Kyne Elected Mayor Of County Waterford

LABOUR CLLR. ELECTED FIRST CITIZEN FOR 4TH TIME

Popular Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, was elected Mayor of County Waterford at Waterford County Council's AGM yesterday (Tuesday) afternoon last.

Cllr. Kyne, son of the late Labour TD for the constituency, Tom Kyne, is one of the most experienced councillors on the local authority.

He was first elected to Dungarvan Town Council in 1979, and was co-opted to Waterford County Council two years later. He has served on both councils ever since.

Over the last twenty years in local Government, he has served as Chairman on three occasions.

UNOPPOSED

He was elected unopposed, something which may have come as a surprise, given that Fianna Fail contested the last two Mayoral elections.

Thanking his proposer, Labour councillor, Ger Barron, and seonder Fine Gael councillor, Paudie Coffey, Cllr. Kyne said it was a particular honour to be elected unopposed.

He committed to work as a team with the elected representatives and the officials, and listed several projects which he hoped would be advanced during his term as first citizen of the county.

PROJECTS

One of those was the seven villages sewerage scheme, which has been mired in red tape for several years. Cllr. Kyne said this wasn't the fault of the council, but due to the difficulties in dealing with the Department of the Environment.

In advancing this, he went on to say, Minister Martin Cullen has, "a massive role to play" in bringing this "frustrating" process to a close as does the new Minister for the Environment, John Gormley.

The second issue he wished to see advanced was addressing West Waterford's water problems.

New Study To Establish Potential For New Sports Facilities

An international firm of consultants, Strategic Leisure Ltd, who are involved in putting infrastructure in place for a number of major sporting events like the Vancouver Winter Olympics and the African Cup in Ghana, have been commissioned to conduct a feasibility study for any future sports development in Dungarvan.

At Dungarvan Town Council's meeting on Monday evening last, a spokesperson for Strategic Leisure said the study links directly into the Town Council's Development Plan and also into the continuing emphasis being placed on sport and recreation by Waterford Sports Partnership.

STUDY

The first element of the study will look at the current supply and use of existing facilities together with an assessment of the need for any additional sports facilities in

Dungarvan.

A comprehensive consultation process is planned to ensure that the Town Council understands local needs.

It will largely take place after the summer break to ensure that schools and clubs can have their say. However, a series of focus groups and a number of meetings will take place in the interim.

OPPORTUNITY

"This is the opportunity for people to ensure that their views are included in the process," the spokesperson said.

The study will provide Dungarvan Town Council with a clear understanding of the sports and leisure requirements of the town.

"This is an important study as it will make sure that we understand what is needed to improve quality of life for residents of Dungarvan," Town Manager, Denis McCarthy said.

RECOMMENDATIONS

"We are keen to make sure that the outcomes are realistic and that we can implement the recommendations over time."

The idea for the study began twelve months ago when the West Waterford Athletic Club approached the council. The club which has 250 members is currently without a base. A tender to carry out a feasibility study was advertised in March, and Strategic Leisure was chosen out of eight submissions.

The company has already viewed a number of current sporting facilities in the town.

WELCOME

The study was welcomed by Sinn Fein councillor Brendan Mansfield, who said the town doesn't compare favourably in terms of facilities with towns of similar size.

He said a running track is one of those facilities needed and said: "A local man, John Treacy, head of the Sports Council, is in a position to provide funding."

And he hoped the study would be inclusive of all clubs.

He said: "There's not even a proper gymnasium in the town, and Dungarvan Hockey club is also without a home."

Replacement Pumps on Order For Park Lane

 Labour councillor Billy Kyne has been informed by the Sanitary Services Section of Waterford County Council that replacement pumps are on order for the Park Lane sewage pumphouse.

Due to a malfunction, raw sewage has been pumped out at the popular White Strand, where hundreds gather to bathe every summer, causing serious health and safety concerns.

A contract is understood to have been signed with a company to replace equipment in the sub-merged pumphouse at a cost of €50,000.

"There is delivery date of six weeks for this critical equipment," Cllr. Kyne said. "Work will then begin by an outside contractor to install the equipment."

While he expressed some satisfaction at getting this information he has raised some concern that a date has not been confirmed by the Sanitary Services division at this stage. But he will continue to liaise directly with the senior executive engineer to get the project completed.

"As the present situation resulting from difficulties at Park Lane pumping station is totally unsatisfactory and members of the public in the area have to put up with conditions that at just not acceptable in this day and age I believe that when remedial work like this has to be done we have to focus on a completion date which is what the public expect and deserve."

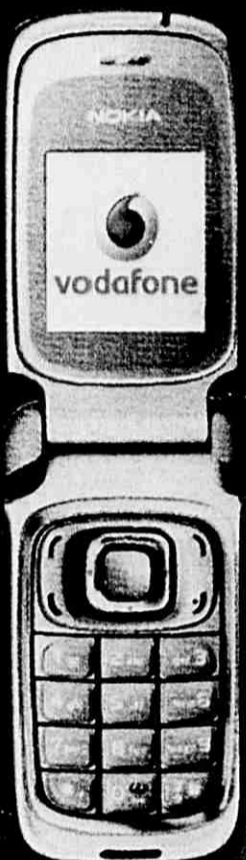

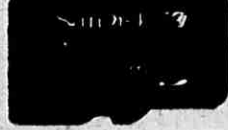

Fabulous Fats

Everyone knows that too much fat is bad for you. A diet which is too high in fat can lead to obesity, heart disease and a variety of other problems. However, the good news is that not all fats are bad, and some are actually an essential part of a healthy diet. Essential fatty acids (EFAs) cannot be made by the body and must therefore be present in the diet. They are an important component of body cells, and are vital for a whole range of physiological functions, such as repairing or replacing damaged cells, producing hormones, and controlling inflammatory responses in the body. This has a very beneficial effect on the heart and circulation, the brain and nervous system, and the skin, hair and nails in particular.

A diet which is rich in essential fatty acids can help to prevent and treat cardiovascular problems such as raised blood pressure, heart disease and stroke, neurological problems such as ADHD, depression and dementia, and skin problems such as dryness, eczema and acne.

Essential fatty acids fall into a number of different groups, and those which have received most attention in recent times are the omega-3 and omega-6 fatty acids. These two groups have different functions in the body and it is very important to maintain a healthy balance of both types.

Omega-3 EFAs are present in fish oils and linseed or flax oil. Omega-3 EFAs tend to reduce the body's inflammatory response which is very useful for preventing and treating conditions such as inflammatory bowel disease, psoriasis and arthritis. In countries such as Greenland where people eat large amounts of fish, there is a very low incidence of arthritis. Unfortunately the consumption of oily fish in this part of the world is now very low, and this has contributed to the large increase in people suffering from chronic inflammatory diseases.

Omega-6 EFAs are found in most other vegetable oils, particularly sunflower oil, and they tend to increase inflammation. This may seem like a negative effect, but it is actually an essential part of healthy physiological function. A healthy and appropriate inflammatory response to infection or injury helps to kill any invading organisms and prevent any further damage to the tissues of the body.

Nowadays however, sunflower oil is one of the most widely used oils in cooking and it is also found in most packaged foods. Many people have also stopped using butter in favour of sunflower spreads, causing an excess of omega-6 fats in the diet. Together with the decreased intake of fish, this has contributed to the huge incidence of inflammatory diseases.

In order to redress the balance it is important to eat at least three portions of oily fish per week, such as mackerel, salmon, tuna, sardines, and trout. If this is too difficult, a fish oil supplement may provide an easier way of increasing your levels of omega-3 EFAs. However, avoid taking cod liver oil if you are pregnant, diabetic, or taking blood thinning medication such as warfarin, unless it is on the advice of a qualified health professional.

For vegetarians, linseeds are an equally good source of these essential fats. Udo's oil is an essential fatty acid supplement which is made entirely from seed oils and tastes a lot better than fish oil! It can be poured over vegetables or used to make salad dressings. Try to avoid using too much sunflower oil and opt for a neutral variety such as olive oil which also has its own health benefits.

Waterford Schools Go Green For Nationwide Experiment

Ten Waterford primary schools took part in Greenwave - a mass experiment open to primary schools across the country. Students were encouraged to send in sightings of when certain species of trees began to bud and when swallows began to appear, as these are indicators of the arrival of Spring in Ireland. In total, 1172 sightings were submitted from schools across the country. The sightings submitted by primary schools in Waterford and across the country can be viewed on

The ten schools from Waterford that participated were - Ballymacarbery N.S.; St. John of God, Passage Road; Scoil Náisiunta na Rinne, Rinn Ua gCuanach; Rathgormack N.S., Carrick-on-Suir; Portlaw N.S., Portlaw; Scoil Mhuire, Abbeyside; Whitechurch N.S., Cappagh; Kilrossanty N.S., Kilrossanty; Knockanore N.S., Tallow; Glór na Mora N.S., Convent Hill.

Knockanore National School, Tallow, won a prize for the best photograph of an ash tree as selected by Eanna Ni Lamhna, President of An Taisce. The photo was taken on 4th May. Eanna said that the photo from Knockanore NS shows the clearly identifiable black buds of the ash bursting into green leaf. "The plated bright green leaves can just be seen emerging from the two terminal buds - showing that these break before the side buds."

Commenting on the project, Peter Brabazon, Programme Director at Discover Science & Engineering, said, "We are delighted with the interest shown by Waterford primary schools in the Greenwave project. The project helps them learn about observing and recording wildlife in a subtle way, as well as picking up on the topical subject of climate change. Its aim is to encourage children to learn more about how their world works and

foster an interest in the applications of science and technology to their own lives."

Eanna Ni Lamhna offered her insight on the project, "This was a very successful experiment this year. Between the start of February and the end of May 1172 records were received from all over the country. Primroses came out first on warm south facing banks regardless of where in the country these occurred. Swallows came in ones and twos at first, but the main body came in mid April and spread directly north from the south coast."

"The green wave was most noticeable in horse chestnut and hawthorn. It took three to three and a half weeks to spread all over Ireland. It began on the south east, spread along the south and east coasts up through the centre of the country along the west and north coast and finally reached the northern inland

counties three and a half weeks later," Ni Lamhna added.

