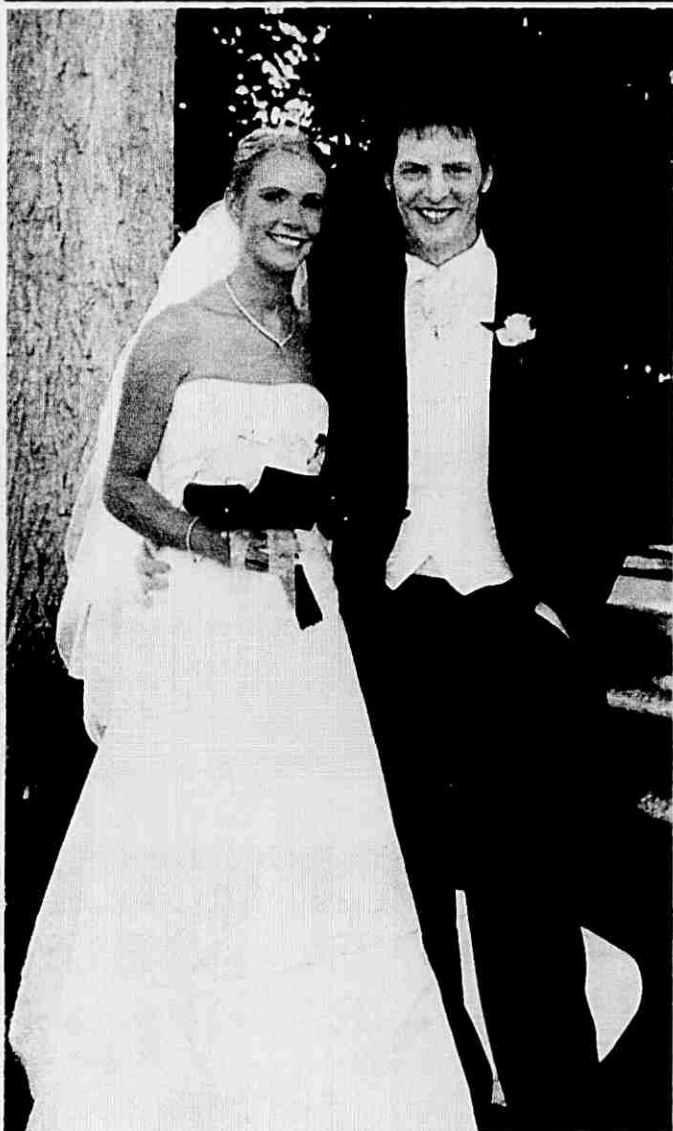

Speed Cameras For County's Death Traps

PIKE AMONG LIST OF ROADS TO BE TARGETED

Mobile and fixed speed cameras are to be put in place on some of the county's worst death traps in a bid to curb the continuing carnage on our roads.

The so-called "red zones" will cover an eight kilometre stretch of road, and will be reduced to amber and green zones once the accident rate lowers.

Both the Pike, one of the most notorious accident blackspots in the county, and a stretch of road on the main Cappoquin to Dungarvan road are to be targeted under the new road safety initiative which aims to crackdown on speeding.

ENFORCING

A special speed limit is already in place at the Pike, but problems with enforcing the

60kmph speed limit have emerged.

"I delighted with this new initiative," Fine Gael councillor, Fred Forsey, who is also a driving instructor in Dungarvan, said.

"Something has to happen soon. We've seen far too much carnage on our roads over the past number of years, and those figures seem to keep climbing with every year.

"I feel this will help the situation and help to reduce the number of deaths and the horrific injuries that are happening on our roads.

"How this will work is the cameras will be digital so the Gardai can download the images.

Anyone then caught speeding can then be successfully prosecuted.

He said that it was also welcome that the private company running the system will receive

a fixed sum each year, rather than be paid by the number of prosecutions they take.

PRIVATISED

Privatised speed cameras will be sited along these stretches of road when they are rolled out next year, and from November, Gardai will use this information



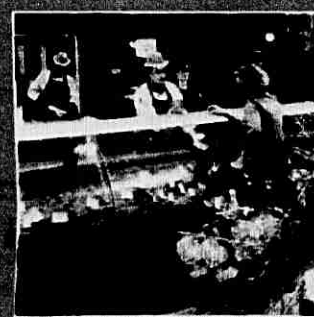

Parking Chaos At Garranbane School

There is chaos at Garranbane school when parents pick up and drop off children for school, a meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Calling for the road to be widened at the rear of the school, Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan said the issue was discussed at the area meeting of the Dungarvan elected representatives.

"The current situation when parents are either dropping off or picking up their children from school is chaotic.

"If the road was widened slightly it would certainly go along way towards alleviating the problem.

NEW SITE

"The neighbouring landowner has agreed to cede the portion of land required and I believe the council should avail of this offer," Cllr. Geoghegan said.

"The school itself is expanding at a rapid rate due to the expansion of Ballinroad and the surrounding area with more developments and more students coming on line shortly.

"These developments have resulted in very large development contributions being paid to the county council and I believe there is an onus on the council to carry out this work.

The school authorities themselves have been very proactive and have in fact provided a

car park for staff and visitors.

"I am asking that the council take another look at the issue before making any final decision," Cllr. Geoghegan added.

SCHOOL POPULATION DOUBLED

The issue was initially raised by Cllr. Brendan Mansfield (SF) who said the school population has almost doubled and it has developed from a two teacher school to one with a staff of 14 teachers and 195 pupils.

The school had undertaken at its own expense the provision of two car parks costing 20,000 euro. Now the adjacent landowner was prepared to give a portion of land free of charge in order to widen the roadway and create extra parking facilities.

Cllr. Mansfield called on the County Manager to make this a priority issue and to take up the landowner on the offer in the interests of safety. With delays

over an application to the Department of Education, he went on to call on the council to get in touch with the Department to speed the matter up.

ACCIDENT WAITING TO HAPPEN

Cllr. Pat Nugent (FG) said parking at the school is chaotic and was "an accident waiting to happen."

Labour councillor, Teresa Wright, said she worked in the area and could guarantee that there would be an accident unless something was done.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said the land offered to the school was below road level and an expensive retaining wall would have to be built. This would require planning permission and he said there was not the budget to do the work. He suggested that the school management apply for planning permission and when work was completed the council would surface dress it.

BRENT GEESE RETURNING

Light-bellied Brent Geese are now returning from the Arctic to spend the winter on Ireland's estuaries where they feed on green seaweed and on the now rare Zostera sea grass. As of 14 October none had yet been spotted at Dungarvan, making them a little late.

Zostera is their ideal food and it is nourishing enough for them that they can eat enough to thrive in just a few hours each day. A combination of disease, nitrate pollution and smothering by the ever more flourishing green seaweeds seem to act together to harm the Zostera grass. Green seaweed is less digestible and the geese take more time to pick up the larger amount that they need.

In Dungarvan both of these food sources are likely to have run out by November/December and the birds will move onto grass. The pitch and putt course at Dungarvan suits them well and their grazing and droppings seem to suit the winter management of this amenity, when it is too

soft to play. Those who study birds in detail also find it a good place to read the numbers on plastic leg rings that some of the geese have been fitted with.

In the last couple of years tiny radio transmitters have been attached to a few of the geese in order to follow their migrations with satellite technology. This tells biologists how much the birds move between wintering grounds and what routes they take for the journeys between Canada and Ireland.

A look at the project website (see below) shows that the satellite-tagged birds (and presumably most of the others) birds are staging in Iceland awaiting better weather.

Two Waterford Schools Get Cash Boost For Play Areas

Better outdoor play areas are on the way for two schools in Waterford after a Government cash boost aimed at making learning more enjoyable for children, according to local Fianna Fail TD, Ollie Wilkinson. "The two schools have between them been allocated 13,935 euro for the development of their play facilities." Clashmore NS received 6,435

euro while Modeligo NS got 7,500 euro. "The type of projects funded cover grassing/tarmacadam of play areas, supply of goal posts, nets, basketball hoops and other recreational facilities for outdoor play areas. "I am delighted this money has come through for these schools and I have no doubt it will be put to good use for the benefit of school children.

"The Clar primary school outdoor play facilities enhancement scheme is a jointly funded scheme aimed at improving outdoor play facilities in small rural primary schools in targeted areas. "Clar and the Department of Education and Science funds 75% of the cost, supplemented by a 25% contribution from local sources up to a maximum of 10,000 euro," said Deputy

Wilkinson. Fianna Fail Senator Brendan Kenneally also welcomed the news. He said: "This major contribution will mean the children of these schools can benefit from upgraded and new play facilities, which is important to the mental and physical health and wellbeing of our children. I am delighted that Clashmore NS and Modeligo NS will benefit from the scheme."

Perfectly Balanced

The human skeleton is a truly amazing piece of machinery with well over 200 bones, articulated by an extremely complex arrangement of muscles, ligaments and tendons. In a fit and healthy individual all these elements are perfectly balanced, allowing for immense strength and an incredible range of movement, beautifully orchestrated by an unfathomable network of nerves. These nerves (together with the blood vessels which provide nourishment for the musculoskeletal system) pass through tiny purpose-built channels within the system with only just enough space to function effectively. It is a feat of design and engineering beyond anything human beings have ever been able to achieve. Yet as many people will testify, this intricate system can be quite easily knocked out of its precise alignment. Fantastic Fish

When searching for food, the mudskipper - found around the coasts of Africa, Asia and Australia - will come out of the water, using its specially adapted fins as legs. It seems to like being out of the water - it will bask in the sun and will often climb trees to find a sunny spot.



Another fish that 'walks' is the tripod fish. Its two chest fins and its tail fin have evolved into long, stiff spines on which the fish walks along the sea-bed.

A Fish Can Give An Electric Shock

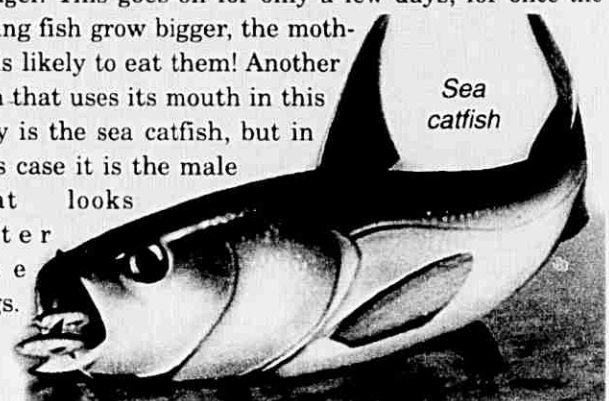
One member of the catfish family is capable of giving out an electric shock to ward off danger. This is the electric catfish which is found in the seas of Africa. Although it can give a powerful shock, it is a delicacy in the Middle East, where it is known as the raad, or thunder fish.

A Fish Can Kill A Person

Several species of fish can make electricity, using specially adapted muscles which create electric impulses instead of movement. Fish are the only creatures that can do this. Electric rays, of which there are about 30 species, can create enough power to disable a person temporarily. However, it is a freshwater creature that produces the most electricity of all. The electric eel found in the rivers of South America, can produce enough power to kill a person outright.

A Mouthful Of Fish

After laying some 50 to 100 eggs, the female Egyptian mouth brooder carries them around in her mouth for safety. Even after they have hatched, the young fish continue to use their mother's mouth to escape from danger. This goes on for only a few days, for once the young fish grow bigger, the mother is likely to eat them! Another fish that uses its mouth in this way is the sea catfish, but in this case it is the male that looks after the eggs.

