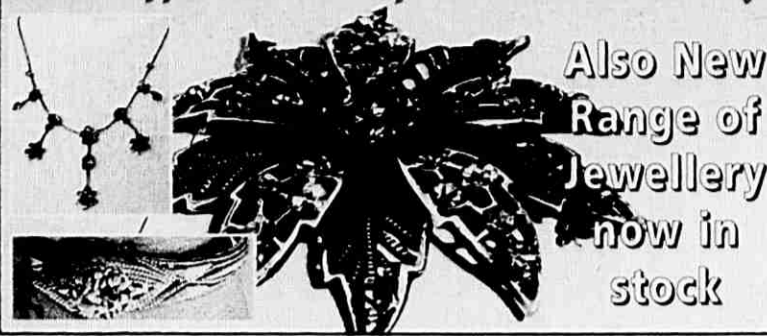

"No Confidence" In Co. Executive If Staff Policy Retained

Labour party councillor, Billy Kyne warned that a motion of no confidence in the council executive will be put forward at the estimates meeting of Waterford County Council if they continue a policy of not filling staff vacancies.

The warning followed a statement by the council's Finance Chief, Michael Quinn who said the council are not filling vacancies in staff in a bid to save money. The cash-starved council is currently running at a deficit of 7.3 million euro, he said.

However, Cllr. Billy Kyne warned of a breakdown in relations between the elected members of the council and the executive if the policy continues, and said the council as a

whole is "losing credibility" over the issue.

COUNCIL "FAILING"

He said they were "failing" as a council by not replacing outdoor staff.

Cllr. Kyne said since he was first elected as a councillor in 1981, he has tried to develop a partnership approach with the executive, but this was "breaking down." He said outdoor staff were critical in interfacing with the public.

By not replacing the staff who have

retired and left the council, the executive have "lost face" with most of the councillors, and it was a "deplorable" practise.

Cllr. Kyne said the policy was "brought in by stealth" and the council was headed for a major breakdown.

"If it comes to having a vote of no confidence in

the executive then we will," he warned.

REPLACE STAFF

The policy only emerged following a question by Ardmore-based Fianna Fail councillor, Tom Cronin who asked why four outdoor staff hadn't been replaced.

Mr. Quinn said by not filling va-

An accident blackspot will be the subject of major road safety works in a bid to reduce speed on the dangerous stretch of road.

The Cuscam to Killineen West road, three miles outside Dungarvan on the N25 at the Pike Hill, has been the location of an alarming number of accidents over the past num-

ber of years.

Between 1996 and 2004 twenty seven accidents, including five fatal and fourteen



Helvick Lifeboat Saves Horse Off Coast

On Sunday morning the RNLI crew from Helvick Head station rescued a mare from almost certain death at the foot of Faill a' Staicin in Ring. This cliff has been the site of many accidents over the years.

The 4-year-old mare, Killinoorin Killy, one of a dozen belonging to local horse breeder, Niamh Creagh, had been grazing in a field overlooking the cliff. On Saturday, Ms. Creagh noted that the mare with her two companions was missing at feeding time.

Quick investigation revealed that the mare had wandered too close to the cliff edge and had tumbled down to the rocks below. Niamh's immediate concern was that the animal though alive might be badly injured.

Without hesitation Padraig Suipeal who works with the horses made his way down the cliff to ascertain the condition of the mare. He was joined by John Murphy of Old Parish who kept an eagle eye on his progress, concerned for his safety. Padraig assessed the condition of the animal, noting that although she had suffered a bad gash on her leg the limb did not appear to be broken and otherwise she seemed unharmed. Apparently, she had fallen on shale, which minimised the chance of grave injury.

Helvick Head lifeboat was alerted, as there was no possibi-

ty of getting the animal up the cliff to safety. Ian Walsh of the RNLI shortly arrived on the scene accompanied by Helvick master and skipper Barty Whelan. They decided it was getting too dark to effect a rescue and the mare would be best left overnight as she was not overly distressed. The rescue was set for ten o'clock the following morning when tide and light would be favourable.

At ten am with tide running full it was too risky to go down the cliff to get the animal into the water. Local man Shane Sullivan pointed out a pathway down. Jimmy Moloney a man of many rescues was on hand with advice. The lifeboat was launched with crewmen Páidí Breathnach Shay Young and David Byrne aboard. Barty Whelan stood by with his fishing vessel, An Finin.

The rescuers on land, led by Sean Walsh of the RNLI succeeded in strapping the mare into a harness. Luckily, she seemed to sense that she was being helped and was relatively calm.

The lifeboat crew brought their Atlantic 75 craft round. Niamh with other helpers got into the water to encourage the animal to swim to the lifeboat. During the operation the mare slipped several times and on two occasions was turned upside down in the sea. Finally she was secured to the side of the lifeboat and all

ashore watched hopefully as the crew cautiously headed the lifeboat for Helvick.

Helmsman Páidí Breathnach kept in touch with the shore via the lifeboat radio. All seemed to be going well until the lifeboat was coming around Helvick Head. The mare appeared to tire and the crew feared for her as she slipped under the water several times. A float was attached to keep her head above water.

The crew immediately decided to shorten the journey by going ashore at the cove at the back of Helvick. All those involved in the rescue plus a crowd of onlookers anxiously watched from the shore as the mare seemed to collapse. She fell under the water but shortly recovered. As she came round and got to her feet in the shallow water spontaneous applause broke out. Many willing hands reached out to assist the mare to safety and a cheer greeted her stepping onto the beach.

The last hurdle was the climb up from the cove. As the exhausted animal got halfway up she got a sudden spurt of energy (maybe conscious of the foal she is carrying) and Killinoorin Killy trotted up the final steps to safety. Her condition on arrival was assessed by veterinary surgeon Walter Connors who declared himself confident of her complete recovery.

With another successful rescue mission completed, Páidí and lifeboat crew returned to the lifeboat house to ready the boat for the next call out. Ms. Creagh

expressed her gratitude to the RNLI and all those involved in the rescue of the mare.

"I am impressed and delighted," she said, "with the competent efficient and caring manner which the lifeboat men displayed during the rescue. I'm greatly relieved to have the mare safely back on land."

The RNLI takes this opportunity to thank all who assisted with due concern for safety in this rescue.

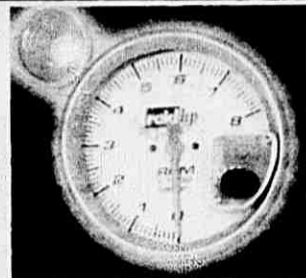

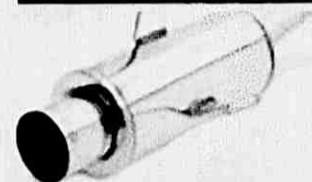

Co. Waterford Beekeepers' Association

We held our AGM on Thursday 24 October in what has become our usual location - The Dungarvan Alternative Health Clinic on Main Street - and many thanks to Kevin Power for housing us once again. The occasion was marked by a presentation to one of our longest standing members Fr. Michael Farrell P.P. who is this year celebrating fifty years of priesthood as well as forty years as a member of the Association. The Federation of Irish Beekeepers Associations was represented by Colm Forde from Waterford and presented Fr. Farrell with a Waterford Glass bowl to mark the occasion and in thanks to Fr. Farrell for his priestly duties in Gormandston every year. Fr. Farrell reminisced over the early years of the Association in which there were only a handful of members, two of whom, Martin Curran and Mary Moynihan passed away earlier this year. Noel Lonergan pointed out that Fr. Farrell had been Chairman for over twenty years - which makes us more recent incumbents very meagre in our commitments. This year Fr. Farrell did not attend Gormandston since he spent the time visiting New Zealand where he visited with several very large beekeepers a received a very warm welcome.

The AGM then followed in its more usual manner with reports from the officers and a statement from the treasurer as to our financial standing. All in all the Association is on a very sound footing and the number in attendance vouched for this too. Tony Murray was standing down as Chairman as was Alice Fitzgerald as Secretary, so Don

Hayes and Pat Dillane were proposed and seconded and returned unopposed as their replacements. This means that Pat takes up the duties of Secretary as well as Treasurer and he can relate that we have twenty seven paid-up members at present. James Claxton continues as PRO. There were a number of suggestions as to topics for the coming season's lectures and you will soon be in receipt of a list with dates and times for same. The subject of honey jars came up and the conclusion here was that we need to know how many members will need jars for the coming season and to find a place to store them. Likewise with the use of formic acid pads for the treatment of varroa. So Please get in touch with Pat and tell of your estimated needs in these respects.

Out in our apiaries the bees have been experiencing the first frosts of the year so clusters have been forming in the cold nights. The recent spell of dry weather has meant lots of flying time for bees foraging on the ivy and lifting (or hefting as it is known as) the hives should indicate if stores have been taken on board. Some beekeepers regard ivy honey as a bane and would prefer not to have any while others regard it as an essential supplement for winter feeding - which reinforces yet again the fact that where you have two beekeepers you have at least three different and conflicting opinions. And on that slightly conflicting note I'll leave you. Don't forget to get in touch as regards jars and formic acid boards.

Cllrs. Seek "Hands On" Role In Drafting Town Plan

A major review of the Lismore Town Development Plan is to be held by Waterford County Council, beginning with a public meeting in the Blackwater Community School today (Wednesday).

It will be the start of a process which will hopefully reach a conclusion in July 2007. The meeting will be held at 8 o'clock.

