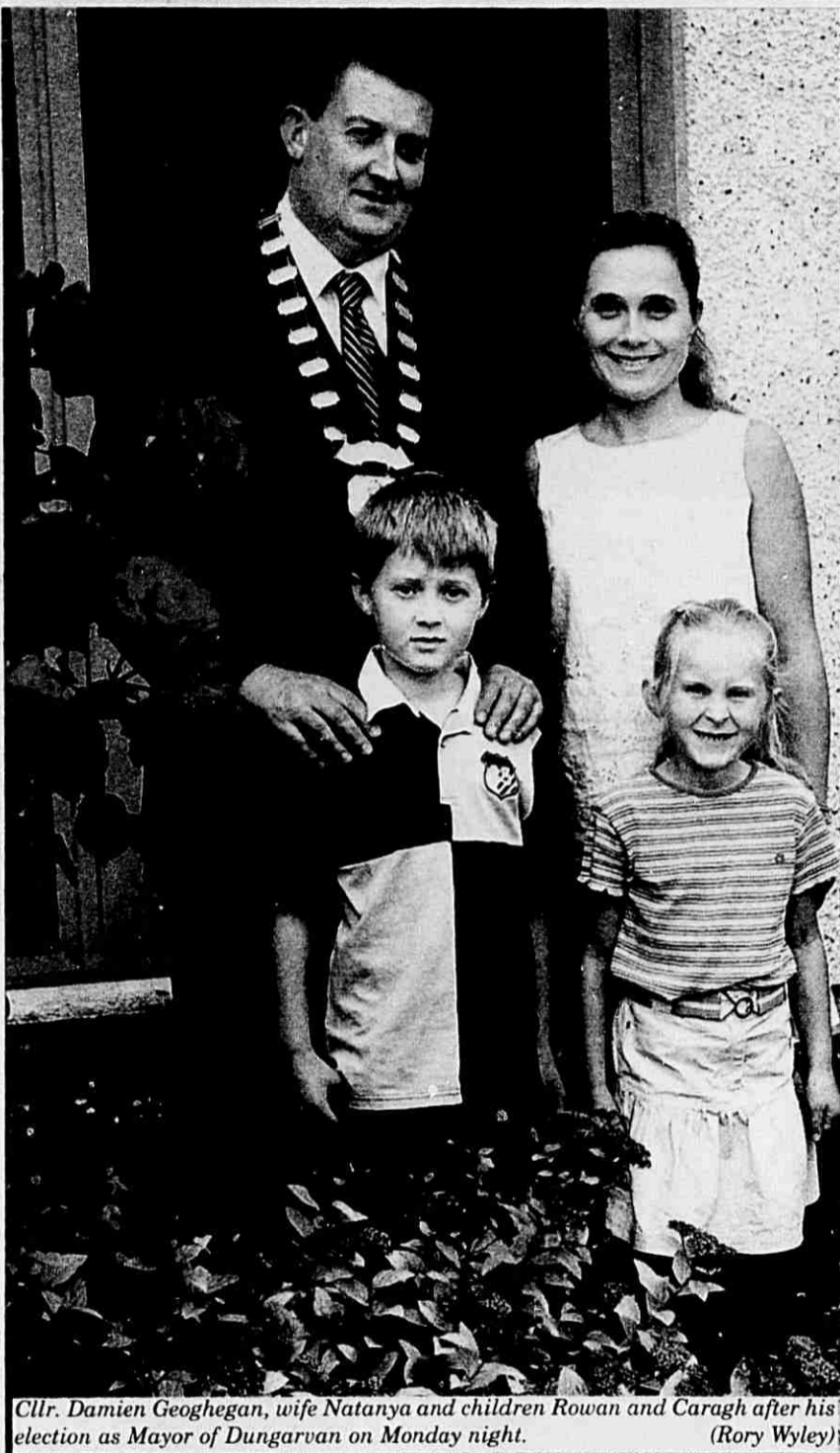

New Mayor For Dungarvan

CLLR. GEOGHEGAN UNANIMOUSLY ELECTED

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan was unanimously elected Mayor of Dungarvan at the Council's Annual General Meeting on Monday night last.

It will be Cllr. Geoghegan's first full term as Mayor, although it is his second time to act as first citizen of the town. Due to illness, Labour councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair handed over the chains of office to Cllr. Geoghegan - who was then Deputy - for the last few months of his term two years ago.

PACT

Cllr. Geoghegan, who is part of the Fine Gael-Labour-Independent pact was proposed for the post by Labour councillor, Billy Kyne and seconded by Fine Gael councillor, Fred Forsey.

No other nominee was put forward, and his elevation was universally welcomed across party lines.

Cllr. Geoghegan, who was first elected in 1999, and topped the poll in the 2004 town council elections, said he was proud to wear the chains of office, which have been worn with distinction by many fine public representatives down through the history of the Town Council.

PROJECTS

He intends to advance a number of public projects, including the development of a theatre in the old Town Hall, the construction of social housing schemes at Cow Lane and Collins Road, the provision of social housing under Part V arrangements, and to substantially progress the proposed development of a multi-million euro marina in Dungarvan Harbour.

He also hoped to push forward the refurbishment of Grattan Square and hoped to see more development on the Shopping Centre site, which

has already done much to reduce leakage of business out of the town.

DECENTRALISATION

He also wished to see progress on decentralisation of the Ordnance Survey department to Dungarvan. "This must," he said, "be actively pursued."

He went on to say that he has great pride in the town, which has made good strides in the past few years, and he saw his role as keeping up this momentum.

Welcoming his election, Fianna Fail councillor, Nuala Ryan described Cllr. Geoghegan as a "gentleman on his fingertips" while Independent (continued on page 8)

Dramatic Rescue Of 3 Men From Drifting Yacht

Three men were "lucky to be alive" after they were rescued from their drifting yacht by the Helvick RNLI Lifeboat on Thursday last.

Gardaí said the 32-foot yacht drifted for 3 days after setting off from the Virgin Islands in the Caribbean over a month ago.

"They're certainly lucky to be alive," a Garda spokesman said. "It was quite an ordeal for the

three men."

The men are believed to have purchased the yacht for several thousand euro after finding it on an internet site.

It's believed they were sailing it back to Poland with the intention of selling it on.

However, 42 days into their voyage, the engine lost power and failed and the mast was lost. The three men sent out a distress signal at 8.50 pm on Thursday about four miles off the Mine Head coast, while the yacht

A new social housing estate, White's Orchard, just off O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, was officially opened by Mayor of Dungarvan, Teresa Wright on Friday afternoon last.

Rain eased for a short period just before the Labour councillor, in one of her last acts as Mayor, cut the ribbon in front of a representative crowd, that included some residents of the attractive estate, developer, Terry McCarthy, and the White family.

JUSTLY PROUD

"This is a development of which everyone can be justly proud," she said, "and I congratulate and thank all those who made a contribution to its provision.

"The layout is most attractive, the stone finish on the frontages matches with the overall theme of a small rural setting in an urban area and the location is secluded and restful.

"It is as close to living in an orchard as anyone can get."

Over the generations, stretching back over 100 years, produce from the orchard was sold to local shops.

ORCHARD

The sense of the orchard has been maintained, with an number of apple trees dotting the seven house estate. A number of sculptures of giant apples rest under the trees.

Deelish Water Free Of Dangerous Gastro Bug

Deelish water supply is free of the dangerous gastro bug, *Cryptosporidium*, tests conducted on Wednesday revealed.

There were fears that the contaminant, which closed down the water supply in Portlaw over Christmas, and is forcing residents in Galway to boil their water, was present in the water.

While traces of E. Coli and

Faecal Coliform were found, tests conducted in Dublin, cleared the water of *Cryptosporidium*.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said they were relieved the tests had come back clear, but the HSE has advised them to maintain the boil notice for the time being.

"We don't know yet for how long, but we hope to be able to lift it fairly soon," he said.

Overgrown Ditches A Safety Concern

The issue of human safety is paramount when discussing the cutting of overgrown ditches, one county councillor told the June meeting of Waterford County Council.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said the approach roads to Colligan Wood and Clonea beach are both seriously overgrown, and the issue must be tackled.

"As a matter of safety they should be cut," he said.

Fianna Fail councillor, Tom Cronin agreed, saying that the ditches on approaches to all the beaches should be cut as well as the regional roads.

He said the money has to be found to "make our roads safe." It is in the interests of safety to cut the ditches on the approaches to beaches and the regional roads, which are the second most used roads in the country.

Fianna Fail councillor, Ciaran O'Riain said a lot of signposts and t-junctions are overgrown and these should be cleared.

However, County Engineer, John O'Flynn said it's illegal for the county council to cut hedges during the bird nesting season except where it is a matter of safety. This would apply at junctions.

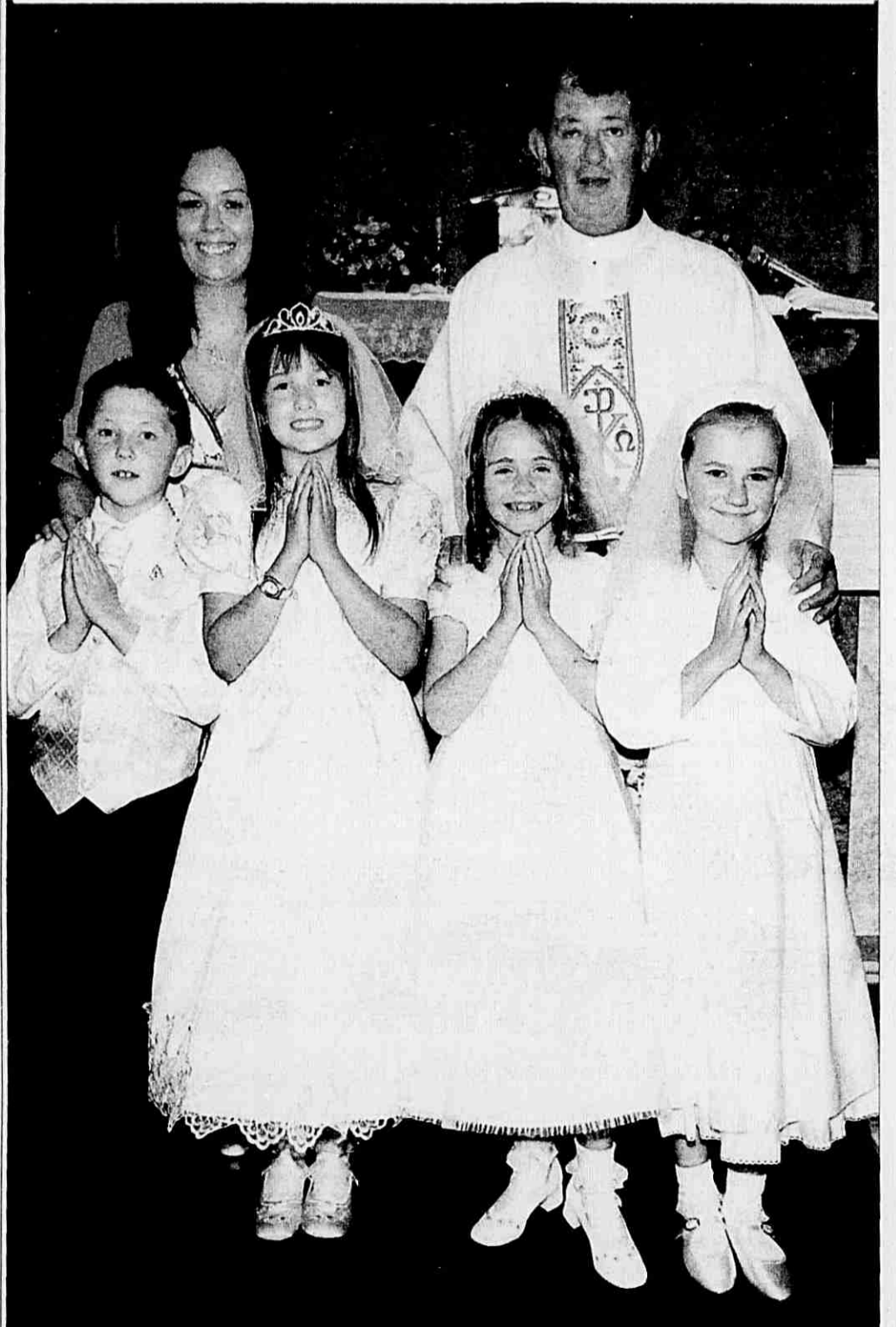

Complicated mobile phone expenses, whereby members of town council's receive €300 for a maximum of €600 spent, have still not been implemented in any of the local council's.

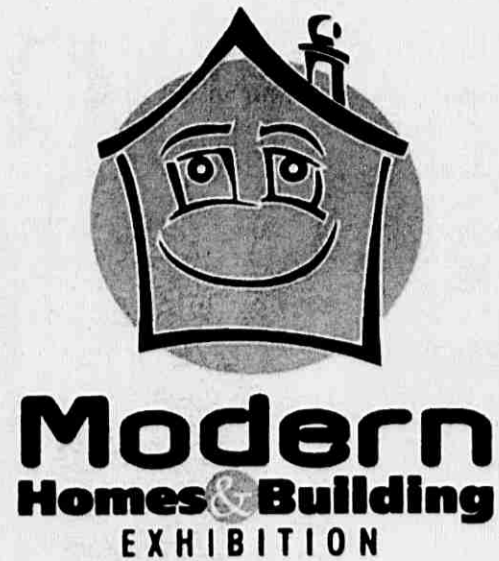
Lismore Town Clerk, Eric Flynn said the regulations are not clear, and none of the councils he has contacted have implemented the expenses.

Both she and Fianna Fail councillor, Bernard Leddy said the way the expenses are currently being formulated was "crazy."

