# IDA Actively Targeting Dungarvan

## JOBLESS FIGURES SOAR BY 170

The IDA is actively targeting Dungarvan for new jobs after the most recent jobless figures recorded a growth of 170 people signing on the Live Register in the past year.

There has already been criticism of the IDA's commitment to bringing new jobs to Dungarvan, but according to the IDA's regional director, Brian Conroy, the future is anything but bleak.

"The IDA has never been working harder to promote Waterford and the South East," Brian Conroy said.

### SHOWCASE

"And it is showcasing all that it has to offer to budding employers all over the world."

His comments come after the latest job losses in Waterford where 200 contract employees were laid off at the Waterford-based multi-national, Bausch & Lomb recently.

"The job cuts at B&L are regrettable - all job losses are. But these were temporary positions and the company hired these people for a specific project. It has also indicated that it hopes to be in a position to re-employ some of them early in

the New Year," Mr. Conroy said.

He said that the omens are generally good for the South East in general.

### EMPLOYMENT

"We are still holding our own regarding employment in IDA supported companies. The numbers employed in companies supported by us has, in fact, increased in the past few years.

"Ireland faces many challenges in the future. But we are continuing to attract higher value jobs and higher skilled jobs.

"These companies are more demanding and require us to offer more."

Mr. Conroy said a number of companies had visited Waterford and the South East and were impressed by what they saw.

"We all need to work together to ensure we meet their needs - those in the educational sector,

local authorities and other agencies."

He said that FAS, Waterford Institute of Technology and other agencies are working together to ensure that jobs are retained in the region and that it remains a hub for expansion, well into the next decade.

### DUNGARVAN AN AFTERTHOUGHT

However, according to figures obtained by Fine Gael Deputy, John Deasy, the IDA has made just a handful of visits to Dungarvan over the past few years.

He said that the IDA made just one site visit to Dungarvan since the closure of Waterford Crystal compared to 39 site visits to Waterford City.

Dungarvan, he said, is seen as "an afterthought" - something which the IDA strenuously denies.

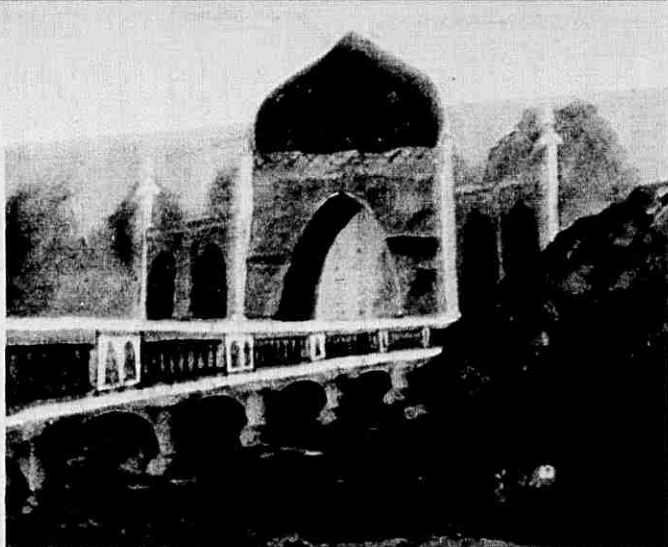

## Strong Uptake from the South East for Places on the Higher Diploma in Television Production

On September 27th Nemeton Television will open its doors to 14 students from all over the country who will be completing the first Higher Diploma in TV Production, to be delivered primarily 'on site' at the Nemeton Television Production facility. An Rinn is already widely acknowledged to be a centre for educational excellence at primary and secondary level. It can now add the string of a 3rd level course to its educational bow. Over the past 4 weeks hopeful students have been submitting applications and attending rigorous interviews to determine their suitability for a place on this course. Miriam Mulrennan confirmed that 14 students will be taking their place on the course of whom the majority are from Waterford and Cork.

The uniqueness of the course accordingly to Nemeton's Training Development Manager, Miriam Mulrennan is that "at the core of this course is a philosophy about creativity. It is the same philosophy that Nemeton applies to making a television programme that was in turn applied to designing this course." Mulrennan goes on to say "yes, we were all delighted at the uptake, I won't say 'surprised' exactly, as all of us involved in designing the course knew we had put together something very special when we completed the process. We were all determined that the course we were designing would truly equip students for an industry that we in Nemeton know from 'hands on' experience, can be brutal and unforgiving, especially to its new entrants". The course received a significant amount of media attention when Minister Cullen launched it in June of this year. At the launch the partnership between Nemeton Television, Údarás na Gaeltachta and WIT was hailed as 'truly visionary'. It was described "as an example of a Public Private Partnership that had truly worked".

The course focus is very specific, and seeks out those who will excel in the areas of Directing and Editing for Television.



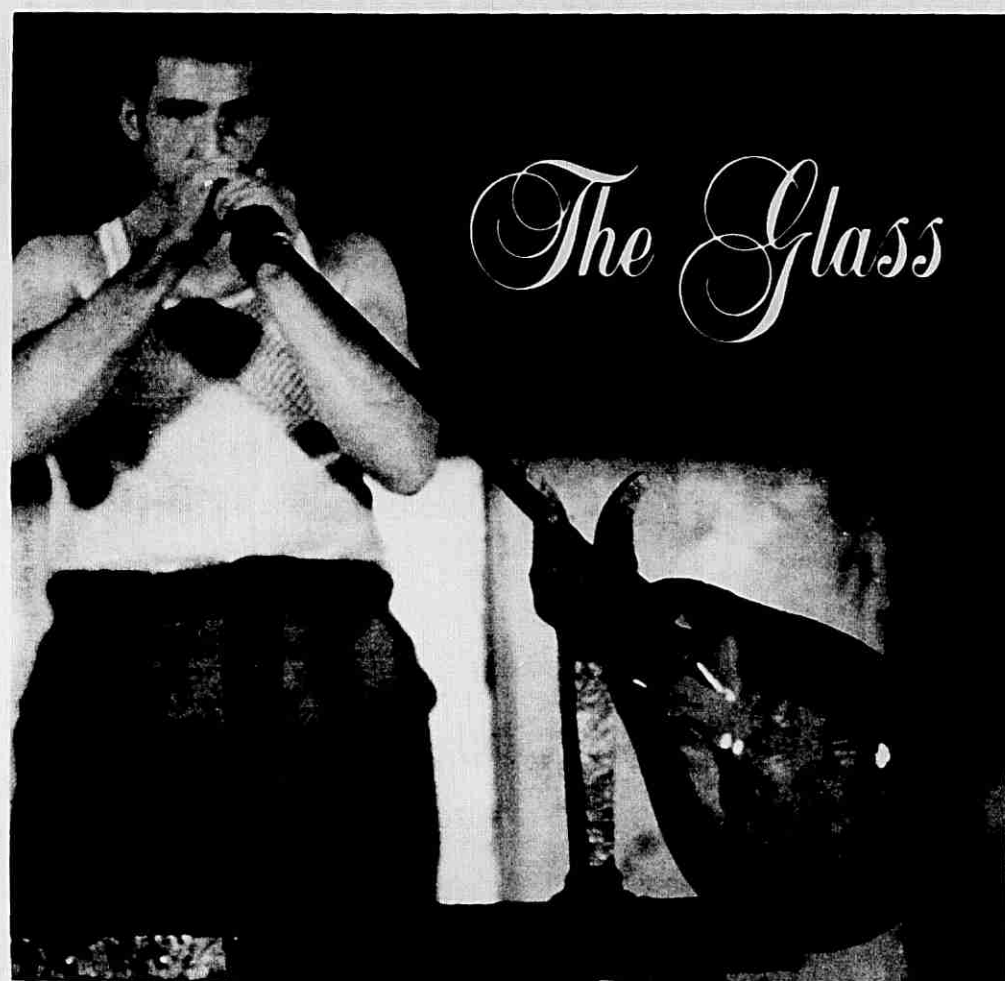

The course will be run through Irish in the An Rinn Gaeltacht, with some modules been delivered on campus at WIT. The course is modelled on the actual television production process. Students will first be introduced to the core elements of pre production - including ideas generation, writing treatments, pitching to broadcasters and funders, preparing budgets and researching their programme. The next stage is production, where students will be in a 'hands on' production environment, shooting their programme, acquiring directing skills, and understanding

the production management element of the process. And in the post production stage of the course students will focus on editing the programmes as well as the marketing, business and legal elements of wrapping up a programme.

For over 13 years Nemeton Television has been delivering quality television programming to both TG4 and RTE. Their extensive list of credits include Laochra Gael, GAA Beo and Health Squad.

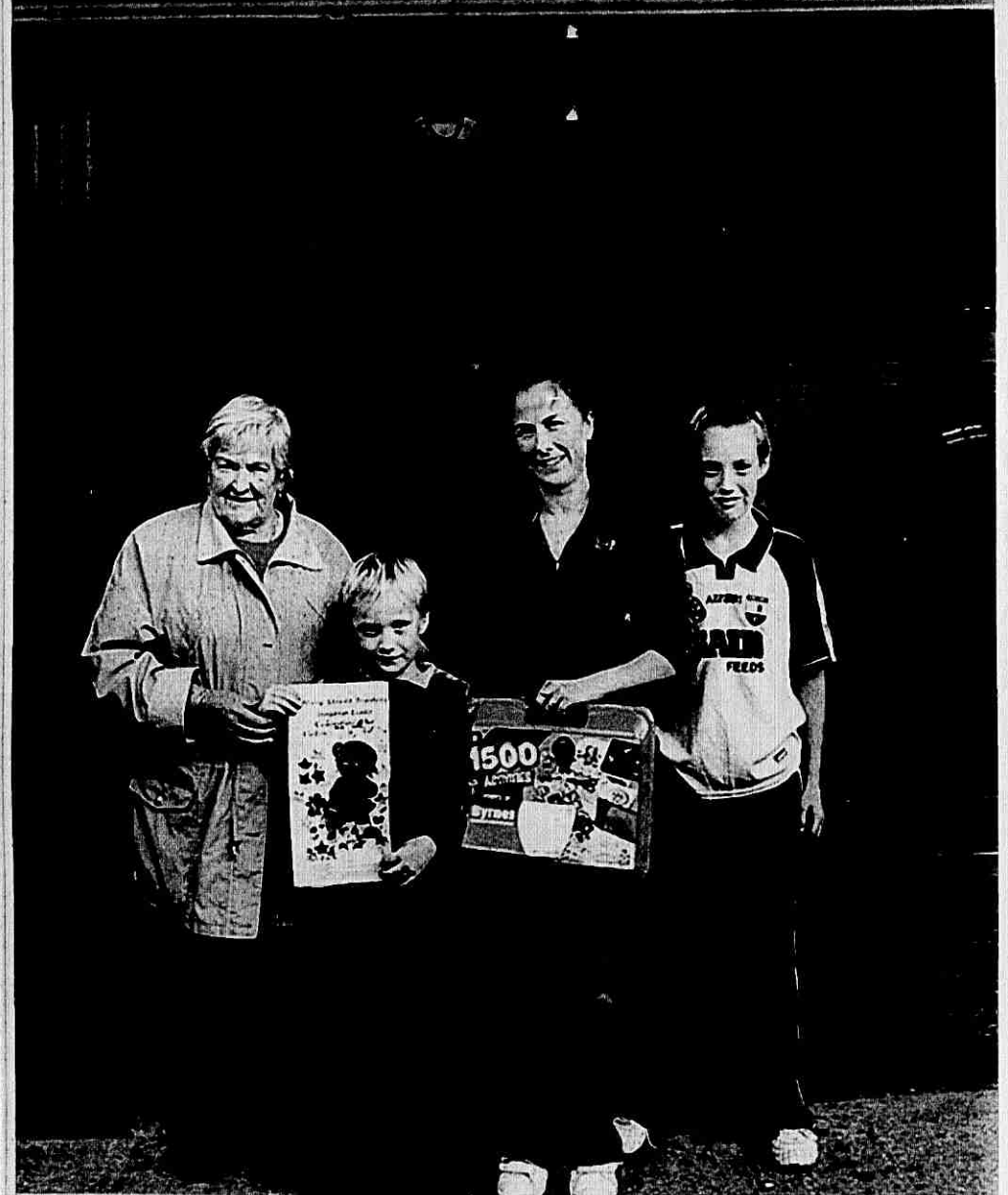

# Sinn Féin Representatives Call For Action On Dungarvan Primary Schools

Sinn Féin General Election Candidate Cllr David Cullinane, and his party colleague, Cllr Brendan Mansfield, are calling on Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council to give support to two local Primary schools experiencing separate difficulties.

