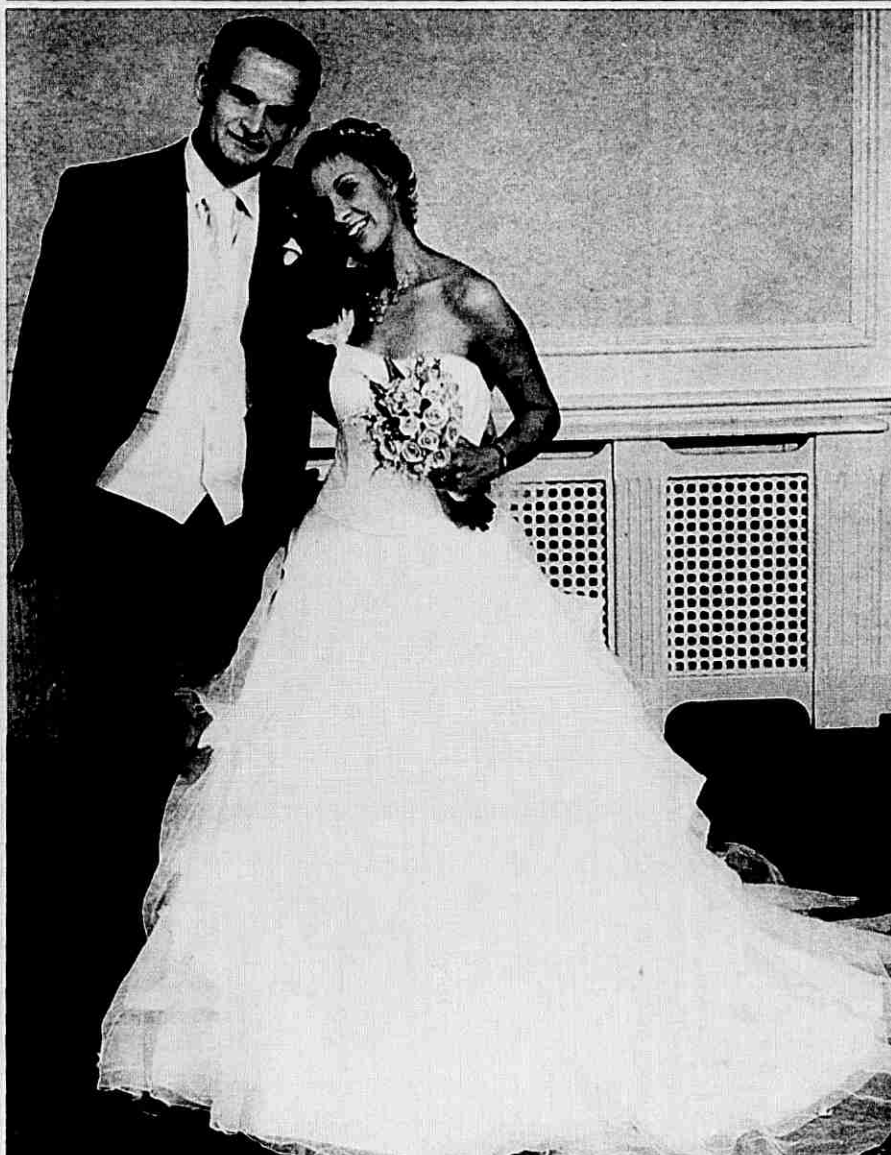

Just Two Reserve Gardai Appointed For County

LACK OF GARDAI HINDERING FIGHT AGAINST ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

Just two people have opted to join the new Garda Reserve Force in County Waterford, despite a continuing spiral of anti-social behaviour and vandalism in the town.

Despite being hailed by Justice Minister and Tanaiste, Michael McDowell, as a force that will bolster and aid the work of the permanent Garda force, Labour town councillor Fiachra O Cailleachair said it would be more beneficial if a commitment to recruit extra Gardai was followed through.

Minister McDowell had promised to recruit 2,000 extra Gardai before the last general election.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

The September meeting of Dungarvan Town Council heard that there were six extra Gardai in the Dungarvan District but just two people have opted to join the Garda Reserve in County Waterford.

The startlingly low figures come as instances of vandalism and anti-social behaviour appear to be in danger of spiralling out of control over the past month.

The Town Park, the former Deise Day Care centre, Quanns and the old Graveyard have all been targeted by vandals in the past four weeks.

According to Fianna Fail councillor, Anne

Marie Rossiter, Quanns was once again the victim of vandalism recently. A bench on the walkway around the Cunnigar Pitch and Putt club was, for the third time in as many weeks, uprooted from its base and thrown into the sea.

TWO MEMBERS OF RESERVE

"Last week, the Garda Representative Association was making the point that the creation of the Garda Reserve Force recently has resulted in only two people being appointed in County Waterford so far," Cllr. O Cailleachair told the Dungarvan Leader.

Abbeyside School Move Plans Roundly Rejected

CALLS FOR NEW SET DOWN POINT AT ABBEYSIDE N.S.

Members of Dungarvan Town Council roundly rejected suggestions that Abbeyside NS should be moved in favour of having one major school in Ballinroad, at its monthly meeting on Monday night last.

Director of Services, and Town Manager, Denis McCarthy restated his view that Abbeyside and Ballinroad would be better served by having one major national school for both localities.

However, councillors across the political divide, expressed their strong opposition to any such move.

COMMENTS

Mr. McCarthy restated his comments on Abbeyside National School - first aired a number of months ago - by saying that Ballinroad was a more suitable location.

He made the comments on foot of an issue raised by Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, who called for a pick up and set

down point for pupils at the school.

Cllr. Kyne stated that the recent return to school and some wet mornings once again confirmed the need for the town council to promote the establishment of an orderly pick up and set down point for this "very busy" and "very important National School."

DISCUSSIONS

Cllr. Kyne drew the council's attention to the fact that part of

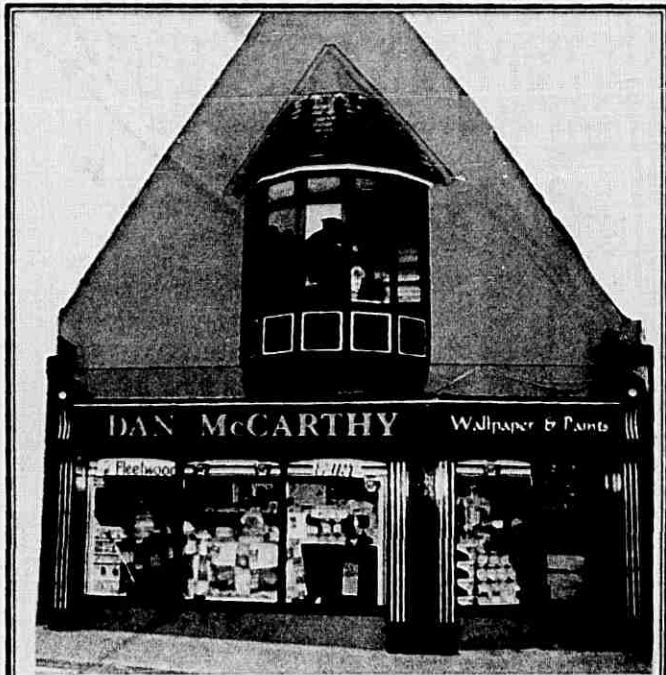

PLAYGROUND FOR BONMAHON

A group of people have come together to form a playground committee to raise funds for a much needed playground facility in Bonmahon. Following two public meetings, facilitated by Rena Cody, Community Enterprise Officer with Waterford County Council, it was identified that there are no facilities for children in the village and with the assistance of Waterford County Council, their aim is to raise €110,000.00 for this state of the art facility.

Sadly over the years Bonmahon village has become a ghost town, having lost their Post Office and as we go to print, the

local shop has closed. 30 years ago children had a playground in this village but today the children do not have anywhere to meet up and play. As children the committee members themselves congregated at this playground and made new friends from the many children who visited Bonmahon with their parents/guardians each year. These committee members have children of their own now and know the value of having a safe and secure place for their children to play and interact with other children. With the local beach sporting a blue flag, visitors flock here every

year and with this facility adjacent to the beach (a site has been secured with Waterford County Council on the public car park); Bonmahon will once again become the centre of activity as it once used to be.

The dedicated committee members are Pamela Fenton, Deirdre Keane, Richard Dowling, Martha Harney, Eamonn Murphy, Louise Mullane, John Fenton and Finola Queally. Look out for major fundraising events which will take place over the coming months and with local support this fantastic facility will become a reality sooner rather than later.

