## Waterford Co. Council Fined For Landfill Breaches

### LATEST SETBACK AS COUNCIL IS BROUGHT TO BOOK

Waterford County Council's waste crises continued to worsen as the local authority was brought before the courts over a number of breaches in the terms laid down for work on its landfill in Tramore.

At a court hearing last week,

Waterford County Council pleaded guilty to two breaches in a case brought by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) - resulting in a fine of 4,000 euro.

Waterford County Council appeared alongside Waterford City Council who also pleaded

guilty for breaches in the remediation of its Kilbarry landfill. They were fined 6,000 euro.

However, the outcome could have been worse. Earlier in the year the council issued dire warnings that the case could result in fines of millions of euros - a maximum fine of upwards of 15 million euros could have been levied by the courts.

## Cappoquin Gets Largest Slice of Sports Funding

Sports clubs and organisations in Cappoquin, Dungarvan and Kilmaethomas were among those celebrating significant Government funding, which was announced this week.

Among the largest beneficiaries was Cappoquin Community Development Company who received 140,000 euros to complete construction of a new sports complex in the West Waterford town.

Progressive GAA club, Brickey Rangers, matched that total, receiving 140,000 euros towards a clubhouse.

"I am delighted that twenty two sports projects in Waterford are benefiting from the

1.642 million euros under the national lottery funded Sports Capital Programme," Minister, Martin Cullen said welcoming the news.

"This funding which ranges from 6,000 euros to 200,000 euros for individual projects gives local sports clubs and centres that essential financial resource they need to maintain and upgrade their facilities.

"Today is further evidence of this Government's commitment to investing in sports facilities, especially at local level, where clubs of wide ranging sports, run by dedicated volunteers, remain the backbone of our sport.

"I am confident that this funding will provide the various clubs with better facilities,

improving the standards in services that they provide, and encourage more people, of all ages, to participate in sport at local level," the Waterford Minister said.

Dungarvan Utd received 45,000 euro towards the refurbishment of their clubhouse, while a further 90,000 euro has been allocated to Dungarvan GAA club for the drainage and floodlighting of the main pitch.

Kilmaethomas GAA Club will receive 60,000 euros for pitch drainage. Abbeyside Utd and Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club will collect just over 20,000 euro each, while 6,000 euro will go to Cappoquin Snooker Club for the refurbishment of the snooker hall.

# The Launch of The Heritage Plan

In a well-attended function at the Civic Offices, Dungarvan, County Waterford's first five-year Heritage Plan was launched by the County Mayor, with guest speakers Eamon de Buillear, film-maker; and Billy Colfer, member of the Heritage Council and author of books on landscapes and history in County Wexford.

The Mayor welcomed the publication of the Heritage Plan, emphasising that, as far as the Council is concerned it represented a beginning of a work programme. He saluted the ongoing work of volunteers who have led the way in the study and promotion of heritage for many years.

Councillor Lola O'Sullivan, chair of the County Heritage Forum, thanked all those who have helped with the preparation of the Plan and who showed their continuing support for the Heritage Plan Programme by coming to the launch. She also emphasised the vital role of volunteers, singling out the County's two independent natural heritage websites and of the County Flora project.

Funds have already been allocated for this year's projects in the Heritage Plan and tenders are being invited for a survey of wetland habitats and an updated list of thatched houses in the county.

Billy Colfer, speaking for the Heritage Council, welcomed the involvement of local communities and individuals whose active participation is the key to progress. He welcomed Waterford County Council's continuing involvement in the Heritage Officer programme, pointing out that 27 Irish local authorities now employ Heritage Officers. National Lottery funds are distributed by the Heritage Council to local authority Heritage Plan projects on a matching funds basis. The minimum allocation is €30,000 while the average has recently been about €50,000. Referring to the importance of heritage to people he said that where local communities support and act to manage their heritage it is mainly for their own benefit. And heritage that is appreciated by local people is often that most admired by tourists. Hook Head and the nearby villages on Waterford Harbour have had a long affinity with county Waterford, linked by accents, fishing and trade.

Brian White, Director of Services for Community and Enterprise in Waterford County Council, said that Waterford County Council were delighted that the strategic plan for heritage in County Waterford was now in place. He thanked the members of the Heritage Forum for their work in the preparation of the plan and he specifically thanked the Heritage Officer, Dominic Berridge and Anne Walsh, Secretary to the Heritage Forum for their contributions. He said that the plan provides a blueprint for action for the next five years not alone

for the Council and all the state agencies with responsibility for heritage matters but also for the Heritage Forum and the wider community. He said the plan acknowledges that heritage is their shared responsibility for all and that by applying the Irish proverb of "Ni neart go cur le cheile" that the heritage of Waterford could be further enhanced.

He said that the Council was aware that the Voluntary and Community Heritage Groups want much more action from the Council. He cited a long list of projects that have run into difficulties because of heritage protection measures including the Vikings at the Waterford City Bypass, the Killarney fern on the Dungarvan Bypass etc. He said that the Council is now taking much more consideration of heritage matters and the recruitment of a Heritage Officer, Conservation Officer, Archivist, Archaeologist and other staff and the impact that they were having on the Council overall was paying dividends. In conclusion he welcomed the Heritage Plan which gave every individual more reasons to be rightly proud of being from County Waterford.

Eamon de Buillear praised the initiative by the Council and the Heritage Forum in developing an excellent and comprehensive heritage strategy. He said that there was an urgent need for much greater awareness and attention to heritage matters. He pointed to the fact that on his journey from Wick-

low to Dungarvan only two flying insect hit his windscreens, years ago there would have been many more. Similarly the disappearance of the meadows and the grasshoppers signified a loss of biodiversity and he said that his greatest concern was the quality of our rivers and streams. Eamon said that part of his love of nature and music was derived from his mother who came from Passage East in County Waterford. He said that he had filmed parts of his programmes for his wildlife television series in County Waterford including scenes at the Copper Coast and more recently in the wonderful project of

Integrated constructed Wetlands in the Ann Valley.

Eamon praised the Heritage Forum and had special words of praise for the Heritage Officer, Dominic Berridge and thanked the Heritage Council for their involvement.

In launching the strategy, he said he would like to set it sail on a traditional Irish tune and he produced a mouth organ and concluded with a beautiful rendition of An Botharin Bui.

# Funding Go-Ahead For Local Harbour Works

Waterford Transport Minister, Martin Cullen, welcomed Government funding to the tune of 1.05 million for coastal protection and small harbour works in County Waterford.

Under the allocation - announced by the Minister for the Marine, John Browne yesterday (Tuesday) - 76,000 euros will go towards upgrading and modernising harbours at both Ardmore Pier and the Blackwater.

But the largest chunk of the allocation, which will come from local authority and Government resources, will go towards vital Coastal Protection works.

"Ireland is recognised as having some of the most scenic coastline in the world. Notwithstanding these most spectacular natural phenomena, some sections of our Waterford coastline are under threat of erosion," Minister Cullen said.

"The Government's coastal protection programme will enable work to be carried out that will slow or even halt the erosion process in places, such as at Bonmahon where the coastline is at its most vulnerable."

The 975,000 euro funding is being provided for the reconstruction of sand dunes at Bonmahon and rock armour and gabion wall at Ballyquin.

Under the Small Harbours Programme, the Government funding will go towards the raising of the deck level at Ardmore Pier and the construction of a slipway and turning circle at the Blackwater.

"These harbours are vital to the economic activity of the nearby towns and villages. Coastal communities with few alternative sources of employment or income can often depend on the commerce generated by our harbours."

"This new funding will secure their smooth operation and development," Minister Cullen said.

A total of 7.9 million euros will be spent by the Department nationwide this year.

# Waterford County Council Fined For Landfill Breaches

(Continued from Page 1) gas from the Tramore site. He pleaded guilty to charges of also pleaded guilty to failing to collect and burn off cap or fill over the cells or

waste holes on the site, within the required time.

The Tramore site has been in operation since 1939, the court heard. It was closed at the end of last year. To date some 2 million euros have been spent on remediation works with a further four million euros pending departmental approval.

Judge Micheal O'Shea fined the council 2,000 euros in respect of each of the two offences.

During the course of the case, he also acknowledged that the failure to properly deal with the landfill was typical of problems surrounding legacy issues.

### CASH STRAPPED

It also emerged that the cash-strapped council did not have the funding to carry out the work. The council has sought funding from the Department of the Environment in the hope that 75% of the multi-million euro remediation works on Tramore and Dungarvan landfills will be forthcoming from the exchequer.

The case was just the latest in a series of setbacks which have beset the council regarding its waste management service. With the closures of Dungarvan and Tramore landfills, the council has been forced to export its waste to landfill in Carlow, leaving them to face a bill of around 700,000 euros per annum.

Alongside this they are facing a major challenge from private operators; the loss of income from the closure of the two landfills; and the failure to find a suitable location for a new

countywide landfill.

While the council executive tried to offset a deficit of over seven million euros by imposing a contentious annual flat fee of 150 euro, just eight thousand householders - three thousand short of the target for a viable service - have paid up so far, a result which has plunged the council into fresh crises and forcing it to adopt a "get tough" policy on those who have failed to pay.

### COMING TO TERMS

Speaking after the case, Mr. Paul Daly, Senior Engineer with the county council said they are doing everything to abide by the terms and conditions laid down by the EPA.

"No regulatory authority wants to find itself in court," he told the Irish Examiner. "We are disappointed we ended up there and being prosecuted. We were trapped and couldn't do anything about the offence."

"We had not reached the required level of work, mainly for financial reasons. We simply did not have the money at the time because of the delay in the Garrynagree landfill. We simply ran out of cash."

"When the EPA inspected the site, we were not where we should have been work wise. We were guilty of the offence as charged. We are now going ahead with the work and will have the major work - the gas collection and final capping work - done within the next six to eight months."

"The site should be fully completed in 12 months," he added.

# Four Houses Planned For Cow Lane

Four houses for the elderly are planned at the rear of Fitzgeralds Terrace behind Kelly's shop in Cow Lane, Dungarvan.

However, the plans met with some opposition at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, where concerns over the "tight space" and traffic arrangements for the houses

were aired.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty had suggested that the plans go on public display under Part 8 for submission.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Damien Geoghegan said the traffic plans for the houses which would open out onto a one way system was "unfeasible" and "not on."

It's understood that traffic would have to go through Mar-

tins Terrace to access the houses as the road is one way up from the rear of Fitzgerald's Terrace.

Labour councillor Teresa Wright said it is an "isolated area" and she was "not enamoured with the proposal"

Her party colleague, Cllr. Billy Kyne also raised concerns, saying the proposal "seems a tight fit" for four houses.

Responding Mr. O'Flaherty said the traffic generated from the senior citizens homes would be "very small".

Town Manager, Denis McCarthy, meanwhile, said there were a lot of implications in regard to developing housing in the area, but he recommended that the plans be put on public display in order to get the submissions from people living nearby.

# Gumdoctor Hired As Part of Dungarvan's Tidy Towns Challenge

Dungarvan's bid for a Tidy Towns award began in earnest last week when the Gumdoctor moved onto the streets of the town. Areas pockmarked by the tell-tale white blotches on O'-Connell Street, Main Street and Grattan Square were removed by specialised machines.

