Lola O'Sullivan Is Council's Top Earner

"CONFERENCE EXPENSES BEING ABUSED" - SAYS CLLR. MANSFIELD

Fine Gael councillor, Lola O'Sullivan is Waterford County Council's top earner, collecting over €32,000 last year, it's emerged.

In the register of payments made to councillors from January to December 2006, a total of €592,310.22 was paid to the local authority's 23 councillors, the figures released on Monday evening last show.

Cllr. O'Sullivan, a Tramore electoral area councillor, received the statutory representational payment, a form of yearly salary for county councillors, of €15,949, and monthly allowances which totalled €6,099.07 for the year. She also collected €5,494.04 in expenses for attending conferences, and a further €5,078.88 for being a chair of a Strategic Policy Committee.

Next highest earner was Fianna Fail councillor, Pat Daly on €31,610.17 followed by Fine Gael councillor, Nora Flynn who received a payment of €30,081.06.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield and Labour councillor Teresa Wright, neither of whom attended any conferences during 2006, received the lowest payments with both collecting €20,203.43.

CRITICISED CONFERENCES

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader in the wake of the release of the figures, Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield criticised the spending on conferences, saying they are being abused in the absence of councillors receiving the average industrial wage.

"My position on expenses was always that a councillor's job is basically a full time job at the moment in terms of the amount of representation you have to do for people and the amount of responsibility you have.

"So as a full-time job, councillors should be paid the average industrial wage.

"At the moment, they're not being paid this.

"It's always been my personal belief that in order to get the average industrial wage that there is an abuse of conference allowances."

MOTION

Cllr. Mansfield put forward a motion last year looking for a written report from any councillor who attends a conference, and that that report be put on the agenda. However, the motion, which needed a two-thirds majority wasn't passed. Cllr. Mansfield believes the motion is the only way to stop these abuses taking place. (continued on page 8)

Coffey And Cummins Secure Senate Seats

Paudie Coffey pulled off a sensational result to secure a Seanad seat at the first attempt last week, while Maurice Cummins retained his seat on the Labour panel.

Coffey, who under dual mandate rules, must retire the seat at Waterford Council he has held since 1999, secured his seat on the Industrial and Commercial Panel on the 35th count.

The Portlawn man, son of the late Pat Coffey, who himself was a Fine Gael representative on Waterford County Council during the 1980's, and who twice unsuccessfully ran for the Senate - once by half a vote, will now go full time into politics.

"I'm both thrilled and I'm honoured to be a member of the Oireachtas representing Waterford," he told the

Dungarvan Leader.

"It's something I've been striving at for some time. It was a hard campaign especially after the general election but I'm glad

the electorate of the Senate, the councillors and TD's, had the faith in me to put me in there."

He said he aims to be a strong voice for Waterford City and County in the Oireachtas, keep his strong connection with the grassroots of the constituency, aid the carers association in raising issues at a national level as well as raising mental health issues especially the levels of suicide.

He said there is also an infrastructural deficit in the county such as sewerage and water, which needs to be addressed as well.

Coffey secured 25,000 first preference votes in what is regarded as one of the toughest panels with 37 candidates vying for 9 places. However, he transferred well, ending up with 107,000.

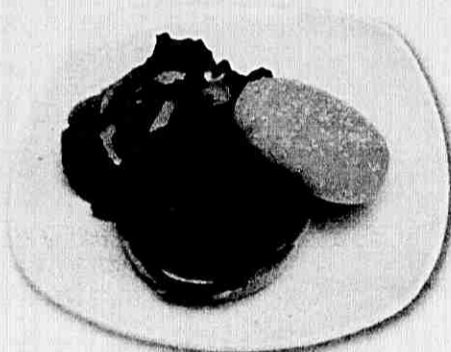

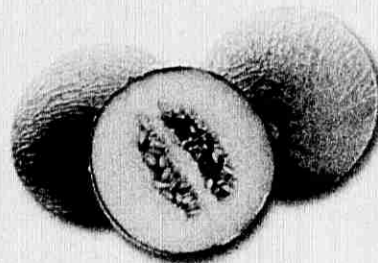

Danú Are Back In Town

Danú have been touring the world since 1995 and established as one of Ireland's leading Traditional Irish band. They have recorded six award winning albums and a live DVD over the past decade.

In the past year they have been taking it easy with less foreign travel to allow for their families and individual projects. They are getting together this August for some major festivals this side of the Atlantic and have decided to include a performance in Dungarvan. In March 2007 the band performed a sell out tour of some major US venues including a Broadway show at New York's celebrated venue "Symphony Space". In April the band were invited as special guests by Liam Clancy for some of his Irish tour, venues including Dublin's National Concert Hall and Corks Opera House. They made a TV appearance at this year at the TG4 awards ceremony in Cork, a show which was co-hosted by the band's lead singer "Muiréann Nic Amhlaoibh". 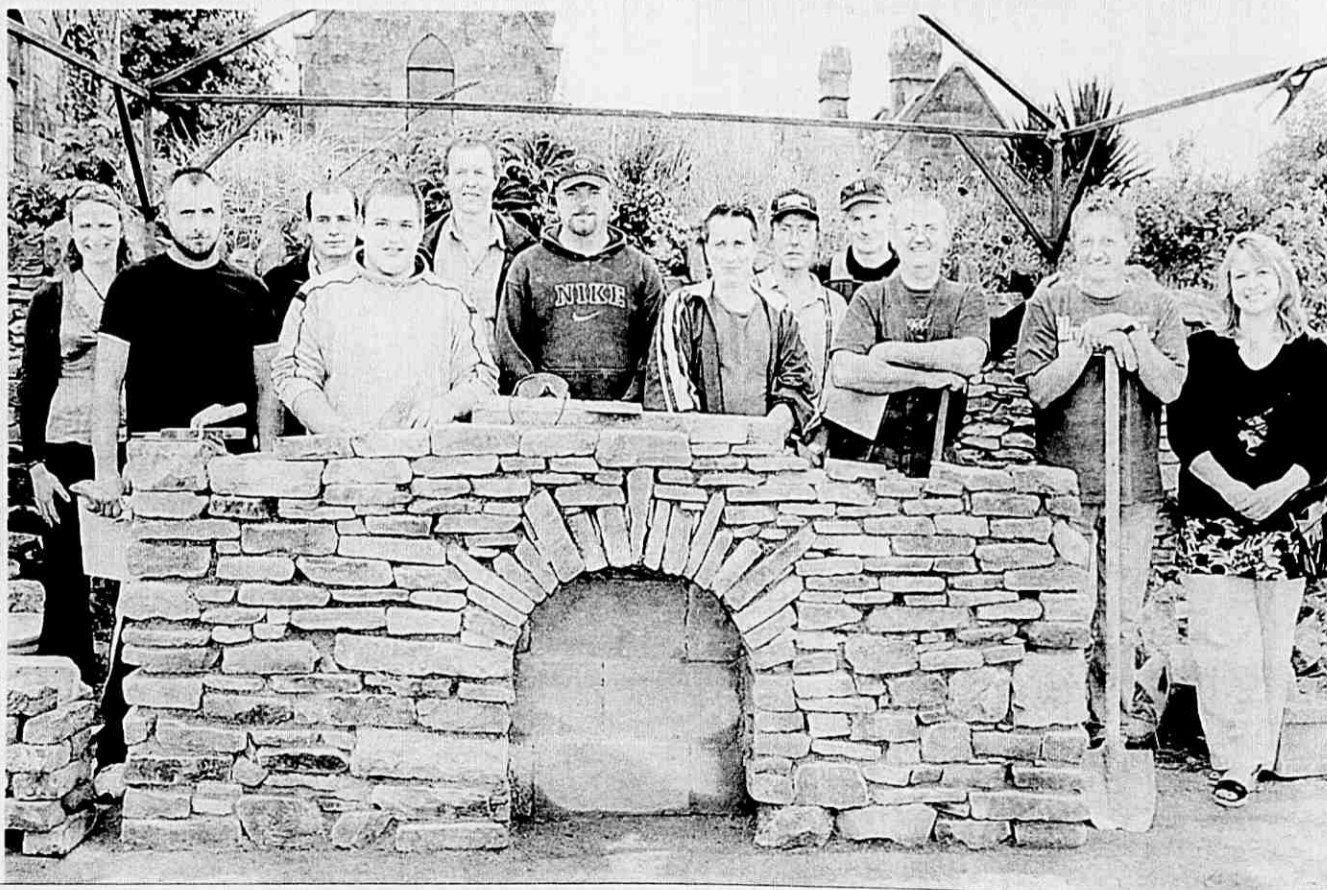
Waterford Leader Partnership Stone Wall Building Course Proves Very Popular

Waterford LEADER Partnership recently organised a traditional Stone wall building course for participants from the Local Employment Service (LES) and the Local Development Social Inclusion Programme (LDSIP) which also funded the course. The LDSIP programme is a series of measures designed to counter disadvantage and to promote equality and social and economic inclusion in the county. The LES is a service which assists the jobseekers in taking practical steps towards securing employment by providing access to a range of employment, training and education opportunities.

The Stone wall building course proved very popular, providing participants with the basic skills in building and repairing walls complete with foundations, through stones and coping, building stone piers, shaping cornerstones and cladding block walls with stone.

This course is one of a range of traditional skills training supported by the Local Development Social Inclusion Programme and which will take place from September in the Dungarvan Training Centre, Kilrush. This training centre is available to anyone in receipt of social welfare payments and does not effect entitlements. Places will be limited. Dungarvan Citizens Information Centre Celebrate 25th Anniversary

The Dungarvan Citizens Information Centre celebrated its 25th anniversary on July 12th 2007. The Centre has a long tradition in the provision of information, advice and assistance on entitlements and services. The Centre was first registered with the former NSSB (Now Citizens Information Board) in July 1982 and officially opened to the public by Judge Catherine McGuinness (retired Supreme Court Judge).

The first volunteers were representative of a number of local organisations. Financial assistance was obtained through the local Lions Club and furniture temporarily borrowed here and there to get the service up and running. Volunteers continued to manage and deliver the service right up to 2004 when we amalgamated with Waterford to provide a county-wide service. Due to the significant development of the centre over the years Dungarvan CIC

gained the services of a part time Information Officer in 2004. Currently there are 20 volunteers attached to the centre, some of whom are founder members. This shows the great dedication and enthusiasm of volunteers who continue to give freely of their time to the centre.

The Centre operates out of premises in the Court House, Dungarvan provided by Waterford County Council. We are open 11am - 1pm Monday to Thursday and 11am - 4pm on Friday with no need for an appointment. The Centre has a wide range of booklets and leaflets offering an important element of choice to all our clients. We cover all types of queries, from employment, tax, health, social welfare to family matters etc. The queries are vast and varied and our Information Officer and volunteers are always only too happy to seek particular informa-

tion for any client who requires it. Our level of queries continues to rise and shows how vital the service is to Dungarvan and surrounds.

In celebrating this important occasion a luncheon was organised on Wednesday July 11th at the Park Hotel in Dungarvan. Representatives of a number of voluntary and statutory organisations were in attendance which provided a great opportunity to network with similar organisations in the town and to showcase the wide range of information provided by Dungarvan CIC. Deputy Mayor of Dungarvan Michael O'Riordan officially launched the proceedings and Dick Hickey Chairperson of Waterford Citizens Information Waterford Ltd. along with Mary Keane, Development Manager, Mary Murphy Citizens Information Board and current volunteers and board were also in attendance. Each echoed words

of praise and encouragement to all involved with Dungarvan CIC wishing continued success for the next 25 years!

Clonea Strand Hotel on November 16th.

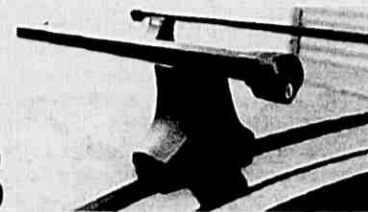
NOMINATIONS

NEW SENATORS FOR WATERFORD

Waterford has two new Senators in the Upper House after Paudie Coffey produced a sensational result winning through to the Seanad on the Industrial panel on the 35th count.

It's an outstanding success for the Portlaw man who was facing the Senate electorate for the first time.

He joins Maurice Cummins who, as was expected, made it through the Labour panel with relative ease, as Fine Gael's duo of Waterford Senators for the next term.

Just how mammoth Coffey's achievement was, can be seen by the number of first timers to the Senate elections who fail to get elected.

His late father, Pat, a distinguished and respected member of Waterford County Council for many years, failed at the Senate hurdle on two occasions in the 1980's, once by half a vote, which just goes to show how difficult a task it is.

As well as that, Paudie was on perhaps the most difficult panel with 37 candidates looking for nine seats. Just three of those were Fine Gael seats.

Paudie's political career is still on the upward spiral, and his senate election, marks the first step in raising his profile, which Viewpoint is certain the hardworking and articulate Portlaw man will do, before ultimately launching a significant challenge come the next general election.

Paudie, who works for the ESB in Waterford, only came onto the local political scene in 1999, but made his mark as one of the best speakers and debaters in the council chambers.

