## Dungarvan Continues Push Up Litter League Table

"Fantastic" 8th Place Finish In Litter League

Dungarvan's push to secure a top of the table finish in the prestigious Irish Businesses Against Litter League continued apace when for the second time in a row it rose up the rankings, this time to eighth place, while also retaining its much vaunted 'Litter Free Status.'

Dungarvan was one of just twenty-four towns to attain the Irish Businesses Against Litter's stamp of approval as a 'litter free town' - which has

been hailed as a result of the mammoth effort put in by the Town Council over the past year to maintain and improve their results.

It's a complete turnaround in fortunes from this time last year when the IBAL survey showed Dungarvan losing its Litter Free Status and slipping to 33rd place in the table. In the two survey's since, the town has climbed back up the

table and a concerted effort is now on for Dungarvan to secure top spot in the league which concludes at the end of this year.

**FANTASTIC RESULT**

"It's a fantastic announcement when you look at it that Dungarvan came eighth this year especially when you consider what they printed about us last year," Independent councillor,

## Public Shouldn't Pay For Council's Mistakes — Deasy

### COUNCILLORS URGED TO MAKE A STAND AGAINST CHARGES

The public shouldn't be made pay for the council's mistakes and mismanagement through increased development charges, Fine Gael Deputy John Deasy has said in a hard hitting statement.

The Dungarvan-based TD is calling on the twenty-three elected members of Waterford County Council to hold firm and not punish the public for what he described as the council's "blunders" in the operation of its waste management sys-

tem. Saying the council seemed "incapable" of balancing the books, Deputy Deasy urged that ordinary householders shouldn't be made pay for mistakes of the County Council's own making. This includes the one million euros the council paid out on the failed proposal to develop a landfill at Garrynagare and the miscalculation made in the amount of revenue that would be generated from the new flat charge of 150 euros.

**DEVELOPMENT CHARGES**

Deputy Deasy warned that increases in development charges are seen as an easy way to raise revenue, and he urged the elected members to make a stand on the issue against the officials.

"The farming community at the very least should be spared any increase in development charges for farm buildings. Young farmers in my opinion, should be exempt from these

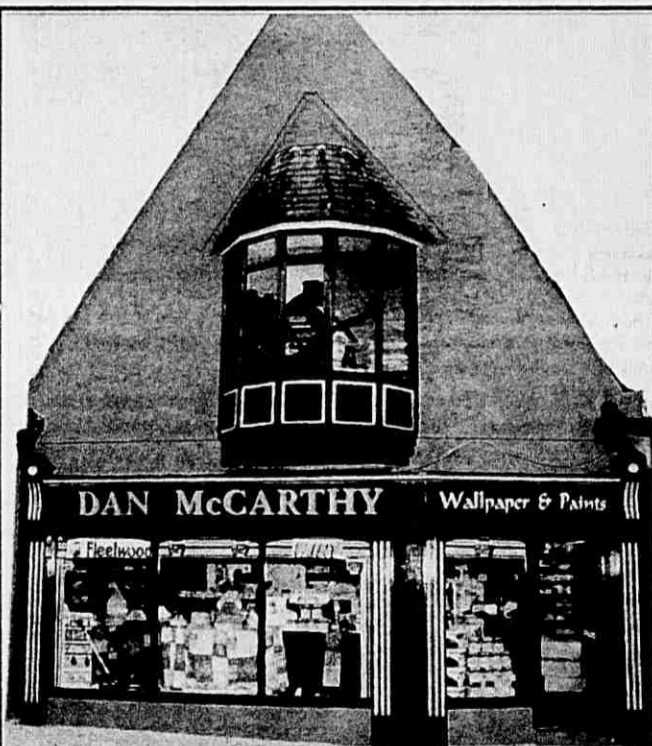

# Dungarvan Continues Push Up Litter League Table

Michael O'Riordan said welcoming the news.

"We got a damning report last year of being a very untidy, unkempt town. This year to come eighth - that is some reversal. We are after coming from 33rd up into 8th. As I stated at a meeting at that time I made out that the adjudicators must have mixed up their towns last year."

As part of the IBAL Anti-Litter League, which is run with financial assistance from the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, all towns of populations of 6,000 and over are monitored independently by An Taisce in accordance with international grading standards.

### GLOWING REPORT

In a glowing report, An Taisce said: "Well done Dungarvan! Could you be targeting the winners podium? The overall impression of Dungarvan is a town which is generally well maintained, with many excellent sites."

"There were no very heavily lit-

tered sites and some of those with moderate levels of litter could easily be improved with a little extra effort.

"Dungarvan Shopping Centre Precinct and Grattan Square were both particularly good considering the high level of activity; Harbour-side presented very well, with the surfaces which had recently been paved. The Street of Old Market House Arts Centre was marred by

the very high levels of cigarette butts and there were no litter / butt / gum disposal facilities at all.

"The Quay (Davitts) would have scored higher if it wasn't for the litter at the bus shelter - there was no litter bin along the whole stretch surveyed. Scoil Naomh Seosamh didn't present as well as other schools - a more proactive approach to litter management might make a difference here."

### BOOKIES ODDS

Earlier this year bookmaker Paddy Power was offering odds of Waterford at 12/1 and Dungarvan at 33/1 to be Ireland's cleanest town when the League concludes in December.

Nationally, the survey by An Taisce on behalf of IBAL showed the average litter rating at 74 out of a possible 100, an improvement of 9% compared to this time last year.

charges completely," he said.

The Irish Farmers Association (IFA) are understood to have al-

ready met with members of the county council recently and have pressed councillors to resist any plans by council officials to bring about higher charges for development in the county. They have warned that small farmers, who have already taken a number of hits in recent years, would be particularly vulnerable to increases.

### MASSIVE INCREASES

"We've seen massive increases in the development charges for all kinds of structures whether it's a single storey dwelling or an industrial unit. It's an easy way for the County Manager to collect additional revenue and every year now increases are rubber-stamped by a majority of the County Councillors," Deputy Deasy said.

"The fact is that Council officials have mismanaged the operation of waste management in the County. Due to these mistakes the taxpayer in the county lost in excess of a million euro over the failed search for a new landfill. Council officials also badly underestimated the revenue generated from the 150 euro flat fee on wheelie bins. As a consequence of this blunder the County Council couldn't put in place a proper waiver scheme for pensioners and others who couldn't afford the flat fee."

"As a result of all this mismanagement, I believe Council officials will attempt to increase development charges to compensate for

their own mistakes.

### FLAT CHARGE

"During the debate on the additional 150 euro flat charge per wheelie bin the County Manager relied on the fact that recent legislation gave him the power to ignore the wishes of elected members.

"This is not the case with any prospective increase in development charges. This time the county councillors can stop the County Manager from imposing additional taxes on people.

"In the case of farmers, many counties around the country do not charge development contributions for farm buildings. Under legislation enacted in 2004 local authorities can require development charges as a condition of granting planning permission for these farm buildings. I don't think farming will remain sustainable for much longer if additional charges like these are heaped on without any thought given to the overall situation in farming today."

### STAND AGAINST OFFICIAL-DOM

"It's time County Councillors made a stand against officials who seem incapable of balancing the books and who every year resort to increasing rates or development charges in order to get out of the mess they themselves have created," Deputy Deasy concluded.

The Minister For Social, Community & Family Affairs has announced that the **Back to School Clothing & Footwear Scheme** will operate from 1st June 2006 to 30th September, 2006.

The general conditions regarding eligibility will be the same as in previous years. Those who are eligible, subject to their satisfying the income limits and other qualifying conditions, include dependent children whose parents or guardians are recipients of:

- Supplementary Welfare Allowance

- Disability Allowance

- Infectious Diseases (Maintenance) Allowance

- Participants on VTOS, Back to Education Allowance, Third Level Allowance Scheme

'Jane is five and is watching television at nine o' clock in spite of the fact her bedtime was eight o' clock. Jane's mother just finishes cleaning up after dinner and finds Jane sitting there: "Jane it is way past your bedtime, come on be a good girl and go to bed." Jane whines and pleads "just one more cartoon". Jane's mother gives in to the pleading and says "just five more minutes". Mother returns in ten minutes and Jane has not moved "please Jane, come on", Jane ignores her mother and changes channel and settles in to watch another program. "Come on Jane it's time, I've warmed your pajamas", again silence. Mother now raising her voice tells Jane "come here now or I will spank you", Jane screams "no, you're mean and a bully I want to stay up and watch this programme". Mother ends up picking Jane up, dragging her across to her bedroom, Jane screaming all the time as if in terrible pain. Mother forces Jane into her pajamas and, after a huge struggle, into bed. Jane cries, screams and kicks all the time. Mother warns her that if she doesn't stay in bed she will be slapped. Mother returns to the sitting room shaking, exhausted and crying.

