€157m Water And Sewerage Investment

Waterford County Council has approved a major multi-million euro Water Services Investment programme for the period 2007 to 2014 which will attempt to deal with the unprecedented levels of housing and other development in the county over the past few years.

The 157 million euro programme, which was welcomed

by County Mayor, Mary Green, seeks to build on the achievements of the current 167 million euro Government Water Services Investment Programme.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said that due to the level of development in the county in recent years demand has outstripped available water supply and wastewater capacity

throughout the county.

Waterford County Council are currently upgrading 30 separate water and waste water schemes which are at various stages of development - from planning through to construction.

"The proposed programme, which includes 37 separate projects, will consolidate and

Landholders Express Concern Over Railway Walk

DECISION ON WALKWAY DEFERRED FOR A MONTH

A decision on developing the first phase of a 300,000 euro Dungarvan to Waterford Railway Walk was deferred for a month to allow more consultation with landholders in the area.

The walk, dubbed the jewel in the crown of the county's strategy to make Waterford the walking capital of Ireland, would ultimately provide unique access to some of the most stunning scenery in the county, taking in the Copper Coast route, and winding its way through to Kilmactomas before linking up with Waterford via tunnels and viaducts.

However, the route, which has lain idle for the past twenty-five years when the last

trains ceased to run, has prompted fears from landholders, who made a total of 55 submissions to the plans which went on display recently.

FEARS

The first phase would develop the Ballinroad to Durrow spur, but landholders fear anti-social behaviour could arise if not properly monitored, expressed concern over the transfer of mobile livestock diseases, and questioned whether rights of way and livestock crossing would be affected.

Fine Gael Councillor, Nora Flynn and Fianna Fail councillor, Tom Cronin also said they would not be supporting any new walkway unless they re-

ceived a commitment that the current walking routes, particularly Glenshelane and the Ring of Ardmore will be properly maintained.

CONSULTATION

While the majority of councillors were in favour of the objective of creating the walkway, Labour councillor, Ger Barron said the legitimate concerns of the landowners must be taken into account, and he urged for more consultation to take place.

Describing the walkway as a piece of vital infrastructure, he said it was with regret that he was proposing that a decision be deferred for a month. He said cottage owners in the area, whose houses overlook the line



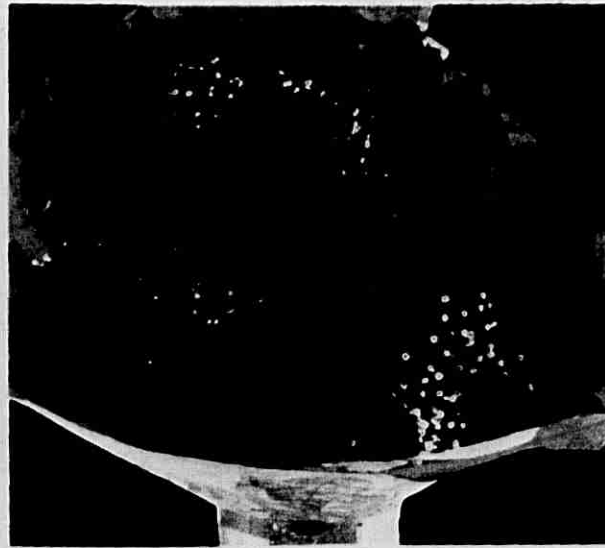

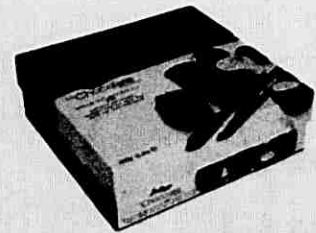

Lismore Town Council To Write To HSE To Clarify Defibrillator Use

Lismore Town Council is to write to the Health Service Executive seeking definitive guidelines and procedures in order to ascertain when the emergency services can use their defibrillator. The service has not received a definitive line on the matter, Tony McCarthy, Chief Fire Officer said in a letter to the February meeting of Lismore Town Council.

Fine Gael Cllr. Orla Russell said the Department's report of March last recommended that defibrillators be accessible for community use by the emergency services.

The wording of the recommendation however, leaves it up to local authorities to interpret it for themselves whether they can be called out specifically for cardiac arrests. While Waterford Co. Council interprets this as only use of the defibrillator for fire or accident call-outs and not specifically for a cardiac arrest, Cllr. Russell questioned whether other council's are restricting its use.

ESB Promise Improved Public Lighting Service

A one million euro investment in a computer monitoring system, increased on the ground monitoring, and a monthly report on the logging of complaints and the status of faults, are to be part of a new system contained in a contract which the ESB hope to sign with Waterford County Council in the coming months.

PJ Nolan of ESB Networks – the division which maintains the local authority's public lighting – said a contract is "on the table" that includes the package of measures.

Included in this would be patrols of every light once every month, or alternatively 12 pa-

trols over eight months – excluding the summer months.

INVESTMENT

A further 5 million euro is being invested in the semi-state company's fleet of cherry pickers.

"We are totally committed to giving the best service we can," Mr. Nolan added.

However, the ESB came under sustained fire for the service it currently offers, with Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin saying the same promises were offered three years ago.

"I would like to see that contract before we sign anything," he went on to say.

He said he had nothing against the workers, who he

was proud of, but with the public lighting management.

FAULTS

He listed a series of faults with lights in Tallow, including seven at the junction of Barrack Street and Mill Street which are turned on day and night at the time when people were talking about conserving energy, and a list of other lights in the town which don't come on at night at all.

He said no one would mind if the lights were fixed in the 10 days promised or even two weeks, but the problems are continually going on for months at a time.

Fine Gael councillor, Nora Flynn also listed long drawn

out problems in Cappoquin including two lights which have been out a year and a half.

BLACKOUT

There was also a blackout over the Christmas period and no one from the ESB was available to come out and fix the problem.

Fianna Fail councillor, Kevin Wilkinson suggested the ESB should engage staff to carry out repairs on the weekends.

His party colleague, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain, meanwhile complimented the staff of the ESB for their work in often awful life threatening conditions.

"It's a question of making the representations to the right people," he said.

Master McGrath Junction An Accident Waiting To Happen -O Riain

The Master McGrath junction joining the Dungarvan to Cappoquin and Clonmel roads is an accident waiting to happen, according to Fianna Fail councillor, Ciaran O Riain who was speaking at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

He said both the surface of the road and the "huge" signposts at the junction need to be urgently addressed.

Urging the County Engineer to take immediate action, he said the Environment Minister, Dick Roche had provided millions of euro to the county council for road works, and yet nothing was being done about this stretch of road.

Mr. O'Flynn replied that the surfacing works are in the roadworks programme for this year, and it would take place once health and safety issues have been addressed.

However, he said he had measured the sight distance from the signs to the junction and found they were well with-

in regulations.


"When the signs were placed they were placed in a manner to ensure there was no danger to sight distance or sight lines," he found.

Ardsallagh Road In Terrible Condition

Ardsallagh road near Clashmore has been left in a terrible condition due to heavy traffic which was forced to use the road during roadworks on the Kinsalebeg realignment, Fianna Fail councillor, Tom Cronin has said.

But despite the works on the multi-million euro road having been completed some six months ago, Ardsallagh road was never brought back up to standard.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said he hoped the Ardsallagh road could be included in the roadworks programme later in the year.


NOTIFICATION TO ALL RESIDENTS RESIDING ALONG COUNTY ROAD L-3012 AT KILMINNION SOUTH

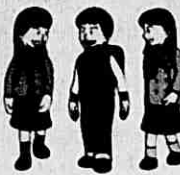

HSE Deny Claims Cancer Service Unit Has Been Scrapped

Cancer Unit Fast-Track For 2008 Date

The Health Service Executive has strongly denied claims by the South East Cancer Foundation that plans for a new Cancer Services Unit to treat public patients at Waterford Regional Hospital have been scrapped.

The new Unit has in fact, been fast tracked as part of the HSE's rolling Capital Plan 2007-2011, which is updated yearly to accommodate priority projects like the new Waterford facility.

BUILDING WORK SCHEDULED

Mr. Richard Dooley, Network Manager for the HSE's South Eastern Hospitals Group, of which Waterford Regional Hospital is a part, said: "Building work for the new Cancer Services Unit is scheduled to start on site in 2008; while a Design Team of architects and engineers, in consultation with medical cancer treatment experts, will progress the planning and scoping of the project this year."

Mr. Dooley continued: "The new Cancer Services Unit will be an investment of approximately 15 million euro, excluding staffing costs. It will

include 42 inpatient beds, 20 day treatment places and an associated Pharmacy for the necessary dispensing of chemotherapy drugs and other medication."

The HSE is committed to this new Cancer Services Unit at Waterford Regional Hospital, as a priority for public cancer patients in the south-east.

CONFUSION

Confusion followed an earlier announcement, as it was initially believed that the cancer centre would be part of a co-location private hospital on public grounds.

Iain Munro, Chairman of the SECF committee said in response to Mr. Dooley's statement: "This long overdue facility for cancer patients has been on the agenda since 1999 but two previous plans, one under the NDP in 2003, and most recently as part of the private hospital project have been abandoned."

"We hope that this announcement represents a significant change in the HSE's commitment to providing a fully resourced cancer service for the south east."

"Mr. Dooley's adamant com-

mitment to the project was clear and the SECF fully supports his efforts."

GREAT NEWS

Mr. Munro added: "This is great news for cancer patients. However, the SECF will closely monitor progress to ensure that this plan is actually implemented. The South East needs

an integrated, fully resourced, regional and multi-disciplinary centre in Waterford to serve the needs all cancer patients."

