Hundreds Of Jobs Promised For Dungarvan

Hundreds of jobs could be created on the outskirts of Dungarvan if proposals to rezone lands at Ballygagin are pushed through, the June meeting of Dungarvan Town Council heard.

According to a well-known businessman, who is behind the project, protracted negotiations have taken place with two prospective companies who would - all going to plan - cre-

ate well in excess of two hundred jobs in the locality.

The news comes just a week after it emerged that in terms of unemployment Dungarvan has recorded its worst figures in just under a decade.

PLANS

The local businessman, who did not want to be named, issued a letter to Dungarvan Town Council regarding his plans.

It stated that: "We have been

in protracted negotiation with two prospective companies, aided by (former development executive) Brian Rafferty, and are very confident that we can get them to locate in Ballygagin creating a possible 160 to 240 additional jobs in the area," he said.

"A development of this kind will create an infrastructure that will allow us to attract in new industry and help sustain

Walton's Park Redevelopment Suffers Delays

New rules governing developments in Dungarvan have stalled plans for a major re-design and redevelopment of Walton's Park in Abbeyside for the past number of months, it has emerged.

With the judging of the Tidy Towns competition nearing, concern was expressed at the June meeting of Dungarvan Town Council over the delays associated with the new Health and Safety rules, and over the "abysmal" state that Walton's Park has been left in.

The works were started with a promise that the park would be revitalised after the year long closure, and that it would bring about an end to the

scourge of anti-social behaviour and public drinking in the park.

However, thus far - three or four months into the project - contractors have only partially knocked a boundary wall, cut down hedges and left the grass grow up to two feet high inside, a Labour councillor said.

Cllr. Billy Kyne described the current impasse as a case of "bureaucracy gone mad."

PROJECT SUPERVISORS

The delay is understood to be as a result of the new requirement to hire 'project supervisors' for the Walton's Park project and a further ten projects, ranging from small housing developments to roads.

"I fully understand and support the requirements placed on everybody by the Health and Safety at work legislation," Cllr. Kyne said.

"There is an onus on both the employer and employee to take these responsibilities seriously. But under this months managers orders I'm genuinely at a loss to see Dungarvan Town Council having to formally designate individual contractors as project supervisors.

"I, up to now, had presumed that when we as a council drew up a contract to build a house that the successful contractor would themselves be liable for all health and safety implications of that job or contract.

Around Ireland Boat Trip For Charity

A unique fund-raising event will take place on the week commencing June 30th in aid of Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind.

Four powerboats captained by four local owners, Maurice Kiely, Paddy Dwane, George Horsom and Tom Shanley will depart from Dungarvan Quay at 1pm and will stop overnight (weather permitting) at several ports along the way.

Their first port of call on their epic journey will be Sherkin Island, then Kilkee followed by Killybegs, Westport, Portrush, Ardglass, then on the eastern side, Dun Laoghaire, Wexford and finally Dunmore East/Waterford City.

Chairman of the charity raising committee, TF McCarthy, urged people to give as generously as they can for this event.

He said the journey around Ireland was the plan of the four powerboat owners who were looking to do something a bit different rather than the

usual runs to Helvick and Dunmore.

"They formed a committee and we decided that they would circumnavigate Ireland - from Dungarvan to Dungarvan leaving from the quay here on the 30th of June at 1pm arriving back on Sunday 9th of July.

"This has not been undertaken lightly. We have held meetings for the last three months with particular emphasis on safety.

"All four boats each carry an individual who has completed a radio course in communications so they can operate the VHF. And several other safety courses have been undertaken.

"We also decided we should associate it with somebody in charity and we thought that guide-dogs for the blind would be a very suitable one.

"Each boat is privately owned and funded and the total amount raised will go to the Guide Dogs for the Blind. No expenses will be taken out of

it," he said.

The committee is currently distributing sponsorship cards. A line costs 5 euro and they will be available throughout the town.

"We would hope that people will really come forward and support this charity. We are all aware of the costs to even train a dog, which comes to around

35,000 euro. I'm sure people won't hesitate to put their hands in their pockets and buy a line or two," Mr. McCarthy said.

Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind was founded in 1976 and is dedicated to providing services which bring mobility and independence to blind and visually impaired people.

UNEMPLOYMENT

Fine Gael councillor, Fred Forsey, reminded the council of the unemployment problems that have beset the town over the last number of years with the closure of Waterford Foods and Dungarvan Crystal recently - the reverberations of which are still being felt.

He said the businessman in question has provided employment in the town for the past 34 years and his company has a turnover of nearly 10 million euro.

He is now trying to re-zone his land for the creation of a Business/Light Industrial Park "which," the developer said, "will enable us to attract inward investment from new business and enterprise."

Cllr. Forsey described it as "a very attractive package" for Dungarvan. If the development comes to pass, Brian Rafferty, the business executive with Waterford County Council, who dramatically retired from his post a number of weeks ago, should be reinstated - a proposal which met with a lukewarm response from several other councillors.

Mr. Rafferty resigned his post after just seven months into a two year contract and in what Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne termed as a "side swipe" at elected members and officials alike, blamed his departure on the council not rezoning land quickly enough.

RESPONSE

Councillor, Kyne poured cold water on the suggestion saying that the position would be filled in the future.

He said the proper thing for the developers to do was go straight to the County Manager if they had as much as ten jobs.

Meanwhile, Labour councillor Teresa Wright called for a report on the activities of the two task forces, which were put into place in the aftermath of the closure of Waterford Crystal's plant in the town.

Both task forces were set up to attract industry into the town and she questioned whether any progress was made.

"We don't know what is really happening," she said. "We sit around here talking about potholes and I think we need to look at the bigger picture and as part of that find out what those task-forces are doing."

SOP TO PUBLIC

Mayor of Dungarvan, councillor Damien Geoghegan, however, said the task forces

were just "a sop" to the public in the weeks after the closure of Dungarvan Crystal.

"I am not surprised if it has all fallen apart," the Fine Gael councillor said.

Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair said the council needs to take a partnership approach and the proposals need to be worked through and the members should be fully involved in promoting Dungarvan.

Earlier in the meeting Cllr. Kyne asked that the council look into what is happening with the German firm Bio Pin, who set up in the town a number of years ago, but no progress on it has taken place since.

"The executive, the elected members and IDA should come together and ask what is happening there," he said.

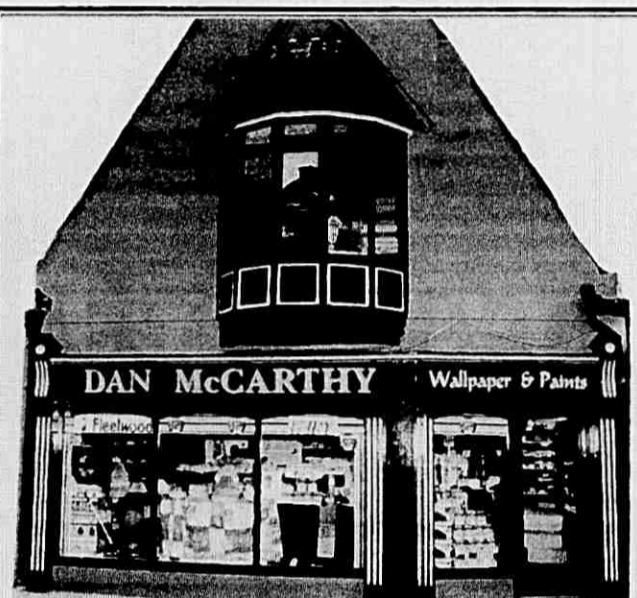

Rural Transport Initiative Continues To Grow

With the introduction in 2003 of pilot passenger transport services under the Department of Transport funded Rural Transport Initiative, the problem of a lack of public transport services in rural areas has begun to be addressed.

The plan initially was to establish a total of seven scheduled routes based in the north and west of the county as these were identified as areas of greater need, however in line with demand and with increased funding from the Department; the number of rural services continues to increase. To date a total of 12 scheduled services operate from rural areas of the County to Dungarvan as well as to the adjoining towns of Clonmel, Carrick-on-Suir and Youghal.

In 2005 services to Cappoquin and Kilmacthomas Day Care Centres and Kinsalebeg Community Centre were introduced and in partnership with Waterford Centre for Independent Living a demand responsive service for people with disabilities, based in Dungarvan and covering a 20 mile radius of town. Services in the fully accessible vehicle are available to people registered with Waterford Disability Network (PwDI). We also support Dungarvan No Name Club and Foroige in providing transport to events.

Passenger numbers continue to grow as the project continues to develop both the number and range of services provided.

ed. Passenger journeys have risen from 4,601 in 2003 to 19,883 in 2005.

New Service in Copper Coast Area

This pilot service will run on Mondays, commencing Monday 26th. June. The bus will leave Stradbally at 10.30 am for Tramore via Bunmahon, Kill, Dunhill, Annewstown and Fenor. The return service will leave Tramore at 3.30 pm. The operator is Ken Carey from Tramore. As with all of our services where people are unable to get to our buses, we will collect and return them to their homes.

The service is free for passengers holding the Department of Social and Family Affairs Free Travel or Companion Passes. Children under 12 accompanied by an adult also travel free, while students pay a €2.00 return fare. All other passengers pay a €5.00 return fare.

As part of ongoing developments in advance of the mainstreaming by Government of the Rural Transport Initiative from 2007, all services will from the end of June operate under the Deise Link brand, while the project name will change to Waterford Community Transport.

AT A LOSS

"I'm at a loss as to why this is required and I believe it will indirectly have cost implications for this council and I'm calling on the town manager and the town clerk to write directly to me explaining the need for this new procedure and to confirm that there's no cost implication to the council.

Cllr. Billy Kyne also raised what he called the debacle of the work on Walton's Park redevelopment.

CRITICAL

"I have got many critical comments on the present state of Walton's Park." Cllr. Kyne said. "This project started out with so much promise a few months ago. All we succeeded in doing is cut down a hedge that I personally thought was attractive and erected a building site railing on the most critical road into the town. This project saw a wall knocked with the resultant blocks left in a quite dangerous situation and Walton's Park has been left in a derelict state with the grass now over two feet high and no work proceeding.

This is totally unacceptable to any right thinking person and

the council must immediately draw up a schedule of works and a schedule for completion of this project."

OBLIGED

Tom Rogers, Town Engineer with the council, responded saying that: "We are obligated that someone must be appointed to look after Health and Safety."

While the hiring of "project supervisors" does not have direct implications on the council, several councillors warned that the additional costs of hiring the new health and safety personnel will be factored into the price of the contract.

ASSURANCE

Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan disputed the executives assurance that it would have no cost implications. He said the contractors will simply factor in the cost of work when going to tender.

He said the council will wind up at estimates time "wondering why this cost so much."

"We are driving up the costs on ourselves," he said, adding that he was "concerned at the delays" in the Walton's Park project.

NRA Plans Are "Way Over The Top" SAYS GEOGHEGAN

A local Fine Gael councillor has described proposals put forward by the National Roads Authority for a stretch of busy road at Kilineen, The Pike, Dungarvan as "way over the top" and akin to "using a sledgehammer to crack a nut."

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan was one of a number of councillors to raise concerns about the proposed closure of the road leading to the popular Bridgie Terries pub as part of new safety measures at the June monthly meeting of Waterford

County Council.

The proposals, drawn up in response to an Independent Engineers Report, which was drawn up and prepared by a Consultant Engineer, working on behalf of concerned local residents.

Cllr. Geoghegan has stated that: "If these proposals are implemented by the NRA it will make the situation at the Pike even more hazardous than at present, and will, I believe, increase the risk of accidents at the Junctions leading to Bridgie Terries more hazardous than at present, and will, I be-

lieve, increase the risk of accidents at the Junctions leading to Bridgie Terries Bar and to Kilineen on the opposite side of the road.

"If these NRA proposals are proceeded with, there's no doubt but it will have a negative impact on residents of areas such as Kilineen, Deelish, Ballymarket and English-town. It will certainly make it a lot more hazardous for residents in these areas when entering/exiting the N25."

Cllr. Pat Nugent (FG), mean-

while, slammed the lack of consultation with the local stakeholders.

"Proper consultation," he said, "is essential in this case."

He went on to call for the public representatives to meet the NRA and said a public meeting was held on last Thursday night to discuss the issue.

Kilmacthomas area councillor, Liam Brazil said there was a strong need for consultation and their views should be taken into consideration.

I am writing to you in the hope that you could possibly help me with something that I am trying to resolve. I am a 38 year old man whose father was born in Sexton Street, Abbeyside, Dungarvan on the 14th of February 1921. He left Dungarvan I think on or about 1930 to work at sea as a cabin boy. From what I know he only returned once during the war to visit his family. He got wounded during the war and caught TB, he was sent to Belfast to recuperate, where he met my mother. Since then he never returned to Dungarvan or had any contact with his family. He was the oldest of 5 brothers, Tom, Christie, Ben and Edward, with a sister Mary who I believe lived in England.

