## Unruly Scenes Mar Meeting Of Lismore Town Council

A war of words erupted amid tempestuous scenes near the end of Lismore Town Council's November meeting over accusations that the Mayor of Lismore, Helen O'Sullivan had misinformed the members of the council of an alleged conversation she had with Town Clerk, Eric Flynn over the visit of An Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern.

The heated and divisive debate centred on the controversy over the aborted plans to have the Taoiseach officially open a playground in the town during his recent visit to the constituency.

The plans were called off on the day of the visit after the playground committee threatened to boycott the opening, claiming that the event was being "politically hijacked."

Fine Gael Cllr. Orla Russell, a member of the playground committee, said she was disgusted with the way it was handled.

She claimed that after the previous month's meeting of the Town Council, Mayor O'Sullivan had "casually"

said to officials that Mr. Ahern was to be in the constituency on October 16th and asked would the playground be ready.

**DENIED**

This was strenuously denied by both Mayor O'Sullivan and Town Clerk,

Eric Flynn. Mr. Flynn said he took "grave exception" to claims

he had foreknowledge of plans to get the Taoiseach to open the playground.

According to Cllr. Russell, there were a handful of people in the council chambers at the time, including the Mayor, the Town Clerk, Independ-

## CDB Looking To Zone Monang Land For Industry

Waterford County Development Board have made a submission to the Dungarvan Town Development Plan, calling for 16 ha of land at Monang to be zoned for clean light industrial use in a bid to attract companies to the area, and facilitate the expansion of others already in the town.

The proposal, which would have to be adopted by the Town Council, probably at its December meeting, is in line with the strategy laid out at the recent 'Invest in Waterford' seminar which would send out the message that "Dungarvan Is Open For Business."

It would also create a "fourth generation park" where it would be possible to "live, work, learn and play", thus enhancing Dungarvan's potential for new investment.

### NEW JOBS ANNOUNCEMENT IN THE PIPELINE

Meanwhile discussions on the expansion of a number of key industries, who will create an unspecified number of new jobs, are already thought to be at an advanced stage, and a major jobs announcement could be down the line, if all goes to plan.

**SUBMISSION**

In its key concern in an in-depth submission to the Draft Town Development Plan 2006-2011, the County Development Board, has called for the zoning of 16ha of land in Monang for suitable employment use.

Fergal Reidy, the Development Executive Officer with the County Enterprise Board, said they are currently looking at the requirements to zone land for industrial use.

"That's currently being considered by the elected representatives of Dungarvan Town Council.

"Essentially there is scope in Monang to look at industrial use there. Dungarvan Town Council is just considering that at the moment. I don't want to pre-empt the outcome of that. **CONTINUED ON PAGE SEVEN**

## O'Shea Accused of Being at Odds With Own Party

Wilkinson Launches  
Blistering Attack on  
Labour T.D.

Fianna Fail TD Ollie Wilkinson launched a blistering attack on Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea, accusing him of being at odds with his own party over for-profit hospitals.

Speaking on a Dail adjournment debate Deputy O'Shea called for an undertaking that immediate steps be taken to provide radiotherapy for public cancer patients in the south-east region at the new multi-million euro private hospital, Whitefield Clinic.

But just the night before, he voted with his Labour colleagues against it. "The discord at the heart of the Labour party is spectacular," Deputy Wilkinson claimed.

During the debate, the Labour party's health spokesperson, Liz McManus, decried the "over reliance on the private sector" for healthcare.

But later, according to Deputy Wilkinson, the Tramore based opposition TD, touted the privately run Whitfield Clinic as the "solution" for radiotherapy in Waterford.

"Of course, the real problem here for Labour is that the party's ideological opposition to private for-profit hospitals does not sit well with some of its local public representatives.

"The truth is that the HSE is in contact with the management of Whitfield Clinic. There are objective guidelines for the type of radiotherapy facilities that the public sector could purchase from the private sector.

Currently, Whitfield are analysing those guidelines to see if they can make a case that their facilities comply.

Deputy Wilkinson said he "fully support those talks" and hoped they would conclude quickly.

"I have long backed the treatment of public patients in Whitfield Clinic," Deputy Wilkinson said. "That remains my position and I intend to pursue it.

"Labour on the other hand cannot move forward because they don't know which way they are facing."

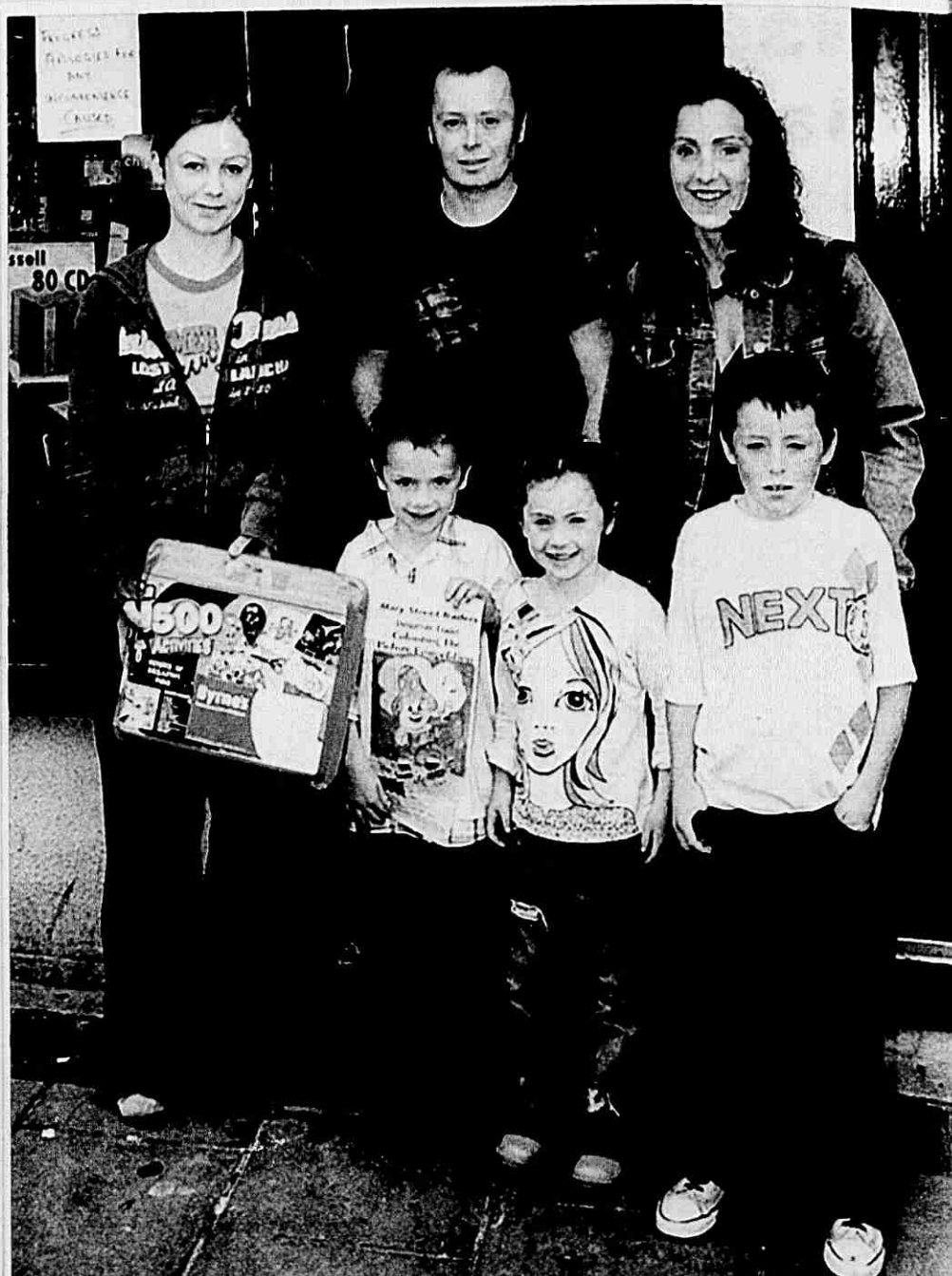

# CDB Looking To Zone Monang Land For Industry

which should happen before the end of December."

He said the industries being looked at would include new office space, and laboratories and other high value added industries.

#### ADVANTAGES

The submission lays out the advantages of the Monang site for light industry.

"This is a profile site adjacent to the N25 route between Cork and Waterford," it says.

"The sites access to the N25 would be facilitated by a roundabout traffic management system.

"This is important as it would represent an attractive and easily accessible site for investors and employers adjacent to a road that could accommodate increased traffic, subject to assessment.

"The availability of industrial land at Monang would be wholly consistent with the principles of sustainable development as it would ensure that the area can be developed in a holistic fashion providing places to 'live, work and play.'"

Furthermore, the submission goes on to say, the presence of lands zoned for institutional use would also facilitate the development of a 'third level' or 'training facility' at Monang.

#### EXPANSION

They say this approach could yield a number of advantages, including the immediate expansion of businesses in Dungarvan; improve the competitiveness of the industrial/employment property market; position Dungarvan as one of the towns in Ireland at the forefront of developing an integrated 'live, work, learn and play' zone; promote to potential investors a fourth generation park; provide Dungarvan with a real opportunity to attract investment by illustrating to current and potential employers the Town Council's commitment to economic development; deliver a clearly defined area of green field lands zoned for industrial use for potential investors immediately; the zoning of lands would allow for a different but complementary type of employment use to be developed in the town, and finally it would accommodate businesses that may prefer to develop within the boundary of

Dungarvan Town Council as distinct from within the environs of the town.

"This is typically the case for clean industry who seek to locate in profile sites within the Town Council's administrative area," it says.

#### ENTERPRISE CENTRE

Meanwhile, Waterford County Enterprise is currently implementing a programme to enhance the enterprise and innovation orientation in Dungarvan. In addition, Enterprise Ireland and Waterford County Enterprise Board have approved 500,000 euro to develop a new Enterprise Centre in the town.

# Deise Link Continues Expansion Of Local Bus Services

Since the introduction in 2003 of pilot services under the Department of Transport funded Rural Transport Initiative, the number of areas across the county that benefits from the introduction of services continues to grow. The plan initially was to establish a total of seven scheduled routes based in the north and west of the county as these were identified as areas of greater need, however in line with demand and with increased funding from the Department, the number of rural services continues to increase.

## SERVICE IN COPPER COAST AREA

In June of this year the services were put on a permanent footing when Minister Martin Cullen launched Deise Link at a very enjoyable and well attended event held in Clonea Strand Hotel. On the day the Minister also officially launched a new service from Deise Link, operating on Mondays from Stradbally to Tramore via Bunmahon, Kill, Dunhill, Annestown and Fenor, and taking in the general Copper Coast area. The service is operated by James

Carey & Sons, Tramore.

## KILMATHOMAS – PORTLAW – CARRICK ON SUIR SERVICE

Commencing on Saturday 11th. November, Deise Link's new service will be operated by Sean Maher Coaches Ltd. Operating from Kilmacthomas to Carrick-on-Suir each Saturday, the service will take in the areas of Newtown, Glenaphuca and 5 Cross Roads, "where people are unable to get to our buses, we will collect and return them to their homes"

Speaking on the launch of the final pilot route for 2006, James O'Donoghue, Manager of Deise Link said "Our experience of running rural transport services over the last three years has shown

that for many people the distance to the nearest bus stop was a problem. What makes our services different is that we can offer a door-to-door service to our passengers. Where people are unable to get to our bus, we will collect and return them to their homes".

We now operate a total of 16 scheduled services per week from rural areas of the County to Dungarvan and the adjoining towns of Clonmel, Carrick-on-Suir and Youghal. Services to Cappoquin and Kilmacthomas Day Care Centres and Kinsalebeg Community Centre were introduced in 2005 and in partnership with Waterford Centre for Independent Living a service for people with disabilities, based in Dungarvan and covering a 20 mile radius of town. Services in the fully accessible vehicle are available to people registered with Waterford Disability Network (PwDI). Deise Link also support Dungarvan No Name Club and Foroige in providing transport to events.

