31 Year Old Man Tragically Killed In Ballinamult

Gardai in Dungarvan are investigating a fatal accident in the Ballinamult area which occurred early on Tuesday (yesterday) morning last.

The fatal single vehicle accident happened close to Toura-neena village, in the Ballinamult area sometime between 2 and 2.30am.

A thirty-one year old male was fatally injured when he lost control of the quad bike he was riding.

The deceased was removed to Waterford Regional Hospital.

Gardai were not releasing details of the mans identity until all his relatives have been informed. They had not all been informed of the mans tragic death at the time of going to press.

The man was not from the locality but was working in the area.

Fire Station In Tallow A "Scandal"

Tallow must "suffer on" with a "sub-standard" fire station after it emerged that no funding has been allocated for it as part of the 2007 fire services capital programme.

A site was identified for a station in the West Waterford town fourteen years ago. But it has been lying idle ever since, resulting in fire fighters working in sub-standard conditions, including using a portakabin as part of the station, while the showers and toilets are inadequate and there is no drying room for gear.

IMMEDIATE ACTION

All the doors in the station must also be opened when the 16 year old fire appliance is started, according to Brian O'Shea TD, the Labour Party spokesman on Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs.

Deputy O'Shea is now calling for immediate action on what he described as the scandal of Tallow fire station.

Deputy O'Shea asked the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government what proposals he has to provide funding for the construction of a new fire station in Tallow, and if he would make a statement on the matter.

UNHAPPY

"I am very unhappy with the response from the Minister of State at the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, Batt O'Keefe TD, who said that approval in principle was granted in 2001 for a new fire station in

Tallow," said Deputy O'Shea.

Minister O'Keefe went on to say that while it has not been possible to provide funding for this station as part of the 2007 fire services capital programme, funding has been provided for various other priority projects in County Waterford since 2001. These include replacement stations and extensions or upgrading works at stations in Ardmore, Cappoquin, Dungarvan, Dunmore East and Tramore.

COLD COMFORT

"That is good news for those five fire stations but it is cold comfort for those who have to work in and depend for a service on the Tallow fire station, which could well claim to be the worst in the country," said Deputy O'Shea.

"A site for the new Tallow fire station has been lying idle for fourteen years, which is





Design Of Kilmacthomas Sewerage Scheme Finalised

COMPLEX CONTRACT SYSTEM MUST BE COMPLETED

Designs for the Kilmacthomas Sewerage Scheme have been completed but under a complex contract process the commissioning of the Waste Water Treatment Plant will not be completed for another four years.

In an update on the status of the Sewerage Scheme by Ray Moloney, Assistant Director of Services with Waterford County Council to Deputy John Deasy, Mr. Moloney said the proposed scheme is part of the Waterford Grouped Towns and Villages Scheme.

EIGHT CONTRACTS

This scheme is split into eight contracts with the first seven contracts for the collection systems in each of the seven towns and villages in the scheme. Contract eight is a Design Build and Operate contract for all seven Waste Water Treatment Plants.

"Currently the design of the Kilmacthomas Collection System has been finalised and the contract documents have been reviewed and are being amended," Mr. Moloney said.

"In order to go to tender, the DEHLG (Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government) must approve a detailed budget cost for the collection system contract.

At present, a first draft of this detailed budget cost has been submitted to Waterford County Council by our consultants and our project team are reviewing it.

REVIEW

"Once this review is complete, it will be returned to our consultants for amendments. Once amended it will be forwarded to the DEHLG for approval. This approval may take 2-3 months.

"When the approval of the detailed budget has been received, we will then go to tender for the scheme. We would expect to award the contract within 4-5 months from the date of tender advertisement. The construction contract duration," Mr. Moloney added, "is expected to be eighteen months."

COMPLEX

The Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) contract is even more complex, and more approvals must be gained from the Department and the Public Benchmarking Sector.

Mr. Moloney said: "We have reached agreement to purchase the site in Kilmacthomas and draft contracts of sale are awaited from the vendor. The seven treatment plants will be constructed on a staggered basis, but the construction and

commissioning period for the entire contract is two years - that is all seven WWTPs will be fully operational within two years of the date the first plant commences construction."

Lisfennel Road Completely Unpassable

The Lisfennel road from Dungarvan GAA pitch to the GSK OTC plant was completely unpassable in a car after a recent downpour, Dungarvan Town Council heard.

The road, long described as one of the worst in the urban area, was again the subject of complaints at the February meeting.

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan said something needs to be done as soon as possible.

"The road surface is extremely poor," he added. "It needs to be completely resurfaced. You couldn't get through in a car."

Tom Rodgers, Town Engineer, said the road is included in this year's Capital programme.

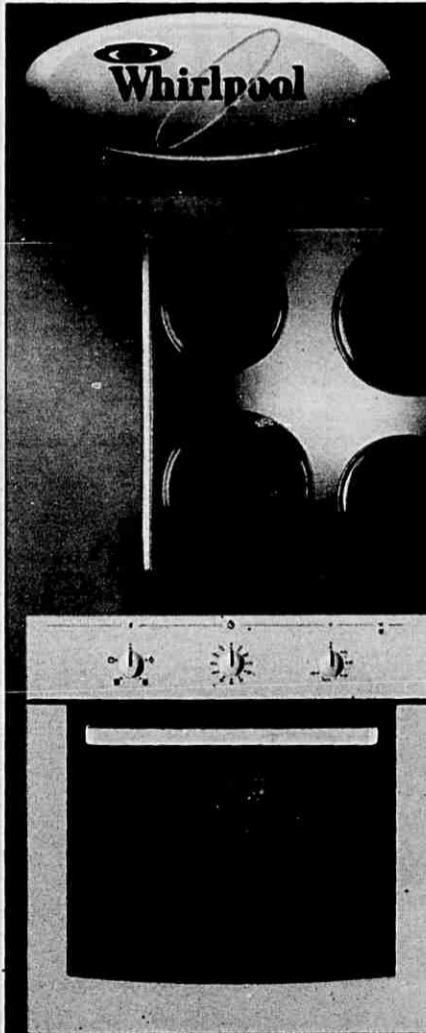

Deasy Sends Pensions Booklet To County Households

Are You One Of The Million People Without A Pension Plan?

If you are someone who has made no provision for a pension plan and are worried about the future Deputy John Deasy has just published a Pensions and Benefits booklet which explains what you're entitled to from the State.

The 12-page booklet describes the different types of State pensions available and provides information on how to contact relevant Government departments. It also lists various benefit schemes that you may be entitled to.

John Deasy is distributing the booklet into every household

throughout the City and County and said, "What I've noticed is that there are thousands of people who haven't got around to arranging any kind of pension and have no idea where to start. It's a complex area so I've tried to simplify the State pensions and benefits so that people will know who to call at the very least. It's not intended to serve as a definitive source for pension and benefits. Its purpose is purely to act as an aid for people who wish to seek further information about these matters which can be really complicated."

Recent reports from pension groups have indicated that up to one million adults have no pension arrangements made. Because so many people are in this situation, some of these pension groups have called for a mandatory State pension regime to be put in place.

John Deasy said, "The scale of the problem is enormous and people are now thinking about providing State pensions automatically, but that could be years away. For now, people still have to figure it out themselves and this booklet should provide them

with some of the basic detail necessary."

The booklet also includes information about the household benefits package, housing grants, the fuel allowance, bereavement grants, travel benefits and treatment benefits.

DEVELOPMENT OF RING BUSINESS CENTRE ON TRACK

Further verification of Údarás na Gaeltachta's plan to build a Business Development facility at its land at Baile na nGall, Ring and it's sequencing in the authority's Capital Plan for 2007 and 2008 has been welcomed by Ring-Old Parish representative Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair.

In relation to it's Munster Gaeltachtaí, the Údarás has agreed on projects totalling €14 million for it's Capital Plan for the period involved. According to Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, the Board will have an opportunity in coming months to agree a specific budget for the Centre in Ring - which will be the first phase in utilising 9 acres of land owned by the Údarás at Baile na nGall and a

further 3 acres at Barra na Stuaic in Old Parish.

Speaking at the monthly Board meeting of the Údarás at Coláiste na Rinne on Friday February 23rd last, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

"According to a Report before us at the Board meeting, the planning application has been prepared for the two storey building enabled to house various small enterprises at Baile na nGall. All going well, the Report informs us that the appointment of a Contractor will be addressed in June and the following weeks set as a possible date for initiating the construction. As things stand, and subject to planning, April 2008 has been cited as the desired completion date".

"Getting things moving on either or both of the sites in Ring or Old Parish - in addition to some Community Development priorities - has been a goal of mine since first elected to the Údarás. This belated initiative is good news, in terms of innovation and job creation, for this Gaeltacht and is but the starting point of several other possibilities for both lands in question".

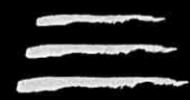

26th Annual West Waterford Drama Festival

Last year, West Waterford celebrated its silver jubilee as a drama festival and rightly gave full vent to marking the anniversary. Over that twenty five years, the Ballyduff-based festival had raised the bar high time and has set new standards for what a drama festival should be. Little surprise that it currently holds the honour of being voted, by competing groups, as the Best Amateur Drama Festival in Ireland, north or south.

Now, in its second quarter of a century, it enters uncharted waters. Many rural communities are struggling to keep their economic and social heads above water, not to mind their cultural ones. Volunteerism is harder to come by and many people access leisure and cultural pursuits in a much more lazy way than going to the theatre. We have become a sedentary, sophisticated nation which likes its TV, its DVDs, its PCs and its BBQs - but also allows, almost encourages, a grow-

ing isolation from community.

The only things which will counteract such a scenario of cultural carelessness are excellence and innovation - two attributes which West Waterford Drama Festival believes in absolutely. And that is the guarantee for the next 25 years. That, in as much as is possible, the festival will provide access to the very best of Irish amateur theatre for the people of West Waterford and East Cork, and will do so in a way that is creative, innovative and challenging.

So what about this year's festival? The one which opens on Thursday, March 8th and runs until Sunday, March 18th. The one which has five absolutely new plays never previously seen by Ballyduff audiences, the one which has groups from Cork, Limerick, Waterford, Tipperary, Wexford, Kildare and Louth?

Well, included, for a start, in the Open competition, are both the winners and runners-up from last year's All-Ireland - Kilmeen from West Cork and Silken Thomas from Kildare, two brilliantly creative groups. Silken Thomas will relish the opportunity for revenge! Back in the fold after a number of years' absence from the circuit are Anvil and Haulbowline. In the 1980's they had huge successes at the Festival. In the meantime, their personnel will have changed, their level of ambition will not.

There are comedies, tragedies, real-life dramas and thrillers. American, British, Irish and European plays - classic and modern.

"Moll" might be the only absolute comedy but "The Kings of the Kilburn High Road", "The Beauty Queen" and "The Memory of Water" have all significant comical components. The very best of Irish playwrights from John B. Keane to Brian Friel are represented. One very interesting work could be the Dundalk play written by Eugene O'Brien, author of the very popular "Pure Mule" series. This play won the Irish Times "Best New Play" award a couple of years back and now appears on the amateur circuit. On a personal level, I have to admit that "Kilburn High Road" is one of my favourite plays ever. Liam Howard's gang will give this a real go. And inside in the middle of it all, the festival offers an "Exorcism". Keep your crucifixes close at hand and, as Bill Canning would have said: "Keep the Faith".

