Outcry Over Illegal Trader/Traveller Encampment

A convoy of around 30 caravans of trader/travellers, who set-up an illegal encampment at the Lookout in Dungarvan, stayed a further two days in the area, after encamping at the Sweep just outside the town, having been moved on from the town council boundary area early on Wednesday morning.

CONVOY

Gardai from Dungarvan and council officials ordered the convoy, which arrived at the Lookout at around 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening last, to move on following a public outcry and with concerns mounting among residents in the area.

The trader/travellers, believed to be originally from Rathkeale in Limerick, had set up camp in Dungarvan after being moved from Bonmahon after a high profile stand-off with the council throughout the preceding week.

MONITORED

They promised council officials that they would be travelling

back to Limerick after they were forced on by the Gardai at around 10am on Wednesday morning.

However, despite having their movements monitored by the Gardai, they set-up another encampment at a layby in the Sweep where they stayed for a further 2 days.

The area was littered with rubbish when they moved on, resulting in a large clean-up operation, which is likely to cost several thousand euro.

UNITED APPROACH

In the wake of last weeks episode, Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield has called for a more united approach from Dungarvan Town Council and Waterford County Council

towards dealing with illegal Traveller/Trader encampments.

"While the convoy of Travellers/Traders that managed to set up camp at the Lookout on Tuesday night last was successfully moved on early on Wednesday morning, they simply set up camp at two lay bys located on the Sweep in Pulla."

In order to gain access to the

layby, the convoy caused criminal damage by forcibly removing a barrier, he said.

APPALLING STATE

"The site was left in an appalling state on Friday morning after the Traveller/Traders were moved on by a joint Garda, Customs Operation.

Twenty-Two Year Old Released From Custody

GARDAI REMAIN TIGHT-LIPPED ABOUT ON-GOING INVESTIGATION

A twenty-two year old man, questioned in Dungarvan over the weekend in connection with the discovery of the body of Gary Bull, an English New Age Traveller, in a slurry pit on a farm in Dunmanway in West Cork, has been released from custody.

The man appeared before a special sitting of Dungarvan District Court on Monday, charged with a separate offence.

It followed a major forensic operation undertaken by mem-

bers of Dungarvan Gardai, led by Superintendent, Tom O'Grady on Friday last.

A kiosk in Grattan Square, near Whites Corner newsagents, was cordoned off around lunchtime on Friday after a tip off allegedly in connection with the discovery of Mr. Bull's body.

A sample of forensic evidence from the kiosk and the area around it were sent to the Garda Forensic Laboratory in Dublin for further investigation.

The man, who is believed to be of no fixed abode, was subse-

quently taken in for questioning in Dungarvan Garda station.

He was released without charge, although he was later arrested, and held in Dungarvan, in connection with a separate matter.

Gardai in Dungarvan were remaining tight lipped about what they described as an ongoing investigation.

"The matter is currently under investigation. No one is currently in custody in Dungarvan in relation to the matter", a spokesperson (continued on page 8)

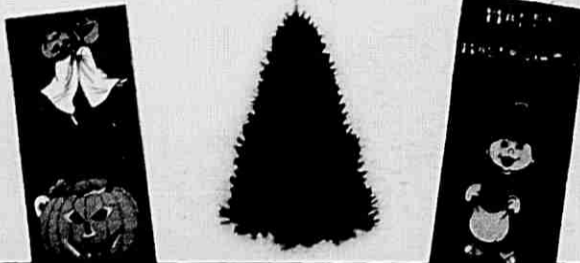

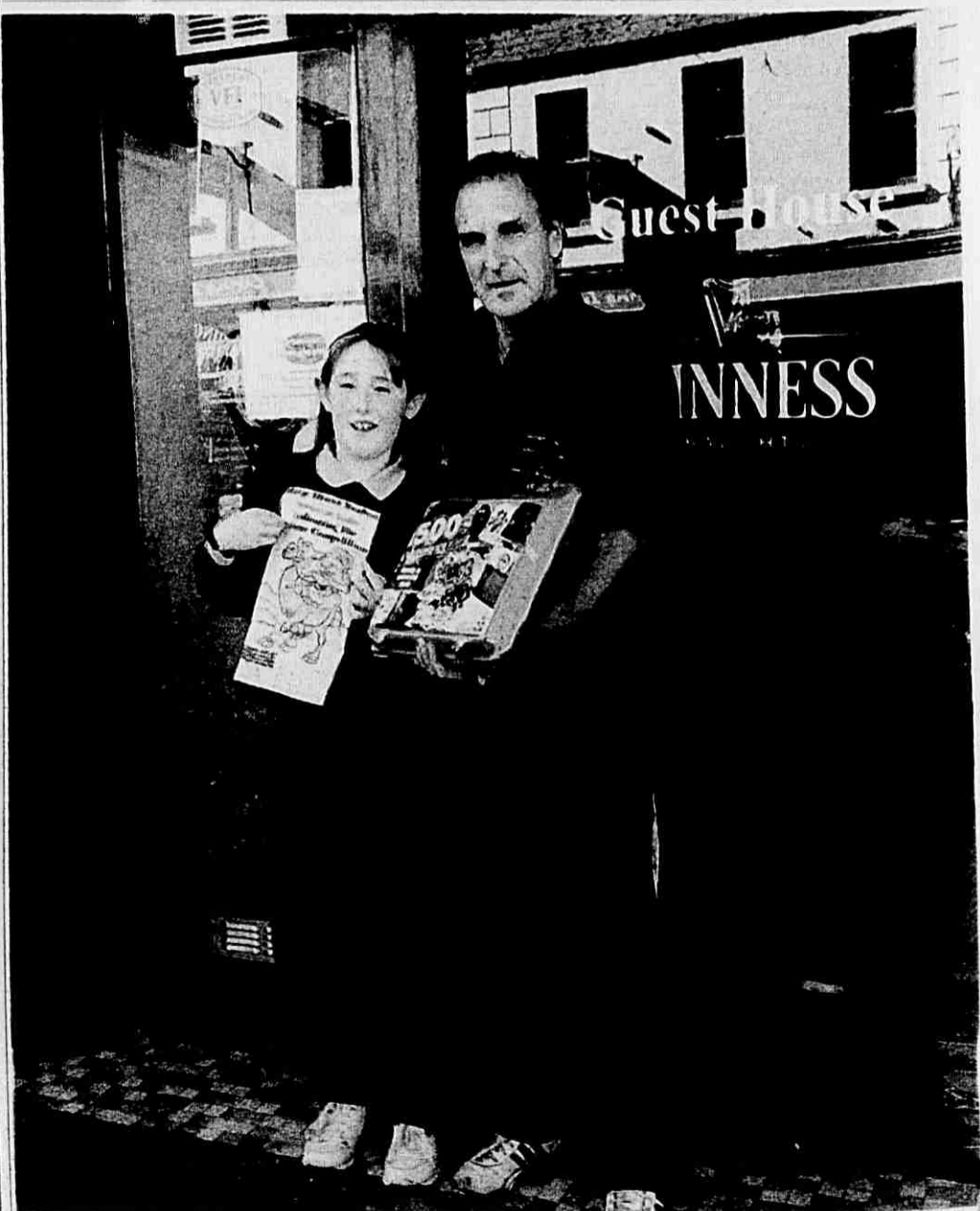

VIEWPOINT

TRAVELLER OUTCRY MAKES MOCKERY OF CLLRS. STANCE

The outcry over an incursion of about 30 trader/travellers, first at the Lookout in Dungarvan and later at a layby at the Sweep, just outside the town, makes a mockery of the stance of some councillors over the provision of a transient halting site in the county.

