String Of Arson Attacks Shocks Quiet Rural Area

THREE HOUSES SET ABLAZE IN MALICIOUS FIRES

Three unoccupied homes, including two holiday homes, one of which was extensively renovated and was about to be put on the market for sale, were set ablaze in a series of arson attacks which has shocked and disturbed a quiet rural area of West Waterford.

The latest arson attack occurred on Tuesday night/Wednesday morning of last week, when arsonists set fire to the roof of a secluded thatched cottage at Bleach, mid way between the quiet scenic villages of Aghlish and Villierstown.

Two units of Dungarvan Fire Brigade responded to the fire, and fought the blaze for several hours.

However, the roof was extensively damaged as a result of the fire.

TWO MALICIOUS FIRES

It followed two malicious fires within one hundred yards of each other over the course of two months at Ballingown, outside Villierstown.

The first arson attack occurred on the 1st of March to a holiday home which was recently extensively renovated and valued at over a

quarter of a million euros. The house is now believed to be unsaleable. Nobody was living in the house at the time.

WITHIN SIGHT OF EACH OTHER

Within sight of this house, another holiday home owned by an English resident who intended returning to the house in Ballingown to live in the next few years, was attacked when two separate fires were started. *Continued on page 9*

Status Quo Remains For Parties In 30th Dail

BUT CHANGING OF THE GUARD FOR SOLDIERS OF DESTINY

The party representation from the Waterford constituency to the 30th Dail has remained at the status quo, but there was a changing of the guard for Fianna Fail with Ollie Wilkinson losing out to Brendan Kenneally after a tight battle that went right down to the wire at a tense Butler Community Hall.

The result of the eleventh and last count, the distribution of Brian O'Shea's surplus, took place in the early hours of Saturday morning, and saw scenes of wild jubilation for Kenneally's camp when the former accountant

from Waterford City took the second seat for Fianna Fail after edging out Wilkinson without reaching the quota.

DISAPPOINTMENT

It was an intense disappointment for the Tourin man, who saw a significant downturn in his first preference vote from 2002. The writing was on the wall once Wilkinson failed to produce a substantial lead over Kenneally, O'Shea and Coffey, and the fourth seat, always viewed as the most vulnerable, came down to a dog fight between the two Fianna Fail candidates.

TRANSFERRING POORLY

With Wilkinson transferring poorly, Kenneally secured a lead which extended with every count, and by the eleventh count was close to 1,000 votes ahead, and deemed elected.

"I was disappointed," Wilkinson said afterwards. "I couldn't say otherwise. While I was there, I did my best, and I was very privileged to be able to help a number of organisations and schools and particularly many individuals. There was great satisfaction out of that."

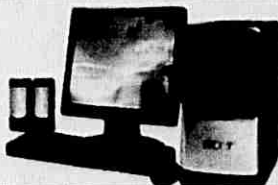

Finsceal Beo Lands Guineas Double For Ryan

Finsceal Beo dug deep to win the Boylesports Irish 1000 Guineas at the Curragh, capturing the Guineas double and sparking scenes of jubilation in the winners enclosure, where a huge entourage of family, friends and supporters of the Dungarvan-based owner, Michael Ryan gathered.

Ridden by Kevin Manning, Jim Bolger's filly had a shade too much for the fast-finishing Dimenticata.

ONLY SECOND DOUBLE

In landing this prestigious prize, Finsceal Beo became only the second filly following Attraction in 2004 to win both the English and Irish Guineas.

Ryan and Bolger's 9-10 favourite were content to sit patiently in mid-division during the

early throes of the race as the front-running Peeping Fawn and Truly Mine ensured a generous gallop.

This enabled Finsceal Beo, headed in the shadow of the post in the French 1000 Guineas on her last start, to slowly crank up the gears.

COMMANDING LAND

A few reminders from Manning just before the one-furlong pole seemed to put the race to bed as the daughter of Mr Greeley galloped into a commanding lead from Truly Mine.

But thoughts of premature celebrations were put on ice as 66-1 shot Dimenticata, ridden by Chris Hayes, came close to causing an upset inside the final 500 yards.

Finsceal Beo just held on after a photo-finish, however, and had a neck in reserve at the line.

GREAT PERFORMANCE

Bolger said: 'I am very happy with her, it was a great performance. The fact she has had three very busy weeks has nothing to do with the way she has run, she is just much better on top of the ground.'

'She's had to be at her best to win on that ground. She's in the Coronation Stakes (at Royal Ascot) but I'm not sure if we will go there.'

'If we are going to step up to 10 furlongs in the likes of the Pretty Polly we will probably give it (Ascot) a miss.'

'She is the best at a mile I have ever trained, although Flame Of Tara wouldn't be far behind her at the distance.'

Local Kayak Expedition Sets Off From Lookout

Three Men Begin Audacious Journey

A local Kayak expedition around the coast of Ireland for the Make A Wish foundation, set off from the Lookout in Dungarvan at 9.05am on Sunday last. Brian Fahy, Tony O'Mahoney and Derek Lyons, all from Dungarvan made good progress despite windy conditions with a north westerly wind at their backs. "We made it as far as Whiting Bay by lunchtime," Brian reported on their blog, which keeps their supporters, friends and family updated on their progress.

"Conditions were rough at the beginning but we made good progress in the middle of the day. When conditions changed again this evening (Sunday) we called it a day in Garryvoe, Co. Cork, 33.5 miles on and over 7.5 hrs of paddling."

Only a handful of Irish Kayakers have completed the full circumnavigation of Ireland before. The team are experienced Kayakers, and the trip, of between 1,000 and 1,100 miles, is expected to take them between 30 and 35 days.

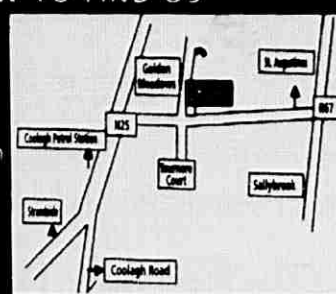

Go Ahead For Multi-Million Euro Retail Development

400 JOBS TO BE CREATED IN INNOVATIVE PLANS

A multi-million retail and residential development, which would create around 400 jobs, was granted planning permission by Dungarvan Town Council. Villierstown-based developer, Andy Hally, received planning permission for the

development on a 1.4 ha site opposite the Dungarvan Shopping Centre, between the SGC cinema and Tom Curran's Hardware store. Mr. Hally purchased the site from a consortium whose plans for a power station on the site fell through a number of years ago.

JOBS

The proposed development is expected to create upwards of 200 jobs in the construction phase and that many again when operational.

Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair said a development of this kind showed the vibrancy of the town, and said it would be particularly welcome in terms of freeing up car parking spaces in the centre of Dungarvan.

"It's a good thing there'll be so many extra parking spaces made available because parking is an ongoing problem in Dungarvan," he said.

"If you look at the centre of the town, the square in particular, the demands on parking are quite intense.

"Obviously, having a new option available nearby where around 300 spaces would be provided would prove very significant as regards traffic management, in particular in terms of parking."

DEVELOPMENT

The development would have a total gross floor area of 32,000 square metres and comprise the construction of two buildings, linked by a walkway. The first building would include 178 basement car park spaces, a large retail and ancillary area of 4,866 sq m on the ground floor and office and ancillary areas of 4,792 sq m on the first floor.

Above that, on the second floor, the developers plan 39 two bed 2 storey dwellings and 1 three bed 2 storey dwelling.

A creche, meeting room, roof garden and children's play area are also all proposed.

CAR PARKING

The second building would be slightly smaller and consist mainly of car parking spaces.

It would include 83 basement car park spaces, and 89 car park spaces on the 2nd floor. On the 3rd floor, the

developers propose to have office and ancillary area space of 2,367 sq m, while there would be a further 30 surface car park spaces.

Walton's Park To Open In July

Work on Walton's Park is expected to be finished in the next two months and the park is due to open in July.

Extensive work has been ongoing in the Abbeyside park, which is hoped to bring an end to youths gathering drinking late at night in the area.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty acknowledged: "Progress has been slow. We're looking at the end of July to have it finished, and opened."

It followed concerns expressed by Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield at the May meeting of the town council.

The location of the public art sculpture in the park was also questioned. However, Mr. O'Flaherty said it would be kept on site. Confusion then arose over what the art sculpture depicted, which Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan described as "a bit of mystery."

While Labour Mayor, Teresa Wright suggested it was a salmon jumping out of the water, Fianna Fail councillor, Nuala Ryan said she'd been told it was a sundial.

"It's abstract art," Cllr. Wright eventually said. "It could be anything. We will have to have a competition to find out what it is."

Council Grant Permission For 146 Houses At Monang

Link Road Should Be Completed Before Development Goes Ahead

The developers of a 146 house estate at Monang, granted planning permission recently, should be required to develop the link road to the N25.

Monang road is due to be widened in multi-million euro works, but at least part of the works were dependent on development contributions from the developers of the estate, Ruben Houses from Carrigaline, Co. Cork.

The condition of the road was the subject of criticism from Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan.

"It's in a dreadful condition. If this takes place, before the road widening works, it will be unpassable," he said. The road is too narrow for construction traffic, and the problems now being experienced will get worse.

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said the council is meeting with the designers of the development. A preliminary design of the new link road has been done and they should have a definitive answer as to the way forward in the next two to three weeks.

He suggested they discuss the matter further in committee. However, he did say, that in the past few weeks, the town council officials have met with the objectors to the road widening project, and they are currently collating a report on the meeting for the members to inspect.