This Summer sees the retirement of Mrs Angela Conway, Principal of Ard Scoil na nDéise.

At a very pleasant function, Superintendent Tom O'Grady spoke highly of his contribution to the force over the years and of his service to the community along with his professional approach to policing.

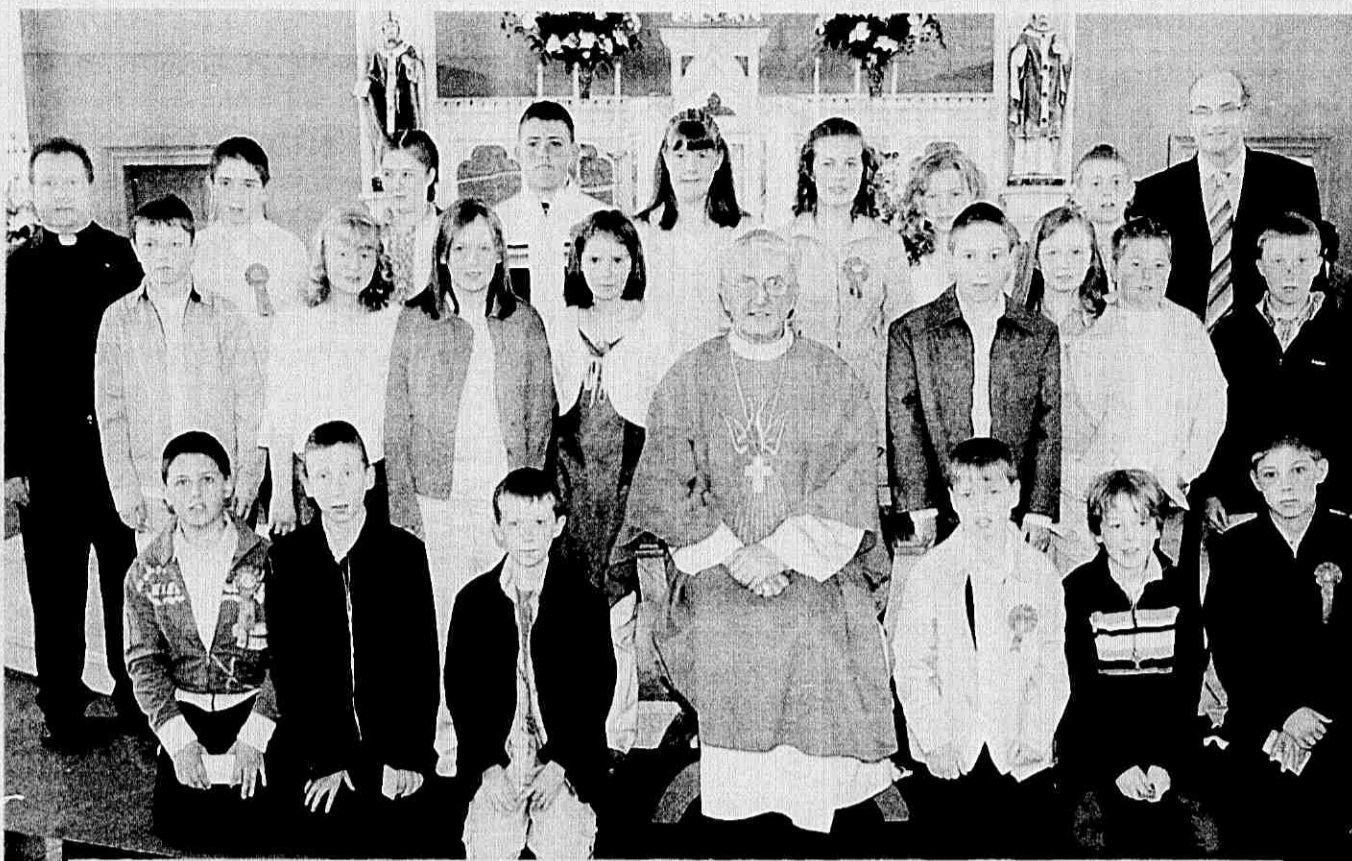
Martin has been a great friend to all his colleagues, having given freely of his advice, time and experience to new and old

Delays Continue To Hamper Seven Villages Scheme

Delays And Hold Up Over Waste Water Treatment Plants

Delays are continuing to stall progress on a multi-million euro waste water treatment scheme for seven towns and villages in the county.

The delays were blamed on the Department, the council and consultants by members of Fine Gael and Fianna Fail at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council.

The towns of Tallow, Cappoquin, Dunmore East, Ardmore, Stradbally, Kilmacthomas and Ballyduff/Kilmeaden, all remain stalled, hampering development.

DEBATE

However, a radio debate between General Election rivals Fianna Fail Deputy Ollie Wilkinson and Cllr. Paudie Coffey of Fine Gael heard Deputy Wilkinson blame the council for slowing progress.

This was contradicted by Cllr. Coffey who laid the blame squarely at the door of the Department of the Environment.

Cllr. Coffey said the delays had implications for towns right across the county.

"We as a council have to come together to get this delivered," Cllr Coffey said.

DELAYS

He said the application for foreshore licences – which several of the towns in the scheme require – have been "sitting in the Department for over a year." "The people deserve the right information," he said questioning where the problem actually lay.

Mr. Pat McCarthy, senior engineer with the council, said the hold up wasn't on the council's side. Everything is being done by the council to move it along, he assured members.

Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin said the council's con-

sultants were at fault. Tallow has a contract award date of the 18th of June of 2007, while Cappoquin has an award date of the 6th of September 2007.

CONTRACT

But it's not expected that a Design, Build and Operate (DBO) contract for the Waste Water Treatment Plants will be awarded before 23rd of December 2008.

Further delays are expected due to a Judicial Review in Ardmore over the Development Plan Procedures, Part 8 Process Procedures and Site Selection.

HAYFEVER

Summer is here: the sun is shining, the flowers are blooming, and everyone seems to be in good form. But for many people it's the start of a season of misery, with itchy eyes, runny nose and constant sneezing.

Hayfever, or seasonal allergic rhinitis, is an allergic reaction to the pollen produced by trees, grasses and other plants during the summer months. It differs from perennial allergic rhinitis which occurs throughout the year, producing similar symptoms in response to other allergens such as dust, chemicals, pollution and certain foods.

There are a number of measures which can help to reduce the severity of symptoms, but it is important to start as early as possible before the season really gets underway.

People with hayfever are often also sensitive to certain foods which can weaken the immune system and worsen hayfever symptoms. It is therefore useful to identify and avoid any foods which are poorly tolerated. Common culprits include wheat, dairy produce, citrus fruits and refined sugar.

It is important to eat plenty of fresh fruit and vegetables such as garlic and onions, beetroot, cabbage, carrots and blueberries. These are rich in vitamin C and bioflavonoids (particularly quercetin) which act as natural antihistamines. Since it may be difficult to eat these foods in large enough quantities, it may be easier to start taking a supplement (preferably from about 6 weeks before the hayfever season begins). Choose one which contains bioflavonoids and provides up to 2,000 mg of vitamin C per day. Incidentally, many people find that taking a dessertspoon of locally

produced honey for about 6 weeks before pollen counts begin to rise can reduce their sensitivity to pollen once the season gets started.

Hayfever also responds well to treatment with herbal medicine. Again it is best to start treatment about 6 weeks before symptoms start, but it is never too late. The first step is to prevent the pollen from penetrating the tissues and triggering symptoms. This can be achieved by improving the integrity of the mucous membranes with herbs such as golden seal (*Hydrastis canadensis*) and golden rod (*Solidago virgaurea*). Herbs which help to reduce the severity of allergic responses include nettles and Ginkgo biloba.

The second step is to address the symptoms using anti-inflammatory and antihistaminic herbs such as eyebright (*Euphrasia officinalis*) and plantain (*Plantago lanceolata*) which help to relieve itchy eyes, nasal congestion and sneezing.

A simple home remedy for hay fever is chamomile tea. Place 2 chamomile teabags in a teapot, add boiling water, cover and infuse for 5 minutes. The tea can be drunk 3 or 4 times daily to help reduce allergic symptoms. The teabags can be allowed to cool slightly before placing one over each eye to soothe inflammation and itching.

JUNIOR PAGE FISH FACTS

Most fish have a torpedo-shaped, cylindrical and streamlined body that tapers towards the tail. Many fish are dark on their upper side so that they blend in with the surrounding sea when seen from above, and have light undersides to match the sky when seen from below. Many fish sport a wide variety of colours, sometimes for camouflage, to attract a mate, or maybe even to warn off predators.

How A Fish Swims

A fish swims by bending its muscular body from side to side while moving its tail, which helps it to swim in a straight line. The dorsal fins on the top of the body and the anal fin on the underside near the tail keep the fish stable. The pectoral fins near the head and the pelvic fins on the underside are normally used for steering or propulsion. Most fish have a gas filled swim bladder inside their bodies, which helps them to keep buoyant. By altering the amount of gas in the swim bladder, the fish can rest at any depth in the water.

Fish Take Oxygen Through Their Gills

Fish get oxygen into their bodies by passing water through feathery structures behind the head, called gills. The gills absorb oxygen into the bloodstream and remove carbon dioxide.

Fish Bones

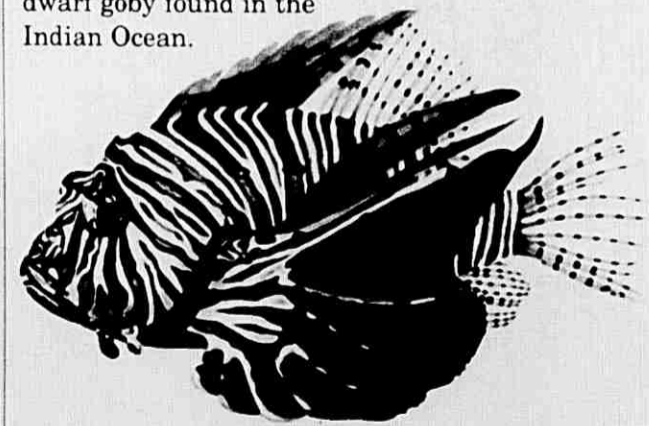
Many fish have skeletons made of bone, and are called bony fish. There are over 20,000 species of bony fish living in the sea and in fresh water. Fish with skeletons made of cartilage (a gristly tissue that is more flexible than bone) are called cartilaginous fish. There are over 600 species of cartilaginous fish, including sharks, skates and rays, all of which live in the sea.

Longest and Heaviest Bony Fish

The longest bony fish is the oarfish, which is found all over the world. With a length of some 8m (26ft), it has been called the 'king of the herrings'. The heaviest bony fish is the ocean sunfish. It is found in warm waters and weights up to 2.025kg (4,500lb).

Largest And Smallest

The largest fish of all is the whale shark (which is not a member of the whale family in spite of its name). The whale shark can measure up to an incredible 12m (40ft) long. At the other end of the size scale, with a length of only 8mm (1.3in), is the dwarf goby found in the Indian Ocean.

DUNGARVAN GIRL PACKS A PUNCH AT NATIONAL INNOVATION AWARDS

Kathleen Hurley, Dungarvan, has won the 2006 Siemens Innovative Engineer of the Year Award at a ceremony in Engineers Ireland, Ballsbridge, Dublin on Thursday 15th June.

Each year engineering students, in their final year, from the Universities and Institutes of Technology throughout the country compete for this prestigious award, which is presented jointly by Engineers Ireland and Siemens.

Kathleen, a student of Mechanical & Manufacturing Engineering at Cork Institute of Technology, beat off six other finalists to take home the coveted title along with a cheque for 2,000. She was selected for designing a medical device, called Finger Fit, which can speed a patient's recovery time from a fractured fifth metacarpal, also known as the Boxer's fracture. Over 12,800 people in Ireland and the UK suffer from this injury every year.

To win the award Kathleen had to demonstrate that she had developed an innovative product or technology that would have a practical application and be commercially viable in the marketplace. Kathleen has set up her own company called "Finger Splint Ltd.", along with 3 of her fellow students from CIT and a major international medical device company has already expressed an interest in her product.

On June 27th Kathleen will travel to London to represent Ireland at the IMECHE Awards for Best Design or Development of a Medical Device.

Speaking at the awards Malcolm Banks, Sales Manager of Medical Solutions for Siemens said, "80% of the devices that Siemens sell today have been developed in the last 3 years. This highlights just how essential constant innovation in the marketplace is and it also highlights the importance of this award, which seeks to foster an entrepreneurial spirit within 3rd level Institutions."