A transient site may be unpalatable in the short term, and is sure to cause a conflagration of emotions for those living in its immediate vicinity, but in the long term, it is the only solution to a so far intractable problem.

It's simply unfeasible to expect the Gardai, and the customs officials to devote manpower to issues like car tax, double parking and the like, and for the council to be left with a bill of thousands of euro in clean up costs, every time a transient convoy rolls into town.

Viewpoint isn't defending these sorts of trader/travellers - not by a long shot.

In fact, the type of behaviour witnessed over the past week, defames the good name of the majority of quiet, decent traveller families who live, and are educated, in our communities.

But the almost yearly incursion by large convoys of trader/travellers into some part or other of the county begs the serious question: what can be done to solve this problem?

Under current legislation the answer is, not a whole lot. Not without a permanent transient halting site in the county that is.

Yes, the Gardai can threaten them with litter and tax laws, and hope somehow the fear of this happening - and Viewpoint is willing to wager very few, if any, of the trader/travellers we saw in Dungarvan will face the courts for these infringements - will drive them to leave the area.

But the council doesn't have the power to move them on.

In other words, if the fear tactic didn't work - and there's not a jot of evidence that it did - the council wouldn't have had the power to tow the caravans away from the Sweep.

But, our elected members, instead of taking the courageous, and in the short term at least, unpopular decision to build a transient site in the county (the county council's own Corporate Plan by the way calls for three to be built, but one would be a start) content themselves with making public sound bites demanding action from council, while knowing full well that the council can do nothing but clean up the mess afterwards.

Surely, paying these public representatives what we do, and it isn't a small sum, the public deserve some courage of conviction, someone willing to put the public's long term good ahead of short term electoral gain.

Only with a well managed, well maintained and monitored transient halting site with proper facilities for the disposal of waste, will the council have the power to move on travellers, and crucially remove the excuse that no facilities are provided for their convoys.

It maybe an unpopular truth, but apparently unlike our elected politicians, at least Viewpoint is willing to speak it.

FIXED CONTRACT FOR WALTON'S PARK WORK WELCOME

Over the past few months, Viewpoint has heard fears from many quarters about the cost implications of the almost continuous delays, which have dogged work on Walton's Park for the past year.

However, the announcement at Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council that the contractor is tied to a fixed contract for €465,000 for completion of the ambitious project is welcome news indeed.

The park, by all accounts, looks set to be impressive and worth the wait, despite some fairly minor teething problems at the moment.

These include flooding on the new paving stones, which were put down only recently. Gullies have not yet been put in place, which has led to the flooding whenever it has rained.

According to Town Engineer, Tom Rodgers, however, these problems will be remedied before the handover of the park through a snag list process.

All in all, despite the delays and the undoubted problems which have constantly set back the opening date, Dungarvan Town Council is to be congratulated not only on their decision to make the park a more attractive amenity for all of the citizens of the town as well as rooting out the lingering problem of anti-social behaviour and public drinking, but on their foresight in tying the contractors to a fixed contract.

Hopefully, they will now ensure the same mechanism is attached to all future public projects.

Council To Focus On Care Of Old Burial Grounds

Waterford County Council is to focus attention on more than 100 old burial grounds in need of care as part of this year's heritage programme, a meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Director of Services, Brian White said a seminar and a guidance document on burial ground management would encourage local community groups to care for old burial grounds in a sustainable manner.

Fine Gael councillor, Declan Doocey said that it was important that the council gave guidance on old burial grounds. Many people came on holidays to visit family graves and unfortunately they were overgrown and they were unable to the family plot.

His colleague, Cllr. Tom Higgins said family graves were very important as genealogical sources and people came from abroad to visit them. It was essential that the burial ground project got funding, he added.

Lidl Appeal Planning Refusal To Bord Pleanala

Dungarvan Town Council's refusal to grant permission for a footpath built by low cost supermarket, Lidl in contravention to planning permission, and which links its store to the N25 ring road has been appealed by the giant German chain to An Bord Pleanala.

Explaining the decision to refuse permission, Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said the footpath would be "totally unsafe".

The footpath was built but was prevented from being part of the stores plans when they opened earlier this year as it was in contravention of the permission granted to them.

Mr. McCarthy said he would be recommending to Bord Pleanala that the footpath not be granted permission.

Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair expressed his surprise that Lidl had ignored the conditions of their planning permission.

passed back along the N25 heading towards Dungarvan, in a total show of bravado they sounded their horns and were openly laughing. "I find this repulsive as the clean up of their mess will cost at least a couple of thousand euro. Walton's Park Regeneration To Cost €465,000

The upgrade of Walton's Park in Abbeyside, which has been dogged by delays and problems since the very start, is set to cost Dungarvan Town Council €465,000, it's emerged.

The works, which are hoped to bring an end to anti-social behaviour and public drinking in the area late at night, were described as being impressive at the October meeting of the local authority.

More lighting, paving and green open spaces are all main aspects of the new park, which is now expected to be officially opened early next year.

However, concerns were expressed at the length of time the long awaited regeneration of the town's largest public park has taken.

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne called for a public assurance that the overrun works would not result in the final price for the works escalating over the original tender price.

He went on to say there were a number of issues of concern with the park, particularly the length of time it had taken to bring it on line.

"With the length of time for the works to be completed overrunning, I want a public reassurance that the price we pay the contractor for this job will be in line with the tender price agreed at the start of the process," he said.

He also said new problems with the park had just emerged. He said since the newly laid paving

stones were put down recently they had started "ponding" after a downpour.

"It raises a lot of questions about the work," he added. "I don't want to see the new park turning into a bog a few months after we open it."

Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty assured the members that a fixed contract was agreed for the work, and he confirmed that there would be no overrun.

Town Engineer, Tom Rodgers said the footpaths were flooding because no gullies had been put in place yet. They had pointed this out to the contractor, and it's likely to form part of the snag process, and will have to be remedied before the handover to the council takes place.

son for Dungarvan Garda Station said.

"We are making no further comment at this time as anything that appears in the media may compromise the investigation in Dunmanway."

The body of Mr. Bull, a 37-year-old British man, who was part of an East Cork New Age Traveller community, was discovered in a slurry pit at a farm in Dunmanway on Thursday last.

He had been living in a mobile home at Kilmichael near Macroom for the past number of years.

Gardai in Bandon and Clonakilty Garda Stations have questioned five persons, aged between nineteen and forty-two years old, in connection with Mr. Bull's death. Files have been prepared for the Director of Public Prosecution.

