

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



From Samuel Lewis's Topographical Dictionary 1837 - BALLYMACART

ish, in the barony county of Waterford, and province of Munster, 6 miles (S.S.E.) from Dungarvan; containing 984 inhabitants. This parish, also called Aglishvenan, is situated on the shore of St. George's channel, and comprises 2966 statute acres, as applotted under the tithe act. On the south-east is the cape or promontory of Mine Head, forming the northern point of the entrance to Ardmore bay. Here is Glenanne Cottage, the marine villa of H. Winston Barron, Esq. It is a vicarage, in the diocese of Lismore, united to that of Ardmore; the rectory is impropriate in the Duke of Devonshire. The tithes amount to £124, of which £82.13.4. is payable to the impropriator, and £41.6.8. to the vicar. In the R.C. divisions also it forms part of the union or district of Ardmore: the chapel is a large building. At Mount Barron there is a school under the patronage of H.W. Barron, Esq., who gave the school-house and four acres of land: it is attended by about 200 boys and 54 girls.


giene procedures at all times, in the interest of patient safety. "I call on the management of the hospital to address this appalling situation, as a matter of extreme urgency.


"Despite the current crisis in the health services across the country, hospitals have no redress or cause to blame funding levels or bureaucracy, for lack of this most basic care owing to their patients.

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




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

Minister Micheal McDowell, Department of Justice Equality & Law Reform recently launched the Developing School Age Childcare Report of a Working Group of the National Childcare Coordinating Committee and announced a funding allocation of over €9 million for the development of School Age Childcare.

In the Developing School Age Childcare Report, school age childcare is defined as childcare for school going children outside of normal school hours where the same children attend the childcare facility on a regular basis and access to the service is clearly defined by agreement with parents and guardians. A Summary of the Report has been sent to all schools and copies will also be made available to community & private childcare services. Full copies of the Report are available for reference at all the local libraries

As part of the €499M budget for the Equal Opportunities Childcare Programme (EOCP) initially a budget of €9.6M has been made available for School Age Childcare - this can increase if the demand exceeds it.

Under the initiative capital grants are available to support schools and school managing authorities interested in establishing school based services. Existing or new community groups may apply for a grant to expand an existing service to in-clude school age childcare and existing or new private providers may apply for a small capital grant to establish/expand

to include school age childcare.

Community/not for profit childcare groups can apply for a capital grant to establish/upgrade childcare facilities/services (no grant ceiling applies)
In addition staffing grants are

available to support community/not for profit organisations which demonstrate a focus on disadvantage) to contribute towards staffing costs, with a view to enhancing quality

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

National Dairy Conference, Ard Rí Hotel, Waterford, Nov. 16th The Teagasc National Dairy Conference is being hosted in Waterford for the first time ever. The theme of the conference is "Winning in Changing Times". All dairy farmers are well aware of the changes taking place in the industry and this conference provides an ideal opportunity to hear and discuss how the various sectors of the industry are planning to manage this change and come out winning at the other side. The day will be divided into four sessions.

Irish Dairy Industry - Where to Now?

Session 1 will deal with the processing sector. John Malone, former secretary of the Department of Agriculture, will report on the findings of his recent study of the Dairy Board and the processing sector. The report evaluates the strengths and weaknesses of processing and marketing and makes recommendations on the future direction. John Moloney, C.E.O. Glanbia, will outline how the company plans to maximise returns from milk in the market place and thus be in a position to pay the best price to its suppliers.

Irish Dairying A Competitive Industry?

In session 2 the focus will be on the milk production sector. Fiona Thorne, Teagasc Economist will report on her study comparing the competitiveness of Irish milk producers with those in other countries of the world. Jack Kennedy, Irish Farmers Journal will then discuss how Irish dairy farmers can maximise returns from the milk produced.

Creating a Winning Environment

Brody Sweeney, M.D. of O'Brien Sandwich Bars, will tell the audience of the challenges he has had to face and overcome in establishing a successful business, in session 3. He has had many ups and downs, which will resonate with the farmer audience.

Seamus Kearney, Teagasc Adviser, will discuss the options available to dairy farmers to generate income in the future. These options will be inside and outside the farm gate and include development of the existing dairy enterprise and alternative enterprises. Philip Donoghue, a successful Carlow farmer, will outline how he plans to develop his business in the future.