John McGowan, President of Engineers Ireland, also speaking at the ceremony said, "At present third level institutions in Ireland are producing 5,100 engineering graduates and 2,500 IT graduates each year. This amount is not enough to meet current demand for engineers in the workforce. We need to increase the numbers of students studying engineering and particularly we need to increase the numbers who are engaging in high-level research.

High level research is paramount to the future economic success of our country and it is awards like this that encourage young researchers to be innovative in their work and to think about the practical applications of their research, so that it has value in the international marketplace."

Waterford Crèches Get €173,000 In Childcare Grants — WILKINSON

Waterford Fianna Fáil TD Ollie Wilkinson has said two childcare providers in Tramore and Cappoquin have been allocated almost €173,000 between them aimed at carrying out building works to meet the need for more crèche places in the two towns.

Deputy Wilkinson said Ladybird Preschool and Crèche in Moonvoy, Tramore, received €60,712 while Cappoquin Community Development Co Ltd got €112,200 in capital grants.

"With record numbers of people going to work each day and

taking college courses, parents need more childcare places. Both Tramore and Cappoquin are rapidly growing urban areas with young and vibrant populations. Providing money for more childcare facilities is a key component of our social and economic progress in the years ahead.

"There is huge pressure on existing childcare services in Waterford. This funding will create more crèche places for our young people - giving them the best possible care and giving their parents peace of mind.

"These capital grants are intended to meet those objectives. I have no doubt that both childcare providers will use the money they have been given to meet their building needs and create the kind of environments in which both parents and children will feel at home," said Deputy Wilkinson.

The Minister for Children Brian Lenihan TD announced the money as part of the joint Equal Opportunities Childcare Programme 2000-2006 and National Childcare Investment Programme 2006-2010.

Huge Attendance For Financial Guru

EDDIE HOBBS SPEAKS AT PARK HOTEL DUNGARVAN

Economist, best-selling author and popular television financial guru, Eddie Hobbs addressed almost four hundred people at the Park Hotel in a talk organised by Eason's in Dungarvan recently.

Perhaps best known for his award winning RTE 1 series, Show Me The Money and his blockbuster social and economic polemic, Rip Off Republic, Mr. Hobbs has campaigned on a range of personal finance issue long before he became a household name right across Ireland.

Loot, his new book, focuses on the spending spurge expected when the SSIA accounts ma-

ture in the next couple of years. Mr. Hobbs also spoke the property boom and interest rates in a fascinating and often amusing one and a half-hour talk.

"We are known for very many good things - artistic, literary, communication etc etc - but long term planning and joined up thinking just don't seem to be in our DNA," Mr Hobbes told the audience.

The lack of joined up thinking was in evidence regarding the decision to build the port tunnel "a foot too short" and also in the decision to toll the main artery roundabout on the edge of Dublin. But it also affects people's financial management.

DEBT

He also warned about accumulating debt and particularly the effect America's massive trade deficits could have on the Irish economy based on the enormous economic boost American companies such as

Dell and others provide.

He advised people in attendance to invest their money rather than fritter it away on short-term luxuries like buying a new car or a holiday to a far flung destination and said there are plenty of smarter ways in which to make your "loot" work, such as investing in property abroad, playing the stock market, buying bonds, recruiting a good investment advisor and figuring out the best pension and retirement funds.

SSIA

A staggering 1.2 million savers signed up to the SSIA who stashed away up to 254 euro a month for sixty months, amounting to a whopping payout of over 14 billion euro with many savers expecting close to 20,000 euro and couples close to 40,000 euro.

He said this will make this year and next year, as the accounts mature, into the year of the Big Review, "a time when thousands of Irish families will ponder the Big Question:

should I spend it, or invest it?" Mr. Hobbs said.

ADVICE

And there will be a deluge of contradictory advice to contend with, coming from travel agents to credit unions, from car salesmen to auctioneers, all baying for the stash.

"This is where a little down time comes in handy," Mr. Hobbs stated. "You need to think carefully about your nest egg and the best way to use it."

He warns against a spend, spend attitude saying that cars are among the worst 'investment' that you can buy explaining that a large chunk of your money will go towards VRT and VAT.

Instead he urged the attendance to "cannibalise" their debt thereby clearing it much earlier, investing in an education fund for the children, buying assets and in storing some away for their pensions.

RECENT DEATHS

Fr. Michaél "Columba" Mansfield (OSA)



On Thursday morning last, the 15th June news drifted across Abbeyside and the Old Borough that one of its own Fr. Michaél "Columba" Mansfield (OSA) had passed to his eternal reward.

Fr. Michaél, the eldest son of the late Mick & Mary Mansfield of The Burgery, Abbeyside was born in Dublin on the 31st December 1936 and at the time his father Mick Mansfield as a member of the Garda Síochána was assigned as a Personal Bodyguard to the then Taoiseach, Eamonn De Valera.

Fr. Michaél spent his childhood in Clonea with his grandmother, Mrs. Mudie Crotty and in Ballinacorney, Ballinacorney and of course in The Burgery in the company of his brothers, Tony and Cathal and his sister Colleen and many tales were told over the course of the funeral of the mischief he and his siblings created in the area.

He attended National School

in Garranbane, Ballinacorney and Abbeyside and his Secondary Education at St. Augustine's College in Dungarvan. Having completed his schooling he joined the Augustinian Order in September 1955 following in the footsteps of his uncle Fr. Ned Mansfield (OSA) while his aunts Sr. Anthony and Mother Enda were nuns with the Presentation and Mercy Orders.

Many of Fr. Michaél's Augustinian Confreres spoke of how he was a breath of fresh air to the Order as he was a person who always spoke his mind. He completed his studies in Orlagh and in Rome where he was ordained on the 16th February 1962 along with Fr. Grace (Waterford), Fr. Kelleher (Abbeyside), Fr. Fitzpatrick (Affane) and Fr. Kiely (Sliabh gCua).

He served in Ballyboden, Nigeria, Dungarvan, New Ross, Johns Lane and St. Josephs Centre, Shankill. Fr. Michaél is remembered as a very innovative and creative teacher at St. Augustines and especially at the Good Counsel College in New Ross where he launched a number of new teaching methods by encouraging debate and helping students develop their own perceptions.

History was his favourite subject and particularly Irish History and he also liked to include contemporary History such as the War of Independence. An avid fan of Irish Culture he loved Gaelic Games and played both codes with the Abbeyside/Ballinacorney Club at Minor Level and while at "Good Counsel College" on one famous occasion caused quite a stir when he lined out at full back against St. Augustines in

their Annual hurling encounter.

Fr. Michaél was a Nationalist true and true and loved his Country, he possessed a great intellect and his wit and satire really came to the fore when he engaged in political discussions. As well as being an accomplished poet he was also the bairn of many Newspaper Editors lives at local and national level for his excellent and insightful letters to Editors.

During the latter stage of his life Fr. Michaél returned to Dublin and served at Johns Lane, before moving to St. Josephs Centre, Shankill. Even while not in the best of health, Fr. Michaél never complained and was a firm favourite with Staff and Residents alike as he became an integral part of the community. Having received difficult news on the health front a number of weeks ago, Fr. Michaél bore his cross with dignity and pride.

A number of hours before his own passing, Fr. Michaél rose from his sick bed to anoint another resident who was passing away, this was yet another example of his dedication and faith.

On Friday 15th June, a Mass was celebrated in St. Josephs, Shankill by Fr. Derek O'Connell (Chaplain) and the very poignant and emotional scenes at the Mass and at the removal of Fr. Michaél's remains were testimony to his standing within this special community. The staff formed a guard of honour and waved as Fr. Michaél commenced his final journey to Johns Lane. Their floral tribute was adorned in the "White and Blue" of Waterford as he was a life long fan of the Deise Hurlers.

Fr. Michaél's remains were received at St. Johns Lane by Fr. Greg Howard (Prior) and a Prayer of Thanksgiving Ceremony was held by his Augustinian Confreres during which Fr. Bill Prenderville delivered a touching homily on Fr. Michaél's involvement with the Order.

On Saturday morning his funeral Mass was celebrated by Fr. Greg Howard (Prior) assisted by Fr. Michael Brennock and Fr. Vincent McCarthy while Fr. Pádraig Daly, Fr. Michael Collender, Fr. Pat Moran, Fr. Flor O'Callaghan, Fr. Columba O'Donnell and Fr. Michael Leahy provided other Dungarvan connections. Representatives from every Augustinian house in Ireland were in attendance and also in attendance were Bishop Fiachra O'Ceallaigh (OFM) and Fr. Michaél's cousins, Fr. John Boyle and Fr. Matt Cunningham, as well as family friend Fr. Cathal Price (P.P.).

Readings were delivered by his nephew Brendan Mansfield and his sister Colleen Lacy. Prayers of the Faithful were read by his nephew Gavin Lacy while the Offertory Gifts were brought to the altar by his nephew and niece, Cormac Lacy and Caroline Mansfield.

Fr. Michael O'Regan in his eulogy summed Fr. Mansfield up perfectly mentioning all the loves of his life, his faith, reading, writing, sport, politics and of course his native language.

Fr. Michaél always had a cuplá focal for everyone he met.

Mrs. Colleen Lacy, Fr. Michaél's sister gave a moving account of her brother and times she had with him, she also included pieces of Fr. Michaél's poetry.

Late Jackie O'Brien



Jackie O'Brien, who died on Monday, 29th May, the day before his 87th birthday, was one of ten children born to Tom and Nan O'Brien in Adramone.

He went to school in Stradbally. During the 30's he joined the Volunteer Force. In the 40's he journeyed about working for various farmers. Then he married Kathleen Daly from Ballyvoile, secured a steady job with the Glue Factory in Dungarvan, and set up home in Sheskin.

When the Glue Factory went out of business, he found work with the Creamery in Dungarvan where, in later years, he was a familiar figure at the Weighbridge. He was very popular with his fellow workers who held him in high esteem.

Around the time he started with the Creamery, he changed from the bike to what was to become for many years his favourite means of transport - the Honda 50. By the time he bought his first car in 1978, he had had five or six Honda 50's.

He retired from the Creamery in 1984. He was to enjoy nearly twenty years of good health which he enlivened by raising calves and growing potatoes. His proud boast was that his spuds were the best in the county.

One day when some calves broke out and ran down the road, he set off in quick pursuit and drove them back. Going in the gate he suddenly felt weak and unsteady and had to use the wall for support. He took to bed, saying he felt the world caving in on him. The doctor, though pronouncing him sound of heart, strongly recommended that seventy year olds shouldn't go running after escaped animals.

Always interested in Hurling and Football, he played for a time with Durrow. He enjoyed the Sunday games in Dungarvan, especially when Kilrossanty and Stradbally were playing. Jackie also liked handball, and the Battery in Ballyvoile was once a popular spot for that past-time. He delighted in a good game of cards, and lively music never failed to activate his feet.

His wife Kathleen died in 1998. He was 79 then. He still drove a car, and he rarely

missed a visit to O'Mahoney's on a Sunday night.

When he was 82 he suddenly decided to stop driving. One could see now and then moments of confusion when simple things would fluster him. He was diagnosed as having Alzheimer's. He spent his remaining years in St. Vincent's and St. Joseph's in Dungarvan.

He enjoyed visits from his old pals and especially from his brother-in-law, John Daly. John would heartily greet him with something like, "How you fixed, Jackie? Cullinane says he's ready to go at the hay in the top field". And then they'd reminisce about the days they'd spent saving hay and the nights they'd spent hunting rabbits. Though he had little or no memory of recent events, he had good recall of times long past. All he needed was the right prompt.

In his last year, however, he became more silent and withdrawn. He came down with a chest infection and was sent to Waterford Regional Hospital where, on that fateful Monday morning, he came to the end of his long, well travelled road, and his spirit drifted away to find a better number on the shores of eternity.

On Tuesday evening, his remains were removed from Drohan's Funeral Home to Holy Cross Church, Stradbally, where they were received and blessed by Fr. Michael Enright assisted by Fr. Pat Butler.

Next day Requiem Mass was concelebrated by Fr. Michael Enright and Fr. Martin Keogh. The readers were son Tom and granddaughter Doireann with soloist Maura Burke singing the Responsorial Psalm, as well as other hymns. Anti Service Charges Protest

Householders Against Service Charges to hold major anti-service charges protest in Co. Waterford.

Householders Against Service Charges (HASC) will be holding a peaceful protest outside the Civic offices, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford on Friday the 23rd of June next starting at 3.30pm.

The election of the new mayor of Co. Waterford is being held inside the Civic offices on that day and protestors will be able to let their local representatives know their feelings on this issue.