Replace Leaking Water Pipes

- SAYS CLLR. DOOCEY

A 3km water pipe in Ballinamult, which was fixed a week ago, has since had to be repaired a further three times because of leaks, Fine Gael councillor, Declan Doocey told the October meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Doocey said the constant repairing of pipes in the old scheme is a waste of money, and called for pipes in areas in Ballinamult, Tallowbridge and Lismore to be replaced completely.

He said the matter needs to be treated as a matter of urgency, as the people in these areas are suffering from low water pressure in their homes, and sometimes can't even take a bath or a shower in the morning because the pressure is so low.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn replied that a water conservation scheme was launched recently with the main priority of identifying and replacing outdated mains and pipes.

The mains replacement report is currently being finalised, and the areas Cllr. Doocey identified will be put in the report for replacement.

Council Urged To Be Wary Of Illegal Dumping

Loud Music And Vandalism Main Cause Of Disputes

Loud music, vandalism and illegal dumping and abandoned vehicles were the main causes of disputes between neighbours on Waterford County Council housing estates, a meeting of the local authority heard.
Tenant liaison officer, Ann Sullivan said she used all available non-legal remedies to resolve disputes. Legal proceedings only were taken when these remedies failed.
There was zero tolerance by the county council towards anti-social behaviour and they were now setting up an anti-social behaviour steering group. New tenants being offered houses by

the local authority must complete a pre-tenancy course before getting the key to the door.
Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan said as Mayor of Dungarvan he had seen great improvements in tenant relations in certain areas. At first, some tenants had been cynical until they saw the positive work being done by the council.
Mayor of County Waterford, Billy Kyne said it reminded the council of the positive work being done behind the scenes and was to be welcomed, while his party colleague, Cllr. Ger Barron said it was great to see a proactive approach being taken.

The selection panel picked "Fishing Boat Steel - Gallan na mBan" by Niall O'Neill as the most appropriate.
It takes the form of the prow of a fishing boat in cast in bronze and is 16ft at its highest point. The sculpture will also act as a sundial and will cast a shadow in the same way as some prehistoric stones.

"I have spoken to them both on the phone and they are both looking forward to the re-match in Dungarvan," he said.

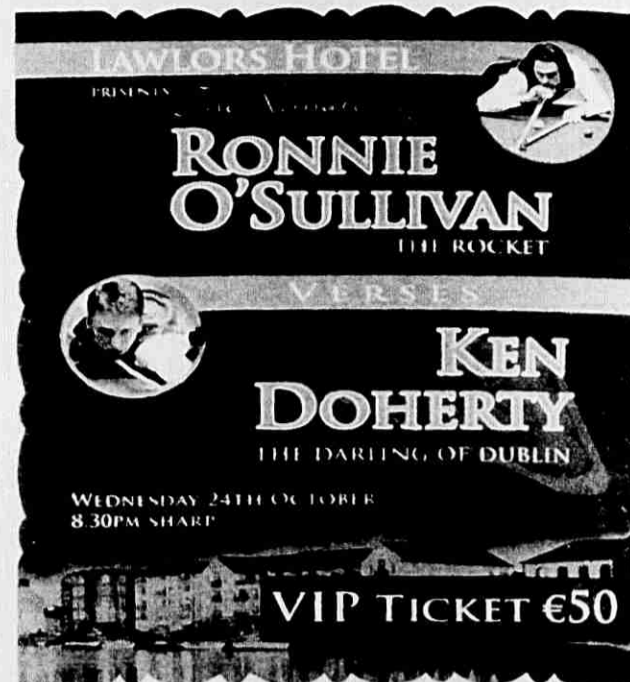
Local players who are billed to also play on the night include Michael Bumster, John Henry Grithiths, Dylan Rees and another player yet to be chosen.

IDA Chief To Be Invited To Dungarvan Over Site Visit Failures

500 Acres Of Land To Be Zoned Industrial

IDA South Regional Chief, Brian Conroy is to be invited to a meeting of Dungarvan Town Council to face questions over the failure to include the town for any site visits this year.

It follows a notice of motion by Fine Gael councillor, Michael Cosgrove who criticised the failure to bring any possible investors to the town this year, despite the devastating closure of Dungarvan Crystal and the resultant 450 job losses.

"It is only by the inclusion of site visits that the full potential of Dungarvan as an attractive location for investment will be realised", Cllr. Cosgrove said.

He said previous and current County Managers had put in train many good initiatives but the fruit of their ideas won't be realised with tangible investment unless potential investors are brought to the County Town.

REZONING

Meanwhile, Town Manager, Denis McCarthy revealed that the

council is attempting to solve the shortage of land zoned for industrial purposes by rezoning 400 to 500 acres of land adjacent to the SmithKline plant and the IDA industrial site on the Youghal road.

"We will be making a significant statement to companies interested in locating to Dungarvan," Mr. McCarthy said of the rezoning.

However, Labour councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who also is a member of Udaras na Gaeltachta, said that in his Udaras role, he was made aware that Government policy now gives the competitive advantage to regions in the Border, West regions.

INVESTMENT

He said the policy discriminates against the South East for investment.

Under the policy, a large company in the Border, West regions receive three times the capital grants than those in the South East, a mid-sized company twice as much, and a small company 60% as much.

"I am very disappointed that the Government has an objective whereby companies in Donegal and Sligo get three times as much in capital grants as here," he said, acknowledging their were some exceptions.

CRYING OUT FOR INVESTMENT

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield argued that the Dungarvan area is "crying out" for investment and that they needed to put "the squeeze" on the IDA. He called on the Government to designate WIT as a University, which would help

the town advance towards R&D investment.

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne, meanwhile, urged caution over the figures surrounding the numbers of former employees of Waterford Crystal who'd found employment elsewhere. He said hundreds of ex-glass workers had gone on employment panels recently looking for secure high-end jobs, belying the figure given during a county council presentation, which said only 22 had migrated to long term unemployment.

Clonea Realignment To Be Finished By The End Of This Year

The Clonea Realignment is Waterford Co. Council's number one priority and should be finished by the end of this year. Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn told Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan at the October meeting of the local authority.

He also said the upgrading of toilet facilities on the beach will be looked at in the estimates programme, and they will probably be done on a phased basis of around one new or upgraded toilet a year.

Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield publicly welcomed the work on what he said during the summer months is probably the busiest road in the county.

€923,628 To Be Spent on Footpaths And Surfacing In Programme

A total of €923,628 is planned to be spent by Dungarvan Town Council on road surfacing and repairing some of the worst footpaths in the urban area over the next three years.

Over half a million euro is expected to be spent on surfacing seventeen areas of the town with a total of 3,533 metres in all of the town's roads included, while footpaths in sixteen parts of the town will be relaid at a cost of almost €372,480, the 2008-2010 programme revealed.

However, Independent councillor, Michael O'Riordan was disappointed that the surfacing didn't include what he claimed was the "worst road in the county" at Monang.

Town Engineer, Tom Rodgers said it would cost over a hundred thousand euro to surface this stretch alone and it was decided to deal with it in isolation.

