Appeal Expected Against Controversial ing Operation

By Kevin Kirrane

A number of local residents are expected to lodge an appeal against Waterford County Council's decision to grant conditional planning permission for controversial work at one of the largest quarrying operations in the county.

The county council recently granted permission to Whitechurch Quarry, Cappagh, subject to 34 conditions.

But, residents fear the operation could contaminate the local water supply including a regionally important Karstified Aquifer System, and damage local water courses and local

The permission allows the John A. Woods Ltd. owned quarry to continue quarrying activities including the processing of aggregates, landscaping, restoration and associated works and retention of existing buildings

CONTENTIOUS

The most contentious aspect of the original application is the proposal by Whitechurch Quarry to excavate down to -29 metres, which residents claimed would contaminate the water supply with silt.

Residents also fear the effect on the River Brickey of the run off of groundwater from the quarr

HISTORIC SPRING

In a number of submissions to the planning process, objectors also warned that a historic spring may be endangered.

St. Cathaldus's Spring in Canty has been a site of veneration since the Saint's birthplace was re-established as being in the small West Waterford townland. Water levels were said by some local groups to have had been affected by the extensive nearby quarrying operations



One in ten children suffer from head lice at any one time

As over 450,000 primary school children head back to school in just over a week, pharmacists are issuing a message to parents to be prepared for head lice to help avoid widespread infestations in schools across the country. It is estimated that one in ten children suffer from head lice at any one time with head lice becoming more challenging the longer infestations go undetected. 80% of head lice infestations occur in children between the ages of 4 and 16 and outbreaks can be distressing for children.

According to pharmacists head lice prevention can be accomplished easily through routine screening at home, early detection and thorough manual removal of all lice and nits. Pharmacists are also highlighting the need for parents and guardians to seek advice from their local pharmacist with regard to the best product to use to treat their child. Treating head lice involves the use of lotions and sprays some of which are alcohol-based, which people should be aware of, especially if their child suffers from asthma or other allergies.

Dungarvan Pharamcist Daragh Connolly MPSI said, "We are urging parents to take a pro-active approach in learning what to look out for in the first place, to check their children's heads for head lice and nits regularly and to know how to effectively get rid of the lice in a safe way. Unfortunately this vigilance is not just a once off and there is a need for vigilance throughout the school year.

Pharmacists can advise parents on all cases as well as specific problems which might arise for example, where children have asthma, a pre-existing skin condition or where treatment has failed previously. "Children of all ages are vulnerable to pesticides, especially those who suffer from asthma and allergies. It is always best to be safe and seek advice from a pharmacist or other healthcare professional. Under no circumstances should lice treatment products be used "just in case" a child might have lice or in an effort to prevent them", Mr Connolly said.

The first sign that an infestation is present is usually an itchy head: however older children and adults may not experience any itching. The most reliable means of detection is regular wet combing which is combing wet hair with a nit comb.

What to do: 1. Check children's hair for lice regularly - once a week. Wet

the hair every week. Tie up long hair in a pony tail to avoid hair coming into contact with other hair that might be infested.

2. Treat the hair only if live lice or unhatched eggs are present. Treat the child as soon as possible. Always seek advice from your pharmacist on the most appropriate products to use.

3. Inform the school, contacts and friends when your child has nits. The school can then inform other parents that there is an outbreak, so everyone can check and treat their own children.





VIEWPOINT LATEST RESCUE **HIGHLIGHTS IMPORTANCE OF RNLI**

The rescue of a young man, trapped on the sheer cliffs of Helvick Cove last week, once more highlights the importance to the area of the local RNLI service.

The lifeboats have been called out on countless occasions over the past year often braving horrendous conditions facing swells, poor visibility and driving storms to bring about rescues.

On this latest rescue, one of the team aboard the Alice & Charles Lifeboat shimmied up the dangerous outcrop of cliff, succeeding in tying a rope around the distressed twenty year-old man in order to secure him to the rocks until the rescue helicopter arrived to winch him to safety

Sometimes this breathtaking bravery goes almost unnoticed until it affects someone close to you.

But it should not be forgotten. And neither should it be taken for

With the increase in leisure activities on the sea around our coast. the number of callouts has risen in tandem.

