## Hundreds Of Tourists Expected In Dungarvan For Sean Kelly Tour

A cycling tour, starting and finishing in Dungarvan, and featuring many of the county's most scenic areas, will generate extra tourism revenue for the county in the late summer season with hundreds forecast to gather for the event.

The Sean Kelly Tour of Waterford, which will take place on Sunday August 19th, will also honour the achievements of one of the county's greatest athletes. The Carrick-On-Suir man, who has won countless titles over the span of his cycling career, has endorsed the tour of the county, which is expected

to bring visitors and cyclists from all over Ireland and many from abroad.

The tour is being marketed by Waterford Sports Partnership, and Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council saw the launch of the official website.

Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Mary Green described the

tour as a very worthwhile enterprise.

"It will bring many people into our beautiful county where they will be able to enjoy the scenery, the activity and the company of hundreds of others on this tour of our county," she said.

The tour will be staffed by volunteers with the profession-

al support of the Gardai and Civil Defence.

## Vandals Smash Bandstand Railings

Vandals smashed at least eight cast iron railings in a mindless attack on the bandstand in Dungarvan Town Park on Thursday night last.

The ornate railings around the refurbished bandstand were smashed, apparently by a heavy implement, which snapped the railings at the top and base, causing damage that could well cost several hundreds of euro to fix.

**STRING OF INCIDENTS**

The damage is just the latest in a string of vandalistic attacks in the past few weeks which also saw hundreds of thousands of euro worth of damage caused to Moloney's Furniture Store. A number of vandalistic attacks are also believed to have occurred in the West Wa-

# Compensation Package An Insult To Injury For Fishermen – DEASY

Describing the salmon fishermen payments as "robust, convincing and fair," Minister John Browne has ruled out any additional compensation for salmon fishermen in Waterford.

Responding to three separate Dail Questions put down by John Deasy T.D., Minister Browne said the overall fund of

some €30million was "a fair and reasonable allocation, which does not need to be modified."

John Deasy said, "If you had been fishing salmon for 40 years and were handed a redundancy cheque of €2,000 I don't think you'd describe this package as convincing or fair. In fact you might be inclined to

consider it an insult."

### COUNTS FOR LITTLE

Deasy said, "I realise that an additional €5 million has been included in the package but it counts very little for individual fishermen who will effectively never experience the benefit of this money which is a block grant for community activities. All through this process I have

to say that the E.U. Commissioner has been more receptive to helping the fishermen with different ideas, than the Irish Government has. Commissioner Borg responded to me by suggesting ways by which additional assistance could be provided through specific schemes for fishermen. The government's response to these suggestions has been disappointing to say the least."

### TRADITION DISAPPEARING

"Right along the coastline of Waterford we are seeing a tradition disappear before our eyes. Some of these families have fished salmon for 300 years. They are being treated very badly," Deasy said.

The Minister's reply made it clear that the Community Support Scheme will focus primarily on those communities where salmon fishing has been a well-established activity and where its withdrawal demonstrably impacts on the economic and social fabric of the area.

### PROBLEM

Deasy said, "The problem with that statement is that many of these fishermen come from areas that haven't depended on fishing for economic wellbeing for decades. The individual is the victim under this compensation package. Many of them are in their late 50's and 60's and realistically will find it impossible to diversify into different walks of life."

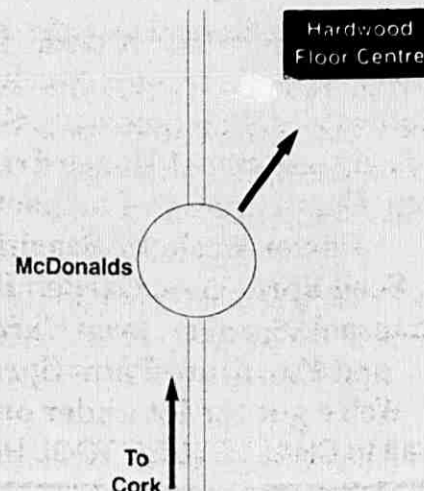

## Waivers to be Discussed Before the Estimates Meeting

**OMBUDSMAN HAS BEEN IN TOUCH WITH COUNCIL**

 Ombudsman, Emily O'Reilly has been in contact with Waterford County Council over the local authority's controversial waiver scheme.  
 Ms. O'Reilly was in contact a number of months ago in regard to one particular complaint and but not yet over the "broad thrust" of the scheme.  
 A series of complaints compiled by Fine Gael Deputy John Deasy were sent to the Ombudsman recently. These claim

the waiver scheme is discriminatory because it only includes means tested welfare payments, while others on smaller welfare payments are not included.  
 Ms. O'Reilly confirmed she would be investigating the waiver scheme.  
 In her only contact with the council to date, Michael Quinn, head of finance, said she was "satisfied with the facts as we presented them." This was before she announced the investigation however.

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan, who together with his party colleague, Cllr. Anne Marie Power, pointed out the anomaly at last years estimates meeting, called on the council to "sit down with the social welfare department and come up with a solution."  
 He described the waiver scheme as it is currently operated as "not fair" for those who receive smaller payments than those on means tested pensions

but who still must pay the €50 flat rate fee.  
 County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer said the council will be discussing the situation shortly before the estimates meeting later this year. "But I think we should remember that we give out 1,000 waivers out of 7,500 customers."  
 He said providing more waivers would have an economic impact on the remaining customers.

**Appeal For More Tidy Towns Volunteers**

 Dungarvan Tidy Towns Committee are appealing for more volunteers for their Wednesday night clean ups as concerns grow that the improvements in the towns standing last year will not be sustained because of a low turnout of litter pickers.  
 The Tidy Towns committee hoped to extend their clean up to Abbeyside last month, but due to a lack of numbers were not able to do so.  
 Smaller towns like Lismore and Cappoquin have large numbers of volunteer litter pickers which in the case of Lismore has seen the town pick up several awards.  
 But in Dungarvan's case, with adjudication looming late next month, volunteers are stretched to the limit.

Anne Marie Rossiter of the Tidy Town Committee, appealed to the public for help.  
 "I'd love if we had enough numbers to go across to Abbeyside, but that's not possible at the moment."  
 "We're only able to aim for one area the whole time now because there could be only four of us out there."  
 "For a town the size of Dungarvan that's simply not good enough. When you see the likes of Cappoquin and Lismore, and the size of their towns - Lismore have 250 volunteers the whole year round, and we can't even get fifty out."

## VIEWPOINT

### HOTEL DEVELOPMENT TO BE HOT TOPIC

Plans by a Clonmel based developer to construct a luxury four star hotel, apartments and village centre is sure to be a hot topic over the next couple of months as the planning process intensifies and a decision nears.

The hotel development, planned by developer, Lar Whelan Trading, would create 200 jobs in the construction phase alone with another 150 jobs promised once the hotel and some of the other beach facilities such as shops and leisure centres are on line. That's to be highly commended.

But though the plans are scaled down from those of Greenbirch, the previous owners of the site, it's likely to get much the same reaction from other local concerned action groups, who fear the intensive development of the site will have an adverse impact on the area.

The machinations behind the zoning have hardly helped.

After all, the council's own planners recommended a zoning which would have kept the site open space or amenity. But this was changed at a meeting of Dungarvan area county councillors to tourism, effectively leaving the door open to another application.

Whether they were right or wrong to do so, is a matter entirely of opinion. But the councillors who dissented from the majority view, Cllr. Teresa Wright and Cllr. Brendan Mansfield, are likely to oppose the plans for a number of reasons.

Not least among them is the use of the Ballinacourty spur of the Railway Line, which is designated for a Amenity Walk, as a road and cycleway into the site.

It does seem extraordinary that the spur should be used for the purpose of what will be more or less a private road, and certainly seems contrary to the plan's stated for the spur when the overall Greenway Dungarvan to Waterford railway walk were announced.

At a time when the county council are forcing small landholders from extending their property onto the line why should a large developer be allowed to take over an integral part of it?

However, access is certainly needed by the developers, being fronted at the southern end by council owned land, and at the northern end by the railway line.

The developers have also moved to address many of the concerns pointed out by An Bord Pleanála in that original refusal to Greenbirch's plans.

Instead of 166 holiday homes - which was the main basis of Greenbirch's plans - there are now around 98 odd holidays homes, and 33 apartments with an interesting village centre at its core.

The focus also seems to be more on a hotel as its centrepiece which seems welcome, and the use of the spit of land fronting onto the beach as a demountable shop seems functional during the summer months and presumably will be taken away again in the off season.

Dungarvan and its environs needs another top class hotel. That fact was pointed to by the previous County Development Executive, Brian Rafferty.

Whether this is the answer to that need will be decided by the planners of Waterford County Council, and more than likely An Bord Pleanála over the next while. One thing is certain though, it will continue to make headlines over the coming months.

### ARMED ROBBERY POINTS UP NEED FOR FULL TIME GARDA

The armed robbery in Stradbally where a quantity of cash was taken from the post office, and the break-in and robbery of the parochial house in the village has raised fears in Stradbally and prompted renewed calls for a full time Garda to be stationed there.

Deputy Brian O'Shea and Senator Brendan Kenneally were among those to call for a full time Garda in the village.

But, Stradbally is just one of a number of smaller towns and villages where the problem exists.

While the Government trumpeted figures of 2,000 extra Gardai on the beat by this year, the evidence on the ground is to the contrary.

Over the past years, and it's a barb Viewpoint aims at all the political parties who've been in Government, we've seen a continued centralisation of the police force.

This was meant to modernise the force, stationed in state of the art police stations in larger towns, operating over larger areas.

These areas once included many smaller manned stations, which are now only manned on a part time basis or else are closed altogether.

When these were manned, the Garda in tandem with the local community were able to adequately police these areas, and provide a quick response.

The fact of the matter is, however diligent the Gardai in Tramore are - and Viewpoint is sure that they are - it's impossible for them to properly cover an area that stretches right across the middle of the county, including large towns like Kilmacthomas, and gather enough intelligence, and have enough of a connection with the community to deal with crime in as effective a manner as was the case when a full-time Garda was in Stradbally.

