Arsonists Set Former Care **Centre Ablaze**

MINDLESS DESTRUCTION AT TWO PREMISES

A burned out shell was all that was left of the former Deise Day Care Centre at Mitchell Street, Dungarvan after a serious arson attack in the late hours of Tuesday night

As a result of the fire, the smouldering wreck of the onestorey pre-fabricated building is now thought to be structurally unsound and may have to be levelled.

It's the latest and most serious incident of anti-social behaviour to have occurred over the course of a month which saw Quanns, the Town Park and the old Protestant Graveyard all singled out for vandalistic at-

Uncertainty Continues Over School Bus Transport

While the problems are not said to be as chronic as last year, when huge confusion surrounded the bus transport routes, a significant number of students could be stranded as a


The problems have been caused by the outdated catchment areas, which were first drawn up in the 1960's under the Free Education Scheme.

Bus Eireann said about 90% of students have been assigned tickets for the new school year. The remaining ten percent of students will be given priority status, they said.







You, Me And Dupree

Coming home from their wedding, Carl (Matt Dillon) and Molly (Kate Hudson) need the space that all newlyweds cherish. So when they are forced to take in Carl's best friend Dupree (Owen Wilson) it seems that their married bliss is in stormy waters and, of course, so it proves to be. The frat pack have made good films out of much flimsier storylines (Anchorman for instance), yet this film doesn't quite manage to scale the heights of the best of the Stiller/Wilson/Ferrell bunch. Whereas Anchorman and Zoolander were free to simply cut loose, You, Me and Dupree has to follow at least the semblance of a plot and its jokes need to fit in to the character's world: a problem when Wilson espe-

cially works best when he is freewheeling. Saying all that, this is a genuinely funny film. Forget the set-up gags such as the scene where Dupree's night of passion goes horribly wrong; the real fun is in the interaction between the trio and Molly's father (Michael Douglas). Dillon is suitably broody in the role of Carl, pressurised at work from his father-inlaw and trying to make a young marriage work, the last thing he needs is Dupree wreaking havoc at home. Douglas excels as the fayet doing it cleverly enough to get away with

Wilson himself is the main reason this film stomach as you leave the cinema. has been getting some harsh criticism. Dupree is the same man-child he has played in every-Crashers through Zoolander; the laid back, socially inept but loveable stoner. How much of this is Wilson and how much is the scripts he has to work with is up for debate. What is important here though is that the act hasn't yet become grating. The gags are still strong enough and Wilson possesses enough charm and wit to make it all work. Perhaps after a couple more films in the same vein Wilson will truly get annoying but for the moment he deserves to be allowed do his thing.

As for the rest of the film, there is enough to laugh at to entertain. Don't expect too many twists and turns, this isn't a thriller but if you don't end up rooting for Carl, a good guy underneath, you may just have a heart of stone.

Election **Candidate** Says No To **Developers**

Independent General Election candidate, Mary Roche has announced that she will not seek or accept donations from developers to fund her campaign.

Cllr. Roche, a Waterford City Councillor, who threw her hat into the General Election ring recently, said that while general election campaigns can be notoriously expensive she believed the public are not prepared to accept the ambiguity of developers funding candidates anymore.

"Everyone knows that the potential for developers to benefit from re-zonings and other decisions made by politicians is very great and as such, politicians have a duty to remove themselves from becoming beholden to such interests.'

LIZARDS

There are about 3,750 species of lizard ranging in length from small geckos just a few millimetres long, to the Salvadori monitor of Papua New Guinea, which can be up to 4.75m (15ft 7in) in length. Lizards are found in most parts of the world. Many live in deserts but some live near water, and are excellent swimmers. Most lizards have legs, but there are some that have no legs and look like snakes.

Skinks Are The Commonest Lizards

With some 600 different species, skinks are the commonest of all lizards in the world. Most skinks are found in tropical Africa and Asia, although there are others to be found in Australia, Europe and North and South America.