The Sinn Féin representatives are highlighting the need for much needed additional land for Abbeyside National School and the provision of extra car parking spaces for Garrabane N.S.

## ABBEYSIDE NS

"I and my party colleague, Cllr Brendan Mansfield, fully support the need to maintain and develop the Abbeyside National School on its current grounds. Cllr Mansfield recently met with the board of management of the school and pledged his support for the

maintaining and development of the school at its current location.

"If necessary we support the need for the compulsory acquisition of nearby land to allow for the development of a school extension and new entrance."

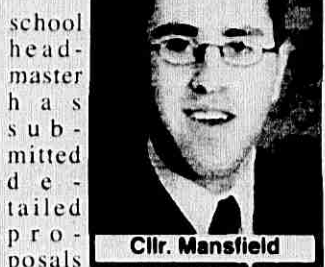
"It is my understanding that there is sufficient land already zoned educational adjacent to the school. The council must step up its efforts and ensure that the children of the school receive the very best education in adequate facilities and in the appropriate location. It is my view that the best solution here is for the council to initiate the compulsory acquisition of nearby land thereby allowing the necessary development of the school. It is unfortunate that some local elected representa-

tives are using this issue as a political football when an entirely appropriate solution stares us in the face. We should all be working together to bring about this solution."

## GARRANBANE

On a separate issue the Sinn Féin General Election Candidate met with representatives of the Garranbane National School to assist in their efforts to secure additional car parking spaces close to the school.

Cllr. Cullinane pointed out that the pupil numbers have virtually doubled in recent years, as have staff numbers, and are set to increase further as more housing developments are expected in the Ballinroad area. Mr Cullinane supports the schools to provide extra parking opposite the school. The

school headmaster has submitted detailed proposals to Waterford County Council which must be acted upon. The cost incurred by the county council would be minimal especially considering the huge amount of money obtained by the council through development charges in the area.

Cllr. Cullinane and Cllr. Mansfield are arranging meetings with council officials to press for a resolution of both issues.

# Part V Social And Affordable Safeguards Working - Says Geoghegan

## DEVELOPERS BUYING OUT COMMITMENTS

New safeguards, which demand that developers provide twenty percent of their developments for social and affordable housing in the county are working, said Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan.

A report in last weeks Irish Independent found that Waterford County Council was paid 2 million euro by developers under the Part V scheme in lieu of housing.

Under Government legislation up to 20% of all new housing estates should be allocated to

social or affordable housing. However developers are allowed to pay local authorities money or transfer land instead.

Cllr. Geoghegan had been critical of how the system was working up to last year after Waterford County Council miscalculated the amount of a financial contribution and under charged a developer by 53,000 euro.

## SAFEGUARDS

However, following complaints, new safeguards were put in place and a committee was established - headed up by

County Secretary, Martin Walsh.

"I'm satisfied that the procedures are in place now whereas up until last year they weren't," Cllr. Geoghegan said.

"The county council was settling for financial contributions whereas they should have been insisting on taking houses or taking land.

"But I am satisfied that the procedures are now working and affordable housing does seem to be coming on stream. We would expect a lot more coming on stream in the next four to five years.

"When the rules came in first, in relation to Part V, the procedures weren't satisfactory and the council were entering into financial agreements and they were leaving developers off the hook. That has stopped I believe. It had to stop - there were two many question marks.

"At one stage Part V contributions were underestimated and one particular developer walked away with 53,000 euro. If the council weren't entering into financial agreements with builders that would never have happened.

Cllr. Geoghegan said: "There are circumstances where this does happen, but they would be very very exceptional." These mostly related to small housing estates of three or four houses, where the 20% social and affordable cannot be adequately estimated.

## A BUYOUT

However, a Labour party environment spokesperson branded the Social and Affordable housing scheme in County Waterford as a "buyout."

Eamon Gilmore told WLRFM

that the problem lies with local authorities.

"In order for the affordable housing scheme to work the commitment should have to be given by the developer or the landowner before planning permission is given. What's happening at the moment is they get planning permission and then they enter negotiations with the local authority afterwards. They are then able to get the council to take alternative land or take some money instead of the houses."

"The amount of money you're talking about - 2 million euro - you're talking about a hundred dwellings which probably isn't the full amount the council should have got in the first place."

## SCHEMES

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Caroline Curley, said it's not always possible for the developers to put social and affordable housing in the schemes.

"Developers have to allow for social and affordable housing within their developments. They have a number of options that they can go for. They can look to transfer land on or off the site, they can look for units on or off the site or they can make a financial contribution or a combination of all these.

"Initially when we were implementing this initiative we did some deals with developers and took financial payments. However, over the last two years our policy has been to take units which is the preferred option. Secondly we would look for land and the third one is a financial contribution."

## O Cuiv Sanctions €200,000 for Strategic Roads In Ring

Gaeltacht Affairs Minister, Eamon O Cuiv, has announced that he has sanctioned 200,000 euros for strategic roads in the Ring Gaeltacht.

Announcing the grant at Colaiste na Rinne, on Thursday last, the Minister said that he was pleased to continue this scheme this year.

"Much work has been carried out through this scheme from 2000 onwards and the Department intends to continue these developments," he said.

"The objective of this scheme is, of course, that there will be a good road into each Gaeltacht."

Seventy-thousand euro will be spent on the construction of a stone wall for 335 m of the R674 regional road from An Rinn towards Helvick, with the remaining 130,000 euro to be spent on tarmacadam finishing touches on the same road.

"This brings to 1.1 million euro the money invested since 2000 under this scheme on strategic roads in the Waterford Gaeltacht.

Of course, this expenditure is made as part of a cohesive and comprehensive policy for the improvement of the economic, social and linguistic infrastructure of the Gaeltacht," the Minister said.

## Viewpoint

### ABBESIDE NATIONAL SCHOOL

The future viability of Abbesside NS was once again headline news – after the council executive made it clear that they preferred to move the school to a new site in Ballinroad. The elected members roundly rejected these plans, and indeed it's understood that the school management are also against them.

However, Fine Gael Deputy, John Deasy, in an outspoken attack on some of the council members, warned that the "horse has already bolted" in respect of the plans. This is because of the location of a housing development on Tierney's Land which, it has to be said, was given the all clear to proceed by both the Town Council and An Bord Pleanála. Complicating matters further, was the debate over the zoning of the land adjoining the school. One side believe the entire site should have been zoned Community – as it was up to a number of years ago – and that this zoning was never actually changed by the elected members. Somehow, and it's not clear as to how a change in zoning took place, the zoning changed to Residential – in effect allowing the Tierney's to develop the site with the exception of 1.4 acres which were rezoned Educational.

One side of the argument echoes Labour councillor, Billy Kyne's argument that the 1.4 acres should be the subject of a CPO if agreement with the landowner can't be agreed – thus safeguarding the school's future expansion needs. The other side, say that 1.4 acres of land is not enough. And, according to Deputy Deasy, An Bord Pleanála's decision to give the all clear for the Tierney's development to go-ahead, was effectively the final nail in the coffin for the school's future in Abbesside. How this web of claims and counter-claims will resolve itself, takes a far better mind than Viewpoint's to untangle. Time alone, we feel, will tell which side is right.

### UNEMPLOYMENT

Currently, there's a disturbing pattern to the Live Register figures for Dungarvan with the latest figures up considerably from the same time last year. The Central Statistics Office have announced that the figures are up from 999 in August 2005 to 1,156 in August of this year. The month on month statistics also make for gloomy reading. It is in this climate that the hundreds of new jobs in Clonmel in a new manufacturing plant are so welcome. The benefit will be seen by those living in North Waterford and indeed, for commuters, in Dungarvan and West Waterford too.

But, sadly, it also comes on foot of Bausch and Lomb's announcement that it is to lay off 200 temporary workers – a significant percentage of whom are living in this part of the county. This decision is a big blow to the workers and their families and its economic fallout will be felt in the general Waterford area. It goes to prove that the roar of the Celtic Tiger for some, is little louder than kittens sigh.

"Unfortunately," Labour TD, Brian O'Shea said recently, "this is part of a pattern we have seen in recent years of the systematic loss of jobs in the manufacturing sector which has been a traditionally important source of employment." Hopefully these layoffs will be temporary as the company suggests. However steps are needed to address the broader problem of the loss of manufacturing jobs in the Waterford constituency. Surely it's about time that all the agencies set up in the wake of these losses came good on promises to find new jobs and new industries.

### DEFIBRILLATOR FOR LISMORE

The vexed and increasingly confused matter of whether the Fire Service should be allowed use a defibrillator for purely health emergencies in Lismore continues following the latest statement from the Health Service Executive that new training procedures will allow the use of defibrillators in any circumstances.

The elected members of Lismore Town Council have been leading the campaign to allow defibrillators to be used for cardiac emergencies. And the statement certainly seems like a giant leap forward.

Up to now, Waterford County Council, has ruled out – on a number of occasions – the use of defibrillators except for conventional fire and accident call-outs.

Lismore Town Council, say that the nearest ambulance deployment point is all of twenty miles away in Dungarvan.

### CLOSURE OF LISMORE BOOKS

On the subject of Lismore, it was a very sad news to hear that Lismore Books is to close its doors for the final time. Australian-born owner, James Hyde, said the popular shop on Main Street, is to close later this month.

Unfortunately, it's one of the vagaries of commercial life that in the early years of a growing and developing town that some businesses will fall by the wayside. Businesses in the town are to a large degree reliant on summer tourism. And while Lismore has seen a boom in the numbers of tourists coming to the town in the wake of its Tidy Towns win, this trade alone couldn't sustain Lismore Books through the lean months of the winter. This column will miss what was a very worthwhile store with its great stock of antiquarian books and would like to wish the best of luck to James Hyde on his next venture.

# Demolition of Ormonde Cinema Refused Permission

Plans to demolish the Ormonde Cinema in Dungarvan and develop a furniture store, four shop units, ten apartments and forty car parking spaces in its place was refused planning permission by An Bord Pleanála.

A number of appeals were lodged by residents of South Terrace after Dungarvan Town Council granted planning permission earlier this year. The old cinema site is owned by Larry O'Keefe.

## REFUSED

However, An Bord Pleanála ruled against the development. If it had gone ahead it would have seen the demolition of the art-deco style cinema. The cinema is on a Ministerial list of protected structures.

An Bord Pleanála said it is considered that the height, bulk, form and design of the proposed development would harm the setting of the protected structures at South Terrace and that it would appear incongruous and visually harmful in the established residential streetscape, by virtue of its form, massing, and detailed design.

## RULING

Having regard to the close proximity of residential properties to the western boundary of the site, it is considered that the two storey west elevation of the proposed furniture store, abutting the site boundary would have an unacceptably overbearing effect

on these properties and would be injurious to residential amenity.

