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

"There is no doubt that the

council has run into problems in the past with large scale developments," Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan said.

"If we were to proceed with a development on the Clonea Road we would face difficulties further down the line.

"I believe that what is now envisaged is much more desirable as private developers will have to meet their obligations to provide social and affordable housing under Part V agreements.

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

Three new restaurants are in the pipeline for Dungarvan, including a franchise from fast-food giants, McDonalds.

McDonalds met with Town Council officials and councillors to finalise details of their franchise which is expected to open off the Fairlane Roundabout early next summer.

Building is hoped to commence in January with a completion date of May 2006.

Meanwhile, Blackrock Developments, Drangan, Thurles - the operators of Dungarvan Shopping Centre - were granted planning permission to develop two new restaurants on the first

One of the restaurants will be located over Xtra-Vision at units Dg.02 and Unit DG.04 and the other over the vacant unit

The units were previously granted permission as commercial







At last week's meeting Waterford County Council adopted the Draft Heritage Plan, releasing it to go on public display in all the Council's offices (Dungarvan, Tramore, Cappoquin and Portlaw) and in the public libraries (Dungarvan, Tramore, Cappoquin, Kilmacthomas, Portlaw and Tallow). Copies are also available from the Heritage Officer, see below

The Heritage Forum members are grateful to all the people who helped with preparing the draft plan: including all those who sent written suggestions; who came to the five public meetings (one in each electoral area) and to all those who answered queries on their ongoing heritage work.

Heritage is classified under sixteen headings: Monuments. Archaeological objects, Heritage objects, Architectural heritage, Flora, Fauna, Wildlife habitats, Landscapes, Seascapes. Wrecks, Geology, Heritage Gardens and Parks, Inland Waterways, Archives, Language and Culture, and Traditional Skills.


There are one hundred and eight actions listed in the draft plan. They are classified under four headings:

- collect and disseminate heritage information;
- raise the level of awareness of heritage;
- promote co-operation between those interested in heritage; • promote best practice in managing heritage.

The draft plan aims to cover all the projects going on in and intended for the county over the next five years that address heritage. Most involve more than one partner, demonstrating the need for partnership in the research, management and promotion of heritage.

It is very likely that the draft Heritage Plan will need corrections and other changes before it can be formally adopted by the County Council as a five-year action plan. 

Áilleacht Chroí - Natural History, a stunning exhibition of new paintings by Rayleen Clancy and Blawnin Clancy is currently running in Greyfriars Municipal Art Gallery in Waterford until December 22nd.

This new body of work is inspired by the unspoilt and natural beauty of the Ring peninsula, with themes and brilliant colour reminiscent of the wonderful summer 05, and canny collectors are snapping up these well-priced paintings.

Rayleen's canvases, delicately wrought with almost microscopic detail, are largely inspired by horseback rides through forests in the Drum Hills in townlands with mystical names like Rí na Phiobaire (King of the Pipers). Her work is a celebration of the

DAIRYING

Options for dairy farmers

At the Teagasc National Dairy Conference in Waterford last week an audience of 620 people heard Dungarvan advisor Seamus Kearney speak about Options for Dairy farmers. The following is a summary of Seamus's paper.

Challenging times.

Dairy farming has always been a challenging and changing workplace. For those that succeed it has been a rewarding job. Dairy farming is now entering another period of change (2005-2014) with milk supports being gradually reduced in 2005, 2006 and 2007. In the face of falling milk prices and rising costs, dairy farmers are concerned about their future. The new challenge to you the dairy farmer is how to harness change in the post Fischler era to secure your future in farming.

Dairy farmers are currently looking at their options for many various reasons. These reasons include income pressure from many sources, the advent of the Single Farm Payment and lifestyle pressures. Dairy farmers have overcome change in the past and will continue to overcome obstacles in the future with the support of their families.

