Deasy And Darcy To Contest Election

The major news to emerge from Monday night's Fine Gael general election selection convention in Dungarvan's Park Hotel was the shock defeat of Senator Maurice Cummins.

Five hundred voting delegates packed a convention that was presided over by Cork TD Bernard Allen, and at the end of the night the party had chosen outgoing TD John Deasy and newcomer Jim Darcy, a member of Waterford City Council, as its two man team to contest an election that is not expected to be called by Taoiseach Bertie Ahern until May of next year.

The unexpected defeat of Senator Cummins however was a major talking point of the night and it may well have sounded the death knell of his burning personal ambition to become a member of the Dail.

With Deputy Deasy always a racing certainty to capture one of the two nominations - he received 225 first count votes - all the focus among the delegates was on the battle for the other one.



One of the reasons the museum has focused so much on using computers and the Internet is their comparative lack of budget. With an annual budget of approximately €6000 they have to be inventive if they are to meet the aims that they have set themselves. By building partnerships with the County Library Service, Fas, the County Council and using technology in an innovative manner they believe they are providing a great value for money service to the County. The museum currently gets approximately 7000 visitors per annum. Their web site gets between 6,000 and 10,000 different visitors every month. The museum answers in the region of 1500 substantial queries per annum. These queries can range from providing the history of King John's Castle to Duchas, to providing a B&B owner with the history of their home for marketing purposes, to assisting school children with projects. Their touring exhibition of postcards has visited Ring, and it will be going to Old Parish and hopefully Clashmore in the very near future. The museum newsletter is emailed every month or so to well in excess of a thousand people.

• It will allow the public to have greater access to the photos/images. The photographs will be disseminated worldwide encouraging further image donation. Specialists in military, maritime and social history etc. will be able to view and comment on these images further increasing our store of knowledge. History students will be able to utilize the archival material in their studies and projects.

• The museum will function more efficiently. Rather than searching through archival boxes to locate a print or photo they can now find them with the click of a button - for example using the search facility on the web site they could find every image of sport from the Lismore area and then quickly assemble an exhibition on that topic for display in Lismore.

 Images and information will be preserved for future generations. Each image is scanned at a huge size (after scanning the image is about the size of your average door). Then a digitally perfect copy of the original image is stored on two different computers in 2 separate locations. In the event of the original image being lost or destroyed, the image can be reproduced using the copy kept in the digital archive.

Information associated with a photo will also be preserved. One of the problems with local historians is that their research is oftentimes not recorded on paper and much of the knowledge that they accumulate over a lifetime is stored in their head. With this system the museum will be able to electronically archive the knowledge historians have about a particular photo


The museum would hope to have sports clubs, community groups, local historians, collectors and members of the public all donating images and photos. This web site allows this material to be enjoyed and learned from by future genera-

This project is different from many of the archival photographic projects that are underway worldwide. Many of these projects put a set number of images or a particular collection online and then the work is done. The museum intends to source historic images on an ongoing basis from around the county. They already have 10 collectors or collecting groups around Waterford collecting photographs within their own community on their behalf. Collectors can see an immediate return on their work as the image goes online within days of being sourced. Each collector is credited on the web site for every image that they have collected, so you can quickly identify images that have been collected by Abbeyside Reference Archive or Sean Murphy for instance.

This image archive is a tool that the museum is putting at the disposal of local historians across Waterford to help them better record and preserve the history of their lo-

In addition to the image archive the new museum brochure was also launched last Friday night. This brochure outlines the main areas of work that Waterford County Museum undertakes and how the public can assist the museum. COUNTY WATERFORD HERITAGE PLAN 2006 – 2010

Waterford County now has a five year Her-13th February 2006.

Central to the making of the Plan has been the Heritage Forum. Members of the Forum were nominated by a range of organisations in the County and it met four times last year to discuss the preparation of the document. There were five public meetings and there were periods during which people and organisations were asked through press advertisements etc. to make suggestions and to comment on the draft. This process is summarised in the plan itself which is available on the Waterford County Council website.

The result is a five year programme of one hundred and nine actions involving people and groups all over the county. Some involve the continuing work of agencies and organisations. Some have the County Council as lead partner and many of these will be eligible for funding by the Heritage Council.

The programme for this year involves itage Plan; the County Council adopted the among other things a survey of thatched draft by vote during its monthly meeting on buildings in the county which will revisit the two hundred and thirty thatches that were listed by Council staff in 1991. The aim is to produce a database of Waterford thatch types and traditions: past and present that will be useful for future work.

