Public Swimming Pool For Lismore Mooted

MOTION SET TO COME BEFORE COUNCIL

A motion is set to come before Lismore Town Council to examine the possibilities of developing a public swimming pool.

The motion follows discussions between Fine Gael councillors John Heneghan and Orla Russell and, as yet unidentified person, described as being "interested in helping the development of Lismore".

The discussions focused on the notion of developing a public swimming pool in the historic West Waterford town.

Speaking at the September meeting of the town council, Cllr. Heneghan accepted that at first he was sceptical about the plan for a number of reasons, but they had had a long meeting on what could be done.

"The bottom line is that it is a possibility," he said.

While he also acknowledged there were "huge capital costs" attached to building a public pool, he said there were huge grants available for this purpose from Government.

The main problem, he added, would be the ongoing running

costs of the project.

He said they are constantly hearing about the massive amounts of money in the economy, and in a modern country, facilities like public swimming pools should be made available.

"I think it's something we could at least look at," he said.

He called on the County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer to attend a meeting of Lismore Town Council to open discussions on the ambitious plans, saying he would like to hear his input.





Ó Céilleachair Backs Gilmore For Labour Party Leadership Bid

Labour Dungarvan town councillor, Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, has paid tribute to outgoing party leader Pat Rabbitte, and confirmed his support for Eamon Gilmore in the race for succession.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says he was disappointed to learn last week of Pat Rabbitte's decision to step down but understood his reasoning.


Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says the espousal of social democracy in Irish politics has been excellently served by Pat Rabbitte and hopes that he would continue to contribute.

CIVIC AMENITY BACKTRACK WELCOMED

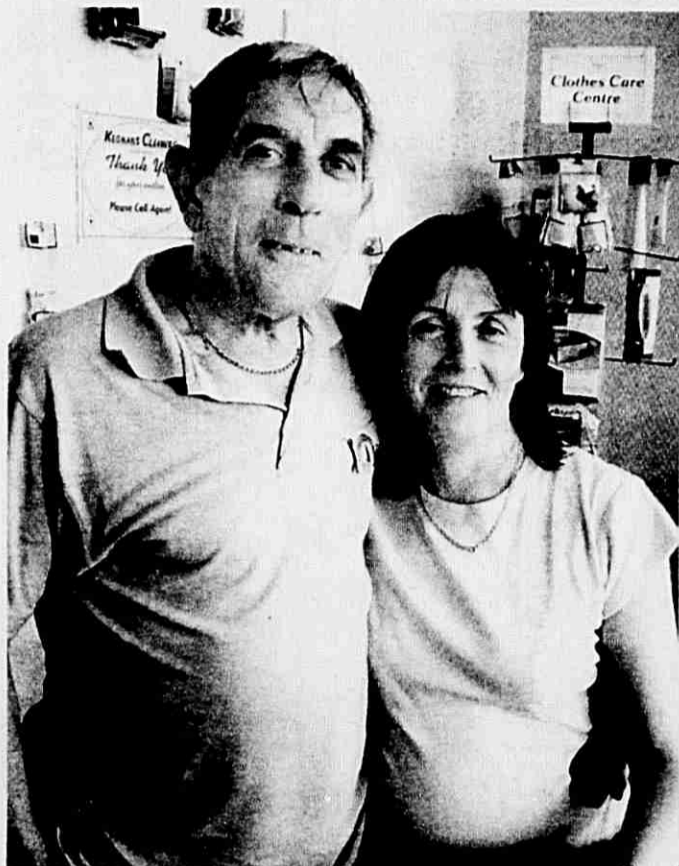

 Waterford County Council's Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan welcomed the move to reduce the charge for a bag of rubbish to €7. Referring to the number of private collectors offering lower

charges than the council, he said it "goes to show" that when the council gets its "economics out of line someone will fill the gap." However, despite the €7 charge he believed it will be difficult to "get customers back". "Once they get in the habit of going somewhere else it's very hard to get them back," he added. He said the council "got it wrong" with its level of charges

and he welcomed the €7 charge for a bag of rubbish. Town Manager, John O'Flynn said the difference between the private and local authority waste bodies was that the council provided a three bin collection while the private sector so far hasn't had to. "That's where they are cheaper," he said. He said changes to charges will be made "on an ongoing basis".

Council To Apply Pressure Over Pre-Fab Classrooms

 Lismore Town Council is to seek to put pressure on the Government to limit the amount of time allowed to use pre-fabs for accommodation at schools. The council is to put forward a motion to the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland calling for time constraints on the use of non-permanent structures at schools.

"We must make sure that when they say something is temporary that it is only temporary and not there for a long time. "There is no health and safety problem when pre-fabs are in place for a short period," he added. "Where the problem arises, and the pre-fabs become a health hazard, is when they are in place for a period of time."

Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan, who put forward the motion, said pre-fabs are a "patchwork" solution, and said there is "no justification" for leaving them in place for 10 to 15 years as is currently happening. Cllr. Heneghan, a teacher at Blackwater Community School, said the Government uses constraints on ordinary people building, so constraints should be put on the Government when it comes to erecting temporary classrooms.

Court Date Still Awaited For Samshire Case

 Confirmation of a court date is still awaited in connection with the removal of hundreds of tonnes of rubbish from the former Samshire site in Lismore.

A growing clamour has come from residents, calling of the removal of the rubbish, which is stacked up at the IDA site since the former county council contracted recycling company ceased to operate. In a statement from the council's environment section, read out at the September meeting of Lismore Town Council, it was stated that a court date is still awaited.

In December 2005, a non-compliance order was enforced on Graham Leake of Samshire Ltd.

Then, in April 2007, a successful action was brought against the company for failure to comply with the Waste Management Act.

A fine of €2,500 was imposed and the county council was granted its costs of over €5,000.

The tenth annual Eigse Sliabh gCua which opened on 24 August, this year celebrated the writer and publisher John O'Daly born in Farnane in the ancient parish of Lickoran (which now, with the earlier parish of Seskinane, forms the modern parish of Touraneena) from where moved to Kilkenny and later to Dublin where he established a successful book publishing business and became well known in Irish literary circles having O'Daly Road in the north city area of Drumcondra named in his memory and while he is remembered locally with a memorial at Millstreet, Co Waterford, a half mile from his birth place, his grave at Glasnevin Cemetery in Dublin still remains unmarked.

Professor Proinsias O Drisceoil came to Millstreet to the site of the John O Daly memorial, for the opening of Eigse Sliabh gCua and in an address to the assembled gathering traced the life and times of John O Daly from his birth in nearby Lickoran, through his early work as a teacher and inspector for the Irish Society in the Youghal / Waterford / Kilkenny area and in the documenting and publishing of many earlier writings of prose and poetry, his work for the Irish language and later as a publisher in Kilkenny and Dublin where he died in 1878. Proinsias O Drisceoil recently compiled a book 'Sean O Dalaigh - Eigse agus Iomarbha' published by Cork University Press on the work of O'Daly and his important role in Irish literary history.

A large gathering of both locals and visitors attended the function which was organised by the committee of Eigse Sliabh gCua at which Brendan Kiely local historian and writer introduced

the principle speaker Proinsias O Drisceoil who gave an interesting talk in Irish and English on O'Daly which was followed by an Irish night in the historic Walsh's Public House where many stories from the past were recalled and related. Marie and John Cummins were perfect hosts for the occasion and amongst the many musicians who turned up for the function included Sean Brien, John and

Maria Sullivan, Kathleen Reynolds, Joe Power from Dungarvan who also entertained those present with songs and ballads in Irish and English. Paschal Power opened the ballad session appropriately with the local anthem 'Sliabh Geal gCua na Feile' by Pdraig O'Milleadha, and there were also songs from Proinsias O Drisceoil and two Tom Ryan ballads recalling local social history, the Wedding of Roger Brien and the 1938 Dance at the Half Way Hall from Ballymacarbery's own Christy Moore which brought back many memories from the appreciative local audience and a good night was enjoyed by all.

One of the stories from the last century told on the night was of a local customer and character known as 'Cullinane the Soldier' because of his exploits around the world with the British army. It would appear that Cullinane's choice of language would sometimes exceed the niceties to which the then proprietor Mrs. Nan (Walsh) a woman of genteel disposition, was accustomed to and on one occasion she rebuked Cullinane for his outspokenness saying to him "how dare you use such language in my presence having regard to the amount of money which was lost on my education" to which Cullinane simply replied 'and lost it was m'am'.

The Eigse continued on Saturday with a bus tour around the historic areas of Sliabh gCua and later with a talk by Ben Guiry on the historic Comeragh Mountains and the Eigse concluded with traditional Sunday Mass Irish at St Mary's Church, Touraneena celebrated by Fr. Kelliher, which last year was broadcast by Radio na Gaeltachta.

This much neglected industrious scribe, transcriber, translator, author and antiquarian book collector and publisher and son of Sliabh gCua who had amongst his friends and admirers such historic characters as John O'Donovan, Eugene O'Curry, George Petrie deserves to have

his last resting place at Glasnevin Cemetery Dublin marked with a Celtic cross above his grave and it is understood that this is an ambition of Cairde Sliabh gCua.

ARDMORE TIDY TOWNS LAUNCH DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Process For Waste Water Treatment Plant 'Torturously Slow' - KYNE

The lack of Blue Flag status and the need for the immediate installation of a waste water treatment plant remain some of the major infrastructural requirements for Ardmore, according to a development plan launched on Saturday by the Ardmore Tidy Towns Committee.

The plan, which was prepared by Lisa Dolan, aims to bring back national success to the town for the first time since winning the National Tidy Towns Award in 1992.

Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Billy Kyne, guest speaker at the launch, said the process for obtaining a waste water treatment plant is "torturously slow".

He said of the seven village and urban and environmental schemes submitted by the council to Government only Kilmacthomas and Tallow have made slow but welcome progress.

This, he said, is because these towns don't need a foreshore license. Ardmore's foreshore license was submitted in April 2005 to the Dept. of Marine and Natural Resources. "Like the other four foreshore applications," Cllr. Kyne said, "progress, if you could call it that, is tortuously slow."

The Mayor, who made progress on the 7 villages scheme one of the main issues of his year in office, appealed for the process to be fast-tracked.

Meanwhile, Mayor Kyne described the Ardmore Development Plan as "ambitious and demanding".