Services are free for passengers holding the Department of Social and Family Affairs Free Travel or Companion Passes. Children under 12 accompanied by an adult also travel free, while students pay a €2.00 return fare. All other passengers pay a €5.00 return fare.

# Unruly Scenes Mars Meeting Of Lismore Town Council

dent Town Councillor, John Campion and herself.

She said that after Mayor O'Sullivan made the comment, Mr. Flynn said, "don't even go down that road" as the playground wasn't yet ready to be opened.

After the denials by both the Mayor and Mr. Flynn, who said there was "no mention of the playground," Cllr. John Campion claimed untruths were being told.

## THREATENED WALKOUT

Cllr. Campion insisted he would no longer remain in the chamber due to what were claimed to be misleading comments, and along with Cllr. Russell, threatened to walk out.

He said the Mayor had told Mr. Flynn that Bertie Ahern was coming on October 16th and she asked was there any chance the playground would be open.

"I can't believe you're denying this now," he said.

He described it as a "white-wash" and "absolute rubbish".

Independent Cllr. Peter Ahern vociferously challenged the type of allegations that were being made, and called for the withdrawal of the remarks.

## FARCE

But Cllr. Campion said it was "nothing but a farce" that the Mayor was denying saying anything, and again threatened to walk out of the meeting.

Cllr. Russell said the first she heard of the Taoiseach's visit was at the end of the meeting on October 2nd and she did not take "much heed". However Fine Gael Waterford County Councillor, Declan Doocey later rang her to say that one of the Director's of Services with the local authority had approached the Taoiseach to open the playground. She said she then rang Waterford County Council to say she was not happy that there was no consultation with the playground committee and that the playground was not ready to be opened in any case.

## FURIOUS REACTION

She said a meeting of the playground committee was held and there was a furious reaction. They "point blank" refused the idea of the Taoiseach opening it, as they wanted it to be a family and child orientated event and they wanted to "keep politics out of it".

The committee then wrote to

Waterford County Council. She said in the letter they received back from Director of Services, Brian White, he informed them that Deputy Ollie Wilkinson had approached Mr. Ahern with the proposal to open the playground. She went on to question whether the matter was again raised at a meeting of the Special Policy Committee.

Mayor O'Sullivan said she had discussed the matter informally with Rena Coady. According to Mayor O'Sullivan, she said to her "how is the playground going" and Ms. Coady said it wouldn't be ready for the Taoiseach's visit to which Mayor O'Sullivan said "fine."

## MEETING

She said there were several people in the room before the SPC meeting and they discussed it informally. She said she didn't remember exactly who the people in the room were as it was a number of weeks ago, but she said there were several members

of the SPC present.

She said she wasn't even aware that the remit of the SPC in question covered playgrounds.

Cllr. Campion said the playground committee was made up mostly of women who had gone knocking on doors and holding discos in Ballyrafter to collect funds. He said they had gone out in all weathers to collect funds. He said some of the women were in tears over the whole thing at a meeting of the Committee three days before the scheduled visit of the Taoiseach.

It was an attempt at "one manupmanship" he said, questioning who had come up with the idea.

## DIVISIVE

As the questioning continued and the debate became still more divisive, Mayor O'Sullivan said she was not going to be made a "scapegoat" for what happened.

Coming to her defence, Cllr. Ahern said that it was the first time that a Taoiseach of any po-

litical hue was stopped from coming to an area. He also pointed out that Whitfield Clinic in Waterford City was opened by the Taoiseach even though it wasn't yet finished.

He went on to claim that a threat had been issued that the Taoiseach's car would be "busted up" if he visited Lismore.

## MOTION

When no apologies were made, Independent councillor, Peter Ahern put forward a motion that next months meeting should not go-ahead unless the Mayor was apologised to for the remarks made.

Fianna Fail councillor, Jimmy O'Gorman said it was a cause to "hang our heads in shame" to stop the Taoiseach of the day from coming to Lismore. He said some people including the clergy didn't know the event had been cancelled.

"It makes us look like the laughing stock of the country," he added.

# ACUPUNCTURE

Acupuncture is one of the many forms of medical treatment which are used by practitioners of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM). It has been widely used in China and the Far East for thousands of years and is now becoming increasingly popular in Ireland.

Traditional Chinese Medicine is based on ancient principles which recognise numerous meridians (channels) through which the energy (qi) of the body flows. areas of the body".

"Cupping involves the use of gently heated cups which are then applied to the skin to stimulate circulation and healing. This stimulates and circulates the blood and qi (energy), which helps to release toxins from the tissues." Adds John.

John O'Sullivan has 10 years experience and is a member of the Traditional Chinese Medicine Council of Ireland. He studied at Miltown Park College in Dublin, and then at Nan Jing hospital in China where he worked with people suffering from the effects of stroke and musculoskeletal problems in particular. # The Centre Of The World

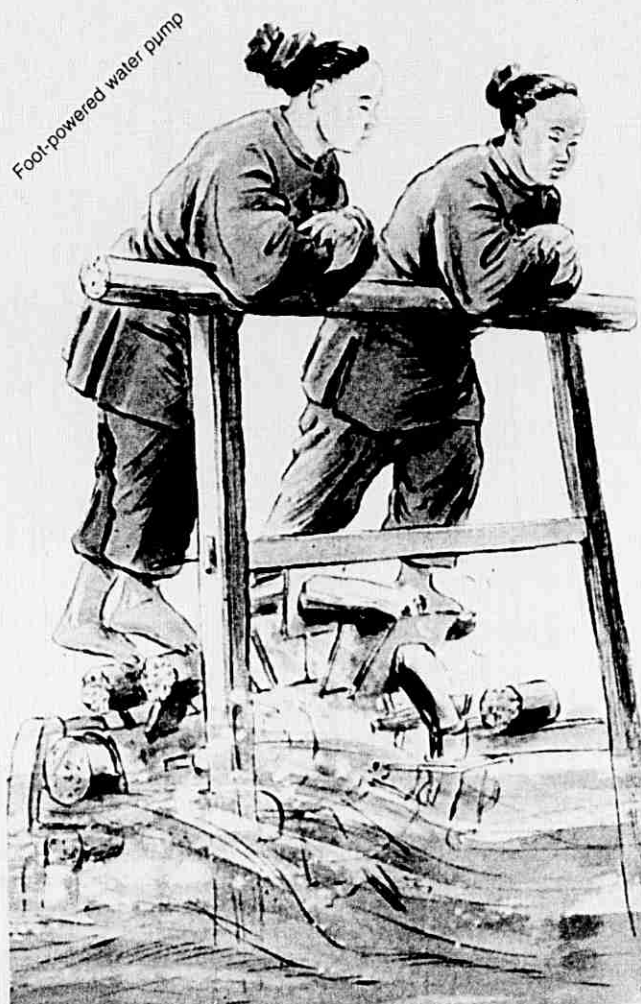

## Environment Today

### SAVE ENERGY

**Did you know** that many of our household appliances still use energy when they are let in "standby mode"? For example, when you turn off your TV with the remote control, a red light indicates that it is in stand-by mode and it will still use electricity unless you actually switch it off. Some appliances can use up to half as much electricity in stand-by mode as when they are fully turned on-so you'll also be saving money on your electricity bill by turning them off!

All the appliances we use in our home use energy, but some are more efficient than others. To help us make a more informed and sustainable choice, many household machines, dryers, fridges, freezers, dishwashers and ovens now come with energy labels attached. These indicate the relative energy efficiency of the appliance on a rating scale from A-G, with "A" rating being the most efficient.

**The next time** you need to buy a new appliance, check its energy rating and choose the highest-rated appliance you can afford. It may be more expensive initially but you save you money on your energy bill every time you use it. Energy-efficient models of washing machines often use less water too, do you can reduce the environmental impact even further.

#### TIPS.

Switch off lights when you leave the room. Lighting accounts for 10-15% of your electricity bill.

Standby. Turn off televisions, stereos, video players and computers rather than leaving them on standby.

Tea Breaks. Only put the amount of water in a kettle that you actually need-otherwise you are paying to heat water unnecessarily.

A lagging jacket on a hot water cylinder will pay for itself in less than a year by saving 75% of heat loss from the cylinder. Insulate your attic.

#### WEEE, The environment and the consumer.

**Play your part in ensuring that Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) is recycled responsibly.**

Waste electrical equipment is a rapidly growing waste stream in Europe.

Significant amounts of WEEE have been consigned to landfill, taking up space and leaving environmentally damaging toxic substances. In Ireland, we have a particular problem with fridges and cookers and other appliances being dumped on mountainsides, lakes and country roads.

To tackle these issues across Europe, the EU has introduced the WEEE Directive.

It requires that all producers of WEEE finance the recovery and recovery of waste electrical and electronic household equipment.

#### FREE take back for consumers.

Since 13 August 2005, consumers can recycle their old WEEE, free of charge in the following ways:-

##### To a retailer.

Retailers are required by law to take back WEEE from customers.

Take back is on a one-for-one basis only and the appliance being returned must be of a similar type or have performed the same function as the new item purchased. E.g. retailers are not obliged to take back a fridge when purchasing a toaster.

Where the goods are bought over the counter, retailers must take back the old product in store either at the time of sale or within a maximum of 15 days of the date of sale, provided the consumer can provide proof of purchase.

Where a new appliance or equipment is being delivered, for example, a new washing machine, cooker, etc, the seller of the product must take back the old appliance on the delivery of a new product either at the time of delivery, provided the old product has been cleaned and disconnected from any utilities and is ready for immediate collection, or

At their premises within a maximum of 30 days from the date of delivery.

Retailers must give 24 hours notice of a delivery or else return within 15 days to collect the old appliance.

Whichever take-back option a consumers avails of must be FREE OF CHARGE. Source: [www.viron.ie](http://www.viron.ie)

Waterford County Council staff will this week be completing their project of replacing 1,800 metres of water-mains piping along the Boherwillin/Chapel Rd./Churchquarter approach road. Constant pressure on the original 2" pipe, which was laid well over 40 years ago, had led to numerous leakages in recent years, and a decision was made to replace it completely along this stretch of roadside, with a modern pressure-resistant 4" version. Apparently, lots of other breaks which hadn't been noted beforehand, were exposed during the replacement works, and already, a 50% decrease in water loss has been noted at the pump in Carrigawn. The Co. Council used temporary traffic lights on this stretch of road whilst work was in progress, to ensure as much safety as possible for road users along this notoriously winding, and indeed busy stretch of the Youghal/Clonmel road.

## CINEMA REVIEWS

### Borat \*\*\*\*

What would you get if you mixed *Jackass*' style of humour with the intelligence of a man with two Cambridge degrees? The answer is *Borat*, Sacha Baron Cohen's Kazakhstani reporter. A blend of idiotic slapstick and a scarily precise satire on American culture, *Borat* is the funniest film you will see this year.

The loose plot sees Borat sent to America to learn cultural and economic lessons he can meld into his documentary for the betterment of Kazakhstan. While in New York he discovers the thrills of *Baywatch* and, dragging his producer Azamat Bagatov (Kenneth Davitian) with him, travels across America in order to marry Pamela Anderson. Of course, the plot isn't exactly important to the film, it is just a means of allowing Cohen to send-up as much of American society as possible.

Both Kazakhstan and America have been outraged by *Borat*, both of them with little justification. While Cohen portrays Kazakhstan as a backwards and disgusting country, the joke is really on the Western world and its ignorance of anything outside its own sphere of reference. America meanwhile can have no complaints at all, as the people shown are not only real but a strong reflection on the general populace. Cohen is not without a heart and does balance his film to show the better side of American life but he never holds back when he reflects upon its uglier sides. Racism, xenophobia, religious extremism as fervent as any other and general uncouthness are all highlighted as being a large part of American life.

