Disappointment As Wilkinson **Loses Seanad Bid** By Kevin Kirrane

Former Fianna Fail Deputy. Ollie Wilkinson, was eliminated on the 15th count on the Agricultural panel in the Seanad elections, and must now look for a nomination from Taoiseach Bertie Ahern if he is to have a place in the Upper House and secure an early return to the national political stage.

Wilkinson's chances of securing a Seanad seat looked all but gone after a disappointing first count placed him in 17th of the 28 candidates in the agricultural panel.

Mr. Wilkinson secured 28,000 votes in the first count, well short of the quota 89,334. The total number of votes are multiplied by 1,000 to facilitate the calculation of transfers and the

The total electorate for the panel is 1,072,000 (1,072) and consists of all the members of the new Dail, the outgoing Seanad and every member of a county or borough council.

A total of 11 seats are available

on the agricultural panel.

Mayor Calls For Memorial At New Dungarvan Hospital

Mayor Of Dungarvan, Damien Geoghegan has requested that Dungarvan Town Council write to the Health Service Executive, asking that the Doctors who contributed much of their professional lives to the District Hospital in Dungarvan, be commemorated with a permanent memorial, when the new hospital, which is due to begin construction shortly, is finally completed.

The Mayor, who raised the issue at a recent protocol meeting of the Town Council, said: "I believe it is very appropriate that the contribution made by Dr John Hackett, Dr Dan McCarthy and Dr Brendan McCarthy, continues to be recognised into the future in the proposed new hospital. **STATUE**

"There is an existing statue in the hospital grounds, which is dedicated to Dr Hackett along with plaques and photographs of all three doctors, which are currently displayed in the hallway of the existing hospital."

Mayor Geoghegan pointed out that: "The story of Dungarvan District Hospital, and the contribution made by each of the three doctors concerned, is a remarkable one. Dr John Croker Hackett (Medical Director 1896-1930), followed by Dr Dan McCarthy (1930-1951) and later Dr Brendan McCarthy, dedicated their professional lives to the development of Dungarvan District Hospital into a comprehensive, modern hospital comparable to any other of its time.

(continued from front page) Mr. Wilkinson, who was defeated by a slim margin in the general election, hoped the Senate elections would be a first step in rehabilitating his political career, but is now likely to have to look to be one of Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern's eleven nominees to the Senate.

Deputy Brendan Kenneally, who ironically was the candidate to take Wilkinson's seat in the general election, also lost out in the Senate elections proper five years ago, but was nominated to the Senate by the Taoiseach.





ILLEGAL REZONING NOT THE ANSWER TO LAND CRUX

Viewpoint was surprised to see the level of criticism directed at both the council executive and the owner of 1.4 acres of land around Abbeyside National School in a debate that threatens to spill from the council chamber directly into the law courts.

A number of councillors have put their name to a notice of motion calling for the land, owned by the Tierneys, to be rezoned from Educational to Open Space.

At the moment the land is worth 1 million: rezoned it would probably be worth half that.

The issue starts in 1999 when the council was considering the Draft Town Development Plan. On a vote, it was decided by 8 to 1 to rezone the land from Residential to Educational. This was done specifically to allow the school purchase the land from the Tierney's. Many of the current councillors on Dungarvan Town Council were on the local authority at the time.

The Development Plan was adopted in 2000 and was warmly welcomed by the school itself, with the principal, Finbarr Keohan even taking the step of writing to the council saying their purposes would be served by the rezoning.

In a further two Development Plans, including the current Plan, the zoning of Educational is included.

But seven years have passed since that first rezoning and Abbeyside National School is no closer to buying the land, leading to concerns about its future at its present location.

However, this is not a reason to either blame the council executive, who – rightly – advised the council that Educational was the correct zoning for the land, or the landowner, who has at all times dealt honestly in regard to the issue, and deserves honesty in return from the council.

The Tierneys have owned and farmed the land for the past 200 years, literally pumping blood, sweat and tears into it to make a living. To effectively cut the ground from under him for the benefit of a wealthy private body - the Catholic Church which owns Abbeyside National School - is not good enough.

