Outrage At Sale Of Land Earmarked For Social Housing

BY KEVIN KIRRANE Outrage and shock greeted

news that Dungarvan Town Council is to sell a site in Abbeyside where 130 social and affordable houses were planned to be built.

Two months ago, members of the Town Council were informed that a first phase of sixty houses were to be built on the 12.7 acre site near the Clonea Road. However, following a question from Cllr. Teresa Wright at the October meeting of the local authority, Town Manager, Denis Mc-Carthy revealed that the plans are to be scrapped and the site

sold to private developers. Just 26 social and affordable houses under Part V would be built if the site is developed by

a private developer.

Fiachra O Ceilleachair described the news as "a dark day" for the Town Council. He said it was unheard of for a local authority to choose to sell land for private housing rather than provide social and affordable housing to ease its hous-

ing lists. Labour Cllr. Teresa Wright and Sinn Fein Cllr. Brendan Mansfield said the announcement was "shocking" and "disgraceful.'

Cllr. Wright said when the original plans were drawn up everything was "hunky dory. However, because of a couple of objections and submissions by people who did not want to live near local authority hous-

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Concerns Over **Private Operation** of Recycling Plant

The Materials Recovery Facility in Shandon, Dungarvan, and the Compost Facility at the Six Cross Roads in Waterford City will be run by private operators eventually, a recent meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

The MRF plant, located in the Advance Factory, will continue to be owned by the local au-thority. But, Director of Services, Denis McCarthy, said they will be offered as part of a bundle on a Public Private Partnership (PPP) basis.


Raising the issue during a de-bate on the South East Draft Waste Management Plan recently, Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said that this was a very worrying development.

Cllr. Mansfield, an active trade unionist, said that this could result in the loss of unionised jobs and could also result in lower pay and poorer conditions for those employed by private operators.

Fine Gael councillor, Paudie Coffey also said the council needs to ensure it keeps a measure of control over the recycling plant in the future. He said unless the local authority keeps its finger on the pulse it can become a 'runaway horse.'

WORK ON ALLEVIATING CLONEETY FLOODING TO TAKE PLACE

Work on alleviating flooding at Cloneety Terrace will take place while the contractors working on the new inner relief road at the Orchard are on site.

Senior Engineer with Waterford County Council, Vincent O'Connor confirmed at the October meeting of the local authority that the work will be carried out.

It followed concerns raised by Labour councillor, Teresa Wright about worsening flooding on both sides of the road which has occurred regularly over the past two years.

WORK STARTED ON STRANCALLY QUAY

Work finally got underway on Strancally Quay in West Waterford where the council hope to provide an amenity area for the public.

The future of the project, planned by the local community council, looked in doubt due to objections raised by the owners of Strancally Castle.

A number of solicitor's letters were sent by the castle owners protesting against its use as an amenity.

However, following questions from Fianna Fail county councillor, James Tobin, Mr. White said work had commenced on the facility.

PUBLIC SAFETY ON CAMPHIRE ROAD A PRIORITY

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A YEAR ON

Lismore Clinic of Herbal Medicine officially opened one year ago this month, and what an eventful year it has been!

People who have attended the clinic now number in the hundreds and have come from far and wide to experience the benefits of herbal medicine. Those people who have more serious conditions requiring long term treatment usually reach a point where gradual improvements are being made, or where the condition is controlled or stabilised. These individuals no longer attend the clinic on a regular basis but are provided with repeat prescriptions for their individual blend of herbs.

Of course there are also those people who, for whatever reason, don't take their medicines regularly, are unable to follow the advice they receive, or don't continue with their treatment for long enough to experience the benefits. These people are in the minority and I am usually very impressed by how dedicated most people are to getting well. Of those who did continue with the treatment, took their medicines regularly and followed the advice they were given, about 97% either recovered or experienced significant relief from their symptoms.

Having said that, the number of people who contact the clinic for the first time has steadily increased over the past year, and those who have been helped by herbal medicine tend to return again if they experience further health problems. For example, some of the people who were treated for colds, flu and other bugs last winter have returned this year for treatment to help prevent further infections. The clinic is therefore becoming busier with every month that goes by.