Aside from Cohen's intellectual undercurrent though, this film works as a pure comedy. Although the trailer itself was hilariously funny, the best parts are, for once, reserved for the film. Without going into any of them, which would ruin the surprise factor that makes them work, all that can be said is that they are utterly hilarious. Prepare for sore cheeks after from all the laughing you will do in the cinema.

### Upcoming Films

Jude Law stars in Oscar-winner Anthony Minghella's latest offering *Breaking and Entering*. Law is a landscape architect who finds his office repeatedly burgled and sets out to investigate the crimes. While some may be sick of the spat of cockney geezer flicks that followed *Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels*, the involvement of Minghella and Law promises a far different film, one which will offer more to the discerning viewer.

Hollywood's riposte is *The Prestige*, a Hugh Jackman and Christian Bale piece set around two rival magicians vying to be top dog in turn of the century London. With able backing from the irrepressible Michael Caine and Hollywood's current starlet, Scarlett Johansson, director Christopher Nolan will hopefully be able to repeat the success he enjoyed with *Memento* and *Batman Begins*.

## BONFIRES AND BANGERS

Halloween in Dungarvan was one of the quieter holiday periods for some time, which is certainly welcome – coming in the face of considerable and understandable fears for the vulnerable in the community. But thankfully nothing of serious nature occurred.

As evidence of this, the Gardai in Dungarvan told Viewpoint that there was just one public order arrest on what is a scary night – not just in the ethereal sense either but of a more determinably solid nature – for some in the town. It came on the back of an equally quiet October Bank Holiday weekend, when, aside from two arrests for drunk driving, there were thankfully few other arrests or problems in the locality.

Bonfires were lit in areas all over town, with the biggest again reserved for Gallows Hill at the ironically named Byrneville estate. Again it was well marshalled and any exuberance stayed within the spirit and atmosphere of celebration and good craic of the occasion. Strictly speaking, bonfires of any kind are illegal under Environmental laws but it would have been a shame for anyone to dampen the good-natured revelry of the crowds who gathered there in their hundreds. In this, the fire service and the council environmental watchdogs have once again done well to keep a distant though watchful brief.

Bangers and fireworks, meanwhile, banged, cackled and whizzed into the witching hours – setting off a chorus of dogs in response. Again while there is certainly an annoyance factor, and in the case of fireworks, a danger to both the users and those living nearby, nothing more serious than a few hours of lost sleep was the result.

Halloween has always been one of the most frightening times for the elderly, especially for those who live alone. But thankfully, unlike in some of the larger cities, incidents of serious and criminal behaviour on Halloween night were few and far between this year.

## SEVERE FLOODING

Despite dire warnings in the past few months, the flash flooding that struck Dungarvan and West Waterford last week came as a quite shock. Damage to homes and businesses was, in contrast to the tidal damage wrecked two years ago, relatively minimal. Motorists were the worst affected. In Ring, in particular, a large section of one road – approaching the oyster beds – was washed away in the cascading waters. And the main arteries into Dungarvan were badly flooded, forcing motorists to either brave the conditions or take circuitous routes home. In total, the damage left a quite considerable bill of over 600,000 euro – over half of which was the result of damage in the Dungarvan area. Fire crews and the rescue services will also have to be paid for their emergency aid.

Cash-crisis Waterford County Council looks as though it will be left with the hefty bill. While there have already been calls on the Minister for the Environment, Dick Roche to come to the local authority's aid that now looks unlikely to happen. Lets just hope that the high tides and flood warnings issued by Dungarvan Town Council for this week pass off without the sort of rainfall we saw two weeks ago. Otherwise, the confluence of heavy rain, gales and high tides could add up to an even larger bill, and not just for the council alone either.

## TOWN HALL

Very welcome news this week in the form of an advertisement for tenders for the renovation of the Town Hall in Dungarvan. The former administrative headquarters of Dungarvan Urban Council, as it was then known, have fallen into a decrepit state of late. The town museum is currently downstairs but upstairs there are serious problems structurally. The cost of the project is likely to top the million mark. The Town Hall, which was a famous dance hall in past incarnations, will be developed into a theatre.

Dungarvan has been crying out for a quality theatre for many years to rival even smaller towns in West Waterford who, with community backing, have developed beautiful theatres in community halls. The fact that Dungarvan has fallen behind in this regard flies in the face of the towns tradition as a choral and theatrical hot-bed that stretches back many generations. The commencement of work, probably in early 2007, will hopefully kick start that tradition again in Dungarvan, and of course, give theatre throughout West Waterford a natural home.

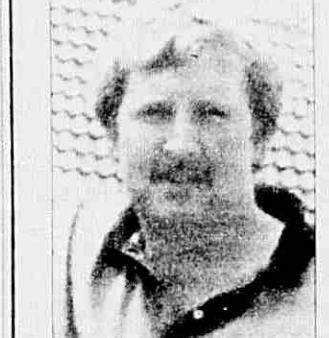

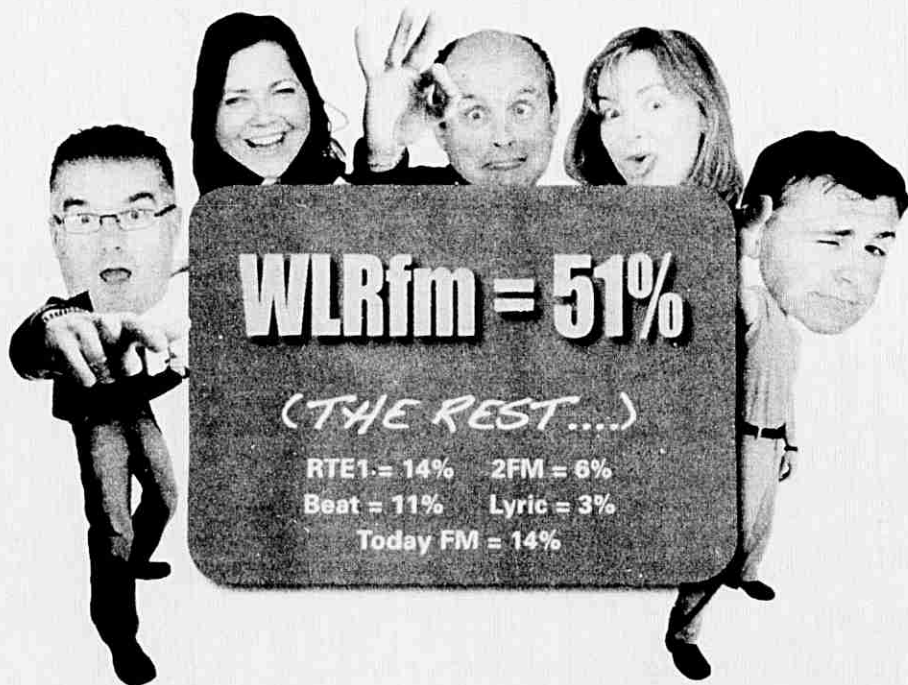

### Ivy On Trees And Walls

With the late ending of Summer/Autumn it has been confusing to see summer and even some spring flowers still in bloom. But one plant that is expected to flower late in the year is the ivy.

Ivy is common all over County Waterford, from high ground to sea cliffs. It can scramble along the ground in woods, but it is more usually seen as a climber on buildings, trees and cliffs.

It does not get its nourishment from trees but uses them for support. If a tree's is sick, this can lead to the ivy taking up the whole canopy of the tree. In this situation, if the tree is near a road or building there is a danger if it catches the winter wind and falls. But "Ivy trees" far from roads and buildings are havens for wildlife.

Ivy flowers, which are just finishing now, attract nectar-feeding insects, including bees which make quite a distinctive honey from it. It has some of the ivy aroma but is not unpleasant. Sadly little Irish honey is sold now labelled with the flowers of origin; it would be nice to be able to appreciate the differences between clover, bramble, lime, hawthorn, ivy and heather hon-

neys. The berries of ivy ripen in January when there is little such food available for birds.

But it is for shelter that Ivy really comes into its own. The best shelter on a cold night is often in among ivy on a wall or a tree. Even bats use it and it is recommended that any felled "ivy tree" should be left unchopped for at least forty eight hours to let them wake up and fly off.

On walls ivy can be a nuisance

if there is damp lime mortar. Then the roots will get into the mortar and grow damaging but also binding the structure. Killing well-established ivy on an ancient church can do great harm as the binding effect of living ivy is lost and the wall can collapse. A "haircut" is the answer to this and the best people to advise are in the National Monuments Service.

During the meeting on Saturday night each Patrol can set up their area.

