Banks In Negotiation For O'Connell Street Site

Dungarvan could have another bank by as early as this summer if negotiations with two large multi-national banks succeed.

The Dungarvan Leader has learned that both the Bank of Scotland and Danska Bank, which took over the National

Irish Bank some time ago, are both interested in leasing the former Curran's store on 1, 2 and 3 O'Connell Street.

Developer, Shane Houlihan, the owner of the building, applied for planning permission for a change in use of the premises from retail to Class 2, a bank, last week.

Permission is also being sought for an ATM machine on the O'Connell Street side of the building.

Discussions with the banks are thought to be suspended until planning permission is secured.

Mr. Houlihan, who has held

€3 Million Upgrade Of Grattan Square

Grattan Square's 200th anniversary is to be marked by a 3 million euros upgrade, it has emerged.

Council architects, Murray O Laoire, have drawn up exten-

sive plans for the redevelopment of the square, work on which, if all goes to plan, is set to begin next January.

The architects are planning to alter traffic flow to the edge of the square, extend the pavement space outside the shops, create a 30 metre pedestrianised central space, invigorate the Thursday market as well as invigorating community and social life.

Controversially, the plans will also see the number of parking spaces being slashed to just twenty-nine.

PROPOSALS

The proposals, discussed in committee earlier this month, came ahead of a meeting between business interests and senior officials from Dungarvan Town Council.

A spokesperson for the town

council confirmed that discussions took place on Tuesday evening (yesterday). The plans will now go back for further discussion and adoption at the May meeting of the council.

The council said changes to the plan may be made following yesterday's talks. The businesses on Gratten Square are said to be particularly concerned over the reduction in the number of parking spaces.

WELCOMED

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Labour councillor, Billy Kyne welcomed the plans, and moved to quash fears that the redevelopment would be seen as overly advantageous for the Thursday market.

He said the market is mentioned in three pages of the architects plans, which he said

may draw negative comments from some businesses – who are already thought to be critical of the times the market operates.

He said the plans allow for a much more vibrant social amenity and safeguards the viability of the square and improves its social fabric. The plans would also stimulate public debate in focusing on a permanent focal piece – although he called for a mechanism that would enable the council to vary it in the future.

PEDESTRIAN ZONE

One of the most radical aspects of the plans will see 71% of the space in the square dedicated to pedestrian use, as against 18% at the moment.

The 30 metre central pedestrian island will be reserved for

prepare an art portfolio which is their third level entry requirement. In recent years students have been successful with applications to the National College of Art and Design (Dublin), Waterford Institute of Technology, Crawford College of Art (Cork) and Limerick School of Art.

Radical Overhaul Of Former Ormonde Hotel

A radical overhaul of the former Ormonde Hotel on O'Connell Street has been granted planning permission by Dungarvan Town Council.

Richard Kavanagh, of Saturnview Ltd, Waterford, plans to construct a mixture of retail, pub, apartments and townhouses at the site.

As part of the plans, he is proposing to demolish 69 O'Connell Street and the rear of the building, facing onto Western Terrace.

He is proposing to construct a new four-storey development in its place. Included is a new shopfront and retail unit and the construction of apartments over the existing pub at No.70 O'Connell Street. An over-retail unit at 69 O'Connell Street with south facing balconies which will overlook a landscaped courtyard is also included in the planning permission which was received this month.

The developers also plan to construct three townhouses on Western Terrace with west facing balconies overlooking the courtyard. Car parking would be provided at ground floor to the rear of the development.

The plans were welcomed by a number of councillors at the April meeting of the Town Council.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said the same developers had built high standard developments in other areas and he expected the same high quality work at the Ormonde.

Cllr. Teresa Wright, of Labour, said she was delighted the plans were going through. It would "take the dirty look" off the now vacant building, she added.

Jenny Murphy Brings All-Ireland Title To The Deise

Dungarvan No Name Club secured its first ever National Title on Saturday night last when club member Jenny Murphy was declared the 2006 National Youth Award Winner of the Hostess of the Year Competition. Jenny won the title despite strong competition from the other Finalist Hostesses who represented New Ross (Co. Wexford), Claremorris (Co. Mayo) and Gort (Co. Galway). Last February Jenny came through the Dungarvan Club's selection process and in March she won the Munster leg of this prestigious competition. Last Saturday's event was held in the west County Hotel in Ennis, Co. Clare and took place in front of almost 1,000 No Name Club members from all over Ireland.

Jenny is a Leaving Cert student at Ard Scoil na nDeise. Jenny excelled at all stages of the process particularly during the Public interview which was done live on stage with TV presenter Sile Seoige. Jenny brought the house down with an incredible performance when she danced to the old Peggy Lee number "Fever".

The National Youth Award is the premier honour, which is awarded to a member of the No Name Club. Each year just one Male Junior Leader (Host) and one Female Junior Leader (Hostess) win this title. In the 28-year history of the event no Waterford person has previously won the title. As well as the title Jenny's win brought her a lovely Waterford Crystal trophy, a Commendation Certificate and very importantly a financial prize in the form of a bursary which she will receive upon starting 3rd level education.

The Dungarvan Club was singularly honoured this year in having a member qualify in both the Host and Hostess categories. St. Augustine's College student Brendan Walsh from Abbeyside also qualified for the Final. Brendan performed magnificently in the qualifying rounds and in the Final. The title eventually went to Kilkenny Host Richard Ryan.

Over eighty enthusiastic Dungarvan Club members who had travelled to Ennis in support cheered on Jenny and Brendan. Jenny and Brendan had travelled to Ennis the night before for the lengthy formal interview and familiarisation sessions. The judges for the event were Liz Howard, newly elected President of the National Camogie Association; Inspector Paul Moran, Head of the JLO Service, Garda Siochana and Peter Fay, past winner of the Host of the Year.

All the Dungarvan members enjoyed the occasion immensely. The event was formal dress wear and the style was amazing all round. After enjoying the event and particularly Jenny and Brendan's performance the whole group along with over 650 others over-nighted in nearby St. Flannan's College. The partying and celebrations went on all night. The happy group returned to Dungarvan on Sunday, weary but delighted with their success. Dungarvan No Name Club now sets its sights on the National Variety Award. They have qualified for the Final in this Talent Competition also. On Saturday, May 13th the Final will take place in the University Concert Hall, Limerick. Can they bring further honours to the Deise?

Watershed for Tourism in Waterford

The Tourism Industry Consultation Day at Tramore Racecourse (12 April) was a watershed for the tourism industry in Waterford bringing together public and private sector tourism representatives from across the City and County. The event hosted by the Visit-Net Tourism Project Office, Waterford County Council provided a platform for consultation regarding challenges and a focus on Actions required to shape the Tourism Agenda in Waterford and provide a future direction for the industry.

The preliminary findings of the Waterford Tourism Product Audit and Destination Marketing research, commissioned by Visit-Net, were presented by the Tourism Research Centre, Dublin Institute of Technology.

The specific Objectives of the Research:

- To research and produce a comprehensive Audit of all tourism product/assets in the county, including a review of existing research to identify product gaps and opportunities.
 - To identify strengths and weaknesses in the tourism product offering and identify opportunities.
 - To assess the relevance and awareness of Waterford's current brand, indicating whether the brand needs repositioning, revitalising or total rethinking.
 - To match the Waterford product offer with market segment profiles to identify 'best prospects' and direction for brand development.
 - To review existing structures and assess potential need for new structures to aid/support the trade and delivery of the Waterford brand effectively.

the trade participated in an open forum which tackled issues including Access & Infrastructure, Product Development and Tourism Supports & Structures.

Overall in terms of key attributes of the tourism product in County Waterford it is believed Waterford offers as good a product as anywhere else in the Country however, it was agreed that a greater awareness needs to be created. There was a call

for less duplication and more pooling of resources to market Waterford as a primary destination, rather than relying on passing traffic on route to either Rosslare Europort or the West. The proximity of Waterford City (Ireland's oldest city) to a variety of the natural amenities - mountains, coast and a plethora of outdoor activities and things to see and do across the County was highlighted.

Dungarvan in the West should also take advantage of its position in terms of access from Cork Airport. "Waterford needs to be sold at these airports", commented Teresa O'Connor Chairperson, Dungarvan & West Waterford Tourism "there is no focussed effort at the moment, there is also a need for more advertising and signage on N25 in order to exploit the strengths of the Rosslare-Cork corridor to keep tourists in the county".

There followed a stimulating

presentation by Mr Alex Gibson, Head of Department of Tourism, DIT on Destination Branding, challenging perceptions on what defines an effective brand. Richard Hurley, Granville Hotel commended the research and agreed there was a need for further research to better understand how Waterford is perceived by our visitors and what our customers want. There was a considerable unanimity from the floor for the need to adopt an umbrella brand to sell the City and County - an elective group of 10 individuals participated in a dedicated focus group on branding following the session.

An outline program for the research can be found on www.visit-net.com and further industry feedback is sought via online questionnaire from the site. Final findings and analysis will be concluded and available mid-May.

Comhlucht Forbartha na nDéise (Déise Development Company) was set up last year to bring forward projects and proposals for the development of the social, cultural and economic life of the Gaeltacht. The board of the company consists of representatives from Comhairle Pobail na Rinne, Coiste Forbartha an tSean Phobail, as well as Waterford Co. Council's Irish Officer. The Company works in conjunction with the local Community Facilitator, Lorcán Ó Muirí, who was appointed almost a year ago. Lorcán has an office at the back of Halla Pobail na Rinne, and is available in the Údarás na Gaeltachta offices in An Sean Phobal on a regular basis.

Lorcán's first job was to put together a three-year social development plan for the area, covering social, economic and cultural development. The plan is nearing completion and these are some of the main proposals to emerge so far:

- Develop childcare facilities in the area.
- The need for a Language Facilitator for the area.
- Improve the supply and quality of drinking water.
- Development and protection of the natural amenities of the area.
- Develop more activities for young people.
- Sourcing of high quality jobs for the area, preferably Irish language based.
- Establish a language support centre to consolidate Gaeltacht status and to increase everyday use of the language.
- Support for target groups of people, such as young parents, unemployed or those with special needs.
- Support for existing youth, sports and recreational clubs.

A copy of the draft plan may be obtained from the library in Dungarvan, Oifig an Údarás in An Sean Phobal, the office in Halla Pobail na Rinne, on CD from Lorcán or from the website www.deise.ie. SUCCESSFUL STUDYING

With just a few weeks to go until exams get underway, the pressure is on for students everywhere. For some people, anxiety about impending exams provides great motivation and focus for revision, but for others it can become a vicious cycle which seriously undermines any efforts to study. They are particularly suitable for students because they also increase energy levels and stamina and help to improve mental performance.

If you are suffering from anxiety or insomnia due to exam pressure, relaxant and sedative herbs such as skullcap and valerian can help to calm things down. While you are studying, burn some lavender oil keep you calm, or place a few drops on your pillow to aid restful sleep.

Of course it is important to stay as healthy as possible during such a challenging time. Get some fresh air and exercise every day as this will increase the blood supply to the brain and liter-

ally help to clear your head. It may seem difficult to find the time to go for a walk when there is so much to do, but you will study more efficiently afterwards. Likewise, try to get to bed at a reasonable time as studying when you are overtired is not usually very productive.