Exploiting our Competitive Advantage

In session 4 Dr. Arnold Harbers, a Dutch geneticist, will discuss what has to be done in order to breed a cow capable of producing 3500 kgs of milk solids (fat + protein) in her lifetime. The cow of the future must produce 500 - 600 kgs of milk solids per year and last in the herd for 6-7 years. The final speaker Brendan Horan, Moorepark Researcher, will describe new grassland management practices, which will increase milk production by 100 gallons/cows during the summer months.

This conference, on the doorstep of Waterford farmers, provides a golden opportunity to hear the views of people from home and abroad who are very influential in the industry. It is on in the Ard Rí Hotel on Wednesday November 16th. The fee including coffee, lunch and a copy of the conference proceedings is 50 for Teagasc clients and 100 for non-clients. SHEEP: Profitability of sheep compared to cattle

Cattle are an enterprise that some sheep producers may consider changing to in times of declining profitability. The 2004 Profit Monitors showed that in the absence of premiums sheep were more profitable than any of the cattle systems. The higher level of profit per acre among sheep farmers was due to higher output & lower cost. The 2004 Profit Monitor results also showed that the difference in profitability was even greater when you compared the average mainly mid-season sheep system which made a profit of 33/acre (excluding premiums) to the average nonbreeding cattle system, where weanlings/stores are purchased & finished, which made a loss of 103/acre (excluding premiums). Plan for Grass in 2006

Now is the time to start planning for next springs grass. The aim is to have enough grass available next spring to minimise or avoid neal feeding ewes after lambing. Research shows that in the early spring no response to meal feeding lactating ewes occurs once grass growth is enough to maintain a sward height of 4cm. The most important management factors that will determine the availability of grass next spring will be this autumn's management & next springs nitrogen application. It is generally recommended that pastures designated for grazing from late February are closed no later than mid-November. The opportunity to graze your sheep on rented cattle pastures, reseeds or aftergrass is increasing. Check now if such grazing is available for later in November & December. This could allow you to close your own paddocks earlier & reduce your winter housing period.

FARMING LEADER

EU Commission Clearance for Payment to Sheep Farmers

with the Minister for State at the Department of Agriculture Mr. John Brown, Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Ned Morrissey has said that the EU Commission has cleared the way for the Department of Agriculture to make payment to over 120 sheep farmers who were depopulated under the scrapie controlled programme as recommended by the Crosby Report.

In welcoming the news from Minister Brown, Ned Morrissey said the Department of Agriculture must immediately proceed to implement in full the recommendations contained in the Crosby Report.

The Report examines and recommends various payments to sheep farmers for the costs associated with re-establishing their sheep flocks following depopulation as a request of a scrapie outbreak on their farm. Personnel from the Department of Agriculture, the IFA and Teagasc were members of the Crosby Committee.

At the meeting with Minister Brown, IFA also raised various issues regarding the problems and concerns of sheep farmers with the current National Scrapie Controlled Programme. IFA requested Minister Brown and the Department to re-examine the exclusion of sheep that were genotyped prior to September 1st. In addition IFA requested the Department to resolve the practical problems associated with trying to differentiate between pedigree and non-pedigree animals under the scheme.

Mr. Morrissey said "sheep farmers who are unfortunate to encounter a scrapie breakdown face a most difficult situation in terms of income loss as a result of culling their flock. In addition the current system of flock restriction and genotyping is

Globalisation of Food **Production Threat to** Biosecurity - IFA

Waterford IFA Animal Health Chairman, Mossie O' Connor said that recent events such as the spread of avian flu and the potential risk of a flu pandemic, coupled with recurring outbreaks of foot and mouth disease in Brazil, raise serious question marks regarding the World Trade Organisation's (WTO) objectives to globalise food production.

Mr. O' Connor said "The globalisation of food production ignores basic phytosanitary principles and issues surrounding bio security. This ultimately will have implications for human

However pressures from the WTO on the EU to dismantle the European Union model of agricultural production will see an ever-increasing level of food imports coming in from countries outside the community which don't observe the same level of controls and standards."

Mr. O' Connor said "Europe and Ireland in particular lead the way regarding full traceability in food production, but the same could not be said about non-EU food production. The EU must re-examine its stance relating to phytosanitary and biosecurity issues in the upcoming WTO negotiations. Economic trade issues should not take precedence over human health safety matters."