The SECF called on the HSE to make public its detailed plans for the Cancer Centre and ensure that this urgently needed infrastructure is built in the shortest time possible.

'Heartbreak' For Young Families Refused Planning Permission

County Development Plan Should Be Amended - Says O Riain

The County Development Plan should be amended to ease the restrictions on young people hoping to build houses on sites on family land, according to Fianna Fail councillor Ciaran O Riain.

Speaking at the February meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. O Riain said he was disappointed to see young men and women born, bred and reared in County Waterford being refused planning permission for houses in the Suir elec-

toral area.

He said they often spent around 150,000 euro on sites, and had to secure a mortgage only to see their applications refused.

"It's very disappointing. It's heartbreaking for them. I've seen them leave in tears," he went on to say.

He said his concern was for those "born, bred and reared" in the county, rather those coming in from other counties.

"It's not on," he said of the refusals. "It's heartbreaking to see those people turned down."

He called for the council to have a second look at the County Development Plan with a view towards amending it.

Caution Urged Over Duckspool Housing Development

Sinn Fein councillor Brendan Mansfield has urged caution over the processing of an application for a 244 house estate at Duckspool/ Burgery at Abbey-

side. The application includes an entrance/exit to the N25, which Cllr. Mansfield, speaking at the February meeting of the county council, said could cause some difficulty.

"The council needs to handle this application with care. With an application like this the council needs to ensure the ancillary works like sewerage, water, footpaths, lighting, etc are carried out either prior to or in conjunction with the housing development."

"Too many times we have seen in the past that a housing estate was built and the people were moved in, but the developer had to be chased up to finish off the estate."

Youghal Bridge Works Due To Finish In March

Structural work on Youghal Bridge are due to be completed this March, according to County Engineer, John O'Flynn.

Answering a question over delays to work from Fine Gael councillor, Pat Nugent at the February meeting of Waterford County Council, Mr. O'Flynn said the works were delayed due to problems with an ESB cable. That issue was fixed in January and now weather permitting the contractor hopes to finish work by the end of March.

He also agreed with Cllr. Nugent that the contractor should have been working at night to speed with the process, but this wasn't part of the contract.

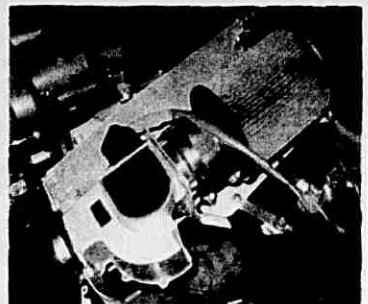

JEWEL IN THE CROWN? WHAT ABOUT THE FORGOTTEN GEM?

Viewpoint counted himself fortunate indeed to be among those visiting Cappoquin Community Centre for the first time last week, which to this columnist's eyes at least - weary from six years of official openings and the tired hyperbole which all too often goes with them - provided a welcome feast - its impressive façade, and its interior that boasted facilities capable of putting many larger towns (Dungarvan included) to shame.

Credit for this feat goes to the intrepid work of the Cappoquin Community Development Company who literally begged and borrowed the 3 million euro plus sum for this community facility.

The reason Viewpoint was in the new building was ostensibly to report on the visit of the National Executive of the ACCC (the Association of County and City Councils) for their monthly meeting.

The fact it was held in Cappoquin was to do with the elevation last September of Cllr. Nora Flynn to the chair of this august body which has been in circulation since the late 1890's. Cllr. Flynn is only the fifth woman to take on the role as chairperson, and is believed to be the first councillor from Waterford to head the organisation in its over one hundred year old existence.

The National Executive were addressed by Kevin McCarthy, the former CBS teacher (Viewpoint was one of his few failures as English and History teacher) and local historian, on some of the work completed and more planned by the Cappoquin Civic Link - another organisation that has fermented community spirit into worthwhile initiatives. Of most notable recent achievements was the publication of Cappoquin: A Window on the Past - an excellent book that details in stunning photographs and helpful informative text the social, cultural and sporting history of the town. Plaques marking some of the notable past brethren of the town are also planned to be put in place by this group in the future.

Denis McCarthy, of the Cappoquin Community Development Company, also pointed out that a number of sheltered homes for the elderly are planned as the next project undertaken by the VOLUNTARY group.

All then looks well, or at least on the up, for the town of Cappoquin - one of Waterford County Council's principle rate bases lets not forget, but for too long bypassed by the local authority in favour of Lismore.

Lismore has often been publicly vouched by at least two county managers as West Waterford's jewel in the crown. Well if Lismore is the Jewel in the Crown, what about Cappoquin as the Forgotten Gem?

Everyone I'm sure is glad with the way Lismore has prospered on the local and national stage both in terms of visitor numbers to its many beautiful public amenities and in terms of private and public development, but Cappoquin and Tallow should not be forgotten. Cappoquin's use of the Blackwater in particular, that familiar and unique position on the u-bend, has been under-utilised from a touristic point of view. All around the town is some of the most spectacular scenery in the country, and in the Glenshalane it has a snaking native broad leaved forest walk that rivals and in fact trumps Colligan for sheer beauty. But again part of this walk is left boggy, and overgrown.

The council needs to concentrate on doing for Cappoquin what it has done for Lismore. Yes Community involvement is a vital ingredient in a successful town. But this must be cemented by financial backing. The know how is there. The will is there. The finances are there - lest no one tell you otherwise - through a number of grant schemes which have worked in Dungarvan, Lismore, Tramore and Kilmac's favour. Now is the time for the council to foster the spirit, use the local know-how, and ensure that the next great facility isn't solely the work of the begging bowl.

YET ANOTHER NEW ALLOWANCE

Ah yes! Viewpoint is back on familiar ground. Nothing other than a new allowance can send a shiver of utter rage up Viewpoint's back. YES that's right. Yet ANOTHER new allowance for our hard pressed elected representatives! This time for mobile phones.

YES your councillors will tell you this came from central Government. YES they will be saying that its long overdue. YES there will tell you they have a mobile phone bill a mile long from doing your bidding. But who other than our own supposedly financially crippled local authority is footing the bill? And exactly how many of your councillors (ask them at the doorsteps the next time they come round) will be forgoing this or any other zany harebrained and easily flouted allowance that comes up?

Because forgive me for being naive, by why exactly are councillors paid well in excess of 15,000 euro a year in representational expenses for a part-time job? Why exactly was the representational payment given a substantial hike this year? Wasn't this more than adequate allowance supposed to cover stationary and other expenses too. And how exactly do you prove what is and what is not working expenses on a mobile? To my knowledge a bill doesn't tell you who or why you called. But then none of your councillors would rack up bills of 1,200 euro a year and expect your financially crippled local authority to foot a whopping 50% of it. If all twenty-three do so (in your interests of course) that would amount to over 13,800 euro. Or would they? Come budget time Viewpoint intends to name and shame.

build on the work already underway." Mr. O'Flynn said.

The Settlement Strategy outlined in the Waterford County Development Plan is based on establishing Primary (Dungarvan) and Secondary (Tramore) services centres, eleven District Centres, eighteen Local Services Centres and twenty settlement nodes, a total of 51 settlements in all.

The County Engineer stated that "delivery of the Water Services Investment Programme identified in the council's Assessment of Needs was critical to achieving the objectives of the County Development Plan."

WATER SUPPLIES

Waterford County currently has 103 separate public water supply schemes. The new programme identifies investment needs totalling 96 million euro to upgrade Water supplies at Dungarvan, Portlaw, Lismore/Cappoquin, Tallow, Faithlegg, Dunmore East, Kilmacthomas, Stradbally, Rathgormack/Carrick and the Clonmel environs.

Part of this strategy would see the rationalisation of some separate schemes. Included in these would be the development of West Waterford Regional Water Supply Scheme, which would rationalise 54 existing schemes.

Mr. O'Flynn described this as the council's "most important water supply strategic objective."

WASTE WATER SCHEMES

Investment of 61 million euro is needed to provide new sewerage schemes or upgrade existing systems to cater for growing demand and protect the quality of the county's groundwater and rivers. Upgrading is required at Dungarvan, Tramore, Lismore, Portlaw, Ballinroad, Ballymacarbry, Kill, Clonea Power,

Crooke and Dunhill, New Wastewater treatment plants are proposed at Rathgormack, Annestown, Ballyduff Upper and Bonmahon.

Over the period of the programme, the council will also complete the Seven Grouped Villages Scheme, catering for Wastewater needs at Tallow, Cappoquin, Ardmore, Kilmacthomas, Stradbally, Ballyduff/Kilmeaden and Dunmore

East.

ZONED LANDS

Mr. O'Flynn said, "The council saw the need for provision of Wastewater Collection and Treatment facilities to cater for lands zoned for institutional, industrial and commercial development in the environs of Waterford City as being of critical importance, and has earmarked 9 million euro for the purpose."

He also outlined proposals for a bundled approach to provision of public wastewater schemes at 14 smaller settlements throughout the county, to enable sustainable development to occur in rural areas.

"Completion of the 157 million euro Water Service Programme provides a framework within which the economic development of the county can take place," Mr. O'Flynn said.

Landholders Express Concern Over Railway Walk

continued from front page were particularly concerned with the walkway.

PEACE AND PRIVACY

Fine Gael councillor, Liam Brazil also had "great concerns" for landowners in the area, who for the past twenty-five years had enjoyed "peace and privacy" which now would be taken away.

He wished for the views of those who had made submissions to be taken into account. He said the track was used by farmers to shift cattle, and he questioned who would be responsible for the damage to fences, and the littering of the area if the track is opened to the general public.

"There are elderly people living in fear about this happening," he told the February meeting of the county council. "I could not support this."

