



10 million Investment For 32 Bed Hospital

By Kevin Kirrane

A long-promised 10 million euro new hospital for Dungarvan, which is hoped to replace the dilapidated and dangerous St. Vincent's Hospital, has been granted planning permission.

Welcoming the announcement, Deputy Ollie Wilkinson described the news as a "very positive development." Fire chiefs and elected representatives have long branded the present District Hospital as a fire risk and said that the hospital, built before the famine, was unsuitable for batterns and staff.

TENDERS

With the granting of planning permission, the Health Service Executive (HSE) is now free to advertise for tenders to build the new hospital. Deputy Wilkinson said the planning go-ahead comes just a few weeks after it was announced that more than 10 million euro has been allocated to the new hospital over the next three years as part of the HSE's capital investment programme.

"The new 32-bed hospital will replace the existing district hospital and provide GP access beds, convalescent care, respite care, care for the terminally ill, short term accommodation for dependent chronically ill young people," he said.

"It's mission will be to provide local non-acute services to complement the services in the acute general hospital."

CARE GROUPS

The new community hospital will cater for the following care groups: eight beds reserved for GP acute admissions; eight beds reserved for respite admissions; three beds for the care of the young and chronically sick; three beds for palliative care; and ten beds reserved for short term convalescent care either for patients discharged from acute hospitals to the care of their GP or patients from the community.

The ten million euro capital envelope will also cover the new 15 place day hospital service for the elderly. It will enable older people to continue to live at home and to avoid hospital admission. It is proposed that the day hospital in Dungarvan will be managed and staffed by the elderly care team in Waterford Regional Hospital," said Deputy Wilkinson

INVESTMENT

In all the total investment in hospital facilities in the county is over 32 million euro which will be pumped in over the next three years.

Deputy Wilkinson said: "Included in that spend are St. Enda's psychiatric ward which is to be replaced with a new building costing 1.2 million euro; the medical oncology ward in Waterford Regional Hospital which is to be refurbished costing 1.5 million; and the accident and emergency department in Waterford Regional Hospital which is to be expanded with a 2 million euro grant. The hospital is also to get extra car parking spaces.

HUGE RESOURCES

"The Government, through the HSE, has committed huge resources to Waterford. I have fought hard for these resources and I am particularly pleased that we are making enormous progress on a new 32 bed hospital in Dungarvan. It will have far-reaching and very positive implications for people in the county for years to come. "It is important that we provide the best possible health service to the community. We are aiming to meet the needs of people on their own doorsteps. In that I believe we are succeeding," Deputy Wilkinson said.

Memorial from the Dungarvan Town Commissioners to the Right Honourable, The Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury 1861 "We the Commissioners of the Town of Dungarvan in the County of Waterford on behalf of the inhabitants of the said County & the Town of Dungarvan Humbly Shew;

First-That the Harbour & seaport of Dungarvan & the Town of Dungarvan that the population of the said County amounts to 270,000 & population of said Town of Dungarvan amounts to 14,000 or thereabouts.

Secondly that the Port of Dungarvan is capable of great improvement at an expense...quite below in point of outlay the great advantages to be derived therefrom to the Trade of said Port.

Thirdly that although the said port has considerably increased in importance by its Trade & Commerce & its extensive Fisheries very little has ever been done, save as hereinafter mentioned by the Government for its improve-

Fourthly... We refer to the works executed at Ballinagoul in this Harbour by the Honourable the Board of Works, whereby the fisheries have been wounderfully improved. In evidence of which it may be fearlessly stated that a small fishing village has been, by that means converted into a most extensive fishing station in whicj not less than 1,500 people are successfully engaged in that branch of the industry".

Well done. Dungarvan on retaining "Litter Free " status in the Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) National Anti-Litter League.

Recent statistics on litter in Ireland indicate that the majority of our towns and cities are "heavily" or "very heavily" littered. However, we in County Waterford are very proud that Dungarvan has been ranked 8th in the IBAL 2006 Litter League- Round 1 with the status of "Litter Free". As part of IBAL Anti-Litter League, which is run with financial assistance from the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, towns of population 6,000 and over are monitored independently by An Taisce in accordance with international grading standards.

