1769, was a barber who also invented a new way to dye hair!
- ★ In 1769, Parliament made the crime of destroying machines punishable by death!
- ★ The output of James Watt's steam engine was measured in terms of the number of horses it could replace, or 'horse power'.

COOKERY CORNER

Exotic chicken curry

A TROPICAL oasis of flavour – try this fruity chicken curry.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4 to 6
- 20ml groundnut oil
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cubed
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 3cm root ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 stick lemon grass, trimmed and chopped
- 100g baby corn, trimmed and sliced diagonally
- 3 x 10ml sp Malaysian mild curry powder
- 20ml Thai green curry sauce
- 1 x 5ml sp ground turmeric
- 1 x 10ml sp plain flour
- 400ml can coconut milk
- 150ml chicken stock
- 2 x 15ml sp freshly

- chopped coriander
- 227g can pineapple pieces in natural juice
- 1 small ripe mango, peeled, stoned and sliced
- 1 banana, peeled and sliced
- 400g Thai jasmine or Basmati rice to serve

Method:

Heat half the groundnut oil in a large pan. Season the chicken with salt and pepper, add to the hot (almost smoking) oil and cook, turning until brown on all sides. Remove from the pan. Add the remaining oil to the pan. Lower the heat and then fry the onion, garlic, ginger, lemon grass and baby corn, stirring occasionally, for about five minutes. Add the chicken. Mix together the curry powder, curry sauce, turmeric and flour, add to the pan, stirring all the time, and cook for two minutes.



Gradually add the coconut milk, stock and juice from the pineapple. Bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring frequently to prevent it burning. Meanwhile, cook the rice

according to the packet instructions. Just before serving, stir the pineapple pieces, mango, banana and coriander into the curry, then serve with rice.

BRIOCHE BUFFET bites with herbs

DELIGHTFULLY different and impressive buffet type snacks – French cuisine with a twist.

Ingredients:

Makes 24

- 8 medium slices brioche
- 1 x 15ml sp chives, finely snipped
- 1 x 15ml sp dill, finely chopped
- 2 x 15ml sp mayonnaise

Method:

Use a 5cm round cutter to stamp out 24 circles from the bread. Do not include the crust. Mix the chives and dill in a small bowl. Next, spread a thin coat of mayonnaise on the edge of each circle of bread, taking care not to get any mayonnaise on the top surfaces. Then, roll these edges in the herbs, give them a gentle shake to remove any excess and arrange on a serving plate. These particular sandwiches will dry out more quickly than others and there isn't any butter to keep them moist, so keep them covered in plastic wrap until just before you are ready to serve.

TOP TIPS: You can try this method with all sorts of herbs and spices – in fact anything that will stick to the bread using a small amount of mayonnaise. Just roll the edge of the brioche circles in your chosen coating instead of the dill and chives and follow the rest of the recipe. Also, brioche is perfect for making the sweet variety of sandwiches too. Use jam or syrup instead of mayonnaise and hundreds and thousands or icing sugar instead of herbs.

American-style picnic muffins

An American cake-snack which is perfect for lunchboxes and picnics.

Ingredients:

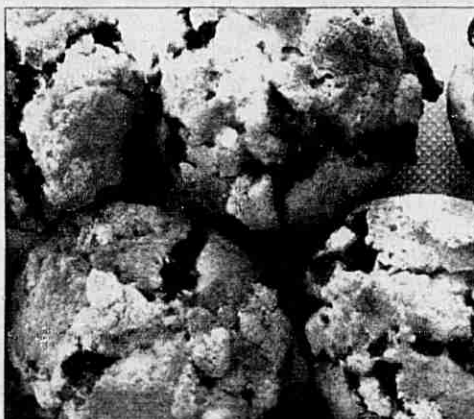
- Makes 16-20
- 200g self-raising flour
- 75g golden caster sugar
- 2 medium eggs
- 4 x 15ml sp sunflower oil
- 4 x 15ml sp milk
- 200g blueberries
- 125g quality white chocolate, coarsely chopped
- FOR THE STRUDEL:**
- 100g butter, softened
- 75g light muscovado sugar
- 1/2 x 5ml sp ground cinnamon
- 75g plain flour

Method:

For the strudel, beat together the butter and sugar. Add the cinnamon and flour and combine well. For the muffins, mix the flour and sugar.