An extremely wide variety of health problems have been successfully treated during the past year at Lismore Clinic of Herbal Medicine. The conditions most frequently treated include depression and anxiety, sleep disturbance, chronic fatigue, headaches

and migraines, allergies, poor circulation, digestive problems, urinary conditions, joint problems, skin disorders, respiratory problems such as infections, asthma and sinusitis, hormonal imbalances such as pre-menstrual syndrome and menopausal symptoms, and glandular problems such as thyroid disease and diabetes.

In the coming year I hope to

hold more of these talks and also to speak on more specific subjects. Of course this weekly column has also been running for the past year now. I hope to continue to write a piece every week and to find interesting and informative topics to cover. I also hope that all those who follow the articles on a regular basis have enjoyed reading them as much as I have enjoyed writing them!

Finally I would just like to take this opportunity to thank all of those people who have supported Lismore Clinic of Herbal Medicine during its first year of business, in particular Akram Hanna and all the staff at Mari Mina pharmacy in Lismore, and of course all those who have attended the clinic to whom I wish continued good health.



"2005 looks set to be another record year for price inflation the second-hand market"

Sherry FitzGerald, Ireland's largest estate agents announced today (Monday) that the average price of a second-hand property in Ireland rose by 3.9% during the third quarter of 2005. This follows very strong growth during the opening six months, bringing the total growth for the year to date to 13.1%, an indication of the continued buoyancy of demand for residential property.

The pace of inflation in the Dublin second hand market however was even more pronounced at 5.1% for the third quarter, bringing the rate of increase to 17.5% for the year to date. This compared to a total growth rate

of 16.6% during 2004. The comparable year on year figure for the twelve months to September 2005 revealed price growth of 21.6%.

The pace of growth in Cork was relatively strong with 3.1% recorded in the quarter resulting in growth of 12.7% in the year to date.

Commenting on the results Marian Finnegan, Chief Economist, Sherry FitzGerald Group said; "After a very strong performance during the first half of the year these latest results confirm that 2005 is going to be another record year for the Irish property market. The combination of the strength of the economy, in particular the continued competitiveness of the interest rate environment and the heightened first time buyer demand following the amendments to the stamp duty rates in the 2005 Budget have resulted in above trend price inflation. This was principally notable in the regional centers and in particular Dublin which enjoyed a premium rate of price inflation. Price inflation remains stronger in the housing market with apartments in general achieving lower growth rates."

A preliminary analysis of a selection of properties which traded in Ireland during the year to date revealed that first time buyers remain a very stable ingredient in

overall demand purchasing an estimated 36% of all the second-hand properties traded and closed during the nine month period. This compared to 33% during the same period in 2004. The comparative strength of first time demand during the year to date would appear to reflect the impact of the amendment in the rates of stamp duty applicable to first time buyers in the second hand market.

Investors were quite active during the year to date with initial estimates suggesting that they purchased 17% of the second-hand properties traded and closed during the period. This compares to 19% during the same period in 2004.

An analysis of vendors who traded their properties during the first nine months reveals that 25% sold with the intention of purchasing a larger property. This is a very healthy indicator of the robustness of the market. In contrast, only 6% of vendors were trading down. Interestingly, 28% of vendors sold investment properties, a marginal increase on the comparable figure of 27% for 2004

Looking to the remainder of the year, Ms Finnegan purports that there is now every indication that price inflation in 2005 will be the strongest level achieved for a number of years. "Evidence to date would suggest that price growth in the Dublin market will approach 20% while overall price inflation for Ireland will reach 15%. Taking a longer term perspective, the outlook for 2006 will be largely dependent on the interest rate cycle and the potential for any further stamp duty amendments in the December Budget. Indications to date would suggest that further stamp duty reductions are unlikely while interest rates are likely to increase moderately towards the middle of the year. If both these assertions prove correct then we can assume the price inflation will be heavily weighted towards the opening months of the year with a lower annual level achieved in the twelve months to December than in 2005."





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








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
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




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
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
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
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SK Foundations For The Future



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
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Work On Alleviating Cloneety Flooding To Take Place

However, following questions from Fianna Fail county councillor, James Tobin, Mr. White said work had commenced on the facility.





