i-to-i's Tsunami Relief IRISH AID UPDATE ONE YEAR ON The Asian Tsunami, caused by one of the biggest earth-

quakes ever, hit the small island of Sri Lanka and everything on its way was reduced to mere rubble. Its coastline was in full of destruction, tens of thousands of people died; many more were injured; and more than a million were homeless. The whole country was in shock, however nearly twelve months on with the aid of Irish volunteers Sri Lanka is rebuilding itself.

Over the past year i-to-i, a leading specialist in international volunteer projects, set up projects to assist the communities along Sri Lanka's western and southern coast. 





Replying to a question from Labour councillor, Teresa Wright, who was previously informed the problem would be fixed, Mr. O'Flynn said the only solution to the problem is to connect the drains up to the sewerage system.

However, he said it was "undesirable" to pump rainwater from Cloneety through the wastewater treatment system.

Cllr. Wright insisted that the problem was a serious one, and both sides of the road were flooded again that weekend. She went on to say that it was more important than ever to fix the problem as the new road is set to open as well as the new housing scheme.

When she said she had been informed that work would be carried out, Mr. O'Flynn replied: "You weren't told that by me.



He said there was a commitment in the Fischler CAP reform that European farmers would supply European consumers and family farming would be secure until 2013. "The new CAP is not one year in existence and politicians are

IFA Urges Members to **Look Out For Neighbours During Winter**

The Chairperson of the Waterford IFA Farm Family Committee Margaret Leahy has urged all IFA members to make an extra effort to look out for neighbours during the winter months.

"With summertime gone and daylight reduced, it is very important that people in rural areas ensure that their neighbours have everything they need. IFA members should make time to check on those who are elderly and living on their own.'

Margaret Leahy pointed out hat changing lifestyles meant that people in rural areas might feel vulnerable without regular contact with others. "IFA has a presence in every parish and this network can be used to keep in contact with people and also notice if anything is amiss. For example, if a neighbour hasn't been seen for a number of days, somebody could drop by and make sure that everything is all right. Transport could also be made available if a person needs to get to the nearest town or village."

The Waterford IFA Farm Family Chairperson appealed to everybody to have an increased awareness over the coming months because of the lack of daylight.

FATAL CRASH ON CAHIR-CLONMEL ROAD

Fantastic Fish

When searching for food, the mudskipper - found around the coasts of Africa, Asia and Australia - will come out of the water, using its specially adapted fins as legs. It seems to like being out of the water - it will bask in the sun and will often climb

trees to find a sunny spot. Another fish that 'walks' is the tripod fish. Its two chest fins and its tail fin have evolved into long, stiff spines on which the



fish walks along the sea-bed.

A Fish Can Give An Electric Shock

One member of the catfish family is capable of giving out an electric shock to ward off danger. This is the electric catfish which is found in the seas of Africa. Although it can give a powerful shock, it is a delicacy in the Middle East, where it is known as the raad, or thunder fish.


A Fish Can Kill A Person

Several species of fish can make electricity, using specially adapted muscles which create electric impulses instead of movement. Fish are the only creatures that can do this. Electric rays, of which there are about 30 species, can create enough power to disable a person temporarily. However, it is a freshwater creature that produces the most electricity of all. The electric eel found in the rivers of South America, can produce enough power to kill a person outright.

A Mouthful Of Fish

After laying some 50 to 100 eggs, the female Egyptian mouth brooder carries them around in her mouth for safety. Even after they have hatched, the young fish continue to use their mother's mouth to escape from danger. This goes on for only a few days, for once the young fish grow bigger, the mother is likely to eat them!

Another fish that uses its mouth in this way is the sea catfish, but in this case it is the male that looks after the eggs.



DID YOU KNOW?

The European eel travels over land when it makes its 6,000 km (3,700 mi) journey to the Sargasso Sea to spawn.

Lung fish can survive out of water for up to four years - by not doing very much!