So faith, hope and charity it is, then. We believe that we have an excellent line-up of both plays and groups; we hope that this year will be at least as good as any of the previous twenty five and, in truth, ticket prices are set so as to encourage everybody's attendance, especially the attendance of a growing number of younger people.

Maintenance of Farm Fencing a Matter for Landowners

A call on Waterford County Council to replace all damaged and rotting post and rail fences in country areas where landowners co-operated with the council in the removal of boundary ditches for the provision of site lines and road safety would create a precedent that could see the council flooded with requests from across the county.

Fine Gael councillor, Declan Doocey made the request as part of a notice of motion at the February meeting of Waterford County Council.

He said landowners in the 60's and 70's voluntarily co-operated in the removal of boundary hedges for the benefit of road safety. Now those fences and rails are rotting and need to be replaced and maintained. He said the council should carry out this work.

However, County Engineer, John O'Flynn said that the replacement of fence posts was a matter for the landowner. There was no agreement, he added, for the council to maintain these fences forever.

On national roads, the NRA is responsible for their upkeep, but landowners are responsible in the case of non-national roads, he said. Landowners are required to keep their stock in. He went on to say that the landowners were compensated in part for the removal of their boundary hedges, but if the Cllr. Doocey's proposal was to go through it would create a precedent that would close down entire road projects due to its cost. Where fences are on council owned property, however, they will be maintained.

SHUTTERS MAY COME DOWN ON ABBEYSIDE BUSINESSES

The sight of shutters coming down on one of the most attractive thoroughfares through Abbeyside, the Causeway, may be looming closely on the horizon if the type of anti-social behaviour witnessed in the area in the past few weeks continues unabated.

Thousands of euro worth of damage in broken windows and smashed doors was inflicted on Enrichts EUROSPAR and Kelly's Pharmacy in the past few weeks.

Viewpoint would be very disappointed at such a vista, but the businesses are determined - whatever the council may say on the matter - that shutters may have to be introduced if nothing is done to sort out the problem, as they can't continually sustain the level of damaged involved.

It's part of a wider anti-social behaviour problem in the Dungarvan area. Not least of these has been the sort of outright menacing thuggery the residents of Kyne Park have lived with for too long.

Trees being burned, bonfires and wild parties on the railway tracks near Abbeyside bridge are an increasingly regular occurrence. And let's face stark facts here. It will only get worse as the long summer evenings approach.

It's an unenviable situation, and an all too real one, facing the residents of Kyne Park - some of whom are so upset and sick of the almost nightly disturbances they are ready to up sticks and leave.

A petition, signed by up to 200 people, was handed into Waterford County Council, signalling publicly the desperation of the people there - who just wish to live their lives in peace - to bring this ongoing and long standing problem to a head.

The council is, it has to be acknowledged, doing everything in its power to bring about a solution from its end. The overgrown shrubbery in the area is to be removed - at long last some might say - hopefully cutting off the screening exploited by those engaged in these activities.

Residents also wish for a wall to be built blocking off the track from the estate.

With the new Railway Walk, Waterford County Council's much anticipated 30km walk from Dungarvan to Waterford, expected to be given the full steam ahead at next month's meeting, it is incumbent on them to ensure that this resource is used properly and is maintained to discourage the type of activity endured by the people of Kyne Park.

It's also up to the Gardai to flex their collective muscles in dealing with anti-social behaviour once and for all. It may never be possible to stamp out individual incidents of this type of criminal thuggery.

But surely, where hot-spots are well-known, proper high-profile and regular policing would quickly stamp it out in areas like the Causeway and Kyne Park where businesses and residents are now crying enough!

SENSIBLE COMPROMISE NEEDED ON HEALTH & SAFETY

The situation where diligent council employees are being prevented from doing their jobs to the best of their abilities and in an adequate amount of time to do their work safely is plainly taking on ludicrous proportions.

Without question, Health and Safety at work is of the utmost importance. We've seen that all too clearly in the number of accidents that have happened in other local authority areas. In fact, in one case in Kerry, a council worker was knocked down and killed.

But, a compromise between taking the rigorous guidelines set down by the Health and Safety Authority seriously, and bringing it to a situation where, as Labour councillor Billy Kyne said, employees feel their capability to work is being hindered, is of optimum importance.

This is not what we've seen in evidence so far though. Far from it in fact. In Walton's Park, work was delayed for several months due to the Health & Safety guidelines, and more of the same is expected to follow in several other areas.

It's hard to disagree with the County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer's assessment that costs are set to go up, and delays in work being delivered are set to follow. But, Viewpoint would like to see a situation where those employees, whose record in the health and safety field is unquestionable, being consulted more on the manner in which these guidelines are currently being rolled out.

OLD CINEMA BECOMING INCREASINGLY DELAPIDATED

For veteran cinema goers and indeed for anyone who has spent part of their youth going to the former Ormonde Cinema on O'Connell Street, it's present state as an eyesore, with its smashed and boarded up windows is a very sad situation indeed.

A major development was planned for the site, but with opposition from local residents, and due to the scale of the development itself, An Bord Pleanala knocked the plans on the head. Now the current owner is having difficulty selling the site, due to the zoning, which was changed from Town Centre uses to Residential - a problem the town council surely must have foresaw happening when drafting up the town development plan.

The demolition of the once landmark site for housing now looks the most likely option, and given the prime location close to the heart of Dungarvan, this shouldn't, in the long term at least, prove too difficult to achieve. Sad to say though, that while several homes will no doubt be able to be built on it, the prime site will not, however, be the home of new jobs and new commercial enterprises for the town as it once looked likely to be, and may have been with good planning and a little foresight.

Bord Pleanala Refuse 82 Houses For Lismore

Decision A Disappointment Says Cllr. Wilkinson

An Bord Pleanala has refused planning permission for a major housing development planned for Lismore.

Blackwater Properties were planning to construct an 82 house development consisting of six 5 bedroom detached, eight 4 bedroom detached, ten 4 bedroom semi-detached, twenty-four 3 bedroom semi-detached, twenty-eight 3 bedroom townhouses, five 2 bedroom sheltered single storey terraced and one 3 bedroom bungalow at Townspark East in Lismore.

The development had been granted planning permission

after a long stretched out planning phase that lasted almost two years. But the decision was appealed by a number of residents primarily from the South Mall area of the West Waterford town.

RULING

An Bord Pleanala ruled that it did not consider the extraction and treatment of water from wells on the site could provide a sufficient and secure water supply to serve the proposed housing estate, and would therefore be premature.

It also ruled that there is an "unacceptably high risk" of failure associated with the proposal to drain foul effluent

from the development via a pumping station and to dispose of surface runoff on the site using a proprietary storm water system and would therefore be prejudicial to public health.

And thirdly, the Bord ruled that having regard to the location of the site in Lismore, a place of distinctive architectural character, it is considered that the development as proposed, by reason of its design and suburban type layout would fail to be of sufficient quality in this context and would therefore be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.

DISAPPOINTMENT

However, the decision was greeted with disappointment by local Fianna Fail councillor, Kevin Wilkinson.

"I think they got this decision wrong in this particular case and the solution that Waterford County Council had for these problems were well agreed and would have been suitable," he said.

"The amount of affordable housing that would have been created by this development -

you would have had 16 or 17 local people who would have had the opportunity to buy and live in their own area at a reduced cost and I think the board should have taken that into consideration.

"There's an awful lot of disappointment expressed to me by people who were waiting and who were showing a keen interest especially in the affordable side of things.

COST OF HOUSING

He said all this decision has done is to drive up the cost of houses in Lismore.

He added: "Blackwater Properties are not 350,000 euro development houses. They're mid-range houses. They're high quality housing and they appeal to middle income people. And that's what makes this particularly disappointing."

"I wouldn't be going as far as to be calling for An Bord Pleanala to be disbanded. Nor would I be calling for objectors not to be given an opportunity to object to a development. But, I really do think, the Board should come down on what's good for the overall people rather than for a minority."

New Consultations Over Multi-Million Development To Delay Decision

New consultations between the developers of a proposed multi-million euro mixed retail, office and residential development and a person who made an observation to the planning process, are set to delay a decision by the planning authority for a month.

A decision was due on the development, planned by Andy Hally for a section of wasteland opposite Dunnes Stores, between the SGC cinema and Tom Curran Builders Suppliers.

However, an observation was made by a member of the public, and consultations between the two parties are understood to be ongoing.

The member of the public made it expressly clear that he was not making an objection, but that he had concerns over

rights of way and access.

"The developers hope that these issues can be resolved," Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty informed a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council.

It's understood that the developers sought and were granted an extension of time for the consultations to take place. It had been feared that the issue may have gone on to An Bord Pleanala.

Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair questioned whether the 380 car parking spaces, which he said is a significant number, would have an impact on the planning for Grattan Square.

However, Mr. O'Flaherty said the car spaces would be needed for the development itself.

scandalous in itself," said Deputy O'Shea. "I understand that part of the station is in a Portakabin; I am told that the toilets and showers are inadequate and that there is no drying room for gear. The heating system is also inadequate and does not heat the station properly.

NOT ACCEPTABLE

"I understand that all doors in the station have to be opened when the fire appliance, now 16 years old, is started. This is just not acceptable," said Deputy O'Shea.

"The Tallow area has had a number of new housing estates constructed in recent years and the area covered by the fire brigade has an oil depot, a factory and seven schools. It needs a proper fire station and it is about time that one was provided," concluded Deputy O'Shea.

Roads Surfacing And Footpaths In Roadworks Programme

A series of roads in Dungarvan will be surfaced, have footpaths restored or may have their layouts changed as part of a 380,000 euro Roadworks Programme for 2007, according to Town Engineer, Tom Rodgers who was speaking during a recent meeting of the Town Council.

A section of road at Springfield, Western Bay as far as Bayview, half of Thomas's Street, a section of the Monang road and a further section at Pinewood Lawn will all be surfaced in the coming year.

Footpaths at Springfield, Western Bay, Congress Villas, St. Brigid Street, Murphy Place and Strandside South will all be restored during the year as well.

Meanwhile, footpaths in Mary's Street, and works in Congress Villas, Mountain View and Fitzgeralds Terrace will all be looked at over the course of 2007.

Larger works, including extending the works in front of the Town Park down along Borrenatra, works on the road in front of the County Council offices at Davitts Quay, changing the layout of the road after the slipway at Strandside South, and completing the Monang Road are all also included in the 2007 Roadworks Programme presented to the council.

A proposal for the dangerous turn from the Shopping Centre road connecting onto O'Connell Street was also put forward. Mr. Rodgers said the plan was to build out the curbs at the New Images and Walsh's Corner sides to allow traffic a greater view. This would require the loading bay in front of Walsh's to be moved down the street as well as a disabled space.

Moving the parking spaces, Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Teresa Wright said, was going to be a problem.

However, Labour councillor, Billy Kyne said safety was the priority in dealing with the issue.

€700,000 Raised For New Enterprise Centre

Over 700,000 euro has now been raised for a proposed new Enterprise Centre expected to attract new investment into Dungarvan, Fergal Reidy, Business Development Officer told a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council.

Mr. Reidy, who was giving an update on the Invest in Waterford initiative launched in the Clonea Strand Hotel last year, said there were also 210,000 hits on the Work in Waterford website so far - which equates to 83 hits per hour.

There are now 211 skills registered on the website, he added.

CHALLENGE

He said there is now a clear challenge to keep up the interest. Over the Christmas period, the Work in Waterford initiative ran ads on national and local radio stations, which had proven successful.