Based in Middleton, the Gumdoctor, was contracted to carry out the seven or eight days work by Dungarvan Town Council. The clean-up comes in the run up to this year's annual Tidy Towns Competition.

Dungarvan has already retained its Litter Free Status and moved up to eight place in the

Litter League Table. And a concerted effort is now underway to have a similar improvement in its rankings in the Tidy Towns Competition.

The Gumdoctor crew already completed work on the streets of Lismore shortly before the West Waterford town won Gold in the prestigious Entente Florale competition.

And the firm has carried out work on five of the top eleven towns which won Gold Medals in the Tidy Towns competition the previous year.

Its estimated that there are 500 tonnes of chewing gum stuck to the streets of Ireland every year. The Gumdoctor

specialises in the removal of chewing gum and other severe soiling from horizontal surfaces where the entire surface can be cleaned thoroughly and pore

deep. It operates in three stages under the influence of steam, environmentally-friendly detergent and subsequent thermo-mechanical cleaning.

## Government Must Take Action on Spread of Crack Cocaine

The Government must take action on the spread of crack cocaine throughout the south east region and beyond, Labour Party Deputy, Brian O'Shea has said.

Deputy O'Shea, who was addressing a Dail motion on Drug Misuse, estimated that the amount of cocaine arriving in Ireland between 1995 and 2004 was worth 5.37 billion euros. Last year alone an estimated 210 million euros worth of cocaine flooded into Ireland - an almost tenfold increase in just four years.

"In my own region, the South East, the percentage of those seeking the support of regional services arising from cocaine misuse was 0.5% while of the 2786 who sought treatment for alcohol and drug abuse in 2005, 2.3% were misusing cocaine.

"In the south east region there is some anecdotal evidence that cocaine users are presenting with chest pains. Cocaine can cause problems for the heart and lungs.

"The use of cocaine is spread evenly across the region. In gender terms 73.8% of those presenting for treatment in the South East region are male while 26.2% are female.

He said that there is a "real need" to spread capital investment in drug prevention into towns both big and small throughout the country.

"The fact that cocaine is seen by many as a drug of leisure without any detrimental effects is particularly worrying. The pattern for so called leisure users of cocaine seems to be, first consume a large amount of alcohol followed by cocaine.

The Joint Oireachtas Committee is presently preparing a report in regard to having alcohol included in the National Drugs strategy.

# Shock As Dungarvan Development Executive Resigns

The man who was hoped to help attract millions of euros in investment and spearhead a number of ambitious projects to kick start the local economy has resigned from his post with Waterford County Council.

Mr. Brian Rafferty, the Business Development Executive, whose special focus was on attracting investment and sparking growth in the Dungarvan economy, resigned after just seven months in the post.

## SHOCKING BLOW

The announcement came as a shocking blow to development prospects in the town. Mr. Rafferty, who is President of the Tipperary Chamber of Commerce, had

been employed by the County Enterprise Board for a term of around three years, having been hired in the wake of the devastating blow dealt to the economy by the closure of Waterford Crystal and the resultant loss of hundreds of jobs last summer.

"He was dynamic and had great plans for the town," former President of Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce Ann Marie Rossiter said.

"He stirred discussion and debate about a marina, and other possibilities which would benefit the town economically.

"He had begun a study of the skills base in Dungarvan in association with Waterford Leader Partnership. He had also organ-

ised a trip for councillors to see Marinas in Dublin working."

## LACK OF LEeway

His departure was blamed on a lack of leeway shown by Waterford County Council for a number of ambitious projects and was also caused by the failure to rezone land for development purposes quickly enough.

Mr. Rafferty previously stated that his main ambition was to build four marinas, creating up to a thousand new jobs, in Dungarvan — a plan which was scaled back to just one marina close to Quanns and Borreenatra.

## SAD END

New Chamber President, Shay Harty, who was appointed to the post at the Chambers recent AGM, described it as "a sad end to a promising start".

"One of the main reasons for his resignation was that not enough land was being rezoned quickly enough to keep the town moving in the right direction.

"We as a chamber must be pushing our town in the right direction while remaining fair to the existing businesses who have built this town and the new businesses who wish to locate here."

## Dungarvan Residence Sells for €1.65m. at Public Auction

After 25 minutes of active bidding, the property was knocked down and sold in trust to Billy Gleeson Esq., Solicitor, Thurles.

Commenting on the price, Auctioneer Eamonn Spratt stated "this is the latest benchmark for prices in the Dungarvan area, both the vendors and the Agents were exceptionally happy with the price achieved on the day".

Spratt Auctioneers are shortly to Auction on the 8th June, a Retail Park Development site adjacent to the Waterford Crystal Plant. This site offers F.P.P. for

70,000 sq.ft. of Car Showrooms and Retail Warehousing accommodation. Following on the 21st June, the Dungarvan Firm shall be offering for sale by Public Auction, on behalf of Glanbia Estates, four Glanbia Branches at, Aglish, Ballyduff Upper, Ballydurn and Cullen Castle, near Tramore.

Rounding off in June they are again offering for Sale by Public Auction on the 23th, a Prime Parcel of Zoned Residential land with valuable alternative access fronting on to the N25 measuring 3.3 Acres.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Eamonn Spratt confirmed that "interest in all of our Auctions to date in 2006 has been exceptionally strong, and this also looks very positive for the third and fourth quarters of the year.

## OUR DAILY BREAD

Cereal and toast for breakfast, sandwiches for lunch, and pasta for dinner (with a few biscuits in between). Wheat-based foods now make up a major part of the Irish diet and as a result they have become a major cause of ill health. Wheat only became such a significant part of the Irish diet relatively recently. For many years, the staple food in this country was the potato and Irish people simply did not develop the ability to tolerate wheat very well. However, in more recent times we have begun to consume lots of wheat-based foods made from refined flour, and large quantities of packaged foods which contain wheat or wheat proteins. The result is that Ireland now has the highest incidence of wheat intolerance and coeliac disease of any country in the world.

Wheat contains high levels of a protein called gluten which has an irritant effect on the lining of the digestive system. Most of the wheat used today has been bred to contain very high levels of gluten. White flour contains no bran or wheatgerm and therefore the gluten becomes particularly concentrated. An individual's tolerance to wheat is influenced by many things including genetic factors, diet, lifestyle, general health, and levels of stress. If there is poor tolerance, the high levels of gluten present in wheat cause inflammation of the lining of the digestive system which leads to a number of other problems.

Firstly, the inflammation can lead to abdominal pain or discomfort, nausea, bloating, and constipation or diarrhoea. Many people also experience symptoms affecting the mouth such as chronic chapped lips or recurrent mouth ulcers. Secondly, inflammation in the digestive tract encourages the growth of unfriendly bacteria and yeasts which cause a range of symptoms including digestive problems, sweet cravings, reduced alcohol tolerance, thrush, sinus problems, headaches, tiredness and poor concentration.

Gluten-induced inflammation causes the body to become even more sensitive to the offending protein. Individuals can also develop an intolerance to other foods which contain smaller amounts of gluten such as rye and oats. In extreme cases, coeliac disease can develop in which any amount of gluten in the diet causes severe inflammation in the digestive tract.

The lining of the gut normally acts as a barrier which prevents mole-

cules from entering the bloodstream until they are fully digested. When the lining is inflamed it becomes leaky and allows larger, partially digested molecules to pass through. This can lead to allergic reactions to a wide range of other foods. Various forms of allergy testing are now widely available with many individuals being given long lists of foods to exclude from the diet. However it is often not necessary or even safe to stop eating many different foods.

In most cases it is just one or two foods which are causing a problem. The intolerance to other items is usually a result of the damage caused by the main problematic foods. For some people, cutting out many different foods can lead to nutritional deficiencies, or (in rare cases) to a situation where intolerances develop to the foods still being eaten, leading to an ever decreasing choice of well-tolerated foods.

Fortunately when wheat is removed from the diet for a period of at least 6 weeks, and appropriate herbal remedies are prescribed to reduce inflammation and heal the damage to the gut lining, the tolerance to other foods tends to increase.

Wheat can be substituted with other grains such as spelt, oats, rice and rye which are rotated to prevent further intolerances developing. Herbs such as chamomile help to reduce inflammation and allergic responses, gotu kola repairs the damage to the digestive system, and goldenseal helps to ensure foods are properly digested and destroys any unfriendly microorganisms. Many other herbs are available to help with other symptoms such as fatigue, bloating, and constipation.

For some people, removing problem foods from the diet can lead to unpleasant detox reactions which can be severe in a few cases. Therefore, any attempt to address a suspected food intolerance should be conducted under the guidance of a qualified medical herbalist or nutritional therapist.

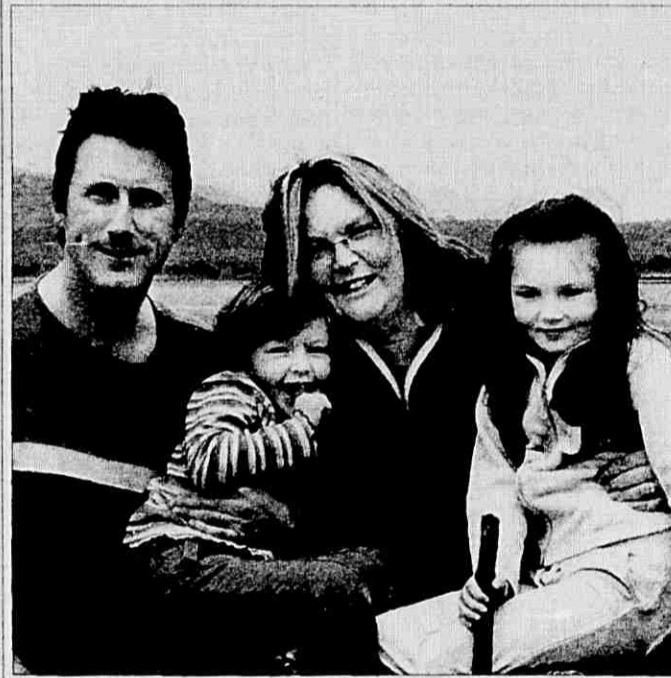

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

### HOUSE REPAIRS

Dear Editor,

May I through your paper offer a word of advice to anyone thinking of doing house repairs or extensions. Don't give the job to the first contractor who offers you a quotation. Shop around, because the price difference between one contractor and another can be quite substantial.

Last Autumn my house needed a new roof. The work was to consist of replacing the tiles, front and back, on the original house plus re-felting a dormer bedroom on the back and re-felting the back kitchen which was leaking badly. Because I was hoping to qualify for a County Council grant, I needed to submit three quotations with my application. I rang seven local contractors around 11th August. From these only two quotations emerged, neither of which was satisfactory. One was for €8,500 plus VAT making it €9,647.50. However, no mention was made of re-felting the dormer and it stated that the kitchen roof would have to be assessed later - meaning that I had no idea what the final figure would be. The second quote was for €21,350. Because it was so high I thought there had been a typing error and that it was meant to be €11,350. But no, on enquiring this guy told me €21,350 was correct and he couldn't do it for anything less. He said if I gave the job to anyone quoting much below that I'd find out at the end that I would be billed for 'hidden extras' not included in the quote i.e. hiring of scaffolding, disposal of rubble, etc.