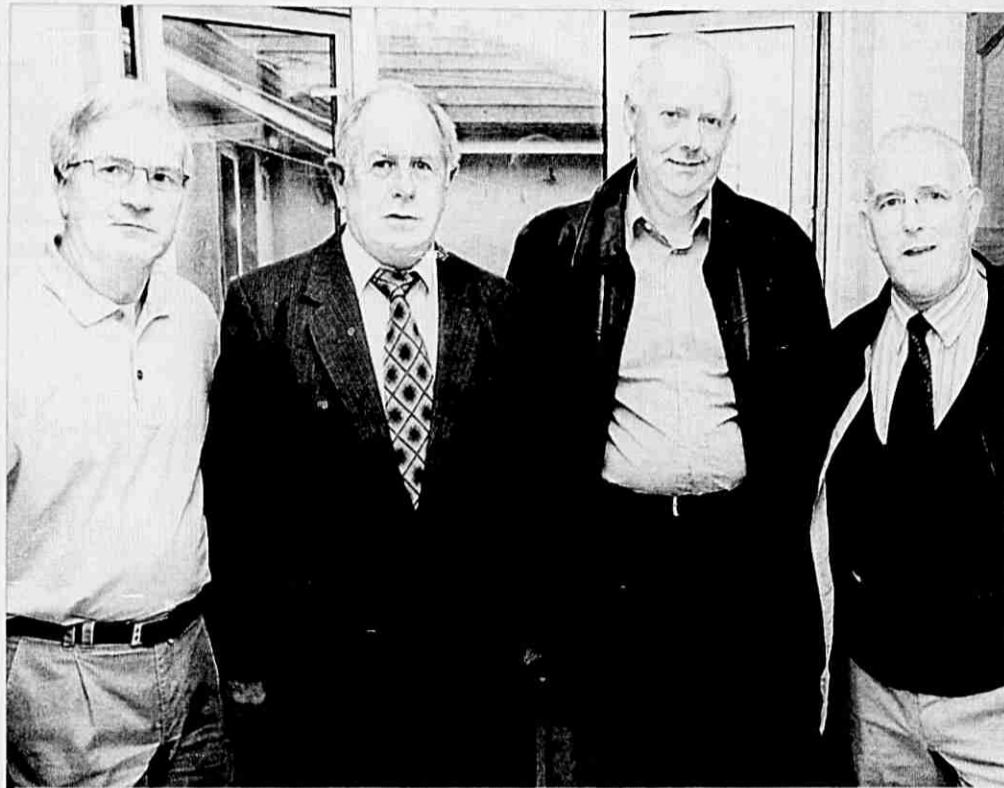
Commenting on the results, Gerald Fleming, RTE weather broadcaster, said, "It has been an unusual spring season with all that fine, sunny weather from the last week in March, through almost all of April, followed by a cool and wet month of May. For this reason the response of the natural world has probably not been typical - looking at the map of the sightings, you can see how some of the earliest were in parts of the Midlands, and even around Sligo, when we might have expected them to be in the southwest."

Council May Regret Disposing Of Abbeyside Landbank - O Ceilleachair

A member of Dungarvan Town Council has warned that the local authority will come to regret having purchased but then moved to dispose of 12 acres of land at the Clonea Rd., Abbeyside.

Labour's Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair was speaking in response to a report presented to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, regarding progress on agreeing Social and Affordable housing allocations with developers under "Part 5 procedures".

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair warned that a local authority dependent on the private sector to meet such housing needs in the community was a "precarious business".

CLONEA ROAD

He pointed out that the 12 acres at the Clonea Road would have delivered up to 150 Social or Affordable housing options in separate phases for the people of the town, rather than what might be a sixth or less of that total by arrangement with the new private owners.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair also made reference to predictions by respected economists, such as Davy Stockbrokers, who were presenting evidence of a slowdown in private housing scheme starts and completions.

IMPLICATIONS

This, said Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, could have significant implications for a Town Council

like Dungarvan's - who had disposed of a landbank and linked its housing strategy to the Part 5 arrangements with such private developers.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair added that if these economic forecasts were correct, then the rising purchase price of private houses could have a negative effect on the policy of Dungarvan Town Council in acquiring houses for sale in private estates for use in their housing stock.

NOT YET SOLD

Given that the land at the Clonea Rd holding has not yet been sold, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said it could not be argued that money saved or accruing to the local authority from it was being

diverted elsewhere, however usefully.

In any event, he argued, the local authority had to balance its own books as regards the cost of having purchased the land in the first place.

Without reliving the debate which led to the majority of Council members voting over a year ago to dispose of the Abbeyside holding, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said it may yet prove extraordinary that such was done in a town where up to 1 in 12 inhabitants are currently looking to the Council to house them - a total exclusive of those attracted through necessity or otherwise to Affordable Housing Scheme options

VIEWPOINT

BURGERY DEVELOPMENT - URBAN SPRAWL OR EXCITING DEVELOPMENT?

The multi-million euro mixed use development at the Burgery is an interesting, if controversial plan, that has the ability to radically transform the landscape into the town, and provide a real alternative for the boundary area, from a strictly suburban to a retail, residential and commercial services setting.

There are some obvious problems with the plans, though. Mainly, the question must be, do the planners wish to have this type and scale of development on the edge of the town boundary.

It seems, from the way that the material contravention has been pushed by the executive, that they are certainly not against it, and the expectation is, if the material contravention is passed, the development would be granted permission.

It's likely that there would be at least some opposition from local residents, and the aspirational approach of the developers, whereby site development works are all that would take place at first before permission is sought for individual facilities like the hotel, and car showroom means that it's hard to know exactly how much of the plan currently on file will eventually be built.

Viewpoint understands that the hotel would be built, and then the occupant would be found. Hotel chains rarely build hotels themselves anymore, and various major chains would be canvassed to take over the hotel.

It's unlikely that any of the facilities, once built, would prove to be white elephants, unless something dramatic happens to the economy in the meantime, and a development of this nature at the Burgery would provide literally hundreds of jobs to the local economy, helping to maintain the construction, retail and services boom that has been experienced in the last decade.

There are other question marks though. Will the development provide an impetus to other developments outside the town boundary, and could this in turn result in the type of urban sprawl experienced in other towns?

This, as Viewpoint sees it, is a real danger.

At the moment good and diligent planning has largely prevented this from happening - a coherent retail planning strategy has been implemented, allowing only retail developments in the town centre. The shopping centre has strengthened the core of the town including Grattan Square and the surrounding shopping streets, which in turn means better traffic management plans and other strategies can be formed to handle the flow of people. The refurbishment of Grattan Square will only continue to strengthen the centre of town.

What a shame then, if what has been achieved by Dungarvan Town Council would be lost by Waterford County Council. If they take their eye off the ball, and allow large retail and service developments to take place outside the town boundary, without question, the area to suffer will be the town centre. Traffic must also be a question for this and other developments in the area. The development would be off the N25, and that in itself could pose problems, with traffic turning off a busy and dangerous national primary road.

All those issues are for the planners though. As yet the development is at an aspirational stage, and without doubt the plans have potential to transform the area for the better. What mustn't be done however, is weaken the strategy for the centre of the town, which in Viewpoint's opinion is the way forward. Urban sprawl is never the answer.

HEDGEROWS A MATTER OF SAFETY

Whatever the argument about birdlife nesting in our hedgerows at this time of the year, the fact of the matter is, the sightlines on our county roads have become ridiculously tight and dangerous.

This is especially so given the weather this summer, when rain and humidity has combined to make the hedges grow outwards, in some cases closing the sightlines altogether, and making already tight and twisting roads almost perilous.

It would be interesting to see a study conducted on the percentage of accidents that occur on county roads at this time of the year, because with more pedestrians walking the roads in what are dangerously tight roads the chances of accidents occurring are surely greater.

The issue was brought to light at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council, but despite assurances that dangerous junctions would be cut, on many roads nothing has been done, leaving signposts, many recently put up to indicate kilometres, close to overgrown. Yes, protecting bird welfare is important - hedgerows are after all the primary habitat in the Irish countryside. But where action can be taken, and it can be taken where public safety is endangered like at junctions, this should be done in a speedy manner to protect the welfare of motorists.

22-Year-Old Remanded In Custody Following Alleged Stand Off

A 22-year-old man was remanded in custody to appear at Dungarvan District Court following an alleged stand-off with Gardai at an Abbesside estate.

Barry Farrell, with an address in Nass, was alleged to have held Teresa Duggan, also from Nass, under duress in a house in the Cluanagreine area of the town for several hours of Saturday night/Sunday morning last.

The alleged incident started at about 11am on Saturday night.

The scene was heavily sealed off by Gardai and Garda negotiators spoke with the man during the hours which followed.

Gardai said Mr. Farrell gave himself up at about 8am on Sunday morning.

Mr. Farrell was said to be known to the woman. She was in a distressed state after the incident.

Mr. Farrell, who is known to Gardai, was taken to Dungarvan Garda station, where he was held under Section 4 of the Criminal Justice Act.

He appeared before Dungarvan District Court at Monday's sittings, where proceedings were adjourned to today (Wednesday).

He will face one charge of false imprisonment and two charges of threatening to kill.

WATER SCHEME

He called for water to be drawn from the Blackwater, to bring an end to a situation where there were hundreds of small schemes in one area.

In the 1980's, he added, Waterford County Council took the decision to source its East Waterford supply in Kilmeaden and because of their "forethought" Waterford City and Dunmore East as well as Kilmeaden itself are supplied.

He called for a similar scheme to be "fast-tracked" in a short period of time for the West of the county, using the Blackwater.

WELCOME

His election was universally welcomed across party lines.

Labour councillor Ger Barron, described Cllr. Kyne as a "very able councillor," a "sharp wit" who can "get to the heart of the matter" and is unparalleled in his "understanding of Local Government procedures."

Fine Gael councillor, Paudie Coffey concurred, saying Cllr. Kyne is a man of "experience and integrity" and a councillor who knows Local Government "inside out."

Traveller Convoy Returns To Estuary Heights

A traveller convoy attempted to push large stone boulders out of the way in order to encamp on the footpath near a council housing estate in Dungarvan.

The convoy of five or six caravans were parked close to Estuary Heights housing estate in Shandon, Dungarvan on Monday last, prompting renewed fears among residents and anger among members of Dungarvan Town Council.

It's not expected that the Dublin firm, contracted by Dungarvan Town Council, to move illegal convoys on, will be in the town until the end of the week.

It comes as the Town Council's June meeting heard that travellers were encamped in five areas of the town, and that many of the chalets in Shandon Halting Site have had to be boarded up.

Fianna Fail councillor, Anne Marie Rossiter said the situation was extremely annoying for people living in adjoining houses.

