Armed Gang **Steals €35,000 In** Grange Hold-Up

A gang of armed and masked robbers made away with 35,000 euro in cash and cheques in a hold-up at Grange, near Ardmore, on Saturday afternoon last.

The three-man gang held-up a female clerk at gunpoint while she was transporting Credit Union money from the Ardmore branch to headquarters in Youghal.

The gang made off with around 5,000 euro in cash and a further 30,000 euro worth of cheques in the audacious daylight robbery.

The gang stopped the woman, who was in her mid-40's, shortly before 1pm, by pulling a

stolen four wheel drive jeep in union for some time. front of her, and demanding that she hand over a bag which held the lodgements from the Ardmore branch.

At least one of the men brandished a firearm, although it's not known whether this was a genuine or imitation firearm. All three men wore balaclavas. They made off along a back road that offered a number of escape routes. The Suzuki jeep was later recovered burnt-out at Kilgabriel, Clashmore.

Garda forensic experts examined the jeep, a white Suzuki, with a registration plate of 99D 30126 which was stolen in the Youghal area on June 22nd.

Investigators believe the gang had been staking out the credit

Gardai issued an appeal for witnesses or anybody who saw people acting suspiciously in the Grange or Ardmore area on Saturday morning to contact them immediately on (024) 92200.

A number of motorists drove past, as the woman's silver Toyota was being held-up and Gardai are keen to make contact with them.

They are looking to speak to anyone who saw the Jeep in the Grange-Clashmore area on Saturday or who may have seen where the vehicle was stored after it was stolen.

Junior Page CRABS AND LOBSTERS

Crabs, prawns, shrimps and lobsters are members of the group of animals known as crustaceans. The largest crustacean is the giant spider crab of Japan which can measure up to 3m (9ft) between the tips of its outstretched legs. Pea crabs of which there are over 200 species, are the smallest known crabs. They hide inside the shells of mussels and ovsters for protection. Although protected by their shells, crabs have several enemies, including humans, and have to find other ways to protect themselves. For example, most spider crabs camouflage themselves with seaweed and pieces of sponge so they cannot be seen easily. A lot of crabs burrow into the sand so that only their antennae are visible. The hermit crab often lets a sea anemone ride on this back. The anemone has stinging tentacles, so the crab is protected too. The grenadier crab goes one step further by carrying a sea anemone in each claw!

Hermit Crabs Live In Other Crabs' Shells

The hermit crab does not have a hard shell sot it makes its home i the empty shell of some other sea creatures. As the crab grows, it has to find larger and larger shells in which

to live. It changes from shell to shell very quickly because it is afraid of being attacked.

Lobsters

Lobsters are generally bigger than crabs and their tails are stretched out behind them, whereas a crab's tail is tucked under its body. To swim, the lobster curls its tail under its body quickly and with such force that the lobster shoots backwards in the water. To help it, the lobster can fan out the end of its tail for greater

Lobsters Walk In Single File

Once American lobster migrates in an unusual way. Every autumn, the spiny lobsters of Florida and the Caribbean march in single file to deeper waters further south to avoid stormy weather.

Crab Legs

Crabs have five pairs of legs, the first pair of which are equipped with large claws. It uses eight of its legs for walking. A crab walks sideways because otherwise its legs would get tangled up. If a crab traps one of its limbs, the limb snaps off and the crab grows a new one.

Crab Claws

The male fiddler crab has one gigantic claw that is much larger than the others, it is the largest crab claw in the world. It is often

coloured differently to the rest of the body and has two purposes, for fighting other males to defend its territory, and to attract a mate.



A boxer crab defends itself by holding anemones in its pincers, like two fluffy boxing gloves!

Long-legged guano crabs live on bat dropping or 'guano'. Yuk! Rock crabs on the Galapogos Islands clean ticks from bodies of iguanas.

The decorator crab wears 'fancy dress', hooking plants on its body to camouflage it.

Spider crabs have changed little since the age of dinosaurs.

In mythology, a crab nipped the hero Hercules on the foot. It was rewarded by his enemies with a place in the heavens, and formed the Cancer constellation.





"Fifth - that from the peculiar formation of the harbor & from the works heretofore executed under the patronage & expense of the Duke of Devonshire, the said Harbour...may be much improved & made a floating Dock and by flushing it at the low water of spring tides, remove the bar at present offering an obstruction to the vessels.