Plan for the future

Sit down with your family over the coming weeks and discuss where you as a family want to be in five years time. It's important to plan now and make sure all the relevant people in your household are involved. It will mean that everyone is working to a common 'focus'. When planning for the future you will have to look at the sources of income in your own household and examine which sources of income can be improved in the future. Some sources of income are already predetermined so the main sources to look at will be farm income and off farm income.

Five steps to success

When you decide to look at your options with the people that matter to you, it's a matter of sitting down and going through the five steps to success'. Your Teagasc advisor is available to help you through this process. By establishing your current situation and identifying your future family needs you will have a starting point and a finishing point for your family's next five-year journey. By examining all possible options that may suit your family you will give yourself a better chance of choosing the correct option to fit your family situation. Once having made the list of options shortlist the ones most likely to suit you and examine them in detail. By doing this it will mean that your family is making the best informed decision that it possibly can. Now you are in a position to make a decision to choose the option that best suits you, to achieve your future goals in dairy farming.

SHEEP

Housing ewes Last year, as part of the Teagasc on farm research project, ewes in 35 flocks were conditioned scored at housing and again after lambing.

- 15% of the ewes were CS 2.5 or less (too thin) at housing
- 14% were CS 2.5 or less (too thin) at lambing

Main reasons

- Ewes are left out too long and have insufficient feeding in the weeks prior to housing.
- Hay / silage quality is often over estimated and / or insufficient concentrates are fed.

Recommendations

Once fields have been grazed off find another home for the ewes. On some farms it may be possible to supplement the ewes on stubbles or on fields that will not be required for grazing after lambing. In the majority of cases it means housing. Make an assessment of silage/hay quality. A visual assessment taking into account cutting date and a pH litmus paper to assess preservation can give a good indication of quality. A large reduction in ewe condition between housing and lambing is often the result of under feeding / poor feeding indoors.

On housing, separate out ewes in poor condition for preferen-

Scan as early as possible (80 days after ram let-out). With average quality hay/silage introduce meals at this stage to triplet and twin bearing ewes that are in poor condition i.e. 10 weeks pre-lambing. With the same quality roughage, introduce meals to twin bearing ewes that are in good condition at 8 weeks pre-

Grass fields that are required for lactating ewes and their lambs next March should have been closed by mid-November at the

IFA SAYS LAMB **PRICES STRONGER**

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Edward Morrissey has said lamb prices at the factories have improved again this week (14/11/05). He said most factories are having to pay €3.42/kg to €3.44/kg (122-123p/lb) to get supplies.

Mr. Morrissey said strong export demand together with an exceptionally strong domestic supermarket trade has left supplies scarce and prices stronger.

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers' leader said market returns in France have increased to the equivalent of €4.03/kg (144p/lb). Based on this return, the factories can afford to lift their farmer prices to at least €3.60/kg (129p/lb).

Mr. Morrissey said prices in the UK have also increased to the equivalent of €3.57/kg (128p/lb).

Prices for light lamb have also increased with some factories paying €3.22/kg (115p/lb). He said light lamb prices should continue to rise and should exceed last years' levels of €3.50/kg (125p/lb).

CATTLE **PRICES STRONGER**

- IFA

Cattle prices continue to strengthen with €2.66/kg (95p/lb) being paid to get supplies this week (14/11/05) according to IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman Oliver Broderick

Mr. Broderick said demand for beef at the factories has increased significantly over the last week with the Christmas trade. "Over the next 4 - 5 weeks demand will be very strong. Factories have to get supplies and prices should continue to rise.'

Some factories have paid €2.80/kg (100p/lb) for U grade steers in recent days.

Mr. Broderick said heifer prices continue to harden with €2.69/kg (96p/lb) to €2.80/kg (100p/lb) being paid. Cows are making from €2.13/kg (76p/lb) up to €2.30/kg (82p/lb).

Dillon Insists on Full Payout of Single Farm Payment on December1st

IFA President John Dillon said this week that 100% delivery on the payout of the new Single Farm Payment scheme by the Department of Agriculture on December 1st is essential for farmers.