TRAVELLERS RETURN TO SHANDON

The arrival of the fine weather to Dungarvan also heralded the return of other less welcome seasonal visitors.

Last week a small convoy of travellers illegally encamped at Shandon, once more making life a misery for the residents of the nearby social and affordable housing estates of Sean Dun and Estuary Heights.

It's been a long running, and it would seem currently a largely

The fact is the Town Council's hands are tied by its own, and the county council's inaction.

Without a permanent transient site somewhere within the Dungarvan Electoral Area, illegal encampments will continue to occur as will all the problems associated with them including lack of sanitary facilities for the travellers themselves.

It's too simple to just cover every area with large boulders, and cover over lay-byes and green areas. The problem is more complex than that, and the solution rests with the local authority

The local authority is obliged to provide one transient halting site in the west of the county, one in the Dungarvan area and another in

However, besides for stating in the their objectives that this was what was planned three or four years ago, nothing has been moved

The reason for this is simple.

There isn't the stomach for a transient halting site or the planning or legal objections that are almost certainly set to follow the identification of an area for a site. Travellers themselves need to hold their hands up and admit their

behaviour is at least partly to the blame for this attitude among settled people. The problems at Shandon halting site where the recently built

chalets have effectively been trashed by the travellers strike fear into settled people.

Solutions to the problem will be difficult to find in what is a real culture clash between the settled and traveller communities.

But a solution must be found, and soon.

Someone must grasp the nettle for the sake of communities like Shandon who are really suffering because of illegal encampments.

They will continue to suffer directly due to the inaction of the local authority unless properly managed, policed and maintained transient sites are built.

By failing to do so, they are failing their legal and moral obligations, and failing the people of housing estates such as Shandon, whose lives will continually be made hell by intimidation, anti-social behaviour and from health fears due to the unsantitary disposal of waste unless and until they fulfil their duties.

JUNIOR PAGE WHAT IS A REPTILE?

Reptiles have been on earth for over 300 million years. They are vertebrates (animals with backbones) and are usually covered with scales, or plates, which are rather like plates of armour. Some have short legs, while others have no legs at all. Reptiles are cold-blooded. This does not mean that their blood is cold, it means that their body temperature depends on their surroundings, so in cold weather, for example, a reptile feels cold. Most reptile lay eggs, but there are some lizards and snakes, such as rattlesnakes, that give birth to live young.

One Reptile Is The Size Of A Paperclip

The smallest reptile is a gecko from the West Indies. At 19mm (3.4in) long, it is a bit shorter than a paperclip. At the other end of the reptilian scale is the reticulate python, which can grow to a gigantic 6m (18ft), long enough to stretch all the way from the ground to the roof of a three storey house. The world's heaviest reptile is the saltwater crocodile, which can weight as much as 1,000kg (2,200lb).

> Many Lizards Have A Third Eye

The brains of reptiles are quite small and not very well developed. This means that most lizards move quiet slowly, with simple movements. Many lizards have a light sensitive area in the top of their heads just beneath the skin. This area is called the


pineal eye, and is sometimes also known as the 'third eye'. It is thought to register solar power and is probably used to control some behaviour that is dependent upon light. Vipers, pit vipers and rattlesnakes have special cells in their heads that can detect heat. The snakes use these cells to hunt their prey in

Different Types Of Reptile

There are about 6,500 species of reptiles in the world. They belong to four main groups, or orders: crocodiles and alligators; turtles tortoises and terrapins; lizards and snakes; and the tuatara. There are three main types of reptile body; lizards, alligators and crocodiles have a long body and a long tail; snakes have a very long body with a very short tail; turtles and tortoises have a rounded, shell-covered body with a short tail.

The Tuatara Is A Fossil

The tuatara, which lives on small islands off New Zealand, is nicknamed the 'living fossil' because it is the only living member of a group of reptiles that is related to the dinosaurs. It is olive green or grey in colour and about 60cm (2ft) long. It looks like a lizard but its skull is a different shape

DAIRYING Teat Dip a Must Do!

Takes 1-2 seconds per cow to do

It is the most cost effective way of preventing mastitis.

It reduces by 50% new infections

It must be made up correctly daily

Mix a fresh sample daily as it loses its disinfectant ability with time after mixing.

Any contamination with milk or dung (if using teat dip cups) reduces activity

Use water of very high quality.