At the protest, the HASC will be renewing its call for the abolition of local services charges. The HASC maintain that local refuse charges are an unfair and unjust tax that should be abolished. It believes that there would be no need for waste service charges if local government were properly funded.

The HASC believes that the County Manager should abolish the

€75.00 charge element of the service charge that is due in July.

Eddie Walsh, Chairperson HASC says, "Our campaign is not going away. We continue to call for the abolition of local services charges. Given the recent controversy about the lack of financial control at the Co. Council office it disgraceful that people should be paying for the mistakes of incompetent local government officials."

Householders Against Service Charges (HASC) are now investigating running local and national election candidates in the Waterford constituency. It is clear that the local politicians need a sharp lesson in local democracy and the HASC intend to provide that education.

An invitation is extended to anybody or any organisation opposed to local service charges to attend the protest in Dungarvan, which starts at 3.30pm.

Dispute Over Old Railway Line

A strategy to develop a walkway/cycle way on the old Railway line as a major tourist attraction lies in the balance after residents claimed "adverse possession of the line" and expressed their intention to fight the council's claims for the land.

A number of houses have extended gardens and property boundaries onto the old line - a situation that has threatened the future of the ambitious project.

Now, Waterford County Council may slap a Compulsory Purchase Order down on the line in order to avoid a legal battle with the residents that could end up delaying the project for years.

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne said that a solicitors letter on behalf of the people living along the line could "further complicate" the development of the greenway project. He said the council should acquire the line by compulsory purchase order and "wipe clean" any title issues instead of entering the legal minefield. He said there was no ambiguity about ownership.

Director of Services, Brian White said the property unquestionably belonged to the CIE as a railway line and the people along it were claiming "adverse possession" of the line.

Town Clerk, Eric Flynn said it was a unanimous decision by the GAA.

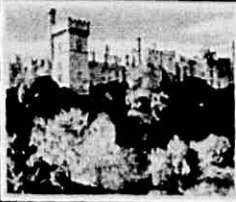
"It's great that when there was a need for car parking, they reciprocated our help for them with a 'no cost' deal on car parking."

FORTHCOMING LISMORE WORLD MUSIC GIGS

Leslie Dowdall first came to attention with her involvement in the 80's as the voice of the band "In Tua Nua" that fused celtic traditions with rock. Leslie Dowdall's solo career started with the release of her first album in 1997, 'No Guilt, No Guile'. The album won high praise for the creativity, vision and the soulful vocals for so long hidden beneath the music of the past. As a result, Leslie won the 1997 'Best Solo Female' artist at the Heineken/Hot Press Music Awards. Her second album 'Out There' released in 1998 not only confirmed Leslie's ability as one of Ireland's best female singers but also confirmed her talent as a songwriter. All the tracks on this album are original, the exception being the Jimi Hendrix song 'Angel' which receives tremendous attention from the songstress. This new album was a continuation of the passage taken with "No Guilt, No Guile", a continued interest in gentler, more reflective, vocally driven songs.

In 1999 Leslie featured in a series of Beatles Celebration Concerts at the National Concert Hall. The concerts were conducted by the Beatles' producer Sir George Martin. 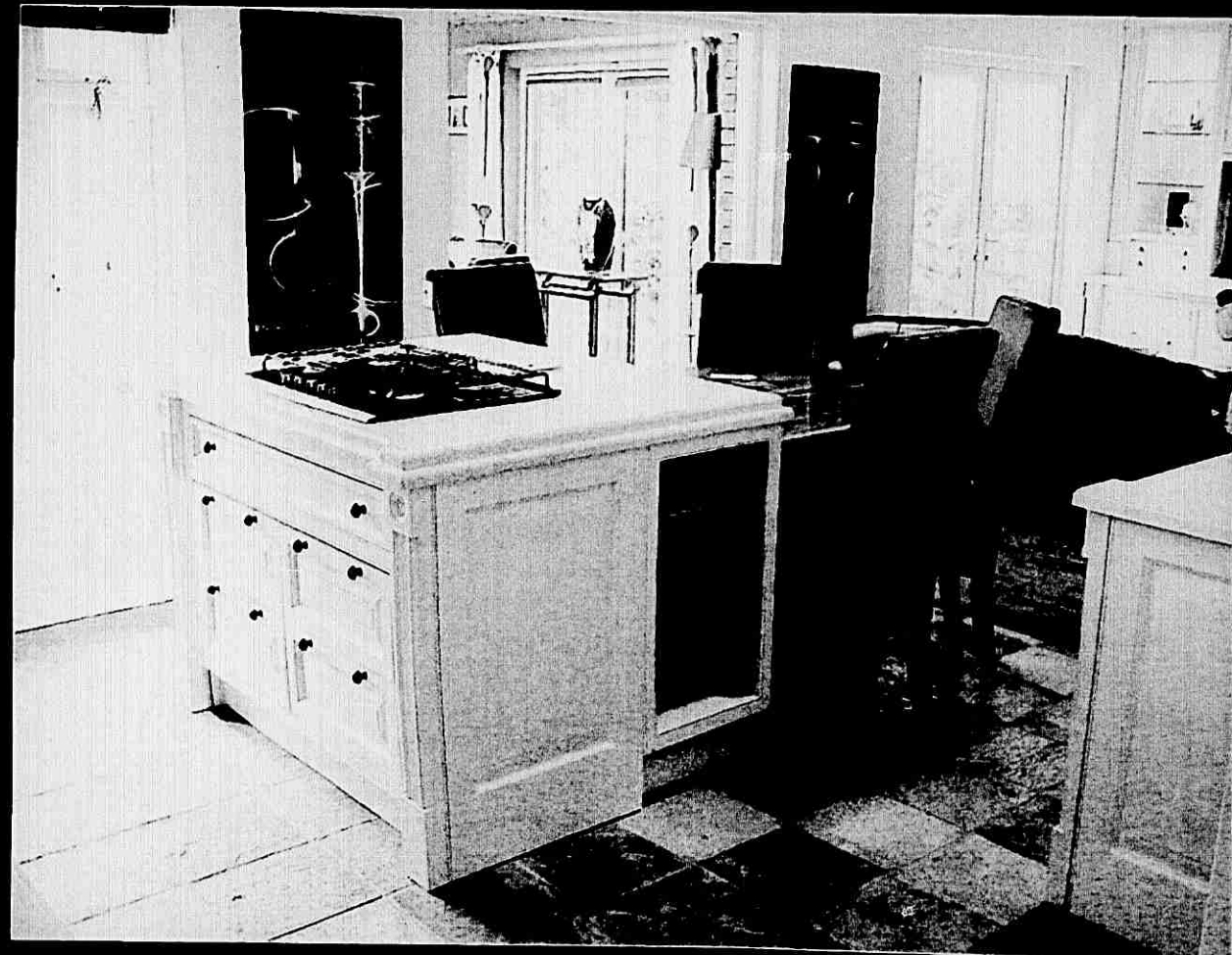

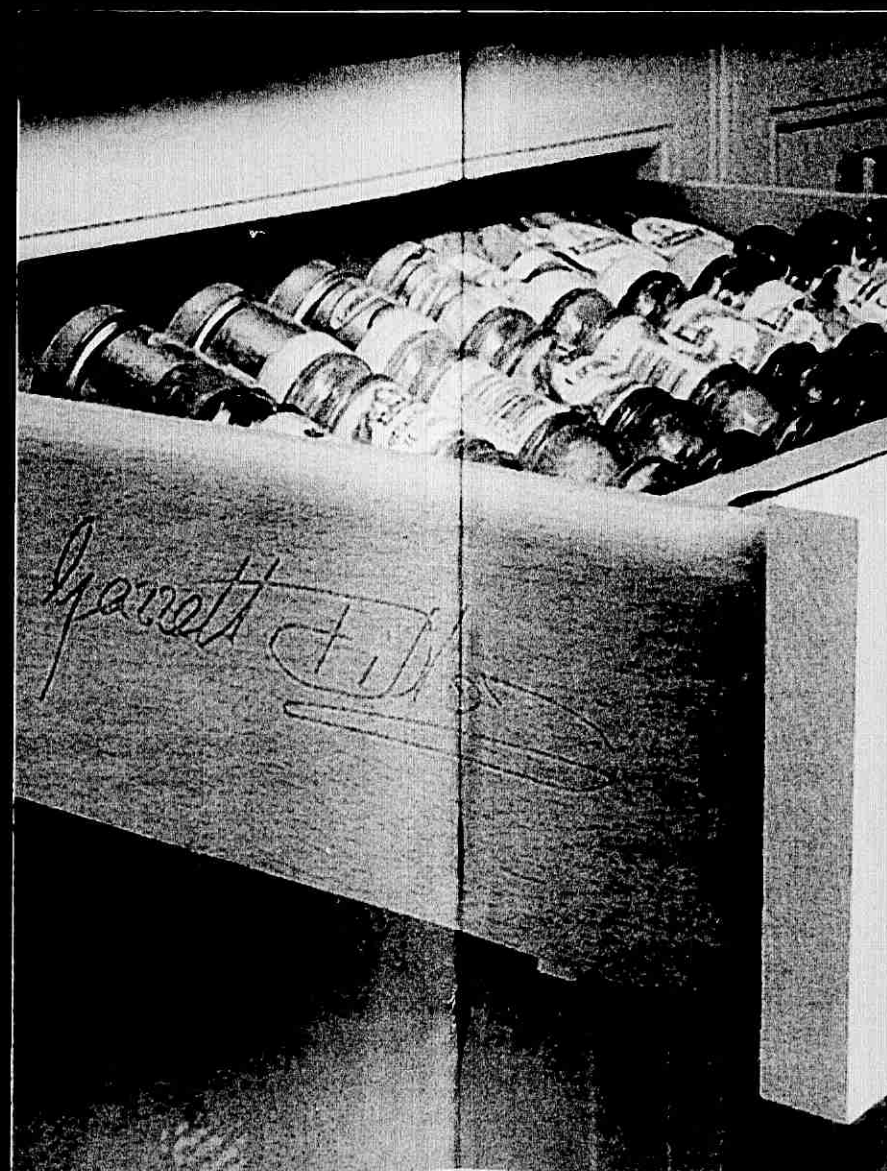
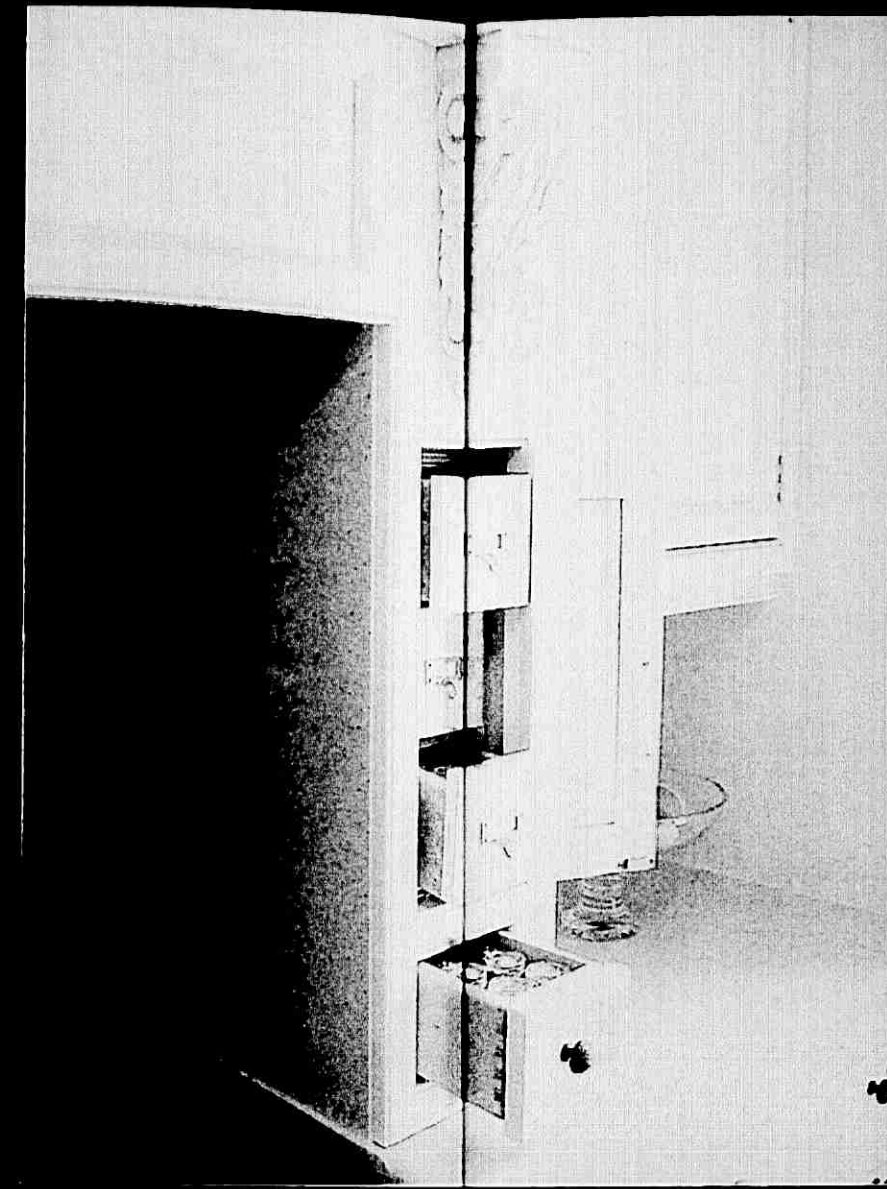

The four members of the band are accomplished musicians and performers and have played with many different people over the years and each one claims to be an illegitimate son of the "King of Cool".