Mr. Dillon said under the new Single Farm Payment scheme, delays by the Department relating to inspections or in dealing with queries cannot be tolerated or allowed hold back payments to farmers. He said a full payout to all farmers must be made on December 1st and any queries can be sorted out at a later stage.

The IFA President said the move under the SFP scheme to change payments from mid October to December 1st had already caused serious cash flow and income problems on farms. In addition it had impacted negatively on the store cattle and sheep trade at the marts.

The IFA leader said advanced single farm payments must be made to farmers on October 16th next year with full payments completed by December 1st.

Old School In Cappoquin To **Be Demolished**

The old school in Cappoquin will be demolished in the next few weeks, the November meeting of Waterford County Council was told.

Social housing is planned for the site, but although it's been on the chopping block for the past two years, demolition work has yet to get underway.

Raising the issue as part of a wider concern about the lack of social housing starts in West Waterford generally, Fine Gael Cllr. Nora Flynn said no new social housing has been built in Cappoquin this year.

Two houses were purchased by the council in Barrack Street, but these were boarded-up. Land in Modeligo was also purchased for social housing, but has remained unde-

She also questioned how many houses would be built in the county under Part V agreements, and how much money the council has received from development contributions under Part V agreements.

When Martin Walsh, County Secretary, assured Cllr. Flynn the old school would be demolished, Cllr. Flynn said: "I was told five times the old school would be demolished. I hope it will be done this time."





Crabs And Lobsters

Crabs, prawns and lobsters are members of the group of animals known as crustaceans. The largest crustacean is the giant spider crab of Japan which can measure up to 3m (9ft) between the tips of its outstretched legs. Pea crabs, of which there are over 200 species, are the smallest known crabs. They hide inside the shells of mussels and oysters for protection.

Shells For Protection

Although protected by their shells, crabs have several enemies, including humans, and have to find other ways to protect themselves. For example, most spider crabs camouflage themselves with seaweed and pieces of sponge so they cannot be seen easily. Some crabs look like their surroundings, or hide under rocks and seaweeds. A lot of crabs burrow into the sand so that only their antennae are visible, the hermit crab often lets a sea anemone ride on its back. The anemone has stinging tentacles, so the crab is protected too. The greenadier crab goes one step further by carrying a sea anemone in each claw!

Lobsters

Lobsters are generally bigger than crabs and their tails are stretched out behind them, whereas a crab's tail is tucked under its body. To swim, the lobster curls its tail under its body quickly and with such force that the lobster shoots backwards in the water. To help it the lobster can fan out the end of its tail for greater thrust.

One American lobster migrates in an unusual way. Every autumn, the spiny lobsters of Florida and the Caribbean march in single file to deeper waters further south to avoid stormy weather.



Crab Legs

Crabs have five pairs of legs, the first pair of which are equipped with large claws. It uses eight of its legs for walking. A crab walks sideways because otherwise its legs would get tangled up. If a crab traps one of its limbs, the limb snaps off and the crab grows a new one.

Crab Claws

The male fiddler crab has one gigantic claw that is much largest than the others — it is the largest crab claw of all. It is often coloured differently to the rest of the body and has two purposes — for fighting other males to defend its territory and to attract a mate.

DID YOU KNOW?

A boxer crab defends itself by holding anemones in its piners, like two fluffy pink boxing gloves!

Long-legged guano crabs live on bat droppings or 'guano'. Yuk!

Rock crabs on the Galapagos Islands clean ticks from the bodies of iguanas.

The decorator crab wears 'fancy dress', hooking plants on to its body to camouflage it.

Spider crabs have changed little since the age of dinosaurs.

In mythology, a crab nipped the hero Hercules on the foot. It was rewarded by his enemies with a place in the heavens, and formed the Cancer constellation.