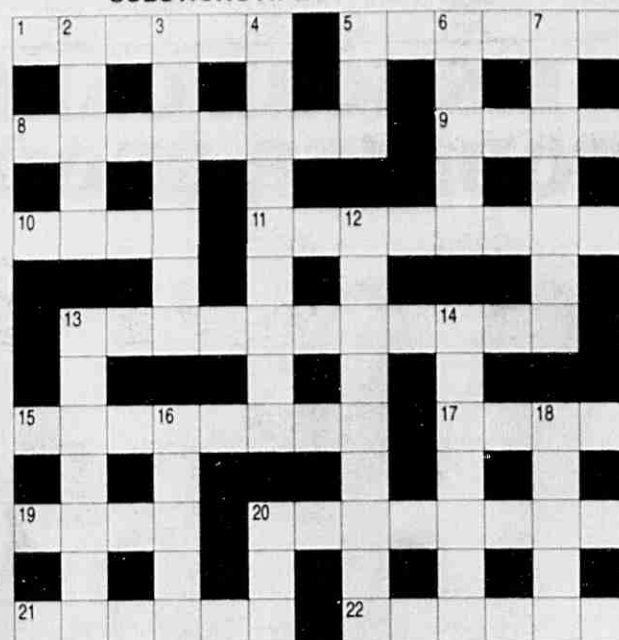
Beat together the eggs, oil and milk then add to the flour, combining gently but thoroughly. Stir in the berries and chocolate, taking care not to bruise the fruit.

Spoon into 16-20 muffin cases. Using your fingers, crumble the strudel mixture over the top. Bake at 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6 for about 20 minutes until golden brown and risen. If you can find large American-sized muffin cases, bake for 2-3 minutes longer.

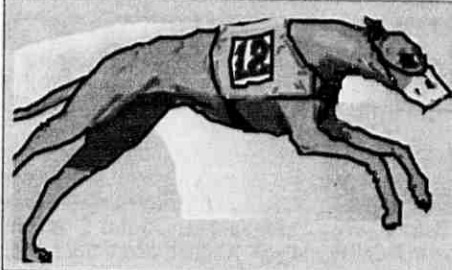

The card also featured the final of the Davy Sauvage Memorial Stake. The George Roche owned Dash Dog Com (Hotshow Ben-Domingo Star) was despatched as the 2/1 favourite and making maximum use of his early pace Dash Dog Com made every post a winning one in a career best 28.62. Castle King gave chase throughout but Dash Dog Com was determined not to lose this final as he came home two lengths clear of Ateantean with a slow starting but fast finishing Topaz Charm just behind in third.

In the opening event of the night the Betty Loftus owned Vigilant Ranger (Droopys Merson-Arlington Road) 2/1 made no mistake with an all the way success in 29.15. A fast starting Rockmount Jessie pushed the winner all the way but Vigilant Ranger kept on at full stretch to open his account by one and a half lengths.

The Eugene Dempsey owned Middletown Star made light of her 5/1 starting price in race two making every post a winning one from trap six in 29.35. Dashing into an early lead over Battstreet Turbo Middletown Star (Knockeevan Star-Slaneyside Moch) was not extended to beat a running on Lifes A Gift by six lengths.

The Ray Jennings owned and Sean Jennings trained Defi (Roanokee-Mitzys Dream) ran out a comfortable 28.90 winner of the third event. Taking over in the lead midway on the back stretch from the early paced Digidyhotdog Defi saw the trip out well to beat a staying on Tivoli Tim by a length and a half.

The John Carroll and Denis Coughlan owned Ashelle Prince (Late Late Show-Little Jingle) 5/2 impressed all present with a no nonsense 28.30 winning effort in the first semi final of the Cork Airport Winner of Four Open 525 stake. Well suited to his rails draw Ashelle Prince drove up the inside of Swift Mermaid to lead the pack out of the first turn. Making the best of his way home a strong running Ashelle Prince went on to beat Swift Mermaid by two and a half lengths.

The final race of the night was an open 550-yard event. Paranoid Pascal 6/4 was backed to the exclusion of everything else but after a bright start the jolly was bumped at the first bend by Silken Thomas and was then cannoned into by Gobstopper at the entrance to the back stretch. Tracking cleverly on the fence the Liam Marks and Dolores Ruth owned and Paul Kiely trained Hes A Duke (Top Honcho-Kinraig Duchess) 4/1 eased his way to the front around the opening two bends and while Silken Thomas remained in second spot throughout Hes A Duke stayed on well in the lead to triumph by two and a half lengths in a smart 29.89.

Impressive Debut By Haddatah Four

April 2004 whelp Haddatah Four (Go Wild Teddy -Copeland Pearl) 3/1 to 1/1 made an eye catching debut in Kilcohan Park last Friday when running away with heat four of the Joseph Ryan Memorial Unraced Stake in a blistering 28.34. Showing massive improvement on his estimated 17.36 sprint trial time on September 23rd Haddatah Four owned by Christine Chadwick forged into an early lead over the well-backed Honey Top. Increasing his lead throughout the strong running Haddatah Four went well clear before inflicting a stunning twelve and a half lengths defeat on Honey Top.

The stewards held an inquiry into this race and the matter has now been referred on to the Irish Greyhound Board.

In heat one Miles Anine was sent off the 4/6 favourite but with the favourite running a trifle green throughout it was the Hugh Martin owned and Ned Murphy trained Bosheen Booster (Fortune Mike-Rogers Stubble) 2/1 who led all the way in a smart 28.94. The early paced Bosheen Booster darted into an early lead over Wilcox Dancer and while Miles Anine stayed on well at the finish Bosheen Booster went on to oblige by a length.