At that point I submitted my application with the two quotations I'd got but I said I'd keep trying and hoped to have at least one more by the time the Council Engineers called to assess the work to be done.

So in late September I rang seven other contractors, five local, one from Lismore and one from Youghal. As a result I received two further quotations - one for €11,722 and one for €12,200. Both of these were satisfactory and were from contractors with whose work my sons were familiar and could recommend. There was a problem however, neither of them could name a date when they would be ready to start the job. They were as we say "up to their eyes" already.

I didn't want the work to go into the Winter, so on 11th October I rang an 052 number which I had seen in the Dungarvan Leader. I had no idea who this contractor was or where he was based. He was in fact from Clogheen (about 4 miles from where I grew up) and he was doing a job in Abbeyside at the time. He called in at lunchtime to assess what needed to be done and he had his quotation (including VAT number and tax clearance cert) in by the following Friday. Because neither I nor anyone I asked knew anything about him, I had to ask for a reference from someone for whom he had recently done some building work. He duly provided that. His quotation was for €9,700 which was €2000 less than his nearest rival. What was more important, he could start the job as soon as given the go-ahead.

I gave him the contract, not because his was the lowest quotation, but mainly because he was ready to start immediately - which he did. His team consisted of just himself, his son and two others and they did an excellent job. Once they started they were here every day that was fine, they made no mess and there weren't any 'hidden extras'.

People around here were impressed by what they saw, before they left here they had been asked to do a similar job for a lady around the corner and six months since then they have re-roofed seven or eight houses nearby.

If this contractor could make a modest profit doing the job for €9,700, how much would the guy who quoted €21,350 be making?

So be wise, shop around.

## Get Your European Health Insurance Card - Deputy Deasy

Deputy John Deasy is urging people planning on travelling to Europe this summer to apply for a European Health Insurance Card for themselves and their families.

Deasy who is Chairman of the European Affairs Committee in the Dail said, "there are many people out there who aren't aware that they are entitled to medical cover if they are travelling or staying temporarily in another state in the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland. Currently, the EEA comprises the 25 member States of the E.U. together with Iceland, Norway and Liechtenstein."

"The card entitles you to necessary healthcare in the public system of any EU/EEA members state if you or a member of your family becomes ill or injured while on a temporary stay in that country. School children will be getting their holidays soon and I think parents should consider applying for the European Health Insurance Card if they are travelling abroad."

"The cards are valid for two years. However the card does not entitle anyone to travel abroad with the aim of getting

healthcare through any foreign public health system. Anyone can get a European Health Insurance Card if they are ordinarily resident in Ireland. To obtain a card you will need to provide your name, address, date of birth, Personal Public Service (PPS) Number. You do not need a card to get healthcare while on a visit to the U.K.

To obtain healthcare with the card while abroad, you can go to the nearest public system doctor, public hospital, or other public treatment centre and present your card. Further information about the card, including application forms, are available for your local Health Service Executive (HSE):—

### The Bridge

Before the bridge was constructed people travelled by ferry from Roderick's Quay, on the site of the now demolished leather factory. There was a ford (on the site of the present causeway) which could only be crossed at low water. This had been used by "great numbers from time immemorial". The rights to the ferry were owned by a Mr. Grogan from Wexford. He received a yearly rent of £70 from the person who operated it. The operator made £200 per annum.

In 1808 Sir John Newport of Waterford urged the Duke of Devonshire to build a bridge across the Colligan. "The electors and inhabitants of that borough have been for some time given to understand that it was not only his grace's intention to layout a considerable sum of money in building houses there but also, and more particularly, to alleviate the difficulties they experience from the ferry by erecting a bridge near the river- this, your lordship will excuse me for saying, has been too long delayed."

J.C Beresford had proposed at the assizes, that a bridge be constructed at the expence of the county, but the motion was not successful. Sir John Newport stated that Beresford was intending to bring the matter up again at the next assizes and suggested that the Duke announce immediately his intention to build the bridge at his own expence. The Duke did agree, thereby boosting his popularity in the county. The Duke's agent, Thomas Knowlton, commented on the efforts of the Duke's agents and friends- "their endeavours have been so far successful in meeting and defeating every measure of the house of Beresford, and I am full of hope that providence will continue to give blessing to their exertions"... to be continued

## ENVIRONMENT TODAY

### JUNK MAIL

Many of us regularly receive so-called "junk mail" in the post - that is, unsolicited mailings, usually of an advertising or promotional nature. As most of this usually ends up in the waste bin, there are ways to cut down on the amount of junk mail that you receive, leaving less waste paper for you to dispose of or recycle. Under section 2(7) of the Data protection Acts 1988 and 2003, you have a legal right to have your details removed from marketing databases.

### WHAT TO DO?

To reduce junk mail, the mailing Preference Service enables you to have your details removed from marketing databases of the main direct marketers in Ireland. A leaflet on this service, entitled Direct Mail: Your Right to Choose, is available from your local Post Office or from An Post Head Office. Also, when completing survey forms etc., be sure to check for a box/space where you can indicate your preference not to receive any future promotional material or to have your details passed on to other organisations for marketing purposes.





**PUTTING AND KEEPING QUALITY INSIDE THE BLACK BALE**

**Plan** — Baled silage is now quite expensive to make, so it is important that the money a farmer invests in producing a meadow and in then mowing, baling, wrapping and storing it are adequately repaid. The chances of success are much higher where the major issues can be pre-planned rather than where making baled silage becomes a rushed or salvage operation.

Wilting is an important component of making baled silage, so some flexibility is needed in the plan to ensure the meadow can be mown when weather conditions permit good field drying.

Baled silage differs from conventional clamp silage in that most of the costs — baling, wrapping and transport — are incurred on a per-bale (effectively per-tonne) basis. Consequently there is a lesser penalty for cutting high-quality, low-yielding, grass crops. This feature can be exploited on farms, and encourages conserving good quality grass, where the superior feeding value of a highly digestible bale more easily justifies its ensiling cost.

**MOWING**

**Management mowing to promote effective wilting**

Mow a meadow after the dew has evaporated. This is because a heavy dew on a high-yielding meadow contributes over three tonnes water per hectare (over 1 tonne/acre) and surface water usually dries quicker from a standing crop — monitor weather forecasts, and try to mow and wilt during a spell of dry, sunny weather.

**Wilting** — The radiant heat from direct sunshine together with the dryness of the air are what evaporate water from a wilting crop. Thus, the more of a mown meadow that is exposed to sunshine and air movement the better.

The target is to bale the grass at about 30 to 35% dry matter (DM)

Aim that the mown swath is on the ground for preferably one, and at most two nights. The grass treatment required to achieve this will depend on the yield of the crop and drying conditions — heavy crops in moderate drying conditions will require the most aggressive approach

If a mower-conditioner is used, ensure that the gates behind the conditioner are opened so as to leave the grass in a wide swath. Aim for 60 to 80% ground cover.

If unavailable, use of spreader-mowers, which give up to 100% ground cover, can eliminate the need for separate tedding in certain conditions. If it is planned to ted grass, do it as soon as feasible after mowing so as to maximise the duration that most grass is exposed to sunshine. If there is a risk of rain overnight, or if baling is expected to be carried out early the following morning, it may be advisable to windrow the tedded grass before nightfall.

Minimise the production of lumpy swaths.

**Baling** — Aim to make dense, well-shaped bales. These bales will be heavy. However, the reduced number of bales per hectare decreases baling, wrapping and transport costs. Well-shaped bales are easier to wrap properly and to handle without causing damage.

Aim to present well-shaped swaths that suit the baler pick-up

Adjust the baler density setting to the maximum allowable position

Drive the tractor to provide an even and balanced flow of grass into the bale chamber. Use a slow rather than a fast forward tractor speed, to help produce dense, well-packed bales

**Wrapping** — The simple but vital aim is to create oxygen-free conditions for the wrapped bale, and these conditions need to last through to feedout. When wrapped in 4 layers of conventional polythene (plastic) film, the thickness of such plastic on a silage bale is 70 µm compared to 250 µm for a double-sheeted silage clamp. With the new thin film on the market, it is even less. Since each bale of silage typically has 6 to 8 times the surface area in contact with plastic compared to clamp silage, it is clearly important that the plastic film is of good quality, is properly applied and is not subsequently damaged.

Bale wrappers are geared to apply film so that each layer overlaps the underlying layer by 50%. In Ireland, four layers of film are typically used, although in countries such as Sweden six layers are the norm. The number of revolutions of the wrapper turntable needed to ensure a nominal covering by 4 layers of film on a regular, well-shaped bale is about 16 turns. Experiments at both Grange and Oak Park have shown that a minimum of 4 layers of conventionally applied standard stretch film is required to conserve baled silage adequately. Where good management practice prevails, the benefits accruing from progressing to 6 layers of film are small. The production of dense, high dry matter (DM) bales from highly digestible grass, with in excess of 200 kg DM per bale, can justify the use of 6 layers of film. An increase of 25 kg DM per bale will pay for two extra layers of film by reducing the number of bales to be baled, wrapped, transported and stored.

ideally transport bales to the final storage area and wrap them there. This avoids damage to the plastic wrap in the field caused by birds and reduces the risk of mechanical damage to the plastic during transport.

**Handle/transport** — Gentle handling of bales before and after wrapping is essential in order to maintain the shape of the bales and the integrity of the seal provided by the plastic film.

Avoid rough handling of unwrapped bales as this can mis-shape them, thereby rendering them more difficult to wrap perfectly (avoid using a spike if feasible)

Transport wrapped bales to the storage area immediately after wrapping, and certainly within 24 hours. An extended delay can allow the shape of some bales to settle, making them more difficult to mechanically lift without causing damage to the plastic film.

Immediately repair any damage to the plastic film

Considerable amount of damage to the plastic film caused by birds can take place in the field shortly after wrapping. If wrapped bales cannot be transported immediately to the storage area, relocating them temporarily from the silage stubble to an area of green grass will usually avoid bird damage.

**Storage** — Chose a level, smooth and hard surface on which to store the bales. Bales stored at ground level can be positioned on their curved or flat sides.

Successfully wilted bales can be stored up to 3 tiers high if suitable bale handling equipment is available (max of two high if in REPS).

Protect and inspect fence off the stored bales from livestock, etc.

Ideally, stocks of wrapped bales should be protected at the sides and top with fine mesh netting or monofilament lines (0.5m spacing). Aim to have about a 0.5 m gap between the netting and the bales.

Whereas painted markings on bales do not provide fully secure protection from bird damage, they can significantly reduce the scale of damage. Use white emulsion paint (not oil based) on black plastic. 'Eye' shaped designs are more effective than X or O designs.