"The council will try to work with the Tidy Towns Association and community of Ardmore to maximise its potential. Most of all," he told the assembled crowd at the launch, "remember the dynamic of 1992 and above all try to replicate it."

VIEWPOINT

CRUCIAL SEVEN VILLAGES SCHEME MUST BE FAST-TRACKED

Almost a decade on from its much heralded inception in 1999, the development of the €47 million seven villages scheme is still progressing at a "tortuously slow" pace.

Those were the words of the Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Billy Kyne, who has vowed to do all in his power to move the process forward during his term.

Housing developments in Tallow, Cappoquin, Kilmacthomas, Stradbally, Ardmore, Ballyduff/Kilmeaden and Dunmore East will remain at virtually a standstill until the waste water schemes come into operation - leading to a population drain and higher house prices, putting houses out of the reach of natives, and instead leading to the continued blight of holiday homes.

Ardmore is a particularly good example of the problem. As a coastal town boasting a beautiful beach and historically important as well as visually impressive buildings, Ardmore should, by now, be a tourism mecca attracting thousands to the Round Tower, Cliff Walk and beach.

Instead, Ardmore beach is badly contaminated thanks to a long outdated sewerage system.

Ironically, Ardmore beach was one of the first in Ireland to be awarded an EU Blue Flag, but that honour has now well and truly been lost, and will not be returned until the waste water treatment system comes into operation.

It's fitting and completely just that Ardmore Tidy Towns Committee - who launched their development plan on Saturday - should mention the town's failure to get Blue Flag status and the need for a Waste Water Treatment Plant as two vital infrastructural necessities if they are to win back the national honour as Ireland's tidiest town they last held in '92.

Cappoquin is another suffering badly, particularly its roads network. Fine Gael councillor, Nora Flynn has raised the situation on countless occasions.

Put simply, the county council is understandably opposed to addressing the problems for fear they would just have to dig up the roads once again when the pipes for the new sewerage system are laid.

However, this problem has dragged on for a number of years now, and the roads in the town have continued to deteriorate to an utterly deplorable state.

It's a ridiculous situation all round, and each delay poses a particular problem for every single town and village in the scheme.

As long as these delays continue, whether the fault of red tape due to the input of consultants or bureaucracy on the part of the Department, these towns and villages will suffer and fall behind in terms of development, upgraded facilities and, in the case of towns like Ardmore, miss out on tourism until new sewerage facilities are put in place.

SENSIBLE COMPROMISE NEEDED TO CAPPAGH QUARRY LOGJAM

The controversy surrounding the conditional planning permission granted to John A Wood for the retention of quarrying operations at Whitechurch Quarry, Cappagh in West Waterford looks set to continue after news that a number of local residents are now expected to take their challenge to An Bord Pleanála.

Whitechurch Quarry, midway between Dungarvan and Cappoquin, is one of the biggest quarrying operations in the county, and one of the immediate areas largest employers. However, Viewpoint would be one hundred percent behind at least some of the sentiments in the 70 odd submissions and objections to Waterford County Council.

At least some - though not all - these issues look to be addressed by the county council. In particular, the contentious plans to quarry down 29 metres, which directly put a regionally important aquifer, and the areas water supply at risk, was the subject of one of the council's 34 limiting conditions.

The county council, in an attempt to safeguard the aquifer, is only allowing quarrying operations down to 10 metres.

Whether that's enough for the quarry to remain viable, and whether indeed residents and groups see it as being sufficient to safeguard the water supply remains to be seen, and we will undoubtedly know more on that score in the next few weeks.

But one area that hasn't been satisfactorily addressed to Viewpoint's knowledge, and he stands to be corrected, is the issue of groundwater run off. Several thousand cubic metres of groundwater would be pumped into the River Brickey under the quarry's plans, which it is feared would drastically affect levels.

Residents also claim that the spring at the Holy Well in Canty will also be endangered.

Whatever the outcome of the situation, it is vital to safeguard the future of the quarry, and those employed in it, but it's also essential that the water supply and the River Brickey are protected. Only in that way, will a satisfactory compromise be found.

COUNCIL MAY WRITE TO OMBUDSMAN AND PAC OVER LISMORE CLINIC

Meetings To Be Held With Health Minister As Pressure Increases On Caredoc

Lismore Town Council may write to the Ombudsman and the powerful Dail body, the Public Accounts Committee, to explore how €800,000 of public monies granted to Caredoc was used, as pressure was ratcheted further on the after-hours doctors service over its failure to found a clinic in Lismore.

The Health Service Executive granted the monies to Caredoc for the extension of the service to County Waterford two years ago.

But all attempts to discover whether part of Caredoc's proposal included a clinic in Lismore have so far failed.

Labour councillor, Jan Rotte lodged a Freedom of Information Request, and attempts to find an elected representative who attended the meeting where the

money was granted have yielded nothing.

The HSE said no elected representatives attended the meeting on 15th of June 2005 when the decision was taken.

IMPLICATIONS

If a Lismore clinic was part of the original proposal it could have wide ranging implications, the September meeting of Lismore Town Council heard.

Cllr. Rotte said the only information that the council has so far been able to acquire confirming that an outreach clinic was part of the original proposal were newspaper articles in the local press on the 22nd March 2005 and again a month later on the 22nd of April.

"We have to see whether or not a clinic in Lismore was included

in the original document," he said. "So far we've been unable to locate that document."

AMAZING

Fianna Fail councillor Bernard Leddy described it as "amazing" that €800,000 of public monies was granted to set up a body yet they couldn't obtain the proposal.

He said Lismore Town Council is a relevant public body as it is in the area where Caredoc operates and they have "the right to know".

Fine Gael councillor, Orla Russell said Caredoc held a public information meeting in Ballyrafter. While she wasn't present at the meeting, she claimed that the "impression" given was that a clinic would be established in the town.

She suggested that the council write to the Ombudsman to uncover where the monies went, and what the original proposal included.

DELEGATION

A delegation of Town Councillors also plans to meet with the Health Minister, Mary

Harney in the immediate future. Mayor of Lismore, Cllr. Peter Ahern, who is expected to head up the delegation, confirmed that the planned meeting hasn't taken place yet, but that they will call on the Minister to get in touch with the HSE to uncover the information, and press for a clinic to be set up in the West Waterford town.

Town Manager, John O'Flynn suggested that the Public Accounts Committee "may be the route to go down" while Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan in hard-hitting criticisms claimed Caredoc is a "symptom of the way private medical care is going" where it "caters for the elite".

ADEQUATELY SERVED

Caredoc chiefs say the numbers of callers to the service, and the population in Lismore and the surrounding areas, does not warrant the establishment of an outreach clinic in the town, and the public is adequately served by a clinic in Dungarvan.

CRIME LEVELS TO BE DISCUSSED WITH GARDA SUPERINTENDENT

A broad range of crime issues are on the agenda as Lismore Town Council prepares to hold its first policing committee meeting with Garda Superintendent, Tom O'Grady next month.

The council will discuss traffic management including speeding limits, underage drinking, and anti-social behaviour specifically the problems at the graveyard when the meeting takes place behind closed doors before the October meeting of the local authority.

The agenda was formulated as it came to light a woman on the outskirts of the town was forced to move out of her house because of a robbery.

Mayor of Lismore, Cllr. Peter Ahern said the woman was now renting another property in the town after she fled her house in fear following the robbery.

Fine Gael Cllr. John Heneghan described the meeting as an introductory meeting of the policing committee, as they work to build a level of co-operation between the police and elected representatives.