It is also important to eat regularly and have healthy snacks between meals to maintain stable blood sugar levels. Skipping meals and eating sweets causes low blood sugar levels which can lead to memory loss. Avoid junk food and eat a healthy diet which includes plenty of oily fish such as mackerel, salmon and tuna. These contain Essential Fatty Acids which are vital for proper brain function and have been proven to help with learning. Essential Fatty Acids can also be taken in the form of a supplement such as EyeQ or MorEPA. Another useful supplement for students is Vitamin B complex which nourishes the nervous system and increases resistance to stress.

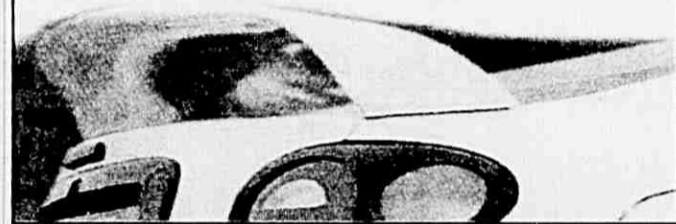

THE ANIMAL KINGDOM

The animal kingdom contains over a million species - ranging in size from microscopic organisms right up to the massive blue whale. Animals can be classified into vertebrates (those with a spine) and invertebrates (those without). There are five main classes of vertebrates - there are the fishes, then come the amphibians, reptiles, birds and the more advanced mammals, which include humans. Animals are found all over the world. They have had to adapt to local conditions and food supplies, so creatures in the same family often have special characteristics suited to their environment and way of life.

The Tallest Animals

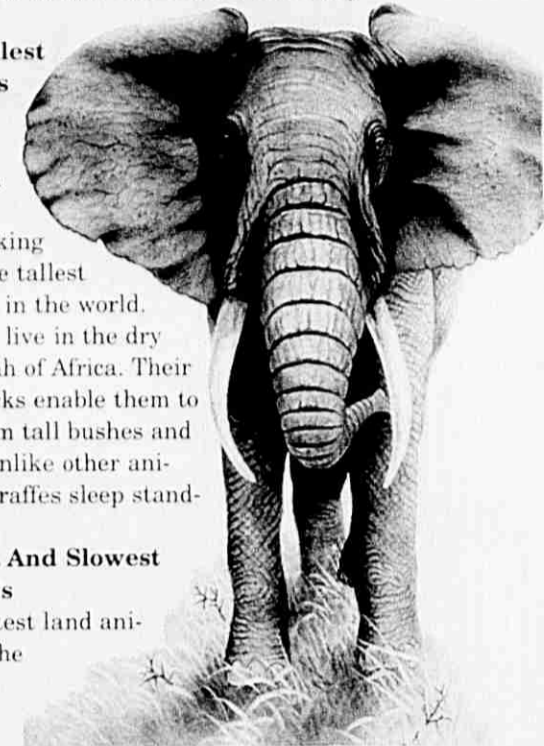
Giraffes can be from 5m (16.5ft) tall, making them the tallest animals in the world. Giraffes live in the dry savannah of Africa. Their long necks enable them to feed from tall bushes and trees. Unlike other animals, giraffes sleep standing up.

Fastest And Slowest Animals

The fastest land animal is the cheetah which can run at 101kph (63mph) for short level distances of up to 500m (1640ft). Over a longer distance the prohorn antelope, on the plains of Mexico and North America, can really travel - it can keep up a speed of 56kph (35mph) over a distance of 6km (4mi). At the other end of the speed scale is the three toed sloth, which takes a whole minute to cover 2m (6.5ft). That is actually slower than an ordinary snail! There are five species of sloth, all of which live in the rainforests of South and Central America. They live in trees and spend much of their time hanging upside down doing absolutely nothing. They can even sleep upside down.

The Largest Land Animal

The largest animal in the world is the blue whale. But the largest land animal is the African bush elephant. This huge beast averages 3m (10ft) in height at the shoulder and weighs 5 tonnes. Compare that with Savi's white-toothed pygmy shrew which weighs a mere 2g (1/10oz)!

- The peculiar-looking armadillo is the only member of the order of mammals called tubulidentata. ★
- The duck-billed platypus and the echidna are the only two mammals that lay eggs. ★
- In the Swiss Alps, stone chests from 100,000 years ago have been found containing the carefully arranged bones of cave bears. ★
- The Roman emperor Octavius Augustus kept 420 tigers, 260 lions and one rhinoceros. The rhinoceros must have been rather lonely. ★
- Zoo's of exotic animals were kept in the 13th century by English kings and queen in the Tower of London, and by the Kubla Khan (the emperor) in China.

Stress, Stress and More Stress

More and more people are contacting me about stress. My name is Michael Fitzgerald I am a Counsellor and a Life & Business Coach. Ireland was once known for its laid back culture, in fact we were proud of it! Today people often have more than one job, we also live in a country where, for the first time, people can be what they want to be and move upwards in their career paths. Often the first question we now ask a stranger is "so what do you do?" as if this will explain who they are.

The success of the 'Celtic Tiger' has left us all wanting more. More money, more prestige in work, bigger houses, bigger cars and yet we also want to spend time with loved ones, holidays of enormous proportions, house extensions etc.etc. Even schoolchildren are under tremendous pressure to know exactly what they will do with the next fifty or so years of their working lives. The result: stress is fast becoming a way of life. As life gets faster, not only in Ireland but throughout the world, everyone is subject to stress, regardless of age, social status or intellectual ability. Stress knows no barriers. The worst thing is, we don't even know we have succumbed to the pressure until we are unwell.

The medical profession has found there are more people suffering from stress than the common cold. Many diseases may be caused by stress, and even more may be aggravated by stress. One only has to consider skin diseases, heart problems, arthritic conditions, digestive problems, insomnia, migraine and allergies to see the medical conditions caused by stress. Equally, mental disorder such as depression, phobias and sexual problems, can arise from stress.

What can we do to survive stress? Why are some individuals affected and others not? Why do some people get road rage and others can drive calmly? Why do some people get completely frustrated, only then to return home to take stress out on loved ones?

The solution is, as all solutions are; easy to say and hard to do! Stress affects different people in different ways. Everyone is unique and has their own particular way of seeing the world and dealing with stress. In this individual perspective lies both the difficulty and the solution. We approach life with a way of thinking, a *modus operandi* a way of behaving that is uniquely ours. The *modus operandi* is what needs to change! Permanently! For example if you are feeling 'road rage', you must first realise you cannot control someone else's actions, only your own reactions. Once you realise this you have a choice, you can continue to be angry, or you can sit back and enjoy the spin! Of course all of this is obvious but changing is difficult to do alone. Find someone you trust that has patience and partner with them, set some goals. Find out what event brings on the stress, then change the thinking around dealing with that event, examine the *modus operandi*, make the change. Use your leisure time to walk beaches or woods, go swimming, dust off the old bike, take time to enjoy life. Allow the other person to help you keep your goals. The key to stress management is 'catch it early, not too late'.

Waterford VEC, the main provider of adult education in the county, and REGSA who offer a free and confidential educational and career guidance service to adults in both the city and county.

Visitors to the fair will have the opportunity to meet with representatives from education and training organisations such as Co. Waterford VEC, City of Waterford VEC, Waterford Institute of Technology, Waterford College of Further Education and Fáilte Ireland. The representatives will gladly discuss queries relating to personal educational/career needs, course/programmes available, financial aid, and much more, either on the day or at a later date, depending on the preference of the prospective adult learner.

Visitors will also have the chance to attend short informative talks by local adult education and training providers. cial Care, Nursing and Child-care. Other topics to be covered include funding supports and grant-aid available for adults returning to education.

Speaking at the launch of the fair Mary Walsh, Adult Education Officer, Co. Waterford VEC said, "We are delighted to be working in partnership with REGSA in organising this exciting event and generally working to promote a culture of lifelong learning in the County of Waterford."

The idea for the fair arose out of an identified need for an increased awareness of adult education opportunities. Adult education courses are available at a range of levels to suit learner needs and often have no spe-

cific entry requirements. "A lot of people in the county are not aware of course options or entitlements..." the Adult Education Officer explained. "For example, those on Social Welfare may not be aware of their continued entitlement to benefit if undertaking some return to education programmes." Peter Lucey of REGSA also added that, "Many adults are not aware of grants available for PLC courses and other programmes."

The fair is open to all adults who may be considering further education as an avenue to improving or developing their personal and/or professional life. It is particularly aimed at those who feel they may have missed out on educational opportuni-

60% Of Dungarvan Householders Paying Flat Charge

Sixty percent of householders in Dungarvan have now paid the controversial annual flat rate charge, town clerk, Joe O'Flaherty told the April meeting of Dungarvan Town Council.

Now the search is on to find out how the remaining forty percent of householders dispose of their waste.

Replying to questions from Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, Mr. O'Flaherty said collections for those who have not yet paid the charge have stopped.

While saying he was pleased with the number of householders who have paid up, he said they must now find out "how those who have not paid the flat charge yet, are disposing of their rubbish. We need to find out how many are using (the private service) Mr. Bin Man, and how others are disposing of their waste."

Cllr. Kyne said this year will be the hardest to get over in terms of paying the flat charge. He hoped the council would be able to "get over this year," and they would be able to continue with a local authority service next year.

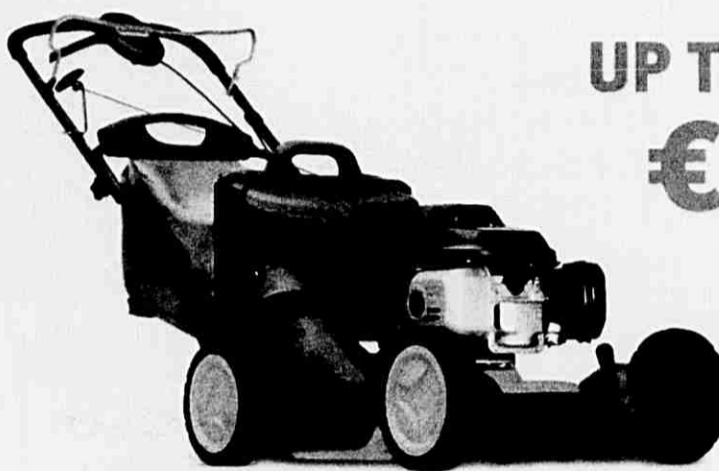

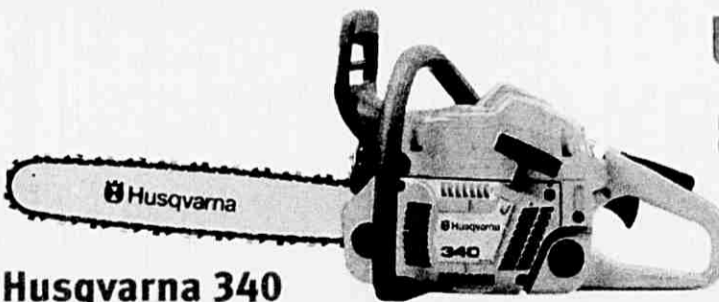

Dear Sir,

On behalf of the County Waterford Social, Benevolent and Patriotic Association of New York I wish to thank the delegation of councillors, the County Waterford Mayor and Manager for accepting our invitation to participate in the Saint Patrick's Day activities. Founded near the end of the 19th century and incorporated in 1902, we have struggled valiantly to keep the name of Waterford to the forefront in New York and U.S. affairs. We have sponsored Waterford teams in both hurling and football since the 1930's, found jobs and accommodation for young men and women in the heavy emigration years and represented our county in the biggest St Patrick's Day Parade in the world. We did again this year in the 245th year of the parade. Like every other county who welcome elected representatives from Ireland, we are proud to receive them, proud that they're coming not as emigrants but as emissaries to talk up their county, tell of the investment opportunities and meet with any and all interested. LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