Since then, he was re-elected in the 2004 local elections in the Suir electoral area. But his challenge for a nomination to the Fine Gael ticket for this year's general election marked his first real impact on the constituency's consciousness.

Coffey clearly secured the second highest number of votes, ahead of city candidate, Jim D'Arcy, but the city-county rule meant only Deputy John Deasy and D'Arcy could go forward.

However, a number of Fine Gael county, city and Lismore town councillors put their name to a motion calling for Coffey to be added to the ticket, which headquarters duly did, causing outrage in the pro-Deasy camp, who felt their candidate's strong base in the rural east of the county could be threatened.

It's the latest instalment in the intriguing story of Fine Gael in this constituency who find themselves still largely divided, and in Coffey, the anti-Deasy camp have discovered a strong figurehead around whom they can rally.

However, it's perhaps not Deasy who should be worried.

A strong second Fine Gael councillor should not dilute Deasy's traditional vote too much, but rather if, as some pundits are openly speculating, Deputy Brian O'Shea doesn't run for Labour, and in the absence of a strong Labour candidate, it's conceivable, if the vote is managed right, Fine Gael could just pinch a seat at the expense of a Labour candidate.

Whether Senator Maurice Cummins is in the running for a nomination could be one of the more interesting side notes of the Senate election.

And also is the fact that Deputy Deasy will be joined on the national stage by two Senators who could loosely be described as being in the Anti-Deasy camp. It perhaps goes to show, the strength and popularity of the two Senators, yes, but also that Deasy definitely has some smoothing over and PR work still to do within his own party, as it was Fine Gael councillors and TD's who voted in Coffey and Cummins, showing up his unpopularity within some sections of the party who have still not forgiven him for questioning the future of Enda Kenny at a crucial part of the election campaign.

IS YOUR COUNCILLOR WORTH IT?

Financially troubled Waterford County Council shelled out over half a million euros on our twenty-three councillors again last year.

Add those figures up over five years and this means the council will pay out well in excess of €2.5 million to councillors over the term of this council alone.

Those are simply mind boggling figures, and when you take the various schemes which the council doesn't have sufficient funding to pay out for, including the most basic like roadworks, then that figure takes on real and eye-opening significance.

This is in the absence, as county councillors will openly admit to you, of having any real powers. County Councils as a direct consequence of various reforms including reforms put in train by our own Minister, Martin Cullen were stripped of power.

On the one hand, under these same reforms they've become extremely well paid for what they do in a part-time capacity, and on the other hand the powers they once had are gone. Whether you take this as a form of pay off for loss of power, Viewpoint will leave up to readers to decide.

The figures don't take into account other expenses and allowances. The new and frankly bizarre mobile phone allowance will allow councillors to claim €600 for every €1,200 they spend on their mobile phone bills even though they don't have to prove what they used the calls for - business or social.

The Mayor's allowance also isn't taken into account.

Conferences too are a bone of contention with Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield openly claiming in this paper's front-page report that conference expenses are being abused.

S.P.C.'s, for which the chairmen get in excess of €5,000 are little more than powerless quangos, who can in themselves make absolutely no decisions - only recommendations to the full council.

These payments, in Viewpoint's opinion, bring local Government into disrepute, and clear reform in the form of more powers for the county council, or else a halt to the ever spiralling increases received by councillors year on year, need to be put in train if we are ever to have value for money.

The question every member of the electorate now has to ask themselves is, are your elected representatives worth the, in some cases, very substantial amounts of public monies spent on them. For some, the answer will be a definite and resolute yes. For others...there's always the local elections in one and a half years time.

Popular Dungarvan Man Tragically Dies In Finland

six brothers, and two sisters in the Moore family.

Pat enjoyed much success with Abbeyside/Ballinacourty GAA club. He won a county hurling medal in 1997, and played in hurling and football county finals again two years later before going on to win Minor football titles in 2001 and 2002.

Pat's remains will be brought from Tampere University to the Kiely Funeral Home in the near future. Funeral arrangements will be announced early next week.

Irish Music "Supergroup" Bohola To Play The Local And Mooneys

Irish music's accordion virtuoso Jimmy Keane and the remarkable bouzour player and vocalist Pat Broaders, who together are known as Bohola, Irish music's newest "supergroup" are set to play the Local Bar, Grattan Square, Dungarvan and Mooney's of Ring this weekend.

Bohola play a driving, muscular, and yet very emotive style of Irish music with deep roots in the 'pure drop' tradition, infused with the raw and gritty urbanized musical vernacular of the Irish and Irish-American experience.

Born in London of Irish-speaking parents, Jimmy Keane's accomplishments are far reaching. The son of a sean nos singer, he is All Ireland accordion champion for five consecutive years. He is a composer and arranger of Irish music and has produced and recorded numerous albums. Many regard Keane as the premier exponent of Irish music on the piano accordion. Noted University of Limerick Professor, composer, and musician Mícheál Ó Súilleabháin praised Keane as the "savior of the piano accordion." Emusic described him as "one of the true giants of Irish traditional music of the past fifty years."

Pat Broader arrived in Chicago

from Ireland in the 1990's. "Pat is a real veteran of the Irish music scene both here and abroad, playing, recording, and performing with many artists and bands over the years," said Keane. "Pat has this acute sense of music and rhythm that enables him to 'lock in' his bouzour (bass bouzouki & guitar hybrid) playing to whatever I might do musically and rhythmically. The synergy that results spurs on Bohola and draws in the audience. And his singing is brilliant - if I could sing, I'd love to sing like Pat."

In concert, Bohola perform music

selections that weave in and out between tunes and songs that can continue for twenty minutes or so, ever evolving and flowing. They play tunes that range from hundred-year-old harp pieces, reels, jigs, slides, polkas and barndances to newly composed pieces in the traditional idiom. And the songs run the gamut from the ancient melodies of Ireland, to songs brought to North America by immigrants, to newly composed songs from here and abroad. All played with a freshness and subtlety of approach that is unique in Irish music today.

"Conferences can be learning things," he acknowledged. "But at the moment, the way they are organised, they are certainly not."

"My motion got no support in the council chamber, and I think you have to question why. To my point of view, all it would have done, is provide transparency."

GOOD WORK

However, he believes 99% of the councillors are doing good work for the communities they serve.

"The public will see these expenses in the press, and the public will say the councillors are getting money for nothing again. That isn't the case. There is plenty of work being done."

"But for the public to appreciate that, it should be transparent. At the moment, I don't believe that around conferences, that it is transparent. If they are prepared to give up their weekends and go to a conference, surely they could write an A4 page on what happened at a conference and what benefit it will be to them as a councillor and to Waterford County Council."

"People around the country were aware I had a good general election performance. They saw that I was passionate about it, and they saw that I really wanted to get into the Senate and maybe long term to maybe help gain an extra Dail seat for Waterford."

He said the electioneering process was difficult: "It was the toughest interview of my life. You're meeting seasoned politicians, who literally sat you down and interviewed you, and you had to be able to stand up to that and respond. And they've obviously shown their confidence in me now."

The absence created by Coffey's retirement from the council is likely to be filled by someone close to the Coffey camp in Portlaw.

The only bear to live in the Arctic is the polar bear. Apart from the Polar bear, which feeds almost solely on fish, seals and walrus, bears eat a wide variety of plants and animals. Two animals often



thought to be bears are the panda and the koala. In fact, neither are bears, the panda is a relative of the racoon and the koala is a marsupial.

A Bear That Wears Spectacles
 The spectacled bear of the Andes is the only bear to live in South America. It has white or twany rings around its eyes which gave given rise to its name. In spite of the spectacles, this bear, in common with other bears, does not have very good eyesight but makes up for this by a good sense of smell.

The World's Biggest Bear
 The Kodiak bear, found on Kodiak Island and other nearby islands off Alaska, is the largest member of the bear family. An average adult male can be up to 2m (6.5ft) long and weight around 500kg (1,100 lb). In spite of the fact that it (in common with other bears) is classed as a carnivore (meat eater), its main diet is vegetable matter, although it does catch and eat salmon as they swim up river in the summer.

Bears Love Fish And Honey
 There are brown bears in Europe and Asia, although the number of brown bears in Europe is now quite low.



The brown bear loves honey and will open a wild hive to get at it, while ignoring the stinging bees. After eating the bear rolls on the ground or rubs itself against a tree to get rid of the bees. Brown bears will also go into a river to catch fish as do other bears.

O'Shea Criticises Undue Delay in Compensating Fishermen

Labour Party Spokesperson on Community Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs Brian O'Shea T.D. has strongly criticised the Department of Community Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs because of the undue delay in the putting in place of the €5m fund to compensate Fishermen in areas where commercial salmon fishing has ceased.

Deputy O'Shea is further concerned from information he has received from Minister Eamon O'Cuiv that the bulk of this money will be concentrated on the West Coast.

Deputy O'Shea's concern is that the South East region driftnet salmon fishermen will not do well out of this fund.

Minister O'Cuiv has informed Minister O'Shea that "The Government has introduced a €30 million hardship fund for the commercial fishermen and others affected by the ban on commercial salmon fishing. Of this, €25 million is being made

available to commercial licence holders who have suffered a loss of livelihood and the Inland Fisheries Division, now in the Department of Communication, Energy & natural Resources, is administering this."

"The remaining €5 million is to become a Community Support Scheme targeted at coastal communities affected by the ban. The money is not intended to compensate fishermen who can avail of the hardship fund but is instead to be a once-off community support to assist in diversification and short-term retraining. The funds are being weighed between fisheries districts on the basis of records of catch for the years 2001-2005 as held by the Inland Fisheries Division."

"Discussions are underway with the Inland Fisheries Divisions as to the administration and operating rules for such a scheme. When these have been agreed, the scheme will be advertised."

CINEMA REVIEW

The Simpsons*****

What the final Harry Potter book was for millions worldwide, *The Simpsons* movie is to fans of the story of Homer, Marge, Bart, Lisa, Maggie and the entire town of Springfield. On the air for almost two decades, with rumours of a movie flying around for most of that time, the most famous family in the world have finally made their big screen debut. The only question is; was it worth the wait?

As most of the best episodes do, the film revolves around the human catastrophe known as Homer. With Springfield's pollution levels at critical levels, Homer engages in a spot of dumping, along with his new pet Spiderpig, that pushes the town over the edge. The government, led by President Schwarzenegger, descend upon Springfield with the wrath of the Environmental Protection Agency. Homer has brought the town to the brink of disaster, will he be the one to save it?

Of course, *The Simpsons* was never a one man show. Happily we see character development for the entire family. Marge has to question her love for Homer and perhaps realise that he has taken one step too far this time. Bart tries to come to terms with the fact that Homer may not be the idol he has always looked up to. Lisa's efforts to save the town from environmental meltdown bring her in contact with Colin, a fellow eco-warrior who is also a dreamboat and a musical magician. Maggie even comes into her own, suggesting at times that she might outpace Lisa as the brains of the family. So not all is focused on Homer.

The gag rate of the movie also far exceeds the later series of the show. As the show has aged, a lot of the simple fun has left it. However, all is revived here, possibly due to so many of the older writers returning for the film. The laughs come so thick and fast that even when a joke fails, another one bowls along to keep you chuckling.

Quickly paced, the 85 minute running time seems to fly past while still leaving you fulfilled, a true sign that there are very few wasted moments in the entire movie. It's hard to think how they could have made a better Simpsons' movie and overall it must be said: Best cartoon-series offspin film ever!!!

Oh, no, you may think. Another cartoon based around the concept of modernising the great fairy tales. Enough already, surely, after the likes of *Shrek* and *Hoodwinked*. However, *Happily N'ever After* manages to trot the right side of the line between knowingly tongue-in-cheek comedy and cliched boredom. Sarah Michelle Gellar voices Ella, a girl who realises her stepmother Frieda (Sigourney Weaver) is leading a gang from the dark side to take over Fairy Tale Land. It is up to Ella to save the day, with some smart ups along the way.

Do you remember *Bruce Almighty*? If so, maybe you recall Steve Carell as Jim Carrey's newsreading rival? Well, Evan has just gone and found his own bit of godly intervention. God, in the shape of Morgan Freeman, charges Evan with the task of building an ark in preparation for another great flood. Carell is one of America's top comedians and is well worth the admission price for any film he is in, witness him stealing the show in both *Anchorman* and *Little Miss Sunshine*. Perhaps happily sparing us the overacting of Jim Carrey, this may even be an improvement on its vastly popular predecessor.

You need only take one look at Molly, at any stage of her life to know that she had a great passion for glamour and style. She even graced the catwalks in the 80's, with the likes of Celia Holman Lee and Olivia Treacy, when she modelled clothing for the more mature woman.

Above all, most important to Molly was her family and she had daily involvement with her 4 children. She was tragically predeceased by her daughter Shelia, her son John and her grand-daughter Jean. Molly was always very proud of her children, her grandchildren and great grandchildren and right up to the end, she was very tuned in to what was going on all around her.

Brid's Magnificent Exhibition Draws The Crowds

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan welcomed the many visitors to the town and to the exhibition and congratulated Biddy on what he said was a 'magnificent collection of paintings, the product of dedicated work and many hours in front of her easel'.