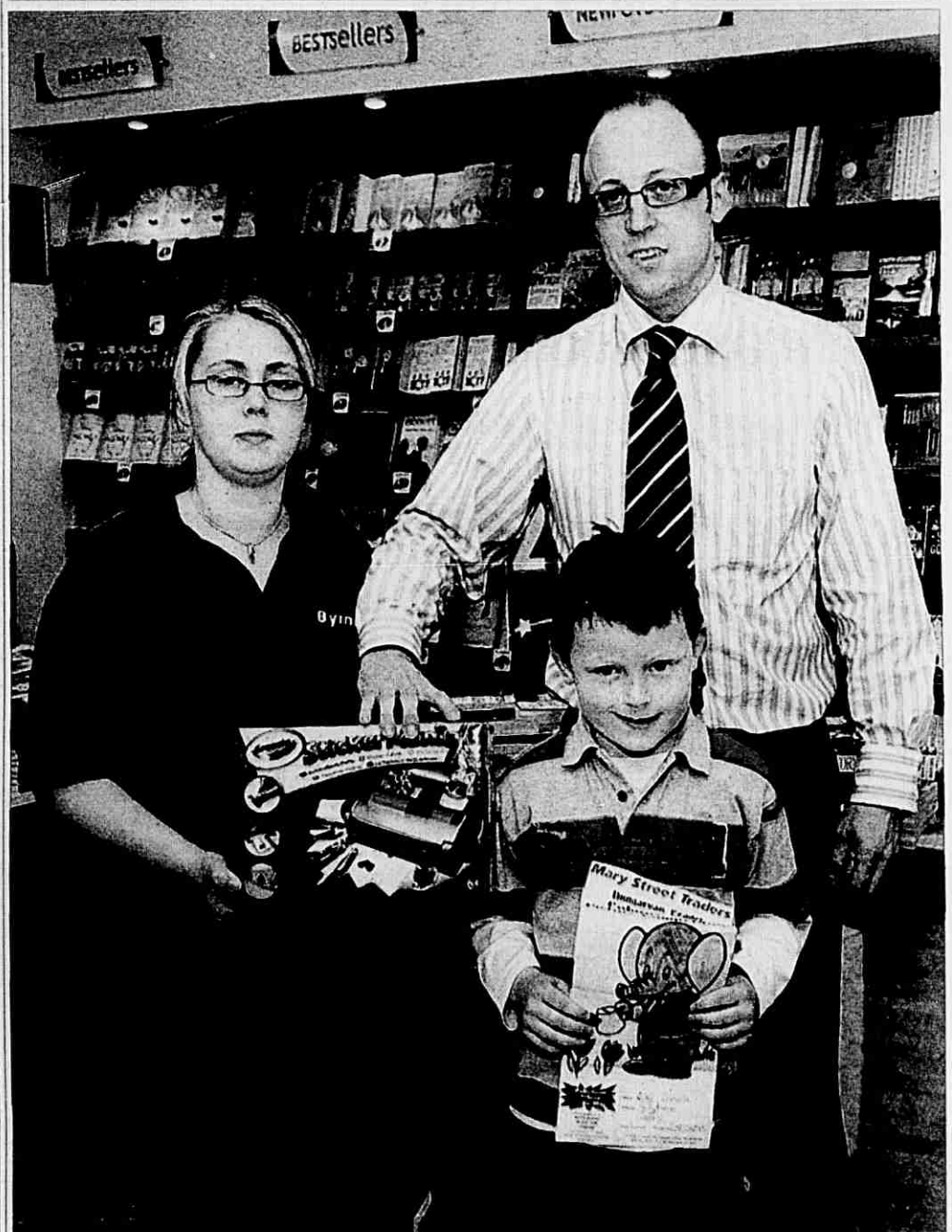

The links between Dungarvan and its sister city, Erie in Pennsylvania were strengthened further when Mercyhurst College Choir performed at Abbeyside Church, and were accorded a Civic Welcome by Dungarvan Town Council on Saturday last. The forty-five strong member choir visited St. Augustine's College, then sang at the Vigil Mass in Abbeyside Church before giving a free concert afterwards.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Teresa Wright extended a warm welcome to the choir in the Council Chamber earlier on Saturday afternoon.

FOUNDING OF COLLEGE
Sr. Eileen Troy recalled the founding of Mercyhurst College in 1926 by the Mercy Order.

"I am pleased that the two cities are joined through their respective Councils," she said, "but we can also claim a link through the Mercy Order. We have a long history of service through education as well as medical care here in Dungarvan as well", she continued, "and I am pleased to have been part of that. I hope your stay here in Ireland will be a happy one and that you will return again some day."

VISIT
"It is only a little over two months since we had the pleasure of a visit from an official delegation from Erie City Council and other interests and concluded an agreement under the Sister City Programme which will encourage and help to foster closer cultural, educational and economic links between our two communities," she said.

"I am very optimistic for this initiative and I know that your visit will cement these ties further and endorse the movement in the minds of our townspeople. FRUITFUL STAY

Principal of St. Augustine's College, Joe Moynihan recalled the 30 year link between Mercyhurst College in Erie and the local Friary college.

"Over the last three decades or so," he said, "we have sent about twenty students to study at the College where there are four studying presently. I am delighted to join with the Mayor and other guests in welcoming the Mercyhurst Choir which is another tangible and useful link in the process of bonding our two communities."

FOSTER LINKS

Criticism Of Removal Of Funding For Mental Health Programme

There was renewed criticism of the cessation of the 'Sonas' programme by HSE, which helps those with mental health problems at a meeting of Dungarvan Town Council.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said it is paramount the HSE provide help those with mental health problems, and felt the HSE had "questions to answer" regarding the funding issues around the programme.

Dermot Halpin, local area manager with the HSE told the town council that the project was pilot programme for the academic year 2005/2006 only.

REVIEW

"As with all pilots," he added, "such projects are subject to review."

"The client group supported by the 'Sonas' programme completed their course at the end of the academic year involved."

"County Waterford Vocational Education Committee was contracted by the HSE to deliver the core modules of the 'Sonas' project in Dungarvan."

"The project was the subject of discussion with the VEC prior to completion of the academic year. It became clear that the programme would not be continuing beyond September 2006, as there was insufficient interest and new referrals from prospective clients."

FURTHER EDUCATION OPTIONS

"The fact that this pilot has not continued in Dungarvan for 2006/2007 would not have prevented individuals from accessing other further education options in the area tailored to their needs operating through mainstream education and training providers such as FAS and Adult Education services."

He went on to say: "The HSE endeavours to provide a comprehensive range of mental health and other services to the population of the Waterford Local Health Office Area, and we will keep under review the potential to develop this or other options in the Dungarvan area in the future."

However, Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan took issue with the reply. He said it is precisely because those with mental health problems are not able to access further education options that this programme was so important.

VIEWPOINT

DEASY'S COMMENTS UNGRACIOUS

Deputy John Deasy is not one to let go of anything once he has sunk his teeth in. It's his greatest strength as an advocate, determined, steely to the point of self-righteousness, and quite a few people (Viewpoint included) have stared down the well aimed barrel of his shotgun diplomacy.

But this same virtue is also his greatest flaw as a politician - he digs his heels in, determined at any cost to be proved right. He is not willing to back down even when he's been proved wrong or smooth down fallings out.

So it was without surprise that Viewpoint heard his comments after his election success. On what should have been an occasion to leave old grudges behind and focus on the positive and the future, on uniting his party locally and nationally, on the back of what was a spectacularly successful election campaign, he choose once again, as he always seems so capable of doing with such careless abandon, to drive the wedge deeper on both fronts.

Locally he did nothing to heal the wounding internal divisions within the Fine Gael party by calling the decision to run Coffey "utterly stupid" - a barb that the majority of Fine Gaelers who backed Coffey's tilt at the Dail won't quickly forget.

The reality is his comments were ungracious in the extreme, unfair and plain wrongheaded. Coffey produced a stunning campaign that almost caused the shock of the election. Just one or two months ago, he was a virtual unknown amongst the general public, trailing in the polls at 5%.

He was a first time candidate who didn't have a ready made core base to take over. With the backing of the county councillors in an intensive four weeks, however, he captured close to 10% of the vote, and was well clear of Sinn Fein's David Cullinane, and only just short of the first preferences achieved by Brian O'Shea and Brendan Kenneally. The least that could be said of the young Portlaoise man is that he is one for the future.

He was the first choice for those 4,658 Fine Gaelers not enamoured by Deputy Deasy's first term, although the 3,000 plus transfers - without any coherent voting strategy between the Deasy and Anti-Deasy camps - prevents an easy analysis of how much exactly of the Coffey vote was as a result of disaffection with Deasy.

Contrast this with the performance of Jim D'Arcy, the third Fine Gael candidate, and the candidate Deasy's camp choose over Maurice Cummins in that divisive selection convention.

D'Arcy was also at 5% in the Red C poll, but come the real poll on Thursday languished at around 2%. To suggest he would have challenged for a second seat had Coffey not run is frankly laughable.

Not content to annoy his local camp moreover, Deasy also lashed out at his party leader, making good his promise to call for Kenny to go after failing to get into Government.

This was despite the fact that Fine Gael was a virtual basket case when Kenny took over five years ago, and Fine Gael captured twenty extra seats after a good campaign that put Kenny to the forefront.

The danger for Deasy, though Viewpoint respects him for his forthrightness, is that his central advocacy, his hard work for people on the ground, gets lost behind the constant calls for people in power to go, and amid his ability to create a maelstrom of infighting all around him.

WILKINSON LOSES OUT TO KENNEALLY AFTER BATTLE ROYALE

As most commentators predicted the party representation will remain the same for Waterford in the 30th Dail.

But there will be a changing of the guard among the Soldiers of Destiny.

After a battle royale that continued into the late hours of the night at Butler Community Hall, Kenneally eventually won out on the eleventh count without reaching the quota.

Wilkinson must have had the creeping feeling that he wouldn't be representing Waterford over the next term after the tallies for the first preferences were known.

He was just a percentage point ahead of Kenneally and O'Shea - a matter of a few hundred votes.

Due to the way the transfer works, with city candidates' votes staying mostly in the city, when Cullen's surplus was divided and with the elimination of the next seven - all city - candidates, he needed to be well ahead to have any chance of grimly holding on to the fourth and last seat.

Sadly for Wilkinson this was not the case. And West Waterford has lost the distinction of holding half the constituency's public representatives. Considering that the rural electorate is now greater than the city, this is a disappointment indeed.

Also disappointed after Friday's count will be Sinn Fein's David Cullinane who was widely tipped to make a strong challenge for a seat.

He was poised at around 9% in a Red C opinion poll, but fell 3% to 6% in the only poll that matters. It was part of a wider collapse in the Sinn Fein vote that saw the party, instead of gaining five seats to 10 or 11, lose one seat instead to 4.

The fires were started on April 5th at about 5pm.

"Despite the efforts of the fire brigade, called by my neighbours, the rear part was totally destroyed," the owner of the house, told the Dungarvan Leader.

"My home was rendered uninhabitable."

INTENSE CONCERN

The series of fires has caused intense concern among home owners in the area.

"People are wondering who's next," said another resident living nearby.

"Somebody is going to get seriously injured or even killed if these criminals are not put out of circulation."

Gardai in Aghlish are keeping an open mind as to whether the incidents were connected or not, but believe this is likely.

WORRY

"A lot of people are worried," Garda Nugent of Aghlish Garda Station said.

"There are a lot of vacant houses out there, a lot of holiday homes. The first two were habitable and a lot of damage was done to them.

"The last one was a thatched home, and half of it is burned down. It's a very old house. It's hard to know whether it can ever be made habitable again or not.