Council planner, Aisling Gleson, said it follows the adoption of the County Development Plan in July 2005.

Arising out of the meeting, submissions in writing can be made, and this will help towards the drawing up of a draft plan. This will be put on display for a period of six weeks, during which submissions can again be made. The plan may then be amended on the

basis of the submission received, she said.

However, Lismore Town Councillors made a call for a more hands on role in the drawing up of the plan.

Fine Gael Cllr. John Heneghan said that the last time the Lismore Town Plan was drafted, the elected members dedicated a meeting of the council to discussing the draft, which was, he said, an "in-

credibly useful" exercise and was one and a half hours of "solid work" as they went through each aspect of the plan in minute detail.

He said suggested that the planners discuss it with the elected members when the draft is drawn up.

The plan will cover the time period for the development in the town from 2007 through to 2013.

KINESIOLOGY

Kinesiology was developed by an American chiropractor, George G. Goodheart in 1964. He discovered that factors which place a stress on the body weaken certain groups of muscles, and that this phenomenon can be used to both identify problems and to pin point appropriate treatments.

Kinesiology uses hands on techniques to test muscle strength in response to certain factors. Muscle testing is usually carried out on the client's arm and wrist while the person is fully clothed. A weak muscle response can signal a problem in the body, while useful treatments tend to noticeably strengthen the muscles being tested.

Individuals may be advised to avoid certain foods or chemicals to minimise the stress on the body. In addition, techniques derived from acupressure such as tapping or pressing specific points on the body may be used to stimulate organs such as the liver in order to assist the process of detox.

Nutritional deficiencies are also a common cause of ill health and these can be identified by testing various nutrients and noticing which cause the muscles to regain strength. The kinesiologist can then recommend appropriate supplements for the individual. This is very useful for people who feel they

muscle pain. They are often subjected to a variety of orthodox medical tests which show no abnormality and they may be repeatedly told that there is nothing wrong with them.

A kinesiologist uses test kits that contain samples of a wide variety of substances which may be causing problems, such as foods, food additives, airborne allergens and environmental chemicals. Contact with the relevant samples causes particular muscle groups to weaken. Test kits can also be used to identify sub clinical bacterial, viral, fungal or parasitic infections which can lead to problems such as chronic fatigue.

Individuals may be advised to avoid certain foods or chemicals to minimise the stress on the body. In addition, techniques derived from acupressure such as tapping or pressing specific points on the body may be used to stimulate organs such as the liver in order to assist the process of detox.

Nutritional deficiencies are also a common cause of ill health and these can be identified by testing various nutrients and noticing which cause the muscles to regain strength. The kinesiologist can then recommend appropriate supplements for the individual. This is very useful for people who feel they

need to supplement their nutrition, but who are overwhelmed by the variety of different products available and confused about which particular supplements would be of benefit to them

Other sources of stress on the body which can be identified by kinesiology include electromagnetic or geopathic stress such as that created by mobile telephones and overhead wires. If this type of problem is identified the treatment might involve clearing energy channels using a similar technique to acupressure. Even sources of emotional stress can be detected using muscle testing.

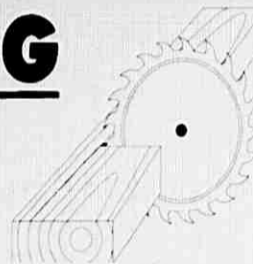

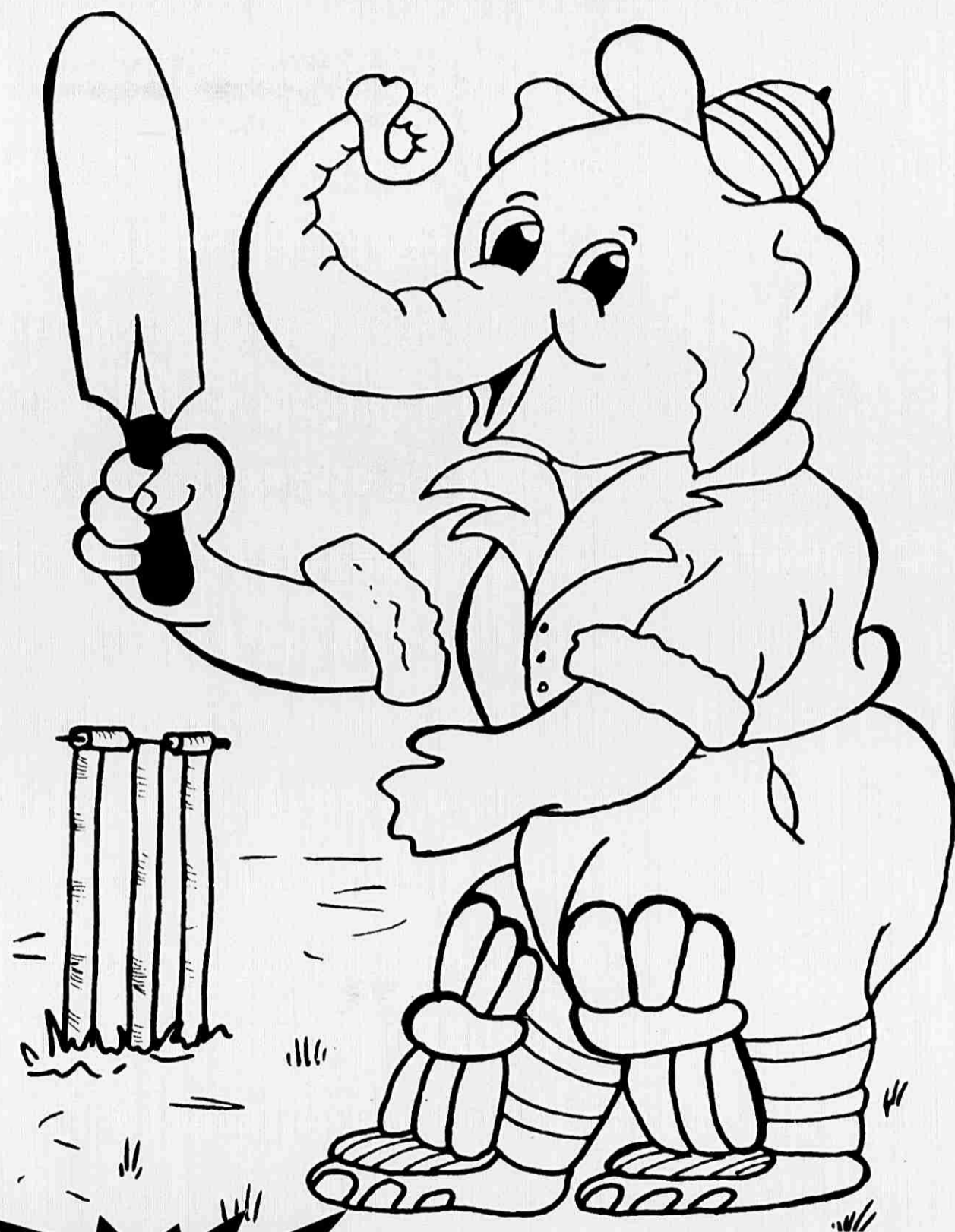

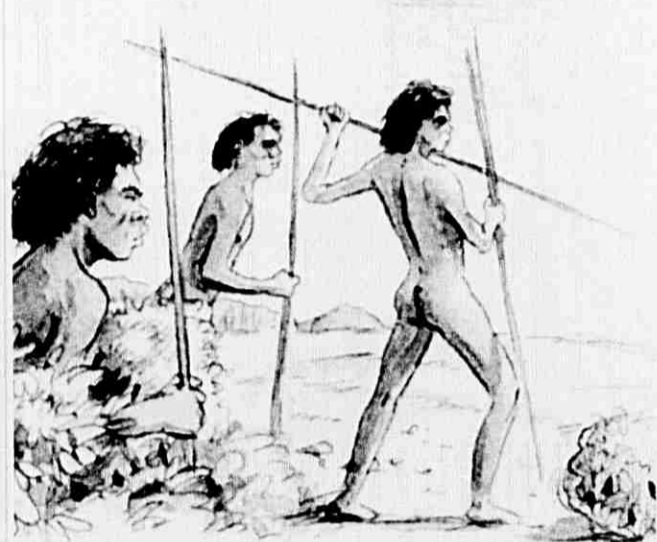

Great Explorers

People have always wanted to explore new places, sometimes to achieve fame and fortune, sometimes to acquire new lands, and often just for the joy of discovering something new. The period from 1400-1800 is often known as the Age of Discovery. European explorers sailed to the Americas, around Africa and as far as Australia, and several European countries established colonies overseas.



James Cook Made Three Expeditions To The Pacific

James Cook's abilities as a good scientific observer and excellent map-maker, charting the coasts of Newfoundland and Nova Scotia in Canada, earned him the leadership of an expedition to the Pacific in 1768. During that expedition he surveyed New Zealand and charted the coast of Australia. From 1772 and 1775 he discovered and charted new islands in the South Pacific. On his last voyage, which began in 1776, he discovered the Sandwich Islands (now Hawaii), where he was killed by local people in February 1779.

