Waterford County Council hope to have fixed a leaking mains by today (Wednesday), and bring about an end to a water crises in Stradbally, which has seen residents of the picturesque village go without water for the past four

The council delivered tankers of fresh drinking water over the weekend to the village, while the fire service pumped in water to enable householders to flush their toilets. The council said they will continue to do this until such a time as the water service is up and running again.

The break occurred on Friday close to a reservoir, leaving the village without a supply throughout the weekend and until Tuesday (yesterday).



As the bridge is a protected structure it will have to go through the Part 8 process of Public Consultation, which will be started shortly.


Labour councillor, Ger Barron welcomed the move, saying the bridge is Kilmac's outstanding landmark.

Tom Gantley, Senior Occupational Therapist with the Sacred Heart Unit, explained: "People who come into hospital can feel disconnected from things, and this is just a nice way to connect with people in need.

"It also gives them a sense of purpose," he added. "A lot of elderly people don't get the opportunities to get involved in something like this, and may feel they are past contributing, so this is really a positive thing

He said people have been very generous towards the charity event so far, and they hope to raise around €500 from the

"It's important that people who are older, and perhaps have some health problems, still feel that they have a contribution to make, and are connected into events," Tom who has been with the Unit since it opened in 1998, said.

"There has been a change regarding people who go into nursing homes, in trying to make them more outward looking communities, and things like this are positive beacons in that effort. And it's morale boosting as well."

The Sacred Heart Unit is a 15 bed unit, three of which are respite. It mainly treats the over 65's providing rehab treatment for those with single or multiple health problems. Together with Tom Gantley, the team therapist assistant, Ron Swanson, and Leslie Bowland, physiotherapist for long stay patients.

It's a huge and deserved honour for the big forward, who was simply majestic throughout the year, leading the team it seemed at one stage, inexorably into the showdown everyone in the country was looking forward in eager anticipation to, an All-Ireland final with Kilkenny.

However, sadly, that was not to be, with Waterford's physically and mentally draining year coming unstuck at the hands of Richie Bennis's Limerick side, and the personal accolade will, Viewpoint is certain, only be scant reward for Dan and the Waterford team's trials and tribulations on the field of play, but it is a welcome consolation nonetheless.

In total, a record five Waterford hurlers were given All-Stars, including, perhaps most notably, Stephen Molumphy of Ballyduff Upper, whose excellent performances earned him a deserved All-Star in his first year, and this record just goes to show how impressive the entire team was throughout the year, when they topped Munster, and more than once showed the sort of form that looked likely to lead them to a long-awaited All-Ireland.

But nobody would deny, the talisman forward, Dan Shanahan top billing.

For a big man, he has a silky touch, pace and oodles of commitment, combining strength with skill to make him the most deadly and feared forward of the year, and perhaps one of the best players to come out of Waterford of the present generation.

Barging and bustling past defenders, taking high balls and rocketing unstoppable shots to the back of the net with the precision of a surgeon has become second nature to him, and for that, and for the excitement and enjoyment he and the Waterford team has given the county's sporting punters, he truly has earned all the accolades that have come his way.

Hopefully, next year, Dan and the team, will get their just rewards for their efforts and get to hold aloft an even bigger prize, the All-

IDA NEEDS TO BE PUT UNDER **MICROSCOPE**

IDA South Regional Chief, Brian Conroy can expect a considerable grilling if and when he appears before the assembled ranks of the elected members of Dungarvan Town Council, probably sometime before Christmas.

There is considerable, and Viewpoint feels, justifiable anger in Dungarvan over the IDA's failure to include the town in any site

As Fine Gael councillor, Michael Cosgrove correctly stated, unless and until potential investors are brought to the town, the work engaged in by the council in starting Invest in Waterford and other initiatives count for naught.

The IDA seems to be deliberately ignoring Dungarvan at the moment, despite the devastating job losses endured by the town over the past few years with the amalgamation of Waterford Foods and the closure of Dungarvan Crystal resulting in the combined loss of close to 1,000.

For any town, and especially a town the size of Dungarvan, that is, to put it mildly, a considerable amount. And while the town, has to some extent, by its own means entirely, surmounted some of those blows, the failure of the IDA to attract a replacement industry is worrying indeed.