Mayor of Lismore, Cllr. Helen O'Sullivan pointed out that all the councillors had different ways of topping up their mobile phone accounts, and not necessarily all were on bill pay.

A large proportion of illegal dumpers are fly-tipping bag loads of rubbish late at night and come from bordering counties, according to County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer who was speaking at the June meeting of Waterford County Council.

He said there is significant dumping in the border areas of the county, and suspected that a lot of it is coming from outside

the county.

"It's also happening late at night, which makes it even more difficult to stop," he said.

His comments followed questions from Fianna Fail councillor, James Tobin who asked how many illegal dumpers have been caught and named.

"It's about time that when they were caught they were named and shamed."

He said some dumping was

occurring close to councillors homes, but he wasn't going to be frightened into dropping his call for a name and shame campaign.

His party colleague, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain said dumping is happening in most rural areas, and he was aware of one incident where a beheaded calf was dumped in the Suir electoral area.

Fine Gael councillor, Nora Flynn said people to enforce the litter laws were "short on the

ground."

She said resources were needed in combination with cameras at litter spots. The prevalence of dumping was, she said, "a shocking disgrace."

Beauty spots like the Vee, the areas around Villerstown, wooded areas like Glenshelane were all being targeted.

Fine Gael councillor, Declan Doocey said people should be encouraged to report fly-tippers.

VIEWPOINT

CULLEN'S DEMOTION

Martin Cullen has had something of a chequered history since he entered cabinet in 2002 as Minister for the Environment, at the same time making history as the first Waterford man to serve as a Minister for many years.

There can be no doubt, even among his political enemies, that Cullen has delivered for the constituency.

That was rewarded with an increased mandate at the last General Election, when he topped the poll by some margin, surpassing the surplus, and being deemed elected on the first count.

While some, mainly national, political commentators were suggesting Cullen was in trouble, and could have been the one to be excluded from Bertie's cabinet instead of Dick Roche, it's still widely held that his move to the post of Social and Family Affairs is a demotion.

This can be seen in terms of just how little the cabinet was fundamentally changed by Ahern. There was precious little but a gentle shuffling of the deck to bring the two Green's aboard.

Roche, who had a near disastrous time in the run up to the election, suffering from a series of bad new stories that culminated in his handling of the water crises in Galway, was the only real casualty with Ahern sticking by his mantra of not changing a winning team.

With John O'Donoghue the new Ceann Comhairle, McDowell gone, and Roche sent to the wilderness, Brian Lenihan and two Greens came in, meaning Ahern, if he wished could keep things at status quo as much as he wished.

No one was suggesting that Cullen would be given a more prominent position. But the waning of his influence in the cabinet will undoubtedly have at least some repercussions for the constituency.

He simply won't be given the same hearing as was the case when he was Minister for Transport or Minister for the Environment. While the social services in this county would, Viewpoint is sure, very much welcome his appointment, and look forward to what they hope will be the bonanza of increased funding, the Department of Social and Family Affairs, has one of the tightest Budgets and shallowest pockets of all the Departments in the Government.

How Cullen can direct funding, influence decisions, and continue to deliver crucial infrastructural projects remains to be seen. But, despite the doom and gloom, neither is it wholly out of the question either. Cullen is seen as a shrewd networker, and has to some extent the sympathy of Ahern for the gruelling mauling he suffered at the hands of the media. He has also worked extensively with backbenchers, forming a strong support, and is reasonably popular in the main corridors of power. With this in his favour, he will still, although to a far lesser extent, be able to fight his corner, and that of Waterford at the cabinet table, and hopefully deliver even more funding and more projects for the people of his constituency.

NEW MAYOR OF DUNGARVAN

What everyone suspected would happen, happened. With the backing of the Fine Gael-Labour pact, which holds the support of the majority of Dungarvan Town Council, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan was elected Mayor of Dungarvan.

He has a hard act to follow. Outgoing Mayor, Teresa Wright had a very successful term, with the undoubted highlight being a project she herself pushed and backed to the hilt. That was the €6 million Resource Centre development on the former Presentation Convent. The centre will bring together, under one roof, a number of social services.

It will make it one of the best social centres in the South East if not in Ireland. Cllr. Wright turned the sod on the development in February, and work is expected to finish on a number of the facilities early next year.

As an aside, she also presided over the shortest meeting in the history of the town council. A forty minute meeting, which is nothing if not brief in the extreme, although all the business of the month was concluded in a thorough manner with no frills, and no divergences, something fairly rare in the august surroundings of the town chamber.

So, Cllr. Geoghegan does indeed have a difficult act to follow, but Viewpoint is confident that he will do so in the style he has made his own.

Thoughtful, quick witted, intelligent and a gentleman to his core, Cllr. Geoghegan was first elected to the Town Council in 1999. And he will certainly make his mark. He has already proved himself as Town Mayor in the absence of Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair when the Labour councillor was hospitalised two years ago, as a fair, diligent and dedicated first citizen of Dungarvan.

His key project for this year, the development of a marina in Dungarvan Harbour is also an exciting prospect, and whether he can pull this off remains to be seen. But Viewpoint is sure he will do everything in his power to propel this proposal forward, and many others, for the good of the town and the people he serves.

Flynn said the issue goes back to money and manpower. She pointed out that Cappoquin still remains the only town in West Waterford without a public toilet.

"The likelihood is we won't get them if we can't even look after the ones we have," she said.

County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer said a grant scheme used to be available for the toilets upkeep. That was no longer available. The council is hard pressed to keep the facilities open and functioning.

Facilities At Presentation Convent Site To Open In 2008

A number of facilities in the €6 million community resource centre to be constructed on the former Presentation Convent site on Mitchell Street are hoped to be ready by the start of next year, according to Dungarvan Community Development Project, who gave Waterford County Council an update on progress to date.

Construction started in early February including for the County Waterford Community Childcare Facility, which will cater for up to 70 children.

The resource centre will also include a Sesame School for children with special needs, the Deise Day Care Centre and Dungarvan Scouts. All of these facilities will be situated on the ground floor.

The HSE will be situated on the first floor level with all auxiliary services. It is envisaged that local community groups will access the second level.

On this site, work has also commenced on the Focus Ireland Development, which comprises of transitional housing. It is hoped that all of these facilities will be ready by January 2008.

"This Community Resource Centre is a much needed facility and will act as a catalyst for community development within County Waterford," Norah Delaney, Chairperson of Dungarvan CDP said.

Labour councillor, Teresa Wright thanked the County Manager, Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council for their help in progressing the project.

No Outright Ban On Dangerous Breeds

Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan once more lambasted the attendance by members of Lismore Town Council at the Senate nominations, which he said was not a democratic process.

He was responding to a comprehensive report by Labour councillor, Jan Rotte, who attended the AMAI (Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland) conference where outgoing Senator Glynn was once again nominated to contest the Senate elections on the Administration panel.

Cllr. Heneghan described Glynn's nomination as a "foregone conclusion," and appeared to describe the visit as a waste of money. "This council doesn't have a rates base that normal Town Council's have. We have to use the limited resources we have in the best possible way," he added.

He said he has no problem sending councillors to meetings on policy but didn't wish to send councillors to political meetings.

This drew a strong response from Cllr. Rotte who was "taken aback" by his comments.

He said Ireland is lucky to have a democratic process, and he had lived in countries where this was not the case, and there was no vote. As such, the council should take part in the democracy in every way.

Independent councillor, Peter Ahern also responded, by saying that if the council is not going to have a say, "we might as well be abolished."

However, Cllr. Heneghan countered saying the Senate has nothing to do with democracy as not everyone has a vote. It's a game played by political parties.

"The Senate is not a democratic place," he said.

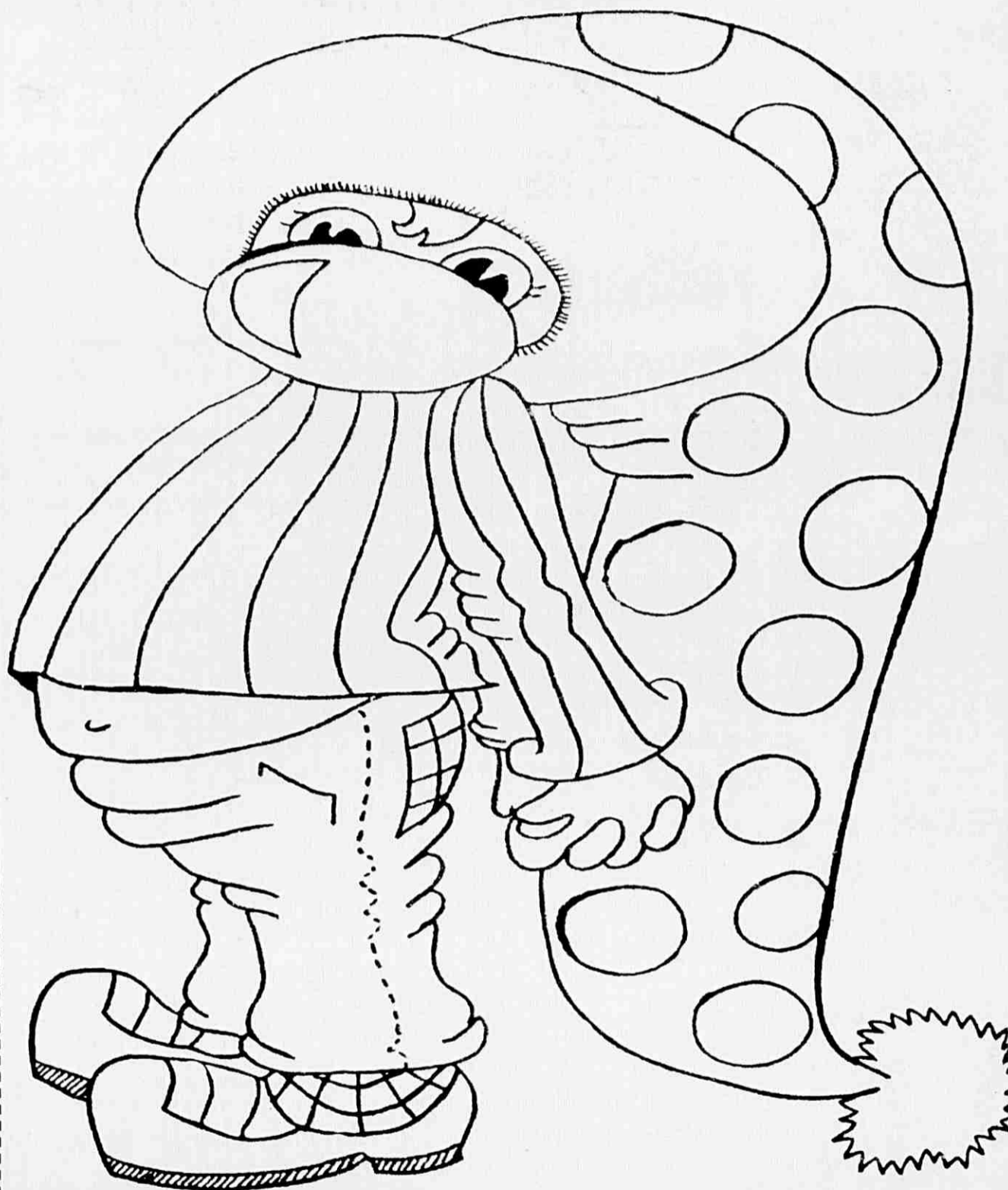

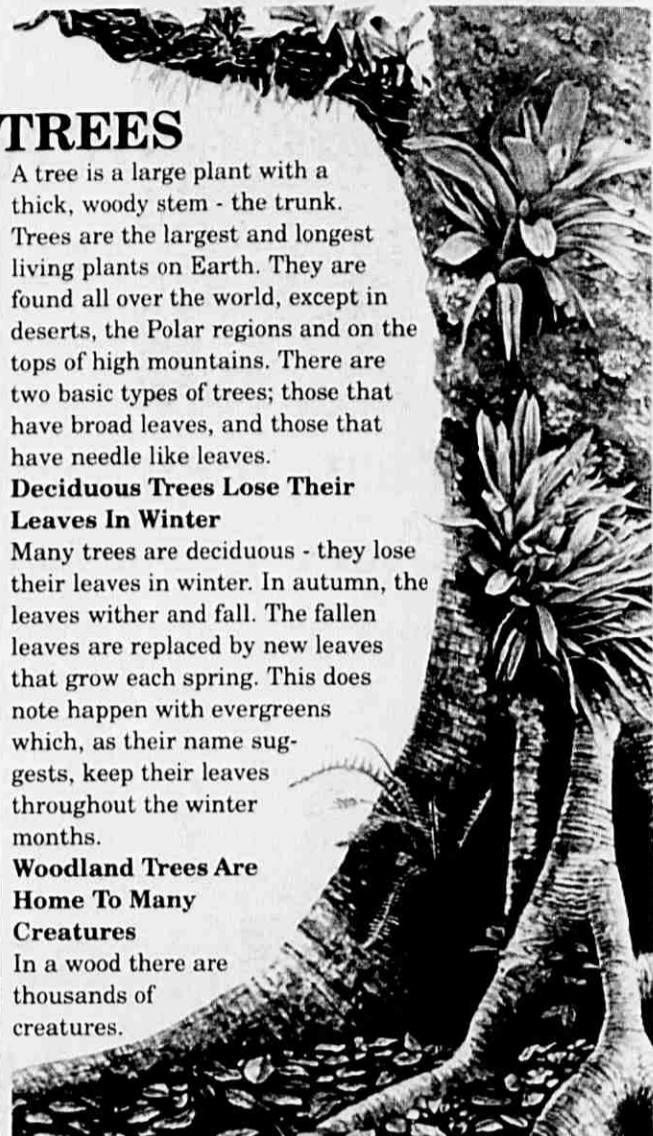

TREES

A tree is a large plant with a thick, woody stem - the trunk. Trees are the largest and longest living plants on Earth. They are found all over the world, except in deserts, the Polar regions and on the tops of high mountains. There are two basic types of trees; those that have broad leaves, and those that have needle like leaves.