Sixthly - that many valuable vessels & their crews have been lost in approaching this port from the narrowness of its channel & the want of proper attention to its improvement to the increasing importance. Where of may be taken as an established fact by reason of the erection of a Light House at its entrance, within the last year by the board commonly called the Trinity Board for Ireland.

Seventhly - We, beg...to state that recently in the year 1859, the right Honourable the Lords of the Admiralty, directed a report to made by their engineer as to the state of this Harbour, and George Sherwood Esq., Civil Engineer in compliance therewith made such report.

And that your Lordships may further be placed to direct such sums of money as have been placed at your Lordship's disposal to be laid out in the improvement of the said Harbour.

THE JUNE GAP

We are all familiar with the development of our colonies throughout the spring and early summer when things are going along just nicely, supers are beginning to be filled and then comes the so-called June Gap, a period in between when no real development seems to be happening. This year the gap hasn't been so marked but those who have kept bees for many years will remember having had to feed bees in June to ensure their very survival

It is possible to keep a few hives of bees at home and to do so very successfully on one's own but most of us run into problems sooner or later which require help or advice or intervention from others. Hopefully this is happening on a local scale where members are in touch with their closest beekeeping neighbour and they can exchange advice and experience and in this way get over problems as they arise. Those beekeepers who are most successful (in the sense that they get the nearest to an optimal result from their hives) don't get there by accident or because they have an innate skill. They do so because they expose themselves to learning situations as much as possible and they interact with other beekeepers. A lot of this can be done by reading in bee journals and by logging on to beekeeping sites on the net, but there is no substitute for being around a living hive and observing things first hand. This is the reason the Association holds open meetings. Over the years they have been well attended and vigorous forums for discussion but for whatever reason this has not been the case in the last few years.

Now it might very well be the case that most of our members are in the Association solely for the insurance cover. If that is the case there is not a whole lot that can be done. It will result in a situation where our members attend other Association events, especially in the case of groups like the South Tipperary Association where there is a great level of activity and expertise, and where there is, pardon the pun, a great buzz about. Whether or not we are to become a collection of passive members is entirely up to ourselves. For those who have any thoughts on this or anything else, Pat Dillane is hosting a Barbecue evening on Friday 21 July at 7 p.m. for all members, and their partners. And besides it will be an opportunity to meet socially, break bread and share a drink together. He is situated between Aglish and Clashmore (there will be signs at the turnoffs).

With a week of warm humid weather coming on and the blackberry just coming into full flower this should be when our supers are really going to be filled. I am hopeful that the lime trees will provide a crop this year for the first time in years and the signs are good so far, as ideally humid conditions and temperature ranges from 20°C to 25°C are optimal for both it and clover. So here's hoping for a bumper harvest and looking forward to seeing you on the 21st.

This common plant is a headache to farmers in many parts of the county as the dried leaves and flowers contain at least three prrolizidine alkaloid poisons (jaconine, jacobine and jacodine) that can kill livestock by causing copper to build up in their bodies and by causing cirrhosis of the liver. The name ragwort means ragged or useless plant, referring to the raggedlooking leaves and to the lack of uses that people have for it.

Grasslands and waste ground with bare patches are good seedbeds for Ragwort which often thrives on roadsides which are not grazed at all. On the other hand, overgrazing of grass by horses or cattle can cause a build up of nasty-tasting Ragwort plants and, if the animals are left hungry, they may overcome their dislike of it and be poisoned. Ragwort tastes less strong when dried or fermented in hay or silage. Contaminated fodder is therefore very dangerous.

The Dept. of Agriculture is campaigning at the moment for people to control infestations of Ragwort as well as of docks and thistles.

Cinnabar Moth caterpillars eat the leaves of ragwort and store the poison in their bodies along with some foul-tasting materials which make eating them a nasty and dangerous meal for birds-which therefore avoid them. Like many poisonous animals they are brightly coloured, as if to warn off enemies, - in this case with fetching black and amber stripes. Cinnabars are apparently not good ragwort controllers.

Ragwort flea Beetles Longitarsus jacobaeae are much better controlling agents and can cause plants to weaken and die or to produce very few seeds. But for creatures like the Ragwort Flea Beetle to survive there has to be respect for what is called biodiversity. Farming and other land management has to allow at least patches-preferably patches joined up by hedges etc.-where a variety of wild plants can thrive.

Sheep graze off young Ragwort plants and grazing with a mixture of livestock is often best for biodiversity.