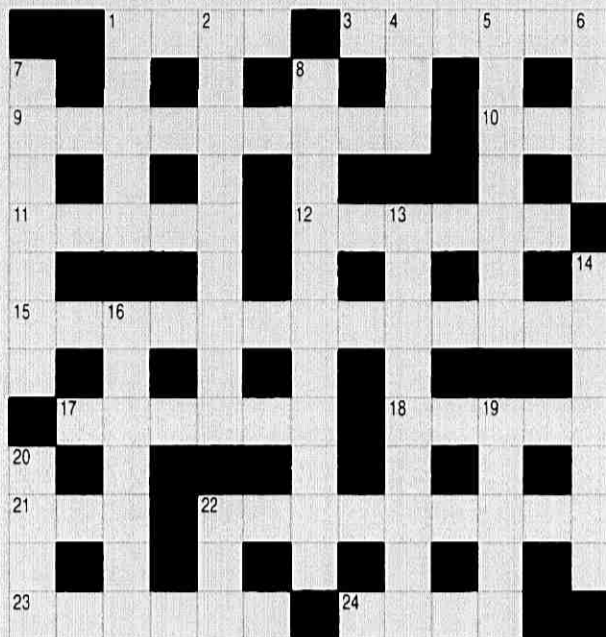

Adequate Resources In Tallow Garda Station

Adequate resources are now in place for Tallow Garda Station after the transfer of a Sergeant to the West Waterford town a year ago. Justice Minister, Michael McDowell informed Waterford County Council.

Minister McDowell, in a letter to the local authority, said local Garda management are "satisfied that there are now adequate resources in Tallow to meet the policing needs of the area."

He added: "Garda management further states that Garda personnel assigned to Tallow Garda Station, together with overall policing arrangements and operational strategy, are continually monitored and reviewed."

"Such monitoring ensures that optimum use is made of Garda resources, and the best possible Garda service is provided to the general public," he said.

Extra resources however will be looked at under the plans to bring Garda strength up to 14,000.

"The commissioner will now be drawing up plans on how best distribute and manage these additional resources and in this context, the needs of Tallow will be fully considered within the overall context of the needs of areas throughout the country."

The response was welcomed at the June meeting of Waterford County Council by Tallow-based councillor, James Tobin, who had been vocal in calling for the vacancy at Tallow Garda station to be filled.

Dungarvan Leader - This Week In The Garden

Go plant potty

Even the smallest patio or porch can boast a crop of vegetables or a garden of flowers in containers.

Planter boxes, wooden barrels, hanging baskets and large flowerpots are just some of the containers that can be used.

The container gardener is limited only by

Container planting: top tips

- Avoid containers with narrow openings.
- Cheap plastic pots may deteriorate in UV sunlight and terracotta pots dry out rapidly. Glazed ceramic pots require several drainage holes.
- Wooden containers are susceptible to rot. Avoid wood treated with creosote or other toxic compounds which can damage the plants.
- Small pots restrict the root area and dry out very quickly. The size and number of plants to be grown will determine the size of the container used. Deep-rooted vegetables require deep pots.
- Make sure your pot has adequate drainage.
- Line hanging baskets with plastic for water retention hidden by a layer of moss. Keep baskets away from afternoon sun.
- If you choose clay pots, remember that clay is porous. You can paint the outside with bright gloss paint or line the pot with plastic. Plants in clay pots should be monitored closely.

his or her imagination.

However, consider the following information as a guideline when choosing your container and the plants that will bring many hours of enjoyment.

Make sure your container drains rapidly but retains enough moisture to keep the roots evenly moist. If your container is quite tall, it is also worth considering how it will be affected by wind too.

This will not only dry out the pot, but could blow it over, so it is a good idea to make sure you use crocks for drainage rather than something lightweight, such as polystyrene. It will not be worth trying to save money by using garden soil in containers.

Growing plants, either vegetables or flowers, in a container is quite intensive and you never know what pests you will be introducing using garden soil, such as slugs.

Purchase a good quality John Innes potting mixture or make your own from equal parts of sharp sand, loamy garden soil, peat substitute and a general fertiliser, such as chicken manure pellets or growmore.

Using a mixture which includes loam ensures that the pot will also have enough weight to withstand all but the strongest gales and will also help the pot retain water. If you are using a growbag, use hessian sacking to hide the bright plastic and make it look more natural and protect the roots from the summer sun.

Your container garden will need at least five hours of direct sunlight each day, and many plants will

benefit from even more. As a general rule, leafy vegetables such as cabbage and lettuce can tolerate the most shade, while root crops such as beetroot and carrots will need more sun.

Fruiting vegetables such as tomatoes and cucumbers need the most sun.

The amount of sunlight needed by flowers varies depending on the varieties grown. Check the flower guides for sunlight requirements. Since potting mixes drain water rapidly, fertiliser will be washed out of the container as you water.

Once the plants have been growing for five or six weeks in the container use a dilute liquid fertiliser at least once a week to keep them well fed and healthy.

The most important thing to remember is that during the summer plants will need to be watered daily, especially during hot, dry weather.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Repot Auriculas

If you grow auriculas, now is the time to repot them. Shake the old soil from the roots and make certain these have no woolly aphid or vine weevil grubs on them.

If any are present wash the roots in a solution of derris or HCH, then repot either in 9 or 10 cm pots, reducing the size of the plants if necessary.

Use a John Innes No 2 compost rather than old compost to give the plants a boost. Pot firmly, water freely and place in a frame or sheltered place outdoors. You can remove offsets with roots if you wish and pot them separately.

Divide polyanthus, auriculas and primroses

These plants growing in the open may be lifted and divided if they are good selected varieties. With ordinary mixed strains it is better to raise a new stock each year from seed, as the old plants get weakened by attacks from greenfly, red spider mite and other pests.

Dig early potatoes

Potatoes planted at the end of February will probably be ready for digging.

Lift one or two roots and see what kind of a crop there is. There is no point in waiting for the tubers to mature. So long as they are big enough to be used, lift them, but only as you actually need them.

It is a mistake to dig too many early potatoes at once for they rapidly lose quality out of the ground.

Start to thin apples and pears

You will now be able to see how many fruits have been formed on your apple and pear trees. It is no use leaving too many in they will be misshapen, small and poor in quality. Usually one per spur is enough, and two should be regarded as the maximum.

If there are more than this, the weakest or least satisfactory will have to be removed. You can begin to do this now, but do not complete the work yet, for there is usually a fairly heavy natural fall later in the month.

Movie Reviews

Fast and the Furious: Tokyo Drift

Amazing cars, beautiful people, exceptional action sequences and some breathtaking scenery; such ingredients will always make a film enjoyable. Even 2Fast2Furious was worth sitting through, despite being an otherwise awful film. Luckily though Tokyo Drift is a massive improvement and will keep you glued to the screen from the opening seconds to the closing credits.

This film's biggest advantage over 2Fast2Furious is that there is actually a new plot, instead of just reusing the same stale story that had to serve the first two films. Sean (Lucas Black) has spent his whole life getting into car-related trouble, so when he breaks California's 3-strike rule his only options are jail or to go into exile with his army dad in Tokyo. Of course once he gets to Japan he immediately becomes involved in the underground car racing scene run by the Yakuza, Japan's mafia. Not only that but he falls for the big bad guy's woman!

Ok, the plot is really only a means of getting from one action scene to the next but at no stage are the pauses for breath boring. When we do get to the racing, not one second of film time is wasted. As the focus is on drifting (where the cars manage to power slide while retaining their speed), we don't have to sit through repetitive shots of cars speeding in a straight line. As one character says, if the cops clock you at over 180kph they don't bother chasing you so they just leave you alone, meaning there are no thrills to be had in conventional street racing. The drifts though are truly breathtaking and we even get a scene where a group of drivers drift in formation, all relaxed, just for the sheer joy of it.

Even if you didn't like the first two offerings in the franchise, Tokyo Drift is definitely worth a look. The change of location offers plenty of interesting diversions and the plot really is capable of holding the viewer's attention. There is also a film ending cameo which actually adds to the movie rather than just being a distraction like so many other cameos these days. An entirely enjoyable film, where you don't even leave to need your brain at reception.

Hard Candy

When 14 year old Hayley (Ellen Page) agrees to go home with Jeff (Patrick Wilson) the 32 year old she has just met from the internet, it looks like we are heading for another justice chases child snatcher film. In one way this turns out to be true, it just happens that justice comes in the form of a boyish teenager intent on repaying the child snatcher for his past sins.

Hayley is a resourceful girl, capable of drugging Jeff while he attempts to seduce her and tie him to a chair before interrogating him ruthlessly. Determined to get Jeff to confess to a host of crimes, she beats, probes and charms her way into his mind. Then she tells Jeff that she has decided to give him a little operation to stop the urges which turn him into a criminal, the sort of operation that would cause any man to shake with fear.

The production of this film is spot on, tight camerawork mixes with a tense soundtrack and perfect pacing. Ellen Page is absolutely flawless as Hayley, one minute a charmingly innocent school-girl the next a scarily logical psychopath. Depending on how Hollywood takes to such a gritty film, Page really should be considered a dead cert for at least a nomination for next year's Best Actress. Meanwhile Patrick Wilson is extremely impressive as the repulsive Jeff. No matter how much he is suffering, Wilson never lets us forget what a truly awful man Jeff is. The only slight problem with the film is that some of what Hayley is capable of is more than slightly unbelievable. Forgetting for a second just how well detailed her plans for revenge are, how does a slim 14 year old girl manage to lift a well built grown man onto a four foot high table when he is knocked out? While this may seem a slight criticism, over the course of the film there are just too many instances that distract your attention by their unbelievable nature.

This really is a film that will have you thinking though. At the end you will not be sure who, if anybody, you feel any sympathy for. Yet, as much as some of the scenes will twist your stomach, you will remember this movie and will be keeping an eye out for the extraordinary Ellen Page in future.

The Wind That Shakes The Barley

This week sees the release of Ken Loach's acclaimed Irish War of Independence film, The Wind That Shakes The Barley. Having won the coveted Palme d'Or, this Cillian Murphy led film has also come in for some criticism from across the Irish Sea as a piece of IRA propaganda. However, most have lauded it as a realistic piece of film making, where the personal stories of young revolutionaries do not detract from the film's awareness of the political situations of the time. Less romanticised than Neil Jordan's Michael Collins and set against the beautiful backdrop of West Cork, if it is as popular with audiences as with critics this will be the big hit film of the summer in Ireland.

Lake House

Sandra Bullock and Keanu Reeves star in this kooky romance where everything is not quite as it seems. Meeting through a note Bullock leaves for the new tenant of her house when she moves out; they begin a romantic relationship conducted through the lost medium of letter writing. It soon becomes apparent though that there is one major problem, while Bullock is living in 2006, Keanu is writing his letters from the same house in 2004. Their last big film together was Speed, but now time can't go fast enough for Reeves' character. If the plot may seem a tad implausible, think of any modern blockbusters or rom-coms that try to be believable. Critics in the States have given this movie good reviews and we all know from Speed how the chemistry sizzles between the two leads.

Museum Notes

Grattan Square/ The Bridge

Samuel Ware compiled a report in March 1813 on the progress of the bridge construction. "I found on the quay an immense quantity of freestone brought from England at an expense, as I was informed, of about 2 shillings per foot cube". Two of the piers had been partly built. Ware stated that he had been shown two limestone quarries, one in Dungarvan (at a rear of houses in Mitchel St./ Mary St.) and one in Abbey-side, where he saw large stones being cut. "I saw part of an expensive block cornice and architrave partly worked and it appears by the drawings, that the bridge was intended to be finished suitably to a nobleman's park or a great city". The original architect's drawings have not come to light. It ap-

pears that the design for the bridge consisted of five arches, which would have stretched across the site of the present causeway. Ware suggested this design should be reduced to three arches. "I am of the opinion that all the work in the faces of the bridge...should be entirely rough (rusticated); In consequence of reducing the length of the bridge, it will be necessary to extend that of the embankment, the quarry on Abbeyside and the facility of obtaining materials on the ground will render this not by any means an expensive work". Some tenants in Abbeyside were compensated for giving up their houses and gardens in order to create a link from the causeway to what is now Sexton Street.