Deciduous Trees Lose Their Leaves In Winter

Many trees are deciduous - they lose their leaves in winter. In autumn, the leaves wither and fall. The fallen leaves are replaced by new leaves that grow each spring. This does not happen with evergreens which, as their name suggests, keep their leaves throughout the winter months.

Woodland Trees Are Home To Many Creatures

In a wood there are thousands of creatures.

Some live underground, some live on the woodland floor and some live in the trees. Birds nest in tree branches, and in holes in trunks. Squirrels also nest in holes in trees. The leaves and bark are home to numerous caterpillars and insects. Even dead trees are full of life, for they are home to beetles and other minibeasts, slugs, worms, small mammals and birds.

The Tallest Trees Are Redwoods

The Coastal Redwoods of California, USA, are the tallest trees in the world. They can be as high as 83m (272ft) or more and one in the Humboldt Redwoods State Park in California is over 111m (364ft) high!

Rings Tell A Tree's Age

A cross-section of a tree shows alternate light and dark rings of wood. The light rings are the tree's summer growth each year and the dark rings are the winter growth. By counting these pairs of rings, scientists can calculate the age of the tree. The width of the rings are also in indication of the weather - narrow rings indicate poor conditions and wider rings denote good weather. Nowadays, scientists use a more accurate method of dating trees, called carbon dating, which measures radioactivity.

Trees Provide Us With Lots Of Useful Things

Apart from various types of timber used in all manner of building and construction, trees also yield many other products useful to humans. Trees provide us with a wide variety of edible fruits. Rubber and cork also come from trees, as do a range of products used in medicines.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Legends of the Bolivian rain forest say the trees walk towards the sun - because their large roots grow towards the sunlight. ★
- Trees are the oldest living things. The bristle cone pine of the Rocky Mountains can live for 5,000 years. Maidenhair trees have been in existence since the age of the dinosaurs. ★
- The ombu tree or Argentina has such a spongy bark that it is virtually impossible to cut down. ★
- The banyan tree grows in the branches of other trees, sending roots down to the ground and gradually strangling its supporting trees. ★
- A banyan has many trunks, and can develop into a one tree forest! The largest example, in Sri Lanka, has over 350 main trunks.

Ireland and – although this day was completely free – participants and any other willing people, were invited to make a donation to the Irish Cancer Society. Over €1,200 was raised on the day contributed by the participants and other generous donors thanks to the efforts of all those who helped to organise it.

After the introduction, Glenda proceeded to give an immaculate demonstration of flycasting, the basic principles involved, and how complete beginners can pick up a fly rod for the very first time and yet be able to cast a reasonable line in the river.

After that, it was the Ladies' turn. Spell-bound by what they had seen, they were then able to take rods and try casting themselves for the very first time – albeit with a piece of wool on the end of the line rather than a real fishing fly! There was a volunteer team of local gillies and anglers on hand to give advice and assistance – all suitably attired for a Ladies Day in pink shirts & T-shirts (sorry guys!).

The women showed that they had listened attentively to Glenda, as they surprised all the experienced anglers present with their determination and ability to cast a line in the river using wool at the end of the line rather than a fly hook for safety.

This was followed by a sumptuous barbeque lunch with half a dozen large tables set out on the grass in glorious sunshine on the banks of the river. The scene was set with potted flowers around the area kindly loaned by Maureen Kingston from Ballygally, Ballyduff. Mattie McNamara from Cahir had generously donated all the meats for the barbeque – way more than adequate for the 30 people present – & he supervised the cooking ably assisted by Michael Sroka from Blackwater Lodge. The barbeque was borrowed from John Frewen of JF Foods in Ballyduff. Cool boxes full of ice kept a more than adequate flow of chilled wine & beer all very generously donated by Anne-Marie O'Keefe from Glenbeg, Ballyduff who also provided the salads and even cut flowers to ensure the feminine atmosphere! Crinnaughton Apple Juice was sponsored by Julia Keane of Cappoquin Estate.

After such a feast, a siesta in the sunshine had everybody in relaxed mode. To finish off a superb day, Glenda cracked the whip & got

everybody back on the bank of the river to put into practice what they had learnt – with real flies this time. After a short while, Ciara Mulcahy caught the first (and biggest) trout of the day. Christine Hyland was the most successful, with five small trout caught.

Everybody present was ecstatic with the day. None of the participants had ever fished before, and most had never even seen the beauty of our majestic Blackwater at such close quarters. The buzz that followed has given Glenda great encouragement to pursue her aim to try to introduce more people to the sport.

The day would not have been possible without the co-operation of Terence Kenny for allowing the cavalcade to pass over his land to the fishing – which was provided by Blackwater Lodge. The Lodge staff worked long & hard to prepare & ensure the smooth

running of the day – especially Martina Salach & Michael Sroka – but also the babysitting team of Joanna & Janna for giving Glenda and Ian the free time to organise the event.

Invaluable helping with the casting came from Connie Corcoran & Len Tomlinson from Ballyduff, Norman Gillett from Lisnora, Maurice Cahill and David Burke from Castlemartyr, Joe Lonergan, Pakie Carroll & Denis O'Donnell from Cahir, Jason O'Riordan from Dungarvan, Paudie Hartnett from Carrigtwohill and Aisling Power (Dungarvan).

There will be follow-up sessions arranged for ladies and a Ladies club may well be formed. In conjunction with the local trout angling clubs, Glenda will arrange introduction classes for youngsters. In the very near future, a programme will be set up to introduce angling and related

themes to schools. It is imperative that a new generation of angling enthusiasts be created to be the guardians of the environment and the wonderful resource that the

river Blackwater is to the area. We have a wonderful amenity on our doorstep and it is our duty to ensure that is passed on in pristine condition to future generations.

The Elder Tree

The elder tree has been used in Irish folk medicine for generations but it is still a very important part of the herbalist's dispensary. The elder tree blossoms around midsummer and the clusters of creamy white flowers can clearly be seen at this time of year on the trees which grow by the roadsides.

Fresh elderflowers are often used to make wine or champagne, but for medicinal purposes they are usually dried and prepared as a tea or tincture.

Elderflowers are particularly useful for the treatment of colds and flu. They have antiviral and immune stimulating properties and they can help to break a fever by promoting perspiration.

In addition, the flowers help to reduce the production of mucus which is useful in many catarrhal conditions including hayfever and sinusitis. A cup of warm elderflower tea with a little honey and fresh lemon juice is a very effective yet gentle remedy which is safe for young children.

The elder tree, as its name suggests, is also suitable for the older generation. An infusion of the flowers or distilled elderflower water makes an excellent toner which is ideal for mature skins. It helps to fade excess pigmentation and cafe au lait patches which often appear with advancing years, during pregnancy or following sun damage.

Elderflowers are a very safe herbal remedy which is easy to find and prepare. However, if you are going out to pick elderflowers this summer, do take care. According to an old legend, witches often disguise themselves as elder trees and they don't take kindly to being cut!

Popular Walk In Appalling State

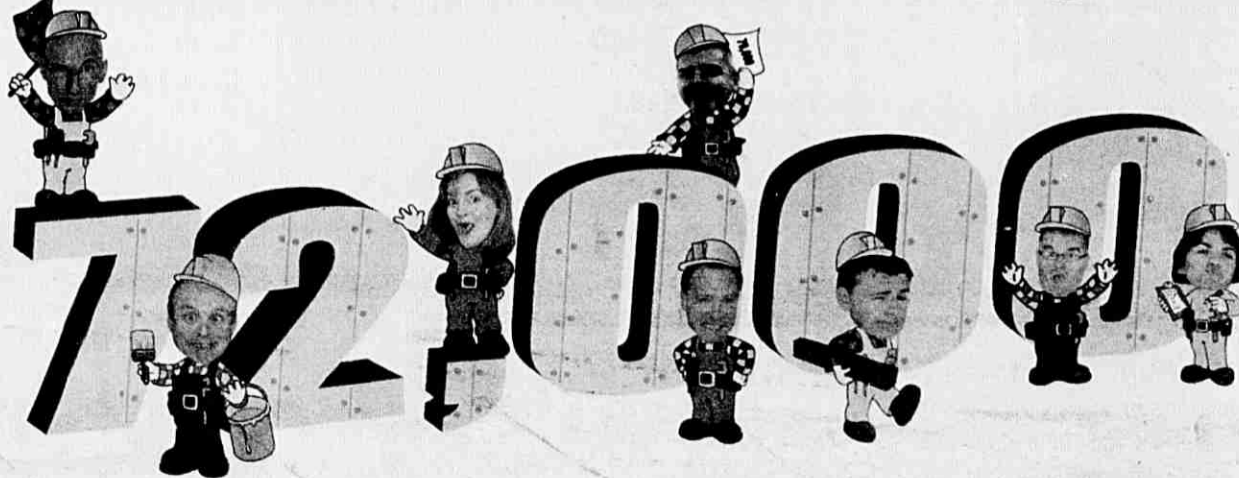

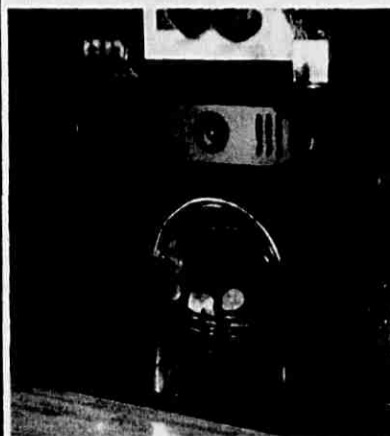

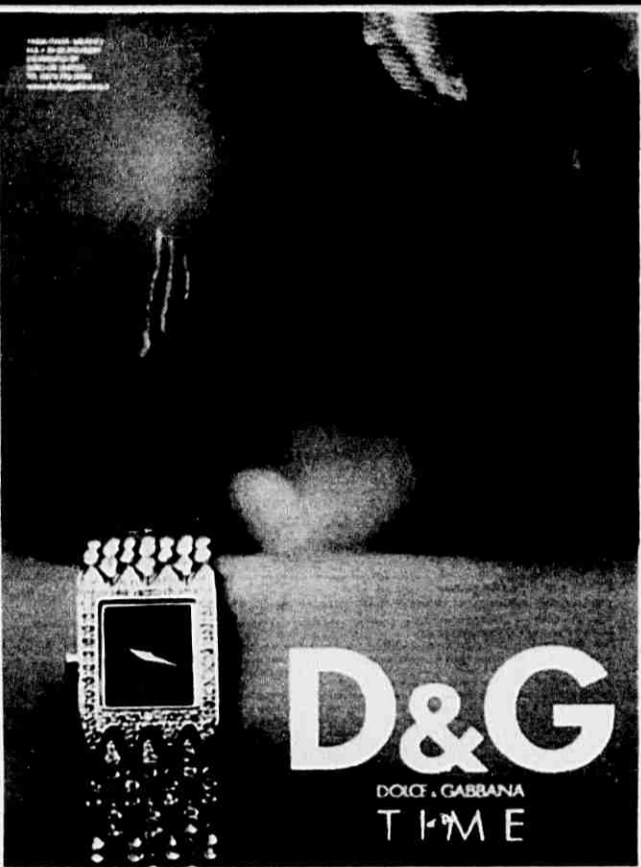

Sections Of Ambitious Traffic Plan In Draft Action Plan For Lismore

A number of sections of an ambitious traffic plan have been incorporated into the Draft Local Action Plan for Lismore.

The alternative one way plans for Main Street, the changes to traffic flow at the monument junction and the provision of short stay parking are all included in the Draft Plan.

However, concerns were expressed at Lismore Town Council's June meeting that no provision had been made for a parking spaces and a crossing at the primary school.

Fine Gael councillor, Orla Russell raised the issue, saying the road is "lethal" and an "accident waiting to happen" at the moment, and something has to be done.

She said it's "chaos" there currently, and with 5 new classrooms added the school is expanding and more parking spaces are needed.

But, her party colleague Cllr. John Heneghan said the problem was due to parents driving their children 100 yards to school.

"Until children start walking and cycling to school again, there will be a problem," he said.

He said more parking spaces just encourage more traffic, and was not a solution to the problem. There was a similar problem at Blackwater Community School where, he said, some of the students were driving in themselves.

THE ANSWER TO WALTON'S PARK SCULPTURE QUESTION

Basically, the structure is about the interaction between colour and the movement of shape and form in open space. To articulate this, I have elevated the main focal point of sculpture to a height of approx 15'. I divided the sculpture into two strong contrasting colours, carefully considering their two functions, equally considering the functional movement of shapes and how they interact within the composition.

In order to identify rather than explain the sculpture, I've entitled it "Sundial". In fact it has a lot in common with figurative sculpture in so far that it is composed of exactly the same language, these being form, shape, movement, space, light, shadow, and colour, the only difference being that I'm using these elements in a none descriptive way. I obviously had to consider the fact that this is a public park, so I scaled the work so that it did not inhibit or dwarf the people. I also considered the safety factor.

The structure is about the common language of sculpture in a modern environment and age. Oddly enough just up the road a modern bridge is being built and the men building it are using exactly the same techniques and tools as myself. So in a way modern technology has opened up new avenues and paths for the artists. The new bridge and my sculpture have a lot in common and in a way complement each other. Both are to be enjoyed and used but in a strange way my bridge is much more difficult to build.

We are all looking forward to November 16th when the Post Leaving Cert students will have their Conferring ceremony.

