Health Board Misses Boat As Property Prices Soar Soaring land prices were

blamed as the Health Services Executive pulled out of a deal to construct a Sesame School in Shandon, Dungarvan.

The Health Board passed up an opportunity to buy a parcel of land for just 293,700 euro two years ago from Dungarvan Town Council.

However soaring land prices have seen the valuation of the 1.78 acres in Shandon rise to 1.2 million - effectively putting it out of the HSE's price range. And now the HSE has gone back to the drawing board and is planning to develop the Sesame School in the new Community Building in the former Presentation Convent balked at the cost.

Passenger numbers continue to grow as the project continues to develop both the number and range of services provided. Passenger journeys have risen from 4,601 in 2003 to 19,883 in 2005.



In his address Ray O'Dwyer spoke of the rural nature of County Waterford. At Census 2002, almost 68% of the population of Co. Waterford lived in rural areas. This makes our county the second most rural County in the South-East Region and the second most rural County. He spoke of a living countryside, where people live and work and commute where necessary and where there is a good quality of life. 

There are about 80 species of whale, among which are the largest creatures to have inhabited Earth. They appear to be very intelligent, social creatures who communicate with each other with a complicated system of sounds. Although whales live in the sea they are mammals, not fish. This means that they are warm blooded and give birth to live young who feed on their mothers milk. The young are born tail first so that they do not drown.

Different Kinds Of Whales

Right whales are named by whales because they are 'right' whales to catch for their oils. There are three types of right whale: the Greenland right whale, the black right whale and the pygmy right whales. All right whales are rare because they have been over


The largest of the toothed whales are the sperm whales. They can group up to 17m (56ft) in length. There are also two sperm whales, the pygmy sperm whale and the dwarf sperm whale, that are among the smallest of the toothed whale.

One very unusual looking whale is the narwhal. The male narwhal has an enlarged tooth that grows straight out of to form a spiral tusk about 3m (10ft)

The black and white killer whale is the most dangerous of all the whales. As well as fish, they will eat seals, penguins and even dolphins to which they are closely related. The killer whale is the largest member of the dolphin family.

Two Groups Of Whales

There are two groups of whales - the whalebone, or baleen, whales and the toothed whales. There are more toothed whales, which are usually smaller than baleen whales. Baleen whales live on plankton, which is make up of tiny sea creatures and plants. The whale strains plankton out of the water by sieving it through the comb like plates of stiff material called baleen, that hang from the whale's top jaw. Toothed whales use their teeth to catch and kill all types of fish. Baleen whales include blue, right, humpback, grey, sei and fin whales. Killer whales, sperm whales, porpoises and dolphins are all toothed whales.

Objections To Two Major Lismore and Aglish **Developments**

The fate of two major housing developments in towns in West Waterford, will be decided by An Bord Pleanala.

A forty-seven house development in Aglish and a seventyfive house estate in Townspark East in Lismore, are both set to be adjudicated on by the national planning appeals board over the coming months.

The Lismore development is planned by Blackwater Properties and will, if it goes ahead, be one of the largest one off developments in many years in the historic West Waterford town.

However, a number of local residents including Janie Keating,. Jane Raven and Maureen Tyndall have brought the development before An Bord Pleanala on a number of grounds, including the size of the development itself.

Meanwhile, a residents group is one of a number of parties objecting to a 47 house development in Aglish.

The development is being proposed by Cloonross Partnership Group, but has been objected to by the Aglish enclose. At the time of publication Residents Action Group and Padraig and Carmel O'Brien.

What is **GLOBAL WARMING?**

Life on earth is possible because the atmosphere is able to maintain the Earth's temperature within the range needed to support life by distributing energy received from the Sun around the globe (see ENFO Fact Sheet 16 and Briefing Sheet

The atmosphere is a mixture of natural green-house gases (GHGs), water vapour and dust. Since the industrial revolution, the compositional changes of the atmosphere have occurred due to air pollution and landuse. Scientists now agree that gases produced by human activity are creating a blanket around the earth and not letting the heat out, causing the Earth's climate to become warmer, hence the term global

Important GHGs, and some of their common sources include carbon dioxide, produced by burning fossil fuels such as coal and oil; methane, produced in the gut of animals such as cattle, rice paddy fields; and Chlorofluorocarbons (CFC's), used in fridges and spray cans and foaming agents.

