However, the pylons, which are located just hundreds of metres from their home, were ordered to be taken down by An Bord Pleanala by today (December 21st).

But speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Frank Drummy has claimed that the ESB are in breach of An Bord Pleanala's ruling that the line would not oversail their property at any point.

"We will be taking further action against the ESB and Waterford County Council if this is not addressed," he

It has also emerged that two landholders have refused to allow the ESB access onto their land to erect large wooden stays. An Bord Pleanala ordered the ESB to erect the wooden stays in order to replace the pylons.

If the ESB fails to remove the pylons before today, Waterford County Council would be required to take enforcement action.

HOLLY AND MISTLETOE

Among the plants that are symbols of Christ-

Only holly is native to Ireland having the Irish name of Cuileann. Its evergreen leaves represent immortality, the spines recall Christ's crown of thorns and the red berries drops of His blood

Mistletoe has white berries and the custom of kissing under it suggests more pagan associations. It is not known to be native to Ireland but it does have an Irish name: drualas, whose origins might make an interesting

Waterford is one of the few areas where both species grow; Holly is in every parish while Mistletoe may be confined to just one or two gardens near Waterford City where it grows on a few old apple trees. It does not seem to have spread to other suitable trees in the area and an examination of about twenty berries in 2001 revealed only shrivelled infertile seeds inside. Perhaps the apple trees were imported long ago from a foreign nursery with the parasitic mistletoe already growing under the bark. There are only about a dozen or so Mistletoe sites in all of Ireland.

Some time in the past the symbolism of the mas Holly and Mistletoe are perhaps the best Holly and Mistletoe got muddled a bit when nurserymen found a freak white-berried holly which they propagated as a cultivated variety

> In the 1970s Dr. Susyn Andrews of the Savill Gardens in Windsor wanted to grow some but could find no living bush to propagate and concluded that this cultivar had died out. The only positive response that she got to her extensive enquiries was from Dungannon, Co. Tyrone. A respondent told of having seen white berries on Holly in a market in the mid 1960s and of tracing the source but reaching it only to find that the bush has been destroyed. They might have concluded that the Christian symbols of Christmas Holly had somehow re-asserted themselves.

> But the search continues for white-berried Holly. Yellow-berried Holly is common in the nursery trade under the name bacciflava and is of no interest in this context. Any news would be appreciated at 086 830 7092.



Influenza Vaccination and Poultry Workers

The Health Service Executive recommends that workers in close contact with poultry receive vaccination against seasonal (human)

Vaccination will be provided free of charge by General Practitioners to the following groups of workers:

- Poultry flock owners and their families
- Poultry veterinary practitioners
- Poultry advisors
- DAF veterinary inspectors and other personnel involved in outbreak control measures
- Laboratory personnel involved in poultry post mortems or poultry virology motion day
- Catching teams
- Poultry transporters
- Carcass transport and rendering plant personnel
- Workers in the hang-on, stunning and plucking areas in slaughter
- plants

The influenza vaccination will protect against seasonal flu, but will not provide protection against avian influenza.

It is important that workers in contact with birds, which may become infected with avian influenza, be immune to human influenza infection. This is to prevent the possibility of infection with human and avian strains of flu at the same time. If this happened, this could lead to the emergence of new strains of flu, which may be more infectious to humans and which could start a flu pandemic. If you belong to one of these groups, contact your GP to arrange an appointment to receive the influenza vaccine. Please bring this advice to the attention of other poultry workers, in particular non-nationals who may not have read

The holiday season has arrived the fun and festivities have already body more susceptible to infection. One of the best begun. But for many people the Christmas season is a difficult and remedies to help prevent winter bugs is Echi-

Stress: Endless shopping in crowded stores, preparing for family coming to stay, all that cooking and tidying up with overexcited children under your feet. If you are losing your temper more easily than usual, passionflower (Passiflora incarnata) can help to calm you down. Rescue remedy is another useful standby for the Christmas season. You can take a few drops any time you are feeling stressed or overwhelmed. It also seems to have an instant calming effect on children who have experienced accidents and upsets.