Lizards' Tails Can Grow Again If a predator grabs a lizard by its tail, the tail snaps off and the lizard makes its escape. A new tail grows in the old one's place. Lizards Perform Tricks The chameleon can change its colour to merge with its surroundings. The gecko has special pads on its feet which enable it to walk up walls and even upsidedown on ceilings. Some lizards, such as the flying dragon of South-east Asia, appear to be able to fly. The flying dragon does not really fly but it can glide for 20m (66ft) or more to escape danger. It has a flap of loose skin on each side of its body, which can be opened out to form a pair of 'wings'. Lizards Can Run On Tiptoe Several lizards can Frilled Lizard raise themselves up

on their hind legs to run for short distances. The sand monitor, or goanna, of Australia can run so fast on its toes that it is nicknamed the racehorse goanna. The basilisk lizard of South America can ever run across the surface of water for short distances, at a top speed of around 8kph (5mph), to escape from predators.

A Lizard Can Have A Ruff

The frilled lizard of Australia and New Guinea runs always on its hind legs when threatened. If is cornered, it raises a large ruff around its neck to make it look bigger. Then it opens its mouth wide and hisses to make it appear frightening. The bearded lizard not only has a ruff, it also has a collar of scales at the sides of its throat which stand out when the lizard opens its mouth. It does this when fright-

Pharmacists Warn Of Dangers Of **Internet Medicines**

Irish pharmacists are calling for a public awareness campaign to inform patients of the dangers of buying medicines over the inter-

The call follows recent reports in the UK of the case where a patient in Sunderland in the North East of England went blind after taking steroids, which she purchased from a website operated from

Daragh Connolly, MPSI of Connolly Pharmacists, Dungarvan, said: "When a patient buys medicines from the internet they have no way of knowing whether the medicines are counterfeit or gen-

"They have no idea what the medicines contain and they are putting their lives and the lives of their family at risk by taking them. Some people might believe that buying medicines over the internet is cheaper than in their local pharmacy, but this is actually not the case, as was clearly shown in a recent article in the Irish Examiner. The majority of medicines are more expensive when bought off websites.

"People will continue to buy medicines online unless the dangers are communicated to them in a public awareness campaign. We are calling on the Department of Health and the Health Service Executive to organise this campaign to ensure that lives are not lost."

Some rain has finally arrived - up to 2" in some areas but only about 1.5" in other areas. It was a little late to have a huge impact but there was just about enough to get grass motoring again. However, the amount of grass that will be grown over the next month will be greatly influenced by the management decisions you take now.

Grass Grows Grass.

Grass must be given time to grow. When grass leaf is short it is growing slowly for the simple reason that its "engine" is small. But as the leaf gets longer and its "engine" gets bigger it grows much more rapidly. So if we can delay grazing short grass until it has had a chance to grow at its faster rate we will grow far more grass. This explains why grass grows so rapidly in the last week of a rotation. So if you have not enough leaf cover the ability of the farm to grow the maximum amount of grass will be severely diminished. Grass growth rates will never reach the levels required and as we move into September any opportunity to build up grass will have passed by.

Longer Rotations.

Moving around the farm with rotation lengths less than 20 days is one sure way of reducing the amount of grass grown and you will run out of grass very quickly. The reason being that the grass plant is not getting a chance to "motor" because of its size. Rotation lengths must be increased to close on 30 days. But to do this demand for grass has to be reduced. And the only way to do this is to reduce the demand for grass by feeding silage, straw/hay or meals or a combination, depending on the type of stock on the farm. Many have been doing this over the past month or more. But one can be sure that by restricting the grazing in the short term you will grow far more grass in the long term. Drystock Farms.

Putting heifers or bullocks that are within about 8 weeks of finishing on ad lib concentrates with a small amount of hay or straw will save grass. On this system they will gain at least a kg per day. Consult your Teagasc Adviser before proceeding with this. This system works best where the length of the feeding period is restricted to about 80 days. A dry suckler cow requires only two-thirds of the feed of a cow giving a gallon of milk to a calf. Earlier weaning of sucklers will avoid excessive weight loss.