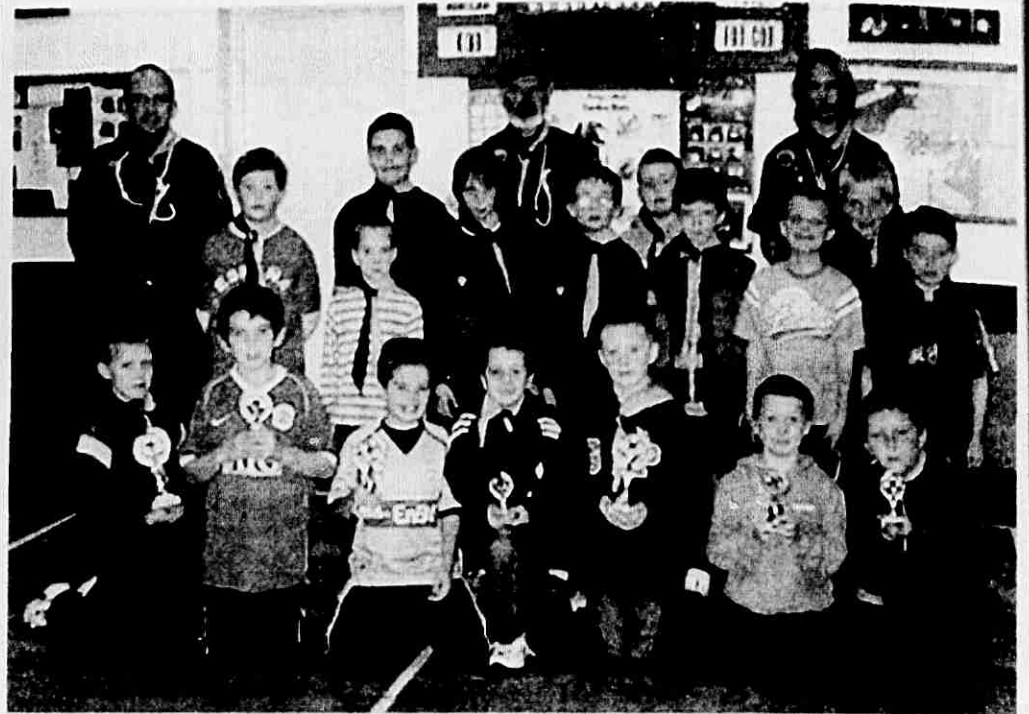

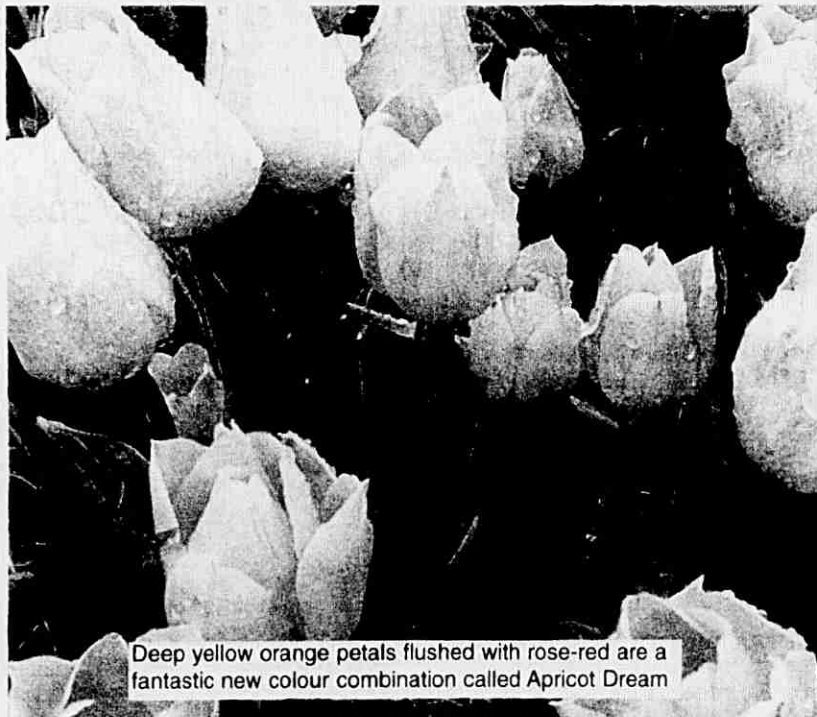

# Dungarvan Leader - this Week in the Garden

## Plant tulips for spring colour

TULIPS come in all shapes and sizes and bring a bold splash of colour to your flower garden in spring. They can be grown with daffodils to extend the early flowering season in a mixed border. Although the time to plant daffodils has now passed, tulips prefer being planted in cold ground to give a fantastic spring show. Tulips are excellent for beds and borders and can be planted in clusters according to colour or variety to give a bold display or scattered randomly across a border. Location is important and, as heights can vary from a few inches to more than two feet, it is worth checking the size the tulip will grow to before planting the bulbs. They grow best in fertile, well drained soil in a sunny, open location and should be protected from excessive moisture and strong winds. Tulips are classified in 15 divisions but are more conveniently grouped by their flowering season and garden use. They come in early, mid-season, late and dwarf varieties and most tulips survive well in fertile, well-drained and humus-rich soils. Some robust cultivars persist from year to year, although many are best regarded as annual bedding plants. Ideally tulip plants should be lifted after

flowering and stored in a dry place until replanted in November. If you are growing tulips in containers, remember to water them during early spring when the container may get dry during warm weather. Most bulbs rarely flower well in the second year but if they are replanted in autumn, they may reach flowering size again within two years. Some varieties, particularly the Kaufmanniana hybrids and the species tulips, can be left in the ground and may spread to colonise an area. Dwarf tulips generally prefer open, gritty soils and full sun. Tulips include an impressive array of flower forms, from the simple upright goblets of sin-

gle flowered tulips to the frilled and twisted petals of parrot tulips and the open double blooms of peony-flowered forms. They are available in most colours, except blue, from the purest white to the deepest purple with many glorious shades of yellow, red and crimson in between. Many of the dwarf tulips also have attractively marked leaves, making a welcome addition to a spring garden even before they flower.

## THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

### SOW HARDY PEAS

Some gardeners take culinary peas, plant them outside to mature and are very successful at it. To have any chance whatsoever you must choose a sheltered spot with well-drained soil.

To improve your chances further, choose the hardiest variety of pea you can, such as Pilot Improved or Meteor.

### DIG UP SEAKALE FOR FORCING

The top growth of the plant should have died back by now and this means the ideal time has arrived to lift the roots for forcing.

Dig them up carefully and cut off the side sprouts of the root bundle and leave in a sheltered position outside for planting in March. Face the central roots against a wall and cover them with sand until only the crown is visible.

### FORCE RHUBARB

If you start your roots at once in a heated greenhouse you should get good sticks in time for Christmas. Strong roots should be lifted and left in the open for a few days, if the weather is frosty. This will actually improve the growth of the plant later on.

Plant them deep in the greenhouse, in soil or container, close together. Cover them with bin-liners so they are in complete darkness, water moderately and try to maintain a temperature range of 13-20°C.

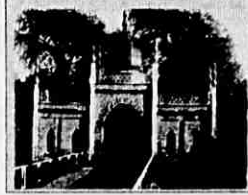
### TIDY HERBACEOUS BORDERS

Most herbaceous perennials will have finished flowering and the borders should be made ready for winter. Cut off all of dead or dying leaves and stems but leave all the evergreen leaves alone. Give the ground a dusting of bonemeal and prick the surface of the ground with a fork, being careful not to disturb plants or bulbs in the process.

### TURN OVER ALL FREE GROUND

By this time there should be lots of free ground for digging.

# COOKERY CORNER

## Baked Potato Treats

EVERYONE loves eating outdoors on Bonfire Night and tucking into some tasty spuds is the perfect treat. Everything can be prepared well in advance in about 20 minutes, with no worries about things running a little late and spoiling.

Some of today's children can be quite fussy eaters, so here are four tasty topping recipes that are suitable for vegetarians too!

**INGREDIENTS** (Serves 4)  
Four baking potatoes

**Toppings**

- Tahini and chive topping
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 3 tablespoons tahini
- 1/2 tsp yeast extract, dissolved in a little water
- 3 tablespoons water
- 15g chives, chopped
- salt and pepper
- Low fat fromage frais with herbs
- 200g low-fat fromage frais
- a handful of fresh herbs, eg basil and parsley, chopped
- salt and pepper
- Tomato salsa
- 225g ripe tomatoes, skinned and chopped
- 1/4 red onion, finely chopped
- 15g fresh coriander, finely chopped
- salt and pepper
- Apple and hazelnut coleslaw
- 1 dessert apple, peeled and grated
- 50g cabbage, finely shredded
- 1 shallot, chopped
- 15g chopped roast hazelnuts
- 30ml/ 1/2 tbsp ready made mayonnaise
- 1 tsp hazelnut oil

**METHOD**

COOK the four baking potatoes in a preheated oven at 200°C/ 400°F/ Gas mark 6 for about 1 - 1 and a half hours until tender. Alternatively, cook in microwave oven.

Mix all the ingredients of your chosen topping together thoroughly (use a blender or food processor for the tahini and chive topping) and serve with the piping hot potatoes.



## PATATAS BRAVAS

THIS is a really fantastic quick and easy dish to serve as the nights begin to close in. Not only is it very warming on a cold November night, but the potatoes and parsley are a good source of vitamin C which will help keep colds at bay during the winter months. It is also suitable for vegetarians.

**INGREDIENTS**  
(Serves 4 as a side dish)  
1 tablespoon vegetable oil  
675g cooked potatoes, cubed

1 onion, finely chopped  
1 tsp chilli powder  
2-3 tbs tomato purée  
1 tbs chopped parsley, to garnish

**METHOD**  
HEAT the oil in a non stick frying pan and gently fry the potatoes, onion and chilli powder together for about 10 minutes or until the onion is soft and all the vegetables are a nice golden colour. Stir in the tomato purée and heat through. Serve the potatoes as a side dish, garnished with chopped parsley.

## Peanut brittle

SWEET-making is often only attempted on Bonfire Night with toffee ñ try this instead.

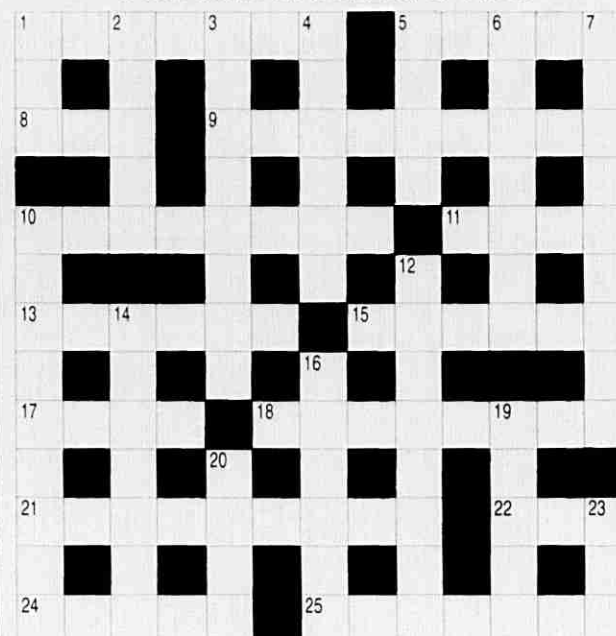
**INGREDIENTS**  
325g loaf or cube sugar  
125ml water  
500g golden syrup  
2 level tspns powdered glucose  
25g butter  
40g browned peanuts  
1/2 tspn lemon essence  
2 tspns bicarbonate of soda

**METHOD**  
Dissolve the sugar in water, together with syrup and glucose, in a large, heavy-

based saucepan set over a low heat. Bring to boil and gently simmer until the mixture starts to thicken. Add the butter, warmed nuts (rub off skins first) and lemon essence then heat until butter is just melted. Stir in bicarbonate of soda ñ mixture will now froth rapidly for a few minutes, but don't worry! Pour it quickly on to an oiled large clean non stick baking tray, and leave to cool. When cold, break brittle into pieces. Store in an airtight container in single layers between grease proof paper.

## Health Tips from "Remedies"

### TURMERIC - Part 2

It has been discovered that curcumin is the most biologically active compound in turmeric which has prompted numerous scientific studies as to its use in a medicinal context. Turmeric is a widely researched herb, with the majority of the studies being conducted on its ability to prevent and treat stomach ulcers. In the past, stomach ulcers were thought to have been caused by a number of factors including stress and regular consumption of spicy foods.

However, it has now been discovered that stomach ulcers are caused by a bacterial infection. The bacterium responsible is called Helicobacter pylori and is unique in that it can live within the mucosal lining of the stomach and erode the protective barrier. Once this barrier is weakened, stomach acid can come into direct contact with the cells of the stomach wall and damage them, causing an ulcer.

One of the category award winners will also receive an overall award in recognition of their special efforts on behalf of the community.

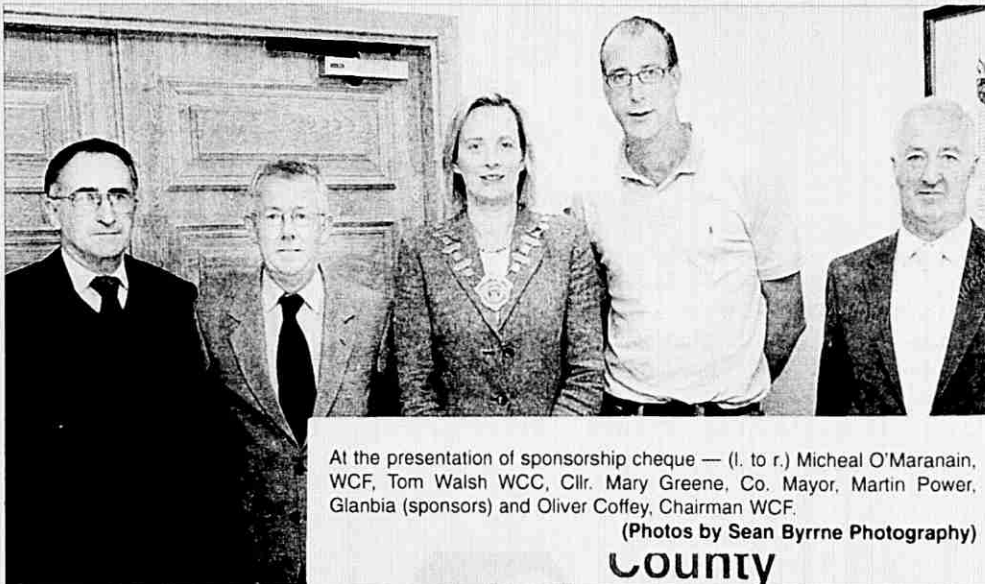

## Weekend Exhibition of Paintings by Anna Moore at Lismore Holistic

Saturday 11th November 11 am to 5 pm and Sunday 12th November 12 noon to 5 pm.

Anna Moore who is from Tramore and lives in Cappoquin will have an exhibition of her paintings at Lismore Holistic on Saturday and Sunday 11th and 12th Nov. The subject is the Omaheke region of the Kalahari Desert of Namibia, where the artist was a Community Development Worker for three years. When she arrived there in 1999, her task was to work with the San people (or Bushmen) to set up the Omaheke San Trust.