Undeterred by this, an hour later Jane comes down stairs for a hug from daddy. This infuriates Mum even further and, again, she lifts Jane up to bed. An hour later sounds are heard from upstairs. Dad goes up as mother is too tired, Jane is playing with her dolls. At first he says gently "go to bed please Jane we are all exhausted". Jane does not move or acknowledge he is there. Dad whispers "if you go I will buy you sweets tomorrow" Jane toddles off to bed.

**What has happened?**  
Jane is not doing this out of malice or even any sort of conscious behavior; she is operating on an "auto-pilot" of feelings and "private logic".

Mother and Jane have been involved in a power struggle which Jane was going to win no matter what the outcome. In the end the only reason Jane went to bed was because of mothers' superior strength and size. Jane can easily believe 'if I was that big I would have won'.

Jane knows her bedtime is eight o'clock and is quite capable of going to bed at that time, but by dawdling, she is challenging mother's authority. When mother conceded and let Jane stay up she played straight into her mothers hands. Jane's misbehaviour says 'I'm important as long as I can get you to do what I want.'

She got what she wanted and showed her ability to 'win out' over her mother. This mistaken goal is a struggle for power, she believes that the only way she can be significant in her life is by 'beating' her mother (and probably all figures of authority). She has gained an immense sense of satisfaction from standing up to her mother and driving her to distraction.

In fact Jane has driven her mother so far that the only recourse mother feels she has left is to force her daughter into her bed and make her promise not to do it again. However there are always more options!

In Jane's mind she has won a huge victory, the only reason Jane is in bed is because Mother is bigger. Mother has been completely defeated and is exhausted and emotionally bankrupt wondering why is her child like this. Dad is dragged in and believes he has bribed his child into submission Jane however is doing what the power hungry do; 'divide and conquer'.

What can a parent do when faced with such impossible odds?  
Jane wants a battle, she wants to be told repeatedly to go to bed, wants to be dragged kicking and screaming to her room. What possible benefit can this have for Jane?

She, at this moment, is the most important person in the universe, ruler of these two adults who will do anything to make her go to bed.

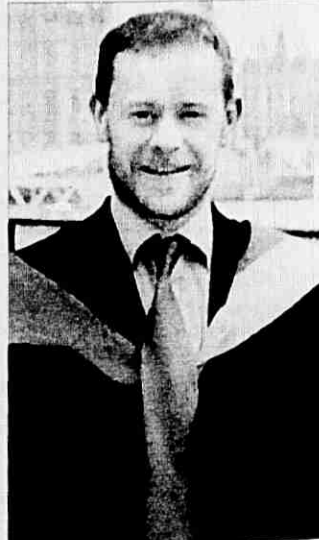
**What can be done?**  
Jane should be reminded that eight o' clock is her bedtime. It is at this moment that the parents must withdraw, Jane cannot win if she has no one to fight. Leave for the bathroom, or a bedroom. Read a book or watch television. Parents often believe that if the do not force their children to bed they believe they will not go! This is what children like Jane depend on, the need to be 'good parents' a fear that if a child does not go to bed early and is tired for school they are somehow bad parents.

Jane is responsible for her own bedtime and understands at a very early age, even as young as four, what she is supposed to do, however she plays on this and uses it for her own purposes.  
If parents withdraw from the power struggle, children will go looking for them, follow them upstairs, or it may be that the parents are watching television and the child will come sit on their laps. Parents must ignore their children's advances and even to the point of sitting up and allowing the children to slide off, with the excuse of making a cup of tea, going to the kitchen for something, or going to the bathroom.

The last thing a power child will expect is a withdrawal from the struggle. It is hard to be victorious in an empty battlefield. This will help the child to be responsible and will help the relationship with parents. Parents will feel better as will the child.

This is a short article and cannot answer every question. Each child is so unique that it barely scratches the surface.

# Tribute To Great Entrepreneur And Innovator

The unexpected death of one of County Waterford's most successful entrepreneurs and technological innovators has left a deep void in Dungarvan and West Waterford.

Sean Casey, a native of Fethard, Co. Tipperary, brought the worlds of multi-channel television and an internet service that is the envy of towns across Ireland and Britain to Dungarvan.

Sean, who was seventy-eight, died unexpectedly at his home at the Youghal Road on Wednesday week last.

Throughout his life and the life of the company he founded he irrevocably changed his adopted town of Dungarvan along with much of the West Waterford area by introducing the high tech infrastructure.

His was the story of success borne of hard work and initiative. He came to work in Dungarvan as a member of the administrative staff at the local Post Office having trained in Athlone. His decision to move to Dungarvan was no doubt swayed by the proximity of the Ring Gaeltacht where his love for the Irish language was copperfastened during his schooldays studying in Colaiste na Rinne.

In the post office, his hard-working spirit and initiative saw him rise inexorably through the ranks to the position of assistant postmaster.

However, in the early sixties he started his first television company, CBR Television, along with Sev Bauman and Paddy O'Riordan. The fledgling television service lasted until 1966, when the three men decided to part ways.

Although enjoying the security of his Civil Service post, Sean took the bold decision, backed by his wife, Margaret, to focus on developing a televi-

sion service, which would bring BBC and ITV stations into local homes.

It entailed bringing sixteen miles of cable underground from the Comeraghs to Dungarvan and beyond (which at the time was the longest trunk cable in the world), the erection of a massive receiving dish on the mountainside, and many other feats of engineering brilliance that only someone of his vast knowledge and skill could undertake and accomplish.

He came up against several obstacles including 'expert' opinion which said it would not work, but his vision was wide enough to see it all coming to fruition.

Sean's son, Billy, joined him as a key figure in the business, and in time his younger son, Pat, followed. His daughter, Noelle joined them while Sean's late wife Margaret was deeply involved in the administration part of the company.

Now trading as "Casey Cablevision" the company continued to gain momentum. It even made its own brand name televisions. Among the many thousands of sets purchased and rented in the locality some were purchased by a number of the biggest cruise ship operators across the globe.

In December of 2000, his tremendous success story and his contribution to the town and wider area was commemorated and honoured by Dungarvan Urban District Council who gave him a Civic Reception in the Civic Offices.

By then he had already set in motion Cablesurf.com

which was connected to the World Global Transit Hub, the largest global internet carrier, a development which would keep Dungarvan to the forefront of communications, and which in turn helped Dungarvan attract new industry to the town.

Sean was also a gifted musician. He was a member of the Dungarvan Brass Band for a

time, and in later years performed with the Dungarvan Jazz Train with whom he regularly showed his talents at musical gigs in many areas.

He was predeceased by his wife of forty-three years, Margaret, who passed away in May 2000. He is survived by his sons Billy and Pat, his daughter Noelle, and a wide circle of other relatives.

## Hawthorn for the Heart

One of the most beautiful sights at this time of year is the hawthorn blossoming in the hedgerows. The trees line almost every bothairín in the country, and during the springtime are covered with a mass of creamy-white flowers.

Hawthorn has been used as a folk remedy for the treatment of heart and circulatory problems since the middle ages. It is also known as May or 'Sceach Gheal' in Irish, and has long been considered a sacred tree which is associated with the fairy folk. It was used to bring love and happiness at weddings and was often attached to babies' cradles as a charm for protection.

Today, the hawthorn is still one of the best remedies available for the heart and circulation. Modern research has confirmed that it contains powerful antioxidants called flavonoids and clinical trials support its use for this purpose. It strengthens the heart, helping it to beat more steadily and with greater efficiency. It is therefore very useful in cases of palpitations and heart failure. It also improves the blood flow to the heart muscle itself which helps to relieve angina.

Hawthorn is beneficial to the entire circulatory system. It increases the integrity of the tissues, softens arteries which have been hardened by high cholesterol levels, relaxes blood vessels, reduces blood pressure and removes accumulated fluid from the body. These actions help to reduce the risk of more serious problems such as heart disease and strokes. Hawthorn can be of particular benefit to an ageing circulatory system where reduced blood supply to the brain leads to confusion and memory loss. It also tends to reduce anxiety and restlessness which can con-

tribute to a number of cardiovascular problems.

Hawthorn is an effective yet gentle remedy which is safe for long term use. For the treatment of mild heart and circulatory problems or for preventative purposes, a tea can be made using the fresh or dried leaves and flowers, and taken on a daily basis. However it should not be used by people with low blood pressure or those taking orthodox blood pressure medication except under the supervision of a qualified practitioner of herbal medicine.

Medical herbalists frequently use hawthorn in combination with other herbs for a range of problems affecting the heart and circulatory system. It may be used with other herbs such as cramp bark which relaxes blood vessels, motherwort which prevents palpitations, yarrow which removes excess fluid, lime flower which acts as a gentle relaxant, or garlic which lowers cholesterol. In some cases herbs such as these may be used to reduce the dose of orthodox medicines in consultation with the individual's GP.

