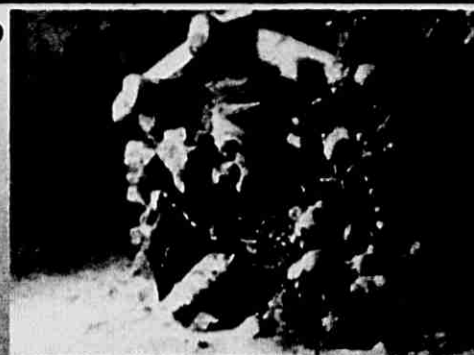

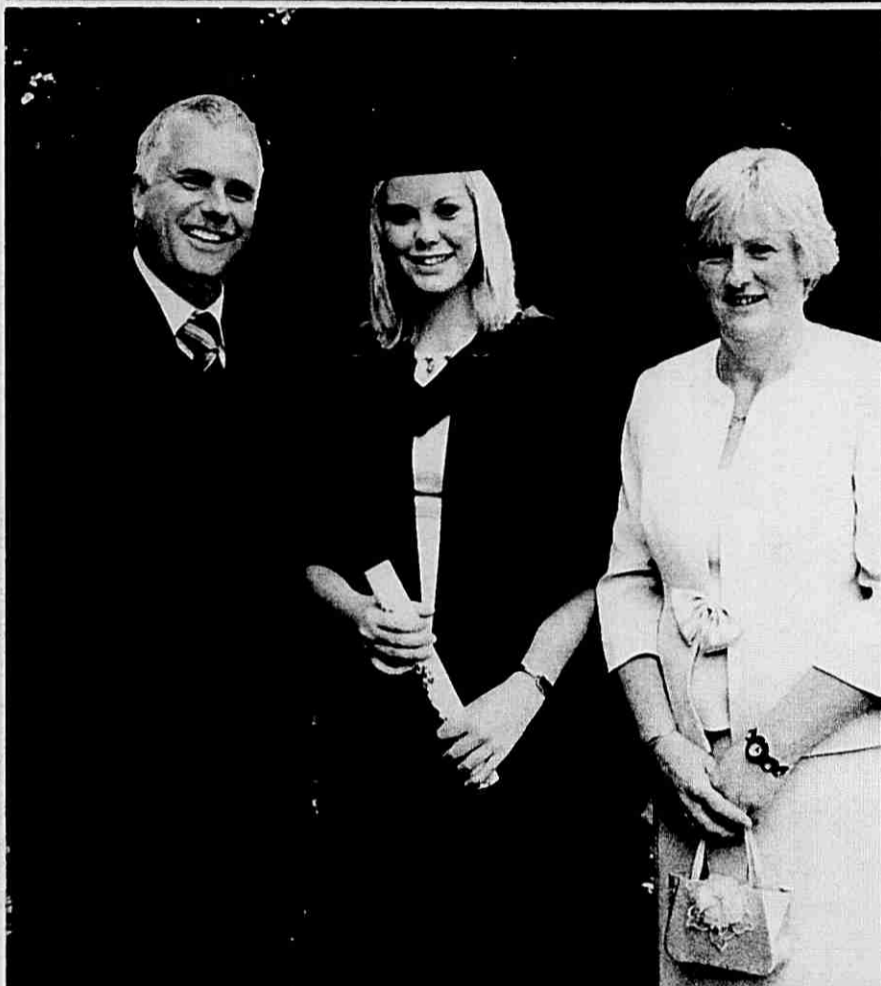

Tyres & Dangerous Materials Confiscated

CALL FOR ONE CONTROLLED 'CIVIC' BONFIRE IN DUNGARVAN

Council workers confiscated tyres and other materials before Halloween night, and garages were warned not to provide tyres as part of a council led initiative to crack down on the burning of toxic and dangerous substances in bonfires in Dungarvan.

However, despite the initiative, in one instance, a tyre rolled off a bonfire at Gallows Hill, striking the side of a council house in Byrneville.

Hundreds gathered around the community bonfires on Halloween night, but the proximity to houses, and numbers gathering, as well as the types of materials being burned, has led to warnings that someone may be hurt or even killed sooner or later.

FEARS

In light of the concerns, calls have been made to ban the bonfires in recent weeks, but Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said he is standing by his idea put forward at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council to have one controlled bonfire in the town.

"My major fear about the bonfires, and it's a genuine fear, is that sooner or later someone is going to be seriously (continued on page 8)

Council Make Presentation To Retired Fire Officer

"Eric was so good to people and went back to elderly people and made them feel more comfortable afterwards," he said.

Mr. Flynn said he was thrilled and surprised by the presentation, and said it would take pride of place. Reflecting back on 25 years of service, he said there were good times and not so good times but it would always remain in his memory.

"I am speechless by this presentation and am deeply honoured and grateful. It's a unique thing to do, and I appreciate it very much", he added.

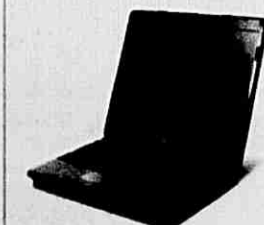

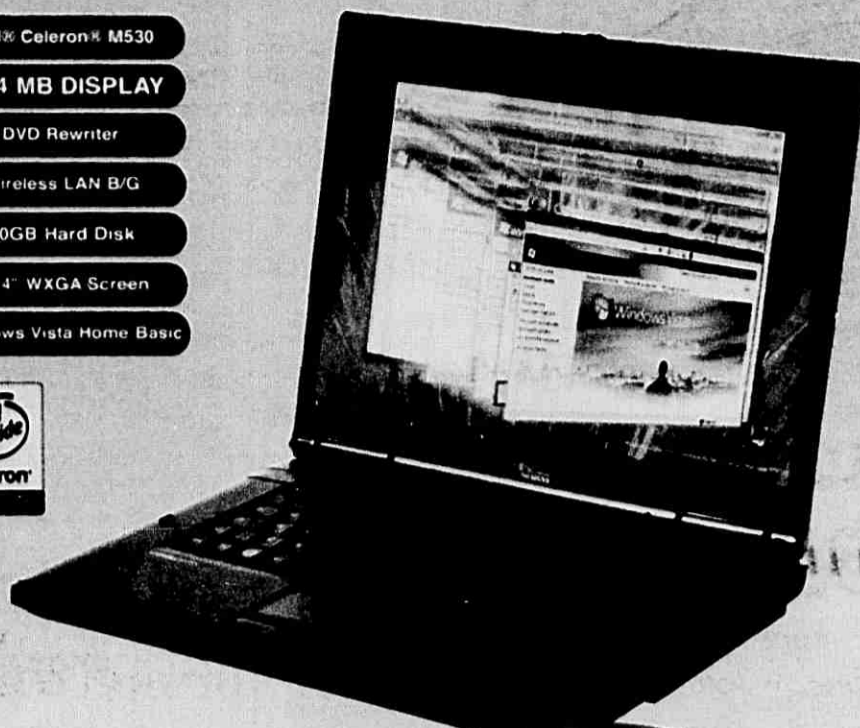

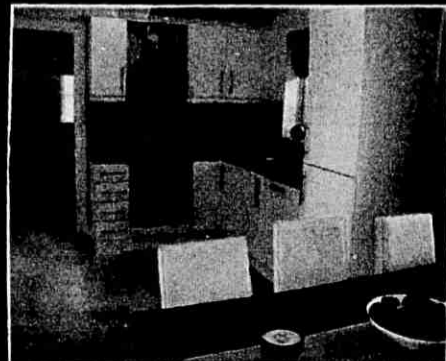

Funding For Swimming Pool Could Come From Development Contributions

Ambitious plans for a municipal swimming pool in Lismore could be partially funded by Development Contributions, according to Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan. Lismore Town Council has

written to Waterford County Council about the proposal, and is currently examining ways to fund the plans. Cllr. Heneghan said the aspiration of developing a swimming pool, which would serve the wider West Waterford

area, is very admirable. "It's only through the Local Authority providing facilities that young people can see the value of the council", Cllr. Heneghan added. "When the playground was provided it gave a huge boost in the way people thought of the local authority.

NOT BENEFITED
"In my time in Lismore, the town has not benefited from any major recreational infrastructural developments like a swimming pool. I feel it would benefit the whole of West Waterford," he said. Town Manager, John O'Flynn said that currently there is no grant scheme for swimming pools but one may be introduced shortly.

CONTRIBUTION
The idea followed a discussion on the draft development contribution scheme. As part of the scheme, developers would have to pay the council a series of contributions towards sewerage, water supply, roads and community developments. In Lismore, they must also pay a special levy towards the upgrade of the Lismore Sewerage Treatment Plant.

Mr. O'Flynn said the funds go into a central fund but "by and large" are spent on the towns and

villages where the development takes place, although there are exceptions.

PLAYGROUNDS
Meanwhile, Cllr. Heneghan also pointed out that the council allocated €1.275 m from the Community Development Contributions budget towards the construction of 10 playgrounds around the county in recent years, and asked whether the recently opened Lismore Playground got a fair share.

He suggested that each playground should have received €127,500 each, but Lismore clearly didn't receive this. He asked whether each playground was funded on a 50% community funding, 50% council funding basis as Lismore was.

ONLY PART OF COST
However, Mr. O'Flynn responded that the equipment was only a small part of the outlay. The council had to service the site, and light it as well as several other costs. A policy regularising the spending on playgrounds has come through the SPC in recent months, but prior to that it may have been done in a somewhat haphazard way.

"Now we are consistently applying the 50-50 policy", Mr. O'Flynn said.

Dan Shanahan To Be Given Lismore's Highest Honour

CIVIC RECEPTION FOR LISMORE'S MOST FAMOUS SON

Dan Shanahan is to be granted Lismore's highest honour, a civic reception next month. It followed a proposal from Mayor of Lismore, Cllr. Peter Ahern, and marks yet another honour in Shanahan's glittering year. Standing orders were suspended, as Mayor Ahern paid tribute to Dan the Man, the hurling sensation and Parks Road native who led Waterford to National League, and Munster Championship success.

"He is an ambassador for his club, his town and his family," Mayor Ahern said.

Shanahan recently received his third All-Star, the Hurler of the Year award, the Daily Star Player of the Year award, the GPA Player of the Year award, and the Munster Player of the Year award.

"There is no doubt", Mayor Ahern added, "that we will never see his like again".

Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan, who is one of Dan's past teachers, said Shanahan's exploits on the hurling field had put Lismore and Park's Road on the map.

"The first thing people from around the country say when you say to them you are from Lismore, is that Dan is from there. I totally agree with this honour", Cllr. Heneghan added.

Lismore Has Lowest Proportion Of Non-Nationals In Ireland

The 2006 Census has revealed that Lismore has the lowest number of non-nationals living in the town per head of population than anywhere else in the country.

While Dungarvan has more Polish speakers resident in the town than there are Irish speakers in the Gaeltacht, less than twenty miles away in Lismore, only 0.7% of the population registered as non-nationals in the 2006 census.

The highest percentage of non-nationals registered was Ballinrobe in Co. Mayo which has 10% of non-nationals domiciled in the town.