Burton failed To Find The Source Of The Nile

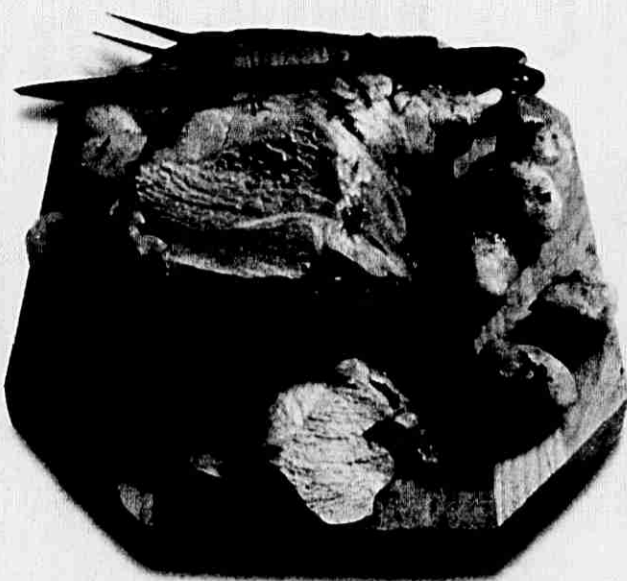
From 1852 to 1856, Sir Richard Burton explored much of West Africa. He searched for the source of the River Nile, but this was eventually found by John Hanning Speke at Lake Victoria. Much of the centre of Africa, which up until then had been completely unknown to the outside world, was explored by David Livingstone, who discovered Victoria Falls. Other great explorers, such as Mungo Park, James Bruce and René Caille, did much to make the continent of Africa known to the rest of the world.

- ★ In the 1st century B.C., the Ancient Chinese discovered that a substance called magnetite could be used to work out direction.
- ★ The first magnetic compasses were used by explorers in the 12th century

Coast Care Groups and the Clean Coast Project

The Clean Coast Project was established to improve the environment of the Irish and Welsh coasts, to restore aesthetic appeal and to increase the amenity and economic value of our beaches for the local community and visitors.

The project focuses on the establishment of local voluntary COASTCARE Groups who "adopt" and manage stretches of coastline.

It aims to do this by:-

- Running an environmental award scheme called the GREEN COAST AWARD.
- Involving local communities in beach management called COASTCARE.

The Green Coast award acknowledges beaches which meet with EC Bathing water quality standard, but which are also prized for their natural, unspoilt environment.

Green Coast beaches are ideal for quiet relaxation and; watersports activities, swimming, surfing, coastneering, diving, canoeing, and windsurfing, and outdoor pursuits such as walking, rambling, cycling, environmental field studies, bird, seal and dolphin watching.

Two of our beaches have been awarded with the Green Coast award, Annestown and Ballyquin.

The aim of Coastcare is to involve local people in caring for their local coastal environment, by promoting and supporting safe, enjoyable conservation activities such as beach clean-ups, awareness raising and practical countryside tasks. A small grant may be available to help towards the cost of insurance, project materials, safety equipment or volunteer expenses.

IN PURSUIT OF TRUTH?

The scenes in Lismore Town Council last week did little to boost confidence about the health of local democracy. The Town Mayor, Cllr. Helen O'Sullivan was reduced to tears at the end of the meeting, tantrums were thrown, accusations of serious mistruth levelled, and all apparently in pursuit of the truth over who exactly invited Taoiseach Bertie Ahern to open a playground in the town.

The playground was not ready to be opened - that's a given. And its quite understandable that the hardworking playground committee who went out fundraising in all weathers to put the playground in place should have - at the very least - been consulted about who would be carrying out the opening and when it would be held. They wished for politics to be kept out of the affair. Again, that's completely understandable. However, amid tempestuous scenes last week, politics is just what they got - and they got it in spades! Accusations, claims and counter claims were made as the meeting was extended past its deadline of 10 o'clock. At one stage it looked as though at least two councillors would walk out on the meeting as a stand-up argument got under way between the Mayor and Cllr. Orla Russell and Cllr. John Campion as they grilled the town's first citizen and the Town Clerk over an alleged conversation they had the end of the previous month's meeting of the Town Council.

It's not for Viewpoint to say who in all of this was right and who was wrong. Without doubt a botch was made over the invitation to the Taoiseach, and when the playground committee warned they would boycott the event, the official opening was called off. Surely, as bad as this possibly may have been, this should have been the end of the affair. Some will say it would have been a honour for the Taoiseach to open a facility in the town in any case. That argument - and it's a valid one - is for another day. As for the entirely unedifying scenes that followed in the chambers of the Town Council? Were they necessary? And if indeed the person responsible for inviting the Taoiseach is uncovered in all of this mess? What next? Demands that he or she apologise for inviting the leader of the Government to Lismore. It's unlikely in any case that the Taoiseach will darken the door of Lismore again - at least not for a long long time to come. Still this messy issue looks set to drag on. At next months meeting there will be a motion before Lismore Town Council calling for the accusations made against the Mayor of Lismore to be rescinded. Lets hope, for the sake of proper debate and the unity of the council that this is done and the more important work of the council is proceeded with in a way more befitting of the office of Town Council and not, this time, of an unruly playground.

DRIFT NET FISHERMEN

The end of a traditional way of life has come to pass with the banning of drift net fishing. Anglers will perhaps welcome the ban. Salmon stocks are low, and there's no doubt that drift net fishing as played its part. But for those whose livelihood has come to and end, proper compensation is certainly due. In this regard it's welcome news that Fine Gael Deputy, John Deasy has received a commitment from EU Fisheries commissioner, Dr. Joe Berg that he will examine the question of compensation. Fishermen in Ardmore, Helvick and Ring have all been badly affected by the ban, and according to Deputy Deasy, the compensation being offered at the moment is woefully low. If indeed, as he says, those who have been all their lives involved in drift net fishing will only get in the region of 2,000 euro, then it is undoubtedly insignificant and grossly unfair. Other opposition figures, including Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair and Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield, have both been vocal over their opposition to the ban. A submission is being put together now over the issue of compensation, and will be with the commissioner this week.

MAJOR JOBS ANNOUNCEMENT

Good news is on its way regarding one of the major industries in Dungarvan, whose plans to expand their business is at an advanced stage. And a significant jobs announcement looks to be in the pipeline. Other medium size businesses in the town are also in discussion with the council's Development Executive, Fergal Reidy over plans to expand as well. This, coming in the face of growing unemployment figures, and of course, the closure of Waterford Crystal's Dungarvan plant is good news indeed. Hopefully, this major announcement will be made public by the industry involved this side of Christmas. It would truly be the best present Dungarvan could hope for.

FESTA del PANE - BREAD FESTIVAL

Imagine packing an Irish town, like Dungarvan full of people for three days in a row. This happened in Italy, and it was not a rock concert! It was the Festa del Pane, in Savigliano, Piedmont, Italy. As a baker from Ireland, it was both amazing and heartening to see such a huge interest in bread from so many people.

Savigliano has always been a wheat growing area and they always had an annual Grain Festival and this has led to the International Bread Festival. The countries represented there were France, Hungary, Slovakia, Belarus, Romania, Slovenia and Ireland. There were also eight Italian regions present. You could say that it was a celebration with bread between East and West within Europe. Ireland was represented by Pat Garvey secretary, Flour Confectioners and Bakers Association, (F.C.B.A.), David Hampson - baker, Dublin, Robbie Ryan - bakery consultant, Tipperary, Adele Connor - Adeles Bakery, Schull, Esther Barron and Joe Prendergast, Barrons Bakery. Esther Barron was also representing the F.C.B.A. as the immediate past President. Though we were probably the smallest delegation there, we did a great job considering it was the first time ever for Ireland to be there. The theme of the Festival was "alva", which is the mother yeast or natural leavening. This theme was chosen because there is a great interest in what we eat and also more interest in traditional bakeries.

The event was really well organised. The town has two large piazzas or squares. In the first one was a building with all the ovens and then a huge tented area of different bread related businesses and sales stalls. In the other square were tents for each of the different countries and also a huge stage where there was music and dancing from the countries. Each day our two bakers had a 4 hour shift to bake their bread. They did a fantastic job under a very pressurised situation and

both David and Robbie deserve the height of praise. It was fascinating to see the different bakers at work, to see and taste all the different breads. These were sold daily on the square and of course we had a great supply of soda bread, bloomers, bracks, milk pans and scones from our bakers for our stand. We attended the stand all day long and it was absolutely phenomenal the interest by the local people in tasting the different bread. The Irish soda bread was a huge attraction.

At the official opening ceremony, the mayor of the town said that in Italy bread is associated with "prosperity". Coming from Ireland, it was wonderful to hear such sentiments. It was Ireland's first time there and we know from the organisers, that they were very pleased with the impression we made. It is a great sensation when you see the reaction of people when you tell them that you are from "Ireland". Overall it was a very motivational event for us all.

NEW DUNGARVAN SHOPPING CENTRE VERY POPULAR WITH SHOPPERS - SURVEY SHOWS

Dungarvan's new shopping centre has proved very popular with the town's shoppers. And, while the new centre has diverted a lot of custom from the old town centre, it has also attracted significant numbers of shoppers who previously shopped outside the town. These are the principal findings of a recent survey of shopping behaviour in the town.

The survey was carried out by Geography students from the National University of Ireland, Maynooth on September 22 last. A total of 177 shoppers were interviewed at six locations around the town centre, including the new shopping centre. In terms of age, gender and occupational profile, the respondents were representative of the population at large.

The survey found that 90% of respondents shopped in the new shopping centre, and of these the great majority shop there at least once a week. The main reasons why shoppers chose to shop in the new centre were related to convenience and comfort, but variety/choice and value/price were also important factors.