Also in a year such as this it is imperative not to have sucklers and their calves competing for grass. Allowing calves to move ahead either under a raised wire or through a creep gate to a meal trough and better grass will greatly benefit the calves. At this stage of the year the cow does not need the quality grass. I have noticed the Kildalton suckler herd in Piltown in the paddocks beside the main gate last week putting this procedure into practice. A creep gate was used to allow the calves go ahead. The stockman informed me that it only took calves a few days to realise the benefits of walking through the creep gate where they have access to meals and a nice sward of grass. Meanwhile the cows were quite content to remain in the bare paddock where they have access to some baled silage in a round feeder. When a system such as this has been in place for a few weeks, weaning is far less stressful

The main priorities on sheep farms at this stage are (1) to keep lambs moving and (2) to make sure that all ewes are in good condition as mating approaches. And if they are too many lambs around it is going to be difficult to have enough grass for improving condition on any thin ewes.

So really the last thing you want in October is big numbers of lambs competing for grass with ewes. Certainly if supply is tight it pays to feed meal. Feed 1.25 lbs per day to lambs. This will speed up finish and allow you to build up grass for ewes.

Of course, the handful of thin ewes will drag down performance unless you get them sorted out in the coming weeks. Because if they are thin at mating, you will still be feeling the effects this time next year - trying to finish their lambs. Research has shown that you get 30 less lambs per 100 ewes where condition score is below par at mating. So again if grass is tight it will pay to feed up to 1.5 lbs to any ewes you have picked out as lacking condition. This can be fed for a month before mating.

FARMERS' GRANT AID WILL BE RECALCULATED WHEN WORK IS APPROVED FOR PAYMENT -Kennedy

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Rosemary Kennedy recently said that farmers who have got approval under the Farm Waste Management Scheme will have their grant aid recalculated at time of payment to reflect the increase in standard costings.

The costing increase varies between 15% to 20% depending on the cost item in the investment. In the case of where a farmer does his own labour, the hourly rate has increased to € 14 / hour.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman said that the costing increase will result in increased grant for approvals already issued of the order of €10 -€12m. For example, the average from €26,000 to over €30,000.

Continuing, Mrs. Kennedy said that costings needed to continually update as already in 2006, there have been substantial increases in concrete and steel prices and he called on Minister Coughlan to immediately set in train adjustments to costings to apply to approvals for next year.



Dungarvan Museum Society News

August 19th was a wet, wild day in Dungarvan, but as we set off to Cork we didn't care! Thankfully the weather did improve and our first stop was Riverstown House. We were met by Mrs. John Dooley. In the 1730s Dr. Browne enlarged and remodeled the original 1602 Riverstown House. The La Francinis adorning the ceiling of the dining-room, representing 'Time rescuing Truth from the Assaults of Discord and Envy', were absolultley beautiful, as were its walls with classical figures and rococo flowers and foliage, finishing an ideal setting for any banquet of old. The fire places were another feature of the house that we all found attractive, each different and relevant to their needs. The house remained in the Browne family until the present century but by the 1950s the house was empty and decaying. It was bought in 1965 by the present owners Mr. and Mrs. John Dooley and sympathetically restored with the help of the Georgian Society. The house has been attractively furnished with period furniture. We were all treated to cooking apples from the trees at Riverstown House...Norma made good use of some of them in a tasty blackberry and apple crumble

The Oldest Handball Alley in Ireland? This week we take an extract from the book 'A history of Handball in Munster' edited by Sean Murphy.

'The alley in Kilgobnet is rated as one of the oldest, if not the oldest, still in use in Ireland, having undergone many changes and renovations down through the years. According to Mr. Michael Devine, now in his seventies, his grandfather, who used to make the hardballs for all the local players in the nineteenth century, claimed that the alley was up to three hundred years old. The original alley consisted of a front wall, constructed of stone and morter, and about 6 feet up on the front wall were two tossing stones, one on either side, measuringabout three square feet each. About eight feet from the front wall were two tossing flags, one on each side of the alley. The player tossing the ball would have to hop the ball on the tossing flag and strike it off the stone on the front wall to commence play. The floor was made of hard clay and there was no backwall. The tossing flags and stones were visible when the alley was renovated in 1971. To be continued...

Ingredients:

(Serves 6) 1.5kg leg of lamb 30g butter 1 tblspn olive oil 500g onions, sliced 1kg potatoes, peeled Dissolve the beef or and thinly sliced salt and black pepper cup of hot water and sliced

1 beef or lamb stock cube

1 cup hot water Parsley

Method:

Heat the butter and oil in a frying pan. Add the onions and cook them gently until they are softened and just starting to colour. Place the potato slices in the bottom of a roasting pan. Spoon the onions over them. Season with salt and freshly

Make small incisions around the bone and under the skin of the leg of lamb and insert the garlic slices.