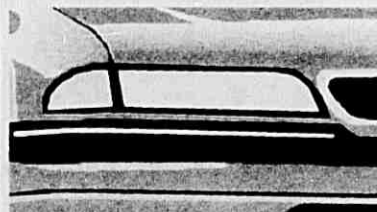

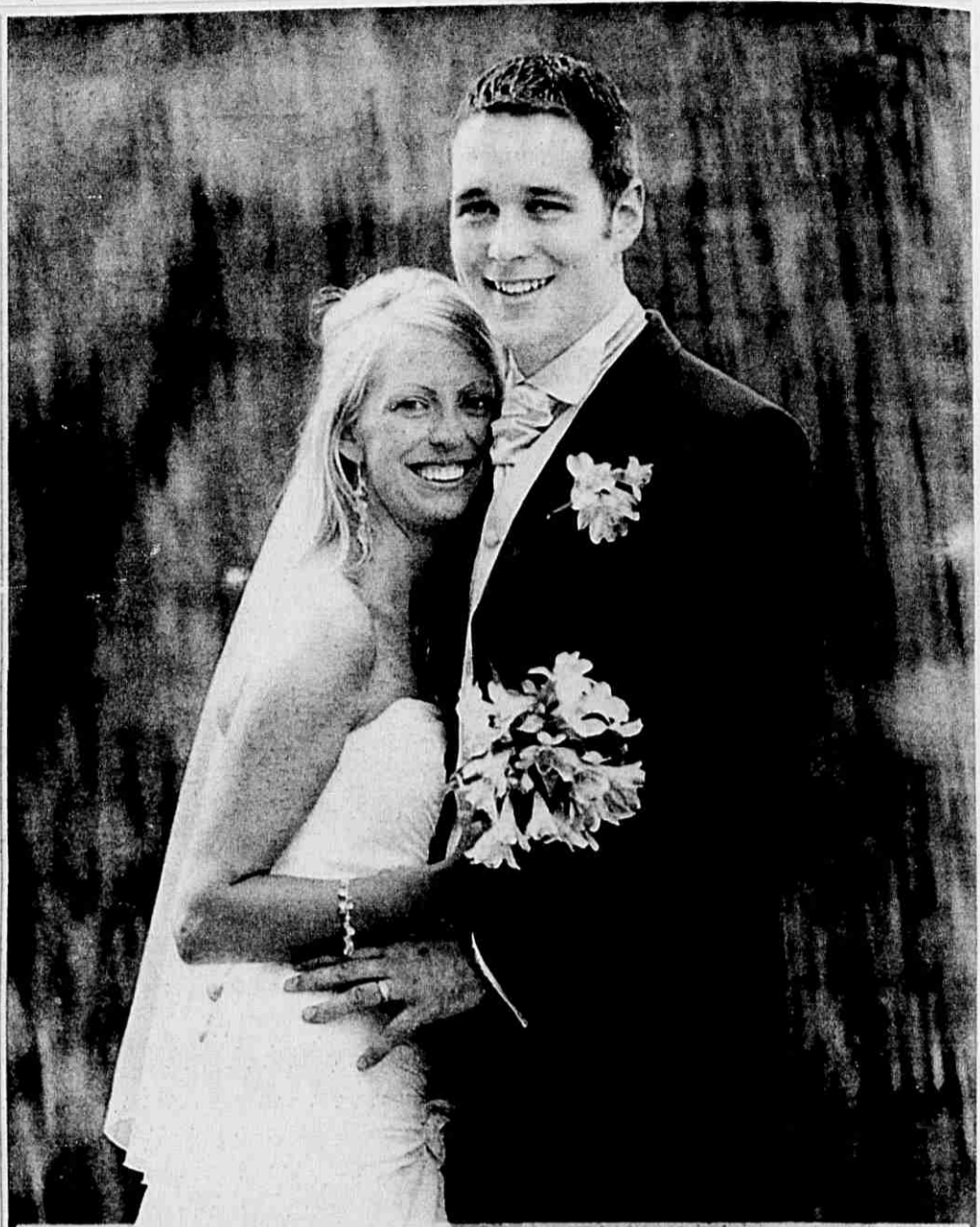

Great Success for Carriglea Swimmers at Garda Training College

The Garda continued their close association with Special Olympics by hosting and jointly organising the Munster Special Olympics Swimming Gala at their lavish training headquarters in Templemore on Saturday the 3rd November. This was one of the Community Based Projects undertaken by the Trainee Gardai this year, with the primary aim of benefiting athletes with an Intellectual Disability and the young Gardai themselves.

The Opening Ceremony was

held in the resplendent training grounds in autumnal sunshine. The parade was led by the Moycarky Pipe Band, followed by the main Garda Marching Unit with the seven centres/clubs following on behind their banners. This was a magnificent spectacle.

Once all the formalities were completed the Gala began in earnest at 11 am and concluded at 3 pm. Nearly seventy swimmers took part, eight of whom represented Carriglea Cairde Services namely Helen Walsh, Joanne O'Dea, Eileen O'Donnell, Kerrie Horgan, Nicola Carroll, Michael Landers, Michael Foley and Liam Mahoney. All of our

athletes swam with distinction winning a combined total of ten gold, 8 silver and 5 bronze medals in events ranging from 25 m to 100 m (Freestyle, Breaststroke and Backstroke). Our 4 x 50m relay team won gold while the 4 x 25m relay team took silver. Another highlight for the athletes was a swimming relay 4 x 50 m comprising of 3 Garda teams and 1 team of Special Olympics Coaches. Here the Special Olympics coaches prevailed by a narrow margin in an exciting finish much to the delight of the athletes, where

Nicola Moroney's swimming prowess and Tom Scanlan's experience were vital.

Lunch was provided by the Garda and they also presented all swimmers with a souvenir hat. Before we made our way home all athletes were afforded the opportunity to sit in a Garda Squad car, work the sirens and get photographs taken with the huge number of Gardai present.

Finally we were given a Garda escort back to our buses and headed home after a fantastic day which we will all remember and cherish for many years to come.

BANDSTAND IN TOWN PARK VANDALISED

A mindless vandalistic attack on the Bandstand in the Dungarvan Town Park, last week has been strongly condemned by Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan.

"The bandstand at the Town Park has been the subject of repeated acts of vandalism and as a Town Council and in conjunction with the Gardai we need to try and stamp out this behaviour," he told the Dungarvan Leader.

"These attacks are absolutely disgraceful and I strongly condemn those that commit such wanton acts of vandalism. I find it hard to believe that mindless individuals find it necessary to vandalise public property in this way."

Several of the ornate railings of the bandstand were forcibly removed in the latest incident. A similar incident happened last year, and again earlier this year.

In light of the vandalism, Cllr. Geoghegan called on the Gardai to be more forceful in the implementation of Town Bye-Laws, which forbid drinking alcohol on the street and in public places such as the park.

"Over the past couple of years the Town Park, and the neighbouring graveyard has been used as a 'hang-out' for groups and it's time that the law was enforced and a stop was put to this behaviour," he added.

"When people engage in this type of anti-social behaviour and criminal activity they are in fact attacking their own community

and I'm sure some of those responsible must be known and I would urge members of the public with any information that it be given to the Gardai."

Cullen Welcomes Grant To Assist With Recycling Costs

Minister Martin Cullen has welcomed funding totalling €51,200 for Waterford County Council to assist them with costs incurred in operating local recycling facilities.

Minister Cullen said the Minister for the Environment, John Gormley is providing the funding to cover specific operating costs incurred in recycling and material recovery for the six month period from July to December 2006.

"I am very conscious of the general costs incurred by our local authorities in providing recycling services for the community - costs for example of operating 'bring' banks and particularly the expense of dealing with different types of waste, including plastics," Minister Cullen said.

"Funding therefore which can assist local government with this important area of their work is very welcome," he added.

Pavement On New Street Needs To Be Looked At

A section of pavement needs to be fixed on New Street in Lismore after a woman suffered a bed fall due to a raised flagstone recently, according to Fine Gael councillor, Orla Russell.

Cllr. Russell said the flagstones are rising badly and she asked whether anything could be done about it.

It followed comments made by Fianna Fail councillor, Bernard Leddy who suggested high heels were behind a number of near accidents. He admitted at the November meeting that he'd "taken quite a bit of stick" over his comments, and said the issue of rising cobbles was a quite serious one. Town Manager, John O'Flynn said the problem was being caused by rainfall leeching beneath the cobbles and washing away the support.

VIEWPOINT

ANIMOSITY GROWS

It's becoming increasingly clear that Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield and Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair don't particularly see eye to eye at the moment. Politically rather than personally, at least.

Despite a growing sense of detente nationally between Ireland's two main left wing parties, who share similar ideological stances on a number of issues, culminating in the voting pact in the last Seanad elections, one of the most entertaining, and predictable, aspects of recent Dungarvan Town Council meetings, is a verbal flare up between the two.

So far, if Viewpoint was to use a boxing analogy, neither has, as yet, succeeded in landing a knockout blow, but both have landed a number of niggling punches all the same.

It's not hard to see where all this is coming from, both ideologically, and perhaps, of greater significance, in the context of the next local elections.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair is a former Democratic Left member, a party whose political progeny dates back to splits in the Workers Party, and before that Sinn Fein, when the republicans split into the Officials and Provisionals in the early 1970's.

Both wings literally detested one another.

Since that time, the Democrat Left became perhaps the most vocal of Sinn Fein's critics on the republic's political scene. And their sublimation into Labour ranks, has done little to cool views among some of the former DL members.

In this context, O Ceilleachair showed his colours when he suggested, prior to the Rugby World Cup, that 'Ireland's Song' was the proper anthem for a team representing the two traditions on the island.

But it's when considering O Ceilleachair's long and short-term political ambitions that one can see a royal dust up coming at some stage down the line - one in which the ballot box will finally show the definitive victor.

Both share the Gaeltacht as significant bases. But the Gaeltacht has only enough voting power to elect one member onto Waterford County Council.

Mansfield currently holds all the cards here.

He was elected after a strong showing in the last local elections, while O Ceilleachair's long term ambitions - he was being openly groomed as Brian O'Shea's successor by some in the national Labour party ranks - were virtually crushed by the loss of his county council seat.

But O Ceilleachair clearly believes he can dislodge Mansfield, and has been using his Udaras na Gaeltachta seat to muscle in on what Mansfield believes to be his territory, most recently with his announcement of a Government grant for the water supply in Ring which Mansfield took particular umbrage to.

It will be a tight battle certainly, and as the political animosity grows between the two it will be interesting to see who lands the most significant blows coming up to the next local elections.

Mobile Phone Allowance To Be Introduced

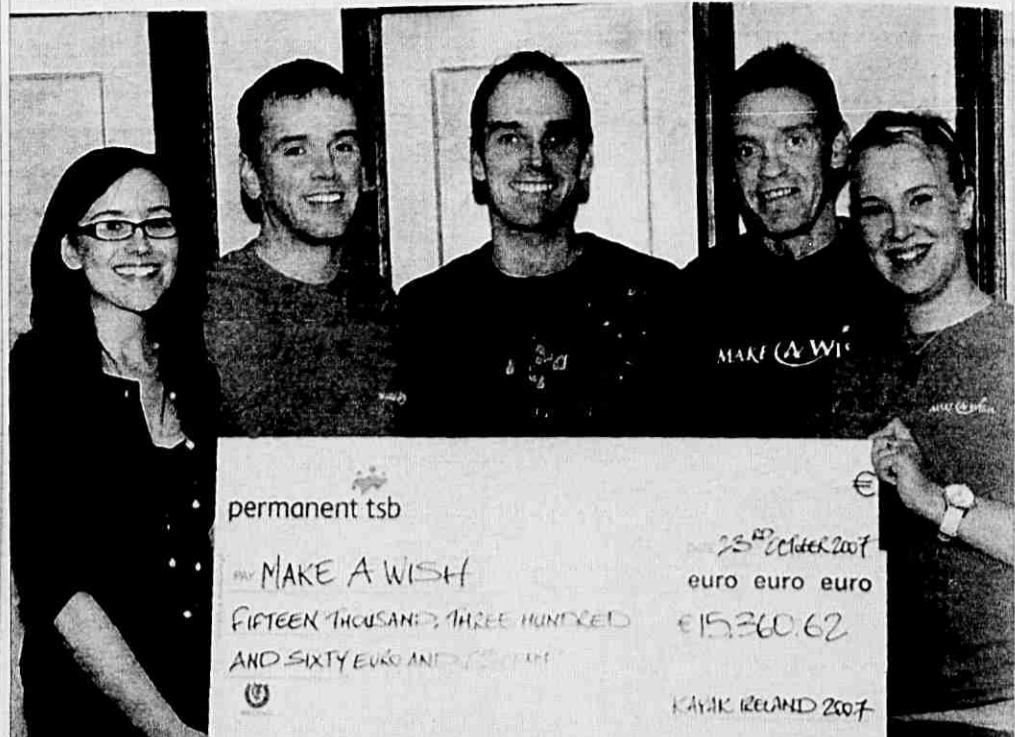

(Continued from front page) hurt. It's very easy for people to think that, by bringing in controls, you're being a killjoy, but if someone gets hurt, people won't be long turning around, and blaming the council for not taking control earlier," he said.

QUIETER YEAR

He said it was a relatively quieter year than others, and he gave credit to the council workers for gathering and taking away some of the materials before Halloween night.

"From an environmental point of view, burning tyres isn't a good thing to be happening. I know people want to have fun and there is an established tradition of bonfires in certain areas of the town, but I think common sense needs to prevail", he added.

There are three main areas in town for bonfires: the open

ground behind Childers Estate, on Gallows Hill, and on the tracks at Abbeyside.

He said: "If you look at the three areas, you could say that the only suitable area would be the area behind Childers Estate; at least it's some distance away from houses. The other two are in very close proximity to houses."

DEAL WITH ISSUE

"Going forward, the council are going to have to deal with it as an issue sooner or later. I know a lot of work went on in the background this year. It was a learning experience. It was probably left too late to do the work, but my position would be that there should be one controlled bonfire."

"At least then some of the materials being burned could be controlled as well, and there could be barriers put around it to keep people back because safety is my major concern."

"I'm not trying to stop anyone's fun or tradition but safety has to prevail. Nobody wants to see anyone getting seriously burnt or hurt or killed at one of these events", councillor Mansfield said.

TOWERING BONFIRES

In some instances, sparks from the towering bonfires were blown across estates, landing several streets away, and some residents complained of thick plumes of smoke seeping through windows and down chimneys into their homes.

Cllr. Mansfield said a common sense approach now needs to be taken.

"You need to deal with the stake holders - the communities and community groups in those areas, and deal with the people who have the tradition and who light the bonfires. There's also a lot of enjoyment with these bon-

fires, in one instance at one bonfire, there were close to 200 to 300 people having a look at it. Contrary to what other people might think there is a tradition of bonfires in the town, and as long as I was growing up, the area has had bonfires.