## SOUTHEAST ICMSA NEWS

**ICMSA Urge Farmers to Avail of 6-Month Veterinary Medicine Prescription To Achieve Savings**

Since 1 January 2006, vets are allowed to provide farmers with a six-month prescription for all veterinary medicines and the ICMSA has urged farmers to avail of this facility in order to achieve cost savings in purchasing veterinary medicines, as well as saving time.

Mr Dominic Cronin, Chairman of ICMSA's Dairy Committee, has said that farmers are now spending over €120 million per annum on veterinary medicines with costs escalating dramatically over the past number of years as the availability of veterinary medicines has become more restricted. Mr. Cronin said that there is considerable variation in the cost of veterinary medicines and he advised farmers to 'shop around' to achieve the greatest value.

The availability of a six-month prescription will facilitate farmers in this regard and ICMSA is advising farmers to insist on getting a six-month prescription and then avail of the most economic outlet to purchase the product: be it a vet shop, a pharmacist or a licensed merchant. Vets are now legally obliged to provide farmers with a prescription for all prescription-only medicines and farmers should insist on a six-month prescription for standard veterinary medicine products.

**National Council Meeting**

National council delegates from the southeast region will head to Limerick for a meeting of the council on Tuesday 13th June. The main issues on the agenda for this meeting include milk price, national partnership talks, and a report from the chairman of the beef and livestock committee John O'Leary.

**ICMSA Accuse Local Authorities on 'Upsurge Of Noxious Weeds'**

The Deputy President of ICMSA, John O'Leary, has called for Dept. Agriculture and Food to move its focus away from farmers and towards local authorities and property developers on the grounds they are the parties most responsible for an upsurge in noxious weeds all over the country.

Mr O'Leary pointed out that 'yet again' the most draconian regulations and punishments seem to be reserved solely for farmers, who run the risk of losing their Single Farm Payment while noxious weeds are left to grow and spread along roadways and building sites with absolutely no action being taken against landowners responsible. The Kilarney-based farm leader pointed out that one need only drive along any road in the country to see the proliferation of noxious weeds along the roadside.

As a result of this local authority inaction, a farmer's land could be contaminated with noxious weeds and he could end up with a penalty on his SFP. Mr. O'Leary argued that this possibility was massively unfair and unacceptable and he said that it was 'high time' that the local authorities and non-farmers got their houses in order on this question. ICMSA was of the opinion that this was the problem that the Department needed to be addressing and not putting a question mark over farmers' Single Farm Payments.



## IFA Urge Farmers to Shop Around for Farm Building Quotes

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Rosemary Kennedy has urged farmers carrying out investment under the Farm Waste Management Scheme to shop around for a number of quotes from builders.

There are reports of farmers getting quotations with a wide variation of prices.

Mrs. Kennedy said that while the Department of Agriculture standard costings for the new scheme are not yet finalised, the grant aid is payable on the actual or standard cost, whichever is the lowest. Therefore it is important that farmers should get the best prices available to carry out the work under the Scheme.

IFA has already got a commitment from Agriculture Minister Mary Coughlan that the costings increase, when agreed, will be backdated to approvals already issued since 1st January.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman said a decision on costings was urgently needed as farmers have to organise their financial investment requirements based on accurate assessment as to what the grant aid will be. "As it stands at present, farmers may as well be getting a 45% grant as opposed to a 60% which the Minister for Agriculture promised."

Mrs. Kennedy said that from IFA analysis costings for building and construction materials have gone up quite significantly over the past 2 years. Based on the CSO wholesale price index for building and construction materials, stone, sand and gravel have increased by 23.5%, cement has gone up by 8%, concrete blocks and bricks have gone up by 17.5%, electrical fittings by 22.5% and labour costs have gone up by over 12%.

## NEW QUOTA SYSTEM MUST KEEP QUOTA AFFORDABLE — KIERSEY

Speaking recently, Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Kevin Kiersey said committed milk producers could only afford to pay an economic price for milk quota, regardless of what system Minister for Agriculture Mary Coughlan introduces after 1st April 2007. He warned that to avoid speculative prices, Minister Coughlan must ensure her proposed new system operates without recourse to brokers or auctioneers, some of whom have already tried to hype up quota price expectations for their own purposes.

"Dairy farmers' incomes are under enormous pressure, with lower milk prices and increased production costs. A 52-cow herd producing 260,000 litres — this is about 20% above average — will generate an income of

around €19,000 in 2006. This is 2/3 of the average industrial income, and less than half the income paid to workers in dairy co-ops," Kevin Kiersey said.

"Farmers will only be able to stay in business and grow their enterprise with viable milk prices and affordable milk quota," he warned.


"The future of milk quota at EU level is uncertain, with many predicting that the 2008 review will provide for the end of the regime on or before 2015. Minister Coughlan's proposed new system must take this into account, and ensure that committed dairy farmers are not saddled with speculative quota prices. The best way to do so is to ensure no intermediaries such as auctioneer or brokers are involved in the scheme," he concluded.

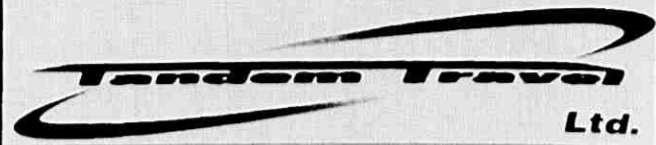

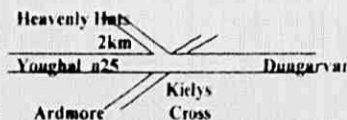

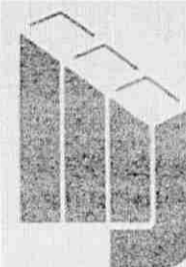

### But A Number of Drink Driving Arrests Made

The public enjoyed a balmy Bank Holiday weekend in good spirits with no major incidents occurring in Dungarvan.

Huge numbers of people took to the streets, and the pubs and clubs over the weekend with the vast majority enjoying a relaxed and good-spirited time, according to the Gardai in Dungarvan.

Spokesman, Sergeant Paul Heffernan said there were a number of minor public order offences and a number of drink driving arrests but in general they were happy with the response of the public to the highly visible presence of the Gardai.

"We had a quiet enough weekend bearing in mind the number of people around. We had a number of arrests for minor public order offences but

"The pedestrianisation of the quay also went well."

He said: "We did have a number of arrests for drink-driving. We are vigorously enforcing the road safety campaign at this stage and if people persist in drink-driving then they can expect to face the full consequences of the law.

"The message has to get across about drink. If people persist then we will be in a position to take them off the road completely."

## Judicial Review Holding Up Ardmore Treatment Plant

Issues around the delivery of Ardmore Treatment Plant must be resolved before the multi-million sewerage scheme can proceed, according to Minister for the Environment, Dick Roche.

Minister Roche was answering a parliamentary question put forward by Dungarvan-based TD John Deasy.

Deputy Deasy questioned the Minister on his views following the publication of the EPA's findings into bathing water

quality at Ardmore beach which failed the test for mandatory standards.

Replying the Environment Minister, Mr. Roche said Ardmore is part of the Waterford Grouped Towns and Villages Sewerage Scheme which is included in the Department's Water Services Investment Programme 2005 - 2007 as a scheme to start construction next year at an estimated cost of almost 47 million euro.

"Waterford County Council is advancing the scheme on the basis of there being separate contracts for the collection systems for each location and all wastewater treatment plants being procured under a single Design, Build and Operate contract.

"I understand that the council is currently in the process of preparing contract documents for all elements of the scheme and these will be dealt with as quickly as possible following receipt in my Department.

"However, I also understand that an application has been made to the Courts for a judicial review of the Part 8 planning approval for the Ardmore wastewater treatment plant. This issue will need to be resolved before this particular element of the project will be able to advance to tender," Minister Roche said.

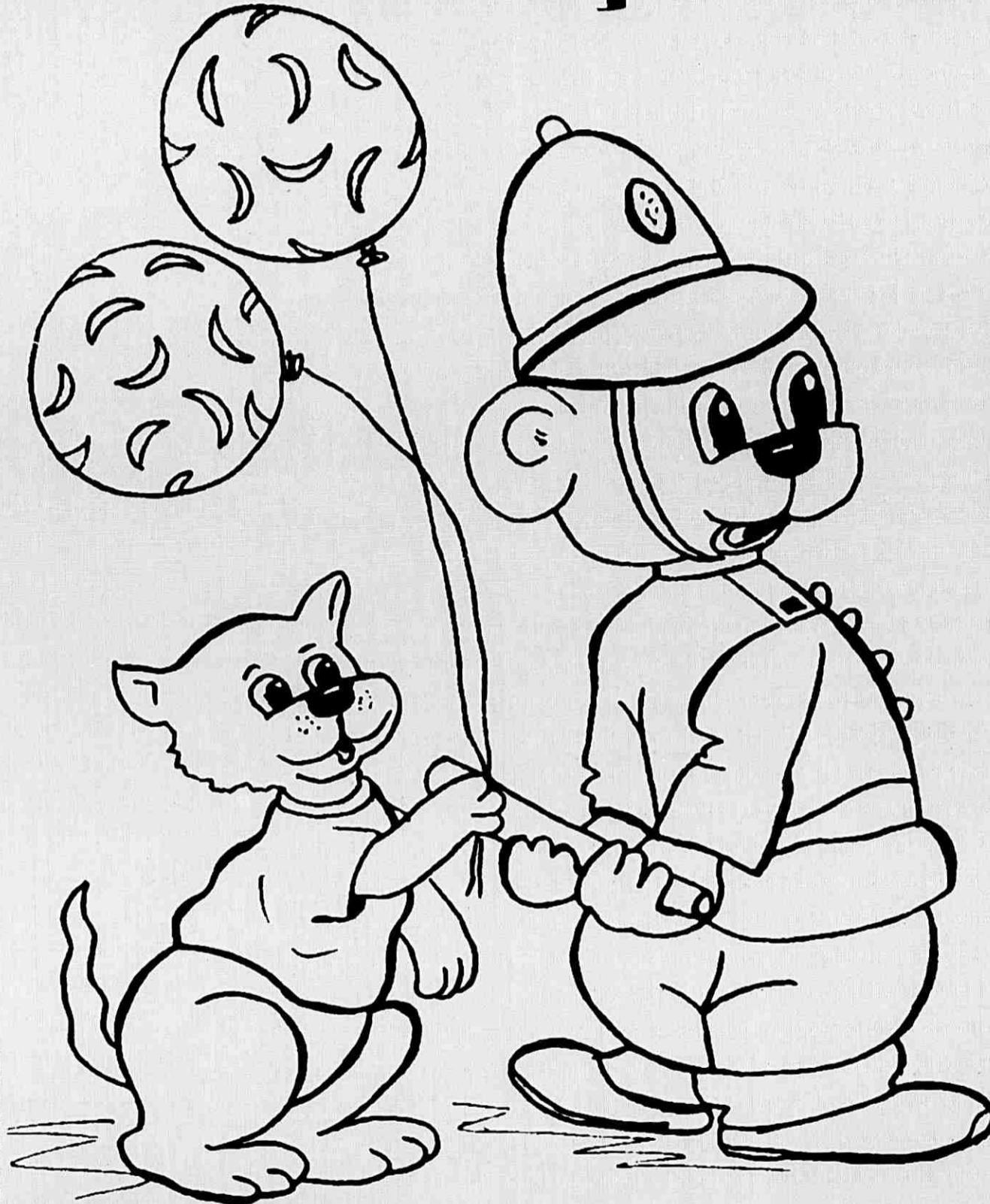

# THE TRIASSIC PERIOD

The Triassic period was the period between 248 million and 213 million years ago. Scientists called it Traissic (from the Latin word trias, meaning 'in threes') because remains of the first dinosaurs were found in a three layered system of rocks.



