Canoeist Saved By Helvick Lifeboat

The RNLI lifeboat at Helvick was called out on Wednesday last in response to a call for assistance for one of two canoeists - a father and son who had got into difficulties outside Helvick Cove.

The 20 year old had taken water in his canoe when a wave washed in over it. He attempted to access the shore by climbing the cliff, but when he scaled almost three quarters of the cliff his footing became unsure and he was unable to go forward or climb back down.

The father had already made to shore and brought in the second canoe.

The lifeboat was on the scene within minutes. The rescue helicopter had also been alerted.

Crewman Richard Haynes climbed up the cliff with a rope to secure the man and prevent him from falling. He then returned to the lifeboat, which stood by while the helicopter arrived and winched the young man to safety.

Both canoeists said they were relieved to be back safely on



Funding Awarded To Waterford County Local Authorities €23,000 Grant For Anti-Litter Awareness

The Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government has allocated €23,000 to county Waterford for public education and awareness initiatives on litter.

This grant is intended to cover a broad range of measures to raise public awareness and to stimulate anti-litter activity at

Is your community planning a project which will raise awareness of litter, if so; you may be eligible for a grant towards the cost of the project.

Waterford County Council invites submissions from Community Groups, Schools, Tidy Towns Committees or other Community Development Organisations who are interested in receiving funding for public education and awareness regarding litter.

Criteria.

Projects should aim at establishing or replicating best practice in relation to litter education/awareness measures, and should as far as possible, have a particular focus in involving schools and young people in anti-litter actions and on voluntary initiatives by community and environmental groups.

Grants should be used, where possible, to leverage local business co-funding of anti-litter education/awareness measures.

Grant Amount.

The maximum grant available in any individual case may be to 70% of the overall cost of the project, with the balance being met by way of applicant's contributions/other sources such as sponsorship.

Latest House Prices Indicate it's a Good Time to Be House Shopping

National house prices in Ireland declined by 2.6% in the first six months of 2007 according to the First time buyers V. Second latest edition of the House Price time buyers: Index. The index measures the

In June, the index records that the average price paid for a house in Ireland in June was €1,561 less than that paid the previous month (May): a reduction in national prices of 0.5% in the month. This follows the reduction in national house prices of 0.8% in May and April and 0.6% in March.

Measured over the past 12 months (up to and including June), the average national price paid for a house in Ireland was 0.9% higher in June 2007 than the price paid in

The average price paid for a house nationally in June 2007 was €302,605, compared with €310,632 in December 2006.

Dublin V Rest of Country:

Dublin house prices declined by 1.3% in June while there was a reduction in prices of 0.9% for houses bought outside Dublin. In May 2007 the relative price changes were -1.2% and -0.8%. Over the first half of this year, prices were down by 2.0% and 3.2% respectively.

However in the12 months to the end of June 2007, house prices in Dublin grew by 4.1%. Outside Dublin they reduced by 0.4% over the same period. The equivalent rates to May 2007 were (plus) 7.6% and (plus) 1.5% respectively.

The average price paid for a house in Dublin and outside Dublin in June 2007 was €418,905 and €257,945 respectively. The

House prices in June for firstmovement of house prices over the first six months of the year. time and second-time buyers reduced by 0.9% and 0.5% respectively. In May 2007 the equivalent figures were -1.8% and -0.5%. During the first half of this year prices were down by 3.2% and 2.6% respectively.

House prices grew by 0.6% and 0.7% year on year to June 2007 for first-time and second-time buyers respectively. The equivalent rates

respectively. The average price paid by a first-

time buyer and a second-time buyer in June 2007 was €270,093 and €340,143 respectively. The equivalent prices in December 2006 were €279,003 and €349,213. **New V. Existing Houses** House prices for new houses were down by 0.7% in June while the price for existing houses

decreased by 0.3%. In May this year the relative price changes were minus 1.0% and minus 0.8% respectively for new and second hand houses. During the first

half of this year prices reduced by 1.2% and 2.7% respectively. New and second hand house prices grew by 1.7% and 1.0% respectively year on year to June 2007. The equivalent rates of growth to May 2007 were .3% and 2.4% respectively.

The average price paid for a new house in June 2007 was €298,962, while that paid for a second hand house was €304,391. The equivalent levels December 2006 were 302,645 and €312,709.