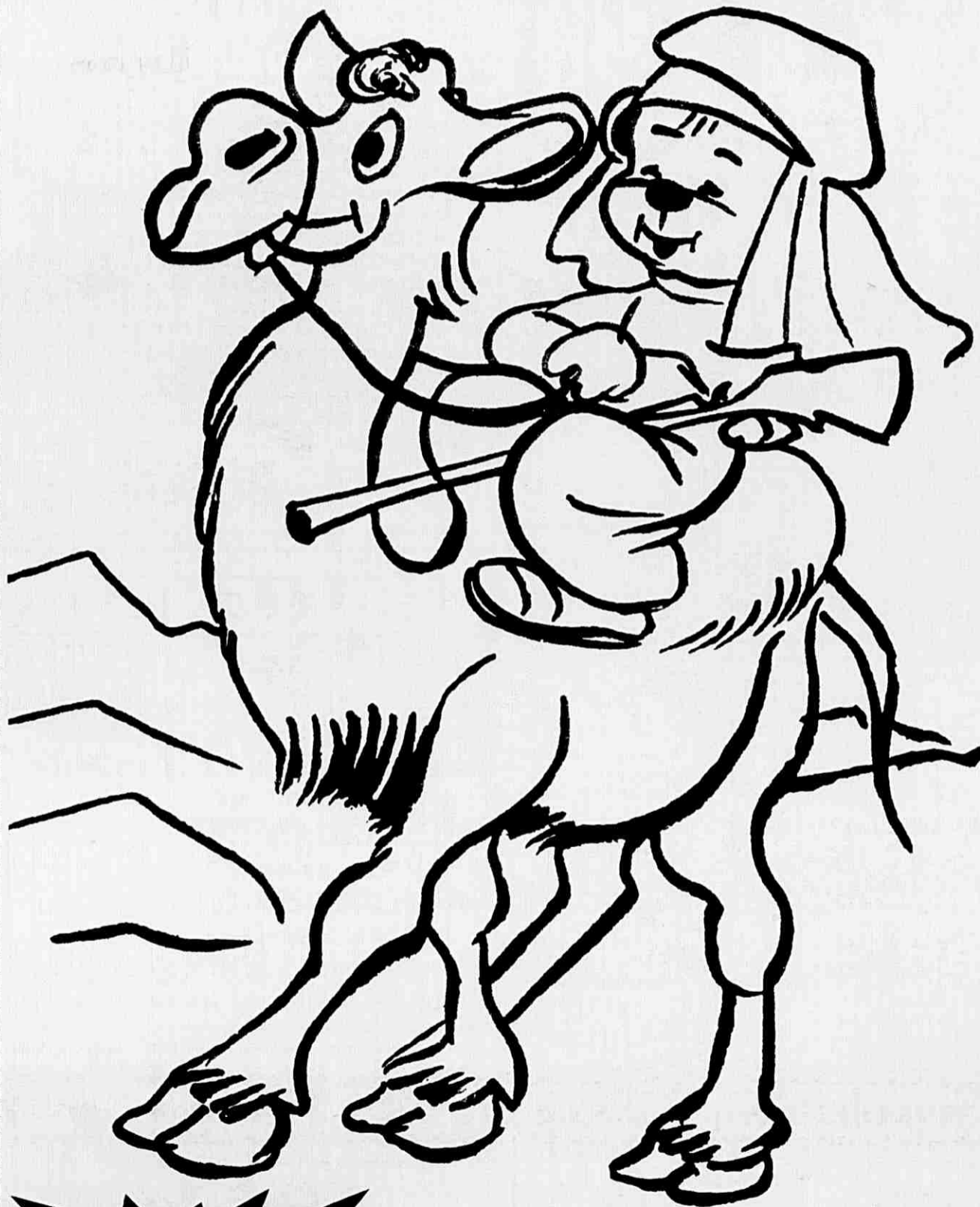

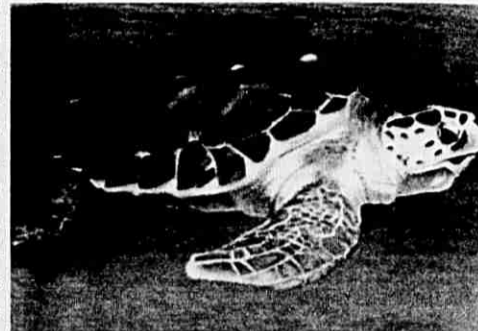

WHERE REPTILES LIVE

Reptiles live in many parts of the world but, because they are cold blooded, many cannot survive in very cold places, such as in the polar regions. Because reptiles are cold blooded they must constantly move from warm places to cooler ones and then back to maintain their body temperature. Land based reptiles can raise their body heat by basking in the sun. Reptiles that live in very hot areas hide beneath rocks or in borrows during the extreme heat. Then they have to bask in the early morning and late afternoon sun to boost their body temperatures, to help them to survive the cold nights.

Turtles Are Good Swimmers

A turtle has two things that help it to be an excellent swimmer. Its shell has been streamlined to help it cut through the water, while



its legs have evolved into large flippers. Turtles usually breed in the same place every year. Although they find it difficult to walk on land, they make their way up to a beach to lay their eggs in a hole in the sand. When the young turtle hatches out they make a dash for the sea. Many of them get eaten by predators before they reach the water.

Reptiles Don't Have Homes

The holes in the sand made by egg-laying turtles and the scraped-out hollow in which crocodiles and alligators lay their eggs are the nearest that any reptile comes to a sort of home. None of the reptiles, with the exception of crocodiles, are very good parents. The young are just left to fend for themselves.

Some Reptiles Hibernate

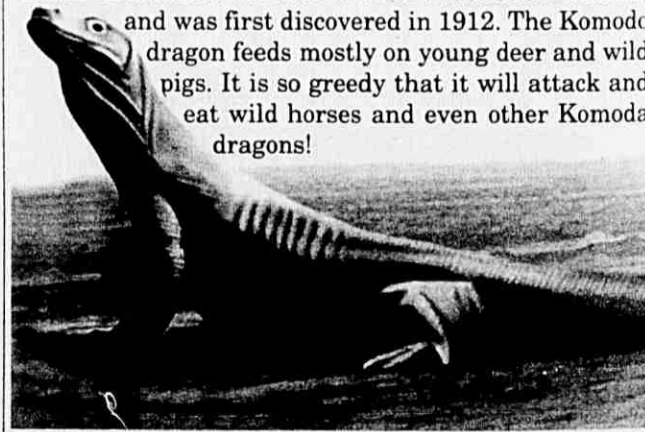
In some areas of the world, the weather is warm enough for reptiles during the summer but too cold in the winter. They survive by hibernating, hiding away in burrows or nests where they sleep through the winter until warm weather returns.

There Are No Snakes in Ireland

Ireland has no snakes of its own. According to Christian legend, Saint Patrick (AD 389-461), patron saint of Ireland, banished them from the island.

Komodo Dragons Are Cannibals

The Komodo dragon is an enormous lizard that looks like a prehistoric dinosaur. It can be as much as 3m. (10 ft) long and weighs some 90k (199lb). It lives on the island of Komodo and a few other Indonesian islands, and was first discovered in 1912. The Komodo dragon feeds mostly on young deer and wild pigs. It is so greedy that it will attack and eat wild horses and even other Komodo dragons!

Dungarvan Delegation Warmly Welcomed in Erie

An official nine member delegation travelled to Erie, Pennsylvania recently in a return visit to the City which had sent a delegation to Dungarvan last March, to explore the possibility of formalising links under the Sister City Programme. On that occasion, an agreement was co-signed which committed the two communities to promoting closer cultural, business and educational ties. The town has had links with Erie for almost thirty years through the co-operation between St. Augustine's College and Mercyhurst, which saw students from Dungarvan study in the US under a four year scholarship.

The delegation, which was led by the Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan, also included Cllrs. Michael O'Riordan, Teresa Wright, Fiachra O'Ceilleachair and Ann Marie Rossiter, who also represented the Dungarvan and West Waterford Chamber of Commerce, as well as Dungarvan Town Manager, Denis McCarthy, Economic Development Officer, Waterford County Enterprise Board, Fearghal Reidy, Joseph Moynihan, Principal of St. Augustine's College and Tom Keith from the Town Twinning Committee.

Despite travel difficulties because of bad weather in neighbouring Ohio which delayed the group's arrival until late into the night, a hectic programme of meetings, visits to educational and business campuses, as well as tourism sites was commenced early the following morning.

Worthwhile

Speaking on his return to Dungarvan, the Mayor, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan expressed himself very pleased with the success of the trip which, he said, had not only established links and further contacts in the North American City, but had delivered tangible benefits which could be seen almost immediately.

"The Erie City Council and the various groups which support the Sister City Programme, are very committed to making this relationship work and we are the fourth and latest city worldwide

with which Erie has set up formal ties."

He said the City and its resources were thrown open to the group and the welcome, both from the various Civic Authorities and the general public in the streets, had to be seen to be believed.

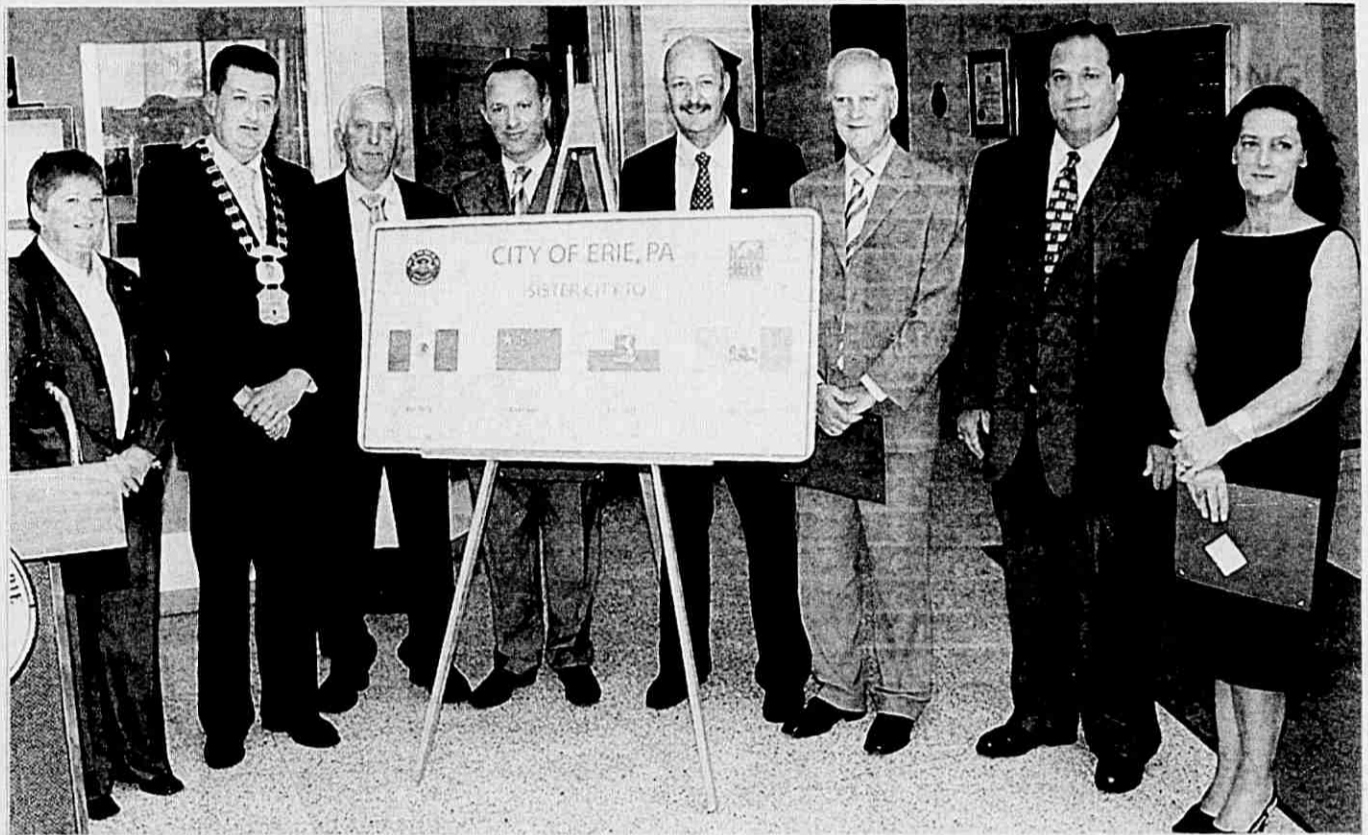
"The people of Erie are very warm and welcoming," he said "and I would like to pay tribute to their wonderful hospitality and caring."

He said that it should be possible in the short term to see an exchange between the Erie Playhouse Theatre Troupe and the Dungarvan Dramatic Club, which was even now in the planning and they had met with Judge Susan Paradise-Baxter, Federal Magistrate who is on the Board of the Erie Theatre as well as Almitra Clerkin, the Director of the Theatre.

"I also have strong expectations that there will be an exchange of young people under an Alternative Education Programme for Maritime Studies which has proved very successful for Erie students who left formal education at an early age."