Of those who shopped in the new centre, two thirds said that the goods they obtained there had previously been sourced in the old town centre. The remaining third had previously sourced these goods outside Dungarvan (mainly in Waterford, Clonmel, Youghal and Cork). These respondents were equally divided between shoppers who lived in Dungarvan and outside the town. Thus the new centre has had a significant impact in getting shoppers from Dungarvan to stay in the town to do their shopping, and in getting shoppers from outside Dungarvan to shop there rather than elsewhere.

Three in five respondents said they shopped less in the old town centre since the new centre opened. However, this diversion of custom from the old centre has been partly counterbalanced by the fact that many of those who didn't shop in Dungarvan before now shop in the old as well as the new centre.

Among the changes which respondents thought would improve the old town centre as a place to shop were improved parking, a better choice of

shops (especially clothes shops), a more pedestrian-friendly environment, lower prices, the modernisation of existing shops and improvement in the general appearance of the area.

Three in five respondents said that parking was a factor in influencing where they shopped in the town. While the availability of parking in relation to where people wanted to shop was the key factor here, the cost of parking was also important.

Two thirds of respondents continue to shop outside Dungarvan. Cork and Waterford are more favoured for clothes shopping, while Clonmel and Youghal are favoured for groceries. The presence of Tesco, Aldi and Lidl outlets in the latter two towns appear to be important attractions. The establishment of one or more of these outlets in Dungarvan therefore seems likely to significantly enhance the town's attractiveness as a place to shop.

CINEMA REVIEWS

Little Miss Sunshine

A darkly funny slice of American life, Little Miss Sunshine showcases some of the best hidden talent in Hollywood while producing a touching and memorable movie. The Hoovers are a New Mexico family who don't subscribe to normal movie stereotypes; they are neither utterly dysfunctional nor perfectly happy. Dealing with their problems as they can they are a refreshing view of family life, showing us all that it is ok to be normal. When daughter Olive (Abigail Breslin) wins a coveted place in the Little Miss Sunshine beauty pageant, the entire family must hop into the run-down mini-bus and travel to California.

Husband Richard (Greg Kinnear) is waiting for his book deal to come together, although it seems to be slipping ever further from his grasp. After a suicide attempt, Frank (Steve Carell) must share a room with Dwayne (Paul Dano), who has taken a vow of silence until he is accepted into military flight academy. Along for the ride is Grandpa (Alan Arkin), a washed up hippy who embarrasses his son at every step. Trying to hold it all together is the mother, Sheryl (Toni Collette), who just wants to keep everyone from fighting.

Although Steve Carell is best noted for his straight-out comic abilities in Anchorman and American Office, he proves equally able here, turning every line to a scene-stealer. Alan Arkin is riotously disgusting

as Grandpa and Greg Kinnear brings a softer value to a role that could have been a real hate figure. Toni Collette is her usual brilliant self but it's the kids who steal the show. Abigail Breslin could be the next Dakota Fanning, as cute as Fanning but with just as much ability to shock. Paul Dano has a real screen presence, especially with a character who is mute for so long.

The rosy cinematography is well used to set up a glowing feeling to the family's adventure and quick turns to more bleak colouring at exactly the right times highlight the artistic merit of the film. While the humour won't be to everyone's liking, it is quite dark, it is right up their with wry comic-noir classics such as The Royal Tenenbaums and The Life Aquatic. A must see for all fans of intelligent cinema.

The Tiger's Tail

When the ever-dependable Brendan Gleeson fails to light up the screen, you know something is seriously amiss. And that is certainly the case in John Boorman's The Tiger's Tail. Set in contemporary Ireland, the film follows the troubles of high-flying property developer Liam O'Leary (Gleeson) as his life is invaded by his doppelganger. The stress of living in the boom period is a theme explored as most of the characters assume Liam has simply lost his mind. But a far more mundane reason quickly becomes apparent; Liam has a twin who begrudges him the good life.

Kim Cattrall of Sex and the City fame stars as Liam's wife, Rachel. However, she is vastly underused and the script in general is poorly written. While Boorman is a superb director, he seems overly enthusiastic here, really pushing the points he is trying to make whereas a subtler approach may have worked better. No matter how many times he batters home the problems resultant from the Celtic Tiger, it all feels a little forced.

Happily though, there is a strong enough central storyline to keep the film ticking over. The quality of filmmaking is as high as you could expect, batting well above the budget afforded a joint Irish and British production. If it does get a bit bogged down and the dialogue is woodier than a kitchen table, just remember, that never stopped Star Wars.

Upcoming Films

This week sees the release of the eagerly awaited return of the Bond franchise in Casino Royale. Daniel Craig is set to play a grittier version of 007, really getting his teeth into a character that had become something of a cliché. While the quota of stunts and eye-candy will undoubtedly be maintained, expect this to be a more satisfying film all round than previous instalments of the series. They are calling Craig the best Bond since Connery, which given Pierce Brosnan's outings as the suave spy promises much for the movie itself and the future of the series.

As a lifelong Nottingham Forest fan I decided to look at what game Brideview were playing around the time of Forests 1979 European Cup victory versus Malmo. For the record Nottingham Forest were written off right at the start of the competition when they drew another English club, Liverpool, in the first round. Liverpool were going for a three in a row but Forest won the first leg 2-0 and prevented Liverpool from scoring in the second leg. AEK Athens and Grasshoppers of Zurich fell by the wayside and Forest played Cologne in the semi-final. The first leg at the City Ground ended in a 3-3 and Cologne were so confident of winning the return leg (as no team had won away to put themselves into the final of the competition) that they had printed the tickets for the final and booked their hotel in Munich also. Suffice to say Forest win 1-0 with a goal through Ian Bowyer and defeat Malmo by the same score when the worlds first one million pound player Trevor Francis scores on the 30th of May 1979.

I was in 3rd class at the time going to school in the prefab in Billy Sheehan's class. In those days Brideview played behind the old school and this may have been the

last game played there as the road which has only just begun to be laid up to the school was to start that summer. The game in question was a few days before and it was a County Cup 1st round match versus Killowen on a Saturday evening 7.30pm. BALLYDUFF NOTES

"The Plough and the Stars" for Ballyduff

"You have disgraced yourselves again", thundered W.B. Yeats from the stage of the Abbey Theatre in 1926. His target was a section of the audience that caused havoc during the second act of a new play by Sean O'Casey "The Plough and the Stars". By this time Yeats on stage was surrounded by a group of women who were hell bent on preventing the play from going ahead. Barry Fitzgerald, the famous Irish actor was in the cast and much of the abuse was directed at him - later, there was an attempt made to kidnap him by republicans. The police arrived and ejected many protestors who included, Hannah Sheehy Skeffington, Kathleen Clarke and Margaret Pearse; all of whom had close links to 1916.

For Yeats and others it was a regrettable case of history repeating itself as nineteen years earlier J.M. Synge's classic "The Playboy of the Western World" received a similar reception. Why did "The Plough and the Stars" - a play set in Dublin during the Rising of 1916 - elicit such a hostile reception? 1926 was the tenth anniversary of the Rising and republicanism was given a boost as a result. O'Casey's play was expected to portray the patriots of 1916 in a favourable light and continue the recent tradition of re-shaping and re-defining Irish identity to counteract the negative Irish stereotype long fashionable in literature and drama. However the ex-

pectations were not realised as O'Casey refused to glorify the violence of the Rising and went further by mocking the heroes by presenting them as drunken dreamers, vain cowards and bluffers. He also committed the cardinal sin of ridiculing Pearse's famous speech at the funeral of O'Donovan Rossa. The coarseness and vulgarity of the language also drew criticism as well as the unfolding of the Tri-colour in a pub. The appearance in the play of a prostitute, Rosie Redmond, also raised hackles despite the fact that Dublin had a thriving red-light district with a very high per capita ratio of "ladies of the night".

Despite the hostile reaction the play continued for two more nights with a substantial police presence and since then it has become a classic of Irish Theatre along with his other plays based on the troubles "The Shadow of a Gunman" and "Juno and the Paycock".

Eighty years after its difficult birth the play directed by Kate Canning will be staged in Ballyduff on November 23rd, 24th, 25th and 26th. While we do not anticipate riots the local Gardaí have been informed and will be on call should members of the audience cause any trouble!!

Apart from the historical background, the play is highly entertaining full of memorable characters. Fluther Good (Brendan Dunlea) is more of a pantomime character who in the early acts is full of one liners, and who is doing his best to give up the drink. Bessie Burgess (Ger Canning), is a

Protestant surrounded by Catholic tenement neighbours who is prepared to speak her mind and ridicule the action of those involved in 1916. Peter Flynn (Pat Sheehan) is used by O'Casey to mock pseudo republicans and is figure of fun throughout. Rosie Redmond (Enda Ormonde) is the prostitute and is presented by O'Casey in a very sympathetic light. There are many other characters in this play highlighting the realism of life in the Dublin slums. It is a play that arouses all the emotions and during the course of the performance your belly will ache

No Suitable Candidate For Ballyduff Post Office

No suitable candidate has come forward to take over the running of Ballyduff Post Office, which closed recently. Donall Connell, Chief Executive of An Post, was responding to issues raised at a meeting of Waterford County Council in connection with the stripping of services from small local post offices. Mr. Connell said the closure of the Ballyduff post office arose out of "circumstances which were completely beyond our control."