BOAT FIND IN CARRICK COW SHED

A current and popular television programme is built around the phrase "you never know what you'll find in your attic", but now for the first time in 120 years, details are emerging of a boat which has been in a cowshed in Carrick-On-Suir for over a century. The rowing boat was built, owned and raced by the famous Maurice Davin, the first president of the GAA, a world record holder in the shot putt and a champion rower. This amazing four rigger, 38ft long racing cot was originally built in the late 1850's. It is fabulously built. It was last rowed in 1871 but may have been rowed after that. The Davins put the boat on the rafters of their cow shed on their farm land just outside Carrick-On-Suir on the Clonmel road, and there it remained ever since. The air circulating through the shed is said to have perfectly preserved the boat. The great grand nephew of Maurice Davin is Pat Walsh and he has now got the attention of RTE who filmed a special "Nation Wide" feature on the boat which was transmitted last Friday night, 4th November at 7 pm. The South East correspondent for RTE, Damien Tiernan says "This is an amazing discovery. A few months ago Pat Walsh spoke to Shay Hurley at the Clonmel Workmans Boat Club, he had been doing talks on historic boating on the Suir. He told Shay he had a boat in the shed and when Shay saw it, he contacted Donal Wylde, our cameraman in Clonmel. We've interviewed internationally renowned conservationists from Letterfrack in the West of Ireland, who say they want to preserve the boat and build a replica of it. It is not known when the boat will be moved from the cow shed.

€5m FACE LIFT FOR CLONMEL DOG TRACK

Clonmel's greyhound racing track is set for a 5 euro million makeover. Plans agreed between Bord na gCon, the greyhound racing authority and the directors of the Clonmel Greyhound Stadium will soon be submitted for planning approval to Clonmel Borough Council. "We have been waiting for a long time but it will be worth the wait", says Pat Somers. With the exception of the kennels built recently at the first bend, most of the existing buildings will be taken down to make way for the new purpose-built state of the art development. The existing stand and the old bar, as well as the tote buildings and turn stiles will all be demolished. A glass fronted stand, which will include a bar and restaurant will be provided in their place. The existing temporary bar will remain in the short term. The tracks board of directors are now in negotiations about the financing at this development. It is hoped to start work after the Produce Stakes next May, and it will be hopefully completed in time for the Produce Stakes in 2007.



Ailleacht Chroi - Natural History, a stunning exhibition of new paintings by Rayleen Clancy and Blawnin Clancy is currently running in Greyfriars Municipal Art Gallery in Water-

This new body of work is inspired by the unspoilt and natural beauty of the Ring peninsula, with themes and brilliant colour reminiscent of the wonderful summer 05.

Rayleen's canvases, delicately wrought with almost microscopic detail, are largely inspired by horseback rides through forests in the Drum Hills in townlands with mystical names like Rí na Phiobaire (King of the Pipers). Her work is a celebration of the wealth and abundance of wildflowers and perennial weeds in these forests which are seasonally inhabited with hordes of flying insects sporting exotic hues.

The Most Feared Sharks

Head Like A Hammer


The hammerhead shark is so called because the front of its head is in the shape of a hammer. About 6m (20ft) long, it is a very dangerous and aggressive, greyish coloured shark that lives in most warm waters. Its eyes are at the ends of the 'hammer', which gives it a wide range of vision.

Sharks Have A Bad Reputation

That sharks have a bad reputation is largely due to the great white shark which is regarded as the deadliest shark of all. It is about 11m (36ft) long. Although encounters with humans are rare, they often prove fatal for the person concerned. The shark that attacks more people than any other kind is the whale shark which lives along the Australian coast.

A Shark With A Grin

Another shark that is regarded as a maneater is the tiger shark, which lives in tropical waters. It has a fold of skin at the corners of its mouth, which makes it look as though it is grinning, adding a sinister touch to its gruesome reputation. This 6m (20ft) long shark also eats other sharks, sea turtles and carrion.

Indian vegetable curry

A WONDERFULLY tasty curry which has the added advantage of freezing well. Serve with boiled brown rice, chappatis and Cucumber Raita - a combination of diced cucumber with yoghurt, lower the heat and cook a little chopped mint, a pinch for 3 minutes, stirring all of chilli powder, cumin and seasoning to taste.

Ingredients: (serves 4)

500g onions, finely chopped 4 tbsps Ghee or vegetable oil 250ml sterilised milk 2 tbsps white wine vinegar

400g tin of chopped tomatoes, liquidised with their juice

1 tbsp tomato puree

1 vegetable stock cube dissolved in a little boiling water 900 chopped mushrooms or mixed vegetables (mushrooms, cauliflower, carrots, potatoes, okra)

2 tsps turmeric

- 1 tsps cummin
- 1 tsps mustard seed
- 1 tsps fenugreek
- 4 tsps coriander 1/2 tsp chilli powder
- 1 tsp ginger 1 tsp black peppercorns.