In heat two the winner Forest Rumble (Smooth Rumble-Colorado Tina) the

evens favourite came back a second time to oblige in a slick 28.79. The Colette Kehoe owned Forest Rumble led to between the final two bends where Geneva Gold slipped into the lead on the fence but on the run to the winning line Forest Rumble stayed on stoutly to defeat Geneva Gold by three lengths.

Favourite backers also chose the right one in heat three as the Majella O Dwyer owned and Peter Brady trained Roll The Dough the evens favourite led everywhere in 29.01. This well bred March 2004 son of Mustang Yank and Lemon Champ left trap four at a fair rate of knots and with the pack always playing catch up thereafter the jolly went on to beat Ballyneale Kill by five and a half lengths.

Airmount Boy broke in front in a 300 yard dash but when a challenging Aunties Rebel took the narrow leader Monmahogue Mindy wide off the second turn the Darren Johnson and Gary Crouch owned and Ian Seymour trained Banco (Droopys Vieri-Kinda Swell) 3/1 cut his way through the pack to score by two lengths over Aunties Rebel in 16.81.

Horetown Merin was well supported in race six but while he led to the entrance to the back stretch the favourite soon gave way to the always prominent 3/1 chance Sheeraghs Dodger. Once in front the Pauline Cunningham owned Sheeraghs Dodger (Droopys Vieri-Sheeraghs Flash) was never in any danger thereafter breezing in three and a half lengths clear of Classy Lass in a career best time of 29.17.

Butlerstown based Auctioneer Kevin Mahony sent out the very easy winner of the seventh contest as his 4/1 shot Cloudy Whiskey (Droopys Woods-Honey Pie) ran the opposition off their feet in 29.11. This lady took an absolute flyer from her middle draw and when a chasing 6/4 favourite Cathals Machine appeared to cramp over the final two bends Cloudy Whiskey went on to beat Our Armageddon by seven lengths.

While he appeared to go off the boil in his last couple of races the John and Adrian Morrissey owned and Sean Dooley trained Rathsilla Lad (Roanokee-Metric Ozzie) 3/1 recaptured his early season form with a polished all the way 28.93 success in heat one of the Cork Airport A3 event. After a sluggish break from trap two Sparta Tina ran on well to fill the runner up spot but this was Rathsilla Lad's night as he went on to score by a length.

In heat two the Nicky Hannigan owned Mindies Champion a May 03 son of Droopys Kewell and Never Dismiss got the better of a three way back stretch duel with Milltown Herr and Knockenduff Ban and once he broke free of that challenge Mindies Champion stayed on nicely to record a three lengths win over Knockenduff Ban in a slick 28.93.

Slieverue trainer Eamon O Donovan sent out the John Waterworth owned Valricco Storm (Cool Performance-Glebe End Girl) to a deserved 29.01 victory in heat three. Ballyneale Will cut an early dash from trap one to lead to near the third bend. 4/1 chance Valricco Storm hit the front at that point however and despite a staying run by Pyball Tom Valricco Storm went on to beat Pyball Tom by a length in a career best time.

Racing concluded with two semi finals of the Cork Airport D2 Marathon Stake. The punters choice in the first qualifier was the Alan Carroll owned Dillrock Cracker and this daughter of Sonic Flight and Dillrock Dot did not disappoint hugging the rails throughout before obliging in a decent 40.90. Jakes Break showed good early speed but gave way at the third bend to the 6/4 favourite Dillrock Cracker. Exploding into action this "Cracker" went right away from that point onwards eventually beating Jakes Break by nine lengths in 40.90.

In the second semi final the Geoff and Niall Maher owned Francescos Girl (Kilmessan Jet-Tuddles Way) 7/2 a course and distance winner came from off the pace to triumph in 41.27. Sorrento Jack, Stretford and Canary Zest were all in with a chance of victory over the final two bends bit a fast finishing Francescos Girl outstayed them all to beat Stretford by one and a half lengths. John O Brien trains this winner.

IRISH RACING WEEKLY REVIEW

IRELAND'S FIRST ALL WEATHER TRACK ANNOUNCED

On Tuesday 27th September, the Minister for Arts, Sport and Tourism, Mr John O'Donoghue, T.D. together with Mr Denis Brosnan, Chairman of Horse Racing Ireland, announced that Ireland's first all-weather racecourse will be built at Dundalk Stadium. Dundalk's plans were given the go ahead when the Board of HRI approved maximum grant aid of €10.276m for the project at their meeting on Monday 26th September. The target opening date for the facility is Spring 2007.

Minister John O'Donoghue said: "Dundalk's new all-weather racetrack will make history on a number of fronts: Ireland's first all-weather track, our first floodlit racetrack and the first combined horse and greyhound racing facility. It is an ambitious project and I am sure that it will be a successful one and a wonderful sporting and social asset for Dundalk, the North East and the entire border region."

Denis Brosnan paid tribute to the Minister and acknowledged the funding structures which he created for the horse and greyhound industries that has enabled HRI to create the Racecourse Development Fund which will see 110 million in HRI grant aid allocated to racecourse projects in the coming years.

