

Unique Fundraiser For Tragic O'Regan Family

Gardai joined with top national hunt jockeys for a unique fundraiser for the three O'Regan children who tragically lost their parents and little sister, Niamh, in a horror blaze at their home in Waterford City.

Cian, Brianna and Aaron O'Regan lost their parents, Bryan and Johanna and baby sister, Niamh in a fire that engulfed their home last June.

Two top national hunt jockeys, and the Garda mounted unit undertook the challenge to ride the 55km route on behalf of the O'Regan family trust.

Tom Ryan, a Cheltenham winner at this years festival and champion jockey, Niall 'Slippers' Madden and two Gardai on horseback left from Dungarvan Garda Station just before eleven o'clock and finished at around 5pm at the Kilcohan greyhound track in Waterford city.

Collections were held in towns along the route, which involved using sixteen different horses in a relay system.

The Gardai have set up a bank account for the event at the Bank of Ireland in the Quay Waterford. Donations can be made to account number 46339608.

Local History Notes

This week we continue our story on Handball in Dungarvan with extracts from the book 'A history of Handball in Munster edited by Sean Murphy

"In 1902, T.Neary of Waterford competed in the Cork All-Ireland Tournament, but was beaten by the winner, J.J.Bowles of Limerick. The Neary family were a very well known handball family at this time.

Gold medals were put up for the annual tournament between the clubs, and at the finals, played in Kilgobnet, the gallery would be packed with about 200 spectators present.

There was a public house a few hundred yards from the alley, and a special license was obtained for the final day. Up to 14 quarters of Guinness and 300 dozen small stout would be consumed on the day.

From about 1935 the original three clubs, Kilgobnet, Waterford City,and Kilnafrehan, were joined by Tournaneena, Modeligo. Stradbally and Lismore, as well as others, such as Tramore, who had joined some years earlier.

At that time there were four different types of ball in use, standard, cock standard, the elephant and Waterford City had a spotted ball. To be continued.

New Slipway Planned For Abbeyside - Deasy

The idea - which originated from members of the sailing club - is to provide another slipway for leisure craft in the town

"Right now the slipway at Stokes Field is hard to access and the seaward wall needs to be knocked and rebuilt to allow for better access and space," Deputy Deasy said.

"The extension of the slipway at the Lookout has been an incredible success this year with a lot more people using the facility. It's causing some congestion and probably can't continue to take all the demand during the summer months on its own.

"For that reason it makes sense to renovate the Stokes Field slipway to provide an additional access point," he said.

Deputy Deasy has also had discussions with Town Council officials about the provisions of a dinghy park.



BEAKS, FEET AND EGGS

A bird does not have any teeth. It uses its beak for catching and cutting up its food. Birds beaks are different shapes depending on what type of food they eat. Birds with long, thin bills use them for probing. Birds with short, strong beaks, such as finches, are usually nut eaters. Beaks that are flattened tend to be used for dabbling through mud. Birds of prey, such as the bald eagle, have strong, hooked beaks for tearing at flesh. Wading birds, such as the avocet have long beaks to probe mud on river beds and beaches. A hummingbird's long beak is ideal for reaching right into tube-shaped flowers. The toucan's colourful beak plays an important part in attracting a mate. The beak is about as long as the toucan's body, but it is not heavy because it is hollow.

Coming In To Land

As it comes into land a bird spreads its tail feathers to act as an air brake. It then stretches its legs forwards towards the ground or a perch. Once landed it closes its tail feathers to help it to balance.

Birds do not walk on the whole area of the foot like humans do, they walk on their toes. This is because the lower joint of the leg is not a knee but more like a heel. Most birds have four toes, three of which point forward and the other points backwards. There are lots of differences between bird's feet according to where and how they live. An ostrich, for instance, has just two toes. The jacana's long toes enable it to walk on floating plants in the marshy areas where it lives. **A Colourful Beak**

A DIFFERENT and delicious way to roast your Sunday leg of lamb.

INGREDIENTS

(serves 6)

1.5kg leg of lamb

3 g butter

1 tblspn olive oil

500g onions, sliced

1kg potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced

salt and black pepper

2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced

1 beef stock cube

250ml hot water parsley

METHOD

Heat the butter and oil in a frying pan. Add the onions and cook gently until softened and just starting to colour.

Place the potato slices in the bottom of a roasting pan. Spoon the onions over them. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Make small incisions around the bone and under the skin of the leg of lamb and insert the garlic slices. Place the lamb on a rack over the potatoes and onions. Season it with plenty of salt and freshly ground pepper. Dissolve the beef stock cube in

the potatoes and onions. Roast the lamb in a hot oven (220∞C) for the first 20 minutes and then lower the oven temperature to moderate (180∞C) and cook for another hour.



THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Some of the hardy annuals can be sown outdoors now which will stand the winter and flower in May and June next year. Sow them thinly where they are to flower and cover lightly with soil. Thin the seedlings out to 8 or 10 cm apart as soon as they can be handled, but leave any further thinning until March or April. Among the best varieties for sowing now are alyssum, calendula, candytuft, cornflower, clarkia, godetia, larkspur and cardinal poppies.

Sow annuals for the greenhouse

Many annuals make excellent pot plants for the conservatory. Sown now, they will start to flower in early spring and continue until May. Sow thinly in well drained seed trays and germinate in an unheated greenhouse or frame.

Make a first planting of anemones. If these are put in successional batches, it is possible to extend the flowering season. The tubers should be planted 8cm deep and 15cm

Pot up more freesias

Make a potting of freesia corms. If these are placed in a frame, and are protected from frost with lights but no attempt is made to force them, they can be introduced to the warm greenhouse a few at a time from November onwards and will supply a succession of flowers in winter and early spring.

Pot on primulas and calceolarias

There may be quite a lot of potting on to be done if growth during August was fairly good. Greenhouse primulas from the April sowing should be about ready for their final pots, while the June sown primulas are also likely to need potting singly into 8cm pots of John Innes potting compost No 1. Pot amaryllis

Pot specially prepared ëChristmas floweringí amaryllis, one bulb in a 10-13cm pot of John Innes potting compost No 1 and put the pots in a light room or greenhouse.

The unemployment rate in the South East remains the joint highest in the country although it has dropped over the last six

The national household survey records an unemployment rate of 5% in the South East the highest in the country alongside the Border area.

The national average is just over 4% while in the Mid-East region it is as low as 3.3%. However, the South East has made a significant drop since last summer when the unemployment rate stood 6.7%.






We hope to work with the existing structures such as County Boards, Clubs, Schools, and Local Sports Partnerships etc to promote and develop athletics for all.