Pure Irish Drops 2006 - Music From The Déise



This year six countries will be visited by the annual Pure Irish Drops tour. The Pure Irish Drops tour began 20 or so years ago and was created by Florian Furst of FF Musik Buro. New Road Safety Measures For Accident Blackspot

A stretch of road which has claimed five lives and injured thirty-two more is to be the subject of new road safety improvements.

September's meeting of Waterford County Council heard that the safety measures will be put in place at a 500m stretch on a crest curve in an area where four major-minor priority junctions on the N25 at the Pike Hill are located.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said that the new measures would reduce the number of lanes that traffic from minor roads will have to cross while accessing the main Waterford/Cork road. Right turn lanes will be provided for mainline traffic wishing to access the local roads and engineering measures will be introduced to reduce speeds within the 60kph area.

At the moment, drivers exit-

ing from the Deelish and the Pike exits have three lanes of traffic to cross when turning right onto the N25. Traffic exiting from Killineen West and East exits have four lanes of traffic to cross when turning onto the N25.

However proposals to close two junctions have met with opposition from the Killineen-Deelish-Glendalligan Residents Group - leading to modified plans from the NRA which will see two junctions open with improved turning bays.

Fine Gael councillor Damien

Geoghegan welcomed the new proposals, saying that they were long overdue. He said they went a long way towards meeting the concerns of the residents. He also said there was a fault with the flashing electronic warning sign on the approach to the Pike Hill from the Waterford side. Instead of flashing "Reduce Speed Now" the sign is inviting motorists to "Speed Now."

Cllr. Pat Nugent, also of Fine Gael, however, argued against getting rid of the climbing lane from Garranbane.

Concern as Post Office is Stripped of Services

Concerns have been expressed over the stripping of services from a post office in Ballyduff Upper in West Waterford.

Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin raised the issue at the September meeting of Waterford County Council.

He said elderly people, often with no transport of their own, are being forced to travel as much as ten miles in certain cases, to collect their allowances.

"It's the thin edge of the wedge from An Post," he said. "I am asking for the full support of the council in the interests of Senior Citizens."

Around four months ago, An Post removed all services except the sorting of letters in the local post office.

Labour councillor, Ger Barron said he was aware of similar problems in small rural post offices in the Kilmac electoral area. Often the rural post offices served as shops as well in local towns and villages, and he questioned the closure of 440 post offices around Ireland last year. Rural post offices were being closed in favour of centralised locations, he said.

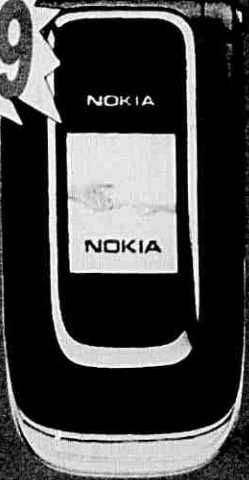

Waterford County Council Honoured for Its "Inspiring Achievements in Improving the World's Infrastructure"

Waterford County Council was a recent recipient of a BE Award of Excellence for its "technical mastery, imagination and leadership" in the field of Civil Engineering. The award was announced at a ceremony held in Charlotte, North Carolina, where the Council was selected from more than 260 nominations worldwide for its "inspiring achievements in improving the world's infrastructure". The BE (Bentley Empowered) Awards of Excellence are hosted by Bentley Systems Incorporated, developers of road design software that is in use worldwide.

The award winning project, entitled "The Integration of the Measurement of Energy Usage into Road Design" (IERD) was part funded by the EU SAVE programme and included development of a computer programme "Joulesave". This programme, which operates with existing road design soft-

ware, allows engineers to calculate the energy usage for the construction and operation of alternative route options. The software calculates the amount of energy used to construct a road and also calculates the anticipated energy consumption of vehicles using the road. The information can then be applied at route selection stage.

The Council was lead partner and co-ordinator of the project which was undertaken by a team of Roads, Energy, Geotechnical and Software experts from Ireland, the U.K., France, Portugal, the Netherlands, the Czech Republic and Sweden. The proposed N25 Dungarvan Bypass was the route used as an example in Ireland; at present there are five different route options. Using the newly developed "Joulesave" software, the five route options were compared in terms of their energy efficiency. Similar comparisons were carried out for se-

lected routes in the Czech Republic, France, Portugal and Sweden. By using the most efficient route, from an energy viewpoint, possible energy savings are very significant.

Commenting on the significance of the project, Executive Engineer, Elizabeth Kennedy, a member of the Council's team who worked on the project, says "The Transport sector accounts for nearly one third of the EU's total final energy consumption, with some 80% attributable to road transport alone. A reduction in the amount of energy used by vehicles would therefore have a significant impact on the EU's total energy consumption."

Ray Butler, Senior Engineer and Project Leader goes on to explain "At the moment, the energy used to construct a road, and used by vehicles on the road, is not taken into account as part of the route selection process. Using the new software, engineers can determine the energy implications of various route options and select the optimum route in terms of energy. The NRA (National Roads Authority) which had a role as

observer in the study, now plans to use the software to incorporate an energy efficiency analysis as part of the environmental assessment on selected new road projects".

County Engineer and Director of Services, John O'Flynn, says "We are obviously delighted with the award and great credit goes to the Tramore House Regional Road Design Team. Nominated in the same category were civil engineering projects as diverse as reconstruction of roads in Tbilisi, Georgia; public transport solutions in Amsterdam; rail commuting solutions in New Delhi and extension of the Metrorail Service from Washington DC to Dulles International Airport". He goes on to say "The fact that an Irish lead team can compete with the world's best is testimony to the calibre of staff and the technical expertise which Ireland can produce. This is a major achievement not only for the County, but for the Country."

Waterford County Council received a commemorative trophy and, in addition, Bentley Systems Incorporated will donate \$1,000 to a charity of the Council's choice.

"Second Best Site" Explored for Ardmore Treatment Plant

A second best site for the location of the new Ardmore Waste Water Treatment was selected at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council. The option was pursued, as the preferred site at Duffcarrick is the subject of an application for a High Court Judicial Review.

The wastewater treatment plant will have an outfall pipe for treated effluent to Ardmore Bay via a 650-m long sea outfall. The back-up site was agreed due to concerns that the treatment plant would delay the other towns in the council's ambitious multi-million seven villages sewerage scheme.

However, a number of residents expressed concern during the recent submissions process about health, noise, odour and the devaluation of property. Among those who lodged objections were Michael Keane, Carole and Ann Troy, Declan Hurley, David Kelly Partnership on behalf of Bridget Hickey, Kevin and Maria Cashman and a joint submission by Patrick Foley, Mary Foley, Brendan and Ber Hurley, Matthew Power, Declan Hurley, Mary Hurley, John P Carlton, Eleanor Carlton, Jerry Foley and Bridgetta Foley.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said that the preferred site was in Duffcarrick on lands owned by the Keane family. An adjacent site owned by Dick Power was offered to the council, was accepted, and was suitable. But following requests and discussion with the Keane family's agent, the council was informed that neither the original preferred site nor the adjacent one were acceptable because the Keane's had future development plans for the land.

The next best site was agreed to be the one on the Dungarvan Road and after a design review of the scheme, this site became the preferred option. This is the decision, which has been the subject of the application for the Judicial Review.

The County Engineer said it was not proposed to extend the sewerage network to Monea, Duffcarrick and the Curragh because they were not currently zoned residential and were beyond the development boundary of Ardmore. All the issues raised would be accommodated within the design and construction of the wastewater treatment plant and all possible constraints and mitigations would be put in place to ensure that the works would have a minimal impact.

Cllr. James Tobin (FF) hoped that Ardmore was not going to hold up the other towns and villages in the waste water treatment scheme. If there were further delays, he warned, the seven villages scheme would be "too late."

Concerns Over Stradbally Quarry

Plans to extend a quarry in Stradbally were greeted with concern at the September meeting of Waterford Co. Council.

Local groups in the area including the Stradbally Tourism and Enterprise Group expressed concern and disappointment over Roadstones attitude to the issue, after they appeared reluctant to comply with the council's request for a planning application and environmental impact statement for their Woodhouse site, and by Labour councillor, Ger Barron who highlighted the concerns.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said it was a topical issue around the country, with new registration system for quarries having been established. When processing the application for Kirwan's Quarry the council would have to consider whether it was appropriate to the environment of the area and the impact to neighbouring lands.