However . . . notwithstanding this achievement, we in County Waterford need to be aware of the fact that littering around the county reduces the attractiveness for tourists and citizens alike, as does illegal dumping in the countryside and scenic areas. While surveys show that we are concerned about littering problems, they also show that many of us admit to having littered ourselves. Changing our personal habits is the only permanent way to tackle this problem.

Litter does not simply happen-it is caused.

THINK TIDY

Make a habit of thinking tidy from now on and you take the first step towards lessening litter.

PICK UP

A little effort can make a lot of difference to the appearance of your home, your school, your workplace and their surroundings. It only takes a moment to pick up a piece of litter and put it in the bin

TAKE HOME

The only proper place for refuse is in the bin. But if you are out and about and no bin is available, take it home for dis-

SPEAK OUT

It is your environment that is being damaged so you are entitled to speak out. If you see someone dropping litter, comment politely but firmly. If you come across illegal dumping then report it to Enforcement Section of Waterford County Council.

GET INVOLVED

If there is a Tidy Town competition, National Spring Clean event or anti-litter campaign in your area -support it. If there is none, perhaps you can get one going with your neighbours or community.





fish that 'walks' is the tripod fish. Its two chest fins and its tail fin have evolved into long, stiff spines on which the fish walks along the sea-bed.

A FISH CAN GIVE AN ELECTRIC SHOCK

One member of the catfish family is capable of giving out an electric shock to ward off danger. This is the electric catfish which is found in the seas of Africa. Although it can give a powerful shock, it is a delicacy in the Middle East, where it is known as the raad, or thunder fish.

A FISH CAN KILL A PERSON


Several species of fish can make electricity, using specially adapted muscles which create electric impulses instead of movement. Fish are the only creatures that can do this. Electric rays, of which there are about 30 species, can create enough power to disable a person temporarily. However, it is a freshwater creature that produces the most electricity of all. The electric eel found in the rivers of South America, can produce enough power to kill a person outright.

FISH GO FISHING

Attached to the head of the angler fish is a small piece of flesh which looks like a worm. The angler fish waves this lure until some unsuspecting fish takes a bit at it, at which point fish promptly gobbles up its prey. Two relatives of the angler fish use similar tricks. The sargassum fish hides in seaweed - some actually look like seaweed and wait for another fish to take the worm-like bait. The bat fish hides its lure in a tube above its mouth until it goes fishing. Then the lure pops out.

A MOUTHFUL OF FISH

After laying some 50 to 100 eggs, the female Egyptian mouth brooder carries them around in her mouth for safety. Ever after they have hatched, the young fish continue to use their mother's mouth to escape from danger. This

The male angler fish weighs one thousand times less than the female, and lives off the female like a parasite!

Deep-sea life was first observed in 1934, when scientist William Beebe descended to 923 m (3,028 ft) in a machine called a 'bathysphere'.

An archerfish can judge the distance of its 'shots' because it is the only fish with eyes that point forwards!!

Archer fish will line up to shoot at the same target - like contestants at a rifle range.

MOVIE REVIEW

Just My Luck***

Lindsay Lohan is the luckiest girl in the world. She wins so often at scratch cards that she believes herself to be good at them, she somehow receives Sarah Jessica Parker's designer dress when her dry cleaning is returned and when she is forced to bumble through a presentation for her company's biggest client on her own, it is of course a massive success which lands her a big promotion.

Chris Pine on the other hand is fortune's fool. He carries a pack around with him which is filled with precautions for every emergency, a necessary safeguard given his tendency to get involved in minor accidents. By contrast with Lindsay, he works in a bowling alley where he has to do all the worst jobs, including unblocking toilets two hours before his shift actually begins. Although he does manage a pop band with some rocking tunes (McFly), he can't get them any more breaks than he gets himself.