While the rezoning of 400 to 500 acres of land near the Youghal road for Industrial purposes is a step in the right direction, the question is, what multi-national industry, supplying a large number of quality well paid jobs is going to be attracted to the county town in the face of stiff competition from those in the Border and West areas where capital grants are higher, without the full backing of the Government agencies.

The answer is of course none, and sadly that's just the way it appears to be proceeding at the moment; Dungarvan is forgotten and will remain forgotten about until pressure is exerted on the IDA to actively promote the town.

No doubt, Mr. Conroy will come away from the meeting with the Town Council, a lot more aware of this fact.



BOVINE TB AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES 2007/2008 HARDSHIP GRANT

- The 2007/2008 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November 2007. This grant is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some owner/keepers whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. In order to be eligible, owner/keepers must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. In addition, the general rule is that where animals (with some specific exceptions) have been moved on to a holding during a restriction period, eligibility for receipt of the hardship grants ceases for the remainder of the restriction period. The Grant may provide eligible owner/keepers with a payment of up to €250 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November 2007 to 30 April 2008.
- 2. The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER97. Potentially eligible owner/keepers will be issued with the terms and conditions document and application form ER97 by the Department's District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.
- 3. The onus is on the potentially eligible owner/keepers whose holdings are, at or after 1 November 2007, restricted as a result of a re-test or continue to be restricted as a result of a re-test during the period 1 November 2007 to 30 April 2008, to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER97.

The onus is on the owner/keeper to apply for a Hardship Grant.

BEAKS, FEET AND EGGS

A bird does not have any teeth. It uses its beak for catching and cutting up its food. Birds beaks are different shapes depending on what type of food they eat. Birds with long, thin bills use them for probing. Birds with short, strong beaks, such as finches, are usually nut eaters. Beaks that are flattened tend to be used for dabbling through mud. Birds of prey, such as the bald eagle, have strong, hooked beaks for tearing at flesh. Wading birds, such as the avocet have long beaks to probe mud on river beds and beaches. A hummingbird's long beak is ideal for reaching right into tube-shaped flowers. The toucan's colourful beak plays an important part in attracting a mate. The beak is about as long as the toucan's body, but it is not heavy because it is hollow.

Coming In To Land

As it comes into land a bird spreads its tail feathers to act as an air brake. It then stretches its legs forwards towards the ground or a perch. Once landed it closes its tail feathers to help it to balance.

Eggs Large and Small



The ostrich lays the biggest egg of all. They are a creamy white, measure about 20cm (8in) long, up to 15cm (6in) in diameter, and weigh about 1kg (2.2lb). If you wanted to boil one for breakfast, it would take you about 40 minutes to do. The smallest bird if the bee

hummingbird of South America. It measures just 57mm (2in) from the tip of its beak to the end of its tail - and half of that is the bill and tail! Hummingbirds to lay the smallest eggs, just 1cm (1.3in) long.


Feet Facts

Birds do not walk on the whole area of the foot like humans do, they walk on their toes. This is because the lower joint of the leg is not a knee but more like a heel. Most birds have four toes, three of which point forward and the other points backwards. There are lots of differences between bird's feet according to where and how they live. An ostrich, for instance, has just two toes. The jacana's long toes enable it to walk on floating plants in the marshy areas where it lives.

A Colourful Beak

Local Firefighters Represent Ireland At French **National Congress** 26-29th September

France was attended by four representatives of the Waterford County Fire and Rescue Service from Cappoquin and Lismore. Held in the beautiful city of Clermont Ferrand in the Auvergne Puyde-Dome department, John McGrath, Stephen Kennefick, David Ind and Michael Russell shone brightly as the delegation etrangere d'Irlande. The idea came about from an invitation extended by Jean Claude Bonnefoy, the local Fire Chief of Chanat La Mouteyre (the French twinned town of Cappoquin located about 10 km from Clermont) last year during the French delegation visit to Cappoquin. John McGrath worked on getting a number of local fire fighters to attend and proudly led the delegation at the Congress.

During four days of events, 30,000 visitors examined numerous exhibits of the most up to date fire fighting and rescue equipment, protective clothing, Fire Tenders, snorkels and anti-chemical treatment vehicles. Other trade stands offered advice on Pensions and Welfare to the Sapeur-Pompier whose profession is taken very

The opening ceremony saw the local representatives take the salute from the squadron leader of the Puy-De-Dome. Standing to attention to the strains of La Marselleise, the many sectors of the Pompiers including Divers, Mountain Rescue and Dog Handlers, Medical Corps and the Jeunesse Sapeurs Pompiers in uniform marched and were reviewed by many important dignatories from the region and the state. An interview with the Congress journalist followed and a photo of our delegation accompanied by Jean Yves Gouttebel, President du Conseil General de Puy de Dome appeared on Flemeche the congress magazine next day.