It is thought that this climate change will cause the Earth's atmosphere to warm by 5.8 c. This is enough to cause severe impacts such as floods and cyclones and the spread of diseases and flora & fauna, normally associated with warmer climates. In Ireland we could experience high winter rainfall with more severe flooding, lower summer rainfall and water shortages, sea levels, accelerated coastal erosion, loss of bogland and threats to agriculture due to additional pests and disease.

WHAT CAN I DO?

- By using less fuel in our daily lives, we can all combat the treats of global warming.
- When shopping for electrical appliances look for the energy label. Appliances are given a rating from A for the most efficient to G for the least energy efficient.
- Make sure that lights and heat are turned off when room is

Letter from John McCann P.P Ring, 8th May 1900 to Thomas McCarthy, Town Clerk, Dungar-

"Dear Mr McCarthy...I beg to state for the information of your board that I believe that any any aid whatever kind made to the Ring fishermen will not prove of the least avail until the grievances which they suffer through English Steam Trawlers off the near coast be abated. Already I have done my best to remedy this evil, which if not timely arrested will put an extinguisher upon the gradually decaying industry of Ballinagoul & Helvick.

The fact is evidenced from the correspondance which I herewith it may have probably escaped the notice of your Board, not appearing in provincial newsapaper...the correspondence discloses the palpable fact that the makings of a Bye Law was a grim mockery rather than as a means of protection of the property of the poor and in many cases destitute fishermen, many of whom are burthened with large families.

The correspondence referred to by Father McCann appeared in the 'Freemans' Newspaper- it comprises of a letter by Father McCann Ring, December 29th 1898 to the Editor of the Freeman and acknowledgments from the Office of Irish Fisheries

The article is headed 'Steam Trawling off Wexford Harbour & Co. Waterford'

" Here about 8 months ago a Bye Law was passed for the protection of the local fishermen at Ring, where there are about 120 men engaged in the industry and who supply fish to the neighbouring town and to all towns within 30 miles of Dungarvan. Owing to the predatory incursions of the Steam Trawlers, the nets of the local fishermen were frequently destroyed. It was found necessary owing to the local fishermen's mode of subsistance being seriously imperilled to pass the following Bye-Law. "It is hereby prohibited to use from any steamer or steamship or vessel propelled by steam the method of fishing known as beam trawling... off the coast of the counties Cork, Waterford & Wexford.

Feast from the East

THIS is an ideal dish for a summer barbecue ñ itís so simple and tasty that itis sure to become a favourite!

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

6-8 Lincolnshire or Cumberland chipolata sausages

1/2 red pepper, seeded and cut into chunks

1/2 green pepper, seeded and cut into chunks

FOR THE GLAZE:

3 x 15 ml sp (3 tbsp) Hoisin

2 x 15 ml sp (2 tbsp) honey 1 x 15 ml sp (1 tbsp) tomato puree

TWIST each of the chipolata sausages in the middle to form two cocktail-sized sausages, and then cut to separate.

Thread the sausages and pepper alternately on to the skewers.

For the sauce, sautÈ the onions in margarine until golden and add all the other ingredients. Bring slowly to the boil, lower the heat and simmer 10 to 15

minutes. After loaf has cooked for 30 minutes, pour half of the sauce over the meat, return to oven and bake for a further 45 minutes, basting often with remaining sauce. Serve loaf hot in thick slices with remaining sauce. Also makes great sandwiches.

GOOSBERRY

ENJOY a taste of summer Blend the custard powder with this easy to prepare dessert that will give your tastebuds a treat.

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

450g goosberries, topped and tailed 125g caster sugar 2tbsp water

1 tbsp custard powder 150ml milk

few drops of green food colouring (optional) 150ml whipping cream chopped toasted nuts, to decorate

Method:


PUT the goosberries, sugar and water in a saucepan, cover and cook for about 10 minutes until the fruit is soft. Cool slightly, then puree the fruit in a blender or food processor. Pass though a nylon sieve to remove the pips.

with a little of the milk; heat the remaining milk in a saucepan. Pour the hot milk on to the blended custard powder, stirring, then return to the pan and stir over a gentle heat until the custard is thickened. Blend the custard into th fruit pulp and allow to cool. Add the food colouring, if used.