Viewpoint

TAOISEACH'S VISIT AND THE GAGGED MEDIA

The visit of An Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, to Dungarvan, while undoubtedly an honour for the town, certainly managed to leave a sour taste in the mouth for some - not least the local hacks. While it is undoubtedly a great honour for this constituency to host a Taoiseach of any political hue, some, Viewpoint included, were less than impressed with the way the media was effectively gagged by the Taoiseach's entourage.

The local media pack gathered at 12.30 pm at Lawlors Hotel for a promised press conference. The visit of An Taoiseach provided local hacks with a great opportunity to hear what would be delivered to the constituency, and from Viewpoint's point of view, to the west of Kilmacthomas in particular. Everything was in place for a rigorous question and answer session with the three local members of the media, along with a journalist from the Irish Times boning up on their list of hard questions for the leader. But the Teflon Taoiseach's stock certainly lowered in this columnist's eyes when, with little ado, the media were rounded up by his press officer shortly after 1pm and were told that Mr. Ahern would take just four questions - one each for the journalists present. But worse was to come for the local fourth estate. We were TOLD the questions we were to ASK!

The press officer counted off on his fingers the allowed questions - WE WERE TOLD one would be on Radiotherapy, one on University status for WIT, the third on the election, and finally one on the resignation of Fianna Fail TD, Jim Glennon, in Dublin. The only leeway the local journos were given was which one would ask which particular question. At this ridiculous point in the shabby affair, the local hacks were far too compliant, and in hindsight, should have demanded to ask their own questions, and failing that leave.

Viewpoint has come across a number of national political figures over the past few years including Labour, Fine Gael, Sinn Féin and indeed other Fianna Fail heavyhitters. NEVER were we treated with such blatant disrespect. Despite hectic schedules that had to be adhered to, these figures made time for the local media to ask anything we wished to.

The miffed media gathered sulkily in the reception room of Lawlors Hotel, when Bertie finally joined us followed by Fianna Fail TD Ollie Wilkinson, Minister, Martin Cullen, and Senator Brendan Kenneally along with a number of councillors who all pressed, ears cocked, into the tiny room. There was not much to listen to. As we asked our questions - the able press officer looking over us hawkishly - Bertie proceeded to read out the answers from a shelf of press releases in front of him. Barely had the press conference begun than it ended. And his whirlwind tour of the constituency continued.

PLAYGROUND

But the media weren't the only ones left miffed. In one case - and Viewpoint does not wish to come across as anti-Ahern in any way - the planned official opening of a playground in Lismore and Ballysaggart was called off after accusations from the committee that the good work of the community was being politically hijacked. After protests from the playground committee, who threatened to absent themselves from the event, a confrontation was avoided and the opening called off until a later time. If, as the media discovered to its own loss, the hard questions are not asked - and indeed it would have been fascinating to know his response to the committee's action - and the top political honchos are able to bluster their way over the fourth estate, then there really is not much justification in covering an event where empty toothless press releases cover up for real debate.

INVEST IN WATERFORD

A very successful seminar was held by Waterford County Council in Clonea Strand Hotel last week, attended by over 200 of the great and good of the county, including many of the most successful businessmen, developers, and entrepreneurs that this county has produced and has been shaped by. The outlook for the county was more rosy than being viewed through rose tinted spectacles. To borrow a phrase, there's a lot done and lot more to do as far as putting the economic climate of the county to rights. It was said to Viewpoint more than once at the same seminar that the county, for far too long, has hidden its light under a bushel. And that the county needs to showcase all it has to offer. The media has come in for some criticism in this regard, but negative stories always emanate from somewhere and someone and need to and must be exposed and highlighted.

The county has much to be proud of. And should not be afraid of saying so. Its natural beauty; its qualified and educated workforce; its developing infrastructure; the pro-active leadership in the council are just some of the facets that make Waterford the tremendous county to live and work in that it undoubtedly is. Hopefully, the two new websites launched at the seminar will go some way towards bringing this to the attention of people home and abroad. It's certainly a step in the right direction.

Cross on Cruachan Revisited and Repainted

On a clear day, those who have good eyesight may see from the town or the countryside around, a cross which dominates the summit of Cruachan. This is the Cross of Hope and Peace, erected by the parishioners of Kilgobinet, Colligan and Kilbrien in August of the Marian Year almost two decades ago. It was blessed during Mass on the summit which was attended by several hundred people.

Later, during the war in Bosnia, there was a Prayer Vigil held at the cross and a plaque was attached at that stage to note that the people of Ireland and the local parishes in particular, were praying for peace in the world as well as in Bosnia.

The original idea was conceived by the then Curate, Fr Pat Butler during the period when Fr. Rd. Doherty was Parish Priest and with the trojan work of a group of parishioners, the Cross was erected to stand proudly, visible from most of the countryside around. It was designed by John Hammond, constructed in the midlands and brought by road to the base of Cruachan. It was then taken to the sum-

mit with some difficulty, but successfully with the assistance of donated machinery and with the willing help of local volunteers.

Periodically over the years, trips were made to the hill-top and when Fr. Pat left the parish, the Moroney family promised him that they would care for the cross and maintain it against the ravages of the weather. Last year, they undertook to refurbish the cross and recently, this became a reality when a group went to the summit on two occasions and completely repainted the cross in white to once more stand clear against the blue sky behind.

Fr. Pat returned with the group to the summit and they had 'some very special time there' including some time for private prayer. He hopes that the cross, a symbol of our Christian faith will continue to be a strong presence in the Dungarvan catchment area and will endure for many years to come.

The members of the Moroney family have committed themselves to maintain the cross over the generations and so, its future maintenance and welfare is secure.

Unveiling of Monument at Baile na nGall



Charles J. "Nomad" McGuinness
1893-1947

Charles McGuinness was born in Derry in 1893. At the age of fourteen he went to sea. He returned to Derry 1920 and was involved in defending the Catholics in the Derry riots. He was a commander of the 3rd Battalion of the IRA's Northern Division and in this capacity he led a flying column in Donegal in 1921. He came to fame by assisting in the breakout of Frank Carty, Dáil Deputy for Sligo from Derry Gaol in February 1921.

In April 1921 he is said to have shot Sgt. Higgins outside St. Eugene's.

In June 1921 he was captured and wounded in Belfast and was imprisoned in Ebrington Military Barracks, Derry. He

was so badly wounded that they did not think him to be a threat. Fr. Coyle of Derry says that he escaped by being smuggled out in a coffin.

The next we hear of McGuinness, he was in Dublin with Liam Mellows and the rest of the GHQ staff. Robert Briscoe and McGuinness were sent to Germany to secure arms. At a meeting of the Southern Command it was suggested to bring the arms in at Myross, Co. Cork, but Pax Whelan Dungarvan, totally rejected this and suggested that they land in Helvick, Ring.

Learning that Maire Comerford was visiting Dungarvan, the GHQ asked her to carry out an independent estimate of the depth of the water in the Ring harbour. The report was favourable and was confirmed when James O'Donovan, introduced her to a sea captain who brought with him complete nautical maps of the southern approaches.

The first ship that McGuinness got was called The Anita. She had some engine problems and while they were in port he was paying men with large notes, at which the Germans became suspicious and raided the boat. A large quantity of rifles were found on board and McGuinness was put in jail. Briscoe hired a good lawyer for McGuinness and when the case

came to court, it was not a big crime to smuggle guns to fight the British and he received a nominal fine of £5.

The next ship that McGuinness required was the Karl Marx. This was towed out of the German harbour by a steam tug called The Frieda, which McGuinness had bought out right. 3 miles out to sea the Karl Marx turned back to port and The Frieda sailed out to sea. This journey from Germany to Helvick was to take 3 days and a watch was put in Helvick for the 30th of October. Liam Mellows, Pierce Kavanagh, Pax Whelan, Liam Lynch, and Joe Vize who had escaped from the Curragh on the 9th September, along with local volunteers were all waiting in Helvick for the arrival of The Frieda. On the 7th of November the watch was called off, as they feared the worst. On the night of the 10th of November, The Frieda arrived off Helvick after having problems at sea. Flares were fired and as McGuinness received no return signal he headed to Cheekpoint, Waterford Harbour. The next morning McGuinness walked the 5 miles to Waterford city and met the mayor of Waterford, Dr. White. Dr. White was afraid to unload the guns in Waterford, as there were naval ships in the harbour, it was de-

cidated to refuel The Frieda and return to Ring.


The guns were unloaded in Ballinagoul and transferred to Keatings of Comeragh and Mansfield's of Crobally Old Parish.

Mellows and McGuinness sold The Frieda to a Captain Collins of Cork where she spent the rest of her days ferrying coal to Cork.

McGuinness was left keep the proceeds of the sale and purchased the "City of Dortmund". This vessel engaged in legitimate trade. She was the first ship to fly the Irish Tricolour.

McGuinness returned to Germany and a second shipload of weapons came to Ballinagoul onboard The Hannah on the 3rd of April 1922. The Hannah was registered to a P. Whelan of Dungarvan. This operation was overseen by Pax Whelan of Dungarvan and Dick Barret on behalf of the southern command; Dick Barret was one of the four that were executed in the civil war. These guns were taken by lorries from Ballinagoul to Birr in Co. Offaly and moved onto Northern Ireland, as this was during the Truce.

Bye-Laws To Clamp Down On Cars For Sale

Bye-Laws are to be introduced in December in an effort to outlaw and impound cars being parked on the N25 approaches from Cork and Waterford and which are being advertised as "for sale".

It follows comments by Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who said those responsible for parking the cars on the margins of the road are acting like it is a moveable garage.

He said there are six cars parked at the side of the road advertised for sale.

"I don't think this is legal," he went on to say. "Will there be a crackdown by the local authority? I know other local authorities are cracking down on this. People will be saying that Dungarvan is a moveable garage."

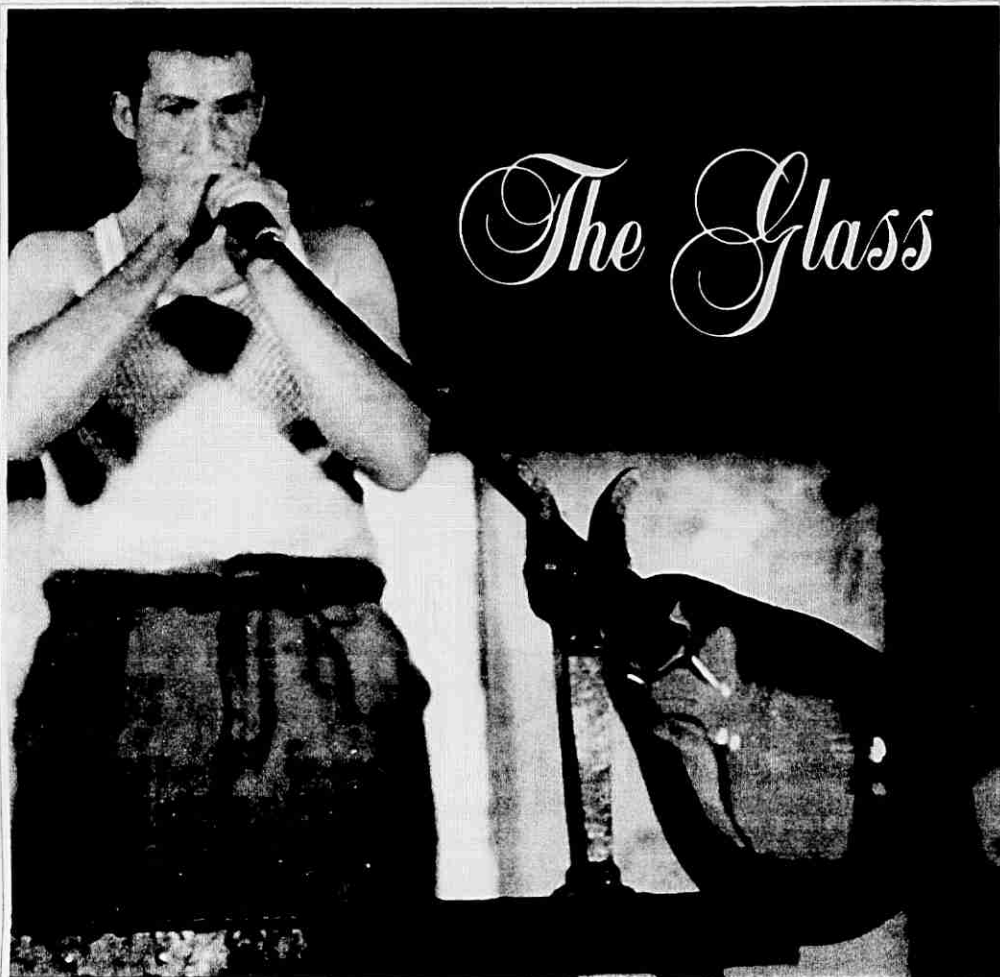
Deputy Mayor Fred Forsey said it is dangerous "carry-on." "They are causing an obstruction to pedestrians and forcing people and children out onto the busy road."

