

## Canoeist Saved By Helvick Lifeboat

The RNLI lifeboat at Helvick was called out on Wednesday last in response to a call for assistance for one of two canoeists - a father and son - who had got into difficulties outside Helvick Cove.

The 20 year old had taken water in his canoe when a wave washed in over it. He attempted to access the shore by climbing the cliff, but when he scaled almost three quarters of the cliff his footing became unsure and he was unable to go forward or climb back down.

The father had already made it to shore and brought in the second canoe.

The lifeboat was on the scene within minutes. The rescue helicopter had also been alerted.

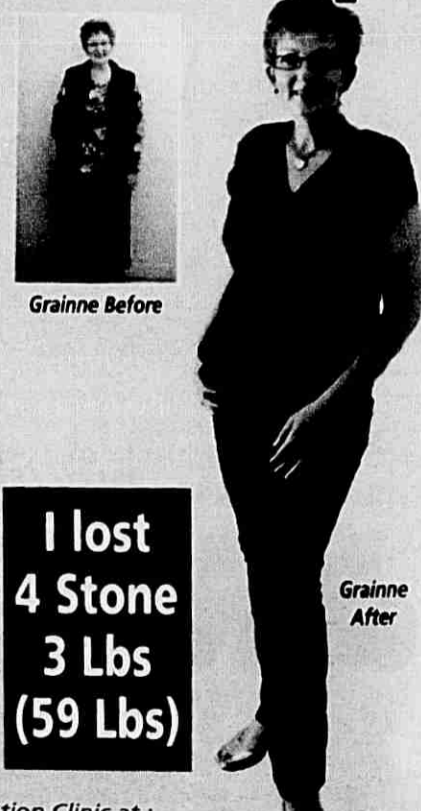
Crewman Richard Haynes climbed up the cliff with a rope to secure the man and prevent him from falling. He then returned to the lifeboat, which stood by while the helicopter arrived and winched the young man to safety.

Both canoeists said they were relieved to be back safely on shore.

Shay Young, RNLI crewman at Helvick Head said: "The RNLI are a vital part of the rescue services and all sea goers can be secure in the knowledge that, if needed, help will be with them in a matter of minutes."

## Colour & Light in The Old Market House Arts Centre

The Old Market House Arts Centre, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford was a hive of activity for the launch of three new exhibitions by local artists.

'West Waterford Light' is an exhibition of work by Clashmore artist Martine Finucane. Martine studied at Dun Laoghaire College of Art and the National College of Art and Design Dublin before working as an illustrator for 'Irish Womens Magazine' and as an art teacher in Blackrock College. She trained as a classic animator and joined Don Bluth's Animation Studio where she worked as an SFX Animator and later as a Background Artist. Martine worked on over ten feature films, the best known being 'The Land Before Time' and 'All Dogs go to Heaven'.

Martine then travelled to America to become Directing Animator for Fox Animation Studios. Martine returned to Ireland and to nature and she now lives in Clashmore. She has had very successful group and solo exhibitions and now paints full-time as well as teaching private and group art classes.

'Wilderness' showcases the work of Rosemary Chapman who is based in Anestown, Co. Waterford. Rosemary paints spontaneously, taking much of her inspiration from the changing moods and colours of the seas and seasons. She is well known for her studies of racehorses and her paintings associated with the sea. Rosemary has been an active member of the Tramore Art Group for several years and

exhibits with them during their annual exhibition each August. Rosemary's desire is that her paintings will allow those viewing to exercise their imaginations to discover a different story from each painting.

In the upstairs gallery Market '07' features glass paintings by Stradbally-based artist Sue Burkitt, Textile Art by Tunde Toth, Kilkenny and paintings by Debbie Kiely, Kilmacthomas.

Mayor Damien Geoghegan welcomed everyone and wished all the exhibiting artists every success. The exhibitions were officially opened by Joan Clancy, director of the Joan Clancy Gallery, Mullinahorna, Ring, Co. Waterford. Joan outlined the background and inspirations of

each artist. She spoke of the striking nature of Rosemary's paintings and the amazing light and shade in Martine's work. Joan explained the Mediterranean influences which inspire Sue Burkitt's glass paintings, complimented Tunde Toth on the intricate detail of her textile art and congratulated Debbie Kiely on her beautiful work.

## Funding Awarded To Waterford County Local Authorities €23,000 Grant For Anti-Litter Awareness

The Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government has allocated €23,000 to county Waterford for public education and awareness initiatives on litter.

This grant is intended to cover a broad range of measures to raise public awareness and to stimulate anti-litter activity at local level.

Is your community planning a project which will raise awareness of litter, if so; you may be eligible for a grant towards the cost of the project.

Waterford County Council invites submissions from Community Groups, Schools, Tidy Towns Committees or other Community Development Organisations who are interested in receiving funding for public education and awareness regarding litter.

### Criteria.

Projects should aim at establishing or replicating best practice in relation to litter education/awareness measures, and should as far as possible, have a particular focus in involving schools and young people in anti-litter actions and on voluntary initiatives by community and environmental groups.

Grants should be used, where possible, to leverage local business co-funding of anti-litter education/awareness measures.

### Grant Amount.

The maximum grant available in any individual case may be to 70% of the overall cost of the project, with the balance being met by way of applicant's contributions/other sources such as sponsorship.

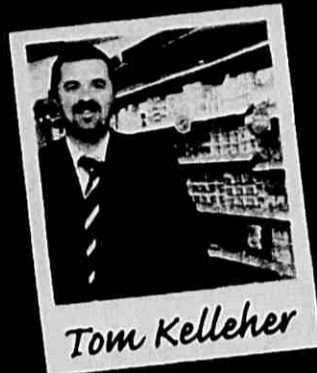

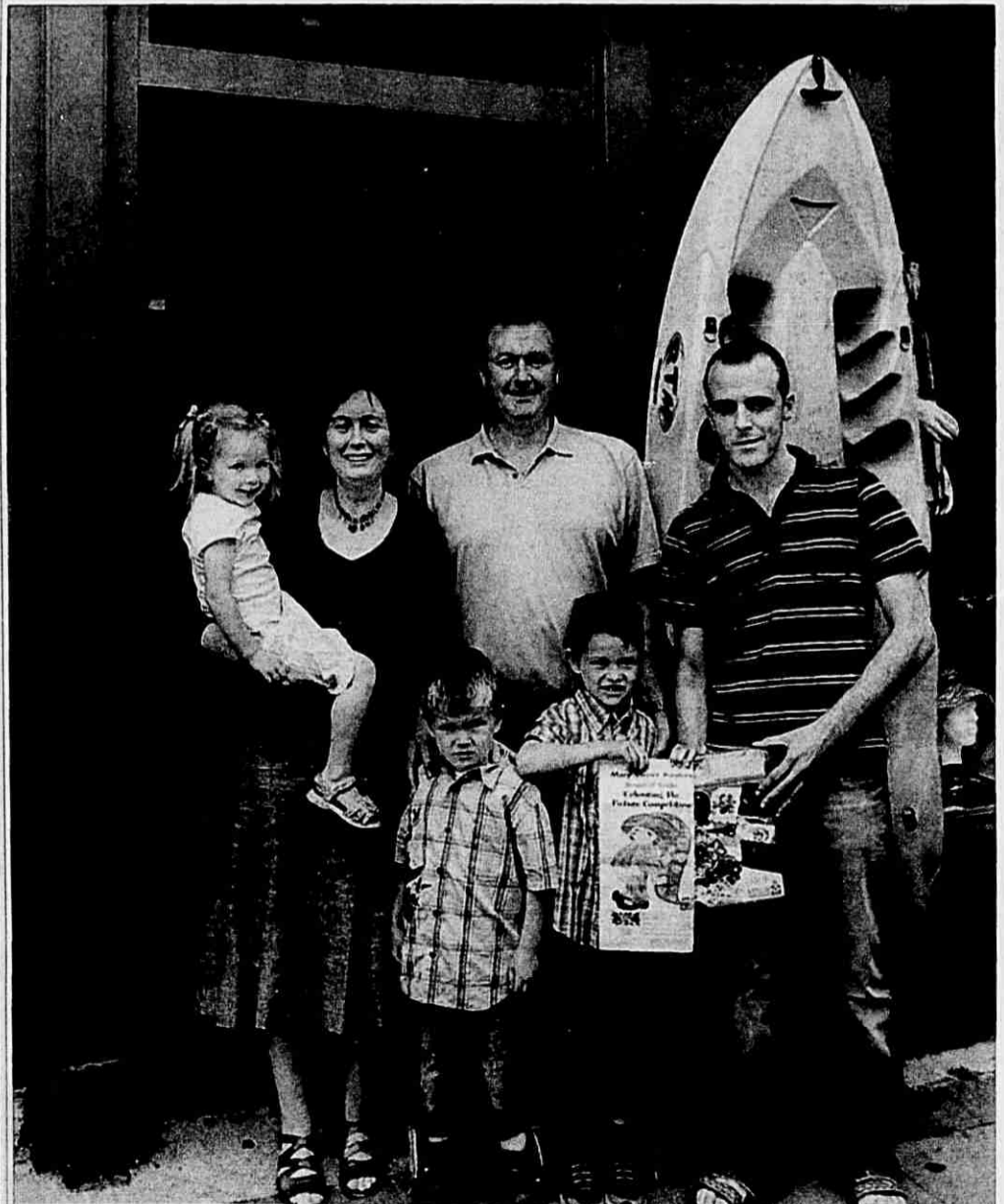

## Latest House Prices Indicate it's a Good Time to Be House Shopping

National house prices in Ireland declined by 2.6% in the first six months of 2007 according to the latest edition of the House Price Index. The index measures the movement of house prices over the first six months of the year.

In June, the index records that the average price paid for a house in Ireland in June was €1,561 less than that paid the previous month (May); a reduction in national prices of 0.5% in the month. This follows the reduction in national house prices of 0.8% in May and April and 0.6% in March.

Measured over the past 12 months (up to and including June), the average national price paid for a house in Ireland was 0.9% higher in June 2007 than the price paid in June 2006.

The average price paid for a house nationally in June 2007 was €302,605, compared with €310,632 in December 2006.

**Dublin V Rest of Country:**  
 Dublin house prices declined by 1.3% in June while there was a reduction in prices of 0.9% for houses bought outside Dublin. In May 2007 the relative price changes were -1.2% and -0.8%. Over the first half of this year, prices were down by 2.0% and 3.2% respectively.

However in the 12 months to the end of June 2007, house prices in Dublin grew by 4.1%. Outside Dublin they reduced by 0.4% over the same period. The equivalent rates to May 2007 were (plus) 7.6% and (plus) 1.5% respectively.

The average price paid for a house in Dublin and outside Dublin in June 2007 was €418,905 and €257,945 respectively. The

equivalent prices in December 2006 were €427,343 and €266,339.

**First time buyers V. Second time buyers:**

House prices in June for first-time and second-time buyers reduced by 0.9% and 0.5% respectively. In May 2007 the equivalent figures were -1.8% and -0.5%. During the first half of this year prices were down by 3.2% and 2.6% respectively.