The following days were filled with meeting fellow fire fighters from France and seven other foreign delegations to exchange experiences and greetings. A special reception for the foreign delegations to the congress was held at the Hotel de Ville (City Hall) by the Mayor of Clermont, Monsieur Serge Godard at which he extended a wonderful welcome to the visitors and presented the head of each delegation with a special miniature replica of a Casque Sapeur Pompier (Fireman's Helmet) as a memento of their visit. In turn John McGrath presented the Mayor with some Irish Whiskey Hand Made Chocolates, which seemed to delight him. The Mayor later chatted to the delegates and in perfect English told us how much he enjoys his visits to Ireland.

We were treated to an incredible feast of entertainment by the Sapeurs Pompiers of Paris in a display of acrobatics comparable only to the Olympic Games, followed by a concert in which the orchestra was also made up entirely of Pompiers from Paris. We were treated to singing by Bernard Oudou a firefighter from the Auvergne, followed by the internationally acclaimed Gypsy Kings. 10,000 people attended this concert. The final day of the congress commenced with a visit of President Nicholas Sarcozy to address the 3,000 delegates and remind them of the importance of their work and thank them for their commitment to their profession. This was poignant as the news of the tragedy of the Fireman in Bray had just filtered through.

This event was followed by a wonderful parade of fire engines showing the evolution of the fire service.

Waterford County Fire Service can be very proud of our representatives at the congress and should encourage others to take part in next year's congress which will be held in Rennes in Brittany around the end of September. (See next edition for part 2)

BALLYDUFF WALKING CLUB **BALLYHOURA MOUNTAINS**

The Ballyduff walking club climbed the classic Blackrock route at the Ballyhoura Mountains on Sunday October 13th. The main objects of this walk were the amazing views from the rocky ridges at the summit. The circuit covers the spectacular scenery of Ardpatrick, Kilmallock, Ballyhea, Charleville, Churchtown and the Castle Oliver Estate. Castle Oliver is a red sandstone Scottish Baronial style mansion which replaced the original Clonadfoy house of the Oliver Estate which consisted of 20,000 acres in 1837 It was the home of Lola Montez, mistress of King Ludwig of Bavaria in the last century. Blackrock is the most northerly peak in the Ballyhoura Mountains and the club continued walking through the exposed high open moorland to the spectacular peaks of Seefin and Carron. Seefin is the highest peak of the Ballyhoura Mountains. It is 1,703 ft high. Seefin is the reputed resting place of the legendary warrior Fionn Mac Cumhaill, father of Oisin. Carron is known locally as the Saddle Mountain. The cairn is the remains of a stone fort on the summit, which was reputedly occupied by Brian Boru. We followed the track downhill along the edge. We returned through Glenosheen forest, which contains an abundance of beautiful trees with the finest collection of beech trees. This walk took three hours to complete. What costs other than my mortgage should I be aware of when purchasing my new home?

There are costs that need to be considered when applying for a mortgage when purchasing your new home. These are outlined below-

Deposit

The majority of lenders will lend a certain percentage of the purchase price of your property. The percentage will vary depending on whether you are a first-time buyer, trading up, non

If you are a first-time buyer a mortgage company will typically lend 92% of the purchase price, so you have to contribute 8% yourself. Let's take an example on this on a property costing €250,000. A lender will advance you €230,000 i.e. 92% of €250,000, so you have to contribute €20,000 from your own funds. First-time buyers normally obtain the 8% deposit from either a gift from parents/family or from savings built up prior to purchasing a property.

100% mortgages are also available for first time buyers from some mortgage lenders and this removes the need for this 8% deposit if people would prefer this route to purchase their first

Legal Fees

You will need the services of a solicitor in order to purchase your

When calculating and explaining what your legal fees are going to be, your solicitor may break the cost down into two separate

The first is what they will charge you for their own time in carrying out the conveyancing process on your behalf.