**The Earliest Dinosaurs**  
 Towards the end of the Triassic period, some 200 millions years ago, creatures developed that were quite different from their thecodont ancestors. These were the first dinosaurs. Among them were two small meat eaters, herrerasaurus and Staurikosaurus. Both were about 2 or 3m (6.5 to 9ft) long and walked upright, but little is known about them because very few fossils exist from this period.

**Dinosaurs Versus Mammals**  
 Many other animals, as well as dinosaurs, lived in the Triassic period. There were creatures both on land and in the water. The first mammals, warm blooded animals that feed their young with milk, appeared about the same time to the dinosaurs. But it seems that the dinosaurs were better adapted to the conditions at the time and thrived, whereas the earliest mammals soon died out. This situation remained unchanged until the dinosaurs became extinct at the end of the Cretaceous period, and the mammals then took over the land.

**Life In The Seas**  
 During the Triassic period, life in the seas continued to flourish. The first ichthyosaurs, placodonts and nothosaurs thrived at this time. Ichthyosaurs were first shaped reptiles ranging from 1-9m (3-30ft) long with limbs shaped like paddles. They also had a dorsal fin and a fish like tail. Placodonts were armour-plated and jawed, most of them were quite small. Nothosaurs, ancestors of the Plesiosaurs, had feet which were used for swimming, but possibly for scrambling on shore as well.

**Not All Dinosaurs Walked Upright**  
 Staurikosaurus, Herrerasaurus and many other early dinosaurs could walk upright. This was important for these plant eaters because they could reach high branches and they could also see around them. Other plant eaters walked on four legs but usually had long necks so they were still tall enough to eat from high branches and look around for danger.

### DID YOU KNOW?

- Dinosaurs ruled the earth for 160 million years before becoming extinct.
- ★ Dinosaurs can be divided into two groups, depending on whether their hip bone looks like a bird's or a reptile's.
- ★ The discovery of dinosaur bones in the 1700's was ignored because of the Christian Church said God would not allow any creature to become extinct.
- ★ The biggest dinosaur discovered in Seismosaurus. It reached 36m (118ft) tall, and weighted 80 tonnes. It wasn't at all ferocious, it just munched quietly on plants!
- ★ Some scientists believe the biggest Branhiosaurus may have weighted 190 tonnes.
- ★ Some dinosaurs swallowed stones to break up food in their stomachs.

The Waterford Intermediate team should operate like any club second team, developing and feeding new players on to the senior team. The difference being, while clubs may have to call on a share of thirty something to field the second team the county would not be similarly limited numerically. I would nearly go as far as to set an age limit; over twenty one and under twenty nine (unless an exceptional case). The new county manager, and this appointment is surely not far off unless Justin wins the All-Ireland, could maybe be given the option of appointing the B team manager. Whoever appoints the second team manager, it should be conveyed to all players that if you want to get on the senior team, this is where you can start. Some players may be good enough to come straight out of u21 grade on to the senior team. Others may need another stage between. Both county managers would work hand in hand. A complete overhaul of the system is required. As it's constituted, players don't take the Intermediate set up seriously. You would get a different response if this team was given real status. We are losing ground to other counties in Munster and much of it is due to systems we operate. It's time for fresh thinking and leadership. I doubt we will see it.

What a wonderful occasion it was on Sunday for two local lassies from Scoil Mhuire. Ciara Hallahan and Michelle Tobin fielded out in the Primary

school game. A great honour for the girls and their families. Well done all.

They say you shouldn't put the boot in when they're down. I will justify this boot by saying I have put it in before, whether they were up or down. A clubman attending the Limerick v Tipperary game told me he was sitting behind five well known, high profile Tipperary hurling men. The group included Nicky English and Donie Nealon. With a wealth of experience and a bird's eye view of proceedings on the field, this quintet would consult regularly, draw conclusions and convey their findings to Babs on the line. Cork and many others operate in the same manner. They have team managers who are big enough to take good advice.

The game on Sunday has been well analysed by now. Just a few brief observations. I was delighted for James Murray who turned in a fine performance when introduced. Paul O'Brien is stereotyped as a corner forward by the selectors. They wouldn't have seen his performances at midfield for Tallow this year.

Justin was interviewed by the Examiner after the game and bemoaned the amount of wides (11) we shot in the first half, injuries etc as the reasons for our defeat. As usual he got an easy ride from the media. What about asking him some real questions? I'm unlikely ever to be sanctioned for a Press Pass but a few questions I would like to ask.

Why did you negate the influence of one of the best midfielders in the country by deploying him at full forward?

Why was a player clearly struggling with injury started and allowed stay on the field for the entire half? Why was a championship debutant given the task of policing the most lethal forward in the game? Are the players not getting dizzy from the merry-go-round of positional rotation? Why have you not developed a panel by giving the bench more game time (against Down, Offaly last year etc. etc.)

There are many other questions regarding selection or non selection over the years. There may be plausible answers. We will never know because nobody will ask the questions. As Tom Humphries put it on Saturday's Times: "And then there is the style of management characterised as Justin's way or the way home".

The way home wasn't too bad mind you. At least I had the gregarious company of Dick

and Finn to shorten the journey. We will await the draw at the week-end and prepare for a trip to some exotic location like Carlow again.

# COOKERY CORNER

## Lamb and watercress

THIS is a stunningly English variation of lasagne, using the best spring lamb and tasty watercress.

Watercress can now be bought at any time of year from supermarkets. If vacuum-packed it keeps unopened for up to five days, but wilts quickly when exposed to the air.

If you buy bunches of watercress, store them upside down, with the leaves plunged in cold water.

**Ingredients:**

- Serves 4-6
- 450g minced lamb
- 2 large onions, skinned and finely chopped
- 2 bunches of watercress, trimmed and finely chopped
- 2 tsp dried oregano
- 7 tbsp plain flour
- 300ml lamb or chicken stock
- 50ml dry white wine
- 25g butter
- Salt and pepper
- 568ml fresh milk
- 176g Lancashire cheese, crumbled
- 225g oven-ready lasagne verdi

**Method:**

**BROWN** the lamb well in its own fat in a large saucepan. Pour off the excess fat. Add the onion and cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the watercress, oregano and 2 tbsp of the flour. Cook for 1-2 minute, then gradually stir in the stock and wine and season



with salt and pepper to taste. Bring to the boil, then simmer gently, uncovered, for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Put the butter, remaining flour and milk in a saucepan. Heat, whisking continuously, until the sauce thickens, boils and is smooth. Simmer for 1-2 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat and stir in 100g of the cheese, stir until

with salt and pepper to taste. Layer the mince mixture with the uncooked lasagne in a fairly deep oven-proof serving dish. Spoon over the cheese sauce. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Bake at 190°C (375°F) Gas Mark 5 for about 40 minutes, until browned. Serve hot straight from the dish with a fresh green salad.

## Broad bean and bacon soup

THIS is an unusual way to serve any excess broad beans, which are often very underrated in the kitchen.

Their flavour is delicate, and the beans are especially good when used very young and tender.

They are only in season from late May to August, but you can use frozen beans or peas when the fresh vegetables are not available.

This is a thick soup- to whet the appetite on a bright spring day, perfect after a brisk walk in the fresh air.

Some of the vegetables are pureed and the rest left whole for an interesting texture.

**Ingredients:**

- Serves 4 (as a starter)

- 225g shelled broad beans
- 225g shelled peas
- 1 large onion, skinned and chopped
- 450ml fresh milk
- 300ml vegetable stock
- Salt and pepper
- 2 rashers back bacon, rinded, grilled and finely chopped to garnish

**Method:**

**IN** a large saucepan, simmer the broad beans, peas and onion in the milk and stock to 20 minutes, until the beans are tender. Puree one-third of the soup in a blender or food processor and add to the remaining soup.

Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Reheat the soup gently before it is served piping hot, garnished with chopped bacon.

## Dreamy banana cremé brûlée

A CREAMY, dreamy dessert to satisfy your custard fantasies.

**Ingredients:**

- Serves 8
- 450ml double cream
- 1 vanilla pod
- 2 bananas
- 6 egg yolks
- 100g caster sugar
- A little demerara sugar.

**Method:**

Put the cream and the vanilla in a medium saucepan and slowly bring to the boil. Remove from the heat just before the cream boils.

Split the pod in half and scrape out the seeds with the point of a knife. Slice the bananas thickly and divide between 8 small ramekins.

Put the egg yolks, caster sugar and vanilla seeds in a mixing bowl and beat until thick and creamy. Pour the

hot milk on to the egg and sugar mixture and stir.

Rinse out the milk pan, dry and pour in the custard. Heat, stirring slowly and almost constantly, until the mixture thickens.

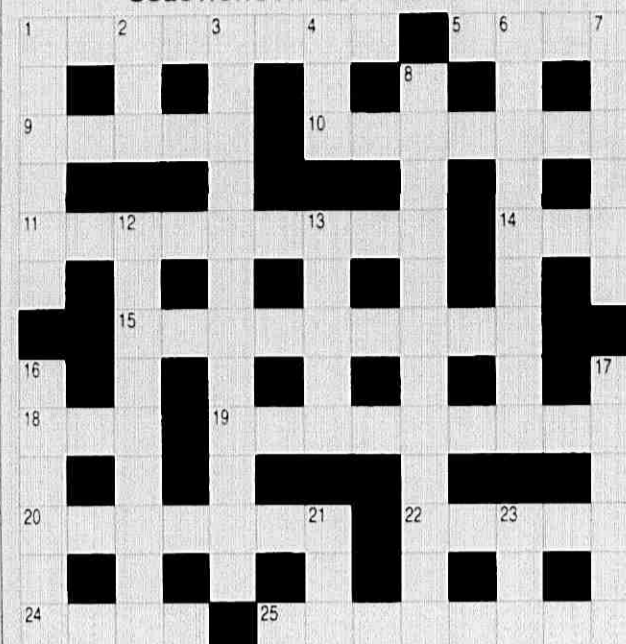
Bear in mind that if you make certain that the spoon gets right into the corners of the pan, you run less risk of the custard curdling, and on no account let the mixture boil, otherwise the custard will scramble.

Pour the custard through a sieve into the little dishes, filling them right to the top. Set aside to cool, then refrigerate overnight.

Dust the top of the custard with a thin layer of demerara, then place under a very, very hot grill for a few seconds until the sugar melts to a shiny caramel. Leave to cool and harden.

# Your very own hanging garden

HANGING baskets are popular everywhere you go, and they are as individual as the person who planted them.

So how do you go about planting a hanging basket that will survive?