About twenty wetlands in the county are to be evaluated by a commissioned survey. They are important for the wildlife and habitats they contain and, perhaps too, for water quality and conservation.

Other actions for the year include a heritage photography competition and the production of an illustrated heritage calendar.

For the moment the plan can be read as a simple WORD document on Waterford County Council's Website. Soon it will be published

Work Must Start Immediately On Sub-Standard Water Schemes — WILKINSON

Waterford Fianna Fáil TD Ollie Wilkinson has said work must start immediately on a number of sub-standard group water schemes in the county after the Government allocated more than €1 million to improve the local water supply for householders.

Deputy Wilkinson said it was imperative that sources and that householders get a proper water supply for domestic and other purposes.

He urged Waterford County Council to move quickly towards identifying priority schemes that need urgent attention so that local householders' water supplies can be dramatically im-

'Some €1,090,000 is to be spent this year to on upgrading existing water networks, improving disinfection equipment and building new water plants.

'Location should never be a barrier for the provision of services. Water is the most basic of these services and householders deserve a propwe protect the quality of our drinking water er supply,' said Deputy Wilkinson, who is based in Dungarvan.

He pointed out that the Government is spending a record €145 million on upgrading rural water schemes across the country - 12 times higher than the 1997 spend. Some 45,000 rural households across the country will get better water supplies as a result of the scheme.

OVARIAN CANCER

Ovarian cancer is the fifth most common cause of death in women, yet it is not a condition which receives much attention. In order to try to rectify this situation, March has been declared Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month.

Ovarian cancer is most common in women over the age of 45. Unfortunately, the prognosis for women diagnosed with this condition is often poor, usually because the disease may be at an advanced stage before it is discovered. The symptoms (which include poor appetite, unexplained weight loss, abdominal pain and possible bowel or bladder disturbance) are vague and therefore frequently ignored.

Ovarian cancer has been linked to consumption of animal fats, and to excessive coffee drinking. It is usually linked with frequent ovulation, therefore women who do not ovulate every month due to multiple pregnancies, prolonged periods of breastfeeding, or use of the contraceptive pill, have a reduced risk of developing ovarian cancer.

In clinical trials, an extract of the Pacific yew tree caused a 50% decrease in the size of ovarian tumours. However, for women who have been diagnosed with ovarian cancer, orthodox treatment consisting of surgery and chemotherapy or radiation offers the best chance for recovery.

Having said that, orthodox treatment only removes the cancer cells, and can place an incredible stress on the body in its own right. In fact chemotherapy and radiotherapy can damage healthy cells as well as cancerous ones, and can induce the same kind of damage which actually causes cancer in healthy tissues. These treatments also cause nausea, vomiting, gastrointestinal inflammation and malnutrition, which reduces the efficiency of the treatment

There are natural ways to improve the success of treatment and minimise side effects. A professional medical herbalist can provide an individually-tailored herbal prescription, nutritional supplements and detailed advice about improving the chances of recovery. Of course there is no magic cure for cancer, but taking a holistic approach to healthcare can help to create an environment in the body which does not encourage its growth.

For example, herbs such as burdock root detoxify the tissues and support the liver and lymphatic system which are responsible for

cleansing the body. There are also herbs which help to prevent the spread of cancerous cells such as periwinkle and reishi mushroom.

Herbs such as Echinacea help to ensure the immune system is functioning effectively which in turn controls the spread of the disease. Other herbs are available to help the person to deal with the emotional impact of the disease, and to help the body to cope with the demands of orthodox intervention.

Dietary advice is an important part of treatment. It is advisable to eat plenty of fresh organic fruit and vegetables, particularly those which are coloured such as carrots, sweet potatoes, greens, cherries and other berries. These contain nutrients known as antioxidants which are deficient in most cancer patients. Seeds, pulses and wholegrains are also very beneficial because they contain isoflavones which also help to prevent cancer growth. Avoid meat, dairy products and coffee. Refined sugar and processed foods encourage the build up of toxins, while a low fat, high fibre diet helps to clear toxic substances from the body.



There are four types of ape: Gorilla, Chimpanzee, Gibbon and Orang-utan. The gorilla is about the same height as a man but has longer arms and is much heavier and stronger. When disturbed, they put on a ferocious-looking display of chest beating and charge forward. This behaviour is all bluff, and intended to frighten the intruder. Gibbons live in the forests of South-east Asia. They spend much of their time in the trees, using their long arms to swing from branch to branch. The shy orang-utan, whose name means 'man of the woods', lives in the rain forests of Borneo and Sumatra. This second largest member of the ape family is reddish-brown in colour and lives mainly on fruit.