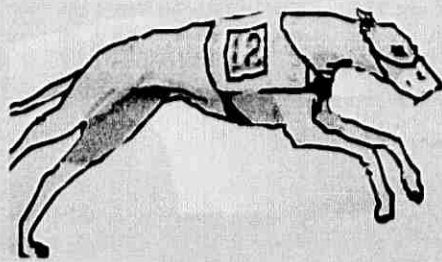

Three In A Row As Nan Blossoms

October 2004 whelp Nans Blossom (Larkhill Jo-Desert Eily) made it a hat trick of victories justifying favouritism in the final of the Kilcohan Park N2/N3 Unraced stake last Friday night. Trained by Peter Brady for Mary Whittle Nans Blossom 1/1 quickly took control of matters on the run to the first corner to take an early lead over Autumn Highlight and Spahill Jess. Setting sail for home Nans Blossom enjoyed a free run in for the remainder of this contest eventually proving four lengths to strong for Nice Prince who recovered well to take the runner up spot after first bend crowding. Time 29.27.

For the second week in a row Mooncoin owner William O'Brien sent out a well-backed novice to open his account. This time it was the turn of Butts Joe this July 2004 son of Teds Jo and Minnies Fancy outpacing his rivals into the first bend and accelerating clear down the back stretch Butts Joe 6/4 basically won as he liked dishing out a four lengths beating to the always well placed Curlew Storm in 29.42.

Mooncoin Blueboy and Treanaree Clover were both to the fore early on in race two but rounding his field off the second turn the William Phelan owned Ballyneale Card (Droopys Scholes-Rhincrew Zara) 6/4 quickly made the long dash for home. At the winning line Ballyneale Card had two lengths to spare over Treanaree Clover in 29.74.

The Barrett Sisters Syndicate owned and David Flanagan trained Beautys Mikey (Mustang Yank-Sarah Lou) 3/1 to 5/4 was all the rage in the third contest and exiting trap four at a fair rate of knots Beautys Mikey made every post a winning one in 29.45. Well clear on the back stretch Beautys Mikey drifted wide into the home stretch and despite a late rally by Sadlers Sand Beautys Mikey held firm to score by a length.

2/1 chance Napp Kidder (Droopys Woods-Scartna Lil) 2/1 got back on the winning trail for owner Martin Walsh and trainer Jimmy Frisby when making all the running from trap two in race four. Shooting into an early lead over Pure Imagination Napp Kidder kept going well up front to eventually win out by one and a half lengths in 29.46.

In a 300-yard sprint Warlock was installed as the 6/4 favourite but he lost ground at the break with a slow exit from trap four. The same could not be said of the S.K.T. Syndicate owned Tinrah Jo (Teds Jo-Doctor Tinrah) this Gerry Mulligan trained 4/1 outsider coming away smartly from trap five to lead early on from Pretty Lily and while Warlock made late headway to finish second Tinrah Jo prevailed by two lengths in a decent 16.52.

The camera was called upon to divide the principals in race seven with victory going to the Padraig Gough and Karl Gostl owned and Phil Gough trained Hell Broke Loose (Sparta Tom-Persistent Chill) 3/1 in 29.55. In a rough race Hell Broke Loose displayed plenty of early foot to corner in front of Third Watch and while the latter was steaming home at the finish a determined Hell Broke Loose dug deep to post a minimum distance success over Third Watch.

The eight event produced a winning favourite with victory going to the well supported 6/4 market leader Vinnies Honcho (Top Honcho-Im A Cooperone) in 29.24 the fastest return of the night over the standard trip. Owned by Vincent Finn Vinnies Honcho emerged out of the opening two bends with a handy lead over Clongeen Classic. Beltra Tresca finished with a rattle in the closing stages but by that stage Vinnies Honcho was home and hosed obliging by a length and a half.

Making the best possible start from trap four in the ninth event the John Walsh owned Monmahogue Mindy (Jamella Tiger-Monmahogue Rose) ran out a clear-cut winner at odds of 4/1 in 29.36. Dashing clear of the pack from trap four Monmahogue Mindy was never going to lose this race leading early on from Sheeraghs Rhys before beating the wide running Final Knock by three and a half lengths in 29.36.

In the penultimate 550-yard contest Early King and Mount Rivers were involved in a real thriller up front. Early King held the early call as the Joan Conway owned Mount Rivers kept looking for a gap up the inside of Early King. 4/1 shot Mount Rivers finally got the split he was looking for off the home turn and in a mad dash for the winning line Mount Rivers emerged victorious by half a length in 30.58.

In the final race of the night Maplewood Sam set out to make all of the running but he could never quiet shake off the challenge of the Martin O'Sullivan owned Minnies Misaro the 6/4 favourite. Gliding into a third bend lead Minnies Misaro (Teds Jo-Minnies Gift) quickly asserted his superiority to motor on for a deserved

three and a half lengths defeat of a running on Curlew Markie in 29.27.

While she failed to run up to scratch the previous Saturday night when fading after a bright start the Michael O'Brien owned Jammie Tart (Rapid Ranger-Blue Mystic) atoned in no uncertain fashion last Saturday night when powering to a 28.75 success in the final race of the session. In a competitive 525, which saw the 6/4 favourite Marshall Nicki sprawl leaving trap one, Jammie Tart scooted into an early lead over

Ballinclare Ivor and seeing the trip out well Jammie Tart crossed the winning line with three and a half lengths to spare over Dash On Lucy.

Racing kicked off with a 3/1 winner as the Frank Cleere owned and Mary Cleere trained Listoloin Mick (Crossleigh Fudge-Tama Chanor) made every post a winning one in 29.27. Trapping smartly from box six Listoloin Mick led early on from a wide running Daroma Dave and Blue Cookie and while the latter finished best of all Listoloin Mick went on to triumph by a length.

Two short heads separated the first three greyhounds over the winning line in race two. The J.M.S. Syndicate owned and M. O'Regan trained Glenbervie Mojos (Blackjack Tom-Longstone Lass) 3/1 made full use of his early pace to kick into an early lead over Butt Candy and while they were queuing up to take on the leader over the final two bends Glenbervie Mojos dug deep to deny a fast finishing Keane Runner by the minimum distance with Carat Of Silver just behind in third. Time 29.55.

By far the easiest winner of the session was the Joe O'Hanlon owned and Jim Scully trained Takemehomejoey (Droopys Vierimurlens Madrid) this evens favourite absolutely hacking up in 28.96. In a terribly one sided third contest Takemehomejoey raced

to the head of matters on the run to the first turn and with the remainder bunching off the second bend Takemehomejoey bounded clear to record a comprehensive ten and a half lengths defeat of Kingsmill Prime.

The husband and wife team of Matt and Frances O'Donnell sent two winners between them on the night both winners starting at odds of 3/1. In race four The Other Gem (Larkhill Jo-The Other Sony) shone brightly from trap six easing his way into an early lead over Chloes Bandit and while Whithered Ferns stayed on well at the death to claim the runner up spot The Other Gem won a shade cosily by two lengths in 29.97.

The Denis O'Connell owned Mardocs Fergie (Premier County-Toss Tulip) brought up the double posting a facile 29.00 success in race six. Black Million set the early gallop here but driving up the inside of Black Million around the second last turn Mardocs Fergie quickly moved on to score by four lengths from Common People.

In between the O'Donnell family double local trainer Eamon O'Donovan sent out John Murphy's Montos Mark (Montos Carhummor-Montos Tricks) 1/1 to an impressive 16.20 sprint success. Elteen Nell took a flyer from trap five but Montos Mark running from trap six had the necessary early gears to motor up the inside of Elteen Nell on the run to the opening corner. Once he struck the front Montos Mark quickly put the issue beyond doubt galloping clear for a three and a half lengths defeat of Elteen Nell.

The John Kavanagh and Tom Foley owned Atlantean (Droopys Kewell-Trendy Belinda) came from behind to capture the seventh contest at a starting price of 5/2. A fast starting Bobbie The Rail was joined in the lead over the final two bends by Bosheen Booster and while this pair rubbed shoulders Atlantean pounced in the home stretch to come through for a half a length win over Bosheen Booster with Bobbie The Rail a length further back in third. Time 29.17.

The Darren Dunford owned Gandisranger a full sister to headline maker Jammie Tart motored onto a comfortable six lengths back stretch lead in the eight contest and while the progressive Firesafe Corey made rapid late headway up the fence 3/1 shot Gandisranger held out by half a length in a decent 28.93.

The all female line up of owner Catherine Keighery, trainer Patricia O'Neill and their runner Hows The Lack (Fortune Mike-Ferbane Spirit) 3/1 came good in race nine as Hows The Lack obliged in 29.06. This lady just loves to bowl along up front and while the cavalry were closing at the finish Hows The Lack deserved her three quarters of a length win over a staying on Sparta Tina.

Local owner Bill Marlin sent out the 4/1 winner of a 550-yard contest as his Lil Bow Wow (Pinewood Blue-Sideshow Mel) came from last to first to win going away in 30.21. When the favourite Our Armageddon went to the front from the early leader Star Soprano between the final two bends the 7/4 jolly looked all over the winner but producing a flying finish Lil Bow Wow flew home from the fourth bend to triumph by two and a half lengths.

TG4 will be in attendance to record the event for Greyhound View, which airs twice weekly on TG4, Setanta Sports and seven times weekly on Sky Sports.

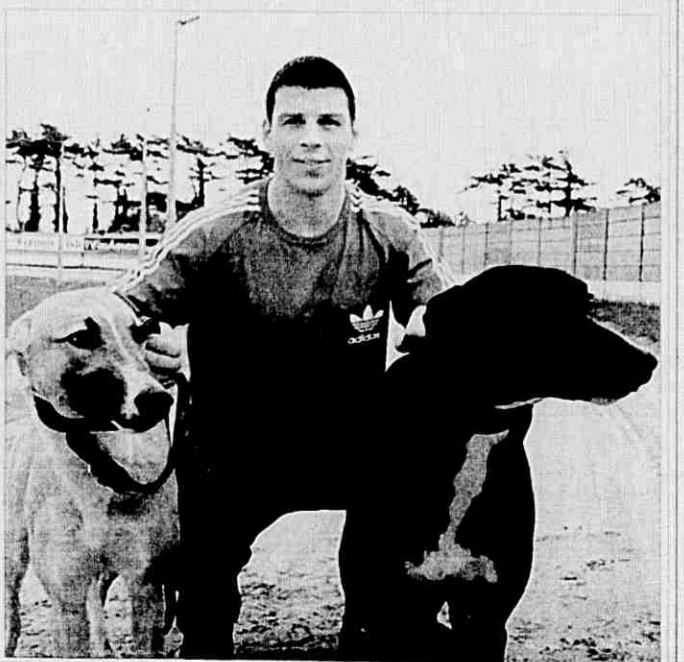

EDDIE TO APPEAL BAN

Irish rider Eddie Aherne could miss out on the last three days of the Royal Ascot meeting if his appeal against a ban imposed by the Bath stewards for improper riding is not overturned.

HRA INQUIRY

Jockeys Brian Reilly and Dean Williams together with ex bookmaker Owen Churchill face a Horse Regulating Authority inquiry in London on June 29th to answer questions over a number of matters pertaining to the running of 10 race-horses between the period December 2004 and February 2005.

NEW LOADING PROCEDURES

The British Jockey Club are looking at introducing new guidelines as to the time it takes to load horses into starting stalls at racecourses around Britain. They are seriously looking at affording horses just two attempts of being loaded into stalls and if both attempts fail the horse takes no part in the race. Incidentally this years Epsom Derby winner Sir Percy took nearly a minute to load prior to this years blue ribbon event.

UNLUCKY FOURTEEN

Did you know that after riding in the English Derby on fourteen separate occasions former champion jockey Frankie Dettori is still awaiting his first success in this much sought after classic.

SHANE IS HOPEFUL

Irish born jockey Shane Kelly took a heavy fall at Leicester last Saturday night but is hopeful of resuming action at Royal Ascot this week.

WOEFUL SUMMER

The last couple of months have not been kind to rider Paul Carberry. His well publicised run in with the authorities over his behaviour on a flight from Spain to Ireland still hangs over him and when he returned from a lengthy period off due to an injury he took a crashing fall at Navan last Friday and missed a winning ride aboard the Eoin Griffin trained Gunnison at Fairyhouse on Sunday.