KINANE BACK WITH A BANG

13 time Irish Champion Jockey Michael Kinane only returned to action at Newmarket last Thursday after a six week absence having broken his right wrist in a fall at the Curragh in mid-August but quickly made up for lost time when winning the Group One Cheveley Park Stakes on the Brian Meehan trained Donna Blini (12/1). Winner of the Cherry Hinton Stakes over the same course and distance in July, Donna Blini held off the determined challenges of both Wake Up Maggie (9/2) and Flashy Wings (2/1 favourite) by a neck and a neck in a driving finish.

KAVANAGH APPOINTMENT

Brian Kavanagh, Chief Executive of Horse Racing Ireland, has been confirmed as the new Chairman of the European Pattern Committee (EPC), succeeding Tristram Ricketts. Kavanagh takes on the additional role on 1st October, while BHB will retain its Secretariat function for the EPC. Kavanagh, a chartered accountant, joined the Turf Club in 1989 as its financial controller, leaving in the mid-1990s to become manager of the Curragh racecourse. He was appointed as Chief Executive of Horse Racing Ireland in October 2001, having occupied the same position with the Irish Turf Club for the previous two years.

KICKING KING SET FOR PUN- CHESTOWN RETURN

Last season's Cheltenham Gold Cup hero, Kicking King, is to aimed at the Daily Star Steeplechase at Punchestown on October 20th for his seasonal debut after trainer Tom Taaffe ruled out a repeat bid at the National Lottery Agent Steeplechase at Gowran Park next weekend. Taaffe feels that the ground at the moment would be unsuitable for his charge and that the timing of the Punchestown race fits in better with his stable star's schedule which is likely to include the new Betfair Chase at Haydock in late November and the King George VI Chase at Kempton on St Stephen's Day.

HOIRIGAN DOUBLE

Trainer Michael Hourigan saddled a fine double at Downpatrick on Wednesday with the well backed Almier (5/1) landing the Robinsons Fruit Spring Beginners Chase in the hands of Keith Hadnett before Emer's Choice (7/1) gave jockey Paddy Flood another success in the RHM Bakeries Handicap Chase half an hour later.

Bleak Day For Punters At Thurles

On a day which the punters will want to quickly forget, all eight favourites were beaten at Thurles last Thursday and it was no

surprise to hear that the Jackpot Pool of over 7,000 was not won. Meath trainer Stephen Mahon took the training honours with a big priced double on the day courtesy of Impartial (16/1) and Le Caro (12/1) who won the Horse And Jockey Maiden and the Holycross Handicap Hurdle respectively.

FIRE BURNS BRIGHTLY AT CURRAGH

Trainer Kevin Prendergast saddled Ugo Fire (2/1) to land the C.L. Weld Park Stakes at the Curragh on Saturday to give long-standing owner, Norman Ormiston, a deserved first Group race success. Runner up to the ultra smart Rumpelstiltskin in the Moyglare Stud Stakes on her previous outing, Ugo Fire showed her determination to defeat Abigail Pett in a driving finish and will now be trained next season with the Boylesports Irish 1000 Guineas very much on her agenda..

SOLERINA'S SURPRISE FALL

The James Bowe trained Solerina was denied her 15th career win over hurdles when taking an uncharacteristic fall at the final flight in the John James McManus Memorial Hurdle at Tipperary on Sunday. Holding a two length advantage approaching the final flight with nearest rival Harchibald making no impression, Solerina (13/8 joint favourite) stood off too far and paid the penalty much to the dismay of her legion of supporters in the large crowd. Thankfully both herself and rider David Casey were able to walk away unharmed as Harchibald (13/8 joint favourite) was left clear to win from Ansar. On an excellent eight race mixed card, trainer Michael Halford sent out Miss Sally (7/1) to win the Group 3 Coolmore Home Of Champions Concorde Stakes over seven furlongs to credit apprentice Rory Cleary with his first ever Group race win.

TREBLE FOR FALLON AS HURRICANE BLOWS AWAY RIVALS

Jockey Kieren Fallon enjoyed a memorable day at Longchamp on Sunday when riding a magnificent Group One treble with his victory on the Andre Fabre trained Hurricane Run in the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe giving him his first success in Europe's most prestigious race. Hurricane Run had to come from well off the pace to defeat Westerner by two and a half lengths and the 11/4 second favourite is likely to stay in training as a four year old. It was six years earlier that his sire, Montjeu, strode to victory in the same race and this powerfully built colt, who won the Budweiser Irish Derby at the Curragh in late June, could develop into a real champion next season.

Fallon had earlier completed a fantastic Group One double for trainer Aidan O'Brien as Rumpelstiltskin (2/1 favourite) overcame a far from clear passage to win the Prix Marcel Boussac in the style of a top class filly while half an hour later the same stable's Horatio Nelson (4/7 favourite) made a lot of the running to win the Prix Jean Luc Lagardere to stretch his unbeaten record to four.