Whip the cream until soft peaks form, then fold into the gooseberry puree. Spoon into individual glasses and chill in the refrigerator until required. Decorate with toasted nuts to serve. For a variation, use raspberries, strawberries or blackberries instead of gooseberries.

If any of these soft fruits are used, do not cook the fruit but sweeten the fruit with caster sugar after it has been made into a puree.

Superman Returns****

The craze for superhero movies continues this summer with the release of the much anticipated Superman Returns, starring newcomer Brandon Routh as the man in blue. Picking up from Superman II, where Superman had returned to his home planet to find out more about his origins, this film finds Metropolis in a darker mood than before, with many unconvinced about Superman's true worth. In fact, Lois Lane (Kate Bosworth) has just won a Pulitzer for an article entitled Why The World Doesn't Need Superman.

Entangled somewhere in Superman's emotional story is Lex Luthor, who has spent the five years of our hero's absence in jail. He plans to use technology from Krypton to create and control a new continent, one bound in Kryptonite to make it impenetrable to Superman.

At two and a half hours, the film is plenty long enough to resolve both storylines. While there is very little of Clark Kent as compared to previous instalments of the franchise, what screen time he gets is made enjoyable by Routh's goofy acting. To get the film's faults out of the way: some of the scenes are slightly lengthy and there are obvious points where cuts could have been made, Lex Luthor's plan is rather vague and careless and, finally, a few more Kent scenes really wouldn't hurt. Apart from these minor problems though, this really is an excellently made film.

Routh shines in his dual role, really defining the difference between the quiet reporter and the ultra-confident superhero. In the TV series you could never understand how the world failed to see the link between the two, but here it is far more plausible that nobody recognises Kent for who he really is. He also convinces well as a man returning to a place he left five years ago and isn't sure of what to find on his return, slowly regaining his confidence and rebuilding his relationships with those he once knew. Bosworth is quietly excellent as a more mature but still dogged Lois Lane. We can see exactly how much Superman's return troubles her and why she has become a more thoughtful, if still stubborn, character. The failures of the script writers to properly flesh out the Luthor character are overwhelmed by Kevin Spacey's scenery chewing efforts. While he sometimes strays dangerously close to a Dr. Evil from Austin Powers performance, he is still the most watchable film villain in years, drawing your attention and holding it for every moment he is on

As you would expect, the effects are absolutely superb but they are also scarily believable. Whereas sometimes perfect effects leave you feeling a little detached from the film, here they really add to it. You will feel every thrill of fear, excitement and beauty as Superman flies through different settings. As for all superhero movies, the soundtrack is classical and complements the movie without distracting. Although it suffers slightly from the Lord of the Rings problem of multiple endings, the time slips by quickly rather than dragging on. Overall, this will become a classic of the superhero/comic book genre, bringing the necessary emotional depth to go with the necessary bangs and crashes.

Ah, how the movies sometimes reflect upon true life. Here Jennifer Anniston plays Brooke, a woman going through a tough break up with a man she obviously still has some feelings for. This time though it is funnyman Vince Vaughn rather than husband Brad Pitt and we can see exactly what happens on the silver screen, rather than having to sift through rafts of guess work in the tabloids and glossy magazines.

Having posted the third biggest opening weekend ever of a rom-com in America, this film has long been hotly anticipated over here. Expect Vaughn to carry through the comedic form he displayed in Dodgeball and The Wedding Crashers. Expect Anniston to be pretty and likeable. The script may end up predictable but there will be plenty of laughs throughout. And for guys, there will be that scene we have all glimpsed in the trailer!

Help bring your garden to life

A great way to bring wildlife into your garden is to simply add water and build a

No matter how small, the water will attract birds, frogs, newts, toads and even drag-

With a PVC or butyl rubber liner you can create your pool where goldfish or more expensive koi (Japanese carp) could provide a flash of gold to the scenery. Depending on what type of garden you

have, the idea can be extended to include a waterfall, a fountain, a water spout or watercourse.