The paintings refer to the effects of colonisation, exploitation and overgrazing of the land. In spite of almost complete destruction of their traditional hunter-gatherer lifestyle, the San people have never lost their love and respect of the land. The San taught Anna to see their desert land on several different levels, this has inspired her work.

Since 2002, when she returned from Africa, she has worked as a professional artist, exhibiting her work in exhibitions in various art galleries and art centres in Munster.

Twenty percent of the proceeds from this exhibition will go to the Omaheke San Trust in the Kalahari in Namibia.

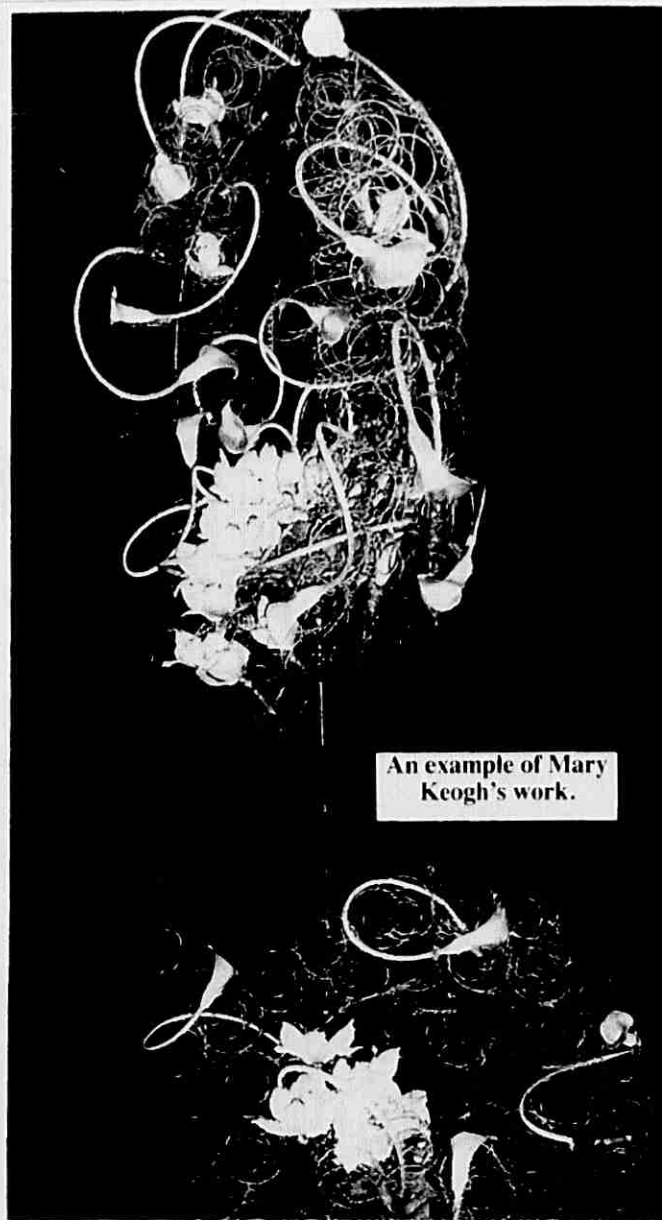

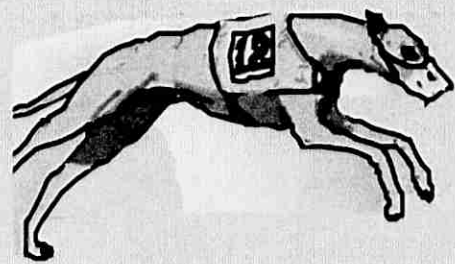

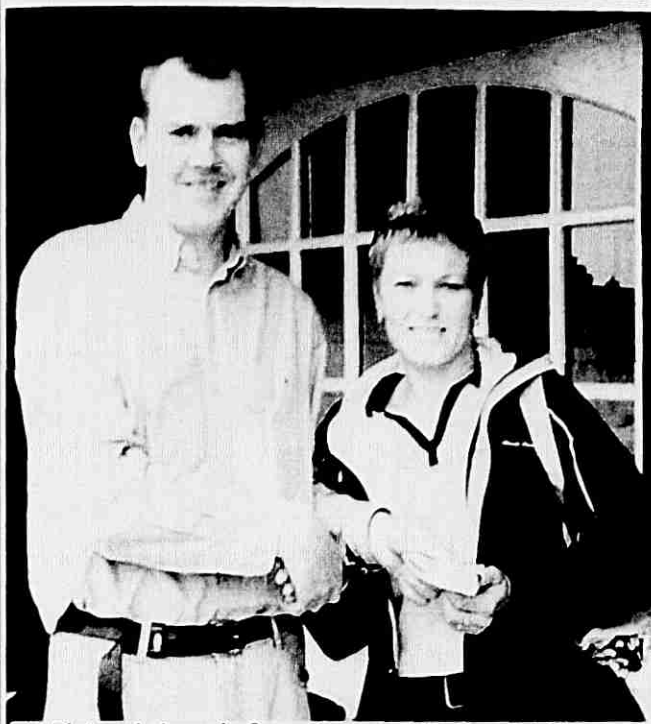

Jockey Paddy Flood continued his fine winning run when partnering another double at Clonmel on Thursday as he combined with Edward O'Grady to take the Cashel Maiden Hurdle with Grapevine Sally (9/4) and the Irish Stallion Farms E.B.F. Beginners Chase with Some Legend (6/4 fav). However, the expected treble failed to mate-

rialise when Back In Front (4/7 fav) fell at the fifth fence from home in the Wilderness Steeplechase which was eventually won by Hear The Echo (7/1).

As expected, Noel Meade's Iktitaf had little more than an exercise canter in justifying 1/7 favouritism in the Anglo Irish Bank Hurdle at Down Royal on Friday. Paul Carberry's mount never came off the bridle to defeat Adamant Approach (5/1) by a cosy two lengths and is now likely to go for the Hatton's Grace Hurdle at Fairyhouse in early December.

## SALMON TOPS IN THRILLER

The €140,000 James Nicholson Wine Merchant Champion Chase at Down Royal on Saturday produced a memorable finish with Michael Hourigan's Beef Or Salmon just edging out War Of Attrition by a neck in a thrilling finish. Winner of the race in 2004 when defeating Kicking King, the 11/4 second favourite responded well to Andrew J. McNamara's urgings to defeat the 4/7 favourite after a great battle between the pair from the final fence. A seventeenth career victory for

Beef Or Salmon and his ninth at Grade One level, this ever popular chaser is likely to try and win the Lexus Chase for the fourth time at Leopardstown in late December.

## NINA LANDS CORK NATIONAL

The hugely talented Nina Carberry had to be at her best in getting Penny Hall, trained by her father, Tommy, home a narrow winner of the Paddy-power.com Cork Grand National at Cork on Sunday. The 13/2 winner got the better of Camptect by three quarters of a length in the famous green and gold colours of J.P. McManus to record a memorable triumph in this three and a half mile contest.

## LOUNAOS LANDS FEATURE

The 2006 Flat Racing Season came to a close at Leopardstown on Sunday with the Eoin Griffin trained Lounaos (8/1) running out a decisive winner of the featured Leopardstown November Handicap over two miles. Pat Smullen's mount proved too strong for the 2004 winner, Al Eile (15/8 fav), by three lengths and this very useful three year old is likely to be campaigned over hurdles in the upcoming weeks.

# IRISH RACING NEWS

## No Fairytale Ending For George

Aidan O'Brien's George Washington was not disgraced in finishing an honourable sixth in the Breeders Cup Classic at Churchill Downs on Saturday night on what was his final career start. He appeared to handle the dirt surface quite well and it was probably the ten furlong distance that found him out in this 5 million dollar contest which was won by Invasor, owned by Sheikh Hamdan Al Maktoum. The hot favourite was Bernardini who had to settle for second place while Brian Meehan's David Junior finished a disappointing last. However, earlier in the evening the Brian Meehan stable pulled off a notable victory when Red Rocks arrived last and fast to win the Breeders Cup Turf under a superb ride from Frankie Dettori with Aidan O'Brien's Scorpion in fifth place just ahead of Hurricane Run. Indeed, it was a tremendous night for Dettori who had earlier partnered Ed Dunlop's Ouija Board to a second victory in the Breeders Cup Fillies And Mares event, a remarkable seventh Group One success for this fantastic globe trotting mare.

## Attrition Could Be Kempton Bound

The 'Mouse' Morris trained War Of Attrition may well go for the King George VI Chase at Kempton on St Stephen's Day rather than the Lexus Chase at Leopardstown two days later as connections go in search of good ground for their stable star. Beaten a neck by Beef Or Salmon in the James Nicholson Wine Merchant Champion Chase at Down Royal on Saturday, Morris feels that the yielding to soft ground proved to be his undoing as he appeared to have the race won everywhere bar where it mattered. The likelihood of soft ground at Leopardstown over Christmas could well mean that War Of Attrition will try and be-

come the third consecutive Irish trained winner of the King George VI Chase after Tom Taaffe's Kicking King proved successful in 2004 and 2005 respectively.

## McDonogh Crowned Champion

Declan McDonogh may not have rode any winners at Leopardstown on Sunday but he was crowned Champion Flat Jockey for the first time after a wonderful season in which he won the Shelbourne Hotel Goffs Million on Miss Beatrix at the Curragh in September.

McDonogh ended the season with 89 winners and was quick to thank his boss, Kevin Prendergast, and his agent, Kevin O'Ryan, for all their support during the year. For the second consecutive year, Chris Hayes was crowned Champion Flat Apprentice with 33 winners and this rising young star now only needs fourteen more winners before he loses his right to claim. Aidan O'Brien was crowned Champion Trainer again with earnings of over €4 million while for the twenty first time, the Master of Roswell House, Dermot Weld, topped the list in terms of most winners trained with 68 victories.

In a quotation by John O'Donoghue from Eternal Echoes the keynote speaker Pat Flanagan, Head of Dept. Health & Leisure/Chemical & Life Sciences in Tralee Institute of Technology, set the tone for a thought provoking conference and underlined our duty: "to speak out for those who have no voice or are not being listened to".

The Lets All Play! Inclusive Childcare conference took place on Thursday 26th October in Hotel Kilkenny, Co. Kilkenny. The purpose of this conference was to highlight the need to make childcare and play environments more accessible to children with disabilities and to explore strategies for the greater inclusion of children with disabilities in community childcare settings.

The seminar brought together local sports partnerships, childcare organisations, play development workers, community development projects, family resource centres, and specialist disability groups in the south east region to focus on how they can create childcare services and play spaces that are inclusive of all children.

The importance of inclusive childcare cannot be overemphasised. The benefits to children with disabilities are far reaching - research has shown that children with disabilities develop socially and developmentally when alongside their typically developing peers.

Inclusive childcare promotes diversity - in inclusive settings all children learn about respect

for difference, new forms of communication, empathy, friendship and solidarity across difference.

The Lets All Play! Conference was a collaborative initiative organized by the Disability Equality Specialist Support Agency (DESSA), Waterford Sports Partnership, Kilkenny Recreation & Sports Partnership, County & City Childcare Committees in Waterford, Carlow, Kilkenny, South Tipperary and Wexford, the Waterford Area Partnership, Local Authorities in Waterford County & City and Kilkenny and Parents Groups in Kilkenny, Waterford and Wexford.