### AFFORDABLE HOUSING UNDER PART V OF THE PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT ACTS, 2000 AND 2002

Dungarvan Town Council now wishes to determine the level of interest for Affordable Housing under the above Act. Dungarvan Town Council will compile a list for 12 months of all eligible applicants for affordable housing under Part V.

Applications are invited from eligible persons in need of affordable housing.

An eligible person is defined as the following:  
A person who is in need of accommodation and whose income would not be adequate to meet the payments on a mortgage for the purchase of a house to meet his or her accommodation needs because the payments calculated over the course of a year would exceed 35% of that person's annual income net of income tax and pay related social insurance.

For the purposes of the scheme, the accommodation needs of an eligible person includes the accommodation needs of any other person who might reasonably reside with the eligible person.

Applicants will be assessed against a points-based criteria. Dungarvan Town Council will have regard to:

- The accommodation needs of eligible persons, in particular eligible persons who have not previously purchased or built a house for their occupation or for any other purpose (i.e. first-time buyers).
- The current housing circumstances of eligible persons.
- Whether eligible persons have been living in the area of the development plan or elsewhere.
- Distance of affordable housing from places of employment of eligible persons.
- Loan finance is to be obtained from private financial institutions.

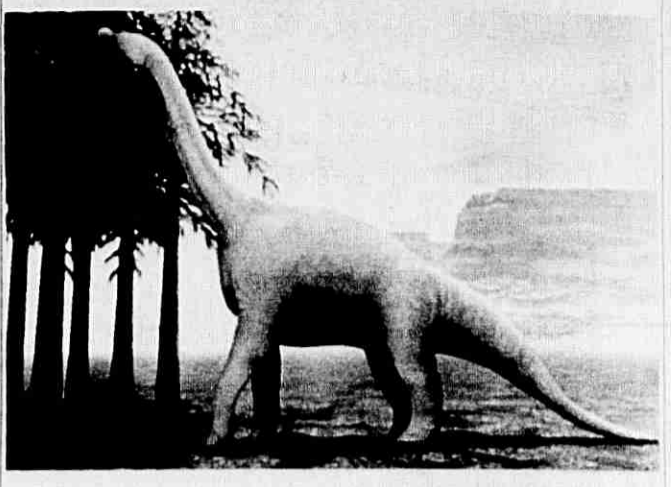

## THE COMING OF THE DINOSAURS



Dinosaurs lived on Earth for 160 million years. The word dinosaur means 'terrible lizard' and was first used by the British palaeontologist Richard Owen in 1842. We tend to think of dinosaurs as enormous creatures but they came in all sizes. The first dinosaurs appeared over 220 million years ago and were quite small. The smallest of the dinosaurs was Compsognathus which was only 90cm (3ft) long and weighted 3kg (6.6lb). Diplodocus was the longest, in fact the longest animals that has ever lived, with a length of 25m (82ft). The heaviest creature that ever lived was Brachiosaurus which weighted over 50 tonnes.

**Two Types Of Dinosaur**  
 Scientists have divided dinosaurs into two main groups: Saurischia, meaning 'reptile hipped' because their hips are similar to those of crocodiles and other reptiles; and Ornithischia (bird hipped) because their hip bones are arranged like those of birds. In fact it is quite possible that the first birds evolved from the Ornithischia dinosaurs.

**Periods Of History**  
 Scientists have divided the last 590 million years of Earth's history into three main era's; the Palaeozoic (meaning old life), Mesozoic (middle life) and Cenozoic (new life). Dinosaurs lived during the Mesozoic era, which is divided into three periods, the Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous.  
 In the Triassic period, 225 million years ago, the first mammals appeared and there were numerous reptiles. The Jurassic period, some 195 million years ago, was the age of reptiles and the time when the first primitive bird appeared. In the Cretaceous period, 135 million years ago, mammals and birds became more numerous. Dinosaurs became extinct at the end of this period.

**First Living Things**  
 Life began in the seas some 2,000 million years ago. The earliest form of life consisted of particles of protoplasm, the basis of all living matter. From this evolved simple single celled organisms, similar to the amoeba, which gradually developed, over many millions of years, into many celled organisms, simple creatures such as microscopic bacteria.  
 More complex creatures, such as sponges and jellyfish, began appearing perhaps 600 million years ago. The jellyfish was one of the first animals to have a mouth and stomach. All life at this time was in the sea and not until around 400 million years ago that simple plants and insects probably began inhabiting the shore line. By 345 million years ago some primitive amphibians were beginning to venture onto land and the first reptiles began developing.

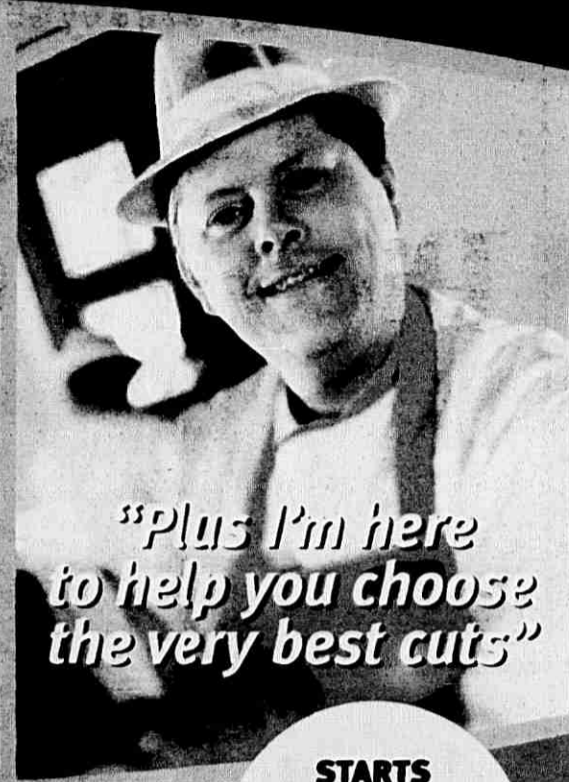

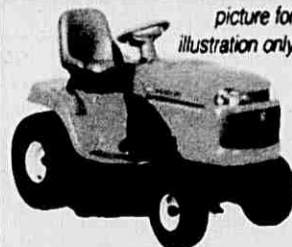

## Dungarvan-Based Kingspan Century Win British Government Competition To Manufacture House For £60,000

Kingspan Century have unveiled their £60,000 stg house, which has won a British Government competition to build social and affordable homes on publicly-owned sites.

The house was devised as an entry by the SIXTYK consortium, which included Kingspan Century. Launched by Deputy Prime Minister, John Prescott, and run by English Partnerships, the competition challenges the building industry to build quality housing for a construction cost of £60,000 stg.

Company Chief Executive Gerry McCaughey said: "This house is a new departure in social and affordable housing and shows it is possible to deliver quality homes for just £60,000 stg per unit."

McCaughey was speaking as an Irish Parliamentary Delegation visited the house. The delegation was comprised of Fergus O'Dowd TD, Fine Gael, Fiona O'Malley TD, Progressive Democrats, Ciaran Cuffe TD, Green Party, and Senator Michael McCarthy of the Labour Party.

"Bold political decisions can deliver amazing results and without the vision of the British Government this house would never have become a reality. This competition has pushed the house manufacturers to achieve global best practice and it is an example that the Irish Government must follow," said McCaughey.

Following a rigorous selection process, the SIXTYK Consortium has been chosen as the developer for two of the ten publicly-owned sites available through the competition: the former Linton Hospital site in Maidstone, Kent, and the former Renny Lodge hospital site in Newport Pagnell, Buckinghamshire.

The SIXTYK Consortium consists of manufacturing specialist Kingspan Century, builder Crest Nicholson, with architect Sheppard Robson, civil, structural and building services con-

sultant, Arup, as well as cost planner, Davis Langdon and landscaping specialist, MacFarlane Wilder.

Significantly, the two-bedroom house is the only one of the winning competition entries on display at the Building Centre in Central London at a week long exhibition to showcase the successful entrants in the competition.

The SIXTYK prototype is a two-bedroom fully fitted house. ### SAVE ENERGY

Did you know that many of our household appliances still use energy when they are let in "standby mode"? For example, when you turn off your TV with the remote control, a red light indicates that it is in stand-by mode and it will still use electricity unless you actually switch it off. Some appliances can use up to half as much electricity in stand-by mode as when they are fully turned on-so you'll also be saving money on your electricity bill by turning them off!

All the appliances we use in our home use energy, but some are more efficient than others. To help us make a more informed and sustainable choice, many household machines, dryers, fridges, freezers, dishwashers and ovens now come with energy labels attached. These indicate the relative energy efficiency of the appliance on a rating scale from A-G, with "A" rating being the most efficient.