He said that there were also positive expectations in relation to a link with the Dr. Barber Centre which implements programmes for children, adults and seniors with developmental disabilities and their families. (See separate report)

"I see this visit as a very positive step for Dungarvan," he said, "and I have no doubt that both communi-

ties can gain substantially from it."

Formal Welcome

The group's first official function was at Mercyhurst College, where they were hosted at a working breakfast by Dr. Thomas Gamble, President of the College. The members of Erie City Council, led by Mayor Joseph Sinnott, formally welcomed the Delegation and Cllr. Damien Geoghegan replied to the good wishes and outlined the hopes and aspirations of the group for the visit and the expectations of the town from the formalising of links between the two communities.

The Mayors and other members of the Councils co-signed a formal Twinning Document in the glare of TV lights as the three local stations had come to cover the event. Both Mayors gave interviews to all three TV Stations ABC, NBC and CBS which were carried on the mid-day news and for the remainder of the day until midnight.

After breakfast and the formalities, the group were taken on tour of Mercyhurst College, which has an impressive campus and a wide range of facilities including the Mary d'Angelo Performing Arts Centre which is home to Mercyhurst Choir who visited the town last May.

Local Interest

There was great interest by the general public all week in the Irish delegation, with people regularly coming up to them in the street to introduce themselves.

The group toured Presque Isle State Park, which, as its name suggests in French is 'almost an island'. It is one of the most visited State Parks in Pennsylvania and even the United States and is justifiably renowned for the beauty of its location on the edge of Lake Erie.

The group went on to visit the Maritime Museum, as well as the Centre for Bayfront Studies where students who have left formal education early, pursue alternative education programmes. (See separate report).

Regeneration

The delegation was joined by the Executive Director of the Erie Port Authority, Ray Schreckengost and several of the Board Members who explained the importance of the new developments on the waterfront site which is being steadily transformed from industrial use to tourism and leisure activities.

Among the Bayfront initiatives are the new Convention Centre which was constructed at a cost of \$42 million and which was officially opened during the visit of the Dungarvan Group by Governor of Pennsylvania, Edward G. Rendell who spoke of the importance of the new Centre and the other initiatives in the regeneration of the Bayfront area.

The Delegation had been officially invited to the event and

the Governor kindly took time out to meet with the Irish and posed for photographs with them.

Later, they visited the natural Amphitheatre on the Bayfront where they met performer for the evening, Tab Benoit, national Blues Performer, who greeted them and shared stories with the party about the Katrina disaster. Mayor Geoghegan was presented with the Key to the City by Mayor Sinnott in front of the audience prior to the start of the performance. Overhead, a large sign welcoming the Dungarvan group was on display and the Mayor announced the arrival of the group to loud applause.

City Hall

The group was received formally at City Hall for the unveiling of the Sister City Sign which will be displayed on the outer wall of City Hall showing Dungarvan as a

Sister City as well as Lublin, Poland; Merito in Mexico and Zibo in China.

Mayor Sinnott presented the group with the Proclamation which stated that Saturday would be Irish Day in Erie. Mayor Geoghegan suitably replied from the podium and was interviewed by the TV Stations.

At Gannon University, the group met with Dr. Antoine Garibaldi, President of the University and Dr. Bill Garvey, former President of Mercyhurst, who gave a brief economic history of the City and County of Erie. They then dealt with the main business element of the visit at the Economic Development Summit which was very well attended by Civic Officials and representatives of Erie business and commerce. Other Highlights From Trip To Erie

On a second visit to Mercyhurst, the group including St. Augustine's Principal, Mr. Joe Moynihan met with the five St. Augustine's Students presently studying at Mercyhurst. The five girls Oonagh Foley, Sara Norris, Sarah Keane, Tess Sheehan, Richeal Forde were greeted by the Mayor

Cllr. D. Geoghegan, and posed for photographs with the group and Mr. Eric Evans, Director of International Admissions, Mercyhurst.

The Delegation toured the historic Warner Theatre, the only Theatre of its kind in America which has retained its original interior. They

also visited the Erie Playhouse Theatre for the Community Group's excellent production of 'Miss Saigon'; met with Judge Sean McLoughlin, Circuit Court Judge of the State of Pennsylvania, at the United States Federal Courthouse and were joined by Judge Warren

Bence, Federal Bankruptcy Court, and Judge Susan Paradise-Baxter, Federal Magistrate who is also a Board Member of the Erie Playhouse. Judge McLoughlin was presented with a memento by Mayor Geoghegan on the occasion.

The Delegation also visited the Troyer Chip factory where, despite the attentions of a major lightning storm, they saw the workings of the plant and were addressed by owner and Chief Executive, Mark Troyer.

Mayor of Waterford, Pennsylvania, Brian Skelton, with other members of the Council and accompanied by his wife Charlene accorded the group a Civic Reception at the historic landmark, the Judson House at Fort le Boeuf, overlooking the only known statue of George Washington in a British Military uniform and later the County Executive, Mark diVecchio hosted the party for lunch in the historic Eagle Hotel in Waterford. The group also took a countryside tour of Spartansburg, Pa., and were able to observe the Amish community and their way of life.

Economic Links Strengthened with Erie

Building on the success of the Economic Meeting held with the Erie Delegation in Dungarvan in March, councillors and officials of Dungarvan Town Council engaged in a series of meetings with business leaders and agencies in Erie last week.

In a statement to the media, Mayor of Erie Joseph Sinnott stated that economic development links with Ireland and Waterford are very important to Erie City Council. This sentiment was reiterated by County Executive Mark diVecchio.

The economic team also met with the Governor of Pennsylvania, Edward G. Rendell. At that meeting views were exchanged in

relation to trade, investment and regeneration. The Governor commended the success of the Irish economy and asserted that there should be considerable scope for economic exchanges between the two jurisdictions.

The Dungarvan delegation also met with representatives of the Port Authority, Mercyhurst College, Erie Chamber of Commerce and Regeneration Partnership, Penn State University, and Erie Co-Operation for Economic Development along with Economic Staff of Erie City Council and Erie County. Specific meetings were also arranged with companies in Erie who are interested in

investigating business opportunities in Ireland. The delegation attended a round table Economic Meeting hosted by Erie Chamber of Commerce and Regeneration Partnership, the Erie - Dungarvan Economic Summit. At the summit mutually beneficial areas of economic co-operation were agreed. Key areas of potential co-operation include: export to both markets, intellectual property, investment and tourism. Focusing on tourism, representatives of the Dungarvan delegation highlighted events and festivals that would be of interest to tourists from Erie, including Feile na nDeise, the Imhrana Festival, The Sean Kelly Tour, Heritage Week and the St Patrick's Day Festivities. Representatives of the tourism sector in Erie were also keen to hear of the wealth of walking trails, watersports, golf and equestrian and other activities in Dungarvan and County Waterford. The meetings were led by Mayor Damien Geoghegan and President of the Dungarvan and West Waterford Chamber of Commerce, Cllr. Ann Marie Rossiter.

Importantly, the businesses in Erie were impressed by the range of supports that are available to businesses in Waterford and the role of Dungarvan Town Council and Waterford County Council in driving economic development through the Invest in Waterford Initiative.

The meetings are to be followed up by specific initiatives, which are to be driven by Kim Greene, Director of Economic Development with Erie City and Fearghal Reidy, Economic Development Officer with Waterford County Enterprise Board.

EXTENSIVE PROGRAMME

It is not possible even in a lengthy report, to be able to give a full account of the extensive programme of the visit. In his parting remarks, Chairman of the Sister City Programme, Councilman Jim Thompson said that over the years over a hundred students from Ireland have graduated from Mercyhurst, some of whom became influential in Ireland and some in the United States. John Melody has stayed and founded a chain of restaurants while John Deasy returned to Ireland to take part in National politics.

"We have already signed the Sister City Agreement and this week, the Twinning Agreement," he said, "and we are already looking to expanding with Gannon University and other Student exchanges."

We look forward to expanding this relationship in many areas, cultural, educational and artistic exchanges and certainly in the areas of economics, as we find areas where we can help each other.

"We live in global society and the world is not coming out looking for Dungarvan and the world is not looking for Erie, Pennsylvania. Unless we go out to the world, they will not know we are here," he concluded.

It seems that firm foundations have been laid in the twinning of the two communities and people will look to see tangible results emerge in due course.

Bay front Centre for Maritime Studies

The Bayfront Centre for Maritime studies a non profit Maritime education Facility, and the local School District have formed a partnership creating a unique opportunity to reach middle and high school students in an alternative educational programme. This partnership provides students with hands-on Maritime based learning experiences that focus on Mastery of Math, Science and literacy skills while developing critical and creative thinking, citizenship and teamwork. Students participate in numerous activities including boat building, sailing Navigation exercises and environmental Science. The programme is designed to introduce and reinforce academics, improve self esteem, and encourage personal growth. The young people are referred to the programme through their school districts and an offer has been extended to young people in Dungarvan who are involved in similar education facilities to visit this programme in Erie. This opportunity will be discussed with those in charge of educational facilities in Dungarvan, as a result of which several children may spend some weeks in Erie under the exchange programme.

Education: A Vital part of Twinning

One of the most important and productive elements of the Erie trip was Education. This was the original foundation of the twinning programme as a relationship between Mercyhurst College and St. Augustine's College has been in existence for almost 25 years already. Quite a number of students from St. Augustine's College have passed through the hallowed halls of Mercyhurst and have moved on to successful careers.

Currently there are five students from the Friary in Mercyhurst and the delegation took time to meet them and welcome them to the new academic year. The delegation was accompanied by members of the Erie City Council who offered the students support and contact detail, along with invitations to local families for the important 'Thanksgiving' celebration.

The Principal of St. Augustine's College, Joe Moynihan, met with the President of Mercyhurst College, Dr. Tom Gamble along with the Director of International Admissions Mr. Eric Evans. A number of issues were discussed, most notably the Irish

Scholarships Programme and the potential linking of Mercyhurst with WIT, UCC and CIT. This could ultimately lead to the growth of an exchange programme between these colleges. Mr. Moynihan also met with Dr. Barbara Behan, Vice President for Academic Affairs, with regard to securing additional scholarships for Dungarvan from Mercyhurst.