In fact, in this whole sorry saga, according to the Tierneys, the school has never even made a single offer to buy the land from them.

Considering that in recent months, Waterford & Lismore Diocese has sold off land for several millions of euro, this is quite strange.

But it appears that instead, the Diocese is content to leave the council make the running on this issue, and that's where the problems emerge. Earlier this year, the council stepped in to CPO the land, but found the independent valuation of €1 million not to their liking, and out of the council's price range.

The council's plan was to purchase the land, and then lease it back to the school. But the question is why?

Viewpoint is repeating himself, but the school is not in public ownership. It's a privately owned school, owned by an extremely wealthy group. Yet, this wealthy body wishes to have it both ways to gain ownership of a valuable asset, and yet pay well below its value.

Lets face fact's, Viewpoint would be very surprised if the councillors who signed their names to the rezoning motion went ahead with it doubtless as they are in their desire to provide Abbeyside with much needed land to extend onto, as they personally, and not the council as a body, would end up being sued. And in any case, at this point, the council is only acting as a public conduit to put quite unfair pressure on the landowner to sell up at a reduced price.

It's up to the owners of the school to face reality at this point, and make a genuine offer to purchase the land. And then, like in any commercial transaction, which this is, it's up to the landowner to decide whether to sell or not.

By going ahead with this notice of motion, the councillors would not only be, in the view of senior counsel, acting in excess of councillors legal power, but they would be morally and ethically incorrect. All that can be done for the school has been done. The land was rezoned Educational in 1999, and its purposes are served by that zoning. To rezone it to specifically reduce its value would be to grab the land from the Tierneys, and would, according to the Tierneys themselves, bankrupt a family which has already been put through the mill by a campaign of public pressure.

At the end of the day, it's up to the school's owners, and them only, to make a genuine offer to the landowners and to finally solve this longstanding issue once and for all.

WALTON PARK WILL BE WORTH THE WAIT

Walton Park is perhaps Dungarvan's largest public amenity space, and despite countless delays, including the most recent which puts back its opening to the public from the end of July to sometime in August, according to the designers, the e-project, it will be worth the wait.

The latest delay was caused by the weather, but most of the work has already been done, and it's understood that the work yet to be completed has mainly to do with paving.

It will be a relief to everyone concerned when the park finally opens its doors again. The old Walton Park had become a virtual no-go area late at night, and something needed to be done. With the hedges taken away, and extra lighting put in, hopefully a new and brighter era beckons for the park, which will allow everyone to use it and enjoy it in utter safety.







THE COMING OF THE DINOSAURS



Dinosaurs lived on Earth for 160 million years. The word dinosaur means 'terrible lizard' and was first used by the British palaeontologist Richard Owen in 1842. We tend to think of dinosaurs as enormous creatures but they came in all sizes. The first dinosaurs appeared over 220 million years ago and were quite small. The smallest of the dinosaurs was Compsognathus which was only 90cm (3ft) long and weighted 3kg (6.6lb). Diplodocus was the longest, in fact the longest animals that has ever lived, with a length of 25m (82ft). The heaviest creature that ever lived was Brachiosaurus which weighted over 50 tonnes.

Two Types Of Dinosaur

Scientists have divided dinosaurs into two main groups: Saurischia, meaning 'reptile hipped' because their hips are similar to those of crocodiles and other reptiles; and Ornithischia (bird hipped) because their hip bones are arranged like those of birds. In fact it is quite possible that the first birds evolved from the Ornithischia dinosaurs.

Periods Of History

Scientists have divided the last 590 million years of Earth's history into three main era's; the Palaeozoic (meaning old life), Mesozoic (middle life) and Cenozoic (new life). Dinosaurs lived during the Mesozoic era, which is divided into three periods, the Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous.

In the Triassic period, 225 million years ago, the first mammals appeared and there were numerous reptiles. The Jurassic period, some 195 million years ago, was the age of reptiles and the time when the first primitive bird appeared. In the Cretaceous period, 135 million years ago, mammals and birds became more numerous. Dinosaurs became extinct at the end of this period.