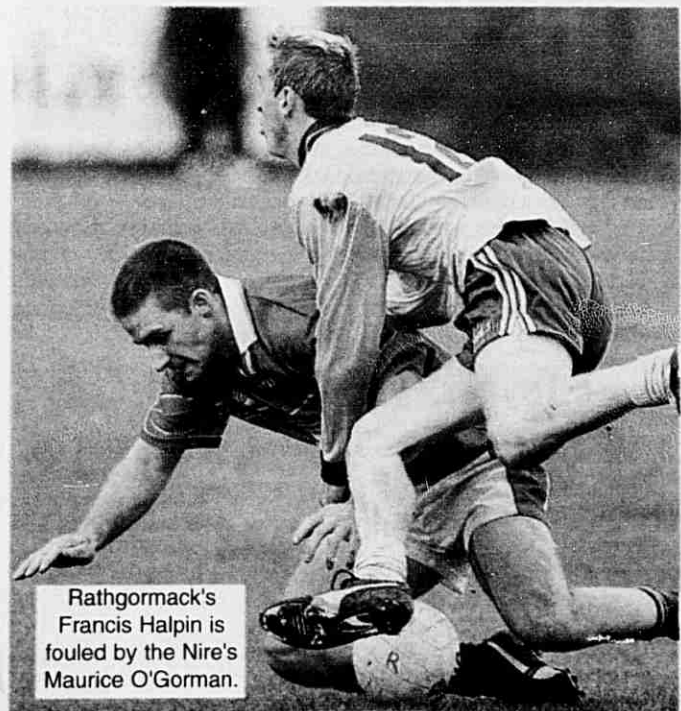

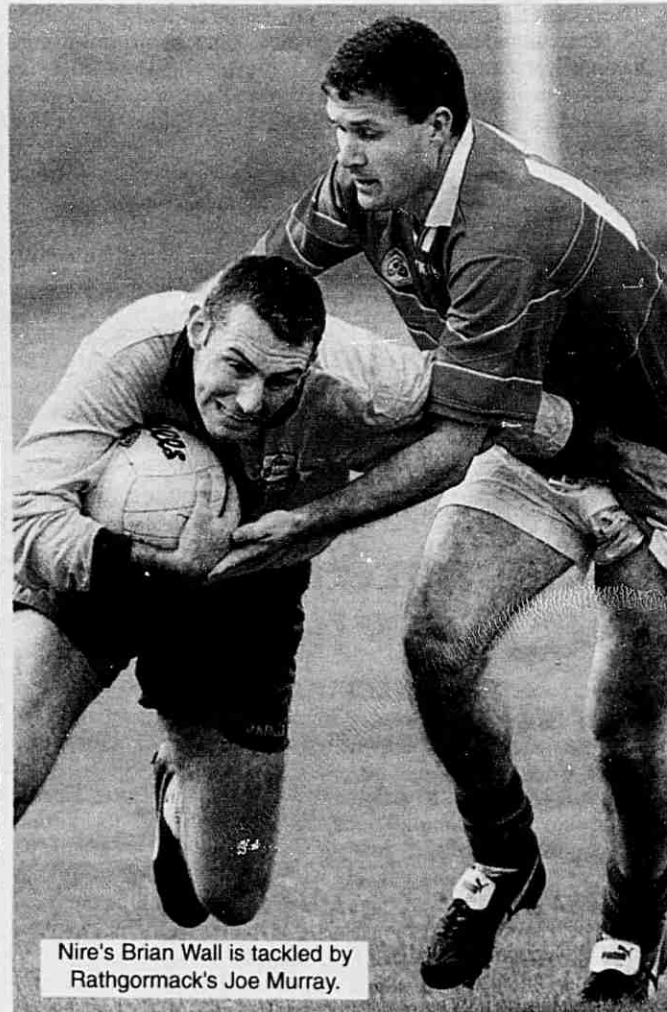

But the victory and the place in the county final against De La Salle went to the 'Gunners who were able to make better use of the chances which came their way.

In fact it could be said with conviction that the two goals scored by substitute Paul Flynn, were the scores which made the difference.

Ballygunner enjoyed an 0-10 to 0-6 lead when Dave Bennett hit a 20-meter free that crashed to the net past a crowded goal line in the 22nd. Minute, but the celebrations lasted a mere 24 seconds when Paul Flynn, having been introduced as a