Place the lamb on a rack over the potatoes and onions. Season it with plenty of salt and freshly ground pepper. lamb stock cube in a 2 cloves garlic, thinly pour it over the potatoes and onions.

Roast the lamb in a hot oven (220°C) for the first 20 minutes and then lower the oven temperature to moderate (180°C) and cook for another hour.

The lamb may be cut into thick slices, arranged on the bed of potatoes and onions, sprinkled with chopped parsley and served in the dish it was cooked in so that you don't lose the juices.



Dungarvan Leader - This Week In The Garden

Give your plot a bit of balance

MUCH admired by gardeners for their architectural value and long-term interest, ornamental trees and shrubs are excellent. Autumn to spring is the plantfor forming the skeleton of a planting

In a mixed border they provide welcome solidarity and substance, balancing the softer pleasures provided by herbaceous

Grouping evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs together also allows you to create an effective display all year round. Such a display also requires relatively little maintenance as well as giving a diversity of shapes and forms.

A wide range of shrubs and ornamamental trees can be grown in most gardens even if the soil is not ideal.

Some of the more popular ornamentals include japonica, lilac, laurel, fuchsia, rhododendron, yucca, abelia and acacia. But many of the rarer and less popular species can help liven up a dull garden. Shrubs and trees may be bought direct from garden centres and nurseries.

They are usually sold in containers, either root-balled or bare-root.

Shrubs on sale should be accurately labelled, healthy, undamaged and free from pests or disease. Inspect the plant before buying and select a specimen with evenly distributed branches close to ground level.

Some suppliers may give a guarantee to replace the shrub if it dies in the first year

provided it has been given reasonable care.

ing season for both bare-root and root-balled shrubs.

Planting in the autumn allows the root system to establish while the ground is still warm. Planting may be carried out during mild weather in winter, but not when the ground is frozen.

Roots will not grow in very cold soil and there is a risk they will be killed.

The major disadvantage of planting in the spring is that top growth is likely to develop before the roots establish, and if there is an early spell of dry weather the plants may need constant watering to survive. The ground needs to be prepared well before planting by digging in plentyof well-rotted organic matter.

Fertiliser, such as bone meal, can be added if appropriate. The hole for planting should be twice the width of the root mass. After planting water the shrub and mulch.

Newly-planted shrubs can be protected from the elements by hessian or wooden structures and an anti-transpirant spray can regular watering.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Prune hydrangeas

Most hydrangeas will have finished flowering and will benefit from a little pruning

Cut off each faded flower truss as far back as the first plump looking growth bud and remove any thin, weaklooking stems.

Of course, if some of the branches are still producing good blooms, leave these unpruned.

Lift spring sown onions

Onions sown in January under glass and March outdoors should have completed their growth, and there is no point in leaving them in the ground any longer. Lift them carefully with a fork and spread them out on the surface to dry. Shake any soil from the bulbs and store them, either on shelves or in shallow boxes, in a dry, frost-proof shed or room.

Sow onions

This is the time to sow onions, both to use when very small in salads and to provide early bulbs before the spring sown crop.

Select a fairly sheltered place and ground that has been well cultivated, but not recently manured. Lift second early potatoes as required

When you come to the end of the first early potatoes make a start on the second early or mid-season varieties, but only lift a few roots at a time as you need them.

Thin vegetable seedlings

Thin out seedlings of lettuce, spinach, beetroot and other sowings made in July. tips of the main stems.

Earth-up maincrop celery

It is time to begin to earth up the maincrop celery. The process is exactly as for early celery, except with these bigger plants more soil will be required. Draw the stems together with some soft string before starting, so you have both hands free to work soil around the plants.