Would Stradbally have even been targeted if there was a full time Garda? Quite possibly. But perhaps the presence of a Garda would have dissuaded the armed robbers from watching the post office for several days beforehand as Gardai said they did. Or at least the suspicious behaviour would have been noted.

Whatever the case, smaller towns and rural areas - the very places which have been the scene of so many horrific robberies of late, and whose population, according to the latest census figures are among the quickest growing, need proper on the ground policing.

If the Government really can recruit extra gardai, their resources should be well managed, and the Gardai integrated back into small rural communities.

terford area over the past two months.

"It's very sad that this is still continuing," said Fianna Fail town councillor, Anne Marie Rossiter, who highlighted the latest incident.

"It's particularly terrible to see these incidents happening at this time of year with the Tidy Towns competition coming up and all the tourists coming into the town.

"Coming into the summer again, every weekend there's a crowd down in the graveyard drinking and that needs to be stopped," she said.

"It was damaged around the same time last year, and was very quickly fixed up by the Town Council. Hopefully we are not going to have the same run of incidents that we had last year."

#### FEARS

Fears are growing that the graveyard, where a number of graves were damaged last year, could be subjected to the same anti-social behaviour again this year as the evenings lengthen and youths gather drinking there.

Cllr. Rossiter added: "It's a

shame that the bandstand which is so popular among visitors was damaged again.

"I hope this type of behaviour is stopped before anything else happens."

The bandstand was refurbished in recent years and a

new roof was put in place at the cost of several thousand euro.

#### THIRD TIME

A spokesperson with Dungarvan Town Council said it is the third time that the railings were damaged.

"It will take some time to get

them replaced. They are quite unusual so it's not a matter of going to a hardware store to get them replaced."

However, it's hoped to have the railings fixed before the Tidy Towns Adjudication at the end of June.

## Treatment Plant Way Behind Schedule

The multi-million euro waste water treatment plant which was supposed to be up and running months ago is still "way behind schedule" for hand over, County Engineer, John O'Flynn acknowledged at the May meeting of Waterford County Council.

The treatment plant has been the subject of a series of delays which has hindered the start of its operations for some time now.

And County Engineer, John O'Flynn told Fine Gael councillor, Pat Nugent that the contractors won't be finished any time soon.

However, he will have more information as to the exact completion date after the next site meeting takes place.

Meanwhile, Labour councillor, Billy Kyne called for the restoration of the roads dug up after the work laying pipes, particularly at Western Bay in Dungarvan.

"It's important that the restoration works take place before it is handed over to a private operator," he said.

Mr. O'Flynn said a snag list has been drawn up and handed over to the developer.

# Old Boys School Site Set To Be Discussed By Area Councillors

## Cllr. Kyne Calls For Significant Redesign Of Controversial Plans

A meeting of local area councillors is to take place later this month to discuss proposals for the Old Boys School site in Cappoquin.

Waterford County Council plans to build a number of houses and apartments on the site which has been vacant since the Old Boys School was demolished a number of years ago. However, the plans have prompted widespread concern among residents.

During the submissions phase, a large number of objec-

tions were made to the proposals, which residents believe are too intensive.

### MEETING

Now the county council is set to discuss the plans with local area councillors in a bid to come up with an agreement in advance of June - when the plans are set to come before the full council for a vote on whether to proceed or not.

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, speaking after the May monthly meeting, confirmed that having being advised of the many submission by Deputy

Brian O'Shea that this was discussed at the pre-council meeting of the GPC with senior council officials including the County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer.

### RE-EXAMINING SUBMISSIONS

It was confirmed that the housing section was going to re-examine the submissions.

The council now plan to organise a meeting with the local area councillors on or around the 28th of May.

"It is hoped that the issue between the parties would be re-

solved in advance of the June meeting," Cllr. Kyne said, "where it was scheduled that this item would be taken by the council as part of the council agenda.

"I feel further dialogue with the concerned residents groups would be useful and hopefully we can get to an agreed position.

"Clearly the strength of feeling on this issue would suggest to me that a significant redesign would be needed to meet the reasonable concerns of the public in the Cappoquin area."

## PROGRESSIVE FARMERS BEING PENALISED

# Charges Inequitable And Discriminatory

Progressive farmers, who dealt with their obligations under the nitrates directive straight away, feel let down by the fact that they have had to pay development charges to develop farm buildings while other farmers, who waited until after the County Development Plan was amended, do not.

Fine Gael councillor, Paudie Coffey, who met with members of the IFA recently, said the

farmers who were forced to pay development charges, before the County Development Plan was changed and the condition removed, felt hard done by, and called on the county council to provide them with some redress.

His comments were backed by County Mayor, Mary Green who said it was particularly unfair that it was the progressive farmers who were interested in protecting the environment and living up to their obligations

who were caught with this charge.

However, County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer while sympathising with those who were in this situation said it is the council's legal requirement to enforce the conditions that were present when they applied.

Cllr. Coffey said the council was being inflexible in regard to charges which were both inequitable and discriminatory, and asked that the farmers involved be relieved of the bur-

den. Fine Gael councillor, Declan Doocey had made a similar motion last May. He said there were a small amount of farmers involved, adding that it was important the council make a move to meet their concerns.

Mr. O'Dwyer replied: "We will have a look at it again. But as I understand it our hands are tied."

Cllr. Coffey called for a report into the issue to be made available to councillors.

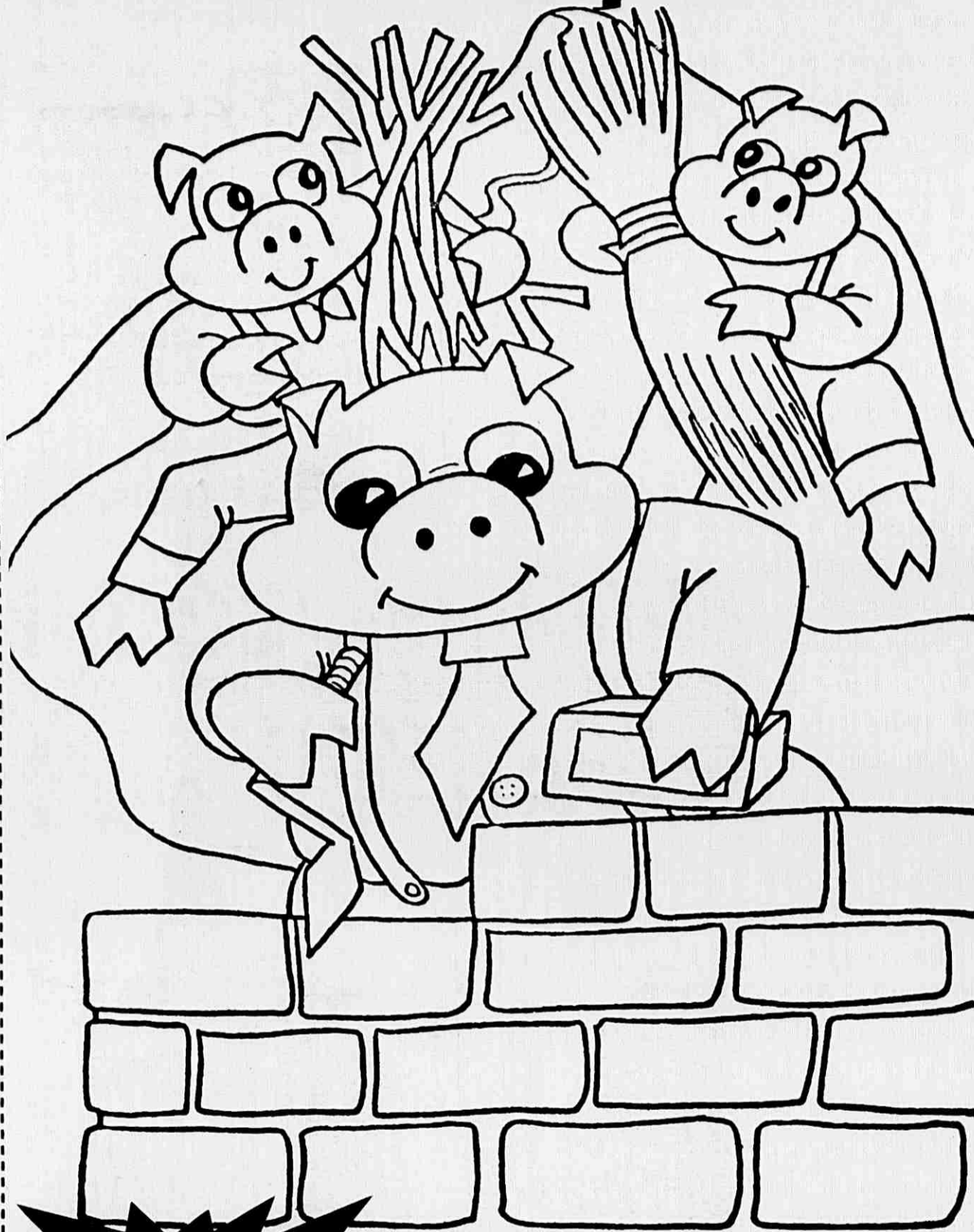

# ROCK FORMS AND FEATURES

All over the Earth rocks have formed different types of landscape from mountains and canyons to sand dunes and flat plains. These natural features form when rocks are made, or are worn away by water, wind or ice. For thousands of years, rocks have also been shaped by people as stone for buildings, tombs, statues and more.

### Columns Of Basalt Look Like Giant Stepping Stones

The Giant's Causeway, on the coast of County Antrim, Northern Ireland, was formed about 60 million years ago. The continents of North America and Europe, which have been joined together, began to split apart. Lava poured up from the ocean floor, making a dark, igneous rock called basalt. As it cooled, the basalt shrank into thousands of six sided columns, which wind and water have worn away to look like giant steps. Legend says that the columns were put there as stepping stones by a giant called Finn MacCool.