The first step is to buy a basket and the size of the basket is very important.

Small baskets with a diameter of 30cm or less dry out very quickly and cannot contain many plants.

A 40cm basket is best for really good displays while remaining not too big or heavy to manage.

Large baskets are better used in sunny places and small baskets are best used in cooler, shadier sites where they won't dry out.

The basket itself can be made from wire or plastic. Some of the plastic baskets have built-in water reservoirs which can save you a lot of hassle when it comes to watering.

However, you cannot plant through the sides of these baskets so you should choose trailing plants to cover the sides.

Once you have chosen the basket it is time to think about lining it.

The traditional lining is moss, but today there are many modern alternatives made from renewable resources such as coconut fibre, wool, foam or moulded card.

Whichever you choose, make sure the lining you buy fits your basket, otherwise the compost will be washed out when you water.

After the basket has been lined, you should prepare the compost.

Use a peat-based or peat-alternative com-

post because it is much lighter than soil-based compost. Add a controlled-release fertiliser and/or water-storing granules or gel to the compost and mix thoroughly.

Put the compost/fertiliser mixture into the lined basket, to about half-full. If you have a wire basket, make planting holes through the liner at soil level and insert small plants through the holes.

Fill the rest of the basket with compost and plant the top.

One of the secrets of having a fine hanging basket display is filling the basket with plants, and then adding just one more. To avoid run-off and a wet head when watering, sink one or two empty flower pots in the top and fill these with water.

Water the planted basket thoroughly and place in a shady position, for a least two weeks, until the plants are growing on strongly.

After this, move the basket to your preferred position. Always think of safety when putting up a basket and bracket. Ensure both are securely fixed at a height that is easy to reach.

In the summer, or in a sunny position, hanging baskets dry out quickly.

If you find that a regular morning and evening drink is proving not enough, perforate a small polythene bag filled with ice-cubes and pop it in to the basket to melt.

Remember too that ensuring the plants continue flowering throughout the summer they basket must be fed.

Adding a little liquid tomato feed twice a week

when watering will help keep the plants healthy and in full bloom until the first frost.

#### **Hanging baskets: planting tips**

WHEN selecting plants for a summer basket start by planting a central bushy plant, such as a bright geranium or fuchsia.

Surround this with several smaller potted plants, such as petunias, French marigolds, alyssum, salvia and busy lizzies.

Add trailing plants near the edge of the basket, or in the sides though the lining, so that a ball of flowering plants is produced.

Plants which are ideal for this include training varieties of lobelia, geranium, nepeta, helichrysums, campanulas and ground ivy.

### **This Week In The Garden**

#### **Remove side shoots from sweet peas**

Early sweet peas grown on the single stem system will need regular attention from now on.

Remove all side shoots and tendrils. Be careful not to pinch out flowering stems by mistake; it is quite easy to tell these, as flower buds are evident even at an early stage.

#### **Sow runner beans outdoors**

It is time to make a good sowing of runner beans in the open. Sow seeds individually or in pairs about 20cm apart in two lines 25cm apart.

If you require more than one double row, leave an alleyway of at least 2m wide between each set. Cover the seeds with 5cm of soil.

If you sow the seeds in pairs and they all germinate, you will need to single the seedlings out later on.

#### **Start to pick green gooseberries**

It is usually possible to get a first picking of green gooseberries at about this time.

The fruits will still be very small and immature and it would be foolish to strip the branches yet, but if you remove a few here and there where they are overcrowded it will give the remainder a chance to develop more fully and give you the chance of gooseberry pie early!

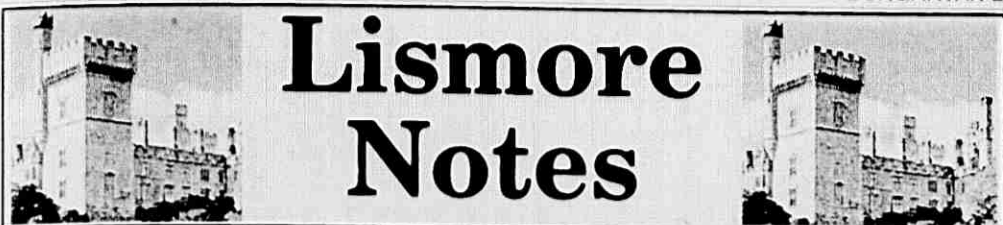
#### **Plant up ponds**

May is the best month of the year for planting water lilies and other aquatic plants. These may either be planted direct in soil, spread on the bottom of the pond at a depth of at least 15cm or planted in baskets or pots which are then sunk into position.

#### **Disbud and thin peaches, nectarines and apricots outdoors**

During this month, peaches, nectarines and apricots on walls will be growing quickly and you must disbud them. The fruits must also be thinned a little, but do not complete this process until the stones are formed.

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

**QUESTION:** I live with my elderly mother who has Parkinson's Disease and is becoming very immobile. I work full time and pay someone to come in once a day to help her wash and dress. She will soon need more care. Is it possible to take paid leave from work to look after my mother?

**ANSWER:** You are not entitled to take paid leave from work. However, you may be entitled to take unpaid leave to care for your mother, provided certain conditions are met. This is known as carer's leave and you may also be entitled to receive Carer's Benefit from the Department of Social and Family Affairs.

From 24 March 2006, you are entitled to take up to 104 weeks' carer's leave to enable you to provide full time care to your mother. She must have been assessed by the Department of Social and Family Affairs as needing full time care and attention. Previously you could only take 65 weeks leave.

Carer's leave may be taken in one continuous period of up to 104 weeks or in separate periods but there must be a gap of at least six weeks between such periods. Also, an employer may refuse to allow you to take carer's leave for a period of less than 13 weeks.

You must have been in continuous employment with your employer for the previous 12 months and you must give your employer at least six weeks notice in writing, except in exceptional circumstances. No one else can take carer's leave at the same time as yourself to look after your mother.

While the leave is unpaid it is reckonable for the purposes of employment rights other than superannuation. You accumulate entitlement to public holidays and annual leave only for the first 13 weeks of carer's leave. If you have a dispute with your employer about your entitlements the dispute may be referred to a rights commissioner.

From 1 June 2006, you are allowed to work for up to 15 hours (was 10 hours) and earn up to 290 a week while receiving Carer's Benefit. You should inform the Department of Social and Family Affairs before starting the work.

### FINANCIAL COMMUNICATION

If you have made that big decision to move in together or get married, try to sort out financial responsibilities while the situation is exciting and new. Don't wait until a crisis strikes to work out who should be paying for what! Money is one of the major causes of a relationship breaks down and, if things go wrong, you could find yourself not only single again, but also in debt and homeless. Partners who ignore financial matters do so at their peril!

Examine your income and expenditure. Make a list of joint expenses - rent, bills, food, household expenses, evenings out, etc. Decide how you are going to divide these. This is particularly important if one of you is earning more than the other. Remember these relationships are based on trust and it is important that you can talk about money. Merge your finances gradually as the relationship becomes stronger. From the start however, you should have a joint account for ordinary bills like food, ESB, TV Licence, etc. Make a decision on how much you are going to put into these expenses every month and arrange to pay it either by direct debit or some other reliable way. Talking about money is almost as important as saving it.

If you have decided to rent a property together, register both names on the tenancy agreement. This will ensure that you both have equal rights to live in the property or to terminate the agreement.

All couples argue about money at some stage, but the two things, which really drive couples apart, are debt and overspending. Some people only resolve financial arrangements when they hit a crisis situation. Remember to plan ahead and divide out the financial responsibilities equally. The key is to communicate about your financial commitments and the more the better. It is a process, which may take some getting used to, but it will help to avoid those unnecessary arguments.

Commenting on the findings Peter says, "With people getting married later in life, the trends in the mortgage market have been correspondingly affected. The growth in single applications within Waterford and in particular along the commuter belts shows that although people are choosing not to make a marriage commitment at a young age, they don't want to postpone acquiring property, revealing that they are more than eager to commit financially".

Overall mortgage level continues to grow in both volume and absolute terms, but the index shows some definite shifting in consumer habits.

- More people are choosing to "go it alone" as the index revealed a 21% growth in the overall number of single applications while the corresponding volume in joint mortgages has slowed significantly. Opinions differ as to the reasons behind this but it is a trend that appears to be here to stay.

- Over the past couple of years, the volume of mortgages from single women has consistently outpaced single men in mortgage growth. That trend has continued with a 30% surge compared to 1% for men. If this trend continues, women will account for half of all single applications within 5 years.

- While we are now older than ever buying our first home, the growing average first time buyer age seems to have levelled off in the mid thirties.

- The re-mortgage market continues to grow faster than the purchase sector as an increasing number of consumers opt to release equity in their home to fund the purchase of local and overseas investment properties. Equity release is also used for home improvements as well as to reduce outgoings by re-mortgaging their debt through debt consolidation.

- But once bitten by the property bug, most tend to switch or re-mortgage within 5 or 6 years of the initial purchase. This is demonstrated by the fall in the average remortgage age (now at 38, down from 42 in 2004). Contrast this to 10 years ago when people only considered increasing or adjusting their mortgage to move house. Strong initial equity appreciation has enabled this property buying culture to foster resulting in many more people investing in Irish and overseas holiday homes.

- The re-mortgaging segment has the potential to capture 40% (currently 25%) of the total mortgage market within three years. In monetary terms, this represents an increase of €2 billion in re-mortgage market size.

### Re-mortgaging market trends

- Many homeowners are choosing not to move, but to extract equity from their home to make a lifestyle purchase holiday home either in Ireland or abroad.

- The consistent increase in property prices seems to have resulted in a relative reduction in the number of properties for sale as more and more people choose to stay where they are and extend or remodel their homes.

- Debt consolidation is also up with consumers choosing to wrap all of their more expensive debts under a mortgage umbrella availing of an interest rate of circa 3.5%, often selecting dual repayments terms.

Applications continue to grow in size with an average level of over €175,000 reflecting the increasing costs of trading up or building on an extension.

## DISABILITY AWARENESS

### Motor Neurone Disease



#### WHAT IS MOTOR NEURONE DISEASE?

Motor Neuron Disease is the name given to a group of diseases in which the nerve cells (neurons) controlling the muscles that enable us to move around, speak, breathe and swallow fail to work normally. Motor neurons are the nerve cells along which the brain sends instructions, in the form of electrical impulses, to the muscles. Degeneration of the motor neurons leads to weakness and wasting of muscles. This generally occurs in arms or legs initially, some groups of muscles being affected more than others. Some people may develop weakness and wasting in the muscles supplying the face and throat, causing problems with speech and difficulty chewing and swallowing.

Motor Neurone disease is generally a steadily progressive disease, but the rate of progression can vary greatly for different people.

#### WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF MOTOR NEURONE DISEASE?

The first signs of this disability are often arm and leg weakness, muscle wasting and faint muscle rippling. These symptoms occur because muscles are no longer receiving the nutrient signals they need for growth and maintenance, a result of motor neurons dying. Motor Neurone Disease nerve degeneration may also cause muscle cramps and vague pains, or problems with speech and swallowing. Some people with the disease may lose some control over their emotional responses. They may laugh or cry much more easily than in the past. Eventually, all voluntary muscle action is affected.