The next time you need to buy a new appliance, check its energy rating and choose the highest-rated appliance you can afford. It may be more expensive initially but you save you money on your energy bill every time you use it. Energy-efficient models of washing machines often use less water too, so you can reduce the environmental impact even further.

### TIPS

Switch off lights when you leave the room. Lighting accounts for 10-15% of your electricity bill.

Standby. Turn off televisions, stereos, video players and computers rather than leaving them on standby.

Tea Breaks Only put the amount of water in a kettle that you actually need-otherwise you are paying to heat water unnecessarily.

A lagging jacket on a hot water cylinder will pay for itself in less than a year by saving 75% of heat loss from the cylinder.

### ROADSIDE WEEDKILLERS?

At this time of year the bluebells and purple vetches are flowering in the roadside hedges in a riot of colour and as the plants grow taller, some people are tempted to "tidy up" with a heavy application of weedkiller. The result is a long streak of roadside that turns from green to yellowy-brown as the grasses and flowers die off.

Weedkillers leave the killed plants in place and this builds up the fertility of the roadside soil. Add to this the nitrates from car exhausts that also find their way onto verges and the result is an increase rank weedy growth of nettles and thistles. These two plants have increased in recent years at the expense of more delicate plants that are more obviously thought of as wild flowers. But even they have their place as nettles and thistles are the food plants for many insects like Peacock and Small Tortoiseshell Butterflies and for Painted Lady Butterflies

So, in the long term weedkillers may actually be encouraging the growth of weedy plants in a sort of vicious circle. The best way to break this cycle is by twice-a-year trimming of the verge early and late in the year with the cuttings being taken off. This takes away the fertility and allows a wider variety (biodiversity) of less vigorous wild flowers and grasses to flourish.

On some new roads in Ireland the verges are not being covered in topsoil as has long been the practice. This can actually save money as rampant thistles, docks and nettles are less of a nuisance and do not have to be controlled. A wider variety of plants, mostly not very aggressive colonisers can be the result, especially if gone-to-seed hay from flower-rich meadows is strewn on the soil.

Established gardens are imbued with an elusive spirit, a lingering presence of the passing years, and whilst no one could argue that the permanent gardens at Mallow racecourse are in any way ancient, they too have a spirit, born of commerce I must admit, but they hide a wish to exist in perpetuity. they might, for this coming June Bank Holiday the festival is set to attract the gardeners of Munster and beyond.

Opening under the new management of Alan Collins, Home and Garden Exhibitions - one of the most successful home exhibition companies in Ireland, this three day event will have all the garden attractions: display gardens, plant specialists, trade stands for pottery, decking specialists, unusual exotics, water plant specialists, plus free demonstrations and presentations (four times daily) from a team of well-known personalities, including a flower arranging expert. Many will remember the likes of the Jolly Garden with its cosy-looking wooden arctic hut (now being renovated in different plant surroundings) or indeed the 'Beyond 2000' garden with its orange walls and almost bathroom-like tiling.

This is also undergoing a transformation as is the Turtle Mound Garden which was part of the first Mallow festival.

The O'Donoghue/Ross family have now adopted the Turtle Garden. A family of sculptors, they have incorporated their striking work into the simple green lushness of the Sagina foliage on the turtle mounds which has been a continuing favourite with visitors over the years. This year, there will be a new raised bank of flowers along the bas relief south wall, filling the garden with purple blooms and the scent of lavender. Smaller sculpture will be interspersed amidst the flora.

Mike Collard of Future Forests, Bantry, is set to stagger visitors once again. Who could forget

his 'wood garden' during the millennium exhibition? Never before had I seen timber rings used in such a decorative and unusual way, or viewed the

roots or an aged tree washed clean of soil, bleached by sun and standing like a smoked

kipper in the vertical plane, to act as walling. He's back this year I believe, to do justice to at least three gardens.

As the Brits round up prisoners in reprisal, Teddy's group is caught and Teddy himself tortured. Saved at the last moment from execution, they head for the hills.

Following the Anglo-Irish Peace Agreement, which formed the Irish Free State as a dominion within the British Empire, the brothers find themselves pitted against each other, with Teddy supporting the Free Staters (as a practical solution to the independence struggle) but Damien still pursuing the IRA's dream of a totally independent Ireland.

With Des Baumann, Jim Duggan and Joe Foley, his music companions they regularly entertained the very many at various functions throughout the locality. In his spare time he loved to watch old films. But most of us who knew Sean Casey will always associate him with the world of business.

At the age of sixteen Sean became a telegrapher in Morse Code, taking up a position in Athlone. A vacancy occurred in the Post Office in Dungarvan, Sean applied and was successful and so for the rest of his life the Old Boro, became his adopted home. The impact he was to have on the town and its people has been immense. He attained the position of Assistant Post Master at the local post office. Keenly interested in Radio and television he set up CBR with Sev. Baumann and Paddy O'Riordan. They decided that Dungarvan should have a television service of its own, to cater for this new and promising industry.

In the mid sixties they decided to go their own ways, Sean decided to resign from his position in the Post Office and so Casey Television was born and from humble beginnings and many difficulties and obstacles Sean showed steely determination. With a shoe string budget he set out to design an aerial suitable for bringing BBC into Ireland in the pre Televis Eireann days. In the days in the run up to the opening of our National Television Station on New Year's Eve's 1961/62 Sean's business began to expand, aerials were erected and televisions were supplied to virtually all homes in Dungarvan and West Waterford.

Over the years those aerials have been replaced by a new underground system. Casey Cablevision also supplied a signal to serve Cork consumers. Cork Communications requested Sean's help, the rest is history. In the past Sean and family made their own television sets. For almost a decade they manufactured their Daysha televi-

sions. The London Educational Authority, the Prison Services in England, the Garda Training College and Headquarters in Templemore were some of the Casey's best known customers.

As the sands of time rolled on change came quickly, fibre-optic network was installed within two years. Cablesurf came into being, the internet was also being spoken of.

Thanks to Sean Casey Dungarvan showed the way and many international companies availed of his expertise. This gave Sean great pride and a rewarding sense of fulfillment. In 2000 the Urban Council saw fit to accord Sean Casey a Civic Reception for his services to the community. This accolade gave Sean great personal satisfaction, his labours over many years were being appreciated and applauded. Surely Sean Casey the Entrepreneur and businessman is a glorious chapter in the history of our town, a man who facilitated business and industry through his ultra modern communications network. The story is still ongoing, Internet and Broadband and thanks to Billy, Pat and Noelle the Casey name is still very much to the forefront of the commercial life of the town.

A big hearted man, who loved the simple things of life, he had the common touch without airs and graces. Sean Casey was a very charitable man, a compassionate man, a man who often put his hand in his pocket to help the under privileged and downtrodden. His passing is deeply regretted by so many whose lives have been enriched by Sean's talents. He has left an indelible mark on virtually everybody. We are all the poorer since Sean left the stage of life.

On Wednesday Sean breathed his last, fortified by the Last Rites given by Canon O'Mahony P.P. Sean lay in repose at the Kiely Funeral Home, near neighbour V. Rev. Fr. Brendan Crowley P.P. led all in rosary and prayers on Thursday evening. Following prayers on Friday by Canon O'Mahony P.P. the removal took place to St. Mary's Parish Church for the 11 o'clock funeral Mass which was celebrated by Fr. Paul Waldron C.C. with co-celebrants Fr. Crowley P.P., Canon O'Connor P.E., Canon O'Mahony P.P., Fr. O'Callaghan O.S.A., Fr. Paul C.C. read the Lessons and delivered a homily which was deeply appreciated.

Mark, Brian and Emma Casey (grandchildren) and Dirk Baumann read the Prayers of the Faithful. The Offertory gifts of a trumpet, cable, bread and wine were brought to the Altar by Jamie and Emily Nagle, Ross and Richard Casey. In the adjoining cemetery we gathered for final prayers and blessing as Sean Casey, one of nature's true gentlemen was laid to rest.

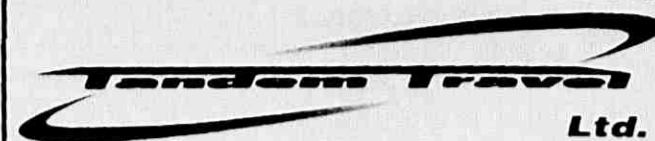

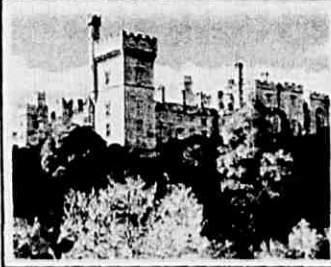



# Mulching now can save water

WITH the ever present threat of climate change, and more importantly hosepipe bans becoming the norm, modern gardeners have to take conserving water seriously.