House prices grew by 0.6% and 0.7% year on year to June 2007 for first-time and second-time buyers respectively. The equivalent rates

to May 2007 were 3.3% and 2.6% respectively.

The average price paid by a first-time buyer and a second-time buyer in June 2007 was €270,093 and €340,143 respectively. The equivalent prices in December 2006 were €279,003 and €349,213.

**New V. Existing Houses**

House prices for new houses were down by 0.7% in June while the price for existing houses decreased by 0.3%. In May this year the relative price changes were minus 1.0% and minus 0.8% respectively for new and second hand houses. During the first half of this year prices reduced by 1.2% and 2.7% respectively.

New and second hand house prices grew by 1.7% and 1.0% respectively year on year to June 2007. The equivalent rates of growth to May 2007 were 3.3% and 2.4% respectively.

The average price paid for a new house in June 2007 was €298,962, while that paid for a second hand house was €304,391. The equivalent levels in December 2006 were €302,645 and €312,709.

## VIEWPOINT BEST KEPT TOWN

Great credit is due to Dungarvan Town Council and, in particular, Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty under whose guidance, the exterior appearance of the county administrative capital has been greatly enhanced in recent years, helping it to make the shortlist for Best Kept Large Town in Ireland.

Dungarvan has come a long way from the dull and dank town pockmarked by abandoned warehouses on the quay, the decaying walls of the castle, and full of derelict houses and former shops of a few years ago.

The floral displays on the approaches to the town, the innovative and artistic designs of the roundabouts, and the plans afoot for the areas of the town as yet untouched by urban regeneration has all contributed to a landscape that matches some of our more illustrious neighbours, and must also ensure that Dungarvan is not only a good town to live in, but also acts as an attraction to tourists and visitors from other parts of Ireland and from further afield.

The remains of King John's Castle is just one area transformed. The old sheds and wasteland surrounding it have been removed, the walls and turrets enhanced through the diligence of the Office of Public Works, and the car park fronting it turned into an interesting amenity area - all of which unfortunately makes the eyesore that is the flats at the Lookout stand out all the more.

Nonetheless, like the quays themselves, and the area where the tannery outbuildings once stood, what was at one time an ugly no-go area has been radically changed, making use of the harbour as our greatest asset.

Walton's Park and Grattan Square are also on the list of projects to be completed, although the latest Viewpoint has heard on the opening of the park is that it won't be opened now until sometime in the New Year.

Businesses also deserve great credit for what has been achieved. Without their input in the upkeep of their shopfronts nothing could have been done.

The Urban Renewal Scheme has done much to inject an impetus into the transformation of Dungarvan. But, the proper use of the scheme was vital, and apart from one or two unfortunate mistakes, including the Lookout apartments, this was achieved. Former County Manager, Donal Connolly deserves more than his share of credit for this.

But perhaps just as important for the town's continuing upwards spiral is the commercial interest in the town, which has occurred in the last decade, ending years of stagnancy and reversal in its economic well-being.

Because of development, and the location in Dungarvan of many new stores and restaurants in the commercial heart of the town, other businesses have met this competition head on, and have upgraded their own stores and businesses, resulting in an almost uniquely vibrant and attractive town centre.

Dungarvan businesses and the town council will continue to face the challenges these new developments and outside commercial interests bring. It's in facing up to, and seizing the opportunities these challenges bring that will ultimately decide whether Dungarvan is not only propelled further into the ranks of possible tourist destinations to stay in and enjoy, but will ultimately provide the shape of the town for future generations.

## WELL DONE TO LEAVING CERT STUDENTS

Simply completing the Leaving Cert is a huge achievement, and all students who are now finished school should remember this.

For many reasons, the Leaving Cert is probably the greatest hurdle they will face in their young lives. Some will have already entered into the points race to get into college, and will go on to complete more technically difficult exams in Universities and IT's.

But the reason Viewpoint would argue that the Leaving Cert is so daunting for so many is simply the pressure exerted from all quarters. Not just from the immediate family, but from peers too. Unlike continuous assessment it is a one-off, on the day exam, that allows nothing for outside circumstances, which may be pressing on the young person, be that excessive nervous tension to some other more serious upset.

It also, wholly unfairly, carries the mark of being a life defining examination. There are plenty of options after the Leaving Cert, and as someone who failed his Maths dismally the first time of asking, Viewpoint also knows there's always the option of a second chance as well.

University and College is a good experience - but by no means is it the be all and end all, and neither does it guarantee work at the completion of the course, nor does not going to college at all, exclude opportunities in the workforce.

The Leaving Cert is worth the hard work and effort certainly, and it does provide the straight route to college, though there are still opportunities for a mature student to go to college at a later stage, but neither is it worth the stress and in some cases distress that the whole process causes to a young person, and to their families.

The main thing on completing the Leaving Cert is just to forget it. It's over. Get on with living life, and be happy that the most stressful examination in a young person's life is thankfully over. Everything else, whether you have been successful or not lies ahead on the horizon, and is yours for the taking.

been developing scholarship and other links with St. Augustines College over a number of years.

Yesterday, (Tuesday) a series of meetings with Mercyhurst administrative and academic personnel took place as well as an information visit to the centre for Maritime studies in Erie. They were also hosted at several tourism ventures and took part in a conference with Erie City Council elected members and management.

**MEETINGS**  
Following that, today, (Wednesday) the delegation plan a series of meetings with representatives of economic, commercial and industrial interests in Erie and Northern Pennsylvania.

Feature information sessions with those implementing and administering law and order in Erie District will also take place, before the delegation is given a Civic Reception which will be hosted in Erie City Hall by Mayor Joe Sinnott and Council President, Rubye Jenkins-Husband.

**PROMINENT**  
A number of site visits to factories in Erie will take place on Thursday. Erie is prominent in the US plastics industry. Several social inclusion projects will also be looked at by the delegation including meeting with members of the Amish community - one of the several traditional sects that have maintained itself after having successfully sought religious tolerance in Pennsylvania when originally settling there from Europe. The nine-man Dungarvan delegation will then be hosted at the Pennsylvania State Knowledge Centre.

On Friday, the Dungarvan group will visit the Dr. Gertrude Barber Centre for Autism in Erie and Saturday will see a focus on meeting the Irish community in the US and engaging their interests. A number of other social and evening engagements are to take place during the course of the visit.

**MARKED DIFFERENCE**  
Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield, a fierce critic of the county council's annual trip stateside for the annual St. Patrick's Day Festivities in New York, said there are marked differences between that junket and the Erie trip.

## SECURING FULLTIME EMPLOYMENT A KEY FACTOR

## BUSINESS COURSES

These courses include the nationally renowned one year Administration course which according to course co-ordinator, Mrs. Joan Begley, provides the students with a high level of competence in the knowledge and skills required in the business world. Many opportunities are open to students of this course from local authorities, Public Service, Financial Institutions to National and International Businesses worldwide. Alternatively they may opt to pursue a business related course in IT colleges or UCC with which the college has link programmes.

We also have the two year Business Studies Course which runs from 8.50am to 1pm each day which makes it very attractive for everyone but especially those with young school going children.

This course provides similar work-place skills to that which the Administration course provides. The fact that it is spread over two years enables the students to develop the skills with less stress in more time. This particularly helps those who are upskilling or re-training or who may need time to re-adjust to the classroom environment.

Comments from students include:

*"The course provides a wide range of skills and interesting subjects that will make me very employable when I've completed it."*

*"a second chance to learn new skills."*

Another course in the Business are is the highly popular Accountancy Technician Course. This course has had tremendous success in the past number of years with students regularly coming in the top 10 in the country in the final examinations. Course co-ordinator and Deputy Principal Mrs Moira Dunford states that there is a 100% job securement rate for students on

completing the 2 year course. The majority of students work in Accountancy firms, Banks, Building Societies, Credit Unions, State bodies and private industry. As one past pupil stated "the hardest part of all for me was getting back into the education system as I had been out of it for some time. I was a housewife and mother of three young children going back to being a student. With the great help and support from everyone in the college I qualified as an Accounting Technician. ## CHILDCARE

The second area of Post Leaving Cert involvement is that of care. Here we have Childcare Level 5. There is a growing job market for people qualified in this area. Looking after children requires a wide range of skills and knowledge, anything from basic childcare, coping with accidents and emergencies or first aid and safety procedures.

The Childcare Level 5 course develops the students awareness of their own responsibilities and helps them to understand what might be expected of them in their place of work, whether it be formal employment in a recognised day care or the casual babysitting session.

There is a need for quality training programmes as more and more parents today, when looking for a care setting for their child/children, will check and ask about qualifications and training of staff. Both childcare courses (Level 5 and Level 6) offered by Colaiste Chathail Naofa are of a national recognised standard. They are approved by FETAC and are open to a wide range of early years care practitioners. (Anyone who works with children from (0-6 years). 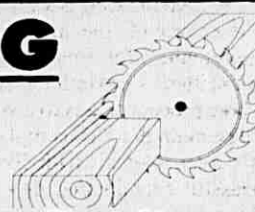

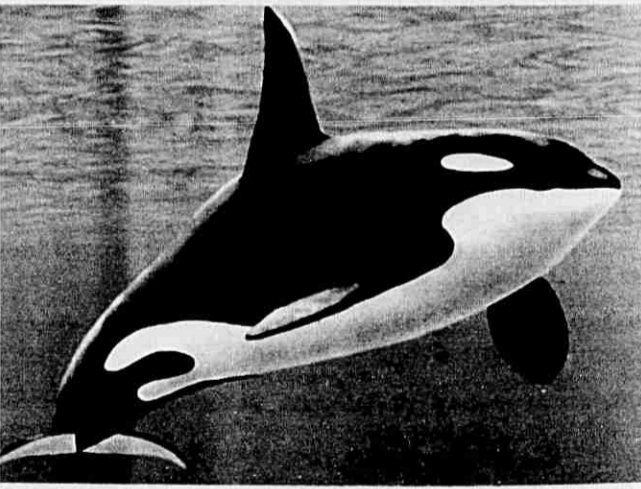
The largest of the toothed whales are the sperm whales. They can group up to 17m (56ft) in length. There are also two sperm whales, the pygmy sperm whale and the dwarf sperm whale, that are among the smallest of the toothed whale.

One very unusual looking whale is the narwhal. The male narwhal has an enlarged tooth that grows straight out of to form a spiral tusk about 3m (10ft) long.

The black and white killer whale is the most dangerous of all the whales. As well as fish, they will eat seals, penguins and even dolphins to which they are closely related. The killer whale is the largest member of the dolphin family.

#### TWO GROUPS OF WHALES

There are two groups of whales - the whalebone, or baleen, whales and the toothed whales. There are more toothed whales, which are usually smaller than baleen whales. Baleen whales live on plankton, which is made up of tiny sea creatures and plants. The whale strains plankton out of the water by sieving it through the comb like plates of stiff material called baleen, that hang from the whale's top jaw. Toothed whales use their teeth to catch and kill all types of fish. Baleen whales include blue, right, humpback, grey, sei and fin whales. Killer whales, sperm whales, porpoises and dolphins are all toothed whales.