DEFER

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan and Fianna Fail councillor, Ciaran O Riain, who represented the area for a number of years until the boundary commission changed the electoral areas, also shared the concerns and agreed that the issue should be deferred.

Fine Gael councillor, Pat Nugent, said there are two stakeholders involved in the decision, the walkers and the farmers.

Issues affecting farmers included control of access, public

liability and the control of dogs. As an example he said if one farm is closed down because of an outbreak of brucellosis, and dogs taken by a walker wander into a field and continue down the walkway, they could spread the mobile disease.

MAINTENANCE

He said there was also a question of who would fix damaged fences, and who would be liable for accidents which occur. He also suggested that a Ranger be hired to patrol the track.

"This thing would want to be thought out in the longer view," Cllr. Nugent said. "It's a very good idea, but it has to be thought out. All parties in this must be consulted."

However, Labour councillor, Billy Kyne was "dismayed" at the sentiments expressed by Cllr. Nugent, which he described as "fear mongering" and "over the top".

He pointed out that two well respected groups, the West Waterford Athletic Club and the Clonea-Ballinacourty Awareness Group saw the benefits of the walkway.

"Let us make the effort to address the reasonable objections and fears. I think we can do that. But we cannot resolve every fear," he said. In particu-

lar, he said Rangers are not employed on every river bank and green area in the county.

UNIQUE PROJECT

County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer said he had no issue with postponing a decision but said it is a "unique project" which will "position us very well in the walking world." It would become part of a "niche tourism product" - something which would entice a lot more tourists to stay in the county and offer unique views of the coast and farmland.

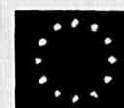
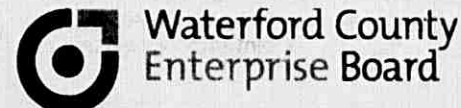

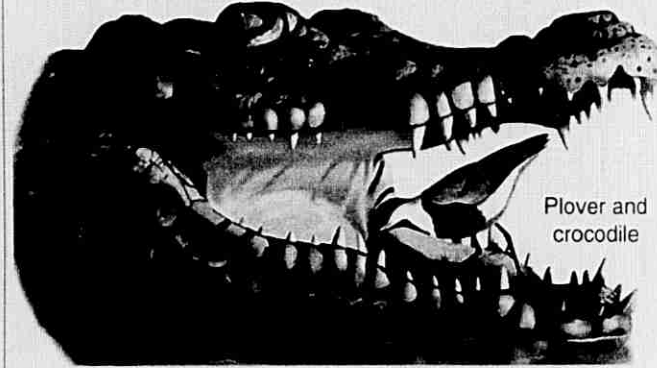
Alligators and Crocodiles

There are 22 species of crocodylians- the family of reptiles that includes alligators, crocodiles, gavials and caimans. All are armour plated, have powerful tails and deadly fangs. Crocodylians eat fish and other creatures, which they catch in their strong jaws. Being good swimmers, they move very fast in the water.

Biggest and smallest crocodiles
The largest member of the crocodile family is the saltwater crocodile of Asia and Australasia. The male averages almost 5m(16ft) long and weighs about 520kg(1150lb) The smallest crocodylian is the dwarf crocodile found in the Congo River of western Africa. This creature is only 1m(3ft) long.

Crocodiles are good mothers
A mother crocodile lays her eggs in a hole, which she then covers with mud. When the babies hatch out, the mother guards them carefully from predators. She picks the babies up gently in her jaws and carries them to the water.

Plovers clean crocodiles teeth
Most creatures keep well away from crocodiles, but plovers have quite a friendly relationship with them. The bird walks all over the crocodile's body, feeding off the leeches that have attached themselves to it. The birds will even go into the crocodile's mouth and peck at food particles on the teeth. Crocodiles benefit from this service and never harm the plovers.

Crocodiles have different heads
There are eight species of caiman living in South and Central America. They look like small alligators and feed on fish, birds and other animals. The gaviol, which lives in the rivers of northern India, looks like a crocodile, but it has a long, narrow snout. It can grow up to 6m(20ft) long but is not generally dangerous to people. It feeds mainly on fish, which it catches by waving its snout from side to side in the water.

Where crocodiles live
There are two species of alligator, both of which are found in North America and China. American alligators are larger than their Chinese cousins and can grow to over 5m(16ft) long. Crocodiles live in Africa, Asia, South America and Australia. The estuarine crocodile is the only member of the family to live in salt water, so it is also called saltwater crocodile- and has often been spotted well out to sea. It is the most fearsome man-eater of the whole family, although the Nile crocodile also has a bad reputation for killing people.

DID YOU KNOW?

The best way to tell a crocodile from an alligator is actually from a distance! (The alligator has a broader, rounder snout.)

Crocodiles cannot seal their mouths underwater, because they have no lips. Instead they have flaps in their throats.)

The East Indian saltwater crocodile, the Nile crocodile and the Orinoco crocodile have been known to dine on humans!

★

Fossils have been found of 108 species of extinct crocodiles.

At Lake Itasy in Madagascar, a proclamation is read to the crocodiles each year warning them that any evil ones will be killed!

According to the famous historian Herodotus, ancient Egyptians kept tame crocodile adorned with jewels!

South East Senior Hockey Champions.

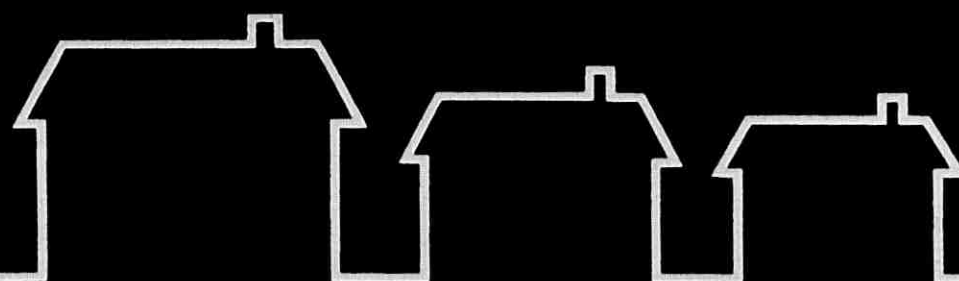

The Copper Coast Geopark - A Story Captured In Stone

A lecture by Sophie Prétesaille

On Wednesday 21st February, Waterford County Museum will host their final lecture of a trilogy which dealt the Heritage and environment of County Waterford. Dominic Berrige, (Waterford County Heritage Officer) kicked off the series which was followed by Joanne Rothwell (Waterford County Archivist). Both these lectures proved to be most successful and generated a great deal of interest. This particular talk promises to be just as interesting it is titled 'The Copper Coast Geopark, a story captured in stone' the lecture deals with one of the most beautiful scenic areas in our County.

Did you know that this part of Ireland was once close to the South Pole, exposed to violent volcanic eruptions? Did you know the area was once a desert, long before the landscape was gouged by glaciers? Well, if not, here's your chance to find out. The lecture will explore the geology of the Copper Coast and also how the local communities got involved to use this fantastic geological heritage to promote the Copper Coast as a tourist destination with a new experience and achieve European Geopark status, endorsed by UNESCO. The lecture will be delivered by Sophie Prétesaille.

Sophie works as a geologist with the Geological Survey of Ireland and is involved in geological heritage, geotourism and public outreach activities. She's been working with the Copper Coast Geopark for the last 2 years in developing educational resources, interpretation and raising awareness of the local geology.

Sophie attends the subject matter with great passion and for those of you who attend this particular lecture...you are in for a real treat. And, as usual, we will have a cup of tea or coffee and a biscuit after the talk and you can meet and chat with Sophie.*

The lecture takes place at the Waterford County Museum on Friary Street Dungarvan (Opposite the Friary Church) at 8pm on Wednesday 21 February.

Bowen Technique

Bowen Technique is probably one of the less well-known forms of therapy available in Ireland today, but it is quickly growing in popularity as more and more people discover how helpful it can be for a variety of problems. In the UK, there are now over 500 registered therapists and the technique has been used by the NHS and in many private clinics. However, there are still only a handful of qualified and registered practitioners in Ireland.

Bowen Technique was originally developed in Australia during the 1950s by Thomas Bowen. The treatment involves performing a series of precise movements on specific points of the person's body. Each group of movements is followed by a break or pause of a few minutes which allows the body time to respond.

The movements themselves consist of a series of gentle rolling gestures over particular muscles, tendons and ligaments, which the practitioner makes using just the fingers and thumbs. This stimulates the nervous system to send messages to the brain about the state of the blood and lymph flow in the area, and about the presence of tension in the muscles and related structures.

The key to the treatment is that, unlike other forms of therapy which attempt to influence the body tissues directly, Bowen technique stimulates the nervous system, which in turn brings about the necessary physiological changes in the body tissues. In other words, it encourages the body to heal itself.

Because of this, Bowen technique tends to work very quickly with many people experiencing significant positive results after just one or two treatments. Anna Corrigan, who practices Bowen Technique at the Lismore Clinic says that "It is a very gentle form of treatment but it can bring about some remarkable results."

"Bowen technique is frequently used to treat problems affecting the tendons and ligaments, such as frozen shoulder, tennis elbow, and back, neck or jaw pain" Anna explains. "However, because it influences the nervous system it can also be very useful in the treatment of more internal problems such as asthma or gastric reflux". She goes on to say that "Since it is a very gentle form of treatment which tends to work quickly, it can be safely tried on many complaints including problems which are quite obscure"

Cllrs To Get 50% Mobile Phone Allowance

Local representatives on County and Town Council's are to get a mobile phone allowance of 50% of their costs up to a maximum of 600 euro in the case of county councillors and 300 euro in the case of town councillors.