Loneliness: While some people are being driven mad by having to spend time with family, others may be feeling lonely. For anyone who has lost a family member, Christmas can be a particularly difficult time. Rose is a very supportive remedy for anyone experiencing grief and loneliness. Dried rose petals can be added to herbal tea or rose essential oil can be used in the bath.

Cold: The Christmas season brings the cold weather, which can be a real problem for anyone with poor circulation or joint problems. Cinnamon and cloves have a warming effect on the body during the cold winter months. When added to winter food and drinks they stimulate the circulation, warming up cold hands and feet and easing joint pain and stiffness. A few drops of clove oil can also be added to alcohol or a suitable carrier oil and used as a liniment for arthritis which is often worse in cold, damp weather.

Winter bugs: The cold brings various winter bugs, and the stress of Christmas is often enough to lower the immune system and make the nacea, which can also reduce the severity and duration of infections. Plenty of hot drinks with fresh lemon, honey and cinnamon can also help to ease coughs, colds and stomach

Overindulgence: Even those of us who don't normally suffer from any particular health problems can be subject to the symptoms of overindulgence during the Christmas season. Too much alcohol and rich, fatty foods, place an extra strain on the liver. Artichoke juice or Milk thistle capsules help to prevent hangovers and digestive upsets by assisting the digestive processes and helping

the liver to break down fats and toxins. Moderation: Of course the best way of all to survive the Christmas season is by practising just a little moderation. It's nice to allow ourselves extra treats at Christmas time, but ask yourself if you really need that second (or third!) helping of plum pudding. These kind of treats are much more enjoyable in moderation anyway, especially if you don't spend the whole holiday unable to move off the couch!

A daily walk in the fresh air and the sunlight (what little there is at this time of year) helps to lift the spirits and to generate energy. If Christmas time is a difficult or hectic time for you a walk can be a time of quiet contemplation or escape from the chaos.

Ring Student To Exhibit Crystal Design in Seattle

Siobhan will spend a week furthering her crystal design in January 2006, overseen by Martin Croke, Head Of Design at Waterford Crystal. Siobhan's piece, once manufactured, will then travel to Tacoma to go on exhibit with the winning piece from Tacoma.

Replacement Garda On Way For Ardmore Station

Waterford Fianna Fáil Senator Brendan Kenneally has said Ardmore will shortly get a new garda to replace Garda John Galvin, Ardmore Station, who retired from the force in August.

'I have raised the matter with the superintendent's office in Midleton, Co Cork. In a letter from the station, Superintendent Hayes said he is conscious of the policing needs in Ardmore and he has sought a replacement for Garda Galvin. I intend to keep pressing the relevant authorities until a new garda is assigned to Ardmore,' said Senator Kenneally.

He pointed out that the number of gardaí in training has doubled in the past three years in a move that should see more officers on the beat in communities across the county.

'There are now 990 gardaí in training, according to figures released by the Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform, Michael McDowell TD. That compares with 503 in 2002.

'We are now on track to bring the numbers in the Garda Siochána to a record high of 14,000 in the lifetime of this Government,' said Senator Kenneally.

He said the boosted numbers will put more gardaí on the streets to fight crime and anti-social behaviour in Waterford and surrounding areas.

Alligators and Crocodiles

There are 22 species of crocodilians- the family of reptiles that includes alligators, crocodiles, gavials and caimans. All are armour plated, have powerful tales and deadly fangs. Crocodilians eat fish and other creatures, which they catch in their strong jaws. Being good swimmers, they move very fast in the water.

Biggest and smallest crocodiles

The largest member of the crocodile family is the saltwater crocodile of Asia and Australasia. The male averages almost 5m(16ft) long and weighs about 520kg(1150lb) The smallest crocodilian is the dwarf crocodile found in the Congo River of western Africa. This creature is only 1m(3ft) long.