Now they hope to make the

website more interactive. Eighty percent of those who had logged on were under the age of 40.

A closer breakdown of the figures shows 48% of those logging on came from Waterford, with 52% coming from outside the county boundary. A total of 69% went on to third or fourth level education, while 62% had a 3rd level degree, making it an attractive available workforce for any outside investor or business already in the county hoping to expand.

Bord Gais also plan to bring a natural gas pipeline to Dungarvan from Youghal, with the town pinpointed as one of the Phase 2 towns in the natural gas plans.

COMPETITION

The business space competition run by Billy Clancy in conjunction with the Invest in Waterford Initiative has also brought some high profile applicants.

Mr. Reidy said a number of industries, mainly local service providers, have expressed an interest in expanding their enterprises in Dungarvan, which would be an achievement.

Answering a question from Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan as to the interaction with the IDA and Enterprise Ireland, Mr. Reidy said he has met both agencies on a number of occasions.

"There is a lot of liaison with the key agencies," he added.

BIO PIN

The apparently stalled progress of the German paint firm, Bio Pin was raised by Labour councillor, Billy Kyne,

who asked what was the current position.

Mr. Reidy said: "It is important to see Bio Pin advance as quickly as possible. Beyond that I wouldn't really like to comment on it at this time."

ADVERTISING

Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan questioned whether enough is being done to advertise the town to medium and large industries.

Mr. Reidy said this was being done. They have received coverage in the Business and Finance magazine and the Irish Independent and Irish Examiner among other national publications.

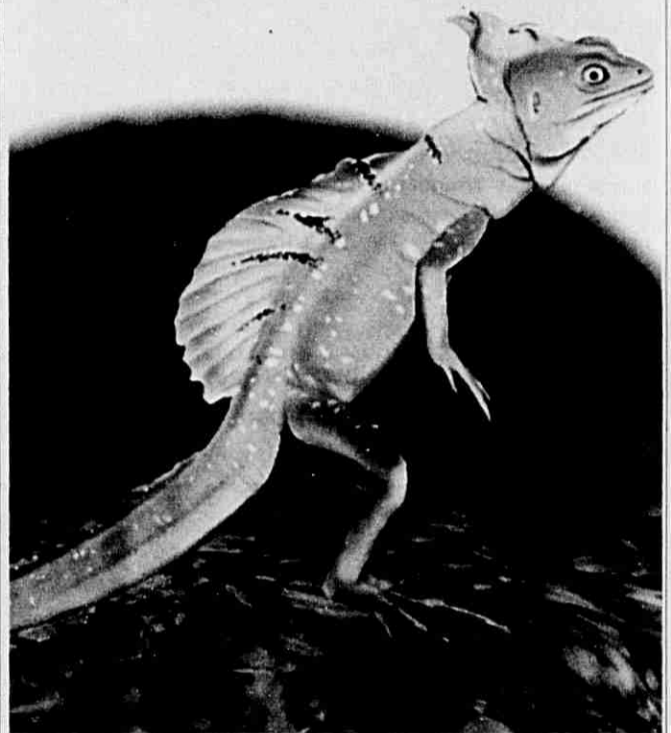

LIZARDS

There are about 3,750 species of lizard ranging in length from small geckos just a few millimetres long, to the Salvadori monitor of Papua, New Guinea, which can be up to 4.75m (15ft 7in) in length. Lizards are found in most parts of the world. Many live in deserts but some live near water; and are excellent swimmers. Most lizards have legs, but there are some that have no legs and look like snakes.

Skinks Are The Commonest Lizards

With some 600 different species, skinks are the commonest of all the lizards in the world. Most skinks are found in tropical Africa and Asia, although there are others to be found in Australia, Europe and North and South America.



Lizards' Tails Can Grow Again

If a predator grabs a lizard by its tail, the tails snaps off and the lizard makes its escape. A new tail grows in the old one's place.

Lizards Perform Tricks

The chameleon can change its colour to merge with its surroundings. The gecko has special pads on its feet which enable it to walk up walls and even upside-down on ceilings. Some lizards, such as the flying dragon does not really fly but it can glide for 20m (66ft) or more to escape danger. It has a flap of loose skin on each side of its body, which can be opened to form a pair of 'wings'.

Lizards Can Run On Tiptoe

Several lizards can raise themselves up on their hind legs to run for short distance. The sand monitor, or goanna, of Australia, can run so fast on its toes that it is nicknamed the racehorse goanna. The basilisk lizard of South America can even run across the surface of water for short distances, at a top speed of around 8kph (5mph), to escape from predators.

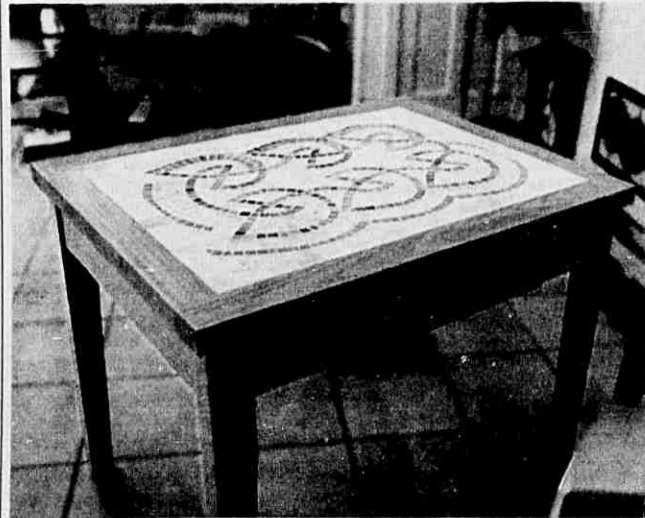

Cllr Coffey Welcomes Radon Gas Survey of All Council Housing Stock Pre-1998 in Co. Waterford

Cllr Paudie Coffey welcomes the fact that Waterford County Council are about to test all of its pre-1998 houses for Radon Gas levels and a sample of houses thereafter. The testing has been approved by the Department of the Environment and Local Government following a request by Waterford County Council which was instigated by Cllr Coffey who is Chairman of the Councils Policy Committee on Housing and Emergency Services.

All houses, since the introduction of the Building Regulations 1998 should have Radon Barriers installed in their floors to prevent the ingress of the gas into living spaces.

"Radon Gas is a naturally occurring colourless, odourless radioactive gas that can accumulate in enclosed spaces and could lead to lung damage and cancer in humans in later life. It is a gas that is listed as a Group 1 carcinogen (cancer causing agent) by the World Health Organisation.

The Eastern part of County Waterford has been identified by the Radiological Protection Institute of Ireland as having high levels of Radon Gas in its sub-soil and it is therefore a matter of grave concern in this area" says Cllr Coffey.

A grant of €40,000 has been acquired by the Council to carry out tests in approximately 500 Council Houses across the entire County and a report will then be produced recommending remedial measures to deal with the problem where required. Radon Detectors will be placed in the houses for a period of 3 months or so to record the gas levels present and will then be collected and analysed.

Cllr Coffey has been informed by the Council that testing will commence in the next few weeks.

Cllr Coffey is also calling on Waterford City Council to carry out a survey on its own housing stock to establish the levels of radon gas in the houses and establish what remedial measures are required.

"This is a welcome development but is long overdue, the gas has serious potential Health risks and the issue requires urgent attention by those in authority, in fact, I strongly recommend that all householders living in houses built pre-1998, both public and private, should ensure that a radon test is carried out in their homes.

The Department of the Environment should, without delay, make grants available to all householders for remedial measures where high levels of radon gas have been identified in their houses.

This is too serious a Health issue to be neglected and the public need to know more about the problem and have financial assistance made available to help them where needed" stated Paudie Coffey.

The magnificent Hamper of cosmetics sponsored by Murray's Pharmacy was won by Eileen Walsh, Kilrossanty.



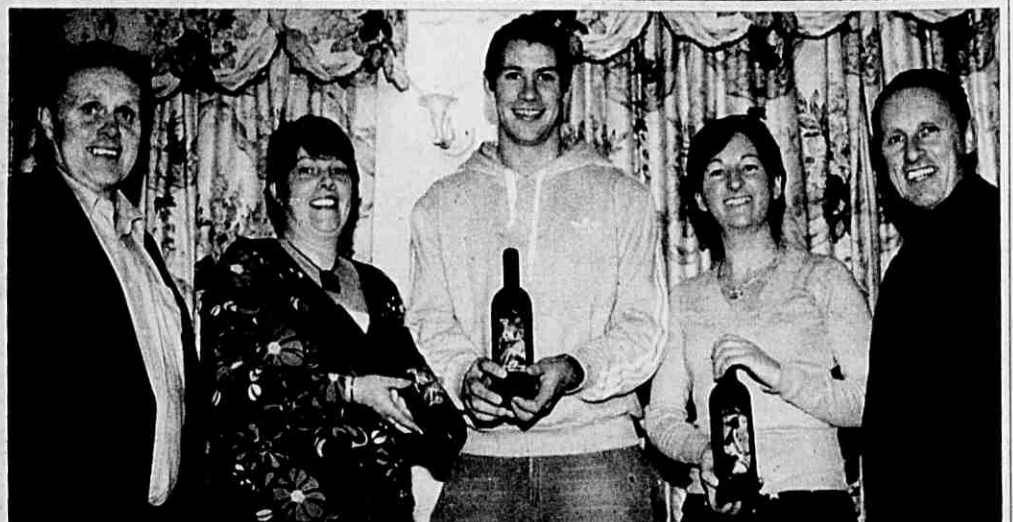

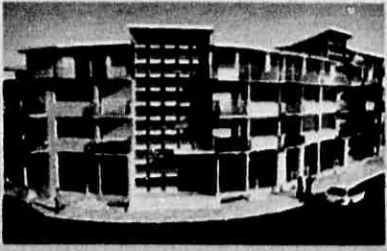

ENERGETIC MASSAGE

The term 'massage' comes from an Arabic word meaning 'to stroke'. Massage is currently one of the most popular forms of complementary therapy available and it is frequently used to aid relaxation and to help relieve pain and discomfort. A good massage therapist will always check that the person receiving the massage is comfortable with the amount of pressure being used. The parts of the body massaged include the back, neck, shoulders, abdomen, arms, hands, legs and feet. A full body massage usually takes about an hour, after which the person receiving the treatment experiences a profound sense of relaxation and well-being.

Energetic Massage Therapy can aid relaxation, reduce stress and tension and relieve muscle pain. On a deeper level it also assists the digestive system. Because massage therapy stimulates the circulation of blood and lymph it also detoxifies the body and improves and nourishes the skin. The types of problems which can benefit from Energetic Massage Therapy include not only physical problems such as headaches, insomnia and joint or muscle pain and stiffness, but also emotional issues such as sadness anger and frustration.