On behalf of the County Waterford Social, Benevolent and Patriotic Association of New York I wish to thank the delegation of councillors, the County Waterford Mayor and Manager for accepting our invitation to participate in the Saint Patrick's Day activities. Founded near the end of the 19th century and incorporated in 1902, we have struggled valiantly to keep the name of Waterford to the forefront in New York and U.S. affairs. We have sponsored Waterford teams in both hurling and football since the 1930's, found jobs and accommodation for young men and women in the heavy emigration years and represented our county in the biggest St Patrick's Day Parade in the world. We did again this year in the 245th year of the parade. Like every other county who welcome elected representatives from Ireland, we are proud to receive them, proud that they're coming not as emigrants but as emissaries to talk up their county, tell of the investment opportunities and meet with any and all interested. Unfortunately, the time is much too short. Allowing two days for travel, they have no more than three days here which circumscribes opportunities. American companies in Ireland employ approx. 9,000. Irish companies in America employ approx. 5,500. So it's not just a case of investing in Ireland but also investing in the U.S. and the resultant benefits to the Irish company and the Irish economy.

We've read and heard of the criticism leveled at these elected representatives. But counties as well as countries are competing for investment. All the counties send representatives here. I can only say that I and the members I represent appreciate their presence here. Maybe it's a giveback for the sacrifices made and the money sent back by all those emigrants down through the ages who never forgot where they came from, and who came from every parish in Waterford. What family wasn't touched by emigration.

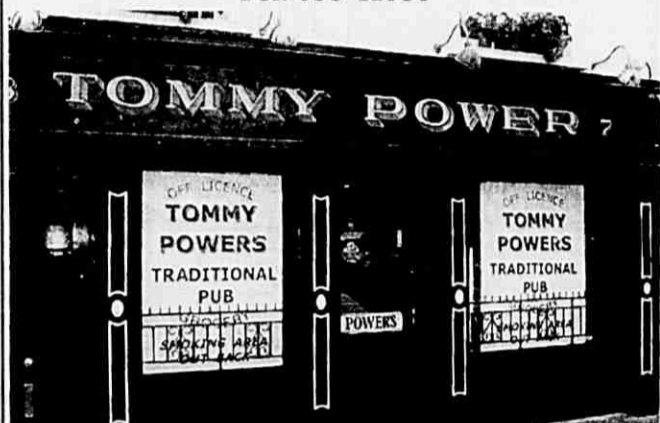

He was to the fore-front in advising his clients on Financial Management on their farms and was one of the first advisors to use computer programmes as a Financial Management tool. His knowledge of Tillage and producing good quality, high yielding crops was renowned - but most of all John O'Brien will be remembered for his un-stinting commitment to his work and to the excellent rapport which he enjoyed with his clients and colleagues alike. Sympathy from all his colleagues in Teagasc Co. Waterford is extended to his wife Maureen and to his daughter Aideen and son David. May he rest in Peace.

TAKE CONTROL OF YOUR GRASS TO GET THE EXTRA KILOS

Over the past few weeks as we assisted farmers in completing the 2006 Single Payment Application comments of drystock farmers included the following, "only for the Single Payment there wouldn't be a bob in cattle" or "do you know when I did the sums for last year I didn't even hold on to all the Single Payment". And these were genuine comments with which a lot of farmers would agree. Well I will highlight a few pointers which might help in not only holding on to all the Single Payment but actually add on a few "bob" to the E.U. Payment.

The Extra 50 Kg: Between now and October there can be up to 50 or 60kgs difference in the weight cattle put on. Getting this extra weight will make a huge difference to the bottom line. And it is all about quality grass. Everybody will have excellent weight gain between now and late May. Grass quality is excellent and 1 kg per day or even higher weight gains are the norm. But it is quite difficult to keep the quality as we move into June/July. Grass may be scarce now for quite a few farmers but when a flush of growth arrives and not enough mouths to consume it - quality is the casualty.

Grass Difficult to Manage: Of all the crops we grow grass is the most difficult to manage. This is because of its tendency to go to seed and become stemmy from mid May onwards. To prevent this happening a farmer needs to be in control and this means having not less than four to six fields or paddocks per grazing group. Six to eight would be better still. The more divisions per group of stock the more control you exercise over grass growth and quality. Temporary divisions are just as good as permanent fences.

In times of abundant grass growth which happen in May, surpluses can arise and grass supply can get out of control. Extra divisions allows for areas to be taken out either with a main crop of silage or as round bales. When grass supply is tight the extra divisions work very much in your favour also. When stock spend too long in one grazing division they can start to eat the regrowths. Regrowths are the key to growing extra grass. Once a grass plant is grazed regrowths appear within 3-4 days. If these are grazed again on day 5 it can be 10-12 days before they appear again.

Keep Down Group Numbers: Too many groups of cattle are the big enemy of managing grass on drystock farms. If there are too many groups then it will be impossible to have the required number of fields/paddocks per group. Where there are a lot of different groups of stock - the tendency is to have small numbers in each group. By keeping the number of grazing groups to a minimum it is easier then to have more divisions per group. Many farmers graze bullocks and heifers together. If grazing both sheep and cattle together - grass quality benefits and it will also help in reducing the numbers of groups of stock.

The Teagasc Advice is that a group of stock should in and out of a field in 3-4 days - five days should be the maximum.

Rotation Length: In May/June period a rotation length of 20-21 days is about right. At this time of year grass is growing fast and if not grazed bare it loses its quality as more stem develops.

Back to Basics: Our lawns never get stemmy, never go to seed. Always leafy. The reason, they are cut short every week or two. We will never keep our grazing swards up to the quality of lawns. But a few principles should guide our grassland management.

(1) If a sward has not been grazed tight (down to 2") when stock move on then that field will have deteriorated by the next grazing (unless topped). And the more lax the grazing then the more stemmy the sward will get. Unless remedial action is taken the quality will remain poor for the rest of the year.

Many farmers get sucklers to clean out any grass left behind by cattle. This is a good practice as cattle have far greater need for quality grass.

Message 1. In the drive for quality, grass swards must be grazed well - or if not - topped. But even with good tight grazing - most swards will benefit from a topping once a year to get rid of tall grass around dung pads etc.

Message 2. Taking out a few acres from the grazing cycle for cutting can work wonders for grass quality. In May an odd paddock or field will inevitably get too strong. It will take extra time in this field to get it grazed. So by the time you arrive in the next field/paddock it is also gone strong. And the vicious circle goes on and on. The best strategy if grass is getting strong when stock enter each grazing block is to pull out a field or paddock for either baling or cutting with the main cut.

Message 3. The calendar is a very good guide on grass quality. In very good growing conditions if the rotation is more than 20 - 22 days, grass is getting stemmy when you return. And this assumes it was grazed tight in the previous rotation.

Message 4. It is much easier to maintain grass quality if you have 5 or 6 divisions per group. This will be impossible if there are too many groups of stock. So try to have as few groups as possible and have 5 - 6 paddocks per group.

Message 5. At this time of year during a good spell of growth grass supply can change quickly for shortage to surplus. It is essential to walk your grassland every few days. You will then be in a better position to make the right decisions about applying Nitrogen, taking out a few acres etc.

IFA Says Dog Owners Must Control Their Pets

Waterford IFA Sheep Chairman Edward Morrissey has said sheep flocks are extremely vulnerable from dog attacks at this time of year.

"There are up to 7.5 million ewes and lambs on 35,000 sheep farms across the country, with most flocks having just come through the critically important lambing period. A dog attack on a sheep flock at this time can inflict immense damage in terms of both the animal welfare and financial conse-

quences."

Mr. Morrissey said all dog owners must ensure that their pets are under full control at all times and not allowed roam freely in the countryside where they can inflict horrific damage on a sheep flock.

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers' leader said dog owners must be particularly vigilant in ensuring that their pets are securely housed at night. Dog attacks from a number of dogs hunting together at night is an

all too common feature in the countryside at this time of the year. Mr. Morrissey said he was particularly concerned about reports from farms and some dog wardens regarding the high number of incidences of dog attacks on sheep flocks in certain parts of the country.

Calling on all dog owners to ensure that their animals are under full control at all times and particularly at night, Edward Morrissey said dog owners should be aware of the fact

that under the 'Control of Dogs Act', they can be held liable for the financial damage inflicted on a sheep flock from an attack by their dog.

In addition, Mr. Morrissey said under the law it is a defence for farmers to shoot marauding dogs threatening their flocks. He said the real responsibility on marauding dogs rests with the dog owners and it is their clear responsibility to ensure that their dogs are under control at all times.

CO. WATERFORD BEEKEEPERS' ASSOCIATION NOTES

To establish that Spring was finally here we had the first of our apiary visits on Saturday. You will remember that our first visit was scheduled to be at Alice's a fortnight earlier, but bad weather determined that that was not going to happen simply because the opening of hives was not on. In our preparations we had not taken into account that Munster would still be in The Heineken Cup and that they would be playing on Sunday 23 April at Lansdown Road against Leinster. That called for a Saturday fixture for beekeeping instead, as such a clash of interests was to be avoided at all costs. The attendance was not overwhelming as only Gwen and Christine turned up but what we lacked in numbers we made up for in enthusiasm. They task for the day was to monitor eight hives and, if possible, to find eight queens and mark them all. As all of you will know the weather has not been warm enough up until now to expose brood frames to the chill conditions, so this operation had been postponed from those April balmy days when the bee population would have been low. As it was on Saturday

the hives were overflowing with bees and most of them needed "supering" though a single queen was caught and marked. With the exception of a single hive, heavy with stores from winter but relatively empty of bees and of another just hived from a nucleus box a week ago, the hives were booming. In answer to Christine's question as to how I intend to prevent swarming I said that I didn't consider the threat to be so great this year as five of the hives have young queens from last year. They shall be given lots of space, a few nucs will be made up and hopefully this and close monitoring will take care of matters. This is the first Spring that my bees have had ideal conditions in their polystyrene hives (without being moved) and they certainly look well.