First Living Things

Life began in the seas some 2,000 million years ago. The earliest form of life consisted of particles of protoplasm, the basis of all living matter. From this evolved simple single celled organisms, similar to the amoeba, which gradually developed, over many millions of years, into many celled organisms, simple creatures such as microscopic bacteria.

More complex creatures, such as sponges and jellyfish, began appearing perhaps 600 million years ago. The jellyfish was one of the first animals to have a mount and stomach. All life at this time was in the sea and not until around 400 million years ago that simple plants and insects probably began inhabiting the shore line. By 345 million years ago some primitive amphibians were beginning to venture onto land and the first reptiles began developing.

DID YOU KNOW?

The oldest animals fossils are about 700 million years old. Human beings did not exist for about another 698 million years!

Soft bodied animals such as worms, jellyfish, corals and molluscs evolved 500 million years ago.

The first fish had no jaws, and had to such food into their bodies

Many kinds of fish appeared 420 million years ago, including the ancestors of today's sharks.

Prehistoric insects were much larger than today's versions. Dragonflies had a wingspan of over 60cm (24in)!





age that the subject receives, it is difficult to be blind to the financial benefit that the steady or surging long-term gains of property ownership brings. It is unsurprising then that young professionals are so keen to get started on the property ladder.







Safe in the Sun

It's nearly the end of July already, and still no sign of the long hot summer that was widely predicted a few months ago. Of course our Irish weather can never really be relied upon, which is why every year many people flock to hot countries (or perhaps just to their local beauty salon) to get that sun kissed look.

Years ago having a suntan was actually considered to be extremely undesirable. In those days, the only people with golden-brown skin were poor farm labourers and servants who had to work outside in all weathers. The aristocrats, on the other hand, could be identified not only by their fine clothes, but also by their very pale skin which resulted from an altogether easier lifestyle.

So the suntan became associated with poverty and hardship, while pale skin denoted wealth and beauty. Ladies in particular would avoid sun exposure and

hot fireplaces at all costs, and would even use white powder to accentuate their porcelain complexion. Fashion has changed a lot since those days, but its strange really, considering that tanned skin is in fact damaged skin.


When the skin is exposed to ultra violet radiation, the damage caused triggers specialised cells to produce a brown pigment called melanin which gives a tanned appearance. Repeated exposure to sunlight can lead to malfunction of these cells which results in the appearance of brown spots, patchy pigmentation and an increased risk of skin cancer. The most aggressive type of skin cancer is malignant melanoma which quickly spreads to other organs in the body and is often fatal.

Exposure to UV radiation can also damage the skin in other ways. In the short term there is the risk of sunburn which can be quite severe in some cases. In the longer term, damage to the skin's structure causes a thickened and wrinkled appearance. In some cases, excessive sun exposure can cause a particularly nasty form of eczema called chronic actinic dermatitis in which the skin becomes permanently thickened and inflamed with numerous scabs. So the long term effects of the sun are really not so attrac-

Perhaps fashion will change, but in the meantime I would urge anyone planning a holiday to a warmer climate to protect their skin from the sun's harmful rays and to avoid sun beds at all costs. In fact the Irish Cancer Society has recommended a complete ban on the use of sun beds following research which revealed that 7 per cent of Irish people use sun beds.

If you do overexpose your skin to the sun there are some natural ways of helping to repair the damage. Make sure your diet includes plenty of nuts, seeds and wheatgerm which are high in essential fatty acids, zinc and vitamin E which promote healing of the skin. Calendula cream, aloe vera gel or a few drops of lavender essential oil diluted in olive or almond oil are all excellent for restoring the skin after exposure to the sun. Alternatively you can cut open a vitamin E or evening primrose oil capsule and rub the contents into your skin. For best results, all the above ingredients can be mixed together for a very nourishing and effective aftersun



Unique Exhibition In Lismore Castle Arts



What to do with a town garden

MANY people who are too lazy to make an effort in the garden say it is because it isnit big enough to do anything with ñ but to pep up a salad. thatis no excuse