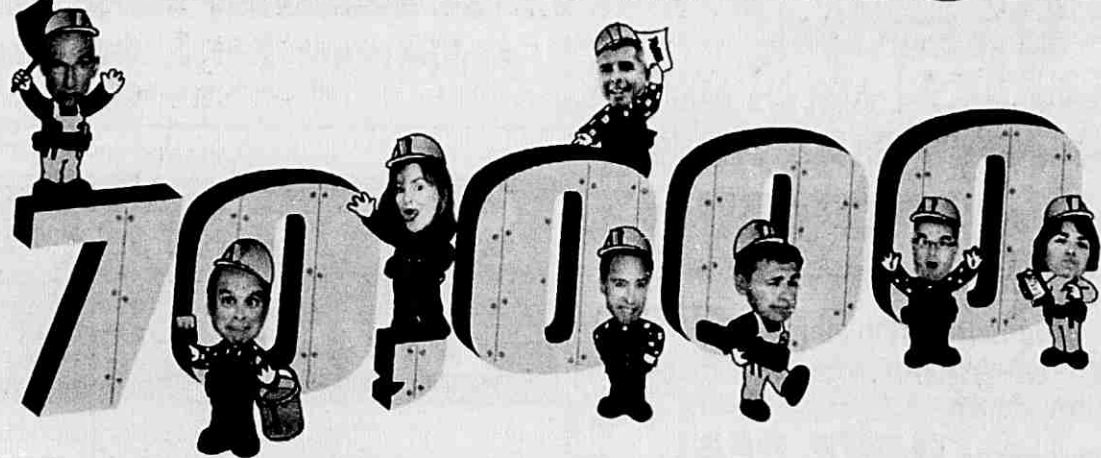
Old Market House Film Club

Figures released last week demonstrate that the ongoing waste management practices by Waterford County Council are resulting in good diversion rates from landfill.

The collection systems and the facilities operated by Waterford County Council have resulted in this excellent performance.

The total tonnage processed in 2006 was 13,807 tonnes, of

this 6,682 was sent for disposal to landfill, and the remaining 7,125 tonnes was sent for recycling or recovery.

Tonnage recycled, 4,769.

Hazardous Recovered 324.

Organic (composting) 2,032.

As well as processing the dry recyclable materials at the Materials Recovery Facility, the following interesting figures show how the materials collected at the Civic Amenities and Bottle Banks are contributing to the overall recycling/recovery tonnages.

It is with great sorrow we record the death of Alice Martin, Acton, London and formerly of Villierstown, Co. Waterford which took place on Monday, 29th of January.

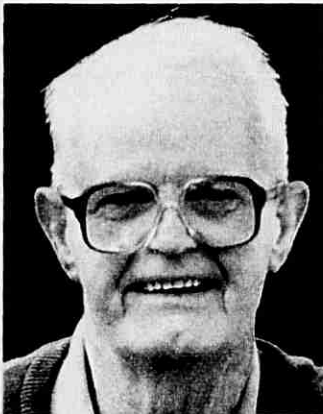

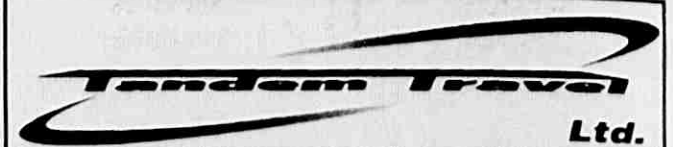

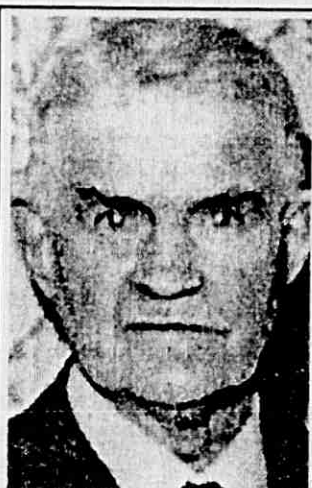

ANGINA

What is Angina and what causes it?

ANGINA PECTORIS is a pain or discomfort in the chest that occurs when some part of the heart does not receive enough blood. It is a common symptom of coronary heart disease, which occurs when vessels that carry blood to the heart become narrowed and blocked. Angina feels like a pressing or squeezing pain, usually in the chest under the breastbone, but sometimes in the shoulders, arms, neck, jaws or back. When an attack of Angina starts, it is usually relieved within a few minutes by resting or by taking prescribed angina medicine. Episodes of angina occur when the heart's need for oxygen increases beyond the oxygen available from the blood nourishing the heart. Physical exertion is the most common trigger for angina.

How is Angina Diagnosed?

Usually the doctor can diagnose angina by noting the symptoms and how they arise. However one or more diagnostic tests may be needed to exclude angina or to establish the severity of the underlying coronary disease. These include the electrocardiogram (ECG - records electrical impulses of the heart) at rest, the stress test, and x-rays of the coronary arteries (coronary "arteriogram" or "angiogram").

Prevention and Treatment of Angina

The underlying coronary artery disease that causes angina should be attacked by controlling existing "risk factors". These include high blood pressure, cigarette smoking and high blood cholesterol levels. If the doctor has prescribed a drug to lower blood pressure, it should be taken as directed. Advice is available on how to eat to control weight, blood cholesterol levels, and blood pressure. Most people with angina learn to adjust their lives to minimize episodes of angina, by taking sensible precautions and using medications when necessary. Angina is often controlled by medication. If the medication fails to ease the angina attacks or if the risk of heart attack is high. Coronary artery bypass surgery is an operation in which a blood vessel is grafted onto the blocked artery to bypass the blocked or diseased section so that blood can get to the heart muscle. An artery from inside the chest (an "internal mammary" graft) or long vein from the leg (a "saphenous vein" graft) may be used. Balloon angioplasty involves inserting a catheter with a tiny balloon at the end into a forearm or groin artery. The balloon is inflated briefly to open the vessel in places where the artery is narrowed. Other catheter techniques are also being developed for opening narrowed coronary arteries, including laser and mechanical devices applied by means of catheters. If your Angina is caused by a medical condition, make sure you follow the treatment advised by your doctor.



Dungarvan Leader - this Week in the Garden

A spot of blue for your border

THE forget-me-not is most famous in its fragrant blue flowered, yellow eyed variety and yet it has over 50 species. It comes in many forms - annuals, biennials and clump- or mat-forming perennials - but it is usually grown as a biennial bedding plant. In the wild, they can be found in woods, meadows, swampy soils and pond margins across Europe, Asia, Australasia and North and South America. For garden decoration, forgetme-nots are useful for rock gardens, banks, scree beds, pond margins or alpine houses. All of the varieties of forgetme-not have fragrant flowers, most commonly found in blue, white and yellow, and occasionally in pink. Most have yellow or white eyes. They produce alternate, variably shaped hairy leaves and are fully hardy, although they may need

gritty, sharply drained soil to survive the wet winters we have been having recently. Forget-me-nots enjoy moderately fertile or poor, moist but well-drained soil in full sun, with some midday shade, or in partial shade. The soil should not be too fertile as they become too coarse. Sow forget-me-nots in a cold frame or outdoor seed bed in late spring or early summer and they should be ready for pricking out in the second week of July. If not, do so at the first opportunity. Don't let the seedlings become too crowded as they will soon become leggy.

The forget-me-not should be planted into their final flowering position in the garden between September and October. Do not delay planting them any longer than necessary - do so as soon as weather and soil conditions are right to give them time to develop before winter. To enjoy plenty of flowers between April and June they should be planted 15 to 20cm (6to 8in) apart. The only preparation that the-

ground needs is a dressing of well-rotted manure that is well forked in, plus a generous topdressing of bonemeal. Forget-me-nots should be propagated regularly as they are

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Sow sweet peas outdoors
Now is the latest possible time to make an outdoor sowing of sweet peas. The soil is much more likely to be in the right condition now for sowing than at any other time of the year. Sow the seeds 2.5cm deep and eight centimetres apart in rows around 25cm apart.

Bed out wallflowers, forget-me-nots and other spring bedding plants
Plant wallflowers, forget-me-nots, Canterbury bells, polyanthuses and double daisies in their flowering quarters now. If soil and weather conditions look favourable do not delay as it has been left very late.

Sow cauliflower and broccoli in a frame
Seeds should now be sown in a frame if it was not possible to sow them in a greenhouse in February. Sow thinly. If you did plant in the greenhouse in February, it is wise to plant now as well to ensure an even supply of plants for a longer period.

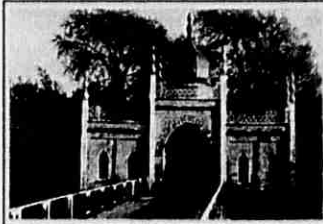
Sow spinach in a sheltered place
Summer spinach can be sown now for the first time in a sheltered border. The area should preferably have a southern aspect. Sow thinly in holes around 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart. More sowings can be made later so there is no need to use up your entire stock now and waste it.

Sow cucumbers
Cucumbers can be sown at any time of the year and you will still get a good crop, but sowing now is probably easiest for the amateur gardener.

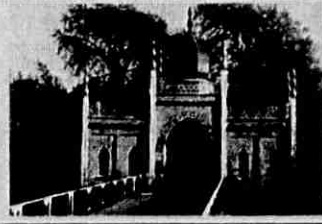
Sow broad beans and celery
Make another sowing of broad beans in boxes for planting out. It is now possible to germinate the seeds in a practically unheated house or frame with soil-warming cables. This is the time to make the main sowing of celery for a supply from October all through the winter. Keep the seeds at 16-18°C.

Forget-me-nots: Problem pests

- Powdery mildew looks like a kind of whitewash coating on the stems and leaves. It is not uncommon. The best thing to do is cut out and burn badly affected shoots and spray with benomyl or thiophanate-methyl to give adequate control.
- Downy mildew symptoms are yellowish patches on older leaves, grey or white spores on the undersides of the patches, later turning brown. There is no cure. To grow mildew resistant plants in the future, spray with mancozeb when they are at seedling stage.
- Slugs and snails tend to cause a problem in the winter. The safest chemical method of getting rid of them is slug pellets or liquid, made from metaldehyde and methiocarb.

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Salmon fennel sauce

CLEANER rivers and fishing controls have meant that wild salmon is increasingly available, but this recipe works just as well with farmed fish. With its mild anise flavour fennel is also widely available in supermarkets and is provides a perfect marriage with fish.

- Ingredients:**
(Serves 4)
4 salmon stakes, each weighing around 175g
2 shallots, skinned and chopped
1 small fennel bulb, finely chopped
1 bay leaf
2 stalks fresh parsley, crushed
150ml dry white wine
2 egg yolks
100g butter, softened
Salt and pepper
Lemon juice, to taste
Fresh fennel sprigs to garnish

Method:
PLACE the salmon stakes in a shallow ovenproof dish. Scatter the shallots, fennel, bay leaf and parsley over the top. Pour in the wine and bake at 180°C, 350°F, Gas Mark 4 for 15 minutes, until the fish is tender. Strain off 100ml of the cooking liquor. Turn off the oven, re-cover

the salmon and keep warm. Boil the strained liquor until reduced to 15ml. Beat the egg yolks together in a medium heatproof bowl, then stir in the reduced liquor and work in half the butter. Place the bowl over a saucepan of hot water and whisk with a balloon whisk until the butter has melted. Gradually whisk in the remaining butter, whisking well after each addition, to

make a thick, fluffy sauce. Remove the pan from the heat. Add 2 tsp of the cooked fennel to the sauce and season to taste, adding a little lemon juice, if necessary. Transfer the salmon to a warmed plate. Spoon the sauce over, garnish with fennel sprigs and serve with boiled new potatoes and seasonal vegetables.



French onion soup

ONCE traditionally eaten in the early hours by the porters of the now defunct Paris vegetable market of Les Halles, this famous soup was also enjoyed by late-night revellers on their way home.