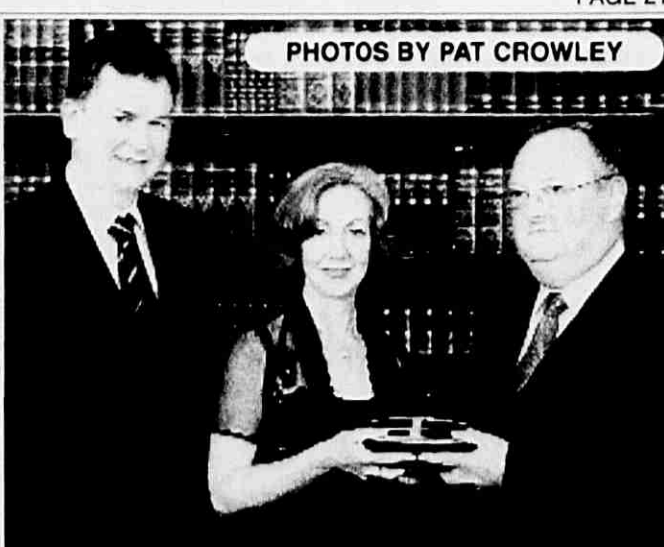

Bridget (Birdie) Cunningham, Ballycurrane, Clashmore, Co. Waterford

Bridget Cunningham, universally known as Birdie, died peacefully in the early morning of Sunday 13th May, 2007.

Birdie, aged 84, parted from this life in the home of her daughter Mary in Cappoquin in the loving company of her six children, the kind Hospice nurse and some other close family members.

Birdie was born Bridget Philomena Donnelly on the 26th June 1922, the fourth of twelve children of Terence and Brigid Donnelly of Glenmore, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford.

She attended Glenbeg Primary School, the Mercy Convent Secondary School in Dungarvan and then spent a year in the School of Rural and Home Economics in Ramsgrange, Co. Wexford.

While still a teenager, during the Second World War, Birdie went to Dumfries in Scotland to train as a nurse, but had to return home within the year for personal and family reasons.

At age twenty two, on Tuesday 3rd October 1944, she married Jim Cunningham, who was seventeen years her senior, and moved to the life of a farmer's wife in Ballycurrane, Clashmore, where over the next ten years their six children were born.

Birdie, like most farming women of that time, had a tough, no frills life, with lots of work and too little time for play. This was especially true of the 1950's and 1960's when her children

were growing up and being educated in countryside much poorer than it is today.

But 'the Birdie' - as she was also affectionately known - always strove to see the bright side, the good side, the funny side and it is for this 'sense of fun' that she is most fondly remembered. She was also a very kind and generous woman, whose acts of kindness, big and small, touched many of the people she encountered during her long and full life.

The great esteem in which she was held was very evident by the huge numbers of people who came to pay their respects at the funeral ceremonies.

On the Sunday, the evening of her death, Birdie was taken back to be waked in her home of sixty three years in Ballycurrane, to be with her family, her neighbours and friends for just one last time. Tea was drunk, times remembered, stories told, tears shed and the Rosary prayers were led by good friend Fr. O'Gorman.

At the Removal from Drohan's Funeral Home, Dungarvan, on the Monday evening and the Funeral Mass, in Clashmore Church on Tuesday, many lovely tributes were paid to Birdie and none more so than when one mourner, while paying respects at the coffin, said - to everyone and to no one in particular - "that was a superb woman".

The religious ceremonies, over the three days, were conducted by Fr. O'Gorman of Clashmore, Fr. Kiely and Fr. Arthur of Cappoquin, Fr. O'Connor of Modeligo (formerly of Clashmore), Fr. O'Riordan of Middleton and Fr. Jack Power OSA, her cousin and lifelong friend since childhood.

Birdie was laid to rest in Clashmore cemetery beside her husband Jim, who died eighteen years ago on 29th March 1989.

The chief mourners were her children: Jerry (Dublin), Mary (Cappoquin), Breeda (England), Terence (Fethard), Seamus (Middleton), Liam (Ballycurrane), 18 grandchildren, two great-grand children, daughter's in law: Joyce, Jennifer, Mary, Kate, sons-in-law: Tommy and John, brothers: Patsy and Frankie, sisters: Chris, Joan, Freeda and Rosie, also brothers in law, sisters in law, numerous nieces and nephews and other close relatives, neighbours and friends.

Helvick RNLI Lifeboat Rescues Three From Drifting Yacht

The crew of the Helvick RNLI lifeboat were last night called out to assist a 32 foot yacht with three persons on board that had issued a Mayday alert and was reported to be drifting four miles off Mine Head in County Waterford.

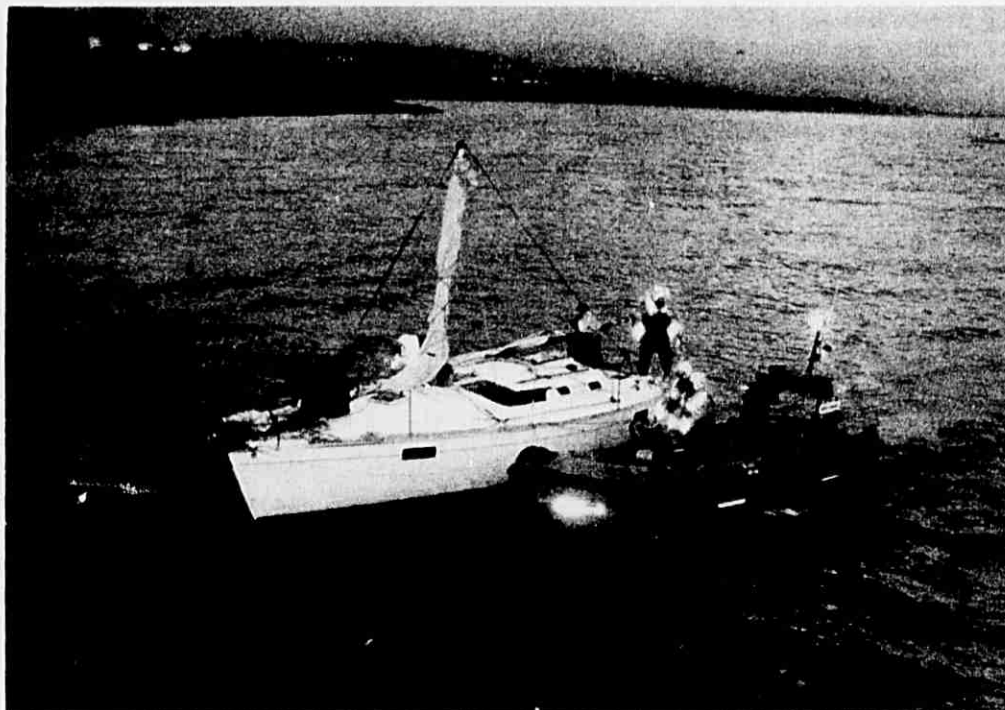
Mine Head Coast Guard received a distress call at 8.50pm last night (Thursday 14 May 2007) from a yacht with three persons on board. They reported engine failure, had lost their mast and their yacht was drifting. Helvick RNLI was contacted by the Coast Guard and immediately launched their inshore Atlantic 75 lifeboat Alice and Charles.

The three lifeboat crew quickly assessed the situation and established a tow between the lifeboat and the vessel. They were then able to bring the vessel to the safety of Helvick Harbour. The lifeboat crew involved in the rescue were Alan Kelly, Paudie Walsh and Richard Haynes.

Commenting on the rescue RNLI Helvick lifeboat Operations Manager Iain Walsh said, "The crew of the yacht

were very lucky. They had no effect. If they had come in attempted to erect a homemade closer to shore they may have mast but it was having absolutely struck the cliffs. Fortunately

weather conditions were favourable and we managed to bring them to safety."

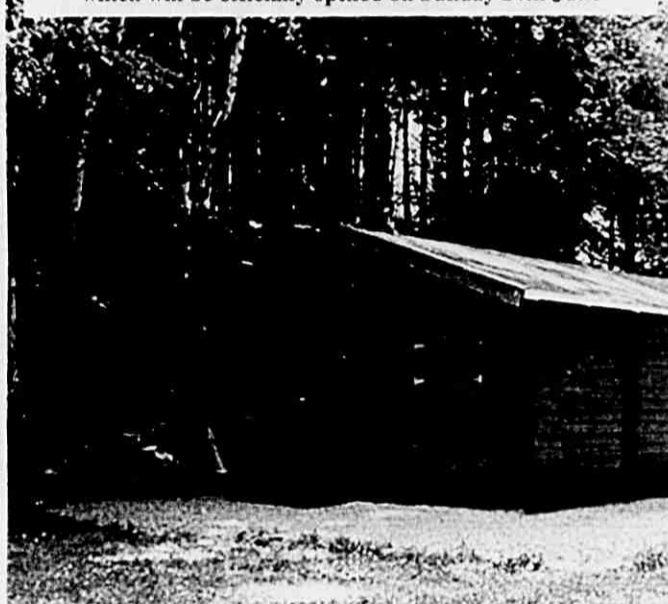

Local History

With all of the talk recently about the quality of the water we thought a few excerpts from the 'Calendar of Minutes & Records of Dungarvan Town Commissioners & Urban District Council 1855-1950' may interest you.

"Letter from Patrick McCarthy, Town Clerk to George Kiely Esq., Springmount May 29th 1865" - "Sir, I am directed by the Town Commissioners to forward you the accompanying copy of an order...to request you would kindly consent to Mr Roberts re-opening it (a well at spring) as the object they have in view is to provide a supply of pure clean water for the use of the inhabitants. Which the commissioners consider they cannot obtain outside in as much as washing clothes & the filth of cars, besides the droppings of muel & donkeys become mixed up with the water in the present well, and is then carted to town for sale"

"Details of the water supply drawn in barrels to Dungarvan from the Spring Well, February 1890" - "The water is sold at 1/2d per crock and 6d,7d,& 8d a barrell, the 'Fort Well' at Brewery end is used by the poor inhabitants of Fairlane, Gallows Hill & Lord Georges Lanes."

Lismore Purple Patch Reaches Fever Pitch Delivering Two Thumping Victories Away To Kerry And Clonmel

It official!! Lismore are the inform club team in Irish cricket right now and should the victories continue to flow are in for quiet a season. Brian Power (4 for 20) cut through the middle order and Byrne (3 for 17) returned to polish off the tail, aided by two stunning catches from Ken Sutton at silly mid-off. The final wicket was a run-out affected by David Campion, and the Kingdom were all out for 106, giving Lismore a 52 run victory. The team was: Sunil Monga (captain), David Campion, Mark Arden, John Russell, Martin Finn, Brian Power, Oliver Ind, Paddy Byrne, Ken Sutton and Niall Stafford.

On Sunday the first team travelled to Clonmel in division 2 and came away with another fine victory. 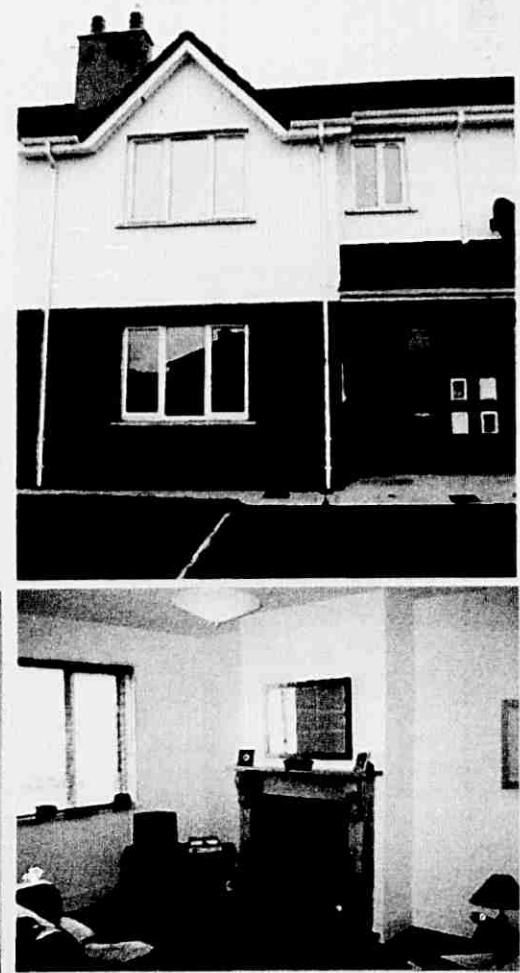