"You're talking about three houses over the course of three months. It is very worrying especially for people living in what is a rural area."

Status Quo Remains For Parties In 30th Dail

We weren't able to do everything we set out to do. But, by and large, I'm happy that I did my best over the last five years.

"We'll just have to pick up the pieces now and look to the future."

SEANAD ELECTIONS

He added: "I'll be running now for the Seanad and we're already in motion there, and we'll just have to see what happens.

"The outcome of the Senate elections will certainly have a big bearing on the future, but it is my intention to run again (for the Dail)," he said.

FIRST COUNT

By that stage, Martin Cullen had already spectacularly taken the first seat for Fianna Fail on the first count, polling 11,438, almost 3,000 votes more than he'd taken in 2002, and a firm endorsement of his campaign to once more represent Waterford at the cabinet table, from where, over the last term, he channelled significant funding into the city and county.

With a turnout of 68.7% of the 72,737 electorate, the quota was set at 9,906, which Cullen surpassed.

CABINET

Cullen was one of the first to be elected in the country, and the father of four must now be a firm favourite to take a cabinet portfolio when a Government is formed.

Outspoken maverick, Fine Gael's John Deasy increased his vote slightly from '02, despite a strong showing from his party colleague, Paudie Coffey in the county.

He polled 7,554 first preferences, and was particularly strong in the Dungarvan electoral area, and Kilmacthomas.

CONCERNED

The Deasy camp had been concerned that Coffey's introduction to the field would dilute the Deasy vote in the county, and divert from the favoured one City candidate, and one County candidate strategy.

In the end, it took until the 9th Count, with the distribution of Coffey's votes, for Deasy to reach the quota, though he never looked in trouble. Deasy received 3,616 transfers from Coffey to bring him over the quota, and spark celebrations in the Deasy camp, as the Dungarvan-based former party justice spokesperson was held aloft.

LASHED OUT

However, after the dust settled, Deasy again lashed out at the decision to add Coffey to the ticket, and at his own party's leadership.

He described the decision to add a third candidate to the ticket as "utterly stupid" considering Fianna Fail had over 46% of the vote in 2002, and increased that again.

"If there wasn't a third candidate who knows what would have happened," he said referring to the possibility of a second seat for Fine Gael.

Deasy also repeated his call for an "attitude change" in Fine Gael, and a "credible leader" in remarks about Kenny who led the party to a 20 seat gain.

LABOUR

There had been some concern in the Labour camp, over Brian O'Shea's seat after a first preference poll that was down by over 600 votes on '02. However, the Tramore man always transfers well, and gained, then

overtook both Wilkinson and Kenneally to take the third seat on the tenth count.

There were some indications that Labour was squeezed by the two main parties in common with the national trend.

"We ran a very good campaign," O'Shea told the 'Dungarvan Leader'. "Ger Barron was an exceptional director of elections, and throughout the county and the city, the organisation delivered an excellent campaign."

LAST WEEK SWING

"We got a really tremendous response as we went around, but in the last week, it was becoming obvious that there was a definite swing in the direction of the existing Government."

"Obviously in Waterford that was Fianna Fail, because there wasn't a PD candidate here. And the fact that it became clear that the likelihood was that Fianna Fail would be back in power Martin Cullen gained a lot of votes towards the end of the election."

"The vote that we got didn't reflect how the campaign was going up to the last week, but we were very pleased to hold the seat, and obviously I'm most grateful to the people of Waterford for returning me now for the fifth time to serve them as a Dail Deputy."

JUNIOR PAGE PRECIOUS METALS

Precious metals are those that are valued because they are rare and attractive, and are not easily scratched or worn away. Precious metals include gold, silver and platinum. They are found in pure form, either by mining or by sifting the mud from river beds and streams.

Gold Is Used To Make Spacesuits

Platinum, gold and silver are all prized for making into jewellery, but they also have many other uses. Platinum is used to make electronic circuits because it does not rust or wear out. Thin films of gold are used to reflect heat rays from visors on spacesuits and from the windows of skyscrapers. Silver is used in chemistry, medicine and photography. Photographic films and paper have a thin coating of silver which is sensitive to light.

Hallmarks Were Invented To Stop Silversmiths Cheating

In the 14th century, a system of testing and stamping silver was introduced. This was to stop silversmiths from dishonestly mixing silver with cheaper metals. The system, called hallmarking, has been used for precious metals ever since. Every silver article over 15.5g (1/2 oz) must be tested and marked - although sometimes hallmarks can be forged!



Gold Can Cause A Stampede

In 1848, a saw mill owner in the Sierra Nevada Mountains in California, USA, was digging out a stream to power his mill, when he found grains of gold. The news leaked out, starting the biggest gold rush in history. People rushed from all over the USA, hoping to strike for gold by swilling pans in streams or rivers, so that sand and gravel flowed away, leaving heavier grains of gold behind. Gold remains so rare that some people estimate that all the gold ever mined would fit into a cube 18m (60ft) square.

Lithium is the lightest metal, and was discovered in 1817 by a Swedish chemist.

Bronze was the first alloy made by humans, when they mixed copper with tin to produce a substance that could be used for tools and weapons.

★
In ancient Greece, around 400BC, the 'laughing philosopher' Democritus suggested that all matter was made up of an infinite number of unsplitable atoms.

Atoms can in fact be split, and splitting the atoms in uranium generates three million times more energy than the same weight of coal could produce.

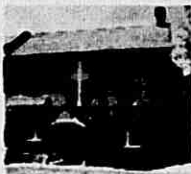

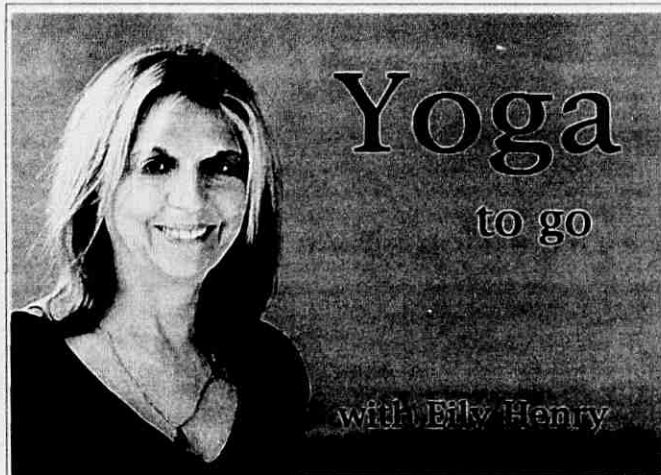

Yoga to go

with Eily Henry

Yoga for the 4-7 year olds

The inner confidence that Yoga brings is an excellent antidote to the pressure to succeed that children can experience at school. From a very early age many children learn that to be seen as successful they must strive to be better than their peers. Winning and pushing everyone out of the way is now the only goal in sight. This kind of intense competition makes children hypersensitive to praise and criticism. If they do happen to do well at school they become self congratulating, if they do less well they become discouraged and may start to see themselves as failures.

In contrast Yoga advocates a non-competitive approach to life. Yoga philosophy says that instead of comparing ourselves with others we should focus impartially on whatever task we tackle.

In the Bhagavad Gita (one of the most important texts on Yoga written around the 6th century BC) it says that focusing only on the successful results of our actions leads to ignorance, whereas if we work to the best of our abilities without anxiety about success or failure this leads to wisdom.

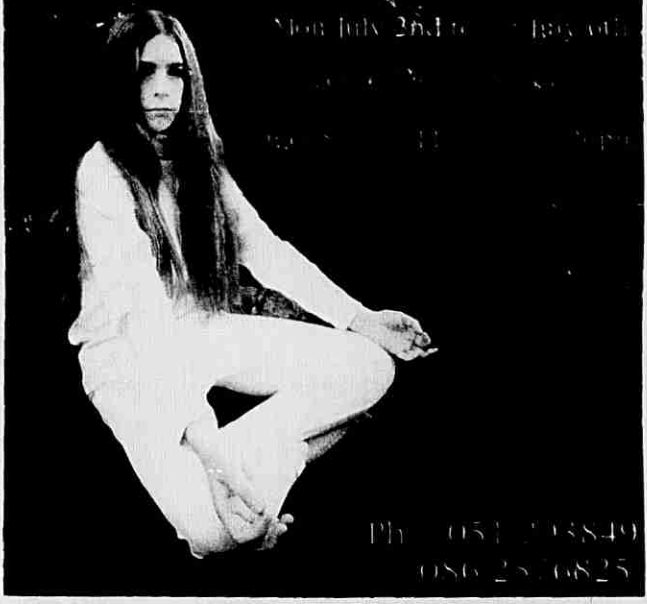
That is why the practice of Yoga in a non competitive spirit can provide a respite from the performance pressure that these young children experience in their daily lives.

At age 4-7 children are becoming stronger and gaining more control over their movements and as they are physically almost tireless and learn more easily, they develop a need for more variation within the Yoga class. One variation is to introduce flowing Yoga with stories developed for each posture. Another is to create games where the children are invited to invent poses and movements and display them to each other. These methods help each child to gain self confidence. Yoga gives children first hand experience of the reciprocal relationship between posture and mood. For instance if people are sad or lacking in confidence they round their shoulders and look down. Angry people stick their chin out clench their teeth and fists and adopt shallow breathing into the upper chest. People who feel happy and confident stand tall with their chest and shoulders open.

Through Yoga children & adults learn how manipulating posture can create a positive state of mind and counteract a negative one.