VIEWPOINT

BEST KEPT TOWN

Great credit is due to Dungarvan Town Council and, in particular, Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty under whose guidance, the exterior appearance of the county administrative capital has been greatly enhanced in recent years, helping it to make the shortlist for Best Kept Large Town in Ireland.

Dungarvan has come a long way from the dull and dank town pockmarked by abandoned warehouses on the quay, the decaying walls of the castle, and full of derelict houses and former shops of a few years ago

The floral displays on the approaches to the town, the innovative and artistic designs of the roundabouts, and the plans afoot for the areas of the town as yet untouched by urban regeneration has all contributed to a landscape that matches some of our more illustrious neighbours, and must also ensure that Dungarvan is not only a good town to live in, but also acts as an attraction to tourists and visitors from other parts of Ireland and from further afield.

The remains of King John's Castle is just one area transformed. The old sheds and wasteland surrounding it have been removed, the walls and turrets enhanced through the diligence of the Office of Public Works, and the car park fronting it turned into an interesting amenity area - all of which unfortunately makes the eyesore that is the flats at the Lookout stand out all the more.

Nonetheless, like the quays themselves, and the area where the tannery outbuildings once stood, what was at one time an ugly nogo area has been radically changed, making use of the harbour as our greatest asset.

Walton's Park and Grattan Square are also on the list of projects to be completed, although the latest Viewpoint has heard on the opening of the park is that it won't be opened now until sometime in the New Year

Businesses also deserve great credit for what has been achieved. Without their input in the upkeep of their shopfronts nothing could have been done

The Urban Renewal Scheme has done much to inject an impetus into the transformation of Dungarvan. But, the proper use of the scheme was vital, and apart from one or two unfortunate mistakes, including the Lookout apartments, this was achieved. Former County Manager, Donal Connolly deserves more than his share of

But perhaps just as important for the town's continuing upwards spiral is the commercial interest in the town, which has occurred in the last decade, ending years of stagnancy and reversal in its economic well-being.

Because of development, and the location in Dungarvan of many new stores and restaurants in the commercial heart of the town, other businesses have met this competition head on, and have upgraded their own stores and businesses, resulting in an almost uniquely vibrant and attractive town centre.

Dungarvan businesses and the town council will continue to face the challenges these new developments and outside commercial interests bring. It's in facing up to, and seizing the opportunities these challenges bring that will ultimately decide whether Dungarvan is not only propelled further into the ranks of possible tourist destinations to stay in and enjoy, but will ultimately provide the shape of the town for future generations.

WELL DONE TO LEAVING CERT STUDENTS

Simply completing the Leaving Cert is a huge achievement, and all students who are now finished school should remember this.

For many reasons, the Leaving Cert is probably the greatest hurdle they will face in their young lives. Some will have already entered into the points race to get into college, and will go on to complete more technically difficult exams in Universities and IT's.

But the reason Viewpoint would argue that the Leaving Cert is so daunting for so many is simply the pressure exerted from all quarters. Not just from the immediate family, but from peers too. Unlike continuous assessment it is a one-off, on the day exam, that allows nothing for outside circumstances, which may be pressing on the young person, be that excessive nervous tension to some

It also, wholly unfairly, carries the mark of being a life defining examination. There are plenty of options after the Leaving Cert, and as someone who failed his Maths dismally the first time of asking, Viewpoint also knows there's always the option of a second chance as well.

University and College is a good experience - but by no means is it the be all and end all, and neither does it guarantee work at the completion of the course, nor does not going to college at all, exclude opportunities in the workforce.

The Leaving Cert is worth the hard work and effort certainly, and it does provide the straight route to college, though there are still opportunities for a mature student to go to college at a later stage, but neither is it worth the stress and in some cases distress that the whole process causes to a young person, and to their families.

The main thing on completing the Leaving Cert is just to forget it. It's over. Get on with living life, and be happy that the most stressful examination in a young persons life is thankfully over. Everything else, whether you have been successful or not lies ahead on the horizon, and is yours for the taking.

MAGNIFICENT WHALES

There are about 80 species of whale, among which are the largest creatures to have inhabited Earth. They appear to be very intelligent, social creatures who communicate with each other with a complicated system of sounds. Although whales live in the sea they are mammals, not fish. This means that they are warm blooded and give birth to live young who feed on their mothers milk. The young are born tail first so that they do not drown.