Finally, the report states, that in regard to the surrounding road network, it is considered that the commercial traffic generated by the proposed development would seriously injure the residential amenities of property in the vicinity and have an unacceptably harmful effect on the local residential environment.

## 'TOTALLY OPPOSED'

Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan, welcomed the decision, saying he was "totally opposed" to the planned project.

"Firstly, I would have been strongly opposed because it is a lovely structure, and its one of the few 1950's structures that are still standing. What was proposed their instead was a three-storey building.

"The people living in that vicinity had a beautiful view of the Comeragh mountains which they would have lost.

"As well as that, the streets were narrow and if a retail business was to open there, the roads are all only sixteen or seventeen foot wide. It would lead to traffic congestion and for the people living down Stephen's Street that would have caused a nuisance."

## HOTEL GO-AHEAD

Meanwhile, an objection to the Ormonde Hotel plans has been withdrawn and it's understood that a new owner is in place. It's believed that a new restaurant is planned with apartments to be built overhead.

## BREAST CANCER

Breast cancer is the most common type of cancer in women, yet surprisingly few women regularly check their breasts or are even aware of the danger signs. October is breast cancer awareness month which provides an ideal opportunity for women of all ages to become more informed about this devastating illness.

The occurrence of breast cancer is closely linked to hormone levels, particularly high levels of oestrogen. Long term use of the contraceptive pill or hormone replacement therapy increases the risk of breast cancer, while pregnancy and breast feeding are protective factors. In recent times, oestrogen-like substances found in many foods have been implicated in the increasing occurrence of breast cancer. These include fruits and vegetables which have been treated with pesticides, non-organic meat and dairy products.

The excess oestrogens and other toxins which can accumulate in breast tissue are responsible for development of abnormal cells. Failure of the immune system to destroy these abnormal cells allows them to spread out of control, and a tumour develops. Any factor which significantly weakens the immune system, including trauma or emotional stress, may contribute to the development of cancer in a susceptible individual.

It is vital that women of all ages check their breasts regularly for any signs of the disease. These include a lump in the breast tissue, swelling, puckering or dimpling of the skin over the breast, changes to the nipple such as indrawing or flaking of the skin, or any unusual discharge.

Treatment usually involves surgical removal of the lump but in some cases it may be necessary to remove the breast together with the lymph nodes in the armpit. Surgery is usually followed by treatment with chemotherapy or radiotherapy to destroy any remaining cancerous cells.

Unfortunately the use of these treatments has not had much of an impact on the survival rate of women treated for breast cancer. In fact chemotherapy and radiotherapy can damage healthy cells as well as cancerous ones. These treatments also cause nausea, vomiting, gastrointestinal inflammation and malnutrition, which reduces the efficiency of the treatment.

However, there are ways to help prevent breast cancer in susceptible individuals, and to improve the suc-

cess of treatment and minimise side effects in those who have already developed the condition. A professional medical herbalist can provide an individually-tailored herbal prescription, nutritional supplements and detailed advice about cancer prevention and improving the chances of recovery. Of course there is no magic cure for cancer, but taking a holistic approach to healthcare can help to create an environment in the body which does not encourage its growth, and can help to give the immune system the upper hand.

For example, herbs such as agnus castus inhibit the production of oestrogen which encourages the development of breast cancer. Herbs such as burdock root detoxify the tissues and support the liver and lymphatic system which are responsible for cleansing the body. There are also herbs which help to prevent the spread of cancerous cells such as periwinkle.

Herbs such as Echinacea help to ensure the immune system is functioning effectively which in turn controls the spread of the disease. Other herbs are available to help the person to deal with the emotional impact of the disease, and to help the body to cope with the demands of orthodox treatment.

If you are suffering from breast cancer or have a family history of the disease it is advisable to eat plenty of fresh organic fruit and vegetables. These contain nutrients known as antioxidants which are deficient in most cancer patients. Avoid meat and dairy products, and any foods stored or heated in plastic packaging. Refined sugar and processed foods encourage the build up of toxins, while a low fat, high fibre diet helps to clear excess oestrogens and toxic substances from the body.

Avoid wearing a tight fitting or underwired bra all day as this restricts lymphatic drainage, which in turn prevents removal of toxins from the area. Make sure you go outside for a walk every day since the main source of vitamin D is the action of sunlight on the skin and people who are deficient in this vitamin more likely to develop breast cancer. Finally herbal remedies and other measures such as yoga can help to reduce stress and anxiety which can contribute to the development of cancer.

### JUNIOR PAGE NOT ALL BIRDS CAN FLY

There are several birds that cannot fly even though they have wings. Flightless birds are descended from birds that flew. Many lived where there was no need for flight. Their wings got smaller and they lost the power to fly. There are now fewer flightless birds. They are easier to catch, so many have been hunted to extinction.

#### Relatives Of The Ostrich

The male rhea, the South American cousin of the ostrich, is very busy during the breeding season. First he hollows out a nest in the ground and lines it with grass, while fighting off other males for the territory. Then he courts several females to the nest and when the eggs are laid, perhaps as many as 20, it is the males job to look after them. There are two species of rhea. The common rhea is found in Brazil and the smaller, Darwin's rhea, lives in Argentina and the Andes. The emu, the second largest bird in the world, stands about 1.5m (5ft) high and can weight up to 160kg (353lb). The adult emu is brown and blackish-brown but the chicks are grey with black strips. The female lays up to ten greenish eggs in a nest of trampled down grass, and these are incubated by the father. Closely related to the emu is the cassowary which lives in north-east Australia and New Guinea. The most distinctive thing about the cassowary is the large bony helmet, or casque, on its head. This helmet protects the bird's head as it runs, head downwards, through the forests and bush.

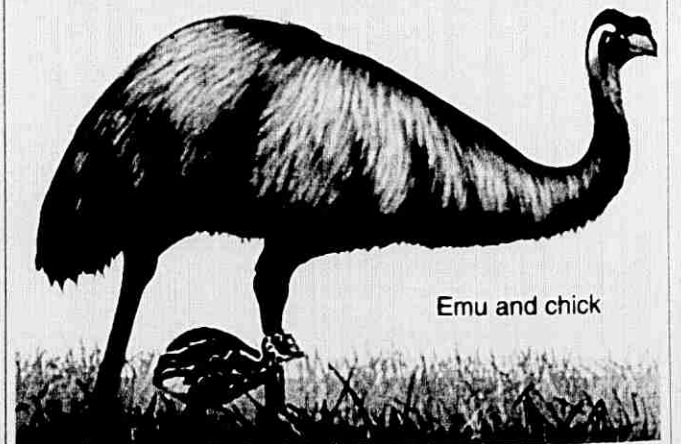
#### The Largest Flightless Bird

The known and largest flightless birds is the ostrich, which lives in Africa. It can grow to a height of 2.5m (8ft) and weights up to 155kg (345lb). It is the fastest living thing on two legs, being able to run at speeds of up to 65kph (40mph). The young chicks are almost as fast as their parents with a speed of some 50kph (30mph).

**Emblem Of New Zealand**  
The kiwi of New Zealand is almost blind but has a good sense of smell. It has a long beak with sensitive nostrils at its tip - a feature found in no other species of bird. During the day it lives in an underground borrow and normally only comes out at night to hunt for worms, insects and berries. The Maori people named the kiwi after its shrill cry of "kee-wi, kee-wi".

- Ostriches can reach a height of 2.5m (8ft 2in), but the extinct moa of New Zealand was over 3m (10ft) tall!
- Ostriches don't really burn their heads in the sand - but they do tuck them in and fluff out their feathers to camouflage themselves as bushes!
- The ostrich is the only bird with two toes!
- The kiwi's enormous egg weights nearly one third as much as its mother.
- The extinct elephant bird's egg held nearly 10 litres (2.5gal) of yolk - 30,000 times more than that of the smallest hummingbird.
- The cassowary has such sharp claws, it can disembowel a careless human.

He had ambitious plans to direct the greek play "Antigone", and indeed, he was jotting down notes during his final days in hospital. Apparently he was having some problems sorting out the Greek Chorus - we're sure these problems have now been overcome, and Pat and his cast are no doubt already busy rehearsing for what's sure to be his finest production yet!

### LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

#### THE ROPE MAKING INDUSTRY IN DUNGARVAN

In Lucas's Directory of 1788 Edward Carter and Son are listed as rope makers. The Burial register entry under the date 4 March 1779- 'Mr. Faulkner, late rope maker, a poorman'.

Slater's Directory 1846 lists the following rope makers: John Carbery, Main St., Mary Ann Phelan, Main St., Micheal Cooney, Main St., Augustus Cox, Main St.

The Carberys and the Coxs continued to work as rope makers for several more decades. The Cox family lived at the corner of Dirty Lane and Main Street. Griffith's valuation 1851 note that William Cox Senior had a shed and rope walk at Blackpool leased from Richard Garde Hudson.

The 1841 Ordnance Survey map of Dungarvan shows two rope walks. One at Quanns and the other which runs from the Glanbia site opposite the new Civic offices on to O'Connell Street.

Slater's Directory of 1856 lists the following rope makers: John Carbery, Main St., Michael Cooney, Carbery's Lane., William Cox, The Quay. However by 1870 the trade had declined to such an extent that Slater's Directory of that year lists only one rope maker- John Carbery, Main Street. By 1886 he is described as having a 'Rope Factory' in Main Street.

In 1924 Edmund Keohan wrote the following concerning rope making in Dungarvan: "In olden times there was a rope walk, owned by Mr. John Carbery. The walk is there still, but the twirl of the wheel is heard no more. When the opposition created by the Belfast rope works came on, ropes made by hand could not compete with those made by machinery. The walk still runs down by the gas house to the Shandon Road"

If you have a particular interest in any area, perhaps we may have 'Local History Notes' on the subject and will include them in future notes. Just drop a note into us at the Museum, stating 'Local History Notes', and the area of interest and we will take it from there.

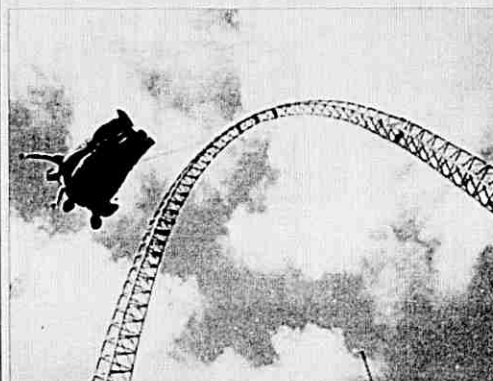

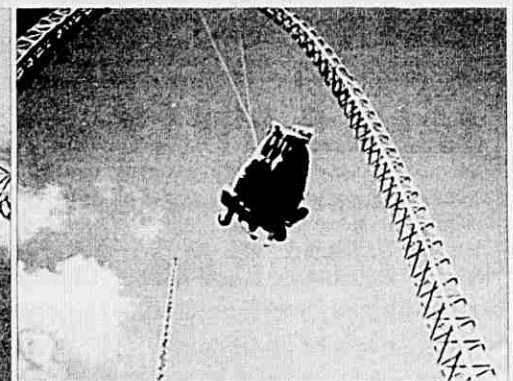

# Popular Civil Defence Officer Retires

At a very pleasant ceremony held in the Park Hotel recently, the retirement of Civil Defence Officer, Colm Bannon, Ballymacmague, Dungarvan was marked on the completion of over forty years of service with Waterford County Council. The dinner in his honour was attended by Colm's wife Breda, his six children and many members of his wider family. Also attending were present and former members of the organisation in which Colm served at various levels for over four decades, the last twenty years of which was at the helm of the organisation.