Chimpanzees Live in Family Groups

Local doctors in the Dungarvan and Lismore areas have organised this Service to provide out of hours medical care for their patients with Urgent Medical problems after their surgeries close.



During these times patients should ring a central number 1850 334 999. A receptionist at the Caredoc assessment centre answers this number and takes the patients details

In the case of an Emergency, the caller is put directly through to the nurse, who will immediately organise the appropriate care for the patient. For non emergency calls, a nurse will ring the patients back and give advice to the patients or if necessary make appointments for patients to be seen at treatment centres or arrange a home

APPOINTMENTS TO SEE THE DOCTOR MUST BE ARRANGED BY PHONE BEFORE THE PATIENTS ATTEND THE CENTRES.

When a home visit is needed or the doctor has to respond to an emergency call the doctors are driven by a local driver who has knowledge of the area in a car equipped with the most up to date medical equipment. The driver is in constant communications with the nurse at the Caredoc call assessment centre.

Caredoc provides a high quality out of hours service for urgent cases. Where a patient contacts the service regarding a problem that can wait until their own doctors surgery opens they will be advised to report to their own doctor at the next routine surgery.


If a patient has a complaint regarding the Caredoc service they should talk to their own doctor or contact Caredoc and their concerns will be fully investigated and any issues arising addressed.

However as part of the programme Ciaran must raise €2,950. the majority of which will be distributed to the local schools and orphanages through Suas' partner charities. The project proposed was a Hydrothermal Heat Recovery System which works on the same principal as a refrigerator. The project looked at the re-use of a relatively large volume of waste hot water such as from a washing machine, dishwasher or shower. The water is then condensed into a smaller volume of high grade heat which could then be re introduced into a home central heating system. The project proposed the potential to significantly lessen our dependence on oil and fossil fuels.

To work in practice hot wastewater could be collected via a separate drainage system in an insulated tank beneath the house. An evaporator coil could extract the heat from the water, compress it, and send it for instance to a condenser coil located in a hot water tank in

Commission **Concede To ICMSA**

NO LEGAL BAR TO REPS FOR INTENSIVE FARMERS

Following recent meetings in Brussels, the President of ICMSA, Jackie Cahill, stated that the new farm grants for the additional storage required by the introduction of the Nitrates Directive are likely to be cleared by the EU Commission with-

Mr Cahill said that a number of issues, including national aid rules, had unfortunately delayed the introduction of these grant aid package announced last year by Minister Coughlan. He went on to say that it was the clear expectation of farmers, based on that announcement by the Minister that these new grants would be introduced in January of this year and would operate for three years up the end of 2008.

Mr. Cahill stated that the Minister must redouble her efforts so that the new grants scheme is actually opened up to farmers before the end of March.

On a related issue, Mr. Cahill said that at these meetings he had also made proposals to the EU Commission for a modified REPS scheme for intensive farmers. Under the ICMSA proposal these farmers would have a stocking rate above the equivalent of 170 kg. Of organic nitrogen per hectare and would, therefore, automatically be in the derogation category for the Nitrates Directive.

Mr Cahill said that the Commission had confirmed to ICMSA that there was no legal obstacle in allowing REPS for intensive farmers and the ICMSA President added that he was now convinced that REPS for intensive farmers would be a welcome and positive development and that the option should now be actively pursued by the Department of Agriculture as an integral and solution focussed approach to the Nitrates Directive.

COMMISSION CONFIRM POLICY OF PRICE SUPPORT TO ICMSA

The EU Commission has this week given firm assurances directly to ICMSA that they are taking action to support butter price and that they will increase export refunds for EU butter, which is currently uncompetitive on world markets. At a meeting in Brussels, Mr Rasmussen, Head of the Dairy Products Division, said that current butter production was qualifying for intervention, he said that APS was available and he also accepted ICMSA's view that export refunds must be increased. This confirmation of policy should immediately firm up the butter market and, taken together with a strong SMP market, it provides the basis for all co-ops to hold milk price going forward.

Mr. Cronin said that the Commission would continue to ensure that stability is maintained in all EU dairy markets and Irish Co-ops could plan on the basis of short to medium term stability. The Commission also confirmed that export refunds would not be abolished in 2013 unless there is full and complete parallelism. The EU would be giving away its export refunds with absolutely nothing being conceded in return.