DIFFERENT KINDS OF WHALES



Right whales are named by whales because they are 'right' whales to catch for their oils. There are three types of right whale: the Greenland right whale, the black right whale and the pygmy right whales. All right whales are rare because they have been over hunted.


The largest of the toothed whales are the sperm whales. They can group up to 17m (56ft) in length. There are also two sperm whales, the pygmy sperm whale and the dwarf sperm whale, that are among the smallest of the toothed whale.

One very unusual looking whale is the narwhal. The male narwhal has an enlarged tooth that grows straight out of to form a spiral tusk about 3m (10ft) long.

The black and white killer whale is the most dangerous of all the whales. As well as fish, they will eat seals, penguins and even dolphins to which they are closely related. The killer whale is the largest member of the dolphin family.

TWO GROUPS OF WHALES

There are two groups of whales - the whalebone, or baleen, whales and the toothed whales. There are more toothed whales, which are usually smaller than baleen whales. Baleen whales live on plankton, which is make up of tiny sea creatures and plants. The whale strains plankton out of the water by sieving it through the comb like plates of stiff material called baleen, that hang from the whale's top jaw. Toothed whales use their teeth to catch and kill all types of fish. Baleen whales include blue, right, humpback, grey, sei and fin whales. Killer whales, sperm whales, porpoises and dolphins are all toothed whales.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Bahamonde's beaked whale, whose bones were washed ashore in 1986, has never actually been seen alive!

Whales evolved from the same ancestors as deer, camels, pigs, cows and hippos.

The blue whale is the biggest creature in the world. It is as long as Boeing 737, and weights more than twenty elephants.



36 Calls To Illegal **Dumping** Hotline

Environmental Agency launched its "Dump the Dumpers" hotline, 36 calls have been made to it in County Waterford.

Of the calls, the top three complaints related to fly-tipping, illegal dumping and the burning of waste.

"The success of the 'Dump the Dumpers' phone line shows that members of the public are willing to get involved in resolving environmental problems. And for that we are very grateful. It is only with their assistance that this initiative can continue to be a success," said Dara Lynott, Director EPA Office of Environmental Enforcement.

The 'Dump the Dumpers' service was designed to encourage reporting of illegal dumping of waste or of abandoned illegal dumps via a 24 hour call save number. This information is followed up and checked by enforcement authorities - local authorities, the EPA's Office of Environmental Enforcement and the Gardai through the Environmental Enforcement Network. The Dump the Dumpers' phone line is staffed on a 24 hour basis so callers get to speak to a trained operator who elicits all necessary details to enable the matter to be investigated.

The 24 hour call save number for the enforcement service is 1850 365 121.



Good Bacteria?

It may not be pleasant thought for many, but various species of bacteria and yeasts are present on the skin and mucous membranes of all normal, healthy people. They do not generally cause problems and many are important for biological functions such as absorption of various nutrients and protection against harmful microorganisms. The various microbial species occupy their own territory Each species constantly attempts to increase this territory, but is kept in check by the surrounding organisms so that no one species is allowed to dominate. The immune system is also involved in maintaining a healthy microbial balance within the body.

Certain situations can allow one species of micro-organism to become dominant.

DipCoun. This causes irritation and inflammation of the local tissues and a variety of other problems which affect the rest of the body. These include thrush, sweet cravings, allergies, sinus problems, reduced alcohol tolerance, digestive disturbances, skin problems, severe premenstrual symptoms, thyroid problems, headaches, tiredness and poor concentration. Common causes of microbial imbalance include pregnancy, nutritional deficiencies, high sugar diets, use of some medicines such as antibiotics and

contraceptives, and some diseases such as diabetes.

In order to restore the balance, the first step is to eliminate the harmful micro-organisms by depriving them of their essential food. Cut out all refined sugar (including cakes, biscuits, sweets, and jams), reduce dairy products, and avoid fermented products such as alcohol and vinegar. Herbs such as cinnamon, thyme and garlic destroy harmful micro-organisms and chamomile may be used to help repair and protect the mucous membranes. Medical herbalists can provide these herbs as part of an individual prescription which can effectively treat the variety of problems caused by microbial

The second step is to repopulate the system with friendly microorganisms. This can be achieved by taking an acidophilus supplement and eating plenty of live natural yoghurt. Bananas provide food for the friendly bacteria and help them to get

It is common to experience a temporary worsening of symptoms on tackling this type of imbalance which generally only lasts a few days. It is usually necessary to continue this programme for approximately 4 - 6 weeks, so perhaps lent will provide an ideal opportunity to get your bugs back into balance.