Crocodiles are good mothers

A mother crocodile lays her eggs in a hole, which she then covers with mud. When the babies hatch out, the mother guards them carefully from predators. She picks the babies up gently in her jaws and carries them to the water.

Plovers clean crocodiles teeth

Most creatures keep well away from crocodiles, but plovers have quite a friendly relationship with them. The bird walks all over the crocodile's body, feeding off the leeches that have attached themselves to it. The birds will even go into the crocodile's mouth and peck at food particles on the teeth. Crocodiles benefit from this service and never harm the plovers.



Crocodiles have different heads

There are eight species of caiman living in South and Central America. They look like small alligators and feed on fish, birds and other animals. The gavial, which lives in the rivers of northern India, looks like a crocodile, but it has a long, narrow snout. It can grow up to 6m(20ft) long but is not generally dangerous to people. It feeds mainly on fish, which it catches by waving its snout from side to side in the water.

Where crocodiles live

There are two species of alligator, both of which are found in North America and China. American alligators are larger than their Chinese cousins and can grow to over 5m(16ft) long. Crocodiles live in Africa, Asia, South America and Australia. The esturine crocodile is the only member of the family to live in salt water, so it is also called saltwater crocodile- and has often been spotted well out to sea. It is the most fearsome man-eater of the whole family, although the Nile crocodile also has a bad reputation for killing people.

DID YOU KNOW?

The best way to tell a crocodile from an alligator is actually from a distance! (The alligator has a broader, rounder snout.)

Crocodiles cannot seal their mouths underwater, because they have no lips. Instead they have flaps in their throats.)

The East Indian saltwater crocodile, the Nile crocodile and the Orinoco crocodile have been known to dine on humans!

Fossils have been found of 108 species of extinct crocodiles.

At Lake Itasy in Madagascar, a proclamation is read to the crocodiles each year warning them that any evil ones will be killed!

According to the famous historian Herodotus, ancient Egyptians kept tame crocodile adorned with jewels!

The "Moresby" Of Liverpool At Anchor In San Francisco Bay



The "Moresby" of Liverpool, a three-masted sailing ship, on passage from Cardiff to South America, was driven by bad weather into Dungarvan Bay on Tuesday 23rd December 1895. Early the following morning, she foundered on the Whitehouse Bank. Her master, Caleb Francis Coomber, his wife and child, and seventeen of her crew were lost. Five survived the wreck, owing to the efforts of a volunteer life-boat crew from Dungarvan. The tragic circumstances are still debated today 110 years later. The survivors included 16 year old apprentice Henry Blount from Ilkeston, Derbyshire, and sail-maker Hugh McKinnon from Campbeltown, Scotland. In 1988, the Abbeyside Pattern Committee placed a buoy on the Causeway to commemorate the event. The mystery of God was concentrated in a little child; God showed us His love in this little one. The God who lived in the highest heavens chose another address; He decided to come among us.



SUCKLER COWS

Feeding the Suckler Cow to Requirements

Following from last week's article on the use of body condition scoring as a guide to suckler cow nutrition, I will look at feed requirements and feed allowances this week for suckler cows at the various stages of the production cycle.

Autumn Calvers

Silage (kg) 68 DMD

Meal kg per day

Just now the Autumn calvers are the priority in relation to feeding. Ideally, these should calve at a condition score of 3.0 and should not loose more than 0.5 of a condition score up to mating. The feed requirement depends on the condition score at calving and the level of milk production. Where a cow is at condition 2.5 at calving she cannot afford to drop in body condition up to mating. In energy terms, a 600 kg cow requires about 5.5 UFL for maintenance (the equivalent of 5.5 kg of standard barley) and each litre of milk requires about 0.45 UFL. The feed requirement of a suckling cow giving either 5 litres of milk or 10 litres of milk per day is shown on the table.