"If there is an overwhelming desire among the members to include it, other areas will have to be left to suffer," he said.

The programme is open to comment from the elected members, and will be adopted at a future meeting of the council.

The Lonergan family, who run Knockanore Farmhouse Cheese, are inviting the public to visit their award winning cheese-making facility, and sample the best of West Waterford artisan food as part of a Slow Food Ireland event.

Run by Eamonn, his wife, Patricia and their five children, Aisling, Orla, Lisa, Edward and Joanne, Knockanore Cheese recently won the prestigious International Cheese Award 2007 in Dublin, ahead of stiff competition from Austria, Germany, Britain and from all over Ireland.

Knockanore Farmhouse Cheese has been in operation for the last twenty years, winning numerous awards over that time, including the Ballygowan Food Writers Award and a Gold Medal at the British Cheese Awards

recognising the outstanding quality of their cheese.

Eamonn, who co-chairs the Irish Cheese Makers Association, explained how the cheese is produced and the growing popularity of Farmhouse cheese in Ireland.

"Farmhouse cheese by its nature is an artisan product. It's made from unpasturised milk from our own cows milk here on the farm. We have an excellent farm manager, Michael Geary, which is vital because the quality of the milk is the most important ingredient in our cheese."

He went on to say: "Farmhouse Cheese is becoming very popular at the moment, with more and more farmers markets setting up all around the country. As well as that, people are becoming more interested in what they're eating."

"The other side of it is that people are going more and more

on holidays now, and they are becoming more exposed to exotic food and different tastes and flavours.

"It's probably being put in front of them more as well. The whole restaurant trade and the whole standard of food being prepared and produced by restaurants and hotels has improved greatly, such as the food being prepared at Richmond House, the Tannery, Buggy's in Glencairn, Lismore Hotel, Foley's in Lismore, the Bridge in Tallow, Ahern's in Youghal, and in Powersfield House in Dungarvan.

"They are into speciality meals, and they're doing a fantastic job in making delicious dishes from the best of locally hand made and organic produce," Eamonn added.

Knockanore Farmhouse Cheese supply a number of deliscent, restaurants, supermarkets and hotels, as well as providing food hampers and are currently in talks with a number of multiples about a wider distribution. They also export cheese to England and Denmark.

At 4pm, guests will be able to experience milking time at the Lonergan farm.

Among the artisan produce on display at the event will be Baldwin's Farmhouse Ice Cream, Mary McGrath's Jam from Mt. Mellerary, O'Flynn's of Cork who will be doing speciality sausages and pork products and Julie Keane's Creanachuan Apple Juice from Cappoquin.

Slow Food Ireland was founded in 1989 to counteract fast food and fast life, and the disappearance of local food traditions while focusing on artisan produce. Slow Food Ireland is headed by Darina Allen, the renowned chef with Ballymalloo House while Donal Lehane, who is formerly of Glanbia, is the head of the Waterford convivium and was instrumental in organising the Slow Food event in Knockanore.

Having completed her Secondary education she felt called to the Religious life and was directed to Mercy Convent, Dungarvan, where she lived and worked for 70 years. She joined the Mercy congregation on 7th October, 1937.

Sr. Rosario became Principal of the Mercy Convent Secondary School (now the Ard Scoil na nDeise) in 1946 and continued that role until her retirement in 1981. Thirty five years as Priomh Oide must be some kind of a record in the history of Second Level Education in this country. She saw children and grandchildren of girls educated in 'the Mercy' and always recognised them even in the third generation. Dungarvan town owes her much, but she wouldn't ever think that way. Her life was a service to the pupils and their families. Her main life-time work was the education of girls in Dungarvan and even up to very recently she could be seen in class rooms and corridors of Ard Scoil. The pupils and teachers did her proud on October 2nd. Hundreds of past pupils from far and wide paid their respects and many attended her funeral Mass.

As Leader she responded to the request from the Augustinians in 1969, to establish a Mercy presence in their mission in Yola, Nigeria, where they set up clinics, adult education centres for women and schools. On her retirement she joined the Mission for a short time in what was then the Augustinian Diocese of Yola. Sr. Rosario devoted her retirement years to encouraging prayer, especially among the young, to promoting devotion to Our Lady and the Miraculous Medal. In her role as Promoter of the 'Irish Messenger' she maintained a personal relationship with a long list of recipients.

On Tuesday afternoon on October 2nd Sr. Rosario was laid to rest. Her funeral Mass was a simple and dignified ceremony. The choir from the Ard Scoil sang beautifully, and their musicians added to the occasion. It was, in fact a ceremony worthy of the person whose whole life

had been marked by a quiet dignity. She always treated others with the respect due to their being created in God's image. She died in her own month - the month of the Holy Rosary, and was laid to rest on the Feast of the Guardian Angels. Let us pray with the Old Irish.

Nature's Best Defence

The days are growing short and the leaves are falling from the trees. October is here again, and the flu season is on the way. Fortunately there is one remedy which can both help to reduce the risk of infections and to speed recovery. The elder tree has been used in Irish folk medicine for generations and it is still nature's best defence against the flu and other winter viruses.

Elderberries, which are rich in vitamins A and C and bioflavonoids, are a wonderful tonic for the immune system and they have a specific antiviral action which helps to prevent colds, flu and other viral illnesses.

Elderberries were traditionally used to make a delicious wine that was taken during the winter months to ward off colds and other winter bugs. For people not skilled in the art of wine-making, elderberry syrup is an excellent alternative that is very easy to make. Simply boil fresh elderberries in water with a stick of cinnamon for about 5 minutes, then squash the berries to extract the juice and strain to remove the skins. Add honey or brown sugar to the strained juice and heat until it thickens. Take one or two dessertspoons of the syrup in a cup of hot water three times a day during the winter months as a tonic to help prevent viral infections.

Elderberry juice and tablets are also available from some pharmacies and health food stores. They are very safe and well tolerated, and are ideal for both adults and children to help prevent winter viruses. However for those concerned about poor immunity it is best to consult a qualified medical herbalist.

For those unlucky enough to succumb to winter colds and flu, the flowers of the elder tree are particularly useful. They have antiviral and immune stimulating properties and they can help to break a fever by promoting perspiration. In addition, elderflowers help to reduce the production of mucus, providing relief from runny noses, sinus congestion and chesty coughs.

Elderflowers can be used to make an effective yet gentle remedy for winter colds and flu which is safe for young children. Put one or two slices of fresh lemon into a suitable container with some grated ginger and one or two teaspoons of dried elderflowers. Add boiling water, cover, and leave to brew for 5 minutes, then strain and add a teaspoon of honey before drinking. If you are unable to obtain dried elderflowers, a little elderflower cordial is a suitable alternative.

This infusion has antiviral, anti-inflammatory, immune-stimulating, pain relieving and soothing properties and should be drunk up to six times daily until symptoms subside. If symptoms are severe or do not subside within a few days, contact your local herbalist for an individually tailored blend of herbs to improve immune function, help fight the infection and provide symptomatic relief.