Dairy: Meal Feeding

The best response to meal feeding of cows is achieved in the autumn. This is due to a number of reasons. Poor grazing conditions, lower feeding value of autumn grass, shorter day length, higher proportion of dung paths, higher water content in grass etc. Therefore, if your quota position allows, you can feed 2 kg of meal per cow. This will increase milk yield, milk protein content and lactose content. Many co-ops have introduced payments in relation to lactose %. Cows of low yield and cows on a low level of nutrition will have lower lactose levels. Of course, meal feeding will help control grass tetany problems also.

Timely Tips

Thirteen times a week milking is working on farms with low bulk milk SCC (under 200,000)

Foot bath your cows early this month and again towards the end of October to harden hooves and eliminate Mortellaro before housing

If you're heading well over quota, dry off thin cows and heifers early and put condition on them on grass pre-housing.

SCC levels are rising - tackle known suspect cows when bulk milk counts rise above 300,000

Light replacement heifers will respond well to meal feeding at autumn grass. It is better to try and get more size in them now, than forcing weight on prior to calving.

Single Farm Payment

Your Single Farm Payment is due over the next months. Have you thought about what you are going to do with it when it arrives. Maybe cash flow is tight and you need it immediately for living expenses, loan repayments etc. On the other hand you maybe facing a bigger tax bill. There's a possibility that you could receive up to 40% of your 2004 premia in 2005 along with your full Single Farm Payment in 2005. The Revenue have provided the opportunity to spread the balance of premia from 2004 (paid in 2005) over the next three tax years; 2005, 2006 and 2007, in equal instalments.

The Teagasc Cost Control Planner would be of great benefit in determining the level of cash flow in the business. By having a picture of cash flow on your farm will enable you to make better decisions. Contact your advisor if you want this programme.

You will receive this Single Farm Payment in one lump sum and many options exist. You may use it for capital investment or maybe you are "in the red" and need it to put you back "in the black". Some banks are offering 3% return on deposit, which would enable you to save it for a rainier day and keep pace with inflation. Consider your options carefully. See important event below.

CATTLE: Finishing Cattle On Grass

Autumn grass is lower in energy and dry matter than grass produced earlier in the year. The lower dry matter and deteriorating weather conditions can restrict intake. Feed 3 - 4 kg concentrates per day to finishing steers where grass is plentiful and higher levels as the grass supply declines. If grazing conditions are good and there is a reasonable grass supply it is preferable to keep finishing cattle outdoors. Housing causes a performance check, can lead to respiratory problems and also results in dirty hides. By late Autumn, 6 - 7 kg concentrates per day may be necessary. This should be given in two feeds and if possible in a yard or gravelled area. Mobile meal feeders reduce the labour required for larger units. Estimate grass supply and requirements. Save the best grass for the finishing cattle. Stores intended for finishing in 2006 should be the first to be housed as weight gain can be low on Autumn grass in the absence of concentrates.

Sell cattle as they become fit. This will leave more pasture available for remaining stock. This year there are no premium considerations to interfere with cattle sales. Steers of about 620 kg in early October can be finished at grass with concentrates or indoors on ad lib concentrates in the November/December period. A number of under 2 year old steers may be capable of being finished pre-Christmas without incurring high feed cost and this option should be considered.

Heifers are more easily finished at grass than steers. Feed 2 - 4 kg concentrates per day to finishing heifers at grass. Where heifers will not be ready for slaughter until December it may be better to house them and feed 4 kg concentrates per day to continentals and 3 kg per day to non-continentals along with good silage or put them on a high concentrate diet. Beef cows should be in good condition at this time. Scanning will show those not in calf. All culls should be weaned immediately and given 6 weeks good grass plus about 4 kg concentrates per day to get them into suitable slaughter condition. Thin cows will need 4 - 5 months feeding. With a substantial rise in carcase value as carcase weight increases, winter finishing of a cull cow can yield a margin of 90 - 120 per head.