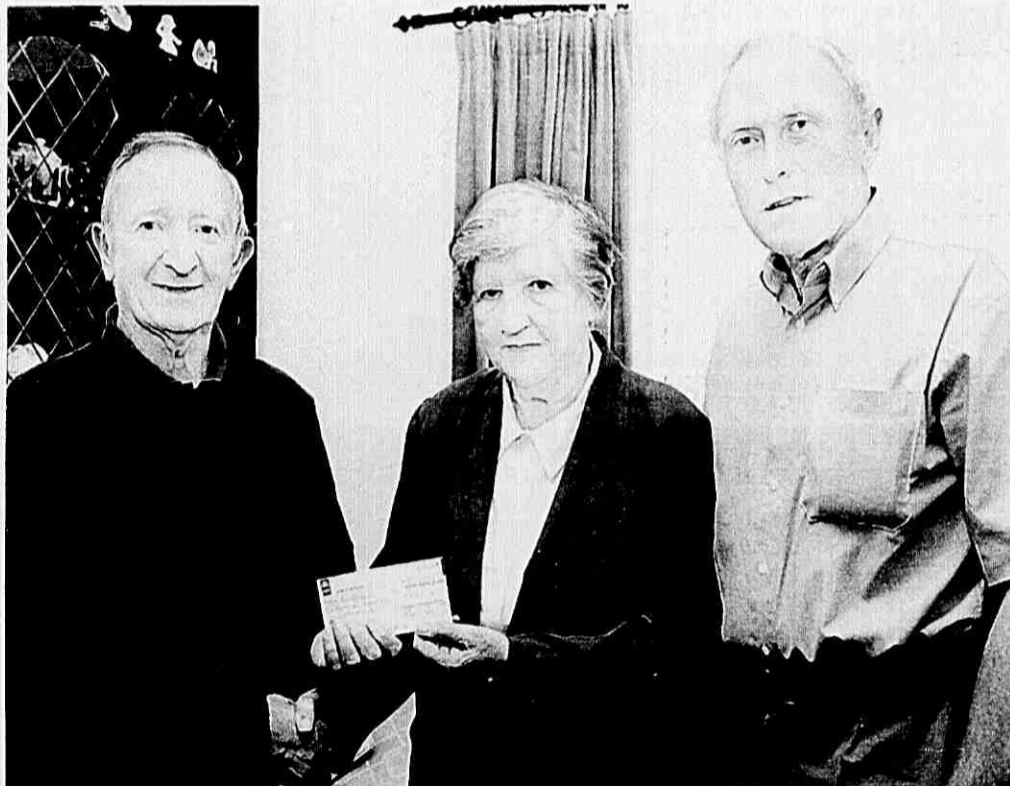

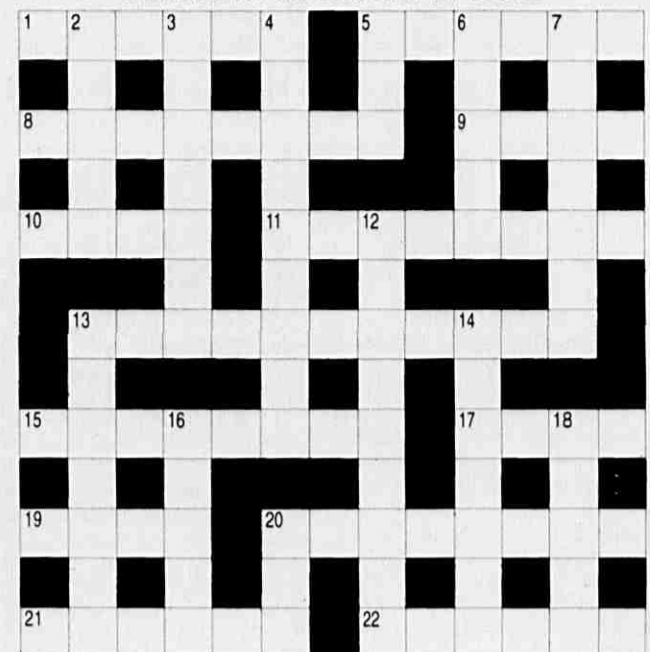

Dungarvan Leader - this week in the garden

A nodding head of winter colour

CYCLAMEN, with their beautiful heart-shaped leaves, can be found in habitats ranging from alpine woodland to dry sands from the Mediterranean east to Iran and south to Somalia. The nodding, sometimes fragrant flowers have five twisted petals, ranging in colour from pure white to pink and on to carmine-red or mauve. Although cyclamen are probably best known for winter flowering, different species could bloom at any time of the year. It is possible to grow cyclamen outdoors, in greenhouses and as houseplants, provided you choose the correct species. C. persicum are the best species to grow as houseplants. They are sweet-scented and have pink, red or white flowers. There are several series in this species of cyclamen, which flower at all times throughout the year. Sow at 15-18oC in late summer for flowering at Christmas of the following year and in late winter for flowering in spring of the next year. Prick out into seed trays and keep the seedlings moist and grow on at 10oC. When they have

made a good root ball pot them on successively to their final 13-15cm pots. Place in a coldframe for the summer and feed weekly. In autumn bring them in for flowering and after this dry them off and store them in their pots until mid-summer, when they should be repotted. A top tip for healthy outdoor cyclamen is to mulch with

an inch-deep layer of leaf mould annually. Pests and diseases cyclamen suffer from are aphids, mice, vine weevils, tarsonemid mites, black root rot, cucumber mosaic virus and grey mould. Aphids also spread diseases so spray with a contact insecticide such as malathion or derris as soon as you notice insects on your plants.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Sow Forget-me-nots

This is a good time to sow forget-me-nots for flowering outdoors next May and June. It is possible to germinate the seeds in the open, sow in drills 1cm deep and 15cm apart. Cover the seeds very lightly with sandy soil and water moderately.

Divide mossy saxifrage

Old clumps of mossy saxifrage may be divided and this is a good policy if they are tending to get brown in the centre. Discard the brown pieces and replant the green clumps in a semi-shady place in soil that contains plenty of leafmould or moss peat. Water freely for a few weeks.

Lift and divide June flowering Irises

This is the ideal time for lifting and dividing all the May and June flower flag irises as most of the plants will be starting to make new roots. It is not wise to lift and divide clumps every year, but after four or five years they get overcrowded and exhaust the soil. Then you should dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the old central portions of bare rhizome, discarding them altogether, and replant the healthy outer growths with 8 to 10cm of rhizome attached to each. Plant in well prepared soil dusted with superphosphate of lime. If you use animal manure, work it in rather deeply, so it does not come in contact with the rhizomes.

Start to bud roses

It is usually possible to start budding rose stocks at about this time, though much depends on the weather. If June is very dry you may have to wait until well on into July whereas if the weather is wet it is sometimes possible to start budding even earlier than this.

Increase in the Plastic Bag Levy to 22 cents from 01st. July 2007

From its introduction on 4th March 2002, the plastic bag levy had an immediate effect on consumer behaviour - with plastic bag per capita usage decreasing overnight from an estimated 328 bags to 21. Our environment has benefited-with a decrease in excess of 95% in plastic bag litter.

Income from the levy has been increasing in the recent past and data from levies remitted and population estimates provided by the Central Statistics Office, would indicate that plastic bag usage rose to 30 bags per capita during the course of 2006. It is vital that the levy's positive effect on the environment is maintained. To that effect the levy will be increased to the maximum of 22 cent with the aim that the increased levy will reduce the per capita usage to the level achieved in 2002 or lower. (Source: Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government).

Waterford County Council has a key role in enforcing the levy Regulations and ensuring retailers implement the increase in the levy and the Enforcement Section of this Council will be monitoring the implementation of the new Regulation.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL INTRODUCES NEW BYE LAWS

Waterford County Council has made Bye Laws for the purpose of regulating and controlling the use of bring facilities e.g. (bottle banks)

The bye-laws provide for the regulation & controls of use of bring facilities within the functional areas of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council.

The bye-laws which will come into operation on the 13th July 2007 and will limit the use of Bring Facilities (Bottle Banks) to persons depositing domestic waste glass materials.

These Bye-laws also make it an offence to deposit waste within 100 meters of a Bring Facility Purpose Built Receptacle (Bottle Bank) other than within that receptacle.

A person who contravenes any provision of the Bye-Laws may be liable to a fine of up to €1,900.

The renovation by Dungarvan Town Council of the Old Town Hall building on St. Augustine Street, Dungarvan (their current premises) has presented them with the opportunity to greatly improve their exhibition space and the quality of their exhibition cases.

The cost of upgrading of the interior of their premises will be in the region of €100,000. Already they have sourced almost €80,000 of this money from the Waterford Leader Partnership, Blackwater Homes and numerous other local businesses.

The new cases, lighting, architectural models, audio-visual presentations, displays and signage that they are currently fundraising for will greatly enhance the visitor experience for locals and tourists alike.

Museum curator Willie Fraher stated, "I feel that we have a one off opportunity for the county to obtain a museum that befits the county's rich cultural heritage. If the people of Waterford do not value and preserve our County's heritage no one else will do it for us."

The museum is appealing to the people and businesses of County Waterford for further donations to make up the €20,000 shortfall in funding. Over the past few weeks most businesses in West Waterford have received a mail shot from them detailing their future plans. In the coming weeks they will be contacting as many businesses as possible with a follow up phone call in order to further explain the project.

Committee member Willie Whelan said that "It is important that the people of County Waterford realise that this is their museum. We record all types of history and heritage countywide. Much of the history that we are preserving is social and commercial history. While there is obviously a lot of attention on

our architectural heritage, battles and famous people, we are equally committed to preserving the history of dramatic societies, sports teams and local businesses."

All donations of €100 or more will be acknowledged in a permanent form on a plaque displayed in a prominent place in the new museum building.

What Does the Museum Do?

As part of their efforts to become a museum for all of County Waterford the museum continues to invest considerable time and effort into several initiatives.

- The museum will expand their service to the local schools. Over 300 children visited the museum during one week in April last year. This weeklong lecture series and exhibition was so successful that they now plan to run this event annually and involve more schools throughout the county.

- As part of their history outreach programme the museum continues to mount temporary exhibitions in communities. Exhibitions have been mounted in Ring, Old Parish, Clashmore and Cappoquin. Exhibitions are scheduled for Portlaoine and Touraneena in the coming months. Visitors to Garvey's Supervalu on Main Street, Dungarvan will have seen the very successful photographic exhibition that was mounted by the museum in conjunction with the Dungarvan Main Street Traders. This exhibition has already been visited by over 1500 people.

- They have mounted over 44 major exhibitions on topics as diverse as Dungarvan Crystal, Waterford's Maritime History,

Waterford Postcards, Waterford & World War I and Sarah Purser.

- They have organised 132 lectures featuring contributions from eminent academics, authors and local historians. Topics covered are very varied and recently included Tom Crean, The Work Of The Folklore Archive In Waterford and Crotty The Highwayman.

- The museum has published 4 books, on Dungarvan's architectural heritage, the famine in Dungarvan Poor Law union and two guides to historic Dungarvan.

Increase in the Plastic Bag Levy to 22 cents from 1st July 2007

From its introduction on 4th March 2002, the plastic bag levy had an immediate effect on consumer behaviour - with plastic bag per capita usage decreasing overnight from an estimated 328 bags to 21. Our environment has benefited-with a decrease in excess of 95% in plastic bag litter.

Income from the levy has been increasing in the recent past and data from levies remitted and population estimates provided by the Central Statistics Office, would indicate that plastic bag usage rose to 30 bags per capita during the course of 2006. It is vital that the levy's positive effect on the environment is maintained. To that effect the levy will be increased to the maximum of 22 cent with the aim that the increased levy will reduce the per capita usage to the level achieved in 2002 or lower. (Source:-Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government).

Waterford County Council has a key role in enforcing the levy Regulations and ensuring retailers implement the increase in the levy and the Enforcement Section of this Council will be monitoring the implementation of the new Regulation.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL INTRODUCES NEW BYE LAWS

Waterford County Council has made Bye Laws for the purpose of regulating and controlling the use of bring facilities e.g. (bottle banks). The bye-laws provide for the regulation & controls of use of bring facilities within the functional areas of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council.

The bye-laws which will come into operation on the 13th July 2007 and will limit the use of Bring Facilities (Bottle Banks) to persons depositing domestic waste glass materials.

These Bye-laws also make it an offence to deposit waste within 100 meters of a Bring Facility Purpose Built Receptacle (Bottle Bank) other than within that receptacle. A person who contravenes any provision of the Bye-Laws may be liable to a fine of up to €1,900.

Money

That was the opening topic of the community group meeting on the 12th of June. Jimmy Taaffe of Waterford Leader Partnership gave us all a fast course in funding. Naturally, we hung on every word.

The summary is this: for suitable rural development projects, 75% funding is available. Community groups should be broadly based but a committed group of six to eight people on a central committee is usually essential for success. Education projects can get 100% funding in certain circumstances and voluntary work, properly vetted and overseen, can count toward the 25% the community must raise. And funding from other sources can be conjoined with Leader funding to reduce somewhat the amount the local group must raise.

Successful projects by other community groups have usually proceeded in stages. For example, communities have built a hall and raised the funding for that project. Once finished, they have successfully submitted further proposals to expand the basic hall or add another project. Two to three years per big project is normal.

Thankfully, help is available. Waterford Leader Partnership provides facilitators who can offer technical and financial expertise. There is no cost to the community group for this service.

What is Green-Schools?

Green-Schools, known internationally as Eco-Schools, is an international environmental education programme, environmental management system and award scheme that promotes and acknowledges long-term, whole school action for the environment.

The aim of Green-Schools is to increase students' and participant awareness of environmental issues through classroom studies and to transfer this knowledge into positive environmental action in the school and also in the wider community. Schools that have successfully completed all the elements of the programme are awarded the 'Green-Flag'. This award has now become a well-recognised Eco-Label. The award has to be renewed every two years.