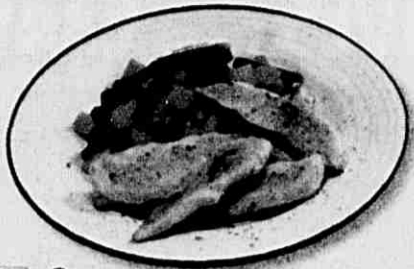

# TG4 BROADCAST NEMETON/ WIT STUDENT PROGRAMMES

### 36 Calls To Illegal Dumping Hotline

By Kevin Kirrane

In the twelve months since the Environmental Protection Agency launched its "Dump the Dumpers" hotline, 36 calls have been made to it in County Waterford.

Of the calls, the top three complaints related to fly-tipping, illegal dumping and the burning of waste.

"The success of the 'Dump the Dumpers' phone line shows that members of the public are willing to get involved in resolving environmental problems. And for that we are very grateful. It is only with their assistance that this initiative can continue to be a success," said Dara Lynott, Director EPA Office of Environmental Enforcement.

The 'Dump the Dumpers' service was designed to encourage reporting of illegal dumping of waste or of abandoned illegal dumps via a 24 hour call save number. This information is followed up and checked by enforcement authorities - local authorities, the EPA's Office of Environmental Enforcement and the Gardai - through the Environmental Enforcement Network. The 'Dump the Dumpers' phone line is staffed on a 24 hour basis so callers get to speak to a trained operator who elicits all necessary details to enable the matter to be investigated.

The 24 hour call save number for the enforcement service is 1850 365 121.

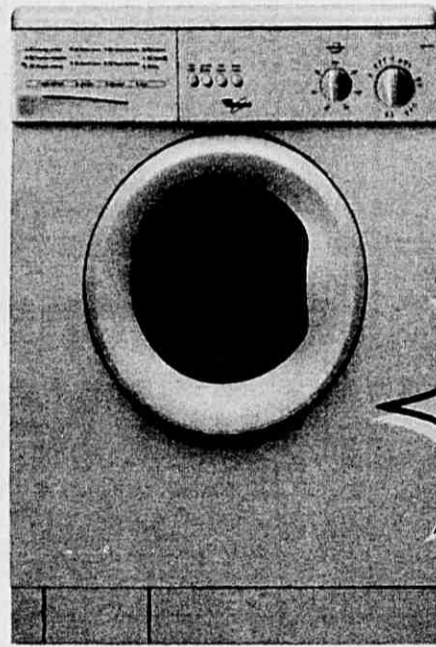

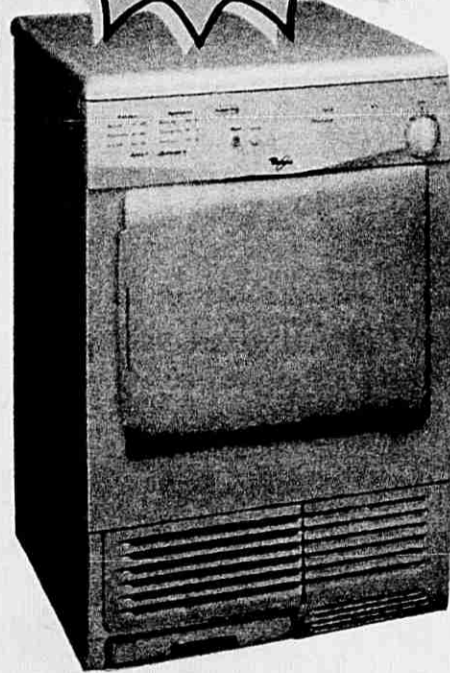

## Good Bacteria?

It may not be pleasant thought for many, but various species of bacteria and yeasts are present on the skin and mucous membranes of all normal, healthy people. They do not generally cause problems and many are important for biological functions such as absorption of various nutrients and protection against harmful micro-organisms. The various microbial species occupy their own territory. Each species constantly attempts to increase this territory, but is kept in check by the surrounding organisms so that no one species is allowed to dominate. The immune system is also involved in maintaining a healthy microbial balance within the body.

Certain situations can allow one species of micro-organism to become dominant. This causes irritation and inflammation of the local tissues and a variety of other problems which affect the rest of the body. These include thrush, sweet cravings, allergies, sinus problems, reduced alcohol tolerance, digestive disturbances, skin problems, severe premenstrual symptoms, thyroid problems, headaches, tiredness and poor concentration. Common causes of microbial imbalance include pregnancy, nutritional deficiencies, high sugar diets, use of some medicines such as antibiotics and contraceptives, and some diseases such as diabetes.

In order to restore the balance, the first step is to eliminate the harmful micro-organisms by depriving them of their essential food. Cut out all refined sugar (including cakes, biscuits, sweets, and jams), reduce dairy products, and avoid fermented products such as alcohol and vinegar. Herbs such as cinnamon, thyme and garlic destroy harmful micro-organisms and chamomile may be used to help repair and protect the mucous membranes. Medical herbalists can provide these herbs as part of an individual prescription which can effectively treat the variety of problems caused by microbial imbalance.

The second step is to repopulate the system with friendly micro-organisms. This can be achieved by taking an acidophilus supplement and eating plenty of live natural yoghurt. Bananas provide food for the friendly bacteria and help them to get established.

It is common to experience a temporary worsening of symptoms on tackling this type of imbalance which generally only lasts a few days. It is usually necessary to continue this programme for approximately 4 - 6 weeks, so perhaps lent will provide an ideal opportunity to get your bugs back into balance.

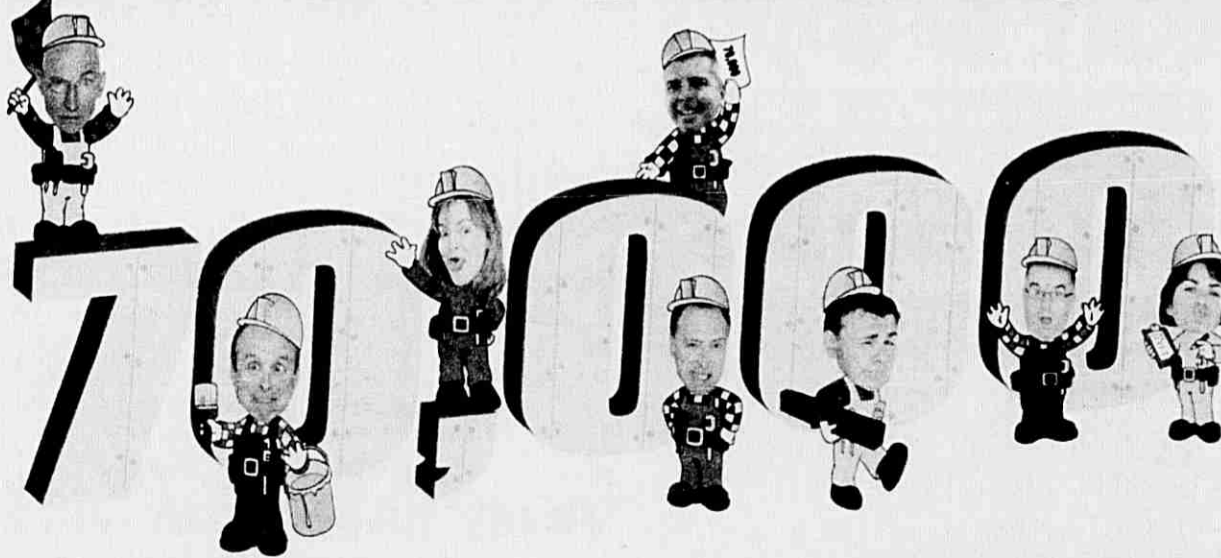

### Dairying Nitrogen Usage

Now is the time to take stock of how much Nitrogen you have used so far this year relative to what you are allowed to use. Over use will result in penalties.

\* Farmers stocked at less than 2.24 cows/ha should only put on Nitrogen once, late August, over the next two months. All other farmers should apply 28 units/acre in August (Urea OK if wet).

\* This nitrogen should all be blanket spread as there are no losses in grass yield for August - September blanket spread applications.

\* Growing enough grass with less Nitrogen is all about very good grassland management:

Farmers now have to learn this

-Remember each grass plant has only 3-leaves and a new leaf arrives every 7 days in April - July period and longer thereafter.

-So, when the 4th leaf arrives the oldest leaf at the bottom starts to die off, therefore don't let your rotation length ever get too long.

- Leaving high post-grazing covers results in huge losses of grass and nitrogen because most of that grass will have rotted and died off before next grazing.

- Some farmers grazing high covers are leaving 500 - 800 kg DM/ha post-grazing and most or all of this 'rots' away.

- No wonder we are only utilizing 8.6 tons DM/ha (target 12 - 14 tons) on our best farms

### Cattle

#### Meals at Grass

There are two groups of stock that will definitely benefit from feeding meals to them at grass.

1) Steers that are going to be finished before housing. Where there is plenty of grass it is economical to feed 3 kg per day for the last six weeks before slaughter. If you are short of grass feed up to six kg per day. The ration can be low in protein e.g. a cereal / pulp / soya hulls mix.

2) Heifers that are going to be finished off grass. The same feeding rates as with the steers applies.

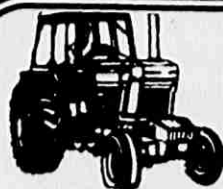
If you are selling weanlings there can be a good response to feeding them meals. Having them eating meals is attractive to any buyer and you will also get a good response for each kg fed. If they have plenty of grass the response will be 1 kg liveweight for each 8 kg fed. If grass is in short supply or of a lower quality the response rises to 1 kg LW for every 4 kg fed. Again the ration does not need to be high in protein.

Where you are keeping your own weanlings and they are being weaned with the minimum of stress e.g. taking the cows away from the calves in small batches over a three week period, and the weanlings are on good quality grass they may not actually benefit from being fed meals. Research has shown that 12 months out from weaning there is no difference in the weight of weanlings fed meals around weaning and those not fed meals. However, if grass supply or quality is an issue and if the weanlings are likely to be stressed at weaning there is no doubt that they would benefit from even a small amount of meals at this time of the year.

# FARMING LEADER

## IFA Seek 40c/l For August Milk

IFA President Padraig Walshe welcomed the record milk prices now being fixed by co-ops for July deliveries and said "they come on the back of record market returns that justify even higher prices being passed back to farmers." He said "what farmers need to realise is that the current markets justify 40c/l being paid for August milk, and even that price would leave co-ops with greatly increased processing margins."

## IFA Call On Minister Coughlan To Act In Farm Improvement Scheme Logjam

IFA Rural Development Chairman, Padraig Divilly, has called on the Minister of Agriculture Mary Coughlan to instruct her Department to accept and process applications under the Farm Improvement Scheme.

Mr. Divilly said that IFA has been inundated with complaints that the Department of Agriculture is refusing to deal with applications not involving construction. It was indicated to IFA a number of weeks ago that a fast-track system would be put in place for investments such as milking machines, bulk tanks, rubber mats, agitators and other equipment.

