Dungarvan Observer. SATURDAY, JANUARY 26, 1918. Dungarvan Urban Council.

Mr. P. Sexton, J.P., in the chair. Also present—Messrs. M. Byrne, J. Curran, W. Stack, M. Brennan, Capt. Foley, J. Walsh, M. J. Casey and T. Flynn.

The total on the pay sheet for the week was £14 3s. 7d. Of this £12 12s. 11d. was expended on the streets, the town's improvement, sanitary, 13s. 8d., and artisans' dwellings, 7s.

Water Supply. Rev. Mr. Johnson, the Rector, Abbey-side, wrote to the council informing them that the water supply at the Rectory was a source of great inconvenience to him, as after 8 p.m. there was no water to be had.

Mr. McGrath—I think Mr. Biggs did something to the water supply in question before he left the town. He made a new connection on the Glenline pipe, but that is only a 1 1/2 inch pipe, and there are a good many branches off it. I believe the cause of the shortage is due to the fact that the pipe is corroded.

Capt. Foley—Mr. Biggs did do something, and I remember that he brought a section of the pipe here and it was all checked up. There are four big rat-pipes in this townland, and they all have the same complaint as regards their water supply.

The council referred the matter to the engineer. Mrs. and Dr. M. F. Moloney wrote expressing their thanks to Mr. M. J. Casey for the kind resolution of sympathy proposed by him and passed by the council on the death of the late Rev. Father O'Farrell, Holy Innocent's New York.

Mr. John O'Farrell, Ashbourne, Lismore, also wrote and thanked the council for the resolution of sympathy passed by them on the death of his brother, Rev. Father O'Farrell.

War Bonus. The L.G.B. wrote asking the council to inform them in what capacity the war bonus was lately granted to Mr. Egan Walsh, whether as that of Town Inspector or as Sanitary Officer. If in the former case they wished to inform the council that they had no jurisdiction over the salaries of Town Inspectors.

Clerk—The salary was granted to him as Town Inspector. Mr. Byrne—What is it then in what capacity it was granted? Wouldn't they like to get a war bonus themselves? Capt. Foley—They would, and they are getting it.

The Clerk was directed to supply the necessary information. Ireland's Food Supply. A resolution was received from the City Hall, Dublin, which pointed out the absolute necessity for retaining all the food there is at present in the country, and asking the council to furnish information as to the quantities of the different classes of food in the country.

Mr. Curran—The Chairman and Mr. Curran—10 bags of sugar. Mr. Casey—20 acres of land—the man that could feed the whole country. Mr. Curran—Are there any free tickets? (Laughter.)

Capt. Foley—Is that the love you have for your country? Mr. Casey—Yes, and 500 acres of land (laughter).

Mr. Curran—Was there ever a local Food Committee appointed here? Clerk—I don't think so, but I believe there is one in Waterford.

Mr. Byrne—The working classes are not at all properly looked after regarding their food supply. There is no one to look after the interests of the labourer. What is the working man going to do if all the food is shipped out of the country. It is a shame, and would advise every working man in the town to go down to the station and if he sees there is any food being sent out of the country let him prevent it and let the people see that he is not going to starve. That is the only way to deal with the food question, as far as the working man is concerned.

A resolution of a similar character was received from the Cork Corporation, which again pointed out the necessity of retaining the food at present in the country. It exhorted the council to use every means in its power to attain this end, and if they could not they may in the near future be confronted with famine.

The Clerk was directed to supply the information referred to and send same to the proper quarters. Corn Mills. A resolution was received from the Galway Urban Council calling on the Government to repair the disused corn mills throughout the country so that they could be used to ensure a sufficient supply of food for the people of the country.

The resolution was unanimously adopted. A resolution was also received from the Corktown U.D.C. calling upon the farmers and plot-holders throughout the country to increase their tillage during the coming year.

This was also adopted. Increase of Wages. Nicholas Koolan and Elze Turpey wrote applying for an increase of 2s. per week. All the other men employed by the board had recently got this increase of 2s., but they had not been amongst them. They were at present receiving 22s. per week. The increase of 2s. per week was unanimously granted.

Housing Scheme. Mr. Biggs, borough surveyor, wrote from the Royal Barracks, Dublin, and stated that with regard to the housing scheme he believed the matter was at present in the hands of Mr. J. F. Williams, solicitor. At the request of Mr. Williams he had recently furnished him with site plans of plots intended to be used for the purposes of building. He had heard nothing further since then, but he was prepared to take any action in the matter that might be necessary. He thought, however, the best thing to be done was to acquire the land.

Clerk—I have shown this letter to Mr. Williams and he has told me that he is doing all he can in the matter. Mr. Casey—What more can he do?

MILITARY CROSS FOR DUNGARVAN OFFICER. Capt. George H. Cooke, R.G.A., son of Mr. T. W. Cooke, Dungarvan, has been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous bravery in the field. His brother, Capt. J. H. Cooke, has already been awarded the Military Medal for bravery. We wish these officers further good luck and honors.