Scientific Intelligence Officer, Mr. Joe Moynihan led the tributes, recalling the excellent service Colm had given to the Council, the Civil Defence or-

ganisation and to the community at large. He said that Colm had always been very supportive of training programmes for both Instructors and Volunteers

alike and had always encouraged and facilitated whatever was necessary to ensure that everyone had every opportunity to learn more about the service of their choice. He wished Colm and Breda many happy years together in retirement.

Former Instructor, Seán Murphy recalled some of the lighter moments from exercises, training camps and weekly classes around the County. Judith Flynn recited a poem she had written for the occasion detailing some of the most significant moments in Colm's life and career.

In reply, Colm thanked everyone from the oldest members to the most recent and those in between for coming to the dinner and presentation and for the beautiful gifts he had been given.

"They are all much appreciated," he said, "and will be a lasting memory for me of my time in Civil Defence. I have many good memories of great times in Civil Defence," he continued, "but without the Instructors and the Volunteers, nothing can happen in the organisation no matter who the Civil Defence Officer might be. I also have my family to thank for their support and for making my task so much easier over all of those years"

He paid tribute also to the conduct of the members who had been exemplary on their many trips to competitions in places as far distant as Donegal and Cork.

"We always had good fun and enjoyed ourselves," he said, "es-

pecially during the many Annual Camps and the great days of our AFS team which won the All Ireland Competition."

He recalled significant events including the 1916 Celebrations in 1966, the Refugees from Northern Ireland in Mt. Melleray in 1972 and the Papal Visit of 1979 and feeding the homeless.

"No matter what the cause, we usually had to turn away members, so many usually volunteered," he added, "and that combined with an excellent discipline which the Instructors inspired, was the key to the success of Civil Defence."

Long time member, Percy Veale presented Colm with a digital camera and travel voucher to mark the occasion, while Siobhán McCormack presented Colm's wife Breda with a bouquet of flowers. The evening concluded with music by Paddy McGrath and Jim Lane.

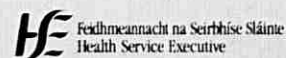

# Waterford Co. Council Switches To Green Energy Supplier

Waterford County Council has signed a contract with Bord Gáis Energy Supply for the supply of electricity to its 270 electrical installations throughout the County. The contract which is valued at over €1m was awarded to Bord Gáis following a public tender process. Bord Gáis has supplied electricity to 114 of the Council's installations since May 2005. The new contract which was signed on behalf of the Council by County Mayor Cllr. Mary Greene will run until 31st December 2007 with a possible extension for a further 12 months. By switching to Bord Gáis the Council will save approximately €80,000 on its annual electricity bill for offices, libraries, pumphouses, fire stations etc.

An additional benefit of changing supplier to Bord Gáis is that 260 of Waterford County Council's general purpose electricity accounts will be powered by green energy, generated from renewable energy sources. Director of Services & County Engineer John O'Flynn stated that it was imperative for Waterford County Council to take advantage of the deregulated electricity market in order purchase electricity at the cheapest rate possible. He further stated that the cost burden of recently announced increases of 19.7% in electricity tariff by the Commission for Energy Regulation would be partially offset by

switching to Bord Gáis.

Mayor Mary Greene said that that the powering of Waterford County Council electricity needs by green energy indicated that Waterford County Council is supportive of the development of renewable and sustainable energy technologies within Waterford. She further

noted that sustainable energy technology needs to be embraced not just by the Local Authority, but by all residents of Waterford.

Bord Gáis Energy Supply is now a significant player in the commercial electricity market and has approximately 14% market share. Bord Gáis has re-

cently submitted planning for a 440MW power station in Cork at an estimated cost of €350 million. In 2005 Bord Gáis contracted to purchase all of the output from the largest onshore wind farm under construction in Ireland (33MW of electricity) until the year 2023.

The tendering of Waterford County Council electricity accounts was co-ordinated by the Council's Water Services Department and Waterford Energy Bureau, Tramore.

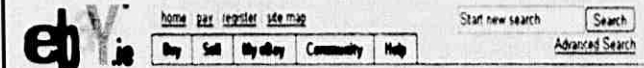

### WHAT IS Ebay.ie ?

Ebay is an on line auction site where you can buy or sell new and used goods. If you're looking for a bargain, then is this the place. Point your browser to [www.ebay.ie](http://www.ebay.ie) for the Irish version of the site. Ebay is an established business and has an excellent feedback rating for buyers and sellers. It also has an extremely comprehensive help section to aid newcomers; <http://pages.ebay.ie/help/ebayexplained/index.html>



### HOW DOES IT ALL WORK?

You buy items by bidding on them like in any live auction but auctions can last a few hours or up to 2 weeks. To buy or sell you must first create an account with ebay. This protects both buyers and sellers and allows buyers to keep track of items they have bid on. So click the **register** link on the top of the page. You must have an email account to register. Once you have registered you can begin to buy or sell items. Don't forget to review the help sections on how to buy and sell on ebay.ie.

### WHAT'S ON EBAY & HOW TO FIND WHAT YOU'RE LOOKING FOR ?

There are 2 basic ways to find things of interest on ebay. You can browse by category, which are listed on the left of the home page. For instance, click on **DVD, Film & TV**. From here you can enter the title of the film or dvd you are looking for or browse by genre. If however you know what you want you can just enter some key words on the Search box on [www.ebay.ie](http://www.ebay.ie). For example enter 'SOFAS' (or anything you can think of) and see what comes up.

To read the detailed information on an item just click on the link or picture. After reviewing the item in detail you can place a bid or go back to the listing page and browse some more. Important things to note for any item on ebay are :

- Current bid (you will have to beat this to obtain the item)
- End time (all auctions end on a specified day and time)
- Item location & Post to (ensure that you will be able to receive the item you are bidding on)

### EXPERT TIPS

**Side By Side Comparison** - When viewing a listing of item you can do a side-by-side comparison by checking the box next to multiple items and clicking on the **Compare** button.

**Seller's Feedback Rating** - When viewing the detailed information on an item click on the seller's name and you can find out more about them. Read customer feedback from the previous items they sold.

**Watch this item** - After reviewing an item you may not want to bid straight away, click on **watch this item** and you will be notified when the bid changes and will appear on your **My Ebay** page.

This should get you started on Ebay and remember to have fun, you never know what bargain you may find.