"First of all I want to thank all the people who voted for me, and all the party members and supporters who worked so hard in the campaign. There will be a new Principal in Our Lady of Mercy primary school when the children return in September after their summer holidays. It will be a historic occasion as new ground will be

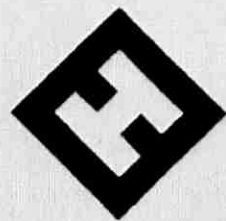

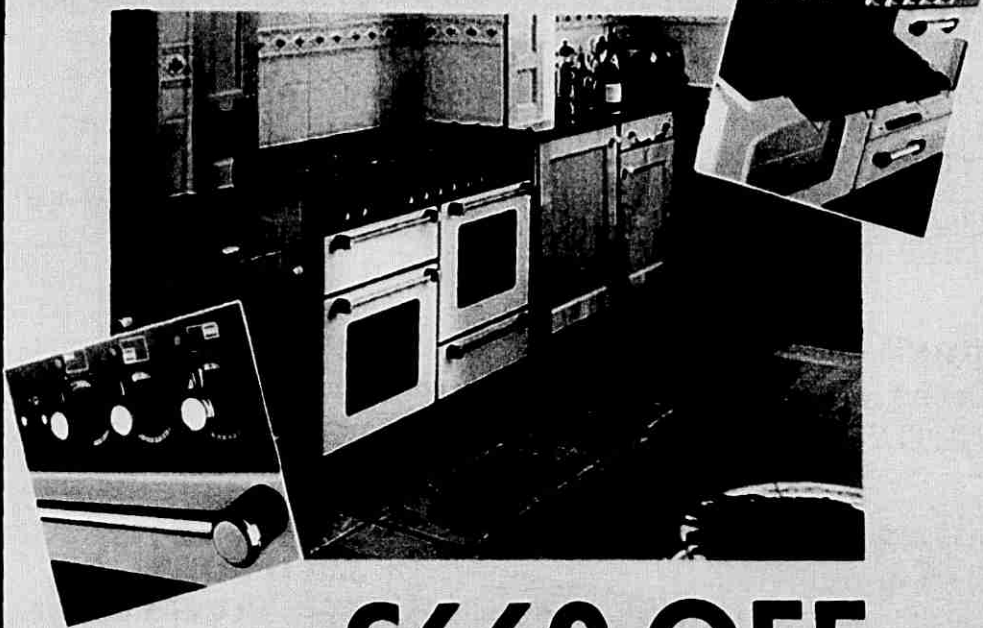

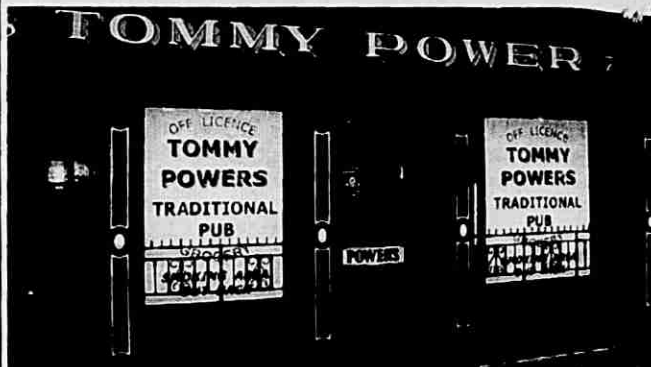

Unsightly Hoarding In Front Of Old Cinema

The old cinema on O'Connell Street in Dungarvan, which has fallen into a dilapidated condition in the last few months, looks likely to be demolished for housing. Officials with the town council are in discussions with the owner, and his architect, regarding plans for the site.

"We're looking at doing something with the developer,"

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said. "We're meeting with the architect to look at something in the general area."

In recent weeks, a hoarding, which Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan described as "unsightly" at the May meeting of town council, has been erected, and was the subject of some concern.

Cllr. Geoghegan warned that

unless attention is paid the inside of the hoarding might become a location for people "hanging out and drinking" late at night.

The hoarding has also effectively stopped residents from parking in front of the cinema. Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan said that people use the area as a parking space. Now they are forced to park further down the town at

Mitchell Street and O'Connell Street. "It's impossible to get parking," he added, "except late at night."

He enquired what was the position with permit parking.

Mr. O'Flaherty said permits are only granted where there's disc parking. If disc parking was generally accepted in the area he would have no problem extending it there.

Hawthorn for the Heart

One of the most beautiful sights at this time of year is the hawthorn blossoming in the hedgerows. The trees line almost every bothairín in the country, and during the springtime are covered with a mass of creamy-white flowers.

Hawthorn has been used as a folk remedy for the treatment of heart and circulatory problems since the middle ages. It is also known as May or 'Seeach Gheal' in Irish, and has long been considered a sacred tree which is associated with the fairy folk. It was used to bring love and happiness at weddings and was often attached to babies' cradles as a charm for protection.

Today, the hawthorn is still one of the best remedies available for the heart and circulation. Modern research has confirmed that it contains powerful antioxidants called flavonoids and clinical trials support its use for this purpose. It strengthens the heart, helping it to beat more steadily and with greater efficiency. It is therefore very useful in cases of palpitations and heart failure. It also improves the blood flow to the heart muscle itself which helps to relieve angina.

Hawthorn is beneficial to the entire circulatory system. It increases the integrity of the tissues, softens arteries which have been hardened by high cholesterol levels, relaxes blood vessels, reduces blood pressure and removes accumulated fluid from the body. These actions help to reduce the risk of more serious problems such as heart disease and strokes.

Hawthorn can be of particular benefit to an ageing circulatory system where reduced blood supply to the brain leads to confusion and memory loss. Its balancing effect on the circulation also helps to ease menopausal hot flushes. It tends to reduce anxiety and restlessness which can contribute to a number of cardiovascular problems.

Hawthorn is an effective yet gentle remedy which is safe for long term use. For the treatment of mild heart and circulatory problems or for preventative purposes, a tea can be made using the fresh or dried leaves and flowers, and taken on a daily basis. However it should not be used by people with low blood pressure or those taking orthodox blood pressure medication except under the supervision of a qualified practitioner of herbal medicine.

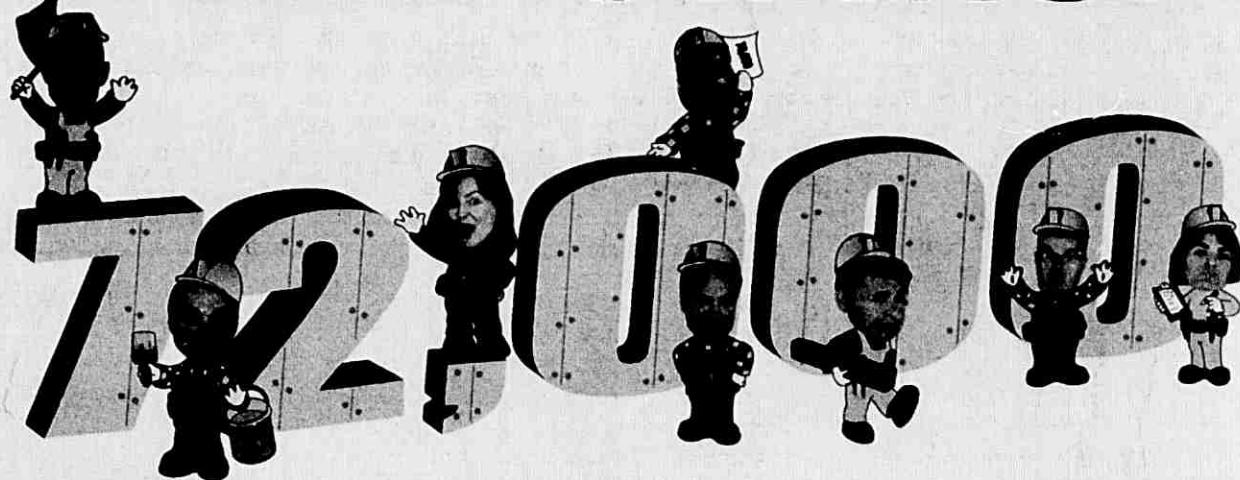
Medical herbalists frequently use hawthorn in combination with other herbs for a range of problems affecting the heart and circulatory system. It may be used with other herbs such as cramp bark which relaxes blood vessels, motherwort which prevents palpitations, yarrow which removes excess fluid, lime flower which acts as a gentle relaxant, or garlic which lowers cholesterol. In some cases herbs such as these may be used to reduce the dose of orthodox medicines in consultation with the individual's GP.

South East Enterprise Platform Programme Supporting Innovation In Growing Business Sectors

The South East Enterprise Platform Programme has been in operation since 1998 and has to date supported over 120 company start-ups in the region. With a comprehensive training workshop schedule, significant funding access, business networking opportunities, business mentoring and access to free office facilities, places on this annual programme are much sought-after.

In the past, participants were drawn predominantly from the general areas of technology and telecommunications, due mainly to the global explosion of technology usage in both business and personal contexts. Three of the companies on the programme are involved in this sector.

"SEEPP welcomes applications from companies with innovations in any sector. This year's successful applicants all demonstrate innovation and creativity, aligned with a strong international commercial potential".

"Accessing the knowledge and experience of others is of paramount importance, especially in the start-up phase of a business" says Crehan. Featuring colourful characters from 'Llareggub' (read it backwards!) and regarded as one of the finest pieces written in English during the 20th Century, Under Milk Wood is a play for voices that was first broadcast by the BBC in 1954.

Published in book form after the Welsh writer's death over 50 years ago, Under Milk Wood still resonates with audiences today and has never been out of print.

Thomas introduces the townspeople of Llareggub through their dreams to give the audience a sense of what is important to them and to reveal some of what bubbles below the apparently calm surface. The audience learns that Dai Bread's thoughts are of harem; Polly Garter loves babies and Nogood Boyo dreams of 'Nothing'!

The shadow of death also runs through the narrative. Promiscuous Polly Garter sings all day of her lost love Little Willy Wee, the only husband Mrs Ogmoré-Pritchard is interested in is a dead one and Captain Cat is haunted by the memory of Rosie Probert, 'the one love of his sea-life'. Indeed, several of the characters are troubled

throughout by their frustrated and sometimes explicit desires.

Under Milk Wood continues to reach new audiences and an atmospheric recording of the late Richard Burton reading an extract from the play currently features in a TV advertising campaign for Volkswagen that debuted during the Champions League final on May 23.

Speaking ahead of the Lismore performance, Prof Kieran R Byrne, Director, Waterford Institute of Technology said: "We are particularly pleased to welcome the Phoenix Players back to the southeast where they also produced Under Milk Wood at Waterford and Kilkenny in 2005 and 2006.

"Productions of Dylan Thomas'

classic works on the Irish stage are rare and it is likely that the dramatised reading in Lismore will prove popular with theatregoers from west Waterford and east Cork. Lismore itself will of course be focusing on the written and spoken word in a particular way later that week as this fine heritage town hosts the IMRAMMA festival of travel writing.

"From the Institute's perspective, our support of this production affords us an opportunity to broaden our arts and culture outreach and to join with our colleagues and friends from Lismore and beyond in one of the town's many fine early 19th Century buildings - one with tremendous multiple uses in this 21st Century."