The daily milk yield of pure beef cows is usually 5 - 8 litres per day during the first 3 months of lactation while that of crossbred cows with some Friesian blood is likely to be 8 - 12 litres per day. Of course there is no way of knowing the exact milk yield. It can only be estimated from the breed type and change in body condition. The feed allowance in the table refers to cows where there is no change in body condition. Where a cow loses 0.5 of a condition score in the first two months of lactation, it is equivalent to a saving of 1.0 kg of concentrate per day in feed allowance. This loss of body condition should only be availed of where autumn calving cows are in good condition at calving (3.0 or higher). Silage quality is much more important for suckling cows in milk during the winter than for dry cows. As digestibility falls, both intake and energy level also falls so that an extra 1.0 kg concentrate is needed for each 5 units drop in DMD. A 600 kg suckling cow in early lactation will consume about 45 kg silage per day of 68 DMD. Good quality silage will have adequate protein for a suckler cow in lactation. On lower quality silage the meal should contain about 16% crude protein. Feed a post calving mineral (dairy cow mineral) on the silage or as part of the meal allowance.

Dry suckler cows can be kept on rather stemmy late cut pit silage or baled silage. As shown above the energy requirement of a dry cow kept at constant body condition is 5.5 UFL per day equivalent to 35 to 40 kg of moderate quality silage (65% DMD). Where a cow drops 0.5 of a condition score over 3 months the above silage allowance can be restricted by about 6.0 kg per day or 0.5 tonnes over the 3

In practice, facilities for restricting silage intake may not be available. However, where cows are housed in pens they can be separated according to condition, where the thinner animals would be given silage to appetite and some restriction (or poorer quality silage) given to the fatter ones. In late pregnancy, (7th to 9th month) the feed requirement increases by the equivalent of 1.0 - 2.8 UFL/day (1.0 to 3.0 kg meal) but flat rate feeding usually works well as body reserves can supply the extra energy required in late pregnancy. The exceptions are thin cows that don't have reserves - these should get the extra feed required. Cows carrying twins often lose significant body condition in late pregnancy and need to get special attention once detected. Spring calving cows in good condition at housing can be fed good quality barley or oaten straw to appetite plus 2.5 kg meal per day for the first 3 months of winter. The protein content of the concentrate should be at least 16% in order to ensure adequate straw intake and provide the dietary protein requirement







Dungarvan Leader - This Week In The Garden

Plants prepare for a new year

WITH spring just around the corner we should soon start to see plants such as the snowdrop popping up here and there. With the days set to start getting longer again, the garden may still appear bleak and unforgiving n but beneath the surface, business is booming.

All of the plants, bulbs and flowers that have been resting in the soil since spring last year are preparing for a brand new year. The plants may grow underground for weeks before you notice any sign of them above ground.

Plants such as snowdrops and crocus have been shooting underground for a month before they rear their heads.

The snowdrop is a reliable notice that reads: iSpring is here at last.î It is one of our favourite plants and has been

featured in folk tales, songs and hymns throughout history. Plants such as the yellow aconite prefer an

alkaline soil, but when they settle they spread and grow although the flowers will not open in the shade

They enjoy a bit of compost in the soil when planted in late spring after flowering while still in full leaf. Aconites seem tough and hardy although the snowdrop is well liked for its frailty and delicate look. But they still flower even in ice, snow or on the bleakest of days.

A snowdrop looks best in the garden in a clump with other snowdrops.



Busy below: In the depths of winter, the snowdrop (Galanthus gracilis) will soon pop up.

The size, shape and site of the clump should give it a natural appearance.

When the time comes for planting, a good site is near trees or in the middle of the lawn ñ making it look wild and untamed.

If you are transplanting bulbs from a clump that has become too crowded, always plant to the same depth

Snowdrop bulbs, like most spring-flowering bulbs, need planting deeper than you would think. As a general rule, plant about three times the depth of the bulb.