"But the overriding message as far as I'm concerned is that a common sense approach is needed in dealing with them", he said.

DISCUSSION

The matter is expected to again come before Dungarvan Town Council at its November meeting in a couple of weeks.

Strong Opposition To Controversial Kilbrien Development

Strong opposition has mounted against plans by local developer, Vogue Enterprises, to build a 39-house development in a scenic area near the Comeragh Mountains.

The developers plan eleven detached dormer houses, eight detached single storey houses, 20 semi-detached dormer houses, a septic tank with tertiary treatment in the form of a reed bed system with discharge to an adjoining borehole and all associated site works, complete with a new access roadway onto the Leamybrien Road at Kilbrien Lower, Ballinamult.

However, a number of community groups, residents and county councillors have expressed their opposition to the plans, and four public meetings have been held, with concern over the plans growing the area.

OPPOSITION

One of the councillors to oppose the plans, Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield said one his major concerns is with the proposal to use a Reed Bed system, which he believes is "untenable" given recent Teagasc and EPA reports.

"The visual amenity of Kilbrien will also be destroyed for future generations if this proposed development was given the go-ahead," he claimed in his submission. "Surely given the mountainous location of Kilbrien the area should fall within the remit of being vulnerable."

A service base is also limited, and proposal would essentially double the population of the area in a matter of months. "What happens then?" he questioned. "The nearest shop is located at an already dangerous junction on the main Dungarvan to Clonmel road. If the development went ahead and the owners/occupiers of the proposed houses had children where would they be schooled, where are the recreational facilities for them? The developer has failed to look at this with a long term vision."

ROAD INFRASTRUCTURE

He also believed adding 78 cars

to the existing road infrastructure would be "an accident waiting to happen" while he said the land is outside the zoned area of Kilbrien, and if granted permission it would set a precedent, contrary to the County Development Plan.

Labour councillor, Billy Kyne,

meanwhile, said he was at a loss to know how "a proposed development of this density came to even be considered in this scenic undeveloped location."

He said it "runs counter to accepted planning norms for the county and shouldn't be granted permission in any

circumstances."

Fianna Fail councillor, Tom Cronin said the development "contravenes the County Development Plan" while Fine Gael councillor, Mary Green said if permission were to be granted it would make a "mockery" of the whole Development Plan process.

COUNTY'S OVERALL EMPLOYMENT FIGURES GROWING

Over 10,000 More Employed In Last Four Years

Overall employment in County Waterford has grown by over 10,000 in the past four years, while the employment in IDA companies has increased by 529 in the same period, despite concerns that Dungarvan and the county is being left as an afterthought in the state agency's plans.

Fine Gael Deputy John Deasy received figures in the Dail recently that show Dungarvan has received only four site visits from the IDA since 2002, compared with 39 visits to Waterford city.

"This Government treats Dungarvan and the west of the county as an afterthought," he said. "They aren't promoting Dungarvan as a destination for industrial development."

However, responding to the Deputy Deasy's remarks, IDA chief executive Sean Dorgan said an individual town or city is too small to make a convincing case to an investor and instead they

need to present themselves as a region.

"Take Youghal and Dungarvan. They had concerns about losing investment and they are saying it's not coming into their town but that's not what the investor is thinking. They are thinking

where can I get business graduates and engineers.

"If you're only fighting the parish or the town fight and not the county fight then you're in danger of not succeeding against the city regions out there," he said.

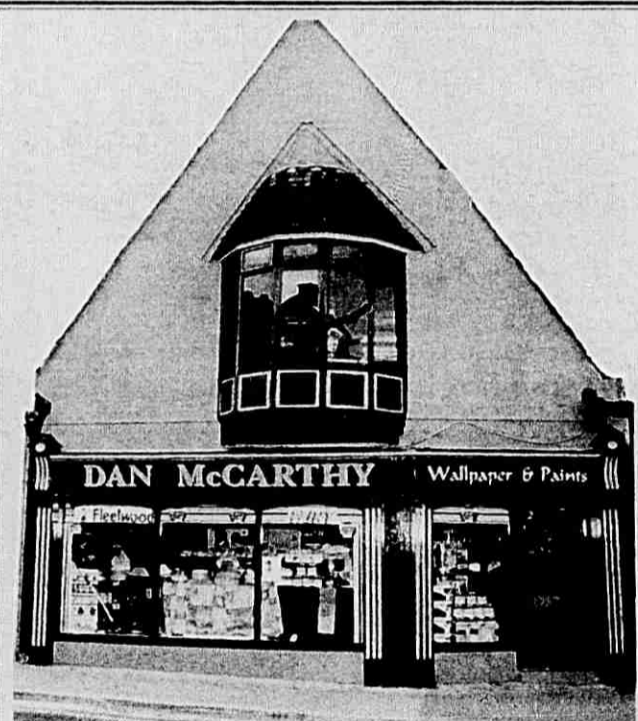
No Demand To See €26,000 Translated County Development Plan

Financially-pressed Waterford County Council spent €26,000 translating the County Development Plan into Irish, but so far there has been no demand to see it, according to reports.

And costs are set to rise substantially in the next few years as most county development and local area plans come up for renewal, bringing them for the first time under the remit of the Official Languages Act, which requires an Irish translation.

A Department of Community, Rural and Gaeltacht affairs spokeswoman said: "The act was brought in to give effect to the constitutional right of citizens to deal with public bodies through Irish. It's a matter of public service."

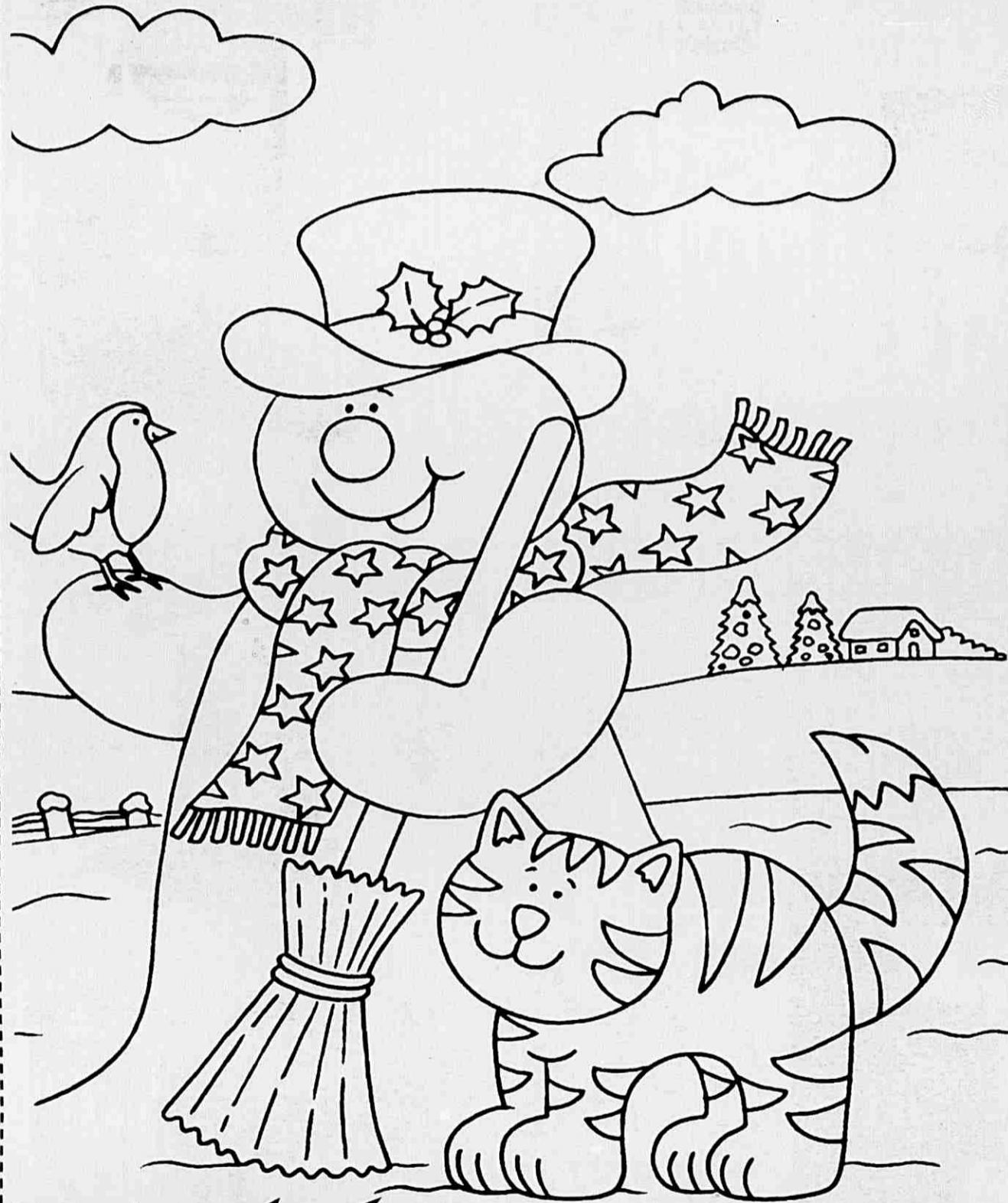

NOT ALL BIRDS CAN FLY

There are several birds that cannot fly even though they have wings. Flightless birds are descended from birds that flew. Many lived where there was no need for flight. Their wings got smaller and they lost the power to fly. There are now fewer flightless birds. They are easier to catch, so many have been hunted to extinction.

Relatives Of The Ostrich

The male rhea, the South American cousin of the ostrich, is very busy during the breeding season. First he hollows out a nest in the ground and lines it with grass, while fighting off other males for the territory. Then he courts several females to the nest and when the eggs are laid, perhaps as many as 20, it is the males job to look after them. There are two species of rhea. The common rhea is found in Brazil and the smaller, Darwin's rhea, lives in Argentina and the Andes.

The emu, the second largest bird in the world, stands about 1.5m (5ft) high and can weight up to 160kg (353lb). The adult emu is brown and blackish-brown but the chicks are grey with black strips. The female lays up to ten greenish eggs in a nest of trampled down grass, and these are incubated by the father. Closely related to the emu is the cassowary which lives in north-east Australia and New Guinea. The most distinctive thing about the cassowary is the large bony helmet, or casque, on its head. This helmet protects the bird's head as it runs, head downwards, through the forests and bush.

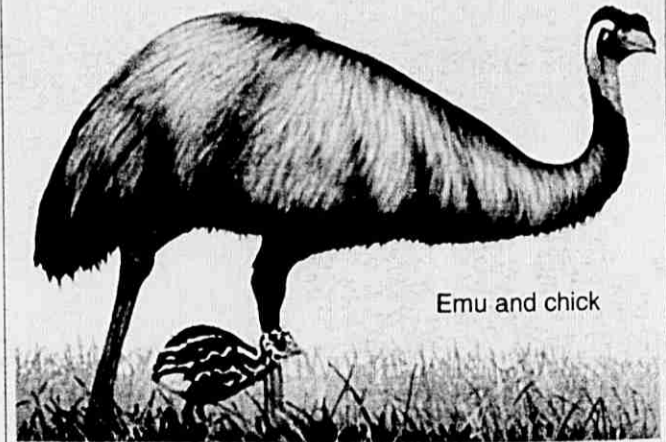
The Largest Flightless Bird

The known and largest flightless birds is the ostrich, which lives in Africa. It can grow to a height of 2.5m (8ft) and weights up to 155kg (345lb). It is the fastest living thing on two legs, being able to run at speeds of up to 65kph (40mph). The young chicks are almost as fast as their parents with a speed of some 50kph (30mph).

Emblem Of New Zealand
The kiwi of New Zealand is almost blind but has a good sense of smell. It has a long beak with sensitive nostrils at its tip - a feature found in no other species of bird. During the day it lives in an underground borrow and normally only comes out at night to hunt for worms, insects and berries. The Maori people named the kiwi after its shrill cry of "kee-wi, kee-wi".

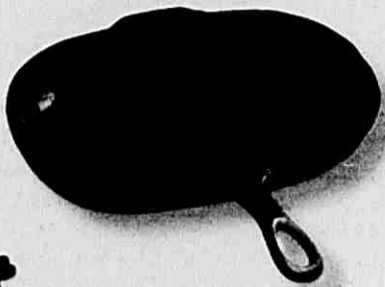
DID YOU KNOW?

Plaque Unveiled to Champion Weightlifter

One of Dungarvan's most successful sportspeople ever, was posthumously honoured in his home town of Dungarvan last week. A plaque to commemorate Sean Norris' eight senior National Weightlifting titles, his singing abilities and Feis successes, as well as his love of stage, was jointly unveiled on the frontage of Devereux Menswear in Mary Street by Sean's widow Mrs. Christeen Norris and the Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan.

Present were many of Sean's fourteen children, their spouses and grandchildren, together with people from the town who had known Sean in the past and had followed his highly successful career at the time.