The plot: when Lindsay and Chris kiss at a masked ball, their fortunes swap. Everything begins to go right for Chris and Lindsay's luck takes a turn for the worse. Now Lindsay must get her luck back, while Chris must deal with McFly's

The problem with this film is that it may leave you a little annoyed at Miss Lohan's character, whereas you are meant to be cheering for her throughout. While her good luck is truly extraordinary, her bad luck seems to be mostly a mix of her own clumsiness and lack of thought, so that anyone who has suffered any real ill fortune may take badly to her self indulgent moaning. However much of the rest of the film is quite entertaining. As plastically pop as McFly are, they do get some funny one-liners to throw around while they strut their stuff. Pine is likeable as the loveable loser with the heart of gold and Lohan is still a good actress, no matter how annoying her character. Don't expect to remember Just My Luck this time next year; it's no Legally Blonde as rom-coms go. Do expect a light hearted piece of entertainment that should leave you smiling as you leave the cinema.

Over The Hedge***

Animated films, featuring animals... has to be another cutesy kids only movie, right? Not quite. Owing more to the likes of Ice Age than Bambi, Over The Hedge is another kids' movie written with adults just as much in mind.

RJ (Bruce Willis) is a wise cracking racoon, who forages for is food in the human world. When he attempts to rob the stash of a bear and accidentally destroys it, the bear Vincent (Nick Nolte) gives him a week to replace what he has ruined or face the consequences. Meanwhile, Garry Shandling, of The Larry Sander's Show, plays Vern, a tortoise who leads a group of forest foragers who spend all summer recovering nature's bounty to get them through the winter. It is this group RJ decides to exploit in order to recover Vincent's bounty.

Compared to Shrek and Finding Nemo, the plot is fairly unimportant here. The main interest lies in the different characters of the various animals and the actors who voice them. Anyone who watches Family Guy will know how William Shatner is lampooned as the hammiest over-actor ever, so here he is cast as a possum, who doesn't just play dead but does so in a manner that would remind you of Leonardo DiCaprio's drawn out death in Titanic. Steve Carell is Hammy the squirrel, as full of manic stupidity as his role in Anchorman. Eugene Levy follows up his character in Curious George with an equally funny turn as a porcupine, which will remind you immediately of his father's role in American Pie.

There are plenty of smart little jokes so that the film at no stage falls back on the "Aw aren't they so cute!" basis that will keep the kids delighted. A couple of small quibbles are how little there is in way of plot and a run of the mill soundtrack. While Ben Folds' songs are easy on the ear, they offer nothing to add to the film in the way of most modern kids' films. This film does get better as it goes on though and the ending is so smart, yet obvious, that it leaves you thinking you won't mind watching this film when it becomes a Christmas and Sunday afternoon TV favourite in years to come.

Late Billy Cunningham



It is with deep sadness and regret we record the passing of Billy Cunningham, 36 Parks Road, Lismore who was called to his eternal reward on Monday, 5th June at Cork University Hospital after a prolonged duration of illness borne with dignity and true courage.

A man of many outstanding qualities, Billy's passing in just his 59th year has left a huge void not only in the lives of his loving family but in the community as a whole. A native of Cappoquin, having completed his schooling days, Billy secured a job with M.J. O'Connor's Chickens in Cappoquin, giving 28 years of dedicated service to the company until illness forced him to retire in 1990

In 1969 he married his true love, his loving wife Mary and after taking up residence in Lismore that same year, he threw in his lot with the local Lismore club. In his earlier years, Billy gave many years of outstanding service on the playing field where his only reward was a Sargent Cup medal won in 1976 and despite going so close on many occasions in the 70's and 80's, that Senior County medal was sadly to

After retiring from the playing side of things, Billy was to become a selector on various teams in both the juvenile and adult section. Two of his highlights being a selector in the unsuccessful 1986 S.H. County final and also a County Minor Hurling selector in 1996. During these same years and up to the time of his passing, he was also a highly respected and valued committee member of the club.

When the club started its own weekly draw, the club were fortunate to have had the likes of Billy for his drive and enthusiasm, where he was responsible for in excess of 100 tickets per week. His other great undertaking was ensuring the completion of the Lismore G.A.A. Community Centre and his endless hours put in, in the day-today running of the Centre and the upkeep of the hurling field.

"House price inflation rose by 15% in first half of the year alone"

Statement by Marian Finnegan, Chief Economist, Sherry FitzGerald Group

Sherry FitzGerald, Ireland's largest estate agents, announced on Monday that the average price of a second-hand property in Ireland rose by 6.8% during the second quarter of the year bringing growth in the six month period to the end of June to 15.0%. This follows growth of 17.3% during 2005, an indication of the exceptional strength of demand for residential property.

