

Lismore's Millennium Park Vandalised

Thousands of euro worth of damage was caused to Lismore's Millennium Park in what was described as an "outrageous" and "senseless" act of vandalism last weekend.

Vandals scaled the walls of the attractive Millennium Park, which is locked at night, knocking flagpoles erected to mark the town's Entente Florale triumph, toppling the heavy Sundial monument from its plinth, and smashing floodlighting in the fountain and under trees.

Graffiti was also scrawled on some of the walls, while washing-up liquid was poured into the fountain. Suds were still being churned up by the fountain and waterfall the following day.

Fine Gael councillor, Declan Doocey, said he was utterly disgusted and appalled at the

outrageous vandalism.



Chamber President and Fianna Fail councillor, Ann Marie Rossiter, confirmed at the October meeting of the Town Council





An Apple a Day

day keeps the doctor away", and like most old sayings there is a lot of truth behind it.

Apples are full of vitamins, minerals and other important nutrients in a form which makes them easy to digest and absorb. These nutrients are essential for keeping the body healthy and helping to prevent disease. 

Lismore Council Offices Sold For €383,000

Lismore Courthouse has been sold to Mari Mina Pharmacy Ltd for 383,000 euro, the October meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

However, a number of councillors complained that the former offices - vacant since Lismore Town Council moved to more suitable premises at the former CBS Monastery would have fetched a better price at public auction.

Replying to questions from Cllr. Tom Higgins (FG), as to why it wasn't sold at public auction, County Secretary, Martin Walsh, said a firm of auctioneers handled the sale and marketed the building.

"They got the highest tender available to them, " he said.

But Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin said the council should always sell by public auction.

Cllr. Higgins added that 383,000 euro for what is "a fine building" seemed "like a small offer."

Cllr. Kevin Wilkinson, who has worked in the property business in the past, however, said the price was a fair one for the property.

Meanwhile, the Dungarvan Town Council is to acquire a 580 sq m (0.058ha) of land at TJ Murphy Place in Abbeyside, Dungarvan for 80,000 euros from CIE subject to a formal exchange of contracts.

Mastitis Control Month

Mastitis and particularly SCC levels have been on the increase at Coop level for a number of years now. Reasons are many. But now is the best time to set a preventative programme in motion for 2006.

Dry cow therapy results in the reduction of new cases of mastitis by

It also heals cows with mastitis, particularly, young cows.

However, a cow that has 'chronic' mastitis will not be healed and even with the best dry cow treatment will have mastitis next year.

So, giving a 'chronic mastitis' cow dry cow treatment is a waste of money. A 'chronic mastitis' cow is one that will have had 3-4 cases of clinical mastitis during this year and/or had SCC levels greater than 800,000 on 4-5 tests during the year.

It is best to dry off cows abruptly: Vital if SCC levels are high. Winter milk producer have dried off cows milking 3 gallons but it is best to dry off when yield is at 1.5 gallons, otherwise, lactose and SCC levels in the bulk tank will be affected.

Dry off cows in batches so that you can concentrate on doing the job correctly on a few given days during the winter.

Doing the job correctly involves operating the following technique: At last milking, wash cows teats and dry with paper towel before putting on cups. After milking clean the top of all teats thoroughly with methylated

Insert the dry cow tube a quarter of an inch and massage up into the udder, having started on the near teats first, making certain not to dirty the top of the tube. Then disinfect the whole teat with correctly made up

The next 3 weeks after drying off are really critical.

Keep her on a clean environment, it is essential to keep cubicle beds and yards clean during this period. Restrict her feed intake severely during the first week or so to prevent bagging up. Stress issues such as noise of milking machine and milking cows moving nearby plus overcrowding must be minimised.

Boviseal is a new non-antibiotic teat seal product.

Trials have shown it to be as good as other dry cow products in the prevention of new dry period infections. And to be significantly better for the prevention of e.coli at calving time. But, should not be used on cows with SCC levels of 200,000 and greater.

Use one of the well known recommended products.

Dry cow treatment is very cost efficient as each clinical case costs the farmer €220 not to put on cost on high SCC levels. Cattle

Weanling Health

Stomach worms, lung worms and lice are the three main parasites of weanling cattle during the winter months. The weanlings have very little immunity against those parasites and must be treated for them.

In the case of stomach worms the animals should be treated about one week after going indoors. Drugs that are effective against type II stomach worms should be used. These are generally the white worm drenches or the avermectin based products. It is advisable to vary the type of product used from year to year and even within each year so as to minimise worm resistance to the drugs. Care should also be taken to ensure the dosing gun is working and calibrated properly.