"Following the closure, we reviewed the volumes of business transacted at Ballyduff and found that they were entirely insufficient to support the kind of investment and ongoing costs associated with the provision of full post office counter services."

The postal service then advertised a "postal agency" contract for the area but, unfortunately, no suitable candidate was forthcoming.

Mr. Connell said that in these circumstances, the postal service were unable to restore core welfare payment, bill payment, and postage sales services at Ballyduff.

However, Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin, decried the stripping of services from the post office, and laid the blame on this decision for the reason why no suitable candidate has so far been found.

"Once they restore the services they've taken away, then they'll be able to find plenty of people to take it on," he said.

TALLOW YOUTH INITIATIVE

The Project started last September and is being funded by Waterford LEADER Partnership through the County Waterford Development Board. It is managed by Foróige, a national youth organisation and operates under the guidance of a local and agency based Advisory Committee.

Part of Nessa's job is to (1) work directly with young people (e.g. summer camps or special interest groups), (2) support existing youth groups and (3) perhaps support interested adults who may be available to work with young people (whatever time you have... everything helps... even if its one hour a month!).

L'AMI PRIMED FOR BETFAIR ASSAULT

French trainer Francois Doumen revealed during the week that L'Ami will run in the Grade One £200,000 Betfair Chase (1.50pm) at Haydock Park on Saturday next, November 18, together with a possible assault on the Betfair Million bonus. Doumen is pleased with the form of the J P McManus-owned seven-year-old, who finished fourth to War Of Attrition in the totesport Cheltenham Gold Cup in March, having filled the same position behind Kicking King in last season's Stan James King George VI Chase. The trainer said today: "L'Ami is very much on target for the Betfair Chase and I would think that A P McCoy will ride him. He has definitely strengthened and improved through the summer and will hopefully run a good race.

"Mr McManus doesn't put any pressure on me, but the Betfair Million is a good enough figure to think about. He could go to the King George, but the Lexus Chase is just as attractive so that could be on the agenda."

DAVID PIPE PROFILE

Born on February 7, 1973, David Pipe is the son of 15-times champion jump trainer

Martin Pipe. He took over the reins at Pond House in Somerset following the retirement of his father on the last day of the 2005/2006 jump season - Saturday, April 29.

The 33-year-old made the best possible start to his training career under rules when getting on the scoresheet with his first runner, Standin Obligation, in a three mile and one furlong novice chase at Kelso on May 9, 2006. Our Vic landed the Grade Two bet 365 Charlie Hall Chase at Wetherby in October on his seasonal return to provide David with his biggest win to date.

David will be hoping to match the phenomenal achievements of his father, who totally revolutionised jump racing in Britain with his new approach to training racehorses.

Martin Pipe came to dominate the sport, having started his training career in 1977, re-writing the record books with his incredible tally of winners. He sent out 230 winners during the 1990/91 season, only to break that total when landing 243 successes in the 1999-2000 campaign. Along with his 15 trainers championships, Martin Pipe also saddled 34 winners at the Cheltenham Festival over the years, taking the Champion Hurdle twice with Granville Again (1993) and Make A Stand (1997).

He won the Grand National with the Freddie Starr owned Minnehoma in 1994, took the Welsh National on five occasions and landed the Paddy Power Gold Cup an amazing eight times, with Beau Ranger (1987), Challenger Du Luc (1996), Cyfor Malta (1998 & 2002), Lady Cricket (2000), Shooting Light (2001), Celestial Gold (2004) and Our Vic (2005).

David Pipe started out riding in point-to-points in 1992, going on to record 22 wins over the next five seasons, plus two under rules, which included victory aboard Bonanza Boy in the Ludlow Gold Cup.

After finishing as a rider, he had spells with Michael Dickinson in the US, Criquette Head-Maarek in France and Joey Ramsden in South Africa, before setting up as a point-to-point trainer, handling the likes of Horus, Lord Atterbury and Celestial Gold, who went on to have successful careers under Rules when transferred to his father's yard. Based at Purchas Farm, a mile away from his father's Pond House, he sent out 164 point-to-point winners over six seasons, with Well Armed successful 15 times.

Having acted in an assistant trainer capacity to his father for the past five seasons, David now has the chance to make his own mark in the training ranks. David has the support of leading owner David Johnson as he bids to bring the trainers' title back to Pond House, following the success of West Country neighbour Paul Nicholls last season. So far this season, David Pipe has sent out 32 winners (up to Tuesday, November 7).

RECENT FATALITIES

The promising Stoneville died after crashing over fences at Thurles last Thursday while two Irish trained entries who finished in the frame at Cheltenham namely War General and Bualtas And Fadas both died from suspected heart attacks.

NOLAND OUT

West Country trainer Paul Nicholls recently ruled out the very useful Noland for the remainder of the season after the Supreme Novices Hurdle winner suffered an injury to an off fore leg.

JUMP JOCKEYS INJURED

Garret Cotter, Denis Hogan and Andrew McNamara all picked up injuries at Thurles last Thursday and the trio face a spell on

the sidelines. There was a further sting in the tail for Denis Hogan when he was fined 250 Euro and banned for seven days after he disobeyed the doctor's orders not to leave the medical room having received medication.

CHANNEL 4 FOR GOODWOOD

After 60 years the BBC recently severed their connections with Goodwood racecourse and in the future Channel 4 will cover racing from the Sussex venue.

JOHN OXX-JUMP TRAINER

Well-known Irish flat trainer John Oxx has taken out a jump licence primarily to train Icklingham over hurdles. John Oxx has never trained a winner over jumps before.

LIBERTINE BACK IN TRAINING

Libertine who was retired to stud after winning the Topham chase is back in training with Nicky Henderson. The 7-year-old mare will be aimed at the Kim Muir Chase at Cheltenham and its then on to Aintree for the Grand National.

WARREN PLACE WINNER OVER FENCES

Warren Place stables in Newmarket sent out Tidal Fury to triumph over fences at Carlisle last week but the winner was down to trainer Jonathan Jay who now shares the famous stables with Henry Cecil. The ex French horse Tidal Fury is only a four year old and looks a decent prospect.

The former Michael Stoute trained Rob Roy who finished fifth in the Breeders Cup Mile is to remain in the USA with trainer Neil Drysdale.

Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea T.D. and Party Spokesperson on Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs has been informed by the Minister for the Environment, Heritage & Local Government, Mr. Dick Roche T.D. that 17 archaeology posts from the Heritage & Planning Section of his Department have been identified for decentralisation to Waterford and that to date 3 archaeologists have confirmed their availability to decentralise.

Discussions, the Minister continued are ongoing at a central level between the Department of Finance and the IMPACT Trade Union to progressing outstanding issues regarding the decentralisation of profes-

sional and technical staff across the Civil Service.

The Minister was responding to a Parliamentary Question from Deputy O'Shea regarding the number of archaeologists from his Department that are to be decentralised, the number the has applied to be decentralised and the efforts being made to encourage others.

Deputy O'Shea stated this morning that the situation regarding the decentralisation of archaeologists was disappointing and he has taken up the matter of progressing the outstanding issues regarding decentralisation of professional and technical staff across the Civil Service with the Minister for Finance.

"Hand Made Wines & Food" Now Open In Lismore

When I (Tom Doorley) decided to swap suburban Dublin for the Blackwater Valley some years ago, I had no idea that I would end up selling wine and food in Lismore. But I can't think of anywhere I would rather live, even if my work with The Irish Times and RTE means that I have to make regular trips to the capital.

Of course, it's one thing to write and broadcast about food and wine; it's quite another to try and sell the stuff. But because I wanted to share my enthusiasm with people and, if you like, get down to the nitty gritty, I decided to take the lease on a shop in Lismore.

In partnership with George Kiely I've recently opened Hand Made Wines & Food where we sell wines that are made by small producers - farmers really - in various parts of the world. And, in addition, there are farmhouse cheeses, almost all of them produced in West Waterford and Cork. I firmly believe that we make some of the best cheeses in the world and it's a joy to be selling the likes of Knockalara from near Cappoquin, Cais Dubh and St Brigid from near

Fermoy and Mossfield Organic Gouda from Co Offaly, the county of my forebears.

Local wines and local olive oil are a bit problematic because global warming has yet to deliver the right climate! But the stuff that we sell are produced in Italy and Spain by the kind of people who would feel very much at home with our local cheeses.

Of course, it's easy to forget that good wine and good food are for everybody, not just the overpaid residents of Dublin 4. The vast majority of our hand-crafted wines sell between €10 and €20 and there are lots below a tenner.

With terrines from On The Pig's Back and craft-baking from Arbutus Breads, both produced in Cork, and all sorts of other tasty things, I don't think I'll ever make a fortune. But at least I know that I'm not just writing and broadcasting about the best food and drink. I'm also helping to make it available every day in West Waterford.

With a bit of luck, it will pay the rent. If it does even a bit more than that, I'll be a very happy man. The only thing that bothers me at the moment is that the brand new series of The Restaurant, which will be seen

on RTE television in the New Year, is going to take me away from home for the odd few days over the next few months.

As work goes, I have to say it's not the hardest, but I resent any time spent away from my beloved Blackwater. I just hope that I don't take it out on the poor celebs who will be cooking for Paolo Tullio and myself!

I like to think that I'm tough but fair, which is what my teachers used always claim, and I suppose I apply the same standards to the food and drink that I'm now offering in Lismore.