The conference was chaired by Heino Schonfeld, Director of Centre for Early Childhood Development & Education. Presentations were also given by Mary Barry, Sports Development Officer with the Irish Wheelchair Association, on his experience of inclusion and by Marie Curran on her experience as a parent on access to inclusive childcare and play opportunities. A case study documenting the transition of disabled children to mainstream settings was presented by James

### Western Intermediate Hurling Champions

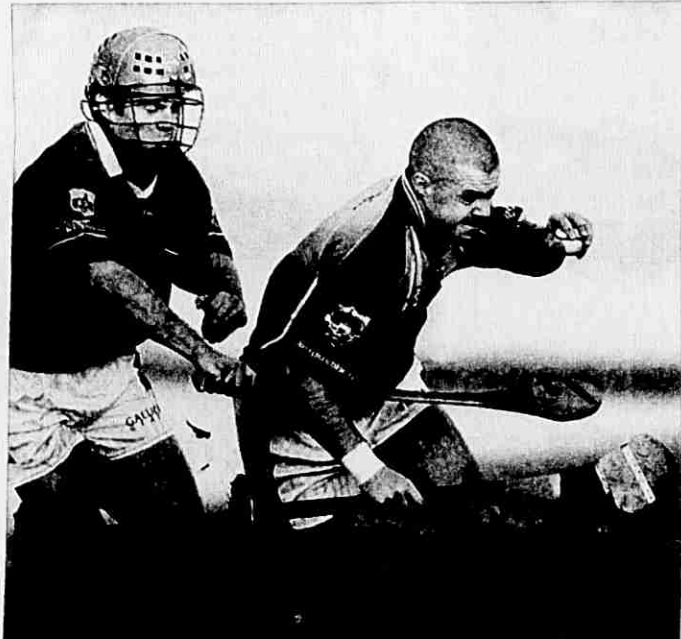

Clashmore had achieved history the week before by beating the Brickeys in the semi final and in doing so they qualified for the clubs first ever western intermediate hurling final. With no pressure on them, we knew they were going to have a right go at us and given our performance against the Geraldines last week, Clashmore had every reason to believe that they might upset the "form guide".

## THE GAME

### First Half

Clashmore started lively when good work by Dungarvan's Captain and full back Trevor Galvan prevented an early scoring opportunity. From the resulting puck out the young Gavin Crotty earned a free out near the sideline, which was converted by the in form Jonathon Regan. He doubled our and his scoring tally in the fourth minute of the game when he slotted over a long range free after Wayne Flynn was fouled over by the stand. These things alone provided the spirit needed to drive home their advantage and when Trevor Galvan led his team out for the start of the second half, there was a sense of inevitability about the outcome of this match, to an observer that is.

## The Second Half

This view was further compounded within 30 seconds of the restart when David Morrissey caught a great ball at the edge of the square and converted his second legal goal of the game. A point from a free by Jonathon a minute later was quickly cancelled by a well worked goal from Clashmore

when Karl O'Keeffe was allowed to solo through the heart of the Dungarvan defence at his ease. A cause for concern as it wasn't the first time this happened. To be fair to the lads they reacted positively and man of the match, at this stage of the game, Boomer slotted over a magnificent point after a great solo. Regan pointed from a free yet again in the 8th minute and at this stage the lads had re asserted themselves as the dominant force in the game. The full back line of Darren Hamilton, Trevor Galvan and John Paul Tutty were flawless and I could write a book on John Paul - Man of the Match for starters. He has all the attributes of a great hurler and the kind of player you look forward to going to see play. Gally deserves a huge amount of credit for staying around for the match when his family were on holidays in New York. A true Blue is Gally and as Captain of the team he played the Captains part with another huge performance. Hammy proved his worth in the corner and never put a foot wrong from start to finish. He got the biggest roar of the game from the crowd when he caught a great ball from a sitting down position late in the second half. After the sickness he had earlier in the year it was great to see his playing at all, let alone to say playing well.

The half back line, the engine of this team was colossal. Wayne

Flynn, despite picking up a nasty leg injury early in the game battled away until he could give no more. Ciaran "Jack" Curran, a serious doubt before the game, was ever dependable and so many times makes the right decision when either defending or attacking. You can't beat experience at the end of the day. At centre back, despite grave concerns about his selection here by a lot of astute pundits, Mici Power put in a fine performance and caught some great ball.

Our centre field pairing of Jamie Nagle and Derek "Boomer" Truman provide the ideal combination of heart and skill with Boomer running himself into the ground literally, whilst the elegant and majestic Nagle showed all un-sundry his array of dazzling skills.

Brian Bannon at number ten was much improved on the week before and played one of, if not his best, games in a Dungarvan Jersey. Despite being as strong as an Ox he is only a garsun after all. Pat Sullivan at centre forward broke up a lot of play and really came into the game in the last twenty minutes. One senses he is on the verge of a big game. Jonathon Regan is enjoying his best form for years at half forward and on Saturday he had another fine performance with his free taking, in particular, being top drawer.

The inside line of John Joe Ronayne, David Morrissey and Gavin Crotty played havoc with the Clashmore defence. Rocky had one of his quieter games, by his high standard, but to be fair to him a nasty eye injury early in the game didn't help his cause. Gavin in the other corner is gaining in confidence as the games are served up and again, like Sullivan; I sense something big out of him in the near future. At the tender age of seventeen he has to be one of the brightest prospects the Club has seen for years. At full forward, David Morrissey rolled back the years - and I mean the years, as it has probably been six or seven years since he has played championship hurling. Any day you finish with two goals and have another one disallowed is a good day. He certainly has added something different to this team. Ger Cusack, Jason O Mahony, Karl Duggan, John Cass and Michael McLaughlin came on and played their part in a memorable performance while several other young players to watch for the future watched on from the dug out and dreamt of playing their part.

Well done to all concerned and commiserations to Clashmore. Things didn't go their way on the day but I'm sure they will bounce back.

As mentioned above this was truly a great team performance with everyone playing his or her part in a famous victory? This wasn't the result of a couple of months training. 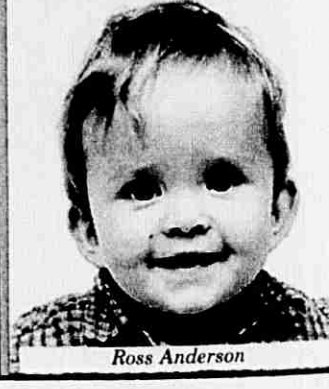

# Decentralisation Is A "Shambles"

Decentralisation plans are a "shambles" according to Brian O'Shea TD, Labour party spokesman on Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs who poured scorn on the Governments promise to move 10,000 civil servants to towns and cities around Ireland saying it has "all the hallmarks of a botched plan which was made up on the back of a cigarette packet."

And according to Deputy O'Shea just 15 Ordinance Survey employees have applied to move to Dungarvan under the long-promised plans.

Emphasising that the need for the economic boost which the projected 210 Ordinance Survey jobs earmarked for Dungarvan was now greater than ever, Deputy O'Shea said it seemed unlikely that the move from Dublin would happen in the short or medium term, if at all.

### DANGER OF COLLAPSE

His comments follow a report in the Sunday Times which claimed that the Decentralisation plans are in danger of collapse.

"There is now a belief in political circles that the decentralisation plan will be significantly scaled down after the next general election and continuing with the process as currently planned will be impossible anyway."

"This weeks edition of the Sunday Times reported that the Department of the Environment is still short 128 volunteers to move to the south east while 16 archaeologists employed by the Department have yet to volunteer to move to Waterford."

### DUNGARVAN

"The most up to date information I have, indicated that 15 Ordinance Survey employees have applied to move to Dungarvan with a further 47 expressing interest in decentralising."

In relation to the Waterford City proposal, the Minister for the Environment, Dick Roche TD, in answer to a question raised by Deputy O'Shea in July, said that the "indicative timescale" for the completion of office in Waterford was mid-2009.

"The Minister told me that the

Office of Public Works had identified a suitable site in Waterford City for the Department of the Environment offices and purchase terms had been agreed with Waterford City Council. In addition to the offices for the 225 Department staff it is planned to extend the courthouse, provide new offices for the Probation and Welfare Services and a multi-storey car park to which the public have access.

### NO CONSULTATION

"There was no prior consultation with the trade unions representing the employees whose jobs were to be voluntarily decentralised. While the influx of new people and the economic and cultural benefits which they would bring to Waterford and Dungarvan would be greatly welcomed here, such a major move does not suit public and civil servants with young children or other family commitments in Dublin. It was quite obvious that such a plan could not be imple-

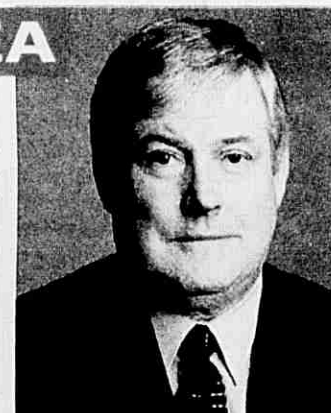
mented solely on the dictat of the Government and it now looks as if the whole plan is a shambles with specialist staff, such as archaeologists, particularly unwilling to move out of Dublin.

"While the need for an economic life-line for Dungarvan –and indeed Waterford City – remains as critical as ever, the debacle reported last week with Enterprise Ireland's proposed move to Shannon makes me think that the Government will not be able to deliver on its promises in this regard anytime soon."

### BOTCHED PLAN

"The Labour Party's finance spokesperson, Joan Burton TD, discovered that Enterprise Ireland has taken out a 25 year lease on two office blocks in Dublin to accommodate 600 staff despite the fact that the State agency is due to move 300 employees to Shannon. Only 19 employees have agreed so far to move, according to media reports.

"Unless the Government plans



to duplicate staff or is admitting defeat and abandoning this particular decentralisation proposal, it doesn't make sense to take such a long lease on offices in Dublin.

"The Enterprise Ireland case is just one more example of the shambles that is the Government's decentralisation project, which, if it was properly handled and implemented would give places like Dungarvan and Waterford city a much needed boost," Deputy O'Shea said.

## CBS Tops In School League Table

Scoil na mBraithre in Dungarvan topped the school league table in the county for the second time in a row. The table is based on the number of students who have gone on to University.

Scoil na mBraithre finished ahead of Ard Scoil na nDeise, which is also located in Dungarvan.

In the Sunday Times table, Scoil na mBraithre was ranked 131, down eleven on its ranking last year with 48.3% of its students going on to study in University and 70% going on to third level.

Ard Scoil na nDeise was ranked 152, up from 228 place in 2005. Colaiste Chathail Naofa finished third, ranked 264th in the country. Next were St. Augustines ranked 272nd and Blackwater Community School in 388th.

The challengers were in control and keeping the champions under pressure when Gary Hurney kicked home a 6th. minute goal and this was followed with a Declan Fives point to give Ballinacourty a 5 points advantage by

the 10th minute..

Three Nial Curran points, all kicked from frees brought Stradbally back into the game and when Mark Ferncombe pointed in the 31st. minute there was just a goal between the teams and this advantage for the challengers was nullified in the 33rd. minute when Nial Curran scored the goal, which is described above.

**SECOND HALF**

Ballinacourty attacked from the throw in and had two narrow wids in the opening minutes.

Then a Stradbally attack saw them awarded a free which the very accurate Nial Curran duly pointed. The same player extended the lead to 2 points before Gary Hurney brought one back for Ballinacourty in the 43rd. minute.. Michael Walsh had a 47th minute point. Both teams missed chances before John O'Gorman reduced Stradbally's lead to a single point in the 50th minute. Again play was tight and with both teams fighting for the score that might decide the game, each had agonising misses before Paul Foley from a 'ruck' kicked home the goal that put four points between the teams before the final whistle sounded.

Ballinacourty will be that bit disappointed at 'what nearly was and what might have been' and Stradbally will be happy and relieved to have come through this high tension combat with their chances of an historic six in a row, still intact.

