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Eight CCTV Cameras To Target Anti Social Hot-Spots

A target date of late next year has been set for the installation of CCTV cameras in Dungarvan as the centre of town prepares to be ringed by cameras in a number of different locations as part of a bid to crack down on crime and provide enhanced policing

The issue was discussed as part of an update on the proposed locations for eight CCTV cameras in the town, during a meeting of Dungarvan Town Council on Monday night last.

Dungarvan was recently selected - together with a number of other towns - for the installation of CCTV cameras to aid the prosecution of offences.

An implementation committee has been set up, consisting of members of the Gardai, the Town Mayor, the Town Clerk and a representative from the Chamber of

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








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


















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

Samshire **Court Notice Published In** English Newspaper

Waterford County Council have sought to break the legal limbo that surrounds the removal of thousands of tonnes of waste from the Samshire Recycling Ltd plant in Lismore.

Denis McCarthy told the October meeting of the local authority that a court notice was published in national newspapers in Ireland and the UK, where it's believed the owner of Samshire Recycling, Graham Leake, is now based.

The county council are to take legal action against Mr. Leake under the Waste Management Act next month. There had been concerns over the go-ahead of the action after a summons was returned unopened a number of months ago.

The legal logjam has resulted in a waste mountain building up at the entrance to the facility. The council said they would not remove the waste until legal action

CO. WATERFORD BEEKEEPERS ASSOC.

You will all have received notification of the forthcoming AGM in the post over the past few days. We would naturally like as many of you as possible to attend, for a number of reasons. One of these is that the AGM is when most of those present pay their subscription fees for the coming season, and once paid this is no longer an issue for the treasurer to haul in. As most of you know the membership includes a third party insurance for damages that your bees may cause to others or their animals and this is the reason why a lot of members join - a useful thing to have but hardly a great reason for membership. A second reason for coming is to give some input into what you want the Association to provide in the way of lectures for the coming winter and spring. The Armagh Association deal with this in a unique way : members are given a topic on which to prepare a short talk for the coming month, so that in turn all members contribute and it makes demands on all. I wonder if this would be a model we could copy! For whatever reason we hope to see you all on Tuesday 24th October at Main Street in Dungarvan beginning at an earlier hour of 7. 30 p.m. We are hoping to have a short talk by a guest speaker after the AGM but as yet I cannot confirm this

An issue that will have crossed the minds of most of us over the past months is where our supply of jars for next year is coming from. I know that several members have made their own arrangements about sourcing jars, but there is always a saving to be made by bulk buying so let us talk about that too. If we continue to get harvests like the previous years we will require jars as never before and, as I realized, the time to go about securing jars is not when the honey is harvested! I have only anecdotal accounts about the honey harvest in Co. Waterford but these would indicate that it was of record proportions. So good luck to us all. For those of you who wish to sell their honey I can safely say that there are no problems in selling local honey - just ask around. All we can do is harvest what the bees have collected and prepared but I suppose there is a case for stating that some do this better than others.

Should anybody be in doubt we can now firmly establish that Autumn is here with lots of rain and high winds and even a few freak storms. I was aware of this when visiting an apiary a few days ago to discover that the roofs of four hives had blown off and lay up to twenty yards from the hives. Because the hives are made of polystyrene the roof of each was weighed down with a solid brick and yet the wind took them. Luckily the hives themselves are so heavy with stores that they were in no danger of blowing over. When I arrived on the scene the bees were gathered on the tops of the frames as if to keep the heat in and possibly the rain out and while I expected some gratitude for providing a roof all I got was a very tetchy response. I put this down to the availability of ivy nectar and pollen - it does not seem to bring out the best in our



bees' temperament.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL EXHIBITION AND KILLOTERAN'S ANCIENT MILL



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An exhibition Migrants Mariners Merchants is running until Tuesday 28 November at the Treasures Museum in Waterford City. featuring recent archaeological discoveries along the route of the N25 Waterford bypass. It has been assembled by the National

When a road route is chosen, teams of archaeologists monitor the stripping off of the topsoil, looking for charcoal, stone tools or the dark imprints that might mark the locations of house posts or anything else that might point to significant ancient human activity Excavations follow of any important sites.