"You have chosen your special guest wisely," he said, referring to Chef, Paul Flynn, "because two things which go really well together are fine art and fine food." He concluded by wishing Brid every success with her exhibition and with what he was sure would be a very successful career ahead.

Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that 'launch' was a very appropriate word to use in the context of such a committed and distinctive artist as Brid, as she was clearly influenced by her native An Rinn and Dungarvan harbour.

"Brid Ni Chionnfhaoilaidh has captured a unique insight into our County through her artistic talent," he said, "and I commend her for that."

He said that as a member of Dungarvan Town Council he could confirm that the 1.5 million redevelopment of the Old Town Hall is well on course for its planned April 2008 conclusion.

"The ground floor will house the Museum Society," he continued, "while there will be a 150 seat theatre on the second floor with storage and other facilities on the top floor. Over 90% of this budget has been generated by the Town Council through the sale of a land holding."

"For Brid in her role as a mother, painter and teacher, I trust this new Town Hall can accommodate her in each and all of her three busy roles."

"To paint and exhibit and build collections is also a very difficult and demanding business," he continued, "and Brid needs to be supported as a local Waterford inspired business and I appeal to businesses and individuals to support Taispeantas '07 by purchasing one of the many fine and distinctive paintings in the Exhibition."

He congratulated Brid and wished her every success with her most recent venture and in the future in her three demanding roles.

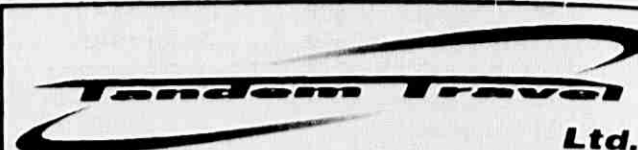

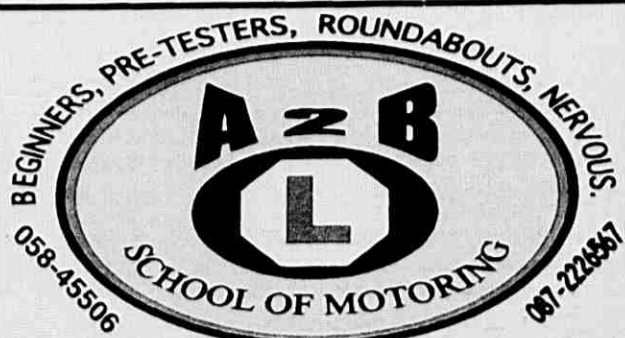

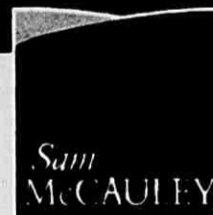

CHERNOBYL AID IRELAND CELEBRATES TEN YEARS

This Saturday will see Humanitarian Aid Leader Liam Grant celebrate the tenth anniversary of Chernobyl Aid Ireland, an organisation he set up in 1997 to bring humanitarian aid to those affected by the Chernobyl disaster, one of the worst accidents in the history of nuclear power.

Each year, under the solid leadership of Liam Grant of Chernobyl Aid Ireland, two convoys travel to Belarus in a bid to improve living conditions in Grosovo Orphanage, 110kms south of Minsk.

Locals including Kevin Bannon and Tony O'Sullivan were part of the April convoy which saw them drive to Chernobyl and deliver much needed building equipment.

The anniversary party will take place on Saturday, 4th August at 3pm in Jack Meade's pub, Waterford and everyone is welcome to attend. A barbeque, live entertainment and children's entertainment is organised for the evening. Volunteers, families and supporters from the Dungarvan and surrounding areas are due to gather to celebrate the efforts of Liam Grant and his organisation this Saturday. All host families especially are invited to attend with your families.

During his April convoy, Liam was recognised by the Belarussian government for his humanitarian work over these past ten years and his dedication to Grosovo. He was presented with an award on behalf of the people of Belarus. Liam spends twelve weeks working voluntarily in Grosovo each year followed by extensive work back in Ireland preparing, planning and fundraising.

Speaking of the past ten years, Liam said, "Chernobyl Aid Ireland is about helping those less well off in Belarus. It's about giving something back. It's about realising that these children need our help, and most of all that we can give it. Everyone can become a volunteer if they so wish and that when you see the smiles on the kid's faces when you arrive you'll know it was worthwhile."

Groups of volunteers including builders, tradesmen, dentists, nurses, cooks and those from other professions join forces in a bid to assist Liam in his efforts. Speaking of the volunteers, Liam said, "We've had amazing support from people from all walks of life from Dungarvan over the past ten years. There's no qualification needed to work with Chernobyl Aid Ireland. If you're hard working and want to help, you're welcome."

Each year, Liam also arranges for the Belarussian children to visit Ireland and stay with Irish families. While here, the children receive medical and dental checkups and enjoy a normal life with these families.

Preparations are now taking place for the September convoy which will see Liam pack his bags and truck again for the long road to Grosovo.

Tickets for the event cost €20 for adults and €5 for children.

Mortgage / Legal Terms Explained

Bridging Loan A short-term loan to a person who has bought a new home before selling their current one. The loan is paid off in full when the current home is eventually sold.

Equity Release Equity is the difference between the amount of money owing on your mortgage and the current value of your home. Equity release allows you borrow up to 90% of the current value of your home, for practically any number of purposes.

Fixed Rates This fixes your repayments at your chosen rate for the period of your chosen term regardless what happens on the variable rate market.

Folio This is a document describing:
The property registered and refers to a plan on the registry maps.
The registered owner.

Any burdens (charges, right of way) which may affect the property.

Home Insurance Protection against risks like fire, theft and malicious damage is key to peace of mind. When looking to insure your home and possessions, some items are categorised as 'buildings' such as fitted furniture and anything that is plumbed in. Other items are treated as contents. The easiest way to make sure everything is covered is to insure both building and contents under one policy.

Income Protection Policy A type of insurance policy which pays out if your income is reduced or stopped because of redundancy, sickness or accident.

Interest Only Mortgage You pay only the interest on your mortgage and pay off the money borrowed at the end of its term.

Land Registry The Land Registry deals with the registration of ownership. The register is conclusive evidence of the title of the person whose name appears on it. Most agricultural land in Ireland is registered in the Land Registry.

LTV This stands for Loan to Value. It describes the percentage size of the loan based on the value of the property. For example, if you owe €100,000 on your mortgage and your house is worth €200,000, your LTV is said to be 50%. The lower the LTV is in your property the better the mortgage interest rate you can get.

Life Assurance If you die before you've paid off the mortgage, the life assurance is designed to cover what is still owed. Subject to limited exceptions, it is a legal requirement to have life assurance when taking out a mortgage

Mortgage
A legal document that pledges a property to the lender as security for payment of a debt.

Mortgage Interest Relief This is tax relief that you can claim on mortgage interest payments. People buying for the first time are entitled to the highest amount of relief. From 1 January 2002, qualifying tax relief for mortgage interest has been applied at source by your mortgage lender.

Negative Equity Occurs where the loan amount outstanding exceeds the market value of the property. For example, you owe €100,000 on your house but it is only worth €80,000. You are said to have negative equity of €20,000.

Offset Mortgages Offset or all in one mortgages allow you to offset the balance of your mortgage, and any other borrowings you have, against any money you have in a savings and/or current account that's held with the same lender. All your borrowings and savings may be combined in one account.

Overpayment A mortgage repayment bigger than the one needed to meet the loan's minimum requirements. This can help reduce the term of the mortgage.

Rebuild Value/Re-instatement Cost The cost to rebuild your home from scratch including demolition of existing structures.

Redemption The word used to describe a mortgage when it is repaid.

Re-mortgage A mortgage that is a replacement loan for another mortgage.

Repayment Mortgage The traditional type of mortgage where repayments are made up of both interest and principal.

Retention A condition of a mortgage where the lender holds back a portion of the loan pending work to be carried out by the mortgagor.

Split Rate You can set a portion of your mortgage at fixed rate and the balance on variable. This gives a 'best of both worlds' scenario.

Stamp Duty An amount of money you have to pay to the government when you buy a property.

Structural Survey A comprehensive and detailed assessment of the condition of the property carried out by a qualified surveyor. It can identify defects that would not be evident from a valuation of the property.

Term The number of years over which the mortgage loan is arranged. Re-mortgagors borrowing against the value in their homes for other assets can avail of split terms, where the term can be tailored to suit the life of the asset bought e.g. 5 years for a car.

Tracker Mortgage Matches movements in the European Central Bank base rate by a certain percentage depending on the loan to value of your property

Valuation An inspection of the property by a valuer to establish its suitability for mortgage purposes. A valuation should not be confused with a structural survey.

Variable Rate Your monthly repayments may fall or rise from time to time in line with general market interest rates.





PLAYING CLUB FIXTURES: A BETTER DEAL FOR PLAYERS

This is the title of a discussion

paper on the subject of preparing a better programme of games for club players. The paper, prepared by Player Welfare Officer Paraic Duffy is intended to be a discussion document around which clubs and counties can debate the problems in club hurling fixtures. Incidentally, I got hold of this document through a club in County Tyrone. All clubs in Tyrone have received the discussion paper. As far as I am aware Waterford clubs have yet to receive the document from the county board.

It is a comprehensive document with 19 discussion points on issues affecting club players. Many of these issues we have raised on the Tallow GAA notes, with some frustration I can tell you, over the last ten years.

At the request of Pat Daly, Director of Games, Paraic Duffy made a presentation to the 2006 National Coaching/Medical Conference on the subject of providing a better programme of games for club players. Subsequently the Player Welfare Manager was asked by the Ard Stiruthoir and an tUachtaran to develop that presentation and to prepare a discussion paper. GAA president Nicky Brennan is well aware of the problems club players face and has on a number of occasions indicated his intention to address the issue. Indeed he gave such an undertaking in person to members of this club on our visit to Tyrone last year. Hopefully this discussion paper represents the first serious step in an effort to improve the lot of club players.

Submissions are invited from interested parties. As Paraic Duffy says: "Complaining about the current situation, without offering possible solutions, is no longer an option." The discussion paper may be available on the GAA website. If not we are happy to provide any interested clubs.

The further Waterford advance in the championship the further from the centre line the real supporters find themselves.

In the early rounds of the league campaign, which only the hard core supporters attended, we had our choice of seats and had

no bother securing the best vantage point on the half way line. By the latter stages of the league campaign as Waterford qualified for the semi final and then the final we found ourselves significantly to the left or right of centre. Come the first round of the championship the move was on in earnest. We were on the 40 yard line rapidly heading for goal. At the Munster final we were stuck behind a pole on the 21 yard, surrounded by familiar faces from clubs throughout the west. The prime seats in the centre sections were occupied by largely unfamiliar faces, many of whom never crossed the threshold of a GAA dressing room or the turnstile at a club game in their lives. The banishment to the extremities continued last week for the quarter final as many grass roots supporters found themselves in the bleachers. The poor quality of tickets allocated to clubs has many people complaining. Please don't take it out on your local club. We have to take what we get and what we are getting is not good. The clubs operate a free distribution network for the GAA. This method of distribution should ensure that those most deserving, who are doing the donkey work on the ground should get some quality of ticket. It's not happening because the better tickets are siphoned off and not getting as far as the club. Along the way the GAA equivalent of the "prawn sandwich brigade" who have friends or business associates with access to good tickets are getting in on the act.

I am told that in some cases you could buy better tickets through ticketmaster than what was available from clubs. A couple of years ago, having left my tickets at home, I purchased tickets at the ticket wagon on the side of the street in Dublin. They were far better than those I had received through the club.

There are 19 discussion points on the paper presented by Paraic Duffy on a "better deal for club players." Could I suggest we add Discussion point 20 which might look at all the criteria used in deciding allocation of tickets to clubs and others. A better deal for the club supporter.

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Lamb and watercress

THIS is a stunningly English variation of lasagne, using the best spring lamb and tasty watercress. Watercress can now be bought at any time of year from supermarkets. If vacuum-packed it keeps unopened for up to five days, but wilts quickly when exposed to the air. If you buy bunches of watercress, store them upside down, with the leaves plunged in cold water.

- Ingredients:**
 Serves 4-6
 450g minced lamb
 2 large onions, skinned and finely chopped
 2 bunches of watercress, trimmed and finely chopped
 2 tsp dried oregano
 7 tbsp plain flour
 300ml lamb or chicken stock
 50ml dry white wine
 25g butter
 Salt and pepper
 568ml fresh milk
 176g Lancashire cheese, crumbled
 225g oven-ready lasagne verdi

Method:
 BROWN the lamb well in its own fat in a large saucepan. Pour off the excess fat. Add the onion and cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the watercress, oregano and 2 tbsp of the flour. Cook for 1-2 minute, then gradually stir in the stock and wine and season



with salt and pepper to taste. Bring to the boil, then simmer gently, uncovered, for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Put the butter, remaining flour and milk in a saucepan. Heat, whisking continuously, until the sauce thickens, boils and is smooth. Simmer for 1-2 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat and stir in 100g of the cheese, stir until melted and season to taste with salt and pepper. Layer the mince mixture with the uncooked lasagne in a fairly deep oven-proof serving dish. Spoon over the cheese sauce. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Bake at 190°C (375°F) Gas Mark 5 for about 40 minutes, until browned. Serve hot straight from the dish with a fresh green salad.