Among the areas highlighted

where travellers have camped were near the Spring roundabout, the Mart, and near the Glaxosmithkline OTC plant, many of which have been in place for a long number of months.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said when council officials attempted to talk with the travellers at Estuary Heights they found no adults in place, while Labour councillor Billy Kyne questioned whether the council has ever issued summons' on any of the convoys.

Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan, meanwhile, feared Dungarvan would be seen as a "soft touch" to illegal convoys. Several caravan's were in place close to Estuary Heights a couple of years ago, when residents complained of ongoing intimidation and other criminal behaviour by one particular group.

Waste Charges The "Elephant in The Room" —Says Labour Cllr.

The existence of Waste Charges has been described as "the Elephant in the Room" when discussions take place about litter, illegal dumping or the financing of Local Government services.

Speaking at Dungarvan Town Council June meeting, Labour Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair said Dungarvan Town Council has an annual budget of €6.5 million to deliver essential services – a figure dwarfed by the sum taken by the Government in income tax from the town each year.

"It's unfortunate, therefore, that we are left to quibble over an eighth or so of our Estimates as it relates to service charges for rubbish collection."

He said just 10 years ago, Dungarvan UDC was able to operate within budget and deliver services without having a 2nd or 3rd charge on householders for collecting waste.

CHALLENGE

"There is a challenge now for the newly appointed Minister for Environment & Local Government (the Green Party's John Gormley) to sort out Local Authority financing.

"Firstly, he should amend the relevant legislation to reform the existence and varied implementation of methods pertaining to such service charges. Then, he should remove the power from County and City Managers to go over the heads of elected Councillors in applying such fees."

PLAY THEIR PART

"Every citizen must play their part in achieving a clean and green Dungarvan," he said. "There are bigger polluters in the world rather than the ordinary householder to go after in terms of cleaning up our environment. I'd be for rewarding householders in regards to recycling and keeping their environment clean.

"Illegal dumping is a despicable practice, wherever it occurs. I think it would be useful for IBAL or some other such source, however, to conduct a survey comparing the situation in that respect to what applied 10 years ago – at a time when Dungarvan Town Council did not apply charges for collecting rubbish.

"What odds that the findings would point to the situation having worsened since the introduction and ongoing increases to collection and service charges relating to collection of rubbish and recyclables from households in this and other towns?"

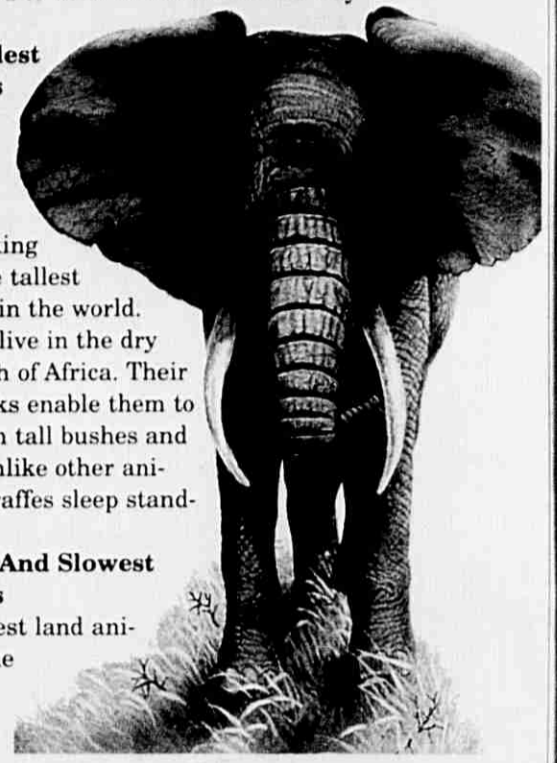

THE ANIMAL KINGDOM

The animal kingdom contains over a million species - ranging in size from microscopic organisms right up to the massive blue whale. Animals can be classified into vertebrates (those with a spine) and invertebrates (those without). There are five main classes of vertebrates - there are the fishes, then come the amphibians, reptiles, birds and the more advanced mammals, which include humans. Animals are found all over the world. They have had to adapt to local conditions and food supplies, so creatures in the same family often have special characteristics suited to their environment and way of life.

The Tallest Animals

Giraffes can be from 5m (16.5ft) tall, making them the tallest animals in the world. Giraffes live in the dry savannah of Africa. Their long necks enable them to feed from tall bushes and trees. Unlike other animals, giraffes sleep standing up.



Fastest And Slowest Animals

The fastest land animal is the cheetah which can run at 101kph (63mph) for short level distances of up to 500m (1640ft). Over a longer distance the pronghorn antelope, on the plains of Mexico and North America, can really travel - it can keep up a speed of 56kph (35mph) over a distance of 6km (4mi). At the other end of the speed scale is the three toed sloth, which takes a whole minute to cover 2m (6.5ft). That is actually slower than an ordinary snail! There are five species of sloth, all of which live in the rainforests of South and Central America. They live in trees and spend much of their time hanging upside down doing absolutely nothing. They can even sleep upside down.

The Largest Land Animal

The largest animal in the world is the blue whale. But the largest land animal is the African bush elephant. This huge beast averages 3m (10ft) in height at the shoulder and weighs 5 tonnes. Compare that with Savi's white-toothed pygmy shrew which weighs a mere 2g (1/10oz)!

The Arts Centre is open Tuesday to Saturday 10am to 5pm. Admission is free and all are welcome.

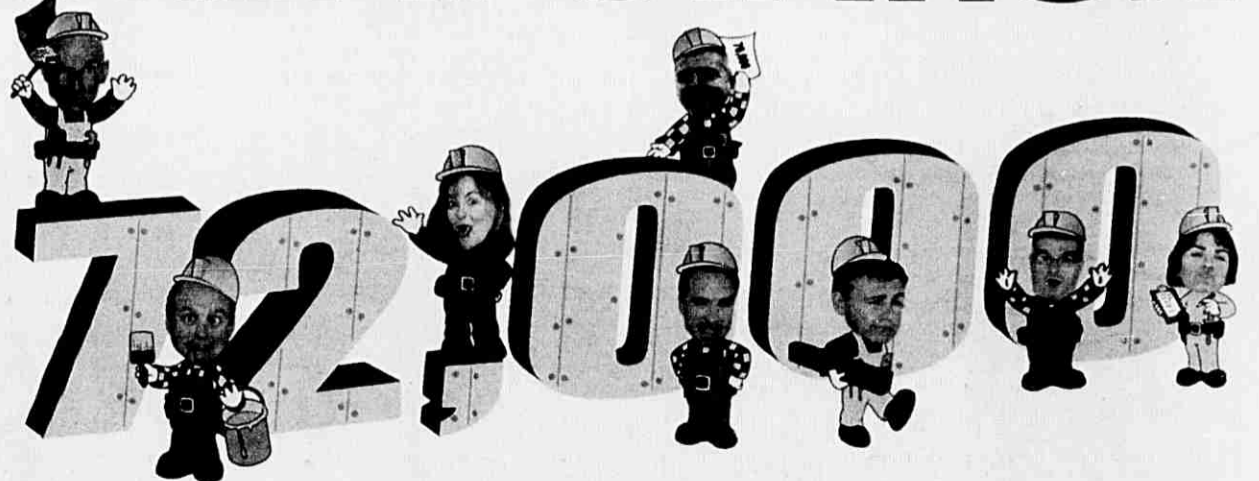
Kilmac' Playground To Open Soon

Michael was blessed with many gifts and talents, he loved to take part in the plays in the Old School in Modeligo, he was an avid reader, who enjoyed reading history which gave him many hours of pleasure. He was a wonderful conversationalist and listener and hence gleaned many insights into life in Modeligo before his era. He possessed a fantastic memory and could recall events, incidents and especially family roots, back for generations.

He had an expert insight into family genealogy and anybody wishing to know their family tree called on Michael for his counsel and his mine of data which he had built up over the years. A man who had a wonderful imagination, his creative stories entertained the many children that always seemed to hang on every word. He loved being in their company laughing and relishing the fun just as much as the children.

He loved the land and nature, treated it with respect, often walking the land after a days work for pure enjoyment. Michael spent many happy years farming alongside his lifelong friend Mikie Power while his family was growing up. Changes from candles to electricity didn't pose any problems for him as he was always open to new ideas and developments and prepared to give change a chance. 'Give it a go' was one of his old saying.

In 1999 he was asked to shoulder the heavy cross of bereavement with the passing of the love of his life Mary Jo (nee Walsh). Life really was never the

same for him.

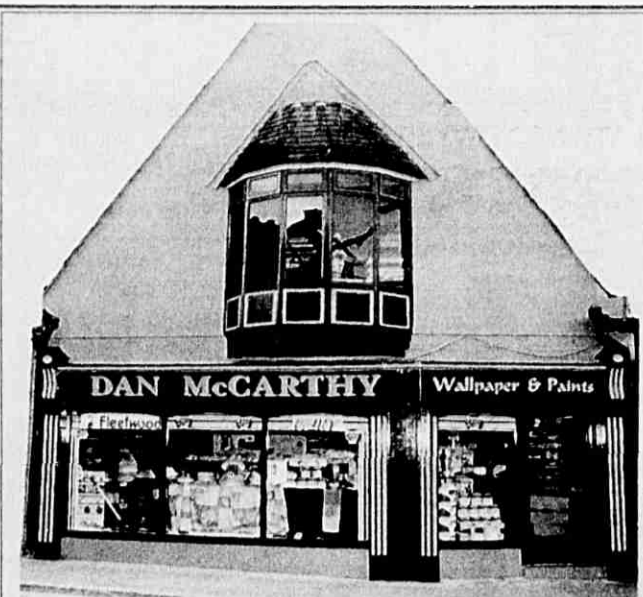

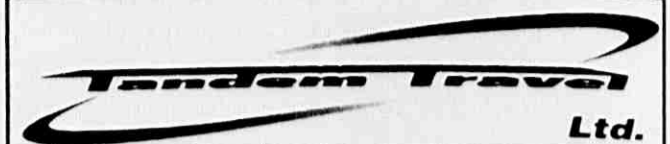

Kinsalebeg N.S. Raises Their First Green Flag

Wednesday June 20th 2007 saw our school year's hard work by staff and pupils of Kinsalebeg NS culminate in the raising of our First Green Flag. In attendance at our Open day were parents and invited local community members, Ms Anne Murphy from the Environmental Section of Dungarvan County Council, local councillor Mr. Pat Nugent and local Waterford hurler Stephen Molumphy, to join in the celebration of this historic event for our school.