ICMSA had also stressed to the EU Commission the need to make no further concessions in the WTO negotiations and reminded the Commission of their obligation to stay within the mandate set down by the Council of Agriculture Ministers. Mr. Cronin said that he could confirm that the Commission was committed to this mandate and that they now fully recognised the importance of the dairy sector to Ireland and the need to provide continuing support to this sector going forward.

"IFA POWER" SUPPLY SECURE SAYS IFA

Following revelations that Airtricity is to exit the domestic electricity market because of market and regulatory failure, IFA Power today reassured customers that they need have no concerns for supply.

Pat Smith IFA Director of Organisation advised the Journal today that as far as IFA was concerned Airtricity was standing by its agreement with IFA Power until an alternative agreement was put in place. He said that IFA entered into an agreement with Airtricity and that nothing had materially changed in that agreement as far as IFA was concerned. Market and Regulatory failure has caused this problem for Airtricity. It was a function of the Government and the Energy Regulator to ensure that the market rules do not allow the dominant player in the electricity supply business to force Airtricity out of providing competitive prices to small business and the farming

Concluding, Mr. Smith again re-assured customers that there was no need for concern. He said that all customers of IFA Power would be written to in due course if and when there are any changes to the current supply contract. For the moment it

IFA Re-iterate Call for Total EU Ban on South American Beef Imports

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman John Bryan recently said the EU Commis-European livestock sector at an unacceptable level of risk by not imposing more stringent restrictions on the importation of beef from Argentina and Brazil in response to foot and mouth disease outbreaks in these countries.

Earlier this week Mr. Bryan called for the EU to impose a total ban on all South American beef imports considering the escalating FMD problem in South America.

Following the meeting of EU Animal Health officials in Brussels today, John Bryan said the EU Commission did not go far enough in applying only a partial ban on eight departments in the province of Corrientes in response to the FMD outbreak in Argentina last week.

"The latest FMD outbreak in Argentina confirms a deteriorating situation in South America. The reality is without a proper and robust traceability and movement control system regionalisation cannot work effectively and the only real protection for Europe is a total ban on all South American beef im-

The IFA livestock leader said by imposing only a partial ban, the EU Commission is ignoring the facts on the FMD disease rift as highlighted by the EU Food and Veterinary Of-

Mr. Bryan said in a report published last spring following a visit to Argentina, the EU Food and Veterinary office concluded "weaknesses were found in control over foot and mouth disease, in public health control systems and in certifi-cate procedures". In relation to animal identification and movement the FVO concluded "the system cannot yet ensure mals to the holding of birth".

John Bryan accused the EU of applying double standards in relation to beef imports. He said European producers are subject to the most rigorous standards of traceability, animal health and food safety control where the Commission consider no level of regulation too much. However when it comes to beef imports, particularly from South America the EU apply a lax attitude and are prepared to take unacceptable risks on animal disease and food safety.

John Bryan said the latest FMD outbreak in Argentina proves again that border controls in South America are totally inadequate and traceability is almost non-existent.





Late Mrs. Anastatia Kirwan

It was with deep and sincere regret the district learned of the death of Mrs. Anastatia (Statia) Kirwan (nee McCarthy), Knockenpower, Colligan, Dungarvan and formerly Knockavannia, Ballymacarbry

Born in 1920 into the McCarthy family of four girls and two boys of Roger and Ann McCarthy (nee Dalton), an old established family highly respected in the farming community. Her home at Knockavannia was a well known house in the troubled days of the twenties. It was at that house that District Inspector Gilbert N. Potter, D.I. of the Royal Irish Constabulary was captured at Hylands Cross, a half mile from Clogheen on the Cahir/Clogheen road on the 22nd of April 1921. He was taken to the Hallinan Homestead at Aughavoulivane where he was prisoner on the first night. On the following day he was taken to McCarthy's, Knockavannia and during his stay there he looked for a prayer book which Mrs. McCarthy supplied to him. That was on the night before he was shot on the banks of the River Clodagh near Clonea Power.

In her early days she received her education at the now defunct School House in the Nire. When school days were over it was home work inside and out and the outing in those days was the house dance, she was not far from the Gap Stage where many girls and boys learned the art of set dancing. A lady in every sense of the word, she was highly respected by her family, neighbours and her many friends who recognised and appreciated her as a caring, extremely kind person. Some years back she married Ned Kirwan and became a kind and loving wife and mother to their children. Her greatest passion in life was her husband and family, to them she was utterly devoted. She had a great sense of fun and humour which made her delightful company.