Anyway, do call in and have a chat. I'm there as much as I can and I'd be delighted to help you choose something tasty, without breaking the bank. Good food and good wine doesn't cost a fortune and if I thought it was just for the snobs I'd give up and get a "real" job. The trouble is that food and wine are the only things I really know about. And when I get a free moment from the shop and the media, I'll be digging over the garden to be ready for growing our vegetables for next year. I'll be sowing the broad beans next week, come what may!

WATERFORD COUNTY MUSEUM

FROM THE MUSEUM ARCHIVES

"Report of Mr W.E. L'Estrange Duffin, Co. Surveyor, on the River Bride - 5th June 1908"

On the proposed improvement of the navigation of the River Bride.

The River Bride is a tributary of the Blackwater and is navigable to a certain extent up to within a mile of Tallow bridge, the nearest point in the river to the town of Tallow, distant about 1/2 mile from the town. The ordinary tides flow to within about 1/2 a mile of Tallow bridge. About 1/2 of the vessels pass by through Youghal Bridge, up the Blackwater, to the River Bride. The traffic inwards is chiefly coal, artificial manures etc. and outwards, native timbers, potatoes, and oats. There are several private quays on the River, but there is no public quay at Janeville, nearly 2 miles by road from Tallow, about one mile from the junction with the Blackwater there is a swivel bridge "Camphire" or "Bride Bridge".

As for as Janeville Quay the navigation is fairly easy, and there is plenty of water most of the way and traffic is carried on regularly. Above Janeville the water is shallow and traffic can only be carried on at, or near, High water of Spring tides... (To be continued).

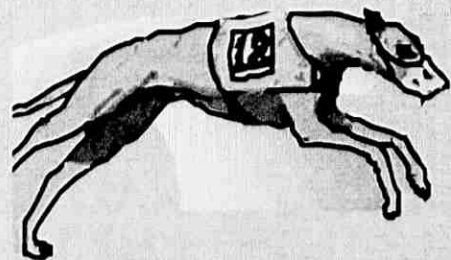
Fine Gael councillor, Davy Whelan said Park Road side is in a "very bad state" and he called for work to be carried out there as well.

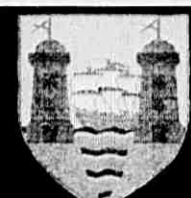

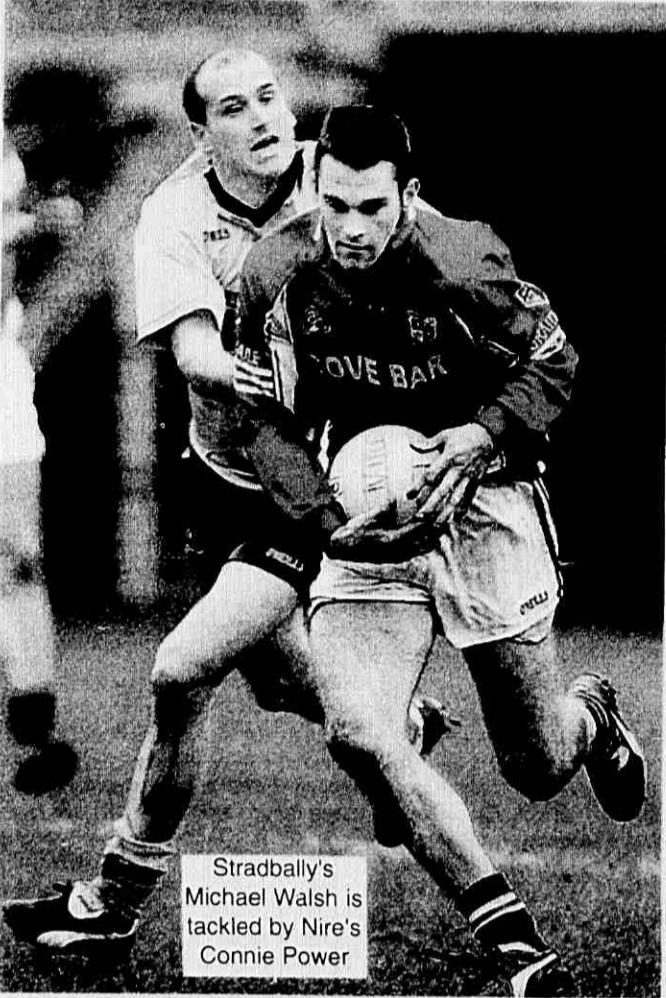

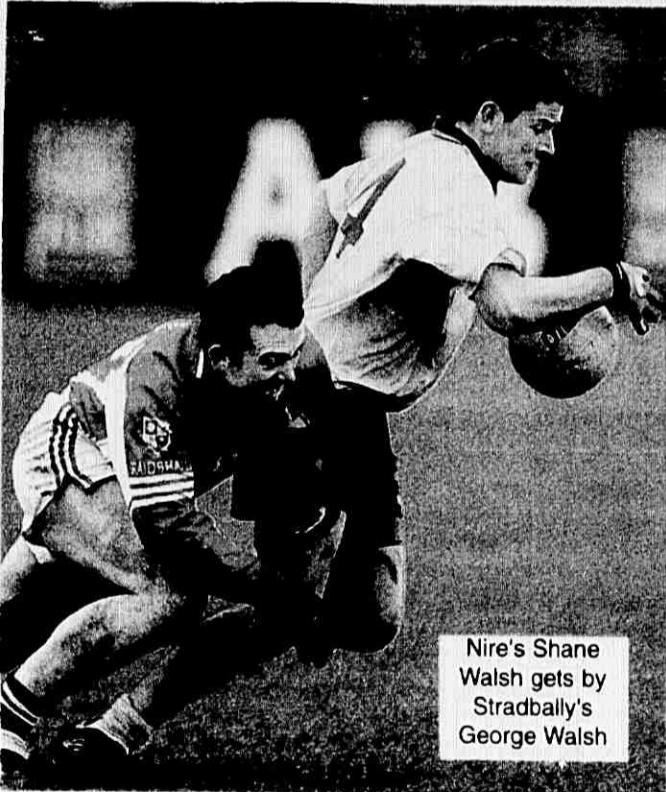

Senior Football Co. Final Nire 1-5 Stradbally 0-3



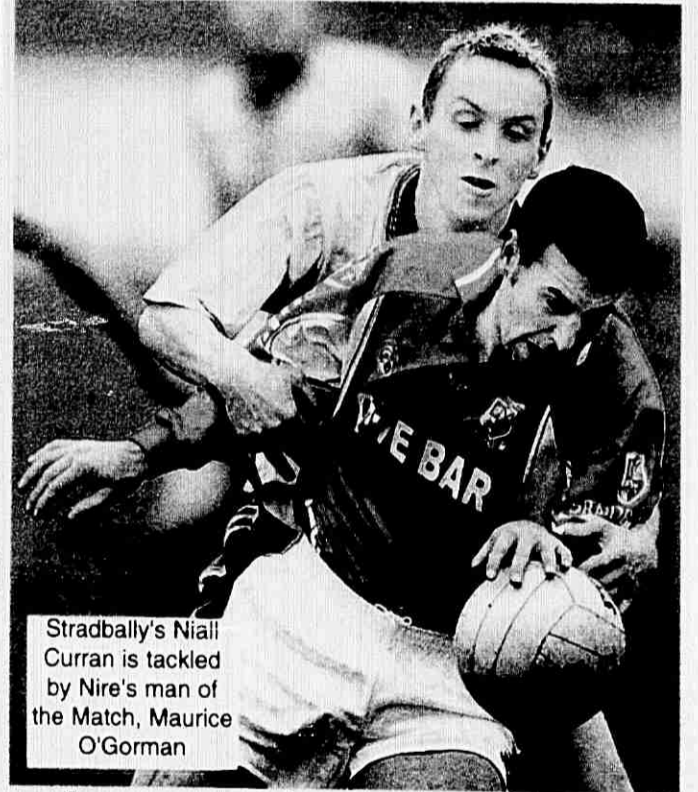
Nire's Shane Walsh in an ariel battle with Stradbally's Ger Power and Niall Curran

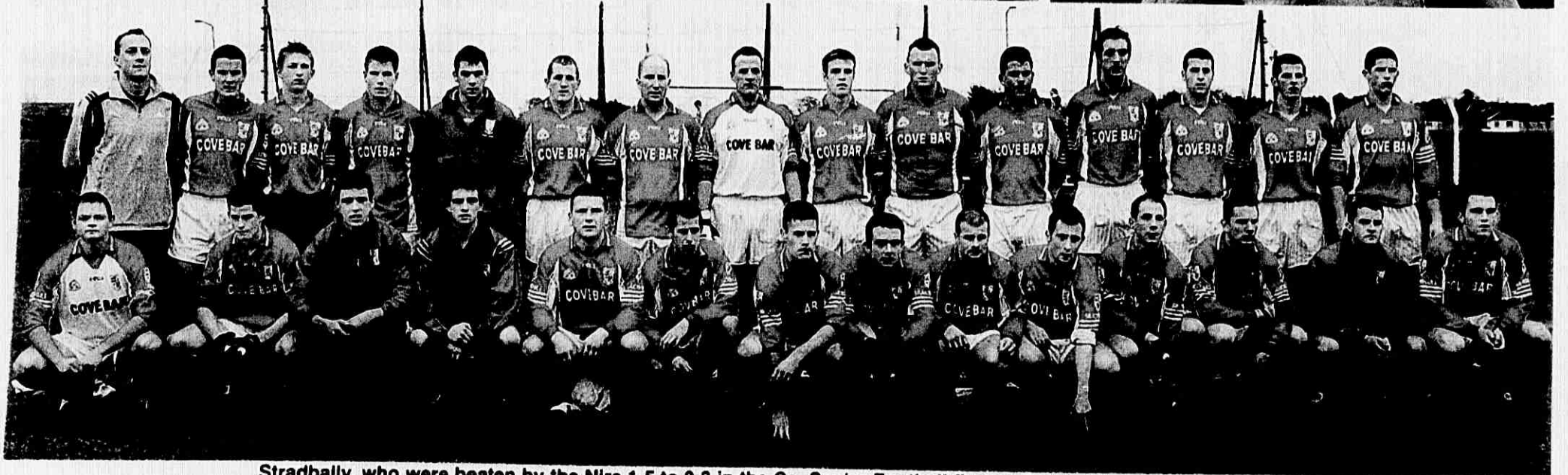
I would rate the final as one of the very best played at Fra-

Towards the end of the final an unacceptable exhibition of unsporting behaviors occurred as players, officials and some supporters became embroiled in a free for all. The substitutes

from both clubs joined in the fracas while match officials, board officers and members of the Garda tried to quell the flare up.