- Ingredients**
(Serves 4)
45g butter
500g mild, sweet Spanish onions, thinly sliced
1 tsp sugar
1 1/4 litres well-flavoured beef stock
2 tbs brandy
Salt
Freshly ground pepper
4 rounds French bread, 2cm thick
3 tbs freshly grated Parmesan cheese
3 tbs freshly grated Gruyere cheese

Method:
Melt the butter in a large saucepan. Add the onions

and sugar and cook slowly, stirring frequently for 20 minutes or until the onions turn a rich golden colour. Add the beef stock and bring it to the boil. Reduce the heat, partly cover the pan and simmer for 30 minutes. Add the brandy, season to taste with salt and pepper and simmer for a further 10 minutes. Just before serving, pre-heat the oven to 23°C, 45°F, Gas Mark 8. Toast the rounds of French bread on both sides. Pour the boiling soup into an ovenproof casserole or tureen. Float the pieces of toast on the surface and sprinkle with the grated cheese. Bake for 10 minutes or until the cheese is golden brown and bubbling.

Spicy Rum Nicky

THIS rich and sticky tart incorporates several of the exotic imports which came from trade with the West Indies, such as ginger and rum. This version also includes dried apricots and is made with wholemeal flour, making it a high fibre dessert.

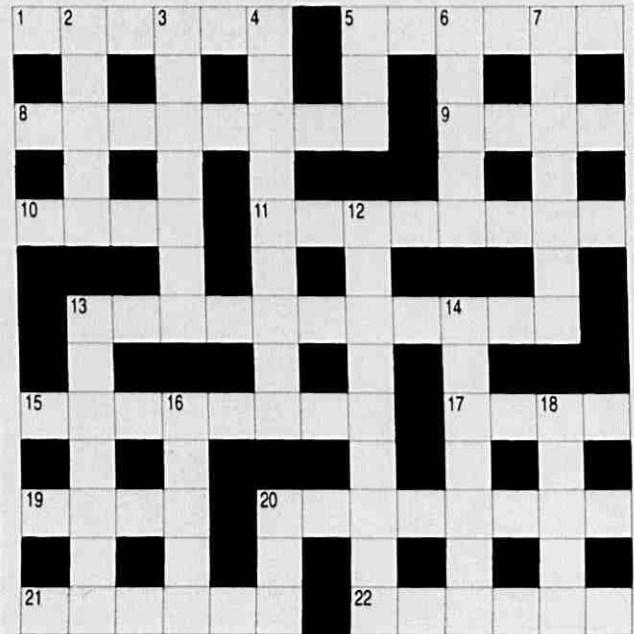
- Ingredients:**
(Serves 6)
225g stoned dates, chopped
100g no-soak dried apricots
50 stem ginger, chopped
45ml light rum
30ml soft light brown sugar
225g plain wholemeal flour
Pinch of salt
115g butter
1 egg yolk, lightly beaten
Demerara sugar, to decorate (optional)

Method:
MIX together the dates, apricots, ginger, rum and half of the sugar. Leave to soak

while making the pastry. Put the flour and salt in a bowl and run in 100g of the butter until the mixture resembles fine bread-crumbs. Add the remaining sugar, then the egg yolk and enough water to bind. Knead lightly on a floured surface. Roll out half of the pastry and use to line a greased 25.5cm flat pie plate. Spread the pastry with the soaked dried fruit. Dot with the remaining butter. Roll out the remaining pastry and use to cover the pie. Cut any pastry trimmings into leaves and use to decorate the pie. Brush with milk and bake at 200°C, 400°F, Gas Mark 6 for 30-35 minutes until golden brown. Sprinkle with demerara sugar, if liked. Serve hot with natural yogurt.

"I think there's been a tightening of the restrictions this year.

People are being asked to jump through hoops and I would ask they wouldn't be asked to jump through the same hoops again next year.

"We need to be a bit more sensible and sensitive in how this is approached," he went on to say.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said the system had to be tightened up this year, as there were very few checks put in place last year, and a number of people who shouldn't have got the waiver did so.

He suggested that the waiver be looked at again in October next.

Fertiliser Use in 2007 is a New Scene

Do you know how much Nitrogen and Phosphorus you can spread this year? Thousands of farmers have completed this exercise with their Teagasc Adviser over the past month. While most farmers who have done the sums to date have very little difficulty with the Nitrogen limits – the devil for many is with the amount of Phosphorus that can be used. And, of course, under the Nitrate Directive if you exceed the phosphorus level – you can be in trouble. Indeed we have encountered cases where no phosphorus can be spread this year. This arises where a lot of meal is being fed and no soil samples are available.

To have the calculations done you must come up with basic information.

Area of land that will appear on the Area Aid form this year.

The average number of stock in each category that will be on the farm this year.

The total tonnage of meal coming on to the farm – the reason being that every tonne of meal supplies 5kgs of phosphorus – so this reduces the quantity of bag phosphorus that can be used.

Any soil results taken in the last five years can be used. If no soil results are available then it is assumed that your soil is at Index 3 which is a relatively high reading. And this cuts down the amount of phosphorus you can apply even though your actual phosphorus reading may be quite low.

Nitrogen

Many farmers are worried that they may not be able to live within the Nitrogen limits. Not so. The vast majority of farmers will have ample scope to apply the required level of Nitrogen for their stocking rate and meet the Nitrate Directive requirements. But there are two issues to be addressed.

More use must be made of the free Nitrogen in slurry.

Our Teagasc colleague James Humphries has produced a table which spells out the amount of Nitrogen one should spread each month at different stocking rates.

Applying too much Nitrogen in a particular month means extra topping, or extra baled silage being made or worse still poor quality grass going forward.

In any event Nitrogen is so expensive that it has to be utilised prudently. With good grassland management we can cut back on Nitrogen, cut costs and still carry the same level of stock.

So if you have not talked to your adviser about fertiliser use for the year ahead do so without delay.

FEPS and REPS

A word has appeared on the farming vocabulary i.e. FEPS which is short for Forest Environment Protection Scheme. Under FEPS a farmer in REPS who plants forestry will get both the forestry premium and the REPS payment. Up to this year land planted was only eligible for the forestry premium.

Only farmers in REPS or who intend going into REPS 4 are eligible and the minimum area eligible is 8 hectares or approximately 20 acres. FEPS is a pilot scheme this year and the payments are guaranteed for 5 years. The scheme will then be reviewed. So a farmer in REPS who until now planted 10 hectares received just approximately €500 per hectare or €5,000 per annum. Under the new scheme the payment would be €5000 + €200 per hectare for 5 years i.e. €7000 per annum. A meeting at which full details of the scheme will be explained will be held at Teagasc Dungarvan On Friday March 2nd at 8.00 p.m.

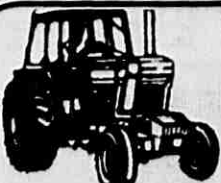

IFA IN BRIEF

EARLY IMPLEMENTATION OF FARM SCHEMES MUST NOW BE A PRIORITY

Waterford IFA Chairman Michael Keane has said that the early implementation of REPS 4 and other key farm schemes is now a priority as the EU Commission is likely to approve Ireland's Rural Development Plan over the coming months.

Mr. Keane said that the plan which was sent to Brussels at the end of 2006 has passed key barriers in its analysis by the EU Commission and has now been circulated among the various sections of the Commission for further comment. This signals that the Irish plan is broadly acceptable and reflects the requirements of farmers and rural areas over the next seven years.

Mr. Keane said that the financial arrangements for the plan were put in place following many months of negotiations in the Partnership talks in 2006 and the €6.8bn available for farm development schemes must now commence without any further delay.

IFA CRITICISES PROPOSED CLOSURE OF 500 POST OFFICES

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Rosemary Kennedy has said farmers and rural communities are opposed to plans by An Post to close 500 Post Offices, most of which are likely to be in rural areas, as part of a new restructuring deal.

"Post Offices are a vital service in rural areas and this proposal by An Post is a clear indication that they have failed to broaden their services to ensure viability", he said. Mrs. Kennedy called on An Post to revise their proposal in favour of broadening services to include a one-stop shop for a range of rural services as well as being a focal point to create new activities.

NEW FOOD SCARES SHOULD FORCE EU POLICY CHANGE ON FOOD SECURITY AND IMPORTS

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman John Bryan said recently the recent outbreak of foot and mouth disease (FMD) in Bolivia and the Avian Flu crisis at Bernard Mathews farm in the UK are a major new warning to the EU Commission and DG Sanco on the necessity to take a much stronger stance against meat imports that fail to meet EU standards.

John Bryan said recent events both in South America and in the UK should set off alarm bells in Commissioner Kyprianou's office. The Commissioner must understand that taking unnecessary risk with meat imports is playing with fire and needlessly exposing both European consumers and producers.

SINGLE PAYMENT TRANSFER – FARMERS ADVISED TO REVIEW WILLS

The Chairman of the Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee, John Joe Byrne, has advised farmers to review their wills to ensure that their wishes as regards the transfer of the farm business are implemented. He said: "the EU single farm payment is not legally attached to the land and does not automatically transfer with land. The single payment is attached to the farmer and currently is treated as a separate asset of the farmer. The payment could end up in the residue of the will and in certain circumstances could be lost by the family."

John Joe Byrne advised farmers who have already made wills, to review their wills, and those farmers who have not yet made a will, to do so. He said: "in the usual situation where a farm owner wants the family member or members who are to inherit the farm to also inherit the single payment, this should be clearly and explicitly stated in the will."

TDs and Senators Shocked by Department Inspection Bureaucracy

IFA President Padraig Walshe said the fears and concerns of farmers over the Department of Agriculture oppressive inspection regime are as high today as they were last November/December when inspections were in full flight on the ground.

Padraig Walshe has said that IFA is taking the bureaucratic Department inspection checklist to all TDs, Senators and political candidates in a nationwide information campaign. He said when politicians received the checklist, for the first time from the IFA, their reaction was one of shock and disbelief.

"Political representatives cannot believe that the Department of Agriculture would subject any farmer to a checklist which runs to 66 pages, covering 1,450 different questions, sections and permutations, and requires the Department inspectors signatures in 28 different places."

The opening months saw the loss of one of our oldest landmarks with the closure and sale of the Glanbia Yard.

Community Care celebrated ten years in operation in 2006 and continued their events for elderly throughout the year. Ballyduff Local Radio, BLR 104.2 FM was launched with the support of Waterford Leader Partnership Ltd. and now transmits Sunday Mass into all homes in the area, thereby reducing rural isolation among the aged and infirm.

As a development of the County Community Forum, Pat Jo Ahern spearheaded the volunteer corps which has undertaken a project to develop the Carnegie Library building into a community facility which can be used as a meeting place for both the elderly and the youth. This culminated in January '07 with permission to purchase the building from Waterford Co Council, (yet to be complete) and subsequent approval of a development grant of €100,000 from Waterford Leader Partnership Ltd.

In keeping with the trend in rural Ireland, May brought another serious blow with the sudden and unannounced closure of the local Post Office. All efforts to maintain this facility in the village failed, and the repercussions from this closure will continue to affect the entire community in the long-term.

Summer saw completion by Waterford County Council of the wheelchair access into St. Michael's cemetery which is a welcome improvement.

Again driven by the Community Council, Ballyduff Drama Group Drama and Comhaltas, we now have a state of the art stage lighting system in St Michael's Hall, which undoubtedly benefits the facility greatly.

The festival committee had a successful year with various music triangles, concerts, and a festival which culminated in an enjoyable "Jigs & Reels" contest. As the main fundraiser for the community council, thanks goes to Pat Kenny and his committee for their work and commitment.