We commenced our proceedings with Miss Fleming, Kinsalebeg's Green Schools co-ordinator who explained what was done to achieve green flag status. She was assisted by the 6th class pupils who gave a synopsis of the work carried out at the different stages throughout the year. We were then entertained by one representative from each class who recited their own acoustic poem compositions. The pupils then accompanied by their class mates on various musical instruments regaled the visitors with songs depicting recycling and enthusiastically sang Kinsalebeg's Green School anthem.

Last September, we started our Green Schools campaign. Our first task was to form a committee which comprised of students from fifth and sixth class plus class representatives from classes from fourth down to first class. (We also allowed the teachers participate). Since then the Green Schools Committee of Kinsalebeg NS has been working very hard to achieve Green Flag status. We have made a huge effort to cut out litter and reduce waste in the day to day running of the school. Everyone in the school, from junior infants to sixth class and all teachers, Mrs Mullins, Miss Fleming, Miss Morey and Miss Griffin have striven to make our school a cleaner and greener place. It has been a long, but interesting and enjoyable experience.

Our first task as a committee was to decide on a Green School's "motto" for our campaign. For this we had a competition to select our Green School's Motto. Kate O' Halloran from 2nd composed the winning motto 'Be free from litter, Let's be cool, That's what makes us a Green School'. We next organised a litter warden rota. We made a rule

that no one could bring food or drink outside in the yard. This cut down on our litter greatly.

We decided to have our Day of Action on October 12th, 2006. This coincided with National Tree Day. To celebrate this we planted a mountain ash tree in front of the school, as 2006 was the Year of the Ash. We planted daffodil and snowdrop bulbs in pots.

In November, we bought a shredder for the school and began to shred paper. This was used for animal bedding. We made an effort to keep doors closed and lights off when not needed to cut down on electricity and heating bills. A composter was donated to the school.

In December, we encouraged children to bring in reusable drinks bottles and to use lunch boxes to cut down on waste from lunch packaging.

In January, we decided to compile a Green Schools Newsletter to inform our parents and the wider school community of our efforts to get a Green Flag and to encourage them to help us.

Finally in February, we sent off our application form which had been compiled by Miss Fleming and the Green Schools committee together with photos of our hard work during the year and a copy of the Green Schools Newsletter to the Green Schools Programme.

In March, we received a letter back from Green Schools to inform us they had received our application and would be assessing us in due course. We had a Green Clean-Up Day on March 30th. We all wore green and brought gloves and bin bags to school. We did a huge spring clean of the schoolyard and the shed. We disposed of five bags of rubbish to our local dump.

We started planting our veg-

etable patch in April. We put in tomato and strawberry plants, lettuce, gourd and pumpkin seeds. We also planted sunflower seeds. In May we set bedding plants in front of the school. We continued to ensure our school was clean and green. We were visited by local Environmental officer Ms Anne Murphy who assessed our school for Green Flag status and who shortly afterwards informed us that we had attained this.

There was great excitement among the pupils in June when we received our Green Flag in a Green Schools Ceremony in the Lifetime Lab in Cork. It has been a hard year's work but it is all worth it now that we have received our Green Flag. Working towards Green Schools has developed lifelong skills in every

child in the school including team building, working together and developing an appreciation and respect for the environment that surrounds them. Working towards Green Schools has come into various aspects of our school curriculum. From turning off a light when not needed, planting bulbs for science, writing poems for english, drawing Green pictures for art and singing environmental songs to understanding the importance of recycling, Green Schools has taught everyone many valuable lifelong lessons.

At our flag raising ceremony we took the opportunity to thank Ms Anne Murphy who spoke to us about Green Schools in County Waterford for all her help and support since September in her phone calls and e-mails. We also

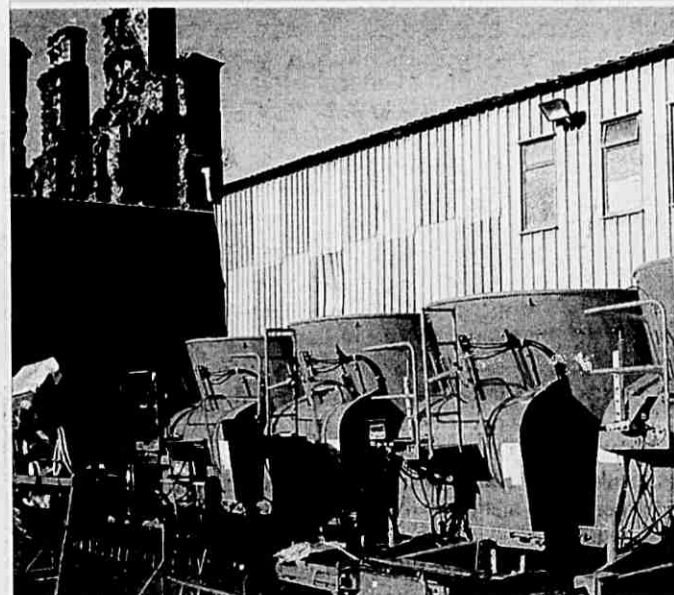

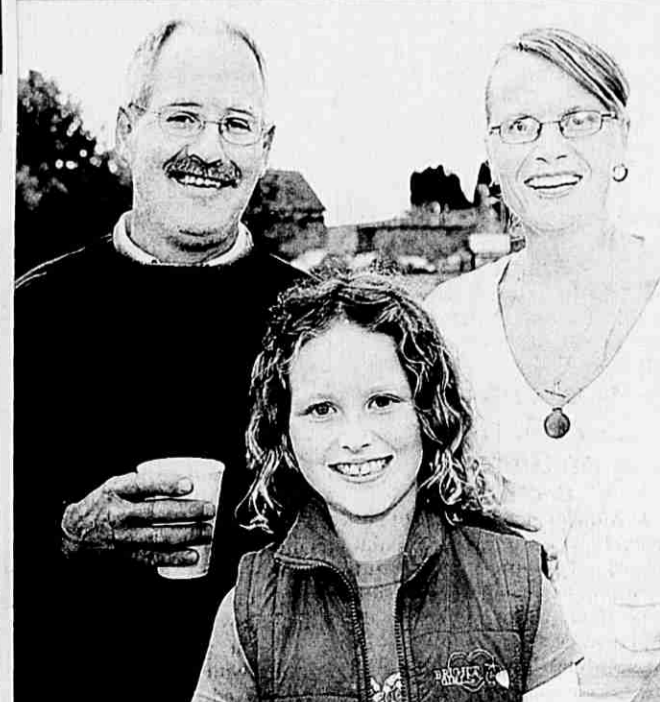

Dungarvan Leader - this week in the garden

A sweet taste of summer

STRAWBERRIES are one of the delights of the summer months - and if you want to be sure of a good supply, you should be planting now. Strawberry plants need to be placed 45-50cm apart with 75cm between each row. A sunny spot, sheltered from the harsher weath-

er, is best and the ground should have been prepared during the autumn with plenty of well-rotted manure or compost. At this stage you can protect your future fruit by using a fabric strip to cover the soil around the plants.

STRAWBERRIES: Choosing a variety

Planting a mixture of strawberries can ensure a good supply from June through to October from your garden

Here are some of the most popular varieties:

Calypso

Good for freezing, very high yielding, with the longest season available from June to October

Pegasus

Not recommended for freezing, crops from late June until the end of July. Excellent, sweet flavoured fruit

Lambada

Not recommended for freezing but exceptional flavour and high yield.

Crops from Mid June until late August

Eros

Good for freezing, crops from early June until the end of July, high yielding and a uniformly attractive shape. Fruits within 60 days of planting

Honeoye

Not good for freezing, fruits early June to July. Good crop of medium-sized fruit

A variety of materials are available from nurseries, generally made of polypropylene, allowing water and nutrients to pass through to the soil while preventing weeds, reducing water loss and keeping your strawberries clean and healthy.

Layers of straw do a similar job but, while cheaper, are not quite as effective.

Before the first fruit appear you should protect the plants from birds, using a plastic net.

Strawberries come in a range of varieties offering different shapes, sizes, tastes and cropping periods.

If you're planning on freezing the fruit, be careful which variety you choose to plant. Some are ideal for the deep freeze but others are best eaten fresh.

By carefully choosing a selection of varieties you can ensure a continuous crop from June through to October. You can extend the season further by growing in a greenhouse. Most nursery-supplied varieties will be high-yielding and resistant to disease.

Some - including the popular Calypso variety - have been developed to crop right through the summer season, from late June until the first frosts.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Sow perennials and biennials

Most perennials and biennials if sown out of doors now will make good sturdy plants for placing in their flowering position in the autumn. The most useful biennials are Canterbury bells and verbasiums. Among the easiest to raise from seed are aquilegias, lupins, oriental poppies, hollyhocks and delphiniums. But there are many other things that you can try if you can obtain the seeds.

Sow thinly in drills of 15 to 20cm apart and cover with 0.5 to 2.5cm of soil, according to the size of the seeds. Violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthes may also be sown outdoors, but it is preferable to choose a shady place for these.

Place Chrysanthemums in summer position
Chrysanthemums grown in pots will be better in the open from now.

It is a good idea to make a special standing ground for them in an out of the way place.

The soil should be well covered with gravel to give good drainage. The plants are then arranged in straight rows at least 75 cm apart, so you can move between them easily for watering and bud taking. Drive a stake into the ground at each end of each row, stretch a couple of wires between the pairs of stakes and attach each bamboo cane to the wires. This is the ideal method with exhibition chrysanthemums grown to a single stem. With decorative plants horizontal wires get in the way.

Thin out vegetable seedlings

Vegetable seedlings from April and May sowings will be in need of thinning out.

Chamber Want Switch On Of Christmas Lights Moved Forward

The Chamber of Commerce want the switch on of Christmas lights in the town to take place in tandem with the switch on of the lights in Dungarvan Shopping Centre.

The Chambers retail committee was in contact with Dungarvan Town Council, calling for the switch on to be moved from its traditional time of 8th of December to the 17th of November to synchronise with the shopping centre.

reasons.

"We will be the ones inviting them in to start their Christmas shopping on the 17th of November," he pointed out.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Damien Geoghegan also described the date as "way too early".

He questioned why the chamber's retail committee didn't contact the shopping centre themselves as the shopping centre was also a member.

However, Cllr. Anne Marie Rossiter, who is also the Chamber of Commerce President, was in favour of a compromise date of 24th of November. The traditional ceremonies could still take place on the 8th of December, but the switch on itself should be brought forward so all businesses could have a level playing field.