The IFA Rural Development Chairman has also criticised the inclusion of the Health and Safety requirement on the new application form. This was not in previous applications forms for grant-aided schemes. All construction jobs on farms are done to the highest Health and Safety standards but to hold-up applications where the necessary boxes are not ticked or where private planners or Teagasc have not signed the form is not acceptable.

Mr. Divilly said that it is ironic that Teagasc have in place a specialist service dealing with Health and Safety yet their advisory service are not in a position to sign the application forms for farmers on this issue.

The IFA called on the Minister to resolve this issue without further delay or otherwise the new Farm Improvement Scheme will not achieve its objectives.

IFA Countryside Chairman David Wilkinson is encouraging shop owners and managers to support this initiative by putting up the posters. He said that everyone was a winner from a litter free countryside and he encouraged all road users to respond positively and take their empties home and dispose of them safely.

Brian Keating, Marketing Di-

rector Cuisine de France, said that he was delighted to support this positive initiative by IFA Countryside.

He said that the vast bulk of road users act responsibly and take their car rubbish home.

This campaign was an encouraging reminder to those who are not yet aware of the damage they are doing to the Countryside by dumping car rubbish out the window and he complimented IFA Countryside on the initiative.

## IFA Livestock Chairman Says "Use Of Brazilian Beef By Irish Army Is A Disgrace"

IFA National Livestock Chairman John Bryan said "it is a disgrace that the Irish Army are providing imported Brazilian beef to Irish soldiers on duty."

Mr Bryan said livestock farmers will be appalled that this is happening and that Brazilian beef is being brought in the back door by the State to feed our troops. It is incredible to think that a British trading company is allowed supply the Irish Army with Brazilian beef.

"I have to seriously question the Army's purchasing policies. From IFA's investigations in Brazil, we know their production standards do not meet EU requirements," he said.

Mr Bryan said "I am therefore calling on the Minister for Defence Willie O'Dea to order an immediate investigation of this embarrassing revelation. The Department of Defence must urgently review the specifications for Army food procurement contracts to ensure proper standards and quality assurance, and that Irish suppliers are well placed to fill contracts with meat of Irish origin."

IFA Livestock Vice-Chairman Michael Doran from Co Wexford uncovered the fact that the Irish Army was purchasing Brazilian beef.

He said "as a livestock farmer, I was disgusted to find out that the State was involved in purchasing Brazilian beef."

## Factories Must Increase Lamb Prices

Based on significantly improved market returns in France, the lamb factories could easily afford to increase lamb prices to over €5/kg according to Waterford IFA Sheep Chairman Ned Morrissey.

He said Bord Bia has again reported an improved French market with prices ranging from €5.40/kg to €5.90/kg excluding VAT. This is equivalent to €6/kg including VAT.

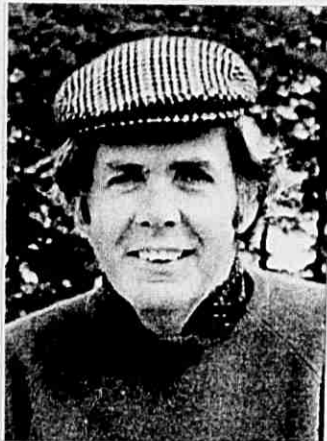



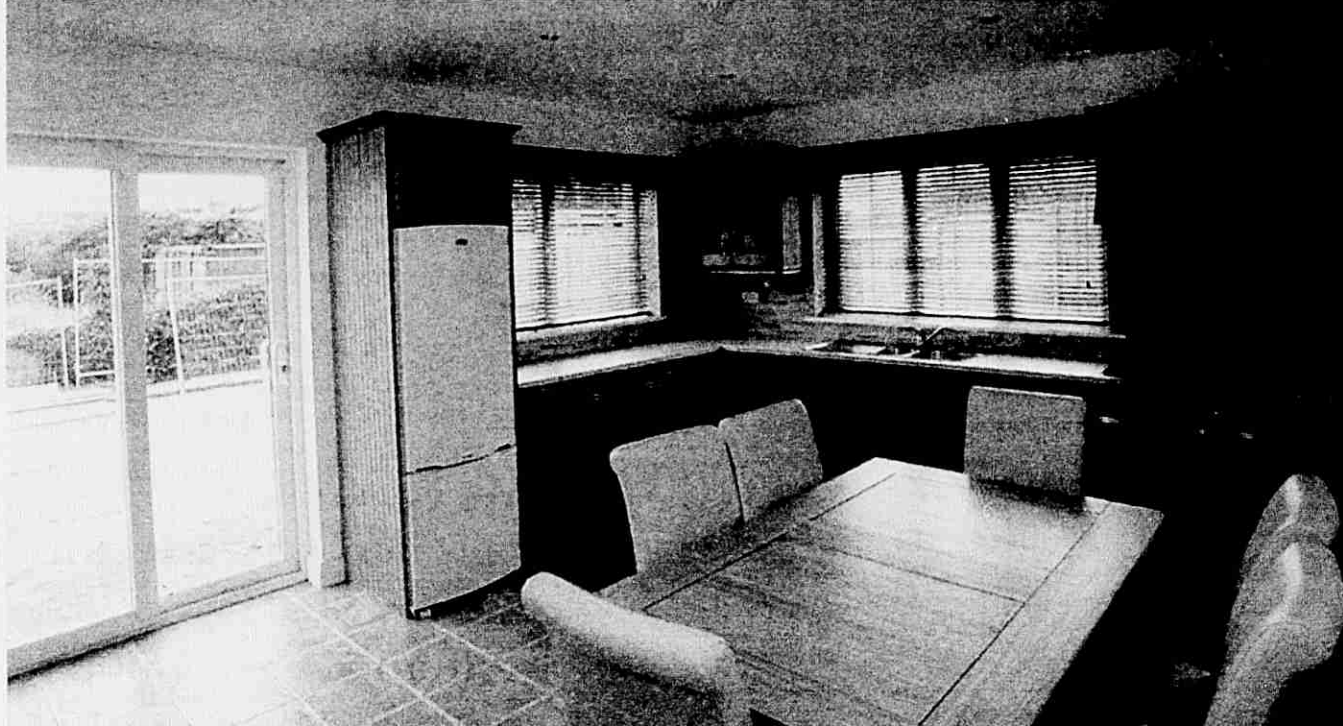

### LISMORE CLOSE IN ON MINOR CUP VICTORY

It was a difficult weekend for sports officials in high profile encounters. In a premier league soccer match across the water, referee Rob Styles managed to make 'heavy work' of a few decisions much to the wrath of a misfortunate Liverpool side. However, in a far more important encounter, Lismores David Champion, whilst at the beginning of a major innings, was given out when umpire Michael Hickey decided bizarrely to overrule his colleague who was clearly better placed to adjudicate on a 'no ball' call. However, a clearly disgruntled Lismore side showed a great deal of professionalism and true grit to carve out a superb victory in the Minor Cup semi final and will now look forward to the opportunity to retain their title.

The players departed from the Red House corner early on Sunday clearly focused on what lay ahead. Captain Sunil Monga selected a strong effective eleven in the knowledge that the club were just a game away from another Munster Final.

Kerry won the toss and invited Lismore to bat, and openers David Champion and Martin Finn were progressing nicely until Champion, as aforementioned, was controversially given out. Champion climbed into a full toss on hearing the call of 'no-ball' from the square-leg umpire, only to sky a catch to mid-on. When the catch was taken, the bowler's end umpire decided to over-rule his colleague on the no-ball decision and gave Champion out. Finn was next man out, caught in the covers driving off the back foot, and the skipper Sunil Monga got a rare duck, lofting a drive to mid-on. This left Lismore in a spot of trouble at 33 for 3 in the 15th over, but Jon Russell and Brian Power built a good partnership to put Lismore back in the ascendancy. Russell drove and pulled well, and Power was very severe on anything pitched short. At the drinks break at 20 over Lismore were 71 for 3, and looking in good shape. Kerry brought on two leg-spinners, the Australian Mike Munday and veteran Ron Kimber, and the game changed. The partnership of 46 was broken when Power (26) was caught slogging at Kimber, and Russell (top scorer with 29) followed soon after, having driven Munday over long-on for 6, was stumped trying to repeat the shot. At 89 for 5, the innings hung in the balance, but then came the best batting of the match. Keith Barry and Paddy Byrne blocked out the spinners, scoring just 7 runs off 6 overs, but slowly began to wrest the initiative back from the bowlers. With a combination of good defence and controlled hitting, the pair began to raise the run rate. 27 were taken off two overs to leave Lismore on 145 for 5 after 38 overs, and a total over 160 looked possible. Lismore lost three wickets for just 6 runs in the last two overs, including Byrne (26), run out, Barry (28), caught slogging, and Oliver Ind, sacrificing his wicket in pursuit of quick runs. The innings closed at 149 for 8 after the 40 overs, with Lismore pleased to have recovered so well and Kerry regretting not having applied more pressure when Lismore were 5 down. The 6th wicket partnership was worth 57, and gave the visitors a good chance of claiming a spot in the final.

After the tea Lismore opened the attack well, with Ian Haynes and Brian Power beating the bat regularly, and after 5 overs Kerry had just 9

runs. The Kerry opening batsmen weathered the storm, however, and put up a 50 partnership in 14 overs. Change bowler Jon Russell made the breakthrough, thanks to a stunning catch a point by Ken Sutton, diving to take a two-handed catch at full stretch. Munday, batting a number three, launched Russell for a big six before being caught by Power off the same bowler, but veteran opener Dennis Moylan and young Seán Rutland built a good partnership to put Kerry in control. With 11 overs to go, and Kerry on 106 for two, 44 were needed to win at 4-an-over with eight wickets in hand, and the smart money was on Kerry. Then Rutland was caught by Keith Barry off Sunil Monga at mid-off, and in the next over Moylan was caught at the wicket by David Champion standing up to Jon Russell. With the loss of wickets, the required run-rate began to climb, and Russell and Champion affected the run-out of the dangerous Parsons as the batsmen tried for a run that was never there. Old foe Dave Ramsey was adjudged LBW to Russell, and with seven overs to go Kerry needed 34 to win with four wickets in hand. Four wickets had been taken for just 10 runs in 4 overs, thanks to the superb bowling of Russell (4 for 18 off his 8 overs) and Keith Barry (whose last three overs went for just 7 runs), backed up by excellent fielding. Ron Kimber (batting with a runner due to a pulled hamstring) and Australian wicket-keeper John 'stretch' Ferraro tried to get them in singles, and with three overs left, 17 were needed for a Kerry victory, as the drizzle began to drift in off Mount Brandon. Skipper Sunil Monga bowled an excellent over for just three runs, and the equation began to favour Lismore. In the penultimate over, Paddy Byrne conceded just three runs, and bowled Kimber, trying to slog over mid-wicket, and the odds were stacked in Lismore's favour. With 11 needed to win off the last over, Kerry needed to find the boundary, and Monga had Ferraro caught by Brian Power at square leg off the first ball of the over. With two runs a ball needed just to tie, Monga was happy to set the field back to defend the boundary, and the final five balls all went for singles, to give Lismore victory by 5 runs. It was a mature performance by Lismore, and a fine display of composure under pressure. Kerry were left rueing leaving Lismore escape from 89 for 5 to a respectable total, and wondering how they had failed to score 44 from 11 overs with 8 wicket in hand. Lismore now face the winners of Cork County and Middleton in the final on 9th September. The team was: Sunil Monga (captain), David Champion, Martin Finn, John Russell, Brian Power, Keith Barry, Paddy Byrne, Ken Sutton, Oliver Ind, and Ian Haynes.