Pork pot with fennel, garlic and tomatoes

POT roast of pork with fennel, garlic and tomatoes

Ingredients:

Serves 4

1.5kg boned, rolled and tied loin of pork, rind intact Salt and pepper

2-3 x 15ml sp dripping

2 x 15ml sp Pernod

100ml white wine

2 large bulbs fennel, quartered 12 medium tomatoes, halved

16-plus cloves garlic, unpeeled and bruised with back of knife 2-3 bay leaves

1 or 2 sprigs thyme Sprinkle fennel seeds

3-4 pieces lemon peel, no pith Juice of 1 lemon


Method:

Put a cast-iron pot over a flame to become hot and preheat the oven to 300°F/150°C/gas mark 2. Rub the pork all over with a little fat or oil. Add the dripping to the hot-pot, allow to smoke slightly and put in the pork loin. Turn and burn the meat for several minutes until the skin turns gold. Lift on to a plate.


Tip off most of the fat and discard, pour in the Pernod and wine. Allow to bubble together, using a whisk to pick up the brown bits at the bottom of the

Return pork to the pot and tuck the fennel, tomatoes, garlic, bay and thyme sprigs around it. Spoon over some of the meat juices, and sprinkle with fennel seed. Put pieces of lemon peel among the vegetables and squeeze lemon juice

over everything. Bring the pot up to a moderate heat, put on the lid and place in the oven. Cook for 2-21/2 hours, turning the meat once during this time. Serve the pork carved into thick slices, with the vegetables around it, plenty of juices and plain boiled potatoes.

Honey-glazed carrots for kids

AN excellent way of persuading stubborn children to Cover the pan and bring the eat their carrots - these honey-glazed carrots are also delicious served with any roasted meat. Ingredients: Serves 4

450g carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally 20g unsalted butter 1/2 x 5ml sp chopped summer savoury or soft thyme leaves

1 bay leaf Pinch ground nutmeg 1 x 15ml sp liquid honey Salt and ground black pepper

1 x 15ml sp snipped chives Method:

Place the carrots in a medium-sized saucepan and add just about enough water to cover them.

Add the butter, summer savoury or soft thyme leaves, bay leaf and nutmeg to the saucepan. carrot mixture to the boil. Simmer for about six minutes and then remove the lid and increase the heat. Add the honey to the pan and cook the carrots until all the liquid has evaporated, leaving a shiny glaze on the carrots.

If you want your carrots to be caramelised or golden, you should cook for a little while longer, stirring them from time to time. But when you do this the butter will separate, creating a much more greasy dish. Season with the salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste and then stir in the snipped chives.

Serve your carrots immediately while they are still hot, with a roast meal of your choice, other seasonal vegetables and gravy.

Créme Anglaise proper custard

THISrecipe will make you come over all wobbly - it's the stuff custard dreams are made of.

Ingredients:

Makes 500ml/serves 4 500ml milk

Vanilla pod, split open 5 egg yolks

75g caster sugar Method:

Put the milk in a saucepan with the split vanilla pod and bring slowly to the boil. When the milk looks as if it is on the point of boiling. remove from the heat and leave for around 20 minutes - this lets the vanilla flavour the milk.

Lift out the vanilla pod and scrape the little black seeds into the milk with the point of a knife.

Whisk the egg yolks and sugar together until they are thick and pale in colour, then add the milk to them

Pour the custard into a clean pan, and put over a low heat, stirring almost constantly until it thickens slightly. The consistency should be that of double cream.

On no account let the mixture get too hot - if it boils it will curdle, so remember to keep stirring. Pour the mixture into a clean bowl and use immediately or cover loosely with clingfilm and cool. TIP:For a traditional banana custard, add thickly sliced, slightly under-ripe bananas to the custard once you have sieved it, then keep warm for a few minutes while the fruit gives flavour to the sauce. The slices of fruit will soften slightly, which is why it

is best not to use ripe fruit.