Locals wallop the students in defence of Junior Cup

It's always nice to put one over on the students, or so it is said. On Saturday last, Lismore commenced their search for an historic Junior Cup defence at the Castlefarm and a clinical and confident display saw them dispatch University of Limerick with consummate ease. Indeed this performance has left Lismore as favourites to retain a trophy they had not won in the previous 41 years prior to last year's magnificent triumph. And it's a position that the club are clearly pleased about. As the students arrived in Lismore mid morning, all eyes were on the heavens as a mixture of threatening clouds had somehow managed to grind to a halt directly overhead. At 12.30, both captains and umpires went to the centre and Limerick winning the toss decided to bat. The students top order looked sharp but they didn't reckon on a Lismore bowling attack of speed

and spin and they were quickly on the defensive. Again, Mubbin Ashraf was in outstanding form and he consistently bagged the batsmen taking 4 wickets for just 9 runs. The other bowlers, Jon Russell, Brian Power and Dave Ind contributed to the students downfall and some nifty work in the outfield ensured that Lismore kept the Limerick total to the minimum. Indeed this was the case as the final wicket fell with the visitors on 101 runs. The teams retired to the pavilion where a delicious tea did not distract the Lismore batsmen from the job ahead. As the clouds grew thicker, the openers Dave Ind and left hander Dave Campion entered the fray. With six overs having passed and with 20 runs on the board, the inevitable happened. Heavy rain saturated the area and the teams ran for cover. Now the focus switched to affairs overhead. Thirty-five minutes elapsed and the clouds decided they had enough and pushed off eastwards. The umpires then had the unenviable task of calculating a new total for Lismore to achieve via the Duckworth Lewis method. Following lengthy deliberations, a new total of 81 runs to win off 40 overs was posted. Lismore were clearly now in the driving seat. Dave Ind and Jamie Mills relished the situation and performed a veritable 'smash and grab' running up 20 runs and 28 runs respectively in ultra quick time. The home side were now at ease. Jon Russell added further runs before rookie Mark Arden took the bit between his teeth and with two runs required sent the final ball sailing over the boundary for a six and victory.

Captain Sean Willoughby spoke highly of the teams performance in the aftermath and morale is high as the fixtures come thick and fast in the weeks ahead. In the Junior Cup semi final, Lismore will now face the winners of Cork County and UCC for the opportunity to retain the trophy. Meanwhile, next weekend sees the rescheduling of the postponed Senior Cup tie versus Galway on Saturday. It's a game that Lismore may find a touch beyond them but home advantage may play a big part in this one. The club will welcome Bandons West Cork Rebels on Sunday for a friendly before competitive action returns on Bank Holiday Monday with a Division 3 tie against rival neighbours Clonmel.

Susan Tajra's Piano Recital In St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore

Susan Tajra will give her first piano recital in Ireland on Saturday, June 16, in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore. Susan, an American who lives in Paris and has spent most of her life there, will perform Chopin, John Field and Moussorgsky.

John Field was born in Dublin, spent his young years in London demonstrating pianos, and then went to St. Petersburg where he lived until his death. He is known in musical circles especially as the creator of the Nocturne, and his nocturnes were a real source of inspiration for Chopin's creative genius. This is not widely recognised in Ireland. Susan will demonstrate the connection in her concert.

Many of us are familiar with Moussorgsky's "Pictures at an Exhibition". However, most of us do not know the story behind the music. Moussorgsky was a very close friend of the artist Victor Hartmann. In St. Petersburg, in February 1874, Hartmann had an exhibition of his watercolours and drawings. The two friends shared a fascination with Russian history and folklore. The exhibition showed picturesque scenes and activities from everyday life, both in Russia and elsewhere in Europe. Hartmann had recently died and Moussorgsky was so moved by the pictures of his recently deceased friend that he chose ten of them to bring to life in music. He finished the work four months later. You will hear these musical pictures at Susan's concert.

Many of Susan's piano and organ concerts and lecture-recitals have been for charitable, humanitarian and international organisations and causes. In addition to appearances throughout France, Belgium and Luxembourg, she has also performed in London, Rome and Geneva. In 2006, she performed in France and in the United States. This last included a tour of the Mid-West and New England in a series of Piano Duo Recitals.

THANKSGIVING MASS AT ST CARTHAGES

St Carthages House, Lismore will be holding a Mass of thanksgiving on Friday, June 15th at 7pm. After Mass there will be entertainment and refreshments followed by the symbolic planting of two oak trees in the grounds of the home. One tree will be planted in memory of all of those good people who have contributed to the home over the last 20 years and the other will represent the hope and future of St Carthages.

The story of the success of St Carthages is truly amazing and went against all the odds, however it did happen and today it is the home of sixty of our senior citizens.

The history of St Carthages Home began in 1987 when the South Eastern Health Board announced the closure in June of Lismore District Hospital. Shock and disappointment were the feelings of people in the parishes served by the Hospital, however, a group of people from the area who were not prepared to leave the elderly with 'nowhere to go' got together and a committee was formed.

The idea coming out of the following meetings was to take over the old District Hospital and run in on a voluntary basis. The management committee consisted of twelve people, Tim Hegarty (chairman); Mary Fenton Morrissey (honorary secretary); Helen McCarthy (RIP) and Tom Murray, (RIP) (joint treasurers); Michael O'Leary, Pat O'Dwyer (RIP); Mona O'Connell (RIP);

Jimmy Quirke; Dr TA O'Donovan, James Tobin, PT Fennessy, (RIP) and Tom Murphy.

Fundraising was a priority and many schemes and collections were put in place over the following months. The 1986 estimate for running the District Hospital, according to SEHB figures, was £180,000. They had agreed to provide an annual subscription of £20,000 to the St Carthages management committee who estimated (taking into consideration fundraising, gifts and voluntary services etc) that they would have an annual budget of £70,000 - leaving a shortfall of £20,000, which it was hoped would be covered by subvention from the Minister for Health.

St Carthages Residential Home opened for business in October 1987. The local population proved to be incredibly generous in money donated, goods supplied and time given with volunteers, including young Leaving Cert students, coming in regularly on a rota basis to help with cooking, cleaning washing up and even walking with residents. Local butchers donated meat while farmers brought in fresh potatoes and vegetables - St Carthages had taken off!

Over the next few years the home was a victim of its own success and it became apparent that facilities in the old District Hospital were old and tired and lacking in suitability. A brave decision to build new purpose

built unit was made by the management committee, and many months of planning and hard work followed before a brick was laid for the new building. Following generous donations and much fundraising the new St Carthages House was opened in 1994 and it now houses 60 residents in fine surroundings.

It truly is an amazing story of 'people power' and the generosity and tenacity of local people who with their efforts made the new building which is St Carthages a reality.

Many visitors to St Carthages are surprised to discover that the

facility is not part of the HSE and is in fact run by a management committee who to this day to a great extent, still rely on donations and fundraising to 'keep the show on the road'. As Mary Fenton Morrison told The Dungarvan Leader this week "We hope to cater for our elderly well into the 21st century, and it is the help of the local communities that will make this possible. Without their help we would not be here today and I hope to see many of people who have contributed down the years at the Thanksgiving Mass on Friday, June 15."

LISMORE CASTLE ARTS PRESENTS TITLED/UNTITLED

Lismore Castle Arts is delighted to present its 2007 summer exhibition, TITLED/UNTITLED, which will run from May 26th - September 30th 2007 at Lismore Castle, Co Waterford, Ireland. This unusual collaborative exhibition brings together work from the Devonshire and Rubell Family Collections - pieces from the Devonshire Collection having been selected by the Rubell Family, while pieces from the Rubell Collection were selected by Lord and Lady Burlington. The complex relationships that exist between the collector, the artwork and the passage of time are explored, and the viewer may be prompted to question their own preconceptions of what is meant by the 'historical' and the 'contemporary'.

The Devonshire Collection is one of the great private collections, housed at Chatsworth House, Derbyshire, England and Lismore Castle, the Irish home of the Devonshire family. Amassed by generations of the Cavendish family, from Sir William Cavendish and his wife Bess of Hardwick in the 16th century through to the current Duke of Devonshire, the Collection has developed over 500 years. The Rubell Family Collection is one of the leading collections of contemporary art in the world and includes a research library with over 30,000 volumes. Housed in a permanent museum in Miami, USA, and open to the public since 1996, the Collection features work dating from the 1960s to the present day with rotating exhibitions including work by the world's foremost contemporary artists. The Collection began soon after Don and Mera Rubell were married in 1964 and at a relatively young age, their son, Jason and their daughter, Jennifer, joined their parents in expanding the Collection which is now known as the Rubell Family Collection.

Many of the works on display have never been seen before in public, and this exhibition provides an unprecedented opportunity to view unfamiliar work by leading contemporary artists juxtaposed in a unique environment with historical work from the Devonshire private collection.

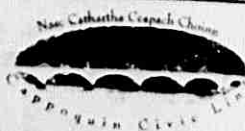

Heritage Group notes

Work is nearing completion on the booklet to accompany the town heritage trail. By the time we go to press this week, a title will probably have been decided as well. It looks like we will end up with a 32-page booklet, in full colour, containing text, photographs and maps to guide people around the heritage of the area. We hope the booklet will be user-friendly and be of interest to local people and visitors alike. We hope to get the text and pictures to our printers by the first week of June and anticipate the booklets being available to buy, at a fairly low price, by late June.

From the practical side of things, the first mock-up lectern display, of St. Anne's Church, is now on public view in the Credit Union window. This has been created by local designer, Jacinta Uniacke, using an Arthur Maderson drawing and text in both Irish and English. There may be some tweaking with the layout, and the eventual size of the displays will be slightly larger than what you see, but this one will give a pretty good idea of what the ten lectern displays will look like. Arthur Butler has been working on the completion of the lecterns themselves in recent days and these will be going for galvanising fairly shortly. The final couple of stone plaques will be completed shortly, so you can probably expect to see the remaining ten or twelve plaques appearing around the place during June. A huge 'Thank You' once again to all involved, not least to Noel, Paddy and the lads in the Co. Council for their help to date with the project.

More fabulous material for the July exhibition has been coming in, with it now almost certain that the four-day exhibition will have at least 1000 square feet of exhibition space. Some fascinating World War I letters, extracts from The Big Sycamore, an explanation of the Blackwater river bend from one of Ireland's foremost geographers and a few All-Ireland medals have been obtained in the past few days alone. Space already looks like it will be at a premium but if anyone has items, documents of photographs that might be used for the exhibition, do let any of the committee members know. We will look after them as if they were our own. With precisely 277 school photographs now in for our next book publication late in 2007, we will use some of the exhibition space to give people a sneak preview of that, and indeed some of the non-school photographs which have come in since last year's exhibition, nearly 100 more in all.