Weatherwise we are in for a good, dry and fairly warm week according to Met Eireann. A good week at this time of year with sycamore, chestnut and other trees about to flower can be very yielding and the taste of Spring blossom honey is just wonderful. It does not require many trees to provide a crop

and the value of a single large sycamore within foraging distance of bees is immense. The blossom on the laurel this year is magnificent and perhaps the bees can use it. Although I have not actually seen bees on the laurel I did notice that bees were returning with very light-coloured pollen which might well have been laurel. As I have mentioned before in these pages the study of pollen sources is a specialised skill of observation and recognition and a colour chart at hand would come in useful (for those of us still learning). Reports from the eastern part of the county tell me that there are sizeable crops of oil-seed rape in bloom already there, (which would indicate that farmers are sowing winter rather than spring seed) and apart from providing a wonderful splash of colour in Spring they also provide a good foraging crop for bees. Personally I would not be keen to have rape seed at this time as it prevents bees from working the sources mentioned above. When rape seed is in blossom one can forget about anything else in the

vicinity....the bees certainly do.

I have in front of me our Spring Newsletter. Our next apiary visit is to Tony Murray inn Carrigroe on Sunday 7th. May, starting at around 2 p.m. For those who do not know where Carrigroe is, here are some simple directions. On leaving Dungarvan on the Cappaquinn road turn left at Ballinamuch at Power's Guesthouse and drive towards Aghish. After a few miles you will come to a national school and after this take the next lane on the left. If at this point you are still lost ring for help. You may wish to check with Tony beforehand at 058-43689. We look forward to seeing a good gathering there. I would say his to all members: it is a great idea to have some of your colleagues around to go through your hives with you as there are always more ways of skinning a cat than you had thought of. So let's hope the weather Gods are on our side for these dates in May - the 7th. at Tony's and a fortnight later at Tony Lawlor's in Clashmore. Directions will be announced.

Late Bill Sheehan



The Old Boro was greatly saddened on Tuesday, 11th April when it learned the sad news from Waterford Regional Hospital of the passing of Bill Sheehan, 48, Caseyville.

A member of one of the towns most respected families, Bill was a familiar face who was a wonderful neighbour, loyal friend and a man among men. To have known Bill is much to be grateful for, his loss and absence to us has made us all the poorer.

Aged 83 years and a native of Lord George's, Bill was educated at the local CBS, took up employment at the local Leather Factory which in those times was the lifeline of the town. Like many of his peers, Bill gave sterling service, worked long hours and took an immense pride in his work. Many a friendship was made on the tannery floor, friendships that have stood the test of time, sadly many of that dedicated band of workers taken

their earthly leave. Once again another chink in the chain of our childhood has been severed. For over four decades Bill walked through the factory doors and gave of his best, honoured with an inscribed gold watch for his service, the closure of the Leather Factory saw Bill enter the stage of retirement. He served in the Irish Army for six years, later the F.C.A. and also was a member of ONE. He was decorated for his efforts by the Defence Forces.

He loved all sports, could throw the rings and darts with admirable accuracy, enjoyed snooker but it was in the ring that Bill Sheehan reigned supreme. A skilled boxer, whose heroics have been spoken and commented upon, Bill was proud of his boxing exploits and that of his family and neighbours, after all Caseyville where Bill and Mary became one of its first inhabitants became known as "The Street of Champions". He was one of the guiding lights in the formation of Dungarvan Boxing Club. He liked to cycle and to go on long walks some years ago.

A man steeped in tradition, he was a true blue. He loved Dungarvan, its characters, people and its history. He could recall incidents from the past and was a mine of information regarding local lore. Bill will be missed, not just by his wife and family but indeed by a much wider community. A man of the old values and traditions, he loved his God and attended to his religious duties with fervour and devotion. Bill also in this time was asked to shoulder the cross of bereavement with the passing of his daughter

Nuala in 1976, son Des who died in very tender years and in November 2004 with the passing of son Alan.

MARGARET RADLEY (nee Calnan)



It was with feelings of profound sadness and loss that the community learned of the untimely death of Mrs. Margaret Radley of Glandore House, 23 Church Street, Dungarvan, who passed peacefully to her eternal reward at the Bons Secours Hospital, Cork on Friday 7th April 2006.

A lady of outstanding character and poise, Margaret was a member of one of Dungarvan's best known and most respected families. A devoted wife, an adoring mother, and an irreplaceable sister, colleague, teacher, neighbour and friend, Margaret's life was one of constant and unflinching contribution to her family, to her work and to her community.

A native of Glandore, West Cork, Margaret was the youngest of six children born to Timothy and Margaret Calnan. Having completed her secondary education she journeyed across the county to UCC where she attained her B.A. and H.Dip. Ed. qualifications to become a secondary school teacher. During her Summer breaks, Margaret would make the long trip to America, the country which was to become a permanent residence for each of her siblings. There she would spend the Summer working, travelling and earning pocket money for the following college year. In the 1960s this was indeed a brave and unusual adventure for any young girl but it was to be the beginning of Margaret's life-long love of travel, sight-seeing, and international trade, fashion and style. Moreover however it was indicative of Margaret's constant yearning for furtherance of her own development and improvement of her understanding of and communication with people from all walks of life and backgrounds.

It was also at this time, during her university years, that a mutual friend introduced Margaret to a young Millstreet man by the name of Denis Radley. The courtship which ensued in the following few years was to be the beginning of a loving, devoted and eternally supportive partnership. Following her graduation Margaret taught for a period in Skibereen, and shortly afterwards she and Denis married in Glandore in 1973, subsequently moved to Dungarvan and later became proud parents to two daughters, Angela and Denise. As a wonderful and committed wife and mother, Margaret excelled. She loved and cared for her home, her family and its values in an inimitable way. She, along with Denis succeeded in instilling and nurturing the fundamental gifts of compassion, kindness,

honesty, faith and self-belief in their two girls and it was of this, above all else, that Margaret was most proud.

An inherently private and dignified woman Margaret was impeccable in her presentation and decorum and the manner in which she ran her home. She had a unique ability to undertake the most routine of daily chores with genuine enjoyment, contentment and energy. She lived and loved life to its capacity and was passionate about all things from the trivialities of shopping to the magnitude of the current and political affairs arena, and without fail she would read her beloved Examiner, daily, from cover to cover. Her roots were always close to her heart and she loved dearly returning to Glandore to visit family and friends.

This passion and enthusiasm with which Margaret lived her life was nowhere more evident than in her workplace. She began teaching in the Presentation Secondary school in Dungarvan in 1973 and in 1990 moved with her colleagues to the amalgamated Ard Scoil na nDeise from which she retired in September 2005. Her enormous love for her career was known by all. She embraced it as a vocation and never ceased to bring out the very best in her students, often going above and beyond the call of duty to assist them in every area of their development. As a teacher, as a guide, as a confidante, and as a colleague she had no equal. Her work did not stop at the sound of the daily bell. From arranging school tours for students and for staff, to being involved in a vast array of extra-curricular activities, she always took the time to keep a close track of her students long after they had completed their secondary education. 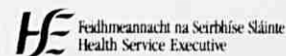

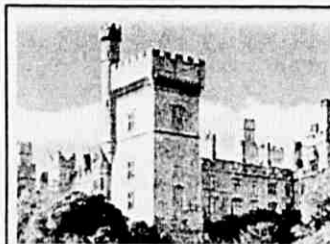

What a day was had by the members of the Comeragh Community Development Group this Easter Monday. The sun shone and with it the community spirit around the Comeraghs was out in full force.

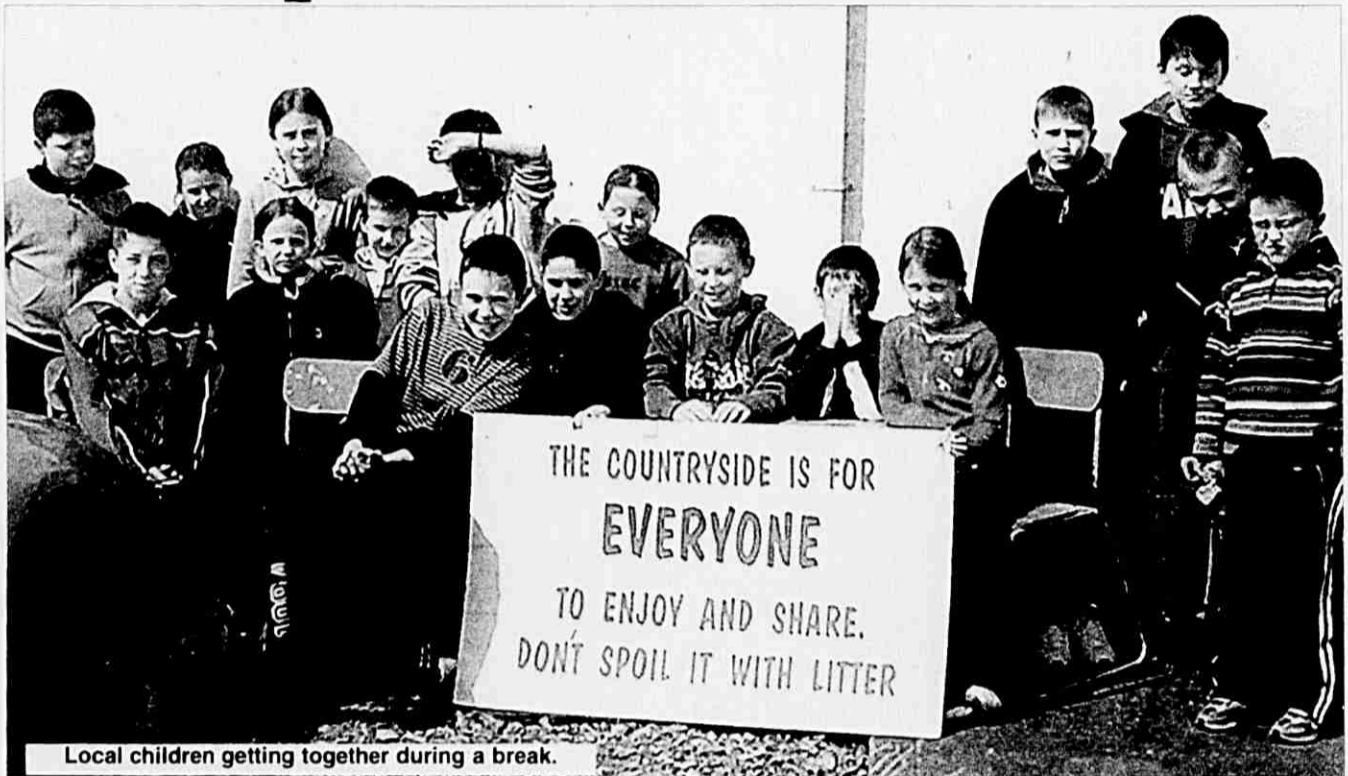

COOKERY CORNER

Fill Them Up With Our Fantastic, Fishy Feast

CREATE a fishy feast with a classic tartare sauce.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4
- Salt and pepper
- Flour, for dusting
- 175-225g cod fillets, skin left on
- 1-2 x 15ml sp oil
- 1/2 onion, chopped
- 2 x 15ml sp capers, chopped
- 2 x 15ml sp gherkins, chopped
- 150ml white wine
- 150ml vegetable or fish stock
- 175-200ml double cream
- 1/2 x 5ml sp Dijon mustard
- 1 x 15ml sp chopped fresh dill
- 1 x 15ml sp chopped fresh parsley, optional
- Juice of 1/2 lemon

Method:

Season and lightly flour the cod. Heat the oil in a frying pan. Place the cod skin-side up in the pan and fry on a medium heat for four to five minutes, until the fish is golden brown. Turn over and fry the skin side for a further four to five minutes until the fish is firm to the touch. Put to one side and keep warm.