On Wednesday afternoon Mr. Moynihan also had a meeting with Dr. Richard Sukitsch

Director of Admissions at Gannon University, which included a tour of the University and a meeting with the President Dr. Garibaldi. The University Provost, Dr. Keith Taylor, called the following evening and requested a second meeting. This was dedicated to examining the possibility of establishing a scholarship programme similar to that at Mercyhurst. Mr. Moynihan agreed to continue to liaise with the university and to help to establish links with other second level and third level organisations here in the south east.

RECENT DEATHS

LATE MARY B. AHEARNE



Wednesday, 22nd August saw the end of an era when Mary B. Ahearne - widow of Thomas (Tommy) Ahearne, Dromore, Aghlish, Cappoquin was called to her heavenly reward.

Despite being in failing health for some time, her sudden passing took everyone by surprise, especially her carers on St. Anne's Ward, Dungarvan Hospital.

Mary was just a week away from her 81st birthday. The eldest of 5 children, born to Patrick (Patsy) Barron and Mary (nee O'Daly), farmers, Ballinamona, Old Parish from an early age, Mary showed a great enthusiasm and ability for hard work, be it milking cows by hand, following the horses, while ploughing, potato picking, Mary never shirked hard work. She was a "doer". Tasks that seemed impossible to others were always completed when Mary took charge.

When she and her little brothers and sisters were orphaned by the death of their mother, again Mary took charge. She organised the housework, cooking, baking, shopping, as well as milking cows, bucket feeding calves etc. It was 1939 - so she also had to cope with

ration cards and feeding a family on meager supplies.

But there is always a light at the end of every tunnel and in 1947 Mary took the boat to England to train as a nurse. Thus began one of the most carefree episodes in her life. She spent nine happy years there - nursing in Liverpool and Southport - eventually returning to marry Tommy Ahearne of Dromore, Aghlish, in September 1956.

At home in Dromore, her skills as a nurse were constantly in demand, by neighbours who needed minor ailments treated. These nursing skills, plus her extraordinary ability to "get things done" were to prove invaluable when her husband fell ill in 1970. She simply carried on, running the farm, the house - and getting her three children to school. It was not easy - her greatest comfort being her faith in God and her confidence in St. Anthony and St. Jude.

The eighties and early nineties saw her three children married and the births of her seven grandchildren. These were happy, independent, times for Mary - visiting her friends and relations in Cappoquin, Dungarvan, Youghal, Fermoy. She loved company, traditional music and dance, and lively conversation. She had no time for T.V., especially programmes containing violence, weapons or bad language.

The last ten years saw her health decline, almost imperceptibly at first so that we, her children, did not realise how seriously ill she was. Several bereavements took their toll, her brother Paddy (1997), her little godchild Tommy (1999), her beloved husband Tommy (2000) and her sister Catherine (2004). It was all too much to think of. Her memory began to fail to an alarming degree and eventually she was admitted to St. Anne's ward in March 2005. Here, she became a firm favourite with staff,

residents and visitors - her independent spirit, her "roguish" sense of humour. Though memory and physical health were failing, that sense of humour and sheer "joie de vivre" did not diminish. Already she is sadly missed.

Mary's removal took place on Thursday evening, 23rd August, from St. Joseph's Hospital chapel, to the Church of the Assumption, Aghlish. Here, her remains were met by Fr. Lucy P.P., Aghlish. Following a decade of the Rosary, we left her to repose overnight, and returned next morning (Friday) for her burial Mass at 11.0 am.

In this Mass Fr. Fitzgerald C.C. celebrated Mary's long life, devoted to the care of others.

The Readings were read by her son John and niece Margaret Kavanagh. Prayers of the Faithful were read by grandchildren Sean Ahearne and Katie Power. Kathleen Coffey sang some of the beautiful old hymns that were Mary's favourite.

The procession of Offertory Gifts were led by daughter Margaret Drohan and granddaughter Aoife Power carrying the bread and wine. Next grandson Liam Drohan brought up Mary's Nursing Cert (dated 1952). Her prayer book, ever a source of comfort and hope, was carried by Sean Ahearne.

After Communion, her daughter Mary Power sang "Sliabh Geal gCua" as a tribute to her mother's love of traditional Irish songs.

At the end of Mass, Mary was carried to her final resting place by her son John, her sons-in-law Jimmy Power and Pat Drohan, her grandsons Seamus Power and David Drohan and her nephew Johnny Kavanagh.

Chief mourners were children John Ahearne, Margaret Drohan and Mary Power, grandchildren Katie, Aoife, Seamus, David, Sean, Liam; her brother James (Jimmy) Barron and sister, Bridget Kavanagh. Also present were several nieces, nephews, cousins and friends from far and near.

CAPPOQUIN PRIEST CELEBRATES GOLDEN JUBILEE

On Friday July 20th, Rev. Dr. Thomas D. Mason O.S.A. marked the Golden Jubilee of his Priestly Ordination at St. Mary's Parish Church, Cappoquin with concelebrated mass in the company of Very rev. Fr. John Kiely P.P., Rev. Fr. Robert Arthur P.E. Cappoquin, and 16 fellow Augustinians. Noel Mason (soloist) accompanied by Mairéad Cullinane (organist) accompanied by her family and Rena O'Donoghue, all cousins of Fr. Mason, provided the beautifully prepared church music. Readings were read by Mary Coughlan and a very eloquent homily was delivered by Fr. Mason's good friend Fr. Martin Crean O.S.A. Offertory gifts relating to various aspects of Fr. Mason's life as a priest were presented by members of the Mason, Coffey and O'Donoghue families. Following Mass a reception and buffet was held at the Central Bar to mark the great occasion.

Fr. Tom, as he is affectionately known in his native Cappoquin was born in 1932, the year of the Eucharistic Congress, to Mick and Josie Mason (nee Coffey), who ran a very successful public house at the square (now Fennells). Unfortunately Fr. Tom's dad passed away suddenly at the early age of 43 year, while saying the family rosary. Fr. Tom recalls with

heartfelt appreciation the solid influence of the Sisters of Mercy during his primary school years and subsequently his teachers at National School, the late Mr. and Mrs. F.X. O'Leary.

Fr. Tom's life with the Augustinians began in 1945 when he attended as a boarder, the Friary College, Dungarvan. He was very much attracted by the warm spirit of the Friary; therefore his decision to join the Augustinian Order with five other friends from his class in 1950 was an easy one. Fr. Tom went to Rome to study for the Priesthood, staying and studying there for a period spanning seven years. Fr. Tom was ordained on March 16th, 1957 and among the many memories of his ordination day was the broadcasting of his first priestly blessing over Vatican Radio.

From 1957 to 1963 Fr. Tom was engaged in further studies in Rome and returned to Dublin fortified with Doctorates in Philosophy and Social Studies. He spent the next six years at the Augustinian House of Studies, where one of his first students was Fr. Martin Crean.

Following the opening of the University of Jos, Nigeria, Fr. Tom was invited to join the University staff as a full-time academic member teaching Philosophy in 1969. He became a professor in 1982 and Dean of the faculty of

Arts in 1986. Throughout those years he also served as Chaplin to the University. In 1989 he took over the chaplaincy at the air force base in Makurdi, ably assisted by very enthusiastic parishioners. Together they built a church, receiving invaluable support from the parishioners of Cappoquin, Affane and Melleray. In 2000 Fr. Tom transferred to Kenya to help in the new House of Formation in Nairobi. He became Chaplin to a group which has committed itself to the care of children infected by HIV/AIDS. This work is made possible because of the wonderful support from the Monks of Mount Melleray, an Augustinian Parish in England and the loyal support of his very good friends at home and abroad.

Much has been left unsaid but Fr. Tom never forgets his roots. He is a frequent visitor to Cappoquin and likes to be kept informed of the happenings in the Cappoquin/Affane G.A.A. Club and Waterford Hurling scene. This is the story of a life filled with blessings, a story that links the living with those gone before us, and many who made it possible have gone to their eternal reward. When a heart is so full of joy and gratitude words are poor enough carriers. For now let us rejoice while thanking God for the past, full of hope for the future and ever joyful in the present.