This can vary from solicitor to solicitor. Some may charge you a percentage of the purchase price and others may charge you a flat fee irrespective of price. Gone are the days of every solicitor charging 1.5% of the purchase price. So the first part of your legal bill is made up of your solicitor's own professional fee, plus VAT

The second part of your legal bill is referred to as outlay. When your solicitor is in receipt of contracts for the purchase of your new property they will be able to determine where the title of the property is held, that is either with the Land Registry or the Registry of Deeds. The cost applicable to your 'outlay' will depend on which one.

Émerald Financial offers its clients the Emerald Mortgage Package which gives clients the option of either Free Professional Solicitor Fees or Cashback of up to €1,000 if clients wish to use their own solicitor which reduces the legal costs to a minimum for its clients.

Insurances

It is mandatory to take out a life assurance policy with your mortgage. This policy has to at least match your mortgage amount and the term of your mortgage.

It is also mandatory to have house insurance cover on your new home. All mortgage lenders will check that these insurances are in place before finalising your mortgage fully.

Valuation Fee

A lender will insist that a valuation is carried out on a property they are providing funds for. The lender requires this type of valuation so they can get independent confirmation from a third party as to what the current market value of the property is.

The normal fee for an initial valuation is € 130. If the property is under construction a second final valuation will be required and will be carried out by the valuer who did the original inspection. The cost for the final valuation will typically be \in 70.

First Time Buyers are exempt from stamp duty on any new or second - hand property. Stamp duty is calculated on the purchase price of the property.

Non First Time Buyers (for owner occupation) of new properties under 1,345sq.ft. (125sq.m) pay no stamp duty

Non First Time Buyers (for owner occupation) of new properties over 1,345sq.ft.(125sq.m) and second hand property pay stamp duty at the applicable rates.

Investors pay stamp duty on new and second hard properties at the applicable rates.

These are the main additional costs that you need to be aware of, some other costs that may or may not need to be factored in include - structural surveys, indemnity bond fees, planning permission fees and assignment of life policy fees.

starting a family expect that becoming pregnant is the most natural thing in the world, but the fact is that around 1 in 7 couples in this country experience problems conceiving, and that number seems to

One of the most common causes of infertility in women is hormone imbalance which prevents ovulation from occurring. This may be due to a problem with the reproductive hormones themselves, or it may be the result of another health problem such as thyroid disease or being very underweight or overweight.

In some cases infertility may be caused by the woman's immune system attacking her partner's sperm, or by insufficient circulation to the uterus which prevents a fertilised egg from implanting properly.

Another common cause of infertility is damage to the reproductive system by infections such as chlamydia, or chronic urinary tract infection. Other factors which can reduce fertility in both partners include stress, nutritional deficiency, exposure to chemicals such as pesticide residues, food additives, smoking, and excessive alcohol or caffeine consumption.

Many couples who have problems conceiving opt for in vitro fertilisation (IVF) treatment in which eggs are removed from the woman's body, fertilised in a laboratory, then introduced back into the uterus. For some people this treatment is very successful, but it is certainly not an easy or a guaranteed way to become pregnant.

The treatment itself consists of daily injections and endless blood tests. The first stage involves shutting down the reproductive system, which can have the same side effects as the menopause. This is followed by treatment to stimulate egg production which can cause fluid retention, nausea and vomiting. However most women who undergo IVF treatment would agree that the physical side effects are usually nothing compared to the emotional rollercoaster ride of anticipating the treatment, wondering if it has been successful, and all too often, the terrible disappointment of a failed attempt.

Each cycle of treatment costs thousands of Euros and carries only around a 25% chance of success. Of course IVF can only ensure that eggs are produced and fertilised. If the problem is due to poor health of the reproductive organs or failure to implant, IVF will have no effect whatsoever.

If you are trying for a baby naturally or considering IVF treatment, there are ways to boost your fertility and increase your chance of becoming pregnant

Ensure your diet includes in plenty of organic fruit and vegetables, oily fish, nuts, and seeds such as pumpkin and linseeds. Nutritional deficiencies such as insufficient vitamin E, vitamin B complex, zinc and magnesium have been linked to infertility. It is therefore advisable to take a good quality multivitamin and mineral supplement which is specifically designed for women who are trying to conceive. These supplements also contain the recommended level of folic acid which is essential before and during early pregnancy to prevent spina bifida, and low levels of vitamin A which can be damaging

Use household cleaning products such as Ecover which don't contain harmful chemicals. Avoid non-organic food and any food which contains additives. Stop smoking, and limit your consumption of alcohol and caffeine.