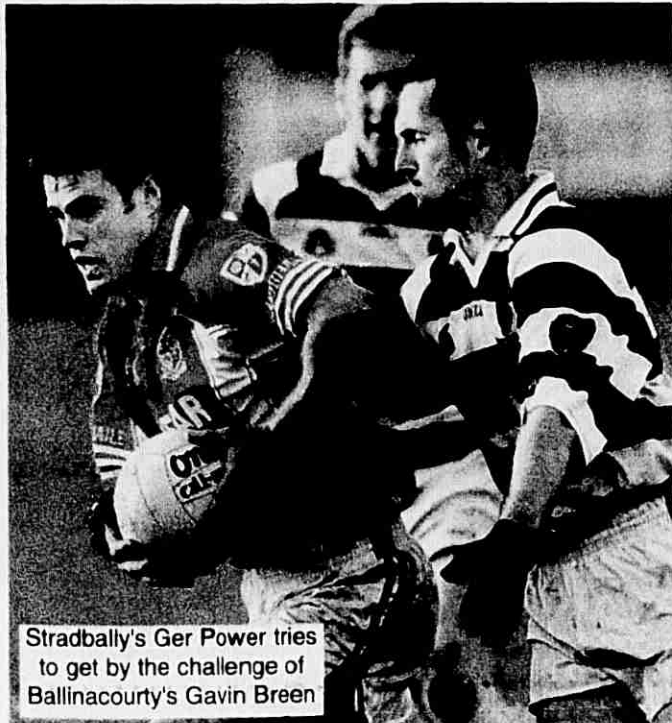

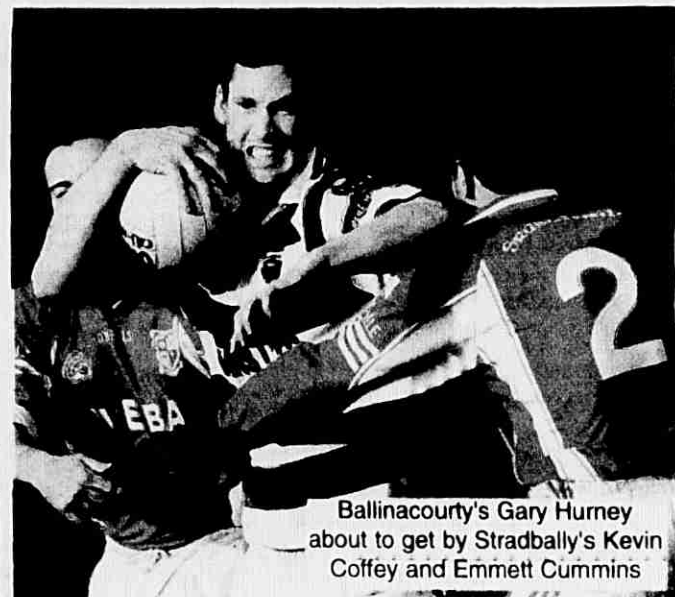

As expected all eyes were on RTE. on Saturday evening last for the 2007 championship draws in hurling and football.

As one columnist subsequently wrote, all interest was in the Munster draw as what happened in the other provinces, mattered very little because Kilkenny in Leinster and Galway in Connacht will be the winners without the shadow of a doubt. The draw for the Ulster hurling championship will take place on BBC at a later date.

### THE SAME AGAIN

In Munster the hurling draw is the same as last year with Munster champions Cork meeting Clare and the winners playing Waterford in the semi-final.

As was the case last year, Tipperary and Limerick will meet in the other semi-final.

Missing the first round will give us an extra fortnight to prepare and a little more breathing space for our club championship.

### FOOTBALL DRAW

Waterford have been drawn against Clare in the first round with the winners meeting All Ireland champions, Kerry in the semi-final.

Should Waterford survive the first round, we can have the All-Ireland champions in Fraher field.

# Stradbally Bidding For Historic Six In A Row Titles

## Nire To Prove Worthy Challengers

Will this be a Red Letter Day for mighty Stradbally or will the Nire prove to be the Giant killers in a county senior football final that has aroused interest inside and outside our county since the pairing became known at Fraher field on Sunday last.

There had been rumors that the Nire might insist on the game going to Walsh Park if Stradbally were the opposition, but within minutes of the Stradbally/Ballinacourty semi-final result, it was confirmed that the final will be played here in Fraher field where the same clubs have contested three finals in four years.

Now on the verge of making Waterford football history Stradbally will try might and main to pull this one off and having seen them in action once again here on last Sunday, my money will certainly be on them to achieve their objective.

### STRADBALLY'S RECORD

Researching Stradbally's senior football record one finds de-

tails of great victories and also details of unusual inconsistency.

Stradbally never won a senior football championship until 1940 and then they went unbeaten for five championships in a row. In those far off days, a county final would likely be a club's third match in the championship.

Dungarvan then took over leadership and they went on to win five championships in a row (Dungarvan had also won a five in a row run from 1926 to 1930).

Kilrossanty then took over from Dungarvan to win four in a row.

The remarkable feature of Stradbally's 'rise and fall' was that after their five in a row they did not win another championship for all of 28 years (1972) and then went for eight years before winning their next (1978). They next won in 1980 and came between Ballinacourty and a four in a row achievement.

They then went out of the headlines and left things to

Dungarvan, Kilrossanty, Nire and Rathgormack before bouncing back for their five in a row commencing in 2001 when they drew with Rathgormack (0-4 each) in atrocious weather conditions at Fraher field.

The replay on the following Sunday at Fraher field saw the match going to extra time before Stradbally emerged winners (1-13 to 2-4) and so herald the start of a crusade that brought them five titles on the trot. Their 2005 win was their 13th championship title.

### THE NIRE RECORD

The Nire were not in the business of winning senior football championships until that atrocious day in Cappoquin when they stopped Dungarvan from winning another 4 in a row. It was 1993 and the first for the Nire who celebrated in the rain. The score was 2-7 to 1-9. Pat Walsh captained that history making team.

In the following final Nire brought off a double by defeating Gaultir and had a county

final win over Dungarvan again in 1987. Their last title win was in 2000 and have played in four finals since and lost. In finals, they have something of a 'losing record' in going under by the smallest of margins.

The respective line outs will very likely be the same as for the county semi-finals and will be in the match programme on Sunday.

### THE RESULT

In my opinion, if we are to have a repeat of last Sunday's form by both sides, then my vote will go to Stradbally to hit the jackpot here and take their record breaking six in a row titles.

But it is a county final with two teams engaged and from experience we know that there are no dead certs in a two horse race.

Stopping Stradbally from winning a record six in a row would bring its own bit of fame to the Nire (as well as a fifth county title).

This will certainly be a game to enjoy.

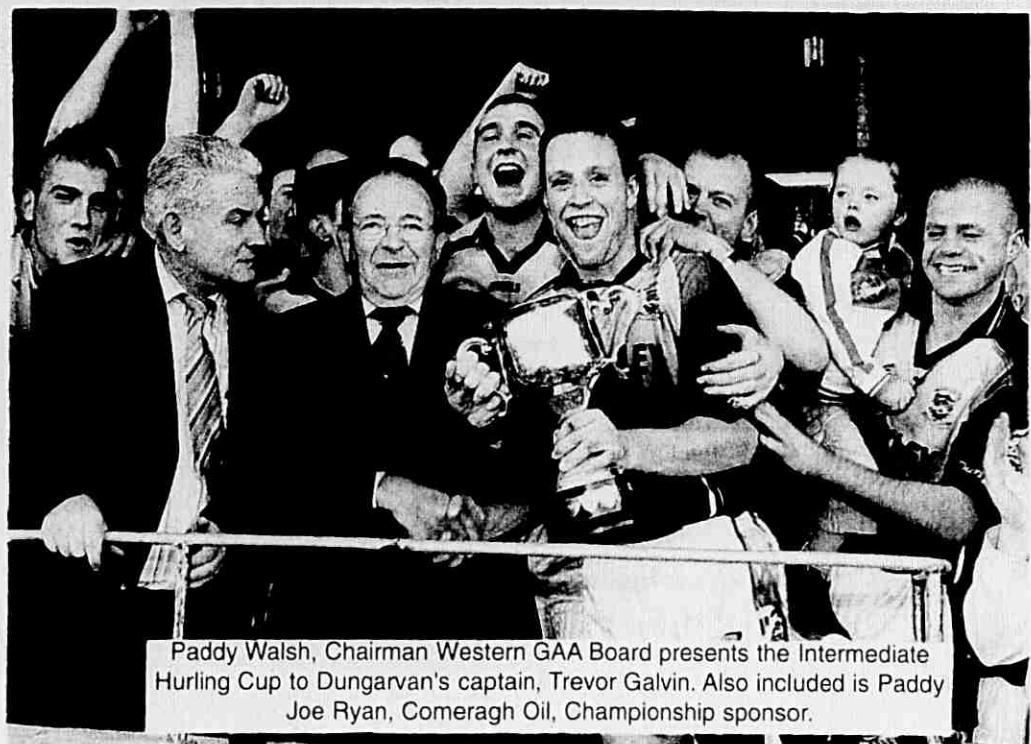
Stephen Barron was Clashmore's outstanding player on a side where so many others failed to perform on the day.

## Years Review.

Last week in the County Bord na nÓg notes we looked back at how our different teams fared at Feile na Gael in Cork and Feile Peil Óg in Wicklow. This week we look back at the under 11 ground hurling competitions.

## Under 11 Ground Hurling Review.

Many people cannot see the value of playing a ground hurling competition. Many well known hurling supporters throughout the county have over the years described the Ground Hurling competitions as nothing but a glorified hockey competition. To me ground hurling is an important part of one of our national games and when played right it is a joy to watch.

Possibly the biggest turn off for playing ground hurling is that everybody has an opinion on what rules should and should not be part of the game. There is a clear set of rules printed and made available to every club in Waterford city and county but many of the coaches find fault with some of these rules. What therefore is needed is maybe for officers and clubs having spoken to their coaches to sit down and draw up a clear set of rules that is acceptable to everybody and then for everybody to agree to play to these rules.

The need to coach players the skill of ground hurling is a must. How often have we sat in the stands in Fraher Field and Walsh Park or at any other ground in the county over the past number of years and watched a forward try and pick the sliotar up when within twenty or thirty yards of goal because he is not comfortable hitting it on the ground or has not been shown how to do it when developing the skills of the game as a young boy.

This years under 11 hurling county finals were played in far from ideal weather conditions at Fraher Field on the 29th of July. The rain that fell on the day made conditions very difficult for the young boys and girls that were on show to show off their skills to the full. It was also holiday time for many and therefore all six teams that were in action were short some players. In saying that there is never a good time to play such county finals during the summer months as somebody will

always be missing and therefore clubs cannot and should not use this as an excuse.

The days proceedings got under way shortly after 11am with the meeting of St. Saviours and Naomh Brid in the Division three final. In their respective divisional finals St. Saviours had put in a brilliant finish to the game to beat Butlerstown 3-0 to 2-1, while Naomh Brid had a very comfortable victory over An Gaeltacht.

On the day Naomh Brid had most of the scoring chances but came up against a brilliant young goalkeeper in Keylan Fasanya. On the day the young goal keeper was outstanding and is a player to keep an eye out for in the years ahead. On the other hand, St. Saviours had two scoring chances and took both scoring two goals. St. Saviours ran out winners two goals to no score and in doing so won a third county juvenile final in 2006, a great achievement for the St. Saviours Club and for the small pool of people that works with the club.

The division two under 11 ground hurling final was by far the better of the three county finals played. Brickeys qualified for this final after beating Clashmore 2-1 to 0-1 in the western final while Passage recorded a very good win over St. Mary's in the Eastern Final.

As already stated above there was a real hero in the opening of the three game programme in Keylan Fasanya the St. Saviours brilliant young goal keeper. In the closing game there was another hero, this time in Brickeys most outstanding player Cormac Curran, a grandson of the legendary former Waterford hurler Austin Flynn. This like Keylan Fasanya is a player to look out for in the years ahead and will surely go on to represent Waterford at many levels in the years ahead.

Scores in the opening half were hard to come by as both defences were on top and it was therefore no major surprise that both sides went into their halftime huddle scoreless. For much of the opening half of the second half both sides were still very evenly matched but when scores started to come they came thick and fast inside four minute spell midway through the second half.