Even though we had a reasonably dry summer and autumn, fluke is still a problem in most parts of the country. It can be generally assumed that fluke is a problem on all farms where there is fair proportion of wet rushy land. Most of the modern drugs kill the adult and immature stages of the fluke worm. It is advisable to wait for 4 weeks after housing for dosing as all the worms will have reached the immature stage and there is a complete kill. (Older cattle and cows may also have to be treated as cattle develop only a weak immunity against the disease).

The main external parasites are biting and sucking lice. The pour-on products are very effective. Animals are usually treated a few weeks after housing or when licking or scratching first becomes visible. A second treatment may be necessary after 6 to 8 weeks.

Local Farmer Writes About His South African Experience

Michael Murphy, Coolbeggan, Tallow winner of the 2005 FBD Scholarship Tour in County Waterford was one of a group of thirty farmers drawn from IFA's 945 branches for their voluntary help in developing the Association's mem-

Here he writes of his experience on his visit to South Africa and particularly the huge challenges facing the country and its farmers who are grappling with new internal political realities since the ending of apartheid and increasing competition from cheaper food imports.

The Scholarship Tour, sponsored by FBD Trust, visited farms and met with government representatives and farming leaders from both the Southern and Northern parts of this vast country.

Farming is predominantly controlled by the white population of South Africa and its scale is immense, with many farm sizes averaging over 400 hectares and some as big as 10,000 hectares.

Farmers have an abundance of cheap labour, enjoy a wonderful ernment regulation and bureaucracy and limited environmental

In relation to regulation and bureaucracy, it was interesting to hear that farmers themselves had imposed their own traceability systems in an effort to reassure their consumers of the quality and safety of their food. The latest technology is used on South African farms in an effort to maximise production and cost efficiencies. For example. meat producers can use growthpromoting hormones in their production, which has a cost of € 2 per animal and increases growth rates by approximately 20%.

The quality of food produced throughout South Africa and its presentation in the hotels and restaurants was excellent. Food prices in the supermarkets were on average 15% - 20% cheaper than

€1,500 euro per year. The availability of loyal, low cost labour is one of the most startling things seen on the farms visited and farm labourers enjoyed an income of between €10 and €20 a day depending on their length of time employed and their experience. Fuel and fertilizer are higher than in Ireland. Foreign food imports and the Government's wish to have a plentiful supply of cheap foods have left South African farmers struggling to maintain profitability.

South African farmers enjoy a wonderful climate but output is reclimate, a huge internal market for stricted by the fact that annual rainits food produce, little or no gov- fall tends to be concentrated in a 2 - 3 month period. In many parts of the country there is serious drought for parts of the year.

As a result of the ending of apartheid, South Africa is now politically controlled by its dominant coloured population. The white farmers are concerned that, in time, they may be forced to sell their land to the state for re-distribution. If this were to happen, the hope is that there would be agreement and those taking over the land would be trained and supported in every way to ensure that production is maintained. A poorly thought out redistribution policy could result in famine and disaster similar to what has happened in Zimbabwe.

South Africa is a wonderful country and has an abundance of beautiful sites, huge natural resources and the capacity to earn significant amount of foreign income from the those in Ireland. country and a largely uneducated and helpless community in the shanty towns as a result of years of oppression, crime is a huge problem. Obviously securing jobs, providing decent homes and educating the population has to be a priority and there are signs that progress is being made. Car sales in South Africa this year are up 25% and property prices have increased at a phenomenal rate over the last number of years. There appears to be a growing percentage enjoying an upper class status in South Africa. However with no middle class, the vast bulk of its people are living in abject and unsustainable poverty.

Overall South African farmers have scale, the availability of land to expand, plentiful supply of low cost labour, a growing number of their population who can afford to buy their produce and a belief and commitment to ensuring they stay in business so that the next generation of their family has the opportunity to farm in South Africa if they so wish. Yet the challenges they face are similar to our own with rising costs and a never-ending downward pressure on product prices due to imports and real concern to future viability.