In August 1997, her husband passed to his reward and she was left to look after place and family, a job she took and done so well. She did not enjoy the best of health for some time past, she was cared for in St. Enda's Ward, the place where she passed away on Saturday, 4th February in the care of the staff. 

PROBLEM

Not enough light

When started indoors the tall, skinny seedlings have toppled over (as described above) in search of light. Long, thin stems are too frail to support the weight of the leaves.

SOLUTION

Fluorescent lighting will help (easily homemade or purchased commercially) or outdoor light is best. If it's still too chilly outside, consider building a homemade cold frame. If you decide to go with fluorescent lights, keep them close but not touching the seedlings, and move the lights up (or the plants down) as they grow. It's also

Successful Seeds

It happens every year doesnit it? Spring is in the air and you are eager to start sowing some of your favourite flowers and vegetables

After spending hours deciding the best varieties, you happily hand over your hard-earned cash on propagation trays, the best quality compost, labels and all the necessary tools that will help your seeds grow into beautiful, healthy plants.

This week in the garden

Sow roses trees and shrubs

This is a very good time to sow roses ñ and any other trees and shrubs which may be available.

Roses are rather temperamental and to get one good rose plant out of 100 seeds is good going.

All should be sown outdoors in a sheltered border of finely prepared soil without manure. Scatter seeds evenly into holes around a centimetre deep and press the soil down firmly on top

Many of the seeds may not germinate in the first year so be patient and make sure you plant them in a place which will not be needed later on in the season.


Sow herbs


Many herbs including thyme, sage and marjoram can be raised from seed sown in an unheated greenhouse or frame.

They should be treated in the same way as normal rock plants or herbaceous perennials.

Now is the time to set about planting a new bed of mint for the kitchen. Lift some old plants or buy some new roots, divide them up and spread them evenly and thinly over the selected site.

The site should be at least, reasonably open with about four centimetres deep of finely broken soil.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION:

I opened an SSIA in my local bank in May 2001 and it should mature soon. Is there anything I must do before then? ANSWER:

Yes there is. You must complete a form for your bank before your SSIA matures.

The Government's SSIA scheme is a five-year savings scheme which commenced on 1 May 2001. To participate in the scheme, savings accounts (called "special savings incentive accounts" or "SSIAs") had to be opened before 30 April 2002. Under the terms of this scheme, for every amount you saved in a special account, an additional 25% was contributed by the exchequer to your savings. So, for every 4 you saved each month, you got 1. The cash was credited each month directly to your savings account.

These accounts will mature during 2006 and 2007 depending on when they were opened. An account that was opened in May 2001 will mature on 31 May 2006.

Within the three months before your account matures you must complete and sign form SSIA4 and return it to the financial institution where your account is held. Therefore if your account matures on 31 May 2006 you must complete and return the form during the period 1 March 2006 to 31 May 2006. You will be supplied with form SSIA4 by your financial institution at the appropriate time.

SAVING TIPS FOR MOTORISTS

Are we all too dependent on our cars? Did you know that 25% of all car journeys are less than 2 miles? Walking or cycling for short journeys would make us much healthier and it would mean fewer cars on the roads and we would all be better off.

However, if you have to use your car you can save up to 13% on your fuel consumption by doing the following:

Avoid high speeds, harsh acceleration or heavy breaking. Make sure your tyres are at the recommended pressure. Use a gear position suitable to road conditions.

Reduce periods of engine idling by switching off the engine when it is safe to do so.

After starting the engine, drive off immediately. Idling causes pollution and excessive fuel consumption.

Depress the accelerator gently to drive away and change to a higher gear in time.

Avoid over-revving the engine unnecessarily.

Ensure your car is properly maintained.

Check the fuel consumption and Co2 emissions label when choosing a new car - your choice will benefit the environment and your pocket.

The way you drive is very important. If you drive aggressively, you will increase your fuel consumption. Try to drive smoothly for a week and see how this affects your fuel consumption and your purse.

DISABILITY AWARENESS

Friedreich's Ataxia

What is Friedreich's Ataxia?