It was agreed to write to the Chamber of Commerce Retail committee and to the Shopping Centre to come up with an agreement.

club and people also like to drive down to the prom.

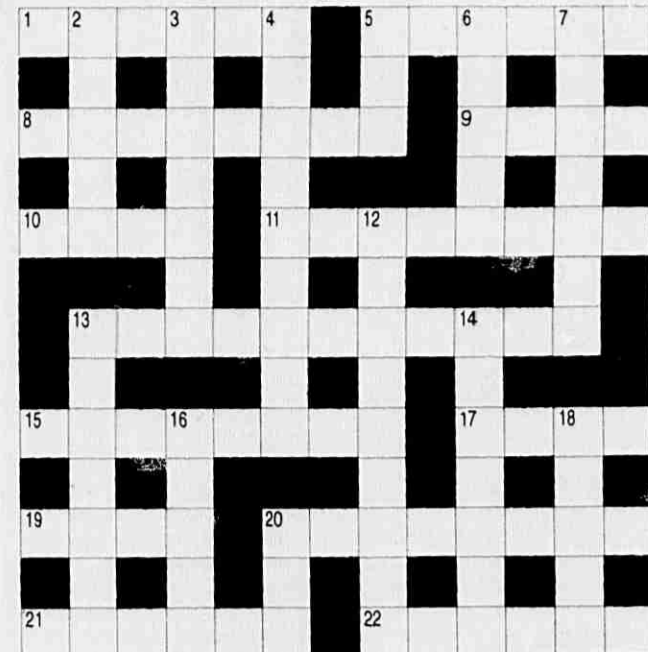
But, she said there is a lot of speeding occurring there, and something needs to be done.

Local History L Keating's Tan Yard, Poulnacurra

Taken from 'Desperate Haven' written by William Fraher, Willie Whelan, Bernadette Sheridan and Seosaimh O Loingsigh. This book may be bought in the Museum.

"On 21 February 1850 the Clerk was ordered to report on the tan yard and store attached to Keating's at Poulnacurra..... The Board leased it at a yearly rent of £40, with liberty to make all necessary alterations. The terms of the lease did not require the Board to put the premises in order as a tannery when surrendering the property.

9 April 1853 the Board of Guardians called an extraordinary meeting to take immediate steps to provide a suitable building for the accommodation of ophthalmia patients. Ophthalmia was prevalent throughout the town and its environs at this time. This epidemic resulted in a corresponding increase in the numbers infected within the Workhouse and its auxiliaries. It was, therefore, necessary for the Board to provide a building capable of housing the ophthalmia patients. These patients were thus isolated from the healthy inmates. The Board chose the tannery to fulfill this purpose. They ordered the Master to have the building cleared out and prepared for all the affected cases, and also to divide it into two wards; one for the male and one for the female patients. They also directed that the existing opening with Keating's auxiliary be closed up. They made a doorway as an entrance from the Shandon side of the building. Immediate reconstruction was necessary, as 17 new cases had occurred within the previous two days. The Medical Officer, John Coman, examined this building and approved of its conversion into an Ophthalmia hospital, stating that, 'it had a healthy situation being adjacent to green fields and good walking ground, which was necessary for the recovery of such patients.'

14 April 1853...255 patients in hospital on that day, 126 were cases of ophthalmia, and the remaining 129 were various cases under treatment at the main house infirmary. This did not include the 39 cases in the Fever hospital.

21 April 1853...numbers in hospital on that day were 223 and that the admissions that week was 58. Of that number 31 were cases of ophthalmia. In the ophthalmia wards on that day there were 104 patients. He assured the Board that ophthalmia was on the decline and assuming a milder type, and also that since he made a change in the dietary from white bread and milk to house diet, no other cases of 'imposition or artificial ophthalmia had occurred'.....

2 June 1853 The number of ophthalmia cases was not increasing, there being only 106 cases in hospital on this day. As the number of cases had decreased the remaining ophthalmia patients were removed to the main house. The hospital closed on 29 September 1853, at the same time as Keating's Auxiliary."

See Something? Say Something!

A new leaflet produced by the Environmental Enforcement Network, encourages the public to be the eyes and ears of the local environmental enforcement agencies and makes it easier for members of the public to make an environmental complaint. Denis McCarthy, Waterford County Council's Director of Services for Environment says "For Waterford County Council to make a difference, we rely on the public to tell us when and where dumping and fly-tipping is happening. The Council operates a freephone 'Litter Hotline' and I would urge the public to make full use of the facility. Each and every one of us has a responsibility towards our environment, dumping is not simply a local authority problem." The Council's freephone Litter Hotline is 1800 201501 and all complaints received are investigated. Complaints may also be submitted by e-mail to: environmentalcomplaints@waterfordco.ie.

The Environmental Enforcement Network is the coming together of a range of agencies involved in environmental protection. These include Local Authorities, the Environmental Protection Agency, the Fisheries Boards, the Health Service Executive, the Revenue Commissioners, the Gardaí and the National Bureau of Criminal Investigations.

The network recognised that members of the public were unsure which agency to contact on specific environmental issues and launched the leaflet to provide an outline of what steps to take when making a complaint. The leaflet explains how to make a complaint and

who to complain to, as well as including a directory of useful agency contacts.

Local authorities deal with most environmental issues such as water quality of lakes, rivers and estuaries; sewage treatment; land-spreading of industrial wastes, sewage and animal wastes; fly tipping of household waste; back yard burning of household waste; noise nuisance from commercial premises and emissions to air, water and land from industrial premises.

The EPA deals directly with large industries that require an

EPA licence. The EPA is also responsible for overseeing the statutory performance of local authorities. To this end if a local authority has investigated an issue and the problem persists, the EPA will then investigate the issue and resolve it where possible.

To coincide with the launch of the 'See Something? Say Something!' leaflet, Waterford County Council's litter vehicles have recently been given a very visible presence. The vans now sport the striking 'See Something? Say Something!'

logo and advertise the Council's freephone number. Says Mr. McCarthy, "Waterford County Council has had a number of successful prosecutions in recent times and we have adopted a 'zero tolerance' approach to environmental pollution. Our Environmental Inspectors are very active and, with the assistance of the public, we can and will make a difference."

Leaflets are widely available from Waterford County Council offices, County Libraries and Garda stations.

Sherry FitzGerald Reynolds Welcomes The Abolition Of Stamp Duty For First Time Buyers

Sherry FitzGerald Reynolds, Dungarvan & Lismore, has welcomed the abolition of stamp duty for first time buyers through the publication of Finance (Number 2) Bill 2007. The Bill, which has been approved by Cabinet, provides a stamp duty exemption for first-time buyers of a house or an apartment on all purchases on or after March 31st of this year.

Speaking about yesterday's announcement, David Reynolds, Managing Director Sherry FitzGerald Reynolds, said "This is undoubtedly good news for first time buyers in the second hand market. The existing rate of stamp duty applicable to first time buyers was acting as a barrier to entry for this cohort of the population into the established property market. Following the amendment announced in this Bill, a first time buyer purchasing an average second-hand property in Ireland will be saving just over €1,000.

David Reynolds went on to say "It is however disappointing news for the rest of the market as the penal rate of stamp duty and the inequitable banding systems have been retained."

Under the new legislation, a first-time buyer who executed a deed of transfer on a property on April 1 this year and presented it to Revenue on April 15 would qualify for a refund of any stamp duty paid, as the deed was executed after March 31.

Stamp duty rates for non-first-time buyers will start at 3 per cent on purchases above €27,000 and rise in a scale to 9 per cent on properties over €35,000.

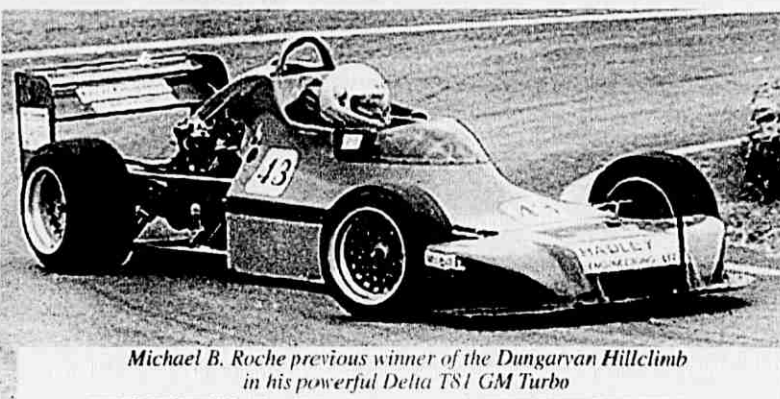

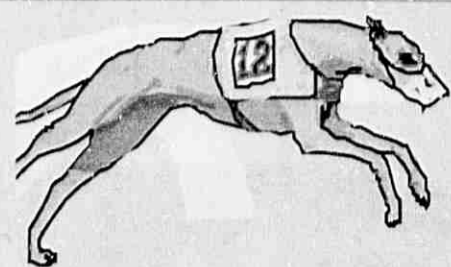

Discipline – And Look Who's Talking?

The matter of discipline (or indiscipline) continues to make the headlines as it did throughout the previous week in all branches of the media.

The fall-out from the burst up between the Cork and Clare players, the suspensions, the failure of the appeals and the adjudication by the Disputes Resolution Authority all were given more than generous coverage in many sections of the media.

Then came the infamous Gerald McCarthy outburst and his attack on the people who administer discipline in Croke Park and on the Association President Nicky Brennan in the immediate aftermath of the Waterford v Cork Munster semi-final.

I have no doubt but that this attack on the establishment was deliberately designed to shift the focus from the hurling match that had thrilled the 37,000 attendance and the viewing public of over 500,000 who watched the match on T.V. Throw in the Limerick/Tipperary replay on the evening before and the replay of the Dublin v Meath game in Croke Park and the other exciting intercounty contests and we had what can be claimed to have been the best weekend for the promotion of the G.A.A. in a very long time. Unfortunately the Cork team coach had to steal everyone's thunder in a ploy to excuse his team's defeat.

The seven players were suspended after thorough examination of the match video, but according to themselves and their two county boards they were innocent and were being wrongly charged and so the proposed suspensions were challenged and when the players given personal hearings and the suspensions confirmed, they appealed. The appeals were subsequently lost and were tested at the D.R.A. and were upheld. Justice was done in accordance with association rules and policy.