Method: GRIND all the spices togeth-

er, this amount will make the time. 3 tbsps of curry powder. Fry the onions in the ghee or vegetable oil

until golden. Add the ground spices, Add the milk and vinegar and stir well.

Add the liquidised tomatoes, tomato puree, sugar and stock.

Bring to the boil, cover and simmer very gently for 1

hour.

Add the vegetables and cook until tender - about 30 minutes.

Tip: The curry sauce will freeze well for up to 3 months, so it is well worth while making double the



Tasty celery, date Fresh strawberry and apple salad

etables are at a premium during winter months and celery, apples and dates combine well with a yoghurt the mint. Set this aside. dressing to make a refreshing and attractive salad. It is best to use sour-sweet apples, or add a little lemon juice to bring out the contrast of flavours of the main ingredients.

Ingredients:

(serves 4) 250ml yoghurt 2 tbsps honey 1 tbsp finely chopped fresh

1 medium-sized celery, trimmed 12 dates, pitted

2 medium-sized apples 30g walnut pieces Method:

BLEND the yoghurt, honey and mint in an electric

Dry thoroughly with kitchen paper and cut into small pieces. Wash the apples, quarter them and remove the cores. Cut the apples into 1cm cubes.

Put the celery, dates and apples into a salad bowl. Pour in the yoghurt dressing and toss gently to mix.

Scatter the walnut pieces over the top and serve immediately, or chill in the refrigerator until required.

cheesecake treat

CHEESECAKE is one of 50g caster sugar the most popular desserts 2 eggs, separated and you can certainly taste the difference if you make your own. With fresh strawberries all year round you can make this cheesecake at any time of year, but it is really special in June when the first locally grown strawberries are available Keep curd cheese in the fridge and use within a couple of days.

Ingredients (Serves 6-8)

75g self-raising flour 25g cornflour 75g butter Fresh milk for mixing 100g fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced 225g medium-fat curd cheese

150ml fresh soured cream Method:

PUT the flour and cornflour in a bowl and rub in the butter until available in supermarkets the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs, then add a little fresh milk to mix.


Roll out on a lightly floured work surface and use to line a 23cm spring form tin. Bake blind at 200°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6 for 10 minutes, until set.

Arrange the strawberries on top of the pastry case. Blend together the cheese, sugar, egg yolks and soured cream.

Whisk the egg whites until stiff and gently fold into the mixture. Pour on top of the strawberries and bake at 180°C, 350°F, Gas Mark 4 for 40-45 minutes, until firm.

Serve hot or cold.

DANGEROUS FOOD

For the person with a food allergy, some foods become positively dangerous. A food allergy is an abnormal hypersensitive reaction that occurs after eating a normal amount of a certain food. The reaction is repeated every time the food in question is eaten and the result can be fatal.

Although food allergies are rare, they most commonly occur in children under the age of four and the most frequent food allergies are to milk, eggs, fish, nuts, citrus fruit and tomatoes. Symptoms include severe eczema (or skin rash), vomiting, diarrhoea, asthmatic bronchitis or asthma and allergic cold. In severe cases of food allergy a life-threatening condition known as anaphylaxis may occur in which the sufferer may experience a drop in blood pressure that results in a loss of consciousness and shock and without immediate treatment can even cause death. Raise hopes for a bumper crop

Now that winter is setting in, it is time to get the fork and the spade out and start digging.

Left on its own, the last thing that soil would do would be to grow bumper crops of vegetables in neat rows with the aim of feeding a family with fresh produce.

To do that the soil has to be fed, and this is the perfect time of year to do this, when there are few other jobs to be done around the gar-

Many gardeners see digging as an annual chore, but others have turned to raised beds.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

SOW HARDY PEAS

Successful sowing of peas at the end of the year depends on a mild winter, so to give yourself a helping hand by choosing a sheltered spot with rich, well drained soil. To improve your chances further, choose the hardiest variety of pea you can such as Pilot Improved or Meteor.

DIG UP SEAKALE FOR FORCING

The top growth of the plant should have died back by now and this means the ideal time has arrived to lift the roots for forcing. Dig them up carefully and cut off the side sprouts of the root bundle and leave in a sheltered position outside for planting in March. Face the central roots against a wall and cover with sand until only the crown is visible.