The easiest way any gardener can cut down the amount of watering required to keep plants healthy this summer is by

### Popular mulches: the facts

**Gravel:** Long-lasting, effective and shows off plants well. May need occasional topping up occasionally

**Tumbled glass:** Very much like gravel but colours only limited only by colour of the starter glass, which is tumbled to take off the sharp edges. Can be expensive

**Membrane:** A very effective and permanent solution, but is hard to install and does not work with flowering plants

**Bark chippings:** Long-lasting and good looking, it is effective, especially in shady settings. Needs replenishing occasionally as it does sink into the soil and eventually rots down

**Cocoa shells:** Lightweight, clean and easy to use. Can be expensive, needs replacing annually and can make dogs ill if they eat it

**Compost/manure:** Excellent soil conditioner and is cheap if home-made. Needs replacing every year

**Newspaper:** Very cheap but needs to be replaced every year. It does not look very pretty unless covered by a layer of soil

mulching.

Mulching involves covering the soil between plants, either with loose material such as chipped bark or gravel or with sheet material, such as a plastic membrane or layers of newspaper.

If loose material is used it is essential that a thick 5-8cm deep layers is placed on weed free soil. The main aim of a mulch is to prevent the evaporation of water from the surface of the soil and prevent weeds germinating.

If an organic mulch is used this will eventually break down and improve the soils water retaining capabilities.

Mulching around plants sometimes has the added benefit of controlling slugs too. Slugs and snails hate trying to cross sharp angular cocoa shells or shredded bark, though they can find a nice warm, damp home under a layers of newspapers.

A thick layer of mulch not only reduces the amount of water lost from the soil, it also restricts the amount of water reaching it too, especially if you are using a non-permeable membrane, such as plastic sheeting.

If you place a mulch over dry soil, the mulch will get wet when it rains, but very little will reach the soil and the roots of plants.

Therefore, it is essential that the ground has been well soaked before you put down the mulch. Gravel is a very attractive mulching material and the more modern alternative of tumbled glass, which is made from recycled material is becoming more popular.

Coming in a variety of bright colours (blue, green and white are popular), tumbled glass is perfect for

showing off specimen plants. It can add a whole new colourful dimension to the smallest garden and at night, with the addition of a few outdoor Christmas lights, can turn any open space into a dazzling talking point.

### This Week In The Garden

#### Thin out rose growth

It is a good idea to examine your rose bushes and standards now and to pinch out any badly placed or overcrowded shoots. Any shoots growing inwards and therefore crowding the centre of the plant are the ones you should look to pinch out in particular as they will cause trouble later on in the year.

#### Watch out for greenfly

Greenfly is likely to make its first appearance this month and you need to keep a look out for this pest especially on the young growth of roses and fruit trees. If you have a bad infestation that natural predators cannot cope with, spray with insecticidal soap.

#### Thin and stake herbaceous perennials

Do not allow your herbaceous perennials to retain all the growth they produce; you will achieve a much better display by thinning out the shoots a little this month. Delphiniums and Michaelmas daisies in particular repay even a drastic thinning. Simply retain some of the sturdiest shoots and nip off the rest. Before the stems grow too long, place bamboo canes in position and loop the stems to these before they begin to flop about. It is best to have several canes per plant.

#### Thin out chrysanthemum growths

Chrysanthemums will be making new growths known as breaks during May. You will have to decide how many you want per plant. The number retained depends on the type of chrysanthemum and why you are growing it. Exhibition Japanese Chrysanthemums, grown for the biggest flowers possible, should have one shoot retained per plant. If you want more flowers, leave three stems per plant.

#### Earth up early potatoes

As the earlier crops of potatoes push their shoots through the ground you need to draw more soil around them for protection. A few degrees of frost will injure these shoots.

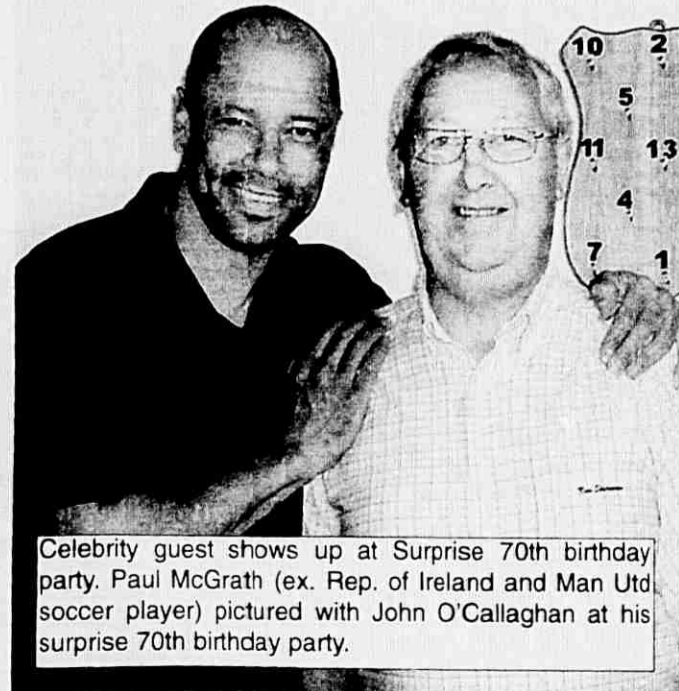

# COOKERY CORNER

## Knives not needed - it's already half-cut!

A TANGY ginger-flavoured Chinese chicken dish, aptly named Drunken Chicken, which will bring out the Oriental in you and your dinner guests.

**Ingredients:**

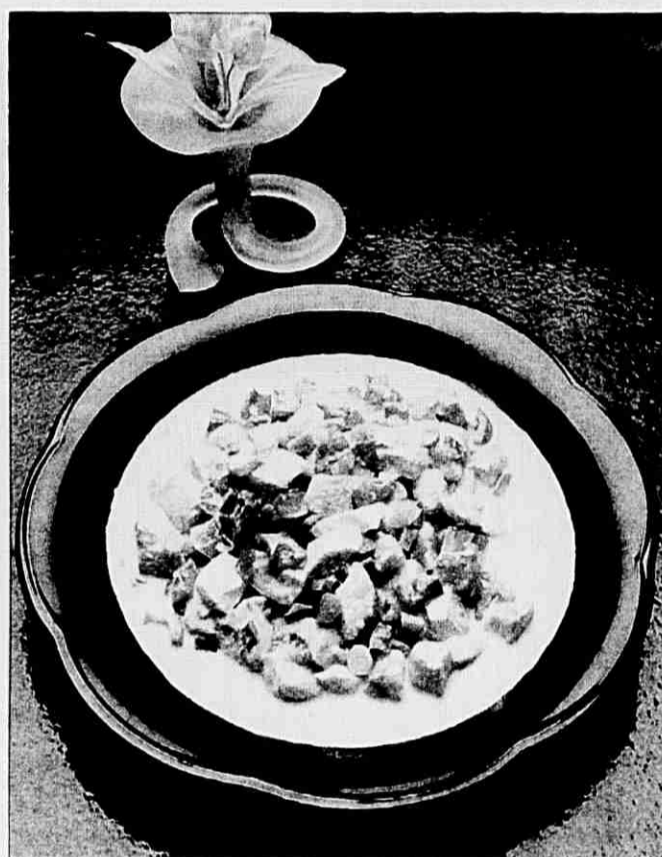
- 1 x 3lb chicken
- 1 spring onion
- 2 slices ginger
- 2 x 5ml sp salt
- 125ml dry sherry or whisky

**Method:**

Cut the chicken into halves and cover it with boiling water. Bring back to the boil, then add the spring onion and ginger slices. Simmer, turning once, for 12-15 minutes. Turn the heat off and leave in the cooking liquid for a further five minutes.

Remove with a slotted spoon, drain and cool. Cut the meat into quarters, rub with the salt and place in a bowl just large enough to hold the pieces. Next, pour your sherry or whisky over the top. Place in the refrigerator and marinate for at least two days, remembering to turn it at least once a day. The longer you leave the meat in the marinade, the stronger the flavour will be. When you are ready to serve the meal, remove the meat with a slotted spoon. Chop it into bite-sized pieces and serve sprinkled with sesame seeds.

**TIPS:** If you prefer, shred the chicken off the bones instead of chopping it up. If you like bourbon rather than whisky, feel free to experiment!



## You'll all go nuts for these acorns

An easy yet elegant butter pecan cookie shaped to resemble an acorn, and dipped in melted chocolate chips and chopped pecans.