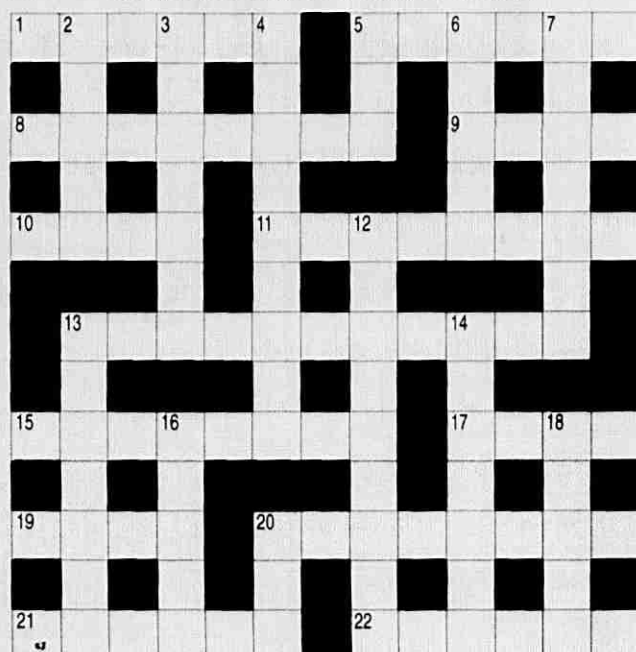

In this competition at the self same venue last year Tallow retrieved an eight point deficit to scramble a draw against Lismore. If you go back a year before that to the Frahaer Field, Tallow suffered a humiliating defeat at the hands of the ancient enemy. There was a different complexion to this years encounter with Tallow looking the more complete team and fully deserving of at least the single point victory they recorded in Cappoquin on Sunday night. Whether this is a measure of Tallow's progress or Lismore's decline and transition, or both, only the remainder of the championship will reveal.

As anticipated, this eagerly awaited local derby drew a huge attendance to the resplendent Cappoquin ground. The paying public should have an opportunity to watch games of this calibre at least every fortnight. The shame is, neither of these two teams will strike a sliotars again in the cauldron of championship hurling for at least three months which is a damning indictment of the way the GAA runs its club affairs. Bennet slotted over another placed ball and James Murray replied for Tallow. A Thomas Ryan free put Tallow a point ahead but this was almost immediately cancelled out by Dan Shanahann, who was superbly marshalled by Ringo Kearney throughout the whole game, with his only point of the match.

It was tight game and after 15 minutes the sides were deadlocked in combat. Both defences were giving no quarter with Ken Kearney and the ever reliable Fada O'Brien doing trojan work in the Tallow rearguard. Paul Kearney pointed from play to nose Tallow in front but a Dave Bennet free quickly restored the status quo. Young Ryan followed this with a match winning goal which he clinically placed out of reach of Brendan Landers in the Lismore goal. 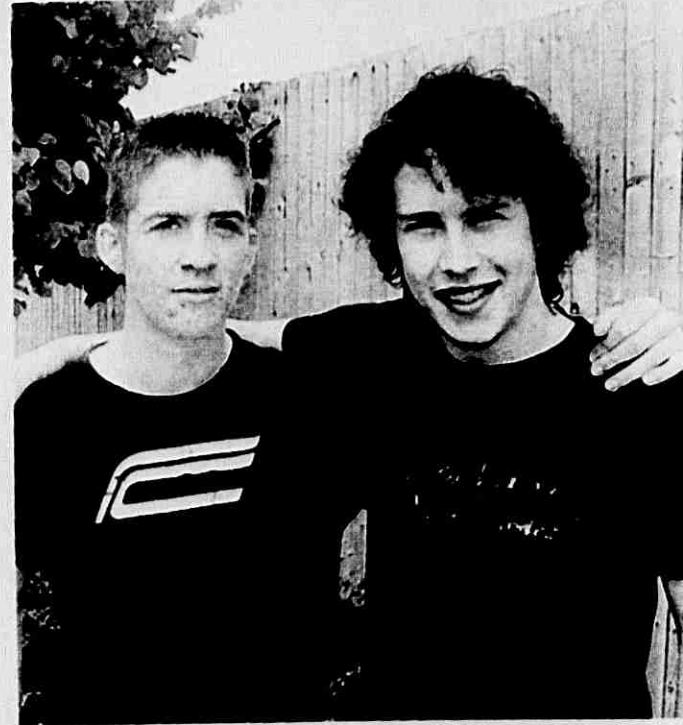
At 1 o'clock on Saturday 5th of May, two young local rock bands began preparing for their performances as part of the May Bank Holiday Féile na nDéise.

have refreshments and goodies of offer. 7.30, be there.

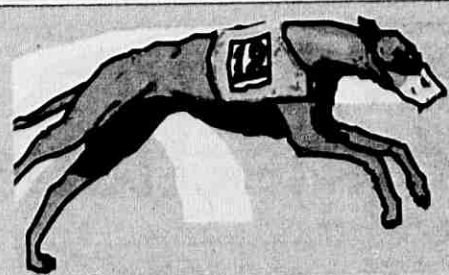

Butlerstown's Mark O'Sullivan Victorious As Aglish Hosts Rd 6 Of The National Grand Prix League

The village of Aglish near Cappoquin was the place to be on Sunday last as many of the country's top Show Jumpers arrived for round 6 of the Boswell National Grand Prix League.

Originally due to be held at Cavan Equestrian centre this latest leg of the competition was cancelled on Wednesday last due to construction work at the venue. However a quick thinking Aglish show committee plus some very generous sponsorship from local builder Fran Mangan saw Aglish step into the breach and bring this prestigious competition to the south east.

This annual Gymkhana normally takes place in April but due to the bad weather experienced in recent years it was decided to move to its new date in mid May. It proved to be a wise decision with warm sunshine for most of the day's action.

Sixteen horses and riders went to post and while this is a relatively small field for a Grand Prix it proved to be probably the most exciting afternoon's entertainment of the season thus far for the watching spectators.

Course builder Anne Waistell provided the perfect result with 8 competitors making it into the jump off after a testing but free flowing first round track. Anne has been building fences at her own Ballyrafter Centre in Lismore for many years and once again showed why she is one of the best in the business by building an exciting finale against the clock.

Seamus Hayes riding Flairtime and Neil Fearon with Beo Wolf were early casualties and finished outside the prizes after picking up faults when trying hard to post an early target.

Cashel's Trevor Breen was next in with Always Cullohill and posted the first double clear of the afternoon to take the lead. However his time at the top was to be short lived as Dungarvan's Gemma Phelan entered the arena. The only female rider of the jump off she knocked over 2 seconds of Breen's time with Killcannon Brigade keeping all fences intact along the way.

Another Waterford rider was next to take on the challenge with Mark O'Sullivan on his own Foxs Billy Whizz. They looked in touch with the target time early on and after taking out a stride heading to the third last only a fence on the floor would cost them the lead. But jumping clean as a whistle O'Sullivan and Billy Whizz crossed the finish beam clear in 46.10 seconds to move ahead of the field.

Only Cappoquin's Tholm Keane could now deny the Butlerstown pairing victory and despite a good effort one fence on the floor meant Keane would finish in 5th.

Speaking afterwards Mark O'Sullivan was delighted with

the win and predicted celebrations could well go on late into the night while thanking Fran Mangan Aqualine for their generous sponsorship.

Tholm Keane has now moved to the top of the Boswell Grand Prix league table following his excellent run of form however he will have to keep on his toes as the action moves to Rolestown Show in Co Dublin this weekend. Francis Connors will be back in action following his brief trip to Switzerland and will be keen to regain top spot and I'm sure Fran Mangan owner of Auto Cruz will hope to recoup some of the cash he dispensed with in his generous sponsorship at Aglish.

Once again Aglish Gymkhana attracted many entries for it's many other competitions with

Hilda Howard coming out on top in both Amateur classes and Ian Cliffe winning the 1m 20.

Huge credit must go to all concerned in the organisation of the show on Sunday last which ran perfectly as always ensuring Aglish Gymkhana which has provided the launch pad for many of the sports finest talents grows from strength to strength.