- Train Merton Thornless, a luscious, big blackberry, along rear fences.
- Plant tomatoes, aubergines, cucumbers, peppers, courgettes and

- Grow the sugar pea or mangetout in a container. The plants look particularly good against an edging of decorative herb such as golden marjoram. Oregan Sugar Pod is a good late summer cropper.
- Fill a tub or tower pot with strawberry plants. Wild Alpine varieties such as Red Alpine give summer colour and autumn fruit.
- Use another tub or barrel to grow an early crop of potatoes. After they are harvested, you can use the compost again for a later crop of leeks or onions grown from sets.
- Pot out some herbs. Rosemary, sage, parsley, thyme, mint and chives are all attractive plants. Add a splash



THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Plant Madonna lilies

This is the ideal time to plant Lilium condidum, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover them with 5cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show; make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good, but not freshly manured, ground.

Lift daffodils and bulbous irises

Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.

Cut back helianthemums

Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own devices, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears.

Start to feed chrysanthemums

It is a mistake to begin to feed chrysanthemums of any type too early, but you can start now with safety. The more varied the feed the better. Give very small doses every five days or so mixed with plenty of water and used in place of the ordinary water. Liquid manure, made by steeping a small sack of cow, horse, or sheep droppings in a tub of water, can be varied with any good chemical fertiliser.

She was always ready to help with inquiries from visitors and members about military history which was a particular interest of hers. Anne had been ill for awhile, but always she had a love for the Museum Society and kept active throughout her illness. She will be sadly missed by all who knew her, and those she was in correspondence with that knew her only via a text message or two. Sincere sympathy is extended to her family. May she rest in peace.

This is an extract from 'A History of Dungarvan Town and District' by Patrick C.Power, concerning the Confederate War in Dungarvan and surrounds:

"In October 1641 the Gaelic Irish of Ulster revolted against the English government and drove out what settlers they could. In the remainder of Ireland there was no response until spring when the Catholic landowners decided to rebel against the government. The Catholic landed gentry rebelled en masse..At this stage they all feared for their lands and the work of the 'discoveres'. Richard Butler of Kilcasi, brother of the Earl of Ormond and a fervent Catholic, captured Clonmel, Fethard and Carrick-on-Suir.

Richard Butler then marched on Dungarvan, the nearest available port, where the Lord President of Munster had appointed Lieutenant Rossington to be governor of the castle. Aready the castle was full of refugees...The rebels had no equipment to besiege it. Then a plan was concocted to offer the ladders of the town for safe keeping in the castle and when they were being delivered, the bearers blocked the open gates. Assailants then rushed in and took the castle. Among those who had refuge there were Mrs Bolt, wife of the Protestant vicar, Henry Davis, a chandler and his wife, William Farmer, an innkeeper, and a Mrs Churton. These English names prove that the plantation and colonisation of the town were already progressing. The new governor of the castle was John Butler from outside Carrick-on-Suir.... The port became very important to the rebels who wished to keep in touch with the European mainland. On the south coast of Ireland Waterford and Dungarvan were the only ports that served the needs of those in arms in Counties Cork, Tipperary and Kilkenny. The ports of Youghal, Cork and Kinsale were never in rebel hands...Sir Richard Osborne's property in the area was attacked. His losses amounted to £ 3,386....his house at Cappagh was burned and Captian Edmund Fennell's men looted the district...10th March his fortress at Knockmaon was attacked and some of his Protestant English tenants were killed who formed the garrison of the castle. Among the slain were Richard Holloway, Thomas Bayley, Ralph Bennet and Robert True senior and his son, all yeomen....Sir Richard Osborne named the attackers as three Fitzgeralds, John fitzThomas of Woodhouse, John fitzTibbot of Clonea (Dungarvan) and John of Farnane in Modeligo, relatives of the FitzGeralds whoo had been dispossessed after the Desmond wars. This castle was of strategic importance to the rebels because it straddled the important road westwards to Cappoquin, Lismore and Cork city and also to the fery at Youghal in these times...Captian Edmund Fennell was appointed governor of the town after John Butler. One William Mullaghane ten years afterward made a statment about some of the events that he witnessed in 1642. He accused Fennell of taking two English girls, twelve and sixteen years of age, when he came on somebusiness or other outside the town. They were brought to Dungarvan, he said, and lodged in the castle for the night. The following day they were both hanged in the lane outside the west gate. He and one William Murphy, he said, cut the corpses down from the trees and buried them. One Thomas Gough of Dungarvan corroborated this statment. However, when Fennell was tried for this offence in December 1652 at Cork, he was declared nit guilty in a court that was not particularly favourable to him or his friends.