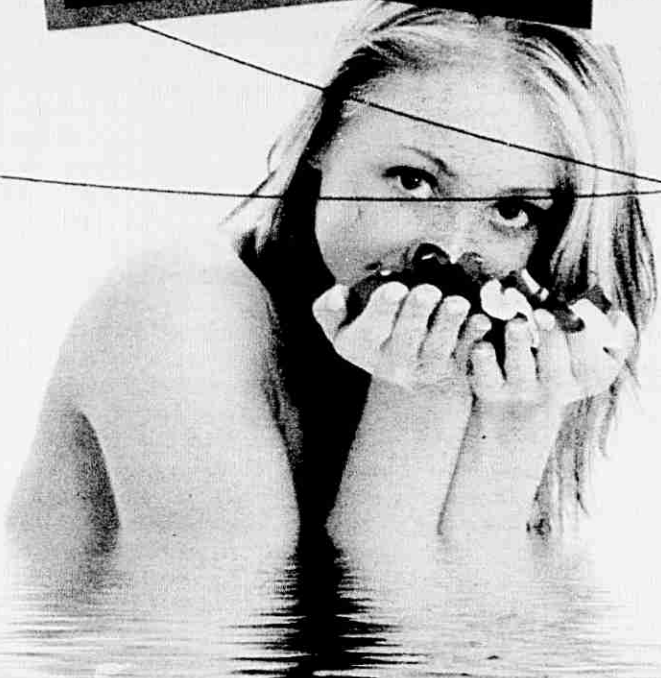

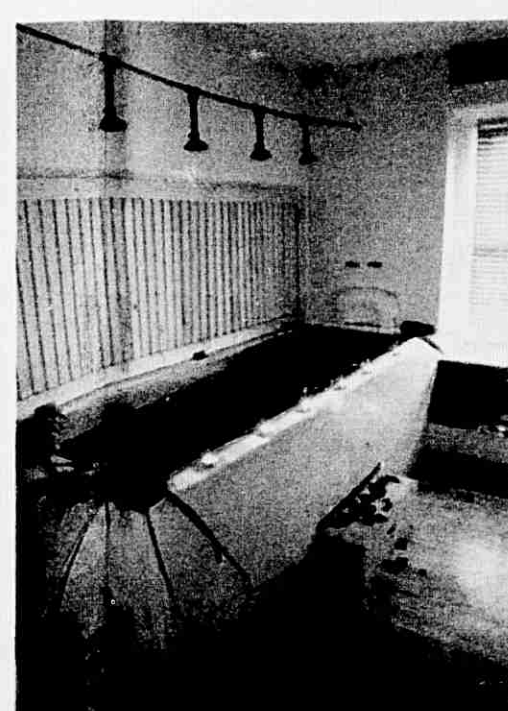

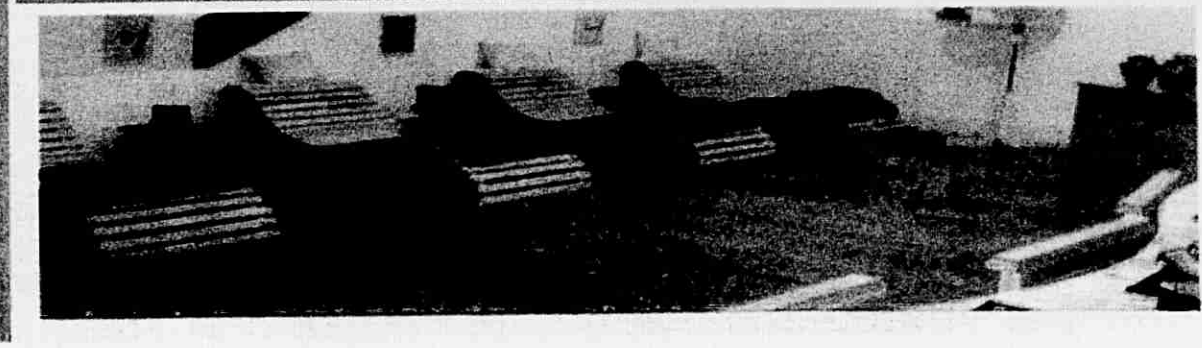

Peter Canavan Talks About Waterford Hurling

There was an aura about Big Frank McGuigan. You sensed his presence the minute he walked into Harpurs Bar on West 231st. He had that star attraction, a magnetic appeal on and off the

field. Despite spending his best footballing years on the cinders at Gaelic Park in the Bronx, he attained legendary status in his native Tyrone. The Ardboe man, whose three sons Frank, Tommy and Brian, have played senior for Tyrone, is still revered around the Loughshore and throughout the O'Neill county. He reigned supreme as the unchallenged all time great of Tyrone football until the arrival of Peter the Great. Canavan is now regarded as the undisputed king of all time. Tyrone have looked rudderless since his retirement. The only one who looked even vaguely capable of taking up Elijah's cloak was funny enough Brian son of Frank but he has suffered horrific career threatening injuries. Please God, he may yet take up the mantle.

Like many of Ulster's top footballers Canavan was also a gifted hurler. He still has a great gra for the game and a deep appreciation of Waterford hurling. Here's what he had to say:

"It is with much embarrassment that I have to say I have never made it to a hurling final. This despite the fact that the first Tyrone jersey I donned was for the Tyrone hurlers in an underage competition." (A bitter internal dispute between rival factions in the parish sundered Canavans club in Ballygawley in 1982 resulting in the clubs expulsion and 8 years in the wilderness. The effectively clubless Canavan joined Killyclogher Hurling club near Omagh which also left him eligible to play for Tyrone minor footballers. A peace was brokered by Fr Sean Hegarty in 1989 and an accord reached. A club with a

new name Errigal Ciaran re entered the Tyrone championship in 1990. The rest is history.)

The great one does not dwell on the fractious and bitter past as he continues "For many years club football commitments have prevented me from attending the final and again this year. However the odd Munster final I have attended has left me keen for more. To witness the speed, artistry and bravery of these men at close hand is something else. Like many Gaels around the country I'm more than a little disappointed Waterford didn't make the final. Without a shadow of a doubt I found them to provide the best entertainment in the championship this year and that includes hurling and football. Sport can be cruel and it will be a tragedy if the likes of Ken McGrath, Tony Browne and Paul Flynn don't get the chance to perform in an All Ireland final, let alone win one. I don't say that lightly. Having played for my county for 14 years before winning an All Ireland I know what it's like to experience the heartache of losing and missed opportunities. The more people say that it was an injustice to play 3 weeks on the trot will not make any difference. The more people tell them that they played the best hurling this year will not make them feel any better. It's only rubbing salt into the wound. Players don't need reminding. The fact is it's another year without the Liam McCarthy. The Limerick defeat will not be easily forgotten, lessons will be learned but the scars will remain. They will carry this into the summer of '08 when once again they will be consumed with the passion of bringing the Liam McCarthy to Waterford"

Peter Canavan concludes with these words of encouragement: "The older one gets there are temptations to throw in the towel. I was thankful that the negatives in my mind were quickly removed towards the latter stages of my career. I hope Browne, Flynn, McGrath and co do likewise. The long wait will make their success all the sweeter when it does come. In 2003 Mickey Harte spoke time and time again about the powers of persistence. It's a trait that I hope the Decies have in abundance next year."

Tyrone/Waterford Coaching Link Up

Waterford Coaching Officer Eoin Breathnach and Tyrone Hurling Development Officer Michael McCullough have come up with a novel idea aimed at improving football standards in Waterford and hurling standards in Tyrone. The initiative will see Waterford hurling coaches visiting Tyrone to work with Development squads and Tyrone football coaches reciprocating. Football Development squads will also travel to Waterford from the north with our hurlers going to Tyrone.

It is a commendable initiative and we hope it bears fruit. The Tallow club has been involved in a similar endeavour with over ten years now and have had many exchanges with the Naomh Columille Hurling club in East Tyrone.

A BURNING ISSUE

Cystitis is an infection of the urinary tract which affects almost every woman at least once in her life, but for some women it can be an extremely regular occurrence which causes much suffering.

Urinary tract infections are usually caused by bacteria which are commonly found in the bowel such as E. coli. These bacteria are easily transmitted to the bladder and urinary tract, particularly during sexual intercourse. Infections are far less common in men due to the much greater distance from the bladder to the exterior of the body.

Symptoms include needing to urinate frequently with a feeling of being unfinished afterwards, intense burning during urination, and in some cases severe lower abdominal pain. If left untreated the individual may develop a fever, blood in the urine, or pain in the loins which suggests that the infection has spread to the kidneys.

The usual orthodox treatment for cystitis is antibiotics. However, these can contribute to the vicious cycle of recurrent infections in some women. Fortunately there are natural approaches to help prevent urinary tract infections and to treat them when they occur.

Recurrent cystitis often suggests an overgrowth of a yeast called Candida albicans in the body. This lowers the immune system and causes inflammation of the lining of the urinary tract which is then more prone to bacterial infections. Regular use of antibiotics can contribute to candida overgrowth.

Treatment of the Candida overgrowth involves removing all refined sugar from the diet, using antifungal and immune stimulating herbs such as pau d'arco, and rebalancing the microbial flora with live natural yoghurt or a probiotic supplement such as Lactobacillus acidophilus. This often helps to break the vicious cycle of recurrent infections.

In addition, cranberries contain hippuric acid which prevent bacteria clinging to the lining of the urinary tract. It is important to eat fresh or frozen cranberries every day, or to use a pure unsweetened cranberry juice. Most of the cranberry juice drinks available in supermarkets contain very little cranberry juice and are loaded with sugar which counteracts any beneficial effects.

Infections are more likely to develop if the urine is too concentrated or if it sits in the bladder for a long time. This can occur due to dehydration or as a result of a structural problem such as prolapse. Drinking plenty of water and herbal teas such as dandelion leaf, nettle or horsetail helps to flush out the kidneys and urinary tract, and the minerals in these herbs help to strengthen the bladder walls.

Practical measures include passing water as soon as possible after sexual intercourse in order to prevent the transmission of bacteria into the bladder. Avoid using perfumed soaps and vaginal deodorants which can exacerbate the problem. Wear cotton underwear and avoid wearing tight fitting jeans or trousers. If you are sitting down all day make sure you get up and walk around regularly to encourage healthy circulation in the pelvic area.

If an infection does develop, antibacterial herbs such as buchu and uva-ursi are a safe and effective alternative to antibiotics. A medical herbalist can provide an effective individually-tailored prescription for the prevention and/or treatment of urinary tract infections, together with detailed advice about diet and other helpful measures.

Property buyers wishing to purchase a property at an affordable price will be most interested in what is happening in County Waterford.

A report is due to be published on the "Affordability of Housing Property in County Waterford" by Consultant Economist, Jim Power, on Friday next, 7th September at 5.30pm, in Lismore House Hotel, Lismore.

It certainly has been an eventful few months, where media headlines frequently detailed turbulence in the financial markets and property investors are now left to wonder how the autumn housing market will perform.

The dizzying growth in house prices over the last 10 years has certainly been fuelled to a large extent by first time buyers as well as investors who see property as their retirement plan. 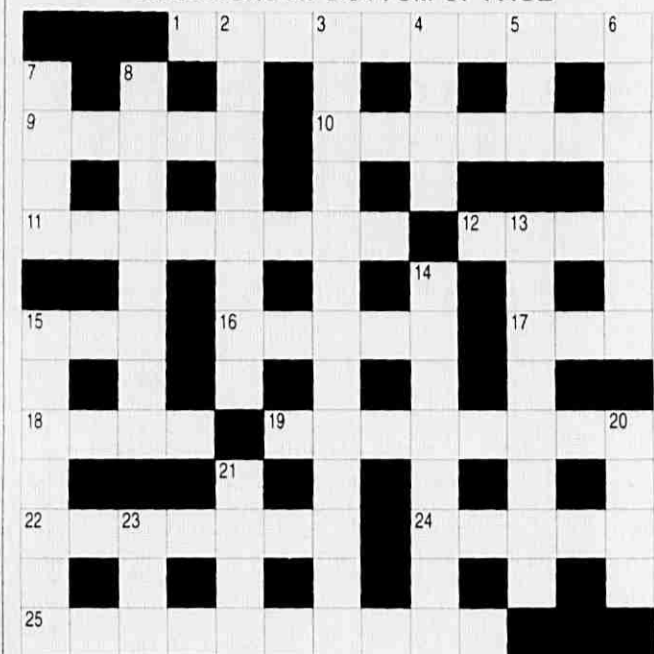

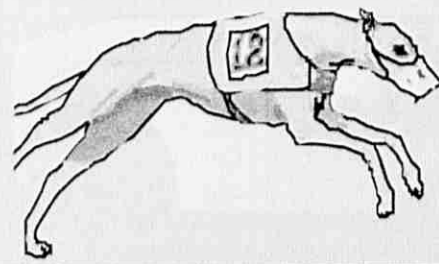

Laytown exudes a certain kind of magic

THE FINAL FURLONG (IN ASSOCIATION WITH BETFAIR) WITH PHIL DELANEY

Now you see it, now you don't! For over 130 years they've been performing miracles at Laytown racecourse to doll up a racecourse in jig time.