At a Central Council summit in Croke Park on Saturday it was revealed that the new disciplinary structures at central level are working very satisfactorily despite the comments of the uninformed critics in recent weeks.

It was revealed that since January last a total of 125 players were recommended for suspension for a variety of infractions and that a total of 110 accepted the punishment without requiring a hearing at the 'Hearing Committee' level. This is proof that the system is working. Of the fifteen who did not accept, four were found to have been wrongly accused and were not suspended. The remaining eleven were suspended.

The meeting of Saturday also decided that attention to the lack of discipline at county and divisional level is to be given high priority and to set this up, county officers will attend a provincial seminar.

Here in Waterford the major disciplinary problems are referee abuse and lack of sideline control and the respective boards have it within their power to deal with these issues.

SUNDAY GAME WASHED OUT

The Clashmore versus St. Saviours senior football championship tie being the only game listed for the Fraher field on Sunday, was looked forward to by supporters and neutrals alike, but a 75 minute cloudburst spoilt the fun for everyone by causing flooding on the surface of the pitch and made playing of the game impossible.

Both teams and quite a number of supporters were in the ground when referee Tim Byrne was left with no option but to call it off.

As no intercounty panellist is involved, it is likely that the game will be re-fixed for the coming weekend.

He was presented with the Waterford Crystal trophy, tracksuit, boots, etc and will represent the Deise in the Munster final in two weeks time.

The under 16 equivalent of the event was also run here and was won by John Dere of the Portlaw club. This competition is confined to the county and there is no provincial final. It is run for the first time this year.

Waterford To Play Limerick In Munster Hurling Final

The hurling saga which saw Limerick and Tipperary battle it out for their third time at Limerick Gaelic grounds on Sunday last, ended in a Limerick victory after 250 minutes of exciting fare that had captured national interest and probably overshadowed all other fixtures on the weekend list. Three full games and two extra time periods is something which we have not seen before and it went to show how little there was between these two hurling counties.

The result was of great interest to Waterford as not alone did it decide the opposition, but it also decided the venue which will be Semple Stadium on next Sunday week.

In the immediate aftermath of the game on Sunday evening, one wondered if Waterford will be good enough to beat this strong and tremendously fit Shannon side team who have survived three very tough contests in the run up to the final.

Waterford have enjoyed a week of euphoria following their win over Cork in the semi-final, but somehow our confidence seems to have suffered a bit after seeing what our opposition can do. On Sunday night I met supporters who are wondering if

we are good enough to cope with Limerick's great fighting qualities? Personally, having watched the game on Sunday, I must confess to not feeling as happy now as I did seven days previously. We are certainly facing a mighty challenge in this Munster final.

Waterford and Limerick have not met in a Munster senior hurling final since 1934. We had also met in the previous year's final and we lost both.

Our last meeting in the championship was at the semi-final stage in 2003 and here the game which was played at Semple Stadium ended in a draw at 4-13 each. The replay on the following weekend saw Waterford survive on a score of 1-12 to 0-13.

We are now scheduled to play Limerick in three hurling championship games over the next three weeks. On July 8th we meet in the senior final in Thurles and on the following Wednesday we will play them in the provincial under 21 semi-final in Limerick and on the following Wednesday, July 15th the counties will clash in the Munster intermediate hurling final which is also fixed for Thurles.

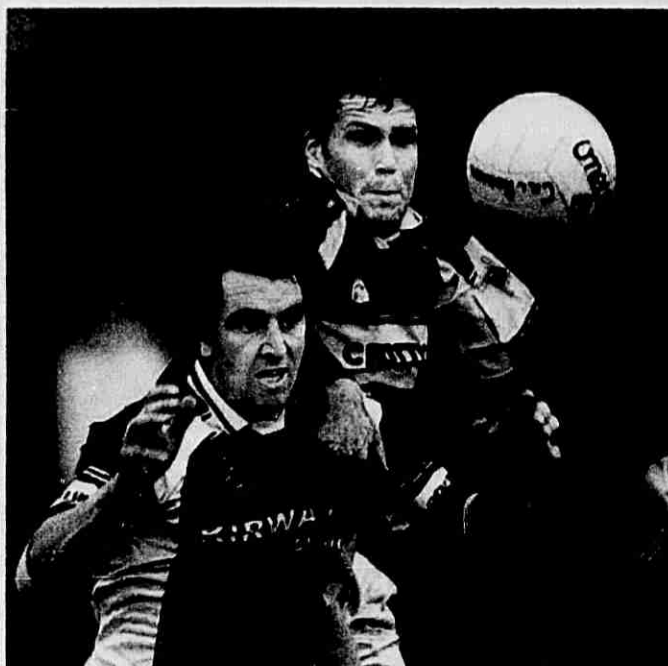

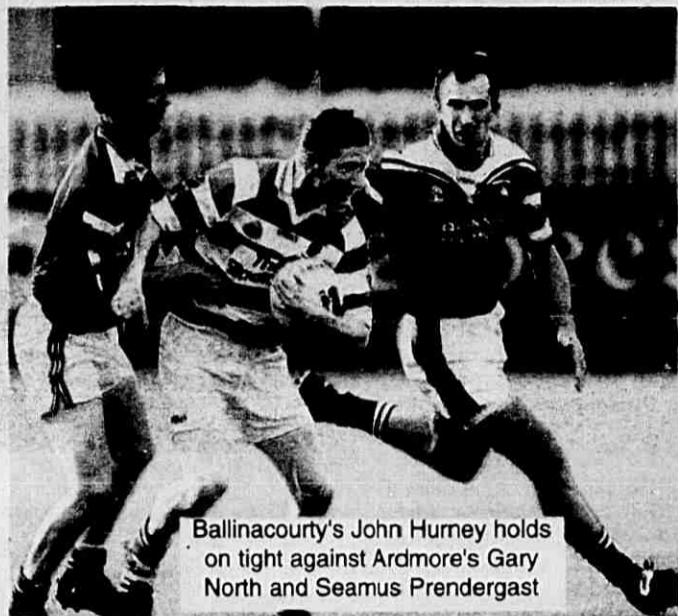

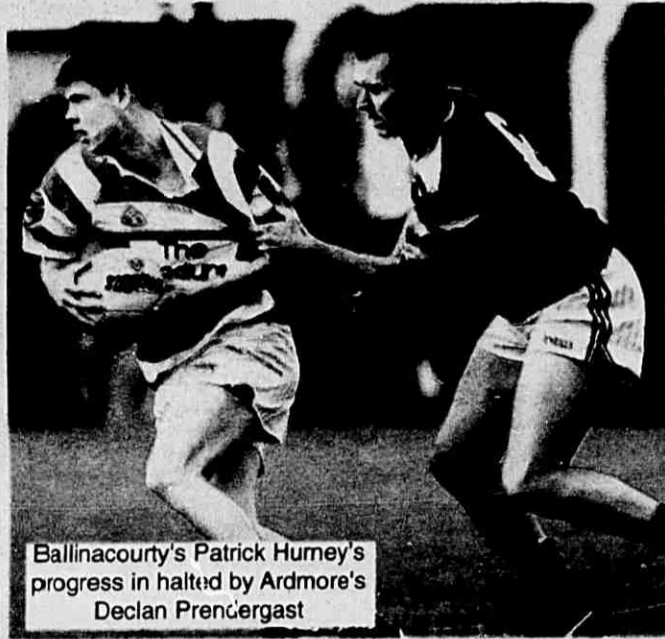

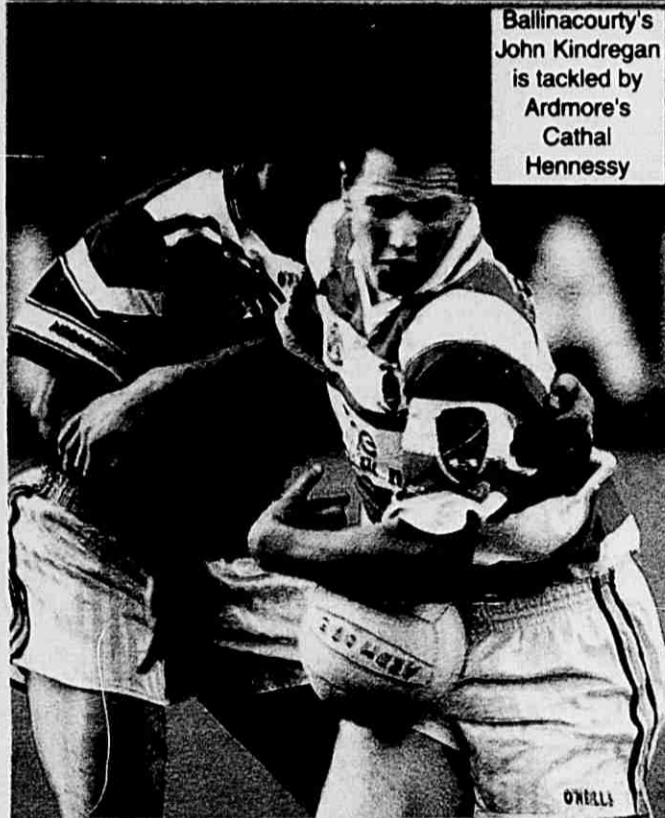
Ballinacourty's John Kindregan is tackled by Ardmore's Cathal Hennessey