SOUND RECORD

When the impressive Shirocco captured the recent Coronation Cup at Epsom it was the sixth time that a runner from the French stable of Andre Fabre had come up trumps in the Group 1 race. His previous winners include Saint Estephe, In The Wings, Apple Tree, Sunshack and Swain.

Trainer Marcus Tregoning is not happy with Derby winner Sir Percy, as the three year old is still not over his Derby winning exertions and the colt maybe forced to sidestep the Budweiser Irish Derby and Coral Eclipse Stakes.

NOSEDA LOSS

Jeremy Nosedá suffered a major loss last week when his Majors Cast broke a leg on the gallops while being prepared for a tilt at the Queen Anne Stakes at Royal Ascot.

PROFILE-DERRICK SMITH, SUE MAGNIER & MICHAEL TABOR

Few in the racing world can boast better connections than Sue Magnier. Her husband John is the most powerful man in the bloodstock world as owner of Coolmore Stud and she is daughter of arguably the greatest 20th century trainer, Vincent O'Brien, who saddled three consecutive Grand National winners and six Derby winners. Her brother David O'Brien is another Derby-winning handler while another brother, Charles, is also a successful trainer.

In the 1970s John Magnier (born February 10, 1948), the son of a Co Cork dairy farmer and stud owner, teamed up with the late Robert Sangster and trainer Vincent O'Brien with the idea of buying potential stallions as yearlings. This they did with great success, counting Alleged, Be My Guest, Caerleon, El Gran Senor, Golden Fleece, Sadler's Wells and Storm Bird amongst those who were bought or bred. Magnier subsequently bought out his partners at Coolmore - which now has huge offshoots in Australia and America - and owns the nearby magnificent Ballydoyle training stable. He has a myriad of other business interests, mainly with top jump owner J P McManus and the duo sold their 28.7% stake in Manchester United FC to American tycoon Malcolm Glazer.

The pair have also invested in the Barchester chain of nursing homes, a property company that owns Unilever House in London, leisure clubs, including the Chelsea Harbour Club, and the Sandy Lane Hotel in Barbados. Monaco-based former bookmaker Michael Tabor, who like Magnier spends much of the winter in Barbados, became a partner in many of the Coolmore horses in the mid 1990s while in 2004, Derrick Smith, a former Ladbrokes trading director based in Barbados, joined Tabor as a Coolmore investor. Entrepreneur, trained by Sir Michael Stoute, took the 1997 2000 Guineas to provide a first British Classic success for the Sue Magnier/Tabor partnership, who also won that season's Irish equivalent and Irish Derby with Desert King.

The duo won the Vodafone Derby in 2001 and 2002 with Galileo and High Chaparral. In partnership with Sir Alex Ferguson, Magnier owned Rock Of Gibraltar, who won seven successive Group One victories including the 2002 2000 Guineas.

Other major wins include the 1998 2000 Guineas with King Of Kings, the 1999 French Derby, Irish Derby, Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe and the 2000 King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes with Montjeu and a run of five consecutive Group One successes in 2000 from Giant's Causeway. Galileo also won the Irish Derby and King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes after his 2001 Epsom win, while further British Classic glory has come in the St Leger with Milan (2001), Brian Boru (2003) and Scorpion (2005). High Chaparral, who went on to take the 2002 Irish Derby, also landed that year's Breeders' Cup Turf and then dead-headed in the same event 12 months later. Last season Magnier won both the 2000 Guineas with Footstepsinthesand and the 1000 Guineas with Virginia Waters, and, while it was Andre Fabre who saddled their Budweiser Irish Derby and Lucien Barriere Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winner Hurricane Run, O'Brien was at the helm when the Coolmore trio, having sent out Oratorio to win both the Coral-Eclipse at Sandown and the Irish Champion Stakes at Leopardstown, topped up their Paris celebrations when lifting both the two Group One juvenile races. This season, their George Washington, trained by Aidan O'Brien, landed the Stan James 2000 Guineas at Newmarket on May 6 and they won the Vodafone Oaks at Epsom with Alexandrova.

Previous Vodafone Oaks Wins: 1998 Shah-toussah, 2001 Imagine (both Sue Magnier and Diane Nagle), and 2006 Alexandrova.

RACING NEWS

GOVERNMENT HONOURS IRISH RACING SUCCESS

An Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, and John O'Donoghue, Minister for Arts, Sports and Tourism hosted a reception for Ireland's National Hunt heroes at Farmleigh House, in Dublin on Monday 12th June. Mr Ahern paid tribute to Ireland's National Hunt stars and said "thanks to the structures and funding created by the Horse and Greyhound Racing Act we now have a secure base for the industry, which gives scope for the natural talents of our great horsemen and women to develop. We no longer export our best horses or people - they now stay at home, providing employment and thrilling the Irish public with their sporting exploits at home and abroad." Presentations were made by An Taoiseach to the owners, trainers, jockeys and grooms of Brave Inca (winner of the Smurfit Kappa Champion Hurdle), Newmill (winner of the Queen Mother Champion Chase), War Of Attrition (winner of the Totesport Gold Cup) and Numbersix-valverde (winner of the John Smith's Aintree Grand National) during the course of the evening.

DEATH OF CHARLES HAUGHEY

Former Taoiseach of Ireland, Charles Haughey, passed away last Tuesday at the age of 80. A great friend of Irish racing, it was he who, when Minister For Finance in 1968, introduced legislation as part of the Finance Act that made stallion owners exempt from tax on stud fees, and removed the requirement to make returns relating to stallion income. This move had far reaching and many beneficial effects for Irish racing as the stallion tax exemption had a profound consequence for Irish breeders and allowed studs such as Coolmore

Stud to grow into the most powerful force in European Bloodstock. Haughey owned some very useful horses over the years with Aristocracy winning the 1977 International Stakes at the Phoenix Park and Vulforo taking the 1973 Power Gold Cup at Fairyhouse but his greatest victory as an owner occurred in 1995 when his Flashing Steel, trained by his son-in-law, John Mulhern, defied top weight of 12 stone to win the Irish Grand National under Jamie Osborne.

BREEDERS ON ALERT OVER SWAMP FEVER

The first clinically diagnosed cases of Equine Infectious Anaemia (EIA) recorded in Ireland have been detected near the Kildare/Meath border and have led to the deaths of a thoroughbred mare and foal. EIA, or swamp fever, has no public health consequences but may be transmitted to equines through the use of contaminated instruments or needles, or where there are a large number of horseflies close to acutely affected horses but the disease is not spread from horse to horse. The Department of Agricultural and Rural Development are advising stud owners and managers to contact their respective veterinary surgeons and assess the need for their horses to be tested for swamp fever. There is no threat to racing, although trainers have been asked to check horses in their care and Brian Kavanagh, Chief Executive of Horse Racing Ireland, stated "HRI has recommended that all horse trainers heed the Department of Agriculture's advice in getting their bloodstock tested to ensure the infection is kept at bay. Racing has not been affected and will continue as programmed."

IRISH RACING REVIEW

(12th June - 19th June)

PROUD TO BE IRISH GALWAY BOUND

Seamus O'Farrell landed the Galway Hurdle in the year 2000 with Perugia Diamond and he has that big race in mind again this time round with Proud To Be Irish (7/2) who ran out a good winner of the Frank Hannon Memorial Hurdle at Roscommon on Monday.

With nearly €750,000 bet with the bookmakers and another €93,000 with the Tote, this was a particularly successful mixed meeting and the large attendance certainly enjoyed some competitive racing.

LYONS LANDS FIRST GROUP RACE SUCCESS

Trainer Ger Lyons will have fond memories of racing at Leopardstown last Wednesday as he saddled his first ever Group race winner in the shape of An Tadh who landed the Ballycorus Stakes (Group 3). The 13/2 winner made all the running under Johnny Murtagh and proved a length and a half too strong for Lord Admiral (11/4) with the disappointing 8/11 favourite, Misu Bond, back in third place.

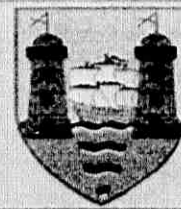

Pat Flynn, Chairman, presided at last weeks poorly attended June meeting of the County Board held at Lawlors Hotel.

REPORTS

Reports to hand from the senior and under 21 selection committees were read and the senior report outlined the reasons why we were not successful against Tipperary in Cork. Preparation for the Qualifier matches was satisfactory and a good draw was looked forward too. It was hoped, the report read, to have a full panel available and fit for the major games ahead.

The under 21 report dealt with the match against Limerick and the preparation for the match with Cork in Cork in the Munster semi-final.

COMPLAINTS

There was a list of complaints all relating to the match in Cork against Tipperary.

The matter of the accommodation for the intermediate hurling team was raised by John Jackson, P.R.O., who said the arrangements were most unsatisfactory and the players should have been given far better treatment by the stadium people. A complaint is to be sent to the Munster Council.

The 'old chestnut' - the matter of the wrong team being supplied for the match programme was raised and debated for a long time with many delegates coming in on the debate and criticising the team management for persisting with this

nonsensical practice. The county Chairman said that several requests had been made to the management to have the proper team published and while they had been given an assurance that the matter would be looked into, no change had come about.

He said it was the policy of the County Board not to interfere with the workings of county selection committees. However he told delegates that another attempt will be made.

Other topics related to the Munster semi-final that were complained about included the choice of hotel accommodation for the teams and the failure to get accommodation for juveniles.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

A report from Development officer John O'Leary referred to the urgency of implementing the I.T facilities. He said that the I.T programme must be up and running by October and an early meeting with all club secretaries must take place in order that we are aware of what the IT programme is about.

YOUTH REPORT

A very comprehensive report from the County Youth Committee detailed the huge amount of work undertaken by this very active group.

It referred to the excellent report of the Congress Youth Delegate, Kieran Connery, and such topics as "Code of Best Practice for Youth Sport," Cumann na mBunscoil and the

Media. This report was submitted by Youth Officer Joe Cleary.

FINANCE

County Treasurer Michael Hogan gave a run down on the finances and told the meeting that €191,000 had already been spent on the preparation of our eight county teams and this is even before we have reached the halfway stage of the season. He said that income since our previous meeting amounted to less than six thousand. He was satisfied that when the club championships resume things will improve.

On the subject of the Development Levy a total of 43 clubs have come on board and three have made a commitment. A total of three clubs have paid the five-year levy.

On the matter of the Golf Classic, Emer Barry reported that a total of 47 teams had taken part but only 19 clubs in the county had entered teams which she said, was disappointing.

Both Butlerstown and Ballygunner were given grant aid towards the costs of travelling to Feile this summer.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

A system whereby the 5 year limitation of service scheme can be introduced with the least possible disruption was outlined to delegates. At Central Council a lottery will take place next year with all members having 20 or more years service being drawn and the first 10

names out will retire at the county convention in that year. A similar lottery will be held for members with 15 years service in the following year and another with 10 years in the following year. This is being done to ensure that the full council (or almost) will not have to retire at the same time.

A formula is also being worked out for Provincial Councils and County Boards, but in the case of County Boards it is now too late to introduce a scheme as those with five consecutive years will be required to retire after one more year in office. It is expected that seven members of the Waterford County Board will be stepping down at county convention 2007.

TRIBUTE

When votes of sympathy were being passed at the meeting, Munster Council member Paddy Joe Ryan paid a special tribute to his Fourmilewater club colleague the late Michael Danagher who had passed away during the week.

In the tribute P. J. spoke about the many roles played by his late colleague in the club down through the years. He said Michael was an outstanding club officer by any standards and no task was too big for him if it was to benefit the club or the G.A.A. He said that the club and the family were very happy to find so very many clubs being represented at the funeral. He said this was greatly appreciated.

Waterford Test Hot Favourites Longford in Exciting Qualifier

If Waterford's determination and courage could be matched by skill and fitness the result of this exciting and very entertaining first round qualifier at Walsh Park might have been far different and if two second half goal chances had been availed of Waterford might still be in the All-Ireland Championship.

Having said this, however, I must hasten to concede that Longford were the better football team and played precision football all the way. Two weeks ago Longford ran hot favourites Dublin to just two points in the Leinster Senior Football Championship and for most of the game here the visitors played to the same high standard.

It is a tribute to Waterford that while Longford were the better team only a single point separated the sides in the fifty fourth minute when the score stood at 1-9 to 1-8 in favour of Longford. In the fifty sixth minute only four points separated

the sides but Waterford were not to score again to the final whistle.

Three weeks ago when Longford travelled to London five hundred supporters accompanied them and on Saturday last the same number must have been present in the eight hundred attendance as we were undoubtedly outnumbered in the stands.