The allowance was discussed at the February meeting of Lismore Town Council.

The council is to ask for clarification from the Department of Local Government as to how

the allowance will be worked as there was some confusion over whether bills should be kept for the year, and its implications for those using 'pay as you go' mobiles and landlines.

The allowance is also only to be used in the course of the councillors work, which may be difficult to prove from receipts, according to a number of councillors.

Councillors across the local authority bodies including the councils representative body

the ACCC have constantly highlighted the mounting cost of mobile phone bills incurred by local representatives in the course of their work over the past number of years.

Lismore Town Clerk, Eric Flynn described the allowance as "not before its time."

It will have some financial implications for the local authority, he added, and this will have to be provided for in next years estimates.

Fine Gael councillor, John

Heneghan, meanwhile, suggested that council agendas and other information be sent via e-mail to councillors laptops, which they may be able to purchase in conjunction with the council.

He pointed out that councillors on the county council were provided with laptops to cut down on the amount of paper being used and also in the interest of efficiency. With the cost of laptops falling all the time, the idea would, he said, be viable.

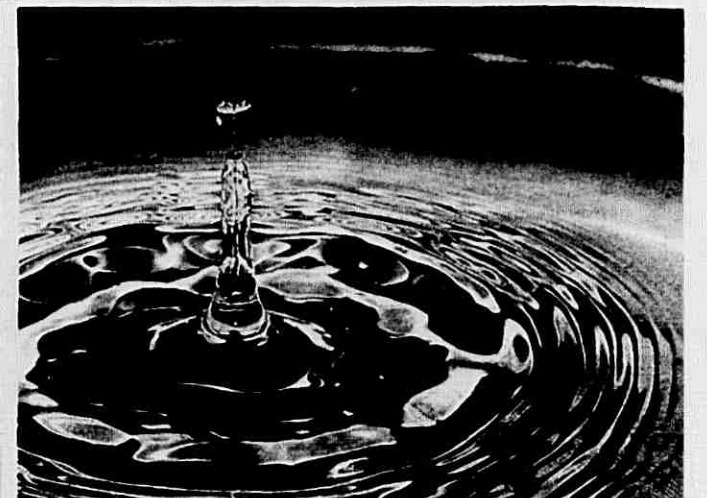

The house purchase maze

Buying a home can be a really exciting, though somewhat daunting task. It takes some degree of organisational skill to work out how much it's all going to cost, find the house you can afford in the location you want, source a solicitor, organise your finances and get to the stage where contracts are signed and keys are exchanged.

In both cases, when making the mortgage decision, there are many choices available to you.

Getting the rate right

Most mortgages are repayment mortgages. Similar to a personal loan, you borrow a certain amount of money and pay it back, plus interest, every month for an agreed period.

Selecting the right rate is always an important decision, as this will determine the amount you repay each month. Bank of Ireland can offer fixed, variable, tracker and split rate mortgages, allowing you to find the one that best fits your lifestyle.

— **Fixed:** Guarantees a set rate for a specific term, for example, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10 or 20 years. This ensures that the monthly repayment remains the same during the fixed rate period. — **Split-Rate:** If you want the certainty of a fixed rate and the money-saving potential of a variable rate, the split-rate may just be the one for you. You can allot your mortgage whichever way you want; for example, 50% at a fixed rate and 50% at a variable rate.

Making your mortgage work for you

Not only is the rate important, but also how you'd like to repay your mortgage. For many, the first few months of being a proud homeowner can be pretty demanding financially. The house may need a lick of paint or a new kitchen altogether, you might have additional transport costs to contend with or you might have some final bills to settle, such as solicitor or estate agents fees.

While selecting a 35 year term lowers the monthly repayments initially, possibly making the monthly cost more manageable in the short term, it does cost more in the long run.

So while you might select a longer term/lower monthly repayment initially, it's worth revisiting your mortgage after about 1 to 2 years, just to see if you can reduce the term and pay off your mortgage at a faster pace.

Pay off your mortgage sooner than you imagined

Reducing your term and increasing your monthly repayment is not the only way of paying off your mortgage sooner. Paying off at a faster rate or making lump sum payments offers you savings on the amount of interest charged and saves you money over the life of the mortgage. If you have a variable rate mortgage and are in a position to make additional payments, the following options may interest you:

— **Index linking:** Allows you to increase your monthly repayments by a percentage of your choice, reducing the interest you are charged. So, for example, if you usually receive a salary increase of about 5% every year, it might be worth index linking your mortgage repayment by the same percentage.

— **Fixed overpayment:** This option allows you to make a specified mortgage repayment each month (made up of your standard mortgage repayment and an overpayment amount). If interest rates increase, the standard mortgage rate will rise accordingly. If you are on a fixed rate, you can pay an additional €65 per month.

— **Lump sum payments:** You may lodge a lump sum to your mortgage account. On a variable rate mortgage, the capital sum may be reduced at any time without penalty.

Local History

Excerpt taken from 'Dungarvan Historic Guide & Town Trail' - available in the Museum:

In the 16th century Dungarvan was attacked several times. In 1525 the Earl of Ormond burned Dungarvan while invading the Earl of Desmond's territory during the Desmond Rebellion. In 1526 Dungarvan was described as 'a great place of resort for English and other fishers'. In 1569 the author Edmund Campion noted 'Dungarvan and Waterford full of traffic with England, France and Spain'. In 1582 most of the buildings in the town were again destroyed by the Irish rebels. As a result of this destruc-

tion the town went into economic decline. The trades of the inhabitants noted in 1583 were mostly unskilled and agriculturally based - e.g. fishermen, yeomen, butchers etc., one goldsmith is mentioned. There was a notable lack of skilled craftsmen and mercantile trades.

Dungarvan received a new Charter of Incorporation as a borough from King James I in 1610. In 1611 Dungarvan was described as 'a poor fishertown of which the chief trade was fish taken there'.

Dungarvan featured prominently in the mid 17th century Civil Wars. In March 1642 Sir William St. Leger, Lord President of Munster, attacked the town and many of the citizens were killed. Soon after, the castle was retaken by the Irish.

Over the next few years Dungarvan became one of the Confederate's (Irish rebels) main ports and ships were sent to Spain and other places for arms and supplies. In 1647 Lord Inchiquin attacked Dungarvan but only recaptured it after a fierce siege lasting several days, which destroyed the town. Sir Philip Perceval commented in 1647 that there were 'no inhabitants or stuff in any of the houses'.

Cromwell reached Dungarvan on December 4th 1649. However, the town had surrendered the day before to Lord Broghill who gave the following account of the event: "The 2nd of this month with a party of 600 horse and 800 foot, I advanced to Dungarvan, where the Lord so ruled their hearts that on the 3rd it was delivered up to me by Colonel Kinsale...there was in the town 6 ordnance, 16 barrels of powder with bullet and match proportionable" Cromwell set up his headquarters in Youghal.

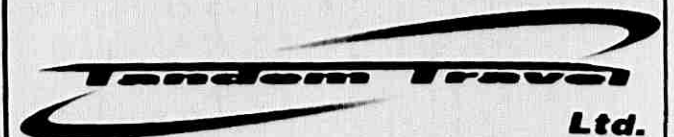

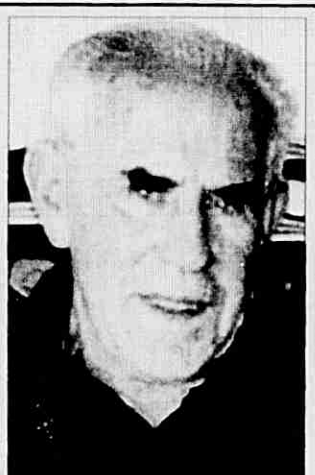

Kenny Throws Down Election Gauntlet On Visit To Cork East

FG LEADER PLEDGES SUPPORT FOR LOCAL BUSINESS AND WORKERS IN LIGHT OF RECENT SETBACKS

The Fine Gael Leader Enda Kenny made a highly successful visit to East Cork last week, visiting local business leaders and members of the public. Mr. Kenny

was visiting the area after local General Election candidate Senator Paul Bradford issued an invitation for him to visit the area in light of recent jobs setbacks for the local community.

Speaking of the coming General Election campaign Mr. Kenny said "I'm absolutely thrilled with the response we're getting in the Cork constituencies. The task in Cork East is clear - if the Government is to be changed then the voters of Cork need to show their commitment to change and vote Fine Gael. Key to this challenge will be the re-election of Paul Bradford to join David Stanton in the next Dáil."

Mr. Kenny met with representatives of the Businesses in Fermoyle, the Mitchelstown Business Association, and the Mallow Chamber of Commerce. He expressed his grave concern at the recent jobs blows inflicted on North Cork, and agreed with them that urgent action is needed in order to attract replacement industries to the area. He also expressed concerns at the high cost pressures facing business over recent years.

Mr. Kenny said: "As with so many other firms that have pulled out of Ireland, FCI Ireland has cited cost pressures from competitors in low cost countries as the cause of the closure. Through a raft of stealth taxes and charges the Government has driven up the cost of doing business in this country and it is Government policy that is forcing people out of work."

Mr. Kenny outlined a series of measures that Fine Gael in Government intend to introduce to boost small business, which he described as "the real engine of employment growth during the Celtic Tiger". Among his pledges were that there would be no increase in corporate or capital taxation; that any rises in

commercial rates would be in line with the rate of inflation; and a pledge that the amount of red-tape and administration faced by small business would be cut by 25%.