This was a tremendous trip and I would like to thank FBD Trust and the IFA for giving me the opportunity of experiencing first hand the friendliness of the South African people, the abject poverty endured by so many of them and how lucky we are in Ireland and the beauty and the potential this wonderful Country has to offer its visitors and hopefully all its people in time to



LATE MR. JOHN WHELAN

It was with deep and sincere regret the district received the sad news of the death of Mr. John (Jack) Whelan, Knockacoola and formerly Castlereagh, Ballymacarbry which sad event took place in the loving and tender care of the matron and staff of Saint Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan on Sunday 16th October. Deceased was the eldest son of the late Laurence and Catherine Whelan (nee Coyne). He was born on the 23rd August 1916 when a lot of unrest was taking place in the country. He had the honour of being the oldest male citizen of the parish of Fourmilewater. Of a farming family his life centered around his farm with his father and brother Michael, in his spare time he took up employment with local farmers. A very devout Catholic up to the time he became ill he was a regular Mass goer at St. Laurence's Parish Church, Fourmilewater.

Some eleven years ago his health began to give him problems which needed hospital care, and for all that time he was cared for in Saint Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan until Sunday morning last when he was called to his eternal reward. The measure of the esteem and high regard in which deceased and his family are held was clearly indicated by the representative groups of mourners paying their final respects to a kind friend at the removal of his remains after prayers and rosary were recited, from the hospital Church, St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan to Saint Laurence's Parish Church, Fourmilewater where they were blessed and received by Very Rev. Fr. Cornelius Kelleher P.P., Nire/Touraneena. On Tuesday morning, the feast of Saint Luke Evengelist, requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his eternal soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. LATE MR. ROY SLATTERY

It was with deep and sincere regret we learned of the death of Mr. Roy Slattery, Comeragh Drive, Clonmel. He was only 25 years old when his young life ended, following a tragic accident, which has left his parents, brothers and sisters distraught from grief at the untimely loss of one who had delighted them so much with his loving ways and infectious good humour. Roy, who had a charming personality, had everything going for him and being on the threshold of life was full of youthful enthusiasm and without a care in the world. For him everything was possible, as he looked forward optimistically as he did, with the fearlessness of his age. The circumstances of his death at such an early age have left his parents, as well as other members of the Slattery family, struggling to pick up the pieces. He was one of a family of six of Pat and Valerie Slattery of Comeragh Drive, Clonmel, three boys and three girls. Having attended S.S. Peter & Paul's N.S. and the Technical School in Clonmel, he went to work for the Fuel Centre in King Street, the proprietors of which Pollards were high in their praise of him remarking that he was more like one of the family then an employee. As the occasion demanded, he also worked in Junior Pollards other business on the Dungarvan road out of Clonmel. However, it is his work in the Fuel Centre in King Street that Roy will best be remembered as he had built up, they said, an unbelievable knowledge of every

rounding areas. And, not only did he know the houses on his coal route, but he knew all the people living there, with whom he had a great rapport, and everyone so much enjoyed the good humoured banter with him. Being a lover of the outdoors, his period in the cubs and scouts was very pleasurable for him. At 16 his adventurous nature prompted him to enlist in the FCA, and for the past nine years he had been attending Monday night training at Kickham Barracks, as well as Sundays at Sarsfield Barracks in Limerick. Both contingents were involved in joint operations winning on one occasion, the Directors Trophy in a Medics Corps attached to the Artillary and had the distinction and of course the wonderful satisfaction of having saved the life of a colleague who had got a heart attack in camp, and whom he accompanied to the hospital in the ambulance, giving him the all important resuscitation on the way. The F.C.A. had virtually become his life, the excitement and the espirt-de-corps on camp, in such places as Tralee, Galway, The Curragh, Bere Island, Lahinch, Templemore and The Glen of Imaal appealing to him so much. Ray too, was so proud of the fact that his three sisters as well as his brother Trevor and some cousins were also in the F.C.A. Despite his apparent carefree nature, he was very protective of his sisters, they said, and where family was concerned he would drop everything for them at a moments notice, if the need arose. He was not one for foreign holidays, Roy loved the country and as a young lad from the age of 8 or 9 used to enjoy staying on the farm with relatives in Colman, Lisronagh, where in his eagerness, according to his mother, he would be up at Cockcrow, hunting down the cows long before they were due for milking. Like most young people too, he loved to go to the discos with his friends, play a game of cards or darts and have a bet on the horses, his mother commenting humorously that he never seemed to have picked a winner. He had a lovely way with children, with whom he used to regularly play ball and so much enjoyed his two year old grandchild. Though the Slattery family will sorely miss him from the home, where he was always in good form, they are consoled in the knowledge that he was a wonderful, warm hearted son and brother who has left them with the happiest of memories. And they are so gratified that three people are alive as a result of the fact that Roy had donated his organs.