Best to use cooled water from the water heater.

Include glycerine to improve teat skin condition.

It replaces that proportion of water when mixing.

How much teat dip do you require daily for a 50 cow herd? If using a dip cup, you need 10 mls / cow, or 0.5 litres for 50 cows (10x50 = 500 ml)

If using a spray, you need 20 ml / cow, or 1.0 litres for 50 cows (20x50 = 1000ml). This is so important because most farmers are not using adequate quantities to disinfect the whole teat.

If the instructions (read them) say to use 1 part iodine with 3 parts water and you are spraying 50 cows per day, the following is the calculation:

Solution

You need 2000 ml (20x50x2 milkings) or 2.0 litres of solution

Mixing disinfectant and clean water

1 part iodine to 3 parts water (1+3=4)

2.0 litres solution divided by 4 = 0.5 litres multiplied by 3 = 1.5litres water

Therefore, you need 0.5 litres of iodine

To make things easy on a 2 litre container, put a mark (permanent marker) where 1.5 litres of water must go and then top up

Make sure to write on the container which is water and which is disinfectant

Use this principle for your own situation

By doing it as advised you will:

know you have mixed the solution correctly, and

know if you are using adequate quantities of teat dip daily (90% of farmers are not)

If you wish to add 10% glycerine to the teat dip solution without adversely affecting the concentration of the disinfectant, it is mixed as follows:

10% of the water portion is 0.15 litres (1.5 x 10/100)

Therefore, the new mixture will be 0.5 litres of iodine, 0.15 litres of glycerine and 1.35 litres of water.

SHEEP

Buy early, buy carefully Reduce the risk of bringing a new disease onto your farm by buying replacement ewes & rams early & from a reliable source. Buying early also gives you more choice. Give all sheep a thorough physical examination before buying. No matter how careful you are you still need to guard against bringing disease onto your farm. So vaccinate & treat where necessary & operate a quaran-tine period. Buying stock well before the breeding season gives you an opportunity to operate a 4 week quarantine period. It also gives vaccines a chance to become effective before mixing with the rest of the flock. During this time keep a close eye on them for any signs of disease & footbath regularly. While many diseases have a longer incubation period than 4 weeks it does help to reduce the risk. Problems that arise during this time need to be nipped in the bud to avoid infecting the main flock. The main problems are scab, resistant worms, footrot, enzootic abortion,

fluke, orf & CLA. Sheep scratching

From September to March of each year there is an increase in the number of reports of sheep scratching & losing their wool. If a number of sheep appear to be scratching then the problem is usually scab, lice or both. In the absence of a specific diagnosis, the surest & simplest way to treat scratching is to dip. This should be done after all replacement ewes & rams have been purchased.

Pre-mating trace elements

Some of these mixtures cost over €1 per dose with 2 doses per ewe pre-mating often recommended. Apart from cobalt there are little real benefits from these tonics. Even with cobalt there will only be a response if there is a deficiency on your own farm. General recommendation for ewes in cobalt deficient areas - two doses, one three weeks pre-mating & the second at ram introduction.

Some sheep farmers still have not given their breeding ewes & rams a proper check for health & body condition. Others have gone through their flock but, have not taken the actions required. The fact that you know your ram is lame (& you have done nothing about it) will hardly inspire him to up his performance at mating time. Ideally the ewes & rams should be checked & given corrective treatment at least 8-10 weeks before mating. Even with only 4-6 weeks remaining before rams go out to many mid-season flocks there is still time to get some things sorted or at least improved. Better late than never.

Certificate in Agriculture (Part-Time for Adult Farmers):

The course commences in Kildalton on 1st October 2007. The course will be delivered over a 3 year period on a part-time basis. Lectures take place on Mondays and Wednesdays (7.00 p.m. to 10.00 p.m.) at Kildalton from October until May each year.

Students will be required to attend for practical skills training on 1 to 2 days per month (9.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m.)

Applicants must be at least 23 years of age on 1st January 2008. On successful completion students are awarded the FETAC Advanced Certificate in Agriculture Level 6. GLANBIA HOLDING BACK OVER €5 **MILLION IN MILK PAYMENTS TO SUPPLIERS** - WALSHE

IFA President Padraig Walshe accused Glanbia of withholding over €5m in milk payments due to its suppliers for the 2006 KPMG milk audit topup and the July 2007 milk price increase.