Dairying Nitrogen Usage

Now is the time to take stock of how much Nitrogen you have used so far this year relative to what you are allowed to use. Over use will result in penalties.

-So, when the 4th leaf arrives the oldest leaf at the bottom starts to die off, therefore don't let your rotation length ever get too long

Cattle

Meals at Grass

There are two groups of stock that will definitely benefit from feeding meals to them at grass.

Steers that are going to be finished before housing. Where there is plenty of grass it is economical to feed 3 kg per day for the last six weeks before slaughter. If you are short of grass feed up to six kg per day. The ration can be low in protein e.g., a cereal / pulp / soya hulls mix.

Heifers that are going to be finished off grass. The same feeding rates as with the steers applies.

If you are selling weanlings there can be a good response to feeding them meals. Having them eating meals is attractive to any buyer and you will also get a good response for each kg fed. If they have plenty of grass the response will be 1 kg liveweight for each 8 kg fed. If grass is in short supply or of a lower quality the response rises to 1 kg LW for every 4 kg fed. Again the ration does not need to be high in protein.

Where you are keeping your own weanlings and they are being weaned with the minimum of stress e.g. taking the cows away from the calves in small batches over a three week period, and the weanlings are on good quality grass they may not actually benefit from being fed meals. Research has shown that 12 months out from weaning there is no difference in the weight of weanlings fed meals around weaning and those not fed meals. However, if grass supply or quality is an issue and if the weanlings are likely to be stressed at weaning there is no doubt that they would benefit from even a small amount of meals at this time of the year.

IFA Seek 40c/l For August Milk

IFA President Padraig Walshe welcomed the record milk prices now being fixed by co-ops for July deliveries and said "they come on the back of record market returns that justify even higher prices being passed back to farmers." He said "what farmers need to realise is that the current markets justify 40c/l being paid for August milk, and even that price would leave coops with greatly increased processing margins.'

IFA Call On **Minister Coughlan To** Act In Farm **Improvement Scheme Logiam**

IFA Rural Development Chairman, Padraic Divilly, has called on the Minister of Agriculture Mary Coughlan to instruct her Department to accept and process applications under the Farm Improvement Scheme.

Mr. Divilly said that IFA has been inundated with complaints that the Department of Agriculture is refusing to deal with applications not involving construction. It was indicated to IFA a number of weeks ago that a fastrack system would be put in place for investments such as milking machines, bulk tanks, rubber mats, agitators and other equipment.

The IFA Rural Development Chairman has also criticised the inclusion of the Health and Safety requirement on the new application form. This was not in previous applications forms for grant-aided schemes. All construction jobs on farms are done to the highest Health and Safety standards but to hold-up applications where the necessary boxes are not ticked or where private planners or Teagasc have not signed the form is not acceptable.

Mr. Divilly said that it is ironic that Teagasc have in place a specialist service dealing with Health and Safety yet their advisory service are not in a position to sign the application forms for farmers on this issue.

The IFA called on the Minister to resolve this issue without further delay or otherwise the new Farm Improvement Scheme will not achieve it's objectives.





Question: What is Mortgage Tax relief? Answer:

Mortgage Tax relief is commonly referred to as Mortgage Tax relief at source. Mortgage tax relief is a monthly credit into your account to reduce your monthly mortgage repayment. The Mortgage lender is responsible together with Revenue to ensure this is credited into you account each month.

It is actually quiet simple to calculate the amount of tax relief you qualify for, please see the table below:

Up to December 2006 From January 2007 Single first time buyer (FTB): Was €4,000 increased to €8,000 p/a.

Married First Time buyer (FTB): Was €8,000 Increased to € 16,000.

p/aSingle Non-FTB: Was €2,540 Increased to €3,000 p/a.

Married Non-FTB: Was € 5,080 Increased to € 6,000 p/a.

Please note that this relief is granted at a rate of 20% of interest paid, up to the maximum ceiling as listed above (Mortgages over 180,000 will qualify for 100% tax relief). Let's take a look at an example:

A first time buyer buying with his girlfriend who is also a first time buyer getting a Mortgage of €250,000 would qualify for the following: €8000 x 20% = €1,600 divided by 12 months = €133 per month off their mortgage EACH, i.e. €266 per month off their

First time buyers (FTB) status runs from the year the mortgage is taken out for seven years (i.e. year mortgage is taken out plus six subsequent years). If a taxpayer redeems his/her mortgage within this seven-year period they are entitled to resume their FTB status when a new mortgage is taken out if they have remaining years.