Broad bean and bacon soup

THIS is an unusual way to serve any excess broad beans, which are often very underrated in the kitchen. Their flavour is delicate, and the beans are especially good when used very young and tender. They are only in season from late May to August, but you can use frozen beans or peas when the fresh vegetables are not available. This is a thick soup- to whet the appetite on a bright spring day, perfect after a brisk walk in the fresh air. Some of the vegetables are pureed and the rest left whole for an interesting texture.

- Ingredients:**
 Serves 4 (as a starter)

- 225g shelled broad beans
 225g shelled peas
 1 large onion, skinned and chopped
 450ml fresh milk
 300ml vegetable stock
 Salt and pepper
 2 rashers back bacon, rinded, grilled and finely chopped to garnish
- Method:**
 In a large saucepan, simmer the broad beans, peas and onion in the milk and stock to 20 minutes, until the beans are tender. Puree one-third of the soup in a blender or food processor and add to the remaining soup.
 Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Reheat the soup gently before it is served piping hot, garnished with chopped bacon.

Dreamy banana cremé brûlée

A CREAMY, dreamy dessert to satisfy your custard fantasies.

- Ingredients:**
 Serves 8
 450ml double cream
 1 vanilla pod
 2 bananas
 6 egg yolks
 100g caster sugar
 A little demerara sugar.

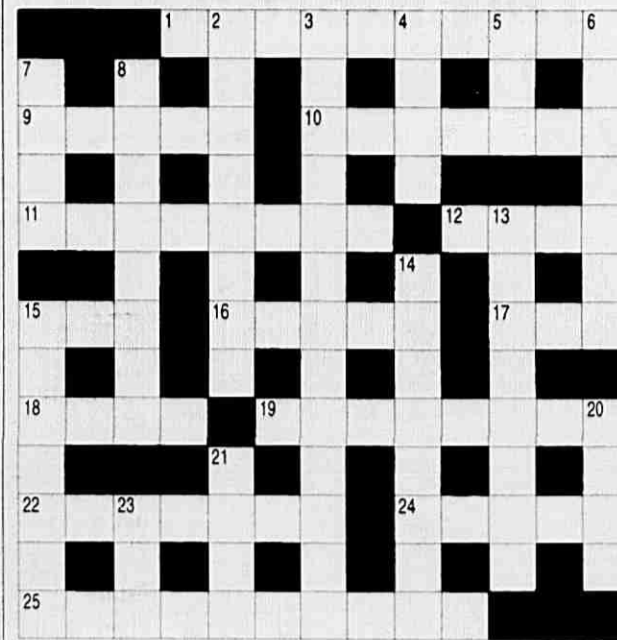
Method:
 Put the cream and the vanilla in a medium saucepan and slowly bring to the boil. Remove from the heat just before the cream boils.

Split the pod in half and scrape out the seeds with the point of a knife. Slice the bananas thickly and divide between 8 small ramekins. Put the egg yolks, caster sugar and vanilla seeds in a mixing bowl and beat until thick and creamy. Pour the

hot milk on to the egg and sugar mixture and stir. Rinse out the milk pan, dry and pour in the custard. Heat, stirring slowly and almost constantly, until the mixture thickens. Bear in mind that if you make certain that the spoon gets right into the corners of the pan, you run less risk of the custard curdling, and on no account let the mixture boil, otherwise the custard will scramble. Pour the custard through a sieve into the little dishes, filling them right to the top. Set aside to cool, then refrigerate overnight. Dust the top of the custard with a thin layer of demerara, then place under a very, very hot grill for a few seconds until the sugar melts to a shiny caramel. Leave to cool and harden.

Explain what Mortgage Interest Relief is and how it reduces my monthly mortgage repayments?

Mortgage interest relief is given to you by the state through the collector general's office. It is based mainly on the amount of interest you pay on your mortgage and whether your mortgage is in single or joint names. Mortgage interest relief can substantially reduce your monthly mortgage repayments. In the last budget the government doubled the maximum amount of mortgage interest relief to €266 per month for a joint mortgage and €133 for a mortgage in the name of one person. One of the major benefits is that the mortgage interest relief is actually deducted from your monthly repayment before the repayment is taken by direct debit from your bank account. For example if your repayment was €1200 per month and the mortgage interest relief was €220 per annum. Of course as the amount of your mortgage reduces, the amount of mortgage interest relief you receive reduces also over the term of your mortgage.

If you have a mortgage and you are not sure if you are receiving your mortgage interest relief you can call the Collector General at 1890463626 with your PPS number and your mortgage account number and confirm how much you are receiving. You should then also contact your lender and ask them how much mortgage interest relief you are receiving to ensure the amount matches what the collector general said. If you are not receiving your mortgage interest relief the collector general's office can send you a claim form to backdate the amount owned and to you and to commence your mortgage interest relief.

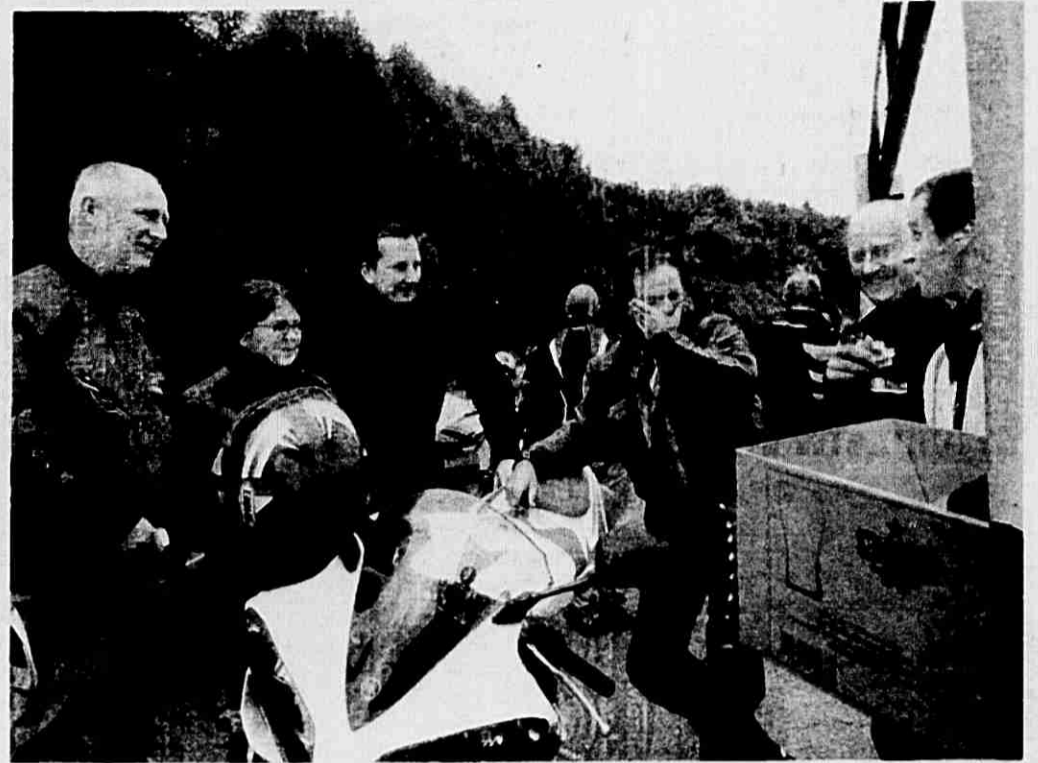

Summer tips for success

To the untrained eye, summer is the time when a garden is at its best and so take a closer look.

A summer garden has to suffer a multitude of batterings from various sources.

Days are scorching hot and nights quite cold if there is no cloud cover.

Kids are playing games and trampling on flower beds, smoke and ash from barbecues pollute the air, and bugs and pests are taking advantage of plant weaknesses.

Follow these top tips on how to look after your garden in the warmer months.

Watering can be fatal to some species if you do it at the wrong time.

Water, just like glass, magnifies the sunlight and burns, so avoid watering during the day.

Early morning, 6am to 8am, is optimum watering time, but if you aren't a morning person, go for early-evening watering.

If you want a colourful garden full of life and bloom, try sprinkling Epsom salts everywhere.

Salts will stimulate new growth, and can be sprinkled in solid form or dissolved in water and applied to the plant.

Feed your flowers all summer long with a liquid fertiliser that is rich in phosphorous and your plants will thrive when it comes to blooming.

August is also a great month for drying flowers and herbs.

For lasting beauty, after cutting, place the flowers in a vase with an inch of water in a cool, dry place.

As the water slowly evaporates the flowers will dry and stay lovely for months.

Snails and slugs are everyone's least favourite pest. In wet weather they will attack your garden and destroy your plants, so use a natural slug/snail repellent to combat the problem.

Keep the application fresh by re-applying every week or so, more often during rainy weather. Apply sparingly, but scatter well - snails

and slugs can travel amazing distances considering how slowly they move!

Ponds need extra care in the summer too. Keep your pond in the shade as much as possible and this will help prevent a blooming of algae, and also provide a good growing atmosphere for plants like lilies and water lettuce.

When mowing your lawn, first check for items such as sticks, rocks and toys. Make sure nothing is hidden in the grass.

Raise your mower's height setting to help prevent and control weeds. Longer grass is healthier, develops a better root system and stands up through drought. Follow this easy rule and never cut off more than one third of the leaf height at any one time.

When you cut grass short, there is less leaf to bring sunlight and water to the roots.

Water your lawn to keep it healthy and prevent burning. Never cut grass when it is wet.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Ripen off onions — Onions from January and March sowings will now be approaching ripeness, and you can hasten this by bending over the leaves just above the neck of each bulb.

Pot winter flowering begonias — If you were able to root cuttings of winter flowering begonias in late winter, the plants should now be about ready for potting on into their flowering pots.

Cut back violas and pansies for propagation — It is an excellent idea to cut back a few plants of any good violas and pansies you may have with a view to encouraging basal growth which will provide cuttings next month. Scissor off the present flowering shoots to within 2.5cm of the roots. Then scatter a little fine soil mixed with sand and sifted leaf mould over the plants.

Sow cyclamen — It is possible to raise cyclamen from seed sown very early in the year and flower the plants the following winter. However, the best results are obtained by sowing about the middle of August and keeping the seedlings growing steadily, throughout the following autumn, winter, spring and summer so they make fine big corms for flowering the following autumn and winter.

Take pelargonium cuttings — You can take cuttings of both zonal and ivy-leaved bedding pelargoniums (geraniums) at any time during August. Choose shoots 10 to 13cm long that are not carrying flowers. Sever them cleanly just below a joint and insert the cuttings around the edge of well drained pots filled with sandy compost.

The cuttings will root quickly if you stand them in a frame and shade them from direct sunshine, but they can also be rooted in any reasonably sheltered place indoors or out.

Continue to remove faded flowers and runners — Throughout August continue to remove faded flowers from roses and bedding and herbaceous plants.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Who is entitled to claim a Bereavement Grant in the event of a death?

ANSWER

The Bereavement Grant is a payment to assist with funeral or other expenses following a death. The grant of €850 is usually paid to the person responsible for these expenses. Eligibility usually depends on the number of PRSI (Pay-Related Social Insurance) contributions that have been made over a certain period of time. You may also be eligible based on entitlement to certain social welfare payments.

The PRSI requirement can be met by the PRSI payments of either the deceased person or their spouse or partner. In the case of the death of a child under 18 years of age (or under 22 if in full-time education), the PRSI contributions of their parent or guardian are taken into account.

The grant is also payable on the death of:

A contributory pensioner, their spouse or partner, or someone for whom they received a qualified child allowance or qualified adult allowance

An orphan for whom a Guardian's Payment (Contributory) was being paid, or their guardian

The widow or widower of a deceased insured person
From May 2007, the grant is payable on the death of a person aged between 16 and 22 who was receiving Disability Allowance

To apply for the Bereavement Grant, contact your local Social Welfare Office or telephone Lo-call 1890 500 000.

Other grants available following a death include the Widowed Parent Grant, for widows or widowers with dependent children, and the Special Funeral Grant which may be claimed under the Occupational Injuries Benefit Scheme where a death results from a work-related accident or disease.

SCHOOL COSTS

Back to school is the furthest thing from most people's minds at a time when the sun begins to shine and the children begin their summer holidays. Yet, by thinking of it now, you may be able to relieve some of the hardship associated with it in a few months time. For most parents, September brings huge bills. Books, bags, uniforms, runners... the list seems endless. If there are a few children in the house, maybe with someone starting secondary school or a Post Leaving Certificate or Regional College or University, the costs seem insurmountable.

To cope with all this, REGULAR SAVING is the answer. It's much better to save, hard as it may seem at the time, than to try to borrow the money at the last minute. There is a huge range of options for this. Post Office, Credit Unions, Banks etc.

Most of the shops, which supply schoolbooks, offer saving schemes, as do many of the retailers for school uniforms and clothes.

If your income is particularly low, you may be entitled to the "Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance". This is a special supplementary payment that exists to help ease the financial pressure at the beginning of the school year. To apply, contact your local Community Welfare Officer between June 1st. and September 30th.