Protein Requirements

Finishing cattle on Autumn grass do not need a protein level above that found in barley, wheat or beet pulp. Minerals can be excluded in the short term. Minerals should be included if the concentrate feeding period is longer than 5 - 6 weeks or if high levels of concentrates are fed. Provide about 100 grams mineral/vitamin supplement per head per day to finishing cattle. On high quality silage a 10 12% crude protein ration is adequate for finishing cattle with 12 -14% recommended for weanlings. A higher protein level is needed if feeding maize silage, whole crop silage or roots. The most economical way of supplementing protein is to include feeds such as distillers' grains, corn gluten or rapeseed meal in the ration.

IFA SEEKS BUDGET TAX PACKAGE

The IFA is seeking a targeted Farm Consolidation Relief in the 2006 Budget to help farmers increase the size of their holdings to meet ever-increasing international competition.

Speaking in advance of IFA's pre-Budget submission to the Minister for Finance, Brian Cowen, IFA President John Dillon said "farmers and their families are being confronted by daunting challenges to their businesses and their futures. The outcome of CAP Reform, WTO talks on international trade, and increasing environmental regulation present a formidable combination of competitive pressures. Government must allow farmers build their capacity to compete and generate income levels that are comparable with income levels in other sectors."

Mr Dillon said farm incomes must take account of the risks and investment demands on farmers and there was an urgent need to consolidate the structure of Irish farms.

The size and fragmentation of Irish farms remains the key barrier to achieving greater competitiveness in Irish agriculture.

BOVINE TB AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES 2005/2006 HARDSHIP GRANT

- The 2005/2006 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November 2005. It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some owner/keepers whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible owner/keepers must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible owner/keepers with a payment of up to €250 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November 2005 to 30 April 2006.
- 2. The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER97. Potentially eligible owner/keepers will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.
- 3. The onus is on the potentially eligible owner/keepers whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November 2005 or during the period 1 November 2005 to 30 April 2006 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER97.



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

Late Mr. Jackie O'Dwyer

It is with deep and sincere regret we record the death of Mr. Jackie O'Dwyer, Summerhill Drive, Clonmel which sad event took place recently at South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel.

A man who was well known and highly respected, a highly esteemed member of the teaching profession in Clonmel for the past forty years. Noted for the great rapport which he had with his students, he always took a keen interest in their progress and in their subsequent careers. And they who had the privilege of having been under the tutelage had the highest respect for him, many continuing to keep in touch over the years.

Prominently identified with Hillview in the fifties and up to the early seventies, he was actively involved with the club both as a player and committee member, successfully taking over the tennis captaincy for a period and who can forget those social occasions in Hillview during the halcyon years, when Jackie would raise the roof with his fine tenor voice in a powerful rendering of Jerusalem or Poc Ar Buile, two of his party pieces. People, too, still recall the Tops of the Town, in those early days when, Jackie representing the local teachers group, with his flair for the theatrical dressed up as "The Merry Plough Girl", a skit on "The Merry

Ploughman" which he did using his own hilarious words. He was son of Jackie and Ann O'Dwyer of Mitchel Street, Clonmel, he was one of two children, his brother Stephen, a solicitor now living in the Cayman Islands. Many in the town and the locality will remember the bicycle shop which his father ran at 25 Mitchel Street. Sadly his father was only 46 when he died in the early fifties, leaving his wife to run the business on her own, which she did very successfully for many years.

Having been educated at the High School and Rockwell College, Jackie went on to do a degree in business and commerce in U.C.D., following which he was offered a position in the Clonmel Technical School by the late William Crowley, who was the principal there at the time. After some years teaching commerce, he decided to go to do a course in P.E. in Strawberry Hill, London. Physical Education being a big subject with him in the Technical School from then on. Jackie who had been a good tennis and badminton player, used to take his pupils all over Ireland to participate in badminton competitions.

In 1974 he married Anne Shanahan from Ard na Greine and they resided in Summerhill Drive raising two children, John residing locally and Marianne now in Australia. According to his wife Anne, Jackie loved teaching, like to pass on his knowledge and took a great interest in boxing locally getting involved with the likes of Tommy Ryan and Billy Keane. He had an absorbing interest in computers, he used to go over to London to look at the latest equipment, and being a lover of cars he always liked to have the latest model. In latter years Jackie studied health and social development and he so much enjoyed teaching mature students who had decided to go back to school.