When order was restored, the final whistle sounded and scenes of jubilation and celebration got underway among Nire supporters.

PLAY

The teams were paraded around the ground by the Thomas Francis Meagher Fife & Drum Band.

Stradbally won the toss and decided to play against the very strong breeze. Each team played the players listed on the match programme but made instant switches after the start.

Nire were first to score when

Connie Power pointed a first minute free and within a minute Tony Grey from play equalised for Stradbally. This was to be the county champions only score of the first half.

After 14 minutes without a score, Brian Wall kicked a free that put Nire back into the lead in the 16th minute and with points from play by Liam Lawlor and from a free by Connie Power, the Nire retired at halfway with an 0-4 to 0-1 lead.

SECOND HALF

Playing with the wind it was anticipated that the champions would waste no time in getting on terms when the game resumed. This prediction looked good when Nial Curran pointed a 35th minute free to reduce the scoring gap.

Stradbally mounted several more attacks that were repelled after a couple of frees which were well within range for sharp shooter Nial Curran were not turned into scores. A fair

idea of the closeness and tightness of the game can be gleaned from the fact that after Stradbally's first score in the 35th. minute, no further flag was raised for all of 19 minutes. The Nire's first and only point of the second half was a delightful effort kicked by Shane Walsh in the 54th. minute. What seemed a scorable free was kicked wide by Connie Power with just two minutes of normal time remaining and the Nire holding on

dangerously to a narrow 2 points lead.

Then the game was put beyond reach of the champions when a high ball kicked into the Stradbally square was finished to the net by Diarmuid Wall and guaranteed the Nire their fifth and well deserved county title.

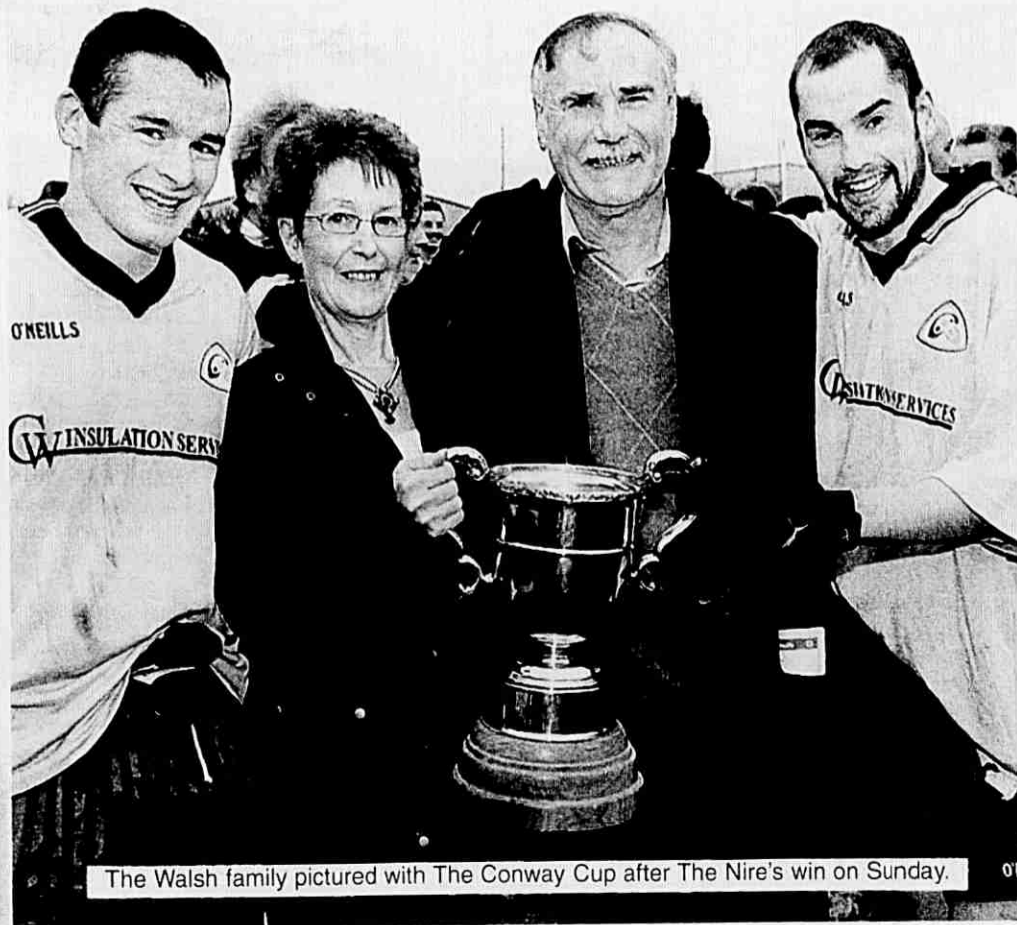

Contest At Fraher Field**

This is but one of several interesting fixtures listed for the coming weekend when the programme for Dungarvan also includes the minor "B" hurling county final involving Brickey Rangers and Roanmore, as well as a Munster Club senior hurling semi-final between Mount Sion and Tipperary champions Toomevara at Neenagh.

Western intermediate hurling champions Dungarvan's chances of regaining senior status will depend on their attitude going out against their Eastern counterparts, Clonea in this very important tie at Fraher field on Sunday afternoon.

Eastern sources with whom I have spoken over the weekend, reckon that Clonea, because of their very imposing record in the Eastern championship this year, will be favourites and they state that the club are confident of getting back up to senior ranks after this game on Sunday next.

RECORDS

This is the 42nd intermediate county hurling championship final since it was inaugurated in 1964 when Ballyduff Upper became the first team to take the title. A total of 26 different clubs have won the championship but only four of these, Ballyduff Upper, Tallow, Lismore and Ballygunner have gone on to win the senior county title.

Today's contestants Dungarvan and Clonea have each won the championship on a number of occasions.

Dungarvan won in 1978 and went down again after 5 years at senior level. They won again in 1986 when defeating Passage on a score of 0-16 to 3-5 and played in the senior championship for 10 years until they went back to intermediate in 1997 after losing their last senior championship match to Tallow by 3-12 to 2-9 in the 1996 championship.

Clonea won the title on three occasions, 1975, 1977 and 1981 and since then have contested 3 county intermediate hurling finals and lost all three. They lost in 1992, 1993 and 2004. Unlike Dungarvan who came through the west undefeated, Clonea were lucky to have qualified after losing to both De La Salle and Mount Sion.

Their two best displays were against Dunhill in the semi-final and neighbours Portlaw in the eastern final.

DUNGARVAN'S LINE OUT

Having come through a very searching test with an unbeaten record in the Western division, it is unlikely that the Blues will change the team who defeated Clashmore in the Western final three weeks ago. They claim with justification that a number of their players on the bench are all good enough to win a

place on the first fifteen, but that being so, it would be foolish not to give a vote of confidence to the divisional champions team.

This will see Paul Ahearn in goal behind a fullback line of John Paul Tutty, Trevor Galvin, and Darren Hamilton.

In the Dungarvan halfback line we will see Wayne Flynn, Mickey Power and Kieran Curran and at centerfield the partnership of Jamie Nagle and Derek Truman is sure to be given a vote of confidence.

The Western champions forward division who are helping

to maintain a fair average on the scoreboard will have top scorer, Jonathan Regan. Pat Sullivan and Brian Bannon in the half line and John Joe Ronayne, David Morrissey and Gavin Crotty on the inside line and making life difficult for the last line of defence on the Clonea team.

THE RESULT?

Dungarvan with home advantage and huge support in Fraher field, must stand at least a 50/50 chance of making it back up to senior ranks and we wish them the best of luck in their efforts to do so.