Ann Allridge - An Appreciation

Although Ann was born in London her real home was in Abbey-side and she was delighted to return permanently in 1970. She worked in the office of Michael Moloney's Hardware in T.F. Meagher Street for 35 years.

She renovated and rebuilt an old cottage which had been the family home at Knockateemore. Here she created a wonderful garden and on a visit some weeks ago she commented on the plum tree which was laden down with fruit. Because of her illness she was unable to work in the garden and this was a great disappointment to her. Dedicated gardeners out there will know what a blow this must have been.

During world War II Ann's mother brought the family to Abbey-side to escape the worst of the Blitz. However Ann recalled that her mother became rather cross listening to complaints from the Dungarvan folk about the inconvenience of the war and decided to return to London. A brave decision!

'We missed the sirens and the gas mask drill

We missed our friends and even missed the thrill

Of rushing down into our shelter deep

And listening to the booming guns while drifting off to sleep'

(Evacuees by Ann Allridge)

During this period she became great friends with Donal Whelan, son of Pax Whelan. Ann told me that before returning to London they vowed to write to each other every week - a ritual they continued for the rest of their lives. Ann had many interesting stories to tell. She informed me that Ernie O'Malley had written part of his autobiography (On Another Man's Wound 1935) at Pax Whelan's house.

Ann developed a great interest in military history and particularly in the stories of county Waterford men who were involved in both wars. Whenever a military query was submitted to the museum (and there were many over the years) Ann was consulted. She enthusiastically replied to every query with the relevant information.

She loved books and literature and wrote poems under the pen name Sylvia Burke. Abbeyside reference Archive published a collection of her work. She contributed many articles to the Abbey-side Parish Newsletter. Ann also loved art and painted in oil and watercolour. She was thrilled to see the painting by Sarah Purser which had been donated recently to Waterford County Museum by the Friends of the National Collections.

Last year Ann realised a dream by finally going on a trip to Venice. In spite of her illness the beauty of the city invigorated her and she found the energy to visit the historic sites and attend mass in St. Mark's Basilica. She was delighted it lived up to all her expectations.

We were all shocked when we learned of Ann's death. Ann was a very able secretary to the Museum Society for over four years. She was full of enthusiasm for the new project to renovate the museum in its old home at the Town Hall and was looking forward next year to seeing the finished project.

A guard of honour was provided by members of the Museum Society flanking the hearse from the Kiely Funeral home to Abbey-side church where members of Abbeyside Archive flanked the entrance to the church. There was a simple and moving service at which one of Ann's poems - Goodbye to Abbeyside was read which was written in the style of John Betjeman.

We were very kindly invited back to the Abbeyside Archive office where we were given refreshments. A big thank you to Fintan and all the staff for the warm welcome. I would like to end this piece with another moving poem by Ann.

Last Resting Place

I may die in a foreign land,
Far from Irish fields and hills,
And icy rock-strewn mountain rills
That flow down to a golden strand.
If you are near on my last day,
Listen to my heart's desire
And play no dirge on mellow lyre,
But bury me in Irish clay.
There my soul will rest at ease
Where early falls the diamond dew
Upon the misty Comeraghs blue,
Blessed by a gentle Irish breeze.
Lay me to rest in Abbeyside
From whence I never more can roam.
My clay will be in clay of home
Where curlews cry at eventide. —W.F.

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

The Union Workhouse - Now St. Joseph's Hospital - The construction began in 1839 and was completed in the summer of 1841, designed by George Wilkinson in a Tudor/Elizabethan style it was capable of housing 600. The building was divided into 3 sections: The entrance building housed the board room, clerks office waiting room and porter's office. Behind this was the main building which contained the school rooms, wards for elderly and infirm. The center block were the master's and matron's apartments, connected to this block was a long, narrow building with the kitchen, dining hall and chapel. This section connected with the final part of the complex, the Infirmary.

The rear of the workhouse is Father Toomy's Well, called after the Augustinian priest Father Patrick Toomy. Tradition records that he blessed the dead with water from this well as they were taken from the workhouse for burial at Kilrush and later at Reilig An tSleibhe.

Where are we? — When have moved up to the 2nd (second) floor above Quasi Lankar, just turn to your left as you enter, then use the elevator and we are there!

PRUDENT MEAL FEEDING TO WEANLINGS FOR SALE WILL PAY

Live exports of weanlings so far this year are back by on last year. However average beef weanling prices for export are similar to last year even though the prediction was for lower prices due to lower demand on the continent. We can do little to influence price but we can do plenty about weanling performance. The cost of meal has soared since last year so weanlings being kept on the farm need only be trained to eat meal before weaning for health reasons.

But when weanlings are going on the scales either for export or home sale meal feeding will still pay. The huge levels of meal fed to weanlings on some farms in recent years has never paid for itself and it will be an even bigger loser this year. Weanlings with access to an ad lib feeder can consume 4-5 kgs per day. Feeding 1-2 kgs of meal you get a kg liveweight gain per 5 kgs of meal fed. However when you move to the higher level of feeding, 5 kgs the response to the extra meal is much poorer. At this high level of meal feeding it will take 10 kgs of meal to get a kg liveweight and this clearly does not pay.

LEVEL OF MEAL TO FEED.

You can save on expensive meal by giving calves access to the best grass. This means training them to creep graze ahead of the cows. Well worth the effort.

High quality weanlings suitable for the export trade give the best response and bulls give a better response than heifers.

Start with a small quantity and build up so that well muscled bulls are getting up to 3 kgs per day by sale date. Heifers up to 2 kgs per day.

Where weanlings have lower potential for growth and grass is good – meal feeding until just before weaning is adequate. The cost of meal versus grass is really in sharp focus now. We must be prudent with meal and put the effort into having quality grass.

Healthy lungs and a healthy stomach are essential in getting optimum weaning performance from meal and grass. Relative to meal the cost of controlling hoose and stomach worms is small.

RAPE FOR THE SPRING.

The soaring cost of meals is generalizing huge interest in the growing of alternatives such as kale and rapes. From now on fodder rape should be the choice.

Rape is a cheap and easy crop to grow. It can ideally be sown after a cereal crop, or by just disking/grubbing the surface. The real bonus is that it can be fed in situ thereby reducing labour. And it matches grass in terms of cost of production – being half the cost of silage and 1/4 the cost of meals. Contact Teagasc for further information.

REACH FOR THE STARS.

If you reach for the stars you won't come down with mud. That's what I like about the milk solids target being set for the dairy cow. 500 kgs of milk solids per lactation averaged over the herd. It is certainly reaching for the stars. But to achieve it a cow would need to be milking close to 1,400 gallons with a butter fat of 4.1% and average protein of 3.6%. Hence the 500 kg milk solids is made up of 266 kg fat and 234 kg protein. 500 kgs of milk solids is being achieved on Curtin's farm in Moorepark.

No doubt many farmers have individual cows producing 500 kgs of milk solids. The challenge is to achieve this as the herd average. To achieve such a target demands excellent standards in breeding, fertility, EBI, grassland management. But the key area highlighted at the recent Moorepark Open Day was the February to April period. This is where many herds have to reach for the stars. Early compact calving with April calvers kept to a minimum.

500 kg milk solids average for the herd is an ambitious target. But every dairy farmer should do the sums to establish his/her current average milk solids per cow. Then dig deeper and see where you can improve. Do that and you are on the road to achieving the magical 500.

REPS 4

The long awaited Reps 4 was approved at EU level last week. But it will be a few weeks before application forms are available. Meanwhile farmers wishing to join Reps 4 should contact their Teagasc office.

Reps 4 will largely be the same as Reps 3 with some notable differences. There will be a 17% increase in payments with the number of biodiversity options increasing from six to fifteen for which there will be additional payments.

Farmers Are Right To Demand Independent Milk Testing For Constituents-Only Payment

With moves to change milk pricing systems to remunerate farmers exclusively for the constituents in their milk, co-ops must act on their suppliers' demands for independence on milk testing and full transparency on pricing, says IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Richard Kennedy.

Milk testing in Ireland is far from satisfactory. Ireland is the only major dairy country where milk testing is carried out by the purchasers of the milk, with minimal checks and balances. I suspect there is no other sector of the economy where the seller of a product would leave the assessment of the product value entirely to the buyer.

It is in the best interests of both the milk supplier and the milk purchaser to have a milk testing system they can both have complete confidence in.

What is wrong with milk testing in Ireland?

Quite apart from the fundamental issue of the buyer being the tester, milk testing in Ireland is not carried out to best international practice.

Milk testing is too infrequent. A farmer's monthly supply is generally measured on the basis of 3 to 4 tests, in some cases taken within a few days of each other, which could misrepresent the farmer's normal production pattern. Ignoring rogue results for payment becomes difficult with so few tests, and they have little farm management value.

Procedures are not well defined, so that queries and problems can take months to resolve. Reports, real or imagined, of results improving or of intimidation after a farmer complains, have done little to improve farmers' confidence in milk testing procedures.

Laboratories and equipment are of variable quality, calibration can be an issue, and many co-op labs need upgrading. With the exception of the Glanbia laboratory in Dungarvan, no Irish milk testing lab is accredited to international standards under ISO 17025.

Checks and balances currently carried out by the Department of Agriculture and through the Moorepark ring-tests are neither extensive nor frequent enough to be much addition.

Finally, the handling by co-ops of farmers' complaints is frequently confrontational instead of practical and scientific. The IFA Split Sampling Procedure is often offered to get rid of a problem rather than solve it.

The overall effect of these shortfalls is a chronic negative perception of milk testing in most co-ops, and a general lack of farmer confidence.

Why do we need independent milk testing and transparency?

If we are to improve our competitiveness to face into a freer, more volatile era in dairy markets, we need to be able to measure every aspect of our activity, from grass management to input costs to production performance. Milk testing is crucial in this.

With the introduction of new pricing systems focussing exclusively on constituents – such as the A+B-C formula – and with new bonuses and penalties linked to somatic and bacterial counts, lactose, heat resistant bacteria and others, farmers are right to demand accurate and reliable milk payment test results which are at the very minimum independently verified and open to query.

It is perfectly logical and legitimate to suggest that this type of payment systems should only

come in conjunction with significant improvements in our milk testing system's credibility – including a clear commitment to the ultimate introduction of independent milk testing.

It is also legitimate for farmers to expect that the "C" element of the A+B-C formula, the amount which is deducted to cover the cost of handling and processing volume, would also be subject to proper scrutiny to secure transparency.

The IFA's 4-point plan towards independent milk testing

IFA is committed to working towards central independent testing. With this in mind, the IFA has put forward the following 4-point plan, which we are currently promoting with co-ops.

Increased monitoring of testing by the Department

This was agreed at IFA's demand under the Partnership Deal. Good progress has been made with the Department accepting IFA's demands for improved monitoring and increased frequency of checking of both protein and butterfat tests, as well as other elements such as SCC and lactose. As requested by IFA, the Department will publish the results of their monitoring.

Greater involvement of farmer committees in co-ops

Elected farmers in co-op advisory committees must have ultimate responsibility for milk testing, defining procedures and helping take the aggravation out of individual farmers' queries.

Milk testing should be extended to every collection for payment and farm management purposes. Results must be returned very promptly through truck, text or internet, followed by a comprehensive monthly report.

Accreditation of all new or refurbished laboratories under

ISO 17025

Co-ops must reduce laboratory numbers by sharing them and investing together where refurbishment is required. Any such common investment must result in full international accreditation to ISO 17025 standards of the refurbished lab.

Notification, training and follow up on farm

Any milk payment change proposed by co-ops, such as the introduction of the A+B-C formula, must be notified well in advance to dairy farmers, by indicating on milk statements for a period of at least 1 year prior to implementation the outcome of both the new and the current payment system.

Farmers must receive advice, training and follow-up from the co-op to best maximise the outcome of the new payment system for their enterprise.

For too many years, milk testing has been a subject of conflict and acrimony, a political subject rather than a matter of science.

The cost of independent testing has been used by co-ops to frighten farmers away from it.


I cannot believe that a single central independent laboratory would cost more than the 20 milk testing labs currently operating in the country.

The cost that never gets mentioned is the cost to farmers of an inadequate milk testing system!

In a more competitive environment without market supports, nothing should distract farmers and processors from achieving the best outcome from the market place.

Independent milk testing is the norm in the majority of milk producing countries. Irish dairy farmers must demand that it becomes the norm for them too.

Now is the time to start making it happen.