In a relatively short period, it's been claimed, that large amounts of earth have been moved, water lagoons built, the flow of ground water changed and stone quarried. The tourism and enterprise group should believe Roadstoen should contribute towards the funding of community projects such as the renovation of the Barron hall, and making the old medieval church safe.

RETIREMENT

It would be remiss of this column not to pay tribute to the man fondly known among local journalists as the "senior scribe" - John A Murphy - who retired from the Irish Examiner recently. Over the years Johnny has brought many of the biggest stories in Dungarvan and West Waterford onto the front pages of the Examiner. He was the first on the scene to break the infamous Claudia gun-running plot at Helvick to name just one of the stories he has broken over the course of his long and fruitful career. His incisive commentary on political, cultural, social and sporting events has marked the Cashel native out as one of the best journalists to have worked in his chosen profession in the county. Johnny also took new reporters under his wing, giving of his experience and expertise generously to young hacks, including Viewpoint. And he was always on hand to provide advice and help whenever it was needed. We wish Johnny a long and happy retirement.

TIDY TOWNS

A remarkable contrast was drawn in succeeding weeks between the success County Waterford enjoyed in this year's Tidy Towns competition and the scourge of illegal dumping in some of the most scenic areas of our county. Hot on the heels of a chorus of congratulations for the achievements of hard working voluntary committees around the county in securing Tidy Town honours, the scourge of illegal dumping once more raised its ugly head. While no one would wish to take the gloss off the county's achievement in taking Gold, Silver and Bronze medals (for Lismore, Stradbally and Dungarvan respectively) local councillors James Tobin and Ciaran O Riain both told of areas scarred by recent fly-tipping. "Only jail is good enough for the perpetrators" may be tough words from Cllr. Tobin, but they are sincerely meant. After all, this is anti-social behaviour in its truest and ugliest sense.

DECENTRALISATION

How long ago is it now since we heard that Decentralisation was moving a step closer to becoming a reality? We now understand that Decentralisation of the Ordnance Survey of Ireland with its 200 high quality jobs won't be coming on stream until about 2009 at the earliest. While, it's certainly positive that we now have a date to pin our hopes on, we've seen many such deadlines come and go.

A year ago we learned that a number of Civil Servants bought homes in Dungarvan, in the expectation that a small advance group would set up in the town. However, a change in Government policy put a halt to this, as Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan warned of at the time. The future looks no clearer than it did at that stage. And indeed in the past year or so the numbers applying to move and work in Dungarvan remain static. At best just 47 of the 199 staff in the OSI's Dublin HQ have applied to work in Dungarvan. Surely the Government's original plan to set up an small advance section - which in turn would have a roll on effect of attracting others to move to the town - was right on the money. While a site was purchased in Shandon for new offices some time ago, the question of who will fill it, still remains pertinent.

OPENING OF CAPPOQUIN CRECHE

Heartiest of congratulations to the Cappoquin Development Company and all others who, over the past months and years, have worked tirelessly to develop the new childcare facility in Cappoquin. It is the first phase of plans for a state-of-art Community Centre, which will be built at a cost of 2.9 million euro. The huge level of work, fundraising and campaigning, which was done on a largely voluntary basis, shows the commitment and dedication there is in the development of Cappoquin. This is a community venture that will significantly add to the quality of life of what is increasingly becoming a very vibrant town. The new childcare facility, which was opened by Deputy Wilkinson last week, is already full to capacity with 60 children enrolled.

Report Needed on Coastal Protection as Weather Warnings Continue

The condition of the county's shoreline line was raised during a meeting of Waterford County Council recently.

Cllr. Ger Barron, of Labour, called for a report amid warnings in the last number of weeks of severe flooding in areas of the county.

Extreme high tides – the highest in twenty years – are forecast in October and November. The results of storms, climatic conditions and higher than normal tides could have a

devastating effect on low-lying areas in the county. The result of the coming together of these conditions could have an even more serious effect than the flooding of two years ago when a number of properties on Davitts Quay were damaged.

The Cunnigar, which acts as a natural barrier, could also suffer from the conditions.

A spokesperson for the county council said they are prepared to deal with any problem that might arise.

SUPERFOOD

There has been a lot of publicity in recent times about various 'superfoods' which are so called because they contain such a large quantity of essential nutrients and have numerous health benefits. Superfoods include oats, garlic and wheatgrass, but one of the most popular superfoods is spirulina (arthrospira platensis), a species of algae which grows on the lakes of Central and South America.

Under a microscope, spirulina looks like spirals of green thread, from which it derives its name. It contains high levels of the plant pigment chlorophyll and turns the lakes on which it grows an amazing blue-green colour.

Spirulina is very rich in a form of protein which is much easier to digest and absorb than that found in meat. This makes it ideal for people who are undernourished, run down or debilitated. It also contains the full range of individual amino acids which are the building blocks of protein. Many of these cannot be produced by the body and therefore form an essential part of a healthy diet. Individual amino acids play important roles in the body such as participating in thyroid gland function, energy production and tissue repair.

In addition, spirulina contains the full range of B vitamins, including vitamin B12 which is normally only found in animal products. This

makes it an ideal supplement for vegetarians and vegans. Furthermore, it is a very rich source of iron which is easy to absorb and does not cause constipation. That's good news for anyone who has a tendency to develop anaemia.

Spirulina also contains an extremely broad range of other vitamins (including the antioxidant vitamins A,C and E), minerals and trace elements (including calcium, potassium, phosphorus, iodine, magnesium, zinc, copper and manganese), plus enzymes and fatty acids, all in an easily absorbable form.

As well as providing a very rich source of nutrition, spirulina is also an excellent detox remedy. It helps to clear toxins from the body, including traces of toxic metals such as mercury and lead. It also helps to remove harmful microbes such as *Candida albicans* which can cause digestive disturbance, thrush, and numerous other health problems.

Finally, spirulina has a very beneficial effect on the immune system which is helpful for people who suffer from recurrent infections or allergies. So it really does live up to its reputation as a superfood!

The most cost effective way to take spirulina is to buy it as a powder and take 2-5 grams per day divided into 2 or 3 doses. half a teaspoon of the powder can be mixed with a full glass of

water and taken three times a day, but the slightly salty taste and dark green colour can make it unappetising to drink. Since spirulina absorbs so much water it is impossible to make it dissolve in a small quantity of water. Perhaps the best way to take spirulina powder is to add it to a homemade smoothie using a blender.

Capsules and tablets are also available but they are more expensive and it is necessary to take 2-6 capsules three times a day. If you are taking spirulina for the first time it is advisable to start on a very low dose such as one or two capsules per day and gradually increase to the full dose over a period of 6 weeks or more. The detoxifying effect can occasionally lead to worsening of symptoms during the early stages.

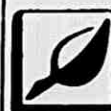

The Nest Builders

A Bird does not have to learn how to build a nest. It is instinctive. However, birds do get better at nest-building with practice. The variety of nests is enormous, from the simplest scrape in the mud to elaborately woven masterpieces. Some birds build mounds of debris up to 2 m (6.5 ft) high, puffins nest in rabbit burrows and other birds nest in holes in trees. The biggest nests are built by the bald eagle of America, the golden eagle in Scotland and the mallee fowl of Australia.

HOMES IN TREES
The quetzal of the rainforests of Central and South America nests in holes in trees. It feeds mainly on fruit. With its yellow beak, bright greenish-gold plumage, red belly and tail feathers up to 105 cm (42 in) long the male quetzal is a spectacular sight. The ancient Mayan and Aztec peoples regarded the quetzal as a sacred bird. The quetzal is the emblem of Guatemala and the name of its currency.

HORNBILLS LIVE IN MUD NESTS
Female hornbills of Africa and Asia nest in a hole in a tree. But then block up the entrance. The male brings dollops of mud which the female mixes with her own droppings before plastering it around the hole, leaving an opening just big enough for the male to pass food in.

MOST INTRICATE NESTS
The most intricate nests of the bird kingdom are those of the weaver birds. They weave a nest using hundreds of long stands of grass. The male bird builds the nest, first tying lengths of grass to a branch and then using them as the skeleton on which to attach more grass. The entrance to the nest is at the bottom, and the eggs are laid on a platform built inside.

Using the Nests of Others

Some birds do not bother to build a nest. They use those belonging to other birds. The female cuckoo picks a nest which already contains eggs and then lays one of her own in it. When the cuckoo hatches the young bird throws out all the other eggs and any birds that are hatched, so that it has all the food to itself. Small birds of Asia and Africa, called honey-guides, also lay their eggs in the nest of other birds, as do the widow-birds of Africa and the brown-headed cowbird of North America and Canada.