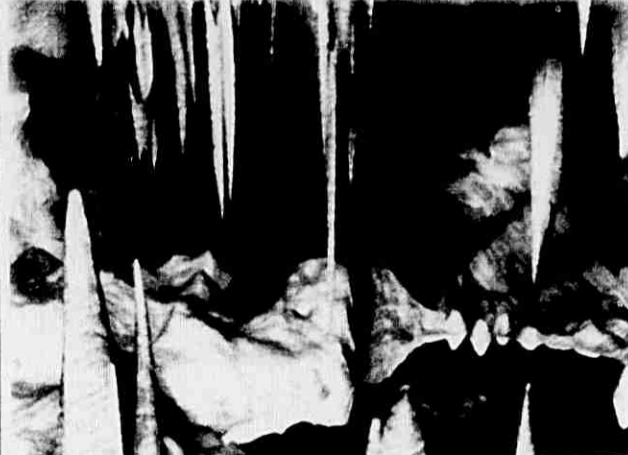
### The Egyptian Pyramids Are Lined With Granite

Granite is one of the hardest building stones. The ancient Egyptians used it to line the pyramids that they built as tombs for the pharaohs. The city of Aberdeen, Scotland, is known as the granite city because it is also mainly built from granite. Granite is an igneous rock that forms deep under ground. It contains minerals, including grey quartz and pink and white feldspars, and polished to a high shine. Granite is quarried by drilling into the rock and driving in steel wedges to break off blocks of stone, or by using dynamite. The granite rock of Mount Rushmore in South Dakota, USA, was carved by dynamite and drilling to form the heads of four US Presidents. Each head is 18m (60ft) high and can be seen from 96km (60 miles) away.

### The World's Biggest Cave Systems Is In Kentucky, USA.

In China's south-western Yunnan Province is the Lunan Stone forest. This 'forest' of stone pillars, up to 30m (90ft) high, formed millions of years ago, when movements in the Earth's crust pushed up and folded a bed of calcium carbonate. Rainwater can dissolve it away, forming steps and pillars above ground or creating passages, potholes and caves underground. The largest cave system in the world is Mammoth Cave in Kentucky, USA, which has around 530m (330mi) of caves and passageways.

### Some Stalagmites Are 10,000 Years Old



Inside limestone caves, rainwater dissolves calcite, dripping from the ceiling and onto the ground to form stalactites (growing downwards) and stalagmites (growing upwards). Stalagmites can take 200 years to grow as thick as a finger. Some are 10,000 years old and measure several metres high.

### Fossils Are Millions Of Years Old

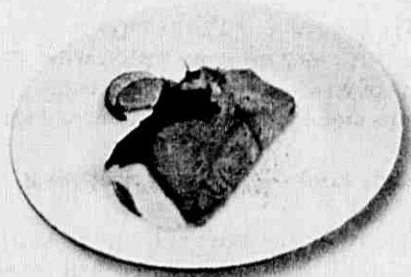
Fossils are the remains of animals or plants preserved in rocks for millions of years. They can be a whole skeleton, a single bone or a set of footprints. Many fossils can be found in limestone rock.

### The Taj Mahal Is Built From Marble

Marble is a metamorphic rock that forms when other rocks, mainly limestone, are changed by heat and pressure. It is easily carved and ranges in colour from white to pink, red, grey or green, but it is also easily damaged by pollution and acid rain. Some of the world's most beautiful buildings, such as the Parthenon in Greece, and the Taj Mahal in India, are built from marble.

# Down Syndrome Ireland Rev Up May Bank Holiday In Dungarvan

Almost two-hundred supporters on 150 motor bikes took part in Down Syndrome Ireland's second annual Rev Up 4 Down Syndrome Ireland motor cycle tour which stopped off in Dungarvan on Monday last.

The Dungarvan leg was part of 1,000km fun journey right around the country to raise awareness of Down Syndrome issues and to raise vital funds for its services.

There are three key issues which Down Syndrome Ireland wishes to raise with the public and particularly with the politicians in this election year:

**1/ Health - the creation of a national medical resource centre**

Adequate information and quality of life services are central to people with Down Syndrome and their families. A National Medical Resource Centre is indispensable in providing professionally all the most up to date and relevant information on which appropriate health strategies and healthcare services can be based, for people with Down Syndrome. Then it can co-ordinate the evidence-based medical and social

management of those services, and focus resources to best purposes for the national community dealing with Down Syndrome.

**2/ Education - Guaranteed one on one resource hours for children with Down Syndrome in Primary Education**

Presently it is at the discretion of school management to decide whether Children with Down Syndrome, who are classified as having a mild intellectual disability, are entitled to one on one resource hours teaching. The Department of Education has decided to deliberately exclude children with Down Syndrome from this sup-

port. **3/ Adult Services - Person centred improvements in Adult Education and Training in Employment and Independent Living Support**

Families involved with Down Syndrome Ireland are deeply dissatisfied with the lack of a comprehensive and consistent

programme of appropriate Adult Services to address all the concerns of Education and Training, Employment and Supported Living nationwide.

## O2 Mast Granted Permission For Cappoquin

### BORD OVERTURN INSPECTORS RECOMMENDATION

An Bord Pleanala overturned its own Inspectors recommendation and granted mobile phone giants, O2 Communications, planning permission for a 24 metre high telecommunications mast on the outskirts of Cappoquin.

Waterford County Council had also refused O2 permission for the mast within the lands of Cappoquin House for a tower carrying 3 antenna and two link dishes. However, this was appealed to An Bord Pleanala.

#### VISIBILITY

The Inspector found that because of its proximity to Cappoquin and its visibility from Cappoquin House it would contravene Waterford County Development Plan. It would also contravene Department of the Environment Guidelines for the protection of architectural heritage as it would affect the character and setting of a protected structure, and would

detrimental to the setting of Cappoquin House.

#### OVERTURNED

However, the board members voted to overturn this decision, granting it permission with six conditions, including that permission is only for a period of five years.

The board ruled that it "would not seriously injure the amenities of the area, or of property in the vicinity, would be acceptable in terms of traffic safety and convenience, would not be prejudicial to public health, and would, therefore be in accordance with proper planning and sustainable development."

A single storey, three-bed bungalow for social housing is to go ahead at Baile na nGall

Beag Ring, despite objections from a nearby resident.

The local resident objected to a submission on the grounds

that the house was to be built on designated open space, that the development on the private estate (of which the council's site is a part of) does not comply with planning permission, and that it has a potential for overlooking.

However Frank Curran of Waterford County Council said the location of the house has been agreed with the planning department. An alternative area

of open space has been allocated within the private development.

The letter outlining alleged breaches of planning conditions has been forwarded to the planning department. However, these do not affect the council's proposed house.

The house will be single storey with screen planting at the rear boundary to minimise any overlooking issues.

The development was proposed by Labour councillor, Billy Kyne and passed unanimously.

Mick loved books and literature and songs and music even though he could not sing. From his days with the E.S.B. and in retirement as a meter reader he took a great interest in folklore and old songs. He particularly liked the Rose of Knocknabrone and of course all the great songs of Sliabh gCua.

As he entered old age his health began to fail which was tough on someone who had been so lively all his life. However, his great sense of humour and love of everyday life overcame the limitations of his wheelchair. He was a regular sight in Carrickbeg and Carrick as he made his rounds each day to the Bookies and the Carraig Hotel.

In his final illness he was lovingly cared for by the staff of the Cardiology Unit of the Waterford Regional Hospital at Ardkeen.

At his funeral Mass in St. Molleran's Parish Church Carrickbeg, which was concelebrated by Fr. Thomas Flynn P.P. and Fr. Séamus Power, P.E., Limerick, leigh an file Micheál Ó Codaigh Sliabh Geal gCua na Féile.

In pouring rain the cortege moved up the hill to St. Mary's Cemetery. Jim English, Mick's old friend sang a final tribute - the Parting Glass.

Mick is survived by his wife Maisie and family Bernadette (Thomastown), Helen (Kilkeny), Maurice (Dublin) and Micheál (Los Angeles); grandchildren; his sisters Gracie (Dungarvan), Sr. Otteran (Belfast) and Sr. Carthage (Limerick), relatives and friends.

## CAPPOQUIN CIVIC LINK NOTES

#### Heritage Group Notes

Work has been progressing on several fronts, as usual, in recent weeks. Preparations for the July exhibition have been advancing quite a bit, with the plan being for a four-day exhibition over July 6th to 9th inclusive. To-date, we have received some remarkable items, with very substantial materials on the industrial heritage of Cappoquin including catalogues, parts manuals and machine parts themselves from the famous iron works of F and H Keane, which operated at the co-op site up to the early 20th century.

Local World War I memorabilia and documentation, copies of items linked to the Cappoquin Rebellion of 1849, Cappoquin shops of long ago, a couple of hundred photographs which have never been published before, a sixteen-foot long Royal Navy map of the Blackwater from 1849 and old school roll books make up some of the rest of the items which have come in during the past fortnight, with the search going on for sporting memorabilia, railway memorabilia and so on. Members of the Wednesday English classes have also agreed to work on a display of eastern European heritage items for the exhibition, which should be of particular interest. In recent days, we have also managed to track down the spot in Ulysses, the most famous novel of the 20th century, where Cappoquin gets a mention (Mind you, it was on Page 901, so it was a bit of a struggle!).

There will be no admission charge at the exhibition, with costs being mainly funded out of profits from 'Cappoquin: A Window on the Past'. Any committee member will be very glad to hear from anyone with photographs or other memorabilia which people would like to loan for the exhibition. We may already have

the material to make this a pretty memorable event but the more the merrier. With the exhibition coinciding with the forthcoming Cornerstone Carnival, the Heritage Group has also offered to sponsor a shop window competition. Basically, any business in town which would like to enter is welcome, with flyers due for distribution this week containing details of the competition. There will be a perpetual trophy and an outside, neutral judge for the competition, which we hope will become an annual event.