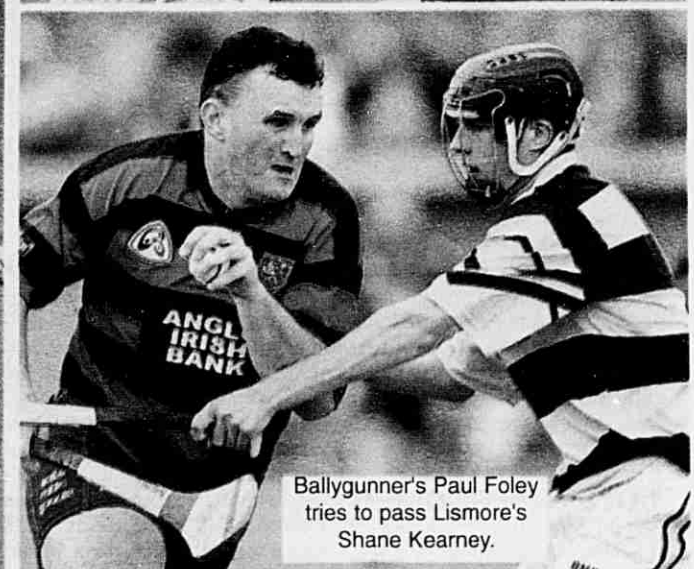

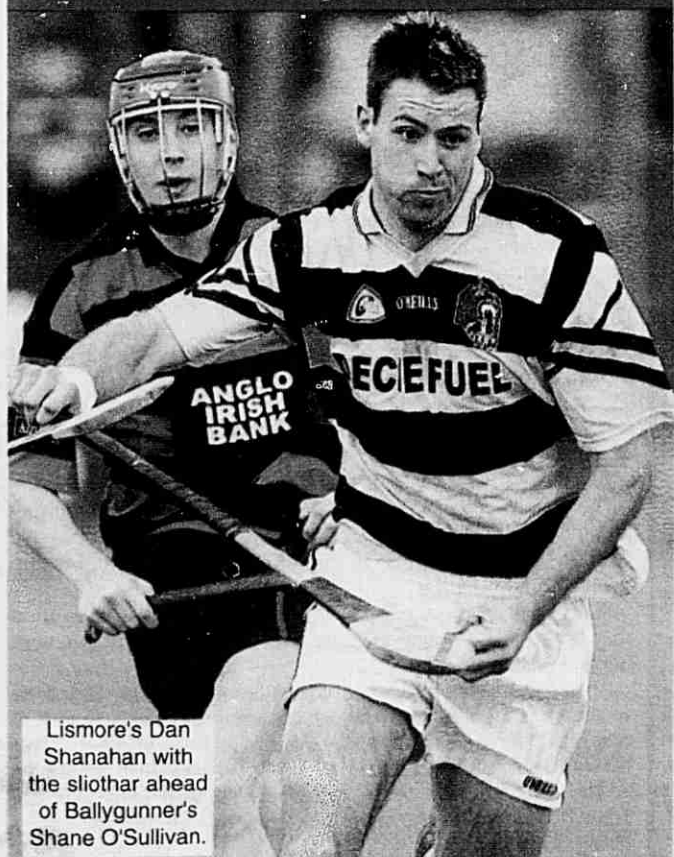


Lismore's Peter Howard solos out of defence ahead of Ballygunner's Tommy Power.

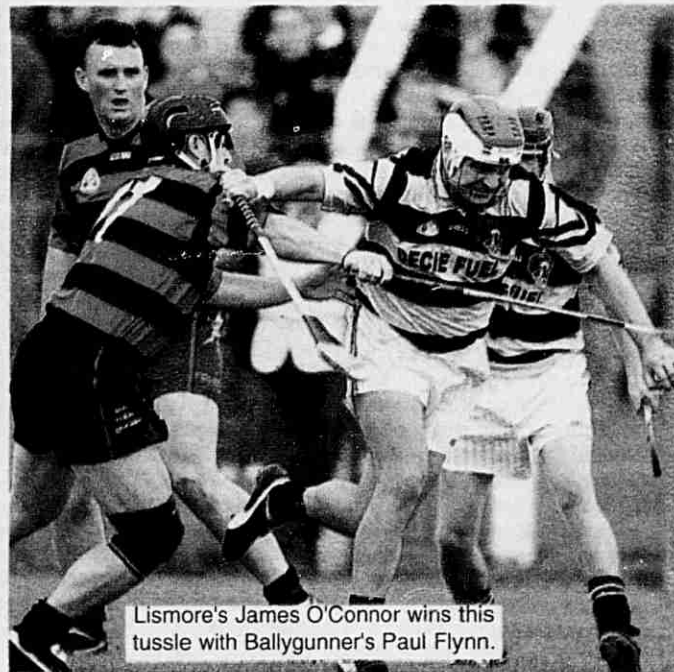


Ballygunner's Paul Foley tries to pass Lismore's Shane Kearney.

Lismore's Dan Shanahan with the sliothar ahead of Ballygunner's Shane O'Sullivan.