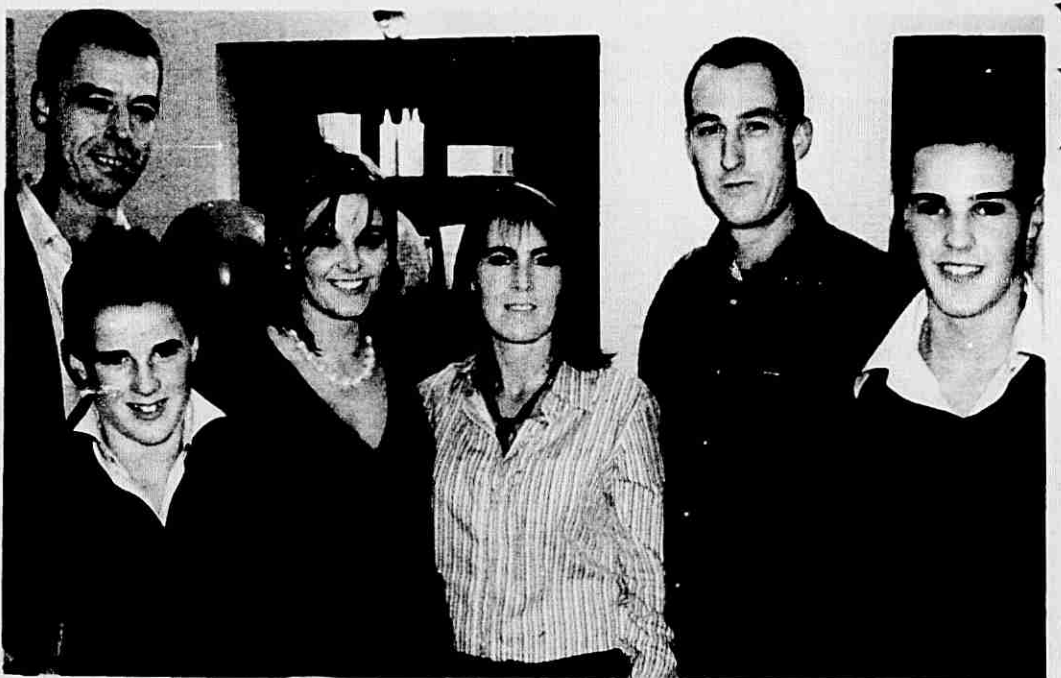

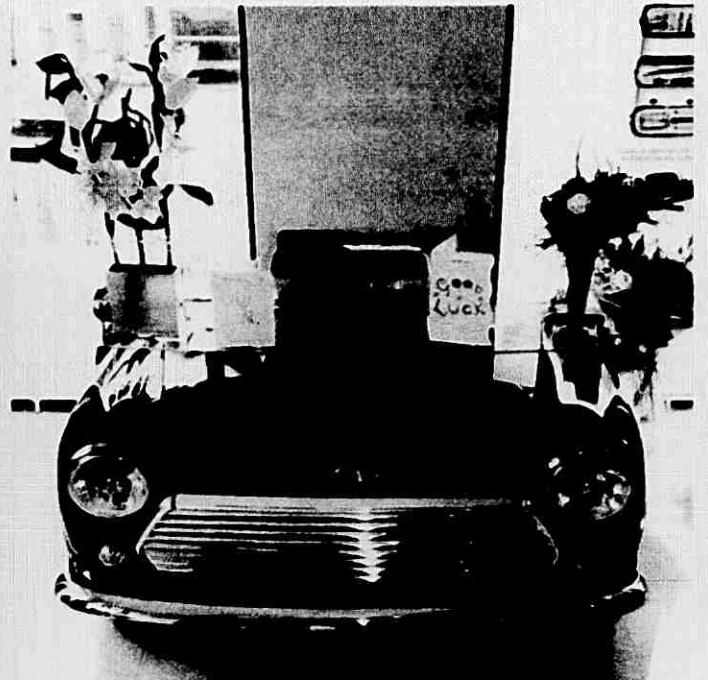

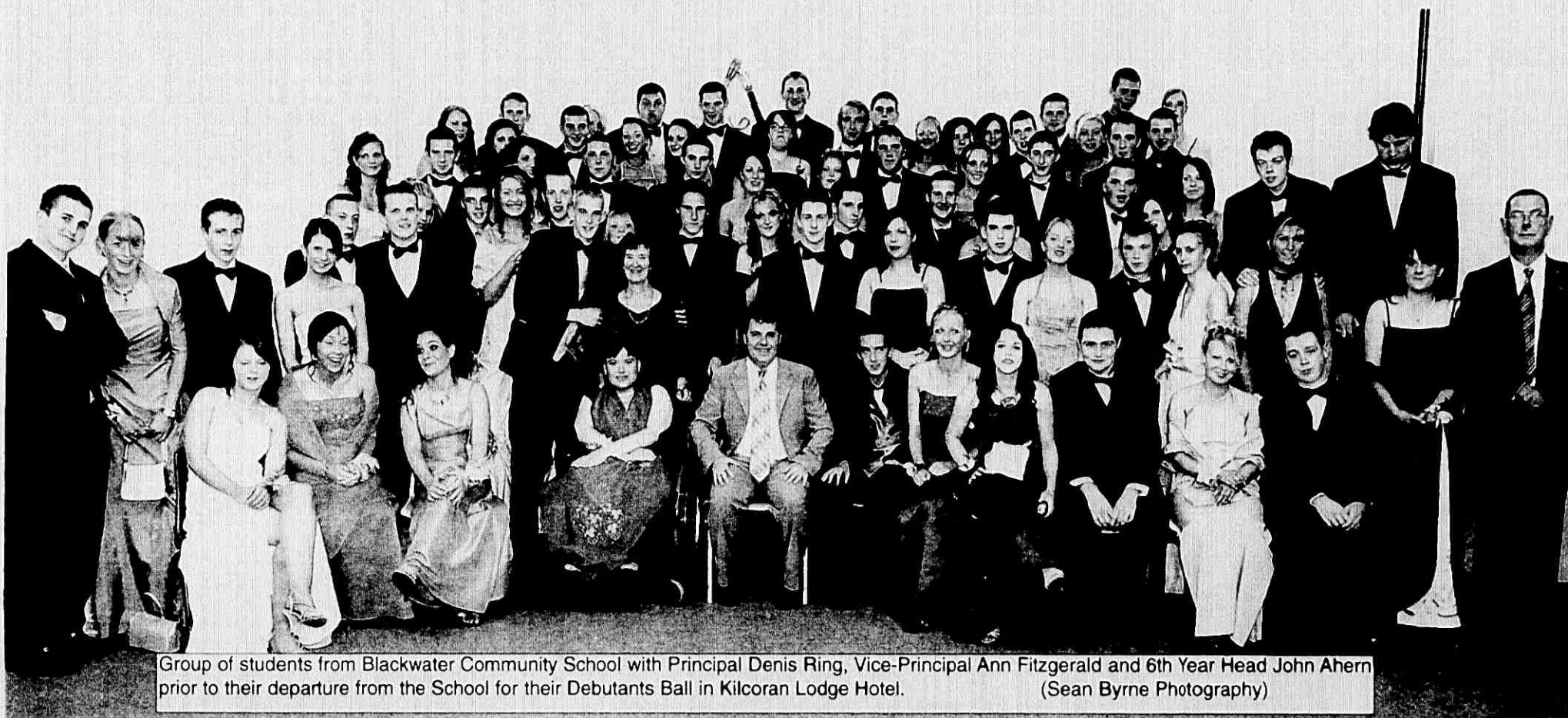

# Plant a healthy winter's diet

NOW that people are looking to eat more healthily, spinach is back on the menu and there is still time to enjoy a home grown crop. Spinach contains high levels of beta-carotene and lutein, which can protect against age related eye disease. It is also a good source of dietary fibre as well as vitamins A and C. There are two varieties of spinach - winter and summer - both of which grow well in temperate climates. Winter spinach is sown in early to mid autumn for use during the winter months. It makes a good follow-on crop to some of the year's earlier sowings.

### SPINACH: top varieties

#### WINTER SPINACH

**Greenmarket:** Has large dark green leaves and is slow to bolt.  
**Longstanding Prickly:** An old favourite that is quick to grow and slow to run to seed.  
**Monnopa:** A fine-flavoured variety with a low oxalic acid content.  
**Sigmaleaf:** A long cropping variety that is slow to run to seed that can be sown in autumn as a winter variety.  
**SUMMER SPINACH**  
**Bordeaux:** Red-veined leaves, excellent for baby leaf growing. Has very good mildew resistance.  
**Spokane F1:** Dark green leaves that need picking regularly. Has good resistance to bolting and mildew.  
**Lazio F1:** Quick-growing variety with thick leaves with full resistance to Downy mildew.

With winter yields in mind, choose an open site with some shelter from cold winds and rake in a general fertiliser at 70g per sq m. Sow the seeds in drills 2-3cm deep and about 30cm apart. Thin the seedlings to stand 23cm apart. If the soil is dry at the time of sowing, water the drills well beforehand. Once established there should be no watering problem as the normal rainfall will be enough. Although the plants are hardy they give a better and cleaner crop if some protection can be given, ideally with cloches during the winter months. Picking can begin as soon as the leaves are large enough. Cut the largest leaves off close to the stem, taking a few from each plant. Leaf production in the winter months is slower than summer, so take the leaves sparingly. In early spring a dressing of nitrochalk at 35g per sq m will help the plants along, by increasing production of leafy growth which in turn will help to give you earlier spinach pickings. Summer spinach should be sown every three weeks from late February until August in drills 2.5cm deep 30cm apart. When large enough to handle the plants should be thinned to 15-29cm apart. Because summer spinach is quick to bolt in dry weather, it is essential to

keep plants well watered throughout the season. Sow small amounts of seed regularly to ensure a continuous supply. There is still time to enjoy a summer spinach crop if you sow a row of Bordeaux. Baby leaves will be ready for picking after 30 days until the plants are hit by first frost.

## THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

### Pot and box bulbs for early flowering

Now is the time for potting or boxing hyacinths, tulips, narcissi, ixias, gladioli and bulbous irises for flowering in a greenhouse, conservatory or house during the winter and next spring. If containers are provided with drainage holes use John Innes No 1 potting compost or a non-peat based potting compost. If they are undrained bowls use special bulb fibre consisting of peat, crushed shell and crushed charcoal. Place the bulbs of tulips and narcissi almost touching one another and barely covered with compost. Space the smaller bulbs and corms about 2.5cm apart and cover to a depth of 1 to 2cm. Then stand all the containers in the coolest place available. This can be outdoors at the foot of a north-facing wall if the containers are drained, but undrained containers must be kept under cover or they may be flooded by rain.

### Pot cyclamen seedlings

Cyclamen seedlings from the August sowing should be ready for pricking off or potting. Often the seed germinates irregularly, so if some seedlings are too backward for potting now, leave them in the seed pans, lifting the forward ones with a sharpened wooden label.

### House late flowering chrysanthemums

Now is the time to bring in all chrysanthemums that are to flower in the greenhouse before frost damages their tender buds. Pot plants should be carried in and set on a hard bottom of ashes or gravel, or be arranged on staging, while plants that have been grown outdoors for lifting must be dug up with as much soil as possible and either be planted in the greenhouse borders or else be planted into suitable boxes and tubs.

### Shelter tender plants

Prepare to take in all tender greenhouse plants that have been outdoors during the summer. This includes pelargoniums, marguerites, fushias and camellias.

### Best Wishes

Best Wishes To Eamonn De Paor  
Our best wishes to Ned who is in hospital at the moment.

The lads in Tyrone still invoke the name of Ned Power as their inspiration to continue their hurling crusade. In a tin hut on a boggy field outside Coalisland in 1986 I read out a letter sent to me from Ned Power in which he exhorted the humble gathering to stay the course. In my heart I knew Ned's concern wasn't solely with hurling in the six counties. He has always cared deeply about the situation our fellow countrymen in the north east had thrust upon them.

I knew that ever before I stayed the night with Liam Hinphey in Dungiven, a kindred spirit of Ned's. Hinphey is a Kilkenny man who became Principal of the local primary school in Dungiven in south Derry (long story). His son plays hurling and football for Derry. They're a hardy breed around Dungiven, fought their own battles when they had to. Joe Broily and all belonging to him are sons of the south Derry soil. The loquacious Joe, gifted footballer, qualified barrister of law and as we see him now quick witted RTE analyst, symbolises and epitomises a new breed of northern nationalist, confident and successful.

Getting back to Hinphey. He was like a hurling evangelist let loose in untilled northern fields. Like Ned Power he had the advantage of being school Principal. Like Ned too Liam ploughed and harrowed and sowed the seed. Dungiven went on to win senior hurling titles in Derry and but for the pre dominance of football in Derry could have become a hurling force nationally. Kevin Lynch was a product of Hinphey's hurling academy. He captained Derry against Waterford in an under 16 All Ireland hurling final. Kevin Lynch died on hunger strike at the age of 25 in August of 1981. He stood as a Dail candidate in Waterford while he was on hunger strike. Liam Hinphey was his election agent. He didn't get elected. After 71 days on hunger strike he died on the 1st August 1981.

I know I'm drifting but sometimes that's the way the mind works. I wasn't aware of it at the time but Ned Power had stayed with Liam Hinphey in Dungiven before I arrived with a bunch of raw under 16 hurling recruits from East Tyrone around 1986. Damian O'Neill Mor was one of those recruits. Having mentioned Tallow over the course of conversation Hinphey's eyes lit up. "Do you know Ned?"

Needless to say it added greatly to my own credibility to acknowledge that I was on first name terms with "an Phaoraigh". Hinphey's regard and affection for Ned was obvious. He respected his achievements as a hurler and a coach needless to say but more than that he recognised that this was a man who was passionate about his native land and language and well informed on the situation on the ground in the north. "Ned is sound on the national question" Hinphey volunteered at one stage.

Both Ned Power and big Liam Hinphey have played their part in the survival and development of a hurling club in East Tyrone. Both men have on many occasions given generously of their time to coach young lads from what was but a fledgling club struggling to put down roots in a most inhospitable climate.

On Saturday week Tallow will travel to Tyrone to play at the official opening of the Naomh Columille hurling field, the first hurling field in Tyrone. It is a modest field, set among the rushes in the townland of Cloghog, two miles west of Coalisland, but it is their home - their home for hurling. Ned unfortunately wont be able to travel with us but take it from me he will be spoken of. They will say tell Ned we stayed the course as he counselled.

I'm delighted to report that Ned is making good progress. We hope to see him back home with us before too long.

**IRELAND'S LEADING FIDDLE PLAYER TO APPEAR AT THE LOCAL**

# Frankie Gavin Live At The Local



One of Ireland's leading fiddle and flute players, Frankie Gavin is to appear live at the The Local Bar in Grattan Square, Dungarvan on the 3rd of October next.

Frankie, a founder of De Danann who has worked with the Rolling Stones, Elvis Costello and Keith Richards over the course of his career, was born in County Galway in 1956 on the eastern side of Lough Corrib, in "Corrandulla."

He hailed from a very musical family, and is the youngest of four, with older brother Sean playing the accordion and sisters Marion and Noirin also heavily

involved in Irish traditional music.

Frankie's father, J.J. Gavin played the fiddle, while his mother, Mary Crehan from Ballygar, and her brothers all played music on the accordion or fiddle.

**YOUNG AGE**

Frankie has been playing Irish traditional music since the age of four when he started on the tin whistle. At the age of seven he made his debut television appearance on Irish TV and had appeared on American television by the age of nine. Martin Rabbitt taught him to read music in Galway, but he is largely self-taught and has a remarkable ability for learning music by heart.

In 1973, at the age of seventeen he was placed first in the All Ireland Under-18 Fiddle Competition and in the All Ireland Under-18 Flute Competition, both on the same day.

Frankie Gavin was heavily influenced by the early 78 US recordings of Michael Coleman and James Morrison, which he listened to at home and has always had a high regard for the latter.

**SESSIONS**

In the early 1970s he started playing at the sessions in the Celar Bar, Galway, with, among others, Alex Finn, the late Mickey

Finn, Johnnie (Ringo) Mc Donagh and Charlie Piggot. The sessions moved to Hughes' Pub in Spiddal and in 1973 De Danann was formed. This was the same year he received his Leaving Certificate.

His Currandulla connection came in useful when De Danann were looking for a singer, and it was he who came up with Dolores Keane from nearby Cahirlistrane. When De Danann brought out their first album, her singing of The Rambling Irishman gained a lot of airplay for the group.

**DE DANANN**

Although De Danann has had many highpoints over a quarter of a century, particularly with the singing of Dolores Keane and Maura O'Connell and the box playing of Mairtin O'Connor, Frankie Gavin's fiddle playing has always been a central feature of its repertoire.

Nuala O'Connor, writing in The Irish Times in 1995, described him as a precociously gifted traditional musician. "Gavin was drawn at an early age towards the 78-rpm recordings of Irish American musicians such as Coleman, Morrison, The Flanagan Brothers, John McKenna and Joe Derrane. It undoubtedly had a liberating effect on his own playing."

She continued: "From his immersion, on the one hand, in the traditional repertoire of the regional hinterland of Galway, Clare and Sligo/Leitrim, and his excursions of the farthest reaches of 78's archives, came a vast store of tunes and a familiarity with arrangements and settings."