LONG SEASON COMING TO AN END

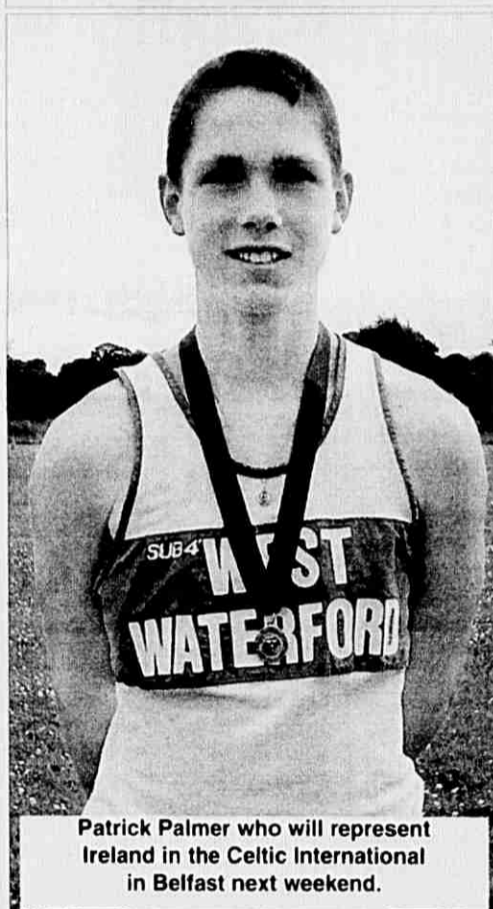

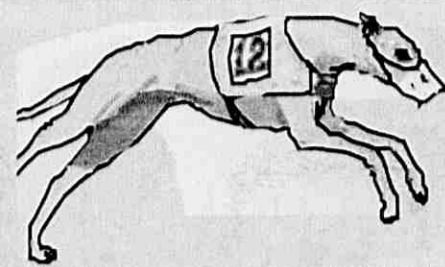

Ex-Celtic Star Turns United's Top Poacher

Vinny Sullivan is Waterford Utd's leading goalscorer and arguably the local eircom league sides' most coveted player. Here as part of the Dungarvan Leader's continuing series on Waterford Utd's growing West Waterford connection, he talks to reporter Kevin Kirrane about his experiences with Glasgow Celtic and Livingston, and reveals his reasons for leaving and returning to the Blues during a turbulent time two years ago.

Vinny Sullivan is back where it all started. We meet at Dungarvan Utd's clubhouse in their impressive football complex, which itself, is just a matter of a minutes walk away from his home where he grew up in Kilrush.

He began playing for Dungarvan Utd at the age of nine before a true footballing odyssey would bring him to Glasgow Celtic, play a string of first team games for Livingston in the Scottish Premier Division, before returning home again and to Waterford Utd where he has quickly become a firm fans favourite and, at the age of just

25, one of the most experienced players on the side.

Vinny, who plays a striker, fired his way from Dungarvan through the age ranks to the Waterford Youth team. His ability captured attention, and he quickly went onto represent the Munster U17 team.

But it was at a tournament in which the four provinces played against each other in Dublin that Vinny secured every schoolboy players dream move, a chance to play for one of Britain's biggest clubs.

Scouts from the Premiership and Scotland were impressed by the Dungarvan lad's ability, and he went on trial to Crystal Palace and Celtic while Middlesboro were also interested.

Celtic won the race to sign Vinny and he signed a three-year contract. It was a dream move for the then 17 year old.

"I suppose for any Irish young lad growing up, Celtic is their second favourite team apart from the big Premiership teams. So it was a massive honour to sign for them," he says of the move.

It was a big year. The same year, he represented the

Republic of Ireland at U17 level where he played in a weeklong international tournament.

He immediately slotted into the Celtic Youth team where he played for two years winning the prestigious Youth Cup in his first season and the finishing top scorer in a side which took League and Glasgow Cup honours in his second, before moving on, in his third year, to the reserves.

He said, "The set-up at Celtic was good. There were a lot of Irish lads there at the time. It was like home from home really. There was Jim Goodwin from Tramore, there was Colin Healy from Cork, there were boys from Dublin and Northern Ireland."

However, Vinny's stay at Celtic coincided with a turbulent few years for the club. He was signed while Josef Venglos was manager, but over the following few years, John Barnes and Kenny Dalglish came and went, before the club finally found stability and eventually success under Martin O'Neill.

O'Neill cleared the decks and Vinny was unfortunate to be

one of the players not to have his contract renewed. It was a huge disappointment, although it's clear he still has great respect for a manager who has brought unprecedented success to the club.

He came home for a period, before the opportunity of a quick return to Scotland came on the horizon. That was in the form of Livingston under Jim Leishman. Livingston offered him a one-year contract after being promoted the year before. He admits it was probably the wrong time to go, as the club were struggling to establish themselves. The club survived, but the squad was pared down to the bones, and despite doing well and making a number of first team appearances, Vinny was released.

He returned home to Ireland, joining up first with Cork City, who offered him a full-time contract. But Vinny says the offer didn't really seem the right option for him at the time, and joined Waterford Utd instead under Jimmy McGeough.

"After being away so long it's

always nice to come back to Dungarvan," he says of the attraction of joining the Blues. "Obviously when you're away you miss your family and friends, and it was good to get back and playing football and enjoying it again."

He stayed for five seasons, notching up a string of goals for the side.

But it was yet more managerial turbulence and a seeming lack of progression, which lured Vinny to Cork City and the chance of league honours. Brendan Rea and Pat Dolan had just steered Utd to safety, but Rea was promptly sacked. A number of players were out of contract at the end of the season and chose not to re-sign. Vinny joined the

exodus. His time at Cork City wasn't a happy one though, and he feels he didn't get long enough of a run in the first team to prove himself. Although manager, Damien Richardson

highly regarded the striker and offered him a contract extension at the end of the season, Vinny returned to Waterford Utd at the start of this season.

This year has proved another tough season for Utd, battling the prospect of relegation, a part-time outfit against a number of full-time sides. But, Vinny believes Waterford Utd have the quality and the strength to stay up.

"We're good enough to get at least to the middle of the table," the side's top scorer says. "There's no doubt that the standard is improving all the time, but as the season goes on I'm confident we'll pick up the crucial points to stay up."

"We've a good set up now, and good players, and the players signed recently are a good addition to the side. It's given us more strength in depth, and hopefully that'll be enough to keep us up."

GOODWOOD STAKES ENTRIES

Full House, who enjoyed the finest moment of his career when capturing the Ascot Stakes at Royal Ascot last month, is set to reappear in the £50,000 Invesco Perpetual Goodwood Stakes, run over two miles, five furlongs on Wednesday, August 1, the second day of Glorious Goodwood 2007. The versatile eight-year-old, who held off the late thrust of Juniper Girl - who went one better next time in the Northumberland Plate - to score by half a length at the Royal Meeting, has a course success to his name at Goodwood, having recorded an impressive four-length victory in the De Novo Stakes over two miles on May 24. Trainer Paul Webber revealed today: "The plan for Full House is to go to Goodwood for the Invesco Perpetual Goodwood Stakes. He'll probably get a speculative entry in the ABN AMRO Goodwood Cup [the following day] also, in case Geordieland frightens everybody away! "We were thrilled with him at Royal Ascot. I thought I had spoiled his chances there, as he went up 8lb for his Goodwood success, but he was in fantastic form going into the race, and won really well." The going is very important to Full House - we have been waiting for some proper summer ground, and that is why he has not run since Royal Ascot." He is in very good form now and I cannot wait to run him. I'm looking forward to getting him back on the track."

Mark Johnston always sends a strong team to Glorious Goodwood and the master of Kingsley House Stables is set to be represented by lightly-raced three-year-old Drumfire in the £150,000 totesport Mile, run on Friday, August 3. Having taken the prize twice in the past 10 years with subsequent Group One winner Fly To The Stars (1997) and Riberae (2001), Johnston certainly knows the type of horse required for the very valuable handicap. Drumfire showed high class form as a juvenile last term, taking the Group Three Solario Stakes at Sandown before finishing unplaced behind this year's Epsom Derby hero Authorized in the Group One Racing Post Trophy at Newbury. The son of Danehill Dancer made a fine reappearance at Newmarket on July 12, chasing home Traffic Guard in a mile conditions event, and is rated a 16/1 with the sponsors for the totesport Mile, for which he has been allotted 8st 10lb. "Drumfire is heading for the totesport Mile. He had an injury to a hind fetlock joint, which is why he was off the track for so long, but he is fine now," revealed Johnston "I was very happy with his Newmarket effort and there was certainly no disgrace in coming second there. He has come out of the race in good form and I would hope that he has come on for the run." He was a very, very good two-year-old and would have been a Guineas runner had he not had the injury. I rate him very highly and we have waited for this race. He will probably step back up to Group class immediately after the totesport Mile, although we have no specific targets in mind."

GLORIOUS GOODWOOD ALL SET FOR A CRACKING FESTIVAL

After walking the course last week, Seamus Buckley, Goodwood's Clerk of the Course and Grounds Manager, revealed: "We are delighted with the way the course has recovered since our early summer meetings and we have a wonderful covering of grass. The current going is good to soft with a going stick reading of 7.2." The thing about Goodwood is that it has a natural drainage system and it is amazing how quickly the course can dry out here on top of the hill. I predict the going to be on the soft side of good if we have the necessary dry days, but we are completely in the hands of the weather." Both Rod Fabricius and myself cannot remember a time when we haven't had to water for the Festival meeting." It seems ironic that at this time last year we worked around the clock to produce good to firm ground. It will be nice to run a Festival in natural conditions." The last six furlongs on the round course (from the six-furlong marker to the winning post on the far side of the course) have been dolled out to a width of six metres. This will be taken down at some point during the five days of racing, depending on the weather and going. Likewise, the top bend has been dolled out by three metres. Buckley added: "We are delighted with the early closing entries of our two Group One races, the BGC Sussex Stakes on Wednesday, August 1 and the Blue Square Nassau Stakes on Saturday, August 4. "The latter race is shaping up to be a cracker with four Classic winners and seven Group One heroines among the entries. We are looking forward to the possible third-round battle of Light Shift versus Peeping Fawn as well as the presence of Nannina

Weld's old-timer can foil the Farmer

THE FINAL FURLONG

There was a time - long before Charity You're A Star but a little bit after Bracken - when Pat Hughes kept bookmakers awake at night.

They tossed and turned and woke up bleary-eyed to check the form book to see if Hughes' handicap plot really had a chance in the upcoming big race. It could be over hurdles over fences, on the flat at Fairyhouse or among the top hats at Royal Ascot. Hughes wasn't fussy, he was just deadly.

A big pot was like a red rag to him. The Ladbroke (now the Piersie) was then Europe's richest handicap hurdle race and each year he'd have the bookmakers running for cover. They learnt their lesson as early as 1985 when he took Time Machine over for the Wokingham Handicap, put little Willie Carson in the saddle and landed a gamble from 20s into 10s in a market where it would have taken a five figure sterling sum to move a single point.

Time Machine typified Hughes' strengths as a trainer. He was bought after a Horses In Training sale for small money because he had a history of leg trouble while trained in England.

But Hughes worked his magic and, wouldn't you know, before long the sprinter was well-handicapped. A little time later a plan was hatched and then, as Cyril Farrell might say on the Sunday Game, "Bang", the plot was executed.

He's had a couple of quiet years. Sure, Rapid Deployment ran up a sequence of victories and Point Barrow landed an Irish Grand National, but Hughes doesn't carry the same menace he once did. Maybe he didn't have the ammunition but that could change at Ballybrit this week with Farmer Brown.

Since the weights for the Guinness Galway Hurdle were formed, Farmer Brown has been favourite with bookmakers. And the reasons for his position at the market are far more compelling than some Pat Hughes Fever on the odds compiler's behalf.

Farmer Brown prepped for Galway with a run in an extraordinary flat maiden at Leopardstown. The 1/3 favourite was Westlake from the Dermot Weld stable and, while the price looked skinny, the distance of one mile-four looked ideal for Khalid Abdullah's well-bred colt. And be-

sides, the National Hun-bred Farmer Brown was conceding almost a stone to his rival.

As is his custom, Farmer Brown travelled well throughout the race and when Westlake went to go and win his maiden, Pat Smullen looked around only to see Fran Berry and Farmer Brown cruising in his slipstream.

What happened next will linger in the memory. Farmer Brown was TWICE hampered - almost comically in the closing stages - but somehow the stewards saw fit to allow Westlake keep the race.

Nevertheless it served to underline Farmer Brown's current wellbeing. He has won on both extremes of ground so that won't be a factor, and his win at Leopardstown on Hennessy Gold Cup day in February singled him out as a horse well handicapped over hurdles.

I've one concern. Even in winning that race he flattened the last two hurdles and some of his jumping in races with big fields has been sketchy. However, before that flat maiden he got in some practise with two facile wins in condition hurdles and hopefully that will have ironed out any problems.

But Galway is a racing festival that can often throw up surprises and there might be a horse at double-figure odds to provide you with a bit of fun in the race.

Mutakarrim won his maiden hurdle at Galway on soft ground as far back as 2002, and finished second in the Galway Hurdle to Say Again later that week.

He's not getting any younger - Michael Smurfit's gelding is eleven at his next birthday - but his recent runs on the level show him to be as good as ever.

At the Curragh in May he won a handicap off 104, the highest ever mark he has achieved that feat. And since then he has finished second to Yeats in a Listed race.

Dermot Weld did have Zeroberto entered in the race and he looked the stable's first choice but Mutakarrim looks a very able deputy. I'd imagine if he and Westlake lined up at home there'd be only one winner!

He's a classy, durable horse who finished fifth in last year's Galway Plate and at 33/1 in some places he's worth an each-way interest.