The pace of inflation in the Dublin second hand market however was notably stronger at 9.0% during the second quarter, bringing the rate of increase in the six months to June to 21.2%. This compared to a total growth rate of 23.3% during 2005. The figure for the twelve months to June was an exceptional 33.8%, a level not witnessed in the market since 1998.

The pace of growth in Cork was more in line with the national average, coming in at 5.5% for the quarter and 11.0% in the first six months while the other regional centers of Galway and Limerick also witnessed similar levels of price growth.

Commenting on the results Marian Finnegan, Chief Economist, Sherry FitzGerald Group said; "The figures for the first six months of the year reflect the phenomenal appetite for residential property in Ireland, particularly as they occurred during a period of rising interest rates. Price inflation was particularly strong in the eastern corridor with double digit price growth recorded in Dublin and the surrounding counties of Kildare, Wicklow and Meath. While the other regional centres also enjoyed above trend price growth.

The strength of price inflation was most notable in the opening months with a gradual easing in the monthly growth rates as the year progressed. This moderation can be attributed to seasonal factors, particularly a rise in the stock of available properties in the summer months with the pace of price growth in Dublin recorded at 1.3% in June compared to 4.9% in March.

A preliminary analysis of a selection of properties which traded in Ireland during the opening months of the year revealed that first time buyers remain a stable ingredient in overall demand purchasing an estimated 36% of all the second-hand properties traded and closed during the six month period. This compared to 37% during the same period in 2005 and 33% in the same period in 2004. The resilient strength of first time buyer demand illustrates the positive impact of the amendments in the rates of stamp duty applicable to first time buyers in the second hand market in Budget 2005.

Investors were relatively active during the year to date with preliminary estimates suggesting that they purchased an estimated 19% of the second-hand properties traded and closed during the period. This compares to 17% during the same period in 2005.

An analysis of vendors who traded their properties during the first six months reveals that 24% sold with the intention of purchasing a larger property. This is a very healthy indicator of the strength of the market. In contrast, only 6% of vendors were trading down. Interestingly, 28% of vendors sold investment properties, a trend, that has contributed to the stabilisation of the market which is evident in the return to positive rental inflation in the private rented market in 2005 - the CPI index of privately owned rents rose by 4% in the twelve months to December 2005 after two consecutive years of depreciation. This trend has continued into 2006 with growth of 2% in the opening five months of the year.

Looking to the future, Ms Finnegan suggests that "2006 will be a record breaking year for the Irish property market with indications to date suggesting that price inflation will significantly exceed the exceptional levels achieved in 2005. That said, we can anticipate a notable slowdown in the pace of inflation in the second half of the year as the impact of rising interest rates and the strength of stock available in the market will facilitate a slowdown in price growth."

Commenting specifically on the interest rate cycle Ms Finnegan noted that the market has largely absorbed the 0.75% rise in the rates in the past seven months. "This upward movement in interest rates was very much anticipated by the market and had we believe already been factored into the budgets of potential purchasers in the property market. 

IDA Disputes **Deasy Site Visit Claim**

The IDA is disputing claims that the agency has made just four site visits to Dungarvan in as many months and rejected accusations that Dungarvan is being neglected.

Fine Gael Deputy John Deasy, who received the figures from Enterprise Minister, Michael Martin, had claimed that ust one site visit was made in the wake of the closure of Waterford Crystal, compared to thirty-nine site visits to Waterford City.

"Dungarvan is seen as an afterthought," said the Dungarvan-based Fine Gael TD.

However, the IDA has said that there has been three site visits since last year and there were more than four in the past four years.

South Area director, Brian Conroy said the IDA recorded six visits to Dungarvan in the four year period since 2002. Three of those were made since job cuts were confirmed at Waterford Crystal.

He said Biopin, the German paint manufacturer, which set up a factory two years ago is ready to come on stream with the creation of 20 jobs.

The IDA went on to say that the location of a plant is determined by the clients and not the IDA, but the company is targeting Dungarvan for new industry.

WHAT'S SO GREAT ABOUT INTERNET SHOPPING?