He also has a gift for absorbing and switching between styles and has paid detailed attention to the variety of Irish regional styles. Philippe Varlet wrote of him: "Frankie Gavin's fiddle playing is technically complex, unabashedly brilliant, and has a pronounced, driving swing which harks back to the sound of the 1920s."

**GALWAY STYLE**

He is known for playing in a very fast and virtuosic Galway style. Gavin has recorded and played with many of the best traditional musicians of his generation. 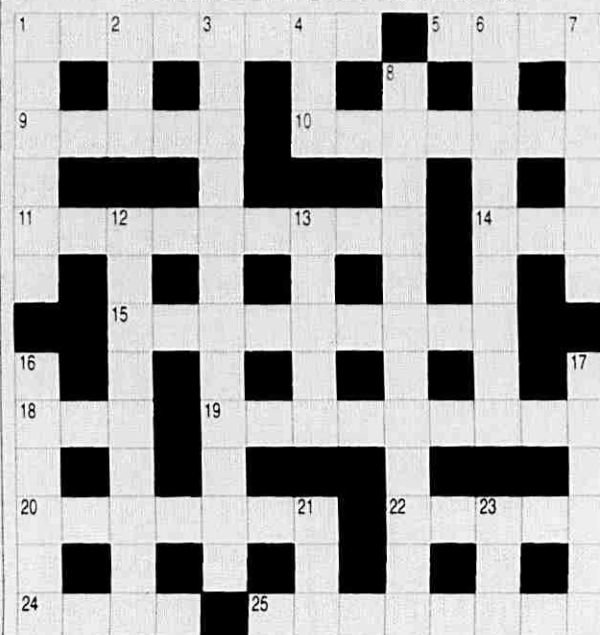

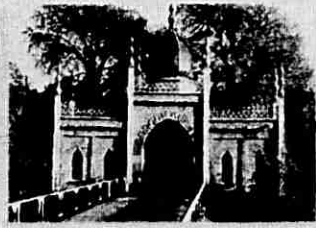

## DERRY O'CONNOR WINS TRIP TO THE US

CBS Leaving Certificate student Derry O'Connor recently won an Internet competition, the prize for which was a 10-day trip to the US. In this article Derry gives us an account of the trip and his experience in the US.

My name is Derry O'Connor and I am a fifth year student in Dungarvan CBS. Last December I won a trip to America on the Graduate Online Youth Competition. This is a government-sponsored programme to increase Civic awareness and encourage young people to use the Internet. Seventeen other prizewinners also went on the trip and two adult supervisors accompanied us. At 17.20 that evening we took off from Dublin Airport, bound for JFK International Airport, New York. We arrived at our hotel in New York at 22.00 on Thursday night. We went for a short walk around the streets before going to bed.

The following day was spent on a busy sightseeing tour of New York City. Our first stop was Central Park. We were all amazed by the beauty of Central Park wedged in the centre of such a sprawling metropolis. We continued our visit, going to sights such as St. Patrick's Cathedral, the Financial District, Greenwich Village and Madison Square Gardens. After lunch we took a ferry to Staten Island,

passing by the Statue of Liberty on the way. We returned to Manhattan later on and we made our way to Ground Zero. We were all deeply moved by the many memorials in the area with messages to loved ones lost in the tragedy. We finished up the day at Times Square where we dined at the Hard Rock Café.

We set off early on Saturday morning for a guided tour of the United Nations complex. This building was most impressive and the tour was very interesting bringing us to important places such as the Security Council Chamber and also the General Assembly Chamber. That evening we visited the US naval carrier the USS Intrepid. This proved extremely popular with the whole group offering first hand experience of life at sea with the US navy. We brought the day to a close by dining at Planet Hollywood.

Early on Sunday morning we set off on our bus journey to Washington, stopping off in Philadelphia en route. I found Philadelphia extremely interesting. There was many items of historical interest in Philadelphia, which we all found quite impressive. We had a three hour guided tour of the city, which took, in the Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, Benjamin Franklin's grave as well as an authentic 18th century streetscape. We arrived in Washington around 8 o'clock that evening.

The next day was jam-packed with activities. We had a full day walking tour of Washington. This was my favourite part of the tour, visiting the many famous monuments in Washington. Thankfully we had magnificent weather with temperatures of over 25°C. We visited the Washington Memorial, the very impressive Lincoln Memorial, the WW II Memorial as well as the Korean and Viet-

nam Memorials. In the afternoon we went to Arlington Cemetery, where we visited the grave of John Fitzgerald Kennedy. The cemetery was awe-inspiring as we looked out over a sea of thousands of white headstones. We returned to the city centre and visited Capitol Hill, the National Air & Space Museum, the Natural History Museum as well as the National Art Gallery. After our full day walking tour we returned to the hotel for a well-deserved rest.

On Tuesday morning we went to the White House Visitor Centre. Unfortunately, due to security restrictions we couldn't go into the White House itself. However, the visitor centre was quite interesting nonetheless. After lunch we went to the Potomac Mills Shopping Centre, one of the biggest in the world where we literally shopped 'till we dropped'. The following morning was our last day in Washington, so we had the morning free to ourselves. Many of us went for another quick look at some of the major landmarks before leaving. After lunch we set off on our final journey in America, back to the airport in New York.

This trip was a once in a lifetime opportunity and I am very thankful for having had the opportunity to be a part of it. I will never forget the many remarkable sights that we saw and the extraordinary places that we visited. Finally, I wish to thank everyone working on The Graduate Youth Project, particularly our two group leaders Bronagh McLoughney and David Simpson. Their dedicated leadership and guidance made the trip all the more special. I am certain that this experience will be extremely beneficial to me and all other seventeen students who travelled for the rest of our lives.

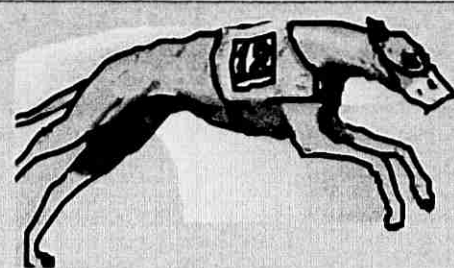
## LADIES LADDER

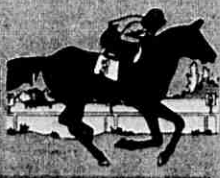

George Washington is now likely to head to the Breeders Cup where the Europeans hope to inflict the same damage as their golfing partners inflicted on the Americans in last weekends Ryder Cup.

County Wexford trainer Colm Murphy revealed over the weekend that his exciting hurdler Feathered Lady has met with a setback having damaged a ligament. The mare is unlikely to see racecourse action until early in 2007.

# IRISH RACING NEWS

## Sod Turned On First Stage Of Curragh Development

Mr. John O'Donoghue T.D., Minister For Arts, Sport and Tourism, announced funding for the re-development of the Curragh Racecourse to a total of €37.3 million early last week and turned the sod to start the project at the track before racing on Tuesday. The grant, representing 55% of eligible project costs, was approved at a meeting of the Board of Horse Racing Ireland at the Curragh. Minister O'Donoghue stated that "The Horse & Greyhound Racing Fund was established to ensure this type of development could take place and the Curragh plan is part of an overall programme which will see €200 million invested in racecourse development by the end of 2007. Racegoers and professionals alike expect the best facilities possible and the Curragh, as the Home of Flat Racing in Ireland and the theatre of so much racing history, will now be able to develop a facility of which Ireland can be proud." On Wednesday 13th September, Kildare County Council stated that all road pre-commencement planning condition submissions have been accepted which will allow work to begin immediately on the realignment of the road (R413) from the back of the existing stand at the Curragh to the north of the proposed site.

## Gowran Park Seeking New Manager

Gowran Park Racecourse is seeking a new manager following the departure from the post of Ms Jane Williams. She has accepted the position of personal assistant to the manager of Kilkenny College after spending two years at Gowran Park. The racecourse has thrived under Ms. Williams and last January's Thyestes Chase meeting attracted a huge crowd of 8,500 racegoers while the meeting was televised by R.T.E. for the first time in many years.

## McDonogh Holds Clear Lead

Jockey Declan McDonogh enjoyed a fantastic week at Listowel riding no fewer than seven winners and is now odds on to be crowned Irish Champion Flat Jockey for the first time in his career at the end of the season. His success on Tawaafur on Saturday was his 77th of the season and he holds a healthy lead over nearest rival Pat Smullen, who is on 65 winners, with just over a month of the season left. The 26 year old son of Des McDonogh, who will always be remembered as the man who trained the brilliant Monksfield to win successive runnings of the Cheltenham Champion Hurdle in 1978 and 1979, fully deserves to be crowned Champion as he has been riding superbly well all season and is a much improved rider over the last four to five seasons.

## Irish Racing Review (September 18th - 25th)

### FIRST DAY FEATURE ENDS IN DEAD-HEAT

There was a thrilling finish to the €40,000 Irish Stallion Farms European Breeders Fund Premier Nursery on the opening day of the Listowel Festival last Monday when the Official Judge could not separate Mica's Island (12/1) and Star Inside (5/2 fav) and declared a dead-heat. Andrew Oliver's Mica's Island, with Willie Supple on board, tried to make all of the running and having been headed over a furlong out by Declan McDonogh on Star Inside, they battled back bravely to share the spoils in a nail-biting finish.

### BEATRIX BAGS MILLION PRIZE

The inaugural running of the Shelbourne Hotel Goffs Million at the Curragh on Tuesday attracted an official attendance of 10,096 racegoers and the big race itself resulted in a very popular success for the Kevin Prendergast trained Miss Beatrix. Winner of the Moyglare Stud Stakes the previous month, Bill Durkan's ultra consistent and classy filly proved too good for her 28 rivals and this 6/1 winner received a tremendous reception in the winners' enclosure after the race. The Shelbourne Hotel Goffs Filies Five Hundred Race saw Paul Blockley's Wait Watcher land the spoils at 20/1 but following a Stewards' Enquiry, she was demoted to second place and the race was awarded to the 9/4 favourite, Silk Blossom, trained by Barry Hills and ridden by his son, Michael.

### JUBILANT NOTE STRIKES WINNING CHORD

Michael Murphy's Jubilant Note (7/1) ran out a decisive winner of the featured Listowel Races Supporters Club Lartigue Hurdle at Listowel on Tuesday. Sent to the front under Davy Russell after the third last flight,

this useful four year old stayed on strongly to defeat Querido (12/1) by five and a half lengths with Timber Scorpion (7/1) another length adrift in third spot.

### KERRY NATIONAL HAT-TRICK FOR RUBY

Jockey Ruby Walsh completed a hat-trick of wins in the Guinness Kerry National at Listowel on Wednesday as he partnered the Willie Mullins trained Bothar Na (10/1) to a hard fought victory over the favourite, Pearly Jack. Successful on Banasan in 2004 and on Euro Leader twelve months earlier, Ruby sent his mount to the front before the sixth last fence and he kept on strongly through the testing conditions to defeat Pearly Jack by two lengths. His trainer is now keen on aiming his charge at the Aintree Grand National next April.

### SKY TO SEA SPRINGS SURPRISE

The heavy ground made life difficult for horses and jockeys alike at Listowel on Thursday but jockey Denis Hogan made light of the difficult conditions when steering Richie Donohoe's Sky To Sea to a 16/1 victory in the featured Guinness Handicap Hurdle over two miles. Hogan's 5lb claim was a big help to the winner as this lightly weighted contender defeated The Last Laugh (8/1) by three and a half lengths.

