THE PERFECT FLYING MACHINE

Birds are superbly built for flight. Their light, strong bodies give them the lift they need to fly. Even their feathers are designed to help them fly. Flying uses lots of energy, so birds spend much of their time eating to keep their energy level up. Birds' skeletons are all basically the same, one that is best adapted to the stresses of flying.

Birds Have Hollow Bones

A birds bones are light but strong.

They are light because they are hollow. The larger bones are strengthened with a honeycomb of crossing struts, rather like the struts inside an aeroplane wing. A bird has about 175 different muscles, the biggest being those that work the

wings. More than half of a bird's weight is in its muscles.

Flights Of Fancy

Wings are designed for different types of flight. An owl has especially soft wings to that its prey does not

hear it approaching. Most sea birds have wings that are long and narrow, which are excellent for gliding. The wandering albatross has the largest wing span of any living bird. From tip to tip the average span is 3.15m (10ft 3in), which enables it to glide for long periods without flapping its wings.


Fastest And Slowest Fliers

Most small birds fly at about 30 to 50kph (20 to 30mph) but the fastest bird, the peregrine falcon, can reach 270kph (168mph) in a dive/ Ducks and geese are the fastest fliers in level flight with speeds of up to 104 kph (65mph). The slowest flying bird is probably the American woodcock which only achieves a top speed of 8 kph (5mph), which is roughly the same as an adult human walking briskly.

Feather Facts

The number of feathers on a bird varies at different times of the year and from species to species. Feathers get battered and worn by wind and rain, but luckily they are replaceable. This process is called moulting. In most birds the new feathers simply push out the old ones. Birds that live in very cold areas cannot afford to be without the insulation that feathers provide. Because of this, the old feathers are not discarded until the new

ones are fully formed. The new feathers fuse themselves onto the old ones so that the bird always has a



"The proposed development would, therefore, seriously injure the amenities of adjoining property and of property in the vicinity and would be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area," the recent ruling stated.

Meanwhile, the faith of a proposed office extension to the rear of the former Kelly's Store in Mitchell Street/Fitzgerald's Terrace, will be decided by An Bord Pleanala.

The History Of The **Bonmahon Copper Mines**

Italian-style sausages

STUCK for ideas for what to do with sausages? Try this delicious easy recipe. INGREDIENTS

(serves 6)

- 1kg small chipolata or Italian sausages
- 1 tbs oil 1 onion, thinly sliced
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 185g mushrooms, sliced
- 3 tbs tomato paste
- 425g can tomatoes, roughly
- chopped
- 1 beef stock cube
- 225ml water
- 1 tsp dried basil or 1 tbsp
- fresh basil, finely chopped
- 2 tbsp parsley, finely
- chopped
- 1 tsp sugar
- salt and pepper
- black olives.

METHOD

HEAT oil in frying pan and fry the sausages until golden brown all over about 6-8 minutes.

Remove from pan and drain on absorbent paper. Pourexcess oil from pan, leaving about 2 tbs

Return pan to the heat, add onion and garlic and fry until onion has softened slightly but not browned ñ about 3 minutes.



Homily of Fr. Jim Griffin at a special celebration of Mass on the 40th Anniversary of **Dungarvan Soccer Club**

(Held on Friday 25th at the Dungarvan Soccer Clubhouse)

'You are the salt of the Earth" Jesus addressed these words to his apostles and followers - the first Christians. Christ was urging his followers to enhance people's lives by building up of community spirit. They weren't to be going around with their heads hanging full of doom and gloom. They were to add flavour to life. Food without salt is tasteless. Salt adds flavour to food. In fact even today when we say someone is the salt of the earth, we mean that person is kind, generous and thoughtful - in short, a good neighbour. So, salt of the earth is the highest tribute we can pay a person.



During my six-year association with Dungarvan UTD 1983 -89 I saw firsthand that these people (Club Managers) were indeed "The Salt of the Earth"

They were doing exactly what Christ asked "Building up Community". I was a curate in Tooraneena when the Club was launched in 1966. It takes courage and vision to start anything and obviously both these qualities were there in abundance. For the first time since Independence, Ireland began to make progress in the '60's. SINN FEIN **URGES VOTERS TO** REGISTER

With the general election less than a year away Sinn Fein is launching a campaign to maximise the number of people registered to vote ahead of the completion of the overhaul of the electoral register.

A large number of faults and errors have been recorded on the electoral register in Dungarvan and the Town Council are currently undertaking an overhaul. Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said it's crucially important that people make every effort to ensure they are on the electoral register.

"Sinn Fein welcomes the overhaul of the electoral register as it has been proven that there are serious inaccuracies with it as it currently stands. However we do have some very serious reservations about the manner with which the overhaul is taking place. Basically, each local authority has been left to its own devices and there has been little or no direction coming centrally from the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government."

"This has led to inconsistency throughout the state and there are concerns that many people may accidentally be omitted from the register. It is for this reason that Sinn Fein is launching this state wide voter registration drive," Abbeyside-based councillor went on to say.