For the sauce, put the onion, capers, gherkins and wine in a pan and boil until reduced by three-quarters. Add the stock to the pan and reduce by half. Add the cream, mustard, dill and parsley, if using.

Bring to the boil, simmer for two to three minutes. Add lemon juice and season with salt and pepper to taste.

To serve, place the fish on top of mashed or boiled pota-



toes and pour the sauce over the cod. Any green vegetables will go well with this dish. You can also serve this dish with chipped or sautéed potatoes. The sauce can be made in advance and reheated before serving.

Authentic Italian Baked Peppers

THE beauty of this lunch or supper recipe is that you can choose from a variety of ingredients for the filling.

Ingredients:

- Serves 2-4
- 2 red, orange or yellow peppers
- 2 x 15ml sp red or green pesto
- 1 small red onion, thinly sliced
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1-2 fresh tomatoes, thinly sliced
- 4-8 slices of mozzarella, Edam or cheddar cheese
- 1 x 15ml sp olive oil
- 1 x 15ml sp balsamic or wine vinegar.

Method:

Preheat the oven to 220°C/425°F, gas mark 7.

Cut the peppers in half length-ways and, keep-

ing the stalks on, remove the seeds.

Spread the pesto on the inside of each pepper half and stuff with the onion, tomatoes and any additional ingredients, if you're using them.

Don't overfill the peppers with ingredients or as they cook and soften, there is a danger the filling will fall out.

Season with salt and black pepper and top with slices of your preferred cheese.

Place on a baking tray and drizzle over the olive oil and vinegar.

Cook for 20-25 minutes until the peppers are soft.

TOP TIP: Try using other fillings such as olives, capers, mushrooms, basil, parsley, ham, chorizo, salami, anchovies and prawns.

The baked pepper halves are delicious served with warm, crusty bread.

Golden Pecan & Raisin Treats

IF you like home-made biscuits you'll love these tasty pecan and raisin nuggets - try serving them as tasty, healthy alternatives to chocolate biscuits for your children.

Ingredients:

- Makes about 20 nuggets
- 100g butter
- 25g caster sugar
- 100g plain flour
- 25g cornflour
- 50g chopped pecan nuts
- 25g raisins

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F, gas mark 4. In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugar.

Fold in the flour and cornflour and then add the pecan nuts and raisins. Roll out the mixture into a

large flat piece of dough and then form it into nuggets, rounds, squares or your preferred shape, using either a cutter or your hands if you prefer.

Bake them for 25-30 minutes until golden. Leave the nuggets to cool before serving.

TOP TIPS:

Try adding the finely grated zest of half a lemon or orange to give the shortbread nuggets a real flavour boost.

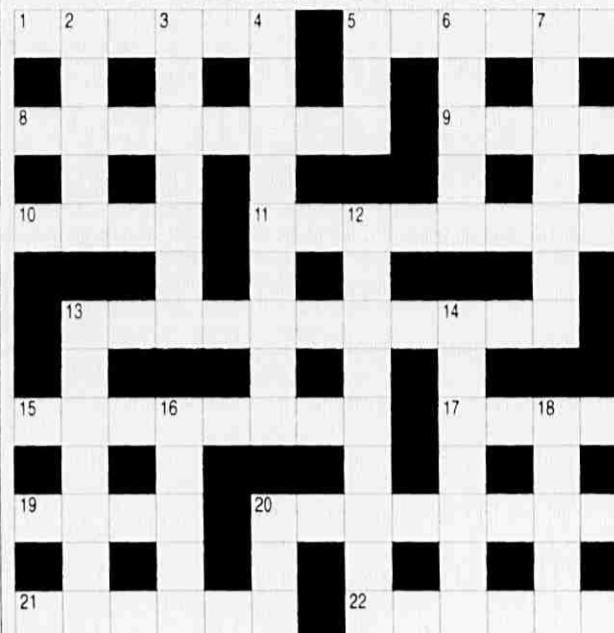
You can also use hazelnuts or walnuts instead of pecan nuts.

For an even tastier finish, mix 1/2 x 5ml sp cinnamon with 15g caster sugar.

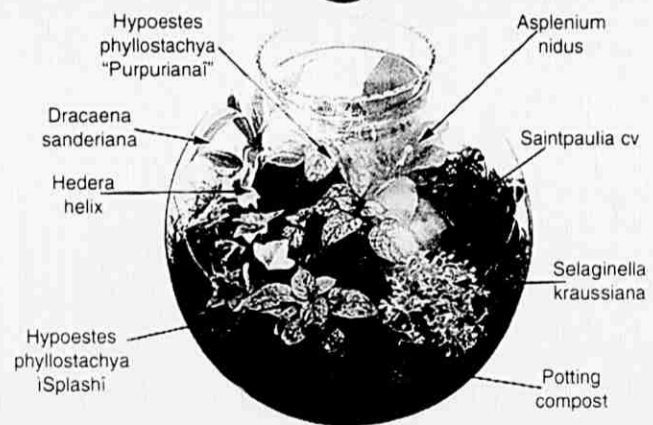

Dungarvan Leader - This Week In The Garden

Build your own bottle garden

Bottle gardens make a lovely decorative addition to any houseplant collection, and perfect bringing a little life and colour to a summer conservatory. Many house plants suffer in the heat of a conservatory during hot weather and need constant watering to keep them from dying of thirst. A bottle garden is the perfect answer because it creates its own microclimate and as long as it is not kept in direct sunlight, they are very easy to create and maintain. They are also perfect for people who live in small flats with no outdoor garden who want to practice their green-fingered skills. You can use any clean bottle either plain or slightly coloured but the neck must be wide enough for the plants to be inserted easily. If the neck is too narrow to insert your hand, make special tools from split cane, loops of wire and household utensils such as spoons and forks. First you need to line the bottom of the bottle with clay pellets or gravel to form a 3cm layer of drainage material. Cover this with a layer of horticultural charcoal then add a 8cm layer of dampened potting compost. The peat substitute alpine mix or something similar is best. If the bottle is to be viewed from the front, it is best to bank up the compost at the back. If the bottle is to be viewed from all sides the compost can be level. Begin planting at the sides of the bottle and work in towards the centre. Depending on the size of your

bottle, you can plant either three or five plants. Remove them from their pots and shake off any excess compost. Carefully lower each plant into a planting hole using tweezers, tongs or a length of wire twisted into a noose. Space the plants at least 3cm apart to allow room for growth. Cover the roots with compost and firm gently. Spread sphagnum moss or a thin layer of gravel on top of the compost. This will make your plants visible, and it will act as a mulch to prevent drying out. Finally, water in, making sure you don't swamp them by tricking a cupful of water gently down the side of the bottle. Looking after your bottle garden should not be too demanding. All it needs is a little water every week, depending on how hot it is, and time of year. Place your garden in a light position, but not in direct sunlight, and keep it watered, especially in hot weather. You will need to replant your garden at the end of the growing season, as your miniature plants will not stay small. Just take them out, pot them up, and replace. Over the winter the new plants in your bottle garden will not grow all that fast, but it is wise to replant your bottle garden twice a year. There is no need to feed your plants in the bottle garden, as they only stay there for six months, and there are plenty of nutrients in the compost. When potting on, however, give them

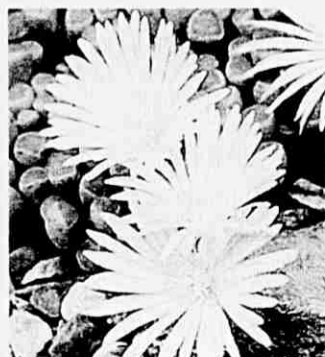


A typical bottle garden and two ideal bright beauties

a feed if it is in the spring. If you are troubled with algae used by condensation, you can clean the inside of the bottle with a sponge

fixed to a split cane. Cacti, alpine plants and miniature rock plants are all ideal plants for a bottle garden.

This Week In The Garden

Plant out and stake sweetpeas
Sweet peas raised in the greenhouse in January will be ready for planting out, provided they are hardened off properly. They will look very well trained on screens, pergolas or arches as well as clambering up a tripod in a herbaceous border. Those planted last month should be well established and now is the time to provide each with a cane. Push firmly into the soil and create a tripod effect for a good show later. Reduce the number of shoots to one per plant, choosing the sturdiest, and lead towards its cane with string or ring. Pinch out the tips of the March-grown plants.

Prune evergreens
Hardy evergreen shrubs grown for their foliage, either as hedges or topiary, can be pruned at this time, especially if hard cutting back is required. Light trimming can be safely done in summer but hard pruning should be avoided then. Worn-out laurel hedges can be revitalised by cutting back to within a foot of the ground at this time of year. The stumps will look awful at first but with a little luck and some warm, showery weather they will soon be a forest of healthy new shoots.

Sow parsley
Nothing beats fresh herbs from the garden, and parsley is a useful addition to any kitchen. Soak the seeds overnight before planting. Sow some in a shadier spot, as plants can suffer in a hot summer.

Remove tree greasebands
Remove and burn greasebands from around the main trunk or branches of apples, pears and other fruit trees.

Outdoor peaches
Young fruit on outdoor peaches and nectarines should now be the size of marbles and should be thinned by reducing the number of fruits per cluster so they have room to swell. Don't do this until after a natural fall which can cut the number of fruits.

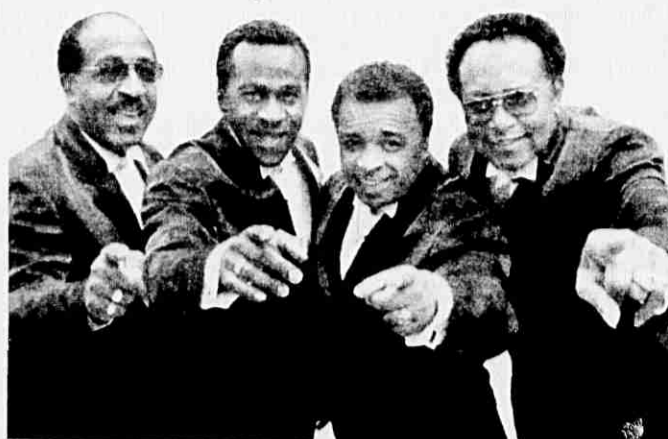

MOVIE REVIEW

Silent Hill **

This horror story is based on the popular horror computer game in an attempted to bring its spine chilling tale to the big screen.

The story starts off when Cybil (Laurie Holden) and Christopher's (Sean Bean's) daughter Rose is seemingly mentally unstable. Her mind is clouded by mental images and memories of a place that she shouldn't even know exists. A deserted town called Silent Hill.