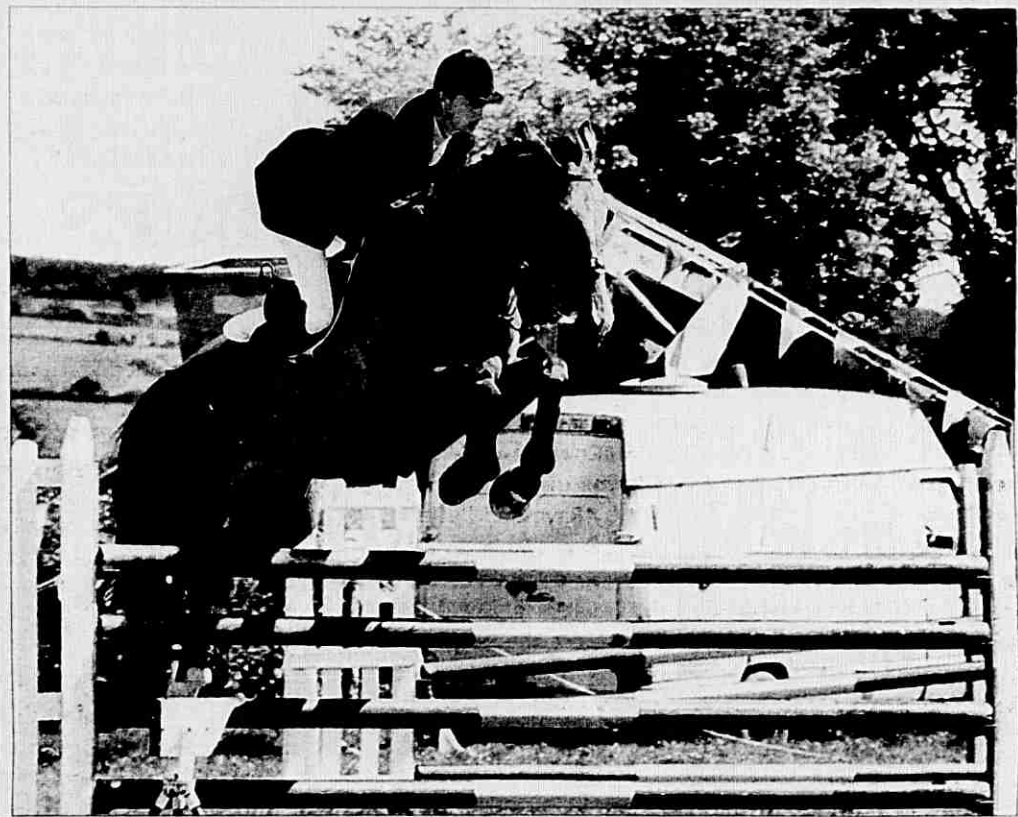

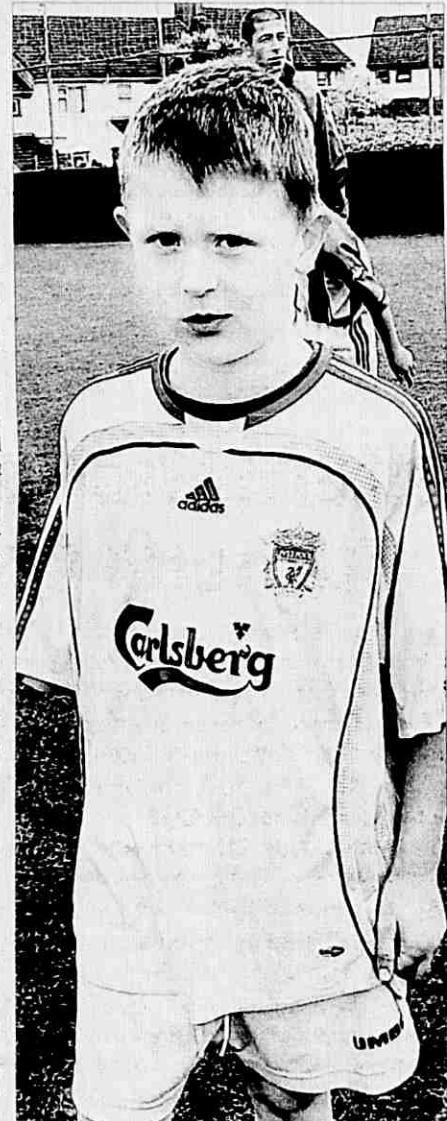

MUNSTER SENIOR FOOTBALL SEMI-FINAL

Waterford Challenge All-Ireland Champions Kerry At Fraher Field On Sunday

The coming of the mighty Kingdom has certainly aroused a great buzz around the Deise and while very few are expecting a shock result at the venue a record crowd are certain to turn up for this David and Goliath battle.

The semi-final is being televised live on RTE and this facility will accommodate the "armchair" visitors who may be unable to attend. Also it will expose Waterford football for the first time on the big stage and for this reason alone, a big effort will be expected from the players.

The big game is scheduled for 2 pm in order to fit in with the television schedule and the junior football Munster semi-final involving Kerry and Clare is also fixed for Fraher field and will commence at 3.45 p.m.

A GOOD SHOW

Waterford's fine display against Kerry in Killarney in heavy rain in last season's championship is likely to ensure support from the Kingdom who may feel a little uneasy about what might happen.

Kerry were undoubtedly flattered by their 8 points winning margin on that occasion (0-16 to 0-8 after Waterford had missed a great goal chance) and this just might tempt Kerry supporters to come down. Also this will be the All-Ireland champions first match in the 2007 Bank of Ireland outing since raising the Sam McGuire in Croke Park in September last year and supporters will be anxious to see if they have "wintered" well.

This year the visitors will be setting out on a campaign to win them their 71st Munster and 35th All-Ireland title. Last year after defeating Waterford and Limerick they surprisingly lost to rivals Cork in a replay of the Munster final, but subsequently got back through the Qualifier section and won their 34th All-Ireland title when defeating Mayo.

With such stars as Seamus Moynihan, Darragh O'Shea, Thomas O'Shea, Bryan Sheehan, Kieran O'Donoghay, Sean and Declan O'Sullivan, Colm Cooper, Tommy Griffin, Mark O'Shea and company they certainly are a formidable outfit who are going to take some stopping now that they are the holders of "Sam"

WATERFORD'S RECORD

To be honest and very blunt on this issue our record at inter-county level is a record of failure. There is nothing to prove otherwise.

The records show that we beat Cork in the 1898 Munster final played in Lismore and after this it was full stop as far as winning senior titles is concerned. Here and there we did make headlines, like in 1957 when we defeated Kerry in Walsh Park in the Munster semi-final, but we never seemed able to sustain our good form on the rare occasions on which we did hit a high standard.

A lot of this has to do with the fact that football is a second choice game in Waterford where hurling has dominated the interests of supporters for as long as I can remember and a lot more of it has to do with the fact that some of our very talented footballers have opted for hurling over the past 20 years and perhaps longer. The fact that we do have some very talented footballers is being continually illustrated in our Munster club championship games. A most recent example of this was seen in the Munster club final against Dr. Crokes (Kerry) last year when the Waterford champions, the Nire after being outstandingly the better team on the day, were unluckily beaten. Dr. Crokes were defeated by Crossmoglen in a replay of the All-Ireland club final subsequently.

Back to the intercounty scene we see that over the past three or four years Waterford footballers have demonstrated that when things go right for them they can play very well and make their way into the headlines. Last season in the Allianz national league

for instance we shocked the hot favourites Sligo and Cavan and in so doing we denied each a chance of gaining promotion. This season in the league we shocked Wexford in Fraher field and two weeks ago we ended our run of bad luck in the Munster championship when winning our first match in 19 years (1988) when we defeated Clare here.

Having put together the best available talent John Kiely and his management team have done everything possible in attempting to raise our standards and make that overdue break through.

The panel in training has remained more or less the same over a period and are playing well as a team (a factor that helped to shape the effort that brought us victory over (Clare).

OUR LINE OUT

It will not be published until tomorrow but it will surprise supporters if it shows, much, if any change from the line out against Clare.

Tom Wall, the Bonmahon club goalkeeper has played confidently throughout the league and against Clare three weeks ago. He is certain to hold his place as goalkeeper.

The full back line will likely read, Justin Walsh, Thomas O'Gorman and Shane Briggs. In the halfback line Edmond Rockett will be in the centre and will be flanked by John Phelan, and Paul Ogle

Mick Ahearne and John Hurney are likely to be given the midfield responsibility and in the outside line of attack, Brian Wall, captain, Gary Hurney and Ger Power, all of whom featured in the scoring against Clare will be expected to repeat their first round form while Wayne Hennessey, Andy Hubbard and Liam O Lonain will be playing on the inside line and hopeful of doing well against the much vaunted Kerry last line of defence.

Senior Hurling Double At Walsh Park On Saturday

Although it is only two weeks out from our Munster semi-final meeting with Cork, two second round senior hurling matches are fixed for the weekend. This is a change from what was thought to be the normal policy of not allowing panel members play club hurling for several weeks before an important game. Others will see it as confirmation that the management never stopped games from going ahead within a reasonable time before an intercounty fixture.

Anyway the Saturday programme will be welcomed by patrons and the clubs involved will have another fixture behind them. Looking at it in another light only two players are really involved. John Mullane who will lead De La Salle against Jack Kennedy's Ballyduff for their game. In the other match only Paul Flynn is engaged and Paul might not start against Cork. On the other hand again, Ballygunner can well afford to play last year's intermediate champions Clonea without him.

Ballygunner v. Clonea

Recalling the manner in which Ballyduff West annihilated Clonea in the opening round, I cannot see them worry Ballygunner to any great extent here because of a gap in standards.

With Fergal Hartley, Matty Moloney, Ger O'Connor and possibly Paul Flynn and company on board for the favourites, there can hardly be any doubt about the outcome here.

Ballygunner having defeated Abbeyside in round one will take the points here also.

De La Salle v. Ballyduff East.

This will be a cracker of a contest and it is listed as the first of the two games on Saturday.

Both these teams were involved in splendid first round contests on the weekend after the national league final. Ballyduff who led at halftime but subsequently lost to county champions Mount Sion (3-9 to 0-13) and De La Salle who beat Ardmore by 1-17 to 1-10 in an exciting game at Fraher field.

Here on Saturday this may be too close to call but I must confess to having a slight fancy for the chances of Ballyduff.

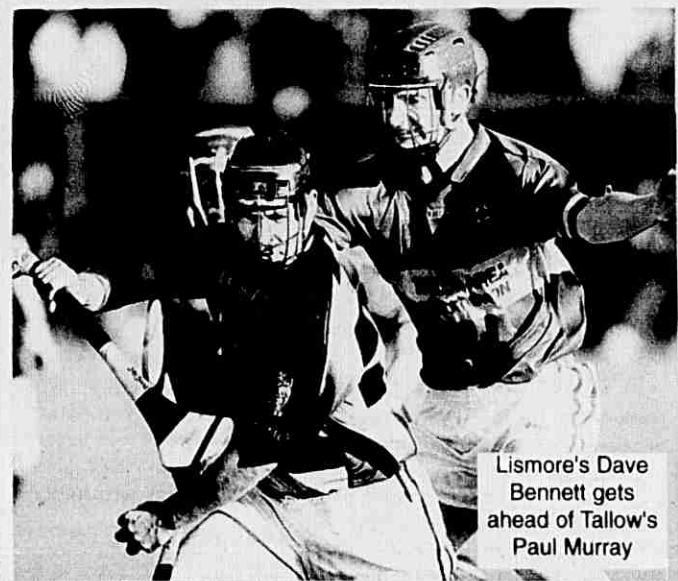

57 Medal Tally For West Waterford A.C.

The Munster Masters Track and Field Championships were held last Sunday in Castleisland, Co. Kerry and the club were on the road bright and early at 8 a.m. with a strong team of 21 athletes ready for action at the championships.

It was a most important outing for the club as for the first time last year we succeed in capturing the best club overall at the championships. The only club to do so outside of Cork or Kerry as it is usually dominated by either one of the Cork or Kerry clubs. We knew travelling that it would be a difficult task to retain this cup. However Masters Track and Field co co-ordinators Michael Tutty and Ann Dunford had their

homework in order and had the best team available competing on the day. As we go to press the full overall results are not available but we are certainly in the shake up, more on this hopefully next week.

Our 57-medal haul on the day was a superb display of team effort by all concerned. We had some outstanding individual performances from Terri Gough over 60 who took three golds-

hammer, javelin, 100 metres and silver in the 200 metres, Jacinta Sheil took home her usual tally of medals over 45, one gold in the javelin, third in the hammer and shot. Joe Gough over 50 had yet again another great day taking two gold medals, 200 and 400 metres, plus silver in the long jump, silver in the 4 x 100 metres club relay.

Sandra Brazil White over 35 showed us why she is one of the best female masters athletes in the country presently taking home 6 medals in total, gold in the 100 and 200 metres and silver in both the shot and long jump and she added two relay medals to her tally also silver club 4 x 100 and bronze county 4 x 100. Judy Hanrahan over 35 won bronze in the javelin. Josie Uí Chuirín over 45 also won 2 bronze medals in the 800 and 1,500 metres and a bronze in the 200 metres.