The finishing touches to the heritage trail booklet are being worked on at present. It looks like it will run to 24 or 28 pages in full colour, detailing the places and people of interest in the town and environs. We would anticipate a launch date of mid to late June, with the expectation that all of the stone plaques should be in place by then and perhaps some of the larger lecterns as well. The lecterns timescale will be slightly in the lap of the gods as many of the frames are already made but the finished work must be sent away to be galvanised and painted. We have also commended work on the designs for the lectern displays, with a sample due to be worked on in the coming days. Hopefully, we will be in a position to put this on display for a short time to give people a sneak preview.

Finally, the photograph book on the area's schools has been progressing very well, with several hundred pictures now 'in stock' and a huge wealth of information being gathered. Angela, Helen, Mary and Dinny have been doing great work gathering materials and will undoubtedly be asking all and sundry over the coming weeks and months to help identify the people in the pictures.

## Give yourself a spring clean

After a long winter of stodgy foods and a lack of fresh, seasonal fruits and vegetables, we could all benefit from some extra nutrients and a good spring clean. Before the days of supermarkets, food had to be stored for long periods for use during the winter months. Stored fruits and vegetables gradually lose their nutritional value and very few will grow during an Irish winter! People recognised that by the end of the season their health could suffer, leading to all sorts of problems. Though we now have access to fresh produce all year round, this is invariably artificially grown or imported. The traditional practice of taking a spring tonic is as important today as it was in the past.

As any gardener will testify, the roots of the stinging nettle grow down further into the soil than those of most other plants. This allows the nettle to draw up minerals from the earth which other plants cannot reach. These minerals, which include potassium, iron and silica, are incorporated into the leaves in a form which is easily absorbed by the human body. Nettles also contain numerous vitamins including vitamins A and C. It is thought that if nettles did not have a sting, they would be quickly wiped out by grazing animals due to their exceptional nutritional value.

Nettles have been used medicinally in Ireland for generations as a spring tonic. They are also very useful in cases of anaemia and during convalescence from illness. The more tender tops of nettle plants can be picked (using gloves!) during April and May, and added to soups and stews. Nettles can also be cooked like spinach or dried and used to make nettle tea (the sting becomes ineffective once the plant is cooked or dried).

Nettles have powerful astringent properties and the fresh juice has been used for centuries to stop bleeding from injuries and nose bleeds. Nettles are a particularly useful remedy for menstruating women to reduce heavy bleeding, and to restore and nourish the blood. They are also very useful for nursing mothers to produce a rich and plentiful milk supply.


Nettles have a diuretic action which helps the kidneys to remove toxins and waste products from the body. This is extremely useful for skin conditions such as eczema and psoriasis. In particular, they increase the excretion of uric acid, a substance which builds up in joints causing symptoms of arthritis and gout. Clinical trials have shown nettles to provide effective relief from the pain and stiffness of osteoarthritis. The presence of silica helps to increase the strength of connective tissue which is important for maintaining healthy joints and skin.

In Russia, the old folk tradition of stinging the skin with nettles was used to relieve all sorts of joint and muscular problems such as arthritis, muscle wasting and sciatica. The sting increases the circulation to the affected area, thus helping to remove toxins and stimulate healing.

Finally, nettles also have an antiallergy action which helps to reduce the symptoms of hay fever and asthma. The strengthening action on the connective tissues helps to keep the lungs healthy.

Though often cursed by gardeners (and victims of their sting!) nettles really are a remarkable gift of nature during the springtime. They are easily identified and often found growing in gardens or in the wild (though they should only be gathered from unpolluted areas). Best of all they are completely free so anyone can benefit from their goodness. However, if this all seems like too much trouble, nettle tinctures, juices and teas are available from health stores.

## Award-winning film maker & travel writer Nick Danziger to appear at Immrama 2007

Travel writer, film maker and photographer Nick Danziger will open IMMARAMA the Lismore Festival of Travel writing on June 15. Danziger was born in London but grew up in Monaco and Switzerland. He developed a taste for adventure and travel from a young age, and, inspired by the comic strip Belgian reporter Tintin, took off on his first trip to Paris aged 13. Without passport or air ticket he managed to enter the country and travel around, selling sketches to make money. Nick's initial ambition was to be an artist, and he attended art school, got an MA and representation from a gallery. But his desire to travel remained - he applied and was awarded a Winston Churchill

Memorial Fellowship in 1982 and used it to follow traditional ancient trade routes - he travelled on foot or traditional local transport from Turkey to China and documented his adventures in his diaries. The diaries formed his first book, the best selling Danziger's Travels, and he never looked back. He has since travelled around the world taking photographs and in 1991 made his first documentary in Afghanistan, War Lives and Videotape, based on children abandoned in the Marston mental asylum in Kabul. It was shown as part of the BBC's video diaries and won the Prix Italia for best television documentary series. Nick has since travelled the world taking photographs and making

documentaries about people he has met. He has published four books, including his latest, 'The British', for which he returned to his roots.

Nick is just one of a number of writers that will explore the theme of 'The Silk Road' at this year's Immrama Festival of Travel Writing held in association with Eason Dungarvan. Other presenters over the weekend include Jung Chang author of and her husband Jon Halliday, Alexandra Tolstoy, Nick Middleton and Donal Brady.

# SGC Dungarvan to Premiere Seven Documentaries by Students of The Nemeton Ard Diplóma in Television Production

As the first year of the *Árd Diplóma í Léiriú Teilifíse* draws to a close the fourteen students who took part in the course will showcase their programmes in the new state of the art cinema in Dungarvan. There are seven programmes currently being wrapped all in the documentary genre by the Nemeton / WIT students. Each with their own individuality and style. SGC Dungarvan and Digital Cinema Ireland have generously provided their cinematic services for this unique event.

Says Miriam Mulrennan the *Árd Diploma Course Leader* and Training and Development Manager for Nemeton "I can say with absolute honesty that the work produced by the students has far exceeded - what were already pretty high expectations. When we first spoke to the SGC in Dungarvan about doing this showcase event for the student's programmes, we did not know how strong each individual documentary was going to turn out to be. It is a credit to each of the students themselves and the excellent tutors on this course that we have a level of output that even industry professionals who have visited are amazed at. Making seven programmes of broadcastable quality is a serious achievement, but the incredible standard these students have achieved - *bhuil sin scéal eile*.

Amongst the programmes are *Giollai Dé* with Geraldine Heffernan from Carrick An Suir, Co Tipperary as Director and Alan Devitt from Shanakiel Co Cork as Editor. This programme gives insight into the secluded lives of the Monks residing in Mount Mellery, Cappoquin. Geraldine with her camera crew of three moved

into the Abbey for one week and gleaned first hand a true sense of the day-to-day lives of the Cistercians living there. Says Geraldine Heffernan "It was a wonderful experience to see such a different way of life, so quite and peaceful".

*Ól, Ceoil agus Craic* has Clíodhna Ní Néill from an Rinn Co Phort Láirge and Sinead Ní Choileáin from Kilmashogue Co Clare as co-Directors and Julie McGee from Killybegs Co Donegal as Editor. This is a magazine style documentary where two young people pose the question - "is traditional Irish music still alive in contemporary post Celtic Tiger Irish culture". They compare and contrast two nights out, one in the Waterford Gaeltacht of an Rinn and one in Cork city. Sinead said of their experiences "We were surprised to find that a lot of young people are still deeply immersed in traditional music, such as young Gaeltacht band 'Bothar Na Sop'".

The half hour documentary *Gobnait* features Eibhlín Ní Chríodáin from Baile Bhuirne Co Cork as Director and Deaglán De Paor from an Sean Phobal, Co Waterford as Editor. Here students investigate whether Gobnait, who even to this day has thousands of worshippers, is in fact a saint or more sinisterly... perhaps a witch. There is a palpable magic associated with *Gobnait* and this can be seen throughout the programme. There are children, singers and historians participating in this documentary. Ní Chríodáin says "there is so much more work involved in developing a story into a visually striking television programme - than one would ever consider but I enjoyed it immensely, it was a wonderful ex-

perience."

*Blian as Baile* with Máiréad Ní Mhurchú from Dunhill Co Waterford as Director and James Lynch from Kilmashogue Co Clare Editing is based on 'Scoil na Leanaf' a primary boarding school. Máiréad interviewed three generations of principals and three generations of students one of whom is former Taoiseach Dr Gareth Fitzgerald. The participants speak candidly of their experiences and memories, some happy - some sad but with a moving sincerity that takes us through the telling of each of the individual stories. Máiréad said of making the programme "it was very challenging and hard work, but looking at the almost finished product - as we are now, it is extremely rewarding".

*An Chogadh Ciúin* with Darina Clancy from Youghal, Co Cork - Directing and Tricia Hastings from Cora Chaitlín, Co Clare Editing is about Darina's fathers' experiences in the Congo. Her father was part of the 32<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the first Irish soldiers to go on a peace-keeping mission. The Irish Government responding to a UN call for troops sent over 650 soldiers to join other nations such as India and Sweden to the troubled Congo. As became apparent the Irish Army was very inexperienced at the time. The 32<sup>nd</sup> Battalion was described as pathfinders and paved the way for other Irish peace keeping missions. This story is a highly emotional one told through the eyes of Darina's fathers.

*Man Bites Dog, M'Uncail* with Rose-Ann Foley from an Rinn as Director and Julie Flavin from Kilmashogue Co Waterford as Editor documents the story of the iconic journalist and writer Donal Foley. It looks

back nostalgically at his life and his work. Twenty five years after his death Donal Foley is especially remembered for his satirical column in The Irish Times 'Man Bites Dog' and for his autobiography 'Three Villages'. The half-hour programme celebrates the impact Foley had on the Irish Times newspaper and on journalism in general. It looks at the various events in his life, which shaped his writing and his journalism, such as the fact that he was born in the Ring Gaeltacht of Co Waterford in challenging circumstances in 1922. In the programme Donal Foley is remembered as many recount their stories of him among them the writer Maeve Binchy and the Irish Times editor Geraldine Kennedy. The programme which includes impressive reconstruction scenes is presented by The Irish Times journalist Catherine Foley - niece of the subject.