The mother is desperate; the medication isn't working and Rose seems to be getting worse. Taking matters into her own hands, Cybil decides to confront the problem head on and brings Rose to Silent Hill. (Yes, she even did her research on the place and still decided to go!) What follows is a fight to discover the truth about what once happened and what does it have to do with her daughter. All the while the darkness that surrounds the town is constantly closing in.

Visually the movie is amazing. The amount of money put into the graphics alone must have been a fortune. As a horror movie though it wasn't ever really up to scratch. You constantly find yourself either fascinated by the story or changing your mind and wishing the bloody thing would just end, but you never really feel scared at any point. All those that liked the Resident Evil movies and are fans of the Silent Hill games would probably like this, otherwise though you should try and find something else.

Tristan + Isolde ****

Didn't know anything about the movie, didn't know who was involved and had just nearly fallen asleep during Silent Hill so I wasn't expecting much going into Tristan + Isolde. A diamond, a gem of a movie was the thought I had leaving the cinema.

The story is simple enough. It's set back in the old time when the Irish and the English are at each others throats. Going back and forth raiding each other and destroying villages. The English are divided though and are looking to become united under the ruling of Lord Mark (Rufus Sewell). While trying to make some headway during a meeting the Irish attack. While they kill many and burn down the village Mark manages to survive along with a few others, he also happens to save a young boy named Tristan (James Franco).

Mark takes on the role as father for Tristan and raises him up to being a noble Knight and a loving son. The attacks between the countries rage on though and during one battle Tristan is wounded and pronounced dead. He's given a hero's send off as he's sent to sea in a boat where he ends up on the Irish shores. Found and taken care of by a young Irish woman called Isolde (Sophia Myles), a love starts to develop, one so strong it threatens to tear apart a nation.

There are some who don't like this and there will be more that won't, but I couldn't find a single fault. It has everything you could want in a movie as the story was so in-depth it just drew you in. It is a love story and there aren't any huge explosions or anything like that. For those that might be put off by that, you should still give it a try because if you liked Braveheart and Troy you will definitely like this as it carries that type of storyline while standing out as its own story.

This movie was an excellent surprise. Your first look at Bruce Willis as the burnt-out over the hill cop tells you this will not be the normal shoot-em-up cop drama. The plot starts building almost instantly, unlike many movies where you have to wait through thirty minutes of fluff before the story goes anywhere. The characters in the movie are surprisingly endearing, honest and genuine. They're just normal enough to identify with. Not the standard super evil villain and valiant good guy. Bruce Willis is awesome in his role as the tired underdog struggling with the morality of torn loyalty. Mos Def, whose character's voice was a little aggravating, played an excellent supporting role. The relationship he develops with Willis' character is both surprising and humorous. Overall, the movie was tense from the start and is filled with suspense, humour and a great deal of drama. It takes some unexpected turns and has a great ending.

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland is a national voluntary organisation established by two carers in 1982, in response to the need for services and support for people with dementia and their carers. The Society grew steadily and today it is the foremost dementia-specific service provider in Ireland, with an extensive national network of 26 branches, 31 centres and services, over 300 volunteers, 600 staff and 2,600 members.

Conservatively speaking, it is estimated that there are in excess of 35,000 people in Ireland with dementia, the majority of these

have Alzheimer's disease. The cause of Alzheimer's disease is still unknown and there is currently no cure for the disease. The risk of developing Alzheimer's disease increases with age from 1% in under 65 years old to 25% in people over 80.

Dementia is the umbrella term used to describe various conditions that cause brain cells to die, leading to the progressive deterioration in memory and affecting the person's ability to carry out everyday activities including, finding their way around, making decisions, understanding information and expressing themselves. There are many different types of dementia but Alzheimer's Disease and Vascular Dementia are the most common forms. The less common forms include Lewy Body Dementia, Frontotemporal Lobe Dementia and Pick's Disease.

While not a homogenous group, people with dementia have particular needs more specialised and specific responses than the rest of the non-dementia and mainly ageing population.

Although commonly associated with older age, Alzheimer's disease can actually occur in people in their 30's, 40's and 50's and this small subset of people with dementia also have specific care requirements.

Local West Waterford Branch Home Care Service provides care in the persons home to provide a break for carers.

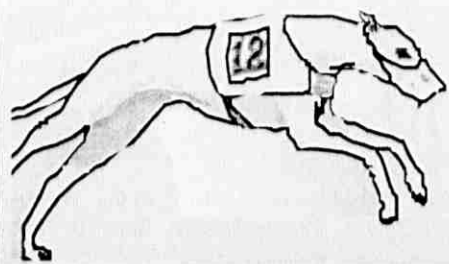

I can only assume that this was Blind Ref's first run around this circuit but he took to Kilcohan like a duck to water beating off the persistent challenge of Haliska Rufus to score by four lengths.

This follows just 22 entries, only eight of whom were for hurdling trials, with 14 requesting trials on the flat.

Simon Claisse, Cheltenham's Clerk of the Course, said: "It is disappointing that the schooling trials will not be going ahead this year." Cheltenham was the first racecourse in Britain to offer this service following the BHB Jump Racing Review and, after a promising start last year, it is unfortunate that not enough trainers have decided to enter horses this time around."

Nice One Carl

Welsh born rider Carl Llewellyn who only recently took over the training duties from Mark Pitman sent out his first winner as a fully fledged trainer as Run For Paddy came with a storming late run to lift the Scottish Grand National at Ayr last Saturday.

Run For Paddy can be a tricky old customer and Carl took the ride himself on Saturday swooping late to short head the well fancied Ladalko whose rider Ruby Walsh was losing out narrowly for the second year in a row in this keenly contested Class 1 event.

Ouija Board Third In Hong Kong

Despite her customary flying late challenge Ouija Board under Frankie Dettori could only finish a close up third behind 5/1 shot Irridescence in the Queen Elizabeth 11 Cup in Hong Kong. The other UK entry Norse Dancer finished a disappointing last.

Tramore Stable In Form

After a quiet spell Tramore trainer Paul Roche has his runners in good form at present and he sent out a shock winner at Fairyhouse recently with victory going to the 25/1 outsider Boom Economy. Boom Economy was ridden by Waterford amateur Niall Halley and if connections can keep this gelding sound he could win again off his current handicap mark.

Stan James 2000 Guineas

With just a fortnight to go until the first British Classic of the 2006 Flat season, the £330,000 Stan James 2000 Guineas at Newmarket, the race is shaping up into one of the strongest renewals seen for years.

At this stage, George Washington, officially rated the best juvenile colt in Europe last year, and Sir Percy, victorious in the 2005 Darley Dewhurst Stakes and the top-rated two-year-old colt in Britain, are both heading to Newmarket on Saturday, May 6, without a prep run.

In terms of the trials held so far this season, Asset was an impressive winner of the Listed Easter Stakes at Kempton Park on April 1, while earlier last week at Newmarket, Killybegs was the decisive winner of the Unicorn Asset Management Craven Stakes. Mitsu Bond captured the bantamshousestables.com Free Handicap and Petrovich took the second division of the Basic Bloodstock Insurance Wood Ditton Stakes.

Dominic Gardiner-Hill, the British Horseracing Board's official handicapper for horses in the mile category, commented: "As far as the Unicorn Asset Management Craven Stakes is concerned, I don't think Killybegs had to improve on his rating of 110 to win the race and he will almost certainly be left on his current mark. He is the serious Guineas contender to have emerged from the contest although he will need to improve on that performance to challenge the best two-year-olds from last year.

"George Washington was rated 124 last year with Sir Percy on 121 and Amadeus Wolf and Horatio Nelson on 120, so it would be disappointing if at least one of those did not run up to their two-year-old form." Amadeus Wolf (120) and Opera Cape (117), another of the top-rated two-year-olds of 2005 are set to run in the Stan James 2000 Guineas without prep races.

Shock Win for Wishwillow Lord

The €130,000 Menolly Homes Handicap Hurdle was the big one at Fairyhouse on Tuesday and it provided a real shock result when the Leonard Whitmore trained Wishwillow Lord, an unconsidered 33/1 chance, made virtually all of the running to score. Given an excellent ride by promising claimer, Nicky O'Shea, the seven year old son of Lord Americo (who paid 95/1 on the Tote) held off the challenge of Callow Lake to triumph by a length and a half to give both trainer and rider their biggest career victory.

Desperado Queen Makes It All

The Ratoath Mares Novice Chase at Fairyhouse on Wednesday resulted in a fine all the way victory for the Bill Doran trained Desperado Queen. The 6/1 winner jumped impeccably throughout under Thomas Dreaper except for a blunder at the second last fence and kept up a strong gallop to defeat Carrigeen Kalmia by five lengths. Also owned and bred by Bill Doran, this is the only horse he has in training under Rules and she may now be retired to the paddocks as she is a valuable broodmare prospect.

Catch Me Scores Again

Trainer Edward O'Grady has big plans for his charge, Catch Me, who made it two flat wins from two starts with a comfortable victory in the Thomastown Castle Race at Tipperary on Thursday evening. The 1/2 favourite had little difficulty in proving too strong for his rivals and may now go for the Vintage Crop Stakes at Navan next month. However, O'Grady believes that his charge could be a serious Sun Alliance Hurdle contender come next winter and he will start over hurdles later in the year.

Key To The Kingdom Strikes For Doyle

Eoin Doyle's Key To The Kingdom recorded the sixth victory of his career in landing the Templemore Handicap Hurdle at Thurles on

Friday. The 12/1 winner relished the good ground conditions in proving too strong for Little Alou and I See lcy in the two miles six furlongs contest and with the ground turning in his favour, Key To The Kingdom will be kept busy over the next couple of months and is likely to race on the flat as well as over hurdles.

Moon Unit Scores For Harry

The Harry Rogers trained Moon Unit, arrived with a perfectly timed challenge to land the featured €50,000 Woodlands Stakes over five furlongs at Naas on Saturday. The 9/1 winner raced towards the rear of the field for much of the journey but finished with a flourish under Willie Supple to defeat Dandy Man (10/1) by a length. Her trainer has the Greenlands Stakes at the Curragh in late May, a race she won last year, in mind for his charge who will soon be retired to the paddocks as she is in foal to Rock Of Gibraltar.

Rhythm'N Roots In Tune At Leopardstown

The P.W. McGrath Memorial Ballysax Stakes (Group 3) was the main event at Leopardstown on Sunday and in an exciting finish it was the Jim Bolger trained Rhythm'N Roots who emerged best by a neck from Golden Arrow. The 10/1 winner races in the colours of the former RTE Radio One presenter, Val Joyce, and showed fine battling qualities to hold off the runner up after the pair engaged in a tremendous final furlong battle.

McNamara In Form Ahead Of Big Week

Jockey Andrew J. McNamara, who has two fancied rides on Newmill and Hi Cloy in Grade One races at Punchestown this week, warmed up for what could be a very important week in his blossoming career by guiding The Fingersmith (5/2 joint favourite) to an eight length victory in the Irish Stallion Farms European Breeders Fund Novice Hurdle at Sligo on Sunday.