In this way the Viking site at Woodstown came to light and some of it-mainly two areas marked for culverts-was excavated and a gateway; some metal working areas and metal traders' lead weights were found along with a warrior's grave just outside the boundary trench-and bank. The exhibition features some of the more decorative weights including a fine one with an enamelled black-and white face which forms the logo of the exhibition. A highlight is the beautifully conserved sword and other weapons from the grave.

A site on the Killoteran stream near Kilmeaden was excavated to reveal Ireland's oldest known vertical-wheeled water mill, used for grinding corn. The grinding stone is on show and there is a nice scale model of what the mill might have looked like in use in the Early Christian fourth to sixth centuries. The next-oldest such mill dates from the seventh century and was found at Little Island in Cork. Corn mills earlier than these all had horizontally-mounted water wheels.

From the Kilkenny side some Middle Stone Age (Mesolithic) remains were found and from the New Stone Age (Neolithic), a team excavated the remains of a house made people from Ireland's first farming period. Both sites had beautifully made stone tools and there was also jewellery.

As well as objects there are information panels and videos of Woodstown and of the excavation of the water mill.

This lavish exhibition is a once-off and well worth seeing. By Dominic Berridge



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

The shy orang-utan, whose name means 'man of the woods', lives in the rain forests of Borneo and Sumatra. This second largest member of the ape family is reddish-brown in colour and lives mainly on fruit.

Chimpanzees Live In Family Groups

Most of the ape family are found in the forests and jungles of Africa, South America and Asia. Chimpanzees live in family groups in the rainforests of central and west Africa. They live on fruit, leaves and roots. They also enjoy ants, when they find an ants nest.

Apes Use Sticks As Tools

Apes are very intelligent. They can work out simple problems, and they can use their hands and feet quiet skilfully. A chimpanzee will use a stick to get to out-of reach fruit or insects, spider monkeys use sticks as weapons, throwing them at any potential threat, and the orang-utan will often use a large leaf as an umbrella.

Apes Are Very Noisy

Most apes and monkeys are noisy but the howler monkey, the largest South American monkey, beats them all. They start howling as soon as they wake up, the noise being a signal to others that this territory is taken. Both males and females howl but the male has a much louder and deeper sound which can be heard

3-5km (2-3 miles) away. A series of bones in the throat form an echo chamber (giving the animal the appearance of having a double chin), which magnifies the sound. Another noisy monkey is the proboscis monkey of Borneo which makes loud trumpeting noises through its long, drooping nose.

The stripping of democracy from Local Government was all too apparent at the most recent meeting of Waterford County Council. Setting of waste charges, once the preserve of the elected members, is just one in a long line of functions given over to the County Manager by the Government.

As a number of county councillors have stated in the wake of the County Manager's decision to hike up the cost of waste charges (albeit not as significantly as was previously feared) the executive holds all the cards. In fact, some councillors weren't even aware of the issue before the October meeting

Now, even the charade of open public debate has been removed. By imposing a new charge two months before the estimates meeting, the County Manager exposed as nothing more than empty rhetoric the conceit that local democracy remains alive. After all, the County Manager need not listen to the arguments of those elected when, as will happen quite soon, the council implements the South East Waste Management Plan and locates an incinerator somewhere

Local Government should be a cornerstone of democracy, yet on environmental issues for one, it is instead subject to dictatorial imposition, once dubbed by councillor Tom Higgins,

This power vacuum has meant it is now up to community groups to use legal measures - at a significant cost to themselves - to overturn contentious plans. Without an effective and powerful opposition to the unelected executives and their hired consultants, poor locations for environmental infrastructure have been proposed. A case in point is the Superdump proposed for Garrynagree which was fought tooth and nail by the Lickey Concern Group.

Viewpoint is very much against the privatisation of the council's waste service. But the need for a strong voice within the community to air the public's legitimate concerns is, sadly, missing. Local Democracy needs a strong voice, instead, at this point in time at least, it is a little more than a whisper in the wilderness.