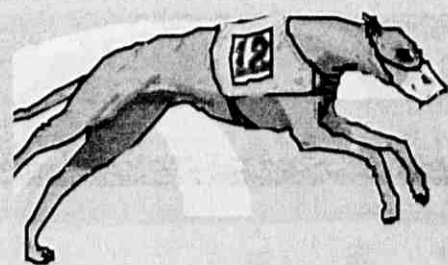

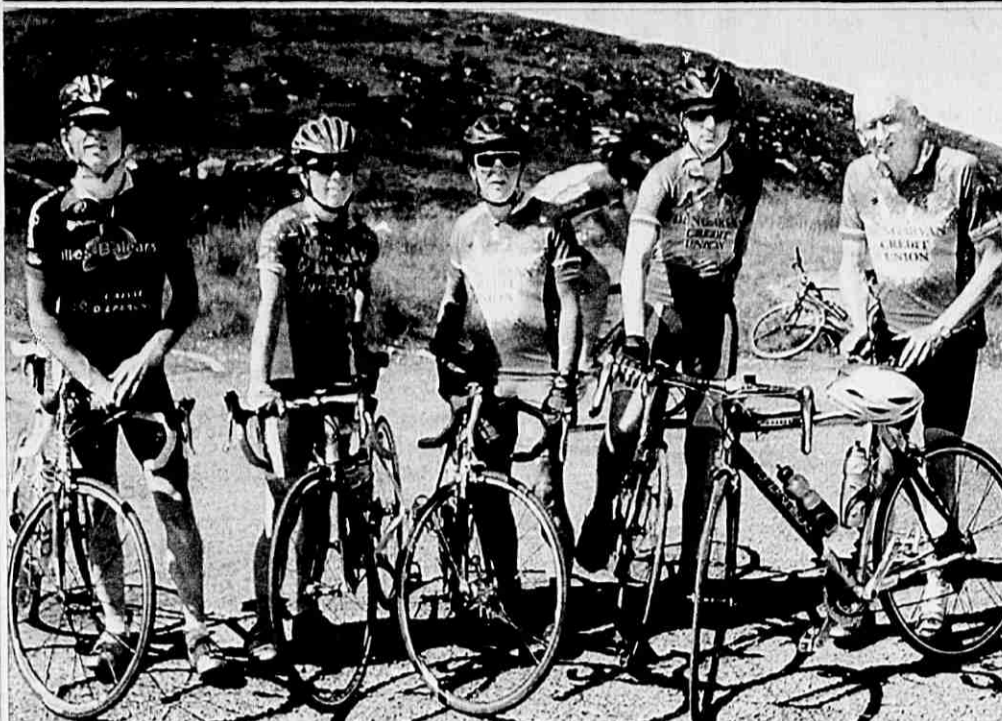

PROFILE OF EPSOM OAKS WINNING TRAINER HENRY CECIL

Born in Aberdeen on January 11, 1943, Henry Cecil has achieved just about everything he could have dreamed of in a training career spanning more than 30 years. If classic success is a measure of achievement on the Flat, the 10-time champion trainer is second to none among current trainers having won every domestic classic at least twice and amassed a total of 24 in all. The Lord Howard de Walden-owned Slip Anchor, partnered by Steve Cauthean, brought

Cecil the first of his four Vodafone Derby triumphs in 1985 with an emphatic victory. Reference Point, also ridden by Cauthean, won the 1987 Derby holding off the challenge of Most Welcome while Commander In Chief, Cecil's supposedly second string behind Tenby in the 1993 Vodafone Derby, and Oath in 1999 - partnered by Cecil's then stable jockey Kieren Fallon - provided his third and fourth successes. Cecil has also landed the Vodafone Oaks eight times, the 2000 Guineas twice, the 1000 Guineas six times and the St Leger on four occasions. Having sent out 100 winners during the 1998 season, Cecil's yearly tally dropped every year until 2006, when his 25 victories included Passage Of Times' Group One success in the Criterium de Saint Cloud - the stable's first Group One success since Beat Hollow in the 2000 Grand Prix de Paris. His passion for the turf was nurtured by his stepfather, Sir Cecil Boyd-Rochfort, with whom a young Cecil served as assistant trainer between 1964 and 1968, before taking out his own licence to train in 1969. It was not long before he staked his claim among the ranks of the leading trainers with a victory by Wolver Hollow in the Eclipse Stakes of that year. On the retirement of Sir Noel Murless, father of his first wife Julie, in 1976, Cecil took over Warren Place Stables in Newmarket where he has remained. He has a string of 78 horses in training for 2007.

COCKNEY REBEL BID

Trainer Geoff Huffer recently revealed that an offer of £10 million had been received for Cockney Rebel ahead of the dual Classic winner's bid for Tuesday's (June 19) Group One St James's Palace Stakes at Royal Ascot. But the Stan James 2000 Guineas and Irish 2,000 Guineas hero's owner, Essex insurance broker Phil Cunningham, will not consider any offers until after the Royal Meeting. "We've had lots of offers and a firm bid of £10 million for him, that's not a bad return on the 30,000 guineas he cost as a yearling - I only wanted to spend 20,000 guineas at the time but it doesn't seem so bad now," said Huffer, speaking on a Royal Ascot press visit to Newmarket. "Nobody's bought him at the moment and Tipperary born Phil Cunningham doesn't want to do anything until after the St James's Palace Stakes. "Cockney Rebel is worth that now and if he wins the St James's Palace Stakes he'll be worth more - he won't devalue. He's a dual Classic winner so he can stand at £15-£20,000 at stud whatever happens." His owner is a sporting man and money is not the main factor, which is that the owner can keep the horse for the rest of the season." Looking ahead to the St James's Palace Stakes, for which Coral quote Cockney Rebel as 6/4 favourite, Huffer is hopeful that his stable star can prevail once again against Stan James 2000 Guineas third Dutch Art. "Mine's improving all the time and you haven't seen the best of him yet," added the trainer. "You can never be totally confident, he's got to run his race, but Dutch Art has to catch us up. People say Dutch Art was unlucky in the Guineas and won the race on his side but he was drawn next to us and we had to go right round Strategic Prince. I would say they are more frightened of us than we are of them but that's what horse racing is about and I don't mind who takes us on. If he gets beat then he gets beat but I find it hard to think he will. "He quickens off a good gallop and then quickens again, very few horses do that. He's run a time of 11.91 seconds a furlong which is nearly sprinting time. Persian Heights, who I trained, was a great horse but this one's better - he's already a legend. "As a two-year-old, he'd gallop with three-year-olds and leave them standing still and he goes on any ground bar very soft. "They didn't go fast enough for him in the Irish Guineas so he pulled to hard. Olivier Peslier is a world-class jockey but had to go too early in Ireland because of the pace and the horse just idled in front a bit. "But you don't get many slow-run races at Ascot and if they do try and go slow there I've got a trick for them - I'm not telling you what it is though!" Huffer added that, after the St James's Palace Stakes, Cockney Rebel will bid for the Prix Jacques Le Marois at Deauville in August before returning to Ascot in September to take on his elders in the Group One Queen Elizabeth II Stakes.

YOUNG MICK OUT

Young Mick is 90 per cent certain to miss the Hardwicke Stakes at Royal Ascot according to trainer George Margarson. The Newmarket trainer explained that he had lost a race against time to get his stable star fit enough for the Group Two event over a mile and a half on Saturday, June 23, Margarson commented: "Young Mick has had a lot of problems with his feet over the years. He was turned out for three months before coming back to me this year and got massively overweight and all his problems came back to haunt him. "His feet have been alright for the past month but I would have to gallop him hard on Saturday and Wednesday to get him anywhere near fit and I am not prepared to put him under that pressure at this stage." Instead we will prepare him to carry top-weight in the Ebor. I think he is capable of winning a big one. The owner Mike Kentish is not keen to go for the Melbourne Cup but I am. He has said if the horse wins two by September then he can go." The trainer could still have a couple of runners at Royal Ascot, two-year-old Magical Speedfit who may run in both the Listed five-furlong Windsor Castle Stakes on the opening day (Tuesday, June 19) and the Group Two Norfolk Stakes over the same distance on Thursday, June 21, and Northern Gem who is on target for the Hampton Court (Thursday, June 21). Margarson added: "Magical Speedfit is the fastest two-year-old I have had and don't be surprised if he wins easily. He is as hard as nails and might run in both races - he picks up and finds gears. I ran him quickly after his first run because I didn't want to take a maiden to Royal Ascot but anyway now I am. He has wanted a fast pace so a big field will help. "Northern Gem is better with juice in the ground. He has taken more time than a lot of them to learn his job."

THE FINAL FURLONG

Yeats Can Be Pure Poetry At Ascot

There'll be lots of horsemen passing by at Royal Ascot this week - hopefully the ones passing by the quickest will carry our 'hard-earned'.

And the horse that can once again light up the Royal meeting on Thursday is Ballydoyle's champion stayer, Yeats.

No matter what he achieves as odds-on favourite for this year's Ascot Gold Cup, it's still very difficult to foresee him popping up on a Leaving Cert paper. Unless, of course, Aidan O'Brien's young lads pen an essay about their summer holidays.

The Ballydoyle Master appears to have two strategies with his top two year-olds - one plan is to run them as much as possible to give them experience, the other is run them only once and let them develop over the winter months.

The second strategy is one he adopts regularly with his middle-distance performers and it seems to have prolonged the career of the aforementioned Yeats.

Yeats appeared just once as a two year-old, winning a back-end Curragh maiden in a common canter. After that race O'Brien indicated that he would take a similar route to the stable's Derby-winning Galileo. "He's a proper horse, has been all along," O'Brien said afterwards. However, unfortunately for the son of Sadler's Wells, things didn't work out accordingly.

O'Brien favours the Ballysax and then the Derrinstown Stud as a run in for his Derby hopefuls and in his three year-old season that's exactly where Yeats appeared. He duly won both and was the spring favourite for the Derby until picking up an injury in the run-in to the race and missing out on the rest of the season.

His much-awaited return came the following summer and there was a certain poetic justice to his first victory as a four year-old. It came at Epsom in the Coronation Cup, the same ground covered in the Derby. He cruised home under a perfectly-judged front-running ride from Kieren Fallon, confirming that his talent hadn't been diminished by injury.

Better was to come last year over longer distances. Most striking was his four-length jaunt to victory in the Ascot Gold Cup last year. After the race his victory must've looked obvious, but beforehand

there were serious doubts about him staying the two and a half mile distance. He effortlessly dropped back to two-miles to land the Goodwood Cup and sealed a rare double as well as comparisons to some of the great stayers of the past 50 years.

Subsequent defeats in the Irish St Leger (to the decent Kastoria on rain-softened ground at the Curragh) and then at Melbourne can be excused. He missed the break at Flemington Park where the muddling pace also played against him.

The top stayer in these isles looked as good as ever with two smooth wins at Navan and Leopardstown. Sergeant Cecil looks a danger because he maintains a progressive profile but as long as the rain doesn't come down in buckets at Ascot this week, Yeats is banker material.

One for the notebook

It might be dangerous to take the form of last week's bumper at Clonmel too literally. The field of 12 didn't exactly go like the clapper and subsequently the time was very slow. Earlier that morning there was good word for Red Rose Café but, in the event of strong on-course support for the Nina Carberry-ridden Cait Ni Chaonaigh, Colm Murphy's debutante was allowed drift out to 9/4. In the end it was Whispering Wind that landed the spoils for the in-form Joanne Morgan stable with the favourite in second, but Red Rose Café caught the eye. She ran green, pulled hard, wandered around - did everything to suggest she would be much better for that run. This column endeavours to identify future winners in the 'one for the notebook section', and Red Rose Café looks a cast-iron winner.

Keyes being the scorer.

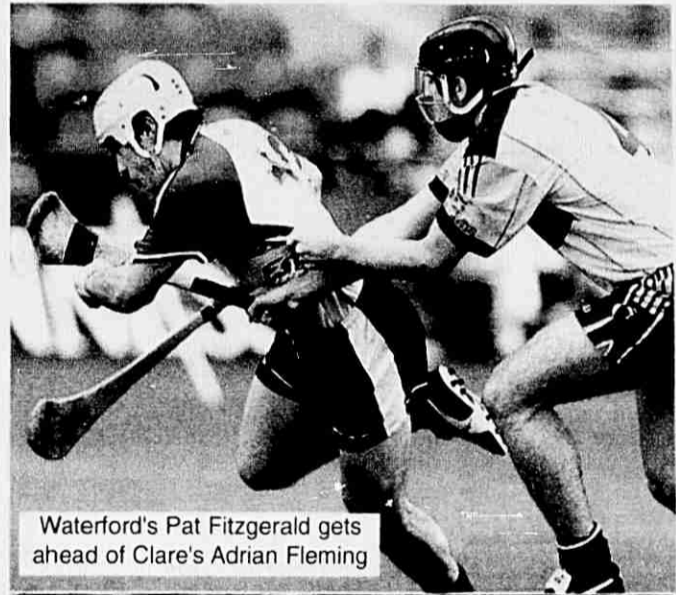
Well done for a great display and a very well deserved win and we look forward to writing more about them before they line out for the Munster final.