*The Vinyl Frontier* sees Aileen Hughes from Ceann Trá, Co Chiarraí taking lead credits as both Director and Editor. The programme takes a look at the popular music format, the vinyl record. A collection of musicians, artists and vinyl enthusiasts offer insight into its distinctive appeal. It is a quirky and appealing telling of the enthusiasm and fondness that exists in abundance for Vinyl to this day.

Nemeton Training department have confirmed that they have already had a large number of applications for next September intake, and continue to receive applications. It seems that only one year in - and this course has already earned itself a strong reputation.

The mother and daughter team travel around the UK and Ireland and have gained a reputation for predicting, with uncanny accuracy what may lie ahead. The pair also work as mediums and can pass messages on from loved ones or spirits, bringing a sense of peace to those of us left behind.

## "Many Student Voters in Waterford Gagged by Government"

Fine Gael Candidate Cllr Paudie Coffey has described as a disgrace the fact that so many young people will be disenfranchised by the General Election being held on a Thursday.

"Fine Gael is committed to ensuring that all those entitled to vote are given the maximum opportunity to do so. Fine Gael recently proposed legislation in the Dáil to guarantee weekend voting, which would allow many more young people to have their say in the elections. Fianna Fail TDs Martin Cullen and Ollie Wilkinson and the rest of the Government voted against this.

"Young people who are in college in another part of the country will suffer most by holding this election on a Thursday. Forty per-cent of young people who did not vote in 2002 cited being away from home on polling day or not being registered as a reason for not voting.

"There are 650,000 people in Ireland aged between 19 and 28 and we must ensure that every single one of these voters is actively encouraged to vote and are given the greatest opportunity to do so.

"It is quite obvious Fianna Fáil and the PDs know they have let young people down on a whole range of issues including the cost of housing, mental health services and road safety and now they are running away from them", said Cllr Coffey.

"If the current Government had any regard for young voters they would have called a weekend poll. I encourage students who make an extra effort to get home to vote to make their annoyance felt at the ballot box by voting for change; voting Fine Gael".



# Ballyduff Native And Two Children Tragically Die In Accident

Prayers were offered at an early morning mass in Ballyduff in West Waterford on Friday last for local woman, Bernie Cassidy, 39, and her two young daughters, who tragically died in a crash between Urlingford and Cashel, Co. Tipperary on Thursday afternoon last.

Bernie Cassidy (nee Cunningham) grew up in Ballyduff but was living in Nass, Co. Kildare, with her husband, Karl, and daughters Caroline, three, and one-year-old Rosanne. She worked as a nurse at the Bon Secours Hospital in Glasnevin. She and her two children died at the scene of the crash.

It is understood the mother of two was travelling to the small West Waterford town to visit her elderly father, James Cunningham, when the crash occurred.

Ms. Cassidy's passing comes just eight months after the death of her mother, Abina.

Parish priest at St. Michael's Church in Ballyduff Upper, Fr.

Michael Cullinan said locals were "deeply saddened" by the tragic loss of Ms. Cassidy and her young daughters.

"Everybody is wicked sad. The community is deeply shocked at the loss of this young family. She (Bernie) comes from a beautiful family and has four brothers and a sister. Her mother only died last September and her father is infirm. They are excellent people - great caring people. It is an unspeakable tragedy."

Ms. Cassidy visited Ballyduff last month in order to participate in a guard of honour at the funeral of a friend who had died in the area. Her friends and relatives in the parish were trying to come to terms with the sudden deaths of the young mother and her two children.

Bernie's brother Patrick Cunningham said his sister was a very loving mother - and a dedicated and talented nurse.

"She was quiet and thoughtful and very kind."

Ms. Cassidy is survived by her husband, Karl; father, James; brothers, Phil, Gerard, Patrick and Seamus; and sister, Breda.

# Co. Waterford Beekeepers' Association Notes



In a number of countries in Northern Europe there is an annual expression of rivalry in seeing who can deliver the first jar of honey to market - just as we do in this country when it comes to landing the first salmon. Now this Spring has been as near perfect as beekeepers could wish for and our colonies have been reflecting this in the amount of bees present and honey gathered. I took particular advantage of these conditions and having moved some hives to a field of oil seed rape was able to extract and bottle honey by 3rd May. (Is this a record?) Once a super is filled with rape honey it must be removed because of the high proportion of glucose supersaturation in this type of honey. Had there not been a period of drought in April the crop could have been harvested earlier, since it first began to yield in earnest after rainfall. I could certainly recommend members to follow my example in the coming years as there is certainly going to be lots of oil seed rape about.

We had our first in a series of hive openings for the Association on Sunday 29 April at Pat Dillane's apiary in Clashmore. Despite a blustery and at times wet day, eight members braved the conditions and we saw bees in excellent condition and humour. We even witnessed the spotting of a Queen and her subsequent marking in far from perfect conditions. The following Saturday Michael Moynihan was host to members at his honey workshop and bottling plant in Colligan. Most of us hobby beekeepers are not familiar with anything on this scale as they were shown around by Michael and later the group visited an apiary "The Eagle's Nest" where Michael split a number of strong hives and took the new hives back to the workshop, where tea and refreshments were served.

Next date on the calendar is Sunday 20 May at Tony Murray's apiary at Carrigroe. Directions there from Dungarvan are to turn off at Power's Guesthouse at Ballinamuck towards Aghlish and look out for a sign on a left hand boreen which Tony will have marked! We shall expect good weather for hive opening and again I would urge beginners especially to attend as there is much to learn from these practical demonstrations.

Right now the abundance of whitethorn blossom is a heartening sight for all and especially for beekeepers so I hope all members are experiencing the rapid filling of supers.





# A Look Back At How Your Club Performed

At this time of the season we take a look back at the teams that competed in the WWEC in the past season and we give a personal analysis of each team. We always stress that it is our own personal analysis from what we saw in the season and we do not want to be critical of any team or club. If we can be helpful we are only too happy to do so.

This week we write and look at the 12 teams that comprised the Mari Mina Pharmacy Premier division, starting with the champions, Valley Rgs.

This time two years ago 2004/05, Valley Rgs were relegated from the premier winning only 3 games and Lismore winning the league, what a transformation in 24 months?

Valley bounced back 12 months later winning the 1st division and playing 14 league games undefeated. The season just gone saw them clinch the premier for only the 2nd time in their history. They also won the Dungarvan Tyre Centre Cup, becoming only the third team in the history of the league to record a league/cup double.

For many of the Valley players, success came after so many years of "nearly", but never claiming a title.

It is only their 2nd title, and the first time they won the cup after three defeats. For team captain Brendan Hickey who has given 15 years of unselfish service to the club, Sean Twomey, Jim Lane and others the past season has to be the best ever in their careers. The name Carr will always be synonymous with Valley Rgs, and the name was on the match cards this season as well.

To our friend Derry, we say well done, because Derry is what a club man is all about and we know he breathes Valley Rgs 7 days a week. Without a doubt they are our club of the year.

Mogeely finished as runners up and for much of the season they led the table. When they look back at the season they will see that Christmas, a time of cheer and goodwill, was anything but for them as they lost three games in the Christmas period.

They will probably say that over all they had a good season. Promoted at the end of last season as runners up the Valley, a touch of de-ja-vu one might say, it was always going to be difficult to repeat the success of 12 months ago as they contested 3 cup finals, winning two. We ourselves fancied Mogeely from the start to figure in the top four and runners up was without a doubt a success and they know what must be done next season to go that step more.

Cappoquin, after a disastrous season in 2005/06 in which they were almost relegated, depending on the last day's results, have had a fantastic season. With Michael Lacey at the helm, Cappoquin led the table up to the half way stage, and then for the remainder of the season were in the top two or three up to the final day with Mogeely and themselves changing places on a few occasions. However when Mogeely defeated Cappoquin at the Cappoquin venue, Mick Lacey's side were no longer contenders for the championship.

Cappoquin went out of the Dungarvan Tyre Centre Cup to Lismore in a cracker of a local derby under lights, and while no honours came to the club, finishing third after the disaster of the previous season, was a great achievement for the players and management and they can look forward to next season with renewed hope, and scoring 44 league goals was a wonderful return for at-

tacking football.

Araglen, promoted last June after finishing 3rd in the 1st division were in the top half of the table all season and finished the league campaign in 4th position. Indeed, many will say they were the surprise team of the season, but one must give credit where it is due and scoring 48 league goals tells it's own story. They had some marvellous results during the season and at no time were teams ever confident when playing against them, especially with the Kearneys in such brilliant scoring form for the season. In the cup semi final in Tallo we made them favourites to beat Valley Rgs. They lost by the only goal of the game and to the neutral present they had plenty of chances of defeating the future winners of the trophy. Overall the Araglen club can look back on a very successful season in the top bracket.

Ardmore proved once again how difficult it is to retain the championship trophy. The seaiders went into the season as favourites to retain the trophy, but as happened to other league winners, retaining the league title is a daunting task, and only Bride View have ever achieved this feat. Ardmore reached the semi final of the Dungarvan Tyre Centre Cup playing Bride View in Cappoquin and after both sides finished level, Ardmore lost the penalty shootout. They were also surprisingly defeated in the Bolger Cup at home to eventual winners Lismore. They lost a total of 7 games which has not happened for many a season, but they still managed to score a total of 50 goals, which is the same total as the champions Valley Rgs.

With much work being done at under age level, and the bulk of the team available for next season, Ardmore can be expected to be challenging for honours in the new season.

Bride View finished in 6th place, and had their worst ever start to the league campaign, lying in the bottom three for many of the early weeks of the campaign. The team was going through a transitional period, but still managed to reach the Tony Bolger Cup Final, being defeated in extra time by Lismore in a cracker of a cup final. They eventually got their performances together in the league and crept slowly up the table away from the relegation zone. Indeed their 42 league goals is testament to their attacking policy which Bride View is noted for. They reached the Tyre Centre Cup Final where they met their neighbours and old adversaries Valley Rgs, but had to give way to the Conna Side who came out on top by 2 goals to nil. With a wonderful underage structure in place, Bride View can look forward to next season with confidence.