He said the owners should "cop-on" and put their vehicles for sale in the Buy & Sell or the local newspapers.

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, a member of the Strategic Policy Committee (SPC) said the issue was discussed at a recent meeting in Tramore.

New policies and bye-laws are being drawn up as a result of the meeting and will be approved formally and brought back to Waterford County Council as soon as possible, he said.

"Owners will be warned, fined and even have their cars impounded. Hopefully the bye-laws will be before the county council by December," Cllr. Kyne added.

HSE Criticised Over Discontinuation Of Back To Work Course

"CHEAPEST" AND "NASTIEST" OF CUTS

The Health Service Executive was criticised for discontinuing a training programme for those with mental illness.

Raising the issue at the October meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, Sinn Fein, Cllr. Brendan Mansfield said the programme, called 'Sonas', which was run by the VEC with the financial support of the Health Service Executive, was discontinued this year.

He said one in ten people suffer some kind of mental illness, but under the programme people with mental health problems were helped and trained to get back to the workplace.

The programme was popular and there were 15 from Dungarvan who regularly attended, but in September of this year, the HSE pulled its funding.

"They can't be allowed to further marginalise those who are ill," the Sinn Fein councillor said. He said some of the stories of those who put their hopes into the course would "hit you in the heart." But to get some kind of help people have now to travel up and down to Waterford.

The 'Sonas' programme was giving people with mental illness a sense of esteem and helped them to function.

He proposed that the council write to the HSE to urge them to immediately restart the programme.

Fine Gael councillor, Damien

Geoghegan described the withdrawal of funding as "one of the cheapest and nastiest of cuts. He said the council should write directly to the Minister of Health to seek the reinstatement of the programme.

However, in a statement to the Dungarvan Leader, the Health Service Executive (HSE) said that the 'Sonas' programme in Dungarvan - which was supported by Health Service Executive

Rehabilitation Training - was a pilot programme for the academic year of 2005/2006 only.

"As with all pilots, such projects are subject to review," the statement said. "The client group supported by the 'Sonas' programme completed their course at the end of the academic year.

"Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee was contracted by the HSE to deliver

the core modules of the "Sonas" project in Dungarvan.

"The fact that this pilot has not continued in Dungarvan for 2006/2007 does not deter from access by members of the public to further education tailored to their needs.

"The HSE endeavors to provide a comprehensive range of mental health and other services to the population of the Waterford Community Services Area."

'Pretty' Speed Ramps May Be Solution

A member of Lismore Town Council has called for 'pretty' speed ramps used by Lismore's successors as Ireland's Tidiest Town, Westport, as a solution to the scourge of Boy Racers and other speedsters.

Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan, put forward the proposal at the October meeting of Lismore Town Council. "I think it's something we should be having a look at," he said.

Cllr. Heneghan said that boy racers would be forced to slow down as going too fast would damage their cars.

However, Town Manager, John O'Flynn who is also County Engineer with Waterford County Council ruled out the option, saying that any speed ramps, attractive or not, would not be suitable in the town. He said the emergency services do not like them and they can cause a lot of noise disruption to nearby homes late at night.

Written Apology Demanded Over Snub To Mayor

The organisers of the successful, Invest in Waterford seminar were left red faced when it emerged that they had failed to formally invite the Mayor of Dungarvan, Teresa Wright, to the event.

Branded as a "serious breach of protocol," Dungarvan Town Councillors responded angrily to the snub.

Mayor Wright was absent from the October meeting of the Town Council and it was her Labour party colleague, Cllr. Billy Kyne, who raised the issue. "I was very disappointed and annoyed to see that Town Mayor, Teresa Wright was not given a formal invite to the event," he said.

Lismore Town Mayor, Helen O'Sullivan and County Mayor, Mary Green were both in atten-

dance along with a number of other dignitaries. Cllr. Kyne said the fact that the Dungarvan Mayor wasn't invited showed a lack of respect for the identity of the town.

"This town has attracted substantial industry, and we are certainly not an insignificant part of a larger body.

"The role of Mayor is an identity for the town. If such a breach of protocol happens again, we will have to take steps," Cllr. Kyne said.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said he was "shocked" when he learned the Mayor of Dungarvan was not invited.

"A lot of the seminar focused on Dungarvan and the surrounding area. Surely it was imperative to have our Mayor represented."

Fianna Fail Cllr. Nuala Ryan suggested it was an oversight, but also registered her shock and disappointment that the office wasn't represented at the top table with the other dignitaries.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) said it was a slight on the Mayor and the Town Council while Labour Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair said he was shocked as a former Mayor for this happen.

Fine Gael Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Fred Forsey called on the organisers to issue a written apology to Mayor Wright.

However, Town Manager, Denis McCarthy said that it was his understanding that all councillors were invited on the day. "Those who were wearing their chains did so of their own accord," he added.

Speed Cameras For County's Death Traps

continued from front page as part of their speed enforcement measures.

The roads in the county are among 400 nationally to be classified as red zones.

Chief Superintendent, John Farrelly, of the Garda Traffic Bureau, said 57% of the 400 red zones are on main national roads, 41% are on regional roads and just 2% are on rural roads.

"These are actually facts that we've gathered up. We've looked back at the history for the last ten and eight years on the roads and this is the data that's been gathered.

"We've had this information before, but this is the first time that we've actually collated it in such a way that we'll be able

to concentrate our efforts," he said.

RED ZONES

Although the most dangerous sections have been classified as "red zones", less dangerous sections have been designated "amber" and "green" zones, using a points system to rank the number of fatal, serious and minor crashes on a particular stretch.

This marking system will be repeated every year.

"This is an intelligent policing system, putting resources into red zone areas where people are being killed.

"The idea is to stop people being killed. The cameras will primarily be in red zones where people are being killed because of speed," he said.

Cllrs. Misled On Landowners Views

Waterford County Councillors were misled over the views of two landowners in the vicinity of the proposed new Burgery Roundabout.

The Burgery Roundabout project has already been the subject of a number of objections due to the impact it would have on a number of local residents.

However, the Dungarvan area councillors were told, during a meeting with Senior Officials of Waterford County Council, that the residents were happy with the new plans.

"In fact," Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said, "the residents didn't even know about the new plans.

"My objection to the plans remain."

Labour councillor, Teresa Wright also added her opposition over what was allegedly said.

"We were led to believe the two landowners were happy with the plans. That is not necessarily the case," she added.

The new proposal would see the entrance to the roundabout moved onto the link road to Monang.

Housing Developments Fate Lies With Bord Pleanála

Bord Pleanála will decide the fate of two housing developments planned for the Dungarvan area.

T&M Fitzgerald are planning to build 28 houses and associated works at Kilminion, Dungarvan.

While the controversial development secured planning permission from Waterford County Council, a number of local residents have appealed the decision to An Bord Pleanála.

A forty-house development at Ringaphuca, Dungarvan has also been appealed to the national planning appeals board.

The McInerney Homes development was appealed by Aonghus Walsh in recent weeks.

Thousands Of Home Owners To Pay Higher Energy Bills

Dungarvan-based Kingspan Century, Europe's largest timber frame home manufacturer, today published independently-verified research which proves that thousands of Irish home owners are paying too much to heat their homes because of a major loophole in energy efficiency standards of Irish building regulations.

The research carried out energy efficiency tests on two identical homes, one built from timber frame, and one built from concrete hollow-blocks. The findings show both houses meet the Irish building regulations, but the timber frame home is up to 30% more energy efficient than the hollow-block home. The discrepancy occurs because hollow-block houses are allowed to be built to a much less onerous energy efficiency standard under the building regulations than timber frame houses.

Kingspan Century Chief Executive Gerry McCaughey said: "This research proves that the Government is costing thousands of home owners a small fortune in high energy bills, because they continue to allow homes to be built to a much lower energy efficient standard than is possible."

"It also means these less energy efficient homes could be worth less when they go to sell them, because of the new EU energy performance labelling," he added.

"This is typical of the Department of the Environment, which astonishingly admitted in an internal memo in 1998 that they did not want to improve the energy standards of Irish homes, because it would make it difficult for hollow block manufacturers to survive," said McCaughey.

"Only last night former Environment Minister Noel Dempsey admitted on RTE's Prime Time programme that he decided not to improve the building regulations while Minister because his primary concern was to build houses fast and cheap," he added.

"This loophole is particularly scandalous when you consider that hollow block is now widely accepted as a dinosaur method of construction. It is high time it was banned altogether by the Government. Local authorities won't allow their houses to be built with hollow blocks, and the only place it continues as a method of construction is in Dublin, Meath and Kildare."