WOULD YOU PLEASE OBLIGE!

I wish members would read notices! "May we play in fours in a singles competition?" No, unless it is specifically indicated on the time sheet. "Must I put my score through the computer?" Yes. All of the important points are included in the 'Conditions of Competition' notice on display in the clubhouse. What about matchplay? The same applies: conditions of the competition are displayed, as is the schedule for matches. If you don't read such notices please don't blame committee members when you are caught out for ignoring the basics. Another notice advises members on whom to contact with a query – on handicaps, competitions, prizes, sponsorship, new members, catering. And, I'm glad to note that all queries are handled promptly, which is hugely appreciated by the members.

RULES CORNER

All the rules queries this week were about practice on the course (Rule 7). A was playing B in a match. He arrived early and played the 17th and 18th for practice. Was A subject to penalty? No. A would be penalised if he was about to play any form of strokeplay. C's ball was damaged after hitting the bridge on the 1st. Before driving off the 2nd, C teed up his ball and drove it out of the course into adjacent farmland. Was he subject to penalty? Yes, for taking a practice stroke, not to mention the danger he was posing.

D was walking up the 9th and, using a 6 iron, casually flicked a ball back into the practice area. Penalty for practising? No, as D was simply tidying up the course: However, if he took a proper stance and was deemed to be actually practising for distance or accuracy, his marker might be justified in penalising D. Or if he hit several balls back to the practice ground. E was adjacent to the 1st tee and practised her chipping and pitching before she started her round. Was there a penalty? No, as this is permitted under the rules. What about practice chipping near the green after play of a hole? No penalty, as long as it is not from a bunker or hazard.

Incidentally, I was asked during the week about the use of an electronic distance measuring device in competitive golf. At the moment, unless there is a Local Rule permitting their use, such a device is not allowed in competitive golf: the player is subject to disqualification. GUI sources tell me that no club in Munster has such a Local Rule;

however, informed opinion suggests that it is 'only a matter of time' – in the forthcoming revision of the rules. I suspect.

Having to return to Dublin

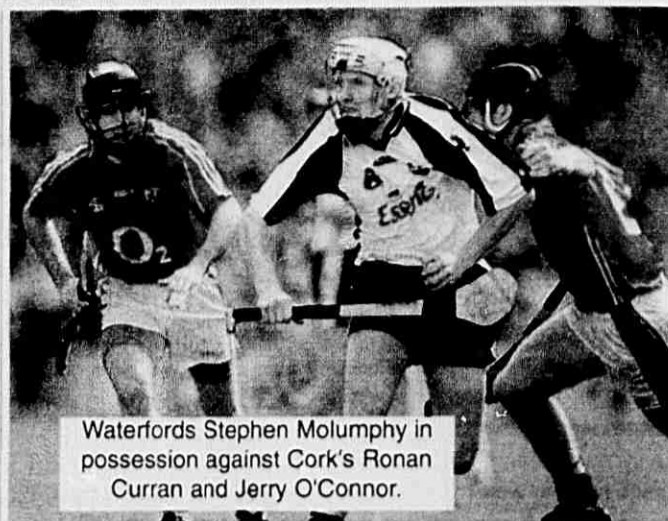
again is certainly very rough on our supporters who will be hoping to win and then have to return for the match with Limerick in the semi-final on the following Sunday.

Cappoquin v. St. Marys

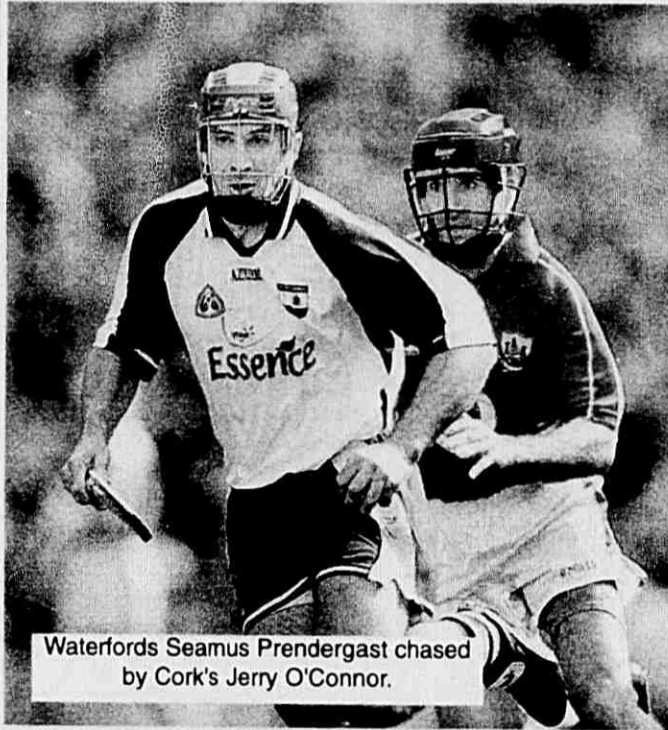
This game will be played at Fraher field and it should be a match with a very tight finish and one that at this stage is too close to call.

Dungarvan v. Clashmore at Colligan

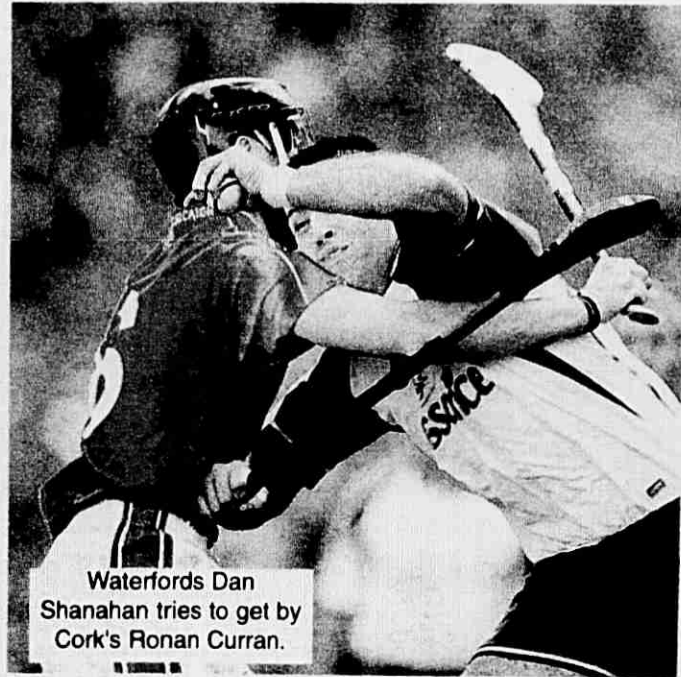

An Rinn v. Geraldines

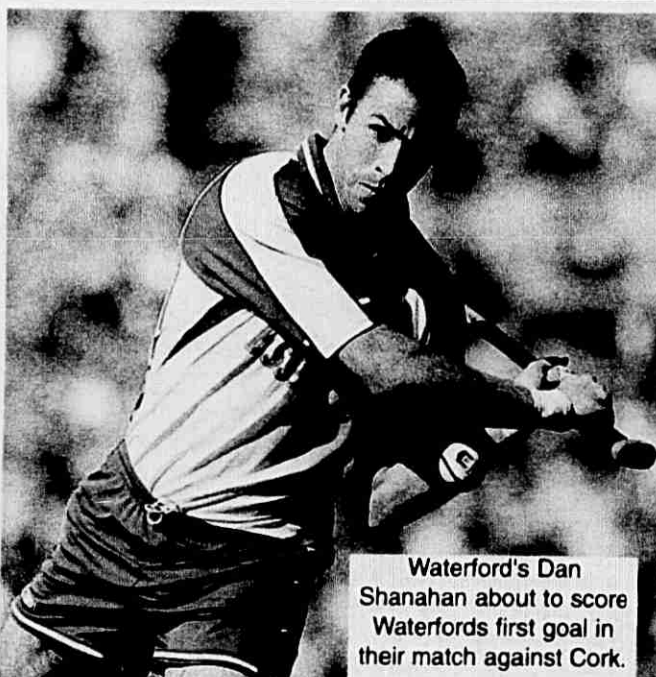

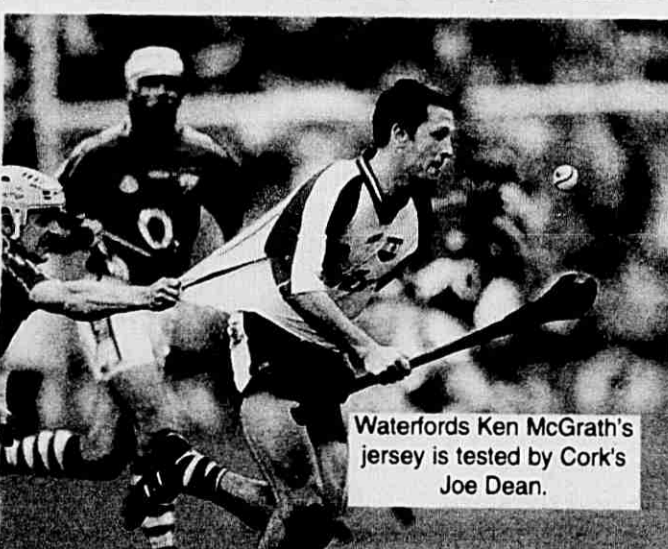
Waterford's Seamus Prendergast chased by Cork's Jerry O'Connor.

Waterford and Cork Share the Spoils in Croke Park Thriller

WATERFORD 3-16 CORK 3-16

The right of Cork to be in this game at all following two championship defeats was the subject of widespread controversy over the past few weeks but the Rebels mistakenly thought they had reason to turn this controversy on its head when a last minute free was awarded to Waterford after goal keeper Donal Og Cusack laid down on the ball that he had saved from an Eoin McGrath shot in the dying minutes of a game that had thrilled almost 73,000 spectators in brilliant sunshine at Croke Park. And while a draw may have been a fair result, Waterford will rue the number of missed chances that came their way and were wasted in the fourteen wifes during the 73 minutes of this game.

As I have written above this was yet another epic in the history of tremendous clashes between these rivals. Readers will recall that last year at the same venue in the semi final against Cork, Donal Og Cusack brought down a ball going over the bar to deny Waterford a replay and it is rather ironic that this year the very same keeper attempted to deny us a replay by lying on the ball but on this occasion it did not work when referee Brian Gavin punished him by awarding a deserved free to Waterford. Eoin Kelly converted the free and brought the match to a replay.

This thriller of a game saw the teams level five times in the opening half and twice again in the second half. It produced some wonderful scores and several great passes of play between the sides and it was a

pity and unfair in fact that the ending of the game should be shrouded in controversy because a deserved free was awarded to Waterford.

BEGRUDGERY

First into the headlines came former Deise coach trainer Gerald McCarthy (who was broken hearted when leaving, and is still on record as having declared "I will never train a team to beat Waterford") who moaned about the referee's decision to award a particular free.

Such begrudgerly by the Cork coach was thought not to be unusual following his infamous outburst against the Croke Park officials at the Semplegate affair.

Well done to Justin who responded by saying "Of course it was a free in. The goal keeper was lying on top of the ball and he, like every other player knows of all those tricks. It would have been a travesty had we lost that game today and it would have been a travesty too had the free not been awarded. There is no doubt in my mind that it was a free." The Deise boss described the game as "a fabulous spectacle and felt that a draw was an ultra fair result."

I am sure, in fact I feel certain that the hundreds of thousands who watched the match on television as well as the massive crowd who watched in the stadium who enjoyed the game and who were thrilled to the core at the epic to and fro of this great contest will agree with Justin's view.

PLAY

The game was under a minute old when John Mullane opened

the scoring for Waterford and within a minute Joe Deane brought the sides level when pointing a free. The sides were level again in the sixth minute and in the eighth minute until Stephen Molumphy pointed Waterford back into the lead after a great run. Then just on the tenth minute, Dan Shanahan, following a great drive from Tony Browne, rattled the net for the first of the games six goals. Dan receiving from Ken McGrath brought our tally to 1-5 as against 0-3 on the twelfth minute. Two super saves by Clinton Hennessy brought relief to Waterford from fierce pressure being asserted by the fast moving Cork attack. A sixty five metre free pointed by Ben O'Connor was responded to by a point from John Mullane. In the nineteenth minute a great Tom Kenny point was added to by an equally great score from Sean Og O hAilpin, then followed points by John O'Connor and Joe Deane and another by Ben O'Connor to level the scores in the thirtieth minute. A point by Ken McGrath and another by Joe Deane left the half time score at 1-7 to 0-10.