E.g. If a buyer buys their first property, as their Principle Private Residence (PPR) in 2007 and subsequently sells this house in 2009.

they will receive tax relief at source on their mortgage interest payments as a FTB for three years. If, in 2011, they decide to purchase another property, as their PPR, they will be entitled to receive TRS as a FTB for the remaining 4 years (2011-2014).





Kerry won the toss and invited Lismore to bat, and openers David Campion and Martin Finn were progressing nicely until Campion, as aforementioned, was controversially given out. Campion climbed into a full toss on hearing the call of 'no-ball' from the square-leg umpire, only to sky a catch to mid-on. When the catch was taken, the bowler's end umpire decided to over-rule his colleague on the no-ball decision and gave Campion out. Exotic chicken curry

A TROPICAL oasis of flavour - try this fruity chicken curry.

Ingredients:

Serves 4 to 6 20ml groundnut oil 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cubed Salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 large onion, chopped 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped

3cm root ginger, peeled and finely chopped 1 stick lemon grass, trimmed and chopped 100g baby corn, trimmed and sliced diagonally 3 x 10ml sp Malaysian mild curry powder 20ml Thai green curry

sauce 1 x 5ml sp ground turmeric

1 x 10ml sp plain flour 400ml can coconut milk 150ml chicken stock 2 x 15ml sp freshly chopped coriander

227g can pineapple pieces in natural juice 1 small ripe mango, peeled, stoned and sliced

1 banana, peeled and sliced 400g Thai jasmine or Basmati rice to serve

Method:

Heat half the groundnut oil in a large pan. Season the chicken with salt and pepper, add to the hot (almost smoking) oil and cook, turning until brown on all sides.

Remove from the pan. Add the remaining oil to the pan. Lower the heat and then fry the onion, garlic, ginger, lemon grass and baby corn, stirring occasionally, for about five minutes. Add the chicken.

Mix together the curry powder, curry sauce, turmeric and flour, add to the pan, stirring all the time, and cook for two min-

Gradually add the coconut milk, stock and juice from the pineapple. Bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring frequently to prevent it burning.

Meanwhile, cook the rice according to the packet instruc-

Just before serving, stir the pineapple pieces, mango, banana and coriander into the curry, then serve with rice.



Brioche buffet American-style bites with herbs picnic muffins

DELIGHTFULLY different and impressive buffet type twist

Ingredients:

Makes 24

8 medium slices brioche 1 x 15ml sp chives, finely snipped

1 x 15ml sp dill, finely chopped

2 x 15ml sp mayonnaise

Method:

Use a 5cm round cutter to stamp out 24 circles from the bread. Do not include the crust. Mix the chives and dill in a small bowl.

Next, spread a thin coat of mayonnaise on the edge of each circle of bread, taking care not to get any mayonnaise on the top surfaces.

Then, roll these edges in the herbs, give them a gentle

shake to remove any excess and arrange on a serving plate.





Affane Man Manager Of Waterford United U-21's

He helped establish one club on the outskirts of Cappoquin, formed a formidable schoolboy set up in the town itself, and has helped mould schoolboys throughout the county and city for the Junior and Senior ranks. Now, one of the most influential figures in youth development, Tom Browne, talks to the Dungarvan Leader about his new role as manager of the Waterford Utd U21 team.

Tom Browne is busier than ever. For someone with a seemingly inexhaustible supply of energy and with a passionate interest in football spanning back to his playing days with Dungarvan Utd, the foundation of Affane Football Club, and the formation of Cappoquin schoolboy side, Railway Athletic FC twenty-five years ago, that says something.

Juggling responsibilities as Head of Youth Development and manager of the Waterford Utd U21's as well as a coaching tutor with the FAI, Tom is a popular figure within the game, and one the elite footballers of the Kennedy Cup sides which have won All-Ireland and Munster titles, know as probably one of the most knowledgeable figures in the local game.