The research was carried out in Ireland by NuTech Consultants, and independently verified by the world renowned Building Research Establishment in London. (www.bre.co.uk)

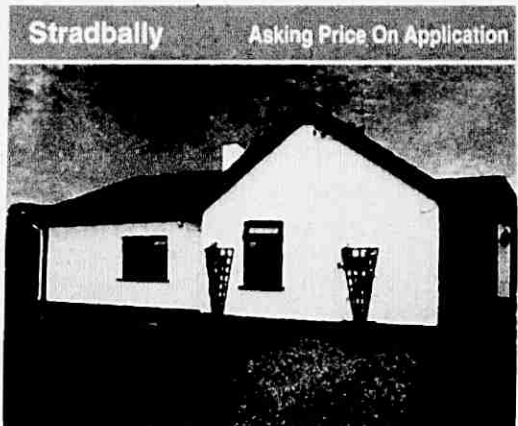

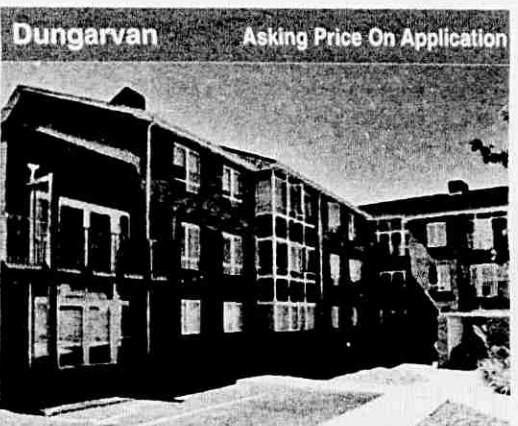

Dungarvan Leader - this Week in the Garden

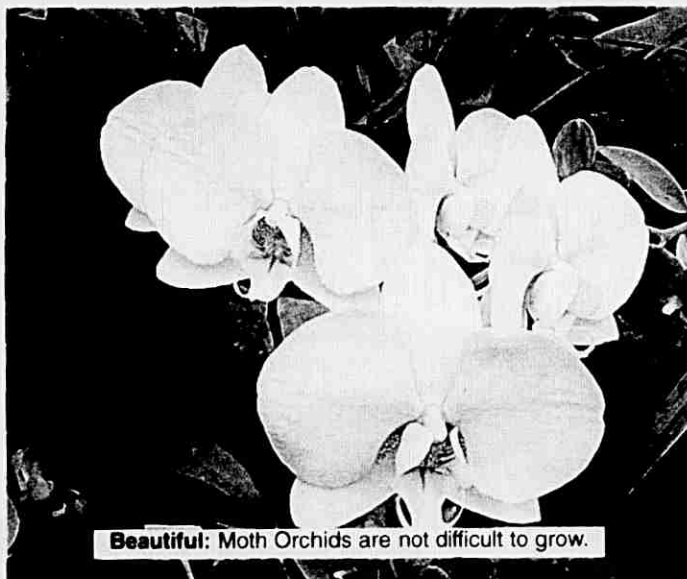
Orchids can be grown at home

RAPIDLY becoming one of the most popular pot plants sold today, orchids do not deserve their difficult-to-grow reputation. It was not too long ago that many people thought that growing orchids involved large heated conservatories and extensive knowledge and skill. Nothing could be further from the truth as long as you choose one of the house plant varieties and take a little time to learn about their needs. A number of orchids are generally regarded as 'easy' to grow, including the miniature Cymbidium which needs a short rest period during the autumn. Coelogyne cristata, which has a fragrant flower 5-10cm across, and the Tiger Orchid (Odontoglossum grande) are also popular as long as they are given a rest during the winter.

Most plants sold in shops are Moth Orchids (Phalaenopsis), featuring flat faced flowers 5cm across with numerous blooms hold on arching stalks which need supporting. These popular plants need steady temperatures and high humidity to do well, but can flower throughout the year. Another orchid that does well in modern homes is the Slipper Orchid (Paphlopedilum), which has prominently pouched flowers 5-10cm across. There are many hybrids of this variety available, sometimes listed as Cypripedium. Each type of orchid has its own special

needs, but there are a few general rules to follow to ensure success. Miniature varieties, such as Cymbidium) are best grown in terrarium, but other types will be very happy sitting on a pebble tray. Good light is essential and an east or west facing window sill is ideal if net curtains or some other sun screen is available. All orchids need to be protected from unfiltered sunshine. Orchids need 10-15 hours of light each day and in winter this may have to be supplemented with artificial light. As a general rule orchids need a daytime temperature of around 21°C/70°F in summer and 15.5°C/60°F in winter. It is also important that temperatures drop 5°C/10°F lower at night. The pot containing the Orchid also needs to be turned occasionally and keep the tray well away from the window on frosty nights.

House plant orchids do not like hot or stuffy conditions, so good ventilation is essential even in winter, and plants benefit from an occasional misting. Do not mist during cool conditions and

be warned, cold drafts will soon kill an orchid. Feed orchids with a liquid feed during the summer months, but cut back during the winter and only use soft, tepid water. Orchids like being pot-bound so do not worry if a few roots grow outside the pot. After a couple of years, when growth begins to suffer, they will need repotting. At this time the plants should be divided, leaving at least three shoots on each division. You will need special orchid compost (usually bark-based) which is available from most garden centres. When you do repot and remember to stake each new plant to ensure that when the orchid flowers, the blooms can be supported.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Destroy infested plants

Destroy any plants that are infested with red spider mites in the greenhouse or conservatory to prevent them overwintering and spreading to other plants next year. Although you may not be able to spot the tiny little pest, the symptoms of attack are a pale speckling of foliage and a mass of fine webbing.

Trim back berries

Cut back to ground level the fruited canes of blackberries and hybrid berries, such as loganberries and tayberries, once the fruit has been picked. Tie in the unfruited canes for crossing next year to prevent winter damage.

Plant up winter pots

Window boxes, pots and hanging baskets for autumn, winter and spring colour should be planted up now. Choose plants that are already a good size as they will not grow much during the cold winter months. Avoid plastic containers which have reservoirs as the compost needs to be free draining to avoid rot. Add a slow-release fertiliser so you will not have to give a liquid feed until the spring.

Wake up cyclamen

Stand pots of dormant indoor cyclamen in saucers of water to wake them up.

Remove pond snails

Snails can be a problem in ponds at this time of year. Float a couple of cabbage leaves on the pond overnight and remove in the morning along with any snails that should have attached themselves to the leaves.

Protect cabbages

Fit cabbage collars to newly planted spring cabbage to prevent damage from cabbage root fly, or cover the whole crop with insect-proof mesh or fleece which will also provide a little protection from the harshest weather.

Bring in herbs

Pot up herbs such as mint, thyme, chives and parsley and bring them indoors or into the greenhouse or coldframe for winter use.

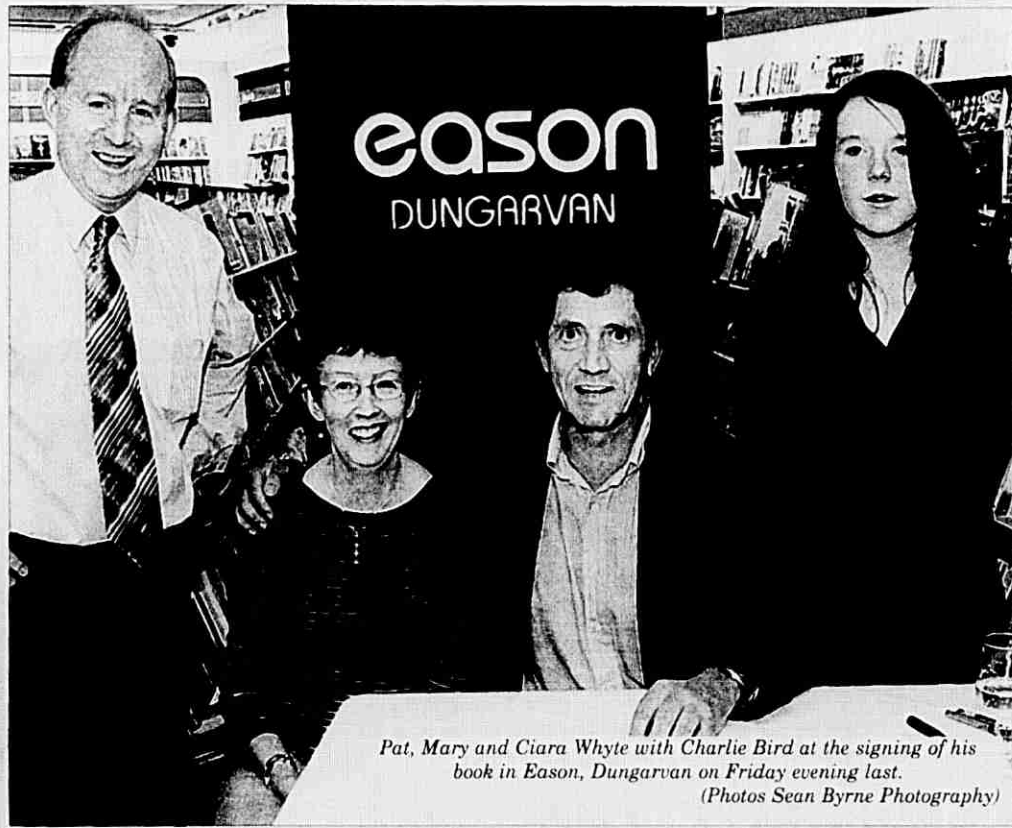

"Nothing To Fear" From New Postal Service Reforms

CROWLEY TO FIGHT FOR UNIVERSAL POSTAL SERVICE

BY KEVIN KIRRANE

Brian Crowley, MEP for the South European constituency, and leader of the Fianna Fail group in the European Parliament, said that the people of Ireland have nothing to fear from proposals being put forward by the European Commissioner for the Internal Market, Charlie McCreevy, to reform the postal services market in Europe.

Commissioner McCreevy does support a greater level of competition in the provision of postal services after the year 2009. However, he is proposing that the principle of universal service is retained within the provisions of this newly revised postal services directive.

This means in simple terms that all Member States of the European Union must guarantee that postal deliveries are made available to both rural and urban homes and businesses at a minimum of five times a week.

"We all know the important role that post offices play, in particular, in rural parts of Ireland," Mr. Crowley said.

"I will be working to ensure that this principle of universal service is kept within the provisions of this Directive when it is voted on by members of the European Parliament."

New €6.5bn Package Gives Local Farmers Benefits Boost

A major increase in the rural environmental scheme (REPS) payments and more benefits for farmers living in disadvantaged rural areas are just two new measures in a new 6.8 bn euro agricultural package for the next six years, according to local Fianna Fail TD Ollie Wilkinson.

"The package is clear evidence of the Government's commitment to farmers and to rural life."

"The unprecedented Exchequer funding for farming between 2007 and 2013 is aimed at promoting competitiveness in the agriculture, food and forestry sector and improving the financial lot of farmers while enhancing the environment," Deputy Wilkinson said.

The major elements of these proposals will see an 17% increase in REPS payments; new early retirement scheme with a maximum payment rate of 15,000 euro; new scheme for the suckler herd; 8% increase in disadvantaged areas scheme payments benefiting 100,000 farmers countrywide; 15% increase in forestry premium rates and a 55% increase in installation aid rates bringing them to 15,000 euro.

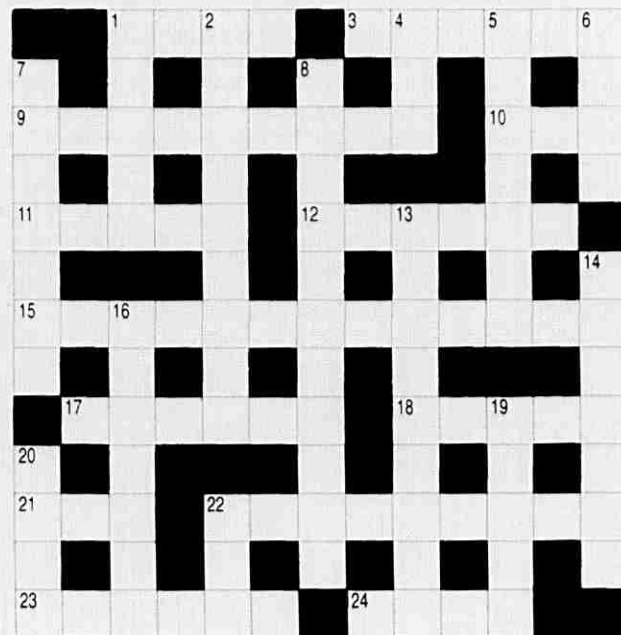

IT'S NOW THE 11TH HOUR TO CLOSE FOR SPRING GRASS

By now we trust that many dairy and drystock farmers have already closed a significant portion of the farm for spring grazing. And, of course, they have taken the right decision. For those who have yet to grasp the nettle – do it now – better late than never. The reasons put forward by farmers for not closing up are many, but the main ones are:

1. "It leads to earlier housing of stock". Not so. Teagasc recommend starting to close in mid October with the last being closed in mid to late November. By then the first closed ground will have a good cover of grass, whereas the last to be closed will be quite bare. This is ideal as the last closed should be the last to be grazed.