SECOND HALF

Within twenty second of the restart Stephen Molumphy shot an excellent pass to Paul Flynn who blasted the ball to the net within thirty seconds to give Waterford a three point lead. A great run and a great point by Dan Shanahan saw the volume of the Waterford support being turned up and Clinton Hen-

nessy brought off a super save from Sean Og O hAilpin. A foul on a Cork defender saw Niall Ronan rattle the Waterford net for their first goal in the fifth minute of this half. Eoin Kelly and Sean Og O hAilpin exchanged points as did Eoin Kelly and Ben O'Connor. Play continued in this fashion until Cork's third goal hit the back of the Waterford net from a Niall Ronan rasper. Seamus Prendergast, playing very well in the second half and like Michael Walsh, distributing a lot of the ball, took a hard knock in getting a ball that he sent over for a valuable point. This gave the Rebels a three point lead which was extended to four points when Joe Deane pointed his last score of the game with time ticking away. It was then that the drama that brought the record attendance to their toes began to take shape. A combined effort by Paul Flynn and Stephen Molumphy saw the young Ballyduff star shoot to the net for a great goal that reduced the leeway to a single point. Then with a minute left for play in added time, a great run by substitute Eoin McGrath saw a shot saved by Donal Og Cusack who fell to the ground and made movement of the ball impossible by the several attacking Waterford forwards. The result of this was that the referee awarded a free which Eoin Kelly pointed and brought the match to a replay on next weekend.

One of the biggest ever gatherings of referees met to discuss the declining situation in relation to indiscipline and abuse during games in the county at all levels. The meeting took place on Thursday evening last at Lawlors Hotel and it is felt that the turn out for the meeting and the fact that every referee present spoke gave a clear indication of the seriousness with which the issue is being viewed.

The discussion was forthright and members pulled no punches in declaring the kind of action that they are demanding from the boards. They blame clubs for not taking action against offenders and they are proposing very severe penalties on clubs whose players transgress.

What they are saying is that all players who issue abuse at referees will be reported and it is then up to the appropriate board to do their job by kicking the individuals out of the championship for whatever length of time is appropriate to the offence.

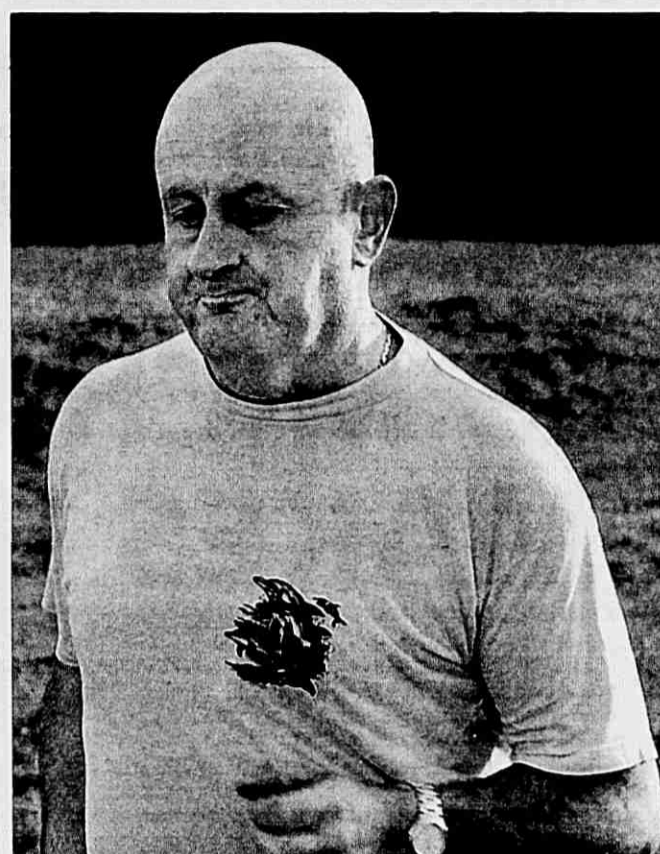

Generally regarded as the fastest course of the four-race Ballycotton series, no runner has now broken 25 minutes here in the past ten years. In 1983, when

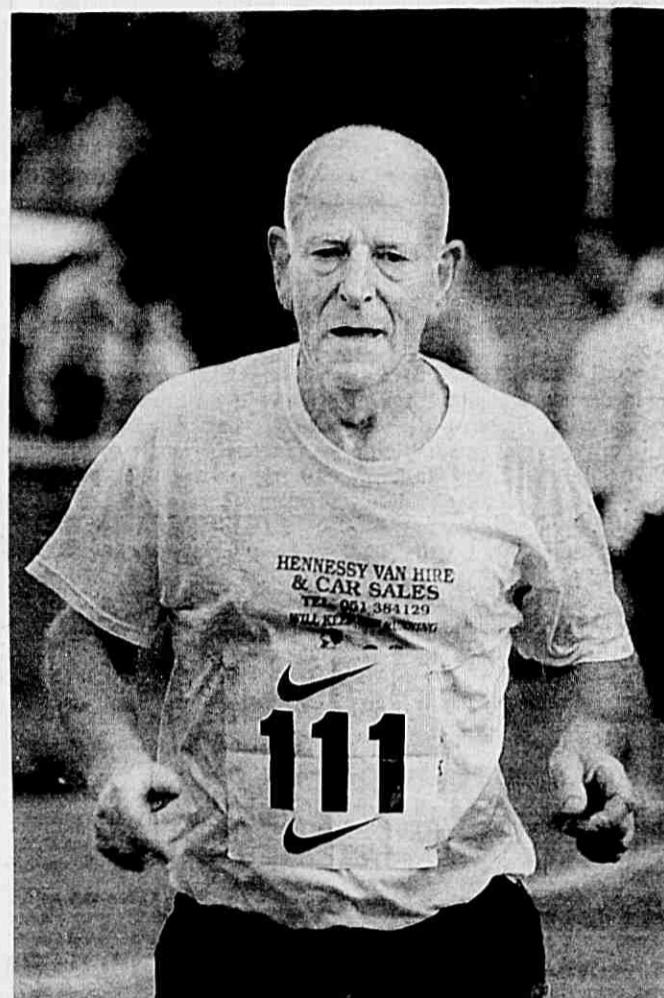
Liam O'Brien set the current course record of 23:40, the first eight finished inside 25 minutes.

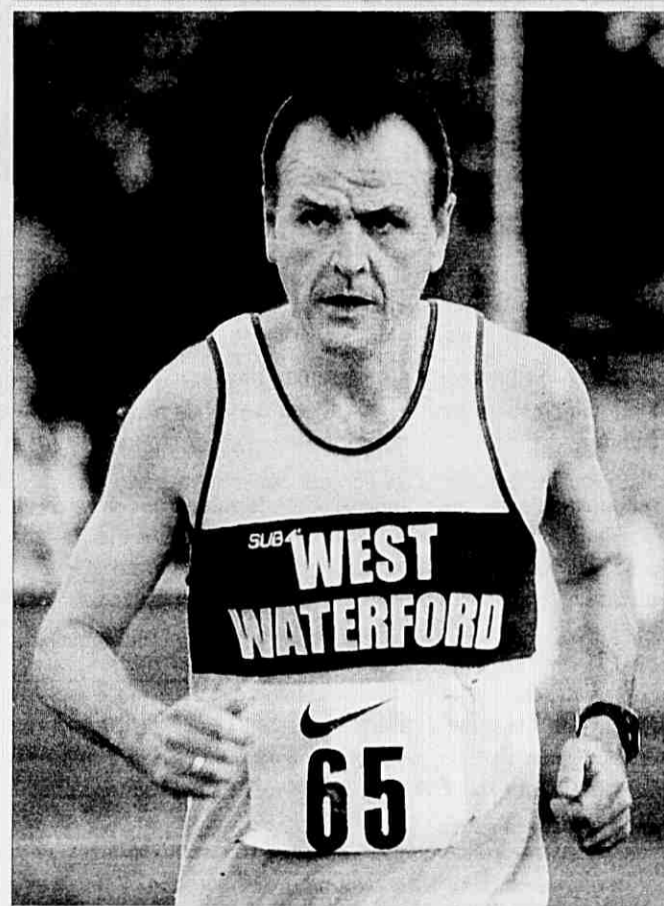

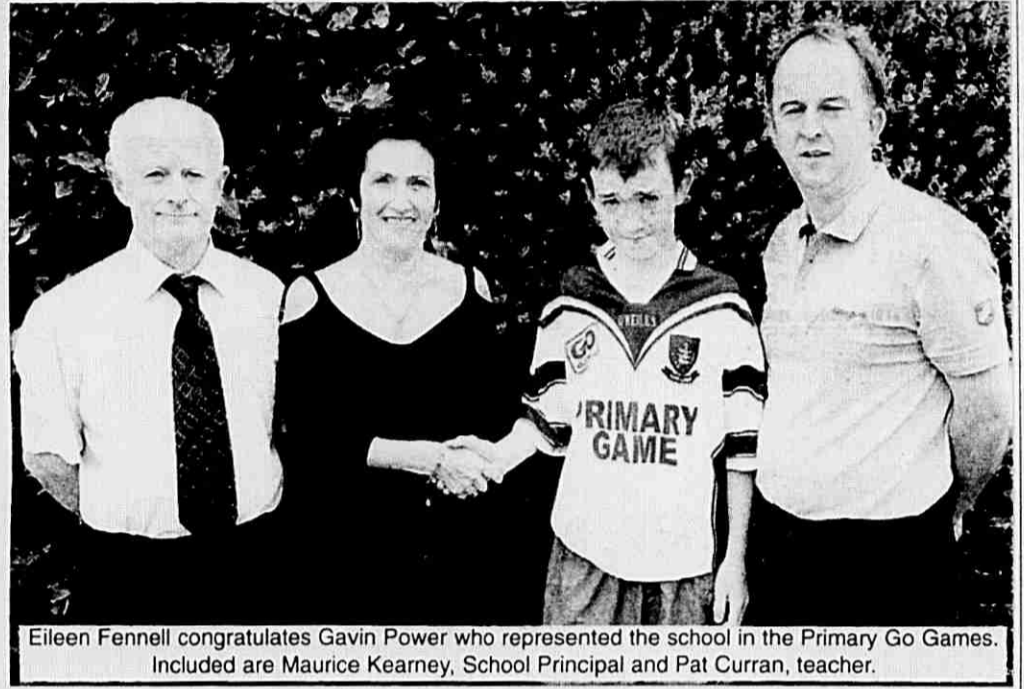

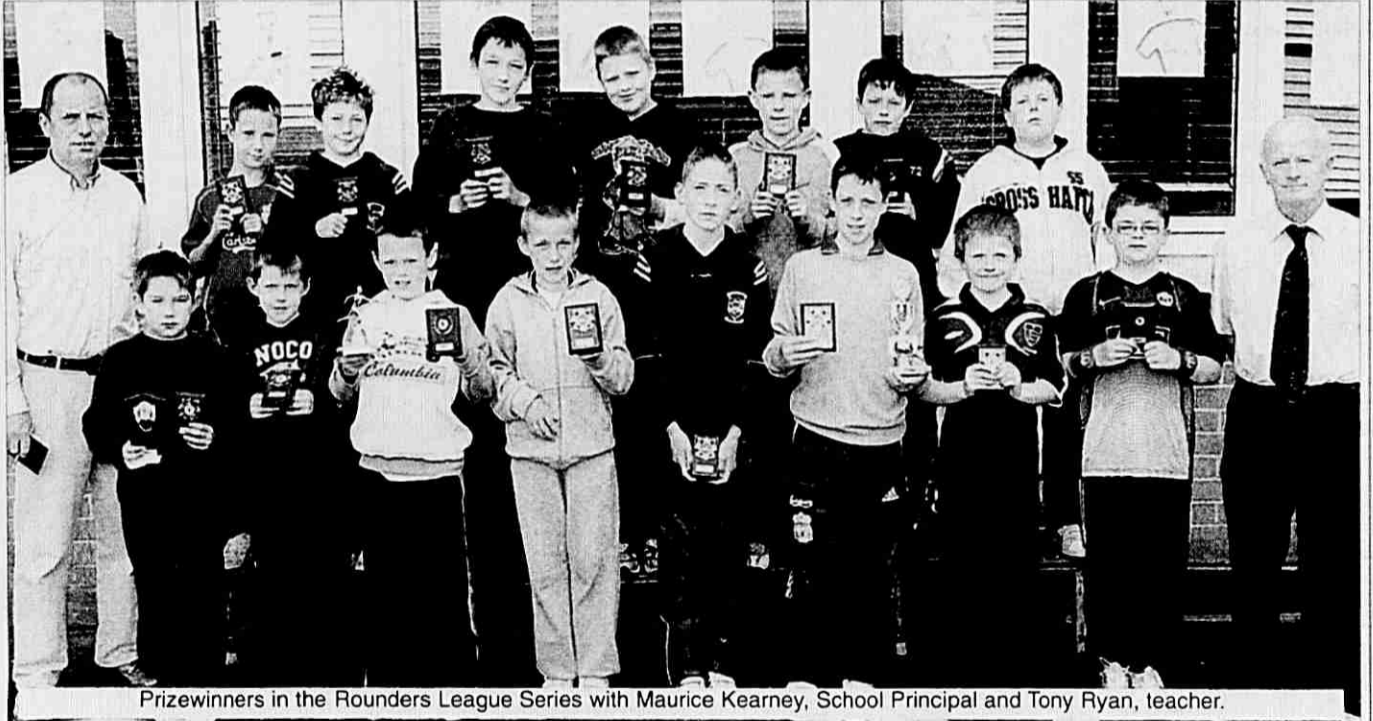