SAMSHIRE TIPHEAD NEEDS TO BE REMOVED

For evidence of the problems that can arise when private companies becoming involved in ill-thought-out Public Private Partnerships, you need look no further than to Lismore, and Samshire Recycling in particular.

The partnership with Samshire, when kerbside recycling was introduced some time ago began in a blaze of glory. Samshire was lauded by Waterford County Council as a key player in its progressive recycling scheme. Yet, the difficulties the company found themselves mired in over the space of a few short months quickly became evident.

It began when thousands of tonnes of waste were seized by Dutch officials in a port in the Netherlands, and sent back to Ireland, because the waste was not properly segregated. Complaints from residents in Lismore also began to flood in, and were aired publicly by members of Lismore Town Council, and it soon became evident that Samshire was simply unable to cope with the sheer volume of waste being produced. Since then, a mountain of waste began to build up at the facility. Even though Waterford County Council threatened legal action, and are finally set to have their day in court next month, it looks unlikely that they will face Graham Leake, the owner of Samshire, who has returned to England

Meanwhile, a festering pile of waste is attracting vermin, and now we're being informed that some residents in Lismore are dumping their waste at the IDA supported facility. Waterford County Council owe the people of Lismore, Towns champions, to do everything they can to remove this disgusting eyesore.

PENALISE COWBOY DEVELOPERS

Currently, there is a growing problem with developers failing to finish off estates, which has the knock-on effect of delaying the county council in taking-over estates - often for months and even, in a smaller number of cases, for years. Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan listed a horror story of unfinished works at some estates, including weeds in green areas, waterlogged areas and drain covers either sunken or raised on roads.

It's a truly horrible situation for residents who've paid, in most cases, extremely large amounts of money, and borrowed heavily to live in these estates. The very least that residents should come to expect is that the developer would finish off their estates. But all too often, the work is not up to scratch. It's time now that Cllr. Michael O'Riordan's call to prevent cowboy developers from ever being granted planning permission again to be implemented.





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

People will have noticed that two memorial stones erected by their fellow workers have been cleaned up recently. One is near the quarry on the coast road dedicated to Martin Morrissey who died tragically on 2nd May 1952; the second is on the road to Kilmacthomas not far from the five crossroads dedicated to James Higgins who also died tragically on 21st November 1951.

Headstones

The headstones of a number of priests who served in the parish of Stradbally, Ballylaneen and Faha were recently cleaned and the difference is plain to be seen as one enters Holy Cross Church, Stradbally. The headstones in memory of the priests who served in the parish make interesting reading. One is in memory of Fr. Patrick O'Connor who died aged 63 on 2nd March 1919 while another was erected by Canon Richard Dunphy in memory of his brother Fr. Edmond Dunphy who spent twenty years as a Parish Priest and died on 7th March 1915. One in memory of Canon Edmond English who ministered in the parish from 1937 to 1959 and died on 14th January 1959. Fr. John Curran was a curate in the parish and died on 8th March 1947. Fr. Patrick Farrell who was a curate in the parish for a number of vears returned as parish priest in 1964 until his death on 23rd November 1978. Fr. Patrick O'Neill was in Dunhill before coming to Stradbally and died on 20th September 1937 in the forty third year of his priesthood. Fr. John Murphy died on 3rd April 1936 and Fr. Maurice Fennell was curate from 1962 to 1968 and died aged 52 years on 30th July 1968. Fr. John Lennon served in the parish from 1919 to 1934. Fr. William Burke served as curate for a number of years before his death on the 11th January 1944

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

This week we visit The Parish of Cappoquin

Cappoquin was once part of Lismore parish but appears to have separated in about 1750, during the episcopacy of Dr. Creagh. In geographic terms the parish is very long and narrow, stretching from the top of the Knockmealdown range to the River Bride, about 16 miles. It had only one single public church, which was situated centrally. The church dates from the early 19th century. On June 13 1819, Sir John Keane leased out the site to John Hely, esq. and Michael Kerrissy for one shilling per year, forever, if demanded