Talking wistfully of her husband, Anne, shocked at his unexpected passing, recalls the lovely times they had together and is proud of the fact he had carried an organ donor card with him. His wife Anne and her family find it difficult to adequately express in words their deep gratitude to the staff of South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel especially the Cardiac unit, there where they as well as Jackie were treated to the utmost kindness at any hour day or night.

His remains were removed to S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. and on the following morning, he celebrated the requiem Mass and after Mass his funeral took place to St Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where he was laid to rest. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. officiating at the grave side.

The Irish Farmers Association are calling for an independent arbitrator to be brought in to resolve the row that has lead to the closing off ofCrotty's Lake in the Comeragh Mountains. Michael Flynn, Chairman of Rathgormack I.F.A. is calling on Waterford County Council to do something to have this dispute nipped in the bud before it mushrooms out of control. Crotty's Lake is a well known beauty spot that has been popular with hill walkers for many years. It was closed to the public by landowner Bernard Cullinane in September following a planning dispute between Mr. Cullinane and the planning authority of Waterford County Council. At the time Mr. Cullinane said the areas was 'no longer open to anyone, and that trespassers would be 'sued and prosecuted'. This week Mr. Cullinane said he appreciated the support of the local I.F.A. but he does not think the Council will be interested. "We would, he said, welcome a resolution to the problem but I don't

think the Council would be interested in such a line. I don't think they do such negotiating but if they do we would certainly be interested" he said. "If there were more groups that joined with the local I.F.A. and made their feelings known, then the Council might take notice. It could gather momentum and

they'd have to face up to it".

In his statement on the matter, Mr. Flynn stated he is willing to offer his services to appoint an independent arbitrator that would mediate in this case. He also called on the County Council to pay the arbitrators expenses because of the good will that the Cullinane family has shown to the Council and to tourists down through the years. In support of the Cullinane family, Mr. Flynn said that they have been unpaid ambassadors for tourism in the area, they have supplied water to Carrick-on-Suir free of charge from their own private lake, and they have suffered damage to fencing and property, from some walkers without a euro in compensation.

In the weeks since Mr. Cullinane made his decision to close off his land, there have been some incidents with walkers asserting their right to walk in the area, he says. I had, he said, to turn back some very disappointed people. Most have taken it well but some have tried to force their way onto the land. Mr. Cullinane said there have been three groups who said they had the right to walk on the mountain and one group from last weekend have said they will be back. "We are very anxious for a resolution to this" the landowner said. Mr. Cullinane said that he knows other landowners who are thinking along the same lines as him. I am calling on other farmers to shut down their lands as well, if they are experiencing difficulties from the Council. This is an action that nobody wants to take, but that's the way it is. He added that it is still his intention to go back to the Council to seek planning permission


Machines for Mining and Building

Mining and building work which once needed huge teams of workers, can now be done by machines guided by computers. Vast drills and tunnel-boring machines cut through hundreds of metres of rock in a day. Cranes are powerful enough to lift loads weighing a thousand tonnes.



Mini Trucks Can Work By Remote Control

The earliest miners used simple picks to mine metal ores. Today, huge drilling rigs bore holes into the mountain side, then dynamite is used to blast away the rock. Giant 980 tonne electric shovels can move up to 40 cubic metres (1,412 cubic feet) of rock at a time, loading it onto 240 tonne dump trucks. Many mining trucks are operated by remote control. In future, it may be possible for all the trucks in a mine to be controlled by one operator working on a computer screen.



The Channel Tunnel Was Cut By Huge Machines

In 1988, work began on the Channel Tunnel, a 50km (30ml) tunnel linking the UK to France. The "Chunnel" was dug out 199m (300ft) beneath the sea by a huge tunnel boring machine (TBMs). Each TBM is as long as two football pitches and can cut through up to 100m (300ft) of rock a day. TBMs have rams that drive the cutting head around, and waste rock is fed onto a conveyor belt. In making the tunnel, 7.5 million cubic metres (265 million cubic feet) of rock had to be removed.

Giant Drills Cut Through Mountain Sides

Drill and blast tunnelling is used to cut through hard rock, such as under mountains. Giant drills working together as a drilling jumbo bore holes into the rock face, guided by a computer. The holes are then filled with dynamite to blast away the rock. French engineers pioneered drill and blast tunnelling when they built the Mont Cenis rail tunnel under the Alps in 1871. They used pneumatic drills which has been invented just ten years earlier.