2. "I close when the whole farm is grazed bare". A disastrous way to manage grass. By doing this you will have very late grass in spring so in effect the winter is stretched at the other end. You will also grow a lot less grass. If the entire farm is bare at housing nothing grows over the winter. If, however, you have started to close in October, there will be quite a cover of grass on most fields. So the "grass grows grass" principle kicks in. The grass continues to grow at a slow rate right through from October to February. Most of the growth will have taken place in the October/November period. The bigger leaf engine available all through this period will have paid off.

3. "Grass grazed in mid to late November is as good to me as grass in spring". Not so – grass from now has almost 90% water. It will put little or no weight on stock. In spring it is capable of putting on over a kg a day. Superb quality indeed. For every 10 days delay in closing you can mark your calendar in red that you will be 20 – 30 days later with grass in spring.

Banishing Plastics

There has been a change in the arrangements for collection of farm plastic in recent times. Presently there are two options available to farmers for disposing of plastic. Poorly managed plastics etc. around farmyards may not meet with the Cross Compliance Inspections of the Department of Agriculture.

1. Farm Relief Service

This service covers a wide range of farm materials from silage plastic, containers, fertilizer bags and silage netting. All of this material is recycled. Materials are separated into 4 streams & collected in special liners which can be stored in special bins. The bins and liners are available from the Farm Relief Service at 051-294277 – brochures are available showing how the system operates. The bags can be delivered to their compound and there is a charge of €50 per bag. A collection service is also available.

Plastic sheeting awaiting collection should be kept tidy in a pallet store.

All materials to be collected must be clean and streamed correctly as recommended by the relevant service.

2 Irish Farm Film Plastics Group.

By contacting 1890 300 444 the farmer registers to have his/her plastic sheeting and silage wraps collected by giving herd number, telephone number etc; this allows a more efficient coordinated collection system by collecting farmers in the same area at the same time. This system has been in place for a number of years the cost of which was covered by a levy included in the cost of the plastic film at purchase. However, there is now a collection charge of €50 per cubic meter (about 400 silage wraps or what would fit into a 4 pallet store). Smaller amounts could be pooled between neighbours. Payment is required to be paid in advance by cheque or by credit card over the phone or through a post office system now in place. The plastic is collected by the local collector as heretofore and only plastic sheeting and silage wraps are covered by the collection.

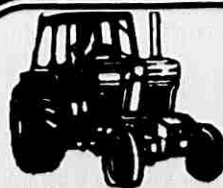

Stockpiled Plastic To Be Taken In Six More Counties

County councils in Longford, Roscommon, Leitrim, Wicklow, North Tipperary and Carlow will be next to organise special open days to give farmers a once-off opportunity to dispose of stockpiled farm plastic.

This service will be free to farmers who bring plastic to designated sites; local authorities will get assistance from the Environment Fund.

Already over 9,300 tonnes of stockpiled farm plastic have been collected in Galway, Offaly, Mayo, Waterford and Clare. "We know now that there are huge backlogs to be collected and this puts pressure on collection systems if a large number of counties operate a farm plastics springclean at the same time. For this reason, the roll out of collections to other areas will be staggered", said Environment Minister, Dick Roche. The continuation of plastics collection by local authorities was welcomed by Michael Slattery, Chairman, Irish Farm Film Producers Group (IFFPG), which has collected 65,000 tonnes of waste silage sheeting and bale-wrap plastic since 1997, funded by a levy on farm plastic placed on the market in Ireland.

Representing the farm plastics industry and farmers, IFFPG continues to handle plastic from the local authority schemes, while also offering its own nation-wide collection service, through 12 contractors, charging a fee of €100 per tonne. IFFPG are set to benefit from new measures to improve tractability of farm plastic, to weed out those not paying the €127/tonne levy on new farm plastic which finances recycling.

Michael Slattery advises farmers to reduce water and soil contamination of waste plastic, in order to get best value for the €100/tonne collection fee. Tips on storing farm plastics, and a collection request card are on the www.farm-plastics.ie website.

The information needed by collectors includes address, full herd number and a mobile phone num-

ber. The collection fee of €100/tonne is equivalent to €50 per cubic metre, equivalent in turn to 300 bale wraps, or the capacity of a 'box' formed by tying together four fertiliser pallets.

The more neighbours registered for collection, the sooner their plastic is picked up.

IFFPG have announced that conversion of their recycled plastic into diesel oil has started at the Cynar facility in Co. Laois, and they plan to offer recycling of contaminated containers and fertiliser bags made of plastic in 2007.

BOVINE TB AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES 2006/2007 HARDSHIP GRANT

- The 2006/2007 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November 2006. It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some owner/keepers whose holdings are restricted **on foot of a herd re-test** and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible owner/keepers must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible owner/keepers with a payment of up to €250 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months **within the period 1 November 2006 to 30 April 2007.**
- The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER97. Potentially eligible owner/keepers will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.
- The onus is on the potentially eligible owner/keepers whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November 2006 or during the period 1 November 2006 to 30 April 2007 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER97.

The onus is on the owner/keeper to apply for a Hardship Grant.

BONFIRES AND BURNING RUBBISH

Bonfires as a method of disposing of waste date back to medieval times when fires were used as a means of disposing of animal bones, hence the term "bonfire".

Many people who burn their rubbish think that they are doing their bit for the environment, by looking after their own waste. However, most people nowadays, realise that bonfires cause air pollution, smoke and fumes and are a source of complaint from disgruntled neighbours.

Although the material in bonfires nowadays may not be as grisly as the bonfires of yore, they do still cause air pollution and annoy the neighbours by: ruining their washing, disturbing the enjoyment of their gardens and preventing them from opening their windows.

Bonfires are controlled by the Air Pollution Act of 1987, under which it is illegal to cause a nuisance. This includes smoke, dust, aerosols and odours emitted in such a quantity "as to be liable to be injurious to public health or have a deleterious effect on flora and fauna or damage property or impair/interfere with amenities or the environment."

Even if your fire isn't a cause of annoyance to your neighbours, they do cause air pollution. This is because waste burned in open uncontrolled conditions, such as plastic; rubber; treated timber and timber products, like formica, chipboard and plywood create an unpleasant odour when burned, but also produce a range of toxic fumes. In high concentrations these poisonous compounds can have a damaging health effects, but if exposure to bonfire smoke is short lived, serious harm is unlikely.

Much of what is being burned is now recyclable under Waterford County Council's Recycling Programme. The Council now collects the following recyclables: paper and card, magazines, cartons, cans, tins, and all types of plastic

Burning recyclables is a waste of resources that could be re-processed and given a new lease of life.

Recent research indicates that the burning of waste by households is the cause of approximately 50% of the dioxins generated in Ireland each year.

THE INAUGURAL DUNGARVAN HOLISTIC FAIR A GREAT SUCCESS

The Dungarvan Holistic Fair was held on Sunday at The Park Hotel with exhibits, demonstrations, and healing therapies.

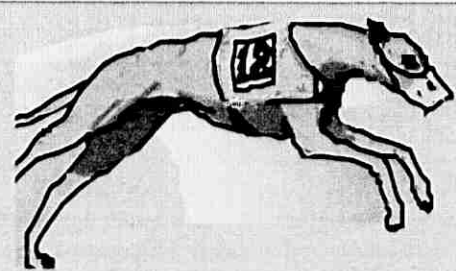
Dolores And Séan Run For Helvick Lifeboat

All five entries were in the wars in the seventh contest over the 550-yard trip. Daring Classic did well to ride a first bend bump and found himself three lengths clear of Asgrove Vieri (Droopys Vieri-Murlens Madrid) on the back stretch. 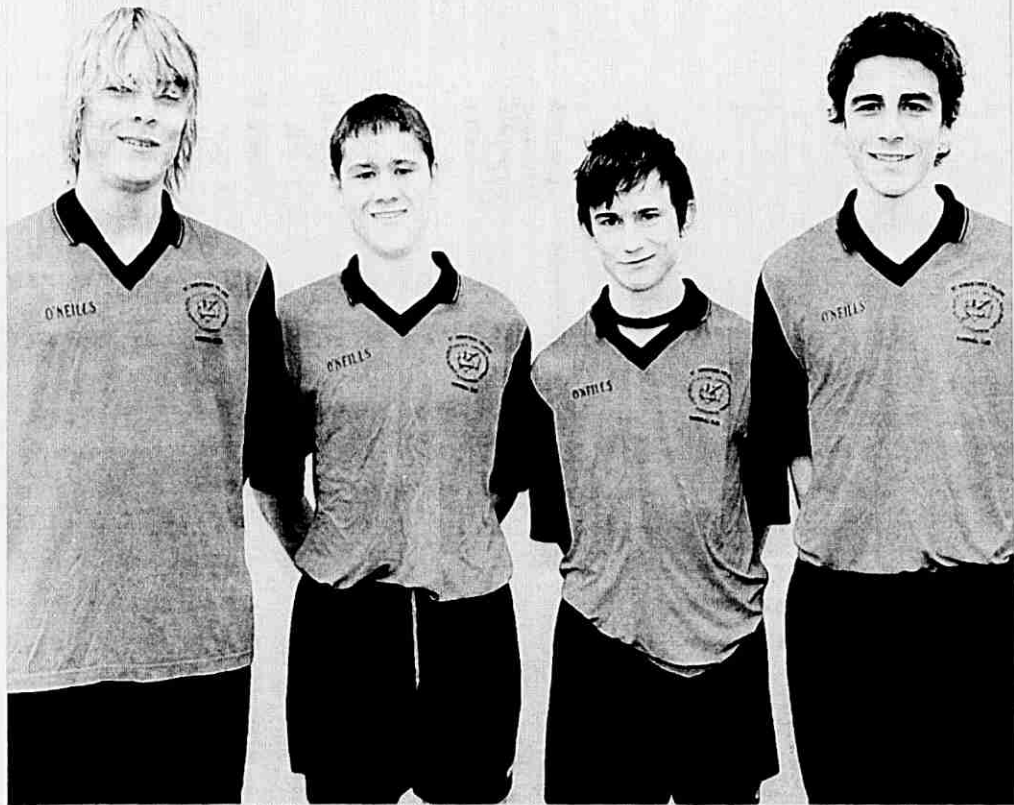