€100,000 For Footpaths in Lismore and Tramore

What can we do to protect the environment all year round?

Summer is the time when we head to swim in the sea or take a dip in lakes or rivers. Unfortunately, in recent years some of us may have seen notices warning that due to problems with water quality bathing is not recommended.

When the family day out is spoiled, it is all too easy to point the finger of blame for Ireland's water quality problems. However, in some way, we all impact on water quality every day of every year.

The important news is that we can all play our part in protecting our rivers, lakes, groundwater and coastal waters

WATER GOES ROUND AND ROUND....

Remember in school, that diagram which showed the water cycle. Essentially it's the same drop going around in an endless closed loop that we are all depending on for the planet's water. Clean water is essential for all life - plants, animals and of course ourselves. It is up to us all to do what we can to preserve our heritage of clean water for future generations.

But what's happening to the water? - The main threat to Ireland's water quality comes from comed Government investment the increase in the amount of nuof €100,000 that is being made trients, including phosphates and nitrates being released into the water. The damaging nutrients come from a number of sources, including agriculture, industrial and domestic. An excess of these nutrients in the water leads to increased growth of organisms called algae, which in turn in summer time can turn into what's called "algae blooms". The algae uses up the oxygen which is required by all the aquatic life, even causing fish to suffocate.

STOP FEEDING THE WATER

Do you know that we all live down stream from each other?

Washing Machine detergents. Check the ingredients of the product. If there is more than 5% phosphates then change over to a product that contains zealots instead of phosphates.

Dishwater detergents. Unfortu-

nately there is no phosphate-free detergent available in Ireland, so make sure you use a full load each time

Paints and Solvents. Do not pour unused household chemicals, paint or solvents down the drain. They should be stored in sealed containers. County Waterford's Civic Amenity Sites will accept these items. See HYPER-LINK "http://www.waterfordcoco.ie" www.waterfordcoco.ie or ring Helpline 058 20894 for information on acceptance of Hazardous Materials.

Summer's here, Save Water (and energy) too. Fix any leaky taps or water pipes, even a small drip can add up to a lot of water over time. Don't leave the tap running while brushing your teeth or shaving.

A shower uses less water and energy than a bath.

Run dishwashers and washing machines with full loads. Also, wash at low temperatures, up to Website www.waterfordcoco.ie

90% of the energy used for washing is used heating the water.

In the garden, leave the grass a little longer, maybe 2.5 inches, this will shade the roots and cut down on water loss

We believe that there is a lot of water in Ireland because there is a lot of rain, and therefore we do not need to conserve water.

Noxious Smell Lingers Over West Waterford

A Fianna Fail councillor who was threatened with legal action after publicly blasting a Cork -based company when he exposed it as having failed to treat the material it was spreading, said forries have returned to West Waterford to spread more waste material again.

Cllr. James Tobin, said on the previous occasion lorry loads of the waste were spread on land in the Camphire area near Cappoquin, forcing locals to stay indoors with the windows closed due to the nasty whiff it caused around the area.

But more recently the green trucks have returned to West Waterford with tanker loads of the waste being spread, this time on lands in Knockane.

"How can anyone have given a license to this firm which isn't even from the county to spread this waste on lands in West Waterford."

Cllr. Tobin also disputed the company's assurance that material was now being properly treated before it was spread.

"There is a noxious smell from this and I couldn't see how this has been allowed happen again. Nobody could tell me this was treated

A Mitchlestown-based cheese company were licensed some time ago to spread the waste. However, last year they admitted that there had been a problem with treating the effluent before it was spread.

Cllr. Tobin said the smell was all over West Waterford on the day it

"It's disgraceful that a company could do this to any small community," he said

Wilkinson Hits Out At 'Dismal Scientist' **Deasy Over Waterford Jobs Record**

Wilkinson has hit out at claims by Fine Gael TD John Deasy that attempts by Government-backed employment agencies to bring jobs to the county have failed.

Deputy Wilkinson said Fine Gael TD's dismal science has tried to present Waterford as an employment blackspot relegated by the Government to the status of "an afterthought"

'Deputy Deasy's remarks are unhelpful, untrue and contrary to the sense of local enterpreneurship and industrial development that pervades this county and characterises the employmentdriven policies of this Fianna Fáil-led government.

'The reality is much different from Deputy Deasy's imagination. IDA records show six visits to Dungarvan in the past four years, there of those since April 2005, when job cuts were confirmed in Waterford Crystal.