These options allow you to grow many plants that thrive in wet conditions. If you are thinking of adding running water you will have to ensure a safe electricity supply for the pump.

Having a power supply means that you can also provide lightning, which will make the pond a striking garden feature at night. You can help the bird population survive Whatever you decide, an open sunny site is best away from overhanging trees ñ fallen leaves can cause nasty, smelly water when they are left to decompose.

Water brings an ever changing patter of reflections, sound and movement that is appealing in a garden.

There are also many other decorative features the gardener can add for interest. Why not try feeding the birds by adding a bird table and a bird bath to your garden. Place them in sight of your window and out of reach of cats.

A herb garden is an excellent feature to build, you could try an old sink for your favourite herbs but make sure there is adequate drainage so it doesnit go soggy. Creating a cartwheel shape with bricks, paving stones, grass paths or low growing hedges, such as box, can make any herb garden very attractive and will prevent the plants from overwhelming each other. A sun dial, a small statue, and interestingly

shaped pots add an extra dimension to the garden landscape but if you are more of a plant fan, then why not try a rockery?

It can be rewarding to grow the delicate looking alpine plants in the comfort of your own back garden. And what better way to rest at the end of a hard dayis gardening ñ sitting in your own arbour.

This can be as simple as a comfy garden chair under the shade of your favourite tree.

A more formal pergola or arch planted with climbing roses, honeysuckle and clematis, over a wooden or cast iron bench, set against a fence or wall, is another option. Put your feet up, enjoy the results of your hard work and smell the fragrance of those flowers.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Prick out perennials and biennials

Perennials and biennials sown in June will be in need of pricking out into a nursery bed. This should be in an open position except for violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthus, which grow more quickly in partial shade.

The ground must be well forked and reasonably rich but not recently manured with well rotted garden manure.

Get the seedlings up as carefully as possible (if the ground is dry it is best to give it a good watering the day before you intend to move the seedlings).

Peg down strawberry runners

The runners of strawberries are most conveniently propagated by pegging them down into pots of compost sunk into the ground. When rooted they are easily transplanted.

Protect vines from mildew

Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew, spray with a copper fungicide.

Plant winter greens

Plant out all manner of winter greens as you clear the ground of early crops such as dwarf peas, early potatoes and the first sowings of turnips and salad vegetables.

As far as possible, choose showery weather for this work. If July is persistently dry, push on with the planting and then water freely for a




m Cashman "Shoots The Lights Out" To Claim Captains Prize

Caution was urged over an application to change the use of a wellknown Irish music pub into a restaurant with a take away facility.

The change of use of Bean a Leanna, at 86 O'Connell Street, fast food outlets which remain open Dungarvan came before the July meeting of Dungarvan Town Council on Monday night last.

However, Fianna Fail councillor, Anne Marie Rossiter, who warned against allowing further Take-Away facilities in a residential street, called for restrictions on the time it would operate from.

"There are already two take-away's there . We don't want another one in O'Connell Street," the former head of Dungarvan and West Waterford Chamber of Commerce, told the meeting.

The application is currently being adjudicated on, and the local authority is seeking further information on the plans. As part of this, the developers may be forced to close earlier than the fast food restaurants on the street

Unwise To Speculatively Rezone Ballygagin Lands Says Council

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis Mc-Carthy, has revealed that a business consortium who are proposing to develop a 60 acre Industrial Estate on the outskirts of Dungarvan weren't forthcoming with the names and details of the two firms who they claim are interested in

The consortium had previously claimed to have been in protracted discussion with two companies, who would employ up to 200 people at the site in Ballygagin.

But, in what is a major blow to the consortium, Mr. McCarthy said it would be unwise to speculatively rezone land for the devel-

'We asked who the one or two firms interested in setting up in Dungarvan were and they couldn't tell us, which was a surprise," Mr. McCarthy said.

The consortium, who had been working closely with Mr. Rafferty - the departed Business Development Officer with Waterford County Council - had gone public on the plans, and have already lobbied members of Dungarvan Town Council and Waterford County

But despite calls at the July meeting of Waterford County Council rezone the land at Ballygagin, Mr. McCarthy said it would be unwise to do so.