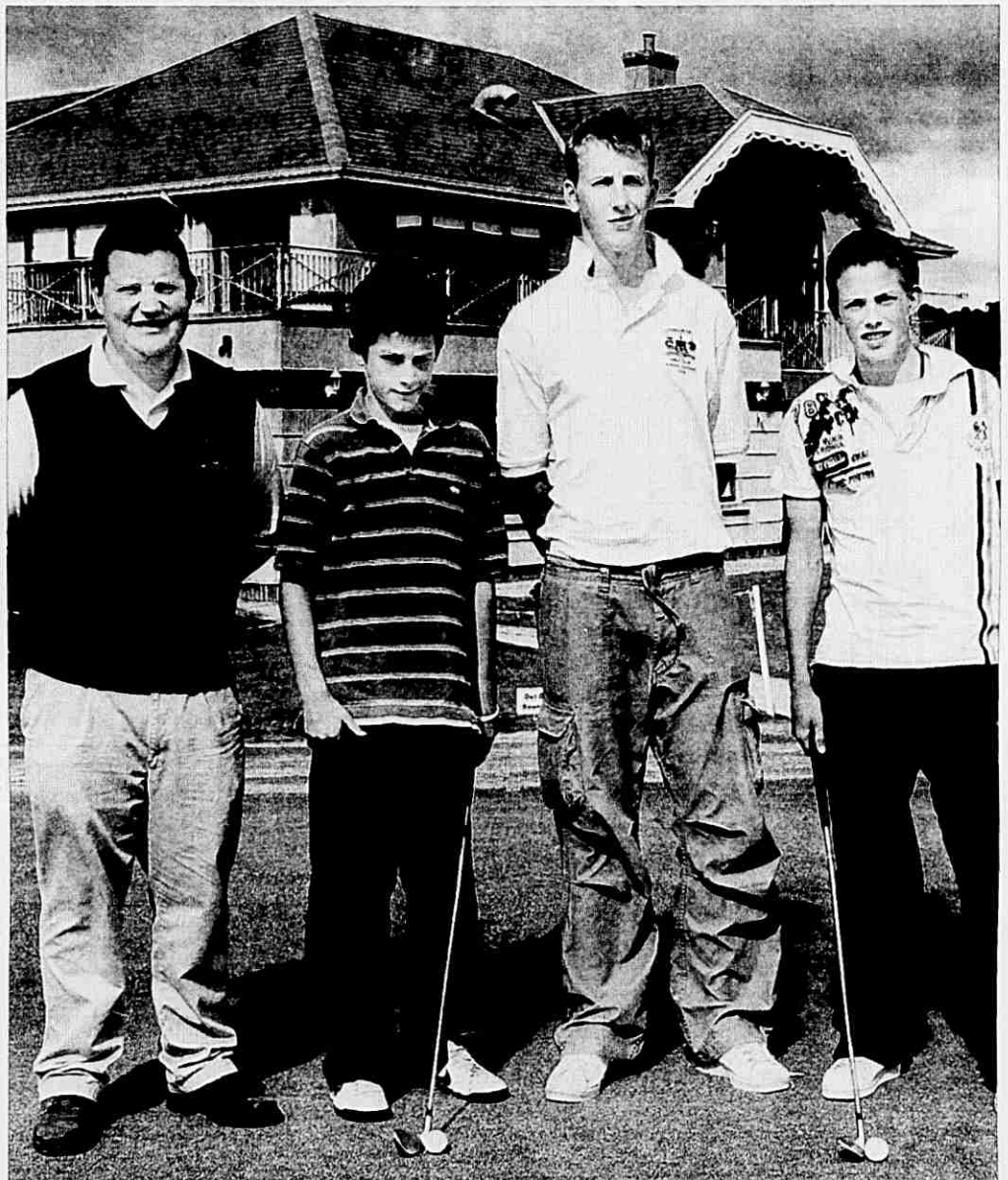

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Stradbally and Gaultier to Meet in Quarter Final at Walsh Park

Same Clubs to Meet in Minor Football Co. Final on Same Programme

This is an interesting and probably unique double header at the city venue on Sunday next and the fixtures should prove to be a special attraction for football followers throughout the county.

What is particularly interesting is that Stradbally are now just three games away from an historic 6 county titles in a row, something which has never before been achieved in the county. Stradbally, Dungarvan Kilrossanty and Clashmore have all achieved 5 in a row championship victories and a 6th for Stradbally, (if it happens) would put them in a place of their own and above all others on the Roll of Honour in the county.

Victory over Gaultier would put them within 2 games of the elusive achievement before they play Ballinacourty in the county semi-final.

But disposing of the challenge from the last remaining eastern team in the football championship is not going to be an easy matter, as last year when the sides met in Walsh Park on Sunday October 23rd (exactly 12 months ago), the

champions were more than a little bit fortunate to have come out winners with a two points winning margin as in the closing stages Gaultier missed an open goal chance in this splendid semi-final.

Gaultier are recognised as one of the rising powers on the football scene in Waterford and the enormous work done at underage level is now beginning to show dividends.

After a successful run at senior level after winning the intermediate county football championship they were relegated but returned to senior ranks in 2004.

Over the past twelve seasons Gaultier have played in four county semi-finals and were twice in the final, in 1994 against the Nire and again in 1996 when defeated by Rathgormack.

This year, they lost their first round to Ballinacourty before defeating Ardmore in a splendid game at Leamybrien. The club have a policy of sticking to (or as near as possible) the same line out for all matches in the seasons so in this case we can expect to see the following

And in the circumstances it could not be any other way. The bookmakers had made the "Reds" firm favorites to take their 6th. title in a row and public perception is that the reigning champions are racing certainties 'to pull this one off' and make them a club apart in our history.

There is some significance in the fact that since the club set out on this 'six in a row crusade' practically the same set of players have lined out in regular positions in all their matches. Given the circumstances I'll go along with the rest of the county in forecasting a Stradbally win here, but Gaultier will test them to the limit.

Mt. Sion Win 35th Co. Senior Hurling Title After Splendid Contest With Ballygunner

Mount Sion 2-13 Ballygunner 0-12

A third minute goal by corner forward Sean Ryan followed with another from the opposite corner by forward Michael White gave Mount Sion a 2-0 to nil lead by the 6th minute and put them in the drivers seat for the remainder of a splendid contest that sparkled at times as the high standard was maintained all the way to the finish.

Undaunted by the setback, the champions fought back and were a mere 3 points in arrears at the break and having wind advantage in the second half, Ballygunner were by no means out for the count.

Throughout the second half the scoring followed a tit-for-tat pattern and disregarding the two early goals there was little between the sides right up to the finish, with Mount Sion scoring 13 and Ballygunner 12 points. Ballygunner's failure to penetrate the solid Mount Sion defence in which Tony Browne, Anthony Kirwan and Brian Flannery were very prominent, eventually proved to be their undoing and thus allowed the famed monastery club to achieve a record 35 titles and making them leaders in this field in the 32 counties.

Disappointment As Intermediate Hurling Semi-Finals Cancelled At Fraher Field

There were angry people around the west on Saturday morning last following the announcement that the two divisional hurling finals which were due to be played at Fraher field, that afternoon, had been cancelled. The announcement came following a directive from the County Board who were concerned about the ground where the two hurling county finals were due to be played on the following afternoon. The concern of the County Board was aroused by the unsatisfactory weather forecast.

The County Board suggested that the intermediate matches

be moved to other venues, but Western Board secretary Anthony Walsh stated that the board were already aware that other venues, considered suitable, given clubs involved, were not available.

This left the Western Board secretary, with no other option but to inform the four angry clubs of the decision. These were fixed two weeks previously and no problems were envisaged until the decision to play the county senior hurling final in Fraher field was made, subsequent to the Ballygunner victory over Lismore on Saturday October 14th. The postponements will have a

'knock-on' effect on the intermediate football championships also.

Looking at the county final fixture in hindsight, it should not have been played at Fraher Field when two city teams were engaged. The particular regulation (B3) was obviously invoked by Ballygunner who felt that they were within their rights and also that it would be advantageous to them to bring Mount Sion out of Walsh Park.

Having the final here was good for Western people but in reality it is a mistake when no team from the division is involved.

Four Brothers On Mount Sion Team

When young Pat McGrath was called on as a late substitute on the Mount Sion team he became the fourth member of a great hurling family to play in this final. Eoin McGrath who captained Mount Sion was awarded the man-of-the-match honour.

All are sons of Pat McGrath who captained Mount Sion to county honours and who also captained Waterford.

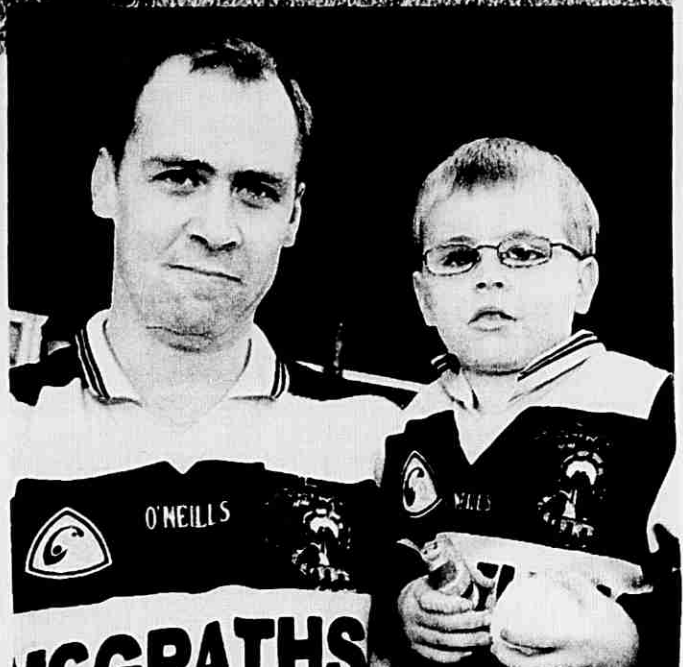

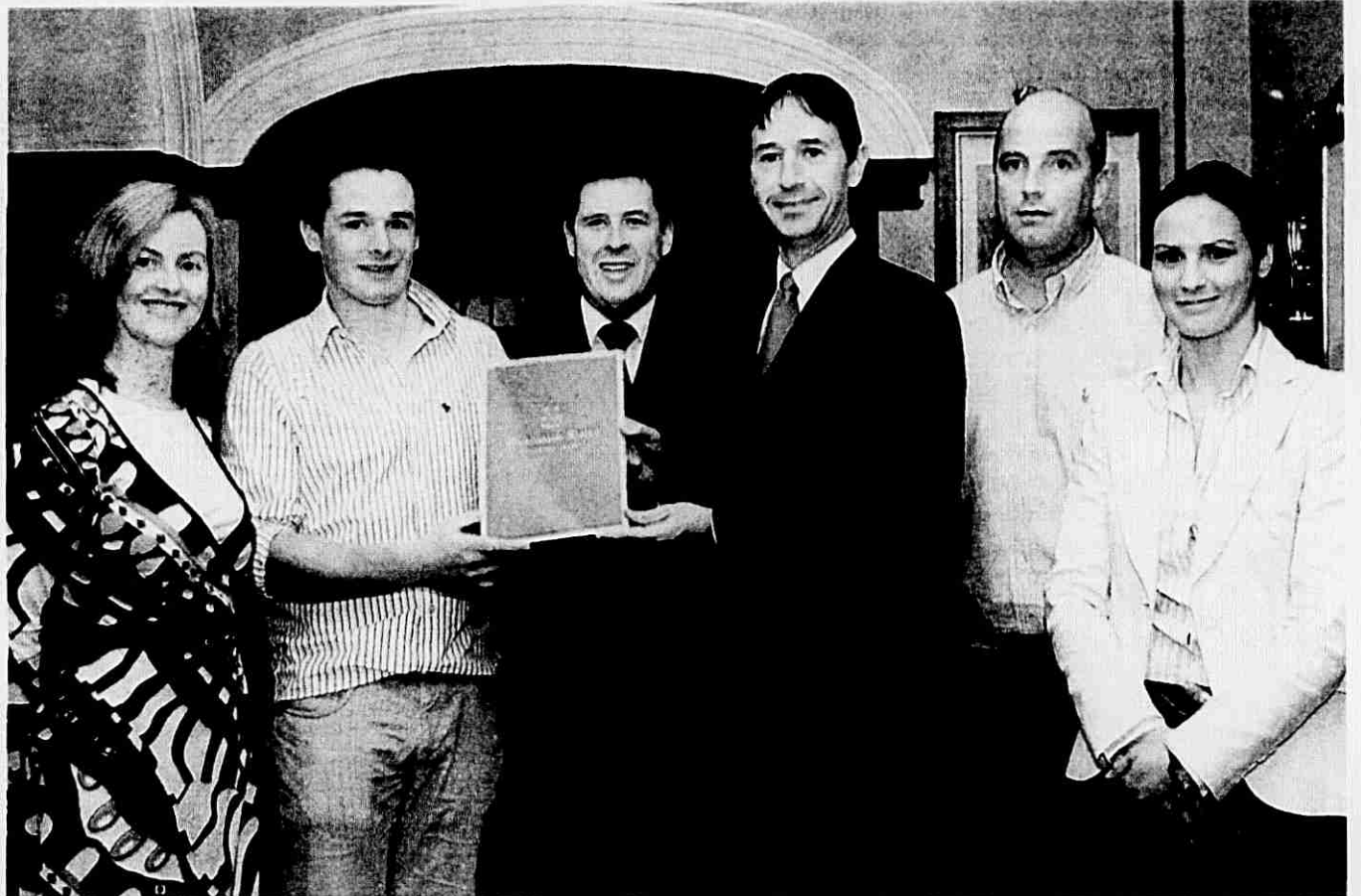
This semi-final was described to me as the best intermediate hurling tie played in the Eastern Division for a very long time.