'In Dungarvan, the IDA owns 35 acres of land beside its industrial park in the town. Phase 1 of the site development has been has been completed and the first client has been called. The German non-solvent paint producer Biopin, which built a plant in Dungarvan two years ago, is finally set to go ahead with plans to create 20 jobs there, manufacturing a plant ingredient.

Community Enterprise Centre Scheme, Dungarvan is to receive €300,000 from Enterprise Ireland for the construction of a new Enterprise Centre. A further €200,000 is being provided by the Waterford C. Enterprise Board.

It is developing a major greenfield site in Belview capable of accommodating large-scale utility intensive industry, most likely in the Pharma and ICT sectors







Show off your summer garden

When the hard work of making your garden gorgeous is complete, it's time to share it with your friends and neighbours. And what better way to celebrate than a barbecue. The word istressî comes to mind for some people ñ a barbecue can seem like very hard work for little reward. And can you rely on the weather? Don't let either of these put you off. A barbecue can be successful with a bit of planning and organisation.

irst things first - watch the weather forecast. Try not to plan your party too far in advance and that way you've got more chance of predicting a good day. The day before the party, mow the lawn,

weed the garden, check that you have enough garden furniture for everyone ñ give the children blankets to sit on or ask your guests to bring their own folding chairs. Make sure you have some candles or lamps in case the party moves into the late evening ñ there are lots to choose from at garden centres, DIY stores and the homeware sections of department

Buy the type that keeps the bugs at bay, such as those which contain citronella. Many people want to keep the work involved in organising a summer barbecue to a minimum, but remember many hands make work light.

Using cheap plastic bowls and plates may cut the washing-up, but think green and use your own plates and cutlery.

Many offlicences and supermarkets also offer a glass hire service which is a good alternative to plastic glass-

Make sure you have enough firelighters for your barbie ñ and of course matches or a

lighter ñ or (if itis a gas one), a full bottle and even a spare. Make sure the barbie is clean too!

The main message is to keep the party food simple ñ complicated recipes youive never tried before are bound to end in disaster. If they are the sort of friends who don't like coming to your house emptyhanded, encourage them to bring their favourite barbecue dish.

You can provide the basics - salads, breads and rolls, pasta and potatoes, nibbles, relishes and maybe special main dishes, such as pork or salmon steaks. Prepare as much as you can in advance and store it in the refrigerator. Barbecue food is best when marinaded in sauces overnight.

Jerk pork, tandoori chicken, lamb kebabs, steak in black bean sauce can all be ready



and waiting for those glowing coals.

Itis important to wash hands before touching food and after touching raw ingredients.

Always use clean chopping boards, knives and utensils and ensure work surfaces are cleaned after use. To avoid cross contamination keep ready-to-eat foods. such as salads, separate from raw meat and poultry. Don't forget to add any fruit or vegetable peelings, uncooked fruit or vegetables leftovers to your compost bin to make your garden bloom next year. Do not let raw food touch or drip onto cooked food

when adding food to the barbecue and always separate utensils. It is advisable to cover foods in order to protect from insects and pests.

Donit forget some simple puddings like bananas in their skins ñ you just need to wrap them in foil and pop them on the barbie when the main cooking is done. These served with some simple vanilla ice-cream makes a great sweet for everyone from kids to grannies.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Lift tulip and hyacinth bulbs

Tulips and hyacinths will now have completed their growth and can be lifted and cleaned. Lay the bulbs in shallow trays and stand them in a dry, cool, airy place, but not in full sun. Dead tops can be removed. Spray potatoesDo not wait until disease attacks your potatoes. Spray them now with Bordeaux mixture. Potato blight disease is common and some plants are likely to become infected unless you take this precaution.

A small sowing of carrots made now is often justified, especially if the season happens to be a bad one for carrot fly. This fly does all its damage early in the ngs from a July so escape. Sow stump rooted or intermediate varieties.

Complete thinning of apples and pears Now is the time to complete the thinning of apples

and pears. Reduce the fruits to one, or at most two,

Finish planting celery

All remaining celery seedlings should now be planted out in the trenches as soon as possible. The last plants to be dealt with will be those from the April sowing in a frame.

Mulch and spray runner beans

Runner beans will benefit from a fairly thick mulch of well rotted manure spread on the ground for a distance of at least a couple of feet on either side of the row. When the plants begin to flower, spray them every evening with tepid water.

