He admitted that the driver had told him immediately on being asked what he was charging for the bread and that there was no attempt made to hide the fact. He

100 LIVES LOST IN A COLLIERY. DISTRESSING SCENES.

A terrible explosion, resulting in the loss of 160 lives, occurred at the Podmore Hall Colliery North Staffs, on Saturday. Of the 247 men who descended the pit only 87 have been recovered alive, and distressing scenes were witnessed at the pit's mouth, where anxious relatives awaited news of the utombed men. The King and Queen and the Secretary of State have sent messages of yangathy to the relatives of the victims, and Distress Fund has been opened by the layor of Newcastle-under-Lyne.

The day shift went down at 6 a.m. on Sat. and should have finished for the half-holi-day at 4 p.m. At 9.30 a.m. the explosion oc-curred, and the Rescue Brigade and doctors and ambulances were quickly in attendance. Forty-seven men from seams not connected with the explosion made their way out unsaided. Near the explosion men partially gassed pressed forward, and finding others bring about struggling for breath assisted

Experts had no hope of the missing men.

of the missing men is Charles E. Jones, who for gallantry on the occasion of an explosion :

T. Brockley, one of the survivors, said he saw the men rolling about in water and he palied them into the road and put some alwayers under their heads and stayed with them until the rescue party arrived. Two men, E. Johnson and T. Walker, escaped after helping each other to struggle along.

W. Taylor said he saw a flame rushing towards him and he dropped behind a wagoon. The flame passed over him, but the fireman with him was killed on the spot.