On Thursday, volunteers at the world's most unique racecourse will wait patiently for the tide to go out sometime after lunch, and the frenetically mark out a racecourse that will hold six races in front of 4,000 people.

It's quite a spectacle, but as novel as it is for us punters it's even more so for the horses. The nature of the venue means that an odd, rogue stream runs across the course - it's just surface water but some horses like it and some don't. Not every animal takes to Laytown first time off, so think of it as a day at the beach rather than one at the races!

It's a busy week's racing with the high-light undoubtedly the Irish Champion Stakes. Over an extended ten furlongs it often brings together the best milers and the best middle-distance runners in Europe. Last year Dylan Thomas edged out Oujja Board under an unforgettable Kieran Fallon ride.

This year's renewal takes place on Saturday at Leopardstown and, at the time of writing, Aidan O'Brien still has some serious options in the race. George Washington, Peeping Fawn, Eagle Mountain and Duke of Marmalade all look like possibilities.

If I had to pick one it would be Duke of Marmalade, who reminds me somewhat of O'Brien's 2005 winner Oratorio. Like Duke of Marmalade he too was a Danehill who found his peers a shade too quick in that year's 2,000 Guineas at both the Curragh and at Newmarket.

But he came into his own over ten furlongs, winning both the Irish and English Champion Stakes. Duke of Marmalade has improvement to make but that little bit extra looked forthcoming in the Juddmonte International at York last month.

That race was won by Authorized from Dylan Thomas, with Notnowcato and Duke of Marmalade three lengths back in third and fourth. The front two look exceptional, and the Duke's run doesn't have him too

far behind them. He seemed to get caught for toe and then had nowhere to go under Mick Kinane, but made up some serious ground in the final furlong and a half to finish just out of the placings. It was a performance better even than his neck second to Excellent Art in the St James Palace Stakes.

There's no mistaking his progressive profile; he's a horse crying out for ten furlongs; he started at 11/1 at Ascot and 12/1 at York, so he'll be a price - now let's hope O'Brien gives him the green light for Leopardstown!

TWO FOR THE NOTEBOOK

I'm not saying "have what you want" on Great War Eagle next time out, but if he runs in a maiden over the next couple of weeks he looks 'maximum bet' territory. My moles in David Wachman's stable have been bleating about this fellow for a while now, and he finally made his debut at the Curragh on Sunday in a six-furlong maiden. A maiden hurdle on fast ground on an easy track should be right up her street.

TOURANEENA RACQUETBALL NEWS

Touraneena Trio Are European Champions

The Centro Sportivo Comunale in Brebiate, Italy was the venue for the recent 14th European Racquetball Championships. Overall the Championship proved to be an enormous success for the Irish Team with 15 of the 17 titles on offer making their way home to the Emerald Isle.

Triston Hickey was part of the men's team that was hoping to regain the title they lost 2 years ago in Hamburg to the German outfit. Bidding for their 3rd title in 4 attempts, the Irish fielded a very strong team on paper. Triston captained the team that included Noel O'Callaghan, Adam Neary and Jimmy Gannon.

In their opening match, they overcame the challenge of the Belgian team with considerable ease with the Irish recording victories in all 3 matches. Next up were the Spanish. In a much tougher encounter, Triston had to come back from the dead to record an 11-10 victory over Victor Monterresat to claim the first singles match. Further victories in the second singles and doubles matches resulted in a semi-final showdown with the Dutch team. Here the Irish went on to record a 2-1 victory which earned them a place in the final against Germany. The final went right down to the final doubles game to decide the eventual winner after Triston won the Opening singles while the Germans levelled proceedings with victory in the second singles. The doubles combination of Noel O'Callaghan and Jimmy Gannon secured the important

points to claim the trophy for the Irish side.

The Skehan sisters, Julie and Eithne were part of the Irish Womens team that was hoping to record a hat-trick of consecutive title victories. On the team they were joined by Kilkenny's Bernie O'Callaghan and Templederry's Helen Shanahan. It was completely new team from the team that recorded victory in Hamburg in 2005.

France was their opening opponents. Eithne played in the first singles match and had the daunting task of facing the vastly experienced and current European Champion, Marie Josse Collet. A super performance by the youthful Touraneena player nearly pulled off the shock of the Championships right in the first match but Eithne just fell short in the finish despite what was her best ever display of racquetball. Ireland secured full points from the next 2 matches which resulted in the overall victory.

Spain was their next opponents and following some top class performances from all 4 Irish players, they recorded an overall 3-0 victory and as a result, they earned a place in the final against Germany. In what was the most exciting encounter of the entire Championships, the performances of the Irish quartet fully deserved the right to be crowned European Champions. In what was deemed an inexperienced and youthful team, they showed great character and skill levels to land the overall team title.

This was Eithne's first ever European medal but before the end of a hugely successful event, she bagged a hat-trick of wins in a very impressive style. In the 18+under grade, she followed in Niamh Coffey's footsteps in claiming the singles title. In her semi-final match, she overcame the challenge of Germany's Lara Ludwig in straight games while her final opponent was her compatriot Toni Neary from Arklow. The first game was close but some determined play from Eithne saw her carve out a 15-10 victory. The second game saw Eithne hit a service streak that earned great reward in the form of a 15-1 victory and the clinching of the overall title. She wasn't to stop there however and after combining with Majella Haverly from Castlebar, she defeated the German combination of Lara Ludwig and Sina Krieger in the final of the 18+under doubles grade.

Triston also returned home with another European Gold medal when he teamed up with Arklow's Adam Neary to take the Mens Open doubles title. A previous silver medalist in this grade, this time he wasn't to be denied the ultimate honour. In the quarter finals, the Irish duo defeated the Italian Brezzolari brothers in straight games. The semi-final was an all Irish affair with Noel O'Callaghan and Jimmy Gannon been their opponents. A hugely determined performance here resulted in the Touraneena/Arklow combination qualifying for the final against the Dutch pairing of Michael

Vander Holst and Pascal Matla. After a super game of racquetball, Triston and Adam recorded the tie-breaker victory which resulted in them being crowned European Champions.

Triston also won a bronze medal in the Open Singles grade. In the opening match, he defeated Orhan Surek of Turkey. Next up was Oriol Salvia from Spain and victory here saw him up against Oliver Bertels of Germany in the quarter finals.

With Triston well in command, his opponent had to retire injured. His compatriot Noel O'Callaghan was his semi-final opponent and in a match that Triston never got of first gear, he had to play second best on the day which resulted in a bronze medal for the Touraneena athlete.

Julie Skehan also brought home a bronze medal in both the open Singles and Doubles grades. One of the stars of the Championships, she played with

a level of maturity and determination that was a joy to watch. In the singles opener, Julie defeated Natalie Raphanel-Anglet from France. A 2-0 victory set up a tough quarter final encounter with one of the tournament favourites, Yvonne Kortess from Germany. It would be fair to say that Julie produced her best ever performance here. In the opening game, she produced a faultless display to record a 15-3 victory. In the second game, Julie found herself chasing the game but to her credit she continued chasing and refused to concede victory and as a result she brilliantly clawed out a 15-14 victory.

A super result for the ever improving Touraneena player. Her semi-final opponent was Arklow's Susan Farrell. The effects of some hard games in the heat seemed to take its toll here but again to her credit, Julie fought hard right to the bitter end. On the day however, she just couldn't produce the game that she had produced all week and had to concede victory to her compatriot. A huge improvement at this level by Julie must be acknowledged however and hopefully it will be a sign for the future in International Championships.

Julie also teamed up with her sister Eithne to win bronze medals in the Open Doubles grade. In the quarter final, they defeated Ayten Kececi and Consuelo Del Prato from Turkey in straight games. 15-14, 15-10 scoreline in the semi-final against Susan Farrell and Toni Neary tells you how close they came to winning a place in the final encounter.

All involved with the club would like to congratulate all 3 players on their outstanding performances at the Europeans. The returning medal haul by all 3 players was an outstanding achievement. Role on the Worlds in Kingscourt now in August 2008!

A very successful Men's Health Day followed in the Park Hotel in October 2006 and covered all aspects of men's health. We hope to do a follow on from this in the future.

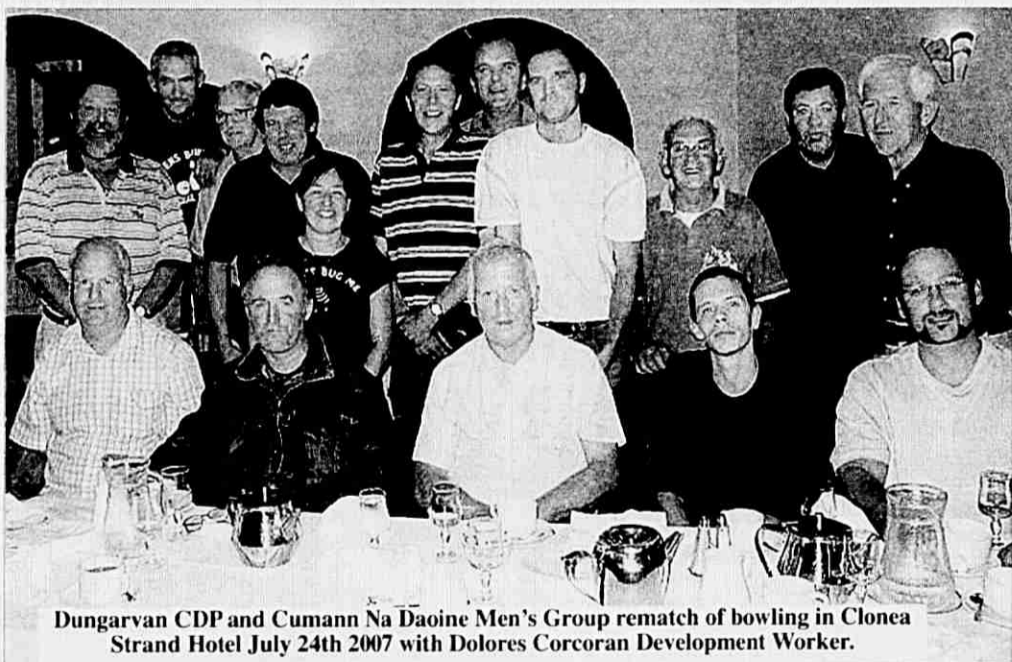

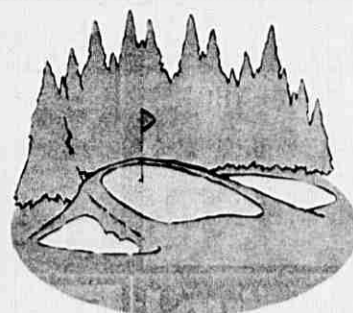

Mount Sion, at full strength were strong favourites to win here but it was only in the final quarter that the county champions took control.