In his dedication, Cllr. Geoghegan said that it is through the highly successful career of Sean Norris as an International Weightlifter with eight senior All Ireland titles to his credit, his further honours which he gained in his sport in later years as a veteran, as well as in his role as a singer and stage personality, that the public will remember him and that young people will get to know him.

"You," he told nearly fifty members of the assembled Norris family, together with their friends, "will have known him better as a husband, father, parent in law or grandchild and I know from speaking to you all, how much you loved, admired and revered him in both his family and public roles.

"You have every right to be proud," continued the Mayor, "because he, with your mother Christeen, discharged their parental duties above and beyond what might normally be expected, at a time when rearing a sizeable family was not easy. Perhaps they even felt that they would like to have done more in a better economic climate, but their fine

record is there for all to see."

"Sean Norris the sportsman won many victories in the sporting arena," he said, "and Christeen as a loyal and loving wife and partner, and you, his children who were around to see it, shared some of that pride and glory. We celebrate today Sean Norris's public performances and his many sporting victories and stage triumphs. However, you and he and your mother Christeen, will know that his real and most lasting achievements, his finest victories, his proudest record, stand here in this room in the form of a family who have come from Britain, France, the USA and places in Ireland to be here on a historic family day.

"You have come to honour and remember not just Sean Norris the Sportsman, but Sean Norris the strong, upstanding, righteous family man whom you have known and loved. Through you, more than the plaque we have unveiled today, Sean Norris will be remembered."

In reply, Sean and Christeen's son, David thanked the Mayor and the members of the Council for the honour which had been accorded his father and to the staff of the Council for 'the hard work and enthusiasm which they had brought to the project'. "You have all gone beyond our expectations and hopes and we thank you for it," he said.

"Dad would be so proud today," he continued, not just for the recognition, but that it's happening in the presence of the people he loved most, in the place he loved best. For Dad, there was no more special place than Dungarvan. It paved the path for so many of his successes in weightlifting and so much else.

He said that despite his years spent away from the town, Dungarvan was always his home, and he sought out every chance to keep in touch.

"I never actually saw dad lift weights," he said, "so I never knew Sean Norris the weightlifter. They say that sport doesn't build character, it reveals it and I do recognise the character revealed by his weightlifting. It is about the qualities and the character involved in taking the script you've been given - and having the strength and the faith to rewrite it."

Paying tribute to his mother, David said that it was only right to acknowledge that Sean didn't do it alone - he had help in the person of his mother Christeen, the 17-year old barmaid in old Dolan's pub whom he met and married and with whom he had so many happy and fruitful years. Today's unveiling is so perfect, because it completes his journey

and brings him back home for good.

"So Dad," he concluded, "if you're listening, I'd say 'Take a good look at what you've achieved, congratulations; and Welcome Home!'"

Among the happy gathering were some of Sean's old friends from Dungarvan as well as some of those involved in the

Weightlifting Club.

This is the second commemorative plaque to be erected in Mary Street, as songwriter and poet Mai O'Higgins, who recently returned to live in Dungarvan, had a plaque erected to commemorate her achievements in poetry and song some years ago. Mai wrote the town's anthem "Dungarvan My Hometown".

Town Council Should Have Role In Appointing Town Clerk

Fine Gael councillor, John Heneghan gave his public backing to a recommendation contained in an AMAI paper, calling for the Town Council to have a role in appointing a Town Clerk.

Cllr. Heneghan said if an appointment of a Town Clerk was left solely to the County Council without input from the Town Council, someone without knowledge and awareness of the town may be appointed.

"This recommendation, I feel, is a very worthy one", he added while acknowledging that such a situation is a "long way down the road" in Lismore. The AMAI paper also contained interesting figures on the Town Boundary situation, his colleague, Cllr. Orla Russell said.

A recent proposal has come before the council to extend the town boundary in Lismore, and Cllr. Russell said the figures in the paper show give credence to the argument by showing how town council areas have grown in recent years.

She said the town council should be serving the wider area, and councillors often receive complaints from people who are living outside the boundary area but they can't raise these issues at a town council meeting. The paper also revealed Ireland is the third least democratic country in Europe in terms of representation, according to Cllr. Heneghan.

He said the figures show there are 36,000 people to every local councillor in Ireland, while this ratio is 1,119 to one councillor in France. He said this clearly shows that more councillors are needed to represent growing urban centres in some parts of the country.

Gerry Adams To Visit Easons In Dungarvan

Gerry Adams, the iconic leader of the republican movement and President of Sinn Fein, is to visit Easons in Dungarvan as part of a nationwide tour to promote his book, 'An Irish Eye'.

Published by Brandon Books, the book covers recent years which has seen many momentous events, from the IRA decision in 2005 to formally end its armed campaign and to put arms beyond use to the Sinn Fein decision in January 2007 to support the policing and justice system, changes which were unparalleled.

In 'An Irish Eye' Gerry Adams brings his own perspective to bear on these developments, and gives the reader an unrivalled insight into pivotal moments in Irish history.

The humble Spud

The potato was first planted in this country in the 16th century by Sir Walter Raleigh, and quickly became the nation's staple food. But there is more to the humble potato than many people realise.

When cooked in its skin, particularly baked or steamed, the potato is very nutritious, easily digested, and provides a good source of energy. It is rich in important minerals and contains numerous vitamins, particularly vitamin B complex and vitamin C.

Contrary to popular belief, potatoes are an excellent choice of food for anyone trying to lose weight. They are very low in fat and contain complex carbohydrates which release their energy slowly into the bloodstream. Unlike refined sugars, carbohydrates which are released slowly are less likely to be converted to fat. They assist in keeping blood sugar levels stable, which maintains energy levels and helps to prevent sugar cravings. Of course this does not apply to potatoes which are fried or smothered in butter! For maximum health benefits, potatoes should be steamed in their skins and lightly drizzled with olive oil, or baked and filled with tuna or natural yoghurt and chives.

The potato has been used as a folk medicine for generations. The juice of raw potato contains anti-inflammatory and antioxidant properties which are useful for all sort of health problems.

When taken internally, raw potato juice helps to soothe and heal the mucous membranes of the digestive system. This is useful for conditions such as excess acidity, gastritis and peptic ulcers. For external problems such as wounds, burns, ulcers, dermatitis and infections of the skin, a grated raw potato can be used as a poultice. Slices of raw potato can also provide soothing relief from headaches and migraines when applied to the temples.

Though the potato is a very safe and nutritious food, the green parts of the plant are poisonous and should not be eaten. The same toxic substances are found in the potato itself when it has turned green. Potatoes, along with other plants of the Solonaceae family such as tomatoes, peppers and aubergines, are also best avoided by people who suffer from certain types of arthritis as they can exacerbate joint inflammation in some cases.

Record 'Leap of Faith' For Mental Health

JOINT OWNERSHIP MORTGAGES

Not everyone can afford to buy a property on their own, or may have a partner or spouse with which to share the cost. Instead, they may have a likeminded sibling(s) or friends who are also keen to exchange their rent book for an affordable home of their own. The cost of a €1,610 monthly mortgage repayment (i.e. a €300k loan over 30 years) split four ways is eminently more 'doable' than one person having to make that payment, and lenders are perfectly happy to extend homeloans to joint buyers.

However, the key to successful joint application is a clear exit strategy if one of the buyers decides, of is forced (through illness or redundancy) to liquidate their share. A good solicitor can draw up a contract that will be acceptable to lenders and buyers and satisfy everyone's need for total transparency. It is also very important that joint owners draw up a Will, naming whoever it is that inherits their share of the property. Death-in-situ will need to be addressed, just as redundancy, illness, emigration, marriage has been.

Paul, Amy and Mark are a brother, sister and best friend who are all in their mid 20's and have been sharing an apartment successfully since they commenced college together. Their rent is now €1,400 a month plus contents insurance of €40 per month which they split three ways. The three each have €20,000 in savings/inheritance and the €60,000 is more than sufficient for a down-payment on a €300k apartment plus the cost of legal and other fees and some furniture. As first time buyers there is no Stamp Duty on the property. Their now 270,000 mortgage costs €1,610 per month over 30 years or €537 each' the annual management fee of €1,500 a year costs them 42 each per month; mortgage protection and contents insurance now costs each of them a total monthly outlay of €40.

Paul, Amy and Mark agreed that if any of the partners become redundant or ill, with no reasonable chance of re-employment within six months of if anyone marries, or emigrates, the other two will be obliged to buy out their share at market value. If that cannot be agreed, the property will be put up for sale. They have each written will with Paul and Amy leaving their shares to each other. Mark wants to leave his share to his parents, but with the proviso that it is then offered for sale at market value to the other two. Their solicitor must now examine this agreement and if it is in order, submit it to the lender.

No one expects the siblings and their friends to live together forever, but if they keep the apartment for the required five years to qualify for Stamp Duty exemption and the property grows in line with inflation, they could expect to walk away with about €27,000 profit each on their original investment of €10,000.

Nemeton Television Nominated For Prestigious Industry Award

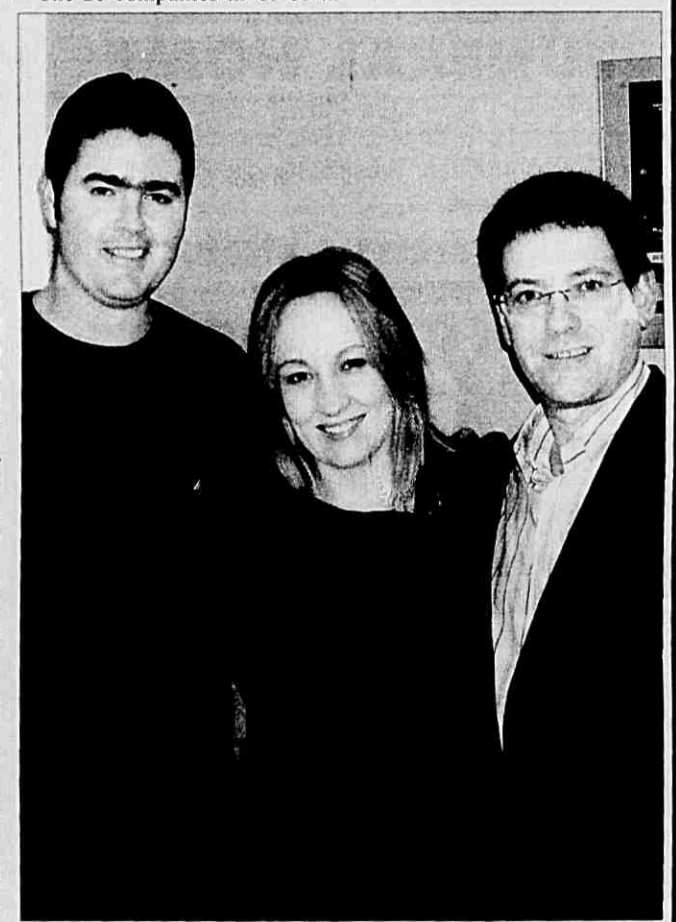

Even though George Tutty reached the ripe age of 87 years, such an achievement only served to intensify the enormous grief of his family and friends. Great comfort was provided to his wife Maude and family by the overwhelming display of support, condolences, callers, Mass cards, sympathy cards, phone calls and the enormous attendance at the interment Mass which provided testimony to his popularity and the esteem in which he was held. George was predeceased by his sisters Nonie, Biddy, Nellie and his brothers John and Robbie whom he loved very dearly and always described as "great friends".

George Tutty was from an old, well established and much respected family in Dungarvan. He enjoyed the respect of his entire family and community. He very much treasured values such as honesty, togetherness, family support, a very strong work ethic and pride in achievement from hard work. Much of these values were passed on from his loving parents Stephen and Ellie Tutty who have long since departed and whom he loved dearly. In his early days George worked for a considerable period of time at the Dungarvan Tannery followed by many years working in the UK. He also loved courting and fishing and in his later years very much enjoyed watching boxing, snooker and being taken around the town by car and in his wheelchair. He loved time spent in conversation with his family and friends. He especially treasured old friends from his early days. He was genuinely liked and admired by all those who made his acquaintance recently and over the years. He always had the best, most interesting and descriptive

recollections in conversation about times past.

On Wednesday October 10th his remains were removed from St Josephs Hospital to Droghans Funeral Home where his body reposed until Saturday October 13th. Rosary was said each night for the family by Sister Therese from Mercy Convent. At 18:15 on Saturday October 13th the body of George Tutty was returned to St Josephs Hospital where a large gathering of family and other mourners escorted the hearse back to Droghans Funeral Home. The hearse was led by his grandchildren and a guard of honour around the hearse was provided by all of his daughters, daughter-in-law and granddaughter. The hearse was immediately followed by his wife, sons, sisters and the funeral procession was kept in mindfull thought by his brother. Along the route the family sang the hymns which George enjoyed most of all and a lone piper led the crowd from outside 14 Mitchell Terrace to Droghans Funeral Home. Rosary was said by Father Cooney at Droghans Funeral Home and the body removed to St Mary's Parish Church at 20:15 on Saturday where it was received by Father O'Connor, Father Cooney and Father O'Donnell OSA. 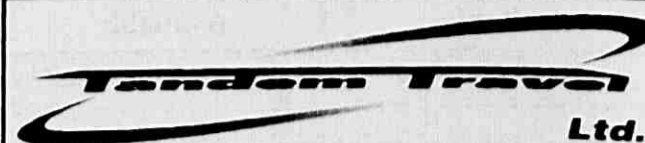

Latest House Price Figures Prove It's A Good Time To Be House Hunting In Waterford

New figures show that house prices fell again last month and are down 3.6% since the start of this year.