Pensions And Retirement Planning

AN INTRODUCTION BY EMERALD FINANCIAL

Generally people are living longer and leading more active lives in retirement. As a result it is more important than ever for you to think about where your income will come from when you retire. Tax Benefits

The Government grants you tax relief on your pension contributions up to specified limits. For example, if the highest rate at which you pay income tax is 20%, you will receive back in the form of tax relief, 20 cents out of every €1 of your investment respectively, and if the highest rate of tax you pay is 42%, you will receive back 42 cents of every €1 invested into your pension fund. (20% and 42% are the current rates of income tax and these may change in the future).

The contributions invested in a pension fund are free from tax on its investment returns. All other investment funds are taxed at 23% currently. This is a very significant benefit, which insures that the pensions fund will grow much quicker than a fund that has to pay tax.

Investing into a pension scheme, represents to best long term investment overall, when account is taken for all tax relief's and tax charges associated with all investments, e.g. direct equities, property, pooled investments etc.

When you retire, you are entitled to take part of your retirement fund tax free. The maximum amount you can take tax free is either 25% of your retirement fund or the equivalent to one and a half times your final remuneration (only relevant to occupational pension schemes). The remainder of the fund can be invested to generate an income (Pension) thereafter.

Start your pension as early as possible, the longer you leave it, the more you need to pay to reach the required amount in your pension fund for retirement. A man retiring at 65 now can expect to live to 81 and a woman retiring at 65 can expect to live to 84.

Did You Know?

By law your employer must provide you with some form of access to a pension, whether you are in full-time, part-time, temporary, contract or casual employment.


You are legally entitled to information about your employer's pension scheme or your PRSA, thanks to the Pensions Act.

You can save for retirement even if you are not working through a PRSA.

Ard Scoil na nDeise News

Sr Rosario McNamara

Last week the passing of Sr Rosario McNamara was mourned by the students and staff of Ard Scoil na nDeise. Sr Rosario had an association with the school stretching back more than 60 years.

Eileen McNamara was born in Ogonelloe, Co. Clare on 28th December 1918 the second youngest of a family of 11, 7 girls and 4 boys. She attended Ogonelloe National School and then went on to the Mercy Convent Boarding School in Tuam for her secondary education. After her Leaving Cert in 1937 she was considering the religious life and a Redemptorist Priest suggested the Mercy Convent in Dungarvan. He said "They're a grand crowd down there and I know the Reverend Mother". She entered the Mercy Convent in Dungarvan on 7th October 1937, the feast of the Holy Rosary. She made her first profession on 29th June 1940.

She attended UCC where she obtained her BA in English, Latin and History and a year later her Higher Diploma in Education. In 1946 she was appointed Principal of the Mercy Convent Secondary School, Coláiste Muire. The Mercy Sisters had opened the school in 1926 to provide secondary education for girls. In the age before school transport the Sisters provided boarding school facilities also. Up to the introduction of free secondary education in 1967 there were only a few lay teachers in the school.

Sr Rosario was principal of the school for 35 years in all. As well as School Principal, she was also head of the Boarding School and served a 6 year term as Superior of the convent. She retired as Principal in 1981 and was replaced as Principal of Coláiste Muire by Sr Goretti Kelleher, herself a past pupil of the school.

In 1981 she went to Maynooth for a year's study. The following year she taught English in Nigeria where the Dungarvan Sisters had a mission and provided education and nursing care.

In 1983 she returned to Dungarvan and taught Religious Education part time in Coláiste Muire. The Boarding School closed in the mid 1980s.

In 1990 St Joseph's Secondary School, run by the Presentation Sisters, and Coláiste Muire, run by the Mercy Order, amalgamated on the Mercy site and formed Ard Scoil na nDeise. Up to 2005 Sr Rosario was a familiar figure in the Ard Scoil where she was held in the highest esteem by pupils, teachers and parents alike.

Though in failing health for the past few months, Sr Rosario still took a great interest in the school, the pupils and the staff. She was taken to the Bon Secours Hospital in Cork three weeks before her death and while there she asked to see the 2007 Junior Cert results.

She died on Saturday 29th September. Her beloved school played a proud part in her funeral on Tuesday 2nd October. Students and teachers formed a guard of honour as the funeral cortege passed the school, at the entrance to St Mary's Church and in the cemetery. The Ard Scoil choir sang beautifully at the funeral Mass.

Sr Rosario is survived by her youngest brother, Michael, who lives in New York.

Joe hit his ball towards the trees on the 12th; he played a provisional ball, but that also went towards the trees. May he play a second provisional ball? Yes. Finally, Tessie pulled her shot on the 13th; she couldn't find it. Can she play her next shot from beside the lake? There must be evidence that her ball went into the lake; otherwise she must treat the ball as a lost ball, and go back to the tee.

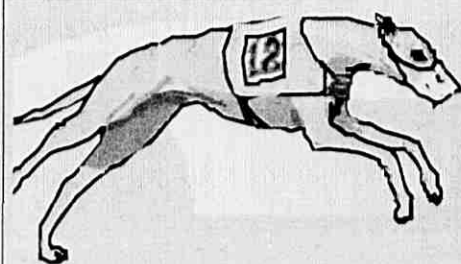

The first meeting of the newly elected committee will take place in Minnie's at 8:00pm on Monday November 5th. Full attendance is required to plan for 2008.

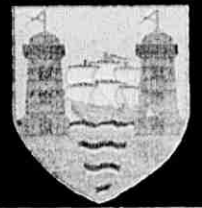

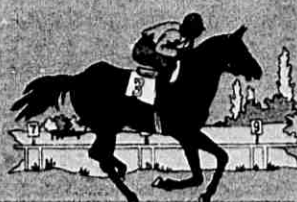

At a Goodwood fixture a bookmaker betting in the ring was stood down by National Joint Pitch Council betting ring manager Vicki Steadman after he was seen taking bets from two boys. The pair one a son of a prominent trainer and the other the son of a well-known owner were not even in their teens. Steadman stated "this came to our attention through observation. I have to say that this is most unusual".

CHEVELEY PARK PROFILE

Horses have been bred at Cheveley Park Stud, on the outskirts of Newmarket, for more than 1,000 years and the stud has been owned since 1975 by David and Patricia Thompson. It is the most successful British-owned breeding operation in the country. Stretching to 960 acres, its umbrella also encompasses Sandwich, Warren Hill and Ashley Heath studs.