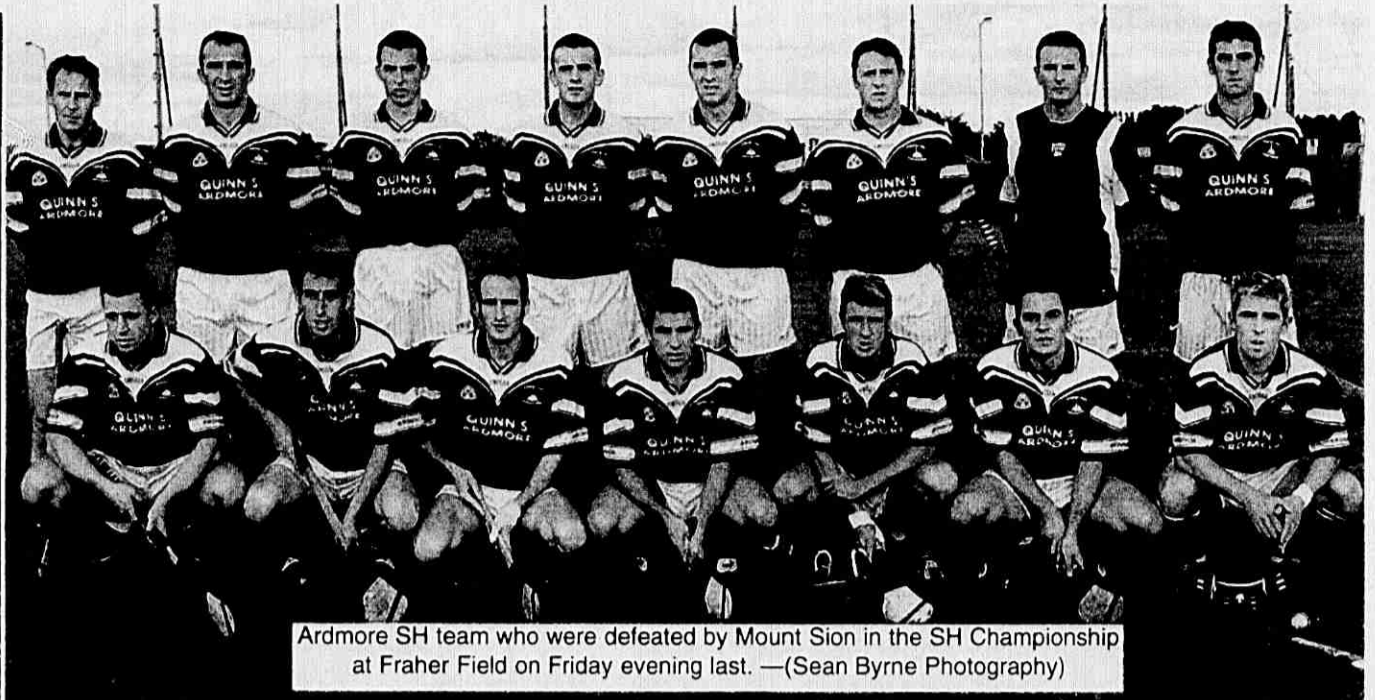
The situation in this group is that Mount Sion will now play De La Salle and Ardmore will meet Ballyduff Lower. These games are fixed for next weekend.

It was interesting as well to hear Brian Coady express the opinion that Limerick under-performed and did not play as well as they did against Waterford.

TOMMY MURPHY CUP

By all accounts its days are numbered and after the Special Congress on September 29th this year, the competition which was inaugurated three years ago, will be just a memory.

The competition was confined to the 8 bottom county football teams and was of such a low key status that it always ran at a loss. Waterford reached the semi-final this year and were defeated by Wicklow who eventually won it after defeating Antrim in the final.

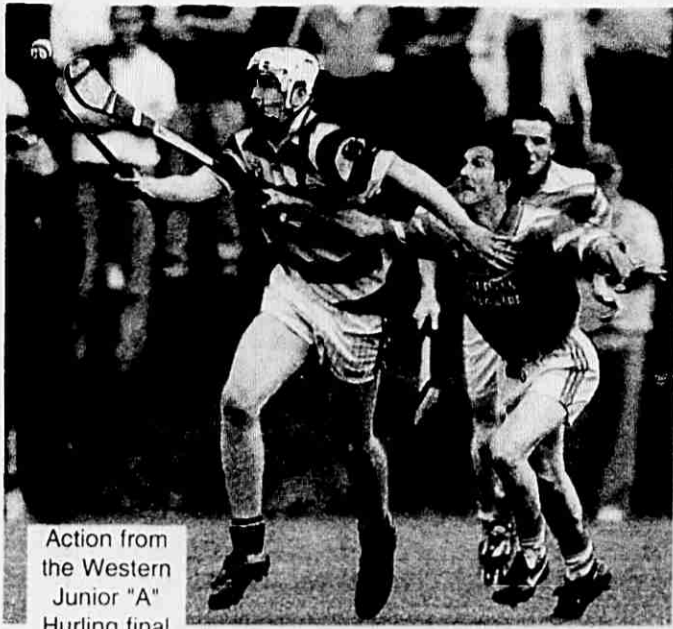

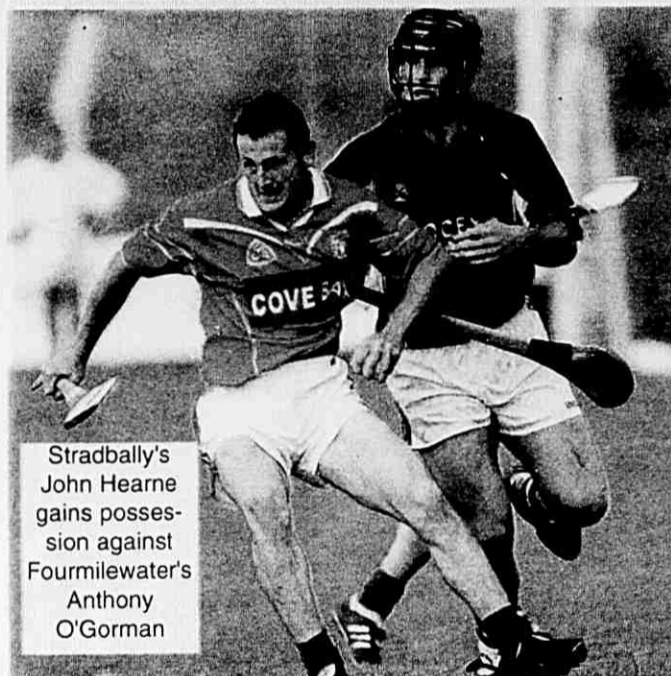


Fourmilewater Score Deserved Win Over Stradbally

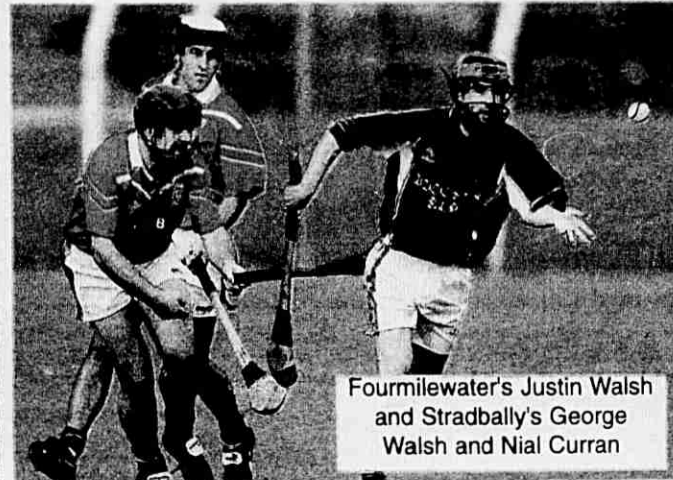

Scoring 3 goals in a 13 minute spell and going into an 8 points lead when facing a stiff breeze in the first half, Ballyduff looked to have this result all sewn up long before the halfway stage was reached in this thrilling game at Cappoquin.

A splendid opportunist goal by Stephen Molumphy in the 6th minute followed 60 seconds later with an unstoppable shot from Pa Kearney who also shot home their third goal in 19th minute gave the far west team what seemed to be an unassailable lead. After what can only be described as a mammoth come back to international competition after his car accident ahead of the 2004 Olympics in Athens which almost ended his race walking career, West Waterford's Jamie Costin and indeed Ireland's participation came to an unwelcome end at the World Track and Field Championships in Osaka last Saturday morning. The 50k walk was held in conditions akin to a sauna with temperatures in the mid 30's and humidity at 80% despite condition training prior to Osaka both Jamie and Ireland's other participant Colin Griffin of Limerick found the conditions very difficult to handle. Colin Griffin was unfortunate to be disqualified after 17k when after receiving two warnings he was red carded, West Waterford athlete Jamie Costin pulled out through cramp with seven kilometres to go. Jamie was coming through the field nicely after starting conservatively because of the conditions and was in the mid 20's when cramp started to effect him. He came to the stage that he was having to stop every couple of hundred yards and to keep going would have done more damage than good so he took the wise decision and called it a day. Jamie will now take a short break to recuperate he has hopeful if selected a year to prepare for competition in Beijing at the Olympic Games next year. There will be plenty of International race walking competitions over the next couple of months and we hope to see Jamie put this experience behind him and look to the year ahead.