Next weekend Lismore fight to keep their Championship hopes alive, playing Middleton in Division 3 on Saturday and home to Waterford Institute of Technology in Division 2 on Sunday. Both games start at 1 pm.

# COOKERY CORNER

## Exotic chicken curry

A TROPICAL oasis of flavour – try this fruity chicken curry.

1 banana, peeled and sliced  
400g Thai jasmine or Basmati rice to serve

**Ingredients:**

- Serves 4 to 6
- 20ml groundnut oil
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cubed
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 3cm root ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 stick lemon grass, trimmed and chopped
- 100g baby corn, trimmed and sliced diagonally
- 3 x 10ml sp Malaysian mild curry powder
- 20ml Thai green curry sauce
- 1 x 5ml sp ground turmeric
- 1 x 10ml sp plain flour
- 400ml can coconut milk
- 150ml chicken stock
- 2 x 15ml sp freshly chopped coriander
- 227g can pineapple pieces in natural juice
- 1 small ripe mango, peeled, stoned and sliced

**Method:**

Heat half the groundnut oil in a large pan. Season the chicken with salt and pepper, add to the hot (almost smoking) oil and cook, turning until brown on all sides.

Remove from the pan. Add the remaining oil to the pan. Lower the heat and then fry the onion, garlic, ginger, lemon grass and baby corn, stirring occasionally, for about five minutes. Add the chicken.

Mix together the curry powder, curry sauce, turmeric and flour, add to the pan, stirring all the time, and cook for two minutes.

Gradually add the coconut milk, stock and juice from the pineapple. Bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring frequently to prevent it burning.

Meanwhile, cook the rice according to the packet instructions.

Just before serving, stir the pineapple pieces, mango, banana and coriander into the curry, then serve with rice.



## Brioche buffet bites with herbs

DELIGHTFULLY different and impressive buffet type snacks – French cuisine with a twist.

**Ingredients:**

- Makes 24
- 8 medium slices brioche
- 1 x 15ml sp chives, finely snipped
- 1 x 15ml sp dill, finely chopped
- 2 x 15ml sp mayonnaise

**Method:**

Use a 5cm round cutter to stamp out 24 circles from the bread. Do not include the crust. Mix the chives and dill in a small bowl.

Next, spread a thin coat of mayonnaise on the edge of each circle of bread, taking care not to get any mayonnaise on the top surfaces.

Then, roll these edges in the herbs, give them a gentle

shake to remove any excess and arrange on a serving plate.

These particular sandwiches will dry out more quickly than others and there isn't any butter to keep them moist, so keep them covered in plastic wrap until just before you are ready to serve.

**TOP TIPS:** You can try this method with all sorts of herbs and spices – in fact anything that will stick to the bread using a small amount of mayonnaise.

Just roll the edge of the brioche circles in your chosen coating instead of the dill and chives and follow the rest of the recipe.

Also, brioche is perfect for making the sweet variety of sandwiches too. Use jam or syrup instead of mayonnaise and hundreds and thousands or icing sugar instead of herbs.

## American-style picnic muffins

AN American cake-snack which is perfect for lunchboxes and picnics.

**Ingredients:**

- Makes 16-20
  - 200g self-raising flour
  - 75g golden caster sugar
  - 2 medium eggs
  - 4 x 15ml sp sunflower oil
  - 4 x 15ml sp milk
  - 200g blueberries
  - 125g quality white chocolate, coarsely chopped
- FOR THE STRUDEL:**
- 100g butter, softened
  - 75g light muscovado sugar
  - 1/2 x 5ml sp ground cinnamon
  - 75g plain flour

**Method:**

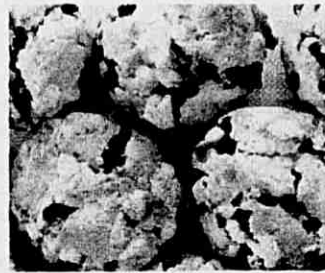
For the strudel, beat together the butter and sugar. Add the cinnamon and flour and combine well.

For the muffins, mix the flour and sugar.

Beat together the eggs, oil and milk then add to the flour, combining gently but thoroughly. Stir in the berries and chocolate, taking care not to bruise the fruit.

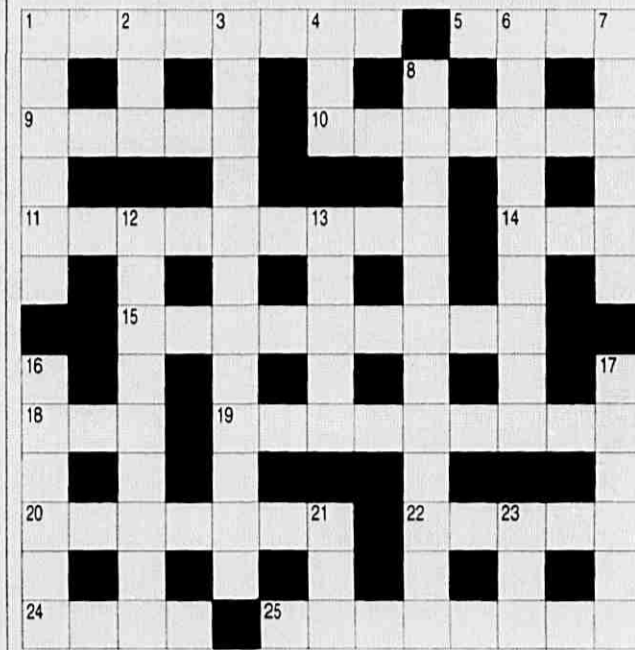
Spoon into 16-20 muffin cases. Using your fingers, crumble the strudel mixture over the top.

Bake at 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6 for about 20 minutes until golden brown and risen. If you can find large American-sized muffin cases, bake for 2-3 minutes longer.

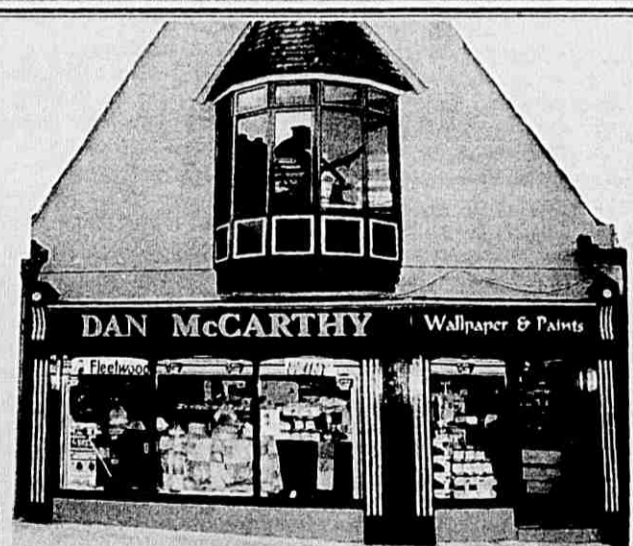

### WW/EC 0 Herbertstown 0

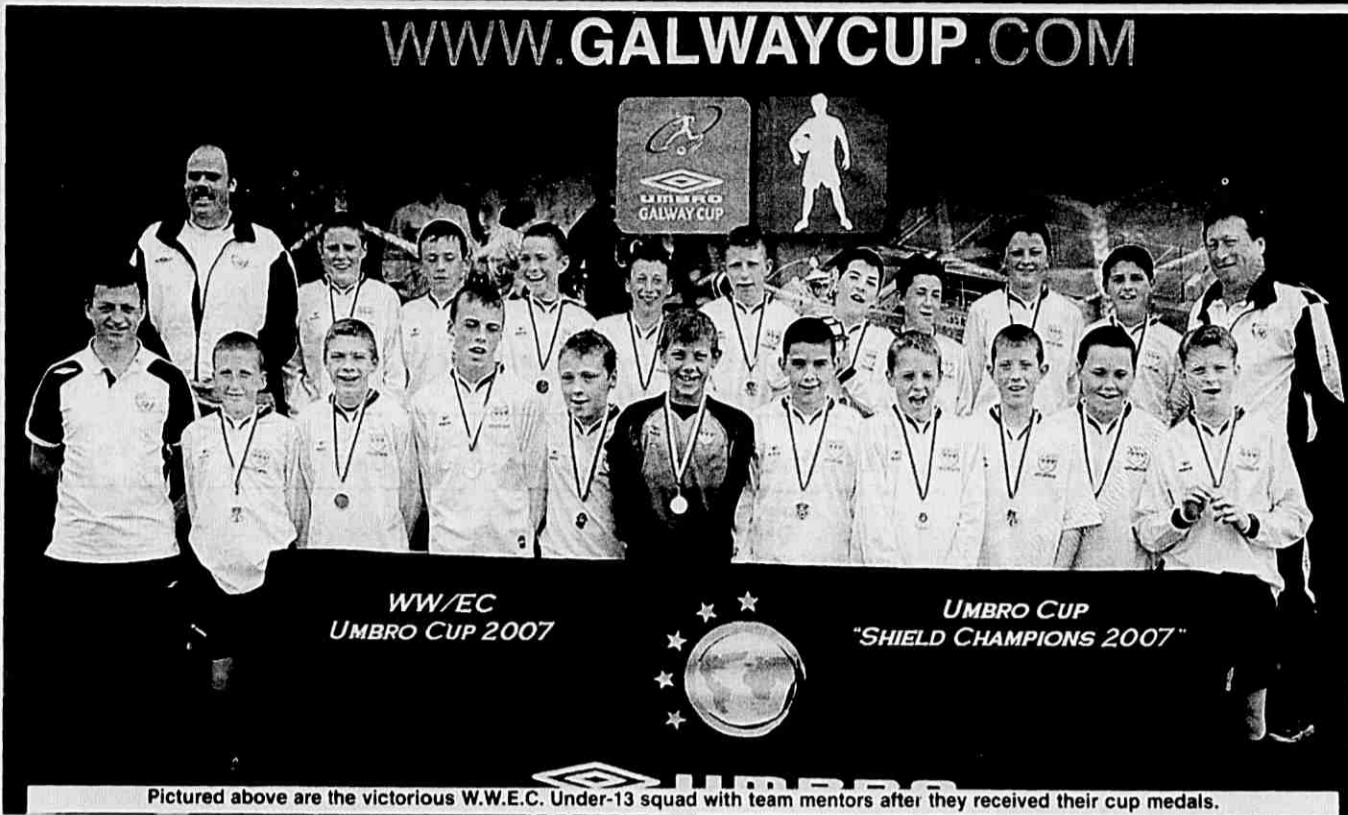

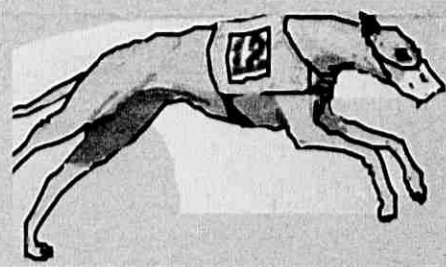

## River Tom Swept To Victory

Favourite backers enjoyed a profitable session in Kilcohan Park last Friday night when a high volume of market leaders obliged on the eleven race card.