Mr. Kenny told local business leaders: "Small business development has been the forgotten child of Irish industrial policy over the last decade. We need an indigenous industrial renaissance, driven by Irish entrepreneurs." The Fine Gael Leader also met with workers from the Mallow Sugar Factory to listen to their concerns. He stressed his support for them and repeated his condemnation at the manner in which Mary Coughlan had dealt with the issue. He also pledged strong support the development of Bio fuels on the site of the sugar factory which Senator Bradford has

proposed as an alternative for workers and farmers alike.

Speaking on the success of the visit, Senator Paul Bradford said: "I am delighted with the reception which Enda Kenny has received here in North Cork. This is his 28th visit to County Cork since his election as Leader of Fine Gael - which shows an incredible commitment to the area on his part. He is in tune with the problems of our community and has pledged to implement the solutions which are so badly needed - particularly in the areas of industry, infrastructure and employment."

"I look forward to welcoming Enda to Cork during the General Election campaign, and again after his election as Taoiseach next summer."

Mr. Quinn said the figure is below that of previous years.

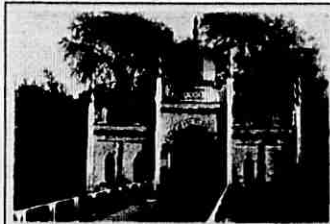

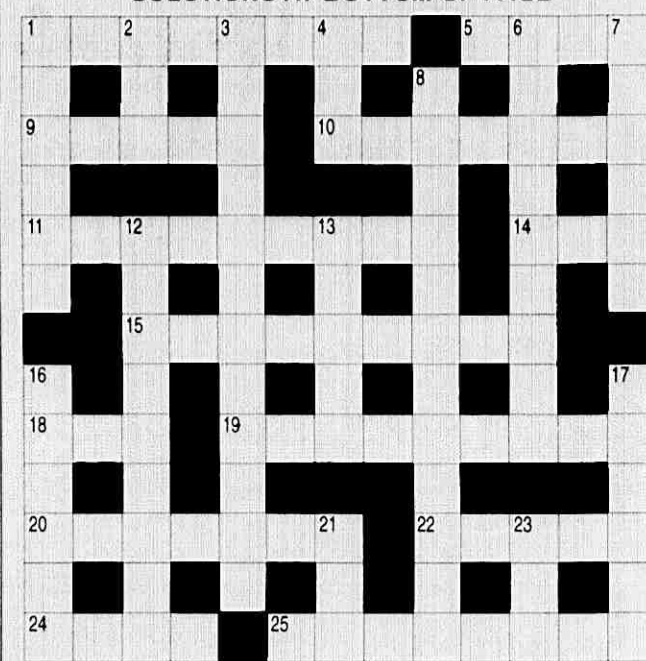

JCSP Awards

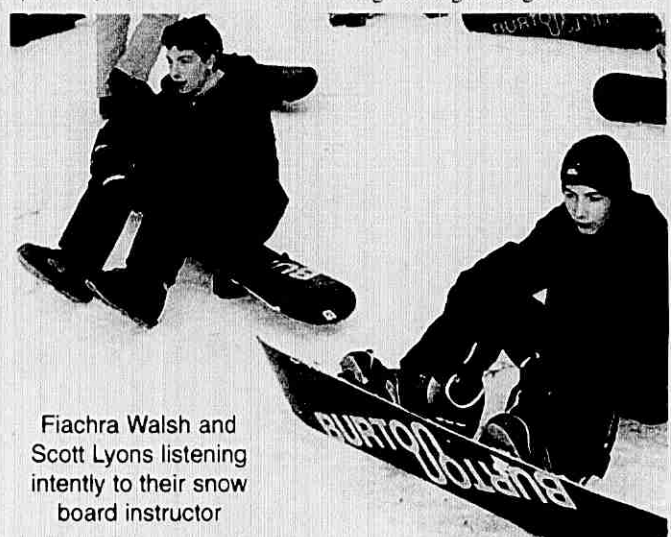

Cllr. John Heneghan also of Fine Gael pointed out that in this an election year "now is the time to ask the questions."

DAVID EARLEY AND KATE VEALE BEST OF YOUNGER ATHLETES

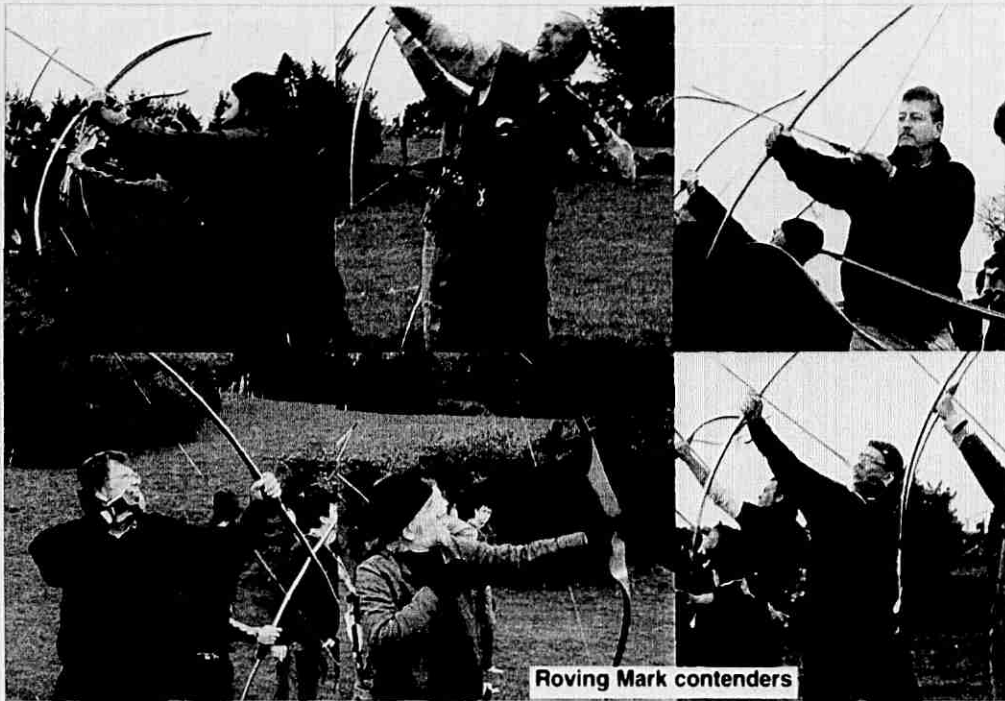

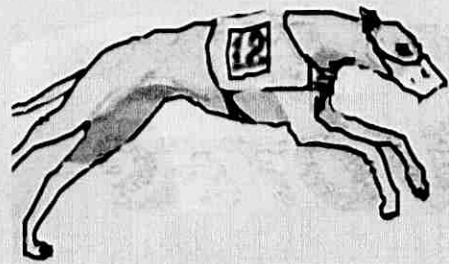

New Official Guides

There was disappointment when the new issues were not available to clubs at the Western Board meeting on Thursday night, but an assurance has been given that they will be available probably within a week.

Clubs should carefully note that an up to date copy of the Club Constitution is included. Clubs will have to amend their copies of the constitution to bring it in line with the new official copy.

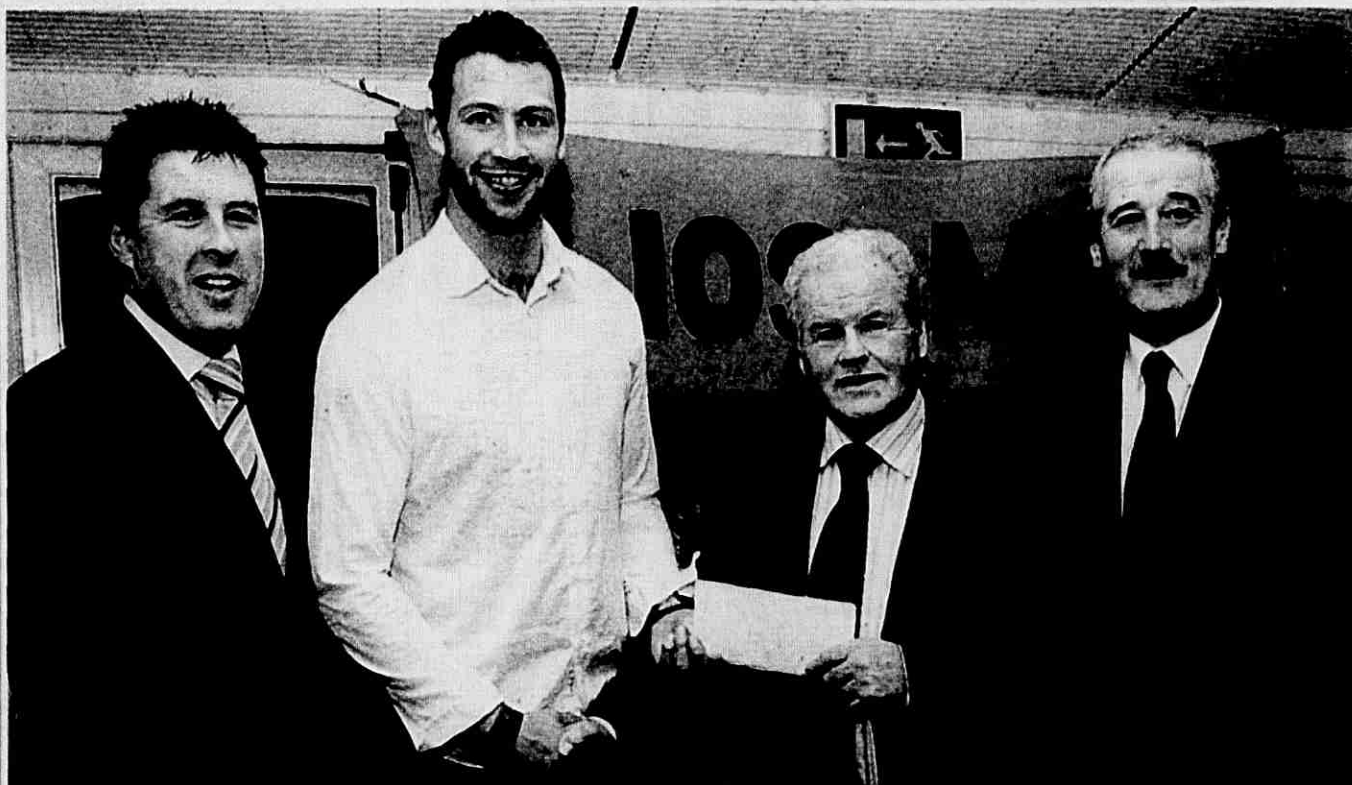
The new and amended Disciplinary code is well outlined in Section 1. There is a whole lot of other very useful information in the Guide.