DID YOU KNOW?

- You have heard of a gaggle of geese, but how about a watch of nightingales, a cast of hawks and a murmuration of starlings!
- Some birds build their nests near to hornets' nests to keep away unwelcome intruders!
- Weaver birds in Africa use up to 300 strands of grass in their beautifully woven nest.
- Australian megapodes keep their eggs warm in enormous piles of rotting compost.
- The South American oven-bird is known as 'the baker' because it makes its nest from a dough of sand and cow dung which bakes solid in the sun.
- The male emperor penguin keeps his egg not in a nest, but balanced on top of his feet!

the landholding adjacent to the school has been zoned educational some time ago with a view towards reflecting the on-going needs of the school.

He said he was aware that some dialogue has taken place between representatives of the landowner and school management, which the council had hoped, might bring this project to a conclusion.

But it seems now that

progress cannot be made in the near future and he urged the town manager to prioritise this transfer of land to the school or council authorities to facilitate progress.

SCHOOL BUS

Fianna Fail councillor Nuala Ryan, a member of staff at the school, also said that something needs to be done, as the school bus cannot drive up to the school.

In response, Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said he

would take this on as a priority item.

However, his comments that, in the long term, Scoil Mhuire could be moved to a new site in Ballinroad met with strong resistance.

REZONING

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Cllr. Kyne rejected the management's proposal of a move to serve the ever-expanding populations of Abbeyside and Ballinroad.

Cllr. Kyne said many schools in the area are coming under extra demand for places. "But," he added, "the perfect location of Scoil Mhuire should be augmented with extra land which in the past was rezoned for education."

"Scoil Mhuire can and must

be extended. And any past or present suggestion to move the school from Abbeyside, does not have my support."

REJECTED

His view was echoed by several other councillors at the meeting with many thoroughly rejecting the proposal of a single site development between Abbeyside and Ballinroad schools.

In conclusion, Cllr. Kyne said that the council, the school management and the Department of Education must try to manage the school's need for expansion in an orderly way while protecting the facilities of this, "highly regarded and very important school" which "serves the catchment area of Abbeyside so well."

Nora Flynn To Head Association Of ACCC

She is a member of numerous Local Government committees with a special interest in the principles of the Barcelona Declaration, which aims to embed concern for the disabled in how local councils plan and organise their local services.

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Italian-style sausage and fried mushrooms

STUCK for ideas for how to make something really interesting with sausages? Then try this delicious and easy recipe to give them some Italian appeal.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 6)
- 1kg chipolata sausages or Italian sausages
- 1 tblspn oil
- 1 onion, thinly sliced
- 1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
- 185g mushrooms, sliced
- 3 tblspns tomato paste
- 425g can tomatoes, roughly chopped
- 1 beef stock cube
- 250ml water
- 1 tspn dried basil or 1 tblspn fresh basil, finely chopped
- 2 tblspns parsley, finely chopped
- 1 tspn sugar
- Salt and pepper
- Black olives

Method:

HEAT oil in frying pan and fry the sausages until golden brown all over – about 6-8 minutes. Remove from pan and drain on absorbent paper. Pour excess oil from pan, leaving about 2 tblspns in pan. Return pan to the heat, add onion and garlic and fry until onion has softened slightly but not browned – about 3 minutes. Add mushrooms and fry until they just begin to wilt and juice runs from them – about 2 minutes.



Add tomato paste, tomatoes, stock cube, water, basil, parsley and sugar. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, lower heat and simmer

uncovered for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Return sausages to the pan with the olives and simmer for a further 5 minutes.

Hearty bread and butter pud

THIS is a simple but filling desert for people with hearty appetites.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 6)
- 300ml (1/2 pint) single cream and 300ml milk or 600 ml (1 pint) milk
- 4 thin slices of day-old white bread
- 50g (2oz) sultanas
- 25g (1oz) mixed peel (optional)
- Grated rind of 1 lemon
- 50g (2oz) butter, preferably unsalted
- 2 eggs
- 2 egg yolks
- 25g (1oz) sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 tablespoon jelly (ie shred-less) marmalade, heated

Method:

Butter the slices of bread and cut each into four triangles.

Place a layer of bread in the base of a buttered one-litre (about two-pint) pie dish.

Sprinkle the sultanas, the mixed peel, if using, and grated lemon rind over the top and cover with the remaining bread triangles.

Beat the cream, if using, with the milk, eggs, egg yolks and sugar.

Strain the mixture over the bread. Set aside to stand for 30 minutes.

Grate a little nutmeg over the surface and bake in a preheated oven, 180°C (350°F, gas mark 4), for 30-40 minutes.

When the pudding is cooked, remove it from the oven and brush the hot marmalade over the top. Serve hot.

Many people enjoy this dish with custard or cream, but ice cream is also a delicious accompaniment.

CHINESE SOUP WITH MEATBALLS

THIS Oriental starter is almost a meal in itself.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 2)
- Meatballs
- 250g lean minced pork
- 2 salad onions, finely chopped
- 30ml light soy sauce
- 5ml sesame oil
- 5ml fresh root ginger, peeled and finely grated
- 30ml light soy sauce
- Soup
- 600ml chicken stock
- 1ml Chinese Five Spice powder
- 10ml grated root ginger
- 1 red pepper cored, deseeded and thinly sliced
- 50g medium egg noodles
- 50g bean sprouts
- 3 Chinese leaves, shredded
- 2 salad onions, trimmed and shredded
- 30ml freshly chopped coriander

Method:

Mix together all of the meatball ingredients except the oil, then form into 12-16 balls the size of large marbles.

Heat the oil in a large saucepan, add the meatballs, and cover and fry in two batches for 6 minutes each batch. Lift out and drain on kitchen paper.

Pour the stock into the saucepan, then stir in the Five Spice powder, ginger, soy sauce and red pepper. Cover and simmer for 5 minutes.

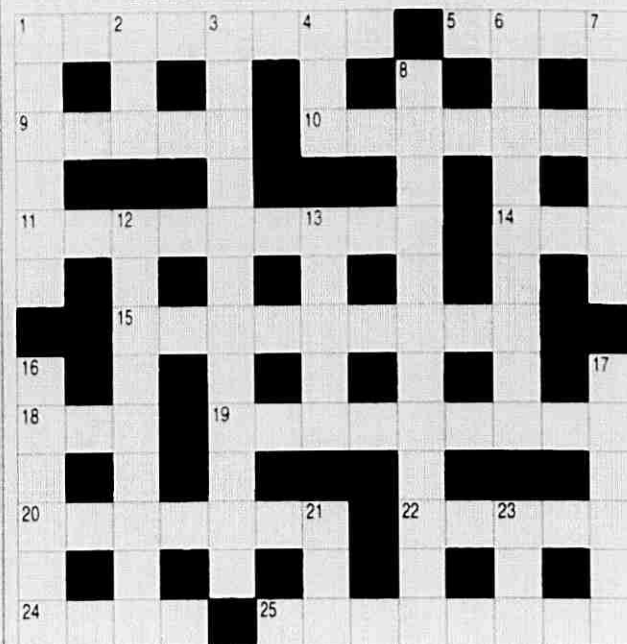
Place the noodles in a bowl, then pour over boiling water and leave to soak for 5 minutes.

Return the meatballs to the saucepan with the bean sprouts, Chinese leaves, salad onions and chopped coriander, then cook for 4 mins.

Pile noodles into large soup bowls, top with the meatballs, vegetables and soup and garnish with coriander.

Theobroma cacao is a evergreen tree growing to 8 metres. The word "chocolate" derives from the name given to this tree by the Aztecs. Native to Mexico and Central America, cacao is a major crop throughout the tropics. The seedpods are collected twice yearly.

The seed pulp contains xanthines, a fixed oil and many constituents responsible for its flavour. The seeds contain very small amounts of endorphins, which are powerful painkillers that occur naturally within the body. Though cacao is most often used as a food, it also has therapeutic value as a nervous system stimulant. In Central America and the Caribbean, the seeds are taken as a heart and kidney tonic. The plant may be used to treat angina and as a diuretic. In 1994 Argentinian researchers showed that cacao extracts counter the bacteria responsible for boils and septicaemia.