The closing months of the year included the set up of a community council driven Public Limited Company, supported by Pobal. Applied for by Tim Cogan, this company will facilitate the appointment of a manager and workers to oversee the management of all community assets. An important local change to note concerns the booking number for St Michael's Hall. Bookings are now being taken by Pauline O'Brien at 058-60168.

Following reports by officers and various sub-committees all officers stepped down and Fr. Michael Cullinan facilitated the election of officers for the coming year.

HERITAGE WEEKLY

Now with the longer evenings and the slightly better weather, it is an ideal opportunity to go and visit some of the villages and towns, which contribute, to the unique architectural heritage of Waterford.

Villierstown is a planned estate village, which was established by John Villiers, 1st Earl of Grandison. Construction works commenced, on a "new neat colony erected for the advancement of the Linen Manufacture" in about 1742, to the south of his Dromana estate. The village was originally populated by a group of linen weavers from Lurgan, Co Armagh. The Dromana Map 1751 shows a anticipated layout of the village in relation to the Dromana Estate. The purpose of this map was, like auctioneers brochures of today, to sell the new village. Illustrations showed the proposed "Tradesman's Houses", which were two storey slated houses, similar to the former Villierstown School building. However few of these house types were built. Instead there is a variety of houses from Villierstown House to the well-proportioned, small to middle-size houses of modest appearance, which contribute significantly to the visual appeal of the village.

The original formal plan of the village is still evident. The Church was built in 1748 to provide for the new residents. It forms the centre piece the village and closes the vista from The Green. The cruciform plan church is built of rubble stone and incorporates a range of distinctive features, including a variety of profiles to the openings, broken pediment over the entrance, and fine cut-stone detailing producing a reserved Classical effect, as well as a distinctive bellcote. Civic buildings include the original schoolhouse and constabulary barracks. At the north end of the street, the elegant gateway with its high quality stonework and the gatehouse are located at the start of the Dromana Drive. Other interesting features of the village include the Villiers -Stuart Mausoleum, the Hibernio-Romanesque memorial, the weighbridge and the free-standing water pumps which provided clean water prior to the provision of the water mains system.

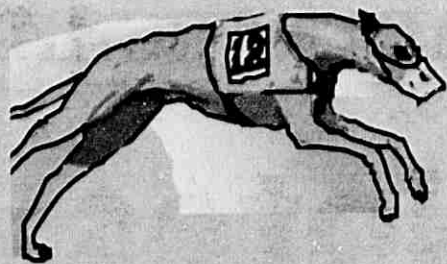

Three In A Row For Warble

After a day of prolonged heavy rain the going for last Friday night's fixture was rated as follows.

The opening semi final of the Francie Walsh Memorial Unraced stake produced a thrilling finish. 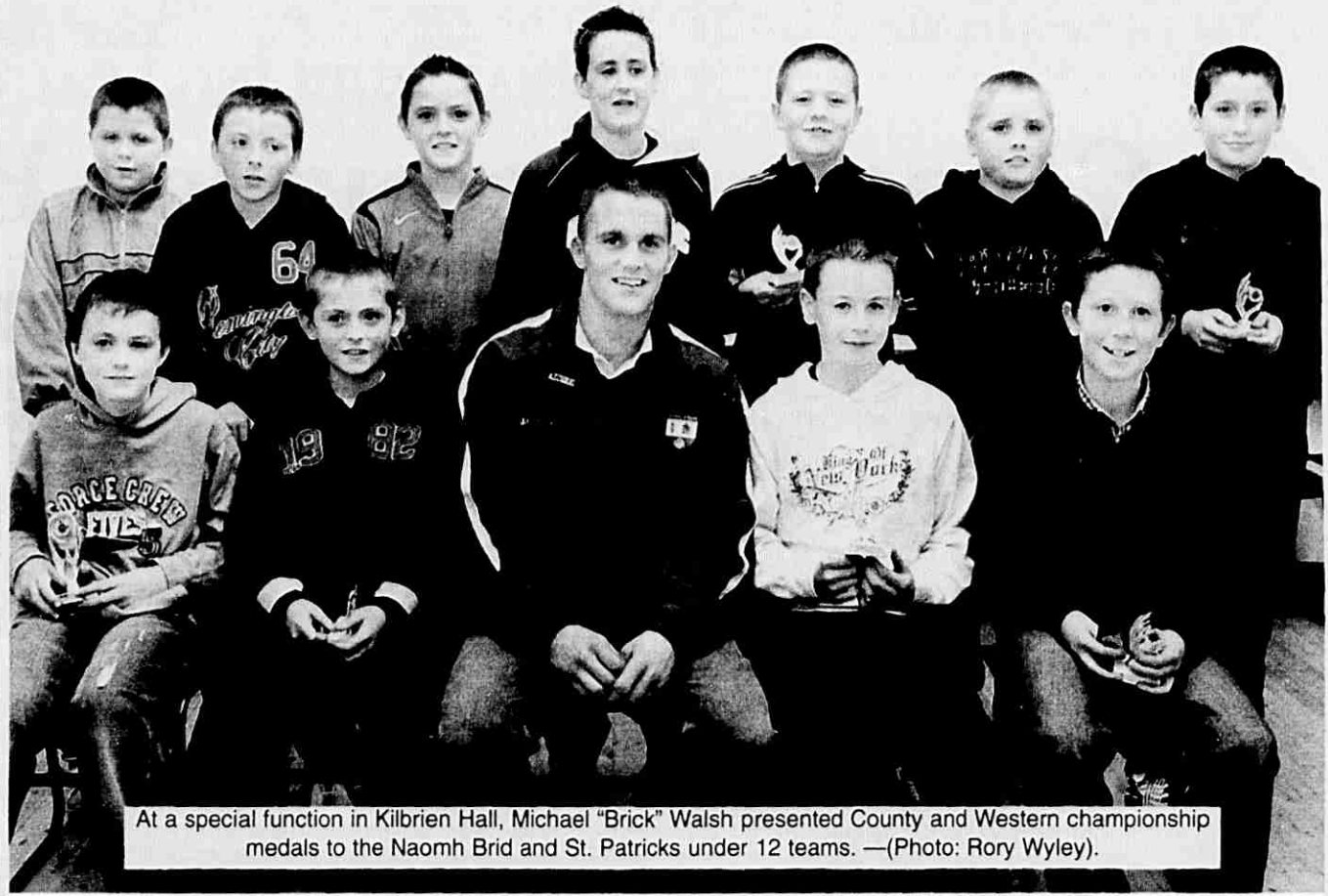

NATIONAL HURLING LEAGUE

Classic Encounter Expected as Waterford and Cork Renew Rivalry at Walsh Park on Sunday

It will be yet another epic in the ongoing saga of clashes between these hurling super-powers and given reasonable weather conditions we can look forward to seeing a massive attendance at the city venue here on Sunday

Following our 11 points victory over Wexford in round one and the splendid displays of Jack Kennedy, Aidan Kearney, Denis Coffey and Kevin Moran there was understandable speculation about the naming of the team for our meeting with our greatest rivals in Munster. It is certainly going to be a very difficult one for the selectors if

Eoin Murphy, James Murray, Tony Browne and Dave Bennett are available for selection. There is also the matter of John Mullane who was forced to retire with a suspected broken finger during the Wexford match. Paul Flynn is not yet back in training.

A lot of water has flown under our bridges since that agonising one point defeat by Cork in the All-Ireland semi-final (1-16 to 1-15) in Croke Park in August and I'm sure that a lot of soul searching has also taken place in examining the 'might have beens' if certain things (different options) had

been taken in that game that saw almost 20,000 distraught Waterford supporters leave headquarters that day.

Both sides will see changes in their line outs. Cork will be without full forward Brian Corcoran (retired). Joe Deane returned to the side for the Offaly game but did not feature in the scoring of their 7 points win. Diarmuid O'Sullivan (the Rock) has moved from fullback to the full forward position on the team. He managed a single point against Offaly and I doubt if the big Cloyne man will hold any fears for Tom Feeney.

An interesting aspect to next

Sunday's clash is that Gerald McCarthy will be back in Walsh Park, but on this occasion he will fill a much different role in that he will be managing Cork whereas he coached Waterford to beat Cork here five years ago. Gerald will know a lot about the form of the majority of the Waterford players, but this should not and will not make a significant difference.

The result of this game can be of vital importance as it may be the one which will decide our placing in the knock-out stages. Two weeks later we play Clare in Ennis which is regarded as the second biggest challenge to our progress in the competition.

To attempt to kick an opponent with force.

To stamp on an opponent.

To behave in any way which is dangerous to an opponent.

To inflict injury recklessly by any means other than these stated above.

To spit at an opponent or to contribute to a melee.

To strike, attempt to strike, to interfere with or use threatening or abusive language or conduct to a match official.

To assault an opposing team official.

Antrim Defeat Waterford by 8 points at Fraher Field

The almost 600 mile round trip from the Glens proved to be a rewarding one when they secured the two league points in a game that was completely spoilt by a near gale force wind.

Antrim travelled with a 30 strong panel but made several positional switches to their advertised line out while Waterford fielded as selected. The

team showed three changes from the side which defeated Wexford here three weeks ago.

Gale Force Wind

The strong gale which blew into the road goal was a factor in deciding the flow of play in the game but to blame it for Waterford's defeat would indeed be misleading. Over the 70 minutes Antrim who were

the better side, seemed better able to cope with the conditions and so ran out deserving winners even though their eight points winning margin did exaggerate the gap in standards quite a bit.

In the view of many of the supporters present the tactic of overdoing the short passing was not suited to the game in the conditions and as a result the attack had less use of the ball than they might have had, particularly when we were wind assisted in the first half.

Waterford did lead for 37 minutes until Antrim equalised, but then the home team went back into the lead only to have their 2 points advantage wiped out by the 47th minute when Antrim equalised for the second time before taking over with the advantage of the gale.

In the 13th minute of the second half the winners took a point lead for the first time when corner forward Patrick Cunningham kicked over the lead from a free inside the 40 metre line.

Waterford mounted several attacks after this in the remaining 22 minutes but could manage only a single point which was kicked over by substitute Jason Ryan on the 35th minute of the half.

PLAY

Gary Hurney opened from play with a point in the 3rd minute and it was 0-2 to nil after Liam O Lonain kicked another from play in the 4th minute.

Kevin Brady had Antrim's opener in the 8th minute and midfielder Mick Ahearn made it 0-3 to 0-1 in the 11th minute. Brian Wall kicked our first score from a free in the 18th

minute and Kevin Niblock responded with a good score for Antrim in the 21st minute.

Michael McCann brought the scores closer when he pointed in the 26th minute but team captain Brian Wall with a splendid point widened the gap to 2 points in the 31st minute. The gap was brought back to a single point when corner forward Cunningham pointed in the 33rd to leave the halftime tally at 0-5 to 0-4 at the break.

Having regard to the strength of the gale which had assisted Waterford in the opening half, the signs of defeat looked to be an odds on bet as the sides rested during the interval. Waterford had kicked 8 first half wides as against 3 for Antrim.

SECOND HALF

Paddy Cunningham converted a 2nd minute free to put the sides level, but a splendid score by Gary Hurney had Waterford in front again within a couple of minutes. Then another splendid point from play from the boot of Gary Hurney had sent Waterford into a 2 points advantage by the 7th minute.

Gradually Antrim began to take control and points by McCann and McGoldrick saw them level in the 12th. minute.