The house price index compiled by Permanent TSB and the ESRI shows that the average price paid for a house in September was €299,483, down 0.3% compared with August. Over 12 months, prices have fallen by 2.8% - more than €8,500.

The figures confirmed the trend of a 'modest decline' in the property market. There were some inconsistencies, with a slight increase in three-bedroom semi-detached houses and no change in the price of new homes.

A breakdown showed that house prices in Dublin fell by 1.2% in September, while prices elsewhere rose by 0.1%. Dublin prices are down more than 5% this year. Prices in the commuter counties around Dublin picked up slightly by 0.1%, though they are still down 5.3% in 2007.

Prices for first-time buyers dropped by 1.6%, while for second-time buyers the fall was 0.3%. New house prices were unchanged, but prices for existing houses fell sharply, by 2.2%.

Locally in the Waterford market, Brian Byrne of Emerald Financial suggests "We have seen cases where properties locally for sale three months ago that have recently sale agreed for prices of between €5,000 and €10,000 below the original asking price, this would however be in isolated cases, overall the changes in property prices has been very minimal since January 2007"

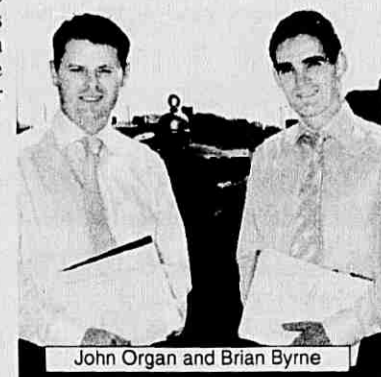

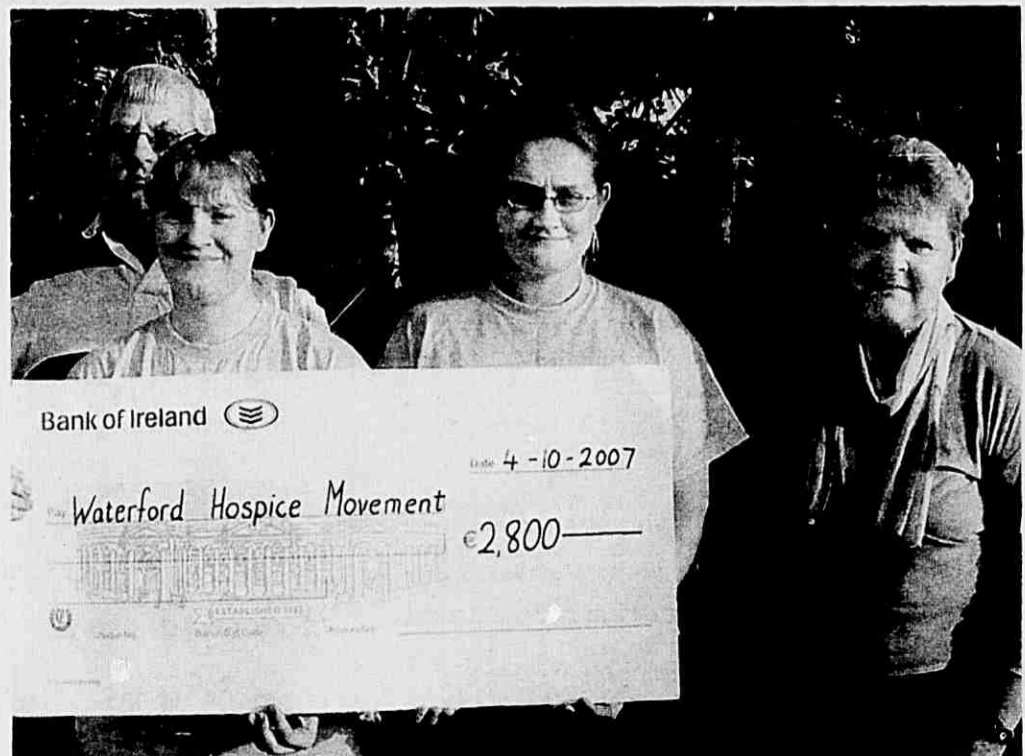

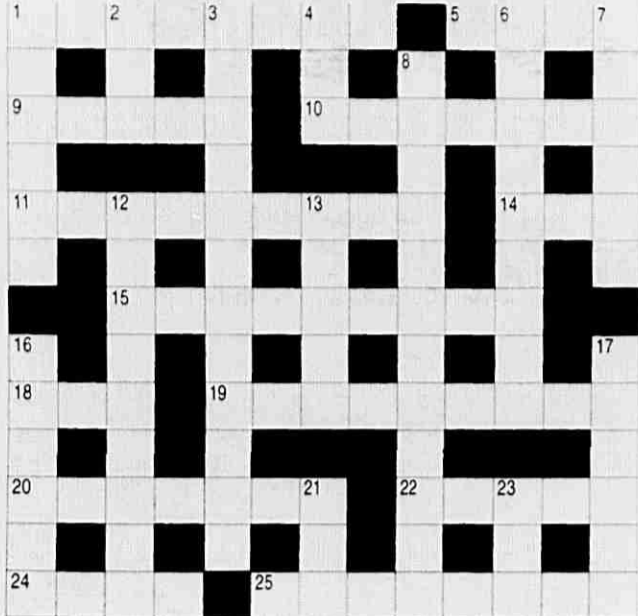

- 8 The window boxes at Thatched Cottage, Ballyrafter will be planted during the coming week.

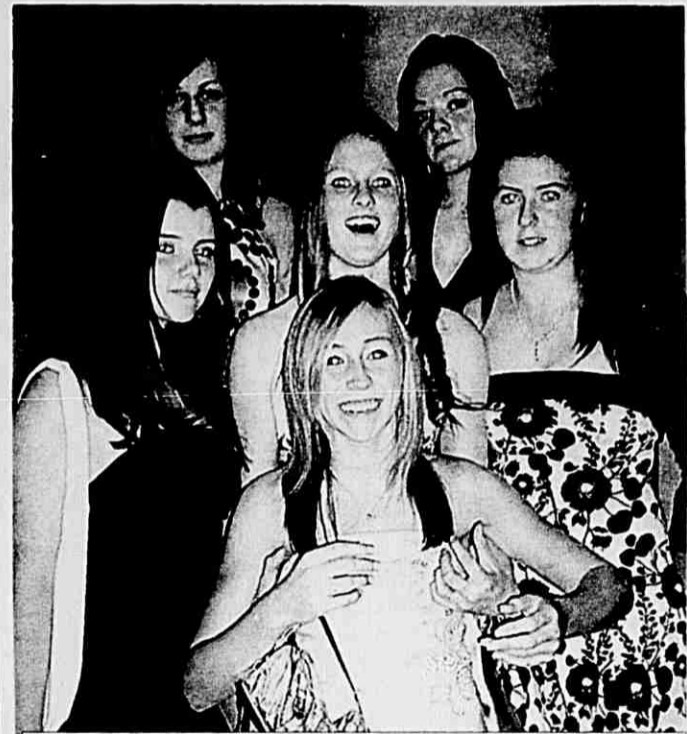

Waterford county councillors were provided with laptops to conduct their affairs a number of years ago, but the capital cost for Lismore may be unfeasible.

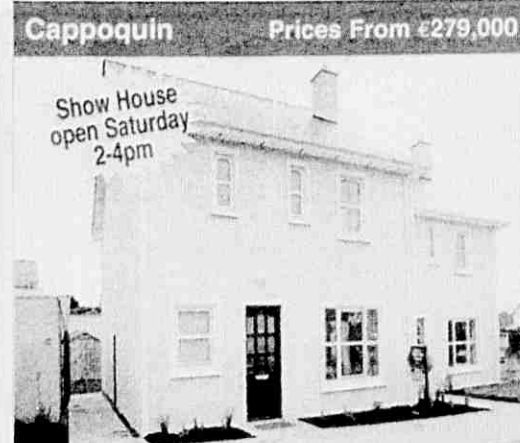
The idea was mooted by Labour councillor, Jan Rotte who said Lismore is one of the few local authorities in the country whose councillors weren't able to use this facility.

Well after last weeks player profile I was inundated with requests for player's profiles from the 70's and 80's. After careful consideration I picked one from the late 70's early 80's and another defender. This week's featured player is my opposite number in the GAA Club Liam Mulcahy.

Liam (Mull) Mulcahy Brideview Utd (1975-81) Appearances 89 Goals 1

Brideview was only three years old when the young (Mull) made his debut at the age of eighteen. In the last game of the 74/75 season Brideview were away to Grange and Liam came on as a substitute for the late Florence Singleton (RIP) in a game which Brideview lost 3-2 with Jan Plante and Donie O'Brien the scorers on the day. The 75/76 season saw his first full season for United playing eleven of nineteen games and scoring his one and only goal for the club. That goal came in a game away to Dungourney in which Brideview won 3-1 despite being reduced to ten men when Len Fraser had been sent off. A strong defender and good in the air Liam forged a strong centre half pairing with Pascal Pescod for four seasons whilst playing a full season alongside Don Henley with some games at right back also. Seven seasons saw him play eighty nine times for Brideview at a time when you were lucky to reach the high teens in a season. The period wasn't a very fruitful time for the Tallow side having just lost the County Cup to Crosshaven in 75 on a 4-1 scoreline having being down 1-0 at halftime. No honours were picked up during that time but the 76/77 season we saw very good performances from United scoring 94 goals with strike partnership Jan Plante and Mickey Curley scoring 49 between them with Jan scoring 33 of those. Lisavard were at the end of an 11-1 drubbing by the Tallow side on March 6 1977 and a few months earlier they had beat Carrigaline 9-1. Mull hung up his boots early when he left Tallow for greener pastures and his last game in the maroon of Brideview was in the Saxone Cup on the first of May 1981. As Liam was leaving Tallow, Paul McCartney was leaving Wings and Bucks Fizz were number one with Making Your Mind Up after winning the Eurovision in Dublin. 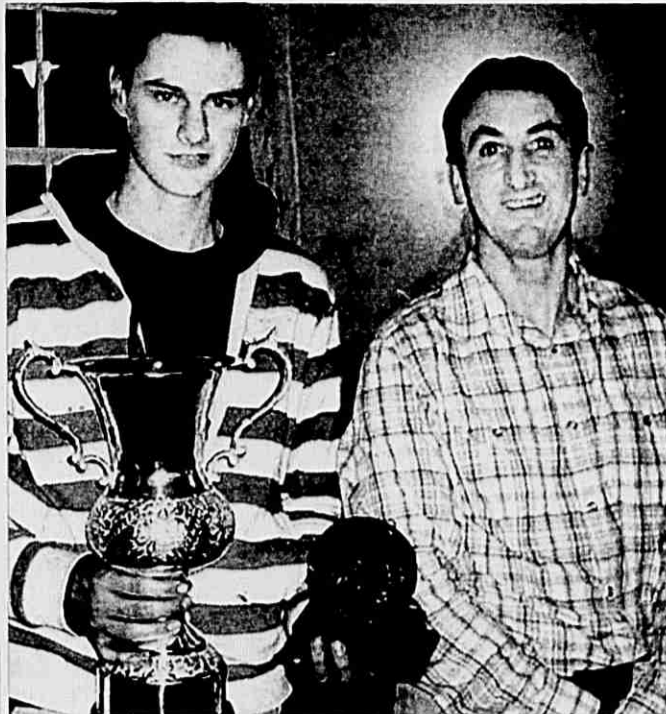

A very enjoyable night of Halloween for primary school pupils was held on Thursday night October 18th in the school with almost 70 teams taking part.