DANGEROUS FOOD

For the person with a food allergy, some foods become positively dangerous. A food allergy is an abnormal hypersensitive reaction that occurs after eating a normal amount of a certain food. The reaction is repeated every time the food in question is eaten and the result can be fatal.

Although food allergies are rare, they most commonly occur in children under the age of four and the most frequent food allergies are to milk, eggs, fish, nuts, citrus fruit and tomatoes. Symptoms include severe eczema (or skin rash), vomiting, diarrhoea, asthmatic bronchitis or asthma and allergic cold. In

severe cases of food allergy a life-threatening condition known as anaphylaxis may occur in which the sufferer may experience a drop in blood pressure that results in a loss of consciousness and shock and without immediate treatment can even cause death. Alternative diets are available at . . .

They are but ones that are useful as well, such as the the Sarracena which makes them stand out. stunning insect eating North American Sar-

stroyed by farmers who have drained bogs

SARRACENIA: The insect eaters

To grow Sarracenia successfully:

- Stand in 25mm of rainwater during April to October. Do NOT use tap water. Plants should be occasionally flooded to the pot rim
- Do NOT feed at any time. Plants will catch their own food and if they are over-fed the pitchers will start to rot
- Good light is essential to bring out the full colours.
- Hardier species including S purpurea and S flava can be grown outdoors. They need a peat compost with added leafy mould and grit sand. Line the area with a polythene sheet to simulate a bog - and don't let it dry.
- Plants can be stood in pots in the shallow margins of a pond during the growing season but they must be removed during the winter months

the world and moved indoors as conservatory owners look for a plant that will eat flying insects that also appear to be attracted by conservatory not just looking for plants that are attractive, conditions. But it is not just the feeding habits of

These unusual looking plants come in a variety of vivid colours and have wonderful nodding lily-Despite seeing their natural habitat de- like flowers. They are also quite hardy and can grow in a cool windowsill or conservatory with virtually no heat at all during the winter. Some species - notably S purpurea and S flava - can even grow outdoors, as long as they are permanently moist and kept out of wind.

> The plant is a perennial and comprises a distinct pitcher, formed from a leaf which is modified into a tube-like structure. This pitcher is brightly coloured and has a simple job: catch insects by luring them in with nectar, never to be seen again.Sarracenia are increased by dividing the rhizome in the spring. Pieces of rhizome with live root about 3cms long can be removed as separate plants and put into damp sphagnum moss or a mix of 70 per cent sphagnum moss, 10 per cent peat, 10 per cent sharp sand and 10 per cent charcoal.Growing buds may take several weeks to appear but good sized plants can be produced within a year.

> The growing season is April to October and plants should stand in 25mm of rainwater - as tap water contains chemicals which may kill the

sunny position, but if you are growing them in full sun it is a good idea to place something in front of the pot to help keep the roots cool.

If insect populations are low then you can apply a quarter strength general purpose plant food very rarely, but make sure you flush the pots with fresh rainwater once a month to remove any excess food.



THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Dig and store Jerusalem artichokes, parsnips, horseradish and salsify

Jerusalem artichokes will have finished their growth so it is safe to cut off the tops and dig up the tubers with a fork. Store the bigger tubers the same way you would potatoes and put the small ones aside in a dry room for planting later.Parsnips and horseradish are perfectly fine if left in the cold all winter - but you may find it hard to eat them if you can't dig them up because the ground is frozen! Dig a few now and store them. Cut off the tops and cover them in some dry sand/soil in a dry room. The salsify should be dug and stored in the same way, but if you want the plant to flower in

spring, leave it planted over the winter. Cut back deciduous hedges

All deciduous hedges such as hawthorn, blackthorn, myrobalan plum, sweet briar, beech and tamarisk can be pruned in November. This is also a good time to do any hand cutting you think may be necessary to keep plant growth within bounds. The base of the hawthorn or sweet briar sometimes gets a bit bare, but this can be rectified by pinning the longer shoots into position.