This will help the flowers to isetî and so ensure a good crop of beans. Keep this up all through the month and on into August.

Spray apples against Codlin moth

Repeat an application of one or other of the sprays recommended by the manufacturers and used in

Ingredients

(serves 6-8)

4 medium-sized ham steaks

4 sheet-ready rolled shortcrust pastry 2tsps prepared mustard

8 thin slices cheddar cheese

440g can asparagus spears, well drained

salt and freshly ground pepper to taste oil for deep frying

Method

CUT each sheet of rolled shortcrust pastry in half, so you end up with eight strips of pastry.

Tim the ham of any excess fat and cut each of the ham steaks in half.

Fill a large pan or deep fryer two thirds full with oil. While oil is heating prepare the parcels.

Place a ham steak half on one strip of pastry Spread ham steak with mustard. Top with a slice of cheese and two asparagus spears

Season to taste with salt and pepper. Brush the edges of the pastry with a little water. Fold the pastry over the ham steak to form a parcel.

Seal the edges by pressing all around with a fork. Repeat with the remaining pastry and ingredients. You should end up with eight parcels in all.

Place the parcels seam side down in the hot oil. Fry until



golden brown and crisp.

Using a metal fish slice turn over and fry until golden brown on the other side ñ this should take approximately two minutesi frying time

Drain each parcel on a double sheet of kitchen paper and serve imediately with a crisp green salad.

Apple Strudel it's irrestible

CRISP filo pastry leaves and sweet apples combined make this delicious pudding irresistible.

Ingredients: Makes 2 strudels, 6 to 8 servings each

8 tart apples, sliced 395g butter, melted 170g ground almonds

170g sugar 170g raisins 225g fine breadcrumbs 200g filo pastry, thawed

2 x 5 ml sp cinnamon 1 x 15 ml sp lemon rind, grated

Method:

Mix the apples with the raisins, lemon rind, sugar, cinnamon, and almonds. Then set aside

Place a sheet of filo pastry on a piece of kitchen roll and brush it with the melted butter. Place a second sheet on top of the first and brush with butter again.

Repeat this process until five

sheets have been used, using about 112g of the butter.

Cook and stir the breadcrumbs with 56g of butter until lightly browned. Sprinkle 395g of the butterfried breadcrumbs on the layered filo leaves.

Now, mound half of the apple filling in an 8cm strip along the narrow end of the file sheet, leaving a 5cm border.

Lift the kitchen roll, and use it to roll the filo sheets over the apples.

Brush the top of the strudel with butter and sprinkle with two 15ml spoonfuls of the buttered breadcrumbs.

Repeat the entire procedure for the second strudel. Bake the strudels in a preheated oven at 400∞F/180∞C/Gas Mark 6 for 20 to 25 minutes, until browned.

Serve hot with custard, cream or ice-cream.

Be careful when eating as the apple filling will be piping hot.



Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest***

After a three year wait, piracy is back in fashion this week as the crew of the Black Pearl sail back onto the silver screen. Returning heroes Captain Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) and Will Turner (Orlando Bloom) vie for screen time with the feisty Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightley). In fact, along with a new set of evil pirates we also see the return of the most popular of the baddies from Curse of the Black Pearl. Herein lies a major part of why this film doesn't live up to its potential.

While the original film was fresh and innovative, breathing life into the dying pirates' genre, this film treads much of the same ground without adding much to the scenario. We get more of Bloom being soppy and over romanticised in the role of Turner. While his effeminate features were perfect for an elf in Lord of the Rings and the vain wimp Paris in Troy, he fails to really convince as a hard nosed would-be pirate here. Depp remains enjoyable though, using the role which earned him an Oscar nomination to tear through the film, dragging the audience along in his wake. However, scratch the surface and you realise there is no real depth to his performance. In the first film, Sparrow was a man on a definite mission, whose longing for freedom and the open seas drove him. Here, Captain Jack has no real reason for his actions; his deeds are just a means to propel him from one set piece to the next. As for Keira Knightley, she is the sort of actress you either love or hate, but she is the only real improvement here. She has been given a deeper role, not just waiting for the boys to come save her but having a far more active character.

So much for the acting, how about the plot. Well, Jack owes his soul to Davy Jones (Bill Nighy), having reneged on a devilish pact he made to him. Will and Elizabeth meanwhile are in trouble with the authorities for helping Jack to escape at the end of the last film. Their only hope is to persuade Jack to hand over his magic compass, which they can use to bargain for their freedom. At times the film feels more like a number of episodes of a TV series knitted together, as the recurring theme of danger and rescue crops up every half hour. And always, we know we are just building to another set piece, after which we will have a brief period of rest before being flung into trouble again.