The Brian Kerr of the Waterford game, Tom founded Affane Football Club with his friend and the best man at his wedding,

A few years later, John Welsh started Railway Athletic FC and Tom was there from the beginning, at the start as a Referee. When his decade long stint as a referee in the Waterford League came to an end, he began a successful time coaching the underage setup at

It sparked a career dedicated to developing young players and bringing them through the conveyor belt of elite representative sides onto the highest levels. He has worked in the role of underage development in Waterford for the past eight years. Just some of the players he's worked with include Manchester Utd's John O'Shea, Eddie Nolan now of Blackburn Rovers, Gary Dunphy who spent time with Glasgow Celtic and Abbeyside's Willie John Kiely who had a spell with Aberdeen.

His term was very successful and the representative teams under

his care won Munster Finals and All-Ireland's

The board of Waterford Utd then asked him to go into the Waterford Utd set-up. With the new licensing conditions imposed by the UEFA, Utd was required to have a conveyor belt of young players coming through. Tom was selected as the man to head up the effort and they asked him to go in as first team coach with manager Gareth Cronin.

"Always in the back of my mind was the U21 team was starting so the natural progression is that players that would have started in the Kennedy Cup six years ago would be at the age now where they would be playing U21 football so that I would know what the players are like. That's where it started. They made me head of Youth Development as well which is continuing on from where I was with the schoolboy league," he says.

Since taking up the role, he's found the greatest difficulty in getting players to play for a club with a low profile. He wants players who "wanted to break the door down to play for Waterford

Utd at underage and U21 level," he says.
"There's a lot to do," he says. "To be honest about it Waterford

Utd were a long way behind."

With the players he brought in, the U21 team has been successful. After the first four league games they were top of the table. But he's under no illusions that it will be an easy task.

"The U21 league is a very tough league," he said of the leagues second tier, which includes Ballinroad's Shane Delahunty and Dungarvan's Jonathon Shaw among their ranks.

"It's a very physical league, but it's technically good too."
He says the Waterford League has a top class set up and the link

up with Waterford Utd can only bode good things.

Years ago," he says, "when the Kennedy Cup was over at U14 the next time that lad could represent Waterford was at U18 level. Now that's gone thank God.

"You can go U14, U15, U16 and U18 and then the U21 team with Waterford Utd. So the minute a young lad starts at 11, if he wants to, he has a ladder the whole way up to go as high as he wants to



A Year To Remember

With ten days having passed since the huge Croke Park disappointment, the county is returning to normal and getting to grips with reality

One of the reassuring features of the aftermath is that there has been no criticism of the players and the general view is that far too much was expected of them in attempting to reproduce the standard of hurling which they displayed against Cork on the two previous Sundays in Croke Park. It is generally accepted that the replay in particular had such an affect on their bodies that it was not possible to recover in the space of six or seven days.

Understandably there has been severe criticism of the system which allowed for a three Sundays in a row programme and requiring amateurs to reproduce top form, Sunday after Sunday.

It is hardly fair either to blame the C.C.C in Croke Park as they have just been operating a system which had evolved in recent years following Congress and special Congress changes.

Some of the above problems were topics in the debate by Central Council in Croke Park on Saturday last. It will likely take another Special Congress to solve some of the many fixtures problems which are making life difficult for everyone at the moment.

GREAT YEAR

By our standards we have enjoyed a great season (without achieving our burning ambition). We did have 5 super games against old rivals, Cork and winning 4 and drawing the fifth. We had a splendid Munster final victory over Limerick and for a long time to come we will rejoice in defeating the champions, Kilkenny in the National League- our first win here since 1963.

A whisper from the inside, tells of that entire senior hurling panel of players, wish to remain on. This, if accurate will not mean that changes won't take place and new talent introduced.

There are indications also that the management team are keen on remaining in control and while this is a matter for the county board, it looks certain to be given their full approval.

I was back in Croke Park over the weekend where I met so many people who expressed their genuine disappointment for Waterford and the general feeling was that the three Sundays on the trot in Croke Park was just too much and that in other circumstances the result would have been difficult.

There were complimentary remarks about we being gracious in defeat and it was also mentioned that the ungracious comments by a representative of the opposition were indiscreet.

In the second half, the hot favourites realising that they were up against it, turned on the style and increased their lead to six points before Nial Curran had the only goal of the game to copper fasten their victory.