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Celebrate autumn with 'The Beauty of Leaves'

Garden Messenger plant promotion

Every season has elements that make it special, but autumn really is for connoisseurs. The natural world rewards every one of our senses in autumn and for gardeners it's a time to enjoy being outdoors - to soak up all that the season can offer. Colour is the key ingredient and plants that offer exciting or attractive colour effects through their foliage are essential elements in creating a garden that is outstanding now.

Add to this the fact that autumn is an ideal planting time (the soil is still quite warm and workable and the plants themselves take well if planted now) and you'll see how there is much to celebrate.

Here is a selection of autumn glories for you to consider for your garden.

Parrotia is grown for its peeling bark, attractive autumn colour and subtle winter flowers, all of which make it a great choice for autumn and winter. Parrotia persica (Persian ironwood) is available in both a full size form, which can achieve a height and spread of 8m and 10m respectively and a miniature form (Parrotia persica 'Pendula'). In this form it only grows to 1.5m in height and 3m spread.

Cornus florida, or Flowering dogwood puts on a great show in autumn when its mid green summer leaves turn to red and purple. This tree reaches a height and spread of approximately 6m and 8m respectively.


Sorbus aucuparia, also known as Mountain ash or Rowan is a real autumn glory as its berries, which have been developing through late summer, fully ripen. Its foliage also provides a spectacle in the garden as its leaves turn red and yellow. May reach 15m in height and 7m spread. Liquidambar is a tree that is grown primarily for its autumn colour. Depending on species and variety, leaves can colour yellow, orange red or purple or variations on this. Liquidambar orientalis can reach 6m in height. Other species and varieties can be bigger.

Euonymus alatus or Winged spindle is striking in autumn when its leaves turn dark red. This dense, bushy, deciduous shrub, is ideal in either a shrub border or on its own as a specimen plant. This plant achieves an approximate height of 2m and a spread of 3m. There is also a compact variety available, Euonymus alatus 'Compactus', reaching a height of 1m is a great option for smaller gardens. If you've never planted a tree before, take some advice on planting when you buy. Many good retailers offer leaflets on tasks like tree planting. Check that there's space for your tree to grow in the intended place and that the soil is suitable for what you've got in mind. These trees should do well on most fertile, humus rich garden soils, though Liquidambar and Cornus prefer a neutral to acid soil. If planting primarily for autumn colour, try to choose a partial or full sun position.

As a number of important legislative changes will be taking place during that time it is felt that Bernard will bring his political and organisational skills to the benefit of the profession of Pharmacy.

PRESENTATION ON "TOM BARRY: IRA FREEDOM FIGHTER"

Responding to the ever-massive interest in Irish history. especially about the key people in the War of Independence, author and historian Meda Ryan will talk on the life and times of Tom Barry, from her book "Tom Barry: IRA Freedom Fighter" (at Ballyrafter House Hotel, Lismore on Thursday 27 October, 7.30PM).

In recent years quite a controversy has arisen on the events surrounding the actions of Tom Barry and the men who fought with him. Born in Killorglin, Co. Kerry on 1 July 1897, Tom was the second of fourteen children born to Thomas (who was in the RIC) and Margaret Barry. Tom's father had eloped with his mother because the family did not approve of the relationship.

The first ten years of Tom's life were spent in Killorglin where he attended the local school. By December 1907 Tom's father, disillusioned with the RIC, resigned and returned to his native Rosscarbery. Barry spent his formative years in Rosscarbery, Bandon and Mungret Boarding school. In 1915, anxious for adventure, he signed up for the Great War and was in Mesopotamia (now Iraq) when he got news of the execution of the 1916 leaders. This had a

Barry is remembered as one of the most successful commanders of the 1916-1923 period. Having organised the 3rd Cork Brigade flying column he fought the decisive Kilmichael ambush on 28 November 1920, where sixteen Auxiliaries and three Volunteers were fatally wounded. This ambush was to boost the morale of the Volunteers nationwide and marked a turning point in Irish history.