"Average suppliers have now been left short by about €1,300 in milk payments due from Glanbia. This is money that Board members can stand by and allow this to happen."

Padraig Walshe said "it is totally unacceptable that Glanbia's 4,000 suppliers have not yet received the top-up payment of at least 1.3c/gal, arising from the 2006 KPMG audit. The top-up is worth at least €780 to a 60,000 gallon producer. In the past, this top-up payment was always issued by way of a second cheque in June or July, as soon as the audit was published."

QUESTION: What exactly is stamp duty? **ANSWER**

Stamp-duty liabilities can be as high as 9% of the price of a property so it is very important to understand how stamp duty works and to take this into account when buying your home. Stamp duty is the tax payable to the government for changing the documents that specify who owns a particular property. Thanks to the changes in the 2007 finance bill Firsttime-buyers will not have to pay any stamp duty on 2nd hand or new homes. (Previously first time buyers were only exempt on 2nd hand properties below €317,500 or new homes below 125 sq. m). Any stamp duty already paid by a first time buyer after 31 March 2007 can be claimed back from the revenue

2. Second-Hand Homes (i.e. Previously occupied homes) The stamp duty due on the purchase of a second-hand home depends on whether you're a first-time-buyer or not and the price of the property being purchased. The table below will help you work out your stampduty liability:

Grow plants in chimney pots

PERIOD chimney pots look great, make superb planters and also create a focal point in your garden.

Chimney pot planters can be placed just about anywhere to achieve that statuesque effect.

Try a single pot at the end of a pathway, or use them in pairs either side of an arch or doorway.

In borders, they provide height and colour, and because they are separate from the main flower beds, you have the opportunity to change the planting as flowers come into season.

Try also using a chimney pot planter to mark the number of your house.

If you would like to try this use a simple plant, and plant it in gravel mulch. This will not only look good but also help retain moisture and is better suited to a stand-alone pot.

Planting a chimney pot can be a lot of fun - let yourself go and use plants in an abstract way to create a theme.

For example, using red and darker coloured plants can create fiery or smoky

The height provided by the pots makes them ideal for trailers and climbers, or

for bringing specimen plants nearer to eye level.

Before planting, prepare the pot by cleaning out any soot or debris using a stiff brush and mild disinfectant.

With taller ones, fill the inside with rocks or old bricks. This not only means that you do not have to use so much expensive compost to fill the pot, but it also adds much needed weight to ensure your expensive pot is not blown over by the wind and smashed.,

You can then fit a plastic pot inside the the top to hold compost for planting.

This method also makes it easy to swap over the display, changing the plant theme as and when you

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Start to plant evergreen shrubs

From now until mid-October is the ideal time for planting hardy evergreen shrubs lifted from open ground. You cannot do this if the weather is very hot or the ground is dry, but neither condition is likely to continue for long at this time of the year.

Plant firmly and stake all big specimens. Later on, if winds are very cold and drying, erect temporary shelters of hurdles, evergreen boughs or sacking between stakes to protect the shrubs, particularly on the north and east sides.

Plant violets in frames


Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass. Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

Plant rooted carnation layers

Carnation layers pegged down at the end of July should be well rooted by this time. Scrape away a little of the soil and see how things are.

If there are plenty of fibrous roots around the cut area, sever the layers from the parent plants and a few days later lift them - each with a good ball of soil - and transfer them to their flowering quarters or pot them in 10-13 cm pots, place them in a frame, and plant them out next March.

RULES CORNER

On Thursday A's ball was in a bunker. B played and his ball went into the bunker, hitting and moving A's ball. What happened next? Under Rule 18 - Ball at rest Moved - A's ball had to be replaced without penalty (if he didn't replace it, A then played from the wrong place). When it was replaced it was just beside B's. B was entitled to ask A to mark and lift the ball as it was interfering with his play. A lifted his ball but had to be careful not to clean it in any way; if he did so he was subject to a 1-shot penalty. B took his shot and A argued that his lie had been adversely affected. A was entitled to recreate his lie before replacing his ball; indeed, if A's ball had been in a heel mark he would be obliged to make a heel mark before replacing the ball. Ask Tom if that was what they did!