THIS delicious Belgian recipe for Carbonnade Flamande opens up with world of beer cooking to the adventurous amateur cook.

Ingredients:

750g stewing steak 3 x 15ml sp butter 3 onions, sliced 2 oz flour 330 ml beer 300 ml stock 1/2 x 5ml sp dried tarragon 1 x 15ml sp vinegar

1 clove garlic, crushed Bouquet garni Freshly grated nutmeg Freshly ground black pepper

1 x 15ml sp sugar

FOR THE TOPPING:

French bread Prepared mustard 56 g grated cheese

Method:

CUT the meat into 5cm

cubes. Melt down the butter in a frying pan and brown the chunks of meat.

Transfer the browned meat to a casserole dish.

Sauté the onions until they are golden and then sprinkle on the flour and cook for two minutes.

Pour in all the other ingredients (except topping), bringing to the boil and stirring continuously. Pour onto the meat.

Cover the casserole and cook for 21/4 hours at 160°C.

When cooked, remove the bouquet garni. Cut the french bread into thick slices and spread with mustard and sprinkle with cheese. Place the chunks of bread on top of the meat in the casserole dish.

Return the casserole dish to the oven for 20 minutes, uncovered until the cheese



Top tips for Tangerine bee

A TANGY, citrus recipe for succulent beef steak.

Ingredients:

Serves 2

330 g fillet steak, sliced thinly 2 red dried chillies, halved 1/2 x 5ml sp sesame oil 80 ml sunflower oil 5 pinches dried orange

FOR THE MARINADE:

peel, soaked

2 x 5ml sp rice wine 1/2 x 5ml sp roasted szechwan peppercorns 1 x 5ml sp ginger; finely chopped 2 x 5ml sp dark soy

sauce

- 1 x 5ml sp cornstarch 1/4 x 5ml sp salt
- 1 x 5ml sp sesame oil 1 x 5ml sp sugar

Method:

Mix together all the mari-

nade ingredients in a bowl. Combine the beef steak pieces with the marinade and let the mixture stand for 20 minutes.

Heat the sesame and sunflower oil in a wok or large skillet until very hot.

Remove the beef from the marinade and add to oil. Stir-fry the pieces of meat until they are brown (this should take about 2 minutes).

Remove from the pan and drain off the oil.

Reheat one 15ml spoonful of the oil, add the chilli peppers and stir-fry for ten seconds on a high heat... Add the beef, orange peel and seasonings to the frying-pan.

Stir-fry for another four minutes and serve at once with rice and crisp stir-fried vegetables.

Pancake balls

Ingredients:

Makes 6 servings 500 g sifted flour

160 ml milk 1 x 5ml sp cardamom 2 x 15ml sp suga

3 egg yolks, beaten 3 egg whites 250 ml thick sour cream

3/4 x 5ml sp salt 1 x 5ml sp baking soda 2 x 15ml sp melted butter

Method:

HEAT a muffin/yorkshire pudding tray to a low heat. Sift together all the dry ingredients in a large glass bowl and make a well in the centre.

Mix together all the liquid ingredients (except egg whites) and pour them into the well all at once. Stir the mixture until well blended and set aside.