In recent years controversy has arisen as to whether or not "a false surrender" actually took place on that day. Meda Ryan's uncle Pat O'Donovan was a member of Tom Barry's Flying Column and was in Section 2 where the three fatally wounded Volunteers were placed that day. She has interviewed many of the participants, including Tom Barry, on nine occasions and feels privileged now to have met and known so many who worked for the independent freedom we now have in our twenty-six County State.

In 1998, another historian called Peter Hart stated that Tom Barry's history of Kilmichael 'is riddled with lies and evasions' These are strong words about a man who was known for his uprightness and courage, and who fought against such great odds dur-

ing the War of Independence.

Meda Ryan's book uses original material to directly challenge this controversial view of the ambush, and also challenges Hart's views on sectarianism during the 1920-1922 period. Meda has brought forward new evidence demonstrating that Hart used documentary evidence in a misleading manner. In her new paperback edition of 'Tom Barry", Ryan lists when all participants in the Kilmichael ambush died. As a sign of support from the academic community, University of Limerick History Department Head, Ruan O'Donnell is launching the paperback edition of Meda's book (thus putting the pressure on Peter Hart to declare his sources).

At her talk in Lismore, Meda Ryan will give vivid accounts of Barry's action-packed life during the War of Independence, his involvement with Michael Collins during the War of Independence, and during the Treaty negotiations when Collins sent for Barry - the only military man that Collins requested to have present. She will also cover how Barry opposed the Treaty, became the first prisoner of the Civil War, made several bids to escape and finally succeeded; plus his involvement in the cease-fire/dump arms deal, his term as IRA's Chief of Staff, his participation in the anti-Blueshirt conflict and the IRA conflicts in the 1930s, 1940s, 1950s up to his death in

1980. It all makes for a fascinating story. All are welcome on October 27 at Ballyrafter Hotel, with a start of

Tasty fig sly cakes

SLY cakes, or 'cheats' as they are sometimes called, got their name because of their very deceptive appearance. On the outside they look plain and uninteresting, but concealed inside is a rich filling of figs, currants, nuts and raisins.

Ingredients (Makes 12) 275g plain flour Pinch of salt 100g butter, diced 75g lard, diced 50g caster sugar 225g dried figs, chopped 75g walnut pieces, chopped 50g currants 50g raisins Fresh milk, to glaze

Alzheimers Society YOU'RE OUR HERO

Colin Farrell Commands Schools Supporting Alzheimer Hero Day

'Good luck ... thank you for your amazing work .. ' is the message from on-screen hero Colin Farrell to primary and secondary school pupils in Waterford taking part in the second annual Alzheimer Hero Day, an education and fundraising campaign being run by the Alzheimer Society of Ireland on Friday 21

The aim of Alzheimer Hero Day is to inform young people, many of whom may be affected by Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia, about the condition and how it impacts on the family unit. All participating schools are provided with an education pack containing a lesson on Alzheimer's plus supplemental teaching notes. In understanding what is happening and how they can help, young people can be empowered to participate the care solution for a loved one with dementia in a variety of ways that focus on the abilities of the person with the condition.

Approximately 873 people in Waterford (or 1% total population) are affected by Alzheimer's disease or dementia. Current estimates suggest that there are more than 35,000 people in Ireland with dementia and with our ageing population and longer life expectancy; this figure is expected to rise to more than 61,000 by 2021. Although not exclusively a disease of older people, more than I in 20 persons over 65 years of age are affected by dementia and this number increases to more than 1 in 4 persons over 85 years.

However, the condition can occur in persons in their 30's 40's or 50's and it's estimated that there are approximately 3,500 people under 65 years in Ireland with dementia (Early Onset Dementia). Furthermore, a recent report issued by the Alzheimer Society - 'Early Onset Dementia: A Needs Analysis of Younger People with Dementia in Ireland' - shows that in 59% of the study group, the person with dementia is living, with their partner in the family home and that in 15% of cases there are children under 18 years living at home.

Through Alzheimer Hero Day, the Alzheimer Society intends to encourage students to recognise the heroes within their lives and within themselves. Primary and secondary schools are invited to hold a non-uniform day in aid of the Society in or around 21st October. In addition, primary schools have the option of holding a sponsored 'Spelling Bee' - testing them on Alzheimer's and hero related words - for 4th, 5th and 6th class pupils.