On hearing of his death a friend penned the fol-

lowing poetic tribute. In the blink of an eye, Your life it was gone, There's an old saying, Life must go on, And life will go on, You left organs behind, Thanks to you Roy, To your fellow mankind, You'd often bring coal. Or blocks to my door, I won't see you no more, And in the graveyard, When they lay you to rest, Many a tear will be shed, You were one of the best.

His remains were removed to S.S. Peter & Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. who also celebrated the Requiem Mass on the following morning, assisted by Rev. Canon Nicholas Power P.P., S.S. Peter & Paul's and the Rev. George Cliffe was present. A guard of honour was provided by the F.C.A. members of which many came from all over the country to bid their farewell to a true friend and comrade at the largest funeral seen for some time. Death of the Dinosaurs

At the end of the Cretaceous period several reptile groups suddenly died out, some 65 million years ago – 60 million years before the appearance of the first human. It is not known what caused this. One theory is that a large meteor may have hit the earth. The impact caused an enormous dust cloud that blocked out the sun causing such a dramatic drop in temperature that most animals could not survive.

Dinosaurs Still To Be Discovered

Over 1,000 different types of dinosaur are now known to have existed, but this number is increasing every year as more discoveries are made by palaeontologists (scientists who make a study of fossils).

Piecing together all the evidence is a slow and painstaking job. In the early days of palaeontology bones were simply collected, but now everything is recorded, detailed notes are made of finds and their locations and photographic and other evidence is also used. Perhaps we will never know everything about the life of dinosaurs, but each day brings exciting new discoveries that are increasing our knowledge of these fascinating creatures.


Other Animals That Disappeared

Many other creatures disappeared at the same time as the dinosaurs. These included the pterosaurs and the ploesiosaurs. They all had one thing in common—they all needed a warm environment to survive, which caused scientists to think there may have been a sudden change in climate for them to have disappeared.

All living things have to adapt to changing conditions to survive. Throughout the Mesozoic era, dinosaurs had proved they could adapt, but this took place over a very long period. A sudden change in conditions would not allow the animal enough time to adapt.

The Time of Mammals

With the disappearance of the dinosaurs mammals began to flourish, giving rise to the many different mammals that we know today.

Prepare now for green treat

CABBAGE is something children are always being told to eat up, because it is good for you.

Nothing changes - the Roman Emperor Tiberious told off his son Drusus for not eating his greens.

The Greeks looked on cabbage both as a means of preventing drunkenness and as a cure for a hangover!

The Romans thought highly of it as a medicine, although they did not know that it is, indeed, rich in sulphur and nitro-

The Romans brought it northwards and in the Middle Ages monks were growing it in their kitchen gardens.

winter weather is over, they never grow as large or as coarse as winter cabbages.

They also have the great advantage of avoiding the dreaded cabbage white butterfly laying its eggs and the caterpillars eating great holes in the crop.

Spring cabbage should be grown in a sheltered part of the garden which has been well manured for a previous crop.

If the cabbage patch was not matured, some manure or Spring cabbage: varieties compost will have to be dug in before transplanting.

Lime is important too. An acid soil discourages growth and encourages the scourge of brassicas, club root – aim at pH 6.5 to 6.8. It is also for the same reason - to keep club root at bay -

that brassicas are not grown on the same piece of land more than one year in three.

Land heavily infected with club root must not be planted with bassicas for at least seven years.

In August seeds should be sown thinly in shallow drills 15cm apart. Remember to keep the seedbed moist.

Transplant the seedlings into moist soil in October 30 to 40 cm apart, in rows 45 cm apart.

If practicable, the rows should run north to south to get all possible sun during the winter months.

Mark out the rows with string for a straight line.

With a dibber or trowel. make holes ready to receive the plants and if the soil is dry fill the holes with water.

If you can arrange it, wait until late in the day to do the transplanting, especially on sunny days.

Lift the plants from the seedbed a dozen at a time with as much soil as you can to help prevent the roots drying out. and Because spring cabbages mature quickly after the worst plant so the leaves at the base of the stem go down to soil

> For a month after planting out, hoe between the rows to keep weeds down.

> From February on, when growth begins, hoe in 60g per sq metre of nitro-chalk or sulphate of ammonia to give the young plants a boost.

Spicy chicken kebab

THIS delicious and warming meal is best served with rice and salad.