Luckily though, the set pieces are so well staged that you can forgive a lot of the film's failings. The pick of the bunch is the attack by the sea monster at Davy Jones' command but we also get some superb sword fights and much more.

Overall, this would appear to be somewhat of a holding film. The film knows it can't offer any real conclusions, with the last in the trilogy due out next summer. So it settles itself to be just a really good action film. Which is fine, except the first film led us to expect so much more. Despite all its faults, this is a superior popcorn movie, it just doesn't hold its own compared to its older brother. Hopefully, next summer will see the Pirates franchise step back up to its place as an Oscar contender

The cinema world is beginning to fall into two camps, those who are sweating with anticipation of the new Superman movie and those who are sick of hearing about it. By this time next week though, fans of motion pictures will be reunited once more - in happiness at a great franchise restored to the top of the game.

Having seen an explosion of superhero films and comic book adaptation in the last few years, the producers of Superman Returns know they are coming into a crowded marketplace and need to cater for a more discerning viewer. No longer is it ok to merely have a hero, a bad guy, an evil plot and a big film ending saviour sequence. Batman Returns brought humanity to the superhero genre, the two Spiderman films have introduced a modern theme of responsibility and the dangers of power and Sin City took us to new heights of style and depths of grittiness. So we will not be seeing a plastic man in blue with no more cares in the world but saving mankind.

Superman Returns will take off where Superman II left off. Returning from his native Krypton, the man in blue finds a world much different from the world he left behind. The world is not happy with him for leaving them in their time of greatest need, Lex Luthor has grown powerful beyond reason due to his cache of alien technology and Lois Lane is, this being a decidedly modern film, a single mother struggling to get by. Although word is that his face has been digitally altered to more closely resemble the great Christopher Reeves, newcomer Brandon Routh will prove that you do not need star power to launch a superhero film any more. Kevin Spacey brings his Oscar form to bear in the role of the maniacal Lex Luthor. Kate Bosworth shows she is more than Orlando Bloom's ex as Lois Lane. And through it all we have some of the best special effects in this part of the galaxy. Be ready, this film will be lauded as one of the great franchise movies in the years to come.

Dungarvan Remembers Hunger Strikers

In driving rain, 300 people marched through Dungarvan on Saturday, 8th July to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the H Block Hunger strikers. It was 25 years to the day that Joe McDonnell died after 62 days on hunger strike. He was the 5th hunger striker to die that year of 1981. Accompanied by the Youghal Republican Pipe Band they marched from Abbeyside to the 1798 Monument at the Lookout. Wreaths were laid on behalf of West Waterford IRA Commemorations Committee, Dungarvan H Block/Armagh Committee, Waterford Sinn Féin, and Oglaigh na hEireann.

Despite the howling wind and lashing rain people gathered to hear Sinn Féin County and Dungarvan Town Councillor Brendan Mansfield introduce speakers Cllr Toireasa Ferris former mayor of Kerry. Jim McVeigh, the last OC of Long Kesh, and Sinn Féin Waterford election candidate and City Councillor, David Cullinane. Toireasa Ferris spoke of the contribution made by republican women over the years and remembered the women in Armagh Jail who were also on hunger strike at that time. She also thanked the people of Helvick and Ring who sheltered her father. Martin, and gave great support to her and her family. Describing Margaret Thatcher as a war criminal, she said, "She may never be brought to court but history will remember her in 50 years as a war criminal and there is no getting away from that". She joined Jim McVeigh in urging support for candidate David Cullinane in the coming election.

Jim McVeigh talked of the dreadful brutality meted out to prisoners at that time. He went on to praise the film "The Wind That Shakes The Barley", about the Tan war and the Civil War, and urged everyone to see it. "Let's elect the first Waterford Sinn Féin

TD since the 1920s", he said.

Cllr Cullinane drew attention to the terrible sacrifice made by the Hunger Strikers and their families. "They were extraordinary men, and yet they were also ordinary young men full of hope and life as people that age are. They and their families were put under cruel pressure to give up their struggle but they stood fast and they won political status," he said. "The best memorial that could be built in their names would be an all-Ireland socialist republic, and I call on you all to work to build that memorial."