In a separate bowl, beat

the egg whites until rounded peaks are formed. Gently spread the batter over egg whites and fold together. Test the heated tray by dropping on to it a few drops of cold water. If the drops dance around in small beads, the temperature is right. Grease the tray well with butter (about 1/2 a 5ml spoon per well). Pour the batter into the wells, filling each one about half full.

With a fork turn the pancake balls frequently to brown evenly. Do not pierce.

The pancake balls are done when a wooden pick inserted in centre comes out clean. Serve immediately sprinkled with icing sugar or a tart jam. TIP: For an interesting variation, dice two medium sized apples and add them to the batter before cooking.

Part Time Course in Agriculture at Kildalton.

An Advanced Certificate in Agriculture for adult farmers will commence on October 1st 2007 at Kildalton College. The course will be delivered over a three year period on a part time basis. Classes will take place on Mondays and Wednesdays from 7.00 p.m. to 10.00 p.m. from October to May. In addition participants will be required to attend for practical skills training on one to two days per month.

On successful completion those attending will be awarded the Fetac Advanced Certificate in Agriculture. This meets the requirement for Stamp Duty Relief, Installation aid and higher grants for farm investments.

Applicants must be at least 23 years of age on January 1st 2008 to enter the course and must be involved in farming. Also there is a requirement to have access to a working farm for class assignments and project purposes. However, participants can gain exemptions from certain modules if they provide evidence of prior learning.

Put the Calf a Step Ahead.

As the suckler cows supply of milk declines the calf's need for grass increases if growth rates of over a kilo a day are to be maintained. This is achieved much more easily if the calf and cow are not competing on the same terriority. Yes, by letting the calves go ahead of the cows they can select the best grass which they need while the cows will be happy to mop up behind. A creep gate or a raised wire is the usual methods of getting calves to go forward. But it will take up to a week for most calves to get the courage to go ahead. Two further benefits arise from calves grazing ahead:

By grazing ahead for several hours a day the parting of cow and calf has begun. In effect weaning has started and there is scarcely any stress when the final break is made.

By having calves graze ahead meal can be introduced without the use of the ad lib creep feeder.

As the price of meal has rocketed the use of ad lib feeders will be a very expensive method of feeding meal to weanlings this autumn.

Graze Reseeds before Winter.

Reseeding is a gilt edged investment when you replace an old sward made up of very poor grasses with current top rate perennial ryegrasses. You will find many economic benefits but the ability of reseeds to produce very early grass and the massive yield that can be got year on year are the chief benefits.

Try and get the reseeding done in early August. Two grazings before the winter do wonderful job in thickening

I walked a reseed recently which was not grazed after sowing last autumn. A cut of silage was taken in late May. The sward is now as "open as a barn door". This sward is now ready to be invaded by weeds and poor grasses. The benefits of the expensive reseeding will be lost in a few years. Remember the all perennial ryegrass mixtures that we use now are very competitive and will not allow any invasion of other weeds and grasses if well managed.

Grant Scheme for Organics.

Effective immediately, organic farmers can once again apply for generous grants under a new On-Farm Grant Aid Scheme for the Development of the Organic Sector.

The On-Farm Scheme provides grant aid of 40% of the cost up to a maximum grant of €60,000. The Scheme 2007-2013 is there to help existing organic farmers and processors meet the growing demand for organic food, both in Ireland and abroad, but that is not their only purpose. This scheme has been designed with a view to expanding the number of participants in the organic sector. It is hoped that those who are considering the organic option will examine the possibilities that this scheme has to offer.

SPECIAL REFEREES MEETING

On tomorrow, Thursday evening a county wide meeting of referees, all grades, is scheduled for Dungarvan. The special meeting is called to discuss the declining standards of conduct (misconduct) and abuse of referees

We have heard of a number of very serious incidents in relation to category (a) offences and of one incident where a very prominent referee who is highly respected in the county, decided to 'call it a day' after refereeing a particular match last

It is no wonder that the refereeing problem is in a crisis situation in the county. Players who misbehave against referees in a serious way must be treated in a serious way and the clubs to whom they belong must also be punished in some very meaningful way, otherwise our playing activities will grind to a halt altogether.