FABULOUS LISMORE MAKE HISTORY WITH MUNSTER CUP DOUBLE

In an incredible display of great skill, courage and composure, Lismore made history last Sunday when lifting the Munster Junior Cup for the first time in 41 years and in doing so completed a cup double never previously achieved. It was a final packed with emotion and joy as the multi national team, regarded as minnows in Irish cricket, ran through a high class Middleton side to capture the Munster crown. Jones put on a handful of boundaries and looked at ease when Campion was nicked for an LBW. Then Richard Tonks entered the fray and gave a magnificent display at the crease. He slowly eased to his fifty (the club's 11th player to score 50+ this year) blazing a hatful of balls to the boundaries and continued to 61 before being ousted. Lismore were looking in good shape at this point but the tail did not wag as expected and Lismore closed on a total of 164 runs all out.

The talk over tea suggested that the Lismore total would not suffice but captain Sean Willoughby gathered his team together and prepared them for one big onslaught on Middleton. The opening partnership put on 6 runs in the first over and had all the air of

confidence about them. However what was to happen in the hours ahead was almost beyond belief. Mubbin Ashraf, Dave Ind, Brian Power and Ryan Thuillier gave the performance of their lives in an extraordinary display of bowling. With fast bowler Ryan Thuillier causing havoc amongst the batsmen, Ashraf launched in his opening over to take out the Middleton number 1 and followed with the number 2 an over later. Then Brian Power used his swing / spin combination to wipe out the middle order with Dave Ind taking two more, one being caught superbly by Jon Russell. Middleton were stunned and crumbled completely under the force when Ashraf was re introduced and another wicket was soon to fall. With Power on the mark once again, the scene was set for Ashraf to claim the title. And in a moment of class the stumps flew high in the air and a mighty roar ensued as Lismore emerged victorious bowling out Middleton for a mere 50 runs to record and 114

run victory. The bowling figures showed Ashraf (4 for 10), Power (4 for 18) and Ind (2 for 2). There were great scenes of jubilation as Lismore gathered to receive the Munster Junior Cup and winners medals. Captain Sean Willoughby thanked his heroic players for their efforts and celebrated one of the club's greatest seasons of all. An official club celebration in Lismore will shortly be announced offering the town an opportunity to meet the team and share in this great success. Lismore Castle Arts is delighted to present Exploring the Whole World: the Revolutionary Art of Richard Long, a gallery lecture by Richard Cork, on Thursday 28th September 2006 at 7.30pm.

He also writes on art for a wide range of other publications, and his books include a two-volume study of Vorticism, awarded the John Llewelyn Rhys Prize in 1976; Art Beyond the Gallery, winner of the Banister Fletcher Award for the best art book in 1985; and an acclaimed four-volume paperback collection of his critical writings on modern art, published by Yale University Press in 2003. His latest book, Michael Craig-Martin, is published in October to coincide with the artist's retrospective exhibition at the Irish Museum of Modern Art, Dublin. In 1989-90 he was appointed Slade Professor of Fine Art at Cambridge, and from 1992-5 the Henry Moore Senior Fellow at the Courtauld Institute. He is a frequent broadcaster, both on radio and television, and acted as a judge for many leading art prizes and commissions, among them the Turner Prize. He has organised major contemporary and historical exhibitions at Tate, the Hayward Gallery, the Royal Academy, the Serpentine Gallery and elsewhere in Britain and Europe.

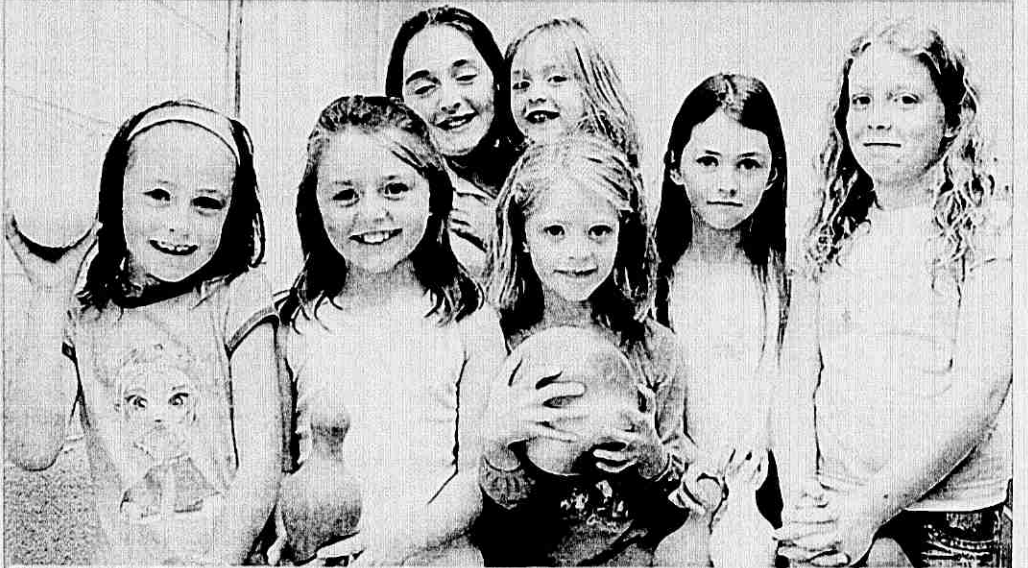

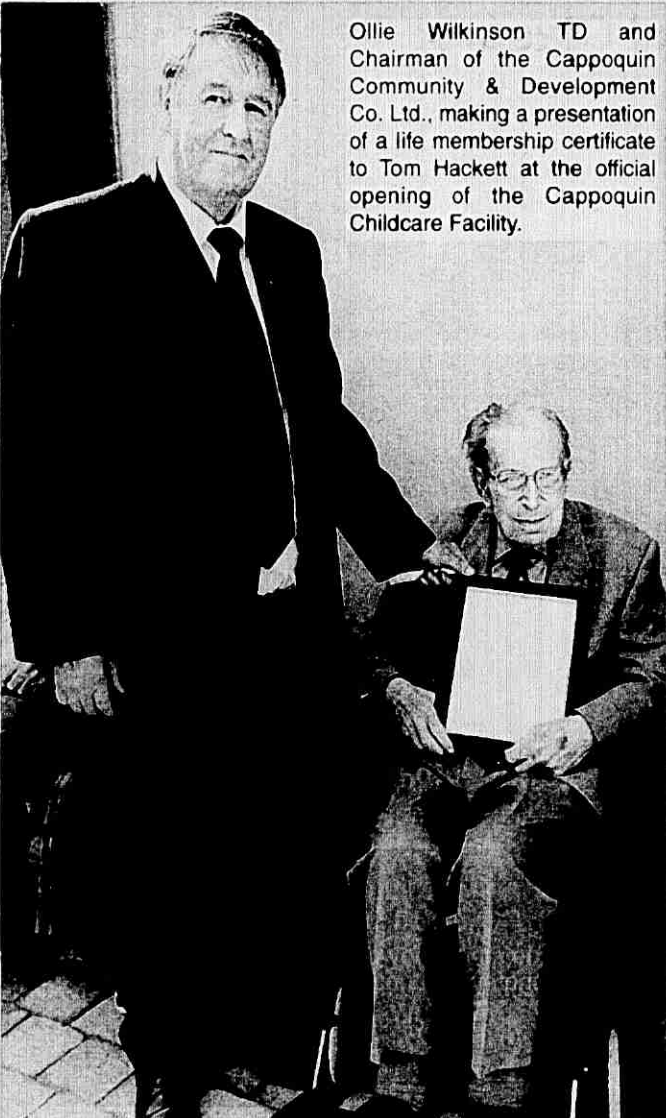

TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION 2006 Ups And Downs For Clashmore In The National Competition

The 2006 National Tidy Towns report had highs and lows for our very hard working committee. While we gained one mark on last years overall score, going from 237 to 238, it was devastating to note that the total marks this year has risen to 400 from last years 300. So overall the finish line is getting further from our grasp.

There was good news, however, for one Clashmore business Liam agus Ann Ui Dhomhnaill were chosen to receive a special award of E2,000. They were chosen for the Foras na Gaeilge award for "Teach Tabhairne Ui Dhomhnaill" in the village.

The following is a detailed report on Clashmore:

Overall Approach

Clashmore is welcome to the 2006 National Tidy Towns competition, thank you for your submission and support material, this facilitated the adjudication. The committee and community in general have a good awareness of their cultural heritage and this is reflected in your heritage developments. There is also strong commitment to the environment which is obvious to even the most casual passer by. Clashmore considered for the promotion of a Heritage award.