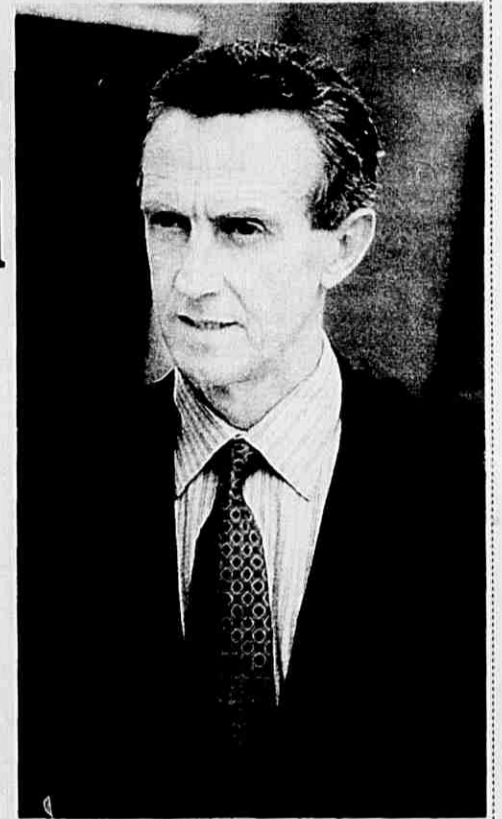
Managed since 1987 by Chris Richardson, Cheveley Park Stud races most of the horses it produces although it sold the 1997 2000 Guineas winner Entrepreneur and this season's St James's Palace Stakes hero Excellent Art as yearlings. Russian Rhythm, a sales purchase, brought Classic glory when winning the 2003 1000 Guineas, going on to land both the Coronation Stakes and Nassau Stakes.

The stud operation houses around 120 broodmares and stallions include Britain's dearest sire Pivotal, who stood for £85,000 in 2007, his son Kyllachy, home-breds Medicean, Iceman and Carnival Dancer as well as Where Or When. Dutch Art is likely to retire to Cheveley Park next year. North London-based David Thompson is a former Smithfield meat trader, who first made his business mark with the Hillsdown Holdings food group, which he later sold in two separate deals for about £300 million.

In the 2007 Sunday Times Rich List the Thompson family, including entrepreneur son Richard, is ranked 165th with assets of £480 million. They have enjoyed a great year on the racecourse thanks to the likes of Echelon, winner of the Group 1 Matron Stakes at Leopardstown, and Nannina, who landed the Group 2 Windsor Forest Stakes at Royal Ascot having taken a Group 1 for the past two seasons. Other past Group 1 stars include Red Bloom, Confidential Lady, Regal Rose, Exclusive, Peeress, Pivotal and Chorist. The Thompsons also won the 1992 John Smith's Grand National with Party Politics, who was bought a couple of days before the race and still lives at the stud. Their nine trainers - all in Newmarket - are headed by Sir Michael Stoute, a director of the stud, and Sir Mark Prescott and also include Peter Chapple-Hyam, Ed Dunlop, James Fanshawe, John Gosden, William Haggas, Michael Jarvis and Jeremy Noseda.

Dewhurst title could be a crown of thorns

It seems that being champion two year-old has never mattered so much. There was a time when it just happened; it wasn't planned - now it's a campaign and a strategy almost military in nature.

Peter Chapple-Hyam thinks his Winker Watson is the best juvenile around and before injury reared its ugly head, he was willing to run him twice in two weeks to prove it.

Now the connections of New Approach and Rio De La Plata have changed their plans and intimated earlier this week that their intention is to take in Saturday's Dewhurst at Newmarket.

The reason probably is the presence there of Ravens Pass, John Gosden's unbeaten two year-old. And there is little doubt - if all three turn up - that the bringing together of the first three in the betting for next year's 2,000 Guineas will end up with the winner receiving the crown as champion of his crop.

But what's the fuss really all about. As our little research project reveals, being champion two year-old has almost taken on the mantle of a jinx in recent times. Of the last ten, only George Washington managed to win an English or Irish Classic. For most, injury and failure cast a shadow on their three year-old season.

Ten long years ago Xaar won the Dewhurst by seven lengths and immediately prompted comparisons to his sire, Zafonic. However, after winning the Craven on the way to the Guineas the following year, Xaar finished fourth at Newmarket to King of Kings - and failed to win on the racecourse again. Aljabr was the 1998 champion two year-old for Godolphin. He won the Sussex as a three year-old and the Lockinge a year later but was just short of top class in his Classic season.

Faslijev in 1999 was Aidan O'Brien's first champion two year-old. A speedy type by Nureyev, he won all five races as a juvenile but picked up an injury that winter and was never seen on a racecourse again. Tobougg landed the 2000 Dewhurst for Mick Channon and was made champion two year-old in a lacklustre year for the division. Subsequently bought by Godolphin, he started favourite for the 2,000 Guineas but only finished ninth to Golan and never won again.

Johannesburg became O'Brien's second

champion in 2001 after taking the Breeders Cup Juvenile at Belmont Park. However he too was a flop as a three year-old, a second-placed finish on his seasonal debut was the best he could manage in three races that season before being retired. His stablemate, Hold That Tiger, followed a similar path. He was third in the Breeders Cup in 2002 at Arlington but could only finish 17 of 20 behind Refuse To Bend in the following season's Guineas. He was yet another champion two year-old who failed to win in his Classic season.

One Cool Cat started at 2/1 to win the Guineas in his Classic year but also flopped in the Guineas and finished second last. Granted it wouldn't be difficult, but their plight has improved in recent years.

At least the 2004 champion Shamardal managed to win two Classics in France. Champion two years ago is our ol' favourite George Washington, a brilliant Guineas winner as a three year-old before a trip to stud ended in disaster. Last year's champion juvenile, Teofilo, was injured and never raced again either.

With that in mind, who in their right mind would like their horse to wear the crown! As punters however, we need to take a view, and mine is that Ravens Pass has enjoyed the best preparation for this race. His win (in record time) in the Solario at Sandown was breathtaking and at 10/3 he looks a bet to outdo his more vaunted rivals for toe when it matters.

I promised last week an ante-post tip for next year's 2,000 Guineas and here it is: Henrythenavigator. True, he looks well behind New Approach so far this season but Aidan O'Brien only ran in at the Curragh, on ground he didn't like, because he was getting lazy at home. I'm led to believe that Ballydoyle still rate him as their best two year-old and can't wait for better ground next year. Besides, New Approach and Rio De La Plata look more like Derby types with every run. The 25/1 with Cashmans is almost six times the price of those two, and is simply too big. Take a bite.