**Ingredients:**

- Makes 36 acorns
- 225g butter, melted
- 1/2 x 5ml sp baking powder
- 675g plain flour, sifted
- 350g pecans, finely chopped
- 150g brown sugar, firmly packed
- 225g chocolate

**Method:**

Preheat the oven to 160°C, 325°F. In a large bowl, beat together the butter, brown sugar, half of the chopped pecans and vanilla on medium speed until well blended. Add the flour and

baking powder and mix well, using a low speed. Shape the dough into 3cm (1 inch) balls. Slightly flatten the balls by pressing on to ungreased paper sheets, then pinch the tops to a point to resemble acorns. Bake in the oven for 10-12 minutes. Remove the acorns from the oven and cool them on a wire rack. In the top of a double boiler over simmering water, melt the chocolate, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat and keep double boiler over water. Dip the large ends of the cooled cookies into the melted chocolate, then roll them in the chopped pecans. Cool to set the chocolate.

## Designer burger with added chilli

DESIGNER cheeseburgers! Tasty meat patty, topped with cheese and served with salad and toasted bread.

**Ingredients:**

- Serves 4
- 700g lean minced beef
- 1/2 x 5ml sp ground cumin
- 75g finely chopped onion
- 1/2 x 5ml sp oregano
- 75g dry bread crumbs
- 4 slices Swiss cheese
- 2 x 15ml sp green chillis, seeded and finely chopped
- 4 slices French bread, lightly buttered
- 1 egg
- 4 crisp lettuce leaves
- 3/4 x 5ml sp salt
- 4 large tomato slices
- 1/4 x 5ml sp black pepper
- 4 sweet gherkin pickles.

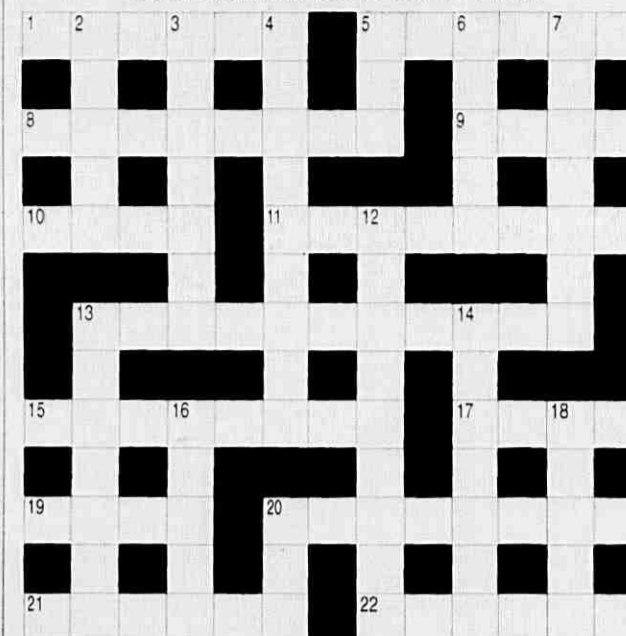
**Method:**

Combine the minced beef, onion, bread crumbs, chillis,

egg and spices in a bowl. Mix thoroughly. When the mixture is completely combined, divide into equal amounts for the number of servings. Shape each portion of the mixture into a thick patty about 10cm (4 inches) in diameter. Cook the patties on a grill until they are done to your liking. This usually takes around five or six minutes a side. Place a slice of cheese on each patty and toast the bread slices on the grill during the last few minutes. To serve, place a toasted bread slice on each plate and top with a lettuce leaf, tomato slice and a cheese-topped patty. Garnish with a gherkin and serve open-faced to eat with a knife and fork.

# SSIAs - Have your cake and eat it!

The first of the maturing SSIAs are only just around the corner. At anytime soon, you can expect a feeding frenzy from many of the financial institutions.

An invest fest. These institutions have only two things on their mind - induce you to reinvest your SSIA money with them when it matures, and continue the savings habit.

The providers of SSIAs have been doing their homework and their surveys. Every week there's another survey. They have found (surprise, surprise) that most of their customers say they will want to reinvest most of their SSIA money into a nicely-packaged product with the same institutions. And what's more, they say they will continue the savings habit at an even higher amount per month, with the same wonderful institution with which they were saving in the first place. How sweet - I've got toothache!

In FBD, we too are a financial institution but we seem to have lost the plot. Or maybe it's because we simply talked to our customers and clients in their homes, to see what they really had in mind.

When you strip down the choices, you can see there are only two decisions to be made -

1. What to do with the savings habit when your SSIA matures, and
2. What to do with all that lovely money.

### Keep the habit

With regard to what to do with the savings habit, here I must confess FBD are much the same as all the others. On the basis that it's probably the only habit you have which is not bad for your health, fattening, or a sin; our advice is - keep the habit going.

It really is as simple as that, so don't get caught up in the avalanche of wisdom and advice, and the finger-wagging circus that's surrounding us at the moment.

SSIA savers are real people leading real lives who have every intention of doing real things with their money. If you're an SSIA saver, just remember one more thing - it's your money, not theirs, so when your SSIA matures, go to them and say "Show me the money".

If you are planning on saving some of your maturing SSIA money or continuing the savings habit, here are a few alternative ideas to the normal deposit accounts and bonds:

A. Pensions - most people know they need to save considerably more into their pension fund. E254 per month invested into your pension will help bridge the gap. If you are a 42% tax payer, you can invest E437 per month into your pension which, in effect cost just E254 after income tax relief.

In addition, E20,000 invested into a pension from your SSIA, grosses up to an investment of E34,500 into a pension for a 42% tax payer.

B. Geared Investment - use E10,000 of your SSIA to invest E50,000. How? Borrow the other E40,000 and use your current monthly SSIA contribution to service the borrowing.

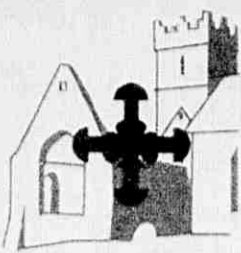

The Munster Masters Track and Field Championships were held last Sunday in Castleisland, Co. Kerry and the club had by far its strongest and strongest team ever participating at the championships. 27 athletes made the journey to the Kingdom in search of an unprecedented Waterford victory.

Last year Joe Gough, Track and Field Masters Co-ordinator, said that in 2006 our club could and would take the title as overall best masters track and field club in Munster and with this in mind he rallied his troops over the last two months and achieved the result he and the club had wished for last Sunday when we lifted the cup for the very first time with 12 points to spare over our nearest rivals. This is the very first time that this cup has seen the light of day outside of Cork or Kerry who more or less have dominated Masters track and field athletics for more years than I care to remember. As I already said we travelled in numbers and a huge tally of 65 medals was our lot from the 27 athletes participating.

We had some outstanding individual performances from Terri Gough over 60 who took 3 golds (hammer, shot, javelin and 100 metres). There was an outstanding performance from Jacinta Sheil over 45 taking 4 gold medals javelin, shot, hammer and discus. Joe Gough, over 50, had an yet again another great day taking 3 gold medals, 400, 800 and 1,500 metres. Sandra Brazil White, over 35, showed us why she is one of the best female masters athletes in the country presently taking gold in the 200 metres and silver in both the 100 and long jump (just piped on the line by the Irish champion in the 100).

Mairead Flynn, over 35, won silver 200 and bronze in 800 and discus. Josie Ni Chuirrin, over 40, also won 2 bronze medals in the 800 and 1,500 metres and Jim Fleming was in terrific form taking silver over 35 in the 3,000, plus he added bronze in both the 1,500 and 800 metres.

Con Kelleher, a noble club man if ever there was one, took silver medals over 50 in the 800 and 3,000 metres. He added bronze medals in the javelin and 1,500 to his collection for the day. John Foley, competing for the first time at these championships for the club, won bronze over 55 in the javelin, 1,500 and 400 metres and took silver in the

800. Michael Wade, over 45, was a key member of the squad when taking silver over 45 in the 800 metres. Ann Moroney another true club lady won for herself and the club 2 silvers in the shot and 200 metres over 45 and also added bronze in the 1,500 and 100 metres to her impressive tally.

Anne Whelan brought home three silver Munster medals

to the Whelan household at Colligan when taking second in the 200, 800 and 1,500 metres. Helene Hayes did likewise for Caseyville winning the full complement of gold 100 silver 200 and 1,500 and bronze in the shot. Joanne Dunford wasn't found wanting when called upon and took a bronze medal in the javelin while her brother Michael also won bronze in

the mens (over 40) 200 metres. Judy Hanrahan took bronze in the 1,500 metres over 35.

Danny McGrath performed well to take bronze in the discus while Garry McCormack won bronze in the 1,500 metres over 40. Pat Dunford showed us fine technique in the shot (over 40) to win bronze and Colin Lyons was on hand to take silver over 45 in the javelin and high jump.

We had some great performances in the relay events with the men taking bronze in the 4 x 100 with the team of Jerry O'Connor, Michael Dunford, Pat Dunford and Garry McCormack.