The Built Environment

The Rising Sun (Beresford's) is beautifully presented and the Old Still looks well also. The O Domhnaill had been considered for the Irish Best Shop Front Award and its presentation is faultless. The sign for petrol and diesel is far too large for these small premises. The premises located beside the Mace shop is needed of rehabilitation and looks as though work may be in progress here. The Old Church/Heritage Centre, together with the burial grounds, is neat in presentation and the building itself has been beautifully restored. It's use as a Heritage Centre is most appropriate, both the school and its local car park looked well.

Landscaping

The group is a landmark feature of your village and is presented to the highest standard. Well done! Landscaping at entrances to the village and throughout has been neatly maintained and younger trees are maturing well.

Wildlife And Natural Amenities

Your interpretative panel with information on nature walks within the environs of Clashmore is a wonderful feature and offers a great incentive to take these walks. We look forward to the installation of your Wildlife Interpretative Panel, it was not in place as you had hoped by the end of June. The riverbanks were admired for their maintenance and presentation. The beer bottles seen in the river was taken as a once off incident. The walk to Tobar Mochua from the Village centre is a pleasant development and indeed the Tobar Mochua development has been considered for the promotion of a Heritage Award as noted above.

Litter Control

A small amount of take away litter together with beer and coke cans were seen on the verge on the new housing estate on the hill. This was a pity as it undermined an otherwise excellent litter free presentation. Your continued use of litter teams including visits to the local school promoting anti litter awareness via a poster competition, is an excellent initiative. Keep us informed of any other activities under this heading, as they can be a source of additional marks.

Waste Minimisation

Well done on highlighting waste minimisation at the school. The bottle bank at the G.A.A. pitch has been noted. We suggest it be placed on a plinth as the area surrounding is weedy and untidy looking. Circulate households and the businesses and wider community regarding the need to reduce the amount of waste produced in addition to collecting recycling, be as creative as possible for devising

new ways of doing. Perhaps a good start would be to encourage each household to use a composting bin. The Race Against Waste booklet included in this years Tidy Towns Pack contains a number of good ideas.

Tidiness

Some stretches of footpaths were in need of scuffing to remove the build up of stones and general debris. The curtilage area of the site beside the Mace shop has already been noted and at the time of inspection looked quite untidy. Well done on your initiative to meet the Council Engineer regarding the need for channels for the down pipes on the footpaths. We wish you every success on this and other initiatives.

Residential Areas

Gardens on the road to the school were admired for their colour and design on street houses were neatly presented and new residential developments are attractive with wonderful landscapes and stone walls entrances. More work in progress has been noted. Hopefully new residents will be welcomed to the Community and encouraged to participate in the environmental and cultural

development of Clashmore. Continue to reveal and refurbish old stone walls as these can be an attractive feature of the village.

Roads, Streets and Back Areas

Roads and footpath surfaces and the bridge were reasonably well presented and nameplates and grass verges of approach roads looked very well. No doubt the overhead service cables will eventually be ducted and service poles removed and attractive lamp standards be put in place.

Dungarvan Leader - this Week in the Garden

Oriental touch for any garden

WITH dry summers becoming the norm, many gardeners are thinking of growing ornamental grasses, bamboos, sedges and rushes.

They make perfect specimen plants to make a bold statement in any garden, or they can be grown together in borders.

The archy, upright stems, feathery flowers and subtly coloured seedheads make them ideal for indoor or outdoor display.

Grasses are often confused with other grass-like ornamental plants, particularly the sedges and rushes, but each of them belongs to a distinct and separate plant family.

True grasses in those of the Gramineae family almost always have hollow round stems with solid nodes at regular intervals.

The woody-stemmed perennial bamboos are good examples with the obvious hollowness of their canes.

GRASSES

These vary widely in colour and habit. The architectural qualities of the taller grasses make them a striking feature in the herbaceous border while low-growing grasses provide a contrast at the front of the bed.

Most grasses prefer full sun, an open position and well-drained but moisture retentive soil.

Very fertile soil encourages foliage at the expense of flowers. A few species, mainly the tall ones, need moist soil and grow alongside water.

BAMBOOS

Evergreen and woody-stemmed with delicately attractive foliage, bamboos make ideal specimen plants. A few species flower regularly but most do not bloom for many years. Bamboos need lots of space and they can grow

over two meters tall with an arch spread of seven meters and they often spread quickly.

The canes take about three years to mature although some species, such as the *Phyllostachis nigra*, will develop its polished black stems during its second year.

Bamboos grow strongly in most soils once established and form excellent screens, hedges or windbreaks. Many are tropical but a large number are hardy in our climate.

Sedges and rushes

Sedges have three sides stems that are solid and pithy throughout.

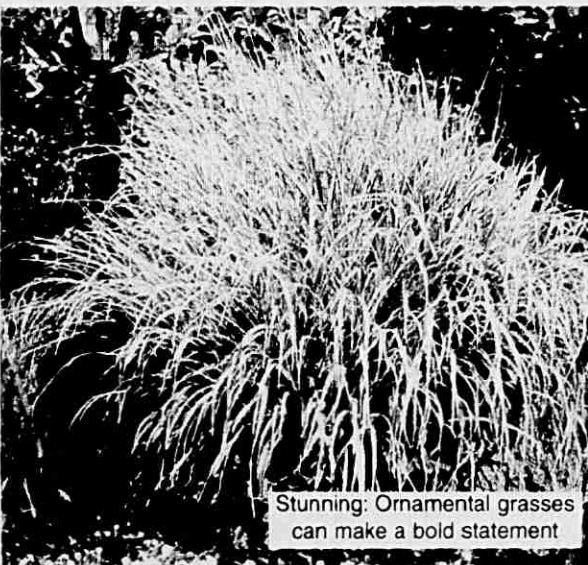
The leaf blades tightly encase the stem coming up from each side in threes. They cannot be easily split or rolled back. The family Juncaceae contain two cultivated genera, both commonly known as rushes.

Woodrushes are most appealing when used to provide spreading ground cover in areas of shades woodland. A number of sedges, with their attractive gold foliage also offer fine colour contrasts in any border.

In general most ornamental grasses require little care as long as they are grown in the correct, properly prepared site. Sedges and rushes are largely treated as grasses.

On dry soils plenty of organic matter should be dug in to ensure adequate moisture retention. The organic matter, however, should not be too rich in nutrients, so leaf mould is ideal.

Feeding is rarely needed, but a dressing of calcium silicate helps to improve the tensile

strength of bamboo shoots.

After flowering, annual grasses should be dead-headed to prevent self-seeding, but do not dead-head perennials. As grasses wither and become unsightly, trim off the old growth.

In early spring cut back the plant to ground level to encourage new growth.

Grasses from warm climates should be cut back in the spring so the old foliage acts as a blanket to help protect the plants from frosts. Pampas grass may be cut back using shears in the autumn in milder areas, or spring in colder zones.

Remember to wear gloves when dealing with many grasses, especially pampas, as the leaf edges can be very sharp.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Start to plant evergreen shrubs

From now until mid-October is the ideal time for planting hardy evergreen shrubs lifted from open ground.

You cannot do this if the weather is very hot or the ground is dry, but neither condition is likely to continue for long.

Plant firmly and stake all big specimens. Later on, if winds are very cold and drying, erect temporary shelters of hurdles, evergreen boughs, or sacking between stakes to protect the shrubs, particularly on the north and east sides.

Plant violets in frames

Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass.

Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

Plant rooted carnation layers

Carnation layers pegged down at the end of July should be well rooted by this time. Scrape away a little of the soil and see how things are. If there are plenty of fibrous roots around the cut area sever the layers from the parent plants and a few days later lift them in each with a good ball of soil and transfer them to their flowering quarters or pot them in 10-13 cm pots, place them in a frame, and plant them out next March.

Pick all tomatoes

Outdoor tomatoes are not likely to ripen any more on the plants now, so it is as well to pick all the fruits that are showing some trace of colour and stand them in a sunny window to ripen.

Absolutely green fruits can be made into chutney. The summer crop of tomatoes under glass will be coming to an end and as every inch of greenhouse space is likely to be needed in the next few weeks, it is a good idea to clear these, treating them in the same way as outdoor fruits.

TALLOW NOTES

In the final speech of the evening, Nora 'put on the style' and had us all in stitches (!) with her dead-pan commentary on fashions of the past and present.

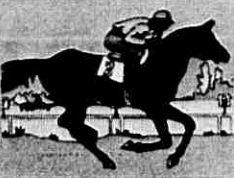

The Cartier Racing Awards, European horse racing's equivalent of the Oscars, are now in their 16th year, and honour the equine champions of the year, plus one person.