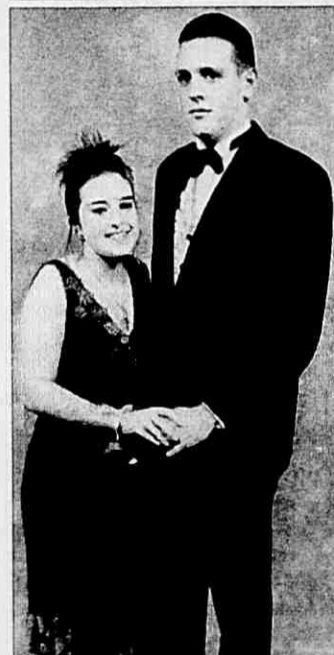

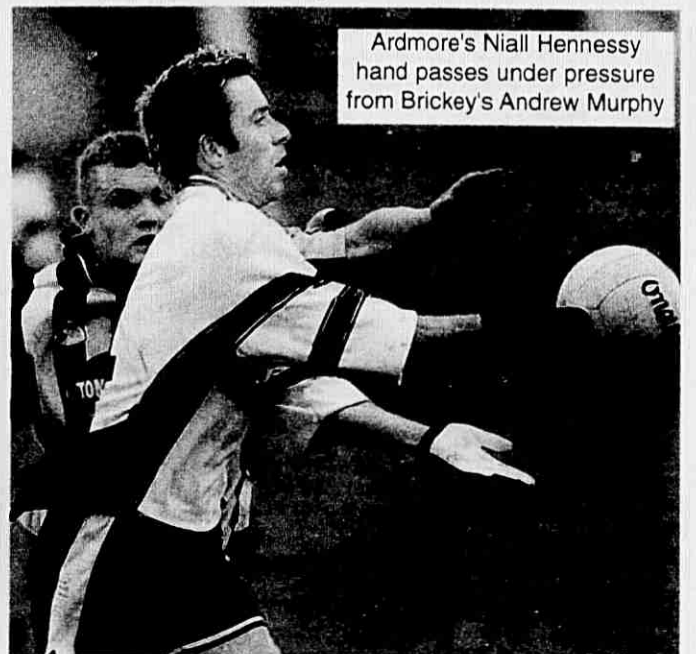

In the senior hurling championship we have seen nothing so far to equal the quality of the hurling which thrilled the 2000 plus crowd at Fraher field on Saturday afternoon and what a shame that there had to be a loser.

I have no doubt about the fact that the challengers, Abbeyside will curse their bad luck in conceding a match that they looked to have all wrapped up after enjoying a three points lead into injury time when a place in the county final looked certain after a 38 year lapse.

With such a lead and given a number of point scoring chances that would have copper fastened victory their disappointment in the agony of defeat is understandable. They will find it difficult to take consolation from the fact that this was their best display in senior ranks for a very long time.

Ballyduff acknowledged as being among the greatest championship battlers in the county kept on fighting when all looked to be lost and a late free awarded (27 metres out) was driven through a crowded goalmouth from a Brendan Hannon rocket turned what looked to be certain defeat into victory. With over 3 minutes of injury time played Abbeyside fought back desperately for the equalising point but the rock solid Ballyduff defence held firm and what a relief it was to them to hear the

sound of the final whistle. This was a match with some dramatic twists and turns and a contest which left the enthralled attendance unsure of what the final outcome would be.

PLAY

John Foley pointed from midfield and Shane Kearney had the opener for Ballyduff within 30 seconds of the start and Mark Gorman responded for Abbeyside before Seamus Hannon sent Ballyduff back into the lead with a fine score in the 6th. minute. Pa Kearney stretched the lead to 2 points in the 7th. minute. However points by Gary Hurney and John Gorman had the sides back on level terms within three minutes again. A super score by John Gorman in the 11th. minute gave the lead to Abbeyside. Then came the charging Brendan Hannon who gave Abbeyside keeper Darren Ryan no chance for the first of Ballyduff's 4 goals.

Brendan Hannon pointed again and minutes later the rushing Stephen Molumphy blasted an unstoppable shot to the Abbeyside net to make the gap a clear 6 points. This became 7 when Brendan Hannon pointed a free in the 21st minute.

It looked now as if the favourites were settling in to get a solid grip on the game, but Abbeyside held their composure and while holding Ballyduff scoreless for the remaining 10

minutes, raised 4 white flags per Mark Gorman. Patrick Hurney and Gary Hurney to leave just 3 points between the sides at the half time whistle when Ballyduff led by 2-5 to 0-8.

The hurling in the second half was even better than the first half and with Abbeyside contributing 1-9 and Ballyduff shooting 2-3, supporters were given reasons to cheer.

Mark Gorman and Ballyduff goalkeeper Adrian Power each pointed early frees before a Brendan Hannon free found Shane Kearney who managed to get the ball to the Abbeyside net through

a crowded goalmouth in the 36th minute.

By the 40th minute Ballyduff had their lead back to 6 points when a semi-penalty awarded to Abbeyside was shot to the net by Mark Gorman. Mark Fives had relieving points in the 45th and 46th minutes to reduce the gap to just one point. Adrian Power again left goal to convert a long range free but back came the challengers with points by Patrick Hurney and Mark Gorman to take the lead in the 54th minute. Mark Ferncombe with a great score in the 59th. minute left Abbeyside 3 points clear.

Play continued at furious rate until Jamie Hannon pointed a 62nd Minute free to reduce the lead to 2 points with time running out. A minute later a free awarded to Ballyduff from about 25 metres out was shot for a goal by Brendan Hannon and somehow the ball passed through a crowded goalmouth to send Ballyduff back into a one point lead.

Abbeyside attacked from the puck out but did not manage to get the magic score that would give them a deserved second chance.

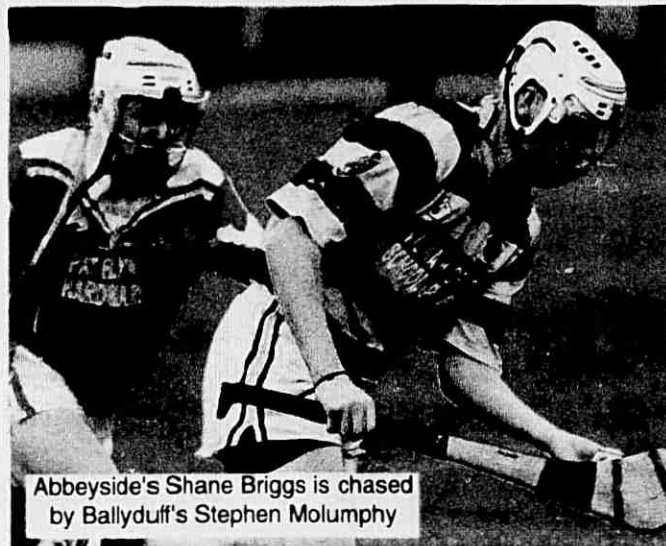

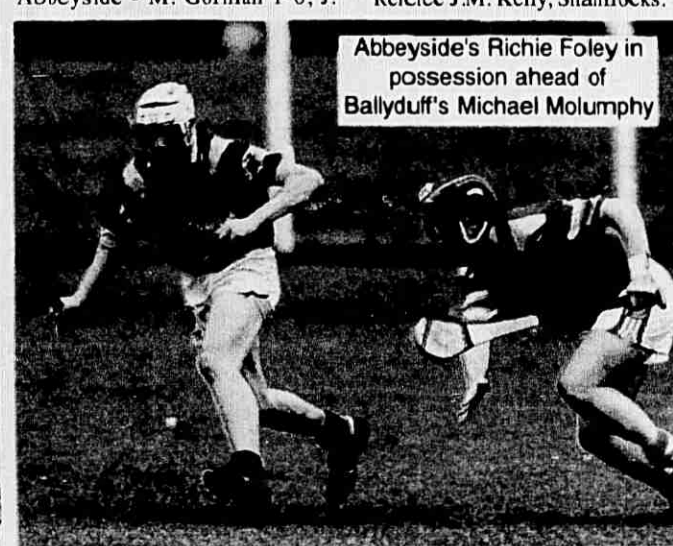

club fortunes in book form, particularly Eleanor Hickey and Catherine Ryan.