CO. BOARD MEETING

County Chairman, Pat Flynn presided at the November meeting which was very well attended by interested delegates waiting to hear the announcement of the new senior hurling management team.

When the chairman announced that the same management team as last year, were being recommended by the 4 man special committee who were charged with the task of selecting members for the positions, the delegates sat silent, and whether or not this was shock, surprise or disappointment, we do not know

The County chairman assured members that their concerns and complaints voiced at the previous meeting were clearly expressed to the management team and that next year, club matches will be arranged and played to an agreed schedule.

The proposals were adopted unanimously.

DEVELOPMENT LEVY

The payment by clubs of the county development levy was debated and was certainly given a rough ride by delegated who did not hesitate to express their opposition and their concerns about having to pay sums amounting to €10,000 to €17,000 over a five year period and having the contributions paid in five yearly installments.

Ardmore delegate Noel Conway submitted a proposal which seemed to have been extensively researched and recommended that the development debt of €700,000 be brought down by reducing payments, said that in some instances costs could be halved. From the response of delegates it was clear that many agreed that his proposals were worthwhile. His proposals were based on the Annual Balance Sheet figures. Judging by the response from the floor it was obvious that very many delegates thought his proposals to be worthwhile.

In all over 20 delegates contributed to the long discussion and these included, Noel Conway, James Tobin, Nicky O'Donovan, Phil Fanning, Declan O'Meara, Emer Barry, Paddy Fitzgerald, John Jackson, P. J. Ryan, Tony Mansfield, Tom Cunningham, Timmy O'Keeffe, Tom O'Neill, Greg Fives, Seamus Quirke, J. D. Leahy, Liam Moroney, etc.

The chairman explained that the levy was agreed to by clubs in January and clubs did have the benefit of a 70% retention of their membership contributions from the Deise Development Draw and out of which the board received not a penny. In the circumstances clubs would have to cooperate and pay the levies.

Treasurer Michael Hogan told Phil Fanning that juveniles under 15 are admitted free to all our games and OAP's and students are charged half price. He also stated that it was not possible to have a more high profile game as a curtain raiser to the county final because of the dual involvement of a number of clubs.


Club Manual Launched



MARATHON TIPS

- 1. You have done your training, be determined that you will finish. Don't give up unless you have an injury. Your mind will play games but don't let it win!
- 2. Taper down well in the last week. It is better to go into the race under trained than over trained. In the former you can always find
- 3. Check out your gear carefully. Lay it out 3 or 4 days before the race. Then you know you haven't forgotten anything.
- 4. Have a run (gentle!) the day before the race. Two miles will not deplete your energy reserves and it will relieve any tension or any pre-race apprehension you may be having.
- 5. Get a good book to read the night before the race or the morning of the race. It will stop your mind dwelling on the task ahead
- Eat a balanced meal the night before the race. This would normally include protein, carbohydrate and some fat. A nice dessert would
- Tape up and grease. Use anti chaffing cream between the legs, under the arms and maybe on toes, if you are blister prone.
- Shower and soap down the morning of a marathon. It removes body oils and helps the body stay cool, which is important to prevent premature dehydration.
- 10. Split the race into chunks. 5 miles or 5 km's, so that you feel you are making progress.
- 11. Stick to an even pace you know you can finish in. Wear a watch and don't get distracted in the excitement. Don't worry about the starting line as in Dublin everyone has a chip on there shoe which will give you your exact time from starting line to finishing line.
- 12. Carefully plan your route and timing to the start, so you don't end up rushing or panicking. Get in your toilet call well in advance of

DON'TS

- 1. Don't get carried away in the excitement of the start, run too fast and "die" at some stage. It is always better to be passing people after half way than be constantly over taken. Stick to your 'pace'
- 2. Don't be on your feet all day the day before the race sight seeing or shopping. It's easily done at the big city events, especially if you go with a partner. Take it easy the day before.
- Don't wear any new gear especially shoes. All of your stuff should be tested and tried in the days before the race.
- 4. Don't over hydrate before and during the race. You should sip water at every stop but not to excess. Never try glucose supplements if you've not used them before in training.