Tragic Death Of Young Jockey

The point to point at Bree in Wexford on Sunday ended in tragedy after the death of 20 year old Dary Cullen following a fall in the sixth event. Dary suffered serious head injuries and was pronounced dead in hospital some time later. As a mark of respect, the remainder of the meeting was abandoned. Dary rode his first winner on the point to point circuit a short time ago and appeared to have a bright future in the game.

Walsh Four Ahead Of Great Rival

Jockey Ruby Walsh, already a three time Champion National Hunt Jockey in Ireland, is in pole position to make it a fourth as he leads his great rival Barry Geraghty by four winners, 84 to 80, in the current title race which ends this weekend after the Punchestown Festival. Unfortunately, Barry suffered facial injuries in a fall at Thurles on Friday and was not in action at Sligo on Sunday where Ruby rode one winner during the course of the afternoon. However, both riders intend to be in action on all four days of the Punchestown Festival Meeting and at this stage Ruby is an odds on favourite to be collecting his fourth Champion Jockeys' Crown at the end of the week.

Moscow Flyer Fronts Irish Horse Welfare Trust Promotion

Moscow Flyer's owners, Mr & Mrs Brian Kearney, and trainer Jessica Harrington, have kindly agreed to let the now retired Champion Chaser to become the Flagship Horse for the leading equine charity in Ireland, The Irish Horse Welfare Trust (IHWT). The horse will make a personal appearance on the opening day of the Punchestown Festival before taking up residence at the IHWT Headquarters at Redcross, overlooking Brittas Bay, in County Wicklow for the Summer months culminating just after the IHWT Open Day on Sunday, 27th August, 2006.

Racecourse Cash Deposit Facilities For Bookmakers In Place

As a result of recent robberies targeted at on-

course Bookmakers, facilities have been put in place with immediate effect to enable bookmakers to make cash deposits with a security firm at all racecourses. A 77th minute try from 20 metres out by prop-come-flanker Timmy Ryan epitomised the nature of this free flowing derby match between local rivals Waterford City and Dungarvan. It was also enough to give Dungarvan a well deserved victory over a team they were meeting for the third time this season.

Balmy conditions and a typical end of season joie-de-vivre ensured that the game was played in a vein more akin to Leinster's recent champagne style than Munster's grittier approach. Both teams looked to run from deep and sweep the ball quickly to their dangerous men out wide, which made the fashion of the opening try all the more surprising. Directly from the kick off we conceded a penalty for dissent on our own 22. City decided against the difficult kick for goal, instead opting to find touch close to our try line. The resultant catch, maul and try could have been a carbon copy of countless Munster scores in the last few years. Having missed the difficult touchline conversion, City found themselves with a 5 point lead 2 minutes into the match.

The match settled into a rhythm very quickly, where Dungarvan dominated possession but were pinned back in our own territory by astute tactical kicking. 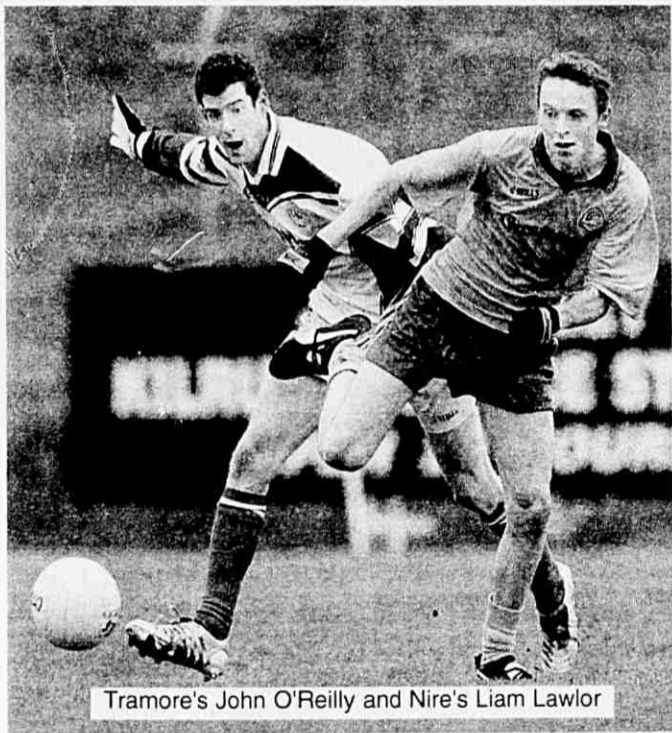

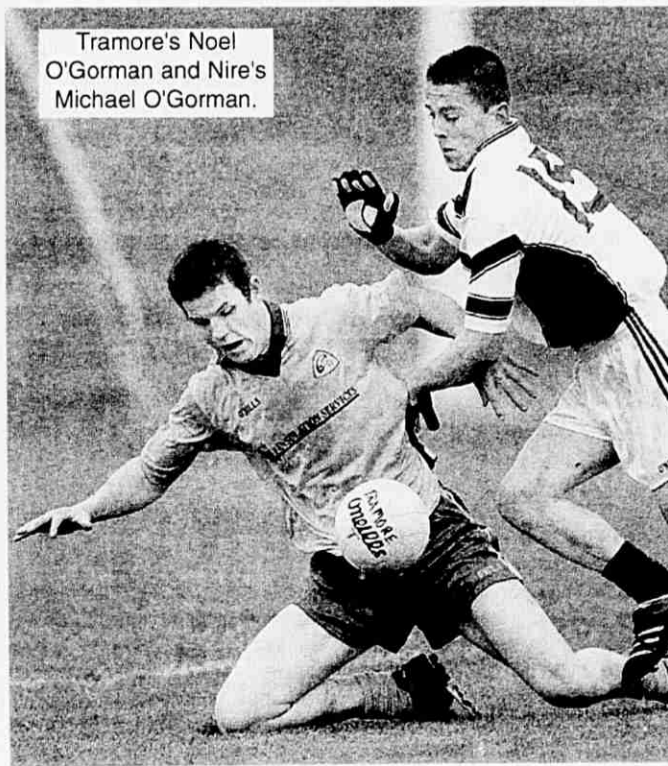

Team line-outs to be made available for match programme purposes at least three days before match in question.

A fine of 100 euro to be imposed for breach of any of the above regulations.

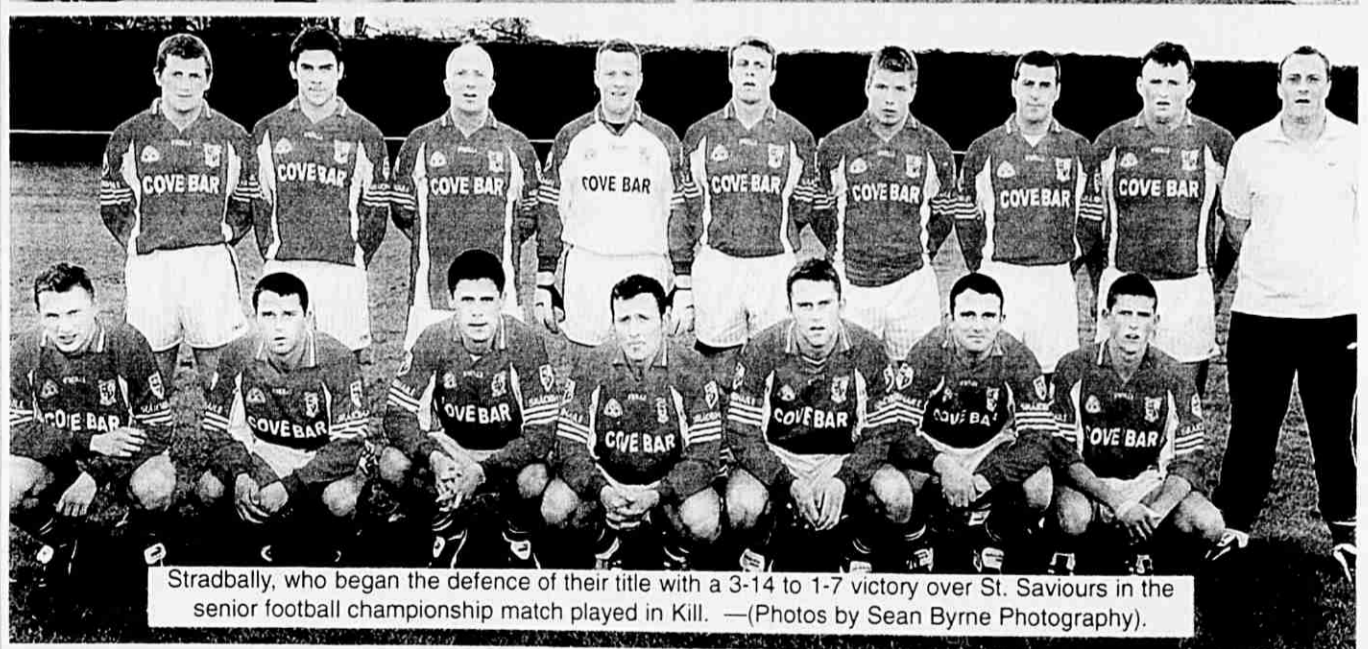
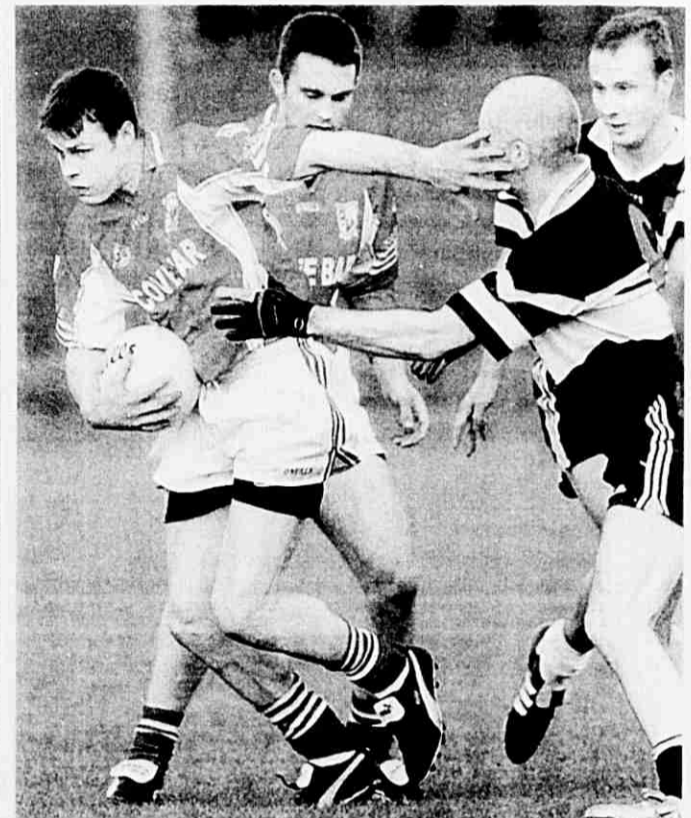
Stradbally 3-14 St. Saviours 1-7

G.A.A. Annual Congress Held In Killarney

Nicky Brennan, holder of five All-Ireland senior hurling medals and who has been chairman of the Kilkenny County Board and also of the Leinster Council, was on last Saturday installed as the 35th President of the G.A.A.