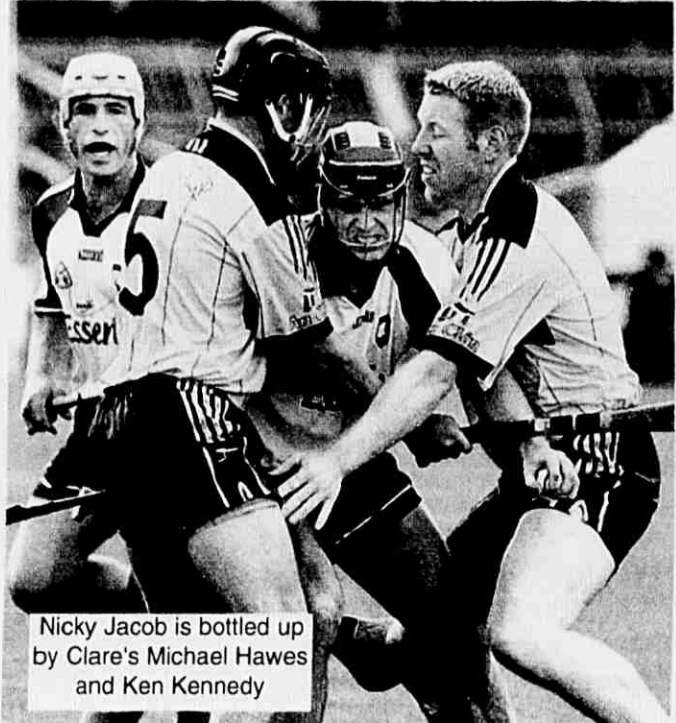

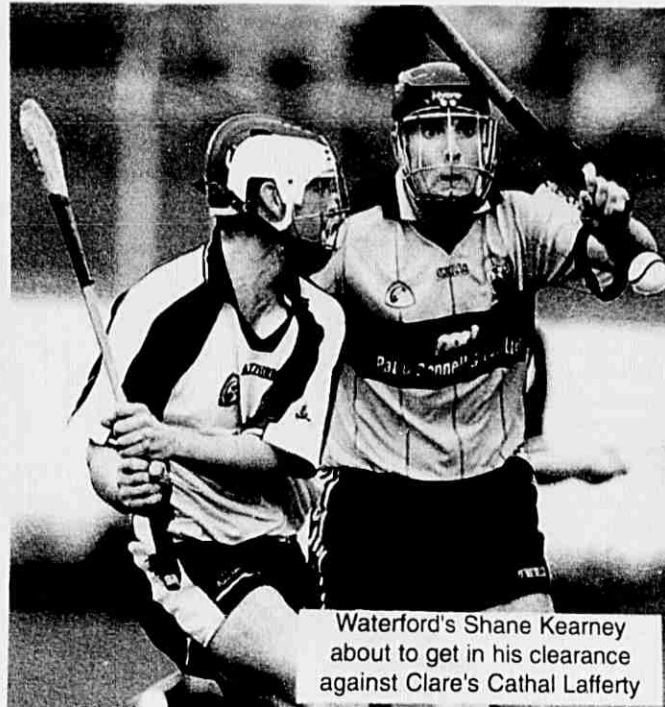

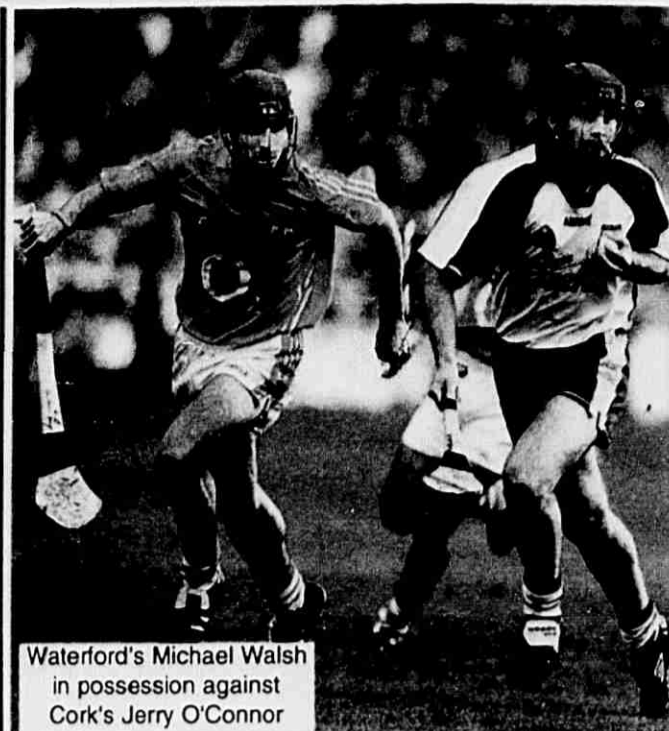
Waterford's Pat Fitzgerald gets ahead of Clare's Adrian Fleming



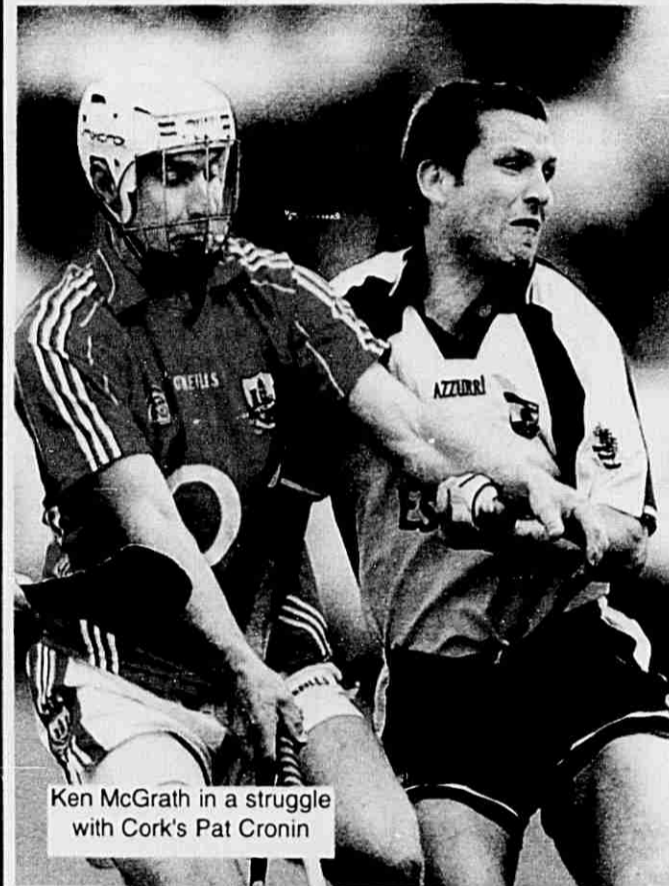
Nicky Jacob is bottled up by Clare's Michael Hawes and Ken Kennedy



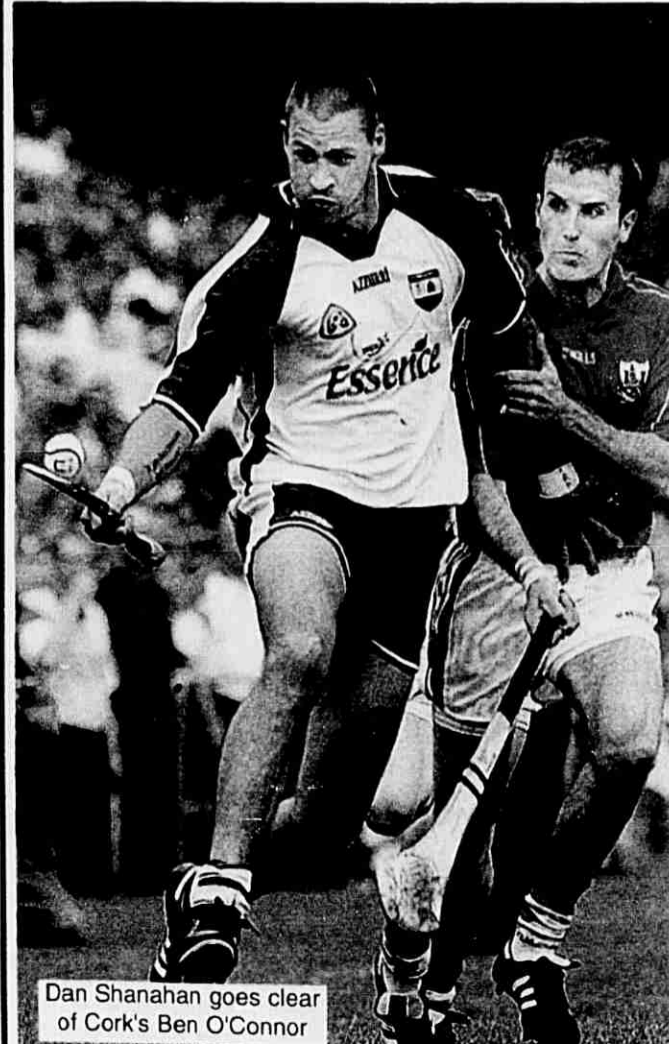
Waterford's Shane Kearney about to get in his clearance against Clare's Cathal Lafferty

Waterford Defeat Rebels in Mighty Contest

Nerve-racking Finish Thrilled The Huge Crowd at Thurles

Munster Senior Hurling Semi Final — Waterford 5-15 Cork 3-18

In the Press Box and mingling with the crowds on the way out we found supporters searching for words to describe this epic battle between these age old rivals but the consensus by both conquerors and vanquished was that it was a modern day hurling classic the likes of which had not been seen for many years at the famed Semple Stadium.

In fact it threw my mind back to that historic day exactly half a century ago in 1957 when Waterford after a thrilling Munster final defeated Cork by the same margin as we saw here at Semple Stadium on Sunday.

The absence of the three suspended Cork players who incidentally sat together behind the Cork dugout was given by some supporters of the Rebels as the reason for their defeat but also the majority of the Cork supporters were gracious and agreed that the better team won on the day and that Waterford are deservedly through to the Munster final two weeks from next Sunday. In the sparkling opening half the standard was brilliant with top class hurling being played by both sides and the lead changing hands on several occasions before Waterford went in with a five point lead after scoring a record four goals in the 35 minutes — something that has not happened to Cork for a long number of years. This did not stop Cork however from fighting back to bring the scores level in a pulsating second half before Waterford edged ahead and stayed in front until the final whistle.

Atmosphere

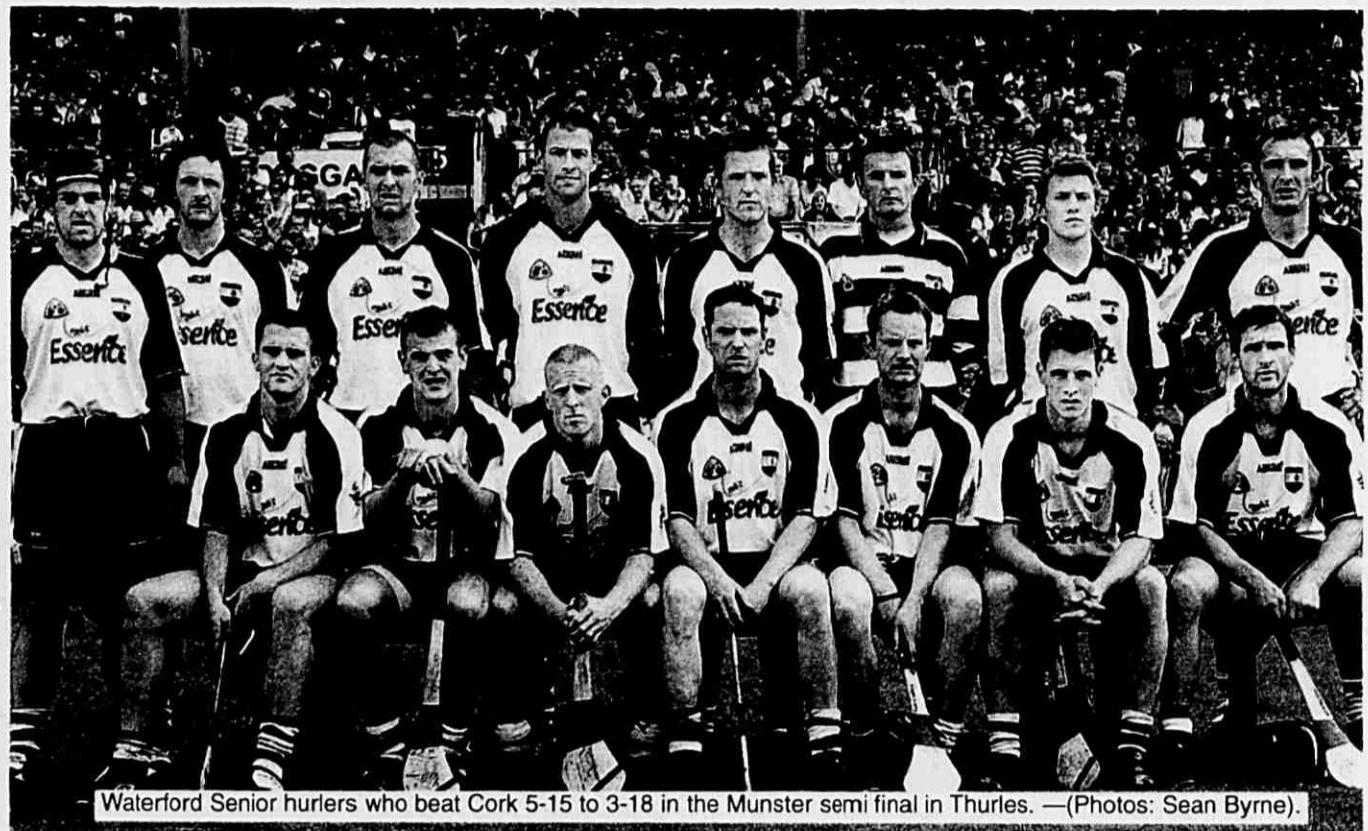
The day was ideal for hurling and Semple Stadium as always looked magnificent for what was to be a battle royal and as the thousands moved out from the square in Thurles there was good humoured banter exchanged between the rival supporters each of whom were confident that their team was

going to win.

Unfortunately the traffic conditions in the town were absolutely chaotic and were not controlled with the usual efficiency. A thunderous reception greeted Waterford when as challengers they raced on to the pitch 20 minutes before starting time but surprisingly the volume of cheering which greeted Cork was even greater. Obviously the controversy which surrounded the suspension of the three players had angered Cork supporters and this to an extent was responsible for having many red bedecked followers in the stadium. There was not an absolute breath of wind or a drop of rain throughout the game so the elements were no advantage. Waterford won the toss and decided to play in to the Killinen goal.