The erection of the present church was completed in 1822, it has a plain but neat and substantial edifice, dedicated under the patronage of Our Lady's Nativity'. The previous church had been a humble thatched chapel, furnished with three wooden galleries that stood at a place called Glenwheelan, about a mile to the west of Cappoquin, on the Lismore road. The present church has been repaired and renovated many times. In 1856 Rev. Michael Spratt erected the surrounding wall, topped by iron railings. In 1872 the church floor was tiled and seating provided, prior to this seating was scarce and the worshiper would have knelt, without support, often on a clay or concrete floor. It was, according to the historian Canon Power, under those circumstances that the unseemly fashion of kneeling on one knee only, like a sharpshooter, became popular.

"In the Cathedral in Waterford is a small silver chalice which had originally been kept in the church in Cappoquin. It belonged to the historian Geoffrey Keating, it came into the possession of the Rev Michael Keating, the first Parish Priest of Cappoquin. Three other small antique silver chalices, two of them of the 17th century, likewise belong to this church. They are inscribed respectively:- "Orate pro aiá Dae Catherinae Shee quae hunc calicem fieri fecit, Ao 1629", "Pray for the soul of Hugh Flyn and Margaret His Wife, Amen. Anno Domini 1684", "Jacobus Launders me fieri fecit in usum parochiae de Cappoquin, 1803'

New Vehicular Underpass Named

A local community - which secured an underpass on the new multi-million euro Piltown Cross/Kinsalebeg road realignment could be forgiven for celebrating another victory over officialdom after the community's decision on the naming of a new underpass was agreed at the October meeting of Waterford County Council.

The community had already ditched the Departments plans to only provide a pedestrian underpass, fighting a high profile campaign for a vehicular underpass instead, culminating in a noisy protest during the 'turning the sod' ceremony officiated by Transport Minister Martin Cullen.

A suspected Dublin gang broke into three premises in Tallow in late night raids last week.

The Post Office, the fire station and the Centra in the town were all broken into between 3am and 4am in the early hours of Wednesday morning last.

Sponsored Walk To Honour **Cahir Nuns**

A 100 mile sponsored walk from Wales to Cahir will pass through Dungarvan on Monday 23rd of October in honour of the Nuns who left Cahir to set up Mary Immaculate College in Pem-brokeshire in Wales in 1956.

The massive trek will begin at Mary Immaculate School in Haverfordwest taking in Pem-broke Dock, Rosslare, Wellington Bridge, Tramore, Dungarvan before going on to Clogeen and finally finishing in Cahir.

The walk is primarily in honour of Mother Eucharia who taught in Wales in 1954. She was approached by families in Haverfordwest who found difficulties in bringing up children in the Catholic faith. She returned to Cahir determined to help these people. Thanks to her efforts, on October 16th 1956 Penbryn, a private house with 11/2 acres was purchased with a view to opening an Independent school the following January. The house was renamed Mary Immaculate. On January 15th 1957 the school opened with 33 pupils.

Fifty years later, the school has 214 pupils aged 3-11. A new school is being built on the site of the convent at a cost of around 3 million of which the parish has to



Extension To Liability Insurance

A new insurance scheme whereby groups, or societies or businesses who wish to obtain temporary use of club property must produce a certificate of insurance cover when applying for use of the said property.

The special insurance cover can be obtained from the official GAA insurers, Coyle Hamilton.

Clubs who loan or rent a part of their property without examining the applicants certificate of cover are taking a very dangerous risk and will be in breach of the agreement.

It was in the headlines all last week with GAA President Nicky Brennan hitting out hard on the topic on a number of oc-

While there is absolutely no evidence that managers are being paid for their services, there are very strong suspicions that they are being well looked after and are being well reimbursed financially. In the absence of proof no action can be taken, but the President has firmly declared that action will be taken against counties who pay team managers. The same will apply at club level.

On two or three occasions recently high profile people who were 'would be' managers said they had negotiated with county boards but could 'not agree terms.' This surely proves that payment was an element in the negotiations.