SECOND HALF

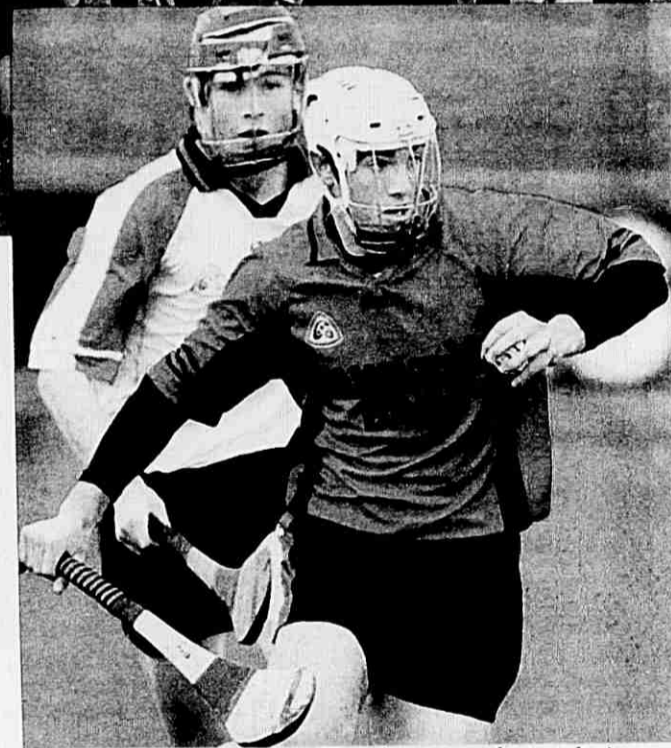

Shane Fives in the 48th. and 52nd. minutes came too late to change the course of the game and so Ballygunner ran out deserving winners by a seven points margin.

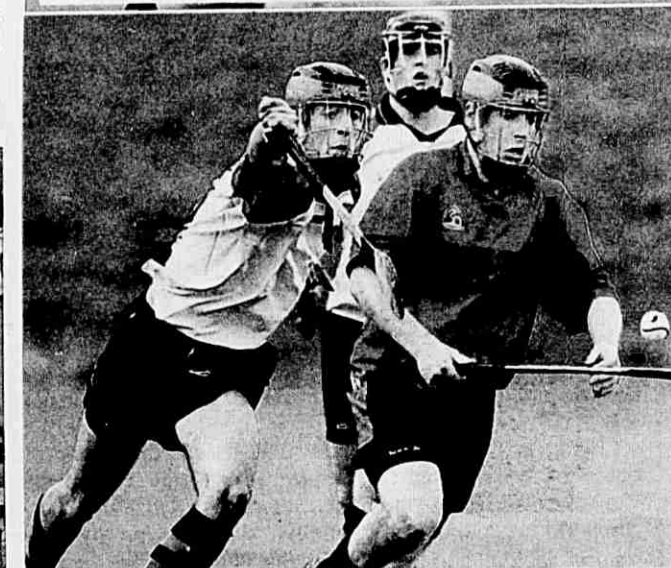

PENALTY POINTS

There's much talk about the penalty points and what's it all about, here's my effort to explain. If you are running the 2.7 mile league and ran it last year and you are more than 3 min-

utes slower than your best time last year you will be awarded penalty points each week that your slower than that 3 minutes, if there's 150 runners you will receive 151 points and not your finishing position points

and so will anyone else who is 3 minutes outside their best time from last year

If you're running the 6 mile course you are allowed 6 minutes grace on your best time from last year again, each week that your 6 minutes or more slower than this time you will receive maximum penalty points, instead of getting your finishing position points you will receive the points total plus one of the amount of finishers on that night eg if 180 runner take part on the night you will receive 181 points along with all others who are 6 minutes outside their late years best time. Penalty points will be awarded each week but wont become apparent until the divisions are in place after the Christmas break. This system opens up the competition to all levels of runners.

Pike Road Safety Plans To Go-Ahead

major accidents, have occurred on the notorious stretch of road.

A 60kph speed limit has been put in place, but problems with enforcing it have emerged.

ROAD SAFETY PROJECT

Now the NRA and Waterford County Council are to spend 130,000 euro on a road safety project which will see measures put in place to force drivers to obey the limits.

The project also proposes to improve safety by reducing the number of lanes that traffic on minor roads will have to cross while accessing the N25; provide right turn lanes for mainline traffic wishing to access the local roads; and provide improved signage.

"Currently drivers exiting from the Deelish exit and the Pike exit have three lanes of traffic to cross when turning right onto the N25. Traffic exiting the Killineen West and Killineen East exit have four

lanes of traffic to cross when turning right onto the N25.

"It is proposed to remove the climbing lane on the approach from Dungarvan to improve safety for drivers exiting the minor routes and in turn reducing speeds on the mainline," the NRA said.

CAMPAIGN

The safety project follows a vocal campaign launched by local residents over safety concerns on the road.

The committee behind the Killineen/Deelish/Glendalligan Residents Group employed an independent consultant engineer, William White, to produce a report detailing the problems associated with the area.

He suggested a number of possible solutions - all of which have been implemented in the new designs.

WELCOME

Speaking at the November monthly meeting of Waterford County Council, Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan welcomed the proposals.

"I would support this very much," Cllr. Geoghegan said. "This meets the concerns raised by the residents and even goes beyond that, so I would welcome it."

His party colleague, Cllr. Nora Flynn also welcomed the proposals. She said with the speed limit in place means a second traffic lane is not needed in any case.

It is, she said, a temporary measure until the Dungarvan Outer Bypass comes on stream.

"It's better to go-ahead than to lose this," she said referring to County Engineer, John O'Flynn's warning that if the project doesn't go ahead in the current year, funding for the proposed changes could be lost.

OPPOSITION

However, Fine Gael councillor, Pat Nugent, put forward an amendment calling for the climbing lane to be retained.

He said the original proposal to remove the climbing lanes was in

order to reduce the number of lanes drivers turning right would have to cross when joining the N25.

"As the issue of junctions does not arise other than at the top of the Pike Hill virtually at the end of the climbing lane, to eliminate the lane, I believe, will increase the incidence of road accidents rather than decrease them," he said.

"If the climbing lane is eliminated and replaced with a hard shoulder, it will have the effect of causing long tail-backs of traffic caught behind slow/heavy vehicles climbing out of Dungarvan

and will, I feel, bring about a situation where impatient drivers will take chances and overtake on the climb.

NOT PERMITTED

"The use of the hard shoulder," he went on to say, "for slow/heavy vehicles as a climbing lane is not now permitted under the Road Traffic Act and is subject to penalty points."

"While we all seek ways to improve road safety, I believe that this proposal will have the opposite effect and should be further examined before we take the decision to eliminate the climbing lane the full length of the proposed plan as submitted."

On a show of hands, Cllr. Nugent failed to get any support for his amendment, and the NRA proposal was passed.

cancies immediately they were saving a small amount of money, and creating a small surplus in the Departments involved.

"There is a 7.3 million euro deficit," he said. "In an effort to bring that into line we are using the timely replacement of staff. It is one way where we can address the deficits in some departments and create a small surplus."

He said there was no proposal to leave the posts empty in the long term, and said the issues were the same for indoor and outdoor staff.

"STUNNED"

However, questions were levelled at the amount of money spent on consultants over the past year. Cllr. Damien Geoghegan said he was "stunned" to hear that the council was spending millions on consultants fees while the council is not replacing staff to save money.

His comments echoed those of Deputy, John Deasy, who claimed Waterford County Council was "spending freely," while at the same time saying they were experiencing a financial crisis.

"I think it's questionable that Waterford County Council would spend €2.1 million on consultants in 2005 and at the same time declare it was experiencing a financial crisis," Deputy Deasy said in a statement on Monday last after releasing figures obtained through the freedom of information act.

CONSULTANTS

"Looking at the figures it is evident that the County Council has been spending freely while at the same time saying publicly it didn't have any money."

"I think it's time the Councilors held the line on any more increases this year. I don't believe there is a financial crisis in the County Council and I still believe taxing every household to the tune of €150 last year was unnecessary, based on these and other figures."

But, Mr. Quinn said 2 million euros of the overall 2.1 m spend is recoupable through capital funding, and said the only time consultants are brought in his when the skill sets needed for a project are not available or provided by the council's own staff.

It's believed that Mr. Wall, who lived alone, died sometime between Saturday night last and Sunday morning.

His body was removed to Waterford Regional Hospital where a post-mortem was carried out.

Dungarvan Gardai said foul play is not suspected.

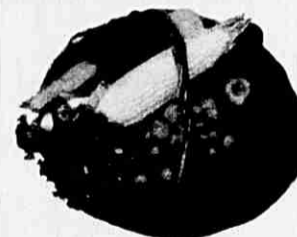

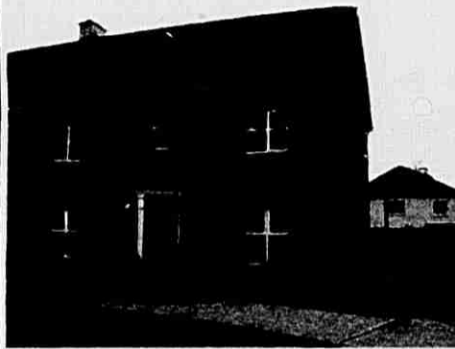

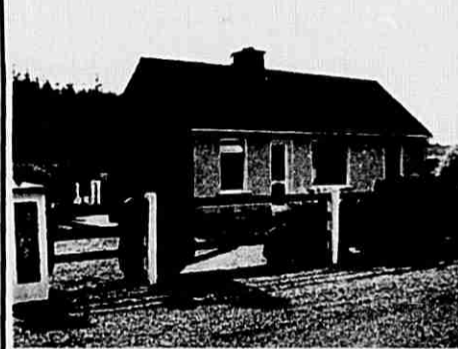