ADMISSION PRICE

The admission price of twenty euros aroused the anger of very many patrons and a few supporters who turned up did not enter the ground.

Conditions were ideal and the slight breeze that blew towards the city end favoured Waterford in the first half.

SCORING

Waterford got off to a flying start after a combined effort saw Karl O'Keeffe through for a splendid goal in the first minute. A great point by Wayne Hennessy left us four points clear in the fourth minute.

A point from a free by Brian Kavanagh got Longford on the scoreboard for the first time in the fifth minute but a second Wayne Hennessy point also from play left us four points clear again in the seventh minute. In the ninth and thirteenth minutes Longford had points per Shane Mulligan and James Martin (Martin's point was undoubtedly well wide but was allowed). Points from James Martin and James Barden followed by two points from Paul Barden left the visitors two points clear by the twenty first minute. Andy Hubbard brought one back for Waterford in the twenty third minute and a further point by Brian Wall brought the sides level in the twenty fifth minute. Then a defensive blunder left the goal area wide open and allowed Paul Barden through for Longford's first and only goal in the twenty sixth minute. There were no further scores in the remainder of the half leaving the score at 1-7 to 1-4 in favour of Longford at half time.

SECOND HALF

A point by Trevor Smullen followed by a James Martin score in the seventh minute sent Longford into a five points lead. Then a Stephen Cunningham point in the eighth minute brought a reply from Paul Barden in the tenth minute, then in the twelfth and seventeenth minute points from play by Karl O'Keeffe and Brian Wall brought the gap back to two points. Waterford were now playing their best football and an upset looked possible. A splendid run by Gary Hurney saw him clear with no one to beat but the goalkeeper who happened to be in the right position to block a rocket drive that brought relief to the worried Longford supporters. In the twentieth minute Stephen Cunningham with a great point reduced the gap to a single point (1-9 to 1-8). In the twenty sixth and twenty seventh minutes David Barden and Brian Wall exchanged points but unfortunately the Waterford effort produced nothing further on the

Waterford scoreboard despite one more golden goal chance that went all wrong. The last four scores were achieved by the visitors who were the first to agree afterwards that the final whistle brought relief.

Managers Comment

After the game team manager John Kiely said overall it was a very good display by Waterford and having lost a couple of scoring chances we had an uphill battle at the end but the players played very well and we will have learned a lot from the game and be ready to take our chances in the Tommy Murphy Cup in three weeks time. The Longford Manager Luke Dempsey said they were very worried for a long time in the game and Waterford provided more formidable opposition

than he had expected. He said they are a panel of players with great potential who are capable of doing better and can be a force in the near future.

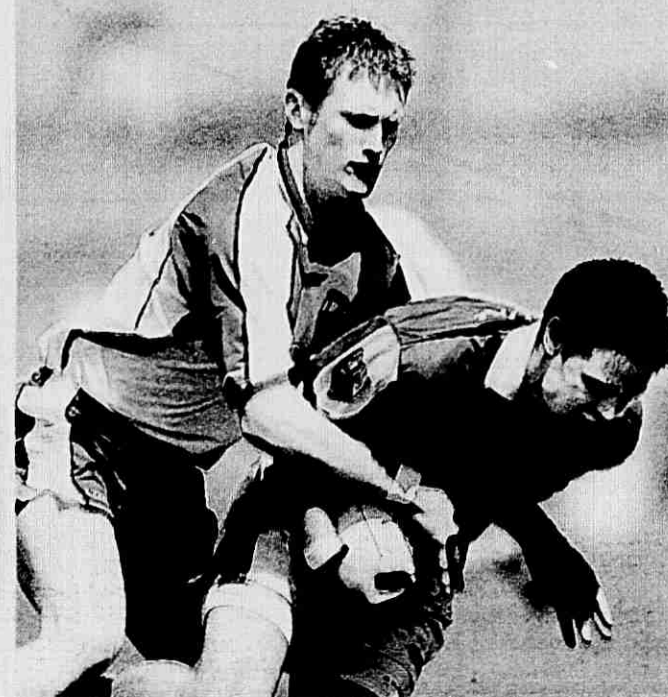

A splendid first half display which saw Waterford a deserved 14 points clear (2-14 to 0-6) at half-time paved the way for their comprehensive victory over the midlanders and keep the county on course for a place in the quarter or semi-final of the championship on Sunday last.

In the analysis too, we must remember that we played without team captain Paul Flynn and Eoin Kelly and were denied three goals by the brilliant Westmeath goalkeeper Ml. Brody who made three supersaves. We did not maintain the momentum in the second half and allowed the home side back

into the game, but at the same time, making them 'keep their distance'. They scored 1-8 in the second half and had a goal disallowed for a 'square infringement'. We also scored 1-8 in the second half to win by our half-time 14 points margin.

A very big crowd were present as Westmeath had played London in the football qualifier in the first game. The crowd remained on for our match which was also enjoyed by a good

Cork are the reigning All Ireland champions having won the title for the first time last October. They are a formidable side moulded together over the last couple of years, they have won the league on '05 and '06 and have a good mixture of youth and experience.

The Waterford County Board special match day committee has announced that stand tickets for the game will entitle the holder to be accommodated in the stand but will not be allotted any particular seat in the stand. Therefore holders will be accommodated on a first come, first served basis. The message from this is to get to the ground as early as possible. Tickets will be issued through the clubs in the normal way.

With five wins from five starts in the series to date Sandis is proving unbeatable currently on the road-racing scene down these parts. After recording a splendid win and setting a new course record in the Toura-neena 5k on the previous Bank Holiday Monday. He once again was on top of his game in Clashmore last Friday night when he clipped a whopping 29 seconds off the old standard of 25.36 with his trade mark front running from the gun he recorded a time very fast time of 25.07. Sandis has now really all but inscribed his name on the Hogáin Cup as overall winner of this year's series, with five from five its hard to see anyone snatching the title from the Latvian national. Mary, one of the all time greats of the sport, is still running very well and was clocked at 32.55. Third was our

own club member Diane Behan who was last years winner of this race. Diane is just getting back to full fitness presently after a little break which was well deserved after a hectic year of racing. We expect to see her back on the winners rostrum in the not too distant future. Diane's time was 33.13.

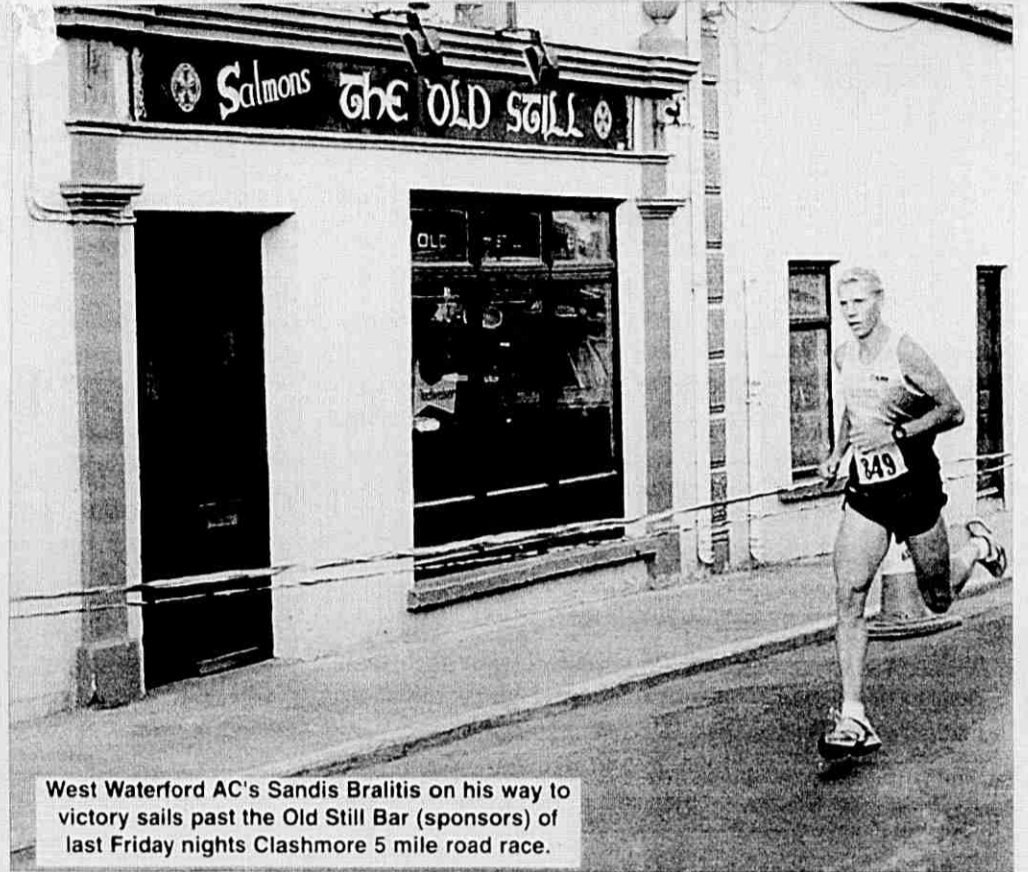

Support Urged For Helvick Fishermen

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield, has called for support from the highest level of the Department of the Marine to maintain Helvick as a viable fishing port.

Cllr. Mansfield also called on the county council to "immediately start" lobbying for a mobile ice manufacturing unit to be made available on the pier for the fishermen.

Currently fishermen have to endure a daily journey to either Dunmore East or Ballycotton in order to get ice.

"This is an added expense given the increase in fuel costs," he said.

At the moment, twenty boats, a mixture of trawlers and punts, are fishing from Helvick, with 25 to 30 employed there.

"I believe that the Department of the Marine should provide a

mobile ice producing unit for the Helvick fishermen - these are small time fishermen who seem to have more and more restrictions placed on them daily.

"If things continue in this fashion," Cllr. Mansfield said, "soon there will be nobody fishing from Helvick which would be a disaster for the area both economically and from a heritage point of view."

The mobile unit is a small container which can produce two tonnes of ice a day.

"EIM made one available to Ballycotton so I don't see why one can't be made available to Helvick."

Cllr. Mansfield said the county council must now live up to their obligations in the county development plan, and improve the piers of the county for commercial and amenity use.

"The residents are extremely concerned regarding the layout of this particular junction and also the number of near-misses which have occurred at this junction in recent years.

"The junction in question spells danger and I intend to raise the matter at the local area council meeting where I will highlight the necessity for additional road markings and warning signs on approach roads to the junction."

Cllr. Geoghegan said that he will also be urging the Engineering section of Waterford County Council to take immediate action to help prevent further accidents at this location in the future and to take on board the very real concerns of the local residents.

Obsolete Statute Removed From Books

A law dating back to 1779 was scrapped from the books after Waterford County Council said it was no longer relevant.

It followed a request by the Attorney General who is currently working on a proposed Statute Law Revision (Pre-Union) Bill which will repeal laws that are spent, obsolete or are not of any practical purpose in the current legal system.

The office of Attorney General requested the information on whether it had any modern relevance.

The County Archivist confirmed that it did not and was indeed obsolete and would not need to be retained.

According to the archivist the act was passed after an earlier 1765 act was passed for the establishment of Public Infirmaries and hospitals in Ireland. Waterford was one of a number of counties not included in this Act and in 1799 an act was passed to specifically grant the right to erect, establish and regulate Public Infirmaries or Hospitals in Waterford.

Pro-Active Approach Need To Deal With Dangerous Road

Waterford County Council need to take a pro-active approach when dealing with requests from GSK OC to put in safety measures at its entrance, according to Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield. There have been a number of near misses at the entrance with one occurring almost every day.

Speaking at a recent meeting of the council, Cllr. Mansfield said he was disappointed that the council has not yet replied to a letter from management representatives at GSK in relation to the entrance. Cllr. Mansfield stated: "GSK are the only major employers in the town and I feel that the council should have been more proactive in getting a reply back to them."

"This is one issue that Management, Employees and union representative are in full agreement with. I would ask the Executive to immediately lobby the NRA in order to alter this entrance."

It was one of a number of concerns aired by Cllr. Mansfield at the June meeting. He also called for extra lighting to be put in place at the Castleview area of Villierstown, Cllr. Mansfield stated that he had spoken to the County Engineer on this matter in the past.

"I believe two to three extra street lighting would be adequate to resolve this issue."

And he highlighted a series of water leaks which took place in the Abbesside area over the Bank Holiday weekend.

He enquired as to what procedure was in place for work to take place over the June Bank Holiday weekend as he said the issue was reported on Friday, June 2nd but repair work did not commence until five days later. In the intervening period a number of residents cars were damaged due to loose chippings and stones which struck cars from the road which had subsided.