Points by Cunningham, McGoldrick and Cunningham again left the visitors three points clear before Aodhan Gallagher got through for the first and only goal of the match in the 18th minute. This major blow to Waterford's chances killed off the game as a contest and Waterford's only response on the scoreboard was the Jason Ryan pointed free in the final minute of the match. Niblock and Cunningham (free) extended the visitors tally to

take the scoring gap to 8 points before full time

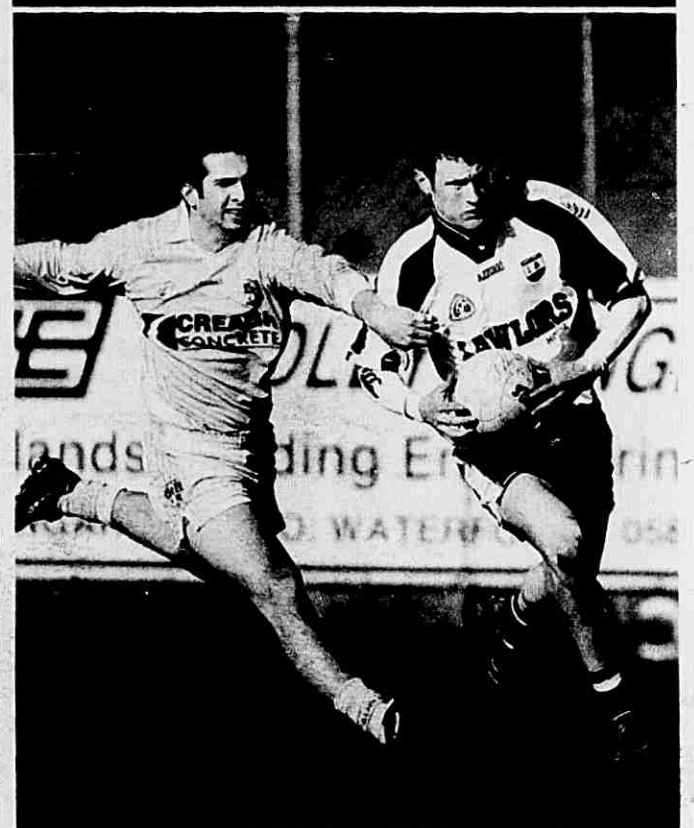

The other important event at this illustrious gathering will be the election of a vice-chairman to succeed Jimmy and here Donald Fitzgibbon of Limerick and Sean Walsh of Kerry are the fancied candidates on a list of four and which also includes Robert Frost, Clare and Jim Forbes, Cork. The Limerick contender may prove to be the successful one.

The Convention venue is Ballyrafter Country House, Lis-

more and will commence with Mass at 6.30 p.m. and will be followed with a meal at 7-15 and the convention gets underway at 8 p.m.

No Motions

For the first time in a long number of years there are no motions on the Clar and this should shorten the meeting, or allow more time to be devoted to the report of Council Secretary, Simon Moroney who has made some thought provoking comments and which are well worthy of consideration. Finance

Financially it was another good year for the council with gate receipts from the hurling championships showing an increase from €2,587,157 in 2005 to €2,678,676 euro in 2006. This was an increase of €91,519.

The senior football championship showed an increase of over €125,000 on the previous season.

The total receipts from games was €4,239,684 euro or an increase of €188,000 euro on the previous season.

The Thurles official who was responsible for a number of innovations including the Munster All-Stars and personality awards as well as the Waterford Crystal hurling tournament dur-

Waterford GAA Coaching and Games Club Information Night

Last Thursday (22nd Feb) in Dungarvan the Club Information Night took place. This is an annual event where all Juvenile and Adult Clubs receive information on all aspects of the Coaching and Games Development Work for the coming year. This year's event was well attended by clubs throughout the county and it is great to see so many clubs interested in finding out what is available for them as they seek to develop the games of Hurling and Gaelic Football in Waterford. It was also pleasing to see so many members of County and Divisional Boards presents (Adult and Bord na nOg) along with representatives of Cumann na mBunscoil and Post Primary Boards present. We were delighted to have in attendance two Waterford men who are doing great work promoting our games at Munster level. Incoming Munster Council Chairman Jimmy O'Gorman has been an excellent help in the last 3 years during his time as Chair of Munster Coaching and Games. Joey Carton has a wealth of experience coaching in Waterford and is now Games Manager for Waterford, Tipperary and Cork and has always been available to help the county in any way possible.

This year's line up included presentations by the 3 GPO's employed full time to service the needs of all involved in GAA and foster development. Also included on the line up was Christy Cooney, Chairman National Coaching and Games Development Committee.

John Quinn updated delegates on the progress being made with Development Squads and Schools of Excellence in Waterford. There are 6 Hurling and 6 Football ranging from U12 Intensive Coaching to U17 Development Squads. John pointed out the hard work being done at each level and thanked the players and selectors for all their hard work. John paid tribute to all parents who bring players to training and matches wherever they are on. Although we have no permanent facility for Devel-

opment Squads in Waterford John acknowledged the support of all clubs in making their facilities available on all occasions. In relation to selectors for Football squads John informed delegates that there are no selectors for the U15 or U17 at present. He appealed to clubs with Gaelic Football mentors to provide some assistance so the children who are interested can play. In Hurling there will be an exciting new development this year. All players born in 1995 will be able to receive 8 top quality coaching sessions over the summer months. These will take place in Mt. Sion, Kilmac-thomas, Brickey Rangers and Lismore. A panel of coaches will provide a programme, which will develop all players and all aspects of their game. Training will be provided for the coaches and anyone interested in assisting can contact John for further information.

Liam Cheasty informed the meeting of the various grants available to clubs. €24000 will be spent on Hurley Helmet subsidies and €10000 on Club/School coaching in 2007. Liam appealed to all clubs and schools to avail of this funding, as there are some clubs who do not take up their allocations. Liam also spoke of the great work being done by Ann Hogan, Post Primary Officer to promote our games in the 13 Post Primary Schools in the county. There is now something for all players at this level no matter what grade they are playing at.

Michelle Power outlined the work ongoing in the Club na nOg programme. Activities such as Indoor Leagues, Floodlit and Astro Turf, Skills, Divisional Go Games Leagues are ongoing throughout the year. Clubs put a great effort in and can be complimented on the great work and cooperation they give at all times to ensure these events run well. Michelle outlined two new projects that will take place in 2007. A Young Whistlers course has already taken place where young players have got involved

in officiating at Go Games Blitzes, Indoor Leagues etc. This will greatly alleviate the pressure on existing referees and hopefully some of these Young Whistlers will go on to become referees at Bord na nOg level and beyond. The second new project will see Coaching and Games organising 16/17 year old leagues in the summer. These will be exclusively for club players not on Development Squads. It will give them an opportunity to get additional games during the summer as some players only get 3 or 4 games a year. The leagues will be non club based with a maximum of 3 players per club on any team. The leagues will run for 4 to 6 weeks in Waterford and Dungarvan.

Coaching Chairman Pat Moore and County Board Chairman Pat Flynn both praised the huge work being done in each club in the county. It is only with the help of the clubs that the Board and the Coaching Committee can carry

out their tasks. Both men have been actively involved in their own clubs and know what it takes to organise everything that must be done.

Eoin Breathnach launched the VHI Cul Camps 2007 for Waterford. This year we will again have 32 camps in July and August with over 2500 taking part again. The kit for the camps will be an "International Rules" type jersey and the initial feedback from people present on the night was very positive. There will be national and local advertising and Eoin thank the local media for their assistance in 2006. County players will be visiting the camps and there will be some new initiatives announced at National level over the coming months. A special word of thanks to Catherine Power of WLR FM who gave great publicity to the camps and all coaching events in 2006 and was present on the night to provide the listeners of Gaelic Ground with information on what is happening in Coaching

and Games Development. Eoin also announced there will be a Teen Summer Camp this year. This will run for those aged 13-16 who have been to several Summer Camps and are looking for something new. There will be one camp in Waterford and one in Dungarvan. As well as Hurling and Gaelic Football there will be focus on other areas of GAA and players development along with some non GAA related activities. The camps will be launched after Easter for all interested.

Our guest speaker was Christy Cooney. Christy has been involved in Coaching and Games for many years at county, provincial and national level. It was interesting to hear his views on current issues. He appealed to all clubs to avail of whatever assistance is available from Coaching and Games and the full time personnel. He reminded clubs that players want to be playing games and we must ensure we have a full and comprehensive games pro-

gramme for all players at all levels. He complimented the clubs of Waterford for being progressive and looking for new initiatives to develop players and clubs and was delighted to see so many people at the information night which shows the deep love of GAA that so many people have and want to pass on to the next generation of players.

Waterford Coaching and Games wish to thank all clubs for their attendance on the night and for their continued support and cooperation for all projects undertaken. Without the support of clubs and the time put in by club personnel at grass roots level there would be no Coaching and Games Programme. We may be form different clubs on the field of play but we are all endeavoring to improve the standards of Hurling and Gaelic Football in Waterford and by working together we can ensure the players have the best opportunity to develop their full potential at whatever level

Minister for Health and Children, Mary Harney T.D., officially opened the Family Heart Screening Clinic at Heart House on Monday, February 5th on Eccles Street, Dublin 7. This is the first stand alone screening clinic in Ireland offering a holistic approach to families who have been affected by Sudden Adult Death Syndrome (SADS). This facility will endeavour to reduce the tragic and silent deaths resulting from SADS through a free comprehensive screening facility for immediate family members (those most at risk), who have lost loved ones to the condition.

Although accurate statistics are not available in Ireland, experts estimate that at least one young Irish person under the age of 35 dies suddenly every week from cardiac diseases such as Sudden Adult Death Syndrome (SADS) or Cardiomyopathy. Most victims of SADS are active youngsters who report no symptoms before their fatal collapse. The deaths in particular of young sports people including 22 year old Tyrone football captain Cormac McAnallan, 18 year old Royal Armagh School rugby captain John McCall and Kevin Quinn a young Cork hurler have further highlighted the effects of this tragic condition.

Dr. Joseph Galvin, Consultant Cardiologist in The Mater Hospital commented, "we are delighted to welcome the opening of the Family Heart Screening Clinic, however we must keep focused on continuing to raise funds and awareness so we can offer the best services and equipment available to fight against SADS."

Sandis Records A Personal Best And Sets A New Course Record

The Hospice Society were the benefactors from the 4th Annual Bausch and Lomb sponsored Kilmacthomas 5 mile road race which was held last Sunday with a field of 161 runners participating, plus many walkers. Despite the blustery conditions on the day, this course is beginning to throw up very fast times and last Sunday was no exception.

The winner and indeed the winner now for the last 3 years was West Waterford athlete Sandis Bralitis who was thrilled to record a personal best time for 5 miles when clocking a very fast 24.06. Sandis took the race from the off and clipped

through the 1 mile mark at 4.40, a fast time was on the cards, his second mile was a 4.53 followed by 4.53 then a very fast third mile on the main road section with the wind at his back 4.35. Indeed he was 19.02 at 4 miles his second fastest 4 mile time ever, finishing off a superb solo effort Sandis ran the last mile in 5.04

Last year Sandis ran a time of 24.14 and this year his finishing time was 24.06 setting a new personal best and a new course record into the bargain. You would have to say now that a sub 24 minute 5 mile run is just around the corner for Sandis according to our club statistician Tony the last man to run under 24 minutes in Waterford was John Tracey in the Dromana 5 in 1994 when he clocked 23.49 on that occasion. Limerick's Tom Carey made the long journey and had a fine run finishing 2nd in a time of 25.02 with West Waterford filling the 3rd and 4th placings Raivis Zakis who finished third last year held onto that position but ran a significantly faster time. He even ran a personal best for 4 miles when he was clocked passing that point in 19.59 but he was just 1 second outside his 5 mile

personal best when clocking 25.16 at the finish line, at year Raivis was clocked at 26.20 so a huge improvement here. 2nd last was Dzintars Klava but this year Dzintars had to be content with 4th but non the less he was pleased with his time of 25.56. Dzintars along with Sandis and Raivis will be real contenders now for the overall team win in next Sundays Ballycotton 10 with the kind of form they showed last Sunday in Kilmac. Mark Shalloe West Waterford AC recorded his second Junior Men's win in a week when coming home first in Kilmac with a time of 28.20 finishing 14th overall. Mark also took this category the previous week in Tramore's Baldy Man.