As the playing rules have not changed since 2005 there are the same as in the previous Official Guide and will not change until 2010. These are in Part 2. Many of the playing rules are not understood by players or club mentors, judging by the way they behave or misbehave in certain circumstances.

An example Page 45 Section 2. 'When a team commits an aggressive foul, the referee may allow play to continue if he considers it to be to the advantage of the offended team. Once he allows play to continue he may not subsequently award a free for that foul.'

This is one of the situations where the referee finds himself in a 'no win' dilemma as offended teams and their officials invariably seek the best of both worlds.

Next week I will publish another rule in which the referee is given an option.

Peter Moloney Takes 14th Pat Noctor Award

Last Friday night, before a capacity crowd in the Assembly Hall of Ard Scoil na nDeise, the Fourteenth Young Sports Star Award for the Pat Noctor Trophy was presented to Peter Moloney, Student of St. Augustine's College whose exploits in the saddle at various Showjumping Arenas around Europe through the course of 2006 made him a most worthy winner of this prestigious award.

The Pat Noctor Trophy, an Award promoted by the Dungarvan District Gardai, is the most coveted prize in West Waterford sport and the name of Peter Moloney is now added to a list of sporting luminaries, some of whom have gone on to major international achievement and have in the process become household names.

The citation declared that Peter, an incredibly gifted horseman, early last year went to Fontainebleu in France and was fourth in the Speed Grand Prix, third in the Grand Prix and then went on to become a pivotal rider in Ireland's famous Nations Cup triumph.

He was second in the International Pony Show in Germany, an outstanding effort that helped him to win the Park Hotel Sport Star of the Month award for July and was also winner of the Park Hotel Grand Prix at his own Dungarvan Show. Some of his later successes included victories at the Kerrygold International Horse Show at the RDS, the National Discovery Pony Final in Millstreet, and the 1'48 title at the National Pony Championships in Mullingar against the best the nation could pit against him. In total he visited the winners enclosure thirty one times in 2006, a quite remarkable statistic that excitingly highlights the enormity of this brilliant young rider's achievement.

It was a decision which had tested the endurance of the Adjudicating panel as they struggled to differentiate between the various achievements, but veterans John A. Murphy, Mary Ashe, Jim Joe Landers and Kieran O'Connor finally came up with a decision which was not only fair and just, but popular among the public.

Outside of the twelve worthy nominees, who had been refined from a panel of forty, those in attendance included the Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Teresa Wright; Cllr. Mary Greene, Mayor of County Waterford; Cllr. Helen O'Sullivan, Mayor of Lismore; Ollie Wilkinson, T.D., Chief Supt Pat Murphy, Supt. Tom O'Grady, G.S., Dungarvan; Insp. Michael Leacy, Serjts. Paul Heffernan, John Molloy, Pauline Sheehan and Oliver Phelan, Dungarvan Garda Station; Garda John O'Dwyer, Chairman of Dungarvan Garda District Social Club; Eddie Fitzpatrick, JLO, who, together with a member of the District Office staff, Nuala Condon, organises the huge event each year.

Also present were the Principals of the local Second Level Colleges; representatives of many local sports organisations; as well as parents, family members and friends of the twelve nominees and many other members of the Gardai of the District. Outside of his role as an adjudicator, Kieran O'Connor of Glanbia and WLR-fm was his usual excellent, effective and efficient self as MC.

Asst. Garda Commissioner, Ray McAndrew, in whose term as District Officer in Dungarvan the Award had been founded was also a welcome guest.

Dungarvan Brass Band had entertained the crowd in the run-up to the presentations and played a fanfare for each of the nominees as they made their way to the stage.

In his address of welcome, Supt. Tom O'Grady said it was his 'privilege and pleasure' to congratulate all twelve finalists for their excellence and achievements at the disciplines in which they participate. He also congratulated the nominees who did not make it to the final twelve, which, he said, was in itself a clear indicator of the very high standards that prevailed.

"It is entirely fitting," he continued, "that the Garda Sioghana should involve itself in a sports awards scheme where all the emphasis is on youth. In today's world, the enormous difficulties and chal-

He extended a special welcome to the late Pat Noctor's wife Judy, her son Ian and wife Jenny whose presence they deeply valued.

Cllr. Teresa Wright congratulated the twelve young nominees and said that they were now 'role models' for their colleagues in their clubs. She paid tribute to their parents and also to their teachers and coaches, most of whom give the young athletes the benefit of their skills on a voluntary basis.

"It is not easy, in the world of today, to get young people out onto a field or track on a cold Sunday morning," she said, "and continue until late Sunday night sometimes with little thanks. As a project worker in Dungarvan, I continually see the great work they do in support of young people and the positive influence they have on them."

Mayor of the County, Cllr. Mary Greene said she was 'absolutely privileged' to attend on what co-incidentally, was a very special weekend in sport and a historic occasion in this country with the playing of a Rugby International in Croke Park for the very first time.

"Our twelve finalists represent a great many sports and what delights me particularly as a woman, is to see the number of young women here this evening who have successfully crossed the boundaries in what typically have been regarded as male preserves, like boxing, soccer and football. All of these young people are pushing out the boundaries and I congratulate them for their enthusiasm, courage and self-belief."

Cllr. Helen O'Sullivan, Mayor of Lismore and the third lady Mayor of the evening, said that all of the finalists have great futures ahead of them, as proven by their commitment to their chosen disciplines.

"All of you are winners so far in your careers," she said. She also congratulated the Gardai and said that West Waterford was indebted to them for 'recognising and acknowledging the achievements of the young stars'.

Chief Supt. Pat Murphy thanked

the Gardai for the opportunity to be at what was a 'prestigious and very influential event'. He said that he was delighted to see the youth and community in general being brought together at events such as this.

"The pleasure of being a Garda is the opportunity to work and make a difference when things are not going right for people. Young people have the opportunity to leave school," he continued, "and go to Garda College, qualify and go back into the community to give back something of real value. Tonight, it is a real pleasure to see the young Gardai in particular working in the community with young people and to come here this evening and see the Civic Leaders, parents and representatives of the families coming together to celebrate the achievements of the youth and of the community."

"I am hugely impressed by what I see and I am very, very proud," he concluded.

On the announcement of the result by Sergt. Paul Heffernan, he was joined by Mrs. Judy Noctor to present the magnificent Pat Noctor Trophy and Crystal piece to Peter Moloney. Speaking on behalf of his family, Ian Noctor thanked the Gardai for the continuing tribute to his father over the past fourteen years, especially Eddie Fitzpatrick, Nuala Condon and "It is always a very proud event for the family," he said, "and we are appreciative of the effort which is put into the Award each year."

Peter Moloney then accepted his award amid loud applause from the capacity attendance, all of whom realised just what efforts and sacrifices he had made, as had all of the young nominees who are champions in their sports.

The twelve young sports people were presented with their commemorative certificates by retired Det. Gda. Mossie Walsh a former Hurling All Star with Waterford and Garda Tammy Hehir, an All Ireland medal winner with Clare in Ladies Football.