Local Happenings.

MR. P. SEXTON, J.P., SELECTED MAYOR FOR THE FIFTH TIME.

At the annual meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council on Wednesday last the following members were present—Messrs. P. Sexton, J.P., W. Stack, M. Byrne, John Walsh and T. Flynn. Mr. Walsh proposed the re-election of Mr. Sexton as chairman, and paid a high tribute to his worth to the town and every interest for its welfare during his four years' chairmanship.

EXTRA POLICE.—"Inquires"—There were a lot of extra police in Dungarvan for the past few weeks. We do not know what they will cost for their upkeep while here, but we know the ratcatchers will have to foot the bill.

HIGHER RATES.—Though the Urban and Rural Councils in this county have increased their rates by five to ten per cent., and that the expenditure has been kept very low, it is hard on the ratepayers to find that the Assessor estimates an increase of 10 per cent. over last year. The County Council estimate is not so high.

MORE EXPENSE.—At Wednesday's meeting of the County Waterford Town Council the estimate for administrative expenses for the coming financial year was £230. Last year the estimate was only £190, and when the new Pension Scheme was adopted it was stated at the County Council it would mean an expense. It is hoped the members of the County Council will question this estimate at their next meeting.

ALLEGED LARCENY OF A SOLDIER'S RIFLE.—A tremendous reception was given to Messrs. P. V. L. and G. L. on their arrival in Dungarvan on Monday last to be tried for the above offence. An enormous crowd met them at the station, and the Volunteers and Cumann Na nGaedheal were lined up and marched before the broke in which the prisoners were being conveyed to the County Jail in custody of the young men who were being released from the County Jail in custody of the young men at the station. A large Republican flag was attached to the rear of the train, and it waved joyfully as the train moved on its journey. The court proceedings in the public were excluded, but Messrs. E. Doe, President Sinn Féin Club, D. Fahy and P. Mulcahy were present. The case is due to come on again on Monday.

DUNGARVAN STRIKE.—The strike at the Blundell Dairy has been settled, and all the men returned to work last Saturday. We hope this is the last of such strikes we will have for a long day, and that employers and employees will work together in that good-will manner in which has been hitherto so successful in Dungarvan. Mr. J. Egan, C.C., was instrumental in getting the men back to work.

DEATH OF MISS MARY KEELLY, RALLYBANOAGUE.—We regret to announce the death of Miss Mary Keelley, daughter of Mr. John Keelley, D.C., Ballynabogue, Kilmacshomus, who took place on Tuesday last at the early age of 30 years. She was a most gentle disposition, and all who knew her admired her for her many noble qualities. She got into delicate health some time ago and peacefully she passed away fortified by the rites of the Church and to the great regret of her parents, family and wide circle of friends. In her father, Mr. John Keelley, deep sympathy will be extended, as he has already had his share of suffering through bereavement from his loss in Liscough some years ago. R.I.P. The funeral to Mollodrig, where the internment took place on Thursday, was largely attended, and was a tribute to the respect in which the family of the deceased are held in these parts.

EXIT CARSON.—Mr. Edward Carson has resigned the War Cabinet and Sir James Craig has resigned the Treasury of the Household. We don't know why except of the grounds of the exigencies of the Government. There is a resolution before the American Senate to loan £200,000,000 to Ireland, which is said to be unanimously passed, and another proposal to invest £200,000,000 American money in Irish industries, and possibly that may have something to do with the "Exit" Carson's exit from the War Cabinet.

TO ANONYMOUS CORRESPONDENTS.—We have received some 8 or 10 letters this week on various subjects of public concern, but as the writers' names were not given, we cannot publish same.

SOUTH ARMAIGH EMERGENCY.—The contest for South Armaigh was opened this week. Dr. McCarthy has been selected. Now, by the Irish Party, Mr. Donnelly, M.P., Unionist candidate always named up for this seat, as there are nearly 2,000 Unionist votes in the constituency, but no Unionist will be nominated this time.

AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE.—At the Conference in the Grosvenor Hotel, Dublin, convened by the Western County Agricultural Committee, Mr. Thos. Flynn, J.P., C.C., Two-Mile-Booie, represented the U.G. Waterford. On Tuesday next there will be an All-Ireland Conference held in Dublin under the auspices of the Department. Dr. Dermott, J.P., Chairman County Committee Agriculture; John O'Dwyer, Secretary, do., and Mr. Thomas Byrne, J.P., C.C., will represent the Co. Waterford.

DEATH OF AN IRISH LADY IN LONDON.

We deeply regret to announce the death of Mrs. Daly, Hammersmith, London. Mrs. Daly was descended from one of the oldest families of Dunalloy—the Forrests of Focmout, Co. Cork, where she was born in 1830. Having married into one of the most respected neighboring families—the Doyes of Kanturk—at an early age, she and her husband went to reside in London, where they occupied an influential position. Though she spent the greater part of her life in London, she was intensely Irish to the heart's core, and to the last had the greatest affection for Ireland, her happiness and opportunity.