Promoted from the 1st Division, where they finished 4th, An Ghaeltacht had a fantastic run in the first half of the league and were in the top three into December and in January were in joint 2nd place in the middle of January.

However they lost a vital league game to Mogeely in March and started to slip to 7th place for the rest of the season. An Ghaeltacht can be proud that the club supplied

4 players to the Oscar Traynor team that played the Limerick League in Limerick in November.

Liam O Linnain ended up winning the Golden Boot for the most League goals scored in the Premier Division, scoring a total of 19 league goals. One can only surmise how many goals Liam would have scored if he was able to play in all of the league games.

Needless to say Martin and Daithi and company are delighted with the team's performances throughout the year and we must admit, An Ghaeltacht, were a fancy for us to lift the title as we entered the Christmas games.

However not being able to field at full strength for many games did not help them, but they acquitted themselves well and know what lies ahead for next season.

Inch finished up in 8th place after a mixed season. In the Summer League they were pipped by Lismore in the last game for the title and then went on to reach the Tony Bolger Plate winning the final at the Cappoquin venue, defeating Blackwater by the only goal of the game. After this game they lost 6 league games on the trot, before they stopped a disastrous run of defeats that saw them hovering on the relegation zone. But a few good results, especially the defeat of Mogeely in the last league game made their premier status secure for the next season.

Peter, Declan and Co worked extremely hard both on and off the field of play for the club and the league was only delighted to grant the club the final of the Liam Fitzgerald Cup, and a wonderful success the club made on the day. Overall the Inch club will be happy enough with their season, even though they know they can improve for next season.

Accrington Celtic were in a relegation fight right down to the last few league games. In the first half of the campaign they were bottom of the table with Lismore just above them. At the start of the 2nd series of games they went to 3rd from bottom and stayed there practically to the final few games. They came to Lismore on Easter Monday knowing a win would almost certainly guarantee them Premier football next year and they came out on top by the only goal of the game. Result wise for them, their final game against Valley would make no difference to their league standings, but they made Valley fight all the way for the champions to win by one goal to nil.

When one looks back at the league tables for the past three seasons, Accrington have unfortunately finished in the bottom four on each occasion, which is a surprise with the talented players at their disposal. But again they are unable to field their strongest team each weekend.

Kilworth survived a relegation play off with Lismore to stay in the premier next season. Having lost their final league game to Lismore by 7 goals to nil, a result that tied both teams on level points, Kilworth came out on top in the play off through a Tommy Seymour goal and a wonderful display of goalkeeping by Mike O'Brien.

Like their neighbours Accrington,

Kilworth have for the past three seasons ended in the bottom four of the league, and this should not be with some of the most talented players in the league. We understand and know that much time and effort is being spent by their committee in procuring their own ground and when this achieved the ground will be the envy of many clubs in the league. We wish them every success with this venture.

For the second time in their illustrious career, Lismore have lost premiership status. After a wonderful start to the season, winning the Summer League and defeating neighbours Bride View in the final of the Bolger Cup in extra time, the league performances of the team never came up to expectations. Losing players who in the past two seasons had won the premier and finished as runners up, proved too much of a burden for the club, and they fielded one of the youngest Lismore teams in the premier for many years. They were never able to climb out of the bottom three place for the entire league and while they achieved success in the Lucozade Sport Munster Junior Cup, before being removed from the competition, they were never able to transfer this form to the league, culminating in finishing level on points with Kilworth, which necessitated a play off with the North Cork side winning by the only goal of the game.

Lismore, if they adopt the Valley Rgs attitude of 24 months ago, will be favourites to win the 1st division next season.

Gortroe, having played 17 league games found it impossible to continue playing and so withdrew from the league, with the points from their remaining 5 league games going to their opponents.

So the above is our look back at the teams that competed in the premier division. As we wrote at the outset and as we write each year, the review is our own personal view of what we have seen. Yes we have seen every team play and

more importantly we are probably better placed than anyone else to analyse each team as after all, each club contacts us every Sunday evening, as per rule, with their results.

We do not set out to be critical, and if it does appear to be critical to some all we can say is we would hope it can be looked on as constructive criticism.

Next week we will look back at the 1st Division.

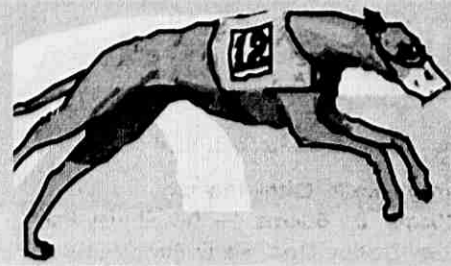

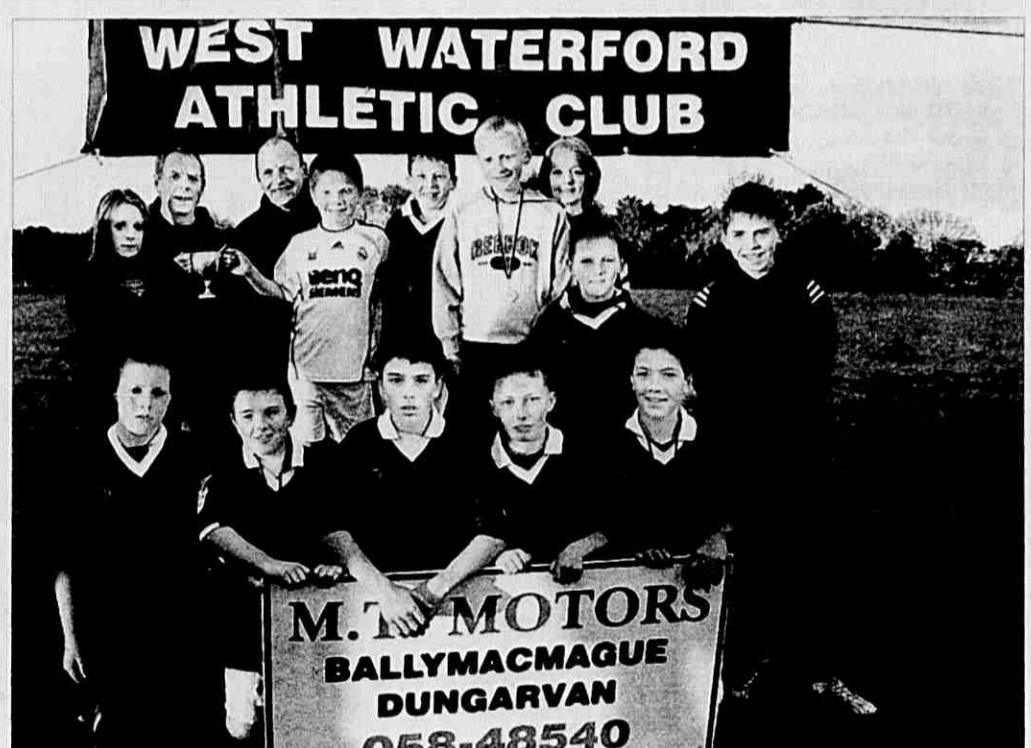

Just seven days after her runaway victory at Newmarket, the dream ended in nail-biting fashion as Christophe Soumillon brought Darjina from the rear of the field to beat Finsceal Beo by a head.

#### SAD END TO GREAT WEEK

It was a sad end to a week that saw the red-hot 5-4 favourite, trained by Jim Bolger and ridden by Kevin Manning, complete a tremendous victory at Newmarket. Finsceal Beo led two furlongs out and ran right away from the opposition, giving Ryan his first Classic.

Although a breakaway group of six started to race on the far side, they gradually joined the others towards the stands rail as Scarlet Runner and Fantasy Parkes took the field along in the early stages.

#### NEWMARKET

Finsceal Beo made significant progress at halfway and was ridden with great confidence by Manning, who used both her speed and stamina to stamp her authority on the fillies' Classic.

Arch Swing came out of the pack to make her bid but Mick Kinane's mount could never get near enough to put in a serious challenge.

Carlow-based handler Bolger was gaining compensation for the late defection from Saturday's 2000 Guineas of his star colt Teofilo.

He told Channel 4 Racing: "It's a pretty good feeling and I'm delighted for everybody concerned."

#### VICTORY

"I've put so much work into this filly and into all the horses in the yard. This one is down to my staff and the owner, Michael Ryan."

Manning said: "There was never a bother. I was little bit closer than I wanted to be, but she was carrying me there. She's done that very easily."

Michael Ryan, the Dungarvan based owner of the Al Eile stud added: "This is absolutely fantastic, my first Classic. There are 36 of us who have come over from Ireland for this."

"Jim Bolger is a super trainer and always has been."

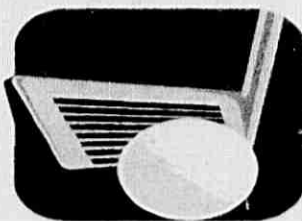

## COUNTY BOARD MEETING

In the report from Central Council at Monday nights meeting of the Senior Board delegates were informed that a reprieve has been granted to all divisional board officers whose terms were expected to expire at the end of the present year. These officers will now be entitled (if re-elected) to remain in office until 2010.

The decision has been regarded as being extraordinary in that county board officers are still subject to the limitations defined in rule 50 and officers who have completed five years cannot stand for election at the end of this year.

## Croke Park Finance

The details of the revenue from the I.R.F.U and the F.A.I games played at headquarters in February this year amounted to 7.5 million. Of this 5.5 million will go for regional development and will be spent mostly through the provincial councils. The remaining 2 million will be shared out among counties giving an average of €60,000 per county. Counties must decide themselves how best to dispose of this money. It was also pointed out that revenue of this amount is likely to be available also for the next three years should rugby and soccer continue to be played in Croke Park up until 2010.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE RETURNS

Delegates were also informed that returns from the National Hurling and Football League showed considerable increase over the previous year with football being up 80% and hurling approximately 70%.

## Insurance Officer

Each County must immediately appoint an insurance officer who will be a member of the executive committee without voting rights and will also be a member of the County committee.