Senior Football Next Weekend

As a result of the recent splendidly attended meeting of the referees in the county, a letter has been received by all the relevant boards who have asked that a copy be sent to every club in the

The 'get tough' policy which is to be pursued by referees (and hopefully by the boards) is clearly outlined in this document. They are not likely to stamp out indiscipline of every degree but this latest campaign should certainly reduce the kind of misbehaviour that is making life so difficult for referees at all levels.

Their letter pointed out that two very prominent and long serving referees have recently threatened to quit the service because of the misconduct (and abuse) to which they have been subjected.

The matter of club officials contacting referees on behalf of players who have been disciplined, will in future be brought to the attention of the appropriate board.

One of the prominent referees involved in this meeting told me that too many club officers do not have the courage to discipline players who engage in referee abuse and the sideline people who offend. The same referee felt that some of the problems would be solved if selectors were kept in the dugouts where they are supposed to be and he said that this is a matter for the boards.



ÉIGSE SLIABH gCUA 2007

It is five years now since Éigse Sliabh gCua erected a fine limestone memorial to Seán Ó Dálaigh (1800-1878) on the Green at Millstreet. The stone is just a short distance from Seán old home in Farnane, Lickoran. Seán was one of the most prominent figures in the Irish language movement, in as much as there was one, in the mid 19th century. He is the man, who as a bookseller and publisher living in Dublin, was first to put the old Irish poets into print - the same poets who still appear on the Leaving Certificate Irish syllabus. Moreover, he did the same for Irish music.

Like many truly great figures he has had to wait a long time for a biographer. In Proinsias Ó Drisceoil's book, Sean Ó Dálaigh: Éigse agus Iomarbhá, which was published earlier this year by Cork University Press, Seán is more than well served. The hardback, which runs to almost 500 pages and is adorned with a portrait of Seán costs only €20.

Eigse Sliabh gCua are delighted that Dr. O Drisceoil, a distinguished Irish scholar and author, a native of Thurles who works in Kilkenny City, will begin this year's Eigse in Millstreet at 8.00 p.m. on Friday, 24 August 2007 when he will give a short open-air talk on the book. Immediately afterwards there will be an Irish night in Walsh's pub which is directly opposite the Green.

On Saturday 25 August 2007 the Éigse bus tour will depart from in front of St. Mary's Church, Touraneena at 2.30 p.m. for a guided historical and literary tour of Sliabh gCua and its environs. Beidh an Aifreann á cheiliuradh ag an tAthar Conn Ó Ceilleachair i seipéal Naomh Mhuire, Tuar an Fhíona ag 7.30. am tráthnóna agus beidh cor ann freisin.

After Mass at 8.30 p.m. in the Community Hall, Ben Guiry who is an expert on the Comeragh uplands, will deliver an illustrated lecture on 'The Comeragh foothills and some local placenames.' This will be followed by the Eigse Seisiún.

There were thousands of Scouts from the four corners of the world waiting patiently for their luggage. The whole airport was a sea of different coloured uniforms and neckerchiefs, to go with this colour where the sounds of Scouts singing

Then it was onto Hylands park to join the rest of the 43,000 participants. When we got to the site we were brought to our sub camp. Day 3

This morning we got time to finish off our campsite and to make new friends. After lunch we went to the Energize base where there were many activities that the scouts could do. There was a circus tent were we could learn how to juggle, ride a unicycle, walk on stilts and even walk a tightrope. There were other activities which included stripping car engines, skate boarding and bmx parks, scuba diving pools, dancing and drumming workshops and even massage parlours. That evening we were given our 100 task challange which was a list of one hundred tasks which we had to complete in a given time.

Day 4

Today we took part in the Starburst programme. Starburst programme is about making a difference and leaving a lasting legacy after the Jamboree in different communities. We were brought offsite to different localitities were we helped the locals clean up parks, restore buildings, clear woodlands and entertained inner city children and elderly people for the day. It was a long and tiring day but everyone felt good afterwards as they had helped make a difference to people's lives. That night we had to perform our party piece on the subcamp stage in front of 2,000 others. We hit the sack early that night after our hard days work.

Day 5 Today we visitd the Global Development Village were we learned about issues that are effecting the world today such as Aids, Global Warming, Clean water and educational rights. This was a very interesting programme as it helped the young people realise how fortunate they are and how they can help those less fortunate than us.