FORCE RHUBARB

If you start your roots at once in a warm greenhouse you should get good sticks in time for Christ-

Strong roots should be lifted and left in the open for a few days. If the weather is frosty it will actually

improve the growth of the plant later on. Plant them in the greenhouse, in deep soil close together, cover them with bin liners so they are in complete darkness, water moderately and maintain a temperature between 13-24°C

TIDY HERBACEOUS BORDERS

Herbaceous perennials will have finished flowering and the borders should be made ready for winter. Cut off all dead or dying leaves and stems but leave the ever green leaves alone. Give the ground a dusting of bone meal and prick the surface of the ground with a fork, being careful not to disturb plants/bulbs

TURN OVER ALL FREE GROUND

By this time there should be lots of free ground for digging. Most of the garden should be attended to with a spade at this time of the year. Most of the vegetable garden should be dug over to two or even three depths of a spade.

What's Your Typical Day?

DEPRESSION

What is Depression and what causes it?

Depression is a hidden disability, the causes are not clear, however it is a serious disability that can affect a persons quality of life, both physically and mentally. People can get depression due to experiencing a traumatic event (such as the death of a loved one), hormonal changes in the person, having to deal with another illness (disability) or substance abuse. Sometimes there is no apparent reason for the depression; it can be brought on by environmental, psychological and genetic factors.

Symptoms of Depression

Anxiety, anger, undue worry, irritability and agitation Indifference and pessimism

Prolonged sadness or unexplained crying Changes in sleep patterns and appetite

Lethargy and loss of energy, feelings of guilt and worthlessness

Unexplained aches and pains

Social withdrawal, unable to concentrate

It is critical to get a medical diagnosis, only a professional medical opinion will determine if you have the symptoms of

Different types of Depression

There are different types of depression; the main types are as follows:

Mild Depression - mild depression can be brought on by a distressing event, such as loss of a family member or friend, the loss of a job, the break-up of a relationship. This kind of depression will usually only last for a short time, and help from a qualified Counsellor can be very beneficial.

Severe Depression - a person suffering from severe depression will have extreme symptoms, these can include hallucinations and even delusions, and medical treatment from a health professional is vital.

Bipolar Depression - also known as manic depression, is a treatable medical disability, where the person's mood alternates between the extremity of depression and mania. Dysthymia - this is a mild depression, people with this kind of depression are often unaware they have the condition, they are able to go to work and manage their lives, but they can suffer from low self-esteem, they usually suffer from a poor appetite or overeat, the condition may come and go.

Postnatal Depression - this kind of depression can start when a woman has given birth to a baby, it can happen immediately after the birth or can develop months later, it can affect the relationship between the mother and baby. Medical advise and treatment is recommended.

How is Depression treated?

Depression can be treated, it is important to get a medical diagnosis of what kind of depression the person is suffering from. There are treatments such as medication, counselling, support groups, stress management and complementary medicine.

Antidepressant drugs are very effective, but it is important not to change or discontinue medication without talking to your doctor. Counselling can also be beneficial. Support groups meet on a regular basis and people can share their experiences (Aware - an organisation that support people with depression, they have local support groups that meet weekly). And stress management can be of help; this includes relaxation exercises, massage and aromatherapy. And complementary medicine is becoming very popular in the treatment of depression, it is important that you inform your doctor of any treatment you receive.

He owned the house that stood adjacent to the opening of this new street, two properties at the other side of O'Connell Street, and his principal place of business was 31-32 Grattan Square, later Flemings.

His grave is in Section two of the Parish Churchyard on the right as you go down the steps.

A once wealthy man, he died in 1936, in poverty, having given all his money to The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul and the town's poor. What a nice gesture now to return the compliment.

I would like through the medium of the Leader, to respectfully point out to the bike and quad riding citizens of West Waterford, that the area of the Knockmealdowns up around Bay Lough and below the Vee is not a public park for their uninvited and highly destructive pleasure seeking. Under the terms of the the farm compliance, a land owner can loose his SFP in cases where land under his ownership is seen to be damaged by illicit activity such as is the case. 