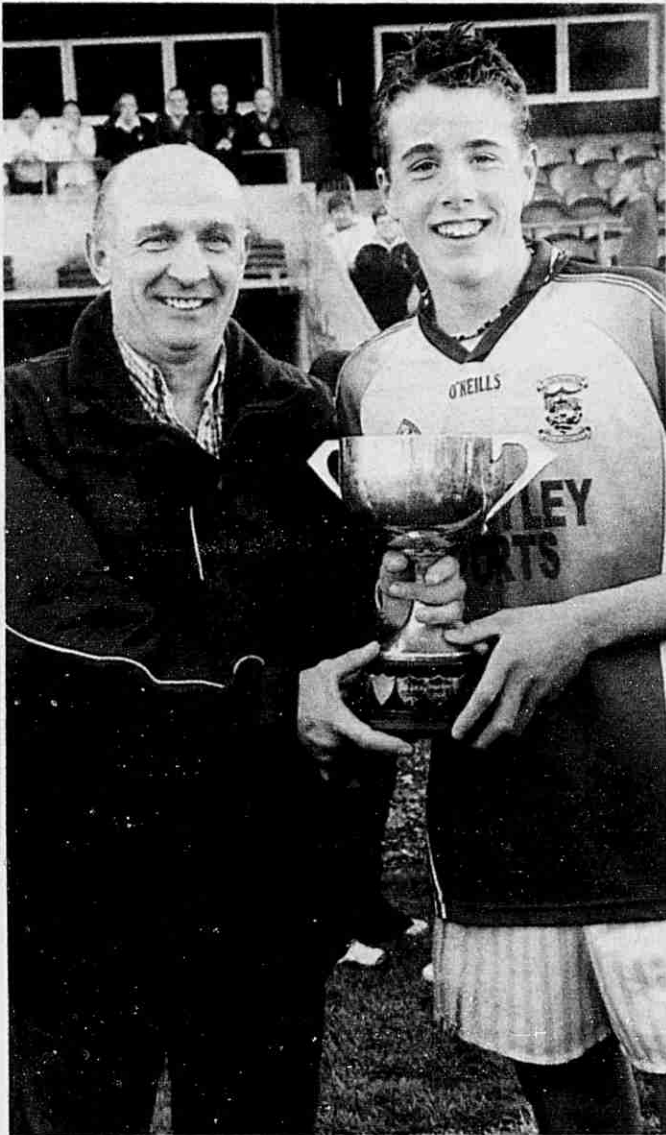


Lismore's James O'Connor wins this tussle with Ballygunner's Paul Flynn.

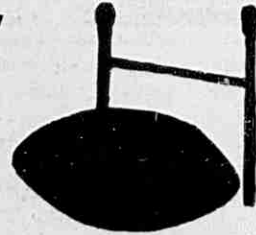

LAUNCH OF REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

As a league they would be the babes of Munster as they only became affiliated in 1999 to the MFA. But in those 5 years they have achieved more than many leagues have in over 40 years. He wished them well and know they will go from strength to strength in the years ahead.

Dail Deputy Ollie Wilkinson TD said he was delighted for the invitation to attend this special occasion and being present was an education as he saw the many plans professionally presented and outlined by the FAI during the course of the evening. In John Delaney and Packie Bonner the FAI could not have a better two at the helm. Ollie went on to say that in the present age where life is lived to the full, sport is the greatest recreation of all for all ages. The government has committed itself to funding for sport and he is delighted that sporting organisations and clubs have benefited through the sport grants.

On a personal note he is delighted that MI Looby was selected for the post of RDO as he knows the work Michael does for the Cappoquin club. 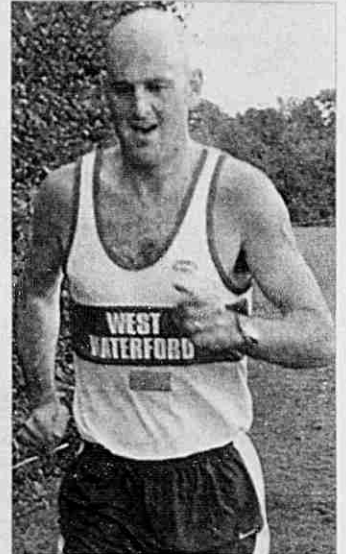

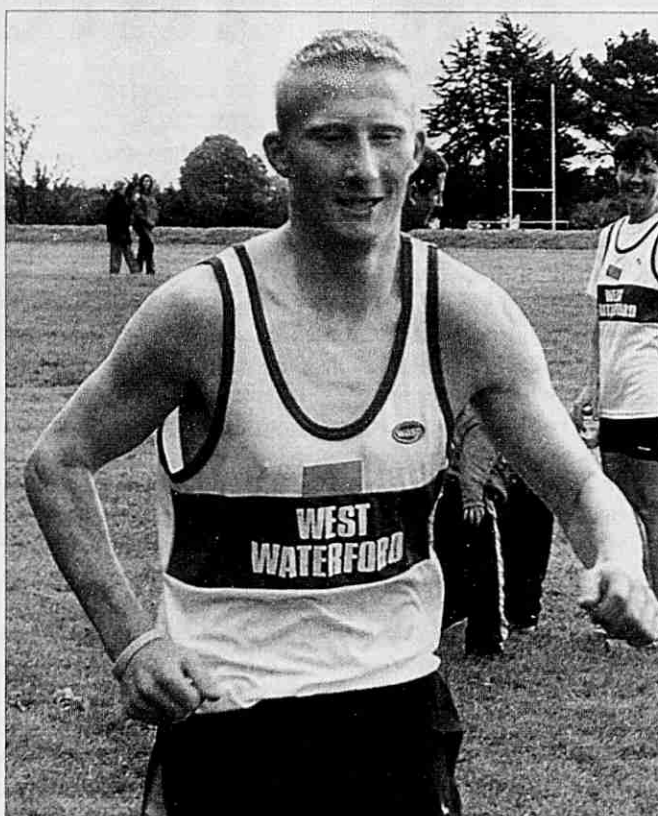

Marathon Corner

HOW CAN I ESTIMATE MY FINISHING TIME FOR MY FIRST MARATHON?