The coveted awards are revealed and presented after the end of the 2006 Flat season at the Four Seasons Hotel in Mayfair, London, England, on Wednesday, November 15.

The eight horse awards are determined by points earned in Pattern races combined with the opinions of a panel of racing journalists plus votes from readers of the Racing Post and The Daily Telegraph, a system which accurately rewards supreme excellence.

CHELTENHAM NEWS

Prize money at the 2007 Festival will increase by £315,000 to £3,185,000 (nearly 11%) as enhanced profits are reinvested in The Festival's four-day format. The two Grade One Novice Chases, the Irish Independent Arkle and the Royal & Sun Alliance Chase, each get £30,000 boosts to reach £170,000, while £25,000 increases will lift the totipot Cheltenham Gold Cup to £425,000, the Ryanair Chase to £175,000 and the Racing Post Plate to £100,000. The Smurfit Kappa Champion Hurdle, Queen Mother Champion Chase, Ladbrokes World Hurdle, Anglo Irish Bank Supreme Novices' Hurdle, JCB Triumph Hurdle and former Royal & Sun Alliance Hurdle all go up by £20,000. The remaining £60,000 is shared amongst nine races including £10,000 that puts the Weatherbys Champion Bumper on £50,000.

Announcing this financial injection into Jump Racing, Cheltenham's Managing Director Edward Gillespie said: "The sheer scale of these increases is unprecedented and could not have been achieved without generous uplifts in sponsorship and being able to plough back the benefit of extending The Festival.

"The new race average of more than £132,000 makes this the most valuable racing festival, even ahead of Royal Ascot."

Whilst record prize money looks certain to stimulate even greater interest from owners, there will be a premium on getting a run in the handicap hurdle races with safety figures being reduced from 30 to 28 and, for the National Hunt Chase, from 24 to 20 in line with the other novice chases. After much debate, the reduction in field size will be the only change in the conditions for the National Hunt Chase, which at one time looked likely to revert to previous restrictions that excluded hurdle winners. Explaining Cheltenham's decision to leave the four-mile race as a genuine novice chase, Edward Gillespie said: "The HRA report into the unacceptable number of fatalities at this year's Festival was unable to identify any specific causes but made a number of positive recommendations. "We have discussed these with trainers and many other people both in Britain and Ireland and work is being progressed to further protect The Festival ground during fixtures from October to December. These measures include reducing safety figures at the December and January meetings to 16.

"A thorough analysis of the National Hunt Chase since this included hurdle winners in 2002 clearly shows that, while tragically all three horses killed this year would not have previously qualified, nor would 43% percent of the winners and placed horses over the past five years. "The change in the conditions has undoubtedly improved the quality of the race, as shown by the rise in the average rating from 122 to 132, and we feel it would be a retrograde step to return its conditions to exclude better horses.

"Expert opinion has consistently suggested we should address safety figures and the significant reduction by four in this race to bring it into line with the other three novice chases is wholly consistent with our long-term objective of continuing to attract and reward top quality contenders across the entire Festival. "Also reducing the numbers in handicap hurdle races should have a beneficial effect on the lead-up to The Festival, as it will be more competitive than ever for

The 16/1 winner just got the better of Be My Queen (6/1) by a short head after a protracted battle in the straight and Madden will have been particularly pleased with this success as the runner up was ridden by six time English Champion Jockey, Kieren Fallon.

Tamazug Regains Winning Thread

The Kevin Prendergast trained Tamazug bounced back to winning ways with a decisive success in the featured Donnelly's Of Barna Race at Galway on Tuesday. The 4/5 favourite gave Declan McDonogh another victory in his quest for his first Champion Jockeys' Title and this useful filly is now likely to be raised in class on her next outing.

Oxx and Kinane had earlier combined to win the C.L. Weld Park Stakes with the impressive Arch Swing (8/1) while they completed a fine afternoon's work when Rhythm 'N Roots (10/1) took the concluding twelve furlong handicap.

Teofilo Too Good In National Stakes

The Jim Bolger trained Teofilo, ridden by Kevin Manning, stamped his class on the Laing O'Rourke National Stakes (Group One) at the Curragh on Sunday to prove too strong for Aidan O'Brien's Holy Roman Emperor by a length and a quarter. A first ever victory in this very important two year old race for the trainer and rider, Bolger's charge is now unbeaten after four outings and is the new ante-post favourite for the English 2000 Guineas and the Epsom Derby next year on the strength of this impressive display.

Minister Turns Sod on New Stand At Galway Racecourse

Minister John O'Donoghue, Minister for Arts, Sports & Tourism, turned the new sod on the new Killanin Stand at Galway Racecourse on Tuesday 12th September. The Killanin Stand is being built at a cost of €22 million and will accommodate 7,000 people with seating for 700 on the balcony. This new development was grant-aided by Horse Racing Ireland to the tune of €10 million and Michael J. McNamara & Co were awarded the contract for the construction of the stand. The facility will consist of 4 floors with the ground floor and first floor reserved specifically for supporters of the Galway Races. These two floors will supply 700 free seats, bar facilities, snack areas, restaurant area, tote hall and toilet facilities while the upper floors will house panoramic restaurants built to standards that will rival any supporting developments in the world.

Oaks Boosted By Increase in Prizemoney

The Darley Irish Oaks will enjoy a major cash injection in 2007 following the decision by Darley to increase their commitment to the Group One Curragh Classic, bringing the total prizemoney to €500,000. The race has been won by the likes of Ouija Board, Petrushka, User Friendly, Ramruma and Dance Design in recent years while Aidan O'Brien's Alexandrova gave the trainer his first success in the twelve furlong contest last July.

Yeats Melbourne Decision Soon

Aidan O'Brien's Yeats, impressive winner of the Ascot Gold Cup and the Goodwood Cup in recent months before meeting with a surprise defeat in last Saturday's Irish Field St Leger at the Curragh, currently heads the betting market for the Melbourne Cup in Australia on the first Tuesday in November. However, following his below par performance at the Curragh on Saturday, a decision on whether he bids for the 'race that stops a nation' will not be made for at least a week according to his trainer. O'Brien has never had a runner in the Melbourne Cup and Yeats will have to shoulder top weight but there is no doubt that if he can reproduce his early season form, he would have an outstanding chance of giving Ireland their third win in this most famous of races after Vintage Crop (1993) and Media Puzzle (2002) obliged for Dermot Weld.

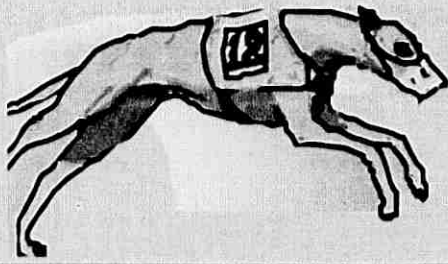

Quick Flush and Swift Mermaid chased Jammie Tart 5/2 throughout but the West Waterford trained bitch kept on in fine style to deny Quick Flush by two lengths.

In heat two the Bill Marlin owned Lil Bow Wow (Pinewood Blue-Sideshow Mel) 5/1 came with a tremendous late burst to win out in 28.67. Gaytime Tia and Mollys Award dominated matters up front for a long period but picking up the leaders in fine style Lil Bow Wow stormed home on the wide outside to outstay Gaytime Tia 6/4 by two lengths.

Lolos Choice was sent off the 6/4 favourite in heat three but fluffed her lines early on courtesy of a poor start. It was a fast starting Adamant Taylor who set the early gallop here but 4/1 chance Tyrur Margaret (Honcho Classic-Tyrur Fiona) quickly went in hot pursuit of the leader. Striking the front on the rails between the final two bends Tyrur Margaret eased her way clear to beat Adamant Taylor with Tearaway Lady just behind in third spot. Catunda Marie was sent off the evens favourite in heat four but she dwelt at the start from trap one and could only finish in third spot. Victory on this occasion went to the Adrian McGarry owned and Ann Wade trained Smooth Surface this November 2003 daughter of Fortune Mike and Miss Santay producing a pleasing front running performance to triumph in a fast 28.67. Dashing into an early lead up the middle of the track Smooth Surface did well to see off the persistent challenge of Currans Merc who tasted defeat by three quarters of a length.

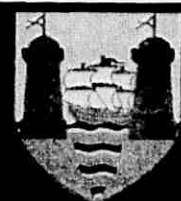

CO. BOARD MEETING

Following the two months recess, there was a very large attendance at last weeks meeting of the county board and at which chairman Pat Flynn presided.