#### HOW IS MOTOR NEURONE DISEASE DIAGNOSED?

There is no specific test for diagnosing Motor Neurone Disease. However, several tests - including nerve conduction studies and electromyogram (EMG) - are used to measure how well and quickly the nerves are working. People showing the symptoms of this disability are usually referred to neurologists, who specialize in the nervous system. The cause of MND is unknown, although recent research has shown that around five to ten per cent of people diagnosed with MND show a definite genetic pattern.

#### Treatment for Motor Neurone Disease

Motor Neurone Disease management involves physical, occupational, speech, respiratory and nutrition therapy. Exercise may help to maintain muscle strength and function, although it is recommended in moderation.

Although there is no cure for MND, recent clinical trials have shown that some drugs affect nerve cell activity and may increase the survival time for people with MND. If you would like any further information relating to Motor Neurone disease, please contact our office.

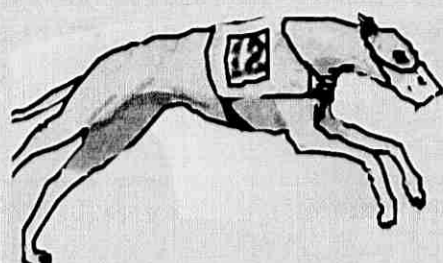
### Under 12 Soccer Tournament

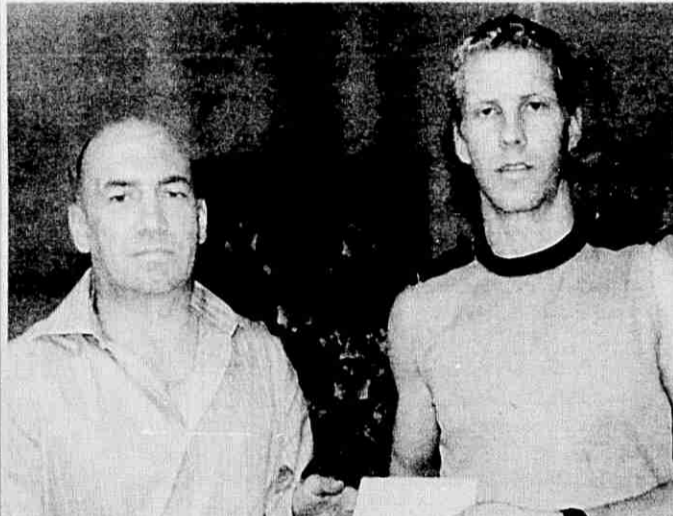

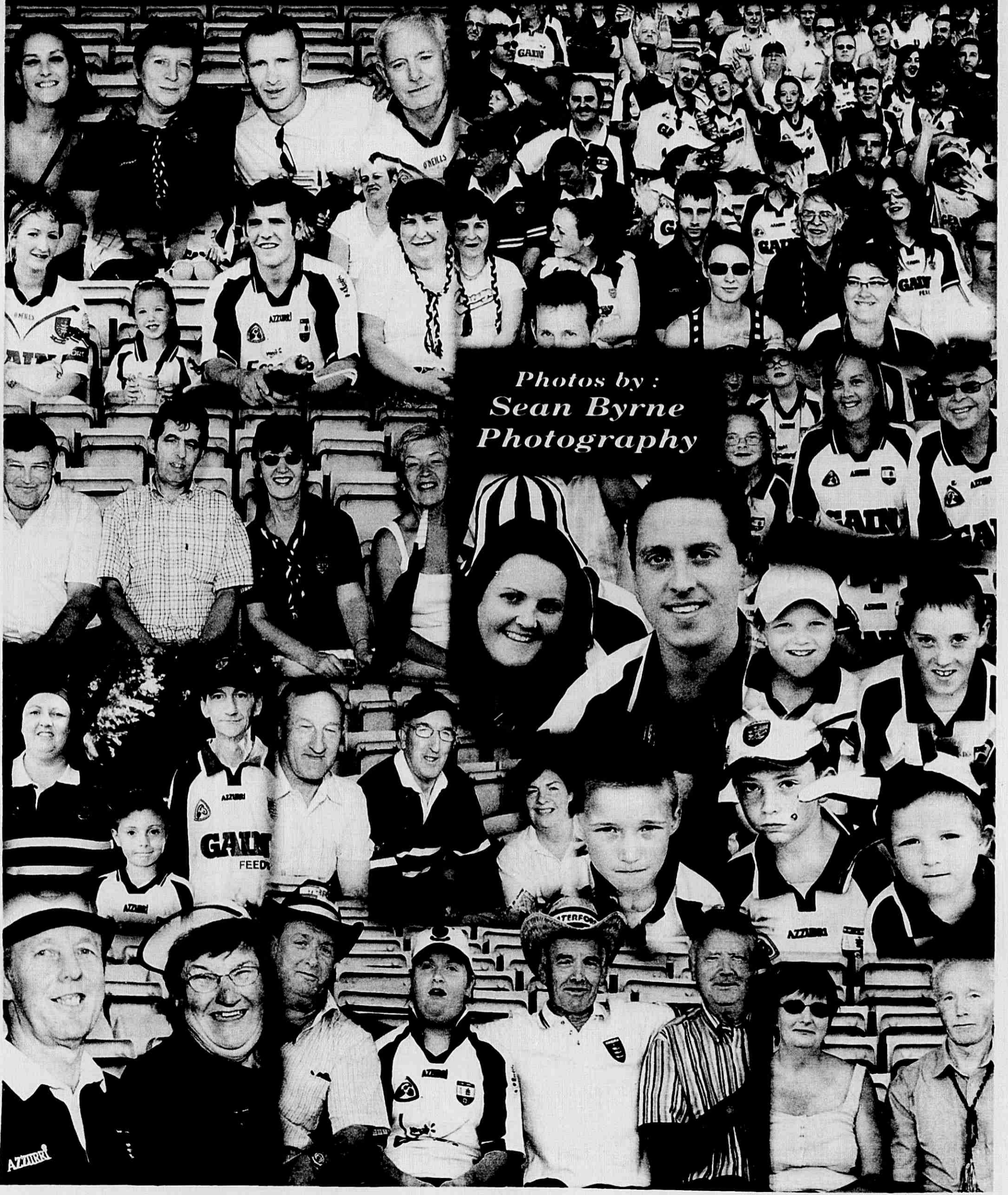

# Wasteful Waterford Lose Out To Tipperary



Waterford Senior Hurlers who lost to Tipperary 3-14 to 1-12 in the Munster Senior Hurling Championship at Pairc Ui Caoimh on Sunday last.

## Tipperary 3-14 Waterford 1-12

All though nobody can dispute the fact that Tipperary were the better team and deserving winners of this semi-final played in 25 degrees of heat at Pairc Ui Caoimh before almost 28,000 spectators on Sunday last the final scoreline does less than justice to a splendid Waterford effort.

The fact that we hit a total of fifteen wides as against four for Tipperary tells its own story and highlights the amazing and costly inaccuracy of the Waterford attack. Amazingly a lot of the misses were from very scorable positions which made the inaccuracies all the more difficult to understand.

Against that one must compare the free taking of the brilliant Owen Kelly whose total of 2-9 surpassed his brilliant effort against Limerick in the first round in which he scored 0-14 points. On Sunday last Kelly hit a total of 13 shots towards goal and scored with eleven. He hit no wide.

The presence of this dynamic forward on the Tipperary team proved the killer blow for Waterford and understandably one

might ask, how Tipperary would have fared had Kelly not been available to them for some reason or other.

Despite all the efforts to contain the Mullinahone player he was able to get through for two goals and hit some splendid points from play and frees and this enabled the favourites to achieve 2-8 to 0-6 half-time lead leaving Waterford with a mountain to climb while playing against the breeze in the second half.

In the second half Waterford had control of the game for more than twenty minutes and brought the scoring gap down to two points. At this point it looked as if we were on our way with Tipperary under enormous pressure and attempting to cool the tempo of the game but in the final ten minutes they regained control to run out deserving winners.

**PLAY**

In the first half we never seemed to get to grips with what was happening in the game. The agonizing litany of missed scoring chances with eleven wides as against just two for Tipperary.

Eoin Kelly's two goals gave them an eight points halftime lead that certainly did not reflect a true picture of the game in that half when the score stood at 2-6 to 0-4. Paul Flynn was in real hard luck for a goal that 'shaved' the Tipperary goalpost on the wrong side

**SECOND HALF**

Paul Flynn and Michael Webster exchanged points in the opening minutes and there followed a similar exchange of scores involving Eoin Kelly and Jack Kennedy, who has a super score.

Ken McGrath and Dave Bennett had points to bring the gap back to just 2 goals in the 10th minute of the half. Then a class point by Ken McGrath who was now at midfield and a converted free by Paul Flynn had the gap down to five points.

Waterford were now in control but were denied a goal when Cummins saved from substitute

Shane O'Sullivan and also saved the rebound that was hit by Dan Shannahan.

Following this Dan Shannahan was in the right place when served with a ball close in and struck the back of the net for a score that reduced the gap to just 2 points after 20 minutes of the half. (2-9 to 1-10).

Then the killer blow really came when substitute Lar Corbett scored Tipperary's third goal only 2 minutes later. They added two further points per Kelly and O'Brien to put them back in control and safely into the Munster final against Cork in Thurles on Sunday June 25th.

**THE WATERFORD LINEOUT**

As expected the Waterford line-out made a joke of their side in the programme with ten of the fifteen players occupying positions different from the published team. This silly practice was continued throughout the national

league and availed us absolutely nothing but nobody expected that it would be carried on to the Munster championship.

Time and time again this worthless practice has been the source of embarrassment to the County Board who are obviously powerless to do anything about it. With this tactic we are fooling nobody only ourselves.

Also the idea of playing players in different position in practically every game must have its effect on our team work as it interferes with the confidence of the players.

It is reasonable certain that the Munster Council will rap the County Board on the knuckles for making the match programme an almost worthless publication.