Racing however opened with a 5/1 winner with the Lough Syndicate owned and Jack Molloy trained Gas Cooker (Knockeevan Major-Dream On Mary) making full use of his early pace to lead all the way in a smart 28.89. Bosheen Booster came out of the pack to give chase to the leader but Gas Cooker was gone beyond recall crossing the winning line with half a length to spare over Bosheen Booster.

Races two and three were semi finals of the Benefit Meetings N2 Unraced event.

In the first semi final Minglers Vieri set a hot early gallop but picking up the running over the final two bends the Tom Power owned Premonition (Top Honcho-Proud Pegs Guest) the warm 4/6 favourite appeared all set for an easy win. After a moderate break Stone Bridge ran on well at the finish but failed by half a length to overhaul Premonition. Time 29.50.

The Jim Curran owned and Peter Brady trained Quanns Blackbird (Honcho Classic-Desert Eily) 2/1 to 4/6 was the best-backed runner in the second qualifier and he duly obliged in 29.40. Behind early on as Peters Fountain made the long break for home Quanns Blackbird produced a nice dash of back stretch pace and cruising into a third bend lead on the fence Quanns Blackbird stormed clear up the home stretch to run out a clear cut ten and a half lengths winner over Celtic Charmer who met with first bend crowding.

Honey Mandy was prominent early on in race four but Rowdy Nellie and Bregawn Jim settled down to battle it out up front the length of the back stretch. Between the final two bends however Rowdy Nellie moved out off the rails and badly hampered Bregawn Jim. Consequently the Davy and Michael Power owned Honey Mandy (Droopys Scholes-Knockmoylean Rose) 6/4 was allowed a free run in to beat Colour Code Kate by four lengths in 29.59.

Both market leaders came up trumps in the semi finals of the Nick Turner sponsored Birchtree Kennels D4 Marathon event. In the first semi final the reserve Hold Tough set out to make all the running, as the two market leaders Distant Darkie and Parisienne Way were none to clever at the break. Cutting every corner the Julie Power owned Distant Darkie (Blackjack Tom-Autumn Gift) 4/6 eventually forced her way into the lead at the fourth bend and while the always prominent Charming Winona stayed on well Distant Darkie dug deep to land the spoils by half a length in 41.14.

The Andrew Weldon owned Roseville Becky (Hondo Black-Adeles Belle) was despatched as the warm 4/6 favourite in the second semi final but after missing the break to her credit the favourite had to work really hard for her 41.37 success. A fast starting Mountkeeffe Lark took six lengths out of the field early on leading from Woodys Dash but with the leaders coming back to the pack we were all set for a grandstand finish. Staying on dourly Roseville Becky came through to beat a slow starting Old South by a neck with the early leader Mountkeeffe Lark two lengths further back in third.

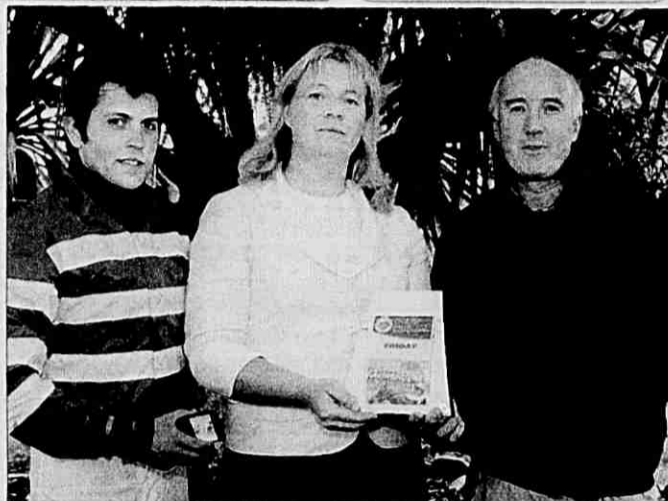

Connections feel this five year old under the care of Tony Mullins can improve even further given faster underfoot conditions.

Saturday evening saw Fran Berry record yet another double courtesy of Bernabeau 12/1 and 6/1 shot Diamond Frontier.

There was a popular County Waterford success on Sunday afternoon as the David Kiely trained 6/1 chance Liscooney under a strong drive from Denis O'Regan finished with a rattle to get up in the dying strides to defeat Arc En Ciel by half a length.

The next fixture for Tramore is pencilled in for Thursday October 11th.

## TEOFILO RETIRED

The unbeaten Teofilo was recently retired to stud and here is a brief history of the three-year-old colt. Home-bred by Jim Bolger and named after the legendary Cuban three-time Olympic Champion Heavyweight boxer, Teofilo Stevenson, Teofilo is from the first crop of Galileo, hero of the 2001 Vodafone Derby, and out of Speirbhean, who Bolger trained to win the Listed 1,000 Guineas Trial at Leopardstown in 2001. Speirbhean's one

previous foal was the filly Senora Galileo, a 10-furlong handicap winner in 2006. Described by Bolger as the best horse he has trained, even surpassing his 1992 Irish Derby victor St Jovite, Teofilo made his debut in a seven-furlong maiden at the Curragh on July 16, 2006, when sent off at 8/1, and after making much of the running he showed determination to rally and account for 4/5 favourite Red Rock Canyon. Stepped up to Listed class for his second outing, Teofilo was the ready winner of the seven-furlong Tyros Stakes at Leopardstown on July 29, coming home a length and three quarters in front of British challenger Middleham.

For his third run, Teofilo returned to the Curragh to contest the Group Two Futurity Stakes on August 26, when once again he stayed on in determined fashion, this time holding off the challenge of Eagle Mountain to score by a head. Teofilo's juvenile season would progress even further with two Group One victories. At the Curragh on September 17, he put up a superb display, taking the lead over a furlong out to prove a length and a quarter too strong for 4/9 favourite Holy Roman Emperor in the National Stakes over seven furlongs.

Teofilo was made 11/8 favourite when he reopposed Holy Roman Emperor in the Darley Dewhurst Stakes at Newmarket on October 14, when he took up the running over a furlong from home before being headed by his Aidan O'Brien-trained rival. However, Teofilo showed great resolution to rally and regain the lead, eventually scoring by a head. Teofilo suffered a slight training setback in mid-April and was restricted to swimming and walking for a week and a decision was then taken to retire him to stand at Kildangan Stud. Teofilo was rated the best juvenile colt in Europe in 2006, with a rating of 123.

## Dundalk opens a new era for Irish racing

### THE FINAL FURLONG (IN ASSOCIATION WITH BETFAIR) WITH PHIL DELANEY

Every sport has its snobbery. Can you imagine the Kilkenny team lining out in Sunday week's All-Ireland hurling final with huris carved and crafted in North Mayo? Or Mayo in turn taking the field for next year's Connacht football championship with a Kilkenny man at the helm.

Even a golfer whose handicap is 24 but could be 84 for all the difference it would make, won't tear off the first tee with his bag full of driving range golf balls. Arrive down at your local tennis club with a timber-frame racket and you might suddenly have trouble finding a doubles partner. Not too far beneath the surface every sport has its own unique snobbery and racing is no different.

Some National Hunt racing supporters would watch reruns of Live At Three before they'd tune in to the action from York and, likewise, thoroughbred Flat racing fans see the jumps season as an unnecessary distraction. Something to keep their country cousins happy for the winter.

But racing fans, be they National Hunt or Flat, unite for one prejudice. All-weather racing.

You know what I'm talking about. Low-grade handicaps, sellers and claimers from Southwell, Wolverhampton, Kempton and Lingfield on a Tuesday afternoon, the same bad horses chasing each other around dusty bends, and the grandstands so empty that sometimes you wonder if these horses drove themselves to the races.

Excuse the hypocrisy then as we welcome the opening of Dundalk's All-Weather stadium, which stages its first race meeting at the weekend.

Built at the cost of €23 million, the new polytrack surface has received glowing praise from frustrated trainers who have been watching their horses being balloted out of races for the past two years.

So what can we expect from the ten furlong left-handed oval track? Views on polytrack differ but it is thought to suit horses who don't want any extremes of going. Jockey Seamie Heffernan said after last week's trial day there, that it would take a gutsy horse to win from the front and with a run in of two and a half furlongs, "stamina" was a word mentioned quite a bit.

There will be no jumps races at Dundalk although 'bumpers' will become a regular

feature and it isn't too dramatic to say that Dundalk will change the landscape of Irish racing. Most of the meetings will take place at evening time under floodlights and if the first of those meetings at the weekend is anything to go by, maybe our prejudices about All-Weather racing will have to be revisited.

Sunday's seven-race card carries €217,000 in prize money with Premier Handicaps worth €60,000 and €70,000. For a while Dundalk will surely be a bookie's benefit as we get to grips with the new surface and back up our stab in the dark with well-earned readies. Maybe a watching brief might suffice for a while.

One of Irish racing's most severe problems is that there are too many horses running in Ireland at present, and too many bad ones at that. That problem is accentuated by the fact that these bad horses can't get into races leaving owners and trainers alike in a high state of frustration. Dundalk's challenge will be to provide a service for that band of horse while also keeping the standard high enough for us snotty purists...

## One to watch

This section is usually the preserve of horses (one of which, Satu, won again at the weekend) but this week we're going to include a trainer. John 'Shark' Hanlon has made a notable start to his training career and he sent out his sixth winner when the former Michael Stoute-trained Darenjan won the ladies maiden at Tramore last week. There was plenty of money behind Adrienne Foley's mount as she won with the minimum of fuss. Shark admitted afterwards that this race had been the plan for some time. ## Affane Man Manager Of Waterford United U-21's

He helped establish one club on the outskirts of Cappoquin, formed a formidable schoolboy set up in the town itself, and has helped mould schoolboys throughout the county and city for the Junior and Senior ranks. Now, one of the most influential figures in youth development, Tom Browne, talks to the Dungarvan Leader about his new role as manager of the Waterford Utd U21 team.

Tom Browne is busier than ever. For someone with a seemingly inexhaustible supply of energy and with a passionate interest in football spanning back to his playing days with Dungarvan Utd, the foundation of Affane Football Club, and the formation of Cappoquin schoolboy side, Railway Athletic FC twenty-five years ago, that says something.

Juggling responsibilities as Head of Youth Development and manager of the Waterford Utd U21's as well as a coaching tutor with the FAI, Tom is a popular figure within the game, and one of the elite footballers of the Kennedy Cup sides which have won All-Ireland and Munster titles, know as probably one of the most knowledgeable figures in the local game.

The Brian Kerr of the Waterford game, Tom founded Affane Football Club with his friend and the best man at his wedding, Eddie McGrath in 1978.