### MCDONOGH SPARKLES WITH TREBLE

Declan McDonogh was in sparkling form at Listowel on Friday as he recorded an excellent treble during the course of the afternoon. He got the ball

rolling in the very first race when making all the running on Salishan (100/30) in the Kirby's Brogue Inn Handicap before guiding Kevin Prendergast's Talwin (8/1) to a narrow success in the featured Guinness Handicap over nine furlongs. McDonogh then completed his hat-trick by giving Phantom Lad (13/2) a typically strong drive to gain a short head verdict in the Dillon Plant Hire Maiden.

### CARBERRY SHINES ON SOME TIMBERING

Jockey Paul Carberry was at his confident best at Listowel on Saturday as he guided the Eamon Sheehy trained Some Timbering (7/4) to a comfortable victory in the Guinness Brewhouse Series Novice Chase over two miles. Challenging the favourite, Anno Jubilo, between the final two fences, Carberry allowed his mount to saunter home four lengths clear and his trainer now intends going for a Grade 3 novice chase event at Tipperary next Sunday.

The Willie Mullins trained Adamant Approach may be in the twilight of his career as a twelve year old but he has been in terrific form this year and proved a decisive winner of the featured Dawn Milk Handicap Chase on the final day of Listowel on Sunday. 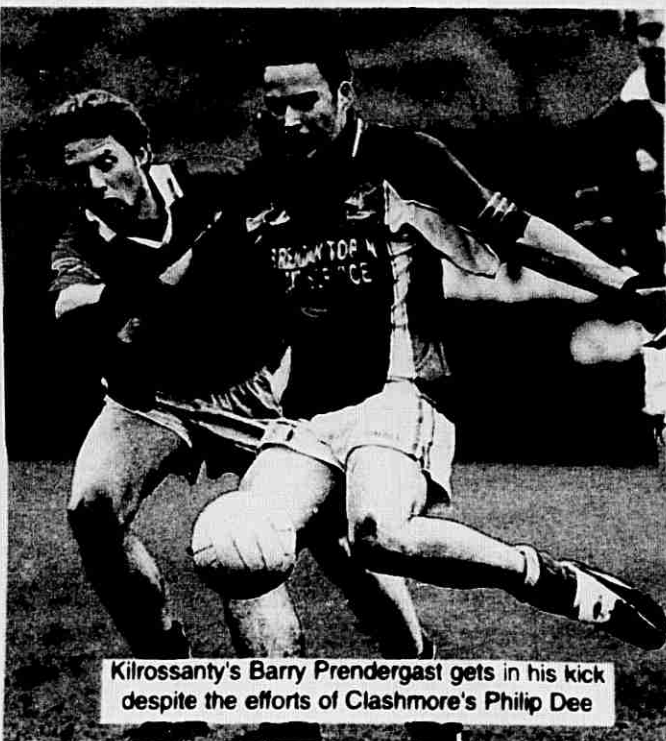

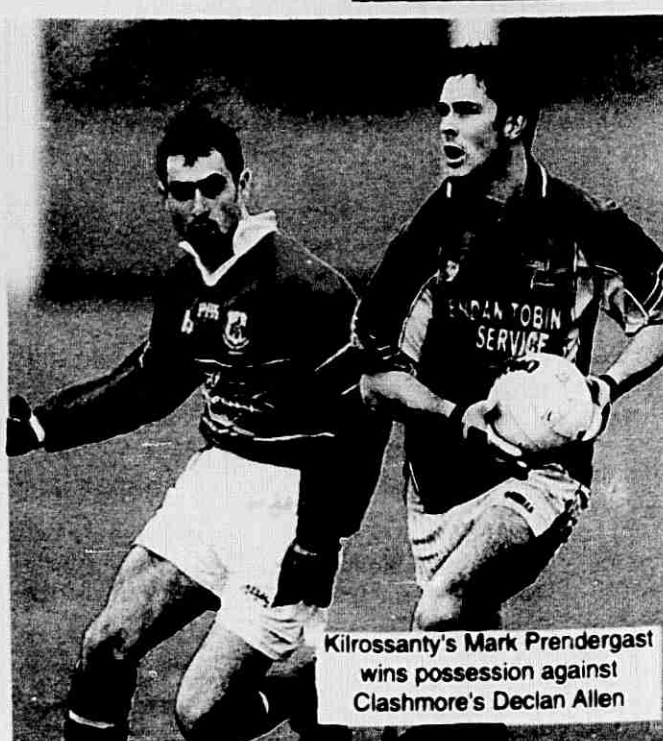

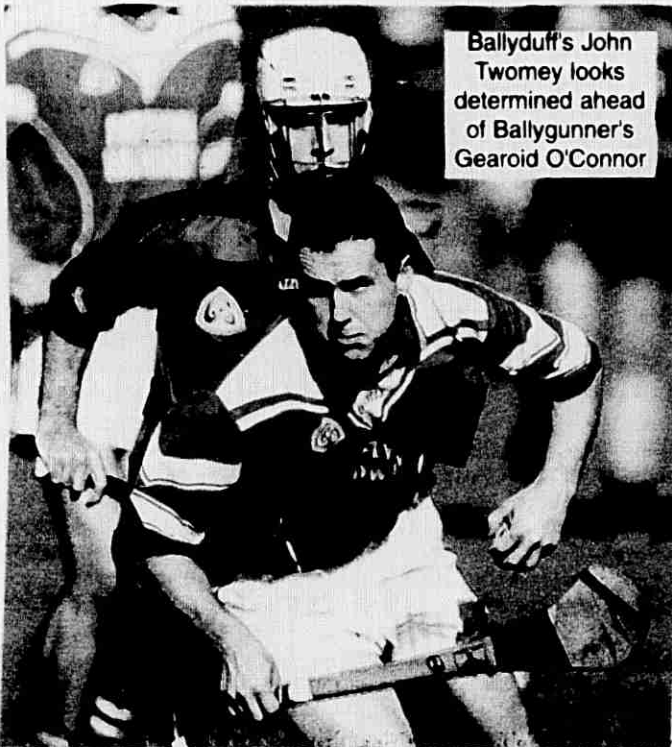

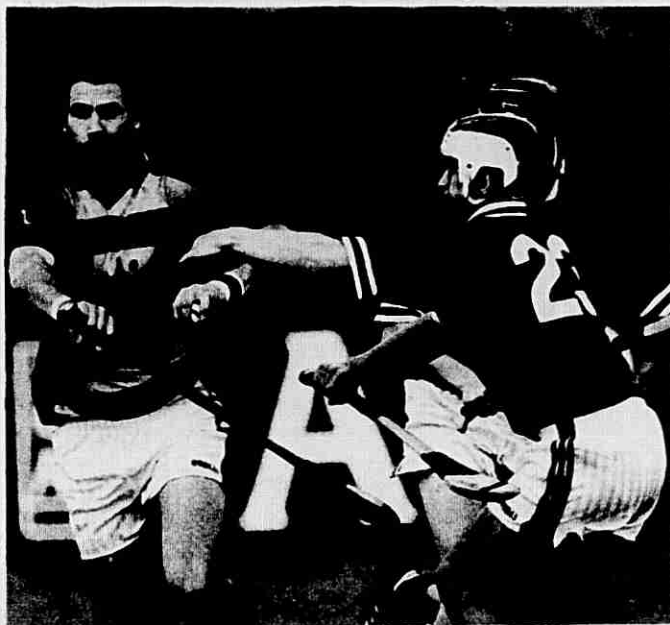

He is an extremely clever player that has great control as to where he wants to place the ball. He is the best player in the club to train on his own which is a vital aspect in the improvement of the basic skills in a player.

Everybody involved in the club are pure delighted to have such a representation on the International team but we should also spare a thought for another player that was so unlucky not to have made the team. Gemma Cliffe lost out on what a near 50/50 call. Although she was playing up an age group, she gave the selectors some serious food for thought with some outstanding performances in training. Her reaction to missing out couldn't be better, back to the court for more training... I've said it many times that Gemma is going to be the best female player ever to come out of

this country and nothing has changed my mind on this. She is the most naturally talented player in the club and that includes International players like Triston, Niamh and Julie. Gemma will bounce back from this disappointment better than ever.....

The raw talent in this group of players and the young players that are following them within the club is unbelievable. In a recent edition of the Evening Herald, top journalist, Lindie Naughton wrote an article about Julie's involvement on the senior team and described her as one of many brilliant young players from the Touraneena stable that has produced many National champions over the past few years. Let's hope they are right...

I hope that all the young players will see what possible if they put their minds to it. Don't be afraid to work hard. Parents of course play a vital piece in the development of a young sports stars future in their chosen sport or sports. They need their full support and encouragement at all times. We are lucky that we have this and this is one of the main reasons that the club has been so successful over the years.

Of course the cost of sending a team to this event is enormous and it wouldn't be possible to do without the help of a lot of people. The trip will be partly funded by the Racquetball Association of Ireland and as players; they then have to raise the remainder. The main problem is that the NGB get little or no funding towards sending International teams to compete in the major Championships and been a minority sport, you will appreciate that it is not easy to raise money. The players will be trying to sell tickets and gather sponsorship over the coming weeks and they would appreciate any financial help that is available. 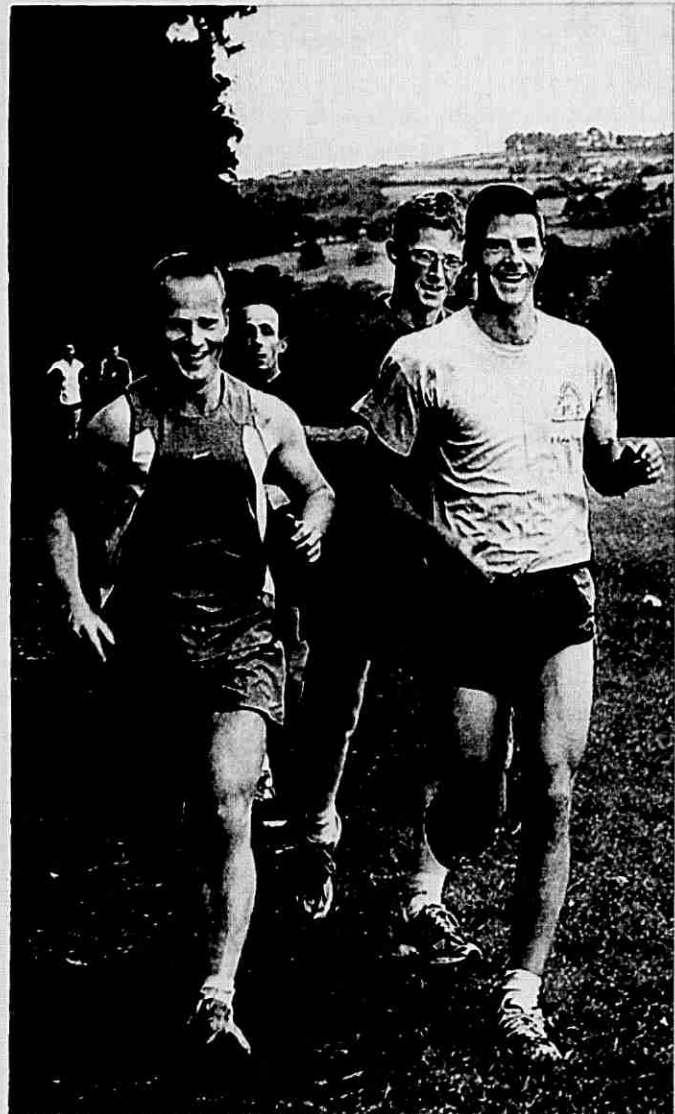

**MARATHON CORNER****HOW CAN I ESTIMATE MY FINISHING TIME FOR MY FIRST MARATHON?**

Well-trained runners sometimes can multiply their 10K time in minutes by 4.66 and predict their approximate marathon time. First-timers should probably multiply by 5, and then add some more time for safety. Another rough estimate can be had by multiplying your half-marathon time by two and adding 10 minutes. There also exist various online charts that allow you to predict pace based on your times at shorter distances. But don't get totally caught up on times. Your first marathon should be more about finishing.