The male angler fish weighs one thousand times less than the female, and lives off the female like a parasite!

Deep-sea life was first observed in 1934, when scientist William Beebe descended to 923m (3,028ft) in a machine called a 'bathysphere'.

An archer fish can judge the distance of its 'shots' because it is the only fish with eyes that point forwards!

Archer fish will line up to shoot at the same target - like contestants at a rifle range.

Ingredients:

Serves 4 200g yellow lentils 50g fresh ginger 6 tomatoes

2 stalks curry leaves 1/4 x 5ml sp turmeric

4 x 15ml sp ghee or butter 1 x 15ml sp garam masala

Homemade garam masala

If you're not using mango chutney, squeeze 1 x 15ml sp lemon juice over the garam masala when added to the dhal.

1/2 x 5ml sp cumin seeds

1/2 x 5ml sp coriander seeds 1/2 x 5ml sp black peppercorns

1/2 x 5ml sp ground turmeric

1/2 x 5ml sp dried mango powder (optional)

Grind the whole spices together, then mix with the ground spices. Sieve, then grind the residue and sieve again. Discard any residue remaining. Keep in an airtight jar for 6-8 weeks only.

Method:

Wash the lentils and, if necessary, soak (according to instructions on the packag-

Give the ginger a whizz in the blender, then put the lentils, ginger, tomatoes,

4 red peppers 2 yellow peppers 290g jar artichoke hearts, in oil, drained and sliced, oil reserved

1 x 15ml sp fresh lemon juice

1 x 5ml sp wholegrain mustard Salt and pepper

Crisp lettuce leaves, such

as cos or Webbs, to serve.

Method:

Preheat the grill to high. Quarter the peppers and remove the seeds and stems.

Place, skin-side up, on a grill pan and grill for five to seven minutes until blackened all over, then remove them from the heat.

Transfer to a plastic bag for 10 minutes to cool. Pour the pepper juices into a bowl. Skin the peppers. Cut the flesh into strips and mix with the artichokes in a separate bowl. Add the lemon juice and mustard to the pepper juices, then gradually whisk in about five tablespoons of oil from the artichokes.

Season, toss with the salad and serve on a bed of lettuce leaves.

TIP: This salad recipe can be made up to two days ahead, but ensure it is covered and stored in the refrigerator.

Transport in a rigid container (pack the lettuce separately).

National G.A.A. Club Forum

Over 1300 delegates from all over Ireland attended the first ever G.A.A. Club Forum in the INEC centre, Killarney last Saturday. All matters concerning G.A.A. Clubs were discussed, including Games Development / Go Games (which Cois Bhride participated in this year), Discipline, Development of playing facilities, Insurance, Club Constitution, Communications - IT / PR, Refereeing, Drug and alcohol abuse, Club Planning and development, and of course, the topic that everyone wanted to comment on, Club v County Issues. A special Club Fixtures Task Force was set up to look into all aspects of how clubs were coping with the pressures of Club v County problems, and their conclusions wouldn't come as any great shock to most people involved in G.A.A. Clubs. They found that a very large percentage of clubs had virtually no matches between May / June / July / August, and a glut of them in the Spring and Autumn / Winter, that present intercounty fixtures make it impossible to plan Club Championships, and that Intercounty team managers seem to be in control of County Boards regarding club fixtures. No news there. Some of their recommendations included less intercounty matches, scrapping the Railway Cup, likewise the U-21 Club Championships, panelists numbered 20 to 30 of intercounty teams be allowed to play for their clubs at all times, and a few more. It may not amount to much, but the feeling in the grassroots is that changes will have to be made, and perhaps the powers that be in the G.A.A. will sit up and listen now. The conference was also treated to contributions from Kevin Heffernan, Donal O' Grady, and Darragh O Chinneide who spoke very eloquently indeed. No doubt this will become an important fixture in the G.A.A. calendar for many years to come.