Once established, snowdrops need very little care, but will give years of pleasure.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Successional sowings

Mustard, cress and radishes can be sown now, the same as in November ñ in a greenhouse or a frame with soil warming cables.

Sow them at a temperature of between 10°C and 20°C, the warmer the better.

Herbaceous Plants

Tender herbaceous plants could have their crowns damaged by the hard frosts.

Protect them by placing wire mesh over them, covering that with fleece and dry straw, making sure you pin down the fleece to keep the insulation in place.

Protect brassicas

Firm the stems of tall brassicas, such as brussels sprouts, to prevent them rocking in the winter winds It is also a good time to secure bird netting over brassicas to protect them from birds.

Plant fruit trees

Plant bare-rooted fruit trees and bushes as well as rootstocks for budding next spring. It is also the best time to plant container grown fruit trees and bushes. Ensure the hole is twice as large as needed to take the rootball and plenty of well rotted compost or manure, and incorporate a good handful of blood, fish and bone in the soil used to backfill the hole. If the soil is frozen when trees arrive, cover the roots with a peat substitute and sacking, or heel the trees in, until the weather improves.

Continue to prune fruit trees

It is a common mistake to say that fruit trees cannot be pruned when the weather is frosty. You should carry on cutting trees and bushes of all kinds back. **Protect alpines**

Remove fallen leaves from the rock garden and cover woolly leaved alpines with glass to protect them from winter rain and snow.





Reserve 175g of the mixture. Add the egg to the remainder and mix to a dough.

Turn into the prepared tin, packing the mixture firmly into the base and 2.5cm up the sides to make a case. Use a metal spoon to level the mixture.

Stir the apples into the cherry mixture and spoon into the case. Scatter with the crumble. Bake at 180∞C, 350∞F, Gas Mark 4 for 50 minutes until slightly risen and pale golden.

Cool in the tin, then serve dusted with icing sugar.

From Samuel Lewis's Topographical Dictionary 1837. Clashmore.

Clashmore, a post-town and parish, in the barony of Decieswithin-Drum, county of Waterford and province of Munster, 12 miles (S.W.) from Dungarvan; containing 3772 inhabitants, of which number, 387 are in town. Glaismhor abbey was founded here, according to Archdall, by Caunchear, at the command of St. Mochuda of Lismore, who died in the year 655; it subsisted till the general suppression, when its possessions were granted to Sir Walter Raleigh.

The town is situated on the mail coach road from Waterford through Youghal to Cork (to each of which a sub-post office has been lately established), and near the navigable river Blackwater, from which a navigable pill runs up within half a mile of the town, and in its course receives the waters of the Greague rivulet; it is navigable for lighters of 20 tons' burden, and might be greatly improved at a trifling expense. Over the river Blackwater is a handsome and very long wooden bridge, which leads towards Youghal. The total number of houses, in 1831 was 50.

A distillery is carried on, producing nearly 20,000 gallons of whiskey annually; and there is a large boulting-mill. Fairs are held on Feb. 8th, May 20th, Aug 20th, and Dec. 16th. A constabulary police force is stationed here; and petty sessions are held every alternate week. The small village of Ballinamultina, in this parish, is about _ mile to the north east of the town, on the road to Dungarvan, and contains the handsome residence of F. Kennedy, Esq. The parish is bounded on the west by the river Blackwater, and comprises 7068 statute acres, as applotted under the tithe act; the lands near the river are fertile, but towards the east are mountainous and of inferior quality. About one-half of the parish is under tillage, and the remainder in pasture. Clashmore House, the seat of R. Power, Esq., is pleasantly situated in a fine demesne, near the confluence of the Greague stream with the Blackwater; the grounds are embellished with some remarkably fine trees; and near the mansion is a well of excellent water, called St. Mochuda's well. The living is a rectory and vicarage, in the diocese of Lismore, partly impropriate in the Duke of Devonshire, and partly constituting the corps of the prebend of Clashmore in the cathedral of Lismore, to which the vicarage, with cure of souls, is united, and in the patronage of the Archbishop of Cashel.