That evening we had a Scouts own vigil on the subcamp were we looked back on the previous 100 years of scouting and reflected on our findings, we then looked to the trash and complete various future to see what we need to do to challanges against each other and continue and maintain the scouting movement for the next 100 years. "knowledge" where the Scouts got over. We took down our site and We headed to bed early as we had to be up really early for the Sunrise day celebrations.

Day 6

We were called at 6 am and told get into uniform we had to make our way to the main arena were we were going to interlink to the Scouts on bownsea island. At 8 am the UK chief Scout Peter Duncan blew the Kudu horn signalling 100 years to the minuite when Baden Powell blew the insrument at the first ever camp for boys who would later be called Scouts. Then Scouts at Hyland park, Brownsea Island and from all over the world stood together and renewed their promise as one. " one world one promise". Then upon the stage walked Lord baden Powell, grandson of founder BP. To a hushed audiance he said "i am very happy to be here. My granfather started the movement

Brownsea Island. One hundred years later 28 million people in 158 countries are involved in Scouting across the world. The movement he started has become one of the instruments for peace. He would have been delighted to see how the seed he planted has grown into such a movement. Thank you for inviting me to this unique event and in the words of my granfather "have a happy life and good camping

With these final words being said the arena erupted with excitement and the celebrations began this was one of the emotional times of our lives as there were tears of joy and happyness being shed all around, we were united as one big family 'the brotherhood of Scouting'

After the ceromony we had to prepare an Irish dish so as our fellow Scouts could sample a piece of irish tradition. We served up Col cannon and this certainly went down a treat as we were cleared out in less than half an hour. We then got to sample some food types from our neighbours. That evening there was an open air concert on in the main arena where all the participants danced and partied into the early hours of the morning.

Day 7

Today we travelled offsite to Alton Waters which is a huge resevoir. At this site the Scouts take part in the "Splash" programme. A total of 500 Scouts take part in various water activities at one time. The activities include raft building, kayaking, bellboats, canoeing and three different forms of sailing. The scouts really enjoyed this programme as they got to get wet and as the weather was really warm a dip in the nice cold resevoir was just what the doctor ordered. That evening we got choice time were we could do what ever wanted to most of us went to the central plaza where there were plenty of shops and cafe's , there were also plenty of small entertainment shows going

Day 8

Today we stayed on site and visited the two world villages Terraville & Aquaville". At these vilages each participaing county had a number of tents where you could try out various sports, dance customs and foods from there country. As you can imagine with 158 different countries there was plenty to try out. You would need a week to visit them all but it was a very enjoyable and educational day. On returning to site we had alarge water fight with our leaders and neighbours.

Day 9
Today we visited the "Trash" Having fun with lots of rubbish is the key aim of enviornmental zone trash. There were four main parts within Trash. These were "arts" where the young people got to make pieces of art out of trash and recycled goods. The next part was "challange" where the participants had to make different items out of trash today and the effects it has on the environment and global warming. The final part of trash was "music" which was by far the most enjoyable part the scouts got to make musical instruments out of trash and perform on them.

Day 10

Today was the higlight of the Jamboree as we got to visit Gillwell Park which is the headquaters of the Scouting movement. Here we got to take part in four zones. The first zone was the discovery zone where we were given a short presentation on the history of Scouts we then got a tour of Gillwell park. The second zone was challange valey which was a large asault course which tested the physical and mental abilities of the participants. The next zone was the Scout skills zone with 20 boys on a camp at were the scouts got to carry out

The ceromony then began with shows from different countries including Ireland, Mexico, Japan and Uk. The world Scout Flag was then lowered and handed over to the Scouts of Sweden who will host the next world Jamboree in 2011. There were a few final words from the cheif Scout and other members of the World Scouting Movement committee. The jamboree cast sang us out with the "Jambo" song and then the sky was lit up with a spectacular fireworks display. After the last firework there was an eiry silence as it was all over 43,000 people from 158 different countries with their eves full of tears turned to one another and said their final goodbyes. Majority of these good bye's were followed with the words.

"see you in Sweden in 2011"

We woke up today to a practically empty site and the "Jamboree blues " started to settle to learn the facts and figures about said good bye to the remainder of scouts left on site.

When we arrived back in Cork we lined up with Another Irish troop and walk out the departure gate singing and smiling trying to hide the emotion of the whole event. We were welcomed by a large cheer and round of applause from the awaiting parents and families

We then said good bye to our fellow Scouts from Ireland as emotions took over, yet again the good byes were followed by different words this time.