A hotly disputed point which from the stand looked as if it went wide but the referee and umpires were clearly of the opinion that the sliotar went between the two uprights put Brickeys a point in front. Within seconds another point followed for the Brickeys this time there was no doubt about it. Two goals in double quick time for the Brickeys gave them an eight point lead which Passage could not reduce in the time remaining. Brickeys ran out deserved winners on a score of 2-2 to no score.

Those expecting a closely fought out division one final were to be left disappointed. In the Western Final Dungarvan recorded a two goals to no score win over Lismore and in the Eastern final Roanmore recorded a 2-1 to no score win against Tramore.

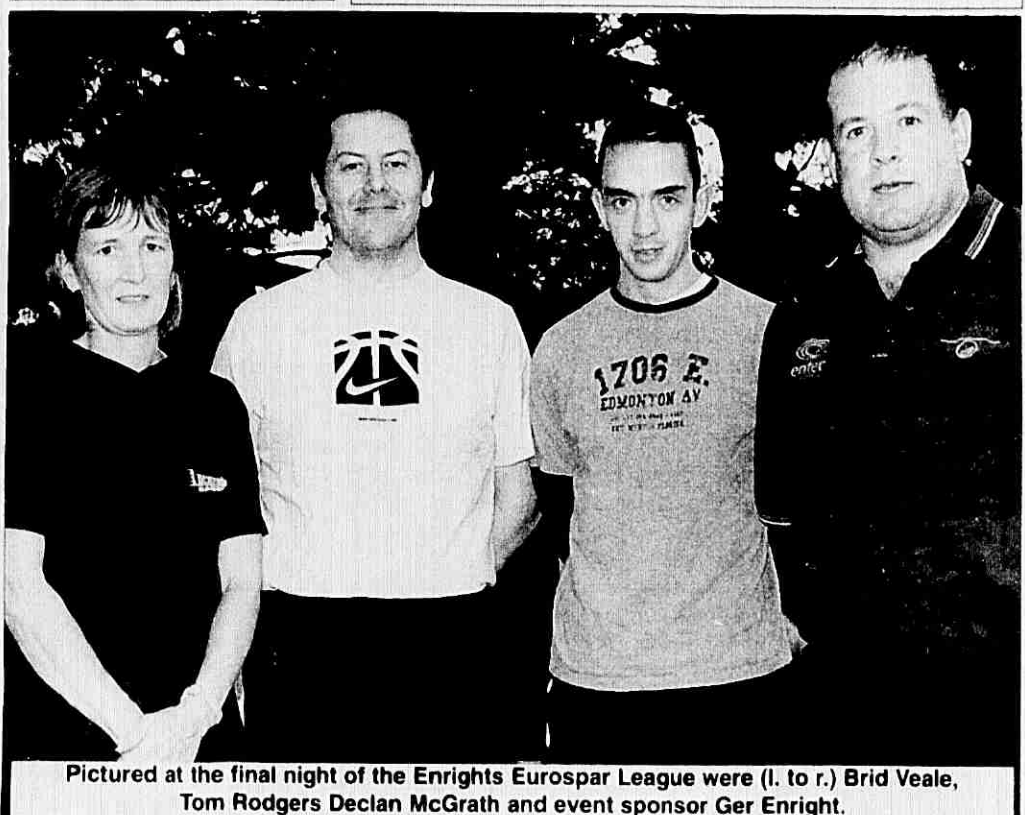

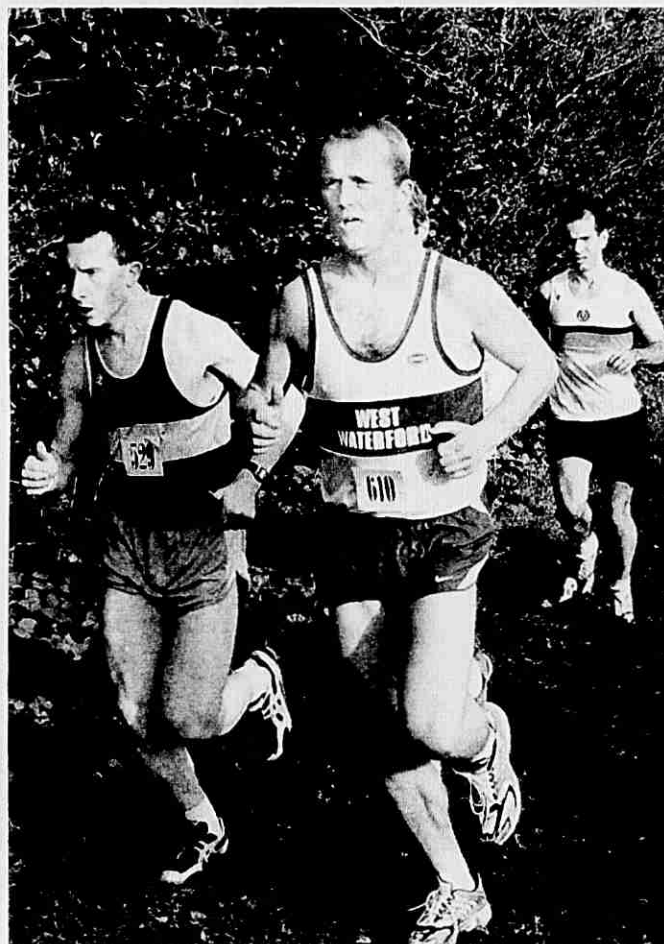

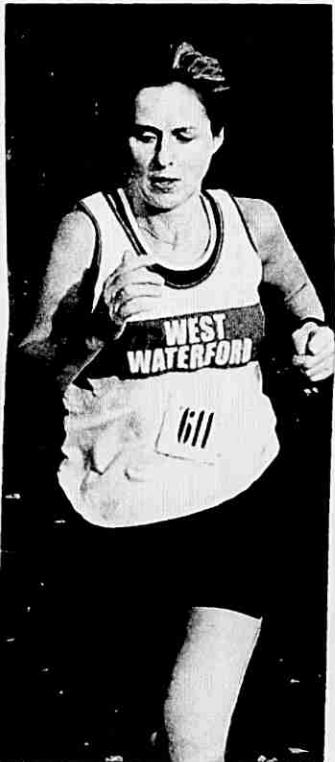

West Waterford's first athlete to finish this year and in doing so became the recipient of the Paddy Joe Delaney Memorial Shield which is presented in memory of the late Paddy Joe who was a regular Dublin participant. For the first time Kilmacthomas dynamo Benji Whelan who ran the distance in 2.54 adds his name to the list of who's who from the club who have been lucky enough to have had their names on this highly sought after shield. Benji who is training for a big event in February when he will be taking on the ultimate challenge of which you will hear more of when the event is launched shortly all we can say presently is that the event will be a huge sponsorship event with all monies being donated to the Cancer Foundation. Benji will be presented with the Paddy Joe Delaney Memorial Shield tonight Wednesday before the off at the Winter League.

Conor Murray a regular Dublin participant was just 1 minute behind Pat with his usual solid run in Dublin, this year Conor clocked 3.11. Ray Dwyer was next with a 3.15 effort. Ray was unsure about getting around the full 26 miler with ongoing injury problems but he battled all the way and will be well pleased with firstly finishing the 26 miles and secondly his finishing time of 3.15. Garret Byrne another who took part in the Berlin Marathon some weeks previously, ran his usual steady race once again when clocking yet another good sub 3.20 with his 3.19 finishing time.

Marathon training takes a big effort over many months and the next two athletes trained to the letter and the results of their efforts were plain to be seen on race day, they both sailed around Dublin in a time of 3.32 Paul Brunnock and Liam Kavanagh were full of running even over the final mile or two when others are usually battling to finish, plenty more to come from these two. Dermot Ryan was another running his first along with his wife Karen and both these two put in a big training effort also and they were duly rewarded with good finishing times. Dermot was clocked at 3.34 just two minutes behind Dermot was Liam Cuddihy with 3.36. Liam who hails from the city has been a valued member of West Waterford for many years and is a veteran of many marathons. Martin Mullarkey recorded a time of 3.37 and he too was well please with this time having ran a marathon in Amsterdam where he recorded time of 3.15 two weeks previous. Portlaw's Michael Wade was hot on Martins heels finishing just 1 minute behind him in 3.38. Michael's tough training regime on the hills of Portlaw paid dividends.

Paul McGrath looked very comfortable throughout the race and came home in 4.14. Martin Houlihan got his pace fairly spot on and finished in 4.22. Vincent O'Donovan like many found the last couple of miles tough but was running a comfortable pace throughout he was timed at 4.23. Our final male finisher was Martin Veale 4.49 another who ran a marathon recently when he completed the Cologne event a couple of weeks ago, wisely Dusty took it easy in Dublin and enjoyed the race.

Turning to our ladies who were lead home by Josie Uí Chuirrin

with a 4.06. Josie ran Amsterdam only two weeks earlier in a time of 3.50. They certainly don't come any tougher than the Kilkenny woman. Aisling Bannon put in a real battling performance when recording a fine 4.13. Karen Ryan in her first attempt over the distance ran a very good 4.16 and Terri Gough was clocked at 4.55 in her 48th marathon race.

There were many great performances by quite a number of our athletes with many running to attain times and many more running to try and complete the distance. To everyone very well done, and to all the back room staff and the travelling contingent thanks for your support and encouragement on the course. There was a big contingent

from the Ring area walking the marathon this year also with many local charities benefiting from their efforts they are to congratulate also.

The National Marathon Championship of Ireland was held in conjunction with Dublin and we had teams in most categories, but as we go to press we await the full list of results here.

## CORK CITY MARATHON RETURNS

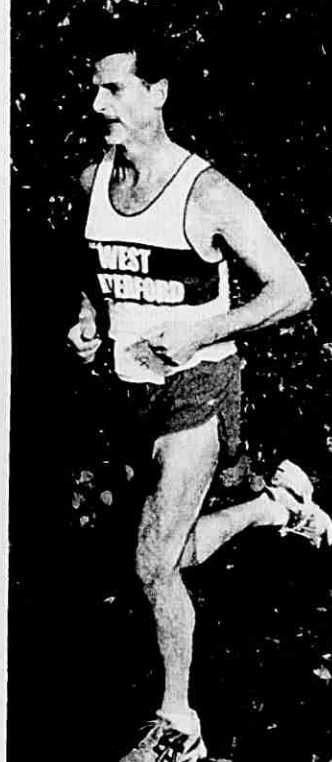

Registration for the Marathon will begin in January 2007.



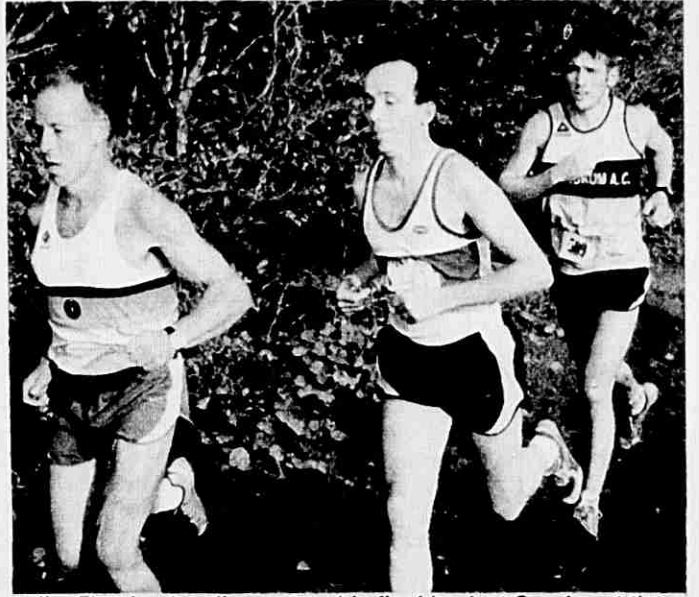
Colin Lyons pictured competing at the Munster Intermediate Championships at St. Augustine's College last Sunday.

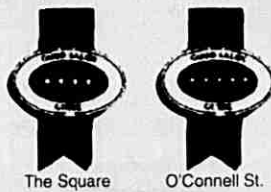