The tithes amount to £705. 2. 8., of which £382. 16. 8. is payable to the impropriator, and £322. 6. to the prebendary. The church is a neat modern edifice with a spire. The glebehouse, the residence of the prebendary, is pleasantly situated; the glebe comprises of 10 acres, subject to a rent of £3 per acre. In the R.C. divisions this parish is the head of the union or district, including also the parish of Kinsalebeg, in each of which is a chapel; that of Clashmore is a neat and commodious edifice, recently erected. A school-house was built by the Kildare-Place Society, but it is not now used as such. There are two pay schools, in which are about 220 children, and a dispensary.



From Samuel Lewis's Topographical Dictionary 1837. Clashmore.

Clashmore, a post-town and parish, in the barony of Decieswithin-Drum, county of Waterford and province of Munster, 12 miles (S.W.) from Dungarvan; containing 3772 inhabitants, of which number, 387 are in town. Glaismhor abbey was founded here, according to Archdall, by Caunchear, at the command of St. Mochuda of Lismore, who died in the year 655; it subsisted till the general suppression, when its possessions were granted to Sir Walter Raleigh.

The town is situated on the mail coach road from Waterford through Youghal to Cork (to each of which a sub-post office has been lately established), and near the navigable river Blackwater, from which a navigable pill runs up within half a mile of the town, and in its course receives the waters of the Greague rivulet; it is navigable for lighters of 20 tons' burden, and might be greatly improved at a trifling expense. Over the river Blackwater is a handsome and very long wooden bridge, which leads towards Youghal. The total number of houses, in 1831 was 50.

A distillery is carried on, producing nearly 20,000 gallons of whiskey annually; and there is a large boulting-mill. Fairs are held on Feb. 8th, May 20th, Aug 20th, and Dec. 16th. A constabulary police force is stationed here; and petty sessions are held every alternate week. The small village of Ballinamultina, in this parish, is about _ mile to the north east of the town, on the road to Dungarvan, and contains the handsome residence of F. Kennedy, Esq. The parish is bounded on the west by the river Blackwater, and comprises 7068 statute acres, as applotted under the tithe act; the lands near the river are fertile, but towards the east are mountainous and of inferior quality. About one-half of the parish is under tillage, and the remainder in pasture. Clashmore House, the seat of R. Power, Esq., is pleasantly situated in a fine demesne, near the confluence of the Greague stream with the Blackwater; the grounds are embellished with some remarkably fine trees; and near the mansion is a well of excellent water, called St. Mochuda's well. The living is a rectory and vicarage, in the diocese of Lismore, partly impropriate in the Duke of Devonshire, and partly constituting the corps of the prebend of Clashmore in the cathedral of Lismore, to which the vicarage, with cure of souls, is united, and in the patronage of the Archbishop of Cashel.

The tithes amount to £705. 2. 8., of which £382. 16. 8. is payable to the impropriator, and £322. 6. to the prebendary. The church is a neat modern edifice with a spire. The glebehouse, the residence of the prebendary, is pleasantly situated; the glebe comprises of 10 acres, subject to a rent of £3 per acre. In the R.C. divisions this parish is the head of the union or district, including also the parish of Kinsalebeg, in each of which is a chapel; that of Clashmore is a neat and commodious edifice, recently erected. A school-house was built by the Kildare-Place Society, but it is not now used as such. There are two pay schools, in which are about 220 children, and a dispensary.