Preparation: 3 hours Cooking: 25 mins

Ingredients (Serves 4)

- 1.5kg chicken pieces 2 onions, finely chopped 50ml oil
- 1 x 5ml sp dried thyme 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 x 5ml sp paprika freshly ground black pep-
- 4 small courgettes 4 small tomatoes

REMOVE skin and bone from chicken pieces, using a small sharp knife. Cut meat into 2cm pieces. Place in a bowl with onions, oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper. Wash courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade and marinate for two to three hours. Preheat grill. Drain chicken and courgettes, reserving marinade.

Peel tomatoes and cut in

half, remove the seeds. Thread pieces of tomato, chicken and courgette alternatively onto four skewers, dividing ingredients evenly

between them. Place on grill rack, brush liberally with marinade. Sprinkle with a little paprika. Grill for 20 minutes or

until chicken is well cooked, lowering heat to moderate after five minutes and turning skewers to cook evenly.

THERE are several versions of this recipe for mus- Place all mussels in the sels but this is the easiest to pan at once and cover with prepare.

Preparation: 30 mins Cooking: 10 mins

Ingredients (Serves 4)

- 4 pints mussels
- 1 small onion 3-4 x 15ml sp dry white wine
- 25g butter
- 1 x 5ml sp plain flour
- 1 x 5ml sp chopped parsley WASH the mussels in cold water, scrub shells and rinse to remove all grit. Pull away the beards. Discard any mussels with broken shells and any which remain open when tapped.

Thoroughly butter the inside of a large saucepan. Peel and finely chop the onion

put in saucepan with wine.

Cook over high heat and shake pan for three to five minutes until all the mussels have opened. Take pan from the heat and

lift out the mussels, discarding any that have not opened. Remove the empty half shell from each mussel and place the other half with the mussel attached in individual soup plates.

Keep hot. Cream butter and flour together and blend into the liquid in pan. Stir the sauce over a low

heat until it has thickened and is boiling. Add the parsley and pour over the mussels. Serve at once.

Marrow casserole -firm and tasty

MARROW has such a high water content that it loses most of its flavour if steamed or cooked in water. Check out the recipe below, and serve up firm, tasty marrows on your dinner table...

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 30 mins

Ingredients (Serves 4-6)

1 young marrow 50 g butter 2 tx 15ml sp mixed fresh herbs - tarragon, mint, parsley and chives Salt and black pepper

Method CUT the marrow into 2.5cm thick slices.


Peel and cut them into rough chunks, discarding all the seeds as you do

Butter an oven proof dish thoroughly.

Add the marrow with the remaining butter cut into small knobs and sprinkle it with the mixture of fresh, finely chopped herbs.

Season with salt and freshly ground pepper. Cover the dish with a lid or foil and bake it in the centre of a preheated oven at approximately 180°C until just tender after about 30 mins. Be careful not to overcook. Serve the marrow at once, straight from the dish.

THYMUS VULGARIS

Description: Natural Order, Labiatae. A small, shrubby-looking garden plant, wild in Europe, much cultivated in our country as a pot-herb similar to summer savory. Stem six to eight inches high, branching, weak. Leaves opposite, very small, numerous, ovate-lanceolate. Flowers very small, in terminal and leafy spicate-whorls, bluish-purple. The whole plant is fragrant, and pleasantly aromatic; and yields a pale-yellow volatile oil, which is used largely in adulterating oil of origanum. Properties and Uses: This herb is a pleasant diffusive aromatic, stimulating and relaxant, acting as a carminative. It may be used in recent colds, menstruation obstructed and painful from exposure, colic, and general flatulence. A warm infusion may be used freely, and gently, promotes perspiration; and the action of the plant is similar to that of pennyroyal. Available at . . .

We hope that this booklet will help other clubs reap the same benefits and help to promote wider participation in running throughout Ireland.

We hope that representatives from as many clubs as possible throughout the country will be present for the launch. TIPS FOR

All the months and weeks of preparation have now finally come to an end and its count down time with just days to go, there is no training we can do at this stage which will make a difference come Monday so relax take it easy, plenty rest and eat and sleep well. We have to spare a thought for one or two of our members who unfortunately through injury will not be competing on the day. We all know the disappointment injury brings when one is so close to their race target, but such is life they will have their day again. From all at the club we wish all those making the trip to the capitol all the very best of luck, don't forget to wear your club singlet we will have a lot of support out there

HOW TO PREPARE IN THE LAST FEW DAYS BEFORE A RACE AND HOW TO ACTUALLY TACKLE IT

Most runners at some stage in their life will want to test themselves out with a race. It's easy to talk about it but when you actually have to get on the start and put yourself on the line things become more diffi-