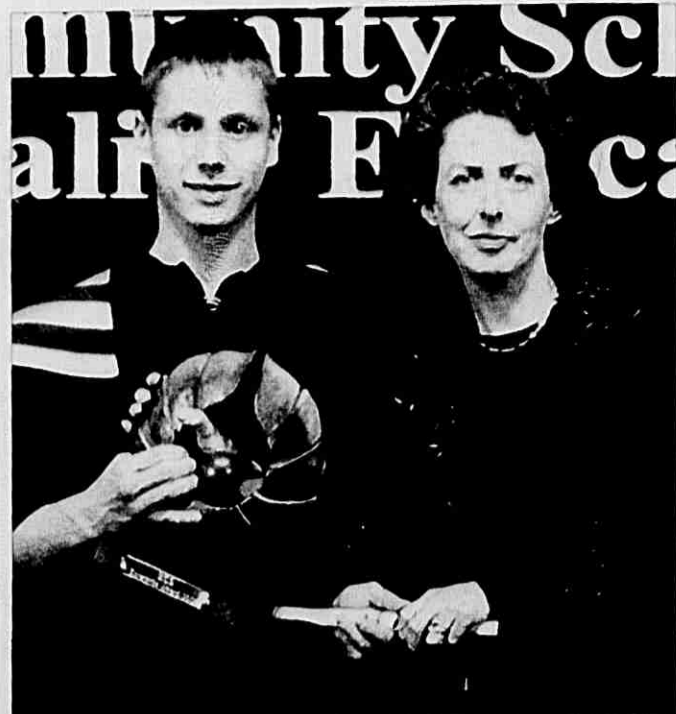

Impressive Display By Cash For Class

The opening four bender was declared void after the traps opened way after the hare at shot past the starting point.

In the second contest the James Moore owned Minglers Vieri (Droopys Vieri-Minglers Return) 5/2 raced up with the pace throughout and grabbing a second bend lead from the early paced Emmas Angel Minglers Vieri gradually broke free of the pack to run out a cosy five and a half lengths winner over Lobnamna Pearl. Time 29.12.

The third event was run off over the 500-yard trip and it produced a clear-cut winner in the shape of 2/1 chance Mall Lane. Breaking smartly from rap two Gas Cooker held the early call over Ima Cooper Cool before proving three lengths to fast for a running on Marwood County.

In the fifth contest Distant Kline and Ballymacaw Tom attracted plenty of market support with both closing as 6/4 joint favourites. While both entries came away smartly it was Distant Kline who won the early battle for outright supremacy to forge clear of Ballymacaw Tom down the backstretch. It was all Distant Kline from that point on and Julie Power's charge encountered little difficulty in dishing out a five and a half lengths beating to a staying on Ballymacaw Tom. Time 29.15.

County Wexford trainer Davy Morris was on the mark in race six courtesy of the Oulart Racing Boys Syndicate owned Oulart Boy this son of Borna Pilot and Floyds Staff covering the standard trip in 29.00. Led to near the third bend by War General a strong running Oulart Boy 7/4 went to the front at that stage and when the always prominent Swan Lodge cannoned into the back of War General Oulart Boy was left in the clear to beat Butter Milk Lane by six and a half lengths.

The previously unraced Fernando Storm was despatched as the 4/6 hot pot in a 300-yard sprint but he could never get to grips with the fast starting 5/2 shot Hunts Snapper. Owned by Donal Hunt Hunts Snapper (Droopys Scholes-Hunts Margaret) adapted successful front running tactics from trap six to upset a gamble on the runner up Fernando Storm who tasted defeat by three quarters of a length in 16.41.

Trap six also housed the winner of the eight event with the Pamela Holt owned Peggy Gadget (Top Honcho-Go Ahead Ivy) posting back to back victories in 29.19. A wet blanket covered Crokers Dragon, Cactus Vieri and Peggy Gadget throughout but in a mad dash for the winning line Peggy Gadget emerged victorious by a head over Crokers Dragon.

Racing concluded with a 550 yard contest and it threw up a trap to line winner in the shape of the Doubting Thomas Syndicate owned and Nick Turner trained Swan Sung Hero who made every yard of the running to win out in a lively 29.88. One must pay special tribute to the National Hunt jockeys who rode in Down Royal in the afternoon and then headed on the long trek down to Waterford to show their support for this fund raising affair.

The action on the track was also top class with the semi finals of the 2007 Gain Waterford Masters topping the bill.

In the first semi final Paddy Power Irish Derby finalist So Determined (Larkhill Jo-Have It On) 4/1 made short work of the opposition powering to a trap to line 29.43 success. With Workshop Lad bumping Express Comet on the run up the Dennis O'Connell owned and Gerry Holian trained So Determined quickly asserted from Standin Me and Si Senior. The latter rode a first bend bump to go in hot pursuit of So Determined down the back stretch but knuckling down to the task the well named So Determined kept on stoutly to score by one and a half lengths from Si Senior with Express Comet staying on into third.

Recent Cashman Laurels winner Catunda Harry (Elite State-Your So Vain) was sent off the red-hot 4/6 favourite in the second qualifier and Owen McKenna's charge did not disappoint doing the business for Ascot based owner Larry O'Rourke. Bounding up the middle of the circuit Catunda Harry led around the first turn from Ballyard Carl and while the latter ran out of his skin he could not peg back Catunda Harry who went on to land the spoils by two lengths with the always prominent Click Click also qualifying for the final on Saturday night next.

Overcoming a near six months layoff after picking up some serious injuries John Spracklin's Moreton Magna (Top Honcho-Dysert Diva) showed that she was far from rusty in the opening four bender this 3/1 chance winning out in 29.03. Winnies Top cut an early dash from trap four but relishing her rails draw Moreton Magna began her challenge on the run to the third bend. Scraping past off the rails Moreton Magna was soon at the head of affairs and lengthening her stride Moreton Magna went on to defeat the always-prominent Bettys Duke by two and a half lengths.

The Pauline Corcoran owned and Phil Gough trained Tinrah Kewell (Droopys Kewell-Making Merry) 4/7 justified her position at the head of the market in the second race over 550 yards this well bred lady leading all the way from trap two in 30.11. The opposition only ever had a rear view of a slick breaking Tinrah Kewell and while Tomas Lady stayed on well at the finish Tinrah Kewell won a shade cosily by three and a half lengths.

Races three and four were semi finals of the Nicholas Kervick Memorial A2 event. The punters waded into Giglis Puzzle in the first semi final but after a bright start his effort petered out along the back stretch. By that stage George Roche's fast starting and early paced Hewillyeah (Spiral Nikita-Betfivemillion) 3/1 was well on

his way to win number ten and relishing his front running role Hewillyeah drove on to account for Threads Of Gold by three lengths in a best ever 28.69.

The second semi final produced a great buckle between Captain Slow 5/2 and Deans Pride 4/1. Captain Slow was in front to the back stretch where Deans Pride edged to the front running down to the third bend. With Deans Pride coming a tad wide into the home stretch a determined Captain Slow (Droopys Scholes-Pearls Lotto) renewed his challenge and staying on strongly Captain Slow finished with a rattle to get back up for a length win over Deans Pride in 28.70. Perry Aylward trains this versatile winner for the Ard No Greine Rockers Syndicate.

A six-bend marathon was a race of changing fortunes. The early leader Willies Prince lost his position between the opening two bends and Parisienne Way quickly forged clear of Sparta Maggie. After a slow start the Tom Walsh owned Bettys Rebel (Moyné Rebel-Regal Honey) 3/1 gave himself plenty to do but coming with a sustained run Bettys Rebel weaved his way through the pack to come through in the home stretch for a clear cut five lengths victory over Sparta Maggie. The winner is now unbeaten in three marathon outings and his winning time on Saturday night was 40.65.

Recent McCalmont Cup runner up Manser (Paulo Coelho-Tory Hill Daisy) went one better in the sixth contest this 6/4 chance showing plenty of early dash en route to a 28.70 success. Trainer Ger Manson gained some compensation for the earlier defeat of Giglis Puzzle when sending out his recent recruit Yahoo Commander (Velvet Commander-Countrywide Joe) to a comprehensive 28.51 victory in the eight event. Getting the better of the early paced Show Million Yahoo Commander running for Portlaw owner Ruth Dwyer gradually put daylight between himself and Show Million before accounting for that same opponent by three lengths.

CARTIER AWARDS UPDATE

Dylan Thomas confirmed himself the outstanding older racehorse in training in Europe with a dramatic victory in the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe at Longchamp on October 7, which took his points total to 228 in the race to be crowned Cartier Horse of the Year as well as champion Cartier Older Horse. The Aidan O'Brien-trained four-year-old, who has also captured the King George VI & Queen Elizabeth Stakes and the Irish Champion Stakes during a remarkable season, was unable however to stretch his lead over Manduro (136) and Ramonti (128) when he finished out of the frame in the Breeders' Cup Turf at Monmouth Park recently.

New Approach (88) followed in the hoof-prints of stable companion Teofilo when extending his unbeaten run to five in the Darley Dewhurst Stakes on Champions' Day at Newmarket on October 20. Jim Bolger's stable star is now 20 points ahead of Godolphin's Rio De La Plata (68) in the fight for the Cartier Two-

Year-Old Colt award.

It is tight between the Jim Bolger-trained Saoirse Abu (76) and Natagora (72), with French-based Pascal Bary, for the Cartier Two-Year-Old Filly category.

Victory in the Epsom Derby and the Juddmonte International has helped Authorized (112) establish a 23-point lead over French Derby hero Lawman (89) in the battle for Cartier Three-Year-Old Colt honours, while Peeping Fawn (142) is in pole position to capture the Cartier Three-Year-Old Filly award after her amazing campaign which has yielded four wins at the highest level.

Yeats (80), who captured the Gold Cup at Ascot for the second year running this season, is ahead of Le Miracle (54) in the Cartier Stayer category, while Marchand D'Or (68), trained by Freddie Head, leads Red Clubs (56) in the Cartier Sprinter division.

NORTH WEST MATERS DETAILS

The exciting Northwest Racing Masters, at Haydock Park and Aintree, offers two of the very best jump racing days of the year. Haydock Park takes centre stage on Saturday, November 24, when the highlight is the £200,000 Grade One Betfair Chase. Last year the Betfair Chase was won most impressively by Kauto Star, the horse of the season, who went on to collect the £1-million bonus offered by Betfair by landing the Stan James King George VI Chase at Kempton Park (or the Lexus Chase at Leopardstown) and the totesport Gold Cup at Cheltenham after his Haydock Park success. Kauto Star was six from six last season and is being aimed at the Betfair Chase again.

Don't lose faith with Ruby's Star



With Jamie Spencer and Seb Sanders inches apart in the race for the jockey's championship, the British flat season comes to an end on Saturday. The curtain call is a final reminder – in case we were in hibernation – that the National Hunt season is well under way complete with new challenges.

The Racing Post newspaper began a competition in the 1990s which challenged readers to choose ten 'horses to follow' for the season, assigned varying levels of points for different races depending on their rank and value, and offered cash sums for the winners. Not surprisingly, it was like a red rag to a bull. Racing fans lapped it up, and now the competition boasts a prize-fund of over stg£1million.

It'd be nice to share in that bounty, so the Final Furlong will endeavour to pick ten horses over the next two weeks that can make a splash over the jumps this season.

So what might we need to patch together a team capable of winning the competition? Traditionalists that we are, we'd love to win it with a core of five horses that include a Gold Cup winner, a Champion Hurdler, a classy two-mile chaser, a staying hurdler and a points-scoring novice chaser.

The jury is still out over Kauto Star's comeback in the Old Roan Chase at Aintree late last month. There was nothing wrong with the way he battled all the way to the line with Monet's Garden, a classy horse who he was giving all of a stone away to. What niggles is the poor manner in which Ruby Walsh's mount travelled through the mid-part of the race. Trainer Paul Nicholls is sure that he will come on plenty for that run, and he's one of the more straightforward trainers on the scene. Whether or not you think Kauto will retain his Gold Cup crown – and stable mate Denman leads a cast of serious challengers – he must top the list for our Ten to Follow. Unlike other would-be champions, Kauto will be busy enough this season to rack up the points. The Betfair Chase comes next, then the King George, one more warm-up after Christmas and then the Gold Cup. As the best we've seen for a while, his versatility and engine makes him so difficult to beat and, though far from original, he has to be our banker.

Of all Cheltenham's championship crowns, the one that seems most open this winter is the Champion Hurdle. Sublimity

came from nowhere last year to scoot up, but John Carr's classy gelding was quirky enough on the Flat for Michael Stoute and wouldn't be one to push too many chips on ante-post. So it may be no harm having a look elsewhere and I've a feeling that Blythe Knight could develop into a Champion Hurdle contender and end Ireland's dominance in the event. He looked real classy when winning the best novice at Aintree last year and John Quinn has aimed him at the Fighting Fifth and Christmas Hurdles, which will give him every chance of racking up some points.

Horses that build up big scores in the Ten to Follow competition have a terrible record the following year. Burn out and injury are reasons put forward why this may be the case. But Martin Brassil can find a way to nurse his top chaser Nickname through another busy – and hugely successful – season. Last year he won six times from seven races, a Grade 1, four Grade 2s and a Grade 3. On winter ground, over anything from two miles to two and a half, he looks top of the food chain.

Wichita Lineman is our nomination for the staying hurdle ranks. A half-brother to the supremely talented Rhinestone Cowboy, this fellow has less class but considerably more guts. He was a brave winner of the three-mile Brit Insurance Novices Hurdle at Cheltenham last year, after earlier defeating the talented Tidal Bay at Prestbury Park in January. With stable mate Black Jack Ketchum too quirky to bank on, this fellow could be the one to take a grip of the staying hurdle division.