The Ladies not to be outdone had two teams taking silver and bronze, the silver winning team consisted of Sandra Brazill-White, Josie Ui Chuirrin, Mairead Flynn and Anne Whelan while the bronze winning team were Judy Hanrahan, Sharon O'Brien, Terri Gough and Helene Hayes.

In the mens team event for the 3,000 meters we won silver with the team of Garry McCormack, Con Kelleher and Jim Fleming.

This rounded of a great day for the club and congratulations to Joe Gough once again and his team captains of Pat Dunford and Sandra Brazil-White, to Bo Bo, Helene, Paddy and club chairman James for there support and participation, and, of course, to John O'Brien who got us there and back safe and sound a big thank you.

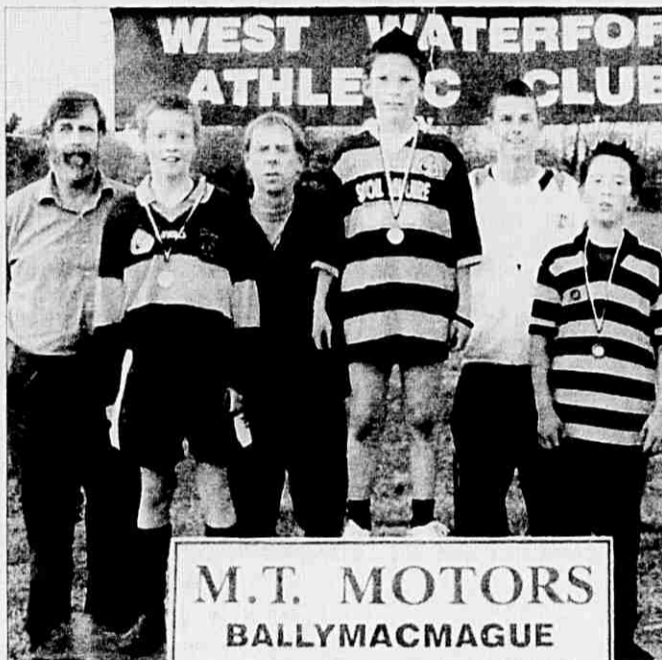
# Primary School Sports

# Waterford Lay Down Challenge to Fancied Tipperary

There is no point in making a secret of our expectations that for very many weeks we had been looking forward to a visit to

Semple Stadium, Thurles, for a battle with Limerick and a possible place in the Munster final against Cork on the last Sunday of the month.

Fate, Tipperary and Eoin Kelly ordained it to be otherwise and now thousands of our supporters will make their way to the Munster capital on Sunday next for a 'showdown' with a county fully determined to gain revenge for 2002 at the same venue when we relieved them of their title before a record attendance.

The result of the Tipperary/Limerick first round clash might have been a surprise, but what was really surprising was the super performance of passion and fierce determination by the men from the premier county who certainly scaled new heights there, in bringing about the downfall of the hot favourites, who had gotten off to a whirlwind start with 2 'gift' goals in the opening minutes. Tipperary's refusal to panic at this stage and their resolve to overcome the setback in the manner in which they subsequently did, has a big message for Justin and the back room team here in Portlairge and the bottom line tells us that our opponents here next Sunday are a much more formidable side than that which played in the Allianz National League this year. The story of our 2002 Munster final meeting with Tipperary still makes enjoyable reading for all Deise folk but a lot of water has flowed down the Lee since that happy day and we here in Waterford have experienced many 'ups and downs' in the four intervening years. The losing of their Munster title marked the beginning of a poor spell for the Premier County who are only now recovering.

In the matter of hurling titles won, Tipperary have a huge lead on us, they have won a total of 37 Munster championships as against only 7 for us. They have won the All-Ireland senior hurling title on 25 occasions and we have celebrated on only two occasions.

**THE 2002 MUNSTER FINAL**  
Tipperary were Munster and All-Ireland champions in 2001 and fancied to add to their record when Waterford defeated them on a scoreline of 2-13 to 3-12 at Pairc Ui Caoimh in 2002. It was an epic encounter and a game of skill and ferocious determination which thrilled the capacity attendance.

In a tribute in the immediate aftermath of that final, Tipperary coach/trainer Nicky English paid a tribute when stating that 'no team in Ireland would have lived out there with Waterford today.'

The news from the home camp is

as scarce as the summer weather with the management team playing their cards close to their chests.

Over the past week it was being leaked out that both John Mullane and Ken McGrath were back in training and that both would likely be included in the starting line out. But unless there is a change of policy on the part of the management team, we are unlikely to know for sure until the fifteen rush out on to Pairc Ui Caoimh at 1-45 p.m. on Sunday next.

Anyway whatever the team is we expect and have every right to expect that the fifteen going out will wear the numbers corresponding with the positions and that they will start in those positions.

This is a Munster senior-hurling semi-final and patrons have a right to expect the match programme to be accurate. Positional changes from the match programme team if announced before the start of the match, will be an embarrassment to all.

## TIPPERARY WERE UNDERRATED?

An R.T.E. games analyst recently made the point that Tipperary were very much underrated going into the Munster semi-final this year, as their form last season was far more respectable than they were being given credit for. Having researched their 2005 record I must agree. Here it is.

First round: Tipperary 2-14 Limerick 2-14. Tipperary 2-13 Limerick 0-18 (replay after extra time)

Munster semi-final. Tipperary 2-14 Clare 0-14. Munster Final Cork 1-21 Tipperary 1-16.

## THE LINE OUTS

Tipperary are very unlikely to make much change on a winning team and when it is announced this evening after training it's almost certain to be very much the same as that which won in Thurles.

Brendan Cummins is absolutely certain to be in goal for Tipp. He has played there on no less than 45 championship occasions since making his senior debut when Tipperary defeated Waterford by 0-11

to 0-10 (remember) at Cappoquin in a tournament on November 14th 1993. The Ballybacon/Grange man played his first senior Munster championship match on May 21st 1995 and that was also against Waterford.

They will likely stick with the defence with Philly Maher flanked by Declan Fanning and Paul Curran and same halfback line of Eamon Corcoran Conor O'Mahony and Hugh Moloney.

Paul Kelly may be recalled to play centre field and if not we may see Shane McGrath and Colin Morrissey there again.

Eoin Kelly who is again their top scorer and our biggest worry will play on the inside line but is likely to be seen anywhere inside the 40 metre line. With him will be Ger O'Grady, the Thurles Sarsfields man, who captains the team, John Carroll, John O'Brien and Michael Webster and Diarmuid Fitzgerald.

## WATERFORD

While Tipperary are undoubtedly on top of their form right now, they are not invincible. Because of our circumstances, Tipp will commence as favourites (as they did in 2002).

Waterford in the role of outsiders may have the capacity of causing a surprise. But this will only happen if every player on the team performs to his full po-

tential. If this happens then we certainly have a chance of winning through to play Cork in the Munster final.