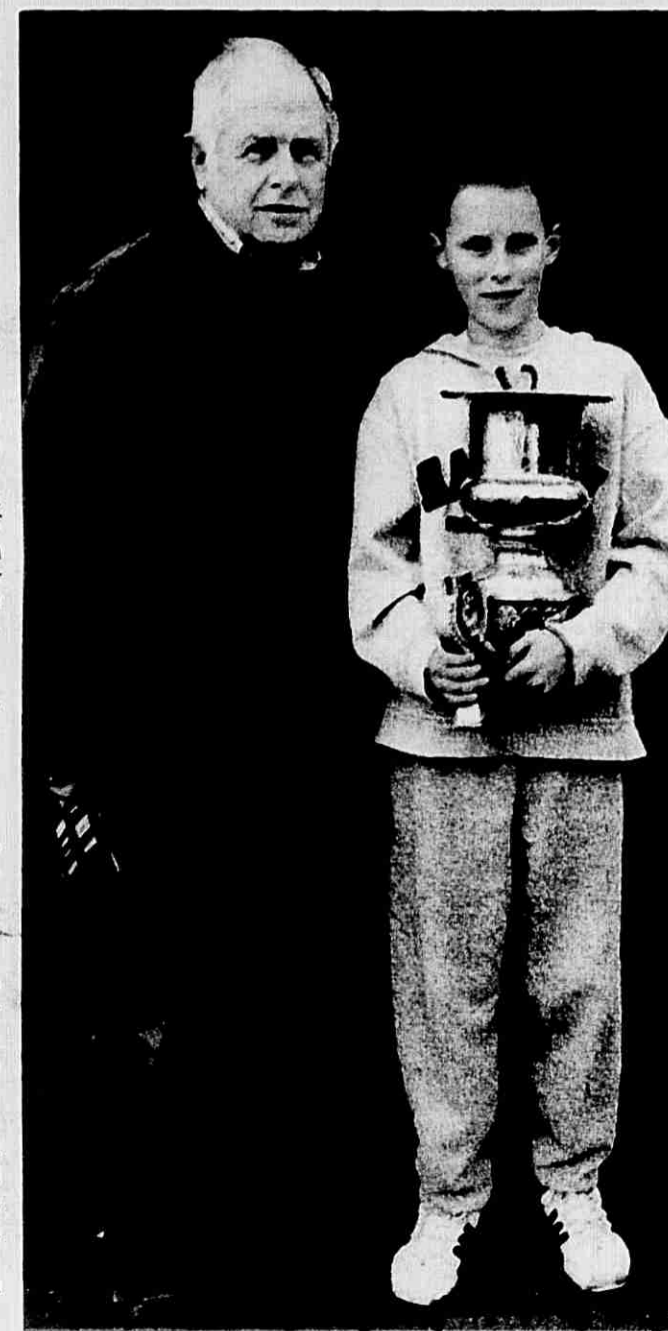

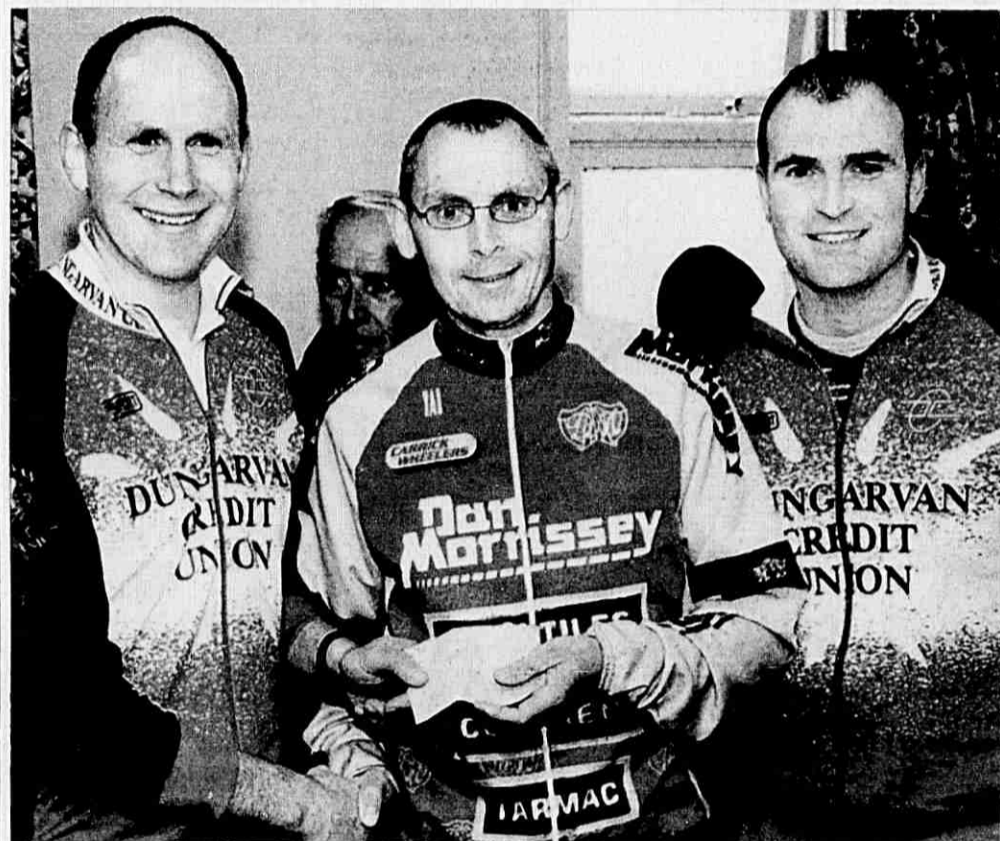

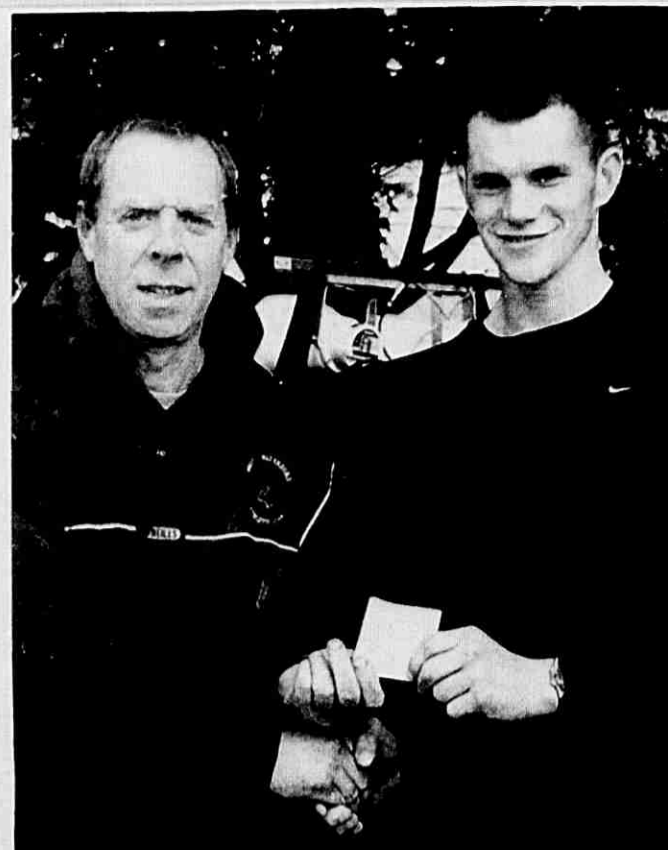
In section A which was one of the Men's sections, Sean Stilwell recorded four wins, one second and one third to claim

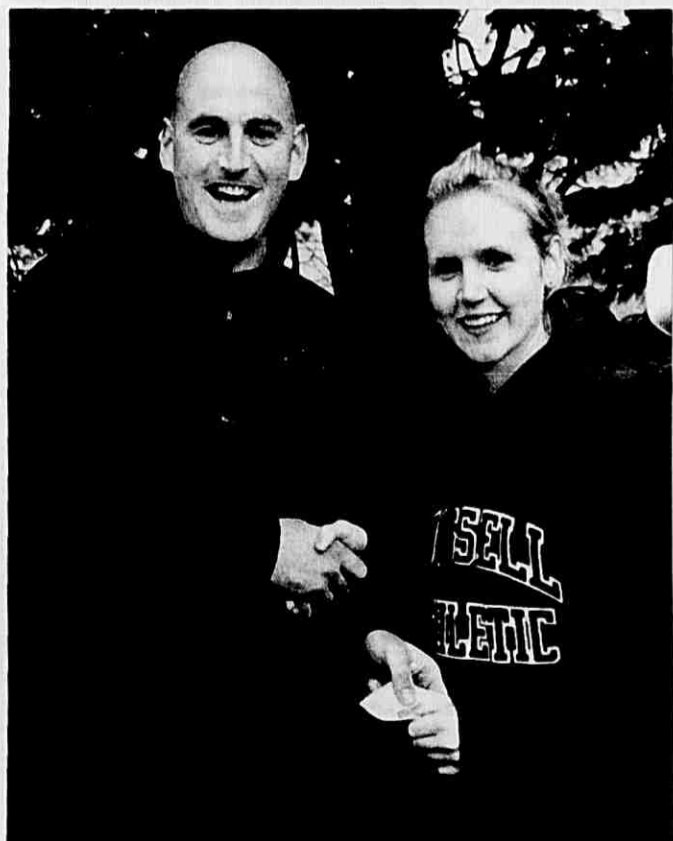

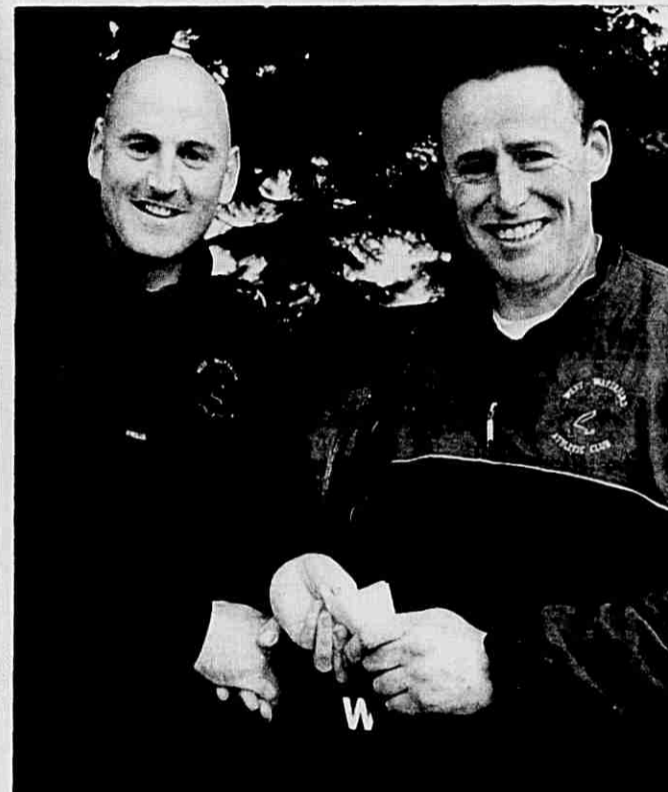

Please note that anybody is still welcome to run just a night or two if they are unable to make all the nights.