Physically you should be fine if you have trained hard enough and over a long enough period of time you will be able to cope with the distance. The hardest part will be the mental preparation and your brain telling you strange and conflicting things about how your body feels. The final few days before any race are the most important as they can decide whether you run really well or poorly. A lot of runners find it difficult to get the last few days correct as they either over train or talk themselves out of performing well. Think of race day as wages day. It should be time to collect what is owed to you and see what you have

worked so hard to get. Banish all thoughts about not being prepared, or being too tired and concentrate on what you have done and what you have achieved in training in the last few months. It is important to ease back and rest for any race, otherwise you won't get the best out of yourself and you could under perform. The final week before race day should be a gradual decline in mileage and an increase in rest, recovery and sleep. Not everybody likes to have a complete rest day before they race but it is important to ease back so your body does recover and physically gets ready to perform to new heights. Work backwards from race day and plan your last four to five days like a military operation. Arrange your travel and kit well before race day, pack your bags the day before and make sure you get a couple of early nights to bank some sleep

EATING THE NIGHT BEFORE THE RACE Make sure you eat something you know is ok for you and you have tried and tested before race day. It is a good idea to experiment with foods during your build up. If something doesn't agree with you (and you will know it) then definitely don't eat it before the race. Write a list of good and bad foods so you don't have to think about what to eat when you are tired after a run. You can eat as much as you want to, but the day before race day it is wise to eat often but small amounts. It is just as important to stay hydrated as well, so make sure you drink plenty of fluids. You should drink around 4-6 ounces every hour that you are awake leading up to your race. Try and eat more healthily in the final week and make a special effort to eat more vegetables and less fat. YOUR RACE GEAR

Be prepared! Make sure you lay out your race kit, which you plan on wearing to race in, the night before the race. It is so easy to forget something on race day, so make a list to remind you of everything you need. D-DAY!

Extra sleep won't help you now. Get up, eat, drink and get mentally prepared. Your body will function much better on the starting line if you have been up and active for a few hours beforehand. Stay away from fried foods and remember this is not a time to experiment! Bread and jam is a safe bet if you don't feel like eating anything at all. DON'T BE LATE. THE RACE WON'T WAIT FOR YOU

It is advisable to arrive at least an hour before the start of the race. This gives you plenty of time to check out the start and get your bearings. Traffic is always bad on race day so take this into account. This advice goes for the toilet as well. There will always be a queue so be

prepared and factor this in to your arrival time. GET WARM AND STAY WARM.

You will be nervous, but you still need to warm up. By getting your warm up started, it will focus your mind better and get you ready for the race, in addition to relieving some of your pre-race anxiety. Your warm up should not wear you out, so make sure you only do easy jogging,

around 5 minutes will do and some light stretching to keep and stay

IT IS NEARLY TIME TO GO

Get to your start position early, as there will be a lot of runners around you all heading for the same spot. When the gun is fired don't panic, try to contain yourself and keep the pace easy for the first few minutes, this may be forced on you by the sheer number of runners around you. If you start off too hard you may well be miserable for the majority of the race and may have difficulty finishing. Once you are into the race, settle in at a pace that feels comfortable to you and enjoy the scenery

Think positive, you have worked hard for this so it's time to enjoy yourself and reap the benefits of all those hard training runs you have been doing.

1. KNOW YOU ARE GOING TO FINISH

Do not attempt to start if you are entertaining thoughts of not going the full distance, be positive I don't know of any club member travelling to Dublin who is not properly prepared for this event, you have the work done, your attitude must be positive. You are going to finish the Dublin City Marathon on Monday!

2. Under estimate your time rather than over-estimate it, it is better to finish in a slow time than to aim too high and have to drop out, the better the runner the greater the problem with poor pacing. The top runners have the highest drop out rate in marathons because of this.

3. Start further back in the pack than you feel you should. This will help you restrain yourself early on All going well you will be passing runners as the race progresses. A much better feeling than being passed yourself I can tell you.

4. Don't think about the early mile markers. This postpones negative thoughts like only four miles gone-twenty two to go. Think about the crowds along the route. Have a few casual words with those running along side you. There will be plenty of time to concentrate on the miles when you get to the later stages of the run.

The elation felt when coming into the final couple of 100 meters at the finish knowing that you are there and going to fulfil that dream will give you a feeling that you won't ever have experienced before in your life smile for the camera and be proud of your achievements. Waddle on friends and best of luck to all. Up West Waterford!