Well for this lazy person, the best thing about shopping on line is I can do it from the couch. I hate wandering around from one shopping centre to another trying to find what I need at the right price. By using the web I can just search on line shops for what I need without ever getting up. This gives me a list of potential suppliers and saves time and effort.

WHAT CAN YOU BUY AND HOW DO YOU BUY IT?

Absolutely anything you can think of! From tractors to treadmills, from driving lessons to Lear Jets I guarantee there's someone somewhere trying to sell them on the web. But it's like any shopping experience you need to be aware of what you are buying and who you are buying it from.

Be sure to get comparison prices! Don't buy the first item you see. Look around and use Google or another search engine to help find alternative web sites.

SAFE BUYING TIPS

A recent report stated that almost 30% of on line purchases made in Europe never arrived. You must protect yourself while shopping on the web.

Get to know the shop you are buying from and look for reviews of the web site. Try using Google 'review of shop name' and see what you get.

Understand the shipping/delivery system and the returns policy, have a quick look at the terms and conditions should you need to returns any items.

Keep a printed record of your order and ensure you have a contact telephone number for the seller. If there are no direct telephone numbers supplied be very careful.

Use a credit card or pay pal to make your purchase. Both companies will listen and withhold payment if there are any disputes. Never use Western Union money transfer.

A very important point to know is that with any on line purchase you have a seven day cooling off period after you receive the goods, during which you can return the item and get your money back. This applies to any web site purchase and gives you the time to try on the piece of clothing or confirm that the item you received is exactly what you ordered.

HYPERLINK your browser to "http://amazon.co.uk/"http://amazon.co.uk/ This is a world wide organisation that sells almost everything, this site is particularly good value for books and DVDs and allows you to buy second hand items at a huge reduction. When you buy from here most goods will be shipping form the UK but I have used them a lot and never had any issues. You will need to create an account to purchase from amazon but it is a quick process.



A truly tropical taste: Tahitian poisson cru

IN the Pacific, Tahiti is the home of delicious tropical raw fish, or poisson cru. Follow the recipe below for a tasty way to prepare raw fish in a traditional way.

Ingredients:

750 g boneless snapper

1/2 red pepper, de-seeded, sliced

1/2 green pepper, de-seeded, sliced

1 clove garlic, crushed

2 spring onion, finely sliced

2 tomatoes, skinned, deseeded and the liquid removed

1/4 x 5 ml sp of powdered ginger

6 lemons

400 g can coconut cream

Salt and pepper to taste

Method:

Cut the snapper fish into cubes

of roughly 1 cm in size and place them in a mediumsized bowl. Then squeeze the juice of the six lemons all over the fish

Toss the mixture well to make sure that the fish is evenly coated with the lemon juice, then refrigerate the cubed fish for at least six hours

This will help to soften and marinate the fish with a delicious citrus flavour. When the refrigeration time is up, drain off the juice. Rinse the fish by placing the cubes briefly under running cold water. Place the fish back in the bowl, and then add the all the other ingredients. They should be chopped to about the same size as the

fish cubes. Add the salt and pepper to taste and then mix everything together thoroughly.

Serve on a large oval dish

TIP: For that finishing touch, line your dish with a variety of fresh green leaves.



Designer burger with added chill

DESIGNER cheeseburgers served with salad and toasted bread can make an ordinary barbecue something special.

Ingredients: Serves 4

700g lean minced beef 1/2 x 5 ml sp ground

75g finely chopped onion 1/2 x 5 ml sp oregano 75g dry bread crumbs 4 slices Swiss cheese 2 x 15 ml sp green chillis, seeded and finely chopped 4 slices French bread,

lightly buttered 1 egg

4 crisp lettuce leaves 3/4 x 5 ml sp salt 4 large tomato slices

1/4 x 5 ml sp black pepper 4 sweet gherkin pickles.

Combine the minced beef, onion, breadcrumbs, chillis, egg and spices in a bowl. Mix well. When the mixture is completely combined, divide into equal amounts for the number of servings. Shape each portion of the mixture into a thick patty about 10cm in diameter. Cook the patties on a barbecue or under a hot grill until they are done to your liking. This usually takes around five or six minutes a side. Place a slice of cheese on each patty and toast the bread slices during the last few minutes.