Plant deciduous trees, shrubs and climbers (ornamental and fruiting)

Planting cannot take place when the ground is very wet or frozen. Otherwise this is the perfect time to plant trees, shrubs, roses and climbers when lifted from open ground. Replanting should be taken care of as soon after the leaves have dropped as possible. However, if you have little time to spare, the planting of several plants can be spread over a period. If you cannot finish by the first or second week into December, postpone planting until early February. Make the hole deep enough to cover all the roots with 10 cms of soil and wide enough to fit them in a perfectly natural manner.

Letter to the Editor

As a life-long resident of Cappoquin, I have finally decided that enough has become enough in terms of the recent decision by the Bank of Ireland to abandon the town. Given that this town has more industrial jobs per head of population than any other part of Waterford, the city included, it was hard to accept the AIB's decision to shut down and sell its premises here four or five years ago. Now that the Bank of Ireland has gone the same route, while some quarters will undoubtedly view this as an opportunity for some initiative or other on the site, Cappoquin has now earned the distinction of being the largest centre of population in the county without a bank.

One could wax on about the destruction caused to the economic and social life of this town by such a decision, of the severe hardship this will bring about for many of the less well-represented members of our community. However, as a delegation who met the bank's officials last Friday seem to have found out, it won't make a blind bit of difference to the bank, whose decision is quite clearly motivated by mere cost-saving motives, safe in the knowledge that the people of the town and district have no alternative bank to move their business to anyway and will probably remain Bank of Ireland customers by default.

Taking all this as read, it is particularly offensive to local people for the bank to have prominently displayed outside the doomed branch posters telling us that it is not, after all, 'closing'. It is, rather, 'moving' to Lismore. What a load of rubbish, what an insult to people's intelligence! One can only take comfort from the fact that at least the bank hasn't seen fit to put up more posters, perhaps telling pensioners how wonderful on-line banking is, or giving advice on the best times for people without transport to hitchhike to Lismore in order to carry out basic but essential transactions.

Perhaps one shouldn't expect much more. This is, after all, the corporate body which advertises 'Understanding Banking' on television by showing us a person who can't distinguish between customers and seems to have huge difficulty with the rear end of a cow. At least the person in the advert seems to have money to invest and drives a Range Rover, ensuring that she will, at least, be able to get to her bank should it 'relocate'

It must be stressed that, in my experience, the staff who have worked at the Cappoquin branch have always been most efficient and pleasant to deal with and should be thanked wholeheartedly for that. Perhaps the best thing to do is just thank the bank's decision makers too, for putting up with us in Cappoquin for so long and maybe to ask if there is any chance of getting its framed 'quality service' award as a souvenir when the branch closes...sorry, 'moves' to Lismore.

SLIM PICKINGS BEST IN THRILLER

This five year old mare had half a length to spare over the 8/11 favourite, Mossbank, trained by Michael Hourigan who was bidding to complete a hat-trick of victories after winning at Limerick and at Fairyhouse in recent weeks.

KINGSCLIFF THE KING IN **BETFAIR CHASE**

The Betfair Chase was the big one at Haydock on Saturday and here the Robert Alner trained Kingscliff (8/1) proved a length and a half too strong for Michael Hourigan's Beef Or Salmon (8/1) with Tom Taaffe's Kicking King (10/11 favourite) finishing a disappointing third. GARVIVIONNIAN A STAR AT AINTREE

The Edward Mitchell trained Garvivionnian produced a 33/1 shock result when winning a thrilling race for the Beecher Chase at Aintree on Sunday. Given a great ride by Garett Cotter, Garvivionnian jumped superbly throughout and had to dig really deep to fend off a succession of challengers from the final fence before holding off Le Duc (25/1) by three quarters of a length with the first five horses separated by less than two and a half lengths. A delighted Mitchell nominated the John Smith's Grand National back at Aintree in early April as the horse's ultimate target for which he is now quoted as a general 33/1 chance