"Tonight, people should take the opportunity to renew old friendships," he said, "to get to know again people you may not have met in years and players you battled with in times past."

"Tonight is a very special night," he continued, "and I would like to pay tribute to the founders of the Club who broke new ground in those times past and to the people who have maintained it since and who make it the oldest club in the country."

He recalled the founding of the Club in 1970 as an outlet for the women and girls of the parish who did not have access to many facilities. The founding of the County Board provided for inter-club competition and he said he was proud that Ballymacarbry played in that first County Final of 1971, only to be beaten Kilrossanty.

As well as the many All Ireland and Provincial successes; the All Star Awards and other honours, he also recalled the sad times and the loss of two of their players at all too early an age.

"They are fondly remembered by their colleagues today," he said and commemorated in competitions which are played in

their names."

In introducing the President of Cumann Gael na mBan, Geraldine Giles, Michael referred to the many fine games their two clubs contested and the heartbreak Geraldine's Club, Rochfortbridge had suffered at the hands of Ballymacarbry, losing to the Waterford girls in four club All Ireland Finals.

In her address, The President was generous in her tribute and loud in her praise for the Club and its members. She congratulated Ballymacarbry on their honourable and successful history over four decades and said she witnessed many of the encounters, some of which still held painful memories for her.

"I am proud to have made the acquaintance of many fine players past and present, players who have taken the game to a new level and who have brought it to what it is today. It has been a great pleasure for me to have come through the process as a player and to have witnessed the game develop. Ballymacarbry have made a very significant contribution to that and continue to do so today," she concluded.

Munster's Marie Halvey said that Ballymacarbry are well deserved of every accolade.

"I have always admired the style and brand of football you played," she said. "I have been impressed by the teamwork, the commitment, enthusiasm and sheer raw skill which your players employed to such success. I have seen the way your players work for each other and the records you have set."

She recalled particularly Bernie Ryan's Captaincy in 1992 when she led the County Senior Team to National League, Munster and All Ireland success and also captained the Club team to Munster and All Ireland honours."

Introduced as the representative who would speak on behalf of the players, Marie Crotty, one of the many stalwarts of Ballymacarbry's game in the early years, led a surprise tribute to Michael Ryan, introducing on video, guests from all over the Ladies Football circuit who paid their own generous tributes to Michael. Some of the warmest words came from teams whom Ballymacarbry and Waterford had defeated.

Visibly moved by the occasion and the detailed planning which went into the tribute, Michael was overwhelmed at the final touch which saw sixty or more players past and present take to the stage to sing 'Simply the Best' to the sustained applause and cheers of the crowd. It was a moment which will live in the memory of everyone present, not least Michael and his family who have given a lifetime of service to the Association.

The planning for the evening was detailed and painstaking and the results were visible all round the Hall which showed hundred of team and action photographs depicting the proud and probably never to be paralleled history of a Ladies Football Club.

LIAM SHOWS HIS A BUDDING YOUNG ATHLETE

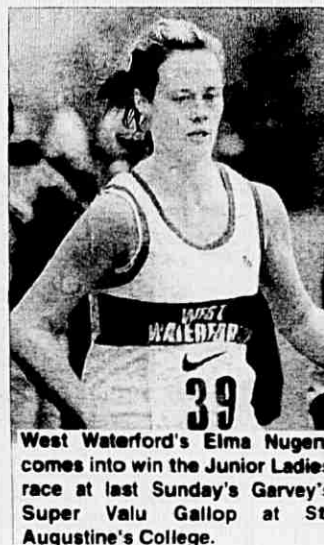

West Waterford Athletes On Meltdown At Chicago Marathon

The LaSalle Bank Chicago Marathon was held last Sunday week and despite the race ending in complete chaos when temperatures reached the city's all time record of 88°F (31°C) the contingent of West Waterford runners did all manage to complete the course but predicted times were out the window in all cases.

By the time the first elite runners were crossing the finish line and while most first-timers and social runners were not even close to halfway the race problems were apparent with several runners fainting and thrown by the road side because of the exceptional heat, and when the water stations started running out of water, the organisers found it necessary to shut the race down.

Everybody who had not crossed the half marathon mark 3 1/2 hours after start time were disallowed from going any further and those who had reached the 20 mile mark were diverted to the finish line covering a total of 21 miles by the time they reached the finish area in Grant Park.

In actual fact the total number of official full distance finishers was 4,500 runners from the entry of 45,000. Naturally, this caused some displeasure among the runners who had trained for months and spent a great deal of money on

entry fees and on travelling and accommodation. The organisers claim that they were forced to call off the race due to safety reasons as emergency rooms were full up and the medical staffs was unable to handle in huge influx of casualties. The disappointed runners maintain that the organisers should have been better prepared — for example by checking the weather forecasts and providing enough water to keep all runners hydrated. No judgements will sound from here, only sympathy for both the frustrated runners and the race organisers who had to make a tough decision.

The most complains from runners are dealing with the fact that many water stations had run out of both water and Gatorade and they had to turn to fountains and generous spectators to get hydrated and to cool down their sweltering bodies. According to eyewitnesses, some runners seemed to welcome the excuse to escape the steaming sauna that the race had turned into. Others were, of course, sorry to see months of training go down the drain. It certainly was the least amount of finishers in Chicago Marathon history.

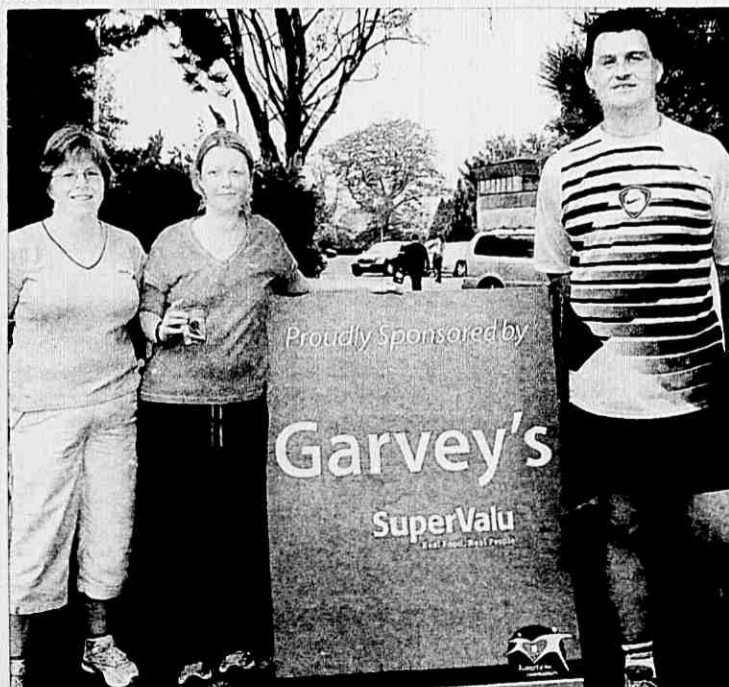