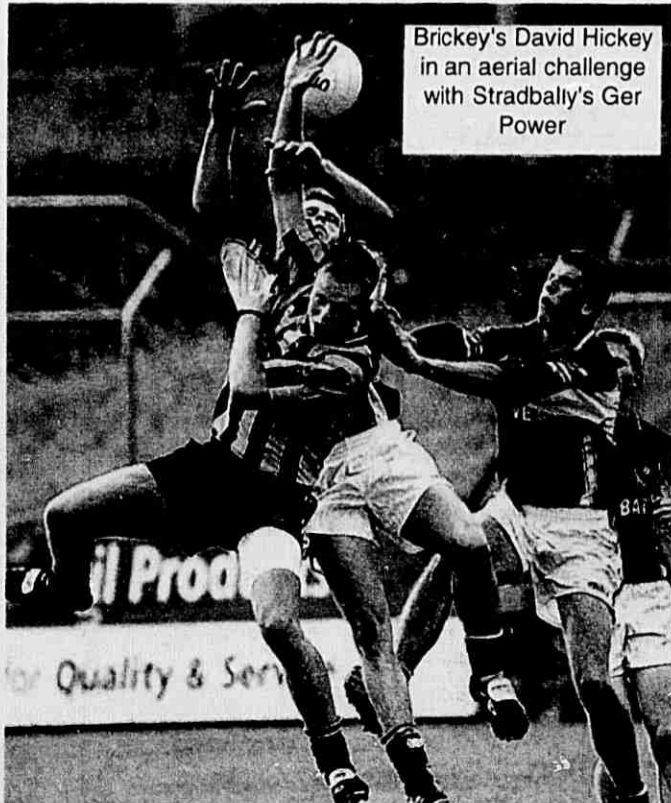

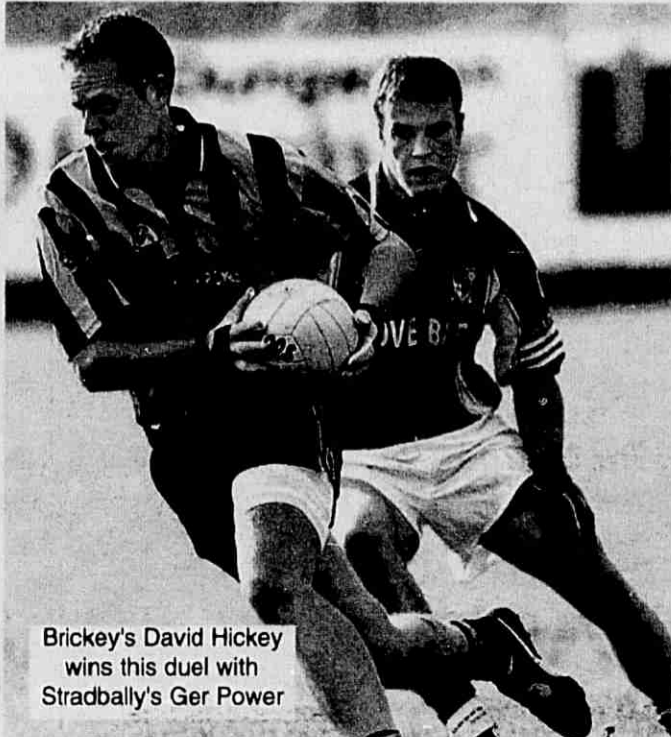
Power and Vincent McCarthy to raise the final white flags to end the game and leave Stradbally the clear and deserving winners

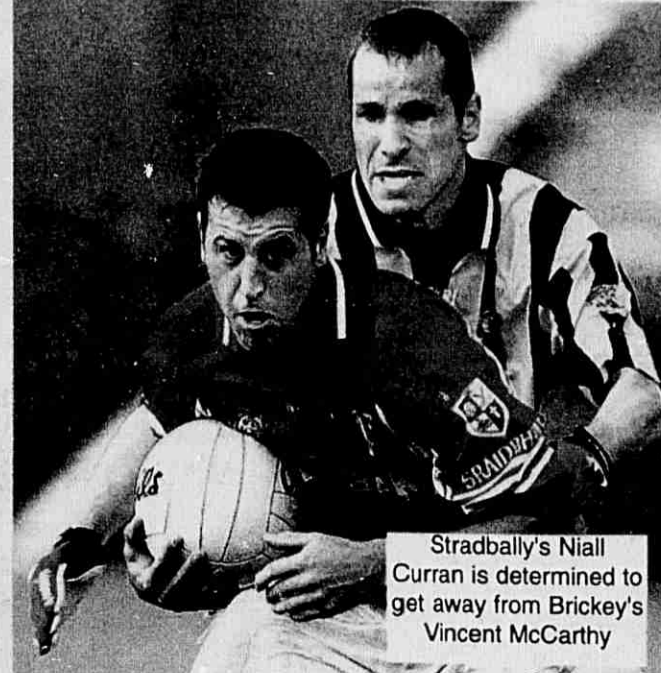

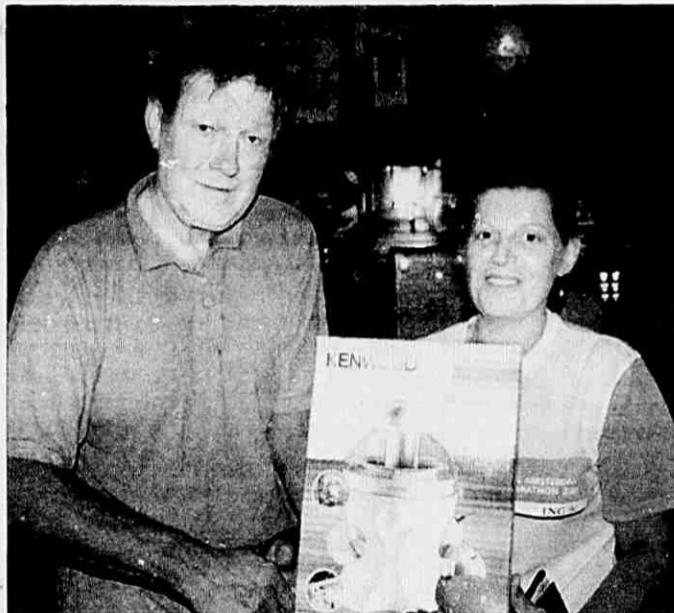

ROYAL ASCOT ROUND UP

Day One — Trainer Aidan O'Brien recorded a double on the opening afternoon of the Royal meeting. He won his fifth Coventry Stakes in ten years as Mick Kinane obliged on 11/4 chance Henrythenavigator. This was Mick Kinane's thirty ninth Royal Ascot winner.

Trainer O'Brien was well represented in the St James Palace Stakes and he sent out the first three home in this event. Excellent Art was unlucky in the French 2000 Guineas but this time with Jamie Spencer still in the saddle he weaved his way through the field to register a well-deserved victory. Dual Guineas winner Cockney Rebel was a major disappointment and hung all over the shop in the closing stages when asked to quicken but it later transpired that this horse cracked a pelvis during the race.

A flop at stud George Washington returned to action in the Queen Anne Stakes and he was well supported to return to winning ways. He pulled very hard in the early stages ran somewhat in snatches thereafter but to his credit ran on strongly in the closing stages to finish a close up fourth bend the always prominent Ramonti this 5/1 shot under Frankie Dettori proving a welcome Group One winner for his main employers Godolphin.

The Australian sprinters were expected to perform with distinction during the week and Miss Andretti 3/1 did not leave the Aussies down streaking to victory in the Kings Stand Stakes. The Tracey Collins trained Dandy Man ran a cracker to fill the runner up spot.

Day Two — County Wexford jockey Jimmy Fortune was the man in form on day two recording a nice priced treble with two of those winners trained by John Gosden. Jimmy's first winner arrived courtesy of the Peter Chapple Hyam trained Tariq this 15/2 shot proving to strong for the well-fancied US Ranger.

Dylan Thomas was well fancied to capture the Prince Of Wales Stakes but Manduro was too good for the Aidan O'Brien runner on this occasion.

Royal Oath came out on top in the very difficult to win Royal Hunt Cup.

County Meath trainer Ger Lyons combined with Johnny Murtagh to capture the Queen Mary Stakes with 20/1 outsider Elletelle.

Day Three — Odds on favourite Yeats continued the good run of trainer Aidan O'Brien posting back-to-back victories in the Ascot Gold Cup. Gordieland came out of the pack to challenge but Mick Kinane was always in control aboard the jolly.

The Philip Robinson partnered Silkwood 4/1 ran out a comfortable winner of the Ribblesdale Stakes for fillies.

Johnny Murtagh enjoyed a profitable week and he steered 50/1 chance Eddie Jock to victory in the Britannia Stakes.

Day Four — Finsceal Beo was an uneasy 100/30 shot in the Coronation Stakes and unsuited by the softening ground failed to make the expected impact. There were no such problems for the Richard Hughes trained 8/1 shot Indian Ink who bounded clear to run out a convincing six lengths winner over Mi Emma.

Mahler 7/1 from the Aidan O'Brien yard displayed his class in the Queens Vase proving to strong for 11/1 chance Veracity.

Day Five — Scorpion was well fancied to capture the Hardwicke Stakes but he could never quiet get to the Sir Michael Stoute trained Marahel who stayed on stoutly all the way to the winning line for Richard Hills.

Miss Andretti was going for the double in the Golden Jubilee Stakes but she failed to get to grips with the leaders as Johnny Murtagh gave the Jeremy Noseda trained Soldiers Tale a power packed drive to post a deserved win.

Former jump jockey Jamie Osborne sent out the final winner of the Royal meeting as Jamie Spencer drove Enjoy The Movement to a facile win in the Queen Alexandria Stakes.

MISS ANDRETTI TOPS

Australian sprinting sensation Miss Andretti heads a superb 54-strong entry who stand their ground at the first forfeit stage for the £375,000 Group One Darley July Cup, run over six furlongs on Newmarket's July Course on Friday, July 13, the highlight of the 2007 Ritz Club July Festival. The six-year-old mare, trained by Lee Freedman, produced a tremendous display to take last

weeks Group

Two King's Stand Stakes at Royal Ascot, knocking over two seconds off the course record for five furlongs as she blitzed to a length and three quarter triumph over Irish hope Dandy Man, with compatriot Magnus close up in third place.

Rookie handler Tim Pitt gained his second top-level success when Les Arcs held off the fast-finishing Iffraaj in the 2006 Darley July Cup, following up his triumph in the Golden Jubilee Stakes at Royal Ascot. The seven-year-old ran unplaced on his return this year in the Group Two Duke Of York Stakes at York on May 16.

The Kevin Ryan-trained Amadeus Wolf was ultra-consistent in 2006, including an excellent fourth to Les Arcs in the Darley July Cup, and looked as a good as ever on his return this year when landing the Duke Of York Stakes, defeating Red Clubs by a length and a quarter.

Aidan O'Brien supplies four of the seven remaining Irish-trained entries, including Excellent Art and Astronomer Royal, first and third in the Group One St James's Palace Stakes at Royal Ascot, and George Washington, the brilliant 2006 Stan James 2000 Guineas victor who returned from an unsuccessful spell at stud to finish a close fourth to Ramonti in the Group One Queen Anne Stakes at Royal Ascot on the same afternoon.

Sakhee's Secret is undoubtedly one of the most exciting young sprinters in training, having landed all three outings in 2007. Hughie Morrison's three-year-old produced an exhilarating performance on his most recent outing when storming to a four-length victory over Prime Defender in the Listed Cathedral Stakes at Salisbury on June 17.