John Walshe and a small band of helpers set about organising the first Ballycotton 5 for August 11th a week after the above mentioned Ballymore race. With a commitment from the winner of the race in Bellymore one, Ray Treacy, that he would be at the starting line in Bally cotton the followning week, "a committment which he was to keep." The work in organising the race had started some week's earlier when local shops and business people were approached for donations. One of the few firms in the area at the time donated 5 Pounds, as did three other businesses, Two more gave 2 pounds and 1 pound each, and even the 50 pence from another was much appreciated. The total came to 28 pound and 50 pence; they were off to a flier.

Entry fee for the race was 20 pence and plaques were presented to the winners. On race day 34 runners were to take part and the rest as they say is history. First to register was Michael Healy of Youghal who at that time was a cross country runner of note in the Cork area. Tens of thousands of entries for Ballycotton events have been received since but Michael can take pride of place as the first runner to have "no 1" beside his name in a Ballycotton race. Their band of helpers for the race were small but willing. When Johnny Walshe and Phil McGrath were out marking the course one local resident curious as to what was going on inquired why the two were writing on the road, that person before leaving the scene remarked that this was graffiti on the road way and that the council will be anything but pleased you know. Race day came and the race was got under way by the then County Board Chairman Paddy Hartnett who since has gone to his eternal reward. John Murray who was a spectator on that very sunny evening was drafted in to lead out the race and this task these days is known as the lead car. John picked up local News and Star reporter on his way round the course Joe Duggan, unfortunaly Joe is now also deceased. Michael Long of Leevale AC along with his girlfriend Ellen were drafted in to take the times of the runners, finishing times were not usually done at races in the earlier years, Joe Duggan in his report after remarked " that all the times of the finishers were

isher's placing on it was given to each runner as they finished; the runner in turn handed the card to the recorder and gave his name. Those cards were handed out on that first race by a little youngest called Seamus Hartnett who later became one of the area's finest athletes, on that night he was down the village to see what all the men were doing running around the road. The other locals involved on that night included John Walshe and Dan Donovan who both ran and an uncle of Phil McGrath's Fr. Tom who was on holidays in the area from England.

The presentation of prizes took place in the Community hall and Ballycotton C.C. Fr. Bertie Troy made the presentation to the winners. The race it self as we said consisted of 34 runners all of them male, the top three home were to become household names in the sport with Ray Treacy, Leevale A.C., brother of John and now head coach in Providence College winning in a very fast time of 23.46 with Richie Crowley, St. Finbarrs' A.C. second in 24.16 and the one and only Donie Walsh, Leevale A.C. third in 24.21. Incidently during the race a heard of cows came out on the Treacy had passed but almost brought the two chasers Crowley and Walsh to a standstill at one point.

In Joe Duggan's report on the race he said that at four miles Treacy was 500 yards ahead of the bunch and travelling at 14 miles per hour as timed on the speedometer on Mr. John Murray's car. One Liam O'Brien came fifth on the night, he later was to be crowned king of Ballycotton but that's for another day.

One footnote, which has to be included, is the fact that in 1980 Liam won his first of 14 Ballycotton 5 titles and in 1985 he set a course record over the Ballycotton course of 23.41, which to this date has never been bettered.

So when did the fairer sex come on the scene, well in 1979 two ladies took part, Ellen Whelan of Leevale and Mary Dempsey of Youghal, she would be better known these days as Mary Sweeney and is still winning races and her love for the sport is an example to all. Numbers taking part have grown over the 30 year period reaching 124 in 1982 and topping the 200 mark the year after. The highest number of finishers 279 was recorded last week the 30th running of the event and the highest figure before this was 262 in 1993. In 1987 the top six broke 25 minutes and it is a reflection on present day standards that only one has done so in the past 10 years.

Yes, 30 years is quite a long time, the Dublin Marathon

was still three years in the distance and the London Marathon six months later. Nowadays the popularity of the Ballycotton 10 is only apparent to anybody who tries to enter it, and the numbers at the four race summer series stay at a consistently high level. A total of 140 five and ten mile races later, the statistics show in excess of 48,000 finishers. That month in August 1977 is also remembered for another entirely different reason, the world was shocked to learn of the death of Elvis Presley. Yes the king of song may be dead but road running is certainly alive and well in the picturesque area of East Cork. However it wouldn't have transpired but for 34 pioneering runners who turned up in Ballcotton village to run five miles on an August evening all