Jim Fleming performed well also taking bronze over 35 in the 800 and 3,000 metres. Anne Whelan (over 40) brought home two gold and one silver when taking gold in both the 800 and 1,500 metres and silver in the 200 metres. Pat Dunford showed us fine technique in the field events when he won a silver in the 56lb distance and added two bronze in both the hammer and discus over 40. Pat was also a member of the club team who won bronze in the 4 x 100 metres relay.

Colin Lyons had the full compliment going home after winning gold in the high jump over 50, silver in the 800 metres and bronze in the javelin. Pat Morrissey was also game

Sandis Wins Inagural Youghal Event

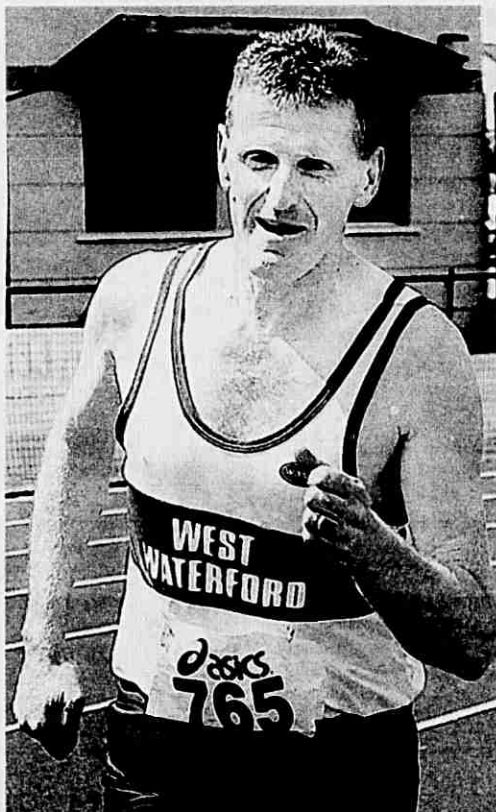

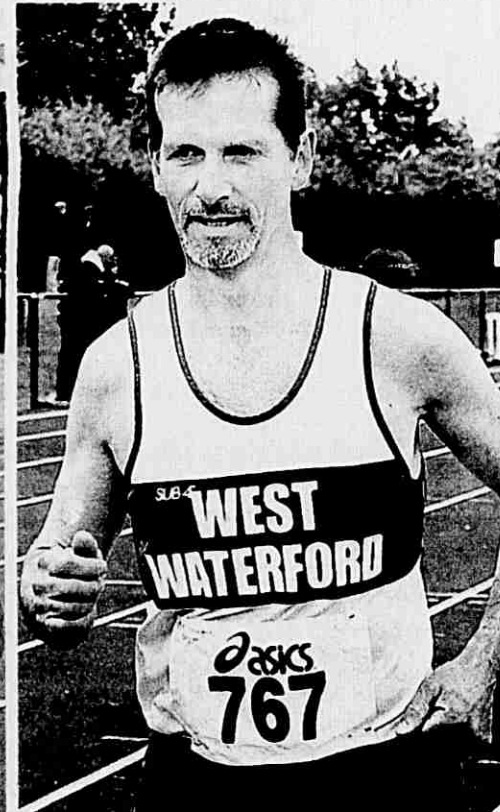

What is Autograss??

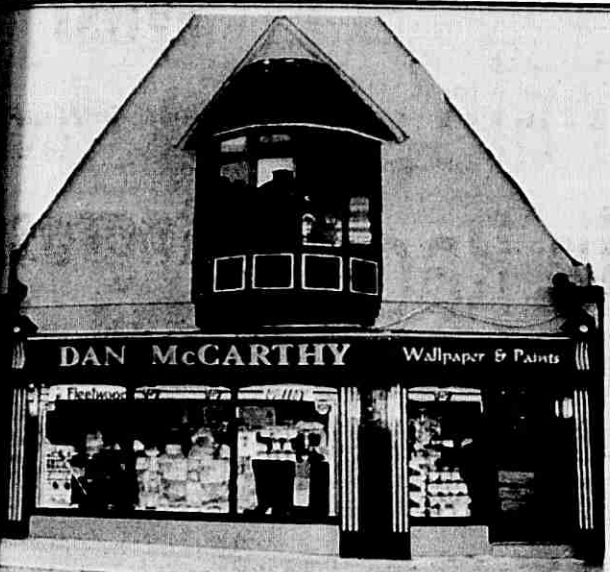

Authorized out to justify the Derby hype

So Mick O'Dwyer had another miracle left in the locker after all. A draw with Louth in Parnell Park last Sunday keeps alive their hopes of avoiding the Tommy Murphy Cup trapdoor.

And the pundits are attributing Wicklow's success to Micko's ability to have his players at the peak of their physical powers and, more importantly, instill belief into his team.

Personally I'm not buying it because if there's a county team out there void of belief, then they have issues. As a wag once said: "most people with low self-esteem have earned it."

But not only have inter-county football and hurling teams got their own manager telling them how brilliant they are, they also have the opposing manager extolling their virtues.

Racing is different. Whereas in team events opposing camps endlessly play down their chances, racing folk take another view.

Take this Saturday's Epsom Derby for example. We may have seen only 90 seconds of Authorized this season but it has been enough for bookmakers to make him an odds-on shot for the middle-distance feature.

Now if Authorised was a football team heading into action this weekend, 'manager' Peter Chapple-Hyam would be telling all and sundry that "anything can happen on the day", and that there are plenty of horses that could beat him.

Instead Chapple-Hyam says about Authorized chances: "he'll win." Careful, Peter, Waterville's most famous pensioner could have choked on his Corn Flakes.

But the difference is that in racing different forces are at work - trainers believe that horses are intuitive, the outside community think they're mad. And trainers therefore will always be positive about their horses, by what they say and by what they do.

This column has been fortunate enough to be a recent visitor to Ballydoyle, and got the opportunity to pick at Aidan O'Brien's brain. The visit took place just weeks after Holy Roman Emperor - O'Brien's chief classic hope for this season - had been whisked off to stud to replace George Washington.

So O'Brien had the unenviable task of sorting through the rest of his string to find a replacement - but he couldn't name one. Why? We asked. Surely it's a matter of running them against each other on the gallops in Ballydoyle.

But that isn't the way he trains horses, explained O'Brien. The words he used

were: "we like to let them all believe they're great."

You can't argue with a man who

has had so much success, but even my most battle-hardened racing colleagues were left flummoxed.

Of course, the cynics will point out that so much of racing, and flat racing particularly, is about hype. Hying up the classic stars and making them more attractive as stud prospects. And the cynics have a point.

But when it comes to Saturday's big race, and Authorized's trainers ebullient pre-race predictions, the cynics can stand down - that's just the way Chapple-Hyam is. In this, his second-coming as a classic trainer, he has attacked the big races with a confidence that must be admired.

That Authorized will go off favourite for the Derby is without contest. His unbeaten record, the manner of his seasonal debut and the fact that none other than Frankie Dettori is in the saddle, ensures that.

But will he justify his small price and his big reputation? And what price an Authorized/Wicklow double?

Bet of the week

Archipenko, advised at 14/1 in this column a couple of weeks ago, has more than a sporting chance of taking the Derby honours at the weekend.

Lay of the week

If it comes up fast at Epsom on Saturday, I'll be keeping Authorized out of any multiple bets.

One for the notebook

Timarwa justified her home reputation by sluicing up in a Curragh maiden on Sunday. Both her mom and dad - Timarida and Daylami - were Irish Champion Stakes winners and she doesn't look too bad herself.

Trainer John Oxx is more than adept at getting fillies ready for Royal Ascot and don't be surprised if Timarwa becomes a leading contender for the Ribblesdale.

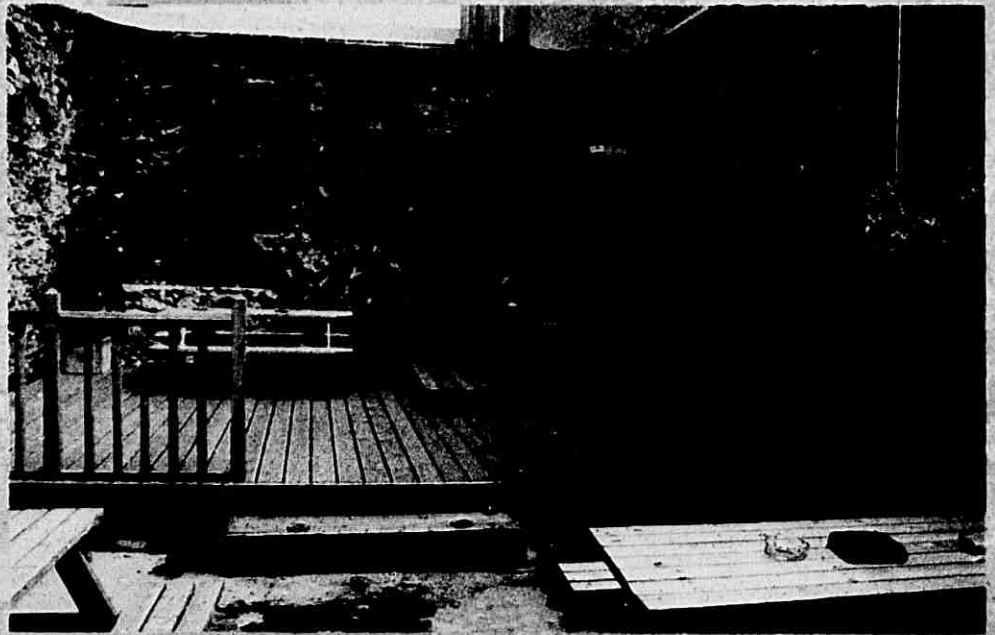

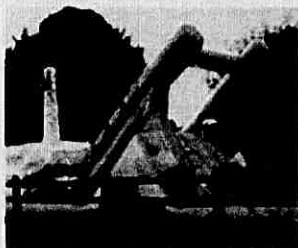

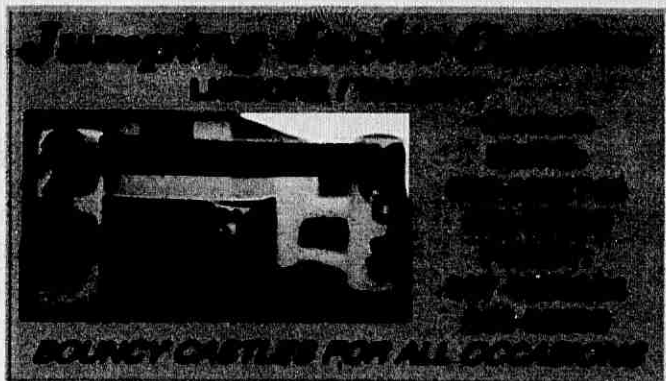