To serve, place a toasted bread slice on each plate and top with a lettuce leaf, tomato slice and a cheese-topped patty. Garnish with a gherkin.

You'll all go nuts for these acorns

AN easy yet elegant butter pecan biscuit shaped to resemble an acorn, and dipped in melted chocolate chips and chopped pecans.

Ingredients:

Makes 36 acorns 225g butter, melted 1/2 x 5 ml sp baking powder 560g plain flour, sifted 350g pecans, finely chopped 175g brown sugar, firmly packed

225g semi-sweet chocolate chips

Method:

Preheat the oven to 190∞C (375∞F) Gas Mark 5. In a butter, brown sugar, half of the chopped pecans and vanilla on medium speed

until well blended. Add the flour and baking powder and mix well.

Shape the dough into 3 cm balls. Slightly flatten the balls by pressing on to greaseproof paper, then pinch the tops to a point to resemble acorns. Bake in the oven for 10-12 minutes. Remove the acorns from the oven and cool them on wire racks.


In a glass bowl placed over a pan of simmering water, melt the chocolate chips, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat but keep the glass bowls over the hot water.

Dip the large ends of the cooled cookies into the melted large bowl, beat together the chocolate, then roll them in the chopped pecans.

THE popularity of growing fresh herbs has for this purpose as you can plant a different herb in each pocket. A vigorous herb such as mint (Mentha spicata), which has very invasive roots that will spread everywhere, is best confined to pots. As a general rule, herbs enjoy lots of sun

> and a free-draining soil or compost. Those with variegated foliage are quite tolerant of light shade

Pineapple mint (Mentha suaveolens) is one such herb and is quite happy to be balm, parsley and chives are just a few of the herbs that can tolerate moist shade providing the soil does not become waterlogged. If herbs are to be grown in the garden it is worth giving consideration to where they will be best placed.

Ideally the closer to the house the more convenient they are to use but ensure that the area is not favoured by pets.

A site specifically designed for herbs is not only relatively easy to design and construct but can be extremely attractive and aromatic. ensure a continuous supply throughout the year, or create a mixed bed of them. If you want a mixed bed avoid really large or spreading types, and keep them in check by harvesting them regularly. Choose sweet smelling lavender (Lavandula) for a low, less formal hedge or select a more geometric, traditional design

If you have the room, grow herbs in blocks to A wide range of herbs can be sown in a single plastic or polystyrene module as most herb seeds require the same conditions to germinate.

Sow a couple of seeds in each cell and germinate them in a temperature of 15∞C.

When the young plants are large enough, transplant them to their final growing position.

No thinning should be needed and because there will be little root disturbance, plants should not run to seed

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN Sow perennials and biennials

Most perennials and biennials sown out of doors now will make good, sturdy plants for placing in their flowering position in the autumn.

The most useful biennial are Canterbury bells and ver-

Among the easiest to raise from seed are aquilegias, lupins, oriental poppies, hollyhocks and delphiniums. But there are many other things that you can try if you can obtain the seeds. Sow thinly in drills of 15-20 cm apart and cover with 0.5 to 2.5 cm of soil, according to the size of the seeds.

Violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthus may also be sown outdoors, but it is preferable to choose a shady place for these.

Place chrysanthemums in summer position

Chrysanthemums grown in pots will be better in the open from now. It is a good idea to make a special standing ground for them in an out-of -the-way place. The plants should be arranged in straight rows at least 75 cm apart, so you can easily move between them. Drive a stake into the ground at each end of each row, stretch a couple of wires between the pairs of stakes and attach each bamboo cane to the wires. This method is the ideal for exhibition chrysanthe-

mums grown to a single stem. With decorative plants horizontal wires get in the way.

Thin out veg seedlings

Vegetable seedlings from April and May sowings will need thinning out.

Plant outdoor tomatoes

Tomatoes that have been hardened in frames may be planted outdoors in a sunny sheltered position. A border at the foot of a fence or south facing wall is the best place for the plants, which should be 38 cm apart. The soil should not be too richly manured as it is wise to let tomatoes set a few fruits then feed regularly.