Friedreich's Ataxia is a slowly progressive disorder of the nervous system and muscles. This disability was named after the physician who first identified it in the early 1860's results in inability to co-ordinate voluntary muscle movements (ataxia). Friedreich's Ataxia is caused by degeneration of nerve tissue in the spinal cord and of nerves that extend to peripheral areas such as the arms and legs. It also affects upper and lower limbs, and the head and neck. There is also a particular loss of the sensations of touch and pressure in the arms and legs. Unlike some neurological diseases, Friedreich's Ataxia does not affect mental capacity. This disability usually appears between the ages of five and fifteen, but it can be present as early as eighteen months old. This disability is uncommon and is inherited, it affects both male and females and no race is immune to it.

What are the symptoms of Friedreich's Ataxia?

Some of the symptoms of Friedreich's Ataxia are weakness in the legs, unsteadiness in standing, difficulties in walking, speech disturbance, sensory impairment, and as the disability progresses some people will develop curvature of the spine (this is due to the muscle weakening and the person developing scoliosis). The most serious symptom of this disability is cardiomyopathy, when the muscles of the heart gradually weaken causing irregularities in the heart rhythm.

What is the treatment and long-term prognosis of Friedreich's Ataxia?

Although there is no cure for this disability, many of the symptoms can be treated. Orthopedic treatment can alleviate scoliosis (curvature of the spine), physical therapy and orthopedic appliances can help with walking and standing. And it is important to remember that everyone with this disability is different, and the person may only have several symptoms, making a diagnosis very difficult; there is no way of knowing how fast degeneration will be. People with Friedreich's Ataxia can go onto lead full productive lives.





The following is taken from the address of County Tutor Pat Moore to last weeks very successful county coaching information seminar held in Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan:

COACH EDUCATION

Over the past year we continued to develop our coach education programme thus ensuring that our overall strategy of "delivering a high level of coaching expertise to each unit in the county" remains firmly on course.

The success of the programme is reflected in the fact that all our club units, schools and mentors charged with responsibility for preparing our development squads, schools of excellence and county squads fully acknowledge that a good coaching structure is an essential part of their player, team and games development activities. It is our responsibility as the county coaching and games development committee to ensure that the coaching needs of all units within the county are fully addressed. We acknowledge and appreciate the enthusiasm and energy of all those who drive the coaching issues within the clubs, schools and various squad units.

COACHING OF CORRECT TECHNIQUE OF HURLING **AND FOOTBALL SKILLS**

In 2005 in Waterford we held three pilot projects in the Mt. Sion, Abbeyside and Roanmore clubs. These sessions concentrated solely on the coaching of correct technique in hurling skills. The emphasis on proper technique is most welcome as this area is sometimes neglected in preference to coaching sessions carried out in a frenzied all action manner with a low skills technique input.

GPA GRANT SCHEME

The much publicised campaign to have government grants paid to top GAA players (as is given to players in other sports) was seen to be taken a step further at a meeting of Central Council on Saturday last when GPA secretary, Dessie Farrell spoke at length on a motion which he had before council concerning the application. He outlined that what the GPA wanted to do was to work hand in hand with the GAA in negotiations with the Government on this issue

However, the motion was eventually withdrawn when President elect Nicky Brennan said that as he would be involved when he takes office in 2 months time he would like to know a lot more about what was involved.

Members of the Council also said that they would like to have an opportunity to discuss the matter with their County Boards before voting on such a matter.

At the present the matter could be said to be put on hold but it is certain to reach Government offices sometime during the next few months even if the GAA do not see their way to cooperate.

It is fairly certain that many throughout the Association will see this as pay for play and a departure from the amateur status on which the association is founded. Many people will submit that a change of rule will be needed to allow such a scheme to be implemented. Many of the top players are certain to back the scheme and will press to have it implemented. It is equally certain that many will oppose it.

If our county is to be taken as an example we have 60 players playing senior championships in both codes and the scheme would apply to them. We have at the present approximately 600 players who will not be eligible to benefit from the grant scheme and this could lead to a feeling of discrimination and jealousy among them. Another point that might be made against it is that county team managers (who already have far too much power) will have the right to decide who are eligible for consideration for the benefits of the scheme.

GPA AWARD SCHEME

The GAA's rival organisation have grabbed the headlines once more by announcing that they are to have their own All-Stars. Hurling and Football award schemes. This is going to be quite attractive as there are cash payments proposed for players who make the team. Very many players are certain to go for this scheme, particularly those who have prospects of making the lineout, however, I can see a huge number of players being totally opposed to it for a variety of reasons. I expect to read a lot more about this scheme in the months ahead when the championships gets underway




NO HELP NO LEAGUE