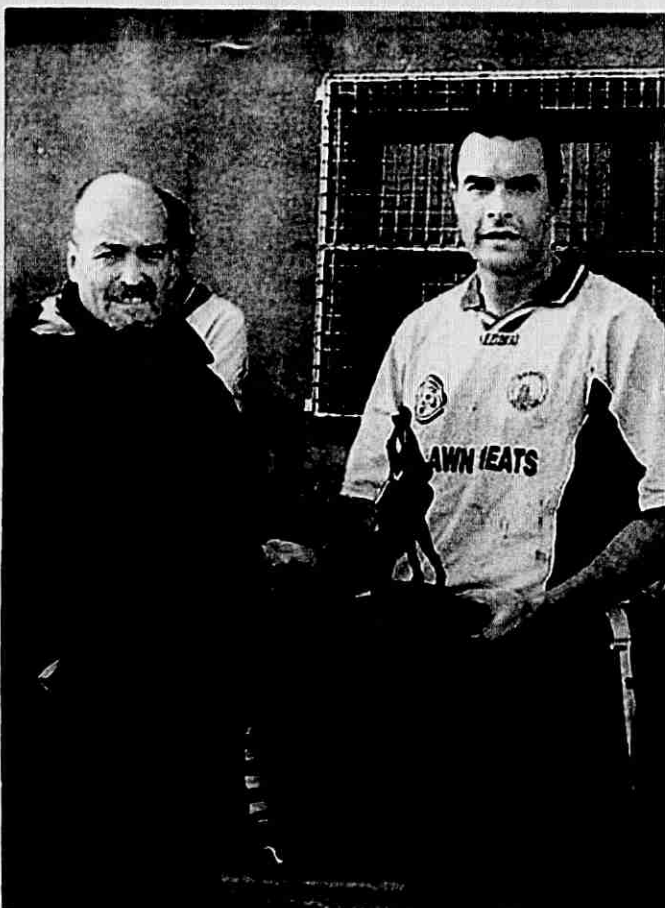

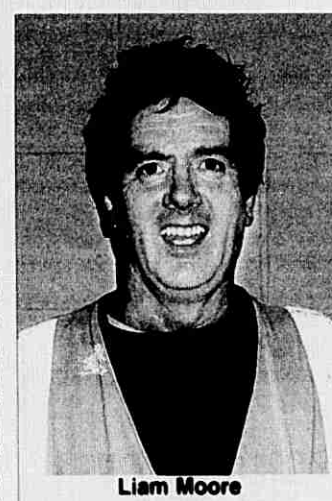

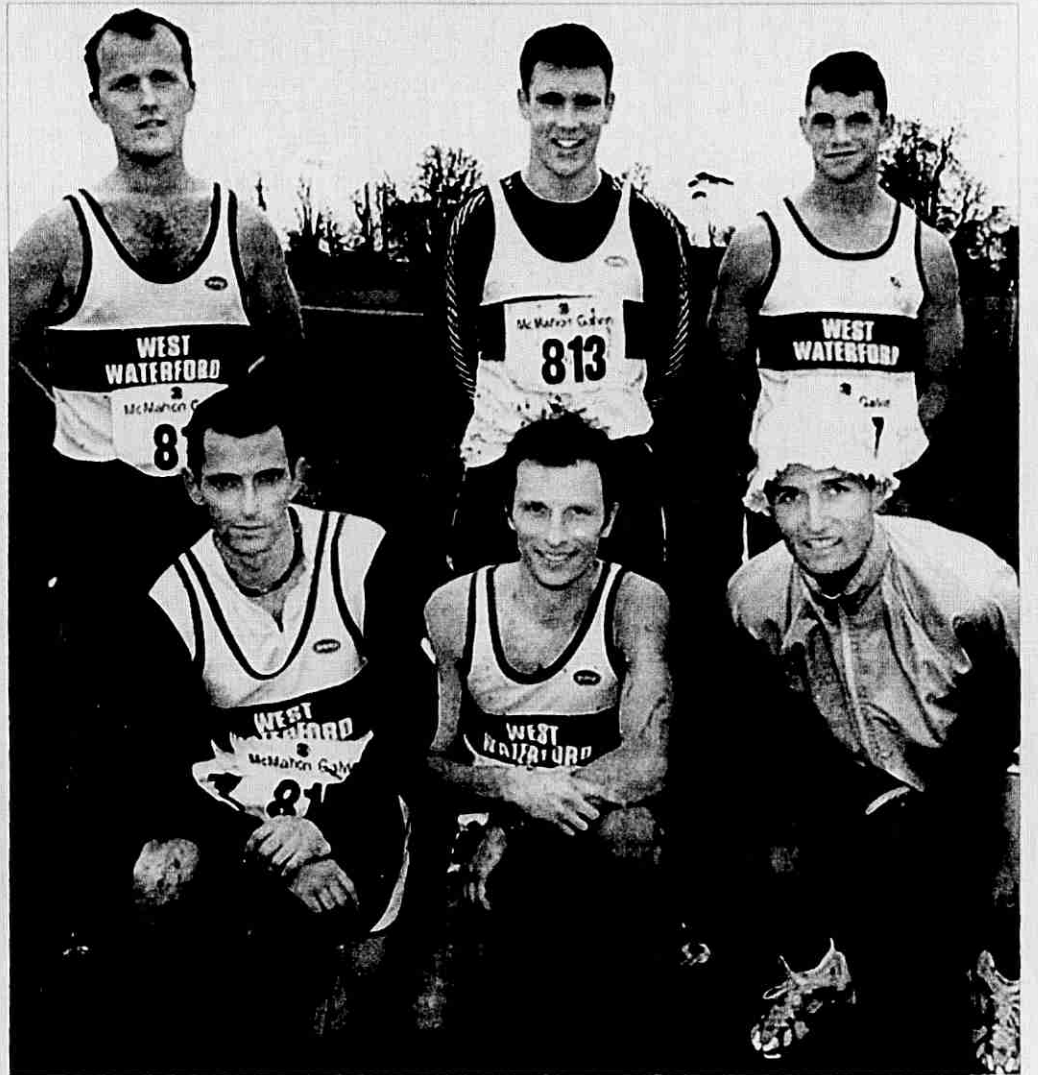

As courses go it is indeed flat and fast — just not as flat as any pancake I've ever seen. A short loop to start with, leads you onto the main loop after about 2 miles. The roads are generally small and picturesque, with a few tight turns and only the two aforementioned hills to contend with. The last quarter of the race leads back into town from the Cork side along flat, well-surfaced roads — just what you need when the lack of cushioning in racing shoes starts to have an effect. There are some nice long flat sections in there, especially along the river at about 6 miles where you can really find a rhythm. Nice course — but that was just driving it — now we had to run!

You may have noticed my report on the Mallow 10' four weeks ago, and now the Dungarvan 10' was the second in the Munster series. I was pleased with 62:05 in Mallow as that race was run off almost no training in November and December. However that excuse was gone as I now had five good training weeks under my belt going into this one. A fast course and perfect weather conditions — bright sunshine, mild breeze, cool air — meant that excuses were few and far between. I targeted a sub-60 finish and planned to run an even paced 6-minute per mile race. Mick on the other hand was just coming off a long, injury-enforced break. His training consisted of about three-weeks slow running with a few testers thrown in. He said his target was 62 or 63 minutes but I knew he wouldn't be happy unless he beat my Mallow time.

About 500 people lined up for the start and under blue skies the race starter asked if we were right. "Off you go so" and the pack surged forward. Throw the plan out the window — I ran the first mile in 5:37. Pure stupidity, way too fast! My normal reaction would be to brake severely at that point and try to hit 6-min pace over the next mile, but I didn't. I recognised one or two people around me and decided that I might be better sticking with the group, reasoning that the pace would probably slow. It slowed a little but we still recorded 5:48 for the second mile. Now it was decision time — slow down to my planned pace or risk a blowout later on. I was feeling good and knew that I was not over working — let's risk it. At this stage I unashamedly ran just behind two or three others and drafted for a few miles. I tried to stay with the group as we moved forward, slowly gaining race positions. The third and fourth splits were 5:58 and 5:48, and on we ran.

At this stage we negotiated a sharp turn of almost 180°, turning back on ourselves and up the first climb. I found that I got up it without blowing a gasket and for the first time I began to entertain thoughts that this was going very well. We descended the drop towards the five-mile marker and I was disappointed to record a 6:21 split. I didn't feel that the hill had slowed us down that much, but I was in good shape having run the first half of the race in 29:31.

A word about the race marshals. They knew what they were at! Each time you came around a corner there were a number of yellow-coated marshals. Typically marshals group together for a chat, occasionally directing a wayward runner left or right — but not these guys. The Dungarvan marshals position themselves such that the first person directs you left or right around the bend. The natural thing for any runner to do is to take the shortest line, which often means you change to the wrong side of the road. The second and third marshals were positioned around the corner guiding everybody safely to the left hand side of the road. You could attempt to run through them or move safely to the left. I choose the left, and so did everybody else. Nice work.

After the halfway point we had a few flat miles. I attempted to move to the front of our group to do

my share of the work (guilt had set in at last) but found that it was a bit of a dogfight with lads vying for the front position. I happily retreated just behind the front two or three and drafted some more. The sixth split was 5:31. I didn't realise it at the time but it's now obvious that the 5-mile marker was not correctly positioned; thus a 6:21 followed by a 5:31. I was working hard to stay with our band of runners at this stage. We followed a river along a nice flat section, running into a mild breeze with the sun shining directly into our faces. Having driven the course, I was preparing myself for the climb ahead. I tried to relax as much as possible. A short rise took us up to a left turn and we were on the Cork-to-Dungarvan road. The climb was not steep but was probably 800m long and enough to sap vital energy out of tired legs. As we each fought our own battles our little group began to break up. One or two runners I had not previously noticed joined us and I dug in.

My strategy here was to ascend as smoothly as possible knowing that the race would really start over the last two miles or so. One guy broke forward on the hill and we let him go (as if I had any choice!). Halfway up I clocked 6:06 at the 7-mile marker. By the time we crested the hill the peloton had reeled back in the brave front-runner. I found myself near the front of the group and was very happy to run on the shoulder of two guys towards the 8-mile mark. A 5:56 split and now I was labouring. Although we were nowhere near the race leaders there was a very tangible competitive spirit here. People were moving to the front, claiming a few inches and fighting for position. I consciously decided to save as much energy as possible and allowed others to fight it out while staying with the group. At one stage the natural path of the race route took the runners ahead of me up onto the footpath. I have a dislike for footpaths and opted to stay on the tarmac. This worked to my advantage when I took the shortest line across a roundabout, while the guys on the path ended up running around the perimeter. Suddenly I was leading the group and this is not a position I'm comfortable with. As soon as I'm at the front of a battle — and this had definitely become a real race — my head starts asking too many questions. Is this too fast? Too slow? Am I making it easy for the others? How far left? I pulled to the side and let a few people through. We reached nine miles with a 5:48 split. I'd like to say I was pleased but I was too knackered to take it in.