The main interest in the meeting was the item on the agenda dealing with the appointment of a senior hurling team manager and selectors.

The final report from the outgoing management committee gave a clear indication that they were willing and anxious to remain in office for a further 12 months. The report told about how close we were to success and with so much talent available that success can be achieved.

Following the reading of the report the county chairman announced that the matter had been discussed by the county executive who were now recommending to the meeting that the four main officers, chairman, vice-chairman, secretary and treasurer, be given authority to interview suitable candidates for the positions and then report back with a recommendation to the October meeting of the board. He said that all

clubs would be given the right to submit nominations.

Phil Fanning proposed that members who are nominated by clubs should be interviewed by this special sub-committee. The Chairman pointed out that this was not the intention as only candidates whom they considered suitable, should be interviewed.

The feeling among delegates in a post-meeting chat is that Justin and his four selectors will be back in control after the October meeting of the board.

The appointment of a football manager and selectors will be attended to following discussions with Coisde na Peil in the next few weeks.

At a later stage of the county board meeting the chairman announced that he will submit a motion to the October meeting in an attempt to get approval for the appointment of senior hurling and football team captains to be decided by the team management committee. Heretofore it has been the policy to allow the county champions in the grade and code to name the team captain.

Finance

In his financial report, Michael Hogan gave details of the costing of servicing our eight inter-county teams. He said that a figure of 400,000 euro would be very close to the mark when the final figures are available. A delegate commented that such a figure would be in excess of a 1,000 euro per day for every day of the year.

Cost of senior hurling was 160,000 euro; Senior football, 74,000, minor hurling, 14,000, minor football 11,000, under 21 hurling, 23,000, under 21 football 18,000

Intermediate hurling and junior football are not included here

Michael informed the meeting that the income from the national leagues amounted to 80,000 euro with 48 from hurling and 32 from football. (this is a drop from 2 years ago when we played in the league final against Galway and received €110,000 from the hurling league alone)

Championship & Leagues 2007

The chairman informed delegates that a decision on the pro-

posals which have been circulated to all clubs, will be taken at the October meeting on the 9th. This will be in time to advise delegates from the board, attending the Special Congress on Saturday October 14th.

Central Council Report

Delegates were informed that a range of issues were debated at the last meeting of the Central Council. Particular reference was made to the setting up of the new 'Hearing Committee' to deal with disciplinary matters in the county. The proposal envisages that only one such body will deal with all disciplinary matters including those referred from the divisional boards and board na n-og. Other matters affected by the decisions taken at Congress arising from the Rule Book Task Force proposals which will come into force on January 1st 2007 will require changes in our Bye-Laws and will need to be discussed at the October meeting.

Information Technology

With just a few exceptions, club secretaries from all units in West Waterford were present

at a two hour session relating to the changes being made and which will come into effect on October 1st when all correspondence including minutes of meetings and other documents will circulate to clubs and individual members through the e-mail system. A similar and very well attended session was held in the east during the previous week. For those officers who are 'computer literate' it was very well worthwhile and those who are still in the learning process of computer work, it was most interesting.

The lecture/instruction was given by Richard Hickey of W.I.T and assisted by County Development Officer John O'Leary and Aine Murphy, clerical assistant at the county G.A.A. office in Walsh Park.

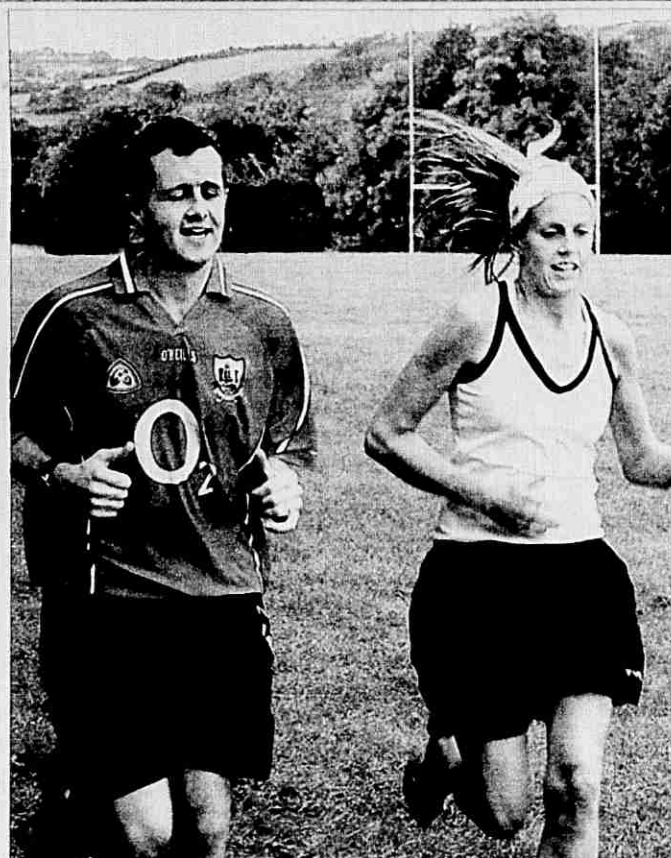

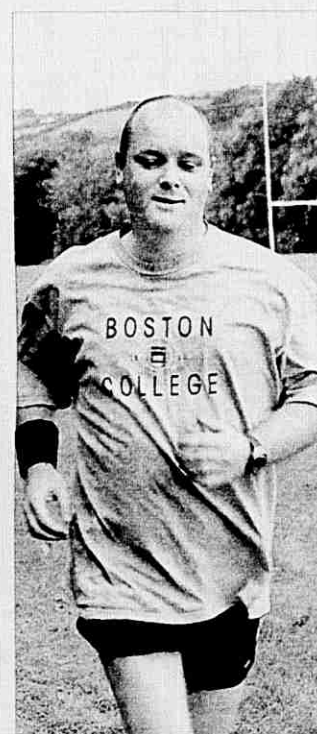

Just Two Reserve Gardai Appointed For County

"I've no difficulty with the Garda reserve. But, having said that, you already have the FCA, the Army itself, and the Civil Defence to assist the Gardaí.

"What should really be the priority should be based on the commitment to recruit 2,000 additional Gardaí."

With 3% of the country's population living in County Waterford this would relate to 60 extra Gardaí being posted to the County, and twenty of those in the Dungarvan District area.

POLICING

"I am not saying that having 20 additional Gardaí in and around Dungarvan is necessarily going to solve anti-social behaviour. But it's certainly going to help," Cllr. O Ceil-

leachair said.

"Obviously if you are going to have twenty extra Gardaí in Dungarvan, it means many extra squad cars on the road at the weekend and it would mean the Gardaí can patrol more places than they are able to at the moment."

EXTRA GARDAI

Dungarvan Gardaí Superintendent, Tom O'Grady, meanwhile, has requested a meeting with Dungarvan Town Council next month where anti-social behaviour is likely to be a key topic.

Cllr. Rossiter said one of the main talking points at the meeting with the Gardaí will be the location of the CCTV cameras.

"Problems with anti-social behaviour is not just a Dungarvan problem. It's happening all over the country. And it's a matter of curtailing it."

Nitrates Derogation To Save Farmers Over €9,000

A year long derogation to enable farmers to comply with the conditions of the Nitrates Directive was secured at the September meeting of Waterford County Council.

The derogation will mean farmers will be exempt from Development Charges if they construct farm buildings in order to be compliant with the Nitrates Directive.

The measure was called for by Fianna Fail councillors Kevin Wilkinson, James Tobin and Tom Cronin and was given unanimous cross-party support.

Cllr. Wilkinson urged farmers to make contact with the council's planning department to make sure the application is correct, and for them to contact an agricultural advisor or consultant to give written clarification that the work is line with the Nitrates directive.

The derogation could save individual farmers over 9,500 euros, Cllr. Wilkinson said.

The Nitrates Directive was in-

troduced with the objective of reducing water pollution induced by nitrates and agricultural sources in a bid to prevent further pollution, with the primary emphasis being on the management of livestock, manure and fertilisers.

"We had a number of meetings and consultations with the farmers groups and we put it to them that we would seek a derogation from Development charges for any works carried out in relation to the Nitrates Directive."

"These works include up-dating farm buildings or tanks.

"What it means is that any works that are carried out directly as a result of the nitrates directive are exempt from development charges, which would mean a saving of up to 9,500 euros.

"This is an incentive for them to do the work and it's an incentive for them to stay in farming," Cllr. Wilkinson concluded.