Last season's hype horse Aran Concerto will have many opponents this season after flopping at Cheltenham in March. He went to post a well-backed 5/2 favourite for the two-mile five novice hurdle but never got into a jumping rhythm, stumbled four out and made another mistake at the last to be beaten 10 and a half lengths into fifth. But it is far too early to write him off, and he can pick up plenty of points this season as a novice chaser.

Next week we'll complete our ten to follow list, give you some dark horses to follow for the new season, and endeavour to find the winner of the jump season's first big handicap, the Paddy Power Chase at Cheltenham!

It is difficult to imagine that after being relegated three years ago and having bounced back to win the County Intermediate Hurling Final in 2005 that they came back this year to remain the only unbeaten team in the twelve club championship and win their third County title.

Ballyduff came to Walsh Park as outsiders in a game that the pundits had expressed confidence in Ballygunner to take their eleventh championship but obviously every one who put Ballyduff as the challengers had underestimated the quality and standard of hurling that

they were capable of producing.

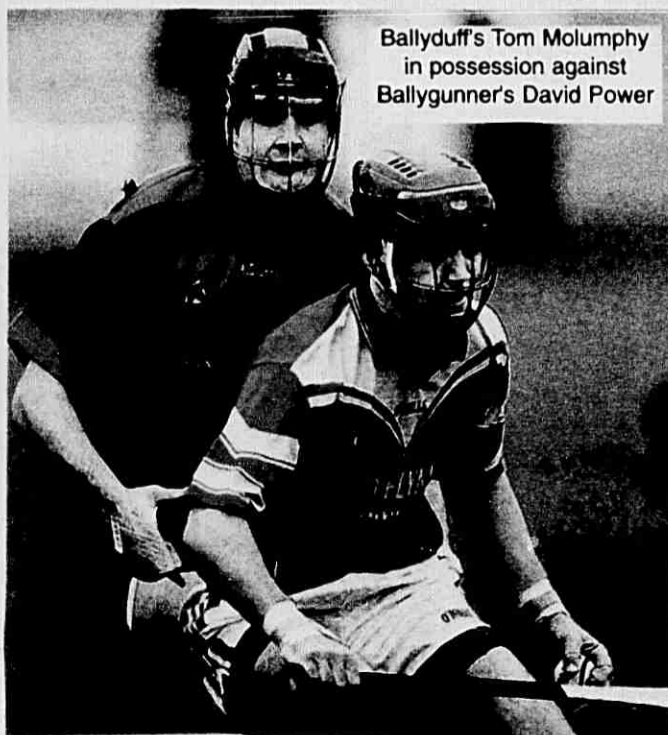
Three weeks ago when Ballygunner scored a four goal victory over the reigning county champions Mount Sion I wrote that there was something freakish about this result and that it invested Ballygunner with a profile that was something way beyond their standards. In the light of what happened on Sunday this assessment might have been right when Ballyduff proved that the city team were that little bit over rated.

The team work of Ballyduff was outstanding and they took the game to Ballygunner from the moment of the throw in and gave notice that they were fiercely determined to bring the Cup back to the village in the

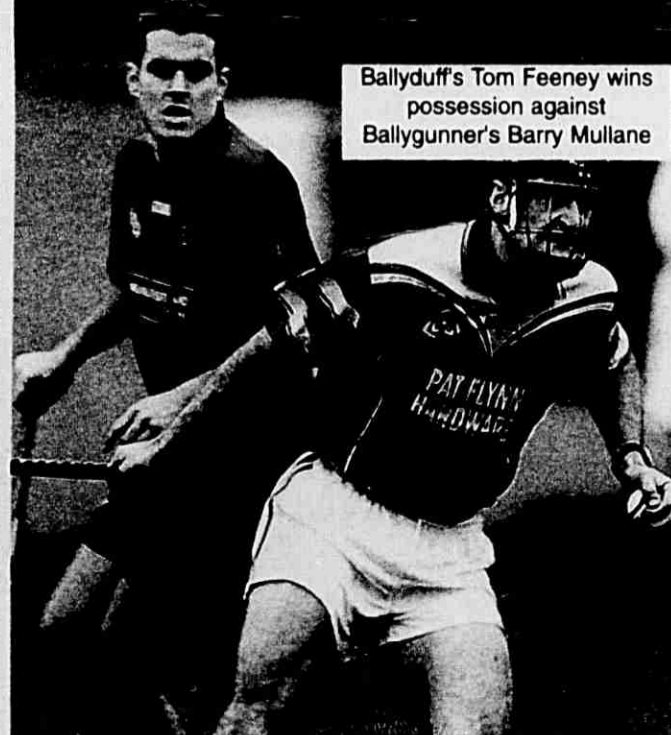
far west after a gap of twenty long years. Ballyduff won the County Title twenty five years ago and they won their second five years later. These games are in the records as outstanding exhibitions of hurling but having seen all their three victories in the County finals I am satisfied that none would compare with the display they put up before a seven thousand attendance at the city venue. They emerged from this contest as a club with a lot of new heroes and players whose future will take them into the headlines in the months and years ahead. They had a number of outstanding players and it would be invidious to name a number of them because this was a game in which everyone of the eighteen players played a magnificent part. Kearney who struck six magnificent points from play or Brendan Hannan who raised a total of nine white flags during his contribution to the victory. Many people will say that Tom Feeney must have surely played himself back on to the County team after a super display in defence.

Ballygunner will undoubtedly feel disappointed as even though they had praised the quality of Ballyduff's hurling in their preview of the game they made no secret of their expectations and their confidence. Realistically they were never in the game until the closing stages when they came from a seven points deficit to just two points in arrears. This was another occasion in the game when the challengers showed their character and fought back to put a safe margin between themselves and the Gunners.

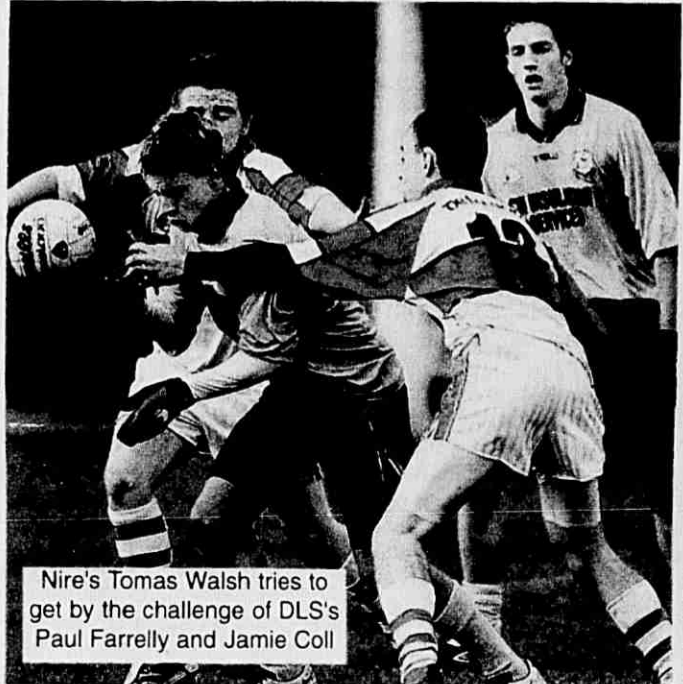

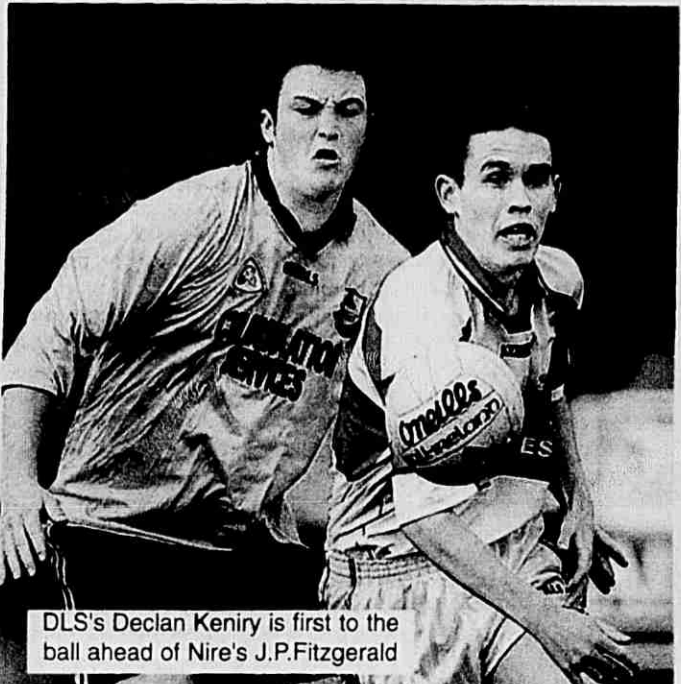

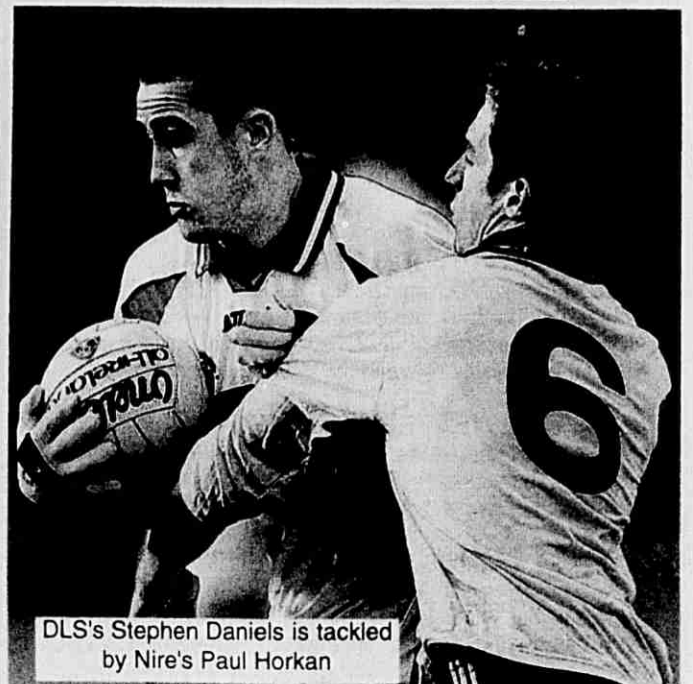

For Ballinacourty the result will see them in action again on next Sunday in a novel pairing with Ardmore in the county final.

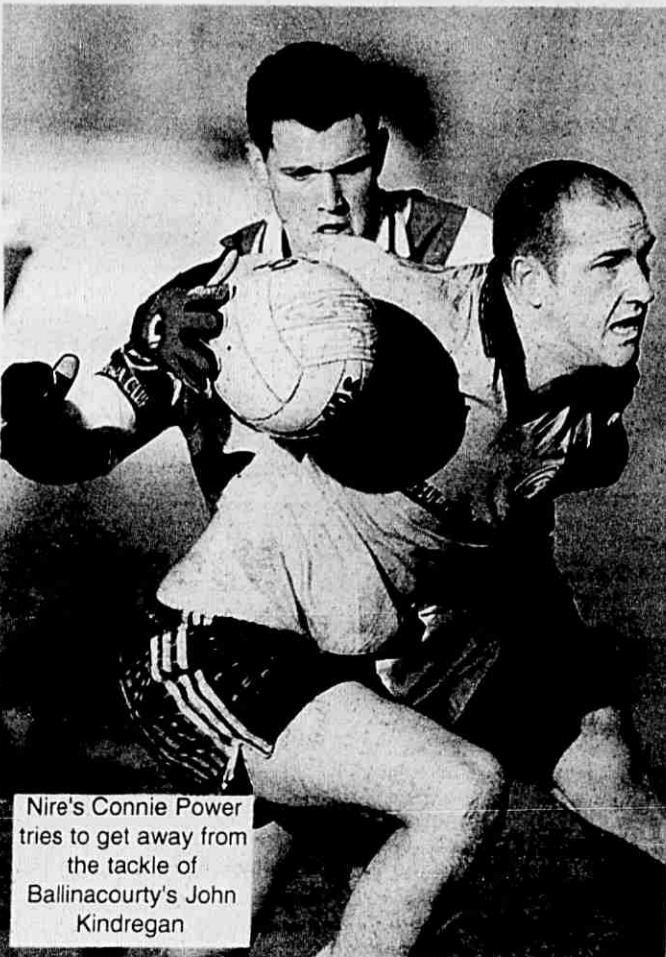
Second Half

Last week for round one as is now traditional we had a mass start with two groups going off, firstly the 2.7 mile group were got under way by league sponsor Pearse Moloney of All Rouser Sports and shortly after the 5.7 mile group were sent on there way by Rory Moloney.

The league handicap system kick's tonight for round two and it's expected that we will have the first of the runners off at 7.20 pm. 6. When your time is called you then begin your run.

7. While on the course please stay on the footpaths at all times and obey the instructions of the stewards, they are there for your personal safety.

8. When finishing your run, please stay in the finishing tunnel. Please do not exit the finishing tunnel by ducking under the tape. Doing so means that your time will not be recorded and it also distorts all the other runners finishing times.