Death Of Best Mate

The racing world was stunned last Tuesday when Best Mate, trained by Henrietta Knight, collapsed and died after running in the Haldon Gold Cup at Exeter. Winner of the Cheltenham Gold Cup in 2002, 2003 and 2004, Best Mate had a huge impact on racing in his short career and his sudden death brought many glowing tributes from the racing professionals. Owned by Jim Lewis and ridden predominantly by Jim Culloty throughout his career, Best Mate won 15 races and up until last Tuesday had never finished out of the first two in his 22 race career, a truly remarkable record. Purchased from Tom Costello after winning a point to point in Ireland in 1999, Best Mate enjoyed a brief but successful hurdling career before being switched over fences and right from the start his economical and fluent style of jumping fences was simply outstanding. Favourite for the Arkle Trophy at Cheltenham in 2001, the Foot and Mouth Outbreak caused the abandonment of that meeting and later that year he failed narrowly to cope with Florida Pearl and Adrian Maguire in a tremendous race for the King George VI Chase at Kempton. In March 2002, he won his first Gold Cup when defeating Commanche Court by two lengths and under Tony McCoy he won the King George VI Chase in late December after showing his customary battling qualities. A runaway win in the 2003 Cheltenham Gold Cup soon followed before connections brought him to Ireland for the Ericsson Chase that December and a huge crowd will always remember his awesome display of fencing as he defeated Le Coudray by a comfortable nine lengths. He became the first horse since the legendary Arkle in 1964, 1965 and 1966 to win a third successive Cheltenham Gold Cup as he fought like a lion to defeat Sir Rembrandt by half a length in the 2004 renewal but was denied a fourth attempt when a burst blood vessel forced him to miss the big race last March.

Winner of the 2003 English Grand National, the Jimmy Mangan trained Monty's Pass, due to be retired two months ago has been given a reprieve. His trainer reports him to be in great heart and a decision on whether to retire him will now not be made until January. On the subject of the English Grand National, the 2006 Grand National will be launched at a special reception at Willie Mullins' Closutton stables on Tuesday, 15th November when last year's hero, Hedgehunter, will be the star attraction.

Dabiroun Out For Season

The Paul Nolan trained Dabiroun, winner of the Fred Winter Juvenile Novice Hurdle at Cheltenham last March, has been ruled out for the season after developing a tendon problem while trainer Edward O'Grady has revealed that Pizarro has also met with a setback and may be out of action for some time. However, stable companion Back In Front is likely to go for the Lismullen Hurdle at Navan next Sunday as connections want to step him up to two and a half miles this season.



However I do not believe that that will happen, or at least for some time as there is a contract in place between the two

A short while after the first test match in Perth a man whom I did not know, but who obviously knew me, put his hand on my shoulder and remarked "wouldn't that exhibition make a national football league match between Kilkenny and Waterford look exciting." And I do not believe that it was uttered out of respect to both counties. But it did more or less put things in perspective.

The exhibition of thuggery by several Australian players in the second test in Telstra Dome stadium did irreparable damage to the image of the game and to the reputations of those responsible. In any other sport Chris Johnson and a number of his colleagues would have been banned from playing for several months.

Now the least that can happen is that the rules of the game must change in order to bring about a sense of fair play if they are to continue. The alternative is to decide to abandon the competitions entirely when the present contract runs out.

The view of the Irish players seems to be that the games should continue with a change of rules that would deal properly with the thuggery that we saw on Friday night in the second test.

As the band played "Waltzing Matilda" at the end of the second test the exhibition of triumphalism by the Australian panel was something that one would never see in Gaelic games or in any other sport for that matter.




NEWSFLASH

Seven Times World Snooker Champion Stephen Hendry

To Play In Dungarvan

Seven times World Snooker Champion, Stephen Hendry, is to play in Dungarvan at the end of this month.

Hendry, who was recently named the greatest snooker player of all time and has collected 8 million euros in prize money, is to play a number of exhibition matches in Lawlors Hotel on Sunday November 27th.

Stephen was born in 1969 in Pertshire, Scotland, and turned professional in 1985 at just 16 years of age. Just as Steve Davis dominated the 1980's, Hendry reigned supreme in the 90's.

He won the Embassy World Snooker Championships an awesome seven times in 1990, 1992 - 1996 and 1999. His first victory in 1990 made Hendry the youngest ever World Snooker Champion.

A model of consistency, Steven was the highest ranked player consecutively through 1990 to 1998.

He was also awarded the MBE in 1997.

The exhibition is being organised by Michael Bumster, who has already brought Jimmy White, Ken Doherty and Fergal O'Brien to Dungarvan. Hendry will play against Michael Bumster and John Henry Griffiths, the Cardiff Singles Champion in 1999, along with two other guests on the night.

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
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
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
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