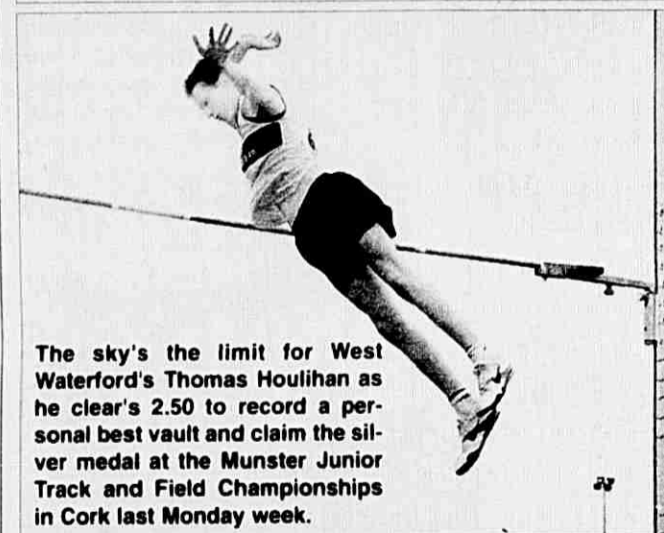

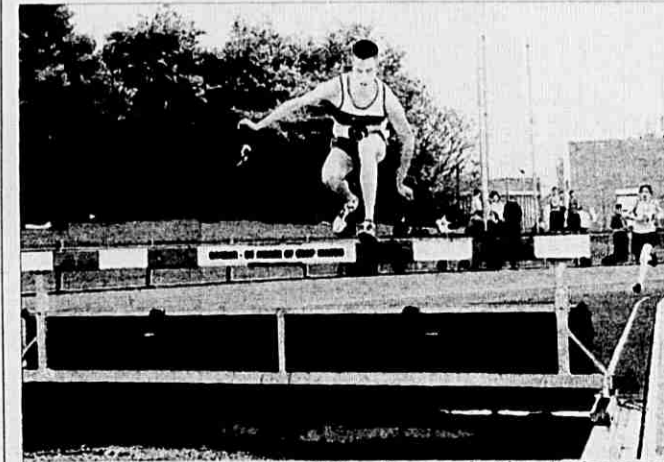
**Action from the Junior and Under-23 Track & Field Championships held recently in Cork**

## Jim Bolger Profile

Born in County Wexford on Christmas Day, 1941, James Stephen (Jim) Bolger was educated at Enniscorthy CBS and the College of Commerce, Rathmines. The farmer's son rode a handful of winners as an amateur. He initially trained and worked as an accountant before taking out a licence to train in July, 1976. He was based at Clonsilla, Co Dublin, close to the now-defunct Phoenix Park racecourse, before moving to his present base at Coolcullen, Co Carlow. His first winner was Peaceful Pleasure at Roscommon on September 20, 1976. He soon made an impact on the Irish scene, enjoying his first Classic victory with Give Thanks in the 1983 Irish Oaks. Over the years, Bolger has proved particularly adept at training fillies, such as the 1981 Yorkshire Oaks heroine Condessa, Flame Of Tara, winner of the Coronation Stakes in 1983 and later a high-class broodmare, Park Appeal, Park Express and Polonia. He has also enjoyed success over jumps and landed the Irish Champion Hurdle with Nordic Surprise in 1991 and with Chirkpar a year later. In 1991, Jet Ski Lady was a highly impressive 10-length winner of the Vodafone Oaks, belying her 50/1 odds, while St Jovite only found Dr Devious too good in the Vodafone Derby the following year. St Jovite subsequently romped home in the Irish Derby by 12 lengths and then took the King George VI & Queen Elizabeth Diamond Stakes at Ascot. Blue Judge was second in the 1993 Vodafone Derby, despite starting at 150/1. In recent years, his best horses have included the 2002 Irish Oaks victor Margarula, who sported the colours of his wife Jackie, and the globetrotting Alexander Goldrun who won five Group One races. A wonderful season in 2006 saw Bolger train both the top-rated juvenile colt and juvenile filly in Europe with Teofilo and Finsceal Beo. Jackie Bolger met her husband while he was working as an accountant and has always played a pivotal role in the stable. Jim Bolger once remarked: "Jackie and I have always been very much a partnership - I think this business lends itself to that." The couple married on April 24, 1965, and have two daughters - Una (who is married to stable jockey Kevin Manning) and Fiona. The Bolgers have successfully developed a breeding operation and currently own around 30 mares. A number of famous names have worked for Bolger over the

years including Tony McCoy, Aidan O'Brien, Peter Scudamore and Willie Mullins. Jim's latest classic success arrived in Newmarket a couple of weeks back courtesy of the County Waterford owned filly Finsceal Beo who romped to victory in the 1000 Guineas.

Amazingly Aintree Grand National Winning trainer Gordon Elliot sent out his first ever winner on Irish soil when his jockey brother Joey guided Toran Road to victory over hurdles at the initial race meeting held in 2007 at Kilbeggan.

## Archipenko can lead O'Brien's cavalry charge

If last week's Derby trials at Chester are anything to go by, Aidan O'Brien will be bringing more horses to Epsom next month than Alexander The Great brought to Egypt.

The Final Furlong's pin fell immaculately on his Solider Of Fortune as the likely winner of the Chester Vase. Okay, the prohibitive starting price (4/9) means that I won't be receiving too many plaudits from even the column's most loyal subjects.

But a winner is a winner.

And Chester had more than just equine winners last week. Alex Ferguson hired a minibus, put his Premiership champions into it, and shot over to the races for a look.

The Red Nosed One had a warm fancy for Maraahel in the first on Thursday and, far from deterred by the odds of 4/6, Ferguson lobbed some loose change onto the counter. Accumulated, the assembled shrapnel made into a £1,000 bet on the favourite and, despite a bobbing, nervy finish, Richard Hills conjured a victory aboard Michael Stoute's charge.

His biggest gamble since Michael Carrick some might say, but can you imagine what Fergie's 'few pound' would do to the Tote pool in Tramore!

Stoute and O'Brien dominated the big race wins at Chester with Mick Kinane aboard more winners than most, but despite Ballydoyle's dominance of the middle distance races abroad this past week, it was the performance of another inmate at home that impressed me most.

Archipenko was sent off at a very generous 8/1 for Sunday's Derrinstown Stud-sponsored trial at Leopardstown, a race where O'Brien supplied four of the five runners. Settled in third for most of the way, Kinane sent Archipenko about his business and this exquisitely-bred son of Kingmambo dealt with his contemporaries in a telling fashion.

To my mind, this performance announces Archipenko as a serious Derby contender. As Derby trials go, the Derrinstown is as good as they

come. Sinndar, Gallileo and High Chapparral all won this race before glory at Epsom - Alamshar and Dylan Thomas took this before winning the Irish Derby at the Curragh.

There's a perception that Ladbrokes know the time of day at Ballydoyle better than any of their rivals, and they make Archipenko a 14/1 chance for Epsom - four points behind the very smart Eagle Mountain. I'm led to believe that O'Brien suspects

Eagle Mountain may have too much pace for the 12-furlong Derby distance.

If that is the case, Archipenko is worth a few speculative pennies this week at those ante-post odds.

## LAY OF THE WEEK

I'll be taking on the penalised Sergeant Cecil in this week's Emirates Airline Yorkshire Cup. True, he's a course and distance winner with Frankie Dettori aboard and comes into the race after a nice prep run at Newbury.

He was second in the race to Percussionist last year but improved as the season went on. So why oppose him then?

I think Friday's race looks a keenly-contested Group 2 for stayers. Munsef has been crying out for a mile six, last year's winner Percussionist comes into the reckoning if there's some juice in the ground, and lots of the younger stayers have scope for improvement.

Sergeant Cecil could win - no doubt - but at a short price he's a lay, not a play.

## INTO THE NOTEBOOK

One of our earlier entries, Followmyfootsteps, ran creditably to finish sixth, beaten just three and a half lengths in Sunday's French 2,000 Guineas. Our assertion that he's a Pattern horse will be borne out in no time.

But for this week's notebook entry, we'll switch codes and drop more than a few grades. Amidst all the top class racing at Leopardstown and Longchamp on Sunday, a fiercely-competitive handicap hurdle took place at Killarney.

The remarkable Nina Carberry was at her best to drive Dolphin's Bay home for a head victory in the valuable Murphy's Stout-sponsored feature. The second horse Jubilant Note was sent off the 8/1 favourite and looks the one to take from the race.

He's a keen type - making Davy Russell his ideal pilot - but has loads of ability and finds more for pressure than you would think. He'll go up a few pounds from his mark of 120 on Sunday but Jubilant Note will have to enter calculations for the Galway Hurdle if it's top of the ground at Ballybrit in the first week in August.