If you are experiencing problems conceiving, a medical herbalists can assess the causes of infertility and provide an individually tailored blend of herbs and detailed nutritional advice. For example, herbs such as agnus castus and false unicorn root help to regulate hormones, and others such as raspberry leaf help to ensure the reproductive organs are healthy. Immunological rejection of sperm can be corrected with herbs such as Echinacea, and circulatory stimulants such as yarrow and ginger ensure a healthy blood supply to the uterus. Herbal medicine can also help with the stress which is associated with infertility.

Herbal medicine can be used alone or in combination with IVF treatment to increase the chance of success. Herbal medicine can also be combined with other therapies which help to increase fertility such as acupuncture. Here at The Lismore Clinic we have treated many women who went on to become pregnant and give birth to healthy children after experiencing problems such as polycystic ovaries, unexplained infertility, repeated failure of IVF and recurrent miscarriage

LABOUR

This is a term referred to those who are building a property and arranging for themselves, plasterers, brick layers, plumbers etc to carry out the specific work on the property. The advantages of building a property by direct labour is that your property can be built much cheaper.

The big disadvantage though is the potential cost overruns, so be very detailed and precise when budgeting

FIXED PRICE CONTRACT

This is where you enter into an agreement with a registered builder they will construct your property as outlined in the plans/specifications you provided to them for a fixed, agreed fee.

The advantage of using a registered builder is that you should know the quality of their workmanship having viewed previous properties built by them.

The one disadvantage to proceedings this way is actually finding a builder who is available, within your price range and ready to start work on your property.



GPA To Ballot on Strike Action

Last week the voting papers were sent to players around the country and within a week or so the decision will be announced. If strike action is approved then there is expected to be turmoil next season.

The GPA which is in effect the players trade union are unhappy with the G.A.A. and the Government for not agreeing to pay out the 5,000,000 euro for player benefits and are urging their players to force the issue by voting for strike action.

Over the weekend I spoke to a very prominent hurler who told me that "the whole affair makes me sick and I cannot see why a special few in the overall context of the association, should demand special treatment.

I could not agree more and like the thousands of club players in each code who will not benefit if the issue comes to fruition, I am entitled to ask why the elite band of intercounty players who are being very well looked after, getting holidays and other perks available that club players do not have would take such avtion.

The GPA do not cater for the thousands of club players who train for three and sometimes four nights per week and are more often to play their matches in winter conditions, etc., because the summer programme is reserved for the intercounty

The outcome of the vote may be very interesting, but I do not see it interfering with intercounty championships next year as I know (as everyone else knows) there are thousands of players out there who will feel proud and privileged to wear their county colours if called upon to do so.







Before Amsterdam last Sunday Mutai fastest time was 2.13.06. Impressive was also the performance of his fellow countryman Richard Limo, who finished in second place in his first marathon ever in 2.06.45. The battle for the third place was a photo finish. James Rotich was less than a second faster than his Kenyan fellow countryman and favourite Paul Kirui both in 2.07.12. Eleven athletes finished within 2.10.00.

In the ladies race Kenyan Magdaline Chemjor took the victory. The 28-year-old Chemjor won in her debut at the marathon distance in 2.28.16. The Polish Dorota Gruca (2.30.10) was just a little faster than the Ethiopian Ayelech Worku (2.30.15).

IRELAND TO HOST THE 2009 EUROPEAN CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2009 European Cross Country Championships will be staged at Santry in Dublin. The European Athletics Council announced last week that the Irish bid had edged out French hopeful Carcassone and Polish city Bydogoszcz. Athletics Ireland has earmarked 13 December as the date for the event. Ireland hosted the 1979 and 2002 World Cross Country Championships but it will be the first occasion the country has staged the European Championships. Mo Farah and Ukraine's Tatyana Golovchenko claimed the individual titles in last year's championships while Irish athlete Fionnuala Britton was second in the Under-23 event. Irish athlete Catherina McKiernan won the European title in 1994. Meanwhile, Paris has been chosen to host the European Indoor Championships in 2011 and Gothenburg was selected to host the 2013 event. The European Indoor Championships were first held in 1966 in Dortmund. Paris has hosted it once, in 1994.