**Be Realistic** — Your goals should be challenging, but achievable. If you are competing in your very first Marathon your goal is all about getting to the finish line, as you are now coming towards the end of your training schedule, your work load will decrease, don't try and cram in any extra training as this will have the opposite effect and will just leave you with tired legs. Be realistic.

**Put It In Writing** — Talking about your goals and writing them down are two completely different things. By writing down the specific steps that you will take to reach your goals, it will give you another reason to stay motivated and stick with your program. Many of the best athletes in the world write down specific goals. You will often see these athletes posting these goals just about anywhere—from their racing shoes to their bedroom wall—their goals are always in front of them. Reward yourself. It is very easy to be hard on yourself in the last couple of weeks and it is common to feel that you haven't enough training done as we approach the big day. Make sure you reward yourself for the progress that you have made along the way. You can do this by taking an extra day off, or enjoying a treat that you gave up during your training. But remember, too much of a good thing will defeat the purpose of your training program, so don't go overboard and keep your goals in the back of your mind.

**Tapering** — Getting fit is only part of the equation to having a great day. Not only do you need to ensure that you peak at the right time, which is on the day of the Marathon, but you also need to arrive fully recovered; that is fresh and without any feelings of fatigue. Peaking and tapering is about ensuring full recovery while maintaining performance adaptations. Why do you need to Taper? — You need to reduce your training volume (taper) to en-

sure full recovery. Running training causes muscle damage, fatigue and also depletes carbohydrate stores in muscle. You need to ensure that these factors are reduced as much as possible while at the same time you need to make sure that the adaptations your body has made from your training are not lost.

**Ensuring Full Recovery** — Let's take a closer look at the key factors you need to work on for full recovery in the taper:

**Muscle Damage** — By reducing training, and in particular long or intense speed training sessions, you will arrive at your event with fresh legs. Quite often marathoners and half marathoners find that it is their legs that give out in the latter part of a race. Starting with muscle soreness or muscle fatigue will increase the risk.

**Fatigue** — By fatigue I mean general fatigue from lots of hard training over a prolonged period (10 weeks plus). A proper taper will give you some mental drive, a very necessary component to ensure that you can focus for your event and push hard in the closing stages. Your central nervous system needs several days of light training as a minimum and the longer your build-up the longer the taper needs to be to remove this.

**Carbohydrate Stores** — Your body can only store a limited amount of carbohydrate in muscle (600g or so) and so your final weeks should focus on maximising this. You therefore need to ensure that you do keep eating well. But you can overdo it. If you have been training hard you will be eating more food than usual, so when you reduce your training in the taper, most athletes would be advised to keep their energy stores up by keeping the same eating patterns. This also follows the age-old rule of not changing anything close to your event. By also timing your meals immediately (<30min) after your training, you will also ensure that you store less of your food as body fat and more as muscle glycogen, which is good general training advice anyway.

**Maintaining Performance Components** — You need to make sure that while you are reducing your training so that you are fully recovered you will need to ensure that you maintain all the adaptations from your training. These adaptations have been hard earned so you want to hold onto them. The key areas are cardiovascular endurance, muscular endurance, cardiovascular speed, and muscular.

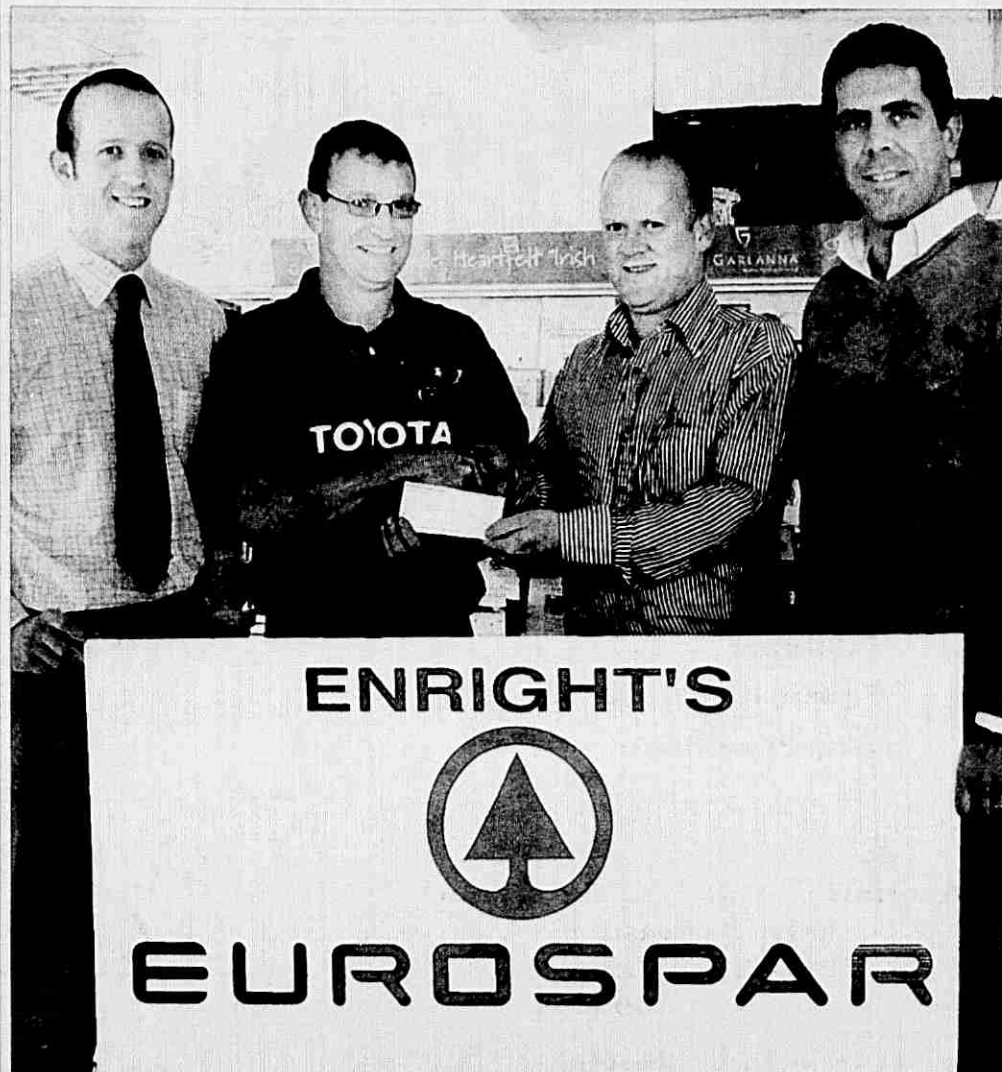

## Minister Says County Council Has Questions To Answer

Waterford County Council has questions to answer regarding planning in Ring, the Minister with responsibility for the Gaeltacht, Eamon O Cuiv said during a visit to the Waterford Gaeltacht last week.

Local residents in the Waterford Gaeltacht have held a number of protests at the council, complaining that Irish speakers find it difficult to secure planning permission and say local housing developments are pricing them out of the area.

Fears are growing that the Waterford Gaeltacht will not survive the influx of non-Irish speakers and the residents are reported to be considering tak-

ing legal as they say Irish language conditions on housing developments in the area are not being met.

"There are very serious questions to be asked of Waterford County Council in relation to the implementation of the 2000 Planning Act," Minister O Cuiv said.

"It says quite clearly in it that the county council has to preserve the linguistic integrity of the Gaeltacht.

"The equivalent is an ecological area. People would say of course we have to protect the wetlands or limestone paving. What we are saying here is that here is a little corner of the county that has something that is very special, not only to itself

but to the country and the county, and in planning, the planning laws require that you take steps to preserve that local way."

"Of course," he added, "anyone who wants to come in, whose language is Irish, and of course, if you are working in the area you can do that. But you wouldn't allow the indiscriminate building of large housing estates in that very small area that will totally upturn the linguistic integrity of the community.

"Anybody who thinks that it is possible to maintain a linguistic community that is absolutely swamped by huge numbers of housing built in housing estate form is not right."

## 'Deckie' Fitzgerald Returns To Dungarvan After 42 Years

**"I FEEL LIKE RIP VAN WINKLE" SAYS RETURNED IMMIGRANT**

The changes are remarkable. In his hometown of Dungarvan. In the country as a whole. Some good, some bad. Younger people hardly know anything of the deprivation that the country faced in the bad post World War II days. The church has been involved in a series of scandals and the country has never been so materially rich.

**BAD TIMES**

Chris (better known locally as Deckie) Fitzgerald knew the bad times. He was forced to leave Ireland to earn his 'fame and fortune' in the early '50's and has returned just once in the intervening years - forty-two years ago.

His hometown could hardly have changed more. The urban regeneration of quays. The development on the Glanbia site and the Tannery have transformed Dungarvan from a manufacturing base into a vibrant services and tourism led destination.

**INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION**

"It's like witnessing a second industrial revolution," Deckie, who is visiting with his wife, Priscilla, says.

"I feel like Rip Van Winkle just after waking up to see the changes here," the father of four joked.

Deckie was a champion handballer, teaming up with the legendary hurler John Kiely, to win a number of national championships for Waterford.

**EMIGRANT**

He left Ireland along with thousands of his contemporaries. But he had better prospects than most who swapped these shores for America. The youngest of a family of five his mother was determined that he finish his education. Deckie was the first in his family, indeed the first in Lough More (now known as Congress Villas), to complete secondary education at the Christian Brothers School.

He went on to continue his studies in America earning a BA and an MA. Deckie, who is now retired, went into the teaching profession, first as a teacher, then as a principal and finally a superintendent (Inspector) of schools. Throughout his time he worked in the state of Washington and then in Alaska, working mostly in Public Education and with Catholic schools.

**MANAGEMENT CONSULTANT**

He ended his working days as a management consultant with the Boeing aeronautical company. After retiring two years ago, Deckie, a proud grandfather of 10, has taken a number of tours of the EU. In his twenty day tour of Ireland he visited Kerry, Cork, Galway and Shannon.

**CHARLIE BIRD TO SIGN BOOK AT EASON**

Charlie Bird has been at the heart of every news event over the last twenty-five years, breaking exclusive stories and interviewing presidents and prime ministers. 'This is Charlie Bird' tells Charlie's own story and reveals how he has become one of Ireland's best known journalists.

Charlie Bird has made his name as a front of camera reporter covering the news as it happens, from wherever it happens. During his career as a news journalist he reported on the upheavals of the Haughey/Fitzgerald years: Charlie Haughey once said jokingly that he was his favourite reporter. He also covered the formation of the PD's, Labour Spring Tide in 1992; and the governments of Albert Reynold, John Bruton and Bertie Ahern.

Charlie Bird was RTE's contact with the IRA and now, for the first time, he reveals the background to his meetings with leading republicans in the lead-up to the 1994 and 1997 ceasefire declarations.

He also recalls the investiga-

tion which exposed wrong-doing at the National Irish Bank and the resulting stress in being involved in Ireland's longest libel case. Other major stories during his RTE career have included the Stardust tragedy, Mary Robinson's term as Irish President and the Columbia Three.

He also gives an insight into his foreign travels including the trial of Father Niall O'Brien in the Philippines, the release of Brian Keenan, meeting Nelson Mandela when he voted in the first post-apartheid elections in South Africa and the Asian tsunami in 2004.

Today Charlie is one of the best-known faces on Irish television. In telling his story, however, he goes beyond the news agenda to tell his own personal story, his family background and Dublin childhood as well as the difficulties that have arisen when he became part of the media story himself.