And so the last mile. Tiredness was now a bear-on-my-back and I simply tried to keep things going in the knowledge that soon the finishing kick would take over and pain is temporarily cast aside. A Waterford A.C. man by the name of Larry Kennedy moved in front of me and my job became 'stick-with-Larry'. I put everything into staying with him and as we approached the finish line I shot ahead... only to discover I had misjudged the line. The disappointment of this realisation knocked me back and Larry got ahead. We had to negotiate a left turn, with Larry taking the inside line, and a downhill sprint to the finish. I just about had the legs on him and crossed the line in a heap. He graciously shook hands in the finishing tunnel and our race was over. The last mile was a 5:38 split giving me an overall 58:31 finishing time. I was delighted with the time, but it was only when I got home that I realised it was a personal best by 16 seconds (Ballycotton 2004, 58:47).

The usual exhausted banter at the finish line, and Mick came racing in, clocking 60:54. I knew he'd beat my Mallow time! We jogged a few football pitch laps as a cool down and were joined by Lucy Brennan. This was Lucy's fourth win on the trot — Athenry, Tuam, Mallow and Dungarvan — she really is on a roll at the moment. Long may it continue. Reading the West Waterford AC race report I learned that she had obliterated the course record and won by a 4min 42 second margin! Well done Lucy. I missed out on the after-race refreshments as I skipped the showers and headed straight into town for the second half of the rugby. I must have been the smelliest man in the pub, but that didn't dampen my enjoyment as Ireland ran in winners and I celebrated with a pint. I hope it didn't dampen my fellow supporters enjoyment too much. Roll on Ballycotton. No pancakes there either! Race report by Peter Delmer Athenry A.C.

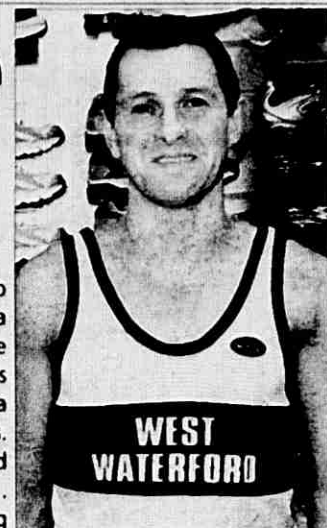

Brendan (Benji) Whelan from Kilmacthomas a member of West Waterford Athletic Club took part last week in the Coastal challenge "Route of Fire" ultra event in Costa Rica Central America all in aid of the Irish Cancer Society. The club and runners of the All Rounder Winter league donated a cheque to the cause on our Charity night in December. Well this week we can report on a most successful trip for the Kilmacthomas dynamo. The Event was a 6-day, 230 km race through Costa Rica, Central America. And was held at night with a 12 midnight starting time because of the extreme heat and even at that the heat was a big factor for the runners With all sorts of terrain including mountains, rainforest, beaches and unused roads. It was run through a highland region with humidity levels reaching 90%, and lowland areas where temperatures may reach 35 DegC. The Race started on February 4th with 68 competitors from 12 countries in the Expedition run as it was called by the organisers most of the competitors would have been experienced ultra distance runners over this kind of terrain where's Benji was attempting this challenge for the first time going into the unknown in many respects.

from Rancho Margot to Tierra Morenas some 65 kms.starting off again at 12 midnight along a vary old abandoned road along by the lake with the volcanos all round then onto one of the big climbs up to Chiripa a serious climb on a dust road over the top before descending down to the lake and on to Tierras Morenas, one of the most difficult days, Benji came through in fighting spirit in a time of 9 hours and 8 minutes moving up two places to 26th overall.

Day three brought the race on the much shorter distance of 20 kms known as a sprint day from Tierra Morenas to Guayabo a pretty flat route on dusty path ways, Benji completed this days competition which started this time at 7 am in 2 hours and 9 minutes and he made a significant move up the leader board when moving from 26th place to 19th overall. Benji was finding his feet and is really into the business end of the event now.

Day 4: Gayabo to Rincon De La Vieja 56 kms, a 12 midnight start. The race starts to descend from the gun into extremely hot and dry conditions this was a most difficult night very very warm but it proved to be a very good leg for Benji who completed the run in 5 hours and 28 minutes. This was the day of the big move for Benji as he came from 19th going into the days run to finishing 3rd on the stage a first podium finish for the Kilmac man. A huge achievement. Could he hold this position with only two days remaining a very tired but confident Benji was hoping for the best.

Day 5 (Transfer to Junquilla): Junquilla to Punta Descartes 40 kms. 12 midnight start, along a stretch of sandy beach where temperatures were again extremely hot despite the night time running, the route then veered inland where it got even hotter and with a big

climb along a traverse towards Punta Descartes. Hard hard going. moving back to 8th overall but an outstanding performance one day to go spirits are high for one last Hurray come on Benji your nearly home what an achievement nothing going to stop the Kilmac kido now.

Day 5 Punta Descartes to Bahia Salinas the final day along remote beaches and old dirt roads but at finish was in sight and the many many months of preparation was needed and worth it. Benji finished with a flurry on the final run in about 2 hrs 15 minutes, what a delight it must have been to finally cross that finish line after 6 days of extreme mental and physical torture. but for an adventures a job satisfactorily completed.

Benji finished in 12th position after the 6 days competition, with one podium finish on day 4, what an achievement considering this was his first attempt at this discipline before. To complete the 6 days was some achievement in itself and to come 12th overall was an added bonus. Not forgetting also the achievement of raising a large sum of money for a very worthy cause it was a case of everyone was a winner. Well-done Benji from all at the club on what was a remarkable achievement, what's next?

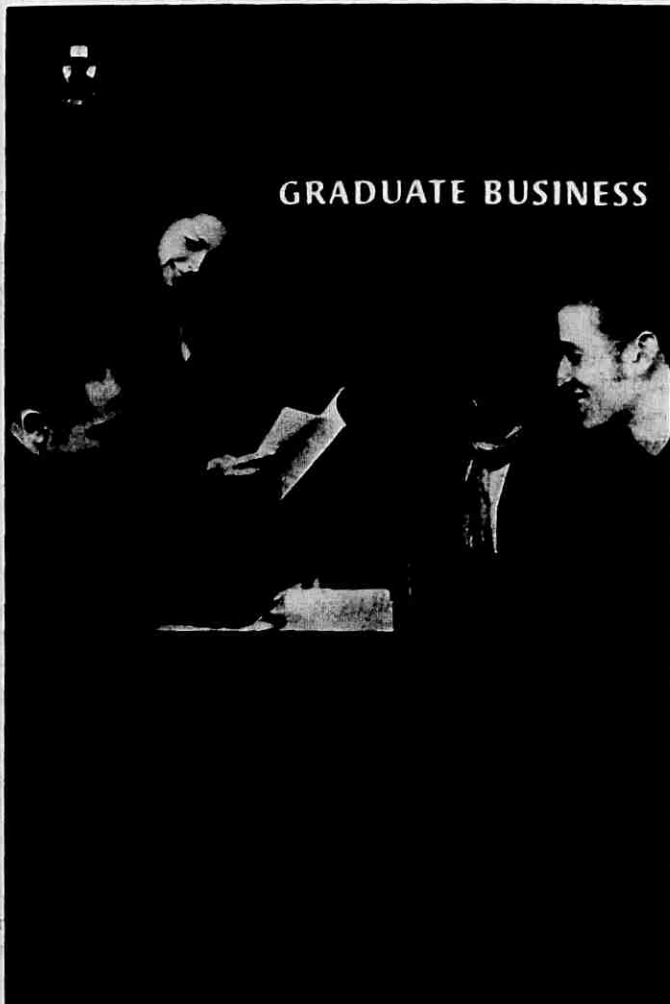

65,000 euro Spent On Heritage Projects

A total of 65,000 euro was spent on heritage projects last year, with the majority of funding coming from the Heritage Council. A report compiled by the council's Heritage Officer, Dominic Berridge for the February meeting of Waterford County Council reveals that the largest slice of funding went towards a wetlands survey.

The survey involved site visits to 21 non-designated wetlands in the county and the preparation of habitat maps, species list, statement of significance of each wetland, and a database.

It found that two wetlands, Monaneena Lake/Bog and Cappagh Lakes/ Wet Woodland were nationally important. A series of other projects including a thatch survey were carried out for the council by the Heritage Officer.

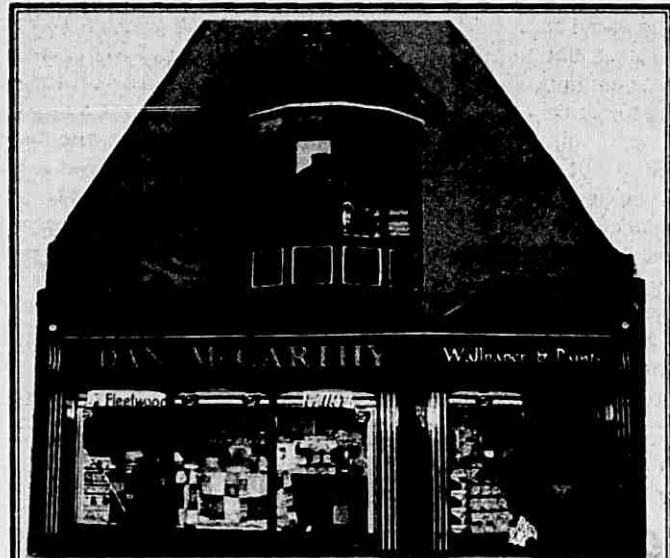
A total of 64,625 euro meanwhile, has also been allocated for this year, which will include an industrial heritage survey (16,500), burial grounds heritage survey (15,000), Village Design Statement for Tallow (16,500), Golden Mile competition (6,200), Local History Course (1,650), Heritage Week events (3,000), Burial Register (1,025) and Comeragh Aerial Maps (4,750).

Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin welcomed the funding for a village design for Tallow, which he hoped would include the removal of the planters from the centre of the town.

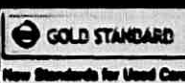