Well-trained runners sometimes can multiply their 10K time in minutes by 4.66 and predict their approximate marathon time. First-timers should probably multiply by 5, and then add some more time for safety. Another rough estimate can be had by multiplying your half-marathon time by two and adding 10 minutes. There also exist various online charts that allow you to predict pace based on your times at shorter distances. But don't get totally caught up on times. Your first marathon should be more about finishing.

Be realistic — Your goals should be challenging, but achievable. If you are competing in your very first Marathon your goal is all about getting to the finish line, as you are now coming towards the end of your training schedule, your work load will decrease, don't try and cram in any extra training as this will have the opposite effect and will just leave you with tired legs, **Be realistic**.

Put it in writing — Talking about your goals and writing them down are two completely different things. By writing down the specific steps that you will take to reach your goals, it will give you another reason to stay motivated and stick with your program. Many of the best athletes in the world write down specific goals. You will often see these athletes posting these goals just about anywhere—from their racing shoes to their bedroom wall—their goals are always in front of them. **Reward yourself** — It is very easy to be hard on yourself in the last couple of weeks and it is common to feel that you haven't enough training done as we approach the big day. Make sure you reward yourself for the progress that you have made along the way. You can do this by taking an extra day off, or enjoying a treat that you gave up during your training. But remember, too much of a good thing will defeat the purpose of your training program, so don't go overboard and keep your goals in the back of your mind.

Tapering

Getting fit is only part of the equation to having a great day. Not only do you need to ensure that you peak at the right time, which is on the day of the Marathon, but you also need to arrive fully recovered; that is fresh and without any feelings of fatigue. Peaking and tapering is about ensuring full recovery while maintaining performance adaptations.

Why do you need to Taper? — You need to reduce your training volume (taper) to ensure full recovery. Running training causes muscle damage, fatigue and also depletes carbohydrate stores in muscle. You need to ensure that these factors are reduced as much as possible while at the same time you need to make sure that the adaptations your body has made from your training are not lost.

Ensuring Full Recovery — Let's take a closer look at the key factors you need to work on for full recovery in the taper: **Muscle Damage:** By reducing training, and in particular long or intense speed training sessions, you will arrive at your event with fresh legs. Quite often marathoners and half marathoners find that it is their legs that give out in the latter part of a race. Starting with muscle soreness or muscle fatigue will increase the risk. **Fatigue:** By fatigue I mean general fatigue from lots of hard training over a prolonged period (10 weeks plus). A proper taper will give you some mental drive, a very necessary component to ensure that you can focus for your event and push hard in the closing stages. Your central nervous system needs several days of light training as a minimum and the longer your build-up the longer the taper needs to be to remove this.

Carbohydrate Stores — Your body can only store a limited amount of carbohydrate in muscle (600g or so) and so your final weeks should focus on maximizing this. You therefore need to ensure that you do keep eating well. But you can overdo it. If you have been training hard you will be eating more food than usual, so when you reduce your training in the taper, most athletes would be advised to keep their energy stores up by keeping the same eating patterns. This also follows the age-old rule of not changing anything close to your event. By also timing your meals immediately (<30min) after your training, you will also ensure that you store less of your food as body fat and more as muscle glycogen, which is good general training advice anyway.

Maintaining Performance Components — You need to make sure that while you are reducing your training so that you are fully recovered you will need to ensure that you maintain all the adaptations from your training. These adaptations have been hard earned so you want to hold onto them. The key areas are cardiovascular endurance, muscular endurance, cardiovascular speed, and muscular.

On Holidays

We had the pleasure of Liam Flynn for many of our training runs last week. Liam was on a short break home in Ring with his wife Chris and he joined us for a couple of runs in the College. Now living in Chicago for quite a few years Liam is still very involved in athletics as well as his own running he is training some very promising young athletes in Chicago. He keeps himself well informed of the goings on at West Waterford AC as he receives the local papers each week. Good to see both you and Chris in the best of form Liam, keep up the good work.

RUNNING QUOTE

Get out well, but not too quickly, move through the field, and be comfortable. Strategy-wise, go with your strengths. If you don't have a great finish, you must get away to win. I've always found it effective to make a move just before the crest of a hill. You get away just a little and you're gone before your opponent gets over the top. Also, around a tight bend, take off like holy hell. I've done that a number of times. You should not be flying down the home straight. Most of your efforts should have been put forth earlier.