It was just a regular meeting but viewed as being special because the names of the manager and county senior hurling selectors were due to be announced following three weeks of interviews, etc., by the Four Man Task Force of Pat Flynn, Pat Grant, Seamus Grant and Michael Hogan (the four main officers).

As were published last week, Justin McCarthy, Manager, Nicky Cashin, assistant manager, Kevin Ryan, Seamus Hannon and newcomer Michael Ryan, Fourmilewater, and successful manager of the Ladies football for the past 20 years, are to be the members in charge and it would be misleading to say that the group caused surprise and it would be equally misleading to say that the announcement was greeted ecstatically. The county chairman, Pat Flynn said that every person who had been nominated by the clubs either for the position of manager or county selector, was interviewed. It is also understood that some high profile people outside the county had been contacted, but not interested.

About eight or nine delegates spoke and here it might be said that there was a half and half ratio of for and against. Some were specific in their reasons and instances where disappointment was felt about team man-

agement during important matches, were quoted. The playing of Michael Walsh at full forward seemed a big issue with some; the late announcement of the line out for games and the difference between the published line-out and the team appearing on the match programme were issues which displeased others.

Others like Seamus Quirke, De La Salle spoke about the progress made under the guidance of Justin McCarthy and his selectors. Paddy Fitzgerald felt that all the people who had been nominated, by clubs, should be named. John Lyons gave his reasons why a change was necessary.

When a vote was taken the result showed a big majority of those who voted to be in favour of the reappointment, 29 for and 12 against. What was strange is that a number did not vote at all.

The chairman said that now that the matter had been finalised, he hoped that the full county would throw their weight behind the team and management in their efforts to bring Waterford to the top in 2007.

Earlier at the meeting a very comprehensive report on the championship activities of the county football panel was read and here the manager detailed the progress made during the past season and referred to their splendid championship display in Killarney against Kerry who subsequently became All-Ireland champions. The report also mentioned the defeat of hot favourites, Sligo and Cavan in the national league, etc.

Under 21 Football Selectors.

The following were unanimously appointed, Pierre Whyte, Kilrossanty, Nial Moore, Ballinacourty, John Sheehan, De La Salle.

Senior Team Captains

As a result of a motion proposed by the county board chairman, the captains in the senior hurling and football grades, will be selected rather than by the reigning county champions. The matter of leadership qualities was a factor emphasised by the chairman who said that players from teams defeated in the championship were excluded under the present arrangement.

The point was also made that club team captains are some-

times selected on a popularity vote rather than on leadership qualities.

Phil Fanning Mount Sion, Charlie Laphorn, Ballygunner and Seamus Quirke, De La Salle were strongly in favour of county champions retaining the privilege and each of them said champions prided themselves in having the captaincy of the county which was deemed to be a great and deserved honour.

It was pointed out that the players selected can still come from the county champions.

The vote was carried by 27 votes to 9.

The county chairman and secretary with the team management will now select the captains over the coming weeks.

Financial Report

Treasurer Michael Hogan told the meeting that a figure in excess of 370,000 euro was spent on the training of county teams for the year and while there is an overdraft at the moment there is still monies to come from Croke Park for the Qualifier Competitions.

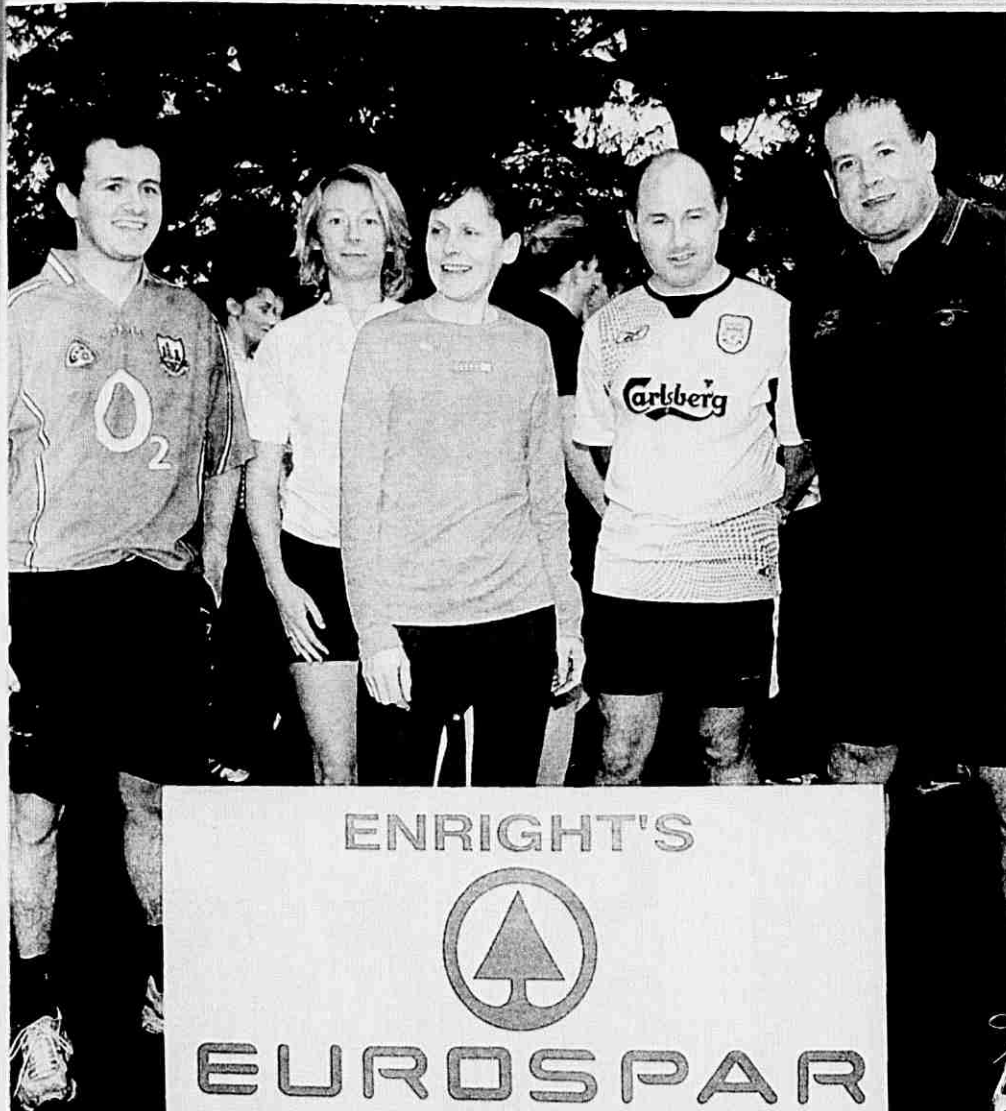

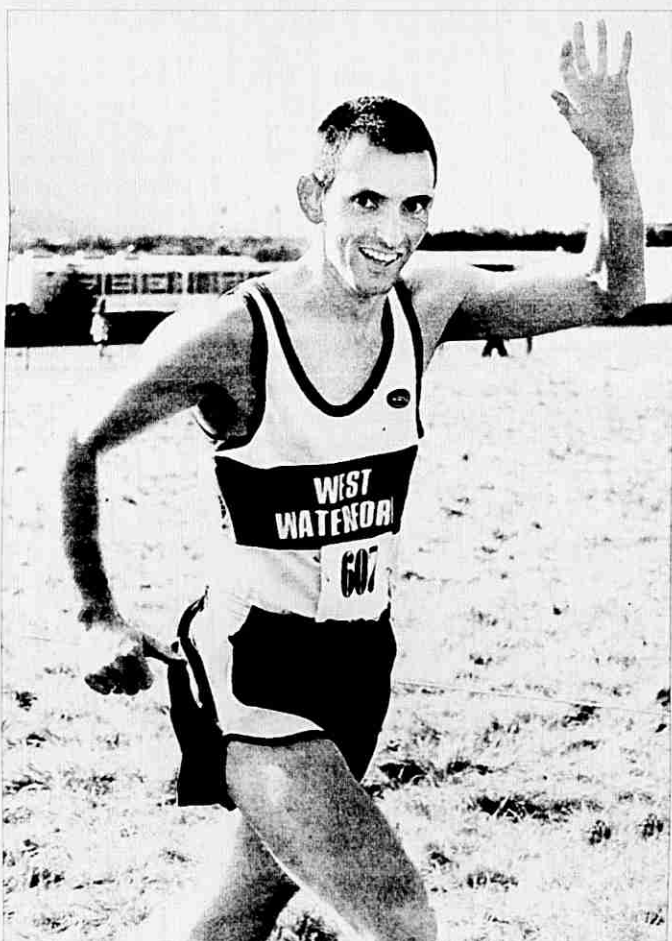

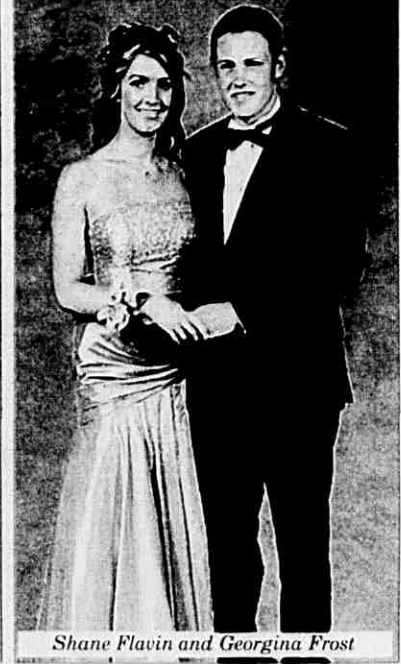

Jumping Stars Head For Wetherby

Wetherby Racecourse holds its first major race day of the season on Saturday, October 28, when the highlight of a cracking seven-race card is the £90,000 Grade Two bet365 Charlie Hall Chase (3.25pm), an established early season target for potential Cheltenham Gold Cup contenders. The fantastic programme, which forms the second day of the two-day bet365 Charlie Hall Meeting (Friday, October 27 & Saturday, October 28), also features the £40,000 Grade Two John Smith's Hurdle (2.50pm), the £25,000 Listed Weatherbys Bank Handicap Chase (2.20pm) and the opening £20,000 Listed Constant Security Wensleydale Juvenile Novices' Hurdle (1.45pm).