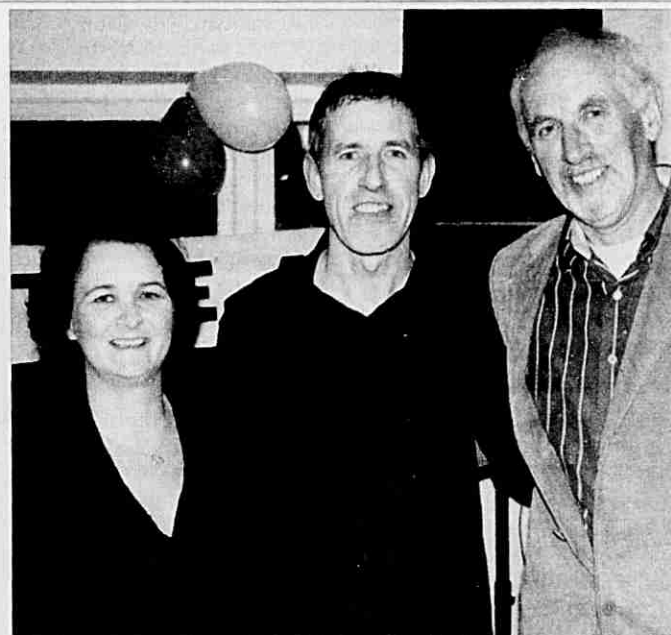
Division 5 — The man who

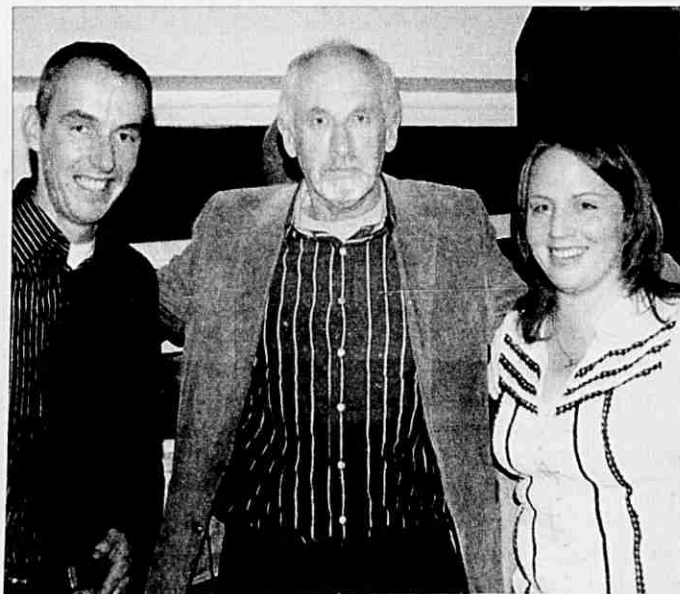

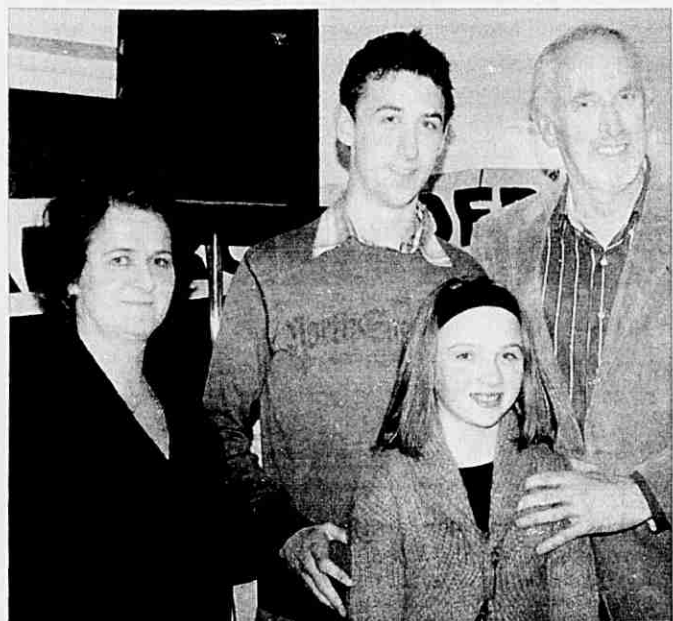

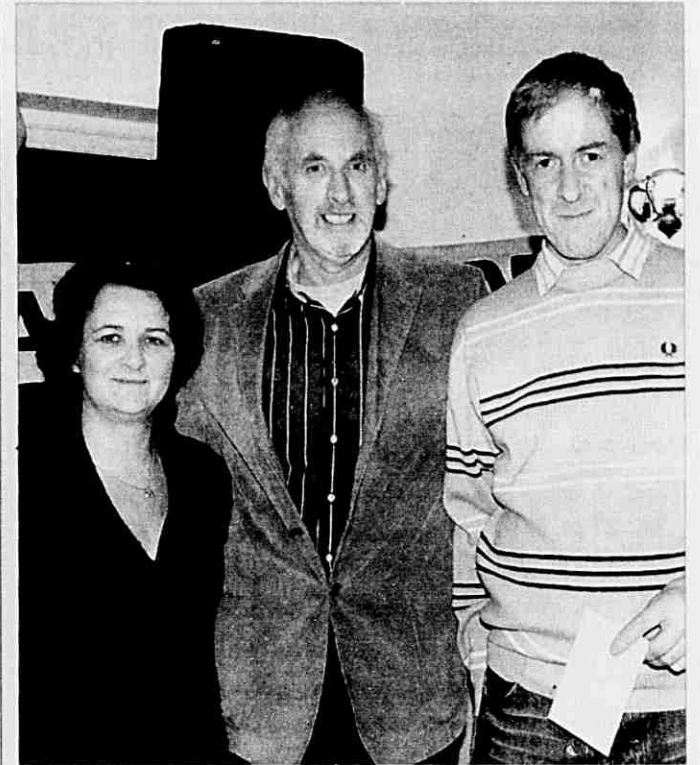

CINEMA REVIEW

The Number 23

**

Jim Carrey stars as Walter Sparrow, an animal control worker who finds his life turned upside down by a book which reveals part of the mystery of the number 23 to him. Even worse is the fact that the narrator of the book, Fingerling, is a seeming clone of Walter; everything that has happened in Walter's life parallels the life of Fingerling.

The Number 23 starts off with an interesting opening act that suggests a film as thoughtful and accomplished as another Carrey vehicle, *Eternal Sunshine of a Spotless Mind*. However, as the film continues it slides back into the pack of general thrillers. It fails to find a purpose to the concept of the number 23 and the weird coincidences that surround it. Instead, it merely references these interesting little facts and moves on with a film that has very little to do with what it claims as its subject; following a run of the mill plot that offers few surprises and with nothing to say for itself.

Carrey though is as compelling as ever to watch. Whether in a far out comedy like *The Mask* or a piece of indie brilliance such as the aforementioned *Eternal Sunshine*, Carrey has always been an actor who grabs the viewer's attention with his wholly committed performances. He manages to do the same here, washing over some dialogue wooden enough to build a garden shed with his split performance as Walter and Fingerling. All Carrey's efforts are in vain however, as a weak plot and a lack of any real action mire this film in the bog of Hollywood monotony.

School for Scoundrels

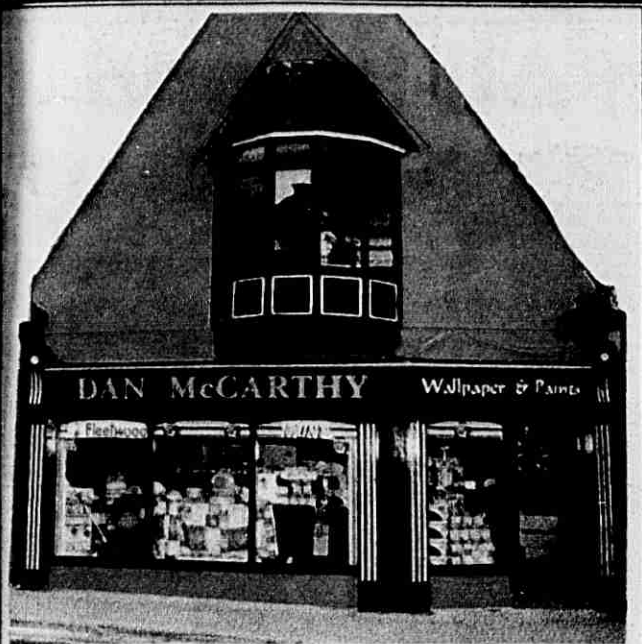
Napoleon Dynamite's Jon Heder teams up with Billy Bob Thornton in this original comedy from the makers of *Old School*. Heder plays Roger, a total loser who is so inept at human interaction that he ends up paying the fines he imposes as a traffic warden rather than stand up to the miscreants he should be punishing. His life reaches a low point when his third little brother (a scheme run in America to make sure young children have good role models) asks for a change of big brother. He needs help and he needs it fast. His friend suggests a class run by Doctor P (Thornton).

Doctor P opens class by telling his roomful of students that they should throw out their self-help books, because they can't help themselves and that they should realise that if they are the only ones helping them that they are being helped by idiots. More of this abuse follows as Doctor P attempts to turn the bunch of life's rejects into winners. As all the other students begin to benefit from the class, Roger stands out, even managing to secure a date with his gorgeous neighbour, on which he does impressively well. This development leads to Doctor P singling out Roger to be destroyed in order to re-assert his place as alpha male. Roger does not feel like going down without a fight though. The battle between the leads to gain dominance runs the rest of the film.

An intelligent comedy is a rare thing these days and this effort has plenty going for it. Thornton brings the roguish quality that was so successful in *Bad Santa*, while Heder is every bit as charmingly quaint as he was in *Napoleon Dynamite* yet pulls off the transformation to slick confidence easily. The soundtrack is a mixture of popular classics and cult hits that spices up the film. And the dialogue, while not as snappy as the *Best Frat Pack* movies, is a major step up from most cinematic comedy these days. It is a pity that it doesn't have the guts to finish as strongly as it starts but *School for Scoundrels* is still firmly in the hit rather than miss category.

Upcoming Films

Robert DeNiro's *The Good Shepherd* is a tale of the birth of the C.I.A. and the lives of the men who made it the most powerful spy system in the world. With the powerful wattage provided by a stellar cast including Matt Damon, Angelina Jolie, Joe Pesci, DeNiro and Alec Baldwin, this is a heavy hitting film that is bound to become a classic in the future. While it may not have reached the heights expected of it at the Oscars, you should never take this as a cast iron guarantee of a film's pedigree; remember, *Forrest Gump* beat *Pulp Fiction* to the Best Film award.