The Richard Hannon-trained Asset finished ninth behind George Washington in the 2006 Stan James 2000 Guineas at Newmarket, but looked a natural sprinter on his four-year-old debut when comfortably defeating stable companion Assertive by two and a half lengths in the Listed Abernant Stakes at Newmarket on April 19.

Borderlescott is a very consistent performer and provided trainer Robin Bastiman with his biggest success in the 2006 Stewards' Cup at Goodwood.

Mark Wallace's Benbaun is yet to win at the highest level but is a classy sprinter, while Bygone Days, who captured the 2006 Group Three Igloos Bentinck Stakes at Newmarket, is the sole Godolphin hope.

US Ranger, trained by Jean-Claude Rouget, was undefeated before this year's Stan James 2,000 Guineas, when he finished seventh behind Cockney Rebel, and he ran a cracker at Royal Ascot behind Taraq.

He is one of four French-trained entries. The German-trained entry is Electric Beat, a Group Three scorer over six furlongs at Hamburg in 2006, who ran second on his seasonal return at Hanover on June 10 for handler Andreas Lowe.

Drayton, unplaced behind Cockney Rebel in the Stan James 2000 Guineas on his latest start in May, could represent South African handler Mike de Kock, while the Gai Waterhouse-trained Bentley Biscuit, in arrears in Ascots King's Stand Stakes, completes the Australian trio.

Other fascinating entries include David Nicholls' useful pair Tax Free and Moss Vale, 2006 Coventry Stakes scorer Hellvelyn, James Fanshawe's improving mare Firenze, the Peter Chapple-Hyam-trained duo Al Qasi, very progressive last season, and Dutch Art, third in the Stan James 2000 Guineas, and Mutawaajid, a dual Group Two winner in Australia now based with Mick Channon.

Michael Prosser, Newmarket's Director of Racing, commented: "The Australian sprinters really proved themselves again at Royal Ascot and we are looking forward to Miss Andretti, Magnus and hopefully Bentley Biscuit taking part in Europe's richest and most prestigious sprint, the Darley July Cup." Though Choisir went close in 2003, an Australian-trained horse has yet to win our race and, as usual, there will be plenty of challengers from Europe determined to foil the long-distance raiders."

THE FINAL FURLONG

Royal Ascot:
good racing but
good riddance!

Whew! Thank God that's over. Months waiting for Royal Ascot to come, yet by the time 22/1 shot Dark Missile won the Wokingham Stakes for Andrew Balding on Saturday, we couldn't wait for the dastardly festival to go away.

Punters were minced during a week when the formbook was as reliable as the clouds that hung low above the refurbished track.

Cockney Rebel and George Washington — the last two winners of the Newmarket 2,000 Guineas — were the bankers on day one but things didn't quite work out that way. Cockney Rebel drifted across the track to finish out of the placings in the St James Palace Stakes. Something looked wrong, and subsequent tests discovered that he suffered a stress fracture to his pelvis — luckily it's an injury that shouldn't keep him off the track for too long.

Gorgeous George remains an enigma. Understandably racing keenly early on when he couldn't find cover, last year's top miler couldn't find his best stride when the race got serious and it was only in the final 100 yards that he really got going.

He was only beaten half a length fourth in the end behind Ramonti, but this was a performance almost a stone below his best.

So punters were chasing their tail after day one and things didn't improve. The banker on day two was US Ranger but he was well beaten into second in the Jersey Stakes. All My Loving was overturned for Ballydoyle on day three when Yeats justified his short price in fine style in the Gold Cup.

Indian Ink upset the odds in the Coronation Stakes on Friday and Saturday's action saw warm jollies Scorpion and Miss Andretti bite the dust.

A bookies benefit then but sure we'll get our dough back by Galway, won't we?

While it was a nightmare few days for some, it was a dream festival for others. There are times in his career when Wexford man Jimmy Fortune has been passed over for high profile rides in favour of more fashionable jockeys but last week belonged to him.

Five victories including a cherished victory aboard Nannina in the Windsor Forest

Stakes saw him crowned the festival's top jockey. And no one begrudged him the award.

One for the notebook

You're so thrilling was a warm favourite to win the Albany Stakes for Aidan O'Brien on Friday. An own-sister to the 'Iron Horse', Giants Causeway, she

encountered minor interference in running second to Mick Channon's Nijoom Dubai.

Some bookmakers over-reacted and cut her to 10/1 for next season's 1,000 Guineas but she's still available at 14s elsewhere. I'm told that she hadn't the perfect preparation for Royal Ascot so much better is expected.

She's a Group 3 winner already and, as Giants Causeway himself needed to be stepped up to seven furlongs to win a Pattern race as a two-year-old, it suggests there's plenty more to come from this handsome filly. Who knows, she might be as good as her brother?

THE GALWAY PORTFOLIO

If you're ever been to Ballybrit for the summer race festival, you've probably sampled a creamy bun in one of the restaurants or sipped a pint of the black stuff in the Guinness & Oyster Bar. A company called Lydon House Catering employ a team of over 1,000 people to fulfil their catering contract at the track which makes our latest entry in the Galway Portfolio even more ironic.

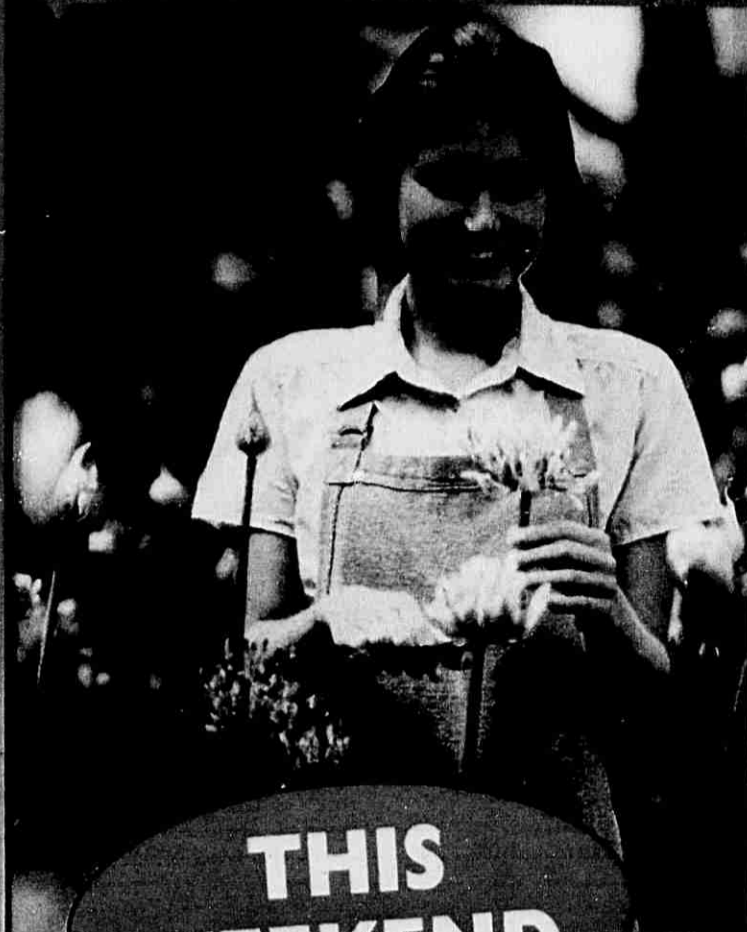
The unexposed Lydon House was backed from 14/1 into 9/2 to win his first handicap chase at Ballinrobe last week. Exceedingly well-handicapped on just 78 (he did win four point-to-points in his time) Lydon House travelled and jumped well except for making a terrible mistake four from home where he was virtually down on his knees.

Safety and imagination are two elemental components in the design and construction of rafts which are being assembled behind locked doors all over west Waterford. And there are still a few vacancies available for entry.

"This inaugural event promises to be fun filled and hilarious, while at the same time" says Christopher Kelly, Hon Chairman of the Dungarvan Fundraising Branch of the Helvick Lifeboat, "safety is paramount. Rafts will be disqualified if safety is in any doubt whatsoever. But" he adds with a smile "acts of piracy are to be encouraged! And businesses and individuals are busy beavering away on their rafts."

Rafts, maximum size 2.m x 3.5m, may be constructed from renewable and recycled materials, but fibreglass and pre-formed structures are not allowed.

Never was there such preparation.....Hackett from Dungarvan led the sack of Baltimore, but weapons for the Daft Raft Race are limited to de-shelled eggs, rotten tomatoes, flour, water and balloons. 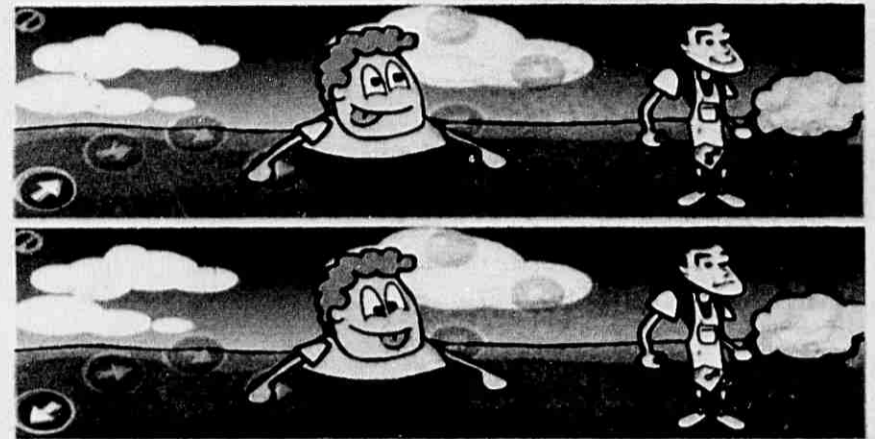



Electrical Fault At Coolagh Petrol Pump

An electrical fault at a petrol pump at Coolagh Petrol Station at the Burgery in Abbesside briefly caused panic among the public on Saturday afternoon last. A number of members of the public rushed from the scene when plumes of smoke were seen emerging from one of the petrol pumps on the forecourt.

Staff at the petrol station reacted immediately to the alert and cut power to the petrol pump, before dousing the faulty pump.

The Fire Service was alerted at 6.15pm, and two units responded from Dungarvan Fire Station. A foam blanket was spread over the faulty pump, and the incident was dealt with in about half an hour.

Assistant Fire Officer, Philip O'Hehir said the area in the petrol pump where the fault occurred was isolated from the petrol so effectively it was just the unit itself which was damaged. "No petrol was involved in the incident," he said.