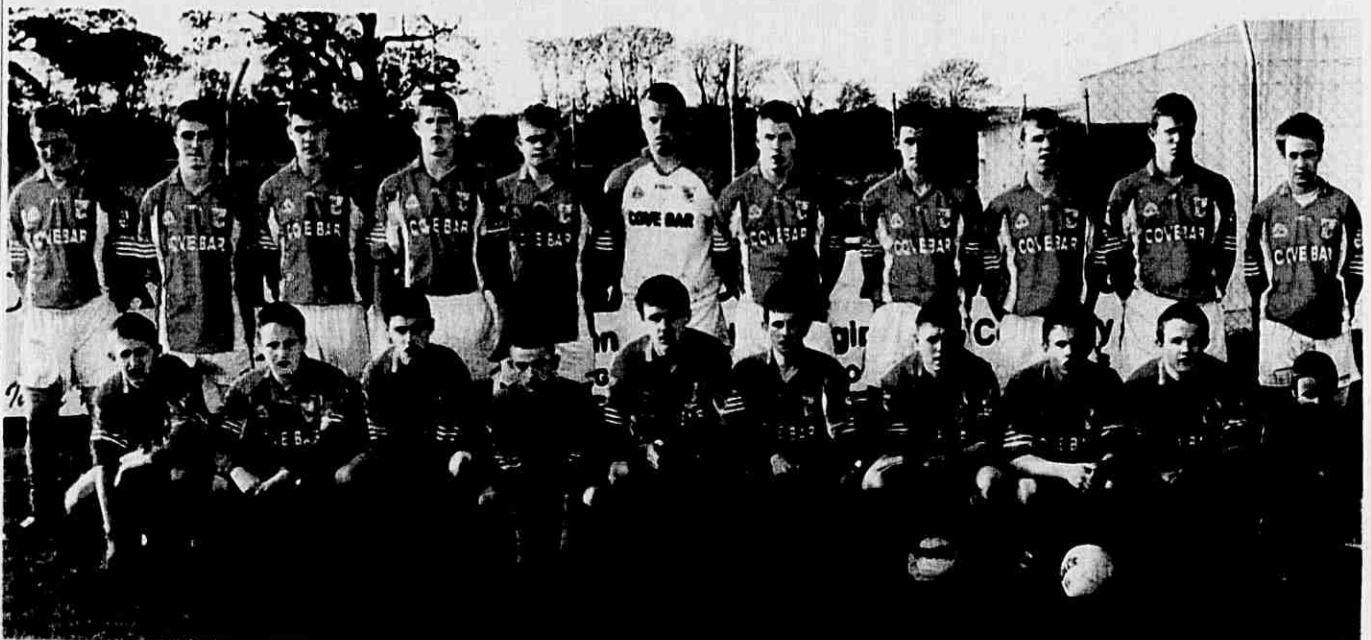

As we wrote we have listened to many in the past few weeks and we are delighted that so many have ideas and suggestions, all for the betterment of the league. What we have learned is, that when the restructure takes place, some clubs will have to change their commitment to the league, or should we say a commitment from the players in those clubs. The changes that are envisaged as we see them, will have clubs challenging promotion and relegation right to the end of the season, similar to the season just finished when relegation from the premier division depended on games played on the final day of the season. Frankie Dettori's win in the last topped off a perfect start to the next phase in Ascot's 295-year history."

Last Saturday's attendance at Ascot was 11,000 and comprised of local residents, industry professionals, press, contractors, Ascot staff, catering staff and invited guests.

## RACING NEWS

### NEW STAND SET TO BE CONSTRUCTED AT GALWAY

The Galway Race Committee have revealed that they have signed contracts for the construction of the New West Stand at Ballybrit. The development will be handled by Michael J. McNamara & Co and the signing was presided over by Minister John O'Donoghue. The total cost of the development will be €22 million and will be grant-aided by Horse Racing Ireland to the tune of €10 million. The work, which will include the demolition of the existing West Stand and the construction of a new facility, is scheduled to start after the 2006 Summer Festival Meeting and will be completed in time for the 2007 meeting.

### CURRAGH DECISION DELAYED

The Curragh Racecourse must wait until at least next week before learning whether it is able to start work on its 100 million redevelopment. On Friday in Dublin's Commercial Court, Mr Justice Peter Kelly reserved judgement on whether to grant a request for pre-emptive costs to Friends Of The Curragh Environment, the group which is seeking a judicial review of An Bord Pleanála's decision to grant planning permission to the Racecourse.

### SCORPION RULED OUT TILL AUTUMN

Trainer Aidan O'Brien has revealed that Scorpion has met with a setback and won't

be seen again till at least September at the earliest. Last year's English St Leger winner and Budweiser Irish Derby runner up has suffered a hairline fracture to his pastern and will definitely miss the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes at Ascot in late July. O'Brien also confirmed that Ace is on target for the Coronation Cup at Epsom on Friday.

### ASIAN MAZE FLOPS IN FRANCE

Winner of the Aintree Hurdle and the Champion Stayers' Hurdle at Punchestown on her last two outings, the Tom Mullins trained Asian Maze flopped badly in the Prix la Barka Hurdle race at Auteuil in France on Sunday. Ridden by Ruby Walsh, Asian Maze weakened out of contention after the fifth last flight and eventually finished tailed off last. Trainer Tom Mullins and jockey Ruby Walsh were at a loss to explain the poor run but she is now likely to miss the French Champion Hurdle and be given a break. On the same card, there was a notable big race win for jockey Philip Carberry as he partnered the Francois Cottin trained Princesse D'Anjou to take the Grade One Gras Savoye Grande Steeplechase de Paris by two and a half lengths. A delighted Carberry reported that his mount jumped really well throughout as he became the first foreign jockey to win this race since Fred Winter won it on Mandarin in 1962.

## Irish Racing Review

### Murtagh On Double At Clonmel

Jockey Johnny Murtagh has been going great guns since the start of the flat season and he was in double form at Clonmel on Thursday night courtesy of Voliere and Faithlegg Girl. The Ger Lyons trained Voliere (3/1) made every yard of the running to win the opening Irish Stallion Farm E.B.F. Fillies Maiden while Murtagh adopted different tactics on Tom Hogan's Faithlegg Girl (12/1) in the Knockmealdown Handicap over ten furlongs as he brought his mount with a steady run in the straight to defeat Misty Island (6/1 joint favourite) by a length and a half.

### Line Ball In Control

A fluent winner at Punchestown six days earlier, the Christy Roche trained Line Ball followed up in good style at Wexford on Friday evening. The 11/10 favourite was not extended by Alan Crowe to defeat Dr Willie Martin by seven lengths and connections are likely to go for another hurdle race with him before sending him over fences later in the Summer.

### Oxx And Berry Double Up

Trainer John Oxx and jockey Fran Berry combined to land a double at Limerick on Friday evening with Shehira and Zarwala, both horses owned by H.H. The Aga Khan. Shehira (8/11 fav) looked an unlucky loser at Naas on her debut recently and proved a clearcut winner of the Mr Binman Median Auction Maiden over a mile while newcomer Zarwala belied a lack of market confidence (returned 5/1, opened 7/2) when recording a decisive success of the Limerick Frozen Foods E.F.B. Maiden over eleven furlongs.

### Araafa Claims First Classic For Nosedo

Trainer Jeremy Nosedo was a very happy man at the Curragh on Saturday when sending out Araafa (12/1) to land the Boylesports Irish 2000 Guineas to give him a first ever Classic success. Only fourth to George Washington in the Newmarket equivalent three weeks earlier, Araafa handled the very testing conditions better than his rivals to defeat George Washington (4/7 fav) by two lengths with Kevin Prendergast's Decado (4/1) one length back in third spot. Jockey Kieren Fallon was quick to blame the heavy ground for George Washington's defeat and is looking forward to a re-match with the winner in the St James's Palace Stakes at Royal Ascot next month.

Later in the day, there was a major shock in the Ridgewood Pearl Stakes over a mile when the John Joseph Murphy trained Pout, a 40/1 chance and the complete outsider of the six runner field, proved too strong for the

13/8 favourite, Jazz Princess, in the hands of Danny Grant. Only rated 90 going into this race, she showed fine reserves of stamina and courage in the testing conditions to record a surprise victory and as a Group Two winner, has significantly increased her value as a broodmare.

### Nighttime Strikes For Weld Family

The Dermot Weld trained Nighttime ran out a decisive six length winner of the Boyle-sports Irish 1000 Guineas at the Curragh on Sunday to give the stable a third success in this prestigious event having won it with Princes Polly in 1982 and Trusted Partner six years later. Having only the third start of her career, Nighttime strode clear of her struggling rivals early in the last quarter of a mile to defeat 50/1 outsider, Ardrae Lady, with Queen Cleopatra (11/1) proving best of the Aidan O'Brien quintet in third place. Owned and bred by Mrs Marguerite Weld, who also bred the 2004 Budweiser Irish Derby winner, Grey Swallow, Nighttime was providing the stable with a fantastic family success and is a well bred daughter of the 2001 dual Derby winner, Galileo.

On a cracking eight race card, the Andre Fabre trained Hurricane Run (1/4 fav) recorded a bloodless victory over Alexander Goldrun in the Tattersalls Gold Cup which was the middle leg of a treble for jockey Kieren Fallon on the day as he had earlier guided Eagle Mountain (3/1) to win the juvenile maiden before partnering Puerto Rico (9/4 fav) to win the Gallinule Stakes, both horses trained by Aidan O'Brien.

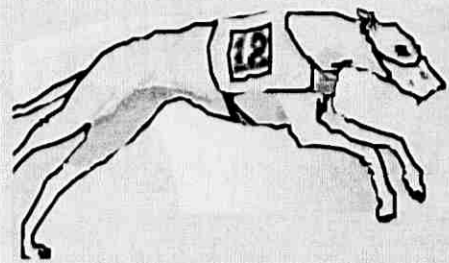

Led early on by both Jades Prince and Tiara Danny Windgap Nikita (Spiral Nikita-Double Glory) went to the front down the back stretch but had to be at his strongest in the closing stages to see off the persistent challenge of Jades Prince who went down by three quarters of a length in 29.01.

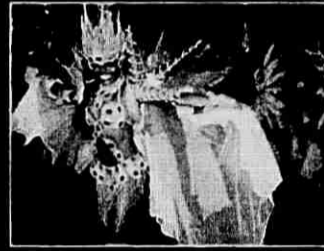

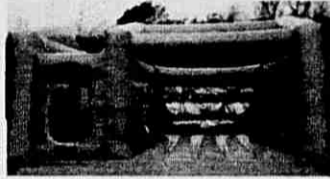