A few years later, John Welsh started Railway Athletic FC and Tom was there from the beginning, at the start as a Referee. When his decade long stint as a referee in the Waterford League came to an end, he began a successful time coaching the underage setup at Railway.

It sparked a career dedicated to developing young players and bringing them through the conveyor belt of elite representative sides onto the highest levels. He has worked in the role of underage development in Waterford for the past eight years. Just some of the players he's worked with include Manchester Utd's John O'Shea, Eddie Nolan now of Blackburn Rovers, Gary Dunphy who spent time with Glasgow Celtic and Abbeyside's Willie John Kiely who had a spell with Aberdeen.

His term was very successful and the representative teams under his care won Munster Finals and All-Ireland's.

The board of Waterford Utd then asked him to go into the Waterford Utd set-up. With the new licensing conditions imposed by the UEFA, Utd was required to have a conveyor belt of young players coming through. Tom was selected as the man to head up the effort and they asked him to go in as first team coach with manager Gareth Cronin.

"Always in the back of my mind was the U21 team was starting so the natural progression is that players that would have started in the Kennedy Cup six years ago would be at the age now where they would be playing U21 football so that I would know what the players are like. That's where it started. They made me head of Youth Development as well which is continuing on from where I was with the schoolboy league," he says.

Since taking up the role, he's found the greatest difficulty in getting players to play for a club with a low profile. He wants players who "wanted to break the door down to play for Waterford Utd at underage and U21 level," he says.

"There's a lot to do," he says. "To be honest about it Waterford Utd were a long way behind."

With the players he brought in, the U21 team has been successful. After the first four league games they were top of the table. But he's under no illusions that it will be an easy task.

"The U21 league is a very tough league," he said of the leagues second tier, which includes Ballinroad's Shane Delahunty and Dungarvan's Jonathon Shaw among their ranks.

"It's a very physical league, but it's technically good too." He says the Waterford League has a top class set up and the link up with Waterford Utd can only bode good things.

"Years ago," he says, "when the Kennedy Cup was over at U14 the next time that lad could represent Waterford was at U18 level. Now that's gone thank God."

"You can go U14, U15, U16 and U18 and then the U21 team with Waterford Utd. So the minute a young lad starts at 11, if he wants to, he has a ladder the whole way up to go as high as he wants to go."

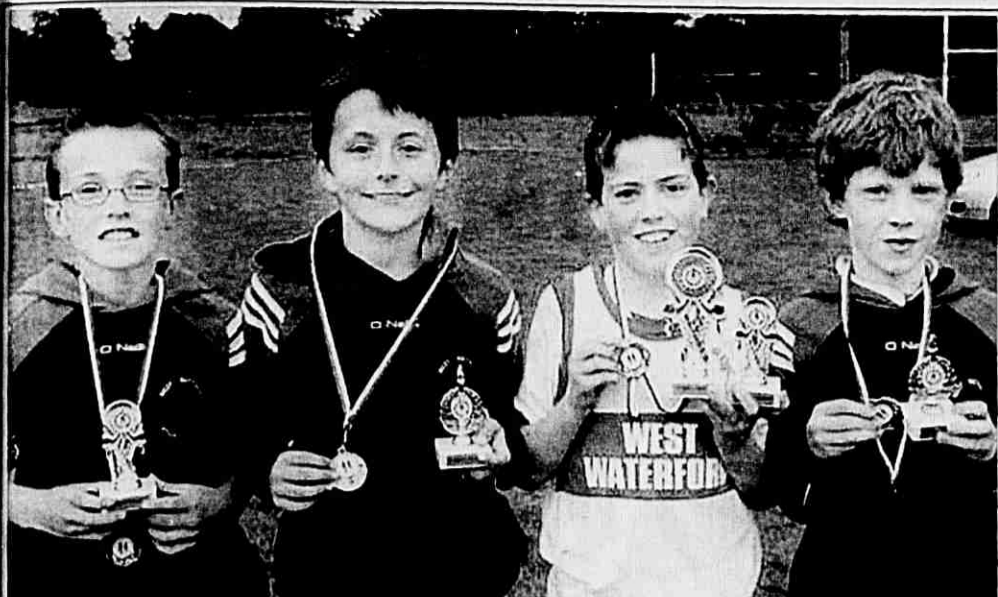

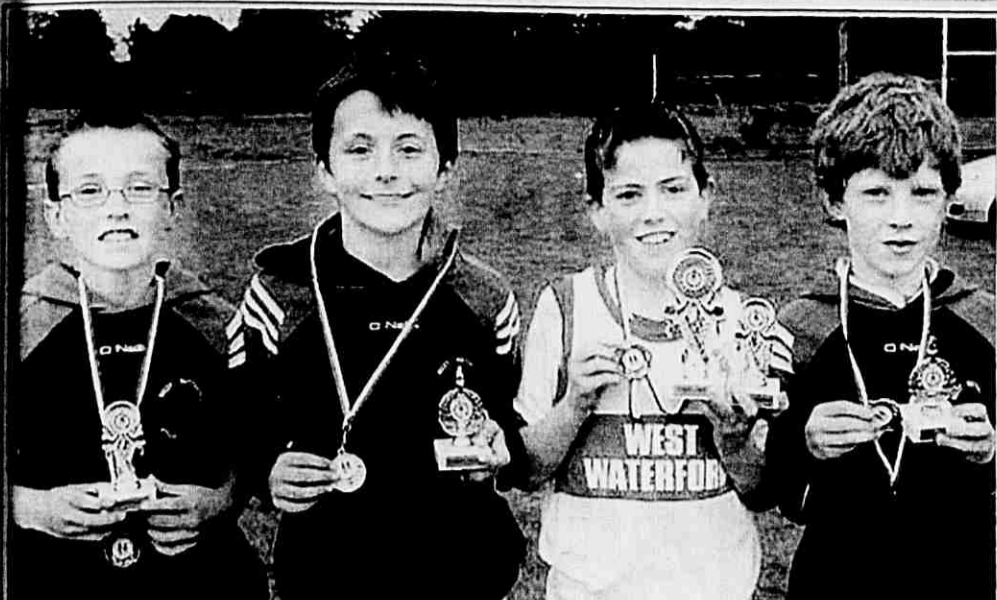

# A Year To Remember

With ten days having passed since the huge Croke Park disappointment, the county is returning to normal and getting to grips with reality

One of the reassuring features of the aftermath is that there has been no criticism of the players and the general view is that far too much was expected of them in attempting to reproduce the standard of hurling which they displayed against Cork on the two previous Sundays in Croke Park. It is generally accepted that the replay in particular had such an affect on their bodies that it was not possible to recover in the space of six or seven days.

Understandably there has been severe criticism of the system which allowed for a three Sundays in a row programme and requiring amateurs to reproduce top form, Sunday after Sunday.

It is hardly fair either to blame the C.C.C in Croke Park as they have just been operating a system which had evolved in recent years following Congress and special Congress changes.

Some of the above problems were topics in the debate by Central Council in Croke Park on Saturday last. It will likely take another Special Congress to solve some of the many fixtures problems which are making life difficult for everyone at the moment.

**GREAT YEAR**

By our standards we have enjoyed a great season (without achieving our burning ambition). We did have 5 super games against old rivals, Cork and winning 4 and drawing the fifth. We had a splendid Munster final victory over Limerick and for a long time to come we will rejoice in defeating the champions, Kilkenny in the National League- our first win here since 1963.

A whisper from the inside, tells of that entire senior hurling panel of players, wish to remain on. This, if accurate will not mean that changes won't take place and new talent introduced.

There are indications also that the management team are keen on remaining in control and while this is a matter for the county board, it looks certain to be given their full approval.

I was back in Croke Park over the weekend where I met so many people who expressed their genuine disappointment for Waterford and the general feeling was that the three Sundays on the trot in Croke Park was just too much and that in other circumstances the result would have been difficult.

There were complimentary remarks about we being gracious in defeat and it was also mentioned that the ungracious comments by a representative of the opposition were indiscreet.

## Stradbally Turn On The Style In Second Half

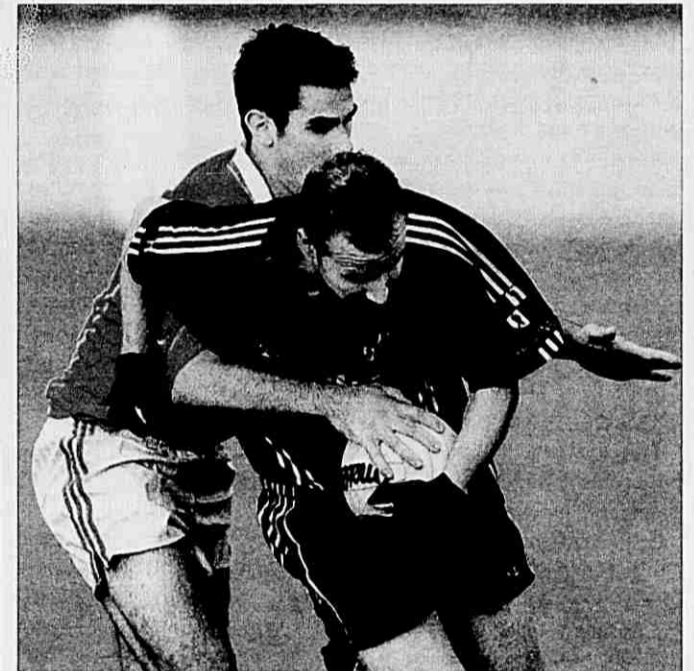
**STRADBALLY 1-12 ST. SAVIOURS 0-6**

# Waterford Quietly Confident Of Beating Wexford

This championship has been completely overshadowed by the senior hurling progress in the county, but now that we are no longer involved in the big game, the focus will be on the attempt by the intermediate side to bring us our first hurling national title since 1992.

It might be a good omen that the final is at the venue where we won the one and only under 21 hurling title 15 years ago. Since late last week when the disappointment of the Limerick game was starting to wear off, there has been a buzz about our prospects of winning our first

ever title in the intermediate grade and the expectations are that a very large crowd will make the journey across the Nore on Saturday to support the team who are reported to be in sparkling form for the test.

Waterford and Wexford have never met in a hurling final in any grade so this will be unique for both.

Wexford, like Waterford are starved for success on the hurling

front. Waterford with a strong and very well coached panel have so far enjoyed a good run, beating Clare and Limerick in Munster before scoring an easy victory over Galway in the semi-final.

Also they have played a few useful challenge matches in preparation for this final test.

On Sunday last they had a trial run in Nolan Park where they took on the Galway under 21 hurlers who are currently preparing for a semi-final meeting with Cork. This was a very competitive challenge with Waterford coming off second best on a 3-13 to 2-13 scoreline.

Wexford are reported to be physically stronger and playing the old style of game that helped them to achieve a huge degree of fame in the fifties, etc.

The line out was not available at the time of compiling these notes but was announced following training at Fraher Field on Monday evening. (See lineout elsewhere on this page.)

It is expected to show little change from the line-out against Galway in the semi-final.

There is a great air of confidence around the county that a bit of history will be made on Saturday, by winning our very first title in this grade.