Horse Racing Ireland Awards Announced The 2005 Horse Racing Ireland Awards Luncheon

was held at the Westin Hotel on Monday 12th De cember to recognise feats of excellence during what was a memorable year both at home and abroad in Irish Racing. The awards were presented by Mr. John O'Donoghue, TD, Minister for Arts, Sport & Tourism who said: - "We are enjoying an era of unprecedented success in Irish Racing. Nine winners at the Cheltenham Festival and eight at the Aintree Festival surpassed our most optimistic expectations. When we include the King George VI Chase at Kempton and the Betfred Gold Cup at Sandown, Irish trained horses won the top five UK national hunt races while on the flat the English 2000 & 1000 Guineas, the Eclipse Stakes, the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes and the English St Leger were all won by Irish horses.

Denis Brosnan, Chairman of Horse Racing Ireland stated that Irish trained horses won well over 7 million in prizemoney overseas and that we also witnessed history-making achievements by Frances Crowley who became the first female licensed trainer to saddle a winner of an Irish Classic race while Nina Carberry became the first female jockey since Gee Armytage in 1987 to win a race in Cheltenham against the professional riders.

The award winners were as follows:

National Hunt Award - Ruby Walsh (won his third Irish Champion Jockeys Title and won the English, Irish and Scottish Grand Nationals)

Flat Award - Kieren Fallon (the six time English Champion Jockey won his first Budweiser Irish Derby and the Prix de l'Arc de Troimphe on Hurri-

Point To Point Award - Derek O'Connor (Regarded as one of the all time great Point To Point Riders, he broke his own record by riding 63 Point To Point winners during a memorable season)

Outstanding Achievement Award - Nina Carberry (became the first female rider in 18 years to ride a winner against the professionals at the Cheltenham Festival in March and was leading lady rider in the qualified rider ranks)

Contribution To The Industry Award - Galway Racecourse Committee (each year the Galway Festival continues to break its own attendance and betting records and attracts visitors from all round the globe)

Horse Of The Year - Kicking King (only defeated once in six races, he won four Grade One events including the Totesport Gold Cup at Cheltenham, the King George VI Chase at Kempton and the Punchestown Guinness Gold Cup at Punchestown).

Limestone Lad Retired

The James Bowe trained Limestone Lad, one of Ireland's most popular national hunt horses, has been officially retired at the age of 13. He was led around the parade ring at Thurles on Sunday in a special ceremony to mark his wonderful career and received a tremendous reception from the crowd. This remarkably consistent performer won a total of 35 races in a 61 race career earning over 764,000 in win and place prizemoney. He won 14 Graded races, four at Grade One level including the Ballymore Properties Hatton's Grace Hurdle in 1999, 2001 and 2002 with his most memorable coming in the 1999 running of that Fairyhouse race when he defeated the mighty Istabraq while his narrow defeat against Like-A-Butterfly in the 2003 AIG Europe Champion Hurdle will live long in the memory. His last race saw him finish third to Baracouda and Iris's Gift in the 2003 Stayers Hurdle at Cheltenham, a race many feel was the greatest stayers' event ever run. 



The words of welcome of the Mayor of Dungarvan, Fiachia O'Ceilleachair, to the forthcoming visit of a delegation from Mercyhurst College (Erie) to the Friary College, highlights the well-established link between the school and the U.S. College

Mercyhurst, as its name suggests, was originally established by the Mercy Sisters, and still retains its strong Catholic heritage and a vision of a College dedicated to the liberal arts tradition in its promotion of the basic values of truth, individual integrity human dignity, mercy and justice. Mercyhurst has been, and continues to be a challenging environment for its students.

The Friary has been privileged to be among the Irish schools welcomed to Mercyhurst and whose pupils have availed of the career opportunities offered there. Among its distinguished graduates is the Dail representative of Waterford, John Deasy, but the original link was earlier forged by another ex-Friary pupil, Michael Kelly.

Michael, son of the late Michael and Mary Kelly, had taken a year out from W.I.T. to explore new horizons. One of his jobs was as a barman in New York.