9. Obeying all the above will ensure the smooth running of the Winter League for all involved.

10. Last but certainly not least, enjoy your run!!

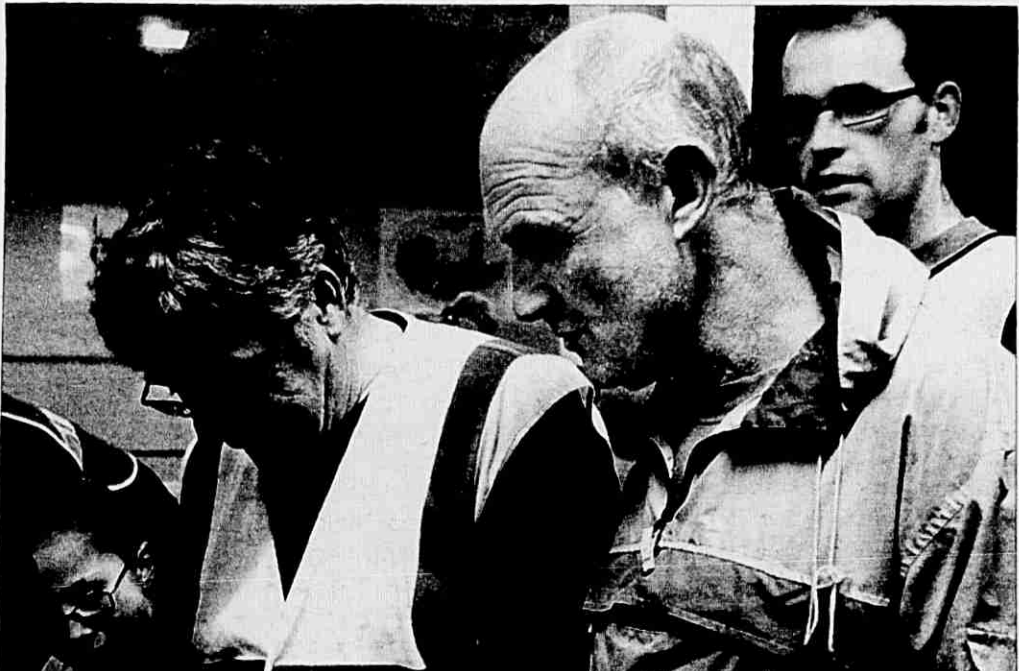

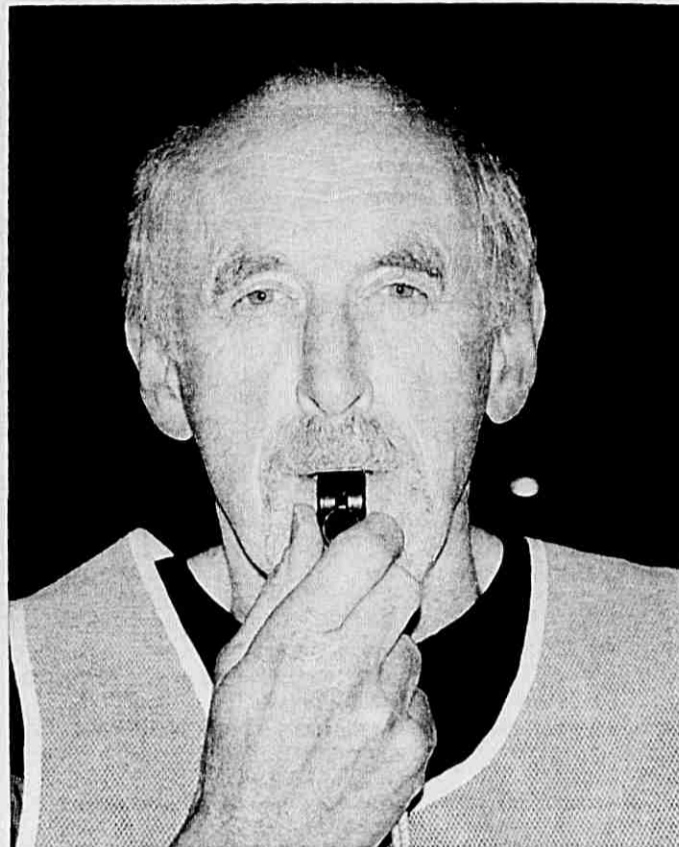

Benji Retains Paddy Joe Delaney Memorial Shield

TERRI GOUGH COMPLETES HER 50TH MARATHON AND TAKES ANOTHER NATIONAL GOLD MEDAL

Despite the fact that the club had athletes competing in marathons as far away as Chicago and as near as Amsterdam in the recent past couple of weeks we also had thirteen athletes running in The Dublin City Marathon last Bank Holiday Monday. The morning was ideal for marathon running with possibly the wind a tad too strong, nonetheless it was good and dry and temperatures were ideal. As has been the case since the untimely death of one of our esteemed members some years back the Paddy Joe Delaney Memorial Shield was up for contention among all West Waterford athletes at the race and hot favourite to retain his title from last year Benji Whelan duly obliged and retained the Paddy Joe Delaney Memorial Shield with a superb time of 2.44. The presentation of the shield will be made to Benji at tonight's Winter League. This time was a new personal best for the Kilmac physio who ran a very sensible race throughout. As predicted by many marathon debutant Declan McGrath had the preverbal blinder when he scaled around the course comfortably in a time of 2.53 a superb performance in this Declan's first attempt at the distance, but to be fair he had massive preparation for the race with no stone left unturned in his training programme.

Ray Dwyer needed to keep a cool head these last couple of weeks, when at a time which saw him running at his best ever, injury was his lot just weeks before he was due to run Amsterdam, but he worked hard at his rehabilitation and was back in action a week later after getting a late call up to compete in Dublin which was held one week after Amsterdam, he ran a time of 3.08. All in sundry were delighted for Ray after knowing the huge disappointment felt when getting injured at the 11th hour before Amsterdam, but patience prevailed in the end.

The club's well known tri-athlete Eoin O'Riordan proved to be in good shape and he pulled out all his triathlon experience with his pacing on the day coming home comfortably with a time of 3.17. Paul McManus, one of our city members, is as consistent as they come and he gave another solid performance with his time of 3.22.

We then saw four West Waterford A.C. athletes finish within two minutes of each other when Waterford based Liam Cuddihy was clocked at 3.25. No one knows the Dublin course like Anthony Dwyer who was completing his 39th marathon (most of them in Dublin) his time 3.26 indicates that he is running as well as ever. Cycling enthusiast Justin Coonan turned his recent attentions to marathon running and to good effect I might add as he also was clocked at 3.26 along with Paul Brunnock who will be delighted with his

new personal best time of 3.26 for the distance. All the above came through to finish in fine style. Another who battled with his share of injury worries was Abbeysides, Dublin based runner Martin Mullarkey, Martin was delighted to get around and he clocked 3.33. David Connors also missed quite an amount of training for this year's event but he still managed a good time of 3.55 on the day. We had two female athletes competing Terri Gough and Ann Moroney, I'm sure Ann won't mind if we say the day belong to Terri as she was in creditably running her 50th marathon. Competing in the over 60 category Terri covered the course in a time of 4.53. To add jam to the occasion for Terri she went on to take yet another national gold medal in the over 60 ladies category when she had two minutes to spare over her main rival Maggie Dunne Grange/Fermoy AC. Terri has run marathons all over the globe these past few years and for someone to complete 50 is a real milestone in the sport of marathon running congratulations Terri from all at the club and hears to the next 50. Her good friend Ann Moroney completed the course in a very good 4.30 and raised a large sum of money for a local charity into the bargain. Well done to you also Ann.

The story of the race itself up front saw Russia's Aleksey Sokolov win in a time of two hours, nine minutes and seven seconds. The Russian's time was the fastest recorded in the 28 runnings of the event, and it is also the fastest time ever run on Irish soil. Sokolov, who also won the race last year, finished 90 seconds clear of Briton Thomas Abyu, while the leading Irishman was Michael O'Connor, he came home in 14th place in 2:25:48 secs. O'Connor claimed the Irish Championship as a result of being the first native man to cross the finishing line. There was also Russian success in the women's race, with Alina Ivanova winning in 2:29:20secs - two minutes clear of the rest of the field. The Russian lady also won the race last year. The leading Irish lady finisher was Pauline Curley in ninth place, claiming the Irish Championship in a time of 2:42:30sec.

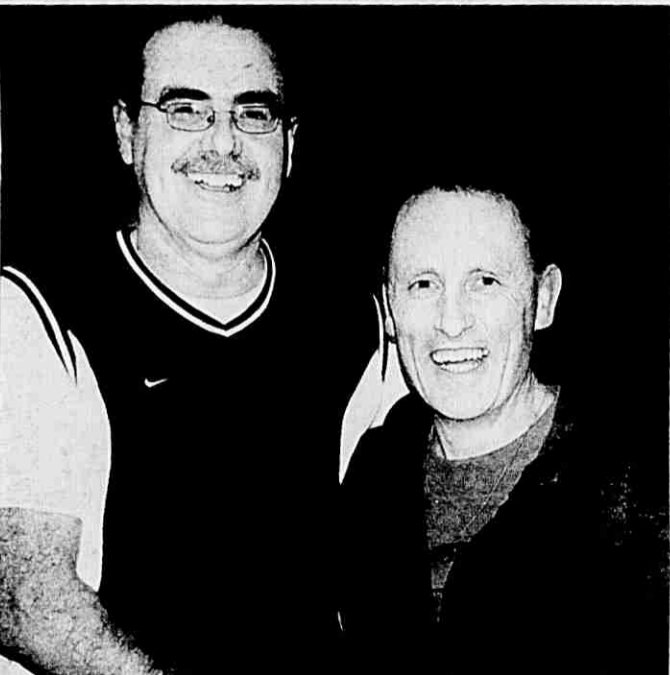

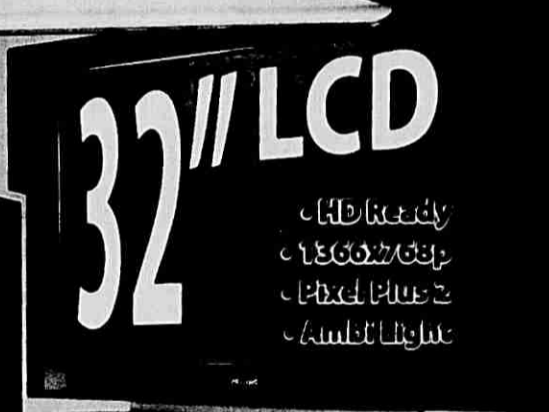
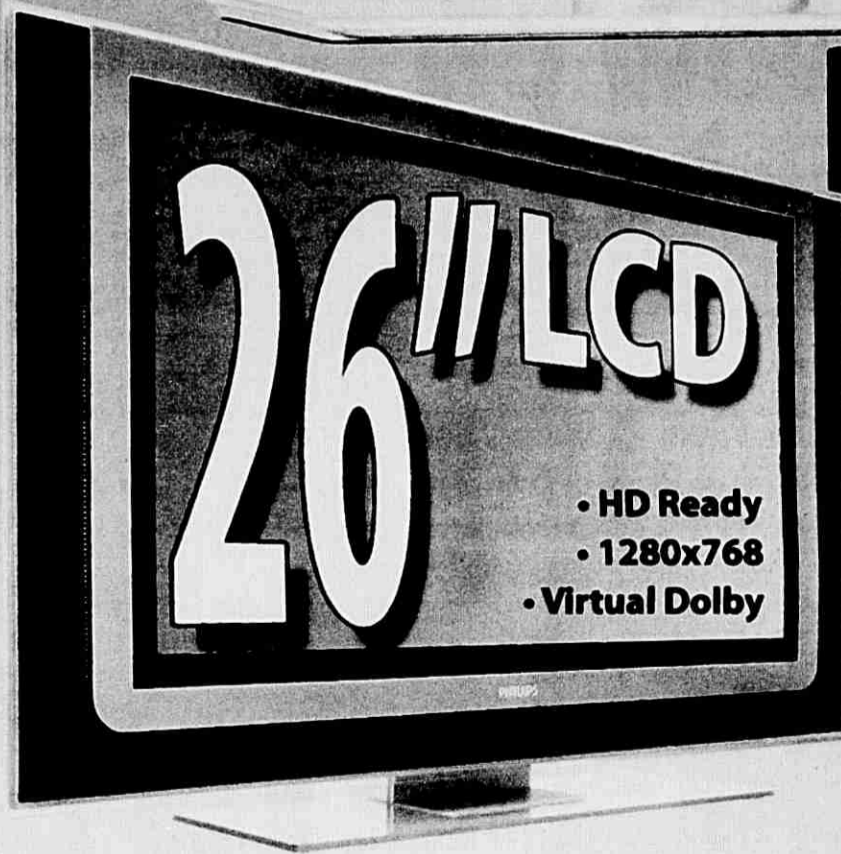