The bet365 Charlie Hall Chase could see the return of the Jonjo

O'Neill-trained Iris's Gift. The nine-year-old grey was the excellent winner of the 2004 Grade One Ladbrokes World Hurdle at the Cheltenham Festival but things did not go his way in the second half of last season after notching a hat-trick of victories in his first three novice chases. O'Neill revealed "He's ready for the bet365 Charlie Hall Chase and he'll go there all being well - so long as the ground is right. "It didn't go to plan last season but that's typical with good horses, you have good seasons and bad seasons with them. He was unfortunate in most things that happened last year and it didn't work out for him. "He's starting out in great form this time and we're very happy with him so it's full speed ahead."

Trainer Robert Alner has again picked out the bet365 Charlie Hall Chase as the ideal race to begin Kingscliff's campaign, while Paul Nicholls has mooted the possibility that his superb Grade One Royal & Sun Alliance Chase hero Star de Mohaison could return to action in the Wetherby showpiece.

Inglis Drever, the champion staying hurdler of the 2004/2005 season is typical of the calibre of horses that contest the three mile, one furlong John Smith's Hurdle, which could see an exciting seasonal debut for the sensational Black Jack Ketchum who is unbeaten.

The seven-year-old enjoyed a phenomenal 2005/2006 season with five wins including imperious victories in the Grade Two Brit Insurance Novices' Hurdle at the Cheltenham Festival and the Grade One Citroen C6 Seltion Novices' Hurdle at Aintree. Trainer John Joe O'Neill reported, "Black Jack Ketchum is in the John Smith's Hurdle and we're looking forward to that. He's in great form and hopefully he stays in good form until then. "He's a very exceptional horse - probably once in a life-time really. Our main worry is keeping him sound because we know how good he is. It's just a matter of keeping everything right and happy for him. I'm really looking forward to running him to be honest." He's a bit special and, if we get him there right on the day, he's going to take a bit of beating."

Alongside Black Jack Ketchum, this year's running of the John Smith's

Hurdle appears set to attract another high quality field with the Henry Daly-trained

Mighty Man a possible, and Alan King eyeing up a challenge with Grade One Ladbrokes World Hurdle victor My Way De Solzen.

Take Cover From Jack Frost

Racecourse Holdings Trust who own Cheltenham and nine other National Hunt tracks in the UK recently purchased 45 acres of covers costing £100,000 to safeguard its tracks against Jack Frost this coming winter.

Alan Out For At Least A Year

Jockey Alan Munro received the worst possible news recently when told he would not be passed fit to ride until at least twelve months time. Alan (39) suffered a blackout last August and faces a 12 months observation period before doctors will possibly allow him to ride competitively. Alan who won the Epsom Derby aboard Generous in 1991 is a tough cookie however and is dead set on resuming his career in 2007.

Ascot Problems

Ascot racecourse were very proud of the fact that they completed their £215 million revamp on budget and on time unlike Wembley stadium but the Ascot management are recognising mistakes of serious viewing problems on the racecourse level on the main stand. Architects HOK are in damage limitation talks with two other companies about a redesign to try to solve the issues in advance of next year's Royal fixture in June. It also emerged last Friday that Chief Executive Douglas Erskine-Crum is to part company with the racecourse at the end of the year.

Rough Diamond

RTE and the BBC are currently shooting a new drama series called Rough Diamond. The production is set in contemporary Ireland and follows the rivalry between a near bankrupt young horse trainer and his millionaire neighbour. Lorraine Pilkington, Conor Mullen of Soldier Soldier fame and Stanley Townsend play the leading parts.

Hairy Molly And Accordion Etoile Out

Last years Cheltenham bumper winner Hairy Molly met with a setback recently and trainer Joe Crowley reports his gelding will not be seen in action until sometime in the New Year.

Accordion Etoile trained in County Wexford by Paul Nolan is also on the easy list and is expected to return to action shortly after Xmas.

Lucky Paul

Top rider Paul Carberry can count himself a very lucky man after winning his appeal against a two months jail sentence for setting a newspaper on fire aboard a plane returning from a break in Spain.

Instead of going to jail Paul must undertake a long period of voluntary work.

Kieren Finished In Ireland

Kieren Fallon is now finished riding in Ireland and as we pen this report he is in Australia to gain some valuable experience of the Aussie racecourses in advance of partnering Yeats in the Melbourne Cup in early November.

Fran Destined For Hong Kong

Flat jockey Fran Berry intends riding in Hong Kong during the winter.

Niall Rejoins John Oxx

Experienced pilot Niall McCullough has split from Michael Grassick and has rejoined the John Oxx yard. County Carlow born McCullough parted on good terms with Michael Grassick and will still continue to ride for the yard. Indeed the pair teamed up with a winner at Navan recently. Niall heads to Bombay in India to ride during the Irish flat off-season.

El Gran Senor Put Down

El Gran Senor a dual Classic winner and a top sire was put down last Thursday at the age of twenty-five. Owned by the late Robert Sangster and trained by Vincent O'Brien El Gran Senor won the 1983 Dewhurst Stakes and then as a three year old in 1984 went on to capture the 2000 Guineas and Epsom Derby.

Deep Impact Under A Cloud

After failing a routine dope test the Japanese horse Deep Impact faces disqualification from third place in this year's French Arc.

Jimmy Banned

Irish born jockey Jimmy Fortune misses the remainder of the British Turf season

having been hit with a sixteen-day ban for a number of riding offences by the British Horse Racing Authority.

Boyle Sports Sponsor At Cheltenham

The announcement last week by Cheltenham Racecourse that the December Meeting is to become the Boylesports International and have at its centrepiece the £200,000 Grade Two Boylesports.com International has received positive reaction from trainers of the top hurdlers in Britain and Ireland.

The Boylesports.com International, a hurdle race over two miles and a furlong on Saturday, December 9, and formerly the Bula Hurdle, has had a massive prize money increase of £125,000, taking its value from £75,000 to £200,000. This makes the Boylesports.com International the second richest hurdle race in Britain and Ireland, with only the £360,000 Smurfit Kappa Champion Hurdle at The Festival in March worth more.

Underscoring the new importance of this event is a £200,000 bonus payment for any horse winning both the Boylesports.com International and the Smurfit Kappa Champion Hurdle in the same season. If won, this will be split £180,000 for the owner, £10,000 for the trainer and £10,000 for the successful yard's stable staff. The winner of both races would therefore amass over £500,000.

Record-Breaking Number Of Fixtures At Wolverhampton

Already one of the busiest courses in the UK, Wolverhampton Racecourse originally had 97 fixtures scheduled for 2006.

However, with the new Essex course, Great Leighs, experiencing a few setbacks, Wolverhampton has acquired 12 extra racedays after they were resubmitted to the British Horseracing Board.

The 100th fixture of the year at Wolverhampton will be on Friday, December 15, and, during November, there will be six fixtures in succession from November 6 to 11, with 110 in total for the year, which includes one Arab meeting.

Handicap just half an hour before guiding Orpen Princess (7/1) to a clearcut success in the Come Racing In Ballinrobe 2007 Handicap and McDonogh is now well clear of main title rival, Pat Smullen, with just over two weeks of the flat season left.

Glenfinn Captain Impresses

Tom Taaffe's Glenfinn Captain made an impressive winning debut over fences when taking the Cavan GAA Supporters Club Beginners Chase in great style at Fairyhouse on Saturday. Partnered by Barry Geraghty, the 9/4 favourite made all the running and jumped particularly well to defeat Khetam in decisive fashion and looks to have a bright future over fences on the evidence of this display.

Mossbank Makes Winning Debut

The Michael Hourigan trained Mossbank (8/11 fav) made a fine start to his chasing career when taking the Irish Stallion Farms E.B.F. Captain Christy Novice Chase at Clonmel on Sunday. Ridden by Conor O'Dwyer, this fine strapping son of Kadeed jumped well throughout and relished the three mile trip in running out a decisive winner under Conor O'Dwyer and he should certainly make his presence felt in all the top staying novice events during the winter months.

Boca Dancer Bolts In

Kevin Prendergast's Boca Dancer confirmed the good impression she had created when winning on her debut at Cork eight days earlier by taking the Lanwades & Staffordtown Studs Stakes at the Curragh on Sunday. The 7/4 second favourite struck the front over a furlong out before going on to win by three and a half lengths from Sensible Lady (7/1) and she looks a nice prospect for next season.

IRISH RACING NEWS

Moran Ban Reduced

Jockey David Moran, who incurred a 21 day ban when riding at the Curragh two weeks ago, had the length of his suspension reduced to 6 days after his appeal was partially successful. The Acting Stewards at the Curragh found that he had attempted to strike another rider during the running of the Derinstown Stud Apprentice Series Final but the Appeals & Referrals Committee ruled that the original ban was too severe. However, the six day ban effectively rules him out for the rest of the Flat Racing Season which ends at Leopardstown on November 5th.

Marketing Award For HRI

Horse Racing Ireland was awarded the Best Domestic Marketing Campaign Award at the 10th Annual HSMIA Sales & Marketing awards ceremony in Dublin last week. HRI's award was based on an evaluation of its marketing campaign from 2004 to 2006 inclusive. The HRI entry was summarised as follows - "Horse racing is experiencing an unprecedented resurgence; a sport whose image had been caught in a bygone era has lost its conservative shackles and entered into the social repertoire of a younger audience, thus ensuring its popularity and relevance for the foreseeable future."

Coolmore Announces New Stallions For 2007

George Washington, Hurricane Run, Aussie Rules and Ad Valorem will all be standing as stallions at Coolmore Stud next season. The news was announced last week and all four horses will have their final career outings in the Breeders Cup Series in America in just over two weeks time. George Washington was a brilliant winner of the English 2000 Guineas and the Queen Elizabeth II Stakes, Hurricane Run won the 2005 Budweiser Irish Derby and the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe as well as the 2006 Tattersalls Gold Cup and the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes, Aussie Rules took the 2006

French 2000 Guineas while Ad Valorem won the 2004 Middle Park Stakes as a juvenile and the Queen Anne Stakes at Royal Ascot earlier this season. All four are beautifully bred horses and join an already impressive stallion roster at Coolmore Stud in County Tipperary.

Taaffe Outlines Plans

Trainer Tom Taaffe recently revealed that his very promising young chaser, Merdeka, is being aimed at the Irish Field Novice Chase at Punchestown on 18th November. Winner of three of his six career starts including a Grade 2 event at Naas last January, Merdeka has the size and the scope to do well over fences and could well have a run in a beginners event before Punchestown. Taaffe also confirmed that Kicking King is continuing to progress well and is likely to go for the Paddy Power Dial-A-Bet Chase over two miles at Leopardstown in late December. The 2005 Cheltenham Gold Cup winner has not raced since winning his second consecutive King George VI Chase at Sandown on St Stephen's Day last year.

Accused Pleads Not Guilty to Murder of Kilmac Woman

A sixty-one year old Scottish man has pleaded not guilty at the Central Criminal Court to the murder of a KilmacThomas woman two years ago.

The trial of Samuel Jennings, who lived at Ashtown, KilmacThomas opened yesterday (Tuesday). He was accused of killing

fifty-four year old Mary Walsh, of Kildaligan, Kilrossanty, on a date unknown between August 30th and September 1st 2004.

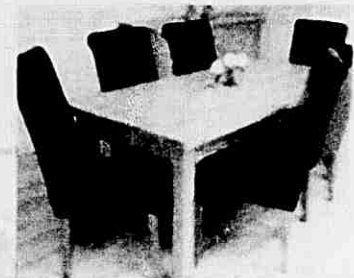