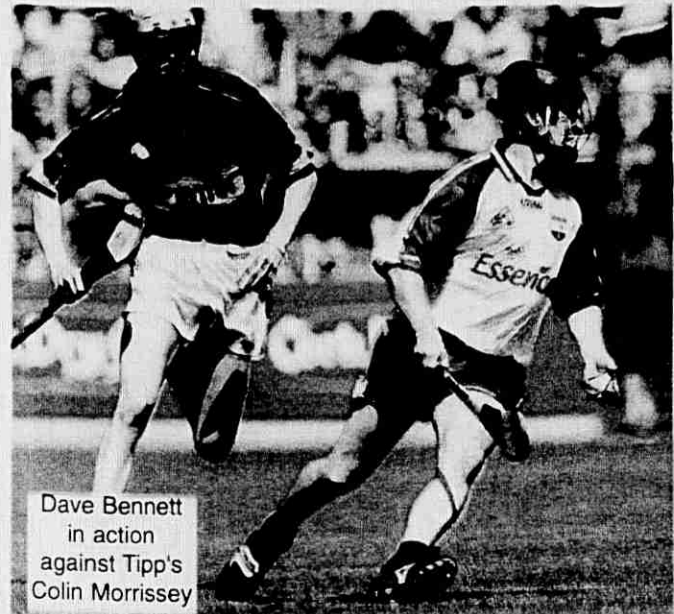

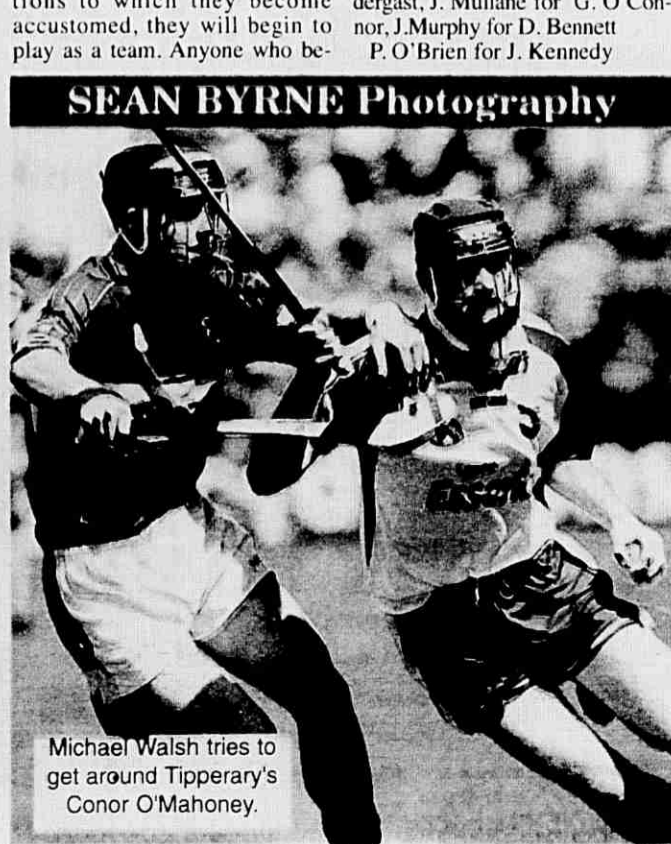

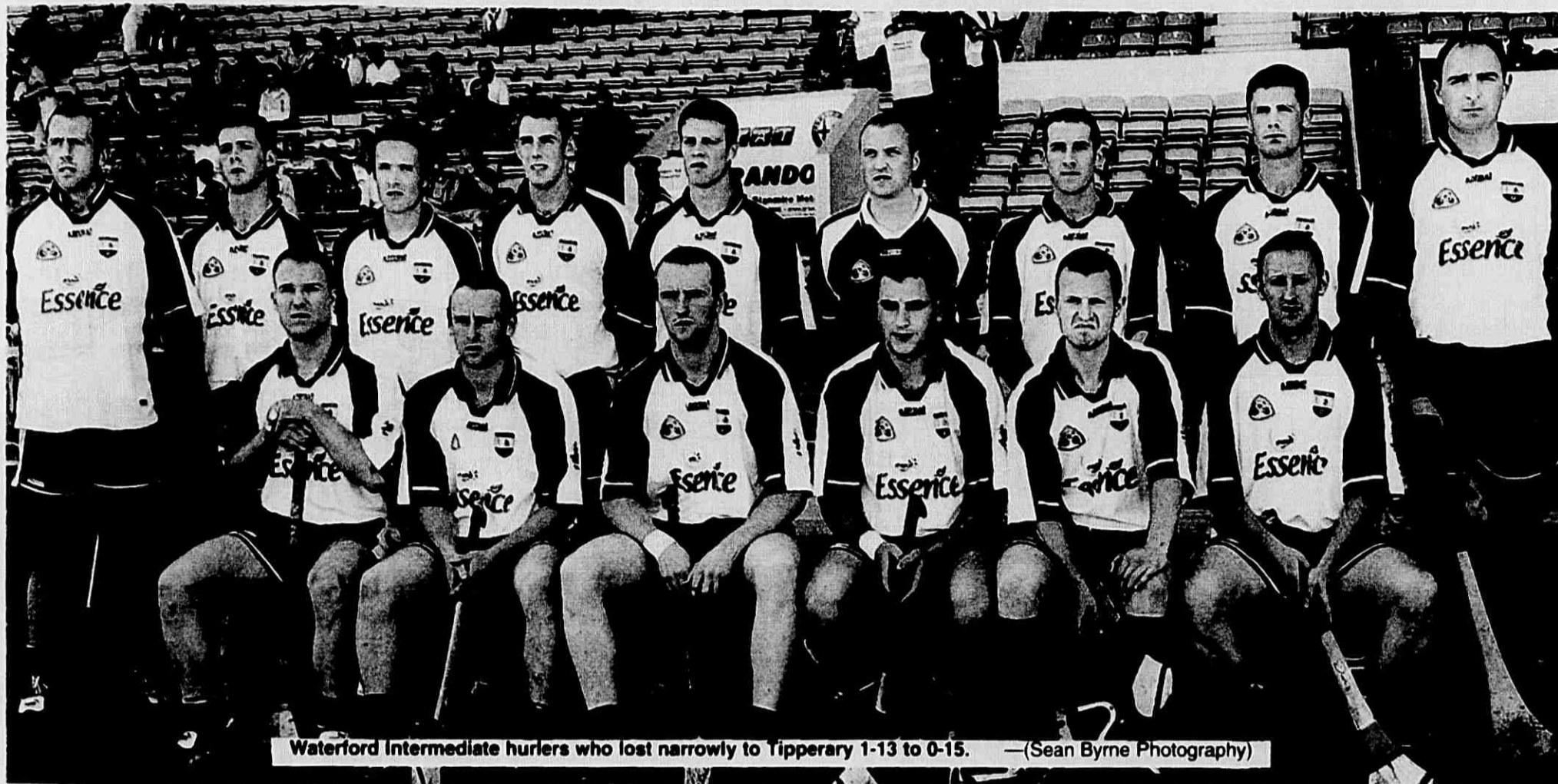

## D.J. Carey Calls It A Day

Surely one of the greatest hurlers of all time and a player who relied entirely on skill and fitness to keep his place on the Kilkenny team, winning five All Irelands several national hurling league and a massive 9 All Star awards.

His announcement which came after careful consideration - mostly relating to his age (he is now 35), certainly made the headlines and the news became a topic not alone on the media, but in work places and at every street corner where hurling people gathered. He did retire a few years ago but was forced back. This time it is for keeps as he said a combination of factors helped him make the decision. His age, his loss of appetite for the game and he being unable to devote the amount of time necessary to train and keep fit for the inter-county pace. He will continue to play with his club, Young Irelands for a couple of years.

During his career D.J. found time to visit clubs in Waterford for juvenile coaching sessions, etc., when requested and those clubs with whom he worked, as well as being very impressed with his teaching technique, found him to be a delightful personality.

His ability to accelerate almost from a stationary position, was probably his greatest attributes.

## REVISED NATIONAL LEAGUES

It is still not certain if there is to be a change in the format and timing of the Allianz National hurling and football leagues, but all counties were asked to submit proposals to G.A.C. before an early June date, if they favored change.

I do know that Waterford are in favour of an eight team group in hurling and 4 divisions with a promotion and relegation arrangement, in football.

In football Waterford are totally opposed to the present set up where we have to travel overnight to Northern counties to play teams of a much higher standard.

Many other counties of a

similar standard to us are in the same situation and the whole thing is certainly doing nothing for football and the longer it goes on, then the longer the agony will have to be endured.

In the first year of a 4 Division grouping the grading could be based on championship standards and in the ensuing years it would be easy enough to sort things out.

In hurling it might be difficult to select the eight counties as realistically at the present time there are nine counties of Liam McCarthy Cup standards, i.e. Cork, Kilkenny, Galway, Waterford, Wexford, Clare, Limerick, Tipperary and Offaly. The

odd one out might be Offaly but the Faithful County people would hardly judge things in this light.

As regards playing a couple of rounds in the late Autumn, I believe it would be an advantage to counties who will have their club championships finished. It would relieve the pressures on players and counties in the Spring.

It might also be an advantage if a decision is taken to play hurling and football on the same weekends rather than on simultaneous weekends as at present. This idea would also leave more time available to counties and clubs.

## SPECIAL CONGRESS

Central Council has decided to hold a Special Congress in Croke Park on Saturday October 14th to consider hurling championship structures. The period of experimentation with the current formula is coming to an end and the association must take a decision to continue or change.

Also at this Congress the Rule Book Task Force will brief delegates on the progress being made with regard to the rule changes.

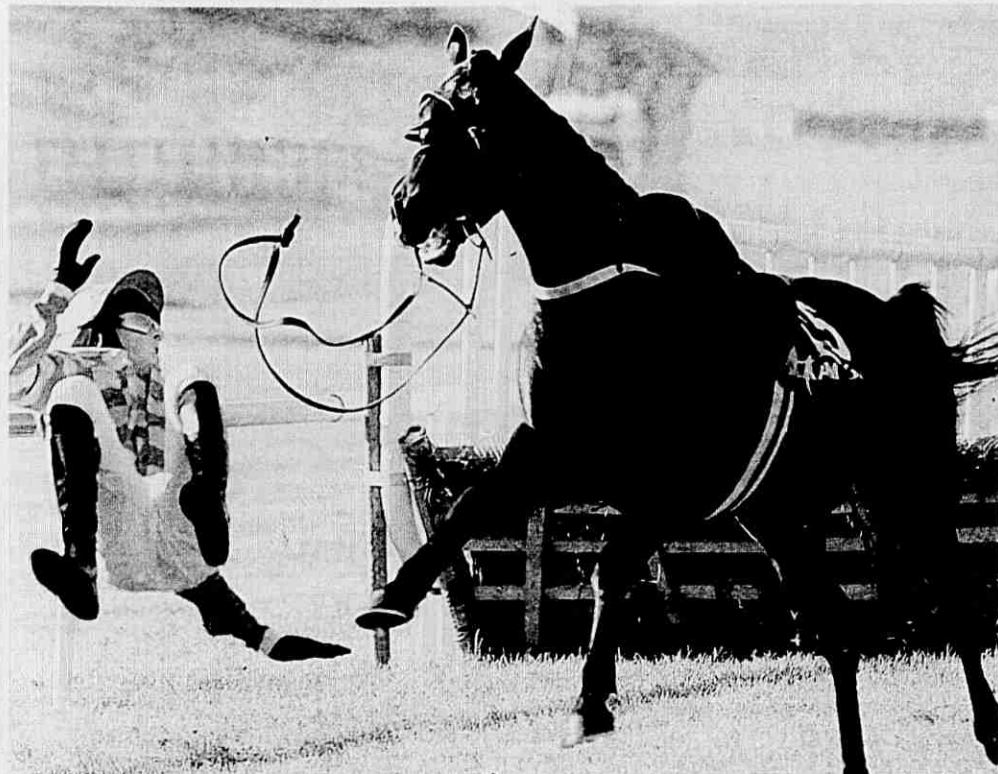