Play

Within ten seconds of the throw in John Mullane was on target with the opening point of the game after receiving an early pass from Michael Walsh and 45 seconds later Ben O'Connor with a magnificent point from a sideline cut had the teams level. In the 4th minute Eoin Kelly pointed a free and the teams were level again in the 7th minute with a Gerry O'Connor point from play. Cork raced into a 1-4 to 0-3 lead after 16 minutes thanks to Kieran Murphy's goal. Back came Waterford and big Dan Shanahan, receiving from Seamus Prendergast rattled the Cork net. This was met with a thunderous roar from the white and blue supporters. Points by Joe Deane and Ciaran Murphy followed, Tom Kenny and Eoin Kelly exchanged points, a pointed free from Ken McGrath brought the lead to three points in the 24th minute. John Mullane struck for his goal in the 25th minute. Gerry O'Connor and Joe Deane brought the gap to a single point before Ciaran Murphy had his second goal in the 29th minute, Kelly pointed

a free and Nial McCarthy scored from play before Paul Flynn striking from a 21 yard free raised our total to 3-8 and left Cork with 2-8 trailing by three points. Two minutes of added on time and the mighty Dan Shanahan rattled home our 4th goal before Joe Deane ended the scoring for the first half with a beautiful point. Half time score 4-8 to 2-9

Second Half

Understandably throughout the interval there had been confidence in the Waterford camp but this was tinged with speculation about our ability to retain this lead in the 35 minutes of white heat hurling that was to follow against the champions. In fact things did look rather ominous when Cork took early control in this half and reduced our lead to a single point after 13 minutes. Tom Kenny opened with an early point from Cork and Ken McGrath responded with a similar score for Waterford, Paul Flynn pointed in the 8th minute but the next four scores were all for Cork and these included a Gerry O'Connor goal in the 11th minute. The closeness of the game at this stage and the roaring of the 37,000 supporters brought a scorched earth policy to the game with both sides throwing caution to the wind and fighting doggedly for every ball. With 15 minutes remaining the sides were locked together on a 4-12 to 3-15 score line and the result was fairly in the balance. Then with 13 minutes remaining top scorer Eoin Kelly burst through for a mighty goal that drew a cheer that rocked the stadium. Entering the last ten minutes Corks Ben O'Connor pointed

and substitute Cathal Naughton brought Cork to within a point of our tally before two points one from John Mullane and a super score from Tony Browne extended the scoring gap to three points and in a frenzy of excitement it remained this way until referee Barry Kelly blew the final whistle to leave us safely in to the Munster Final at a venue to be decided on two weeks from next Sunday. The venue will depend on whether our opponents will be Tipperary or Limerick and the Munster Final will be played in either Cork or Thurles.

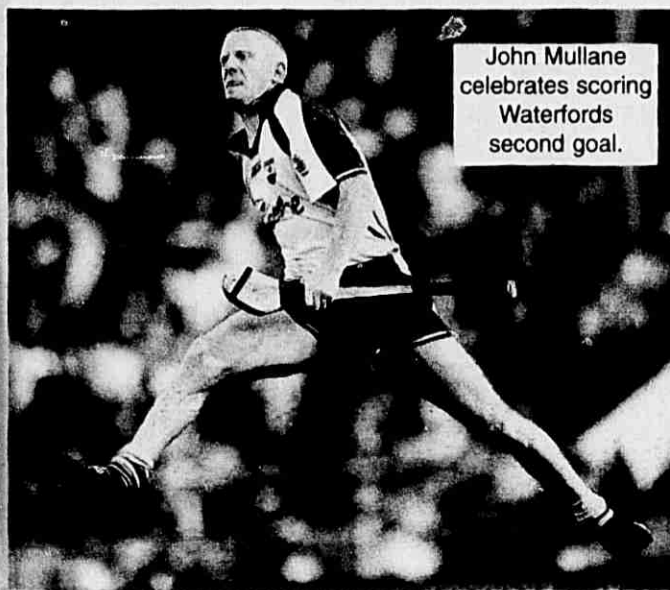

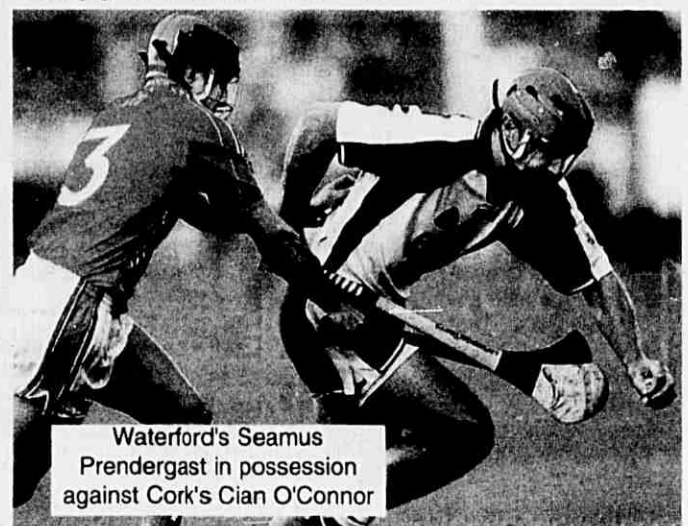

Five Senior Football Championship Games On This Coming Weekend

If this programme goes ahead as scheduled the second rounds of the championship will be completed and a few matches in round three as well.

Nire v An Rinn

This game is fixed for the Colligan venue on Sunday and it will be an interesting one in that it will be the Nire's first outing in the championship since defeating Stradbally in that epic county final last October.

The Gaeltacht team showed improved form when defeating Brickey Rangers in the opening game of the 2007 championship and again on Saturday night when accounting for the well fancied Mahon Gaels but in this contest, it would be difficult to see them shock the county champions who were

exceptionally impressive in the Munster club championship when they almost defeated the Kerry champions, Dr. Crokes in the final.

Ballinacourty v Ardmore at Fraher Field

This is one of the three weekend matches which are fixed for Friday and it is probably the most attractive of the trio. It is not a match that can be forecasted with any degree of confidence since on form there is very little between them.

Rathgormack were surprisingly well beaten by Ballinacourty and will be hoping to make amends here and win the points that will keep them in contention.

Gaultir will be having their first game here and will be hoping to improve on the form shown in their defeat of Ardmore in one of the better matches of the championship last year. The Passage East based Gaultir could take the points in this interesting clash.

In the feature game which follows, St. Brendan's who had a hard earned first round victory over Tramore (2-8 to 1-8) but who were surprisingly defeated by An Rinn on Saturday night last are one of the strongest group sides to play in the championship and with the likes of county team players Mick Ahearne, Tom Wall (goalkeeper), Andy Hubbard and Ray Hennessey on board they will prove a big handful for this Comeragh side with Stephen Raheer, Conor Hayes, Barry, Stephen, David Prendergast, Matty Kiely, Darren Mulherne and company who will be making a super effort to stay in contention, by repeating the fair good form which they showed in beating Tramore on Saturday last.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

Pat Flynn, chairman presided at the June meeting of the county board on Monday night of last week. The attendance of delegates was less than half the full membership of the board and the entire business of the night was dealt with in a matter of about 50 minutes.

Reports

Reports from the minor and under 21 hurling committees were read to the meeting as was the very comprehensive report from the county senior football manager John Kiely.

While the chairman thanked the managers for their reports, there was no comment from the floor about any of the three.

One would have expected that with the 4 county football teams all knocked out and with only one win in our six championship matches, there would have been some comment from the floor as no more intercounty football championship will be played until March of next year. All but the junior footballers suffered very heavy defeats.

Finance

County Treasurer, Michael Hogan informed delegates that the July Deise draw will go entirely to the benefit of the County Development debt. Clubs who have a draw membership in excess of 450 will benefit from the numbers above this figure.

Clubs Not Co-operating

In his report of progress with the county leagues, county secretary Seamus Grant told the meeting that some clubs were seeking postponements for trivial reasons and that this was making progress very difficult. He said that an effort will be made to complete the outstanding matches in the Phelan Cup.

DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

Discipline, or the lack of it, is back in the headlines once again and we see some sections of the media making a meal out of the adverse publicity which surrounds every incident. No mention is ever made of the thousands of matches in both hurling and football which are played sportingly and incident free.

However we do know that the incidence of referee abuse is causing a very serious problem in very many counties, including our own county.

This unwelcome behaviour seems to become par for the course in the age that we live in and where disgruntled players - invariably on the losing side think nothing of having 'a go' at the referee. This is happening at an alarming rate but we hear so little about the bad behaviour because referees just do not want to bother reporting it. Rather than put the complaint in writing and have the boards deal with the matters, some referees have taken the easy way out and packed in the service of refereeing.

Referees have stated again and again that clubs more than players are to blame as invariably they opt to ignore the behaviour (to their shame).

Here in Waterford we are reaching crisis point and the good people who try to recruit young referees tell us that games will one day - and not too far away - grind to a halt if this does not stop. It is being preached over and over again that club officers have the remedy in their hands and until they begin controlling these unsporting people things will continue to get worse

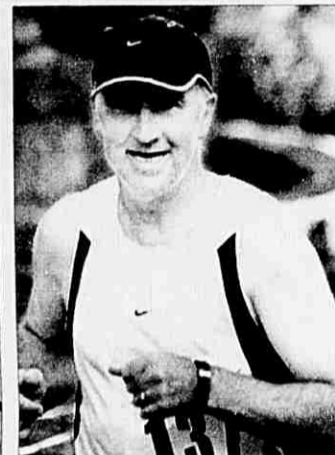

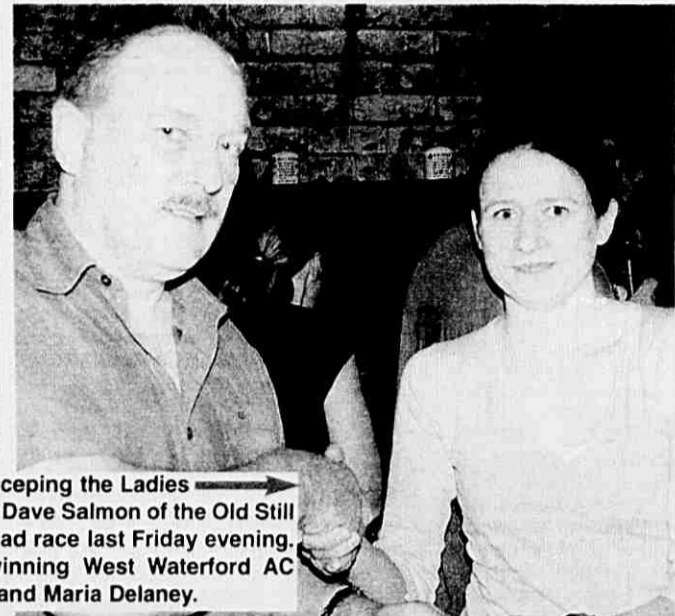
David McCarthy Competes In Germany

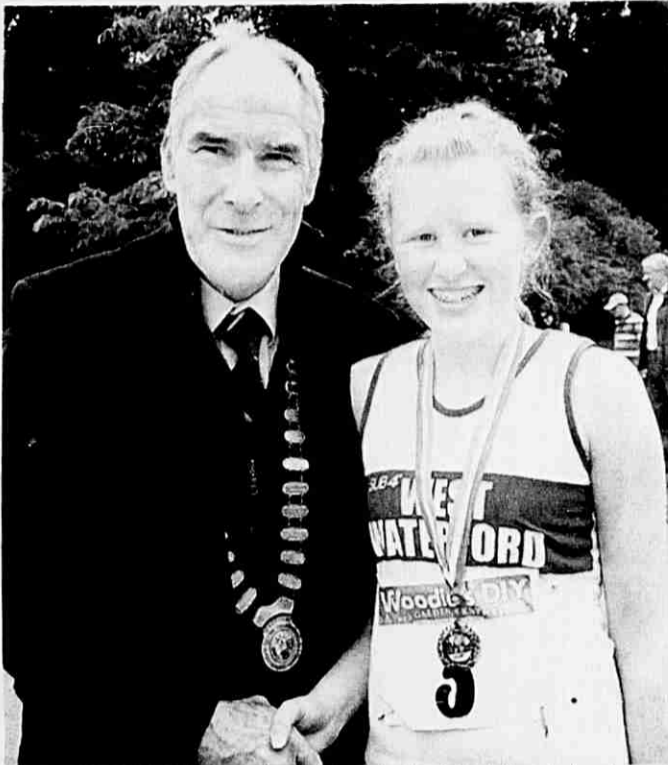

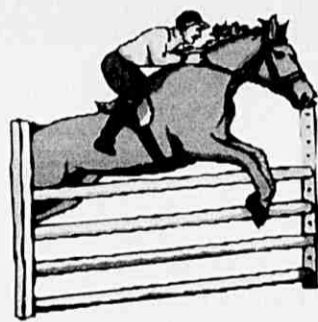

Safety and imagination are two elemental components in the design and construction of rafts which are being assembled behind locked doors all over west Waterford in preparation for the RNLI Inaugural Daft Raft Race scheduled for Sunday July 8th at 12 noon in Davitt's Quay Dungarvan.

"This event promises to be fun filled and hilarious, while at the same time" says Christopher Kelly, Hon Chairman of the Dungarvan Fundraising Branch of the Helvick Lifeboat, "safety is paramount. Rafts will be disqualified if safety is in any doubt whatsoever. But" he adds with a smile "acts of piracy are to be encouraged!"

Rafts, maximum size 2.m x 3.5m, may be constructed from renewable and recycled materials, but fibreglass and pre-formed structures are not allowed.

Never was there such preparation.....Hackett from Dungarvan led the sack of Baltimore, but weapons for the Daft Raft Race are limited to de-shelled eggs, rotten tomatoes, flour, water and balloons. And each raft must have an equal compliment of female crew, minimum age 16. Buoyancy jackets or automatic life jackets must be worn.

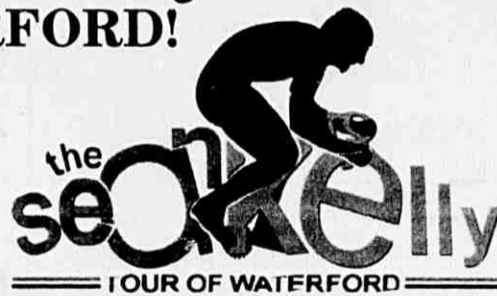
The Sean Kelly Tour COME ON WATERFORD!