Records This championship did not commence until 1961 when Wexford were the first winners after defeating London by 3-13 to 4-4.

Ten counties, Cork 6, Tipperary 5, Wexford 3, London 2, Galway 2, Carlow, Kildare, Antrim, Kilkenny and Limerick have all won it on one occasion. Cork are the holders, having defeated Kilkenny here in Fraher Field in 2006.

The championship was suspended from 1974 to 1996.

This championship took over from the junior hurling All Ireland championship at the start of the sixties and Waterford and Clare are the only two McCarthy Cup teams not to have won it.

Early in the last century when the junior hurling championship was a high profile competition, Waterford made the headlines on two or three occasions. Those were the years in which we played all our best hurlers in the junior grade and had all the top players giving it their all.

In 1931 when Tallow were the leading lights in the game, we won the Munster J.H.C when defeating, Tipperary by 7-3 to 4-5 in the final before going on to defeat Lancashire by 10-7 to 1-2.

In 1934 Waterford again won the Munster J.H.C. having defeated Cork by 7-10 to 5-2 before beating London by 3-5 to 3-3.

We lost the 1936 All Ireland J.H. final to Westmeath (3-5 to 2-1) after winning the third Munster J.H. final (Waterford 3-2 Cork 1-1).

1936 then was the last occasion on which we last won a non senior hurling adult title.

## Referees & Discipline

As a result of the recent splendidly attended meeting of the referees in the county, a letter has been received by all the relevant boards who have asked that a copy be sent to every club in the county.

The 'get tough' policy which is to be pursued by referees (and hopefully by the boards) is clearly outlined in this document. They are not likely to stamp out indiscipline of every degree but this latest campaign should certainly reduce the kind of misbehaviour that is making life so difficult for referees at all levels.

Their letter pointed out that two very prominent and long serving referees have recently threatened to quit the service because of the misconduct (and abuse) to which they have been subjected.

The matter of club officials contacting referees on behalf of players who have been disciplined, will in future be brought to the attention of the appropriate board.

One of the prominent referees involved in this meeting told me that too many club officers do not have the courage to discipline players who engage in referee abuse and the sideline people who offend. The same referee felt that some of the problems would be solved if selectors were kept in the dugouts where they are supposed to be and he said that this is a matter for the boards.

## TICKETS

This was the second semi-final and a match in which the seven points gap exaggerated the difference in standards between the teams.

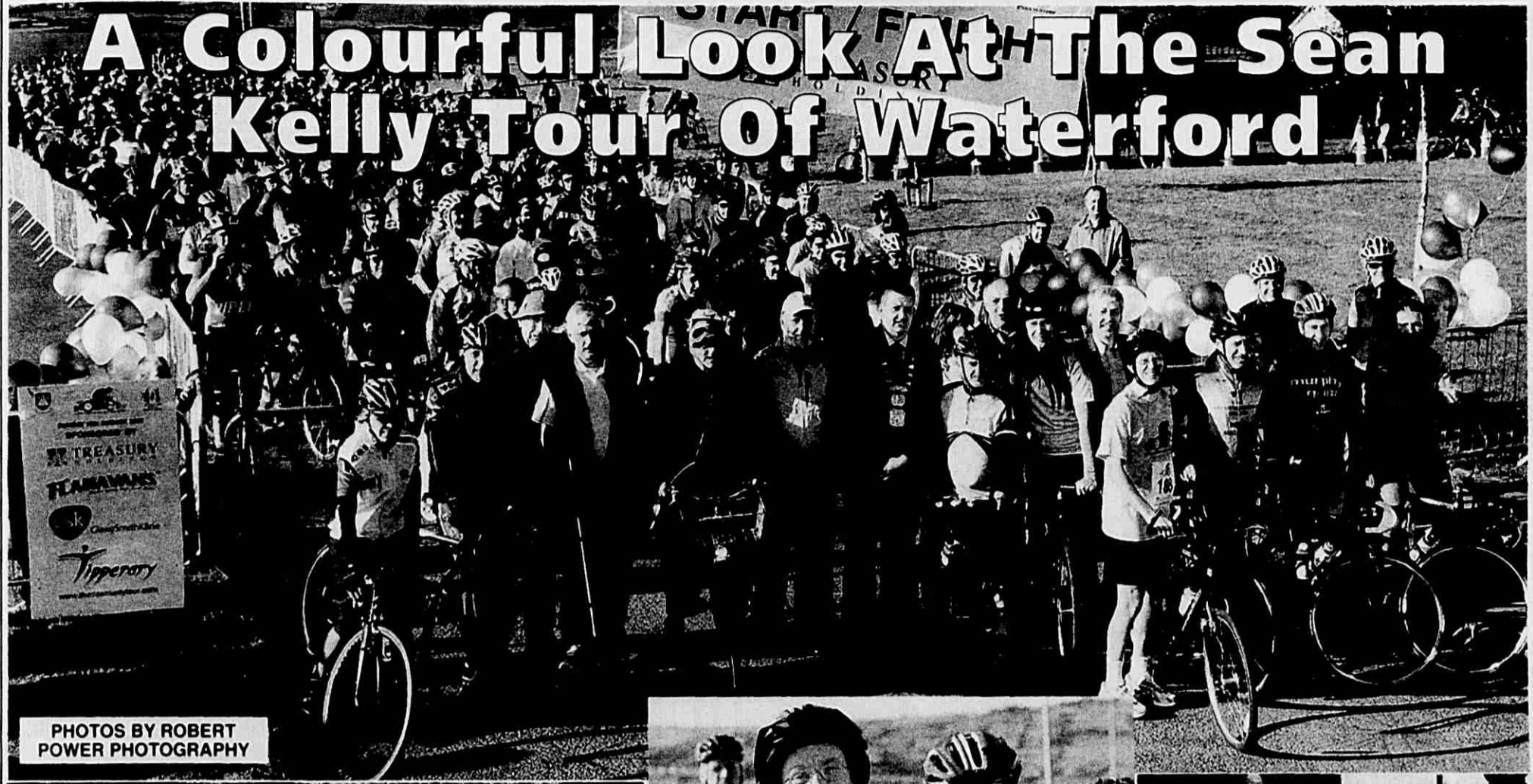

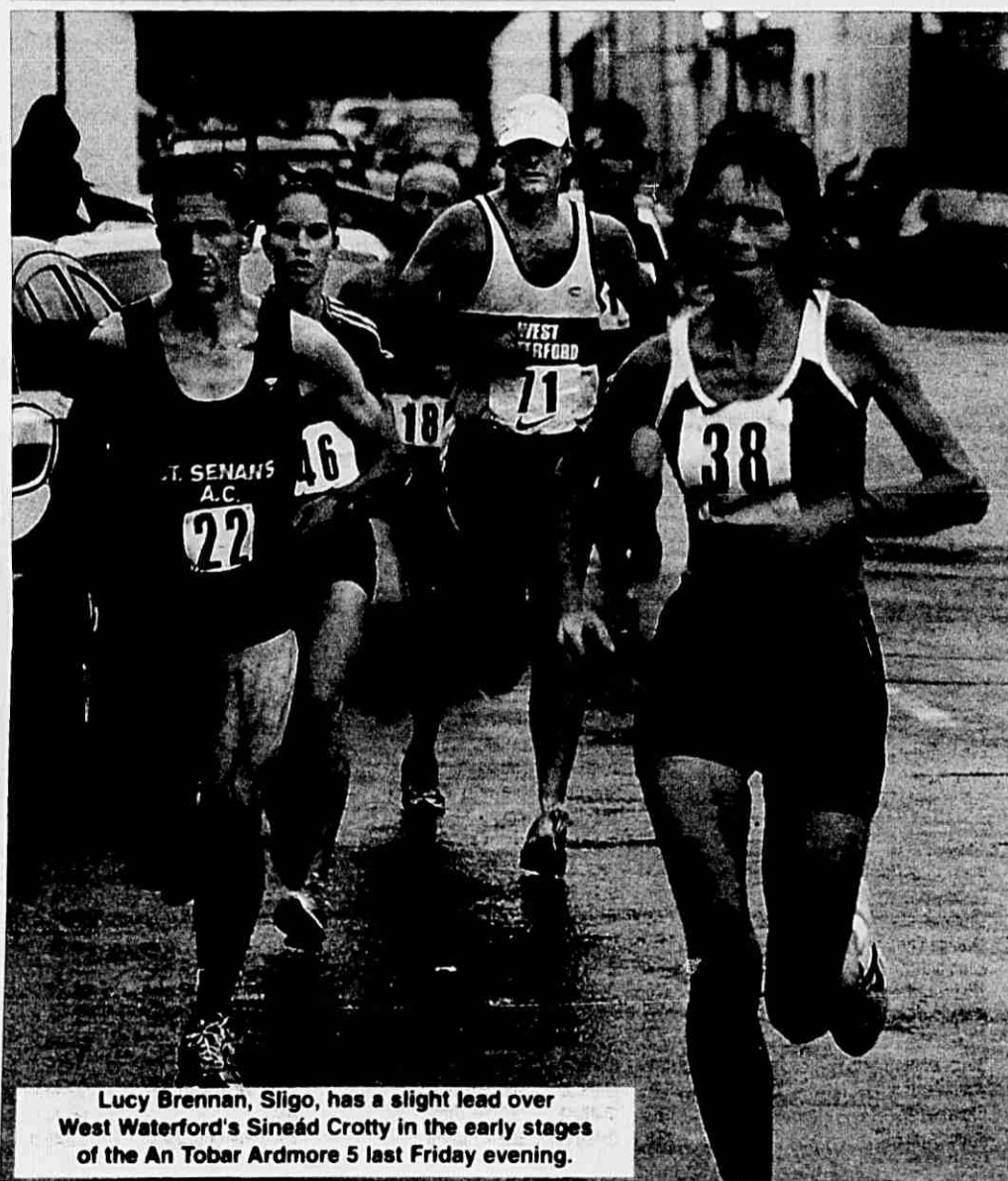

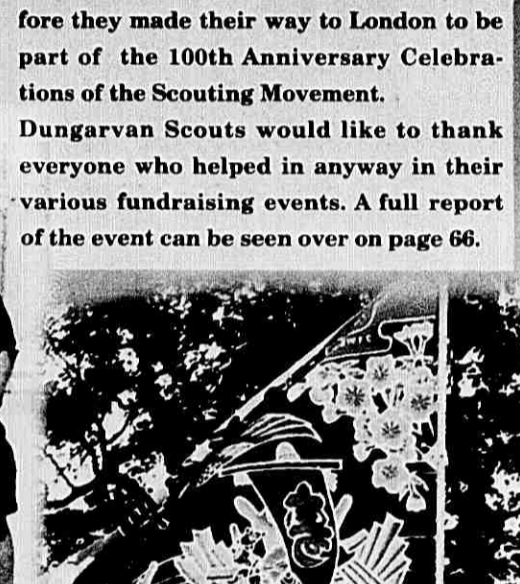
## Dungarvan Scouts Are Part Of World Jamboree In England And Join 43,000 Scouts In Hylands Park