Nicky is the fourth Kilkenny man to hold this presidency. His predecessors were Bob O'Keefe (1935 to 1938), Al-

derman James Nolan who served for 20 years and after whom Nolan Park is named, and of course Paddy Buggy (1982 to 1985).

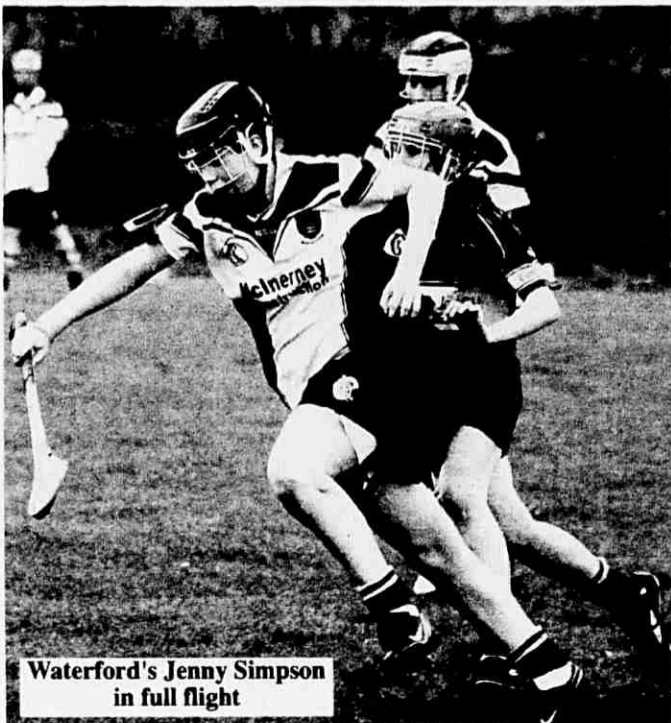

However Tipperary asserted control to add two points in the closing minutes and take their place in the Munster final on May 19th.

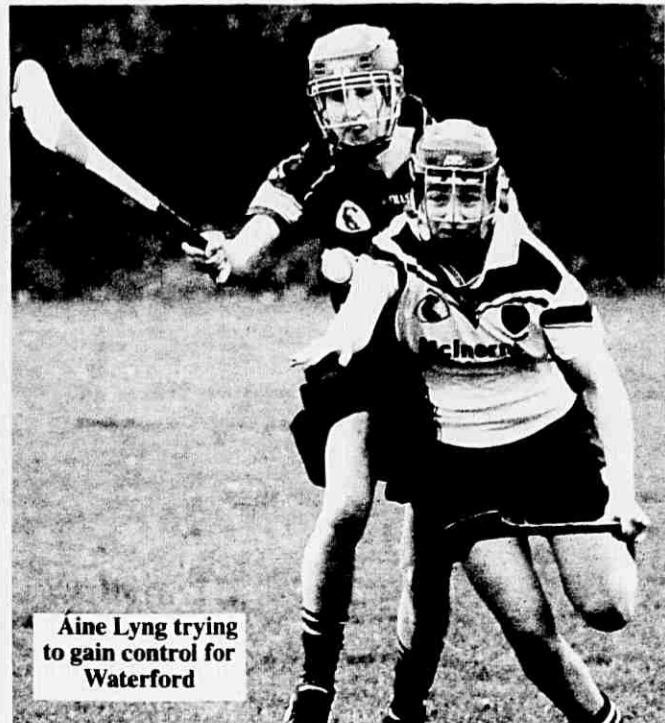
Waterford are certainly going

When one looks at the season just finished and take the contrasting form of both sides Mogeely would definitely be favourites, but then one must say that Cappoquin were playing in a higher division all year. We believe that Mogeely will hold their own next season in the premier and teams will not look forward to playing them as there makeup is built on attacking football which at times have left them exposed at the back and vulnerable to a counter attack. Cappoquin have a strong defence with one of the best keepers in the league in Liam Morrissey, while in front of him he has McCarthy, Lenane and the long serving pair of captain Martin Lacey and Garry Morrissey.

With Veale, O'Sullivan, Collins and the outstanding Twomey working from midfield to attack they will cause many problems for the Mogeely defence, and manager Willy Collins will have worked on any weaknesses he has seen in the Cork outfit.

Likewise, Mogeely manager Simon Rumley will have his home work done and his experience will have his charges in tip top form for this final. Simon has players of the calibre of Lar Hayes in goal, Ron Barrett at the heart of defence and goal scorers with so much experience in O Shes, Collins, McGann and the Mottelibi brothers, each and everyone capable of scoring winning goals and they will have no fear of the opposition.

So what of our prediction? Cup finals are always difficult to call and we think this is

going to be a close call and a very open game. Form counts very little in a one off encounter but we must predict a winner and we are going for form and think Mogeely may just shade it.

Regardless of the result we wish both clubs the very best and as neutrals we look forward to a cup final to remember.

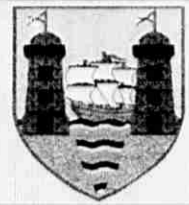

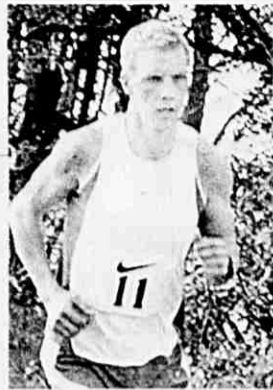

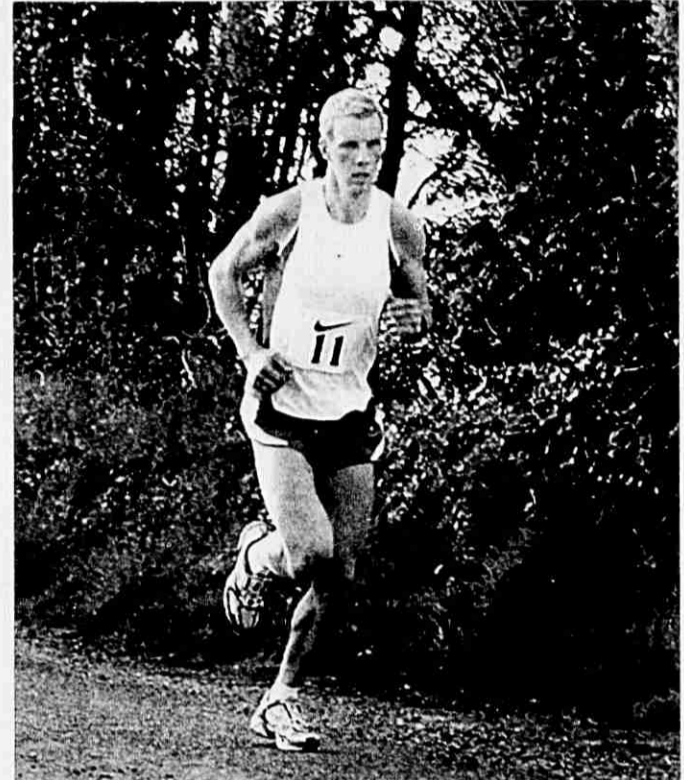
Sean Stilwell, West Waterford A.C., was the first Junior finisher in a time of 36.46 finishing one place more (8th) than

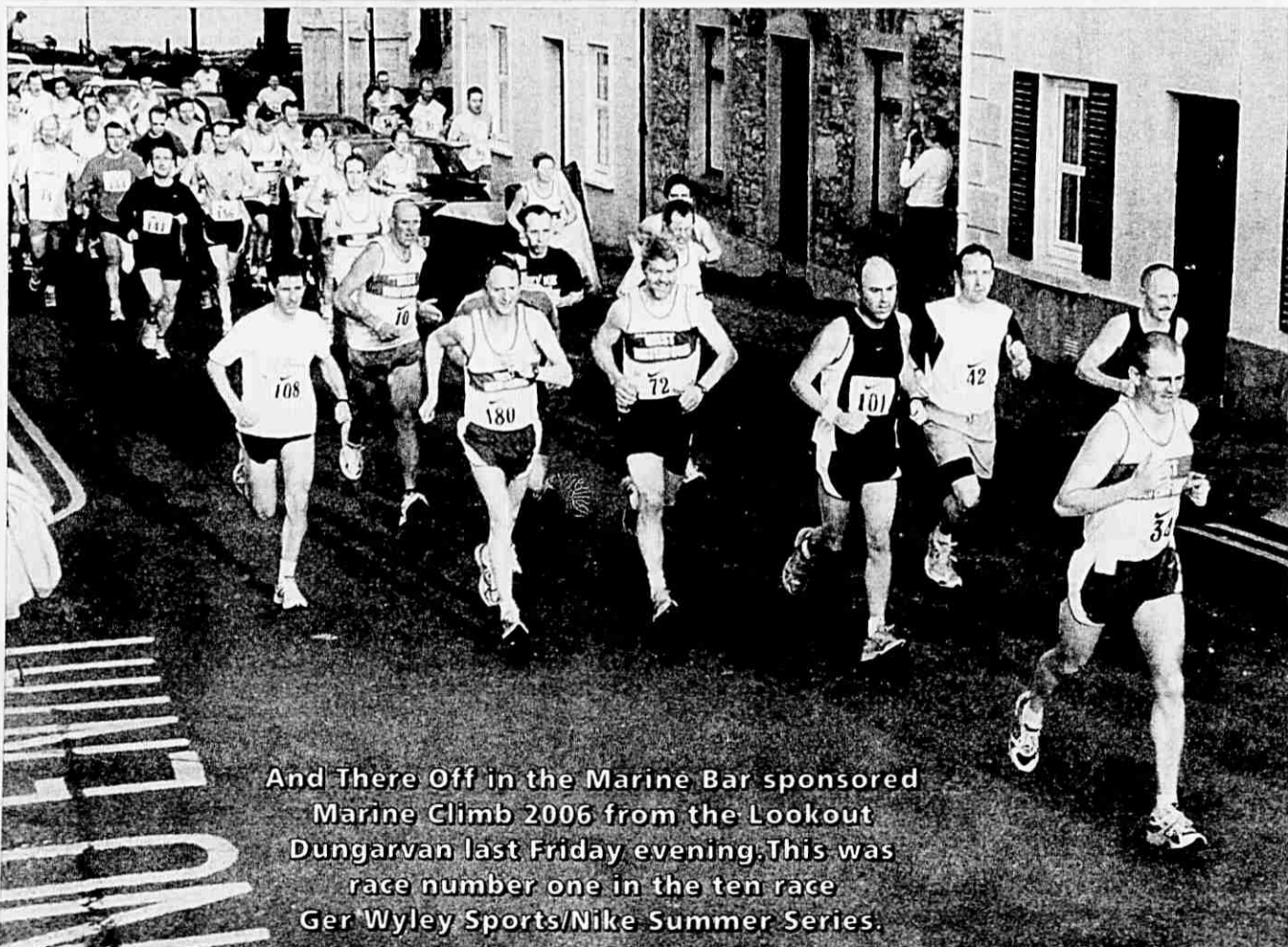
